

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HISTORICAL FACTS.

In accordance with the expressed wishes of a number of the members of the German Reformed Salem Church of Harrisburg, the Rev'd John Winebrenner, then Pastor of the Church gave notice from the pulpit on the 12th of November, 1820, that a meeting of the membership would take place on Friday evening, November 17, 1820, to consider the propriety of establishing a Sunday School Society in connection with the Church. The Congregation then worshipped in the Log Church, corner of Third street and Cherry avenue, the first building This building erected in Harrisburg expressly for Divine worship. of which the engraving on the title page is a faithful picture was removed in 1854 and the present four brick dwelling houses erected in its stead. Those members who felt interested in Sunday Schools attended the meeting at the time and place above mentioned, and organized by electing Frederick Kelker chairman and John S. Wiestling secretary. It was resolved to establish a Sunday School Society, and a committee, consisting of George R. Horter, George H. Bueher and Joseph Van Reed, were appointed to draft a Constitution, which, after retiring for a short time, they reported as follows, to wit:

Constitution of the Salem Sunday School Society of Harrisburg, established with an intent to promote piety and learning:

ARTICLE 1. The society shall be known by the name, style and title of the Salem Sunday School Society of the Borough of Harrisburg.

ART. 2. The Society shall meet semi-annually on the second Monday of April and October. At their meeting in April they shall elect one President, a Secretary, Treasurer, and nine Managers, which Managers shall appoint from their body one President and Secretary, all of whom shall serve for the ensuing year, each of which may be re-eligible at any succeeding election.

ART. 3. An annual subscription of twenty-five cents shall constitute Membership.

ART. 4. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Society, but in his absence some other member shall be appointed President *pro tem*. The said President shall on the request of any five members expressed in writing, convene the Society.

ART. 5. The duty of the Secretary shall be to keep minutes of all business transacted by the Society in a book provided for that purpose.

ART. 6. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all monies collected, either as subscriptions, donations or for the sale of books, and enter the same carefully into a book provided for that purpose, and pay the same in orders signed by the President and attested by the Secretary of the Board of Managers, and shall annually exhibit a statement of his receipts and expenditures, to the Society, or such committee as they may appoint, and such committee shall have power to examine his accounts and make report at the succeeding meeting of the Society.

From the semi-annual report of the managers, read April 9, 1821, it appears that about one hundred children attended the first meeting of the school, which, it is believed, was opened in the Church on the 19th day of November, eighteen hundred and twenty. The enrolment was commenced on the following Sunday, November 26, 1820. This number had increased to 150, with an average attendance of one hundred. Many of the scholars recited from fifty to one hundred verses from the New Testament, with their catechism or hymns on each Sunday. Some from one hundred to three hundred verses, and mention is made of one girl, about twelve years of age, who on a certain Sunday recited eleven hundred verses, all of which she had learned during the previous week, besides a number of hymns, which latter could not be heard by her teacher for want of time.*

The first report is dated April 9, 1821, and signed by George Mish, President, and George H. Bucher, Secretary. The second October 29, 1821, signed by Charles Clark, President, and George H. Bueher, Secretary. April 8, 1822, we find Rev. John Winebrenner, President, John C. Bucher, Secretary and John S. Wiestling, Treasurer, and Managers, the Misses Doll, Mish, Ziegler, and Bucher, Geo. H. Bucher, Joshua M. Wiestling, Geo. Mish, Norman Callender and Henry Beader. Norman Callender, on behalf of the Managers reports "average "attendance of scholars one hundred. Five classes of boys and three " of girls who read in the Testament: three classes of boys and two of "girls who are reading and spelling in the spelling book; two classes of "boys and three of girls in the alphabet and spelling, and two classes of girls "reading and spelling German. Usually twenty ladies and gentlemen "attend as teachers. In numerous cases scholars recite from one hnn-"dred to three hundred verses each of the Testament learned in the previous week. "The reports for October, 1822 and April, 1823, are also signed by Norman Callender, President. Owing doubtless to the troubles between Pastor and people at that period, the Sunday School waned, and we find in the minutes that a meeting was held on the evening of Wednesday, the 23rd of June, 1824, for the purpose of re-establishing the Sunday School. Rev. Albert Helfenstein (who had just succeeded Rev. Winebrenner) Geo H. Bueher, Norman Callender and George Kunkel were appointed a committee to ascertain whether a sufficient number of competent teachers could be engaged to take charge of the At an adjourned meeting held on the 25th of June, this com-School mittee reported favorably.

The Constitution of the Salem Society was adopted until another one

could be prepared, if found necessary, and Rev'd A. Helfenstein was appointed President, John C. Bucher, Secretary and John S. Wiestling, Treasurer. Norman Callender and Miss Sarah Hoyer were appointed Superintendents and Geo. H. Bucher, Secretary of the School. The report dated Oct. 17, 1825, is full of encouragement and states that "lately there was formed in this place," (Harrisburg.) "The Dauphin "County Sunday School Union," with which this Society is connected, "and that a depository of Sunday School Books has been established "in which books can be obtained at Philadelphia prices."

March 11, 1828, we find the same Superintendent's report that in October 1827, it was found advisable to have a Sunday School Library which at the date of the report contained eighty-eight volumes. Scholars received a book per week for one red ticket, and the Teachers and others by payment of one cent. (Scholars then had to recite six verses to earn one *blue* ticket, and six blue tickets purchased one *red* ticket.)

On the evening of the 11th of March, 1829, the Society met in the school-room in the old Church, John C. Bucher presiding.

Norman Callender and Miss Sarah Hoyer report that the School has continued to assemble twice each Sunday as usual, with about one hundred scholars in regular attendance, seventeen teachers-thirteen young ladies and four young men; that the Library was opened on the 4th of November, 1827, and that it now contained 109 volumes. "They "also state that through the exertion of the ladies and others connected "with the Sunday School, who collected funds, and by permission of the "Vestry of the Congregation, the upper part of the old Church has "been prepared, and now afforded a very convenient and pleasant "school-room, and could also be used for congregational and prayer-"meetings." Previous to this time the School was held on the first floor of the old Church. The building had galleries on three sides, but was now remodeled so as to divide it into an upper and lower room. The Sabbath School was held above, and the lower part rented for dayschool purposes. The Secretary was ordered to send a copy of this report to Charles Capp, secretary of the Dauphin County Sunday School Union.

The officers elected to serve for the ensuing year were—President, Frederick Kelker; Secretary, John C. Bucher; Treasurer, George H. Bucher; Superintendents—Norman Callender and Sarah Hoyer; and George H. Bucher and Norman Callender, managers.

The same officers served in 1830, 1831 and 1832, excepting that Rev. D. Zacharias, then Pastor, was chosen President.

No record of the School from 1832 to the fall of 1838 can be found at present It is believed that David Krause, Esq., superintended part of the time. Norman Callender removed from Harrisburg in 1836. Rev. J. F. Berg was Pastor of the Church from November 1, 1835 to November 20, 1836. Mr. D. W. Gross is under the impression that he acted as superintendent while Rev. J. F. Berg was pastor. We find that when the records of the School were resumed, October 7, 1838, Mr. Gross was superintendent. At that time there were 461 volumes in the Library. On the 12th of May, 1839, Mr. Gross was compelled by severe affliction to resign, and the Hon. John C. Bucher, who had entered the School as a teacher on the second day of December, 1838, was chosen superintendent.

At this time there were upon the Roll 16 male and 18 female teachers, 97 male and 123 female scholars. Total-34 teachers and 220 scholars.

On the 8th of August, 1841, the new Lecture Room, 28 feet by 54 feet was dedicated. Divine services were held in the Church in the forenoon, and in the new building in the afternoon and evening. There were then upon the rolls, 36 Teachers, 294 Scholars.

On the 15th of August, the Sunday-school convened for the first time in the new School-house. As the Church building was then undergoing repairs the congregation continued to worship in the School-house statedly until the 3rd of October, 1841, when they again took possession of the Church.

On the 7th of April, 1843, the teachers and officers of the School, established a monthly concert of prayer. This association existed for seven years, and was productive of great benefit. The meetings were held on the second Monday of the month, conducted by Superintendent or Pastor. Teachers and scholars attended; essays were read by some teacher appointed at a previous meeting, and addresses on the subject of Sunday Schools delivered from time to time.

On the 6th of Angust, 1844, Mr. Charles F. Muench, assistant superintendent for a number of years resigned, and on the 14th of the same month D. W. Gross was elected to fill the vacancy. Mr. Gross continued in that office until his resignation, July 20, 1846, when Mr. George Zinn was elected in his stead.

On the first Sunday of March, 1847, all the scholars under the age of eight years, were placed under the care of Mr. Daniel W. Gross as superintendent, and the Infant School established. It met in the forenoon, and the Senior School in the afternoon. Thus ended the custom which had obtained from the beginning, of having two sessions of the School on the same Sunday. At the annual election held by the teachers August 9, 1847, Mr. George H. Small was elected Superintendent in the place of Hon. John C. Bucher, who had held the office from the 12th of May, 1839 to that date. It is due to the memory of this eminent servant of God and the church, here to record the fact that for integrity of purpose, assiduous labor and punctuality in duty Judge Bucher was without a superior. The records of Sunday School kept by him during his administration are most minute in their details and form a complete history not only of the Sunday School, but of the Church, Pastor's services, prayer-meetings and of every event in any way connected with the Church or School.

When he laid down the office of Superintendent he took a class of boys from twelve to fourteen years of age, and continued as a teacher until his sudden departure from this life on Sabbath morning, October, 26, 1851. Of him it may truly be said "*He walked with God, and was* not, for God took him." The Infant School continued to meet in the forenoon and the School School in the afternoon until November 28, 1852, which it was reorganized and occupied the new room which had been added to the Lecture room, extending the building to Cherry alley. This improvement added thirty-seven fect to the first building, making the whole length ninetyone feet by twenty-eight in breadth. The rooms were separated by folding doors, and the Schools then and thereafter assembled at the same hour, viz: 1:30 P. M.; excepting during very warm weather when the session has been occasionally changed to the morning hour. Mr. Gross was continued as Superintendent of this Department together with Mr. Chambers Dubbs who was chosen as assistant.

In 1865 the Infant School was placed in charge of D. A. Muench, [and A. L. Chayne (?)] and Mr. D. W. Gross appointed as Teacher of an Adult Bible Class of both sexes, then first established.

On the 29th of April 1850, Mr. George H. Small resigned his position Mr. Rudolph F. Kelker was elected Superintendent and Mr. George Z. Kunkel Assistant These brethren assumed their duties May 5th, 1850, and continued to serve in their respective stations being re-elected annually by the Teachers until December 31, 1869. On the 13th of July, 1868, and the 12th of July, 1869, the Consistory of the Church acquiesced in the elections made by the Sunday School Teachers, electing however, as General Superintendent, Rev. W. H. H. Snyder, and Daniel A. Muench Superintendent of the Infant School, and Mr. A. L. Chayne and Miss Rebecca C. Witman as his Assistants. December 6, 1869, the Consistory re-organized the School, to take effect January 1, 1870, viz: General Superintendent, Rev. W. H. H. Snyder,

Third Department, Adult Bible Class.—Rudolph F. Kelker, Teacher. Second department.—Superintendents: D. W. Gross, George Z. Kunkel.

Infant department.—Dauiel A. Muench, Superintendent, with Assistents A. L. Chayne and Miss Rebecca C. Witman.

These parties were re-elected December 5, 1870, and December 27, 1871, on which latter date Joshua M. Wiestling was substituted for Daniel A. Muench, who had declined re-election.

The same officers were continued through the year 1872, 1873 and 1874, with the exception of Mrs. Rebecca C. Moffit *nec* Witman, whose place was filled by election of Miss Fannie Muench, December, 1873.

December 28, 1874, the consistory elected the Pastor, Rev. W. II. H. Snyder, Teacher of the Adult Bible Class, in which capacity he has served until the present time; D. W. Gross and Geo. Z. Kunkel, Superintendents of Second Department, which position they filled until February, 1879, when Mr. Gross was appointed Superintendent of Infant School, which position he still retains; Joshua M. Wiestling, Superintendent of Infant Department, with Miss Kate Swarger and Fannie Muench as Assistants.

All of the above parties were annually re-elected until the present time, with the exception of Miss Fannie Muench, whose place was supplied in December, 1876, by the appointment of Misses Katie B. Swarger and Louise H. Orth.
