




Preface





Class

I T all began in September, 1939. A group of eager freshmen entered Chicago Teachers College, and on the other side of the globe, treacherous armies were invadina innocent countries.

Such was the beginning. The two have moved along together for four years — the process of educating for democracy in the classroom and the process of fighting for liberty on the battlefronts of the world. The culmination of one is at hand — the end of the struggle seems not yet in view.

At commencement exercises on June 22nd, Bachelor of Education degrees will be conferred on one hundred eighty-seven members of the class of June, 1943. Twelve of that number are men who have withdrawn from the College to enter the armed services of the country.

Although the times were tense, dunes trips, dances, parties, socials and many other events kept the class in constant movement from its beginning to the present time.

The class of June, 1943, is a class of leaders—leadership they acquired in teaching and in extracurricular activities. This leadership will show itself on the fields of battle for some and in the fields of education for most. All will not be called into service or vital industry, for there is work to do in the classrooms. It will be through this leadership that the citizens of the future will keep the world from repeating the chaos in which it is now enveloped.

The class of June; 1943, has produced its share of outstanding students. Class officers, Bob Moore, John Harbaugh, Ann Ross, and Helen Higgins have done a fine job of guiding their class through a difficult year — a year which saw its ranks being constantly depleted by the departure of personnel for the armed forces, to follow soldier and sailor husbands, or to work in defense industry. The senior prom, traditional with CTC graduating classes, was cancelled due to the depletion of the male membership. This affair was replaced by a class dinner in June.

Prominent on Council and the War Board were soriors Jack Duggan, Student Council and War Board president, Irwin Suloway, and Peg Connelly. Suloway's work on the publications has further distinguished him and Peg Connelly's capture of many athletic honors has given the College renown in the field of women's athletics.

Bob Anderson and Walt Krolikowski have been leaders in the publications, Mary Caplis, in Fellowship, Pete Bruschi in athletics, and Marge Kirk in class activities. If the names of all who are leaders and who have played important roles in the life and activity of the class were mentioned, the list would be a statement of the complete class personnel.

Officers

In Sebruary of 1940, fresh from the high schools, the Junior Colleges, the business world and other institutions of higher learning, one hundred and thirty-five individuals sat in the auditorium to hear an address of welcome by President John A. Bartky and officially become the class of February '44. The history of this class is the history of an America gone to war, for when the Bachelor of Education accolade is presented to its remaining members, fewer than seventy-five students will be there to receive their just earnings.

This class, which started so bravely, almost immediately felt the effects of world hypertension. The men of the class soon were leaving in an ever increasing stream, and the women of the class began dropping out to take war jobs and to follow soldier and sailor husbands. And so, the once hundred and thirty-tive dwindle to less than seventy-five as the world goes to war.

But while they were here, the class was one of the most active on the campus. Not content to accept previously conditioned ideas of college life, the class decided that education should be mixed with a seasoning of social activity. To make this more than a mere freshman's dream, the class broke the social ice by traveling to the sand dunes. This highly successful venture was followed by the other classes in the school and the Student Council. This tradition has been religiously followed and the students with their favorite

"profs" have taken trips to Starved Rock and White Pines State Park as well as their initial adventure into the wilds of the dunes. Their dances, the "Freshman Fling", Sophomore Cotillion, and the "Windy Whirl" packed a spirit of dash and freshness not oft seen on campus circles.

Social life was not their major contribution to college life, for while only a small percentage of the entire college enrollment, names of their members could be found on the teams, the clubs, the governing bodies, and all the other extra-curricular functions of campus activities. High on the list of student leaders would come: John Philbin, whose outstanding job was co-chairmanship of the '43 Homecoming celebration, just previous to his departure for the armed services; Fran O'Brien and Sylvia Buttney, two young ladies whose activities are too many and too numerous to mention; Al Schwartz, Tempo, tennis, and class fame; Jack Dyckman, ace class writer and roving member of the literary endeavors of the College; Marge Paschke, senior class president; to the June '43 class they gave Tom Jenkins, a real school leader.

As they leave to enter the war weary world to play their part in building a new world, this, the last mid-year graduating class, led by Marge Paschke, its president, Al Schwartz, vice president, Alice McCabe, secretary and Marge McGarigle, treasurer, can look back on four trying but successful, happy years. Theirs was a class split by war's fires, but theirs is a spirit which hopes to kindle days of peace.





A Student Council committee, the War Board this year was the major student group on the campus, sponsoring the vast majority of the College's war activities. Led by Council officers Jack Duggan, Irwin Suloway, Sylvia Buttney, and Peg Connelly the board supervised the sale of war stamps. Under its auspices a service flag was purchased and its dedication was made in a pre-Armistice Day assembly when the total number of men in service was one hundred sixty — a figure which has now risen to three hundred and thirty six. January was the unveiling of the honor roll of CTC servicemen. Probably the greatest single contribution of CTC students to the war effort was their response as blood donors when, through the activity of the War Board's Blood Donor Committee, the Red Cross Mobile unit was brought to CTC for a four day stay from March 23rd to March 26th. Over six hundred pints of blood were accepted from student and Englewood community volunteers.

An impressive record of success in ninety-five per cent of its endeavors has made the Student Council War Board a duration institution at the College.

Industrial Arts

SERVICE has keynoted the year in the industrial arts department. 
