The 18th of the 12th Month 1638

The Town Records of the Lands and Meadows that lyeth in the Bounds of the Town of Reading either as they were given by the Town of Lynn; or as they were given by the Town of Reading; or as they have been purchased of others

The land was given him as appears by Lynn Town Books in the year 1638

The Lands and Meadows of Nicholas Brown as they were given him by the Town of Lynn; and as they were given him by the Town of Reading, and as he hath purchased of other men. Given him by the Town of Lynn Two Hundred and ten acres of land lying within the Bounds of Reading, And is bounded on the East side of it with the great River - on the South side with the land of Bonifas Buxton, on the west side of it with the land of Leicut Thomas Marshall and Jeremiah Swain, and on the North of it with the meadow commonly called the Wigwags

Also purchased of George Taylor of Lynn in the year 1642 fourscore and ten acres of land now situate in the bounds of Reading, and is bounded with land of Capt Richard Walker and John Pool and Zachariah Fitch on the East and West and on the North by the land of Hannaniah Parker and on the South by the land of John Bacheller; This is one Thirty acres of it

Another Thirty acres of it, bounded by land of Edward Taylor and John Bacheller on the North and South and on the Great Pond on the west, and on the East by the said Thirty acres and Thomas Parker

The other Thirty acres lying between Edward Taylor and Capt Richard Walker on the South and East and on the West by the Great Pond and on the North by the land of the said Nicholas Brown

1647

Also purchased of Hugh Burt of Lynn the 30th of the first month in the year 1647 fourscore Acres of Land lying within the Bounds of Reading, and is bounded by the land of Leicut Thomas Marshall on the East, and by the land of John Pool on the North, and by the Great Pond on the West, and the land of the said Nicholas Brown on the South

Gifts of Town Lands

1647 Given to Nicholus Brown by the Town of Reading in the year 1647 - Thirty acres of upland and as bounded by the land of John Person on the North and by the land of Capt Richard Walker on the South -

1647 Given to Nicholus Brown by the Town of Reading in the year 1647; Thirty acres of Meadow being bounded with the Meadow of Josiah Dosten on the North West of it, and part of the swamp on the South East - and so all the corner of Meadow from Josiah Dostins to the end of the Meadow, next to Thomas Hutchinsons be it more or less that may be called Bear Meadow

The land of Thomas Dunton that he purchased of Thomas Kendall that is by estimation eight acres more or less lying in the Town of Reading, and is bounded on the west with land of Jeremiah Swain, and on the North with land of William Cowdry and on the East with land of Thomas Kendall and on the South with the land of Thomas Clark

Gifts of Town Lands

The lands and Meadows of George Davis of Reading Lands & ce they were given him by the Town of Reading, and as he Meadows (c) hath purchased them of other men George Davis)

Bought of William (Blott) and his wife and Leicut Thomas Marshall a House lot containing nine acres more or less, part of it bought in the year /45 and part of it in the year 46 and part of it in the year 47; being bounded by the land of Robert Burnap land on the North the common lands of Reading on the East, the land of Thos Clark on the South, the land of Leuit Thos Marshall on the West

1644 Given to George Davis the Sixth of the eleventh Month in the year 1644 Three acres of Meadow lying in Purly Meadow bounded by the Meadow of John Damon on the North, the Common lands of Charlestown on the south--

1647 Given to George Davis the Sixth of the tenth Month in the year 1647 eleven acres of Meadow lying upon Ipswich River bounded by the Meadow of Samuel Walker on the West and the Meadow of Leicut Thos Marshall on the East

1647 Given to George Davis the Sixth of the tenth Month in year 1647 eleven acres of upland bounded with the land of John Pool on the North West and with the lands of Fitch on the South East

1654 Bought of Thomas Dutton of Reading the ninth of the first Month in the 1654 one acre and a half of upland lying in the Bounds of Reading and bounded by the lands of Thos Taylor on the West the lands of Thos Dutton on the North Thos Clarke on the East and John Gould on the South

1658 Given to George Davis att a General Town Meeting held upon the 14th of Feby in the year 1658 - Two Hundred and four acres of upland laying on the North side of Ipswich River and is bounded on the East by land of Samuel Duntton and on the West with the land of John Damon and on the North and South with a Highway at the end of it which is to be ten poles Broad at each end -

1658 Given to George Davis the 14th February in the 1658 three acres of Meadow lying in a Meadow commonly called Flaggy Meadow and is bounded on the West with the Meadow of Jonathan Pool and on the South with the Meadow of John Bachellder

1658

Given more the day and year above written to George Davis Three acres of Meadow laying in a Meadow on the Right hand of Andover Highway which Meadow the lines run through between Andover and the Town of Reading, and is Bounded on the North with the Meadow Joh Osgood and on the South with the upland of William Coopter Richard Walber and William Hooper

1658

Given to George Davis more the 14th of February 1658 a peice of Meadow about an acre & half or two acres of Rubish stuff laying on the North side of Ipswich River, and is bounded on the North by a Highway at the end of the lot and on the West with the Meadow of Leiut John Smith and on the South with Ipswich river and on the East with the Meadow of Samuel Walker

This land was laid out by Robt Burnet Sen. (Thor) works Kendall, John Hatchelder & Jons Poole the 28th of June 1665

The land Daniel Hertsborn that he purchased of Bonifet Buxton laying in the neck being Threescore Acres more or less, and is bounded on the South West by the land of John Poole and on the North West with the Land of John Poole and on the North East with the land of Nicholas Brown and on the South East with the River that runs down to the Iron

Gifts of Town Lands

The Lands of Nathaniel Cutler

Given to Nathaniel Cutler his home lot Containing 11 acres more or less, this was given to him the twelfth of the 11th Month 1653 and is bounded on the South with the lands of George Thomeon and on the West with the Lands of Henry Belflower west and east with the common lands of the Town of Reading - and 27 poles Northward with the land of George Lilley--

Given to Nathaniel Cutler the 12th of the 11th Month 1653 7 acres of Meadow more or less laying in the Hundred acres and is bounded on the North with the Meadow of Thomas Bancroft, John Weyly and Henry Merrow - and on the South with the Meadow of Henry Belflower

Given more to Nathaniel Cutler the 12th of the 11th Month 1653 - Three acres of Meadow more or less - laying in Birchen Meadow, and is bounded on the North East end - with the Meadow of Mr Brooks, and on the North side with the Meadow of James Pike

Given to Nathaniel Cutler the 22nd of the 10th Month 1668 the first lot being one acre or therabouts, being number one - and is bounded on the South with the lot of Joseph Davis

The Lands of Hananish Parker

1684 In the first and Second division as they fell to him by lot, his first lot is the seventh lot in the first division, and lieth on the east side of the Highway, as goeth to Bear Meadow beyond the uplands towards the Cedar Swamp, Bounded on the Southerly side with the land of Cornelious Brown and the Towns Swamp, and on the North with the land of Robert Burnap Sen; A Little Pine Tree by the Highway side marked HP or R.B. and so East North East to a maple Tree marked HP or R.B. and from thence to another maple tree on the East side at the row of hills by the old Cedar Swamp, marked H. and so from thence Southerly to a white oak marked S:B: H: which tree is the South West corner of Edward Browns Farm

1684 Hananish Parkers lot in the second division and is the first lot; and lieth near to a Lot of Black Oaks by the Meadow side marked - and so along by the Meadow side towards the North west to a shrubby Maple marked on the South side, and so South Sixty six poles to a pine tree marked H: R:B: and so East South East or thereabouts to a pine tree marked H: R:B:

--The Lands and Meadow of William Houser--

William Houser second division Lot being in number six and is bounded as followeth "viz" By the land of Abraham Briant on the Northerly side and by Woburn line Westerly and by the Meadow Easterly and by the land (no name given) Southerly, and is bounded by a pitch pine tree on the North west corner marked with W.H. and with A.B. and by a pitch pine tree on the North East corner marked with W.H. and with A.B.

At a General Town (Meeting) held upon the 6th of February 1659 - It was ordered that William Houser should have Ten acres of land at the end of his Ten acre Lot, that he was to have at Burthen plains, to lay at the end of his ten acre Lot, part of it to lay against John Damons Ten acre Lot, This not being fully perfected the Selectmen sometime March 1692/3 did lay out ten acres of land for William Houser more or less which is bounded as followeth; by a Walnut tree by Dea Dammans barn an South Westerly to a young walnut tree with an heap of stones and so from thence Southerly to (a) black oak with an heap of stones and from thence Easterly to a stake in a heap of stones; and so along by Sarg John Parkers land to a Red oak at the end of William Housers former ten acre Lot and from thence Northerly to the Walnut tree at the end of Deacons Dammans Barn--

Gifts of Town Lands

The Lands and Meadows of Capt Richard Walker--

1642 At a Town Meeting in the year 1642, There was given to Capt Richard Walker Twenty seven Acres of upland laying on the plain on the West side of the great Pond, and is bounded on the North West (by) the land of Mathew Edwards, and on the South with the Highway and on the East side with the Great Pond.

1642 At the same time there was also given to Capt Richard Walker a parcel of Swampy meadow, and is bounded with the Great Pond on the East, and the Highway on the South, and on the North West with his own land--

1642 There was also given to Capt Richard Walker at the same time a neck of upland containing Ten acres more or less, and is bounded on the west (side) with the land of M^r Samuel Haugh, and on the South with the land of Mathew Edwards, and on the East with the pond, and on the North with a little River that runs between the beech neck and this land, the Westerly line of this neck of land, begins at a great White Oak which parts Major Samuel Haugh and Capt Richard Walker and Mathew Edwards; and from this the line is to run North West to the little River by Beech Neck

1647 At a general Town Meeting held upon the 6th day of the tenth month 1647, There was given to Capt Richard Walker Twenty five acres of meadow laying in Bear Meadow and is bounded on the South with the great River, and on the West (side) the Meadow of John Pearsons, and on the North with the Common lands of the Town of Reading and the East with the Bridge going to Andover

1652 Given to Capt Richard Walker Twenty acres of land laying in the plain, and is bounded on the North with the lands of Nicholas Brown, and on the South with the land of Francis Smith, this land layeth in the middle Range of lots

1655 Given to Capt Richard Walker the 24th of January 1655 half an acre of Meadow and thirty four poles, and is bounded by the Bridge that goeth to Andover on the South and the Meadow of Robert Burnap on the North

The land of Capt Richard Walker that he bought of Lieutt Thomas Marshall, which is half of the Two Hundred acres that was some time, Maj-Richard Sedlers, laying on the west side of the Farm that was Captain-Bridgets *Bridges*

Gifts of Town Land etc

Also bought of Samuel Bennett one Hundred acres of upland and Meadow, bounded on the North with the great River that parts Lynn & Reading, Running out with two points of upland, butting upon several small Lots of Meadow Eastward toward the great River; and on the South butting upon the Meadow of John Hawks, that was given at the first to one William Amy of Lynn; and on the South West with a Ten acre lot of Thomas Talmag sometime of Lynn; and on the North West with the land of Zachary Fitch, Robert Burnap, and the Meadow of Edward Taylor John Pearson and Thomas Parker

Also bought of Lieu Thos Marshall a Ten acre Lot that was sometime Thos Talmags of Lynn, and is bounded on the South with the Farm of Nicholas Brown, and on the west with the land of Robert Burnap, and on the North with the Wigwam Meadow--

Whereas Thomas Parker, Jeremy Swayne, John Wesson was appointed by the Selectmen to lay out a convenient Highway for the use of the Town for Cart, Horse and foot, and not for any private way, have accordingly done it, that is to say two poles wide, one pole wide upon Josias Dustin and a pole wide upon Zachery Fitch, from the Common up to the further end of their Lots, till we come almost at the Highway, and then two pole broad upon Josias Dustin wholly till we come to the Highway that comes from Andover, this 12th of July 1657--

Articles of agreement between the Town of Reading on the one party and Jonathan Poole of Reading on the other party this 16th of September 1668

First the Town of Reading doth give free liberty to the aforesaid Jonathan Poole and to his heirs and assigns, the liberty of the River that now the Town Mill stands (upon) without molestation from any others, so long as the said Jonathan Poole his heirs and assigns, shall keep the (said) Mill in good and sufficient case to grind the Towns Corn only, (except there be sufficient water, (for) out of Towns' mens Corn) and to maintain the same from time to time at his own expence, cost, and charge, and to keep the Mill House in such repair as may secure mens Corn and Meal, and to clear the River to the Mill from time to time at his own expence cost and charge, This sufficientoy of grinding we mean so much as the water will grind with the best husbandry as may be used

Agreement between Andover and Reading 2nd peice

Given to John Upton a peice of Meadow in the year 1682 which is an acre & half more or less which was laid out by Maj John Brown and Capt Jeremy Swayne, which Meadow lyeth on the North side of Martin's River and is bounded on the westerly by Woburn line and by the River Southerly, and Easterly by a pine tree and is marked with J. U. and so straight to the River and on the North with the upland, the above said bounded premises was given to John Upton Senior for satisfaction of wants of Meadows

At a Meeting held of the Committee of Reading and Andover at the House of John Osgood upon the 29th of the 3 month 1660, it was agreed by us of Reading, that what Meadow of John Fries Junior of Andover, which falls within the line, that we then agreed upon that the said John Fries should enjoy it quietly and peaceably, as it was butted and bounded to him by the Town of Andover, which Meadow lyeth near to Robert Russells Meadow, with three pine trees one of them marked, and so running to a pine tree marked, on the other side of the Brook, and from thence to a Maple Swamp on the south west corner, one of them being marked, from thence to a pine tree marked, on the south side of the Brook, and from thence to a Maple tree at the South east corner and by a Brook

This Meadow the said John Fries is to enjoy quietly and peaceably without molestation as from us of the Town of Reading, only he is to pay scot and lot to the Town of Reading if it be demanded; But having payed Eight shillings the Meadow is free to this day being the first of December 1667--

Town and County Highways 2 and 3rd act

Given to Henry Merrow an acre of Swamp more or less and was laid out by Captain Swayne and John Batchelder and is bounded or lyeth near unto Goodman Rights Meadow or the Meadow which is called Lowes Meadow which Swamp is encompassed round by the upland

Recorded this 20th of February 1678

Highway

A Highway laid out through Zachery Fitch's Lot, for a Town Highway for Cart and Horse and foot but not to be a drive way laid out in June the 10th day 1659-- The highway is layed out from the Common to the County highway at the lower end of the lot The highway is to be a pole broad from the Common up to the White Oak Clump, and from thence to the other end of the Lot is to be a pole and three quarters broad, Furthermore it is sgreed that Brother Fitch is to have the Gate that the Town made and to hang it up, but the Town is to maintain it; and Brother Fitch is to make another Gate at his own charge and to set it up at the other end of the lot and to maintain it at his own charge; This is a perpetual agreement forever

County
Highway

An Agreement made the 26th of the 11th month 1660-- Between Nicholas Brown of Reading and the Selectmen of the same Town, whose names are here under written, about a County highway through the land of the said Nicholas Brown to Salem: Beginning at the West end of his Thirty acre Lot, and so over his land that is now broken up, or may be broke up hereafter, untill you come to a River called the Wigwam River, This highway is to be two poles broad all along upon good, sound, firm upland, and where the way lyeth between the said Nicholas and Zachery Fitch it is to be one pole broad upon each of them-- And for full satisfaction of the said highway, and for satisfaction of his bad Meadow we do give to the said Nicholas, all the Meadow that layeth between Samuel Duntons Meadow and Josias Dastin's Meadow and all that thereon may be made Meadow, with that spunge of Meadow at Dastine Bridge, with this quitall that the Town shall have liberty to cut so much grass on each side of the Bridge, as the Town shall necessarily use for the mending of the Bridge yearly--

Highways and Foot Path

The 14th of the 3 Month 1675 over Isaac Werts Land There was layed out a foot path to the Meeting House and to the Mill and for the Towns use of a quarter of a pole broad, and satisfaction was given him in the Com on adjoining to his own land, to his content- three quarter's of a pole broad along by his own fence from the Pond to a great stump and so to the corner of his own fence; this was done and laid out by Robert Burnap Senior Thomas Parker Thomas Kendall and William Cowdery--

Whereas there is a dissension amongst our Neighbours that down beyond Ipswich River about the Highway at the South end of their lots, the Town taking it into serious consideration that there might be love and peace amongst them did at a General Town Meeting held upon the 20th of May 1675 Appoint and empower John Batchelder Junior, Hannania Parker and Benjamin Fitch to lay out and establish the highway where it shall be, and in so doing you are to have respect unto the Towns orders, and Whereas it is said that John Upton and John Phelps both of them have encroached upon the ten poles that was left at the end of their Lots for a highway either by building or fencing or other way, you are therefore to have respect to both of them without any partiality and with all love and tenderness according to your wisdom and discretion so as not to molest either of them no more than needs must (be) so that there may be left a sufficient highway, and this highway you are to lay out from the Slough at Goodmans Clarks Meadow to Salem line provided you lay the highway but two poles broad over John Uptons Meadow at Goodman Clarks Slough, This order was voted upon a Training day and it was agreed that these men that are here named, should lay out according to the order here expressed

Dated this 25th of May 1675

The return of the Committee

That we John Batchelder, Benjamin Fitch, and Hannania Parker have layed out the highway as followeth. Over the Meadow at Goodman Clarke Slough 2 poles broad and from thence we layed out a Cart highway along by the river untill we come past Phillip McIntires Lot and from thence up by the north side of John Phelps marked tree, and from thence on the east side of the Meadow that was Mathew Edwards Meadow, and so along by the North side of John Phelps barn and so along to Salem line, and to this way aforesaid John Upton and John Phelps did mutually agree, provided that the Town will not require the Land that was left at the South end of his Lot for a highway

Town Records 1675

Given to Zachery Fitch for satisfaction for a highway through his Lot, A parcel of upland laying on the North and South side of the highway as goeth down to Bear Hill Brook, leaving to Rods broad between this parcel of Land and the Lands of william Lawson down to the Swamp for a highway, and so to be a Cert way all along the Swamp side for the fetching of wood. And also three acres of Meadow given more to the said Zachery Fitch in consideration of the highway before mentioned-- laying at the north end of the long sledge of Meadow bounded on the South with the Meadow of Peter Palfrey

Town Records 1664

An agreement between the Town of Reading and Mathew Edwards upon the 5th of December 1664 Concerning a Tract of Land Called the Beech Neck with the Swamp thereto adjoining containing 16 acres or thereabouts; which Land the Town of Reading do give in exchange unto Mathew Edwards for five acres of upland laying in the further end of the little plain; on the North side of the highway going into Johnes Neck and Thirty shillings and a gallon of Liquor which the said Mathew Edwards hath already paid. The bounds of the said Lands of Mathew Edwards is from Maj Brocks Marked tree which is a Maple that stands by the Swamp side, and so to an Elm standing by the Brook side in the Swamp, and so the Brook, is the bounds of the said Land down to the Pond, the Pond bounding it on the North East and the Land of Capt Richard Walker and the Lands of Maj Samuel Haugh on the South East, only the wood of the said land the Town reserves for their use as they have occasion to take it--

The Lands or Meadow of Samuel Dunton Junior Given to Samuel Dunton Two acres of Meadow adjoining to the Meadow that was left for the Ministry, which one is the North and bounded on each end with the upland, and on the South with the Meadow of Thomas Helton and was layed out by Capt Swayne and John Bachelder--

At a generall Town Meeting held upon the 7th of December 1668; Jonathan Poole and William Cowdrey was chosen to state the Bounds of the Lots of John Pierson and Nicholas Browne Maj Halihock and Edward Taylor, how far they should run into the Great Swamp; First that the Lot of John Pierson should run into the great Swamp, threescore and fifteen poles upon the same line that runs along between them, And from thence to a little White Oak upon a straight line; And so the head line of Nicholas Brownes Lot to run from that little White Oak slanting to a marked tree in the Swamp near to a little Run which is the head line of Maj Halihockes Lot, and this line of Maj Halihock is to run to a tree Marked near to the place, and from thence to a marked tree that is between Edward Taylor and Maj Halihock, and so Edward Taylor is to run from that marked tree to a spruce in the Swamp, and so from thence to a straight line to the upland, and so along by the upland untill he meets with Lynn line; we mean the upland on Edward Hutchinsons side

1686

Edward Taylors second division Lot being in number five and is bounded as followeth "viz" By the land of David Hartshorne on the North, and by the lands of Josiah Browne on the South, and by the land of Benjamin Fitch on the East and by a Range line on the West

April 20th 1655--

There being a difference between Edward Taylor and Nicholas Browne, about Edward Taylors Lot, they did both of them desire us whose names are hereunder written to come and set them to rights. That upon the 20th of April (55) that then the said Nicholas Browne and Edward Taylor did fully and freely agree that Edward Taylors Lot should run his full length from the great Pond on the west and to the marked tree at the East end, and to be 28 poles broad all along; as we did begin to stake it out; that is from a marked tree on the North side between Edward Taylor and Nicholas Browne, to a stake a little above Edward Taylors House, on the South Side of Edward Taylors Lot there to be 28 poles broad, and from a stake on the north end of Edward Taylors Lot, between Nicholas Browne and Edward Taylor near to a great White crooked Oak to a stake thereto be 28 poles broad; and so from a burnt Stump in the Cow Pen on the South side of Edward Taylors Lot and there to be 28 poles broad and so to run a straight line to the end of the Lot, this was a full agreement between them both

Edward Taylors first division Lot being in number five and is bounded as followeth "viz" by the Lands of Samuel Lamson on the west, and by the Lands of Thomas Burnap or High way on the East, and by a Range way on the North, and by the Swamp on the South, and is bounded by a White Oak tree on the South West corner, marked with B.T. and with S.L. and by a Black or red Oak on the North East corner marked with B.T. and with O

The Land of John Nichols

A peice of Swampy Land that John Nichols that he bought of the committee namely Capt Swayne and Hannanish Parker for the sum of eight Shillings in money, which Swampy land layeth on the North side of the Meadow that is called Buttons hole, and is bounded on the West within a pole of the Bridge, and on the North and South with the upland. The quantity of the Land is all the low Lands within the said bounds that is fit to make Meadow of

1682

Dated the 17th of the first Month 1653

We whose names are under wriþten being indifferently chosen by the two Towns of Lynn and Reading to settle the bounds of the two Towns do agree as followeth--

First to begin at the River called the North River bounded by a Hill called Tobacco Hill, and so to run on a due South line to the North end of the great Swamp to a tree marked with L. R. and so along on the East side of the great Swamp till it come to the River called Saugus River, or otherwise called the Saw mill River to the first Swamp above the Saw Mill; and from thence downward; the River to divide betwixt the two Towns; till it come to a little run at the East end of Maj-Howkes Farm which is now John Smiths Farm, and that Farm is to be the bounds betwixt the two Towns; and it is also agreed that all the Common land that is betwixt the little Run on the East side of the afore said Farm and on the West side of the Great River to a little River called Samuel Bennets River, and so to Boston bounds shall be for free commonage for Cattle to both Towns, and all other privileges belonging to Lynn, as Wood and the like--

And it is further agreed that all the land that lyeth on the West side of the Line from the North end of the great Swamp to Tobacco Hill that Lynn hath formerly laid out, the proprietore shall enjoy

Namoly that the North line at the Land of Hod and the East line shall stand as they are at present stated, and for that Tract of Land which is in Contreversy between the old Line and that that is run North and by West lately by Ensign Sherman, we say the distance that is between the Old and New line shall be exactly measured at the head, and a true line of division stated from the East line of the Land of Hod to the white Oak at Parly Meadow--only Reading is to have Forty acres of Land more than their half, which Forty acres is to be taken out of Woburn half, as followeth, namely that they shall have it in what poprieties of theirs that falls within Woburn division and what there be remaining that their proprieties doth not amount unto they are to take next their Meadows, in case they find it advantageous fencing them, and then if yet there remains any more of the said Forty acres, they are to have it on the North side of Maple Meadow River, joining to the River, and further it is agreed that this Forty acres within Woburn bounds shall Rate free from Woburn Town, We also do agree that these Copies shall be Recorded in both the Town Books of Woburn and Reading-- And this is a final conclusion of all differences about the bounds of our Towns between Woburn and Reading, to which agreement we have set to our hands interchangably this 30th of April 1666--

Encroachments on Common Lands

Pursuant to a Town order bearing date March 4th 1699 empowering the Selectmen to settle bounds between the Town and proprietors in and about the Town;

Some of the Selectmen with the layars out on the 16th of August 1700 settled bounds between the Town bounds and Sert Thomas Nichols his Ash Swamp Lot at the Pond head as will appear by the Record above said. Also viewing the way from the pond head to Deacon Benjamin Litch's, we found an encroachment by John Dix upon the Town Land, which he has several times promised to amend but is not yet done.

The 17th of said month a committee of the Selectmen settled bounds between the Town Land and Thomas Hodgman's Land; the N. E. corner bounded by the end of a stone wall formerly made between said Hodgman and the Land formerly called Harts Land, or the Land bought of John Winburne the line runs Southerly from said corner to a heap of stones lying upon Benjamin Burnse's side line; the bounds of Thomas Hodgman's House Lot that they bought of the Town is as followeth; the N. E. corner being a heap of stones by Thomas Boutwells Meadow, and so runs Southerly to a heap of stones being the South corner, and from thence Westerly upon a straight line to a heap of stones being the S. the highway ten rods wanting two feet; by Samuel Litchs his corner turning down to bare hill Brook across the street seven rods ten feet. Boundary Line between Reading & Andover

As whose names are under written being chosen by the selectmen of Reading and Andover to renew the bounds betwixt the said towns of Reading and Andover, did meet at the time and place appointed, and did run, Renew, and settle the line betwixt said towns in manner following; that is to say, beginning at the most westerly part, namely at the old mark at the Coburn line and so went upon an easterly course to a heap of stones; from thence to a great litch pine dated (1701) and marked with R. A. and so to a pine the body leaning something to the North then to a little pine tree and then to a great pine tree marked with R. A. and so to a pine tree near to the head of Martins Pond, and so to a twin Maple being the bounds of Ensign Ballards Meadow marked with B. and so to a great twin Maple marked with R. Laying out lots on the north side of Ipswich River

At a general Town Meeting held by the Town of Reading on the third day of February 1661 when was chosen "viz" Dea William Cowdrey Capt John Smith, Capt Jonathan Pool and Capt John Brown, as layers out, to lay out the great lots in Reading, on the North side of the River called Ipswich River, which was done by all the above named. As the subscribers being the only survivors of the said layers out being desired by the Selectmen of said Reading to give our information and knowledge of the manner of our laying out said tract of Land which is as followeth:

We began to lay out by said Towns order at a place that was called Andover Highway, Dea William Cowdroy lot was the first and so to lay out Eastward while the Land Eastward was laid out; and then we began again at the said place and left sixteen poles wide of land from the River to Andover line for the Town; between said Deacon Cowdreys lot and William Leaskins lot which was the first lot in order in our laying Westward, and then we laid Westward while we had finished our work in laying out said tract of Land; and the lots by order were laid in one Range; the Lines were near North and South, and the lots being long, the way we laid the sd lots out was thus; we knowing by former measure the length of said lots, we began as above said and measured both ends and the middle of every mans lot, and made bounds so at both ends and the middle which six bounds to each lot was all the bounds that we made; and the said six bounds are to be and remain for the just bounds of the said lots, whether the middle bounds stand in a line with the end bounds or not;

Highway at Lobs Pound Mill

Reading June 16th 1713--

We the after named proprietors and owners of a Saw Mill and Dam at a place called Lobs pound in Reading, and over a River called Ipswich River, We upon the Towns desire, and in our goodwill to the Towns Highway over said River, do for our selves and for our heirs, Covenant, promise and agree, upon the conditions and for so long a time, as shall be heresiter mentioned, that is the Town shall use and improve their Highway over our dam above mentioned, for their accommodation for Carting, Horse, and foot, and that the Town shall not from hence be obliged or exposed to repair any part of said dam for the use of the said Mill.

Further we the proprietors above said will with all conveyant speed repair the present breach, and that at our own cost and charge, and that where the present Breach is we will erect a Sluice, which shall be in strength and proportion, as well to accommodate the Towns Highway as for our own use. And we the proprietors above said will at our own cost and charge maintain, not only the whole dam for our use, but sufficient for the Towns use as a Highway for Carting etc from the North side of the afore mentioned Sluice to the Southernmost part of our dam, Sleepers and covering to said Sluice only exempted

Further we promise that Northerly above the flume of said Mill Ranging with the Mill as it now stands, we will wharf and make sufficient for a Cart way before the said Mill flume, that is, up stream, Northerly to the upland as bests accommodates for Carting.

Further we promise that if there should happen any Breach in the above mentioned dam, which shall be to the damage of the Highway, as well as to our damage, we will with all conveyant speed repair the same, as well with respect to the Highway, as for our own use,--

All which we for ourselves and for our heirs promise, upon the condition, that the Town do from the North side of the aforesaid great sluice, to the North side of the said Mill flume, Ranging Northerly with and joining to the above mentioned wharfed part of Highway made by the proprietors; and that the Town do make and maintain that part thereof fronting the Saw Mill flume a hollow Bridge, and the other part as shall best accommodate the Towns Highway; and the Town find Sleepers and covering for the Sluice.

All which we the proprietors above said promise and engage and that for so long a time as the Town shall improve the same for a Highway, if we the proprietors shall as long improve the same for a Saw Mill, or any such like uses.

Sale of Range Ways

At a General Town Meeting in Reading March the 7th day 1714/15 held by the Freeholders and other Inhabitants qualified as the Law directs regularly assembled; being the Annual Meeting.

There being a Report brought to the Town of Reading at said Meeting, that there was several Range ways, and some ways across the Ranges that were not of any use to the Town, nor like to be; The Town did then choose us the subscribers to go and view several Highways, and treat with them they adjoined on, about the price of them, and make Report at (the) May Meeting following; which we did.

And the Highways as they are Recorded and not used, that we reported might be sold, and the Town not damaged, was a Range way from Josiah Hodgmans to Parly meadow hill; and a cross way between Peirson Richardsons land, and that was Benjamin Hartshorne and Widow Cutlers that was William Arnolds. And another cross way Between Thomas Bancrofts and John Parkers Deceased, now in John Parkers improvement; and at the head of the Swamp a way between Edward Taylors and Thomas Burnaps now both John Pratts. The Town voted to sell the said lands at four pounds, fifteen shillings per acre; and then the Town did by a general voice desire us the subscribers to stand a committee for to sell said ways and also to take the Money for them to pay towards the new Bell. And also the Town voted to sell the Range way from Parkers Saw-pit, to Widow Briants lowest corner of her orchard, to the persons adjoining, and at the above said price, for the ends above said; this last said way the Town did make an essay to sell about six years ago, and chose Capt Nichols and Ens John Wesson to sell the same, but they having not done it, the Town voted to sell it to the persons adjoining for the price above said.

And we sold to Sert Thomas Pool, between that which was William Arnolds and his said Pools house lot, one hundred and five poles and for it received of said Pool 6^s - 4^s - 8^d -- Then between Pool aforesaid and Joseph Felchs, we sold to said Joseph Felch the whole way against his lot for which we received of said Felch nine shillings eleven pence. Then we sold the way between Doct Felchs Wood land, and Thomas Pools land to Samuel Felch, and received for it nineteen shillings and ten pence, and this land sold to Samuel Felch we would not have sold to him, but that we had reason to beleive that Doct Felch impowered Samuel Felch to buy it for him said Doct Felch.

The next way betwen Nathaniel Goodwins and said Pool we exchanged with said Goodwin for forty eight poles between said Pools and his lot for 58 or 60 poles at the North East corner of his land by Kendell Goodwins House.

The next between said Goodwins land and Widow Briants land, and between Doct Felchs land and said Briant, so far as the fence across the Highway at the South West corner of the Widow Briants Orchard; we sold unto the said Widow Briant, for which we received of said Widow Briant, one pound, ten shillings, and so much is the Range way from Parkers Saw pit unto the South west corner of the Widow Briants Orchard.

Then the Range way from Josiah Hodgmane to Parly Meadow hill, we sold between Joseph Damons and the Goodwin land, all to said Joseph Damon and received for it three pounds nine shillings & six pence; then we reserved four poles in the Range Way (that makes eight poles of land) between the two cross ways for the Towns use.

Then we sold unto En^s John Wesson one pole wide at the West end of that which was Samuel Fitchs lot, and also a pole wide the breadth of that which was Joseph Browns lot, and so joins the said lots together, for which we received of said Ensign Wesson one pound thirteen shillings.

Then we sold unto John Parker the cross way that is Recorded between John Parker and Thomas Bancroft, and a pole wide for half the Range way at the West end of the lots in his home stead, for which land we received of John Parker eight pounds 14 shillings.

Then we sold unto Josiah Hodgman and his Son Thomas, one half of the Range way at the West end of their lot and Orchard, on the Southward of the Highway before their house, for which we received of them two pounds 5 shillings.

Then we sold unto Stephen Wesson at the East end of his homestead lot, half the Range way for which we received of said Wesson one pound 18 shillings and six pence.

Then we sold unto the Widow Cutler the cross way that is Recorded between Benjamin Hartshorn and William Arnolds, for which we have received of the Widow Cutler Seven pounds, and if the said Widow Cutler pay thirteen shillings more, she is to have half the Range way at the East end of the lot she dwells on. May 14th 1716 the Widow Cutler paid the thirteen shillings.

Then we sold to Peirson Richardson half the Range way at the East end of Benjamin Hartshorne lot (now the said Richardson possesseth the said lot and we received of said Richardson ten shillings one penny.

Then we sold to Joseph Rice, half the Range way at the East end of his lot that he lives on, for which we received of said Rice one pound six shillings, and this is the way that is recorded from Josiah Hodgmans to Parly Meadow hill.

Then we sold unto John pratt a way as it is recorded, between Thomas Burnaps lot and Edward Taylors, at the head of the Swamp so called, as the Town voted to sell to him for which we received of said Pratt three pounds 7 shillings and six pence--

Town Way to Woburn Line

Reading May the 30th 1717

At a Town Meeting held May the 21st the Inhabitants on the West side of the Town, the Row to the hundred acres, did request the Town to have an open way from the Road by Mathew Grovers through his land to Woburn line, it being about twelve or thirteen poles. The Town did so far concede with it as to appoint us the subscribers to agree with Mathew Grover, and to exchange with him some of the Towns Swamp land adjoining to the said Grovers land, for this way; We have agreed with him that he should have a small slip of Swamp contained within two bounde. And first Southerly at a Swamp Oak marked, which was an old bound mark of his lot, and from thence to a young Maple, and so straight to his upland; which piece of swamp, we do suppose may contain near three quarters of an acre; this we do suppose to be a reasonable recompence for a two pole way.

Settling of Town Highways

The Town of Reading, considering the circumstances of their ways looking what was returned about them, and finding in one of the said Towne Books, a return of land for Highways, returned by Mr John Brown who was chosen to lay out to every man his lot of Land (but not to lay out ways) in the first and second division in Town Rights (so called) and entered by Leut Hannaniah Parker, who was not then Town Clerk; and as the return being done private as to the Towns knowing of it, and some of the places so returned, in such ground, that to make Ways to pass there must be several hundred of poles made causeways, and some places such Hills that there is not passing; and some of those Ways needless, there being conveyant open High Roads at the other ends of their Lots, and several places where there should be only liberty of passing, for the improving of old proprietie but no need of an open Way to them. And because they were not brought to the Town they were never yet settled and allowed by the Town. Therefore, At a general Town Meeting held on the 13th of May 1717 "Voted" That Capt Pool, Capt Burnsp, Ens Goodwin, Leut Thomas Brient, and Mr Thomas Bancroft, shall be a committee to go and veiw the land for ways in the first and second division of the Town Rights laid out by Capt Brown and make report to the Town at the next Town Meeting in order to their being allowed and settled.

And we the above said Committee, have veiwed and considered the necessity and circumstance of the above said Ways; and do make Report to the Town of the same as followeth, that if the Town of Reading please to settle and allow The Old Highway from parkers Sawpit to Doct Feltschs--The Highway from Mr Joshua Eatons to Rock Pond-- A two pole Highway between Charlestown Land and the lote of Jeremiah pike and Nathaniel Goodwin left now for the Towns order afterwards but not an open Way yet, That part of the Land left between Woburn line and Joseph Damons Land, to be ordered as the Town shall see reason, but no need of a Way there; but a Way between Woburn line and lots of Joseph Brown, Nicholas Rice and Davis, John Brown Sen and Benjrn Hartshorn should be allowed--and then up to Widow Cutlers Stephen Wessons and so to Daniel Merrows South West corner, and from said Wessons to Josiah Hodgmans, and then down to Doct Feltschs as it is now used--by Francis Smiths land sold to Henry Merrow, deceased.-- Then a Way between the lots of Mathew Edwards and James Stimson out of Parkers Sawpit Way to the Range line Westward-- Then a Range Way to Kendalls Meadow, and round said Meadow on the West side, and so out to Charlestown land as improved-- Then the Way between Ens Wessons and Joseph Feltschs land as now used-- and between Samuel Fitch and Ralph Dix-- and by Joseph Damons to Woburn line, as the Town exchanged or accepted in exchange with said Damon-- Then before Thomas Pools House between said Pools land and the Swamp lots of Mr Joshua Eaton, Thomas Eaton, and Josiah Hodgman, not an open Way but, a liberty for them, their heirs, and assigns, to fetch off their hay for ever-- And new Bridge Way up to James Nichols and so by Ensign Parkers and Samuel Lemsons and Jonases Bridge as it (was) formerly used-- Then for a Way between the Swamp lots and the upland lots out of new Bridge Way between that which was Mr Timothy Wileys and the Swamp lots, and so

And a two pole Way from the Common land at Tearbrich Hill, to Jonathan Parkers, on the North side of that which was Abraham Briants, this is that way that Ens Nathaniel had leave to fence in for a time.-- Then also from Mr Herberts Meadow head Eastward through Capt Savages then between the lots of, Northerly- Capt Thomas Nichols, David Hartsborn, John Bachelier, Johns Eaton into bare Meadow Way- Southerly Cornelius Brown, Josiah Brown, David Bachelier, Thomas Burnap, Edward Taylor and Samuel Lampson-- and out of said Way a Way between Capt Savage and Samuel Lampsons to Mr Herberts Meadow, not an open Way, only liberty of passing and repassing, to improve said Meadow or the Swamp by it-- and also the way as it is now in use as it goeth through the Islands and so to the Old Cedar Swamp and great Swamp, and also up to Dastins Bridge, up to Bare Meadow Tatmans & Hoopers Meadow and Kendalls Meadow--and other proprietors of said Bare Meadow have liberty to improve their Meadows, but not an open way by Bare Meadow side, Then from said Dastins Bridge as it is used up to Lobe pound, and there may be

We the Subscribers being appointed by the Selectmon, to lay out a Highway agreeable to the Towns vote, Voted May the 21st 1717 did on June the eighth 1717 at said place appointed, there did meet with Capt Thomas Flint and his son Thomas Flint and two other of his sons, and by said Flinte consent, did at the North end of the Range way so called; at or near the North East of said lots, there we began and marked two small trees near the River, about two poles asunder on the upland Southerly of the River. Committees return of Land exchanged with Sergt Flint

We the subscribers being chosen a committee by the Town of Reading to set out the Way; exchanged with Sergt Flint, as may more at large appear by said vote of the exchange bearing date Sept 6th 1715. We went on the premises about the begining of Sept last Sergt Flint being not able to go with us, he informed us of the bounds and sent his son Ebenezer with us to act in that affair; and he shewed us the bounds as his Father had informed us, and they stood on the East side of Andover Old path according to Record. And we ran the lines according to said bounds, and fairly marked trees on the West side of the Towns land, and we found at the South end it was about five poles and a half, in the middle about nine poles and (2) half, at the North end about sixteen poles, which sixteen poles was measured out about Eleven years past, And said Ebenezer Flint agreed with us to lay out for the Town on the West side of the lot they bought of Deacon Fitch, Ten poles wide at both ends and the same in the middle which we did then bound out.

And we having then the Towns vote shewed to us that the Town had given the land above set out to the Inhabitants of the North Percint; reserving three poles wide in the most conveniant place for a Way; And the Selectmen had given us an order bearing date Sept the second 1718 to lay out said way which we did, and it is as followeth; at the North Meeting House it is to go next to John Eatons land untill it comes within about twenty poles of some low land that joins to Sargt Flints Orchard and then goes a slant over to Sargent Flints land, and so by Sargt Flints land forty poles, and then turns aslant by the Hill over to said Eatons line at the end of the Hill, then it is to lay by said Eatons line across three swamps; then turns aslant to said Flint line at the Middle mark. Then it is to turn aslant over to Eatons line at the North West end of Rattle Snake Rock, so by Eatons line till it comes to the foot of the Hill this side Jebit, plain, then it is to turn aslant to Flints line at a valley at the other End of said plain (then said plain being all suitable for a Way any part of it) it is to go through said plain so as to leave five acres more to said Flint, than it doth to said Eaton. And said Ebenezer Flint agreed to change said land for the accomodation of a Minister if it was divided so, which we did.

Perambulation between Boston & Reading

Pursuant to an order made and passed at a Meeting of the Selectmen of Boston the fifth of April 1738 in obedience to an Act of the Great and General Court of Assembly made and passed in the fourth year of King William and Queen Mary entitled an act for Regulating of Townships etc directing that the bounds of all Townships shall be run betwixt Town and Town and marks renewed once in three years by two of the Selectmen of each Town or any other two persons whom the Selectmen shall appoint.

We the subscribers "viz" Caleb Lyman, Jonas Clarke and Thomas Hutchinson Jr with William Hasey and Jacob Hasey appointed a committee by the Selectmen of Boston, met with the committee appointed by the Selectmen of Reading "viz" Ebenezer Parker and Thomas Nichols, at a heap of stones on Tear Breach Hill so called on Monday the seventeenth day of April Anno Domini one Thousand seven hundred and Thirty eight; and after we had shewn each other our respective orders for running the line and renewing the bound marks between the said Towns of Boston and Reading; We proceeded as followeth "viz" Having put a stake in the middle of the fore mentioned heap of stones, being the boundary between the Towns of Boston Reading and Malden, marked B. R. M. from thence we run upon a course N. W. and by N. to an heap of stones on a Rock, from thence to an heap of stones round an old stump, from thence to a black Oak tree marked B. R. from thence to an old Maple Stump in Ebenezer Nichole Orchard, thence to an Heap of stones on the side of the Hill, from thence to another heap of stones on the side of an Hill, and from thence running N. Highways & Watering places reserved etc

Reading November 23rd 1737

We the subscribers being a committee chosen by the Town to take a view of the common land in order to see what is necessary to be left for Highways Watering places and other Public uses, having entered upon the affair consulted the same and Report as followeth "Viz" That all the common between Capt Thomas Nichols's and the Widow pattisons and Des Fitchs gate lay as it is, excepting the land that lays upon the Easterly side of the Road, that leads from the corner of Capt Nichols's stone Wall within six feet of the Cert path untill it comes to a white Oak standing near Esq Poole draw bars below his house; and so the line turns off up to said bars, yet nevertheless a way is reserved for Thomas Wesson and Des Gibson up to their houses which shall be left upon the Causeway; and said way shall be three rods wide at the Easterly end, and three Rods and a half at the West-erly end. 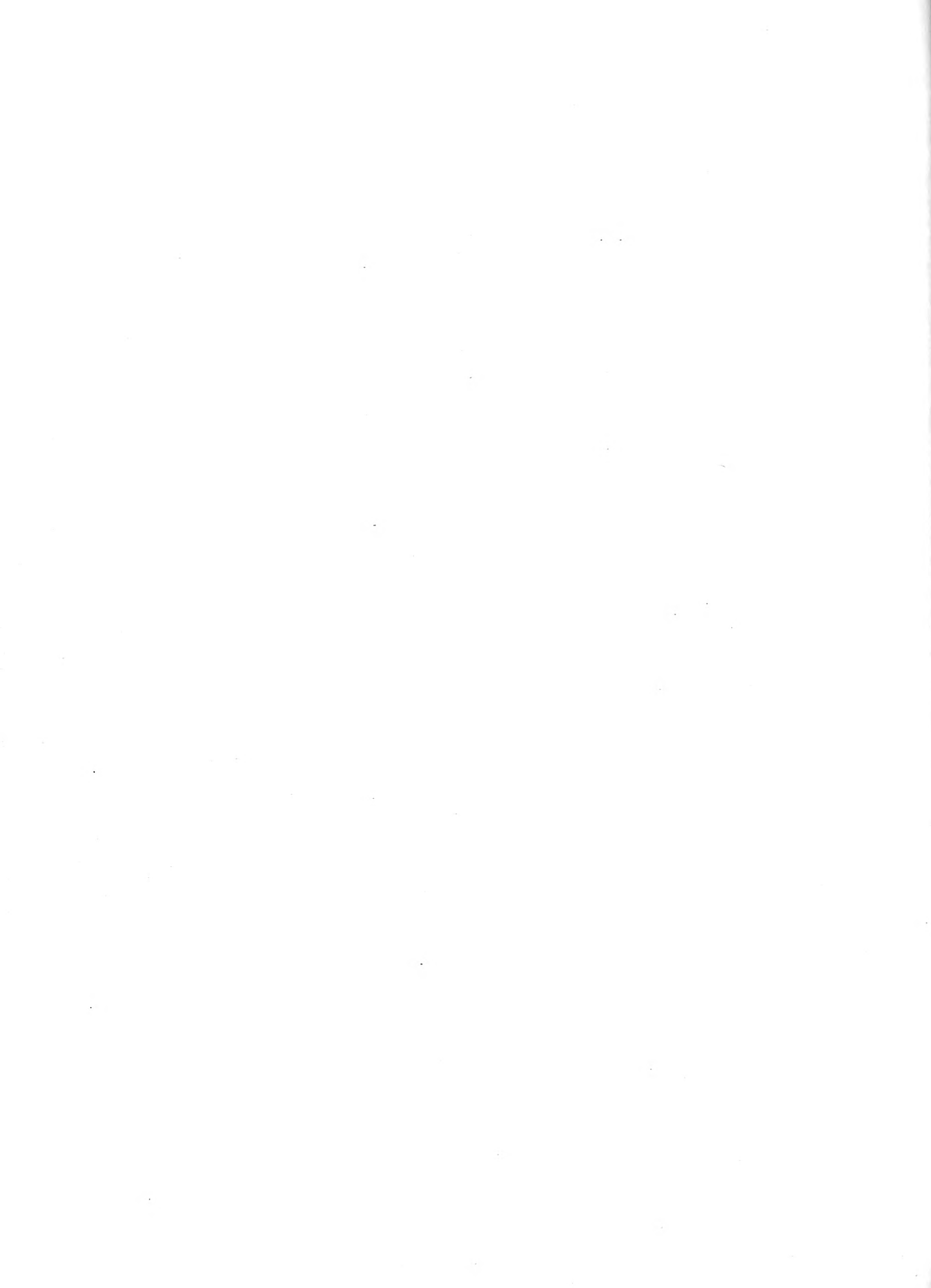

We the Subscribers being by the Selectmen of said Reading appointed a committee to lay out a Road over a corner of Mr Ebenezer Flints land to meet with Andover Road, at or near Osgoods Farm so called, and to agree with said Flint for damage done him by said Road being so laid out over the corner of his land, and to make Report of our doings therein, at the next annual Town Meeting in March, we make Report as followeth; We began at the corner of the Wall belonging to Osgoods Farm upon the east side of the Road Called Andover Road, and so extending Southerly about 10 poles to a heap of stones by the fence of Mr Ebenr Flints Farm, thence still Southerly about 15 poles, with a straight line to a Black Oak tree standing at the turn of the Way near the fence, upon the West of this line we laid out a Way three poles wide to meet Andover Road so called, said Road bounded upon the West by stakes and stones, said piece of way being about 25 rods in length, And we gave Mr Ebenezer Flint his recompence for the damage he doth sustain by turning said Road; out of the ten rod way adjoining upon the said Road East allowing him rod for rod with which recompence he declared himself content--

Whereas Capt Edward Hurcom and others preferred a petition to the Selectmen for to lay out a Road, from the Road near Jonathan Bachelers Barn to Wilmington line, to meet a Road laid out by the Selectmen of Wilmington by Nods Mill to Reading line, accordingly the Selectmen of Reading did meet and laid out a Road two rods wide, beginning at a pitch pine tree at Wilmington line, from thence to a dry pine stump; from thence to a green pitch pine tree from thence to a small White Oak tree; from thence to a large pitch pine tree; from thence to a small pitch pine tree near Eleazer Flints House two rods South of the South East corner of said Eleazer Flints House; thence to a small pitch pine tree spliced near the line between Mr George Flints land and Ebenezer Jones land, thence to the end of the Road formerly laid out behind the house of Jonathan Bachelier (Deceased) which road extendeth the west side of Nathaniel Bachelers land, The above said Road from Wilmington line was laid on the North side of the above named bounds, and across the land of Mr Thomas Flint, Mr George Flint Mr Ebenezer Jones and the Widow Dix--

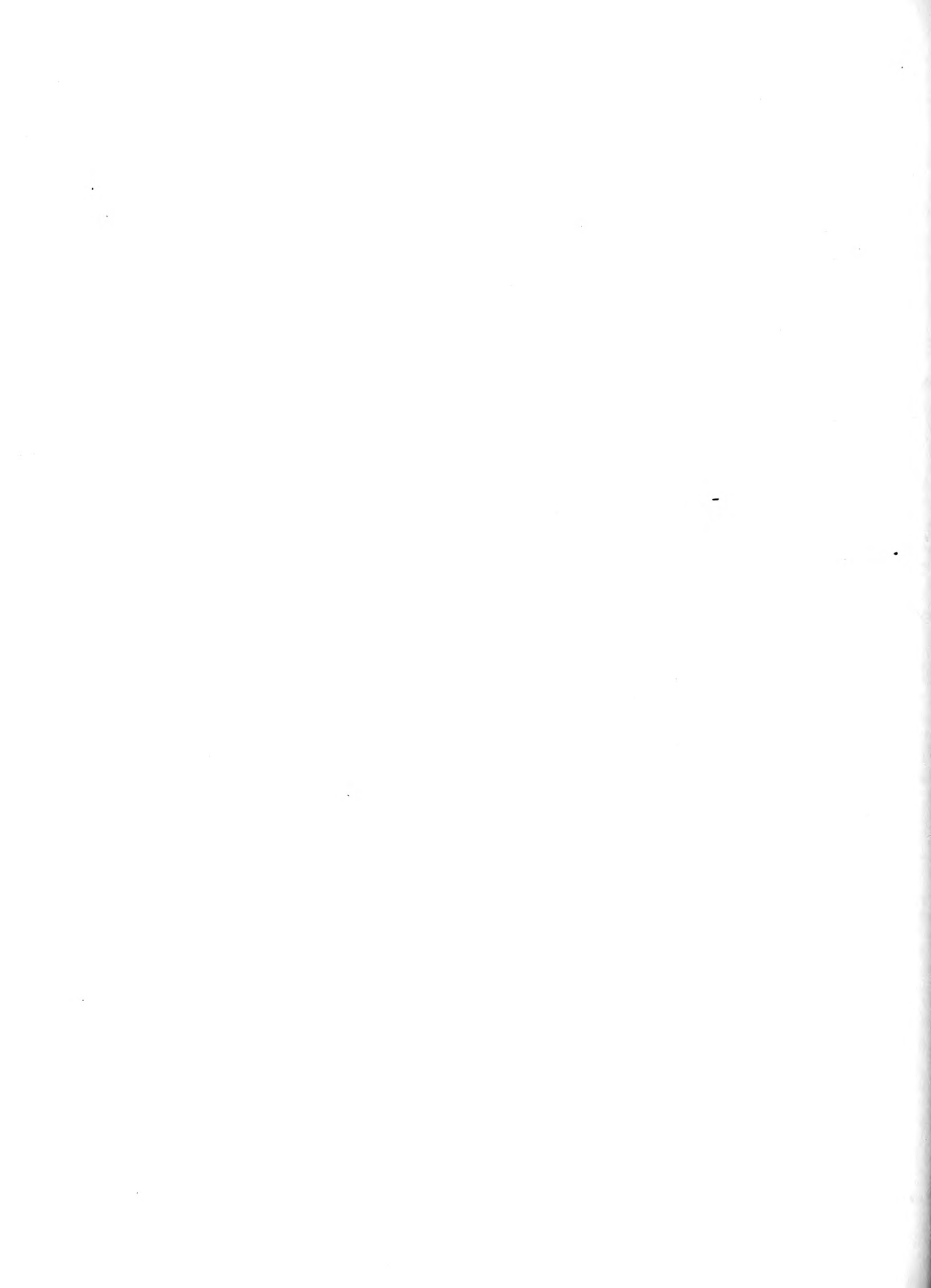
