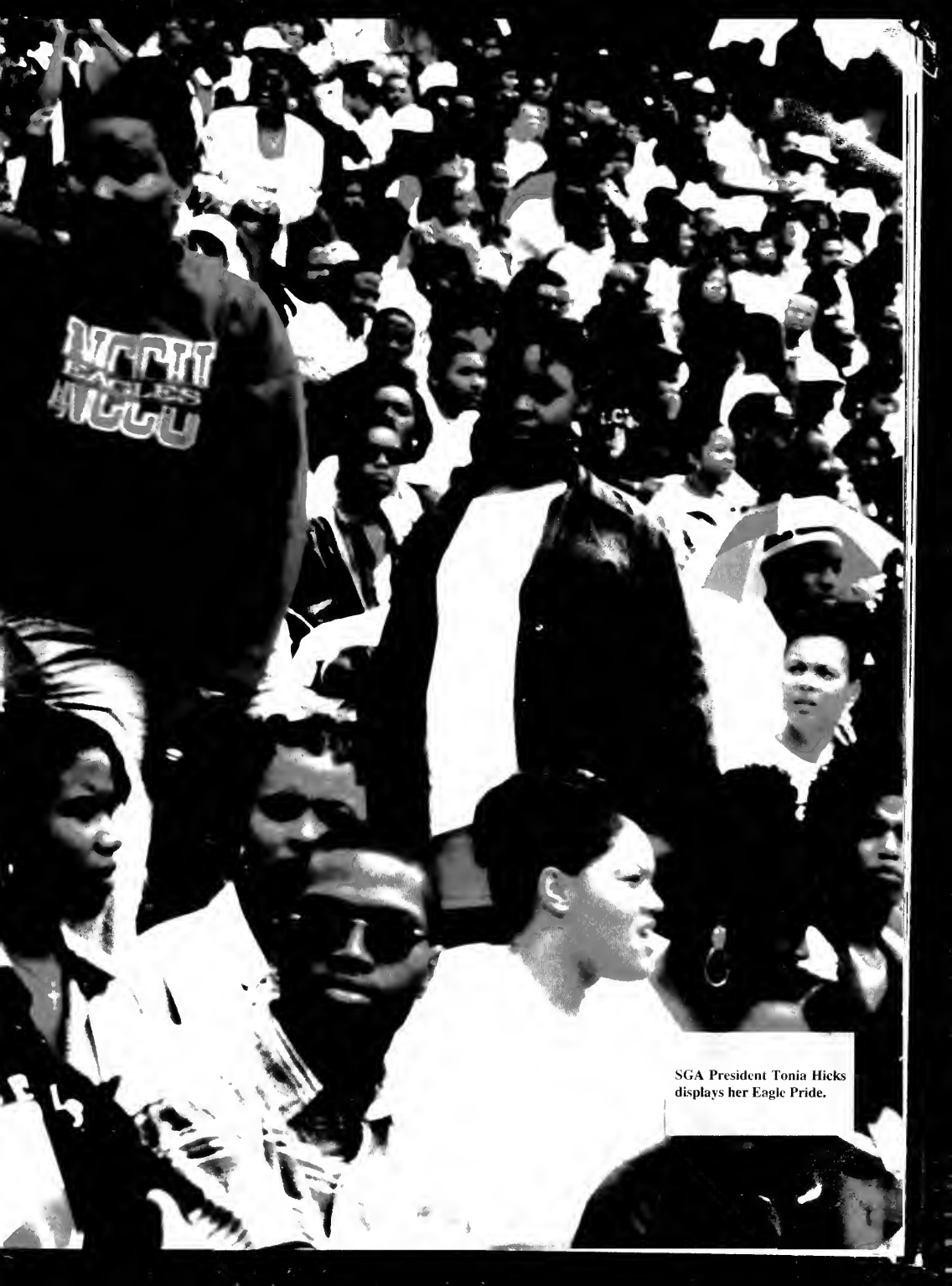

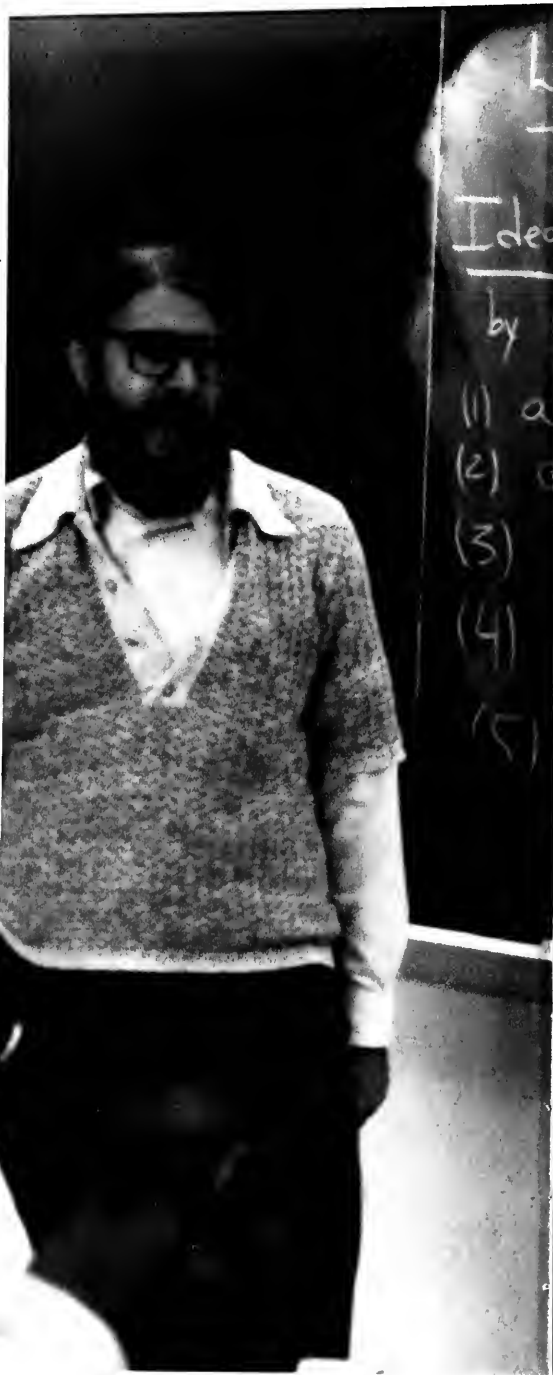

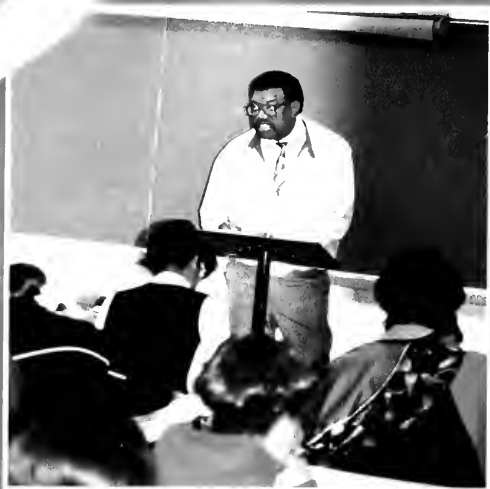

The Chancellor places academics as his top priority. During the 1993-94 academic year, Chancellor Chambers established new admission requirements for admission to NC Central University. He set a goal to obtain a 900 SAT Average Score for the 1994-95 academic year. The SAT average score for the Freshmen Class admitted to NCCU for the 1994-95 academic year was 879. In spite of the odds, NC Central admitted one of the top freshmen classes in the history of the institution. One of the Chancellor's goals is to make North Carolina Central the top liberal arts institution.

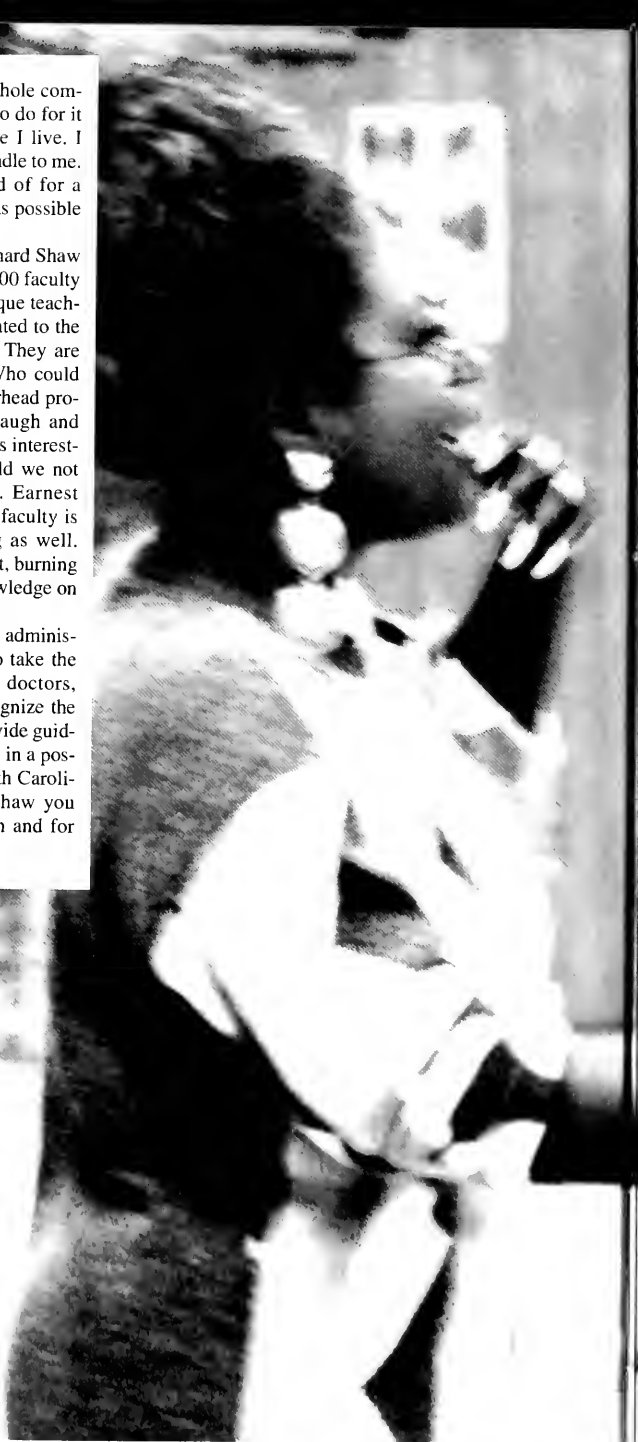

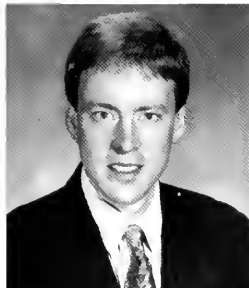

Junelle, who represents our university so well, certainly does so in the spirit of truth and service.



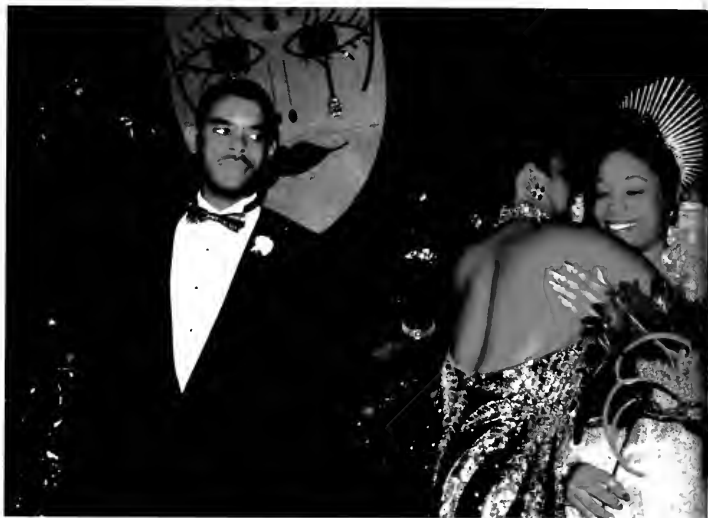

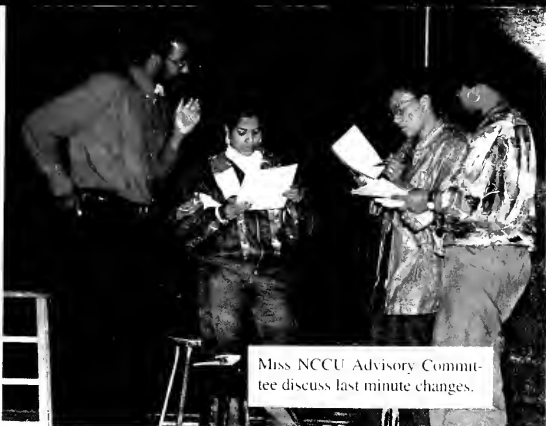

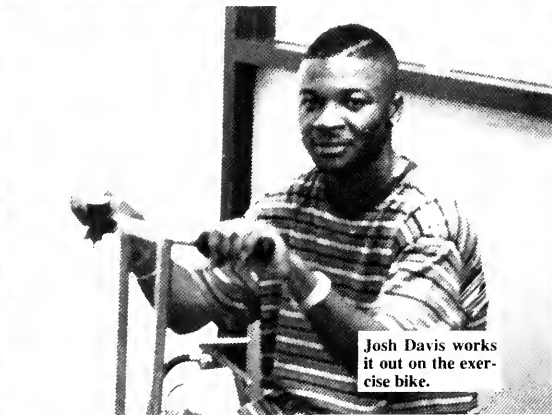

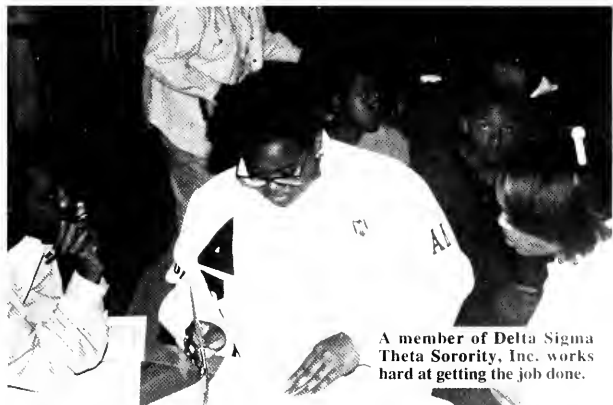

The National Pan-Hellenic Council, Incorporated was organized in 1930 on the campus of Howard University, located in Washington, D.C. The idea of the council was initiated by Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc. in 1921. The council's purpose is to ensure that all inter-collegiate African American Greek-lettered Fraternities/Sororities have unity in principles, thought, and mutual action.

The National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC) is composed of these eight National Predominately African American Greek-lettered Organizations: Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc., Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, Inc., Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., Phi Beta Sigma, Inc., Omega Psi Phi, Inc.

The NPHC was established at North Carolina Central University March 28, 1955. Since its inception, the council has made numerous contributions to the Durham and NCCU community. The Council's motto for 1994-95 was "Unity: The Scope of Our Existence". The council supports and embraces the needs of the African American community.

One illustrious member of this fraternity is our very own — Chancellor Julius Chambers.

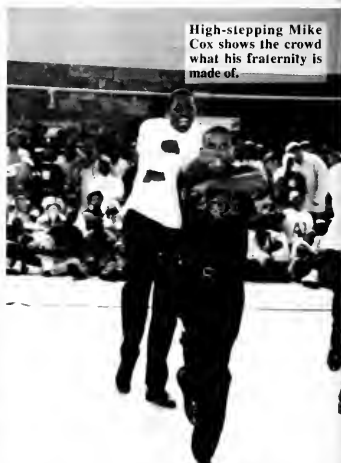

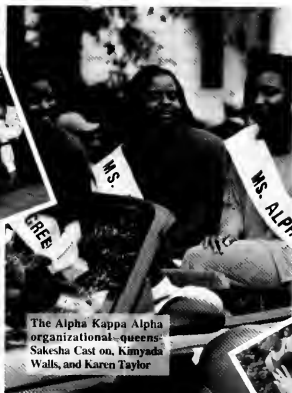

The first men's Greek letter social organization to be organized on a Black college campus was Omega Psi Phi Fraternity. Founded at Howard University in Washington, D.C. on November 17, 1911, the fraternity boasts over 325 chapters and 110,000 members. The founders: Oscar J. Cooper, Ernest E. Just, Frank Love, and Frank Coleman, began this organization on the basis of four cardinal principles; Manhood, Scholarship, Perversance, and Uplift.

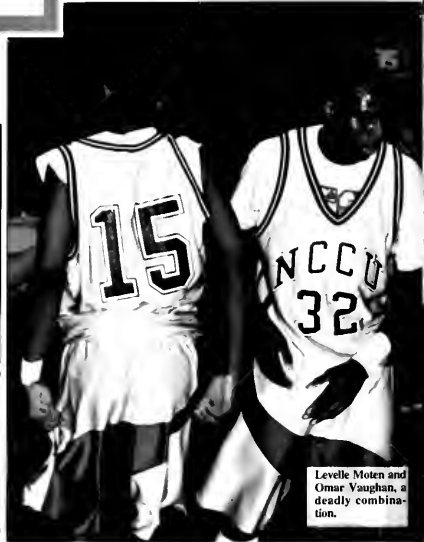

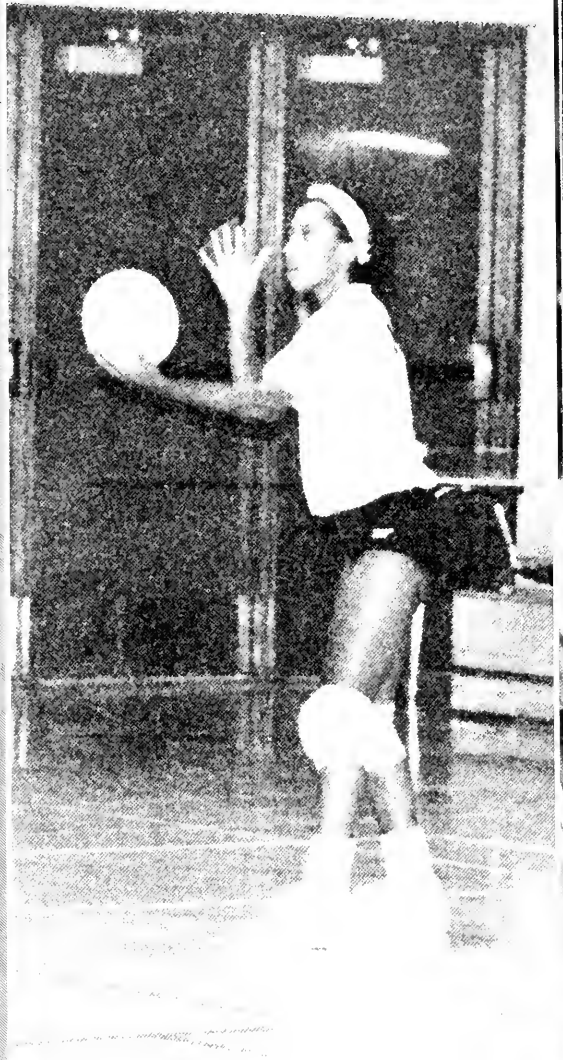
Doing it Up At NCCU

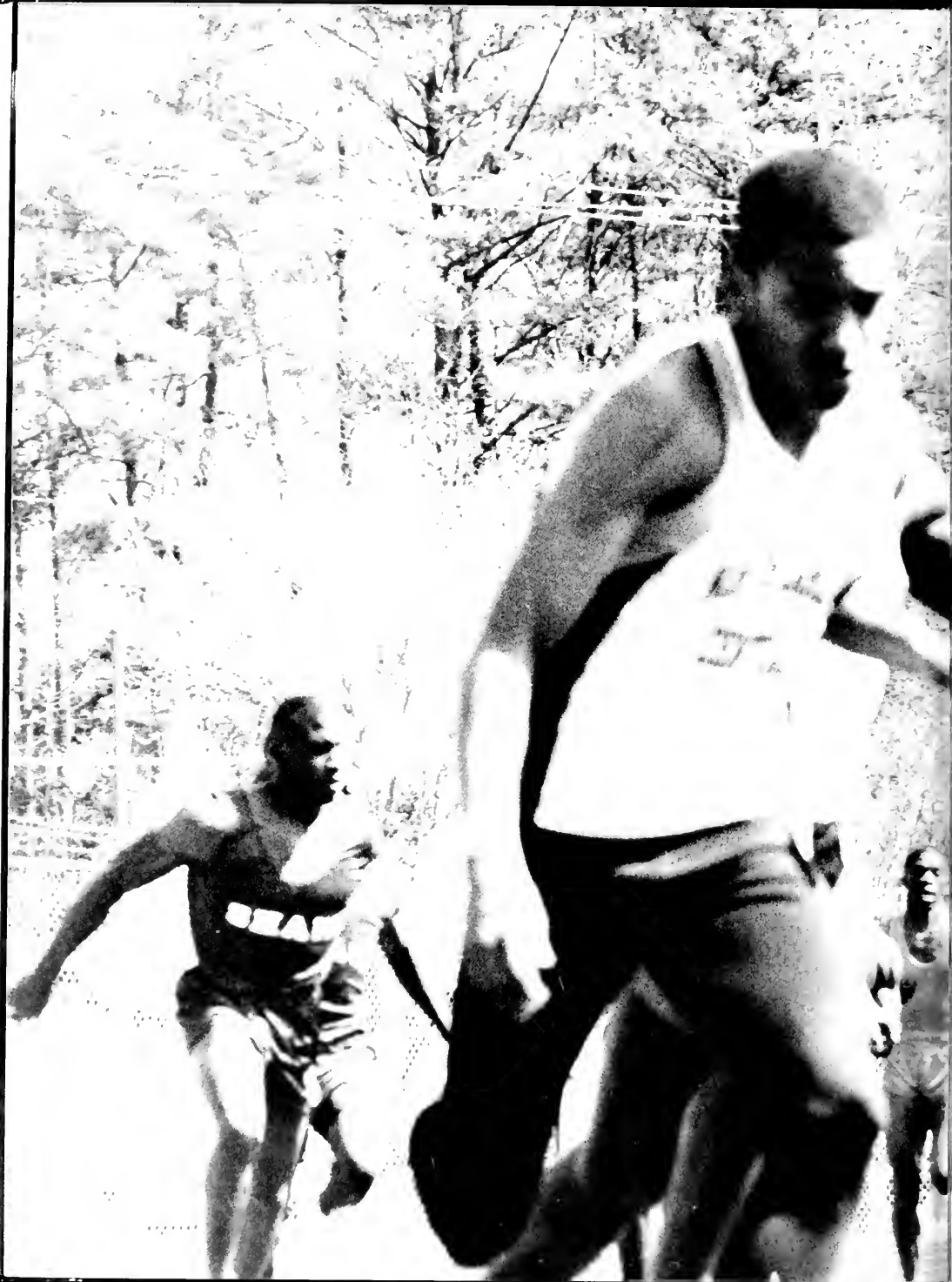



The vision of an educational institution of higher learning for blacks was born in 1910 by a great man of faith, perseverance and diligence, Dr. James Edward Shepard. After receiving his degree at Shaw University, he founded this institution whose curriculum was centered around religious training. Therefore it was named the National Religious Training School and Chataqua, after which it became the National Training School. However, Dr. Shepard's vision surely didn't end there. After soliciting the support of North Carolina's General Assembly in 1923, the name was then changed to Durham State Normal School. Like many other African-Americans of his time, Dr. Shepard endured several difficulties, he came upon many stumbling blocks both financial and physical. The attribute of Dr. Shepard that served as his source of strength was his never-ending faith. It was by this faith that in 1925 this institution became North Carolina College for Negroes, the United States first state supported, liberal arts college for blacks.

Once again the college experienced another change in 1947, as it became North Carolina College at Durham. In the year 1969, the General Assembly called for the final change as it stands today on it's sloping hills and verdant green, North Carolina Central University.

Although Dr. James E. Shepard is no longer with us in the physical sense, his vision still lives on. He allowed his wings to spread in order that we may soar far and beyond the call of our educational and community-oriented duties. For we must remember that ... "The Eagle is No Ordinary Barnyard Fowl."

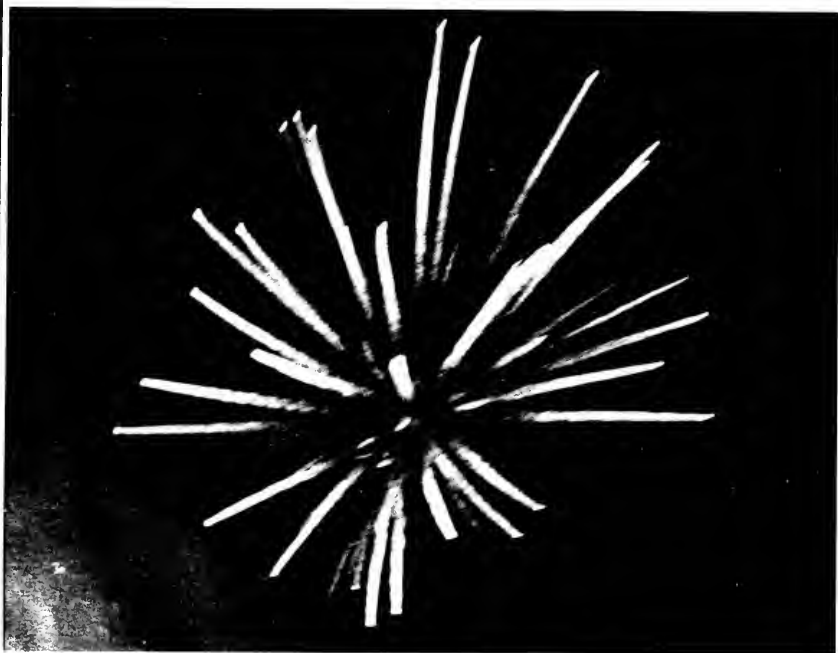















THE ALMA MATER - 'DEAR OLD N.C.C.'

Our Alma Mater N.C.C.

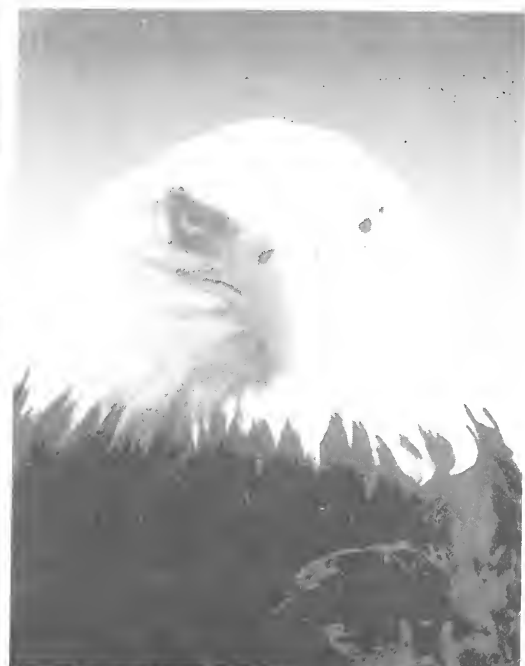
Then Rah! Rah! Rah! For our colors so gay!

Our Alma Mater, N.C.C.

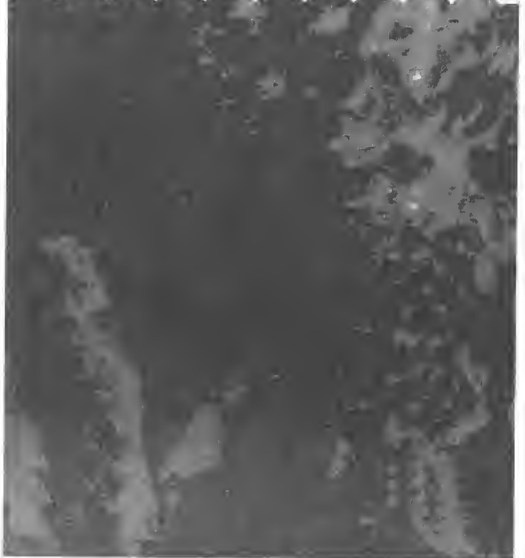


Senior, Jimmy Monroe takes final walk through campus in route to Commencement 1995. The day has come to depart Dear Ole N.C.C.
