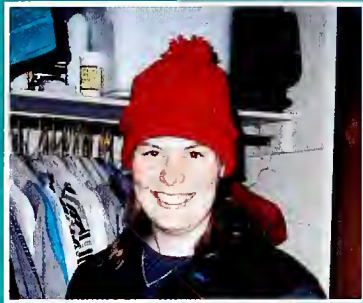

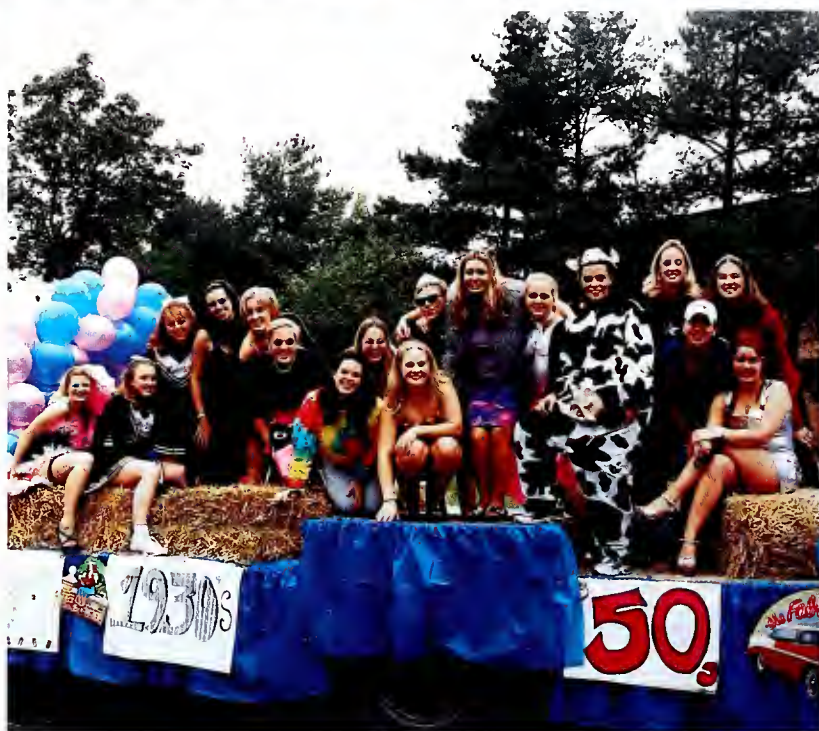

Cross Country

The 2000 season included many highlights for the men's and women's cross country team. Led by three seniors on the women's side and three juniors on the men's side, the team had experienced leadership throughout the season.

Both teams placed sixth at the Tom Barry Invitational, while taking second at the Carthage Triangular.

The women's fifth place finish at the Concordia University Invitational continued their success. The

men took fourth out of the twelve teams competing, also having a strong showing for Lake Forest.

In the Midwest Conference Championship, the women took eighth out of ten teams, while the men placed ninth out of ten teams. Lake Forest had a strong showing at the competition.

The Foresters sent runners to the NCAA Midwest Regional Championship. At that meet, the women finished 26th out of 31 teams, and the men placed 29th out of 30 teams.

Under the direction of first-year head coach Chad Eisle, the football team finished the 2000 season with an overall record of 3-7.

In the Midwest Conference, the Foresters ended with a 3-6 record, good for sixth place.

The three victories for Lake Forest included its conference opener against Monmouth College, defeating the Fighting Scots by a score of 30-13.

Their next victory came against conference foe Beloit College, 34-20. The

Foresters defeated Lawrence University for their third win by a score of 41-6.

Despite losing a strong core of seniors from the 1999 season, Lake Forest played aggressive defense and a balance of offense to challenge its opponents throughout the 2000 season.

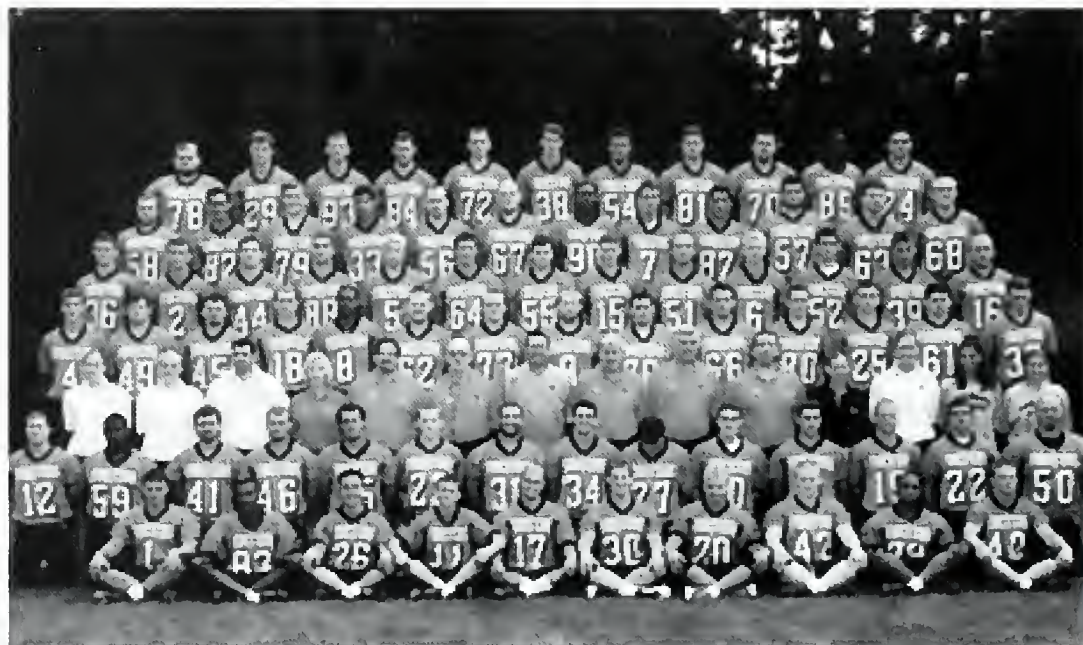

Men's Soccer

The men's soccer team challenged itself to build on its 1999 successes and return to the Midwest Conference Championship Tournament to capture the 2000 title.

The Foresters began the season with two losses, but they bounced back to win their next seven. More importantly, six of those seven wins were against MWC teams.

Lake Forest finished the regular season with a number two seed heading into the conference tournament.

The Foresters faced Grinnell College, the number three seed in the semi-finals. After defeating Grinnell by a score of 2-0, Lake Forest moved to the championship game.

Matching up against Ripon College, who had beaten them earlier in the season, the Foresters attempted to avenge the loss.

Lake Forest lost 4-0 to its opponent. The team finished the 2000 season with 12-6-0 overall record, while earning second place in the MWC with an 8-1-0 record.

Women's Soccer

The women's soccer team continued its success from the 1999 season with an appearance at the Midwest Conference tournament, after barely missing it in the past season.

The Foresters finished the season with an overall record of 11-4-2 and an MWC record of 6-1-1.

In the regular season, Lake Forest lost two of its four games by a point. The team also played four overtimes, showing the close contests between the Foresters and their opponents.

In the Midwest Conference tournament, which four teams advance to based on regular season records, Lake Forest played Grinnell College in the first round.

The teams were tied 1-1, and the game would only be decided by penalty kicks. The Foresters lost in a 0-3 contest, knocking them out of contention for the MWC title.

Even with the loss of four seniors, Lake Forest looks to next year with a solid foundation of leadership and experience.

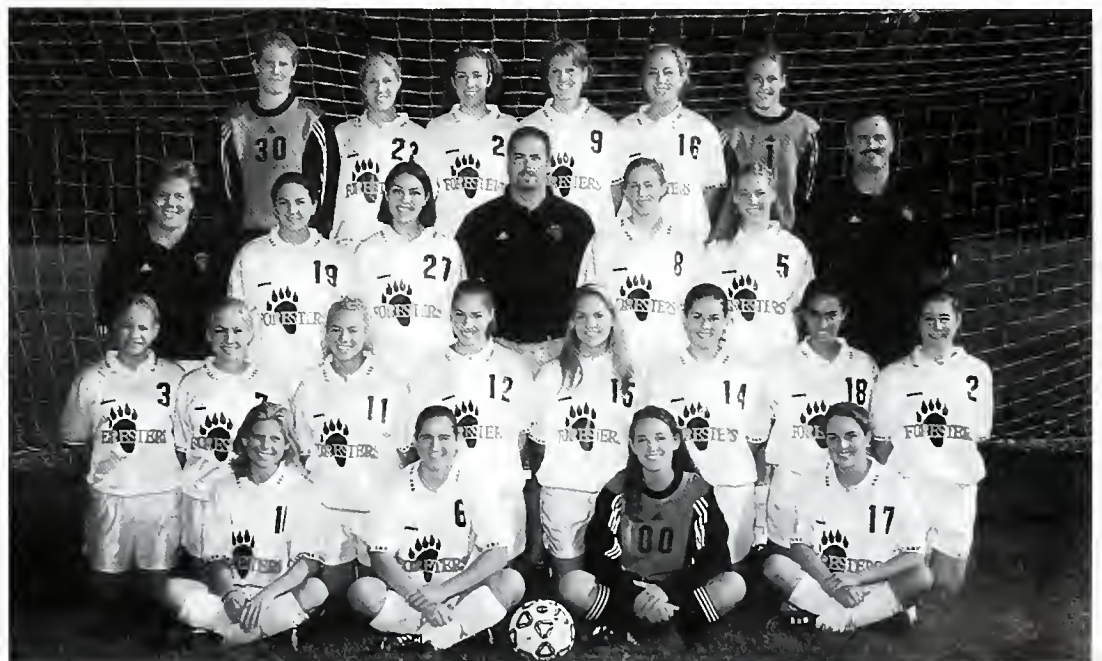

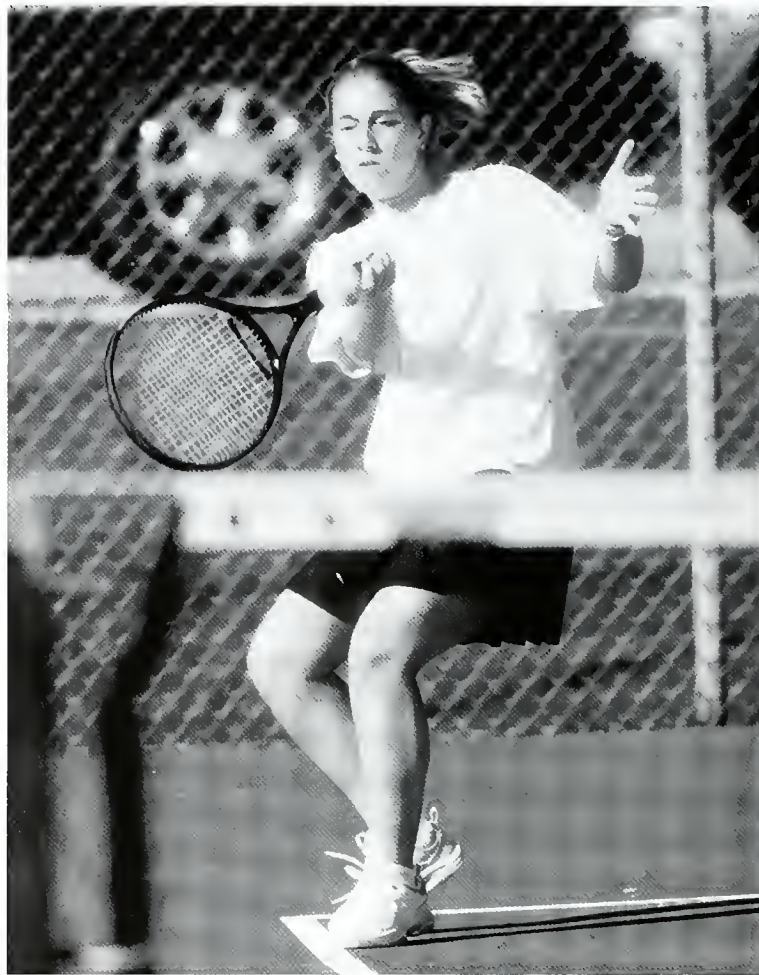

The women's tennis team had three- and five-match winning streaks that showed the balance and ability of the players throughout the 2000 season.

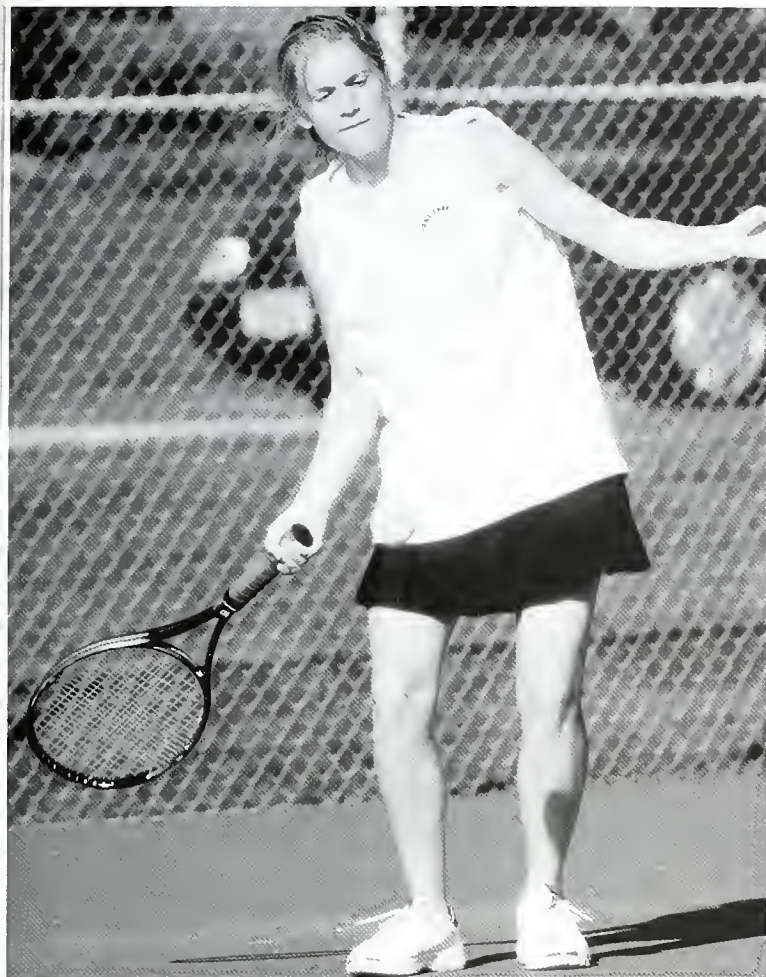
When Lake Forest played in the Midwest Conference tournament, it advanced in the semifinals by beating Carroll College, 5-0.

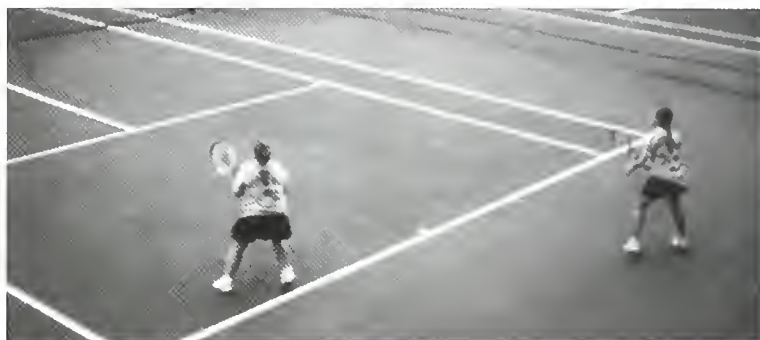

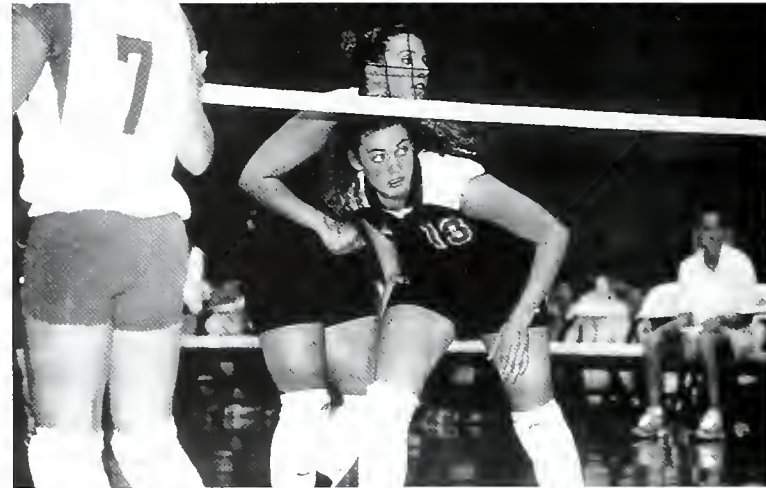

Volleyball

The women's volleyball team entered the 2000 season as the 1999 Midwest Conference champions and NCAA Regional Semifinalists.

Lake Forest began its 2000 defense of the MWC title with an undefeated 4-0 MWC South Division record, earning the number one seed going into the conference tournament.

Lake Forest played Ripon College in the first round, defeating them in three straight games. In the semifinal match, the Foresters faced Carroll College and won in three straight games.

In the finals of the MWC championship tournament, Lake Forest matched up against St. Norbert College. After winning the first and losing a close second game, the Foresters defeated the Green Knights in games three and four.

Winning the 2000 MWC title marks the third time in four years Lake Forest has won the championship.

In winning the MWC, Lake Forest earned an automatic bid to the NCAA National Tournament, where they were knocked out in the first round by Elmhurst College.

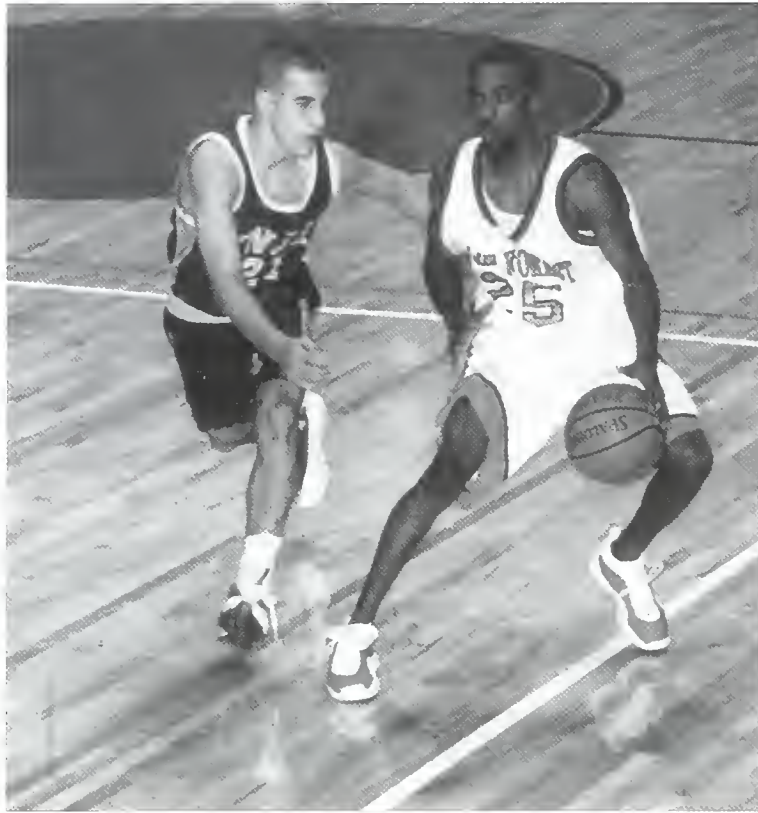

Women's Basketball

As the 1999-2000 Midwest Conference defending champions, Lake Forest began the 2000-2001 season with high expectations.

The Foresters started off slowly with two losses in their tournament. From that point, they began to gain momentum and had a twelve-game winning streak in the middle of the season.

Lake Forest earned the number one seed in the MWC South Division, earning the right to host.

In the first round, Lake Forest held off St. Norbert College to advance to the finals by a score of 66-63.

In the championship game, Lake Forest pulled away from Carroll College and defeated them 72-59.

With the MWC title, the Foresters earned an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. For the first time in Lake Forest history, the school hosted the first round of the tournament.

The Foresters fell to Ohio Wesleyan University, 55-67.

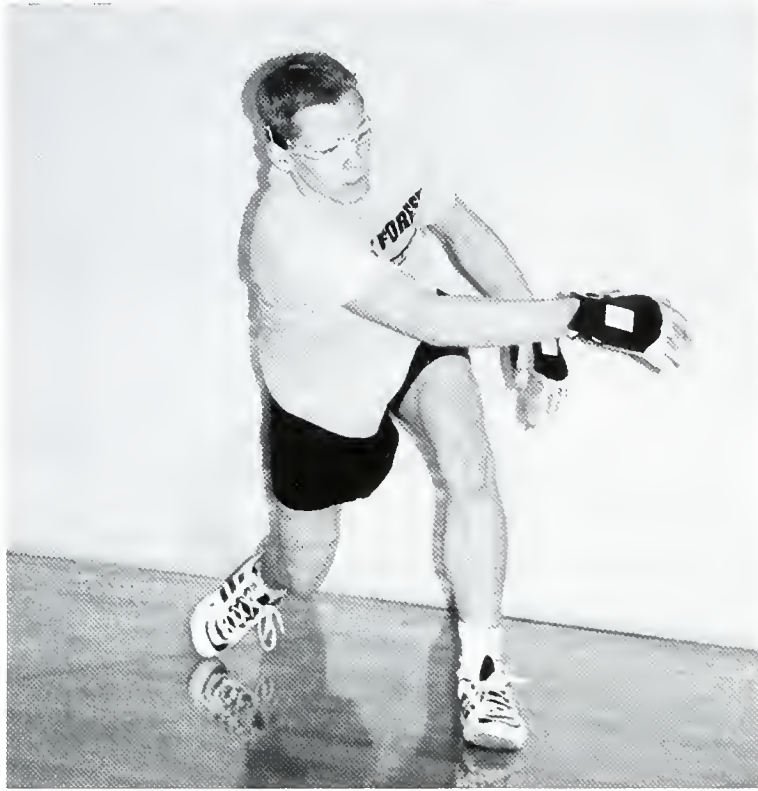

This is the first women's title for Lake Forest in the program's history, as well as the first time that the school has won all three titles in the same year.

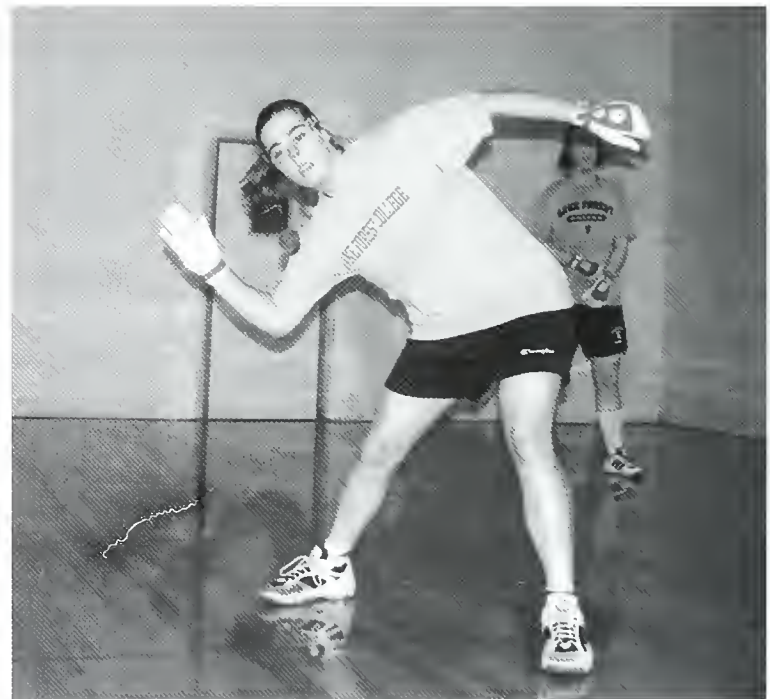
Megan Mehilos won both the Open singles and

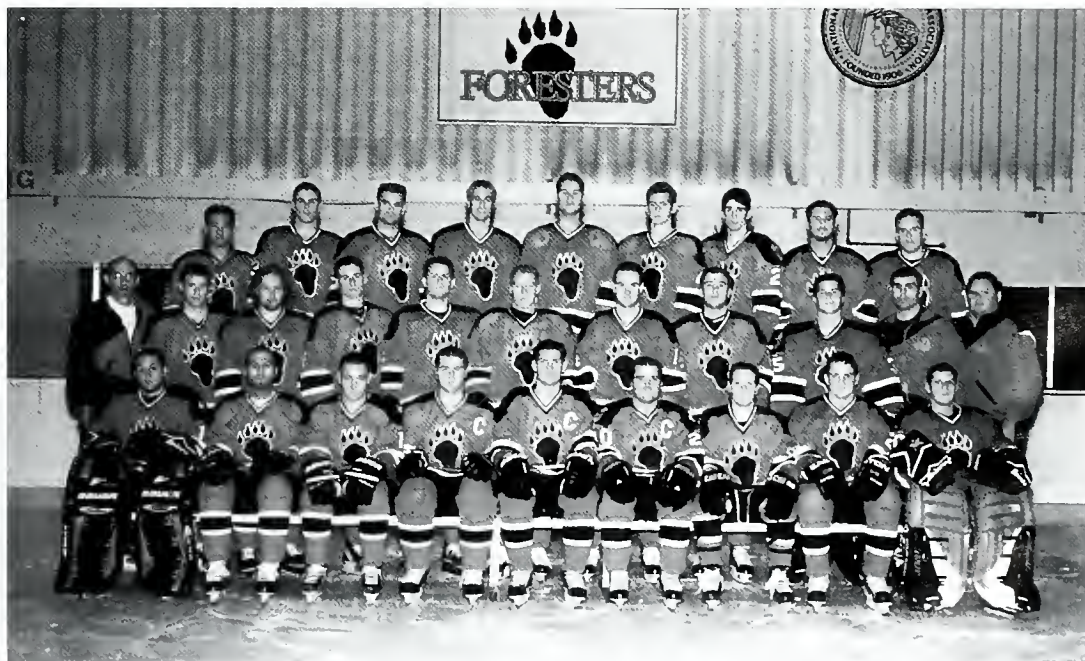

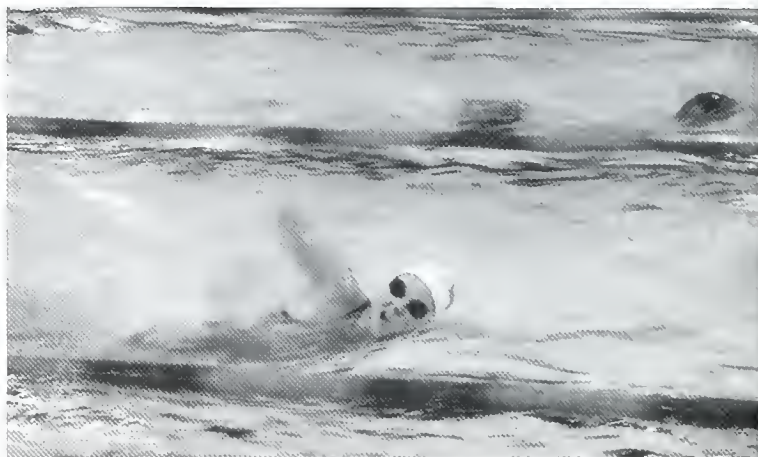

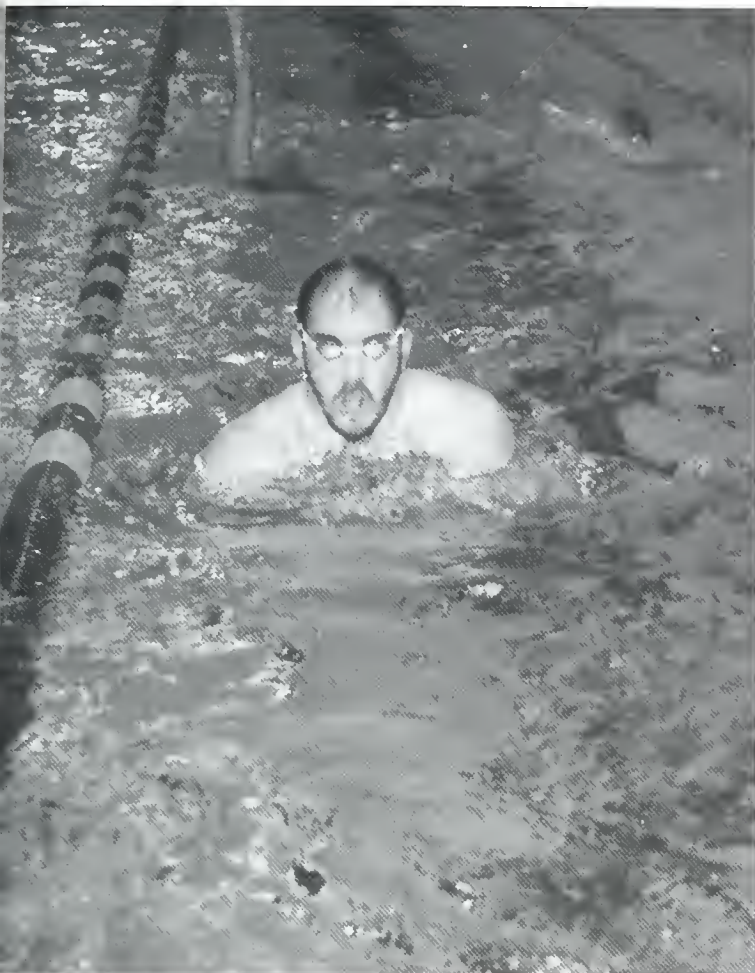
Swimming and Diving

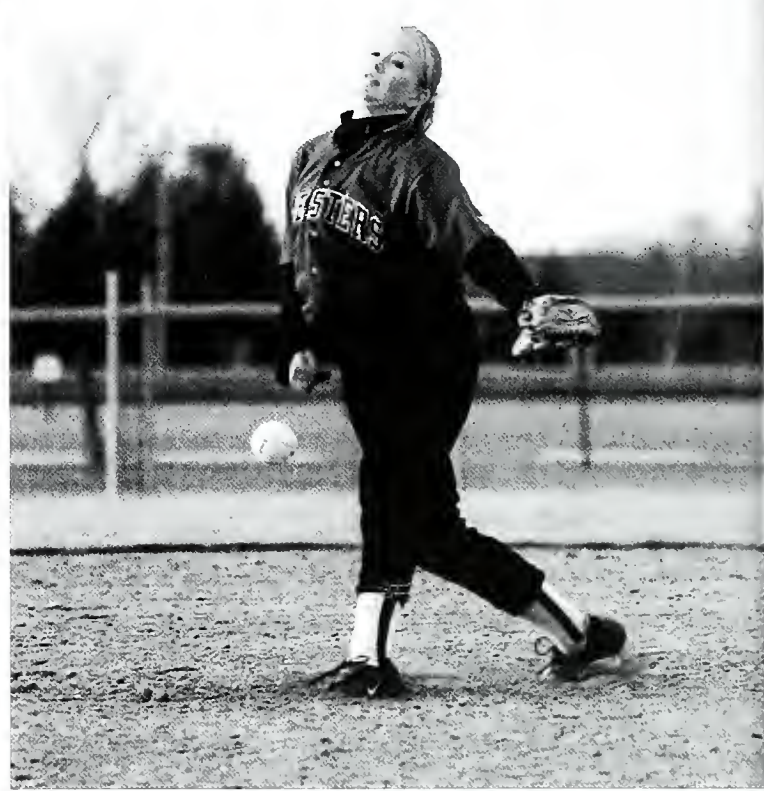

Beginning the season in Florida, Lake Forest ended the week with an even 4-4 record. Many of the games were decided by one run.

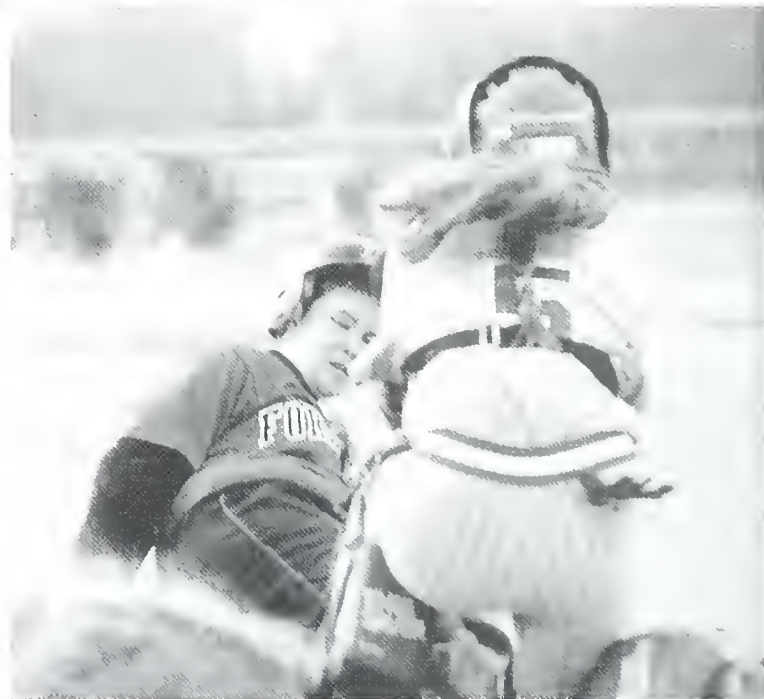
In their hunt for the conference title, the Foresters won the MWC South title, the first time the team has ever won it outright.

After losing a significant part of the 2000 team to graduation, the Foresters knew this would be a rebuilding year.

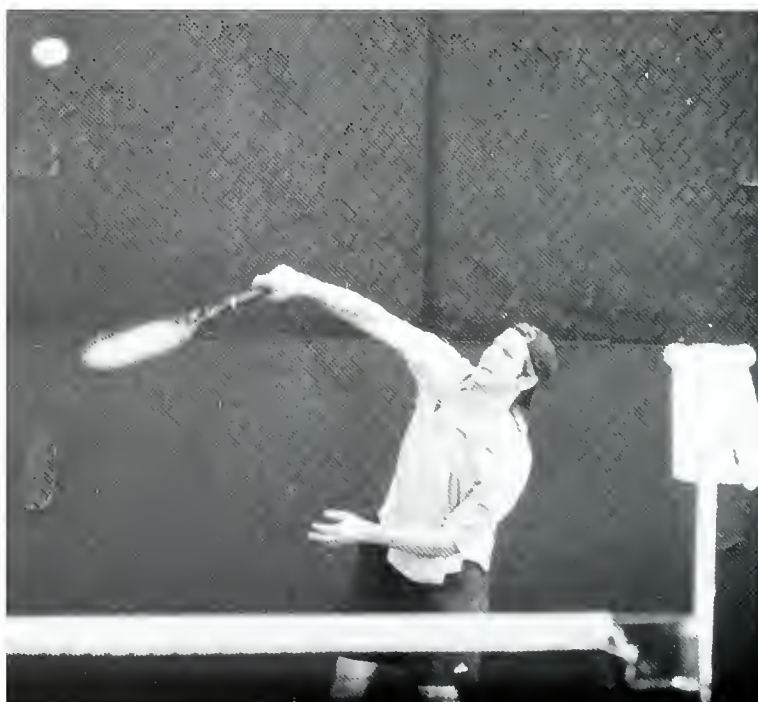
With only two juniors on the team, Lake Forest depended on strong leadership to improve daily.

With the experience gained by the players this season, the Foresters look to the 2002 season to win the MWC title.



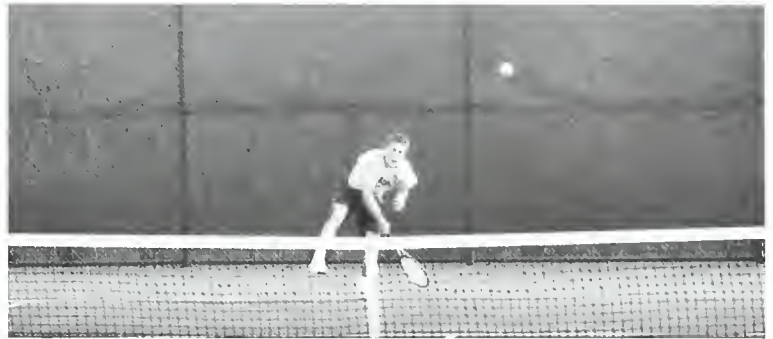

It also boasts the Hugo L. Sonnenschein Art Gallery, a venue for student, faculty and visiting artists.





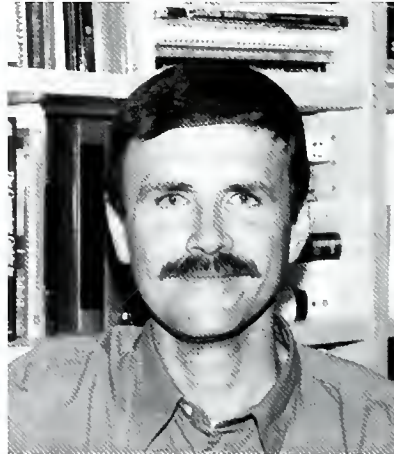
Lily Reid Holt Memorial Chapel and Arthur Somerville Reid Hall, both built at the turn of the twentieth century, are a great asset to the campus.

The Lake Forest College Campus is beautiful during all seasons. Lush green lawns sprawl out, on Middle Campus especially, making a welcome retreat for the college community.

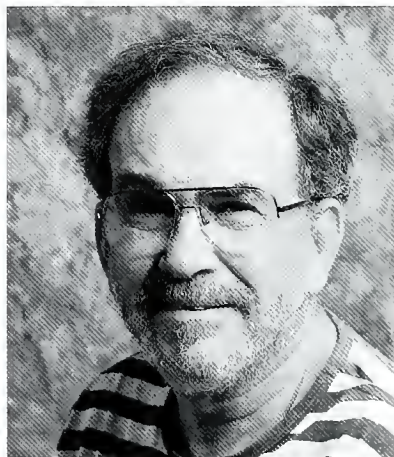

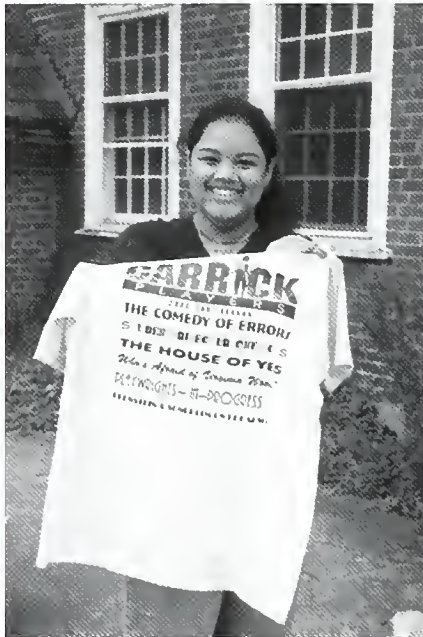

A café, multiple study lounges and television lounges, and even a pool table adorn this three story dorm on South Campus.

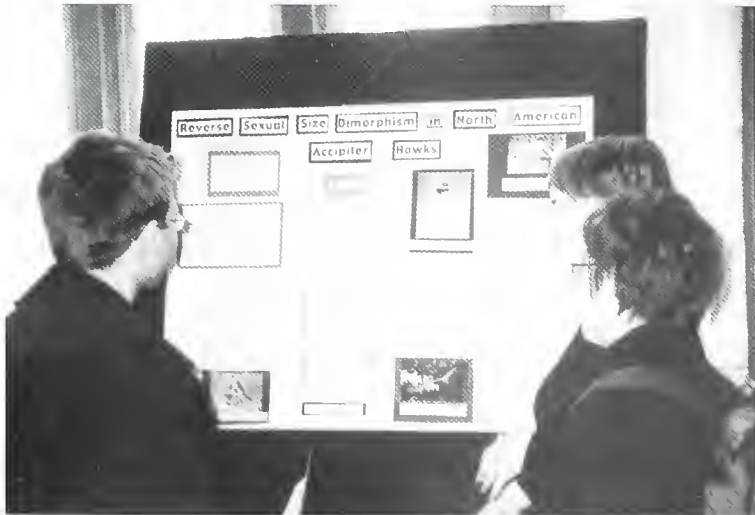
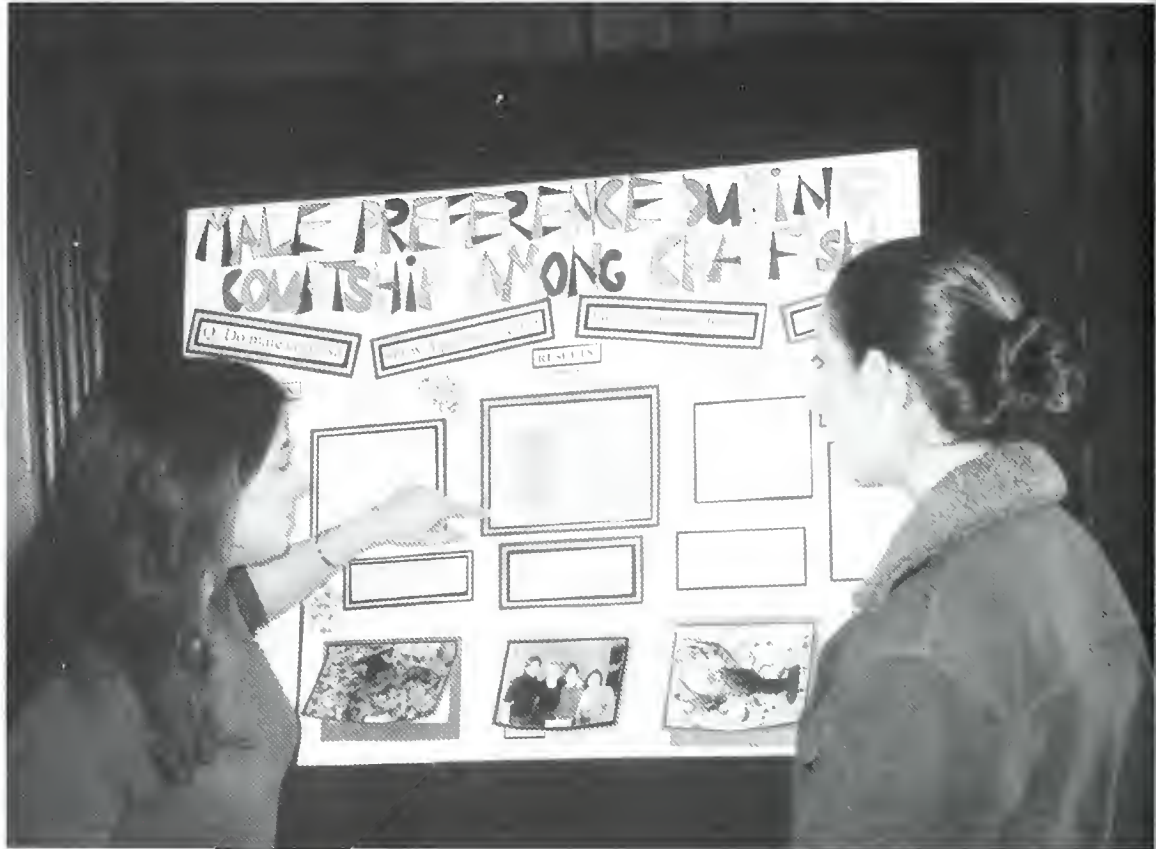

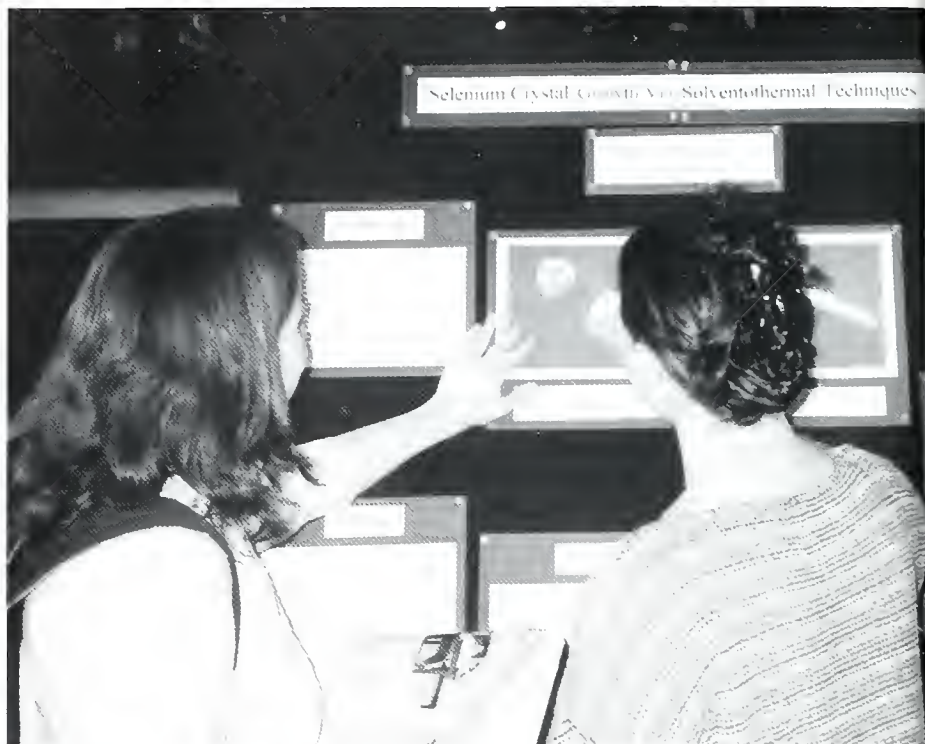
The Fourth Annual Lake Forest College Student Symposium

The Student Symposium is an outlet for students to show the College community the academic activities and topics they have been pursuing.

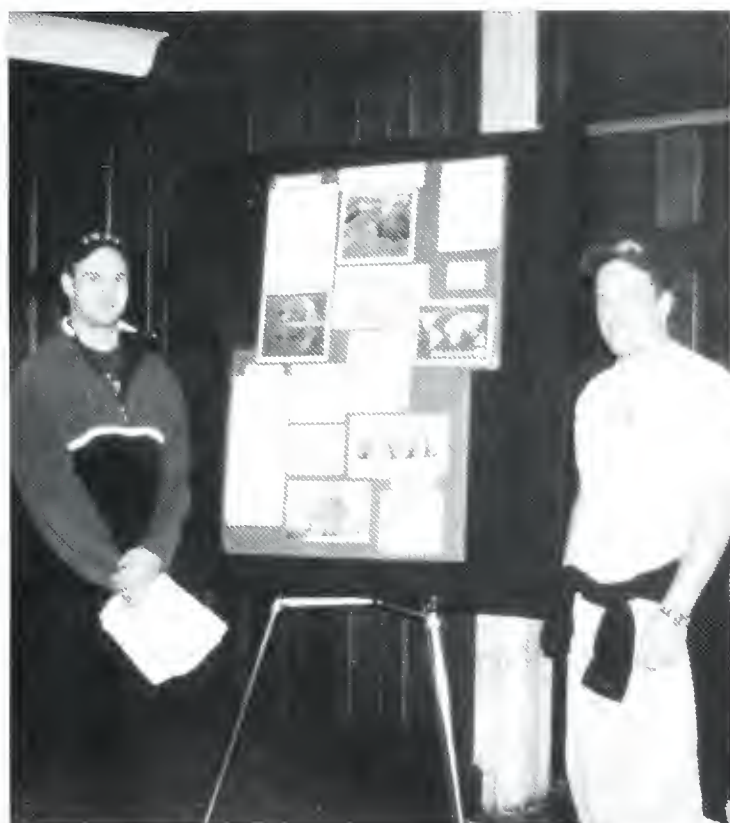

President Clinton makes a last-ditch effort to broker a Middle East peace deal before his term ends in January 2001 by drafting a plan for leaders of both Israel and Palestine to review. Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak and Palestinian Yasser Arafat agree to review Clinton's proposal, but no deal is signed before month's end.

A Singapore Airlines jumbo jet crashes during takeoff in Taiwan, killing 81 of the 179 people on board. In a blinding rainstorm the pilot uses the wrong runway and collides with construction equipment.

AIDS reaches epidemic proportions in southern Africa. Leaders and citizens throughout the world conduct a massive educational campaign on World AIDS Day December 1 to teach people about the disease that is killing 6,000 sub-Saharan Africans each day.

Uganda is struck by an occurrence of the deadly Ebola virus that is linked to more than 100 deaths. The outbreak is traced to a Gulu woman who died in September and whose body infected other people during the ritual cleansing of the dead.

▲ Two hundred North and South Koreans separated from family members since the 1950-1953 Korean war reunite in August. The four-day visits are a goodwill gesture by both countries' leaders, who met for the first time in June.



▲ In January 2001, a 7.9 magnitude earthquake devastates Gujarat in western India. The huge quake causes an estimated \$5.5 billion in damages and kills more than 20,000 people.



▲ In August, Somalia elects its first president in nine years. President Abdiqasim Salad Hassan promises to bring peace and economic recovery to the African nation.



▲ Former Coca-Cola executive Vicente Fox, of the National Action Party, is elected president of Mexico in July, ending the Institutional Revolutionary Party's 71-year reign.



▲ More than 150 world leaders meet at the U.N. Millennium Summit in September to discuss war, poverty, disease and other global problems. The meeting is the largest gathering of world leaders in history.



▲ In July, an Air France Concorde supersonic jet catches fire and crashes outside Paris, killing 113 people. The crash is blamed on metal debris which punctured the tires and damaged the fuel tanks.

✓ The worst wave of Middle Eastern violence in years erupts between Israelis and Palestinians, leaving more than 350 dead. A visit by Israeli opposition leader Ariel Sharon to a Jerusalem holy site on September 28 is claimed to have sparked the fighting.

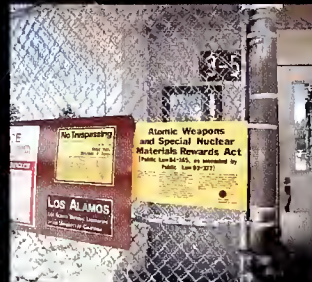

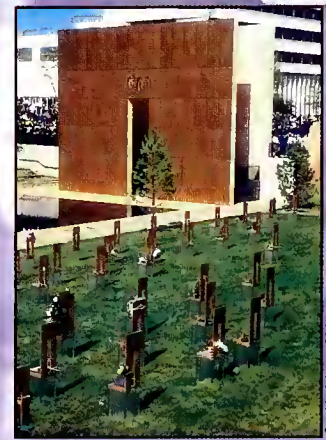

A wave of Internet startup companies, once the darlings of the online economy, file for bankruptcy after falling short of stockholders' earnings expectations. The NASDAQ stock exchange, where most dot-coms are traded, loses 39% of its value for the year.

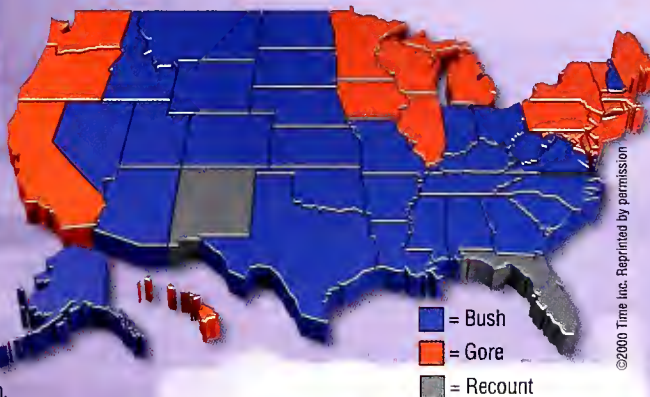

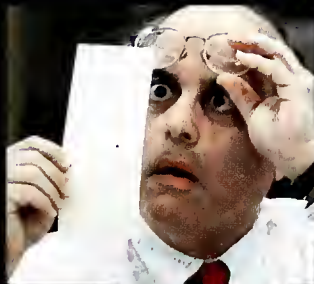

▲ In the closest presidential election in more than 100 years, Republican George W. Bush of Texas beats Democrat Al Gore from Tennessee. The race isn't decided until 36 days after the popular election, when Florida's hotly contested 25 electoral votes are awarded to Bush.



▲ Chads, dimpled chads and butterfly ballots become common terms during the election as Florida officials assess voter intent. The confusion generates national discussion for uniform methods of voting.



▲ The U.S. Supreme Court casts the deciding vote in the nation's election. The court ends the Gore-Bush legal battles in Florida by stopping all recounting, an action that effectively gives Bush victory.



▲ In a fiery and highly publicized political battle, Hillary Rodham Clinton beats Republican Rick Lazio decisively to become senator from New York. She is the first first lady to be elected to public office.



▲ Missouri Governor Mel Carnahan is elected to the Senate days after he dies in a November plane crash. His widow, Jean Carnahan, agrees to serve as senator in his place.



▲ In October, the USS Cole is bombed while refueling in Yemen. A number of terrorist groups are suspected of the blast that kills 17 sailors and injures 39.

✓ The Federal Trade Commission charges the film, recording and video-game industries with marketing violent and adult-rated materials to teens. The entertainment giants are requested to stop the practice or face legal intervention.

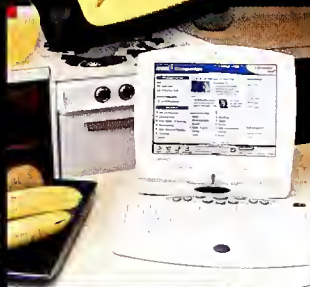

✓ Teens involved in anti-smoking organizations such as The Truth and Target Market strike back at Big Tobacco for marketing to youth, by launching their own in-your-face advertising campaigns targeting cigarette makers. The print and broadcast ads are sponsored by funds won from tobacco suit settlements.

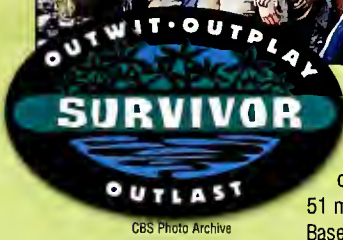

Napster loses several court battles with the recording industry over copyright infringement. The popular online music sharing service, with over 60 million users, faces shut-down unless it can create a new business formula that satisfies the major recording labels.



MTV's "Total Request Live," which allows viewers to vote for their favorite music videos, continues to gain popularity. Host Carson Daly becomes one of the year's best-known faces.



Destiny's Child achieves three back-to-back No. 1 singles in 2000, making the band *Billboard*'s Top Pop Artist of 2000. The group is nominated for five Grammys, four for the single "Say My Name."



Faith Hill and Tim McGraw perform to sellout crowds on their Soul 2 Soul tour. Hill and McGraw win the Country Music Association's Female and Male Vocalist of the Year, making them the first couple to win in the same year.



Pink is one of the year's top new artists. Her debut album, *Can't Take Me Home*, sells 2 million copies, and two of her songs are Top 10 hits.

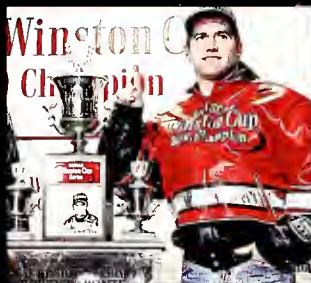

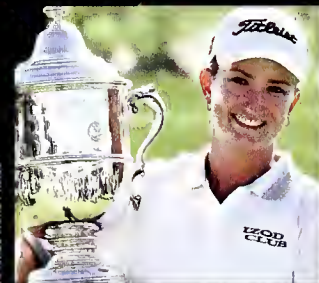

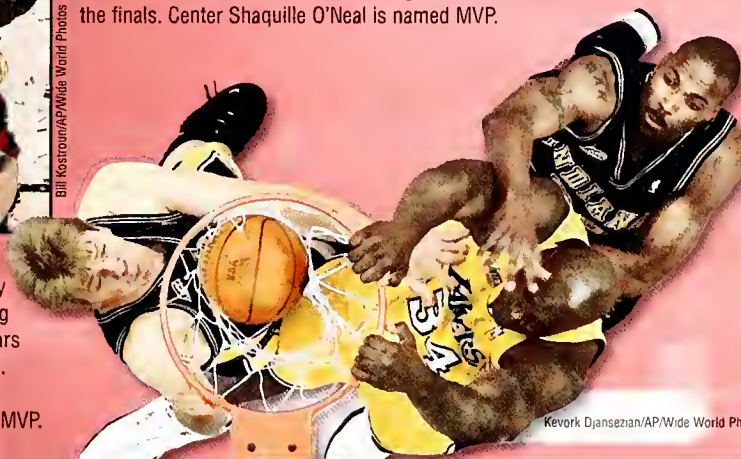

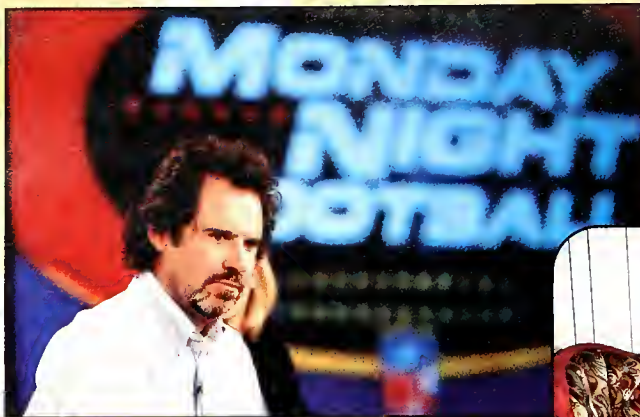
