

And who can give a pantomime better than Janet Morris or a monologue better than Florence Kervin we would like to know? Oh ves, the Seniors were well represented in this splendid production.

By the time December came around, the entire school was waiting for the annual Christmas Party which was under the direction of Chairman Adelaide Zeng. With the Christmas spirit in the air and with such fine planning, the party was a great success.

Returning to school, we found Elinor Monaghan busily working on material for *Foot prints*; Marion Noel chasing Seniors to the studio for pictures; Betty Morgan making preparations for the Senior-Junior Theatre Party, and the Religion Committee planning the annual Retreat. Amidst all this activity, students were tucking books under their arms and seeking quiet corners for exams were here again.

Alumnae THEN - 1920

ON A CRISP Autumn day in October 1916, a group of twelve girls attended the first Mass of the Holy Ghost in St. Joseph's College. Properly speaking there was as yet no St. Joseph'sonly a small grey building standing empty and waiting. Actually it was that little group of girls, the pioneer class of 1920, that was St. Joseph's. Called the "twelve apostles" because of the great work they were about to undertake, they became the first class of St. Joseph's College for Women. On their shoulders rested the future of this new venture in higher education for Catholic women in Brooklyn. The buildings had been provided for them and the courses supplied, it remained for the class of '20 to determine whether St. Joseph's would rise or fall. The fact that, twenty years after, the original twelve have increased to over four hundred and that the college has expanded its boundries to twice its former size and is now known all over the country is the final proof of their success.

But the class of 1920 did not brood unduly over its great responsibility. They took it all in their stride and proceeded to enjoy their four years at St. Joseph's thoroughly. Meet any member of that class today and their uniform response to the question of what life was like then in "St. Joe's" is always, "It was such fun!" They gave parties on every possible occasion, rode out on the Island, "en masse", to collect leaves for a Hallowe'en dance, feted the faculty at a formal banquet and caricatured them in their year book, ran cake sales to buy Liberty Bonds and adopted two brench war orphans. They made the rooms in "245" ring with their laughter and we shall never again enter those rooms without seeing there the "Class of '20" in their high laced shoes, their straight ankle-length skirts and their long hair arranged in puffs over their ears.

Naturally, college life was not all pleasure and no work. They, too, dreaded finals and crammed for 'quizzes' at the last minute; they complained about five o'clock classes and got up a mock petition for an extra hour in exams. And life became a trifle somber to them in April 1917, when war was declared and they saw their relatives and friends leaving them.

As a pioneer class, theirs was the unique privilege of establishing all college precedents. It is strange to imagine a time when all our familiar tradition never existed. Yet it was this class who had to organize the Undergraduate Association, the Cercle Moliere, the Glee Club, the Dramatic Club and Class Days. And when they graduated, the Class of '20 published the first volume of *Foot prints*. The torm may have changed somewhat through the years, but the name of the year book and the spirit behind it have remained the same. This, the 20th volume of *Footprints*, is dedicated to that class who published the first volume and whose spirit of pioneering and adventure is the spirit of St. Joseph's College for Women.

NOW - 1940

"They come they go, the treasured hours Whispering to us hopes sublime And we love their lingering traces, Our Foot prints' on the sands of time."

SUCH WAS THE introductory poem that graced the first page of the first volume of St. Joseph's College Year Book. Looking back twenty years, we can continue to say we love their lingering traces.

The beginnings of everything are breath taking, fraught with suspense, filled with hope and made courageous by uncertainity. So it was with this first class of St. Joseph's. Many of our footprints had to be retraced. Some were taken in the wrong direction. A few had to be obliterated. Others were timorous. But under the sure and kind guidance of an excellent faculty, of whom the present Bishop



of Brooklyn was the head, most of them were brave and deep and true.

To the Class of 1920 as Commencement Day approached, the awe inspiring words meant an entering into a richer, fuller life, which in some future chronicle of the College might find an echo worthy of Alma Mater's teaching.

You, the Class of 1940, have made our efforts, our struggles, our defeats and our achievements worthy of that hope by dedicating this twentieth anniversary volume to that small group that comprised the Class of 1920.

The members of the Class of 1920 are found to be actively engaged in the various walks of life. One of us has entered the religious life in the community of the Helpers of the Holy Souls. Another is a practising physician in Jamaica. We are represented by teachers in the parochial schools of the diocese and in both the primary and secondary schools of the City of New York. Since her graduation one of the class has been identified with the Motion Picture Bureau of the International Federation of Catholic Alumnae. Two of our group are members of the Advisory Board of the Catholic Charities in Queens. Seven have married. Eleven children, ranging in ages from six to sixteen, constitute the younger generation. One member of the class has attained the final commencement and awaits our reunion with her in heaven.

To the classes that have come after us we are deeply grateful. You have made this college we so humbly started i thing of beauty, a place of light, an embodiment of all that is good and strong and true. Best of all you have kept the spirit of St. Joseph's so bright and shining that this our request made in 1920 has been most amply fulfilled:—

Fellow students, this we ask you
You who've been our comrades here
Keep St. Joseph's as we've known it
Throughout each happy, joyons year.
So that though the world may worry,
Fill our lives with its dull care
We may turn to Alma Mater
And find the same kind mother there.




