The Rererend Jesse Iowis Jackson. Rec. Jackson touched the hearts of so many as he spoke about the importance of coter registration. Every black persom, eligible, should be "a carl carrying registered coter. "If Mandella can sit in jail for twentysix yedrs for the right, then no one
can say they have self-respect if they are not a card carrying regis. tered coter," said Jackson. He also reminded us of the four little black girls that died in a church in Alabama and that Ree Dr. Martin L. King uas shot to death for the right to vote.
"If dogs can raise their puppies ... if cuts can raise their kittens ... if eagles can take care of their raglets until they can fly. . . and if snakes can watch their little suakes "il the!! shed," thundered
