TThe year 2000 was met with a great deal of anxiety. Many people thought that it was the beginning of the third millennium since it began with 2 . In reality it was the end of the second millennium which began in the year 1001 . The year 1999-2000 was very significant for anything dealing with computers because of the dates. The first event occurred on August 21-22, 1999 and dealt with the Global Positioning System which was a series of satellites which enabled receivers to know exactly where they were on the face of the earth. At that time, the first GPS 'year' (which was 1024 weeks long) ended and the GPS receivers had to reset themselves and reacquire their satellite information which meant that some units didn't work for a short period of time.

Many people feared that on Jan 1, 2000 the computers would interpret the 00 in the date as 1900 and that all kinds of things would go wrong from massive power failures to not getting money from banks to transportation of food and medicines being disrupted. The year 2000 was an interesting year to anticipate.

# THANKS FOR THE MEMORIES Euclid football coach, Tom Banc 

Flourteen years ago, Tom Banc took over as head football coach at Euclid High School. Previous to that time, Euclid had some good teams but season records ended up around .500 . ## Colophon Thank You

Josten's Printing and Publishing Division at State College, Pennsylvania printed the 530 copies of the 2000 Euclidian. The book was printed on Gloss 191 paper stock and included 48 pages of full color. All pages were created using the Aldus PageMaker® 5.0 program running on a Macintosh G3 computer that had 192 megabytes of RAM, and a 6 gigabyte hard drive. The pages were backed-up onto a 100 megabyte Iomega® removable Zip disk. A $21^{\prime \prime}$ color, two page monitor working with a $17^{\prime \prime}$ color monitor made page layouts much easier. A Macintosh IIsi computer with 17 megabytes of RAM was networked to the $G 3$ so that digital pictures could be indexed while the G3 was processing digital images. The IIsi was running system 7.5 while the G3 was using system 8.6. Digital images were imported either directly from a Kodak DC 280 Still Video Camera into the G3 via USB interface or were scanned in from a photograph using a 600 dpi scanner. The images were processed using Adobe Photoshop ${ }^{(B)}$. Graphics were produced using Aldus Freehand®, Type Styler® and Microsoft Works®. The index was made using the Josten's program, Last Name First®. The pages were recorded on 3.5 inch floppy disks and 100 megabyte Iomega ${ }^{18}$ Zip disks and hard copy was printed on a Hewlett Packard LaserJet III printer. The hardcopy and disks were sent to Josten's who stripped in the photos and produced the final copy on a Linotronic printer. The deadlines were submitted on lomega $®$ Zip disks since there was so much memory needed with the digital images. The cover was designed by the Josten's Art Department. Pages were submitted to the plant on five deadlines: November 1, November 22, December 27. January 24, and February 21. The pages were submitted as double page spreads. All the color pages had to be in the first deadline since their production entailed so much work. Since the final deadline was in elate February, nothing that occurred after that time could be included in the book. The picture patron option has gained in popularity with eighty six students having their baby pictures included. New this year was the option for parents to purchase more than just the 1/9 page ad if they wished to put multiple pictures or longer messages to their children. The Name Stamp option that was begun last year has also increased in popularity
