We, the persons whose signatures are hereunto affixed, do associate ourselves together for the purpose of intellectual and social culture, and do hereby adopt the fol1owing articles of association:

## ARTICLE I. NAME.

The name of this Association shall be the Fortnightly Club.

## ARTICLE II. MEMBERS.

Section 1. Candidates for membership shall present an application in writing endorsed by at least three members; or an application may be made by three members in behalf of the candidate. When the names of husband and wife are proposed for membership, the vote shall be cast as for one, but they shall count as two niembers. Applications must be read at a regular meeting, and voted upon at a regular meeting not earlier than two weeks thereafter.

SEC. 2. The vote shall be by written ballot, and a vote equal to a majority of the total membership of the Club sha11 be necessary to elect. Each member shall vote for no more than one candidate at a time, husband and wife counting as ont.

SEC.3. When there is no election upon the first ballot and the number of candidates is greater than three, the succeeding ballots shall be confined to the three candidates having the highest number of votes. When two of these three candidates shall have been elected, the remainder of the list shall be open for balloting.

SEC. 4. The voting shall proceed until the list of candidates is exhausted, or until it is discontinued by a motion to that effect sustained by a majority vote, but such motion shall not be in order until three ballots shall have been taken. Candidates voted upon at any meeting but not elected shall not be roted upon again without the previous notice required by Section 1 of this Article.

ARTICLE III. OFFICERS.
The officers of the Club shall consist of a President, Vice-President and Secretary, whose duties shall be those usually devolving upon such officers. They shall be elected by ballot and shall hold office for one year, or until their successors are elected. At the sante time and in the same manner, four members shall be chosen, who, together with the President, Vice-President and Secretary, shall constitute an Executive Coni-
nittee. It shall be the duty of the Executive Conmittee to determine the place of meeting; to arrange a programme of exercises; to receive and present to the C1ub applications for membership; to propose and submit to the C1ub for adoption, such standing rules of procedure and amendments hereto, as may from time to time seem desirable; and to exercise a general supervision and direction of the business affairs of the C1ub.

ARTICLE IV. MEETINGS.
Regular meetings of the C1ub shall be held on each alternate Monday evening from October 1 to June 1.

ARTICLE V. QUORUM.
Of the C1ub one-third of all the members, and of the Executive Committee a majority, sha11 constitute a quorum to do business.

ARTICLE VI. AMENDMENTS AND LAWS.
Amendments to these articles, also bylaws, standing rules and amendments thereto, may be proposed at any regular neeting, voted upon at the next regular meeting, and adopted by a two-thirds vote, and no article, law nor rule shall be adopted, amended or repealed, except by a two-thirds vote at a
regular meeting after a notice given at some previous regular meeting.

## STANDING RULES.

1. The exercises of the evening shall begin prompt1y at eight o'clock and sha11 consist of one paper, not exceeding forty-five minutes iu length. Four persons shall be appointed by the Executive Committee to discuss each paper, and their names shall be printed in the programme. The time linit of each of these discussions sha11 be five minutes in length. These shall be followed by a general conversation of thirty minutes, in which one person shall speak not more than twice. Closing remarks by the leader, limited to five minutes duration, sha11 end the programme.
2. Absence from three consecutive meetings without a satisfactory excuse to the Executive Conmittee, rendered before the next meeting, sha1l be construed as a desire to withdraw frou the societs, and names shall be dropped from the 1ist without further notice.
