

The Founder

James E. Shepard was born November 3, 1875, in Raleigh, the son of Reverend Samuel Augustus and Harriet Whitted Shepard. He received his undergraduate and professional training at Shaw University, from which he graduated in 1894. In 1895, Dr. Shepard married Annie Day Robinson. They had two daughters, Marjorie and Annie.

In 1910, Dr. Shepard founded this institution as a center for religious training and named it the National Religious Training School and Chautauqua. Later it was renamed the National Training School. In its early years, the school was kept afloat by the philanthropy of Dr. Shepard's friends from both the North and South. When the General Assembly of North Carolina provided support in 1923, the name changed once again to become Durham State Normal School.

Dr. Shepard faced great difficulties in keeping the doors open. He traveled many miles, made many physical and financial sacrifices, and always managed to uplift his race as he went on. He had faith and believed that his faith would pay off in abundant dividends.

In 1925, the institution became North Carolina College for Negroes, the first state-supported, liberal arts college for blacks in the United States. Its first four-year college class graduated in 1929. In 1947, the college's name was changed to North Carolina College at Durham. The 1969 General Assembly made the institution of the state's regional universities and changed the name, finally, to North Carolina Central University.

At his time of death, Dr. Shepard had guided this university from its humble beginnings to great heights in higher education. He left a memorial of service and achievement which may be emulated by all persons connected with North Carolina Central University.

North Carolina Central University Museum Of Art

The North Carolina Central University's Art Museum had it's beginnings in a small room of the Old Fine Arts building. Later it moved to a larger space in the Old Cafeteria building and finally to the building in which it now resides. Today, the Art Museum exists as a separate facility that is comprised of a main gallery and offices.


The North Carolina Central University Art Museum was dedicated on Founders Day, November 4, 1977. The facility was designed to house the University's growing art collection and temporary exhibitions. The museum represents the culmination of a dream that can be traced back to the earliest days of art instruction on the campus.

Throughout the history of the Museum there has been an emphasis on the presentation of art exhibits that expose the campus community to a broad array of visual art forms. Particularly, the Museum has featured the works of the all-too-often overlooked minority artists.

In addition to special exhibits, the Museum maintains a permanent collection. The main focus of the Museum is African-American art. However, it's collection is by no means limited to African-American art. It includes European, African, and Oceanic works.

So, for keeping our heritage alive, hats-off to North Carolina Central University's Museum of Art because they have it going on.






Registration

So you had better preregister or be prepared to stand in the broiling sun, soaking rain or freezing cold. Because you will be in long registration lines.




Faculty And Staff




"Now wait a minute. I strongly disagree."




TOWING! WHO DOES IT BENEFIT?


"Due to the lack of parking space, towing has been enforced on the Campus of North Carolina Central University this year," Security reported.

The fraternity was incorporated October 28, 1914. Omega Psi Phi was founded by men who adopted the ideals of "Manbood, Scholarship, Perseverance, and Uplift" as their four Cardinal Principles. The Brothers of Omega Psi Phi adhere to the motto: "Friendship is essential to the soul."

The Mighty Tau Psi Chapter was founded here at NCCU on October 28, 1932 by W.D. Hill, W.G. Pearson and Jimmie Jones. Omega Psi Phi is the largest black greek letter organization. The fraternity is composed of an elite group of men dedicated to the improvement of society and the betterment of all mankind.

Focusing on the contemporary issues which plaque our society, Farrakhan made the observations that our educational, and medical systems are ineffective.





He noted that our teachers are unable to teach our children, our medical doctors are unable to cure our ills, and our economists are unable to solve our nation's financial problems. Yet, each year our universities continue to graduate individuals called teachers, doctors and economists. He challenged our historically Black university to become a vehicle for the liberation, rather than the continued suppression of the Black man.

Farrakhan concluded with a call to Islam as the "true religion."

If you do something embarassing and somebody sees you, just admit it and hand 'em over.



The royal procession and the crowning of Ms. Teresa Walker, as the Miss NCCU 1989-90 shall he remembered by all as "The Splender of Virtue."



Socially and geographically, the queens came from a variety of backgrounds. Their hometowns ranged from New York City to Coats, North Carolina.



Fight the Power



Despite the loss of two great future NCCU Hall of Famers, Robert Massey and Earl "Air" Harvey, the Eagles continued their destruction of opponents with a tenacious defense. Led by the All-American candidate, Harry Fuller; the aggressive, hardnose play of Rodney "Kiwi" Edmonds; the tough-man tactics of Willie Holmes and Howard University implant, John Royster; our Eagle defense became the CIAA's #1 and the nation's #2 stingiest defense.



The Eagles finished their season with a 5-5 record.





The Coach

Henry C. "Hank" Lattimore completed his seventh season as head mentor of the North Carolina Central University football program. Since arriving on the NCCU campus in 1978, Lattimore's teams have posted a 63-42-2 overall record (.598) and a 57-15-1 record (.788) in CIAA competition. During the Lattimore era, the Eagles have won the CIAA Football Championship (1980), claimed the CIAA Southern Division crown (1981 & 1982) and have been Southern Division runner-up four times. In 1988, the Eagles advanced to the quarterfinal round of the NCAA Division II Playoffs, posting a 9-2-1 record, the best since 1972 (8-1-1). Prior to his arrival at NCCU, Lattimore was head coach at Morgan State University where his team won a MEAC Championship (1976).

Season To Celebrate

As expected, the season for our men's basketball team was nothing less than outstanding. With an overall record of 23 and 5, (13-0 at home), the Eagles maintained their status as a force to be reckoned with in the CIAA.

In the season's finale, the Mighty Eagles soared past the plodding Winston-Salem State Rams to capture their third consecutive CIAA Southern Division title. During the game, the Eagles trailed 43 to 40 with 5:22 left to play. Senior guards, Jeffrey "Blade" Hayes and Antoine "Ice" Sifford, made four big offensive plays and the Eagles seized a 49 to 43 lead with 1:39 left to play.

McDougald Gymnasium erupted with pandemonium unusual even for our highspirited Eagles when Derrick Leak blocked Jonathan Hardin's driving baseline jumper.











Excitement bounced off the rafters as the crowd rose to its feet chanting "NCCU!!!" As the letters echoed through the air, those fighting birds of prey turned up the heat. "... it's hot in here! There must be an Eagle in the atmosphere!"

The victory over the Winston-Salem State Rams marked the Eagles' 13th straight home win and concluded the fifth 20-game plus season for Head Coach Michael Bernard. This game also evoked an outstanding player accomplishment. Jeffrey Hayes set an NCCU single-season record with 111 assists.

This year's edition of the Fighting Eagles journyed to the CIAA Tournament in Norfolk, VA. and the NCAA South Regional Finals in Lakeland, FL. In Norfolk, the Eagles were eliminated in the semifinals losing to Norfolk State, 56 to 59. In Lakeland, they lost a hard-fought battle that went into overtime with Jacksonville State, 88 to 95. After two consecutive appearances in the NCAA Tournament, the Mighty Eagles of NCCU are now known nationwide.

EDITOR'S COMMENTS

While in office as Editor of the Eagle Yearbook, I learned not only how to do layouts, edit copy and produce an annual, but I also discovered North Carolina Central University in a whole new light. Never did I imagine the difficulty involved in evoking cooperation and support from the student body and administration.

When I joined the staff in 1987, the last yearbook produced was in 1984, but we (the staff) published all those back issues and the 1987 edition. We were a team then and our teamwork was very effective. In 1989, however, all that changed. Most of the faculty and administration, as well as the student body, did not take their pictures. When asked wby, the answers ranged from, "I don't have time" to "My hair just doesn't look right." Taking a picture took only 10 minutes and seniors wore caps. Who would know their hair wasn't right. How could this staff or any other staff put together a "good" yearbook when only half of the university bothered to take pictures?

I want to thank those who stuck by me those long nights, weekends and this summer until the book was completed. I also want to thank those who took their pictures and helped us in our efforts to get this 89-90 Eagle Yearbook into everyone's hands.




