Preface.

HIS Register is in a certain sense the outcome of the inauguration of the OLD ELIZABETHAN ASSOCIATION in 1892. In 1882 there was a movement towards the formation of such an association. A meeting

was held and a resolution passed that there should be an annual dinner, but the scheme was not fully realised till 1892. Since that date the Annual Commemoration has included a College Service in the Parish Church of St. Peter Port, the annual Prizegiving, a "Past and Present" cricket match, and a dinner which is held alternately in London and Guernsey. At the dinner of 1882 the menu was printed in quaint Old English, and the object of the annual meeting was thus expressed:—

"Procession of yo Feste being yo assemblying together (after dyberse travels) of Acholeres of yo past, by whyche thactes and noble faytes of illustryous Elyzabethans ben had in remembrance, and abyde in perpetual memorye, to thentente that men of vertuous courage should take ensample tempryse workes leeful and honeste."

At each successive gathering fresh reasons for a School Register were found, fresh names were announced of famous men who claimed the College as their Alma Mater, and facts were stated, for which the hearers demanded chapter and verse. One such statement may be instanced. In 1892 it was claimed that there were seventy-five Guernseymen in the Crimea. The Register, at least, shows that sixty-seven Old Elizabethans served in that war, either in the Army or Navy, that eight of these also served in the Indian Mutiny, in which forty-eight Old Elizabethans took part, and that five were killed in action in the Crimea, and nine in the Mutiny.

It was after the dinner of 1882 that the then Principal of the College, published a "List of Scholars." This little book found its way to some in whose minds it re-awakened the desire for more knowledge of their old school, a desire already kindled rv. Preface.

by chance meetings with fellow Elizabethans in foreign lands. And so, in 1883, when two Old Elizabethans met in Madras, they were not surprised to find that each possessed an interleaved copy of Mr. Oates' "List," scored with notes regarding their con-A compact was entered into then and there temporaries. that they should prosecute their enquiries and compare notes at their next meeting in Guernsey. One of them took advantage of long leave from India to enlarge upon Mr. Oates' plan, bringing the List up to date and adding information gathered by private enquiry and from the dusty minute-books in the Directors' room, in the hope of paving the way for a formal Register of Elizabeth This publication, entitled "A Short Chronicle of Elizabeth College" appeared in 1889. In 1892 the compact of 1883 took practical form. The two old students were joined by a third-all three having meanwhile begun to see the end of their official careers and the prospect of leisure for carrying out their plan, but it was not till 1895 that they were able to set to work in real earnest. The compilation has occupied three years of unremitting labour, and the compilers are the three old students whose names figure on the title-page.

We adopted the plan of publishing week by week in the Guernsey News short instalments as our enquiries progressed, inviting co-operation, and indicating where assistance was needed. We have succeeded in tracing more than 94 per cent. of the students since 1824. Very many of the rest were birds of passage, having no abiding interest in the island. The College roll, too, is responsible for several of the failures, in that it has omitted to fill in the domicile of parents, and even the title of the father.

We regret that the Register for the "dark ages" between 1563 and 1824 is so incomplete. No nominal roll was kept, and it was not till after the date of the re-chartering in 1824 that the school was made to fulfil the objects of its institution. In all probability many Guernseymen, and others too, such as the heroes whose deeds are recorded in Tupper's "Sarnia," were educated at Elizabeth College, but proof is absent. We believe that if the work of compilation had been delayed even a few years longer, all trace would have been lost of many distin-

guished men, whose careers we have now been able to sketch with pardonable pride.

It is hard to analyse the feelings uppermost in our minds as we present to all Guernseymen, but especially to those interested in the welfare of Elizabeth College, the record which these pages contain. By many it will be read with lively satisfaction,—to some it may recall memories of a disappointed past. The winners in the race for distinction and glory will pardon our reflection that many a career which holds a humble place in the Register has a value which we cannot easily represent in words. The following quotation from a thoughtful writer will better express our meaning than any words of ours:—

"We see heroism broken into units, and say,—this unit did little—might as well not have been. But in this way we might break up a great army into units; we might break the sunlight into fragments and think that this or the other might be cheaply parted with. Let us rather raise a monument to the soldiers whose brave hearts only kept the ranks unbroken,—a monument to the faithful who were not famous, and who are precious, as the continuity of the sunbeams is precious, though some of them fall unseen."

Some may question the wisdom of dividing the record; but to have brought the Register up to date would have necessitated the inclusion of many who are yet too youthful to have made their mark, and more than this, we should have deprived the older students—for some years—perhaps for ever—of the pleasure of seeing what their school-fellows have done. Some, indeed, of those who had waited for the published record with eagerness have already been called away. We cannot wait. We believe that this first instalment of Fifty Years will prove to the world what our school has done, and we are content to hold in reserve the proof of what it is doing. We think, too, that the publication of Volume I. will facilitate the compilation of Volume II., which we propose to commence at an early date.

We have added to the Register a short notice of the MASTERS, to whom much of the success of students in after life was due. The pages of the *Elizabethan* must be referred to for longer

reminiscences than can be introduced into this Register, and we trust that many sketches, now overdue, will soon find a place.

It will not escape notice that the HISTORY has been written up to 1826 only, and that no comment has been made on later changes in the constitution of the Governing Body, or in the Statutes of the College. The Revised Statutes of 1852 are available to any enquirer, and it would be, in our opinion, a pity to rob Volume II. of its due share in the narration of events of interest. Suffice it to say that up to the present date the College has fully maintained its high standard of instruction and efficiency, and can more than hold its own in these days of keen competition, as the annual record of honours abundantly testifies.

Our acknowledgments are due to three old Elizabethans—to No. 905, Dr. Magrath, Vice-Chancellor of Oxford; to No. 1418, the Rev. G. E. Lee; and especially to No. 1824, Mr. Lucien de Bernardy—who have spared no time or trouble to assist our researches. We are also greatly beholden to Mr. Frederick Clarke, proprietor of the Guernsey News, not only for opening the columns of his paper to our weekly record, but for the keen interest he has shown in the work; and to the authorities of the Guille-Allès and the Candie Libraries for their readiness to place at our disposal their valuable books of reference.

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History of Elizabeth College.



HE Grammar School, now called ELIZABETH COLLEGE, was founded and endowed by Queen Elizabeth in 1563. In the statutes of that year the Queen's intention is stated:—"to erect a Grammar School . . . to be commonly called the School of Queen Elizabeth."

But as early as 1573, in the Livre de Perchage du Fief le Roi, the school is styled Le College de notre Souverayne Dame la Royne; and, though we find various other designations used,—e.g. Grande Eschole de la Royne (1589)—Collège de sa Majesté, notre Sire le Roy James (1616)—École Latine (1682)—École Elisabeth (1683)—École Latine et Publique (1759)—The Free School in the Island of Guernsey (1761),—the title ELIZABETH COLLEGE, or its equivalent in French, is the name by which the school has been in fact "commonly called." But a more august title may be claimed, for on the foundation stone of the present edifice are the words "The School of Queen Elizabeth, . . . now called the Royal College of Elizabeth" (1826), a title once given by the Ecclesiastical Court of Guernsey in 1668.

It is not the oldest school in the island, but is the only school of royal foundation. In 1563 there were three pre-existing schools—at St. Peter Port, at St. Pierre-du-Bois, and at St. Martin's—of which it is known that the first was founded in 1513, and that the last was moved to a new site in 1591. These were parish schools, the management of which was vested solely in the parish, but Queen Elizabeth added to their endowments, with the aim of making them subordinate to her "new school," i.e. Elizabeth College, in the sense of preparatory schools to feed the College. In one respect the authority of the parish was limited, for the wheat rents granted in 1563 for the support of the masters

were beyond its control. It is probable that rights in these schools were acquired by neighbouring parishes at an early date.

It is computed that, at the time of the foundation of the school,

the population of the island was about 6000, including about 500 strangers, i.e. non-natives. Figures for other dates are shown in the 1625—6,862. margin, which are to some extent estimates. The 1727—10,552. 1801—18,655. then condition of the island was deplorable. Ignorance and superstition were combined with unrest in politics 1801—20,300. and superstition were combined with unrest in politics 1841—26,706. and religion. The terrors of Queen Mary's reign were 1891-35,218. a recent recollection. The island was still in the diocese of Coutances, and the vicinity of the French coast helped to check the efforts made to cast off the yoke of Rome. In 1563 a synodical system* was formed, in alliance with Jersey, to regulate the churches of both islands. It was not till 1568 that they were transferred to the diocese of Winchester. In 1566 piracies had become so frequent that Royal Commissioners were sent to make investigation. The authorities were themselves at variance. In 1565 and 1580 several Jurats were summoned before Her Majesty's Council to answer for their conduct towards the Governors, and three were imprisoned in the Marshalsea prison. Burnings for witchcraft and magic were numerous and executions occurred every year. The whole island was in a state of dissension and Two letters of the first master of the College may be confusion. cited to show the facts as presented to an eye-witness. Dr. Saravia wrote in 1565 to Mr. Secretary Cecil a letter stating as follows:-

"As to religion there are only three or four people in the island who attend service, and if an ecclesiastic goes into the country he is greeted with jeers and laughter, and often has dirt thrown at him. They are worse than Turks, and the Jurats connive at all this. Robbery and slaughter are committed with impunity, and the decisions of the Judges are various. Everybody is at law in some court. The Jurats treat the people like sheep, unrestrained by fear. The people are so inert that they had rather live poor and idle than grow rich by labour."

In the previous year he had written still more strongly, and with special reference to the newly-established College:—

"Tametsi totos tres annos habitaverim in Anglia, nunquam expertus sum id quod vulgo de insularibus dici solet. Sed hic

[•] In 1563 Presbyterianism was introduced into the island by refugees from France, chiefly disciples of Calvin, and observers of the worship of the Church of Geneva. Elizabeth sanctioned this discipline and form of worship in the Town Church only, but it rapidly spread over the whole island. The Governor in 1563 favoured the innovation and allowed the clergy to appoint elders and deacons, and to form themselves into a "colloquy," of which the Governor himself, the Bailliff, and some of the Jurats were members. Guernsey retained the Presbyterian discipline with much greater persistency than Jersey. James I. tried to re-establish episcopacy in Jersey, but he left Guernsey alone, even confirming Elizabeth's indulgence. Perhaps he feared to make the attempt to reform both islands at the same time. During the Rebellion, and the Protectorate, Presbyterianism flourished unchecked, and it was not till 1662 that the Act of Uniformity was enforced and the office of Dean revived. There was no "dissent" in the island till 1750.

He added in this same letter that the Guernsey people utterly despised the gift of the school; that nothing had been done to carry out the orders of the Commissioners; and that he had only ten

Guernsey scholars, the rest being English boys.

The language of the doctor's letters—highly coloured as it undoubtedly was—goes to prove the need of "a grammar school in the said island, in the which the youth of the same may be better instructed in good learning and virtue." The Letters Patent, dated 25th May, 1563, appointed as Royal Commissioners the following:—Sir Francis Chamberlain, Governor of Guernsey; Thomas Carew, Governor of Hurst Castle; Dr. George Ackworth, Chancellor of the Diocese of Winchester; Thomas Compton, Bailiff; John After, Dean, also Rector of St. Peter Port and St. Martin's; and Nicholas Carey, Queen's Receiver; to examine the state of the harbour and island generally, and specifically to endow a royal school. The statutes of the "School of Queen Elizabeth" are contained in the letter of the Royal Commissioners, dated 27th September, 1563.

The Royal grant was made in two instalments. In 1563 the lands (1 vergee and 27 perches) and tenements of a convent of Franciscan Friars, who had been expelled from the island in the reign of Henry VIII. by Bailiff Compton, together with 80 quarters of wheat rents, were assigned for the support of the school. The old church of the friars was intended to be the school-house, the cemetery a play-ground, and a piece of land was destined for the master's use. In 1568 a further grant was made of land (10 vergees) and buildings not included in the assignment of 1563, but which had also belonged to the Mendicant Friars. On 26th March, 1568, the Governor (Chamberlain) handed over the school property to the Bailiff (Compton), and Jurats, and States of Guernsey. The rentes appropriated to the master of the school had previously belonged to various churches and confraternities. It is certain that all the land of the earlier assignment was soon alienated from the school, and has never been recovered. In 1824, during the progress of an "Enquiry into the state of Elizabeth College," to which reference will be made further on, the land thus "illegally transferred" was clearly identified, and a debate arose as to whether the then possessors could be ousted.

The original statutes of the College provide that there shall be six classes, in which the lessons are to be as follows:—Class I.—A short catechism of grammar, comprehending the eight parts of speech and the syntax. Some Latin and French vocabulary, out of which the scholars are to learn first ten, then twenty words daily. Class II.—The sacred dialogues of Sebastian Castalio, with biblical exposition thereon, the epistles of Cicero, and grammar. Class III.—

The elements of Greek, the principles of rhetoric. An oration of St. Chrysostom to be learned by heart. Class IV.—In the upper classes Latin authors are to be combined with Greek. In this fourth class Hesiod is to be read with Virgil, or Pindar with Horace: Greek and Latin prosody is to be taught, and verse-making in both languages. Class V.—Some of the orations of Cicero, to be treated in the demonstrative manner, with the Greek orations of Isocrates, or Cicero's offices with some of the morals of Plutarch. Class VI.-Histories, as Cæsar, Sallust, and Livy in Latin, and Plutarch, Thucydides, and Herodotus in Greek, "that having passed the other classes, and being now matured and even perfected, they may look into antiquity, the mirror and effigy of posterity." Besides the above lessons various "exercises" were prescribed. Class I. was to learn to write and spell correctly both in Latin and French. Class II. was to translate themes and sentences into correct and chaste Latin. "The plain and simple faculty of speaking Latin being obtained," the boys of this class were to learn to turn a Latin sentence in various ways, according to the example of Erasmus. Class III. was to continue the same exercise, together with translations from French into Latin, and Latin into French; letter writing was also to be taught, by way of "a sport to the scholars." In Class IV. prosody and verses alone were to be added to the foregoing exercises. Class V. was to proceed to the highest grammatical studies, viz., the gymnastics of Aphthonius, or some other gymnatic of the studies of the studies. nosophist. The Commissioners add, "if they can learn and perfect themselves in these exercises, there is nothing which they can further desire in this school." Class VI. had no special exercises appointed. Lest the master should find himself too much hampered, the Commissioners continue, "By these aforesaid statutes, we do not so strictly bind him that he may not occasionally add something of his own, and by a variety of exercises sharpen the wits of the scholars, and even remit something of these and concede some intermission for singing, arithmetic, writing, and also, but seldom, for play"!

The school was first held in the church or temple of the friars. It was moved* soon after 1568 to the house in the enclosure, which made part of the additional assignment of that year. That house was turned into a prison in 1590, during the plague—perhaps because the sickness had either suspended the instruction, or quite put an end to it. It was pulled down in 1753, and a new school-house was built at the expense of the States. This is what is now known as the "Old College," set apart since 1826 as the residence of one of the masters. The present edifice was, as will be seen, con-

structed in 1826.

The succession of masters is very obscure. What little was known

[•] It was suggested by the Committee of 1824 that, when this move was made, the land and buildings of the earlier assignment were abandoned, and, there being no trustees named by the States, were looked on as waste land and useless tenements, and that therefore the appropriation later on by private persons may have been made without any notion of invading the rights of the College.

in 1824 was gathered from public records, dealing either with complaints against masters, or with their complaints as to the necessity of repairs of the school; but the Acts of the Presbyterian Colloquy* (1585-1654) and of the Ecclesiastical Court of Guernsey after 1662 were, at that time, insufficiently studied.

Dr. Adrian Saravia† was the first master, from 1563 to about 1568.

There is reason to believe that one William Hart was master in April, 1581. The Rev. George Capelin, secretary to the Colloquy and Chaplain of Castle Cornet, was master in 1589, the year of his marriage, and held the post till his death, early in 1592. Martin de Pestere was master, at least from 1599. He resigned the school in 1606, and was called on by the Court (Chief Pleas, January, 1606) to vacate the premises. His successor, Simon Hern, Minister. was master from Michaelmas, 1606, till Lady Day, 1608, assisted by the Rev. Thomas Bradley, Minister of Castle Cornet. Knowledge of French was certainly contemplated in a school where the introduction of English a century later was viewed as an innovation. Hern had covenanted to learn French within a year. He complained to the Royal Commissioners in 1607 (Sir R. Gardner and Dr. Hussey) that his salary remained unpaid. The Commissioners allowed the claim, but called on the master to resign, fixing the date of resignation so as to give time to the Governor to select a successor. This was in accordance with the statutes, which empower the Governor to fill a vacancy in the case of misconduct, if ignorance of the language of the scholars can be held to be mis-It is noteworthy that the statutes did not provide for vacancies otherwise caused, an omission which led to much irregu-Such irregularity, probably amounting at times to malversation, came under the notice of the Royal Commissioners in 1607, as is shown by the Order passed with respect to "Queen Elizabeth's Grammar School," viz., "that the Governor be enjoined to have an

thus been made available.

+ Adrian Saravia was born in 1531, at Hesdin, in Artois. In 1537 he escaped from a Franciscan Convent; student at Oxford, 1561; was master of Elizabeth College, 1563-8, and Vice-Dean 1564. In 1576 he was master of the Grammar School at Southampton, and later, was pastor of the Protestant Church of Antwerp, and founded a like Church at Brussels. In 1586 he was implicated in a plot at Leyden. Some of the conspirators were caught and executed, but Saravia escaped to the Hague, and thence to England. In 1587 he became Doctor and Professor of Theology at Leyden. He was successively Prebendary of Gloucester, 1591; Canterbury, 1595; and Westminster, 1601. In 1600 he was one of the translators of the A.V. of the Bible into English. His name appears, after the names of Bishop Andrewes and Dean Overall, on the Westminster Committee, to whom the task of dealing with the books of Genesis to II. Kings was assigned. He wrote, among other works, anti-presbyterian tracts; and argued with the ministers of Guernsey, urging them to accept episcopacy. He died in 1612. His widow placed a tablet in Canterbury Cathedral. His portrait may be seen in the large stained glass window in the hall of Elizabeth College.

explicit care that the said school be always furnished with a sufficient schoolmaster," and "that whensoever the said school shall happen to be void, the Governor shall place a schoolmaster therein, within the space of three months, and in case that he shall fail so to do, upon any pretext whatsoever, that it shall be lawful for the Bailiff and Jurats, or to the Ministers of the isle, or to the more part of them, to procure some fit man to teach in the said school, and present him to the Governor or his Lieutenant, who should presently approve him, if there be nothing against his learning, religion, or good manners, causing one of the Ministers of the island to teach the scholars ad interim."

The statement of the Committee of 1824, that one Amos Horn was sworn in as master in 1608, is proved incorrect by the records of the Colloquy. Early in 1608, Jean de la Marche, who had just left the University, was urged by the Colloquy to undertake the charge of the grande escolle for a short period, till the new master shortly expected, should arrive. It seems that de la Marche, anxious to commence his theological studies, declined the invitation. In June, the Governor wrote that he expected, almost immediately, to be able to bring with him a man competent to take the mastership with ministerial charge also of Castle Cornet, and in December the Rev. Wm. West was appointed accordingly. He did not know French, and an arrangement was devised by which the Rev. Mr. Perchard, Minister of St. Saviour's, St. Peter's, and Torteval, undertook to assist Mr. West in his duties at the College, till the arrival of a Mr. Daniel Maris, whom the Governor intended to act as assistant master. The school had for some time been without a master, for the Rector of St. Peter Port was in December, on Mr. West's appointment, asked to give notice that the parishioners might send their boys to the school.

If Amos Horn was master, the year of his tenure is uncertain. There is no record to show whether Daniel Maris ever came, or how

long the Rev. William West remained.

Jean Ganrey, Seigneur de la Champagnolle, took the oath of office before the Royal Court on 10th May, 1613. Ganrey was appointed by the Governor. In 1615 the Colloquy made it incumbent on the master to submit an annual progress report. The next master, of whom anything is known, was Thomas Mauger. He represented to the Royal Court at Chief Pleas, September, 1622, the ruinous condition of the College. A grant for repairs was made from the *Trésor* of the parish of St. Peter Port. The master must not be credited with interest in the school in having thus come forward to secure repairs, for, as stated by the Committee of 1824, "the States, time out of mind, have allowed the master to reside in the house in the close (the building on the land granted in 1568) and to take to his use the profits arising from the whole of the remaining estate, which was not intended at the time when the two assignments (of 1563 and 1568) were made." Mr. Mauger died in 1626.

Where the school was held at this time is not known. It was of yery little use in regard to the education of the youth of the island,

for there are numerous instances of students being sent by the parish to England to be educated for the Church in Guernsey; or, by the Royal Court to Saumur or Cambridge, with a grant to meet the cost of education. As regards those sent to a University, it is not improbable that they had previously been pupils of the College, though this fact is not recorded. The mention of repairs to the College after this date is frequent; indeed for a long time it was the only direction in which the States appear to have interested themselves in the school at all. In the call on the Trésor of the Town parish, in 1622, the words are added "suyvant qu'a esté par ci-devant accoustumé."* There is no evidence of any such custom. Perhaps the custodians of the Trésor were afterwards able to resist, or, more probably, the Governor wanted help from the Trésor for repairing Castle Cornet and like purposes, to which the church fund was, on occasion, made to contribute.

Mauger's successor was Mr. Joshua Slowley, who was very formally sworn in as master, in the College itself, in the presence of the Lieutenant-Governor, the Bailiff, the Jurats, and the Rectors

(qui s'y sont transportés exprés), on April 4th, 1627.

In 1627 the College was repaired, on the order of the States, out of the pier fund, and again in 1628. In 1629 the Cimetière des Frères, part of the College estate, but at the time appropriated by one Thomas Blanche as a private garden, was, by order of the Royal Court, utilized for the burial of victims of the plague.

Nothing but Latin and a little Greek had been hitherto taught, so

that the custom had arisen to have no school in the afternoon, to enable the scholars to learn "writing, ciphering, and French" elsewhere. In 1633 the States engaged a stranger, one Thomas Jaillant, where. In 1635 the States engaged a stranger, one Findings Canada, to teach the youth of the island reading, writing, ciphering, and music, for one hundred livres tournois, the pupils paying from 4 to 8 sols a week, according to what each was taught. Of the fixed salary, two-thirds were to be paid by the Town parish and the remainder by the country parishes. The statutes allowed the master to encourage other studies besides the classics, but this was the first effort made in that direction.

The year 1635 was an important one in the history of insular education, and indirectly of the College, for in that year Charles I. founded three Fellowships, at Exeter, Jesus, and Pembroke Colleges, Oxford, for natives of Jersey and Guernsey. Jersey was not content to allow Elizabeth College to do duty for both islands, though till the opening of Victoria College, † in 1852, it did in fact serve both. Queen Elizabeth gave her licence to a new College—Elizabeth College, Jersey—to hold lands in mortmain, but it remained

^{*} It was afterwards (1739) claimed that the charge of repairs against the Trésor was fully justified; that a plot of ground in High Street, called the Place des Halles, and actually used as a meat market, in 1630, was, about the date of the foundation of the College, ceded by the public to the Trésor of the Town Church, on condition that the repair of the College should be chargeable against the Trésor.

neglected, and the revenues, insufficient as they were, were mis-

About 1618, a petition was presented to the King for grant of facilities for the maintenance of poor scholars at one of the Universities. An opportunity offered itself to meet the petition, on the acquisition by the Crown, by escheat, of the estate of Sir Miles Hobart, Alderman of London. King Charles was anxious to abolish the Calvinistic discipline.† It was represented to him that many of the Ministers in Guernsey were old, and that it would be very difficult to fill recognize caused by death on otherwise. difficult to fill vacancies caused by death or otherwise, for, it was urged, a supply from France was impossible. The King founded three Fellowships, as stated above, out of the Hobart properties, with the condition that the Fellows should return to the islands to serve in the Ministry. The King named the first Fellows; afterwards the Dean (not the Bailiff) and Jurats of either island were to nominate. The first post-Reformation Dean of Guernsey (Dr. John de Sausmarez) was appointed in 1662. The office in Guernsey, as in Jersey, had not been filled since the introduction of Presby-Arthur Morehead, probably an Englishman, was the master in 1635.

It is believed that Dr. Isaac Basire; was master about 1636.

Jacob de l'Epine was sworn on 29th May, 1639. In 1644 the inhabitants prayed the Lieutenant-Governor to dismiss him and appoint a fit successor. The Lieutenant-Governor took no action, and the States (27th May, 1644) displaced the "Regent" of the College, on

It would be interesting to know exactly why Guernsey was thus preferred to Jersey. Duncan in his "History of Guernsey" declares circumstantially that "private affection, as well as public policy, might have induced Queen Elizabeth to exercise so much kindness to Guernsey, she being very closely connected with the ancestors of the present Carey family, so numerous and respectable in the island," &c., &c.; but Tupper in his "History" asserts, on perhaps insufficient evidence, that the family relationship is wholly mythical. The influence of Sir Thomas Leighton, who was connected by marriage with the Carey family and who had resided a considerable time at Elizabeth's Court, may have induced the Queen to endow the Guernsey College. It is certain that at the time, both in respect to trade and to the proportion of English residents, Guernsey was in advance of Jersey.

The Acts of the Jersey Colloquy refer constantly to the intended college there. Laurens Baudain, of St. Martin's, Jersey, gave thirty-six quarters of wheat for the foundation or maintenance of a College, and the Queen allowed the gift and further contributions of two hundred quarters. In 1594, the Colloquy resolved to propose to the States that the two schools of the island should be united into one college. In 1598, the statutes of the College were approved. In 1601, the Colloquy addressed the Governor. In 1604, a Mr. William Steward was master of the College demeure negligic test revenues dicelus non appliquez à l'usage public," and King James in certain Letters Patent states that "the erection and foundation of the said College hath been utterly neglected, and the said gift (of Baudain) applied to ther uses."

† Guernsey, whither the Prince de Condé had retired, expelled all natives who did not conform to the Geneva platform; and only accepted the Prayer-Book at last, in 1662, at the pike's point, some of the ministers resigning their cures rather than be re-ordained.

† Isaac Basire was born in Jersey. He was M.A. of Leyden, and D.D. of Cambridge, 1640. After appointment as Rector of Stanhope he was Chaplain to Charles I., and also, after the Restoration, to Charles II. He was with the former during the siege of Carlisle. He travelled in Syria and Palestine, and was for seven years Professor of Divinity in Transylvania. He was a staunch Anglican, and translated the Church Catechism into Arabic. He died in 1676 as Prebendary of Durham.

the score of his "négligence et autre mépris de scs debvoirs." In the November following, the States gave notice of another election, and, in December, elected Thomas Carey, M.A., son of Thomas Carey, Jurat, subject to his passing before a board of nominated examining Ministers. The Committee of 1824 urge, with regard to the proceedings of the States, that "the first act (the dismissal), being contrary to the Charter, was illegal; and the latter (the new election) also, since the situation was not void by that Charter," adding "but the times* were unwholesome."

This criticism appears to be unjust. It is true that the Charter did not empower the States to dismiss a master, vesting the authority in the Governor, or, in his absence, the Lieutenant-Governor, at the instance of the Dean; but at this time there was no Dean. Further, the records show that at the States Meetings, both of November and December, the Lieutenant-Governor was present. It is reasonable to conclude that he expressly or tacitly delegated his authority to the States.†

The new election appears to have been exactly in accordance, if not with the letter of the Charter, at least with the ruling of the Royal Commissioners of 1607, for the mastership had been vacant for more than three months.

Mr. Carey was a Parliamentarian, and at the Restoration either resigned or was ousted. He was succeeded by the Rev. Gabriel du Perier. An arrêt was brought against him by the Constables of the Town, probably for cost of repairs of the College, and his appeal to the Court was rejected in 1667. He remained in charge till his death in 1669, and was followed by Mr. George Dalgarno, in 1670. A novel order, as to the repairs of the school-house, makes this period interesting. In or about 1671, the Royal Court granted £300 tournois to be raised by the constables of all the parishes from the Church Trésors rateably (selon le rast accoutumé), but ruled that the master himself would in future be held responsible. As the States allowed the master to use the College as his residence, this ruling was not unreasonable; but Dalgarno at once resigned.

^{*} The Guernsey Rebellion occurred in 1643. The Royalist Governor or Deputy-Governor, Sir Peter Osborne, shut himself up in Castle Cornet to avoid seizure by the "Provisional Government" of Guernsey. This Government was appointed by the Parliament, and consisted of twelve "Commissioners," of whom Peter de Beauvoir, des Granges, was president. Sir Peter Osborne entrapped three of the Commissioners, and imprisoned them in the Castle, whence they cleverly escaped. The Lieutenant-Governor, referred to in the text, was a Major Robert Russell, deputed to Guernsey by the Earl of Warwick, Lord High Admiral of England. At this period the States generally, if not always, met in the College, partly perhaps because, with a very few scholars or none at all, it was a convenient place, or more probably because the College was beyond the range of Sir Peter Osborne's cannon in the Castle.

[†] This conclusion is confirmed by the rising in 1643, occasioned by Russell's high-handed behaviour. "The islanders rose in arms, and compelled Russell to promise that in future he would be guided in his proceedings by the States and Royal Court."—Tupper.

[†] This was unfortunate, for Mr. Dalgarno was an eminently gifted teacher. He was born in Old Aberdeen, kept a private school at Oxford for thirty years, wrote several valuable philosophical works, and died at Oxford in 1687, at the age of about sixty.

The Rev. Francis Dubois was, in 1672, appointed by the Governor, Lord Hatton, to the vacancy. He was a B.A. of Christ Church, and an M.A. and Fellow of Jesus College, Oxford, Chaplain to the Governor and to the garrison. His tenure was short, for he died in 1675. At his death the "benefice" of the College was sequestrated by order of the Ecclesiastical Court in the hands of the Churchwardens of the Town, a practice which became customary. We Churchwardens of the Town, a practice which became customary. We learn from Bishop Morley's register that, in July 1675, the Rev. Nicholas Le Mesurier, M.A., of Jesus College, Oxford, was ordained deacon and priest on his title of Rector or Master of the Royal College in Guernsey. Later on (1711) when the question of pluralities came up for decision during the incumbency of the Rev. Lawrence Payne, master, and also Rector of St. Martin's parish, the Rev. Nicholas Le Mesurier, then Dean, certified that he had resigned the mastership on preferment to St. Andrew's in 1678, as he could urge no precedent for holding a cure in conjunction with the office of master. with the office of master.

In 1674, King Charles issued an order that one of the three Hampshire places in Corpus Christi College in Oxford should be always appropriated to a scholar of the islands of Jersey and Guernsey by turns, and the Bishop wrote to the President of the College to that effect. But this arrangement fell through, and in 1678 Bishop

Morley founded five Scholarships at Pembroke College.

This generous benefaction, made exactly 100 years after the islands had become parts, albeit "the remotest parts," of the Diocese of Winchester, was expressly designed to encourage better men to qualify for the King Charles' Fellowships than the "raw youths" who had too often been advanced to them. The scholars were to be nominated by the Dean, Bailiff, and Jurats of either island, and were to receive annually £10 each with chambers. They were to hold the Scholarships for five years, residing at Pembroke, except for the fifth year, during which leave was given for them to travel in France to master the French language. They were required to promise solemnly to return to the islands to serve as preachers, schoolmasters, or otherwise*; and on attaining the age of twenty-one each scholar was solemnly bound before the Dean and Bailiff in a penalty of £200 to fulfil his engagement.

The first Morley scholars at Pembroke were John Ahier, Charles (son of Philip) Dumaresq, and Edward d'Auvergne, all born in Jersey; and Thomas Picot, a native of Guernsey. The foundation allotted three of the Scholarships to Jersey, and two to Guernsey. Elizabeth College is not referred to in the Indenture, the only condition being that the scholars should be natives of one island or the other. This omission, taken with reference to the low standard of educa-

[•] This condition was rescinded in 1857.

^{*} This condition was resembled in 1857.

† Bishop Morley died in 1864, at the age of 87. He took a prominent part in the stirring politics of his day. He was stripped of his preferments, and went into exile with King Charles II. He helped to smoothe the task of the Restoration, being not unacceptable to the Calvinist party. In 1860 he was made Dean of Christ Church, and then Bishop of Worcester, and, two years later, Bishop of Winchester. His benefactions were numerous, amounting to \$40,000.

tion attained by the islanders elected to the King Charles' Fellowships, makes it evident that the College was of little utility. King Charles II. (1678) gave the Morley scholars a preferential claim to his father's Fellowships. It may be stated, by way of anticipation, that, in 1857, the Fellowships as well as the Scholarships were made open to all natives of the bailiwicks of Guernsey and Jersey, and to others, not natives, who had been educated for two years at Elizabeth College, Guernsey, or Victoria College, Jersey.

years at Elizabeth College, Guernsey, or Victoria College, Jersey.

In 1682, the Rev. William Johnson was master of the College, as appears from the record of a reprimand administered by the Dean, as Visitor. The visitorial authority, under the statutes, was limited to reprimanding the master for neglect of duty, or for cruelty, and the scholars for disobedience to the master. As regards the latter, it extended to expulsion after three admonitions. Mr. Johnson, an Englishman, was thus formally admonished in 1682 for his ignorance of French, "qui le rend incapable d'apprendre la Latine a ses écoliers." The school was emptied, and, in 1683, the Dean, at the instance of the Royal Court,* caused the master to be examined, when, admitting his want of knowledge of French, he offered to engage an assistant. The Dean, considering such an offer inadmissible under the statutes, decided to refer the matter to the Governor. Whether such reference was made or not does not appear, but Johnson continued to hold the mastership till his death, in 1698. There is no record that he was allowed an assistant, and it may be presumed that the Dean or Governor eventually connived at the introduction of English text-books and manuals, an innovation generally attributed to Dean Hemming's time.

Jacob Bouhaut was master in 1700.

The Rev. Lawrence Payne, master in 1708, applied to the Court for a grant for repairs. His incumbency brought up the question of pluralities. The Court (1711) ruled that the master was bound to repair dilapidations which had occurred during his occupation. Payne failed to make the repairs, and the Court attached the rents of College lands leased, and the wheat rents. His successor found the repairs still unexecuted, but was permitted to enter without incurring responsibility therefor, and Payne's tithes, as Rector, were (1715) put under attachment till he produced security. In this year the Court made a grant of £300 tournois from the public revenues, in addition to the sum recovered from Payne, to put the building into order.

The public complaint (1711) against this master was not only that he absented himself for eighteen mouths in England leaving a Min

The public complaint (1711) against this master was not only that he absented himself for eighteen months in England, leaving a Minister to act for him, and that he was about similarly to contract for a new period of four years; but also that, on preferment to the parish of St. Martin's, he had not, as his predecessors had done in similar case, resigned the mastership, but had further agreed to do duty at St. Saviour's. The States took the matter up, resolving

[•] The petition to the Court stated that many parents would willingly send their boys to the school, and thence to Oxford, to be trained for the ministry, if the master were a competent man.

that the union of the mastership with any clerical benefice was incompatible with the statutes of the school. It was decided to refer the question to the Crown, and, though a grant for that purpose was made from the revenues of the King's Weights, it seems that nothing was done. Payne's action in resigning, in 1714, may have induced the States to save the cost of the reference. This is to be regretted, for a clear and authoritative decision at this period would have prevented much abuse, which will be referred to in its place.

have prevented much abuse, which will be referred to in its place. Though the Court, as has been said, allowed John Rowe to take possession of the school in 1714, there is no record of his "induction," and the King's Procureur, in 1719 (after Rowe's death in 1716) charged Payne with simony in the contract by which he handed over to Rowe. The case was given in Payne's favour.

The vexed question as to the responsibility of the master for repairs was at last decided during the time of the next master, of whom a record remains, the Rev. John Le Mesurier, M.A., also Dean of Guernsey, who held office from, at least, 1738 till his death in 1759. He was also Rector of St. Andrew's. No objection seems to have been taken to the plural appointments of Dean, Rector, and Master, though by the statutes, the Dean, as shown above, is the only official holding immediate authority over the master; and though a bitter outery was roused against Le Mesurier's successor, in both offices conjoined. The explanation is simple. Dean Hemming was a stranger, and Dean Le Mesurier had the advantage of being a native. The latter, however, had apparently expected opposition, for he obtained, in 1738, the written opinion of Dr. W. Strahan, of Doctor's Commons:—"Although the Dean has power to admonish the master, he cannot deprive him, that power being vested in the Governor of the island, or his deputy, and therefore I see no inconsistency why the offices of Dean and Master may not be united in one and the same person, since the discipline of the school will not thereby suffer, the Governor having the supreme power of correcting the master." The Dean did not make use of this opinion.*

In 1720, during the office of some unknown master, the Royal Court had mulcted the Town Trésor of £123 tournois for College repairs. When, in 1738, Dean Le Mesurier petitioned the Court to relieve the master of all responsibility, it was urged, on his behalf, that, in the statutes of foundation, the school was assigned to the States, and that the States were responsible. The Advocate for the country parishes (les paroisses des champs) claimed to be held free of liability, on the ground of old custom. This claim brought under enquiry the liability of the Town parish, as owners of the market place (Place des Halles) in High Street, alleged to have been handed to that parish with the condition that the repairs of the school should for ever be made at the cost of the Town Trésor. It was

^{*} And it was not till 1760 that the Ecclesiastical Court became aware of the existence of this document, though in that year the Dean's son, Mr. John Le Mesurier, Greffier, certified that he had given Dr. Strahan's opinion to Mr. Hemming on his appointment.

also urged, on behalf of the master, that there could have been no intention on the part of Queen Elizabeth to saddle him with so great a burden, "vast messuages, great gate, long and high walls, repair of which would swallow up the slender emoluments of the endowment. It was also understood that the former College house i.e. the church of the friars, had been larger than the then (1739) College, and that it had spacious vaults underneath. The Town College, and that it had spacious vaults underneath. parish, represented by the Procureur, contended that the school was open to the whole island. The Court decided that the master should proceed against all the parishes for re-imbursement of his outlay on repairs. This shows, at all events, that the claim against the Town with regard to the market place was not established. The decision was not given till 1747. Between that date and 1753 various surveys and temporary repairs were made, till it was finally decided to pull down the building and erect a new College.

The States further decided to erect the new College at the public expense, and the Committee of 1824 remark that, since that date, the States have held themselves responsible for its upkeep, a decision "most conformable to the original intention of the donor," and "most reasonable, since the master's portion (of the land assignment) had been allowed to be alienated."

The new College was not completed till 1760, after Dean Le Mesurier's death. It was close by the old one. Its erection cost the States £6,866 tournois, and £117 tournois for house rent during the course of erection. The cost (£490 sterling) seems small, and in an anonymous letter, signed "Patriot," in 1760, it was stated to

have been £600 sterling.

The Rev. John Hemming, M.A., succeeded Dean Le Mesurier in 1759, as Master in May, and as Dean in August. He had been tutor to the children of the Governor, Lord Delaware, who appointed him to the mastership, and presented him to the Bishop for institution as Dean. The selection of an Englishman was naturally very unpopular, and whatever Mr. Hemming's merits or demerits, he soon had a swarm of hornets about his ears. His claim to sit in the States was negatived, on the ground that the Dean only sat as a Rector; and there was such opposition raised to his continuing as master of a school, of which by office he was Visitor, that he was not sorry to resign, perhaps on obtaining some other preferment in England. Dean Hemming had a serious quarrel with the Royal Court and with the parishioners of St. Pierredu-Bois, as he chose to object to the removal of the school-house He was defeated in the latter affair, as he undoubtedly deserved to be, but not until the death of his patron.

When the Dean found that he had not been summoned to the States, he appealed to the Bishop and the Governor, who obtained an Order in Council that the Dean "do hold, possess, and enjoy all the power and privilege which his predecessors in the same office have at any time heretofore held, possessed, and enjoyed." (June

1760).

In October, 1760, an influentially-signed petition was presented

to the States, complaining that, though Mr. Hemming took possession in August, 1759, he had not yet opened the school, declaring that he had submitted to the States the conditions under which he would receive scholars.

The letter to the States referred to was dated 10th March, 1760. In it Mr. Hemming set forth that certain lands and part of the wheat rents of the College, forming integral portions of the royal endowment, had been alienated; and that, until the States took steps to recover the alienated lands, he felt himself relieved of the duties incident to the mastership. He offered to bring an action against the persons in possession of the alienated College property, if the States would give him authority to do so and support him with the necessary funds. He also called attention to certain

additions and repairs required in the new College.

The Court, in November, 1760, sent a copy of the petition to the master. Dean Hemming, in reply, and with reference to a summons to appear before the Court which he had just received, urged that the Court had no jurisdiction whatever, for he hardly thought that the precedent of 1644, when, during the rebellion, the States assumed a power to correct the master, could be cited. He urged that the ecclesiastical jurisdiction in the island vested in himself as Dean, and referred to the Order in Council of June, 1760, which confirmed him in all the powers and privileges of his office. He called on the Court not only not to encourage, but to censure all attempts to disturb the good order of government established in the island. He added "if there be any complaint to be made against the master of Elizabeth College, let it be legally done; first to the Dean (which has not yet been done), and then to the Right Honorable the Governor."

At an extraordinary meeting of the Royal Court, the master was ordered to appear. The order was repeated four days after, a warning being added that the master would be proceeded against for contempt. On this, Mr. Hemming opened the school, received some scholars, and promised to receive more after Christmas. He apparently did not feel his position to be quite secure, should there be a question before the King in Council whether, under the peculiar circumstances, the States at least, if not the Court, had not a right to interfere. He did not, however, take any notice of the summons, and the Court, on the other hand, having gained an essential point, apparently thought it best not to proceed further, and so suspended their order.

The committee of 1824 remarked that the States should have applied to England for the appointment, for the nonce, of another

Visitor.

The Court took Mr. Hemming's letter of 1759 into consideration early in 1761, so far as it dealt with additions and repairs of the College. Since the date of the letter, a series of counter propositions had been presented by one Henry Le Mesurier, who was in possession of a good deal of the alienated land, and who, perhaps, feared enquiry, or was angry at the questioning of the validity of his

title. Mr. Hemming had asked that the walls round the College estate should be repaired. Part of the wall separated Mr. Le Mesurier's land, which was portion of the assignment of 1563, from the land in possession of the College. The Court postponed consideration of the matter. It was disposed of after Mr. Hemming's departure, when the States both made the additions asked for by the master, and accepted Mr. Le Mesurier's claim to have the right to repair the wall, binding him and his heirs to keep it in repair.

It is probable that Dean Hemming deserves the credit of having finally changed the language of instruction at the College from

French to English.

He was succeeded by the Rev. Elias Crespin, B.A., who had officiated for him as Garrison Chaplain, a post which Mr. Hemming had held in addition to the Mastership and Deanery. The date of Mr. Crespin's appointment by the Governor was 26th June, 1761, and he was formally put in possession by Mr. Hemming, as Dean, on July 11th. His appointment was to the mastership of the "Free School of Elizabeth." The statutes nowhere make the tuition free, though, even up to 1824, nothing but a customary fee of one guinea as a Christmas gift to the master, together with 2s. 6d. (afterwards 5s.) for coals, and 1s. to the master's servant, was from a very early date paid voluntarily by each scholar. The school was free in the sense that any native was admissible, without limit of age, or even, as held by the Committee of 1824, of sex. There was, however, an idea prevalent at one time, that not only strangers' children, but even children of natives born out of the island, were inadmissible. This point was only once mooted, when, later on, Mr. Naylor was assistant to the master.

Mr. Crespin was inducted as Dean in 1765. He employed the Rev. D. F. Durand as his assistant or substitute in the school until the year 1772. The objection taken to such employment of an assistant in the time of the Rev. W. Johnson, 1682, was not raised, though in so far as the master failed to attend the school, continuing to draw the emoluments, and, inasmuch as the assistant was not sworn or inducted, the employment of an assistant was clearly contrary to the statutes of 1563. The practice soon, however, became established. In 1772, when Mr. Durand was absent from the island, Mr. Crespin assumed charge of the school, except for a short time, when he secured the services of the Rev. René Martineau (who did not know a word of English, now the language of the school), till Mr. Durand's return in 1780. For the remainder of Mr. Crespin's term of office, Mr. Durand held charge of the College, even when he was Rector of St. Andrew's. In 1795 Dean Crespin retired, in order to secure the mastership for his nephew, the Rev. Nicholas Carey, who also succeeded him as Rector of St. Martin's. Mr. Durand became Dean in 1795. The Rev. Nicholas Carey, B.A., held the mastership till 1824. He held, also, the cure of St. Martin's and, till the French Chapel Royal in St. James' Palace was destroyed by fire, was one of the three readers at that chapel, paying one of his colleagues to do his duties in Guernsey. The number of scholars fell off rapidly at the College, as was natural, till, in 1815, the master was left with only one pupil, the afterwards famous Dr. Jérémie, Dean of Lincoln. In 1816, with the concurrence of the Lieutenant-Governor and the Dean, he appointed the Rev. C. D. Isdell, B.A. (an ex-bible-clerk of New College, and minor canon of Winchester), to have charge of the school; and the school was moved away from the College to premises in Sausmarez Street, outside the grounds. Mr. Isdell, in consequence of the declaration of peace, lost his garrison duty in the Vale parish; but being elected one of the Ministers of St. James' Church, he gave up the school in 1818, and continued at St. James' until his return to his Vicarage of St. Thomas' at Winchester. He was succeeded in the school by a Mr. Naylor (1818-9), and then by the Rev. Thomas Grut (1819-24).

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Mr. Grut, Rector of St. Andrew's, who had for years kept a small day school, was induced to accept Mr. Carey's offer of £50 a year as assistant master, by reason of the success of a rival school, kept by the Rev. Philip Hayes.* Mr. Grut increased his emoluments by teaching branches of knowledge not included in the College course, for five guineas a year.

This section may conclude with a note on two points of importance, (1) the number of scholars at various times, and (2) the great increase in the value of the wheat rents, which formed so large a

portion of the master's revenue.

At various periods—under Mr. Johnson and Mr. Nicholas Carey, for instance—the school was empty. Few scholars attended at the beginning of Mr. Crespin's time; afterwards his assistant, Mr. Durand, had from fifteen to twenty-five boys. In 1798, under Mr. Carey, "the school became languid," and in 1799 there was only one boy. There was a revival in the next year, until the year 1806, when an average of eighteen was reached. From that time to 1813 there was a great falling off, one or two boys only attending. At last from 1813 to 1816, not a boy remained under instruction at the College. There was again a partial revival, and from that time to about 1824 the numbers fluctuated from fifteen to twenty-nine. On the eve of the re-opening, after the appointment of Mr. Stocker, there were only ten scholars left.

Mr. Carey had a house and garden, above seventy-eight quarters of rentes, and fields which let for £26 a year. The rentes, which in 1824 were 15s. a quarter, were, in war time, much higher, sometimes as much as 40s. At the time of the endowment the rentes were only 4s. 3d. a quarter. It must not be lost sight of that the so-called assistants to Mr. Carey were really in charge of the school, and it must be inferred that, apart from other cures, he enjoyed an income, paying only £50 to the assistant, far beyond the services rendered.

[•] Hayes' proprietary school was founded in 1811 by the Rev. Philip Hayes, and continued by his son, Mr. J. F. Hayes. It was long a rival to the College, and claimed many distinguished Guernseymen. It was closed in Midsummer, 1872. Mr. John Foster Hayes died in 1882.

ENQUIRY OF 1824, AND THE THE RE-CHARTERING.

In 1821, Sir John Colborne, K.C.B. (afterwards Baron Seaton) was Lieutenant-Governor; Mr. Daniel de Lisle Brock, Bailiff; and the Very Reverend D. F. Durand, Dean. The Rev. Nicholas Carey was master of Elizabeth College. There was much discussion about this time on the subject of education. The substitution of ecclesiastics for laymen on the staff of the College of Caen had closed the doors of that excellent school to the staunch protestants of Guernsey, and enhanced the old difficulty of providing a good education near home for their sons. The good work being done by Mr. Grut no doubt brought the College to the minds of thinking men, but the credit of the idea of a complete reform belongs entirely to Mr. George Le Boutillier,* a Jerseyman of good family, who had been in business in Guernsey since 1804. He found great indifference on the matter among the authorities, but at last decided to submit his scheme to the new Lieutenant-Governor. He wrote out his project, and sent it to Sir John Colborne, by the hand of the Rev. Richard Potenger, with the promise that his name should not be disclosed. But Sir John insisted on knowing and seeing the author. As Mr. Le Boutillier says in his autobiography, "the matter could not have been placed in better hands." In October the Lieutenant-Governor invited the Dean to consider whether the College could be "made a fit place for the education of the sons of the inhabitants of He pointed out that there were only sixteen boys in the school, taught by the Rector of St. Andrew's (Mr. Grut) at a salary of £50; that the master appeared to imagine himself the "custos or head of the College," without any obligation to enter the school himself as instructor; that the mastership had frequently been considered a sinecure; and that the mismanagement of the school was the sole reason why it was in such a deplorable condition. He reminded the Dean that, ever since he had been Visitor, the master had refused to take scholars, or had claimed the right to appoint a deputy; and asked him whether his permitting the master to absent himself was not virtually a sanction to the continuance of The Dean replied that he would certainly feel flagrant abuse.

^{*} Mr. George Le Boutillier (born 1783, died 1867) was also the projector and builder of the "Le Boutillier Arcade," now known as the "Commercial Arcade," one of the most notable improvements in the town of St. Peter Port, which carried with it the beginning of the South Esplanade reclamation. He introduced gas into the island in lighting the Arcade therewith. He took a prominent part in local politics, but lost so greatly in the Arcade scheme that he emigrated to the United States with his family in 1838, where he and his sons founded the Le Boutillier houses at Cincinnati, New York and Philadelphia, and attained a position in the commercial world which, with all their energy and intelligence, they could scarcely have achieved in Guernsey. "Il a droit aux égards qui sont dûs à son esprit directeur, qui a laissé son empreinte par où il a passé dans le monde." "One of the greatest benefactors that ever came to the island, whose services were not only ill requited, but scarcely acknowleded."

bound to enforce the statutes if called on to do so in his official Sir John Colborne then wrote that he would consider capacity. himself warranted in suspending the master, unless the Dean reported that (1) the statutes were no longer neglected, and (2) that a complete classical education could be received at the College. At the end of October, Mr. Durand "had great satisfaction in saying that, whatever irregularities may have occurred heretofore, they do not now exist." He reported that Mr. Carey was regular in his attendance at the school, taking the upper classes, and leaving the juniors to Mr. Grut, the under-master. He also reported that he considered both the master and under-master competent, as the former was educated at Winchester, and as both were graduates of Oxford.

This sudden improvement does not appear to have satisfied the Lieutenant-Governor, but he took no further action for two years, till December 1823. He then resolved to institute an enquiry. The Dean had not the "smallest objection," and the master replied to the Lieutenant-Governor's notification that he would "be happy "to attend the committee appointed by him to ascertain whether "the endowment of Elizabeth College would admit of improvement. The Bailiff expressed hearty approval, and promised co-operation.

TERMS OF INSTRUCTION AT ELIZABETH COLLEGE.

"The Latin and Greek languages are taught in conformity to the royal "statutes of this institution, without any charge.

"The English language, writing, arithmetic, and geography (one guines per quarter), but with geometry, mensuration and land surveying, navigation, algebra, or any part of the higher branches of the mathematics.

Mr. Grut was then the only teacher, and the notice must be read with Mr. N. Carey's report, in 1824, that nothing was taught in the institution but Latin and Greek.

The Committee was entrusted with the duty of enquiry, to enable them to suggest means for checking the "irregularities and abuses which have pervaded every department of Elizabeth College." They had scant material to work upon, "since no record had been kept at the College." They were unable to find important documents, notably the Commission of Queen Elizabeth to the Commissioners of 1563, which, indeed, is still unavailable.

Parenthetically it may be stated that immediately after the appointment of the Committee, the master moved the school back to the College, from the house in Sausmarez-street, where it had been held since 1816, when Mr. Carey began to employ a deputy to "perform the duty formerly assigned to the master of the College." One of the heads of enquiry specified in the instructions to the Committee was the "cause of the removal of the scholars from the College " (in 1816).

Without repeating the facts detailed in the earlier pages of this history, we may briefly notice the finding of the Committee on important points, in order to explain the recommendations made:—

The statutes did not appoint a Visitor, though certain visitorial powers were conferred on the Dean.

The discipline of the school was entirely vested in the master, subject to the said powers of the Dean.

The statutes failed to prescribe rules for the appointment of a master, save in the case of the vacancy caused by removal for misconduct; and though the Royal Commissioners, in 1607, supplemented the Charter, the Governor's nominations did not always give satisfaction, and at times the States usurped the function of the Governor.

The master need not be in holy orders. The College is a lay establishment, and the Dean, in his ecclesiastical jurisdiction, has no authority, and therefore the sequestration of the revenue by the Dean during a vacancy is ultra vires.

The States are responsible for the upkeep of the College, as finally settled, in 1748, to have been the intention of the statutes, and, in the event of expenditure beyond the revenue of the College estate, may levy a tax on the island at large, or may charge reasonable fees on the scholars, or in addition to, or in lieu of, these methods, may obtain funds in any other way in their power.

The States may raise the master's salary, if he is called on to teach other subjects than Latin or Greek; and may employ assistants to the master, provided that the master is not deprived of any portion of the endowed wheat-rents; and provided that his authority over the scholars or under-masters is in no degree abridged.

In spite of precedent to the contrary, it is optional with the States to allow the master the revenue arising from the leasing of any part of the College estate.

The introduction of English as the medium of instruction, though an innovation on the statutes, must be recognized, albeit, as long as French is the language of the pulpit and the

bar, the teaching of French is indispensable.

The employment by the master of an usher or under-master, to keep the school independently of him, is a violation of the statutes.

Though the holding of a church benefice by the master is not contrary to the letter of the statutes, it is contrary to the spirit thereof, unless the master attend the school continually during the prescribed hours of instruction.

Similarly the conjunction of the offices of Dean and master is objectionable, unless another than the Dean is specially or

generally vested with visitorial authority by the Dean.

The scholars of Elizabeth College, as such, have no peculiar claim on the King Charles Fellowships, nor on the Bishop Morley Scholarships.

The three subordinate free public schools, which enjoy a royal

endowment, are not affiliated to the College.

endowment, are not athliated to the College.

To correct abuses, to enlarge the system of education, and to connect it with University preferment, the Committee made the following proposals, which, with some important modifications, were, as will be seen, incorporated in the new Charter:

The Governing Body.—It was proposed that the Governor should be Patron, and the Bishop of Winchester Visitor, with power to

delegate his authority as such to the Dean, or his Surrogate, not being a master of the school; and that the States should elect twelve Trustees, natives or "received inhabitants," to serve for life, but subject to disqualification by misconduct, or by absence for more than two years at one time; and that the Trustees, with the resident Lieutenant-Governor as president, and the Visitor's delegate for the time being as ex-officio Trustee, be constituted a body corporate, with a common seal, to administer the affairs of the College. It was contemplated that the Trustees would proceed at once in the work of reform, and then formulate new statutes for incorporation in a new Charter, to be solicited by the States of the island.

MASTERS.—There were to be two masters under the Committee's scheme, a head master and a second master, the latter being appointed as soon as the number of scholars should reach seventy-five. The appointments to be made by the Trustees, subject to the Patron's confirmation. Both masters to be allowed to employ an usher, with the previous sanction of the Trustees, but neither to leave his classes in charge of his usher. A deputy, however, to be allowed during sanctioned temporary absence, provided that the deputy be approved by the Trustees, after due certificate of competence, and be formally sworn, and be inducted by the Visitor. Both masters to be members of the Church of England, and the head master to be also a graduate in priest's orders. Both to be certified as to qualification by an English University, and, as to character and art and ability to teach, by The masters to hold office the Visitor, after examination.

quamdiu se bene gesserint, to reside on the College premises, and not to be permitted to hold any church benefice, or other public office, which might in any way interfere with attendance on their classes. It was intended that the head master should retain the then school-house as his residence, with its garden; and that the second master should have quarters in the new College to be erected. The masters to divide the six classes between them, the "lower school" being allotted to the second master. The head master to be allowed to keep boarders, including, with the sanction of the Trustees, boys not admissible on the foundation.

The proposed emoluments for the head master to be guaranteed to be not less than £350 per annum, and for the second master not less than £200, made up as follows:—The head master to receive a quarterage, in lieu of the customary new year's gift, servant and coal money, of 12s. 6d. per quarter for scholars on the foundation, and double for those not so admitted. The quarterage was intended to cover the charge for instruction in the Latin and Greek classics. For instruction in the English classics a fixed charge to be made of 22s. 6d. per quarter in the junior, and five shillings more in the senior classes. For other subjects the charges recommended were:—

1, French; 2, navigation; 3, book-keeping

The head master to receive, besides his house and garden, and an equivalent for the endowed wheat-rents (to be fixed), £3 10s. for every boy in the school, and £1 in addition for each boy in the senior classes. The second master to be allowed, besides his apartments, coals, and a servant to sweep the schoolroom, a fixed salary of £40 per annum, and £2 per boy, and 15s. more for each boy in the junior classes.

OUT-RESIDENT MASTERS.—The Trustees to be empowered to employ special masters to teach other subjects than the classics. These to be required to attend from two to six days in the week, according to the number of scholars in their respective classes. The French, mathematical, and architectural masters to be paid a salary of £30, plus £1 for each pupil assigned to them, and the master for writing and arithmetic to have a salary of £20, with 15s. per annum added for each pupil. The ushers appointed by the head master and the second master to look for payment to their employer.

SCHOLARS.—The number not to exceed one-hundred-and-fifty, without the sanction of the States. This limit applied only to foundation scholars. The age of admission on the foundation to be from eight to fourteen, but no boy to be allowed to remain on the foundation after attaining the age of nineteen. The privileges

of the foundation also to be restricted to boys born in the island, and to boys the sons of native parents or of received inhabitants, even though born elsewhere. The admission of nonfoundation scholars to be regulated by the Trustees, on the principle that the numbers should not be in excess of the accommodation and means of education, or to the prejudice of the foundation scholars. All scholars to be registered on entry, and those for the foundation admitted according to the date of such entry. Preference to be given by special regulations, to be prepared by the Trustees, for the admission of scholars to the College from the three subordinate schools of royal endowment, who had attended such schools for three years.

who had attended such schools for three years.

The fees* to be paid by scholars have been described in the summary of the proposed emoluments of the masters.

CURRICULUM.—Latin and Greek to be taught in all the classes, in conformity, as regards text books and exercises, with the practice of the University of Oxford. English classics likewise to be taught in every class, and to include history (general and scriptural), rhetoric, elocution, and the belles lettres. All other subjects to be optional, and writing and arithmetic to be confined to the lower school.

The year to be divided into four terms, with one month's vacation at Christmas and at Midsummer, and one week at Easter; and holidays to be allowable for one day per quarter at the discretion of the Trustees, and another at that of the head-master, besides the holidays on days set apart by the Church for special services.

The school hours to be from 9 a.m. to 3.15 p.m., without a recess, and without a half-holiday on Saturday.

Scholarships, etc.—The Committee recommended that the Crown should be moved to restrict the selection of Guernsey candidates for the Bishop Morley Scholarships and the King Charles Fellowships to students of Elizabeth College of not less than four years' standing, and to prescribe a public examination

before admission. It was proposed also that steps should be taken to endow a fourth Fellowship on the King Charles' foundation, so that two Fellowships might be allotted to each of the islands of Guernsey and Jersey, and, further, that means should be devised for providing an endowment for a third Scholarship on Bishop Morley's foundation, so that Guernsey might have as many Scholarships on that foundation as Jersey. It was lastly recommended that three Exhibitions of £10 per annum each (at any College at either of the two English Universities) should be established, and should be in the gift of the Trustees of Elizabeth College.

MISCELLANEOUS.—The Committee proposed that the States should be asked to contribute £80 per annum for repairs of building, and all contingencies whatsoever. Secondly, that a building fund be raised, in shares not exceeding one-hundred-and-fifty, of £50 each, to be paid off gradually by the Trustees. Thirdly, that the Bailiff be requested to move the States to grant a sufficient sum, for lifteen years, to enable the Trustees with the

help of surplus income, a.—To pay off the shares of the building fund.

b.—To raise an endowment, conjointly with Jersey, for a fourth Fellowship.

c.—To raise another endowment for a third Scholarship, and

d.—An endowment for three Exhibitions.

An elaborate estimate was made in order to show that a sum of £300 from the States for fifteen years, besides the £80 proposed as an annual permanent grant in lieu of calling on the States for funds to repair and to meet contingencies, would, with surplus income, enable the Trustees to raise the building fund and pay off the debentures, and leave £720 for the additional Scholarship, and £3000 for the half endowment of the additional Fellowship, the cost of the three proposed Exhibitions being treated as current expenditure.

Before dealing with the manner in which the States received the Committee's recommendations, it must be noticed that a difficulty presented itself as to the vested interests of the then master, the Rev. Nicholas Carey. He could not be removed against his will, nor could new rules be imposed on him without obtaining a Royal Charter. Nor could he be compelled to discharge his usher or assistant, Mr. Grut. This matter was finally settled by a compromise. Mr. Carey agreed to quit the College premises, and to resign the mastership in consideration of a life grant of £60 per annum.

mastership in consideration of a life grant of £60 per annum.

The States met on 30th June, 1824, to deliberate on the Committee's proposals. A Committee of Public Instruction was nominated to consider and report. The States accepted the compromise made with the late master, and sanctioned the immediate appointment of a head master at a salary of £300 for three years, and the opening of the school.

On the 8th October, 1824, the Rev. Nicholas Carey took leave of the students, and on Monday, the 11th October, the Rev. Mr. Stocker opened the College on its new footing, with forty names enrolled. Of these, however, two did not join. In the "Register" it will be seen that the two sons of the Lieutenant-Governor received the places of honour as Nos. 1 and 2, an honour due to their father for his disinterested activity, and one fully justified by the aftercareers of his two distinguished sons. Next them were enrolled the three eldest sons of Mr. George Le Boutillier, in recognition of the credit due to him as the projector of the scheme of re-organization.*

The Committee of Public Instruction was composed of the following

members:—The Bailiff and two Jurats (Messrs. James Carey and John Hubert); the Rector of St. Sampson's (Rev. William Chepmell); the two Crown Officers (Mr. Thomas de Sausmarez, Procureur, and Mr. Charles de Jersey, Comptroller); and the Constables of the

Town.

The suggestions of the Committee and the disposal thereof by the States may be considered together. The report came before the States on the 6th January, 1825.†

The States adopted the following articles submitted to them in

the Billet d'Etat framed on the Committee's report :-

VISITORS.—Four to be appointed by an Order in Council, viz: Secretary of State for the Home Department, Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, and Dean of Guernsey, to whom appeals are to be made.

DIRECTORS OR TRUSTEES.—The Lieutenant-Governor and the States to be authorized by the Order in Council to elect thirteen Directors and Trustees, to whose management and superintendence the College and affairs relating to it, except the discipline of the school, are to be consigned, viz:

DIRECTORS AND TRUSTEES EX OFFICIO.—Bailiff, Lieutenant-Bailiff, and Rector of St. Peter Port. Three Directors to be named by the Lieutenant-Governor, and seven by the States.

Conditions.—After four years from first election, two Directors to resign in rotation every year, and two new Directors to be appointed, a resigning Director to be eligible for re-election after the expiration of one year. Directors to vacate their office when they leave the island for two years.

- * It appears somewhat strange that Col. De Havilland's two sons were not placed next in the order, for, after his return from India, in 1823, he surpassed all others in his energy and interest for the success of the re-establishment of the College of Elizabeth.
- † In 1825, the Rev. Mr. Grut, then rector of St. Andrew's, was much concerned by certain phrases which appeared in the Billet d'Etat. The two statements to which he

certain phrases which appeared in the Butta Ltat. The two statements to which he took exception were:—

"Pour le Collège, où le produit était nul, il fallait un changement total," and "Autrefois il n'y avait rien à payer, mais aussi il n'y avait rien à apprendre, et personne n'était content."

He named a long list of scholars who had either notably distinguished themselves, or who had at least done creditable work under his tuition. The letter appeared in the Gazette de Guernesey of the 8th January, 1825. It evoked a kindly rejoinder from the framer of the Billet, published in the same paper on the 15th January.

Powers.—The Directors and Trustees to regulate the finances of the institution, to receive all dues and rents, and to demand £12 from each pupil annually.

SALE OF EXCESS LAND.—The Directors to reserve six vergees for the masters and boys, and to dispose of the remainder, if not deemed useful to the establishment.

APPOINTMENT OF HEAD MASTER.—And to notify to the Vice-Chancellors of Oxford and Cambridge when the headship of the College becomes vacant, to receive testimonials of candidates for that office, and to forward their claims, through the Lieutenant-Governor, to the Governor, with a recommendation.

Funds for Building, &c.—An extension of the *impôt* (tax on spirituous liquors) to be applied for, from the year 1829 to 1844; a part of it to be appropriated yearly to the use of the College and parochial and national schools; and a sanction to be obtained to raise money for the expenditure required for these institutions.

DIRECTORS TO REGULATE INSTRUCTION IN PAROCHIAL AND NATIONAL SCHOOLS.—The Directors to be warranted to this effect by Order in Council, paying deference to private rights and patronage, in order that the inferior schools may have the advantage of their guidance and also aid from the College funds.

APPOINTMENT OF DIRECTORS.—Provisional Directors to be named at once, who are to receive full powers from the States to carry such parts of the intended arrangement into execution, as can be accomplished without an Order in Council or reference to Government; to prepare a plan to be laid before the States for the erection of buildings; to collect the College rents and education dues, to defray all the expenses incurred, and to fix the salaries of the masters and their places of residence. Seven Directors were at once appointed by the States.*

With respect to the articles dealing with means for guaranteeing to students of the College succession to vacant benefices in the island, and for abolishing the *champart*, and for commutation of tithes payable in kind, with a view to equalize the incomes of the country benefices, and lastly for obtaining a cession of some portion of the Crown tithes in order to raise those incomes:—

The States were of opinion

That a prayer should be added to the petition to Council for a regulation which may guarantee to the clergy, educated at the College, the vacant benefices, and to give the scholars the same preference for the Fellowships and Scholarships, to which the Royal Court and the Very Rev. the Dean at present nominate.

CONDITIONS.—(1) Provided the said ministers or scholars be

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natives of the island, or sons of at least one native parent; (2) that they shall have been at least three years at the College; (3) that the previous sanction of the Royal Court and the Dean be accorded to the proposed regulations as to Fellowships, etc.; and (4) that the regulation apply only to scholars of or over fourteen years of age.

Crown Tithes.—That the petition to augment the revenues of the clergy be submitted to the Crown through the Governor.

CHAMPARTS AND TITHES.—That the proposals regarding tithes and champarts be made the subject of an application to His Majesty in Council, after strict investigation and approval by the States.

The proposal as to an annual examination was adopted with modification. The States agreed that there should be an annual examination, at which prizes should be distributed to students who had shown distinguished progress, but they thought that the prizes should be fixed by the Directors for the first year, and further that they should be distributed by the Lieutenant-Governor (and not by the head master, as proposed) in the presence of the Visitors, the Royal Court, and Directors. The States were also of opinion that the Directors thus would be in a position to submit to the States proposals as to the sum necessary in future for the annual prizes.

The remaining article was rejected. It set forth a proposal to found an annual Exhibition of £100 per annum, from 1829

or sooner, to be tenable for five years.

It will appear from a comparison of the recommendations of Colonel de Havilland's Committee and the resolutions of the States that, in the main, the Committee's recommendations were approved. As regards the constitution and election of the governing body, some important modifications were suggested by the Committee of the States, which were finally approved, not only by the States, but by the King in Council. These modifications were probably wholly acceptable to the members of the Committee of Enquiry, and the outcome of maturer deliberation. As to the fees payable by students, in the same way, the outcome of the deliberations of the States Committee of Public Instruction greatly simplified the arrangement originally suggested.

The States further resolved to take on themselves the duty of raising a building fund rather than leave the governing body to raise such a fund by debentures. The proposals as regards the endowment of an additional Fellowship and Scholarship on the existing foundations were not accepted by the Committee of Public Instruction, whose enlargement of the first proposal as regards the endowment of an annual Exhibition, however, failed to secure the sanction of the States. Private benefaction soon supplied the want by the institution of no less than three Exhibitions, of which two remain to the present day. In some respects the States went beyond the recommendations of the Committee of Enquiry, notably in taking up the matter of control of, and aid to, primary and secondary schools

by the College Board of Directors, the improvement of the incomes of the island benefices, and the claim to succession thereto by clergy educated at Elizabeth College. The States supported the recommendations as to the claim of the College on the King Charles Fellowships and the Bishop Morley Scholarships, though, as has been already noticed, that claim did not secure recognition till 1857. The question of the steps to be taken to recover the alienated lands granted, in 1563, by the royal foundress, was finally settled by a letter dated 24th December, 1824, from the Lieutenant-Governor to the Bailiff. Sir John Colborne informed the Bailiff that after taking the opinions of the King's Law Officers, and after making enquiry, as already intimated in letters submitted to the Bailiff, it seemed to be established "that great part of the endowment (of lands to Elizabeth College) was illegally transferred, not many years after it had been delivered over to the States for the use of the island for ever. But as the States and authorities of a remote period allowed the intentions of the foundress to be frustrated, and probably connived at numerous unwarrantable proceedings, and as the spoliated lands have been lost to the College for more than two centuries, the present possessors of the property in question, rightly and honourably acquired by them and by their ancestors, could not, with any justice, be called on to surrender it, without receiving an indemnification from the States."

The Law Officers gave their opinion that the question must be decided by the law of Guernsey, and that, by that law, prescription as defined by Terrien gave the possessors a valid title sufficient to defeat the claims of the College, but that an action to recover the property might be entered in the name of the States. Mr. Advocate Jérémie, however, urged that prescription did not apply to choses hors de commune, as church-yards, colleges, etc., and that the documents in the case, aided by possession, were not sufficient to

defeat the claims of the College.

The States decided to act on the opinion of the Law Officers, bearing in mind, no doubt, that the land left to the College was even more than was requisite, for the States had (Billet d'Etat of January, 1825) sanctioned the sale of a portion even of that remainder.

The Order in Council, dated 30th September, 1825, dealing with the matters submitted by the States of Guernsey, was duly registered

on the records of the island.

This new Charter of Elizabeth College sets forth in the words of the Report from "the Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Council for the Affairs of Guernsey and Jersey, etc." the steps taken by the States of Guernsey to improve the College and the parochial schools, and notices that "some of the propositions, which the States have approved in principle, requiring elucidation as to the detail and mode of execution, the prayer of the States is confined to two points; the one having for its object the improved plan for the College and other public schools; the other, the means by which the States are to defray the expenses consequent to that improvement."

The narration of the detailed proposals follows:—As to the

appointment of Visitors and Directors, the procedure for selection of the Principal, the authority of the Directors with regard to parochial and national schools, and the sale of excess lands, on the one hand; and as to the renewal and continuation of the impôt, on the other.

The recommendation of the Lords of the Committee of Council was that "having taken the said petition into consideration, and the several documents accompanying the same, and having received the opinion of your Majesty's Attorney and Solicitor General thereupon, their Lordships do agree humbly to report as their opinion to your Majesty, that it may be advisable for your Majesty to comply with the prayer of the said petition, subject to the proviso, that instead of the Visitors proposed by the States of the said island, the power should be reserved to your Majesty of appointing such Visitors as your Majesty may deem proper as permanent Visitors, and also such other Visitors as your Majesty may at any time think expedient for any special purpose; and further, that it should be provided by express regulation that the acts of a majority of the Visitors, or any other, should be determined by your Majesty to be valid and binding."

"His Majesty having taken the said report into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, to approve thereof, and the Right Hon. Robert Peel, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to take the necessary measures, and cause the necessary directions to be given herein accordingly.'

Attention must be called to the modification made by the above order, as regards the Visitors. The appointment by His Majesty of the Lieutenant-Governor (whilst he continued Lieutenant-Governor) and the Very Rev. the Dean, to be Visitors of Elizabeth College, was intimated on the 7th March, 1826.

The States met on the 29th March, 1826.

The Billet d'Etat entered into great detail, both as to the satisfactory results already secured in the condition of the College, and as to the financial condition of the revenues of the island. No reference need be made in this place to the latter subject. The following articles were adopted:

To set apart £1400 per annum from the produce of the impôt on spirituous liquors, to be renewed, under the sanction of the Order in Council, from 1st September, 1829, for fifteen years, to pay off the £10,000 required for the erection of the College, and other immediate wants, at the rate of £666 per annum; and to create a fund for the College which will repay the interest due on the money, and every species of expense; and to improve the state of the parochial schools. For these two latter objects an annual sum of £734 was granted, making up the total of £1,400, it being ruled that at least £245 per annum should be allotted to the improvement of the parochial schools.

This article was not adopted without opposition. The opposition was, however, not to the proposal to build the College, but to allot an annual sum for repairs before it was built. It was urged that provision for repairs should be put off till repairs were needed, when "the States will grant the money requisite to effect them." The result was that there were eight votes against, and twenty-one for the article.

To raise, by anticipation, the sum of £8000 gradually, as required, for the new building, estimated to cost that sum.

quired, for the new building, estimated to cost that sum. To raise likewise the sum of £600 needed to level the College grounds and enclose them by a wall.

A sum of £700 to meet current expenses of the College up to

the 1st September, 1829.

And a like sum, also to be placed at the disposal of the Directors for the improvement of parochial schools.

Lastly to authorise the Finance Committee, conjointly with the Supervisor of the Harbour, to raise the required sums, by issue of States Notes of 20s. up to a limit fixed, and by arrangement with the Savings Bank for the balance, if any.

At the first meeting of the Directors, on 19th January, 1825, Mr. de Lisle was appointed secretary, and Mr. Bonamy Maingy, treasurer. At the same time Mr. J. du Port was appointed clerk by the Board. A committee was nominated to discuss the question of

tithes and champarts.

At the second meeting of the Board, it was resolved to build the College by contract, and on the 9th June, 1826, the tender of Mr. Samuel Goodwin for £9,565 was accepted, subject to the approval of The matter came before the States on the 28th idem. the States. The Bailiff in the Billet d'Etat explained that the foundations had cost £750 more than was expected, and that, besides this, a sum of £1345 would be required in excess of the original estimate of £8000. He urged that the action of the Directors should be approved, holding that they would have acted foolishly if, in order to bring the cost within the original estimate, they had sought to erect a smaller building or a cheaper one. He believed that the erection of a large and fine College, which would be an ornament to the island, would also be an advantage, in that it would afford the means of a good education to the children of natives, and save the cost to parents of obtaining a more costly education elsewhere; and that it would influence many respectable families to reside in Guernsey, thereby giving an increased activity to trade. He proposed therefore to grant an addition of £140 per annum to the £1400 voted in 1825. This proposition was adopted by a majority of six in a house of twenty-eight voting members.

The Board approved of the plan submitted by Mr. John Wilson, but awarded prizes to John Grover, junior, of Guernsey, and John Kendrick, carpenter, for the designs sent in by them in response to

an advertisement.

The foundation stone of the new College was laid on the 19th October, 1826. The following account of the ceremony is taken from the local newspapers of the day:—

The ceremony of laying the foundation stone of Elizabeth College took place last Thursday. At about half-past nine in the morning,

the grenadiers and riflemen of each regiment of militia infantry. together with a company of militia artillery, the band of the east regiment, and the buglers of the 81st regiment, assembled at the Gravées, where they formed into a brigade under the command of Col. Shortly after ten, the brigade marched towards the Court House where many of the constables, douzeniers, members of the court, and clergy, were already assembled. The right wing of the brigade extended as far as Government House, its left wing as far as Bethel Chapel. At a quarter before eleven, His Excellency Sir John Colborne arrived. He was accompanied by the Bailiff and the Very Reverend the arrived. He was accompanied by the Baillif and the Very Reverend the Dean, together with His Excellency's secretary, P. Bredthafft, Esq., and J. S. Brock and F. C. Lukis, Esquires, his aides-de-camp. His Excellency was saluted by the militia with presented arms, the band and buglers playing "God save the King." After some time had been spent in front of the Court House, in making the necessary arrangements, the procession moved forward in the following order:—

It was preceded by a part of the brigade, headed by Col. Guille, Col. Price, and Lieut.-Col. Bell, The remainder of the brigade, accompanied by Lieut.-Col. Prisulx and Lieut.-Col. Mansell, brought up the rear. by Heut.-Col. Primux and Lieut.-Col. Mansell, brought up the rear.
Arrived at the Town Church the troops defiled right and left whilst the
procession walked in. The usual morning prayers were read by the
Reverend Havilland Durand; and during the course of the Service, the
Te Deum and Jubilate were chanted with very good effect by the
singers of St. James' Church; they were accompanied on the organ
by Messrs. Kenge and Le Patourel. The service ended at noon, when

the procession returned up High-street, to the College-ground.

The Lieutenant-Governor and the Very Rev. the Dean delivered speeches. The latter said:—"That Elizabeth College, so nobly endowed by the royal foundress of blessed memory, should in the lapse of two hun-dred and fifty years, require a revision of its statutes and ordinances, suited to the temper of the times, and the improved state of society, is not to be wondered at. Whatever irregularities may have hitherto existed, we have the satisfaction to say they are at present effectually removed."

Extract from the Prayer used by Dean Durand at the laying of the stone. WE implore Thy divine blessing on all establishments devoted to the cultivation of religious and useful learning; on the two English Universities; and therein for the Colleges of Exeter, Jesus, and Pembroke, at Oxford. We also humbly pray for the good estate of the Royal College of Queen Elizabeth, in Guernsey: and herein for the Governor, Visitors, Directors, Principal, and all others connected with the Institution; that both here and in all other places more immediately dedicated to God's service and man's improvement, true religion and sound learning, with whatsoever else is excellent and useful, may for ever flourish and abound. We yield Thee our unfeigned thanks for mercies already received, for our creation, preservation, and all the blessings of this life, particularly for the advantages derived from the liberality of Foundress and Benefactors, such as were Queen Elizabeth, the munificent Foundress of this College, King Charles the First, and George Morley, Bishop of Winchester.

A Vase containing current coins of Great Britain and France, together with pieces of money, was deposited in a cavity which had been made in the Foundation Stone. The hole was covered with a brass plate containing the following inscription in Latin and English:—

The ceremony was concluded by the singing of the 100th Psalm.

After the ceremony, the boys of Elizabeth College were regaled in a most splendid manner under marquees erected upon the lawn in front of Government House, and in the evening Lady Colborne gave a grand ball and supper. The Royal Court, part of the Clergy, the Directors of the College, and the Militia officers, who had assisted at the ceremony,—to the number of fifty-nine—dined together at Rosetti's Assembly Rooms at five o'clock. The expense of this dinner was defrayed by a subscription. The Douzaines from the country parishes dined together at Coles' Hotel, the cost being met by a grant from the States Lotteries Fund, at the disposal of the Royal Court. Wine and biscuits were distributed as refreshments to the troops after the procession upon the New Ground; and the workmen were presented with a good solid dinner and a hogshead of wine by the Royal Court."

The narrative has now been brought to the date of the opening of the College under the new Charter of George IV. The object of this preface is only to show how the great legacy of the XVI. century, so long neglected and undervalued, was at last made to bear fruit. The record of the Register which follows is the fruit. In point of quality at least it is a record which will not suffer from comparison with that of any public school of England.

The Register will be carried on in the pages of the Elizabethan till it is brought to date, and in Vol. II. the history of the school from 1824 will find a place. We have adopted the motto suggested by the present Bailiff of Guernsey, whose record appears under No. 705, Fuimus, Sumus, Erimus.

Vol. I. may claim that it represents Fuimus. It is illustrated with scenes from many lands, and with pictures of bright and glorious deeds, set forth on a background of solid worth. The canvas is well preserved. Few indeed are the scratches and stains to disfigure it. Fuimus may in friendly rivalry challenge Sumus to beat it either in merit or brilliancy of colouring, and then, whatever the result of the challenge, both may join hands and call on Erimus to do its best; and our island will rejoice if the sons of Elizabeth College in the future surpass the deeds of their forbears. This publication of the brief outlines of their life work will in some measure incite the younger generations to achieve success, and add to the glory of their Alma Mater.

Students before the Re-Chartering.



S no fees were paid before the re-chartering in 1824, no nominal roll of scholars was kept. The following list has been compiled partly from private records and partly from the names of students incidentally given by

the Rev. Mr. Grut (vide footnote, page xxxii). Some names have been admitted on the evidence of the recollection of relatives and friends; but care has been taken to exclude doubtful Though even in the time of Dr. Saravia the number of non-Guernseymen was as large as that of natives, the list is made up of Channel Islanders only. In the absence of information as to the date of entry, the names are arranged in the order of birth :-

1765 to 1824.

Saumarez, John—born in Guernsey, December 12, 1755; son of Dr. Matthew Saumarez, of La Plaiderie, at one time Surgeon, R.N., and Carterette Le Marchant.

Medicine; Mem. Corp. Surg. (Diploma), 1776; M.R.C.S. 1800, when the Corporation of Surgeons was dissolved; Army Medical Department; Surgeon, 1802; served on the Staff of Major-General Sir John Doyle, Lieutenant-Governor of Guernsey, 1806-1814; promoted to Deputy-Inspector-General by Brevet, 1821, and afterwards to Surgeon-General to H.M's. Forces in the island; died in 1832.

Saumarez, James-born in Guernsey, March 11, 1757; brother of the above.

Entered the Royal Navy in 1770; "A celebrated naval hero; served in the Revolutionary War, 1774-82; present at the desperate attack on Sullivan's Island; at the great fight between Rodney and De Grasse, 1782, gained much distinction by his coolness and intrepidity. For his gallant capture in 1793 of the French frigate La Réunion, with one inferior in size and equipment. he received the honour of knighthood. He took a prominent part in the battle off Cape St. Vincent, 1797, and was second in command at the battle of the Nile in 1798, in

which he was severely wounded. In 1801 he was made a baronet, and vice-admiral of the blue; and in the same year fought his greatest action off Cadiz, defeating a French-Spanish fleet of 10 line-of-battle ships and four frigates with a squadron less than half their strength, and causing to the enemy a loss of 3000 men and three ships. This contest gave Saumarez the Order of the Bath, the freedom of the City of London, and the thanks of Parliament. He became Admiral in 1814, Vice-Admiral of Great Britain in 1821, was created G.C.B., K.S., and a Peer in 1831, under the title of Baron de Saumarez, of Saumarez, in the Island of Guernsey, and died at Guernsey in 1836." (Standard American Encyclopedia). Founded the "Saumarez Exhibition" at-Elizabeth College, in 1827. For fuller details of life and services, see "Memoirs of Admiral Lord de Saumarez," by Captain Sir John Ross, R.N., 1838. See also tablet in the Parish Church, St. Peter Port.

De Havilland, Thomas Fiott—born in Guernsey, April 10, 1775; son of Sir Peter de Havilland, Bailiff of Guernsey, and Carterette Fiott; and father of Nos. 13 and 14.

Carterette Fiott; and father of Nos. 13 and 14.

H.E.I.C.S. Madras Army, Cadet 1791; Engineer Corps, 1793; employed in the operations against Pondichery 1794; Seringapatam 1798-9 (medal); in Ceylon 1796-7; and in Egypt 1801-2 (medal); appointed by the Duke of Wellington, Field-Engineer in the Expedition to Egypt; attached to the Royal Engineers about 1803, under Sir Alexander Bryce; employed in the survey of Lake Marcotis near Alexandria, and also to examine the desert from Cairo to Suez for the supply of water for the Indian troops, (thanks of General Commanding). Returning to India from Guernsey in 1803 as a passenger in the Admiral Aplin he was cap ured by the French Privateer Psyché, but was ultimately landed at Calcutta; employed on the survey of Berar and Candeish Provinces; Superintending Engineer, Seringapatam; Field-Engineer to Commander-in-Chief 1814; at various times was Engineer and Assessor to the Madras Justices; Civil Architect, Madras Presidency; Superintending Engineer, Fort St. George and Acting Chief Engineer; constructed many works of importance e.g., the Scotch Church (St. Andrew's) at Madras; and the Madras Groins, an undertaking described by the Government as "beyond all comparison the greatest and most arduous work ever executed by any individual under that Presidency." Promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel in 1824, and retired in 1825; was President of the Committee of Enquiry in 1824 which led to the re-chartering of Elizabeth College, the credit for which was due to his untiring energy; was Director of the College, 1825-33. He built Havilland Hall in 1829; was elected Jurat of the Royal Court in 1842, and died in 1866.

Carré, Hilary—born in Guernsey, October 2, 1775; son of Hilary
Carré, of Le Valnord, and Mary Ollivier, of Le Mont Durant,
and grandfather of No. 775.

No profession; Jurat of the Royal Court, 1812; residence, Le Valnord; died in 1822.

Chepmell, William John—born in Guernsey, October 16, 1783; son of William Chepmell and Elizabeth Effard Coutart; and father of Nos. 27, 166, 239, and 441.

Also at Dr. Lemprière's School at Abingdon; Pemb. Coll., Oxford, 1800; B.A., 1804; M.A., 1807; Holy Orders; Rector of St. Sampson's and Vicar of the Vale, Guernsey; Director of Elizabeth College, 1825-33 and 1835-40; died 1859.

Dobree, John Saumarez—born in Guernsey, October 9, 1791; son of the Rev. Nicholas Peter Dobrée, Rector of the Castel, and Charlotte Saumarez, sister of Admiral Lord de Saumarez (above); father of Nos. 836 and 1151.

Left Elizabeth College, 1806, and went to Winchester; entered the Commissariat Department of the Army; Deputy-Assistant-Commissary-General 1810; Commissary-General 1852; served in the Peninsular War (medal with eight clasps for Sahagun, Benevente, Barrosa, Vittoria, St. Sebastian, Nivelle, Nive, Orthes, and Toulouse); Vice-President of the Poor Law Board, Guernsey, 1859-1861; Director of the College, 1837-42; Donor of the Champion Belt, Elizabeth College, 1860; died in 1884.

Ozanne, Richard Mansell-born in Guernsey, June 21, 1797; son of Richard Ozanne and Zuhowska de Warsaw; father of Nos. 283 and 473.

Served for forty-seven years in H.M. Service, Ordnance and War Department; Storekeeper, Fort George, Guernsey; died in 1866.

O'Brien, Terence-born in Guernsey, March 12, 1798; son of Dr. J. T. O'Brien, 95th Regiment, and Polly Isemonger; father of No. 777 and brother of No. 23.

Entered the Royal Navy as Midshipman under his cousin Admiral Sir Edmund Nagle; subsequently R.M. College; Ensign 87th Regiment 1813; Lieutenant 1815; Captain 1828; Assistant Military Secretary, Mauritius, 1834-43; Brevet-Major 1844; Lieutenant-Colonel 1846; Staff College; D.A.G. Leeward and Windward Islands, West Indies; A.Q.M.G. Cork; A.Q.M.G. Horse Guards; promoted to Major-General 1859; General Commanding in Ceylon 1860-1865, and Acting Governor of Ceylon for two years; died on voyage home in 1865 at Suez.

Carey, Frederick Charles--born in Guernsey, April 17, 1798; son of Isaac Carey and Margaret Tupper.

Business in Barcelona and Trieste, firm "Métivier, Betts & Carey," for many years; held a Commission in the Royal Guernsey Militia; residence, Woodlands, Castel; died in 1886. Benefactor of Elizabeth College by a legacy for the foundation of the "Fred. Carey Gold Medal" for Drawing.

Theodore Augustus—born in Guernsey, October 24, 1800; son of Colonel William Corbin, Royal Guernsey Artillery, and Mary Carré; brother of No. 161 and father of No. 1062.

Also College at Caen; Merchant Service; purchased and commanded a brig, which was chartered as a transport by the H.E.I.C.S. during the Burmese War of 1824 (thanked in despatches; Burmese Medal with clasp for Ava). After the war he was appointed Master Attendant at Amherst; subsequently appointed through the interest of Mr. A. C. Maingay (Chief Commissioner of the Tenasserim Provinces) Assistant Commissioner in Burmah, which position he held until 1844, when he was invalided home; died in Guernsey in 1856.

Jeremie, James Amiraux—born in Guernsey, April 12, 1801; son of James Jérémie and Marguerite Amiraux; and brother of No. 24.

Trinity College, Cambridge, (Scholar and Fellow); B.A. 1824; Holy Orders; M.A. 1827; B.D. 1850; D.D. 1850; D.C.L. 1862; Norrisian University Prize 1827, and the Hulsean Prize 1826; Hulsean Advocate 1833; Professor of Classics 1833, and then Dean (1836-50) of the H.E.I.C.S. College at Haileybury; Prebendary of Lincoln Cathedral and Rector of Winwick, Northampton; was appointed Regius Professor of Divinity at Cambridge 1850; and also Rector of Somersham, Hants, 1850-1870; Sub-Dean, 1848, and afterwards, 1864, Dean of Lincoln, in succession to Dr. Jeune; Author of the "History of the Church in the Second and Third Centuries." Founded two annual Prizes at the University for the encouragement of a critical study of the Septuagint Version of the Old Testament, etc.; died in 1872 at the Deanery, Lincoln, and was buried at St. Martin's, Guernsey.

Tupper, William de Vic—born in Guernsey, April 28, 1801; 5th son of John Elisha Tupper and Elizabeth Brock; brother of No. 17, and father of No. 476.

Also private tuition in England and Paris; unable to obtain a commission in the British Army owing to the reduction after the war in 1815, he went to Catalonia and thence to Chile, where his knowledge of English, French and Spanish obtained him military employment, first against the Spaniards and afterwards in the Civil War which ensued about 1829. He displayed the greatest

tact and bravery; rose to the rank of Colonel and was killed after an action near Talca, in Chile, in 1830. Besides many expressions in the highest quarters of the brilliancy of his achievements, the American Chargé d'Affaires wrote that "the heroism displayed by Tupper surpassed the prowess of any individual that I ever heard of in battle, and Guernsey has cause to be proud of such a hero." (Tupper's Witters of Guernsey) History of Guernsey).

Grut, Thomas Charles—born in Guernsey, April 30, 1802; son of the Rev. Thomas Grut, Rector of St. Andrew's and Assistant Master of Elizabeth College, and Lucy Elizabeth Martin.

Business at Copenhagen, firm "Hambro and Son," and at Hull; afterwards settled in Australia; died in 1879.

MacCulloch, Robert—born in Guernsey, January 10, 1804; son of David MacCulloch, Government Secretary, Guernsey, and Elizabeth Susanne Fischer: father of No. 1181.

Université de France, Caen; Guernsey Bar; Advocate of the Royal Court, 1824; Deputy-Judge Advocate of Guernsey and its dependencies; Lieut.-Colonel Commanding 3rd Regiment, R.G.M.; died 1865.

Carey, John—born in Guernsey, March 29, 1804; eldest son of John Carey, of the Grange, and Rachel Carey Dobrée; father of Nos. 1084, 1119, 1195, 1347, 1479, 1480.

Lord of the Manor of Ste. Hélène, Guernsey; held a Commission in the R.G.M.; Director of Elizabeth College, 1833-7; died 1878.

O'Brien, John Doyle—born in Guernsey, September 25, 1804; brother of Terence O'Brien (above).

Ensign 70th Regiment, 1821; Lieutenant 1825; Captain 1835; Major 1845; died as Colonel and D.Q.M.G., at Barbados in 1852.

MacCulloch, Charles—born in Guernsey, July 21, 1805; brother of Robert MacCulloch (above).

Business in Rio de Janeiro from 1821-41; retired to Guernsey, and died 1846.

De Sausmarez, James—born in Guernsey, January 20, 1806; son of Thomas de Sausmarez, H.M. Procureur, and Catherine de Havilland; brother of Nos. 21 and 101; father of No. 1132.

Pembroke College, Oxford; Scholar 1821-31; B.A. 1825; M.A. 1828; Barrister at Law, Inner Temple, 1828; practised in London and was offered, but declined, the rank of Q.C.; died 1846.

Merchant Service; commanded one of his father's vessels; retiring from the sea, entered into business in Guernsey; Member of the Central Douzaine; died about 1870.

Grut, Alfred—porn in Thomas Charles Grut (above). Alfred—born in Guernsey, May 3, 1806; brother of

Went to Rio de Janeiro; and died there at the age of 18.

O'Brien, Donough—born in Guernsey, July 30, 1806; brother of Térence O'Brien (above).

Ensign 72nd (The Duke of Albany's Own Highlanders) Regiment, 1822; Lieutenant, 1829; Captain 86th (The Royal County Down) Regiment, 1840; served in the Kaffir War (medal); died in India, in 1855, as Major.

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Bredthafft, Peter—born August 13, 1806; son of Peter Bredthafft, Government Secretary, Guernsey, and Deputy Inspector, R.G.M., and Martha Vardon.

Université de France, Caen; Guernsey Bar; Advocate of the Royal Court, Guernsey, 1826; Captain and Adjutant, R.G.M.

Jérémie, Peter-born 1807; son of John Jérémie.

Guernsey Bar; Queen's Comptroller. Author of the "Law of Real Property in Guernsey," 1841; and "Parochial and States Taxation;" died 1871.

MacCulloch, Henry—born in Guernsey, April 7, 1807; brother of Robert MacCulloch (above).

Assisted his uncle, Dr. John MacCulloch, M.D., F.R.S., F.L.S., and F.G.S., who was engaged by Government in the geological and mineralogical survey of Scotland; obtained a cadetahip in the H.E.I.C.S., 1827; 2nd Lieutenant, 18th Bombay Native Infantry, 1827; engaged in Surveying duties (services acknowledged after his death, in India in 1830, by a grant from the Government to his father).

Mauger, Nicholas—born in Guernsey, May 13, 1807; son of Captain Nicholas Mauger, R.N. (Villette), and brother of Nos. 81, 262, 488, and 587.

Went to India as an Indigo Planter, and was drowned in crossing a river.

Price, Bonamy—born in Guernsey, May 22, 1807; son of Lieut.-Colonel Frederick Price, R.G.M., and Maria Vardon; and brother of Nos. 15, 731, 744.

Also private tuition under Rev. Charles Bradley, at High Wycombe, 1821; Worcester College, Oxford, 1825; Scholar, 1828-35; B.A. (First Class Classics and Mathematics, the only double first of his time), 1829; M.A. 1832; Assistant Master at Rugby under Dr. Arnold, his former College tutor, 1830-2, and Classical Master, 1832-8; Master of the "Twenty Form," 1838-50; resigned and resided in London, 1850-68, during which time he served on two Royal Commissions. In 1868 he was elected Drummond Professor of Political Economy at Oxford, a post which he held till his death in 1888. He was twice president of the Economical Department of the Social Science Congress, at Cheltenham, in 1878, and at Nottingham in 1882. He also served on the Royal Commissions on Agriculture, and on Depression in Trade and Commerce. He was a keen advocate for the higher education of women. He wrote:—"Principles of Currency," 1869; "Currency and Banking," 1876; and "Chapters on Political Economy," 1878. He was made Hon. Fellow of Worcester in 1883, and also Hon. LL.D. of Edinburgh.

Mansell, Alfred—born in Guernsey, October 25, 1807; son of John Mansell, of the H.E.I.C.S. Navy, and Charlotte Ann Vardon; and father of Nos. 829, 866, 960, and 1051.

Business at Copenhagen, firm "Hambro and Son," and in Guernsey; also Manager of the Guernsey Commercial Bank for about twenty-five years; Danish Consul in Guernsey, 1848-1855; and Portuguese Vice-Consul 1858 to 1887; Director of Elizabeth College, 1851-4; at one time held a Commission in the R.G.M.; residence, Ashgrove, Guernsey; died in 1894.

Guerin, Elias Thomas—(afterwards de Guérin, see No. 593, his brother); born in Guernsey, November 9, 1807; son of Lieutenant-Colonel Elias Guerin, R.G.M., of Le Mont Durant, and Mary Ann Collings.

Business in Guernsey: Commanded the 1st Regiment, R.G.M.; died 1893.

Mansell, Frederick—born in Guernsey, March 10, 1808; son of Colonel Frederick Mansell, R.G.M., of the Vauxbelets, (Jurat of the Royal Court), and Ann Lukis; and brother of No. 258.

Business in Guernsey; Constable of St. Peter Port; also Lieutenant-Colonel of the West Regiment, R.G.M., and A.D.C. to General Napier, Lieut.-Governor of Guernsey; died in 1867.

Poore, John—born in Guernsey, November 20, 1808; son of John Poore and Mary de Lisle.

Engaged in the firm "Janvrin and de Lisle," in London; then went to Canada about 1833; was Captain in the force raised to quell the Canadian rebellion; died at Hamilton about 1841.

Solbé, Guerin—born in Guernsey, May 22, 1809; son of Elias Guerin Solbé and Sophia Guille.

Holy Orders; M.A.; Chaplain at Bonjah and Smyrna, and afterwards Rector of Sternfield, Suffolk; died 1860.

MacCulloch, Arthur—born in Guernsey, June 6, 1809; brother of Robert MacCulloch (above); father of No. 1205.

Merchant in Alicante; firm "Carey & Co.;" died at Newcastle, 1854.

Carré, Collings Mauger—born in Guernsey, July 17, 1809; second son of Hilary Carré, Jurat, (of Valnord), and Margaret Sarah Collings; father of Nos. 1365 and 1423.

R.G.M.; Lieutenant 1829; Captain 1843; studied medicine at University College, London, 1830-1, (1st medal for chemistry); abandoning this profession, he proceeded to Oxford, Magdalen Hall; B.A. (Hon. Class in Lit. Hum.) 1847; M.A.; Member of the "Catholic Apostolic Church" from 1828 till his death in 1854; was Evangelist, Pastor, and Angel of the Church in Geneva and Paris.

Mansell, Thomas Lukis—born in Guernsey, November 6, 1809; eldest son of Admiral Sir Thomas Mansell, Knt., K.C.H. and K.S.S., and Catherine Rabey Lukis; and brother of Nos. 59 and 586.

Trinity College, Dublin; B.A. 1831; Medicine; M.D. Edinburgh, 1832; M.R.C.S. England, 1832; practised in Guernsey; unanimously elected a Jurat of the Royal Court, 1868; appointed Supervisor of the States shortly before his death in 1879; was an authority on meteorology, and an F.R.S.

Bodiley, Alfred—born ; son of Mr. Bodiley, of High Street, Guernsey.

Business in Guernsey.

Colborne, James—born in Devon, September 8, 1815; son
of Sir John Colborne, G.C.B., etc., afterwards FieldMarshal, and 1st Baron Seaton, Lieut.-Governor of

Trinity College, Cambridge; 24th Regiment; Ensign, 1834; Captain, 1841; Major, 1850; Colonel, 1860; Major-General, 1868; served in the Canadian Rebellion, as A.D.C. to his father, Governor-General of Canada; and Military Secretary to his father, when Commander-in-Chief in Ireland (1855-60); succeeded to the title as 2nd Baron Seaton, 1863; retired as Lieut.-General and C.B. in 1881, and died in 1888.

 Colborne, Francis—born at Florence, April 23, 1817; brother of No. 1; left 1829.

Ensign 15th Regiment, 1836; A.D.C. to Governor-General British North America; Brevet-Major, 1853; Brevet-Lieutenant-Colonel, 1854; served in the Canadian Rebellion, 1838-9 (action of St. Eustache), and, as A.Q.M.G. throughout the Eastern Campaign, 1854-5; (Alma, Balaclava, Inkermann, Sevastopol—medal, 4 clasps; C.B., Knight Legion of Honour; Medjidie; Sardinian and Turkish medals; A.Q.M.G., Gibraltar, 1856-61; Q.M.G., Mauritius, 1862; A.G. in Scotland, 1867-71; commanded troops in China and Straits Settlements, 1874-8, (including Perak Expedition, 1875-6); K.C.B.; medal and clasp; General 1883; Colonel-Commandant the Queen's Own (Royal West Kent) Regiment, 1881; died in 1895.

3. Le Boutillier, Charles—born in Guernsey, December 1, 1811; son of George Le Boutillier, of Trinity, Jersey, and Elizabeth Le Maitre; vide 4, 5, 56; left 1827.

Was at Elizabeth College before the re-chartering; business in London; emigrated with his father to the United States in 1838, and, after some years in New York, (Canal Street), settled in business in Philadelphia, where he died in 1890. With his brothers, Nos. 5 and 56, he founded the "Le Boutillier French Prize," 1869, and in 1889, with his brother, No. 5, gave a handsome donation, in memory of their father, to the Guille-Allès Library, Guernsey, founded in 1882, by their friends, two true Guernseymen, Mr. John Guille, and Mr. Frederick M. Allès, after thirty years business partnership in New York.

4. Le Boutillier, George—born in Guernsey, August 26, 1813; brother of No 3; left 1827.

Emigrated to the United States and joined his father at Cincinnati, where they founded the business house of Le Boutillier; died about 1860.

Emigrated to the United States in 1839, and settled in business with his father and brother in Cincinnati, where he still resides.

6. Power, Horatio—born in Guernsey, May 12, 1810; son of Captain Thomas Power and Mary Perchard Mansell; vide 7, 269, 289; left 1827.

Medical student; died of cholera in Jersey, 1832.

7. Power, Thomas Barratt—born in Guernsey, October 13, 1815; brother of No. 6; left 1830.

Planter in Texas; married Miss Lee, niece of the famous General Lee, of the Confederate States Army; died 1882, in Alabama.

8. Le Mottée, John—born in Guernsey, September 1, 1810; son of John Le Mottée (Platon), of Huguenot descent, and Charlotte Boucaut; son, vide 1066; left 1827.

Lieutenant 1st Regiment R.G.M., 1882; Captain 1888; transferred to the 3rd Regiment, 1843; was elected Jurat of the Royal Court, 1851, and became Lieutenant-Bailiff, 1883; was Chairman of the Old Elizabethan Dinner, 1882; died 1896.

9. Le Mottee, William—born in Guernsey, December 11, 1812; brother of No. 8; son, vide 932; left 1830.

Open Scholarship, 1884, at Trinity College, Cambridge; B.A. (13th Wrangler) 1835; M.A., 1888; Holy Orders, 1837; Director of Elizabeth College, 1841-6, 1848-53; Garrison Chaplain, Guernsey, 1849-57; Vicar of Helion Bumpstead, 1857; died 1896.

10. Le Mottee, James—born in Guernsey, June 10, 1814; brother of No. 8; left 1827.

Died at Caen while studying for the Guernsey Bar.

11. Carey, William Huskisson—born in Guernsey, April 19, 1814; son of James Carey, Jurat, (Bigoterie) and Caroline Le Marchant, vide 64; son, vide 1073; left 1831.

Merchant at Havre; since retirement has resided in Paris.

12. Carey, Henry Charles—born in Guernsey, November 1, 1815; brother of No. 11; son, vide 1202; left 1832. Wine Merchant, Elsinore; died 1897.

13. de Havilland, Thomas—born in Guernsey, May 31, 1812; son of Colonel T. Fiott de Havilland, Jurat, (Havilland

Note.—In 1840, there were three officers in the Senior Department at the R.M. College, of whom two (Lieutenants de Havilland and T. F. Simmons, No.

183), were Old Elizabethans. The three officers were publicly informed by the Governor that "observing that they had all three not only acquitted themselves most satisfactorily in their examination in the prescribed course of studies, but had also extended their acquirements, beyond the limits of that course, unto the highest branches of mathematical science, further than any officers had ever done before them, the Board had marked their sense of their very superior talents and merits, by giving them the highest class of certificate which had ever been awarded at the College." The establishment of the R.M. College, it may be added, was due to the energy of a Guernseyman, Major-General John Gaspard Le Marchant, its first Lieutenant-Governor, 1802-11.

Medical Service, 1840; served with the 30th Bengal N.I. throughout the Punjanb Campaign, 1846-9, including the battles of Chilianwalla and Goojerat; medal and clasp; attached to a Regiment of Irregular Cavalry, 1851; stationed at Mussoorie, 1852-4, and then at Agra, 1855-64, as Garrison Surgeon; was shut up for eight months in Agra during the Mutiny; promoted to Surgeon-Major, 1860, and retired with the rank of Deputy Inspector General of Hospitals, 1866, to Guernsey; Director of Elizabeth College, 1870-5; bought "Saumarez Lodge," and continued in private practice till his death in 1884.

 Tupper, Henry—born in Guernsey, December 22, 1809; son of John Elisha Tupper, Les Côtils, and Elizabeth Brock; son, vide 830; left 1826.

Studied Law at Caen, and under Mr. Charles de Jersey, H.M. Procureur, in Guernsey; called to the Guernsey Bar, 1830; 2nd Regiment, R.G.M.; Captain, 1830; Major, 1835; Lieut. Colonel, 1840-46; elected Jurat of the Royal Court, 1857; an eminently patriotic and far-seeing Guernseyman; to him Guernsey is mainly indebted for the Hanois Lighthouse, the New Harbour of St. Peter Port, and St. Sampson's Harbour, the Breakwater at Sainte' Bay, the St. Julian's Avenue, and the New Markets; was Vice-Consul for France, and was recommended for knighthood of the Legion of Honour, in consideration of his services to the French marine, and with special reference to the erection of the Hanois Lighthouse, but, as a British subject and a civilian, he was ineligible for the dignity, and in lieu thereof a special gold medal was struck, which was sent to his widow a month after his death by the Consul-General for France on behalf of the Minister for Foreign Affairs; a model of the lighthouse was also presented to his widow and family by the French residents in Guernsey; was President of the Guernsey Committee of the "Conseil de la Société Française de Secours aux Blessés et Malades des Armées de Terre et de Mer," 1870-71, and was presented with a bronze medal and diploma; the "Henry Tupper" French Prize at Elizabeth College was founded by his daughter, Victoria, the wife of General Hubert Le Cocq, No. 784, in memory of her father and in fulfilment of his express wishes; was President also of the Guernsey Chamber of Commerce for many years; and was author of "Observations on the Law of Descent and Real Estate in the United Kingdom, and on the Social Condition of the People;" was Chairman of the College; he died in 1875 at Les Côtils, in the new house which he himself built.

Ensign, Cape Mounted Rifles, 1845; Captain, 1848; Major, 1853; Brevet-Colonel, 1854 (after nine years' service); Kaffir Wars, 1846-47, (horse wounded), and 1850-52 (slightly wounded and horse killed, medal and Brevet Lieutenant-Colonel); exchanged in 1858 into the 18th (Royal Irish) Regiment; served as Military Secretary to his uncle, Sir James Jackson, Commander-in-Chief at the Cape, 1856-7; New Zealand War, 1863-65, as Colonel on the Staff and Brigadier General (medal); commanded the expedition on the east coast to the Thames and to Tauranga; commanded at the siege and capture of the enemies' stronghold Orakau, which fell after three days' operations (C.B.), and received the surrender and submission of William Thompson, the great rebel chief in May, 1865; appointed to command the troops in Australia, in August, 1865; Acting Governor of Victoria for three months and received the thanks of the Legislature for his services; commanded an Infantry Brigade at Aldershot, 1867-71; Major-General, 1868; transferred to the command of the Northern District, 1871, and died while in command at Manchester, in 1872, at the age of 49, and was buried in Guernsey; tablet in the Town Church.

Merchant at Cuba; died at Portland, in Maine, U.S.A., in 1857.

322. Lang, Robert Cooper—born September 20, 1813; son of Robert Lang (Moor Park, Farnham) and Maria Francklyn; left 1831.

Business; went to the West Indies to superintend the property of his father, a West Indian merchant; died at St. Vincent on his way home in 1839.

323. Crowdy, Henry—born at Highworth, Wilts, March 5, 1816; son of Rev. William Crowdy (Classical Master, Elizabeth College); vide 377; left 1833.

Solicitor; practised at Highworth; died at Old Croft, Blunsdon,

Medicine, M.R.C.S., Eng., 1840; Assistant Surgeon, Army Medical Department, 1841; Surgeon Major, 1861; served with the 4th Regiment throughout Eastern Campaign, 1854-55, including the battles of Alma and Inkermann, siege and fall of Sevastopol (medal with three clasps, Knight of the Legion of Honour, and Turkish medal); retired as Honorary Deputy Inspector General, 1867, to Jersey and thence to Guernsey, where he died in 1894.

326. Le Lièvre, Edwin-born in Guernsey, December 25, 1817; son of James le Lièvre and Caroline Brown: left 1832.

Captain in the Merchant Service (East India Line), afterwards engaged by the Government, but was compelled through ill-health to give up the appointment; died in 1864.

327. Le Lievre, Thomas Brown—born in Guernsey, June 19, 1819; brother of No. 326; left 1832.

Merchant at Havannah; returned in failing health and died in Jersey.

328. Begbie, Matthew Baillie—born in Mauritius, September 13, 1819; son of Colonel Thos. Stirling Begbie, 44th Regiment;

Also private tuition, Edinburgh; Trinity College, Cambridge; migrated to Peterhouse; B.A., 1841 (28th Wrangler, and 3rd class in classics) and M.A.; Fellow of Peterhouse; Barrister-at-Law, Lincoln's Inn, 1844; sole Judge of British Columbia, 1858-70; Chief Justice, 1870; was knighted in 1875; was the strongest man of his day at the University and a keen sportsman; died, 1894; accorded a public funeral at Victoria, Vancouver's Island.

329. Begbie, Thomas Stirling—born at Chelsea, April 26, 1822; brother of No. 328; left 1836.

Engaged for three years in a West India Mercantile House, Glasgow; in 1842 started as a manufacturer on his own account, and worked up a large business in Glasgow; in 1850, joined a firm of locomotive builders, with colliery and iron works in the north of England; steam-ship owner during the Crimean War and Indian Mutiny; was actively employed by the Government in the conveyance of troops; owner of collieries in Lancashire and South Wales, and iron mines in North Staffordshire; elected F.R.G.S., 1860; residence, London.

330. Savi, James-born in Bengal, April 20, 1816; son of John Angelo Savi (of Elba); left 1832.

Indigo planter in Bengal; died in 1867.

331. Maingy (afterwards Maingay) William Bonamy—born in Guernsey, October 14, 1819; son of William Maingy and Eliza Lamb; left 1833.

Merchant at St. Petersburg for many years; residence, Exeter.

332. Musgrave, Charles Thomas—born at Camberwell, February 13, 1818; brother of No. 308; left 1832.

Engaged in farming in Norfolk; afterwards held a farm ("Lime End" farm) near Herstmonceux in Sussex; died there in 1876.

333. Collier, William Proctor—born in London, May 8, 1821; brother of No. 240; left 1831.

Civil Service; entered the Legacy Duty Office of the Inland Revenue in 1843; rose to the position of Deputy Comptroller of Legacy Duty, Dublin; retired in 1884; died in 1891.

334. De Lisle, Charles—born at Stoke Newington, June 14, 1819; brother of No. 110; left 1835.

Farming in Canada; died at Aylmer, from the effects of an accident, in 1874.

the Government to conduct the first exploration of York Peninsula (now part of Queensland); the numbers of the expedition were reduced from thirteen to three by climate and hardships, when Kennedy himself was slain (1848) by the aborigines in the vicinity of Escape (now Kennedy) River; a tablet was placed in St. James' Church, Sydney, by Government, in pursuance of a vote of the Legislative Council of N.S.W.; Mount Kennedy in West Australia also took its name from the explorer.

735. Mellish, George Lilly—born in Guernsey, August 31, 1834; brother of No. 557; left 1852.

Exeter College, Oxford, 1852; Scholar of Pembroke, 1852; rowed in the University eight against Cambridge; Ensign, 44th Regiment, 1855; Lieutenant, 1855; Crimean War; present at the taking of the Redan and fall of Sevastopol (medal and clasp); resigned in 1857; sheep-farming in New Zealand; Maori War; Captain in the 4th Waikato Regiment; remained in command of Galloway's redoubt till appointed Stipendiary Magistrate at Picton, New Zealand, 1865; transferred to Kaiapoi, 1868, and subsequently to Christchurch, N.Z., where he held office till his death in 1881.

(vide page 41), by an investment of £500.

The founder's intention was to create an exhibition of £20 per annum, but the interest on the capital sum invested necessitated the reduction of the annual value first to £15, and later on to £14.

Form, between the ages of fifteen and nineteen, of at least three years' standing; four exhibitions of £20 each, tenable for four years, provided that no student hold two of the exhibitions at the same time. Subjects:—(1), Divinity and History; (2), Mathematics and Arithmetic; (3), Classical Literature; and (4), Modern Languages.

The exhibitions only open to subscribers to the fund, to which the Masters above named contributed at a fixed rate for each of their boarders. At first natives and sons of natives were ineligible, but this restriction was removed in 1829.

Founded by Mrs. ANTHONY DELACOMBE MAINGAY, widow of A. D. MAINGAY, Esq. £40 per annum, tenable for two years; open to all students of one year's standing, between the ages of 16 and 19; this scholarship is expressly intended to encourage competition for the Indian Civil Service.

Mr. A. D. Maingay was appointed to the Colonial Civil Service, Straits Settlements, in 1815. In 1827, at the early age of thirty-two,

he was transferred to the H.E.I.C.S. his services being requisitioned to take administrative charge of the newly acquired province of Tenasserim in British Burmah. After a brilliant career of eight years, he retired, with a liberal pension from the Hon. East India Company's service, in shattered health, and died in 1865. His widow, besides endowing the Maingay Scholarship and Medal, presented the College with the Gymnasium, at a cost of £1000, which was completed in 1883 (see Frontispiece).

- Rev. Nicholas Le Mesurier (1675-8) was B.A. of Trinity College, Oxford, 1670, and M.A. from Jesus College, 1674.
- Rev. John Le Mesurier (1738-59), son of the above, was B.A. of Pembroke College, Oxford, 1712, and M.A., 1715.
- Rev. Elias Crespin (1761-95) was a graduate of Caius College, Cambridge.
- Rev. Nicholas Carey (1795-1824) was B.A., 1792, and M.A., 1796, of Pembroke College, Oxford.



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
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
