

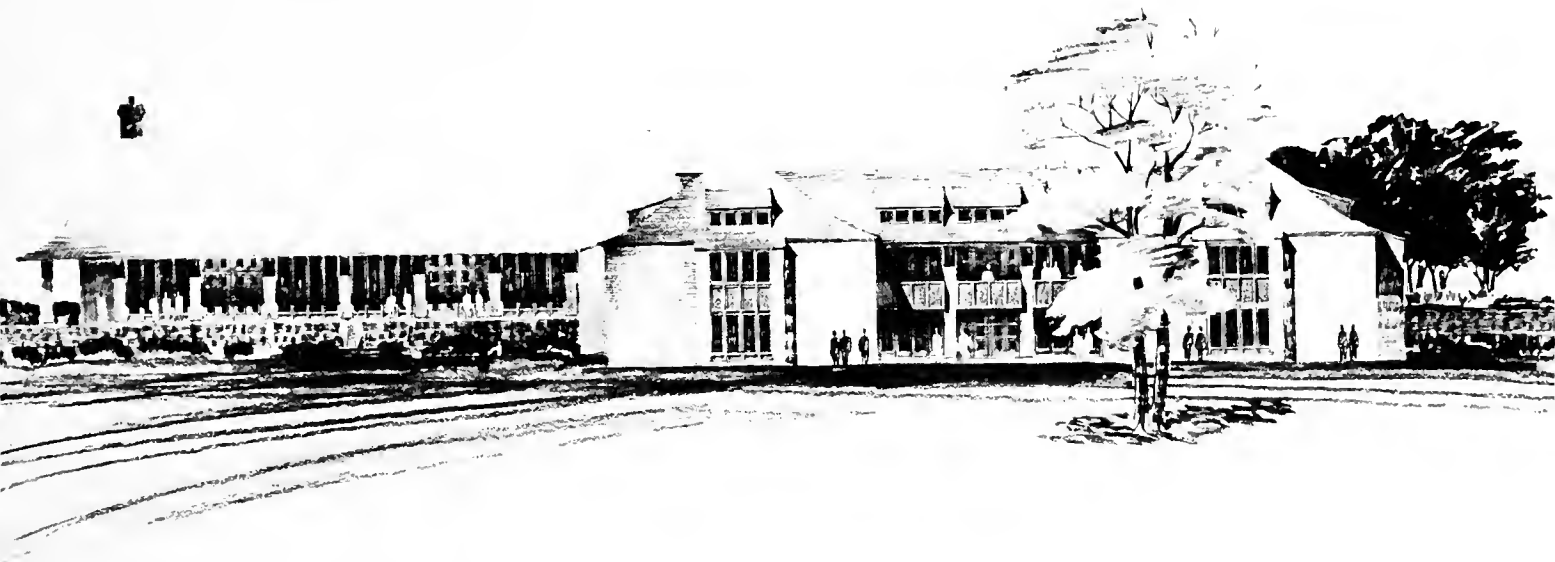

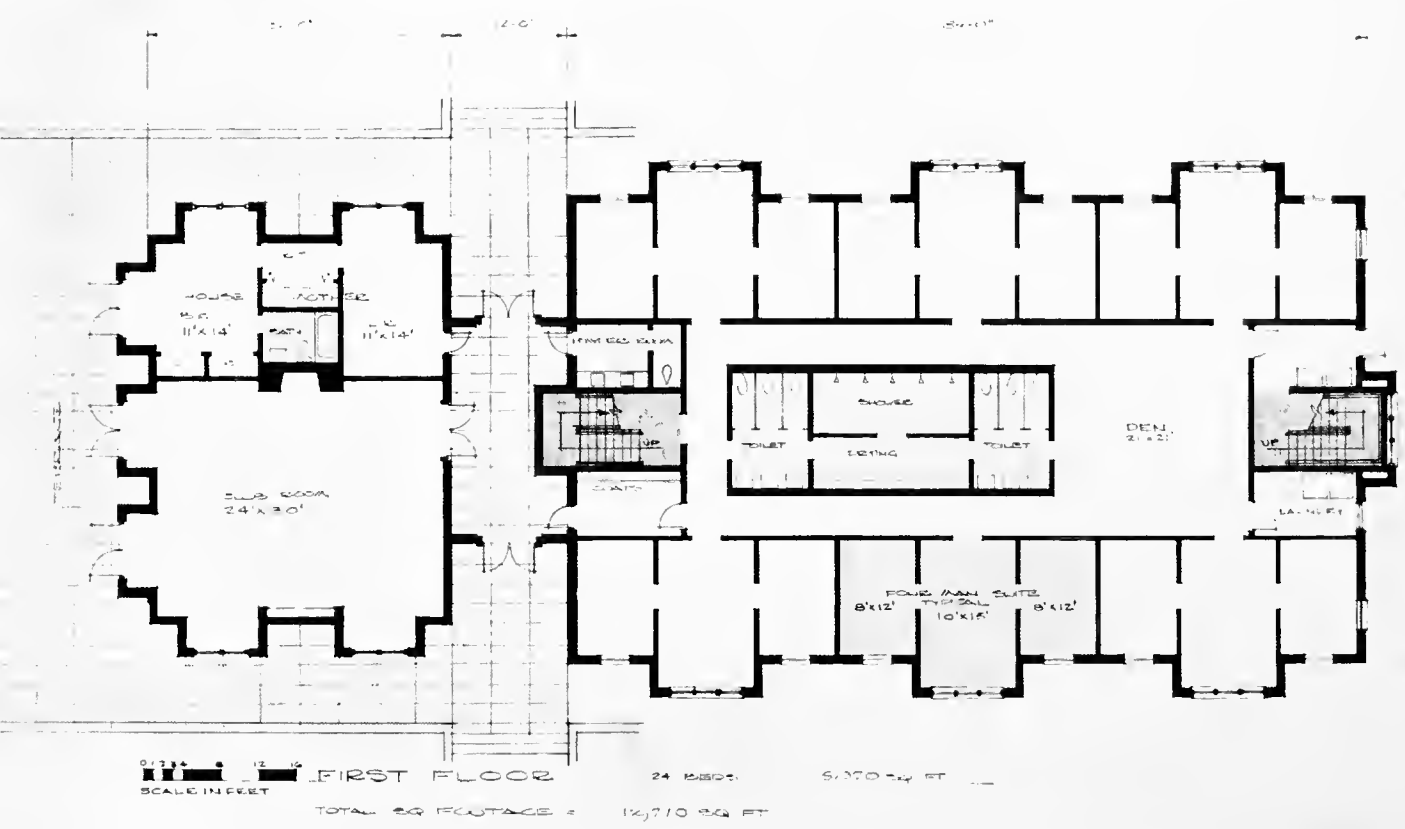
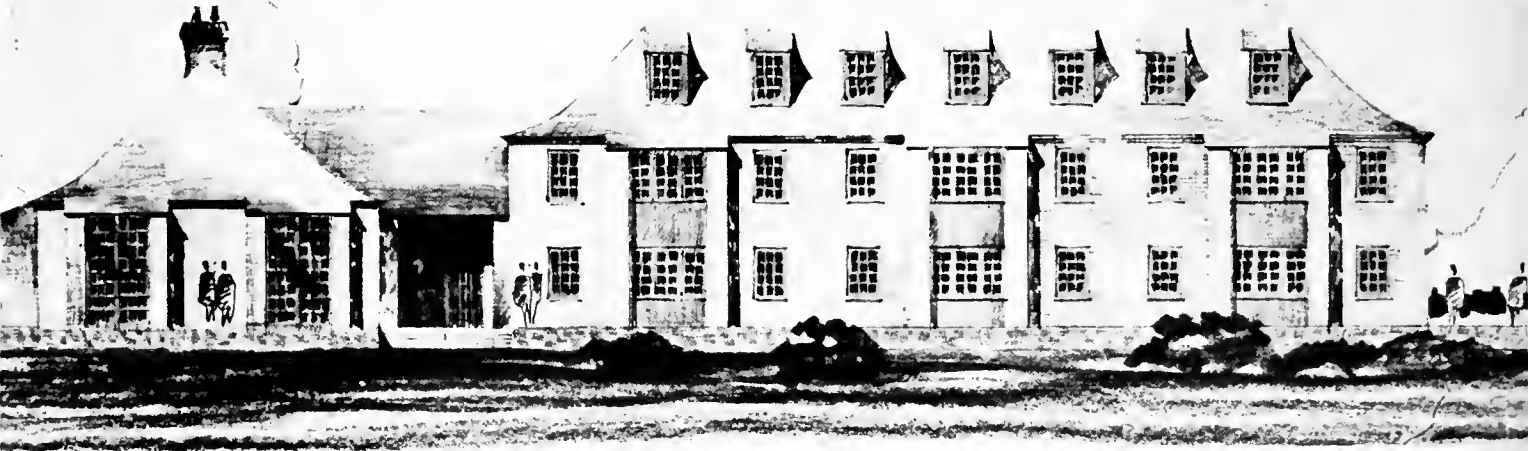

THROUGH THE YEARS

Judge Thomas L. Camp, '25, Fulton County Civil Court Judge, has been elected chief judge of the Civil Court in Fulton County. Judge Camp was elected by his fellow judges and assumed his new position on May 1 for an indefinite term. Judge Camp has served on the Fulton Civil Court since 1957.

Hilliard T. Steele, '43, is president of the Commack (L. I.) School Board, which is the 4th largest non-city school board in New York State. Mr. Commack works with Shell Oil in New York City. His son Gary, 17, is recipient of "The Athlete Of The Year" award on Long Island. The southpaw quarterback ranks Number One in his senior class and has accepted a 4-year football and baseball grant-in-aid from Georgia Tech. Bill Carter To Coach Summer Basketball In Puerto Rico

Bill Carter, assistant coach at Oglethorpe College, will coach summer basketball in Puerto Rico.

Carter will handle the reins of the San Germán team in the Superior Basketball League. The eight-team league has utilized such famous American coaches as Tex Winter of Kansas State, Lou Rossini of NYU and Art Loche from the University of Vermont.

Each team in the league features a distribution of Puerto Rico's best high school, college and amateur players. Richard Pietri, a 6-4 forward, who appeared in Atlanta with the Puerto Rico Olympic squad against Oglethorpe, will be a member of Carter's squad.

Last season, the San Germán squad was runner-up in the league and Carter is hopeful of carrying this year's club to the championship.

Coach Carter will start practice in early June. The 21-game schedule will begin in July and continue through early September, at which time the playoffs will commence.

Carter, a former Oglethorpe star guard, has been an assistant to Petrel head coach Garland Pinholster for several seasons. He is head coach of the Oglethorpe baseball and soccer teams. He will assume his regular coaching duties at Oglethorpe next fall.

The Old West leaves the television screen late show and returns to the silver screen which it inhabited for many years.

Buster Badlands, presented by the Oglethorpe Players May 13 and 14, includes most of the stock traditions begun by the "Great Stage Robbery" many years ago. Bad men fight in the streets, Indians attack, and pretty girls are menaced.

To go along with these antiquated events, the student authors of this work have added such modern bits as a pacifist sheriff, but he still gets his man.

The basic plot revolves around the discovery of gold on Indian land by that intrepid miner, Cooter Cudahy, played by Nate Zahn. Plotting to steal this gold over some Redeye in Blossom Seedy's saloon (Blossom is played by Mina Meines) are those two nefarious villians Buster Badlands, or alumnus Phil Leftwich, and the educated Indian Greasebelly. Filling out this part is Richard Laurence Baron.

Crystal LaRoue, the delectable saloon girl played by Carole Moore, discovers the plot and is kidnapped. To her rescue rides that fearless no-gun sheriff, Gunther Dodgem, portrayed by Bob Hamrick.

The major location for this thriller was the old west town at Lake Spivey. Except for the electric lights, loudspeakers, and fans, this is an extremely authentic site and well suited to the making of a movie during the off season.

Much thanks must go to the owners for their permission and assistance in using this local bit of history.

There is, of course, more to the plot than the outline above indicates, and several subplots as well. These naturally, can only be revealed at the showing of the movie itself.
