New ground intended for a flower-garden should now be forwarded; and the borders, beds, and other compartments dug ready for planting. In mild weather anemones may be planted. Carnations in pots should, at this season, be kept in a warm situation, in frames, or have the shelter of mats in severe weather. Plant in pots any desirable roots, plants, flowers, and shrubs. Plant suckers of roses, lilacs, and various other shrubs in open weather. In the kitchen-garden, in open weather, forward all necessary digging and trenching. Prepare composts for hotbeds with rich earth, light surface loam, and rotten manure all blended together in a heap. Plant for seed good-headed old cabbages and savoy; also carrots, turnips, onions, &c. Plant out some strong early plants of cabbages. Sow a small portion of carrots on a warm border. Earth up celery in open weather. Cucumbers, for earliest crops, may be sowed in hotbeds. Sow a small portion of lettuce seed in a warm border. Sow early hotspur peas on a south border. Plant potatoes.

GARDENING.

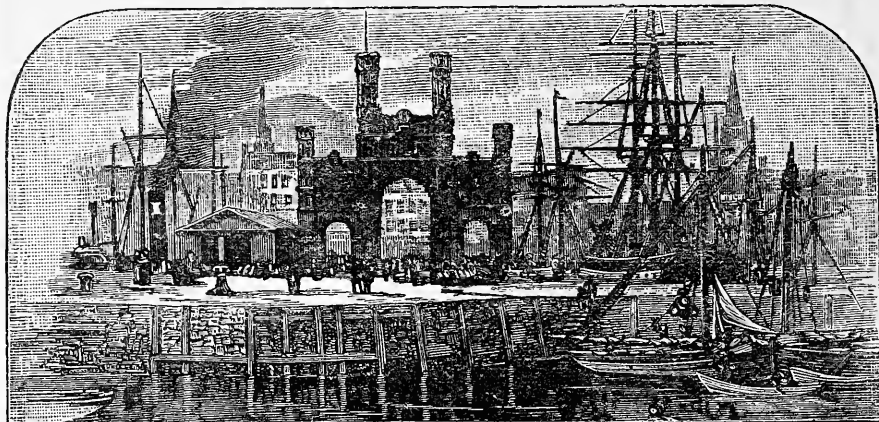
EDGINGS to bed and borders may now be planted. Begin sowing hardy annuals in beds, borders, and pots, and annual flower seeds of the hardy kinds. Finish planting bulbous roots of all sorts as soon as the weather permits, in beds and borders. Dig shrubberies, and rake the surface over. Flowering shrubs may now be planted, and evergreens also. To force for early flowering, place pots of pinks, roses, &c., in a hot-house. Sow mignonne in a hot-bed. In the kitchen-garden, digging and trenching should now be forwarded in all vacant ground. Still plant for seed old cabbages and savoys, onions, celery, &c. Plant some early kinds of beans, and full crops of all. Cabbage plants of strong growth may now be planted out finally in rows; to produce sprouts, reserve or plant cabbage and savoy stalks. Begin sowing carrots in mild weather, the first main crop; also the first main crop of onions on rich ground. Sow peas in plentiful crops.

GARDENING.

CLEAN and spring-dress the flower-garden, by digging, hoeing, and raking the borders, beds, and shrubberies; weed, sweep, and roll the gravel walks. Plant carnations in pots and borders; those in small pots transplant into larger, with ball of earth to the roots; and sow carnation seed. Slip polyanthuses for increase. Finish planting all anemones that remain out of ground. All sorts of hardy annuals may now be sown in beds and borders to remain. Plant climbers to ascend upon walls, &c. Plant different sorts of roses. Sow seed of sweet briars in a drill, and plant young plants in shrubberies and borders. In the kitchen-garden, finish digging, trenching, and manuring all ground. Sow a full crop of asparagus in rich earth for planting out next spring. Plant full crops of the principal large kinds of beans; and a small crop of kidney beans in a south corner. Sow a moderate supply of the early purple broccoli for heading in autumn. Plant out full crops of the strongest winter cabbages; also red cabbages for autumn and winter. Sow peas.

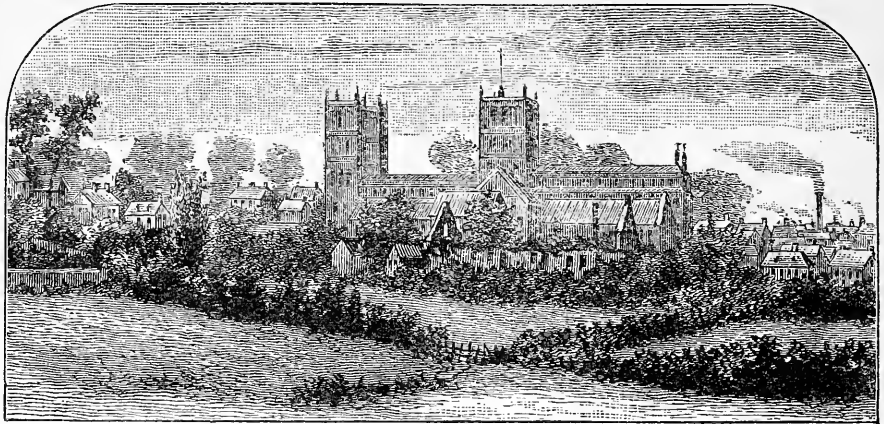

GARDENING.

HARDY annuals may now be sown in full collection. In dry weather, water plants in pots. Give fresh earth to plants in pots, or shift into larger ones. Finish planting carnations in pots, beds, or borders. Sow mignonette in beds or borders. Plant passion-flowers against a south wall. Plant pinks and daisies; also plant slips and part the roots. Plant some slips of tuberoses in pots, in a hot-bed or hot-house. Wallflowers may be transplanted with balls of earth. Any bulbous roots remaining out of ground, plant as soon as possible. In the kitchen-garden, hoe between plants in rows; prick out seedling plants from seed-beds. Finish sowing asparagus in an open situation. Plant full crops of Windsor beans; hoe those that are up, and draw earth to the stems. Sow a good crop of broccoli in an open situation. Finish planting out all winter-standing cabbage-plants, and prick out young seedling cabbages. Complete sowing the main crop of carrots. Finish planting the main crops of potatoes in rows eighteen inches asunder.

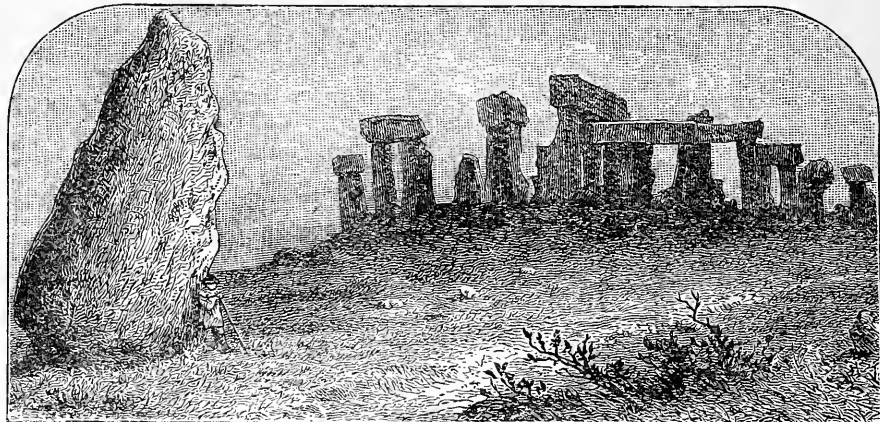

GARDENING.

ANNUALS will require thinning, some pricking out and transplanting, and some sorts sowed. Water the patches of hardy annuals in dry weather. Keep weeds under in all parts, by timely hoeing and hand-weeding. Early anemones done flowering should be taken up, and the offsets separated. Place sticks to the flower-stalks of carnations. About the middle of the month, place out dahlias in borders and clumps for flowering. Climbing honeysuckles train to walls or stakes. Sow more mignonette in beds to flower in succession. Plant in pots some roots of tuberoses. In the kitchen-garden, carefully weed old and new asparagus beds. Plant successional crops of beans of the large or sword long-pods; also broad beans, and plant full crops of kidney beans. Plant out early-raised plants of broccoli. Hoe between cabbages, and draw earth about the stems; plant out spring-raised cabbages. Clear carrots from weeds. Early-raised celery plant out in trenches for blanching, and prick out young celery from the seed-bed.

GARDENING.

KEEP the borders neat by regulating the plants, by weeding, hoeing, and raking. Give proper support to climbing plants; cut down decayed flower-stalks. Piping may now be performed to propagate pinks, carnations, &c. Annual flower plants of many sorts will now require final removing or transplanting; thin hardy annuals. Take up bulbous roots done flowering. Box edgings should be clipped after rain. Water in dry weather all plants in pots, and others lately planted. Prick out seedling carnations; begin to lay carnations, and plant pipings. Prune any disorderly shrubs. In the kitchen-garden, particular attention will now be required in weeding, thinning, hoeing, and watering many principal crops. Plant once a fortnight further successional crops of beans of larger or smaller kinds; sow full crops of the best dwarf kinds of kidney beans. Plant broccoli out in moderate crops; hoe advancing crops of cabbages, and draw earth to the stems; prick out young seedling cabbage plants.

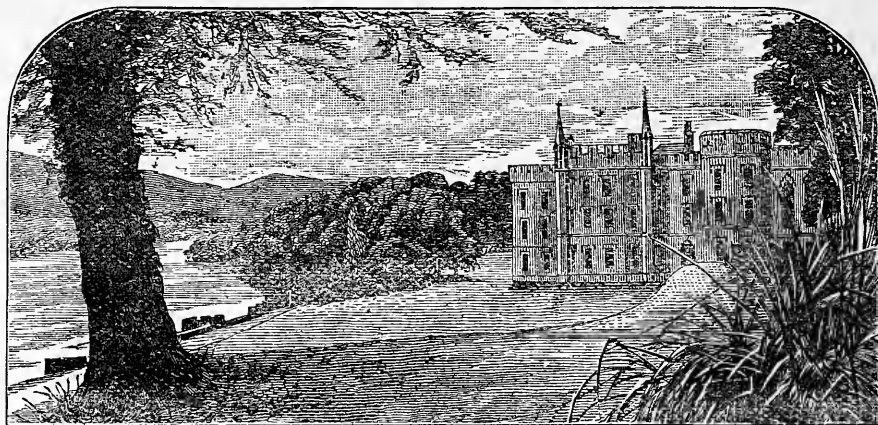

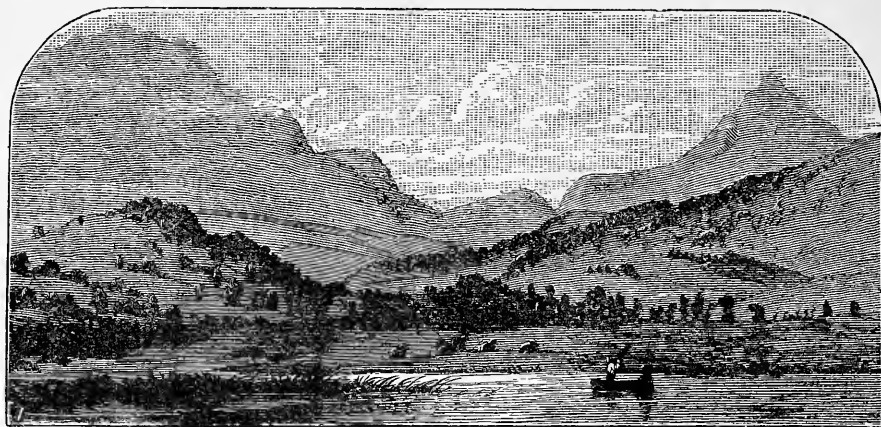

GARDENING.

CLIPPING will now be required in all sorts of hedges, cutting them close and even at the sides and tops. Budding may be performed in any curious roses. Make layers of all curious carnations, also of cloves, double scarlet or mule sweet-williams, and capital varieties of pinks. Save seeds of annuals and biennials, and of any perennials required that are ripe. Thin the patches of large kinds of hardy annuals. Seeds of bulbous roots may be sown. In dry weather, water all plants in pots every day. Showery weather is proper for all pricking-out, planting, and sowing. In the kitchen-garden, dig vacant ground cleared from summer crops, and manure the same for principal autumn and winter crops. Guard ripening seed from birds. No hot-bed sowing is required at this season. Herbs for drying and distilling should now be gathered. Terminate the general cutting or gathering of asparagus for the season. Plant a moderate crop of beans for late production; sow a principal late crop of kidney beans. Young cabbage plants should now be planted out for autumn and winter.

GARDENING.

CONTINUE to dig and manure vacant beds and borders. Flowering plants requiring transplanting to flower the same year, may be removed with balls. Gather all sorts of annual flower seeds as they attain maturity. Plant out bulbous offsets, especially small ones, in separate beds from the main bulbs. Finish laying carnations; early layers and pipings well rooted, plant off in beds or pots. Daisies may be slipped, or the roots parted into smaller or larger sets, and planted in beds and borders. Plant offsets, slips, or cuttings of pansies in a shady corner. Evergreens may be removed and planted. In the kitchen-garden, prepare cleared ground by digging and manuring. Ripening seeds gather as they attain perfection. Plant beans for a Michaelmas crop; and a moderate crop of kidney beans may be sowed. Finish planting the last principal crop of broccoli. Sow cabbage seed for a full crop of young plants to stand the winter; finish planting main crops of savoy. Sow a small crop of carrots, to come in for drawing young in the spring.

GARDENING.

DIG vacant beds and borders, for bulbous roots and other perennial and biennial flowering plants. Edgings may be planted of box, thrift, daisies, &c. Plants in pots may be fresh-earthed at the top. Pippings of pinks and carnations that are well struck and advanced in growth should be planted in beds, borders, and pots. Gather seeds of flowers as they ripen. Part roots of perennials done flowering. Finish planting autumnal bulbs. Finish clipping hedges. Layers of carnations separate from the old stools, and plant in beds and pots. Begin planting hyacinths. In the kitchen-garden, hoe and earth up the stems of late crops of beans, and, if in blossom or podding, let the stems be topped; and hoe and earth up the last advancing young crops of kidney beans. Early-planted broccoli will now begin to head for use. Finish planting out the last late crop of savoys for small heading. The main crops of spring-sown carrots should now be in good perfection. Earth up to blanch celery in trenches of advanced growth.

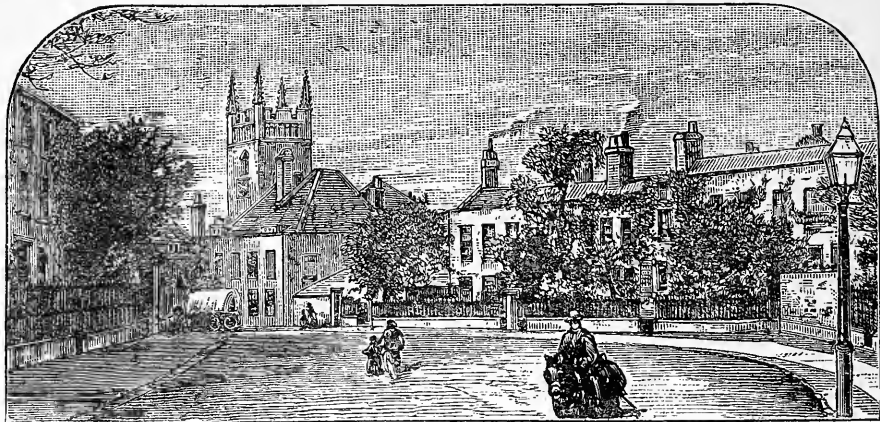

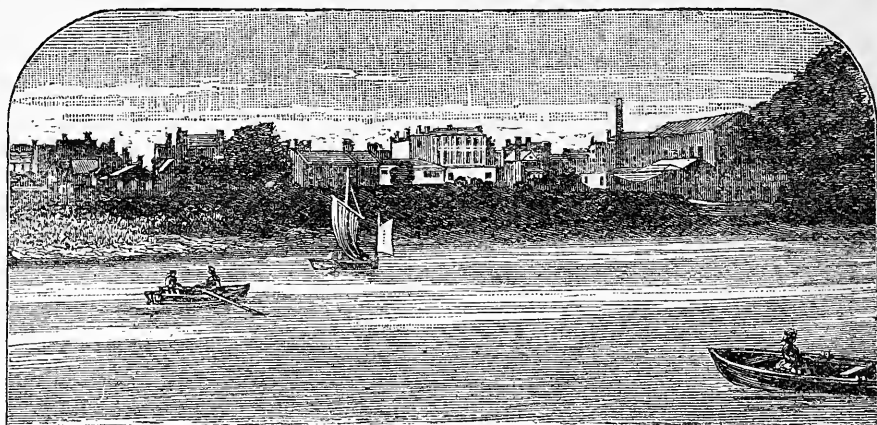

GARDENING.

CLIMBING plants of different sorts may now be planted; also flowering shrubs. Place seed pots and boxes in warm situations, to remain in shelter all winter. Finish gathering seeds of flowers; this must be done in dry weather. Biennial flowers, raised in spring and summer, may be removed with full roots, and transplanted into the borders. Protect autumnal bulbs in flower from rain and cold. Bulbs of lilies should be mostly all planted. Plant anemones for early spring flowering; and finish planting some best kinds of carnation layers. This month, in the kitchen-garden, all sowing and principal planting should be finished for this year. Prepare vacant ground, by manuring and digging, for future crops. Begin the winter dressing of asparagus beds; asparagus to force may be planted in a hot-bed. Plant a small crop of mazagan beans in a south border. The main crops of savoy will now be finally cabbaged for general use. Earth up celery as it advances in growth. Potatoes of full growth should be dug up and housed, to keep for winter.

GARDENING.

FORWARD ground-work for planting, and other designs in walks, lawns, and shrubberies. Beds and borders, designed for planting bulbs and other flowers, prepare by proper digging. Edgings may be planted. Climbing and trailing plants of the shrubby kind may now be planted, and trained against walls. Prepare composts for flower-beds of good light garden earth, sandy loam, and rotted manure. Shelter tender plants in pots and beds from frost. Part roots of perennial flowers, to increase the sorts required; hardy perennials may be planted. Finish the autumn planting of hyacinths. In the kitchen-garden a few articles may be sown and planted for early crops next year. Trench vacant ground, laying the earth of each trench in a rough ridge, to pulverise and improve by the weather. Clear advancing young crops from weeds. Plant more mazagan beans on a warm border. Finish planting out cabbages, all that are intended before spring. Finish digging up the main crops of carrots.

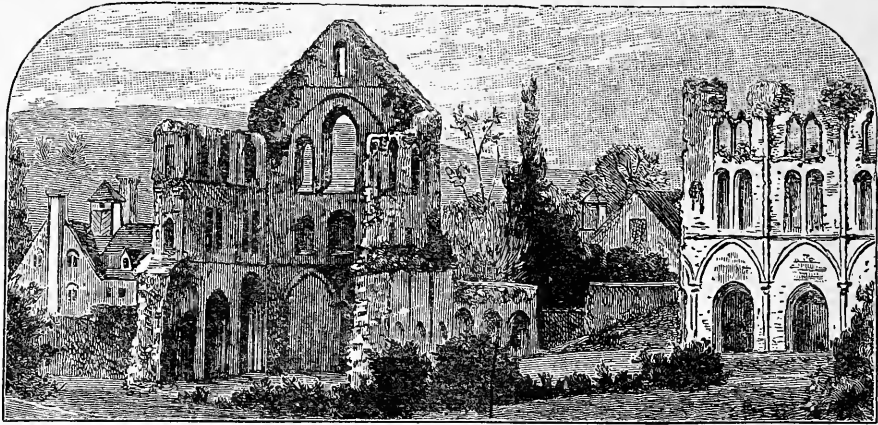

GARDENING.

DIG beds, borders, and shrubbery compartments for intended planting. Vacancies in borders, clumps, shrubberies, and other plantations, may now be supplied with roots, plants, shrubs, trees, &c., in open weather. The hardest kinds of perennial flowers may be transplanted in open weather. Defend curious and tender plants, in pots or beds, from severe frost and snow with an awning of mats. Bulbous roots may still be planted in mild dry weather. Place the tenderest sorts of plants in pots in frames; others in a warm situation, or plunged in some dry ground, to secure the roots from frost. In the kitchen-garden, continue preparing vacant ground by occasional manuring, or general digging and trenching in ridges, to enrich for spring sowing and planting. All sowing and planting in the open ground, perform only in open dry weather. Sow a few early peas and radishes on warm borders, and small salading and cucumbers in hot-beds. Plant early beans, and strong cabbage plants; in hot-beds, asparagus and cucumbers. Dig up esculent roots to lay in sand.

Exceeding 10 oz., but not exceeding 12 oz. 4d.

A letter exceeding the weight of 12 oz. is liable to a postage of 1d. for every oz., beginning with the first oz. A letter, for example, weighing between 14 and 15 oz. must be prepaid fifteenpence. A letter posted unpaid is chargeable on delivery with double postage, and a letter posted insufficiently paid is chargeable with double the deficiency.

No letter is to exceed one foot six inches in length, nine inches in width, and six inches in depth.

A penny stamp is now issued, which can be used either as a postage or receipt stamp.

Post Cards.

Post Cards, bearing a halfpenny impressed stamp, are available for transmission between places in the United Kingdom only. They are sold in packets at 7d., or of finer quality at 8d. per doz. They can also be had in smaller numbers or singly. Return Cards are now sold. Foreign Postal Cards, 1d. and 1½d. each.

Registration.

By the prepayment of a fee of twopence, any letter, newspaper, or book packet may be registered to any place in the United Kingdom. The Post Office will not in any way undertake the safe conveyance of unregistered letters containing valuable articles; or hold itself responsible for the loss of registered letters, but on certain conditions will refund to the amount of £2.

Inland Book Post.

The Book Post rate is one halfpenny for every 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz. Every Book Packet must be posted either without a cover or in a cover entirely open at the ends. No Book Packet may exceed 5 lbs. in weight, or one foot six inches in length, nine inches in width, and six inches in depth.

Inland Parcels Post.

At any Post-office in the United Kingdom, Parcels are now received for transmission at the following charges: not exceeding 1 lb., 3d., and 3d. for every additional 2 lbs. up to 7 lbs. The length must not exceed 3 ft. 6 in., length and girth combined 6 ft.

Postage on Inland Registered Newspapers.

Prepaid Rate.—On each Registered Newspaper, whether posted singly or in a packet, the postage when prepaid is one halfpenny; but a packet containing two or more Registered Newspapers is not chargeable with a higher rate of postage than would be chargeable on a Book Packet of the same weight, viz., one halfpenny for every 2 oz., or fraction of 2 oz.

Unpaid Rate.—A newspaper posted unpaid and a packet of newspapers posted either unpaid or not sufficiently paid, will be treated as an unpaid or insufficiently-paid Book Packet of the same weight, and charged 1d for every 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz., deducting the amount of any stamp or stamps affixed.

Penny as well as halfpenny wrappars can now be obtained.

Post Office Savings Banks.

No deposit of less than a shilling is received, nor any pence, and not more than £30 in one year. No further deposit is allowed when the amount standing in depositor's name exceeds £150, exclusive of interest. Interest is allowed at the rate of 2½ per cent. (or sixpence in the pound) per annum—that is, at the rate of one halfpenny per pound per month. When the principal and interest reach to £200, no further interest is paid until the sum at the depositor's credit is reduced below that amount. Deposits already made in other savings banks can be easily transferred to the Post Office. Separate accounts may be opened in the names of wife and children.

At every Post-office in the United Kingdom, forms for making small deposits are now issued gratuitously. Each form has twelve divisions; in each of which a penny postage stamp can be placed; when the twelve are filled in, it is received at any Post-office Savings Bank as a shilling.

Any person can now invest at any Post-office Savings Bank, small sums in Government Stock. Not less than £10, and not more than £100, in any one year. The amount held by any one investor must not exceed £300.

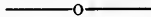

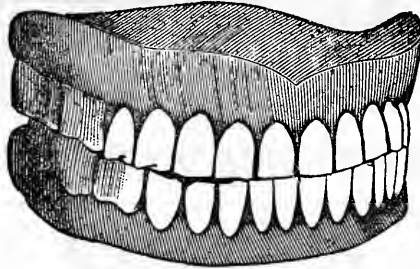
