

*At a meeting of the General Association of Connecticut, at the house of Rev. Francis L. Robbins, in Enfield, on the third Tuesday of June, 1835. Present,*

The Rev. Thomas F. Davies was chosen Scribe ; Rev. Jeremiah Day, D. D., Moderator ; and Rev. Thomas L. Shipman, Assistant Scribe.

Certificates of membership were read, and the session was opened with prayer by the Moderator.

The Rules of Order were read.

The Rev. Messrs. Beach, M'Ewen, Waterman, Burgess, and Robbins were appointed a Committee of Overtures. Committee of Overtures reported in part : Report accepted.

A communication was received from the Congregational Association of the State of New York ; whereupon, Messrs. Beach, M'Ewen, and Shepard were appointed a Committee to report on said communication.

The Rev. Messrs. Brace, M'Ewen, Hickok, Fowler, Waterman, and Burgess were appointed a Committee to report on the State of Religion in the churches connected with this Association and corresponding Bodies.

Recess till half-past 2 o'clock.

Business being resumed : The Trustees of the Everest Fund reported. Report accepted. (*See Appendix, No. I.*) The following persons were appointed Trustees of that Fund, viz : Rev. Allen M'Lean, Benjamin Ely, Esq., Horace Cowles, Esq., and Rev. Jairus Burt.

*Resolved*, That the Trustees of the Everest Fund, be requested, in their next annual report to this Body, to state the manner in which said Fund was created, the conditions on which it stands, and the uses to which it is to be applied.

The Committee on a communication from the Congregational Association of N. York, reported, that in view of the documents presented to them from that Body, they respectfully recommend that the Rev. Pindar Field be admitted to sit as a corresponding member of this Body during the present session. Report accepted ; whereupon, Mr. Field was invited to sit with the Association.

The Report of the Treasurer of the General Association was read and accepted. (*See Appendix, No. II.*)

At 3 o'clock, attended public worship, when the Associational Sermon was preached by Rev. Anson S. Atwood, from Matt. 21 : 43.

The votes of the several District Associations in relation to the recommendation of the General Association, that the Register and Treasurer of the Association be members of the same ex-officio, were communicated, when it was found that a plurality had voted against concurrence.

The Rev. Samuel Spring was chosen Treasurer of the General Association.

The Rev. Messrs. Nathan Perkins, D. D., Calvin Chapin, D. D., Jeremiah Day, D. D., Matthew Noyes, Cornelius B. Everest, Daniel Smith, Thomas Punderson, Daniel Dow, James Beach, Samuel R. Andrew, Aaron Hovey, and William Ely, were appointed to certify the regular standing of travelling ministers.

The Rev. Nathan Perkins, D. D. was appointed to preach the *Concio ad Clerum* at the next Commencement of Yale College.

Whereas the Congregational Association of the State of New York, having requested a permanent union as a corresponding Body with this, and their Constitution and Confession of Faith, as submitted, having been read and carefully considered :

*Resolved*, That the Congregational Association of the State of New York be admitted to union with us on the same terms of correspondence as the Ecclesiastical Bodies in New England.

Heard Reports from the delegates to foreign Ecclesiastical Bodies.

Adjourned till half-past 7 o'clock, to-morrow morning.

*Wednesday morning*, half-past 7 o'clock, June 17.

Met according to adjournment. Prayer by the Moderator.

Rev. Messrs. Boardman, Shepard, and Dennis were appointed a Committee for receiving the Ecclesiastical Statistics of the Churches.

The Report of the Trustees of the Missionary Society of Connecticut was accepted and adopted, and directed to be printed with the Minutes. (*See Appendix, No. III.*)

The Rev. Messrs. Davies, Boardman, and Lee, were appointed a Committee to nominate Directors of the Missionary Society of Connecticut Auxiliary to the American Home Missionary Society. Committee reported : Whereupon the following persons were appointed by ballot : Rev. Joel Hawes, D. D., Jonathan Brace, Esq., John Caldwell, Esq., Seth Terry, Esq., Rev. Noah Porter, D. D., Samuel J. Hitchcock, Esq., John Hall, Esq., Rev. Nathan Perkins, D. D., Rev. Caleb J. Tenney, D. D., Rev. Timothy P. Gillett, Rev. Edward Bull, Thomas C. Perkins, Esq., Rev. Thomas Punderson, Jonathan Barnes, Esq., Rev. Bennet Tyler, D. D., Rev. Daniel G. Sprague, Rev. Samuel Spring, and Rev. Leonard Bacon.

To the General Conference of Maine; Rev. Messrs. Epaphras Goodman, and Gordon Hayes, principals; Hiram P. Arms, and Columbus Shumway, substitutes. [Meeting 4th Tuesday of June, 1836.]

Rev. Messrs. Urmston and M'Ewen were appointed a Committee to nominate delegates to the Congregational Association of N. York. Committee reported; whereupon, Rev. Messrs. Abner Brundage and James Beach were chosen principals; Leonard Bacon and Charles Bentley, substitutes, to the Congregational Association of New York. [Meeting at Paris, on the Thursday preceding the last Sabbath of August, 1835.]

Heard addresses in behalf of common schools in Indiana, by Rev. Amos Blanchard;—of the American Peace Society, by Rev. George C. Beckwith,—and the American Tract Society, by Rev. Ornan Eastman.

Rev. Messrs. Hickok and Pinneo were appointed a Committee on the subject of peace. Committee reported: Whereupon,

*Resolved*, That this Body highly approve of the objects and efforts of the American, Connecticut, and other Peace Societies, for the promotion of universal peace, and commend them to the prayers and patronage of the Christian community.

*Resolved*, That ministers of the Gospel connected with this Association, be requested to preach on this subject, at least once a-year, and the churches to observe the annual concert of prayer for the prevalence of peace through the world.

The Committee upon the State of Religion reported. Report accepted; and after some alterations, was adopted, and directed to be printed with the Minutes. (*See Appendix, No. IV.*)

Recess until 2 o'clock, P. M.

Convened at 2 o'clock.

*Voted*, That our Minutes shall be a certificate of the appointment of delegates to foreign Bodies.

The Committee on Ecclesiastical Statistics reported. Report accepted.

Rev. Messrs. Allen M'Lean, Joab Brace, Stephen Hubbel, Timothy P. Gillett, Herman L. Vaill, Charles A. Boardman, John Blatchford, George J. Tillotson, Epaphras Goodman, Thomas L. Shipman, Tetrius S. Clarke, and Moses B. Church, were appointed a Committee to procure Statistics of the Churches in their respective Associations, and forward them to the next General Association.

Attended public worship, and united with the church in Enfield, in the celebration of the sacrament of the Lord's supper.

The Committee to whom was referred the subject of Church Psalmody reported, that they have examined, with some care, a number of different versions and compilations of Psalms and Hymns, de-

signed to be used in public worship ; and while some of them may present a greater variety, both of subject and metre, and perhaps some improvement in arrangements and lyrical expression, yet they find no occasion to suggest to this Body any new recommendation to the churches on this subject. Report accepted and adopted.

A communication from the Rev. Justin Edwards, and others, was received : Whereupon the following preamble and resolutions were adopted, viz :

As it is the will of God that all persons should remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy, and as obedience to his will in this respect, is essential to the social, civil, and religious interests of man, and as every person is under obligation to use all suitable means to accomplish so desirable an object : Therefore,

*Resolved*, 1. That the running of Stages, Boats, Cars, and other vehicles of conveyance for purposes of worldly business, amusement, or profit, and also the travelling in them, on the Sabbath, are, in our view, *immoralities*, and ought to be universally abandoned.

*Resolved*, 2. That the patronizing of such establishments, thus violating the Sabbath, by knowingly and deliberately vesting stock in them, is, in our view, morally wrong, and ought also to be abandoned.

*Resolved*, 3. That it is the duty of all persons, especially ministers of the Gospel and members of Christian churches, by precept and example, by the diffusion of information and the exertion of kind moral influence, perseveringly to make efforts to secure universally, and to perpetuate the proper observance of the Christian Sabbath.

Adjourned to 7 o'clock, to-morrow morning.

Attended the annual meeting of the Domestic Missionary Society of Connecticut Auxiliary to the American Home Missionary Society. The Annual Reports of the Secretary and Treasurer were read, accepted, and directed to be printed. Addresses were made by Rev. Messrs. Leonard Bacon, T. T. Waterman, and Theron Baldwin.

*Thursday, June 18.*

Met according to adjournment. Prayer by the Moderator.

Andrew Kingsbury, Esq. was appointed Treasurer of the Missionary Society of Connecticut, and Rev. Horace Hooker, Auditor.

*Voted*, That the Committee for preparing a Pastoral Letter to our Churches be discharged from the duty assigned them.

*Voted*, That the next annual meeting of this Association be held at Norfolk, at the house of Rev. Joseph Eldredge, on the third Tuesday of June, 1836.

Rev. Messrs. A. McLean, Z. Crocker, A. M. Train, Z. Whitmore, S. D. Jewett, E. Hale, J. Blatchford, N. S. Hunt, W. Smith, G. L. Brownell, T. S. Clarke, and W. Ely, were appointed Receivers of Money in their respective Associations.

Rev. Samuel Spring was appointed to superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes of this Body.

*Voted*, That a Tax of twenty-five cents be collected from the pastors in the churches connected with the General Association.

*Voted*, That Rev. Messrs. J. Hawes, D. D., A. M'Ewen, S. Spring, C. Chapin, D. D., and B. Tyler, D. D., be a committee to revise the Rules of this Body, and report at the next annual meeting.

*Voted*, That the thanks of this Body be made to the people of Enfield, for their courteous and Christian hospitality during the present meeting ; and to the choir of singers, for their appropriate and acceptable services.

*Voted*, That the above be accepted as the true Minutes of this Body.

The closing prayer was offered by the Rev. Archibald Burgess, of New Hampshire.

Adjourned *sine die*.

## NO. III.

## Report of the Missionary Society of Connecticut.

*To the Missionary Society of Connecticut, to be convened at Enfield, on the third Tuesday of June, 1835, the Trustees of the Society respectfully present the following Report :*

CHRISTIAN FRIENDS AND BRETHREN :—

The receipts of the Missionary Society of Connecticut, for the year ending January 1, 1835, were \$3,446 38. There was expended during the same period, \$1,300 43. No addition was made, the past year, to the Permanent Fund, which now amounts to \$29,877 43.

The receipts are larger than can be reckoned on, from year to year, from the regular sources of income, belonging to the Society. The interest of the Permanent Fund is all upon which the Trustees, in forming their plans, can place reliance. Donations and legacies will probably be received, occasionally ; but in making appointments and incurring expenses, only the avails of the Permanent Fund can safely be taken into the account. If the resources of the Society are enlarged, by donations and legacies, the operations can be extended to a corresponding degree ;—but it would not be prudent to anticipate these resources, in plans for future action. This is one reason why the expenditures of the Board, the past year, were less than the receipts. Another reason is, that the Board were changing their mode of operations, on the Western Reserve, to which their attention is now exclusively bestowed. They did not think it expedient to make new appointments, until the arrangements contemplated, were carried into effect.

The new organization has been completed. The principles on which a Board of Directors, to act for the Trustees of this Society, on the Western Reserve, are to proceed, were stated in the last report to this Body. An active and efficient supervision, it is believed, will be exercised over our missionary operations, on the Reserve, under this arrangement. While the Trustees make all the appointments of Missionaries, and commission them for the work, the Board of Directors, who act under their control, will have the best means of judging as to the field of labor, and the amount of compensation.

The mode of conducting missions of the Western Reserve, is, in some respects, different from that in the old States. Congregations are aided, as among us ; but the circumstances of the community require that itineracy, within moderate and prescribed limits, should also be allowed. Beside his own congregation, a located missionary is, in some cases, permitted to occupy a field in his neighborhood, embracing not more than three townships. In this way new churches can be planted, and feeble churches be cherished, until, eventually, it is hoped, every township on the Reserve, will have its church and its minister, and be able to support religious institutions, without foreign aid.

No peculiar results crowned the efforts of the missionaries of this Society, the past year. The General Board say in their Report, "God has graciously blessed the labors of some of our number, and through our humble instrumentality, brought many sinners into the fold of the Great Shepherd." But the year seems not to have been so signally marked, by the enlargement of the churches, as were some former periods, in the history of our Society. The arrangements for the promotion of piety and salvation, in that section of our country, have never been better than at the present time. May the Spirit of God smile on our feeble attempts, that "glory may dwell in our land."

## NO. IV.

### Report on the State of Religion.

From the statements of the several District Associations, it appears that during the year past, the State at large has not been blessed with so extensive revivals as in some preceding years; yet in the aggregate, the work of grace has been considerable. The sections most affected by the Divine Spirit, have been the county of New London, the northern district of Hartford county, the northern district of Litchfield county, and the eastern and western districts of New Haven county. A number of churches in these locations have received large accessions. In other parts of the State, effects of divine grace, to some extent, have been noticed, and some additions made to the churches.

A few places in the western district of New Haven have been signalized by a special revival. The account of this work cannot be better given than in the words of the Report from that District.

"Some of our churches have been signally blessed, and we have reason to rejoice, that within a short period, in Milford, North Milford, Yale College, and other places within our limits, two or three hundred, as we hope, have passed from death unto life. These victories of divine grace have stimulated many of God's people to prayer and effort for a general revival of religion.

"Through the great mercy of God, Yale College has again been blessed with a powerful work of grace. It has been strikingly marked by manifest answers to united, and earnest, and persevering prayer. During the winter, the number of academical students communing with the college church, has been about one hundred and sixty. A few of these, from the commencement of the winter term, were so deeply impressed with the necessity of the Spirit's influence, to deliver from the prevalent security in sin, and to renew the heart to repentance, that they continued to meet and pray, during the term, though they saw no indications of special religious impression upon

the body of the students. Near the beginning of the spring term, they commenced a stated meeting for prayer, every evening. The number of those who attended was, at first, from fifteen to twenty; but afterwards increased to a hundred and fifty. This meeting is continued to the present time. In the early part of March, a special meeting of the *whole* church was held, to offer united supplications for the influences of the Spirit on the college. This was soon followed by a course of frequent preaching, in addition to the stated ministrations of the Sabbath; upon which the blessing of heaven descended, in a very manifest manner. A general solemnity pervaded the Institution. Numbers were deeply impressed with a conviction of guilt; and of these, sixty or more have expressed a hope, that they have cordially embraced the salvation of the Gospel. A solemn attention to the great interests of religion still continues; especially on the part of those who are hopefully pious, who now constitute the major part of the whole college.

"The *means* which have been used during the revival, have been frequent and fervent prayer, in the public assembly, in meetings of the church, and in various smaller circles; preaching specially adapted to the occasion, religious conversation, and meetings called for the purpose of addressing those whose attention was more or less awakened to the concerns of the soul. Though the religious interest has been deep and general, there has been no derangement of the regular order and literary exercises of the college. Most of those who have become hopefully pious, are the sons of parents who are professors of religion.

"The number of students in the *Theological* Department of Yale College, is between fifty and sixty. They have manifested a deep interest in the revival in the college, by their prayers and active labors. As there has heretofore been no provision to furnish them with convenient rooms for lodging and study; the Christian community have lately contributed about eight thousand dollars, to erect a building for their accommodation, the foundation of which is already laid."

We are pleased to learn, from the Report of the Hartford North Association, that "the Theological Seminary, at East Windsor, is in a promising state. It now contains sixteen students, and while it is rapidly taking a rank among sister institutions, bids fair to become an instrument of advancing the cause of Christ in our own and heathen lands."

Among the evils to be deplored, is a fearful increase of the profanation of the Sabbath, by travelling and vain recreation. While looking at this alarming sin, we feel some encouragement in the contemplation of a deep anxiety manifestly awakened in the pious, concerning the desecration of God's holy day. It is with surprise, we learn, that in some churches the Monthly Concert of Prayer is hardly observed; and with deep regret we hear, that in many of those in which it is observed, the attendance is very small. While we speak of this with pain and trembling, we rejoice to know that other churches attend this season of devotion with great punctuality, and make constant contributions to Foreign Missions. Another evil is looked at with dismay: The spirit of innovation and instability, pervading a large mass of

our Ecclesiastical Societies, renders the dismissal of ministers frequent, and their ministrations comparatively unsuccessful. The enemies of religion are encouraged to great intrigue—parishes are subjected to much turmoil and much expense—and the want of home with which ministers are threatened, operates as a powerful restraint upon an entrance into the sacred profession.

In general, the churches seem to enjoy peace, though some speak of trials; and we rejoice to hear that some feel more deeply than ever the importance of discipline. Though the congregations are reported as undiminished, still a conviction seems to be felt, that a larger proportion than formerly, of the population of the State, neglect public worship.

The several religious enterprises of the day, to which both the labors and pecuniary contributions of the people are devoted, have been well sustained, and we should think, with growing zeal and liberality.

Intemperance struggles hard to maintain its existence in our community; and its avaricious patrons are bold and obstinate. The effect of these things is however cheering. Reformers are more confirmed in their purposes, and more active and successful in their labors.

The commissioners from the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church state, that the last year has not been so distinguished for revivals of religion as many of the preceding years; but it is believed that the cause of Christian benevolence is, on the whole, advancing. The friends of Missionary, Bible, Tract, and Education Societies, are becoming more numerous and more efficient. Sabbath-schools are regarded with extensive favor, and exerting a most promising influence. While there is much to deplore, there is also gracious evidence of the continued protection and care of the King of Zion over the interests of his ransomed church.

The brethren from Massachusetts inform us, that although the special energies of the Divine Spirit are not *generally* enjoyed, yet in Bible-classes and Sabbath-schools, over four hundred have been hopefully brought into the fold of the Great Shepherd; that Williams and Amherst Colleges have both been visited with divine influences; that the Theological Seminary, at Andover, continues to enjoy the peculiar smiles of Heaven; that the cause of temperance steadily advances; that benevolent institutions are liberally and cordially sustained; and that in view of the Lord's mercies they have occasion greatly to rejoice.

From the General Convention of Vermont we learn, that of the two hundred and ten churches connected with the Convention, ninety-two are feeble—which, however, are anxious to support themselves; that the Vermont Domestic Missionary Society is waking up to their aid; that revivals have been enjoyed in Middlebury College, and in a number of towns in the State; that various errors prevail in the waste places; and that there is much occasion for renewed humility, prayer, and resolution in the service of the Great Redeemer.

The General Association of New Hampshire reports, that within the year past, all the churches in one of its District Associations, and many other churches in the State, have been copiously refreshed by

showers of divine grace. Seventy feeble Societies receive aid from the Domestic Missionary Society, while fifty-two, unaided, support the Gospel. In addition, the affecting and appalling fact is stated, that New Hampshire contains a hundred towns in which no minister of the Gospel, of our denomination, is to be found. Many of these are desolations, where formerly flourishing churches existed.

By the Evangelical Consociation of Rhode Island it is reported to us, that their churches are increased in number and activity; that Home Missions, the Temperance enterprise, and the Tract distribution, have received a good degree of attention, and have been marked with success.

An Ecclesiastical Body has been recently organized, called "The Congregational Association of the State of New York," and it has at this session been received into correspondence with this General Association. Their delegate reports, that it is one of the objects of the Association to collect the many churches which are yet disconnected with any ecclesiastical body, that their real situation may be known; that the great objects of Christian enterprise are patronized by the churches generally; that a few revivals of a very interesting character have been experienced; that the prospects of the churches which had been formerly affected by divisions, are considered promising; and that they are encouraged by a condition already more favorable to their spiritual prosperity.

On the whole, the review of every year is a review of sin—of short-comings in ministerial and ecclesiastical duty; but withal, a review of the forbearance, and loving-kindness and grace of our God. In him would we put our trust, and with renovated prayer and labor press into the duties of another year, hoping at the close of it to sing a new song to the praise of his grace.


