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



PREFACE.

To collect, edit and publish such material as should find a place in the family history, is a work of many years. The author of this history has given such time as could be spared for the purpose during a period of ten years, and yet the work is not as complete as could be desired. Some historians of many families have been busy in their labors a much longer time, and yet their tasks remain unfinished. Information sought from several sources which has been repeatedly promised has not been forwarded, but the pressing demand for the book will not admit of further delay.

Like the publication of all family histories, this work has been largely "a labor of love." No one who has not given the subject thought can comprehend the difficulty of gathering together the names and other items of so many individual members of the many families represented in a work of this character. Records of towns have been searched; old family Bibles have been interviewed; libraries of several cities have been visited; church histories and town histories have been carefully looked over; many authorities have been investigated, and numberless letters to correspondents have been written for desired information, with a hope to make the work as complete and correct as possible. The author has found in some few instances discrepancies of date when comparing records obtained from different sources. In such cases, however, those that have seemed the most authentic are herein quoted.

The idea of bringing together records of the scattered branches of families descending from Robert Francis was first suggested on receiving an old manuscript copy of the genealogical records of Rev. James Hanmer Francis, born in Wethersfield in 1796, and who, many years ago, searched the records of the town to trace his lineage. Soon after, the author corresponded with the late Rev. Dr. A. B. Rich, who had devoted a number of years to an unsuccessful search for the

missing links to connect the ancestral chain between his father, Daniel Francis, who settled at Wells, Vermont, in 1764, and Robert¹ of Wethersfield; which connection the writer of this, after much persistent effort, recently discovered. Dr. Rich forwarded a printed copy of his researches, with wishes for success in a continuance of the work. About the same time Mr. James Henry Francis of Pittsfield, Mass., kindly furnished information concerning the descendants of Josiah Francis, who settled in Pittsfield in 1792. Mr. W. F. J. Boardman of Hartford generously permitted the author to make copies from his records of the descendants of Captain Daniel Francis, and from his book entitled "Wethersfield Inscriptions." Mr. John Hall Francis, of Meriden, Conn., sent a list of the descendants of Jacob Francis, who resided at Wallingford in 1732. Mrs. F. J. Hall, of Meriden, aided in securing records of the Derby branch. Mrs. Josephine R. Baker, of Hartford, gave v information concerning the descendants of William F. who settled in Southwick, Mass., in 1704, and Dr. Charles G. Woolsey of Erie, Penn., sent records of Samuel Francis, who settled in Southwick the same year. A few quotations were made from Mrs. C. E. Chatfield's records; and many other friends located in various sections of the country contributed what they could to aid in this work; all of whom have the sincere thanks of the compiler.

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PROGENITORS OF THE FRANCIS FAMILIES.

The ancestors of the Francis families of America (so far as evidence can be obtained) were residents of the northern and northeastern countries of France. The class of people who inhabited that region during the thirteenth, fourteenth and fifteenth centuries have been described by historians as "hardy, courageous, energetic and industrious."

"They were persevering in whatever they attempted to accomplish, and possessed a remarkable degree of persistency and will power, together with independence of thought and mind." "They were not easily over-awed or readily subjected; were impatient under restraint and unwilling to submit to

unjust treatment."

A distinguished English writer states that the Gauls who settled in northern France were "a bright, intelligent people, full of vivacity: frank and open in disposition; brave, and scornful of tactics, as though strategy were a lie and a

disgrace."

History records that many of these people were well educated, and not a few highly intellectual. Among them were scholars, lecturers, poets, lawyers, theologians, artists, architects, teachers of philosophy, etc. Classic art and literature were zealously cultivated by the scholarly element, and it is recorded that their studies were all the more keenly pursued because opposed by the orthodox majority of the monks, who feared that such literary pursuits would tend to insubordination among the people. Fondness for law was one of their peculiar characteristics. They acquired reputations of a high order as contenders for legal forms, legal processes; and, indeed, seemed to delight in arguments, and all manner of litigations.

ORIGIN OF THE NAME.

The name Francis is of Franco-Gallic origin. Like the name "Frank," it signifies "candor, sincerity, absence of disguise or deception." It suggests "liberality in thought, generosity in disposition and practice, together with a spirit of freedom in uttering one's real sentiments." From the fact that several of the kings, prelates and other dignitaries of France, Germany and Austria bore the name of "Francis," it would seem that the name was quite popular in that part of the world.

Lampierre, in his biographical dictionary, refers to families bearing the name of Francis among residents of the northern parts of Europe—chiefly in France and Germany. The same author states that they attained distinction as ecclesiastics, artists and lawyers. He made especial reference to Lucius Francis, who was engaged by the kings of France and Spain in his professional capacity. A son of Lucius was also an artist who gained a similar reputation.

SOME OF THE ENGLISH SETTLERS.

Many of the residents of the countries referred to in preceding chapters found their way in course of time to Great Britain, making for themselves homes in different sections of that country, and the name Francis appears in many English records.

SIR JOHN FRANCIS, knight, was Lord Mayor of London, in the years 1400 and 1401. (See Art of Heraldry, 1730, p. 431.)

Philip Francis was mayor of Plymouth, England, in 1644. John Francis, D.D., son of Philip, was Dean of Lighland, in 1704.

John Francis², D.D., son of Rev. John (above), was Dean of Lismore in 1722, and Rector of St. Mary's Church, Dublin. He married a Miss Tench. His children were Tench, Richard and Philip.

TENCH Francis, son of Rev. John², came to America about the year 1770, as attorney of Lord Baltimore, and settled in Kent County, Maryland, where he practised law. He married, Dec. 29, 1724, Elizabeth Turbutt, daughter of Hon. Foster Turbutt. He subsequently removed to Philadelphia, and was appointed attorney general of that city in 1744, which office he held several years. He was recorder of Philadelphia from 1750 to 1754. He had nine children.

RICHARD FRANCIS, second son of Rev. John², was born in 1705, and was an eminent lawyer. He entered college in 1723, at the age of eighteen, and was admitted to the bar in 1729. He was the author of a well known law book entitled "Maxims in Equity."

PHILIP FRANCIS, third son of Rev. John², was a distinguished clergyman, who received the degree of D.D. He was also a noted classical scholar, well known for his excellent translations of Horace, Æschinos, Demosthenes and other works, which gave him a world-wide reputation. He died in England in 1773.

SIR PHILIP FRANCIS, M.P., born in 1740, was son of Rev. Philip (above), and is recorded as "a conspicuous Whig politician and a powerful pamphleteer." Sir Philip, even from very early age, was in the habit of writing for newspaper publication, etc. He was a prominent official in the war office of England in 1762; and in the same year he married Miss Macrabie, daughter of a London merchant. Under the nom de plume of "Junius" a series of letters were published that caused a decided sensation in the political world, and it was generally conceded that he was the author. He was associated with many of the great men of his day in all progressive works. Among his firm friends were Lords Chatham, North, and Barrington; and the eloquent statesmen and reformers Burke and Sheridan. It is stated of the two last named, that Francis, as an energetic promoter, supplied them with the materials for their eloquent orations and burning invectives.

Sir Philip, in common with English politicians, found his attention very strongly called to the events then occurring in France. His sympathies were wholly with the revolutionary party. He opposed Government measures against reformers, at home or abroad. He favored and strongly worked for restoring the constitutional system of representation, and was regarded as one of the earliest promotors in the cause of Parliamentary reform.

Sir Philip was greatly interested in the discussions of the American questions, and, with Lord Chatham, condemned the policy of the so-called "Rockingham Ministry" in its unjust measures towards subjugating the American Colonies. In 1773, he was appointed a member of the Supreme Council at Bengal, with a salary of £10,000 per annum. In 1814, he married (for second wife) Miss Emma Watkins, who long survived him. Sir Philip died Dec. 23, 1818.

Note.—I have quite a record of the descendants of Hon. Tench Francis, who came to this country in 1770, which I will gladly present to any reliable party who will bring the list nearer completion and have it published. C. E. F.

EARLY SETTLERS OF AMERICA.

Among the promotors and incorporators of the "Virginia Company," formed in London in the year 1606, was WILLIAM FRANCIS, who, it is stated, was one of the leading spirits of the Company. "He sailed from England with a party of one hundred and five colonists, among whom were Edward Wingfield, a rich merchant; Robert Hunt, a clergyman; and Capt. John Smith, a man of genius."

The man chiefly instrumental in organizing this Company was Bartholomew Gosnold. Others who aided the enterprise were Sir John Popham, Chief Justice of England; Richard Hakleigh, a historian; and Sir Ferdinand Gorges, a distinguished nobleman.

A fleet of three vessels under command of Christopher Newport set sail on Dec. 9, 1606, and, after a wearisome and roundabout voyage, reached Chesapeake Bay, then up what is now James River, to a point where they landed, April 26, 1607, to which they gave the name Jamestown. (See Brown's "Genesis of the United States.")

In "Hutton's Original Lists of Emigrants of Quality, &c.," to Virginia plantations, on page 296, we read: "William Francis was one of the first and earliest settlers and founders of Virginia, and came in the ship 'Virgin,' and was of Catherington." This was probably the same William Francis who, with some others of the earlier colonists, made a home voyage to the mother country and returned a few years later.

Brown's "Genesis of the United States" also gives the names of "Albian Francis: Giles Francis, Gentleman: and Thomas Francis," as members of the Virginia Company (pages 222, 305, 468, 770, 892).

Mills in his "Virginia Carolorian," page 261, states that Thomas Francis was burgess of Upper Norfolk in the Virginia Assembly Council in 1638–9; and Raleigh Francis was burgess in the same Council from South Gloucester County, in 1663. (See pps. 261, 297.)

EARLY SETTLERS OF MASSACHUSETTS.

The first resident of Massachusetts by the name of Francis that can be found on the records of that state is *Richard*, who was born in 1606, in England; and who located at first in Medford, afterwards in Dorchester, and, in 1636, settled in Cambridge, where he was made freeman in 1640. He married Alice Wilcox, 1644. They had five children.

There seem to have been several other parties by the name of Francis in the Massachusetts Colony. Savage in his history states that Francis Francis, of Reading, had a son John, born Feb. 4, 1657. Savage also refers to a John Francis, living at Braintree in 1650, with his wife Rose, who died 1659. He had two daughters: Elizabeth, b. 1657; and Susanna, b. 1659. Reference is also made to a Richard Francis, living at Northampton in 1675, "who came from the East" and was "clerk" of Turner's Company in King Philip's war, and "wrote a very good hand." So far, nothing further has been brought to light concerning these parties, nor has their relationship to Richard of Cambridge been established, yet probably a relationship did exist.

Note.—I have a somewhat elaborate and very interesting record of the descendants of Richard Francis of Cambridge, which I will gladly present to any reliable party who will bring the work nearer completion and publish it. C. E. F.

FIRST SETTLERS OF CONNECTICUT.

The early "Puritans," who established what was known as the "Massachusetts Colony" in the year 1630, under the leadership of John Winthrop, were, as a rule, a cultivated class of individuals. Many had received a finished education in the leading universities of Europe, and would have retained a high standing in the societies of the Old World had not their zeal for reform and opposition to religious ceremonies provoked the censure of the bishops and expulsion from their parishes for defiance of ecclesiastical authority. The ministers of the newly formed colony were men of excellent standing and considerable influence. Of the laity, many were versed in public affairs; some possessed fortunes—accumulated or inherited—and lived in the enjoyment of such external comforts as the wealth of those times could command.

Parties from this Colony made pilgrimages at various periods to countries along the Connecticut River, and settled at different points in that beautiful and fertile valley. Rev. Thomas Hooker organized one of these parties in the year 1636, and founded a new colony, which is now Hartford, the capital city.

WETHERSFIELD.

The town of Wethersfield, situated about four miles south of Hartford, was organized as a colony Jan. 7, 1633. The name

it received from the early pioneers was "Watertown," which name may have been suggested from its location on the Connecticut River, or possibly from a town in Massachusetts where some of them had previously resided. The original or Indian name was "Pyquaig" (Pauquin and Anke), signifying "clear land." In February, 1637, the name "Wythersfield" was given to the colony by a council of residents, in honor of a town in England then bearing that name, which in many respects, including its rich soil, climate, etc., much resembled the township for which it was named. It was afterward Weathersfield or Wethersfield.

(Note.—In the year 1631, eleven years after the settlement of Plymouth, Massachusetts, "Wah-quinacet," a sachem of the Connecticut valley, came to Plymouth Colony and Boston, soliciting the governors of these colonies to send parties and make settlements in the Connecticut valley, promising them as an inducement, to supply the colonies with corn and make them presents of beaver skins. But the real cause of the sachem's visit and solicitude was that he was fearing an invasion from the terrible Pequots at New London, and he thought he might find safety from English settlement in his territory. In 1634 a few men came from Watertown, Mass., and built them huts in Wethersfield; and this is the oldest town in the State.—"Records of Goshen, Conn.," by Rev. Grant Powers.)

The name of John Clark appears on record as one of the pioneer settlers in 1629.

The first child born in Wethersfield, 1635, was John, son of Leonard Chester, who married Mary Neville, a descendant of Sir Hugh de Neville of England.

John Oldham, one of the original settlers who came from Massachusetts, was master of a "shallop," or sailing vessel, September, 1633. He was the first member of the colony killed by the Indians—a roving band of the Narragansett tribe who made a raid July 20, 1636. The colonists were also beset and greatly annoyed by Indians of the Pequot tribe for a number of years.

Wethersfield when first organized as a colony embraced a territory of about fifty-eight square miles, which included the present towns of Newington, Berlin, Rocky Hill and other places on the west side of the Connecticut River, and Glaston-

bury and other places on the east side of the river. In 1693, its territory was reduced to one half, and later on it became still more reduced. Newington was cut off in December, 1712, but was not incorporated until 1781. It was previously known as "West Division."

The first road to Newington was laid out in 1671. The first church (Congregational) in Newington was erected in 1713. Newington has always been a temperance town and no drinking saloon ever existed there.

The first clergyman in Wethersfield was Rev. Henry Smith, who came from Charlestown, Mass., in 1639, but was not ordained pastor until 1641.

The first church in that town (Congregational) was built in 1685, and was replaced by a more commodious structure in 1761, which still stands near the site of the original building, although changes have since been made in way of repairs and improvements. Rev. William Partridge, a graduate of Harvard College, became pastor in 1691. He was son of Col. Samuel Partridge, of Hatfield, Mass.

Rev. Stephen Mix was installed as pastor in 1694, and continued his ministration there for over forty years.

Among the early residents of Wethersfield, we find the name of ROBERT FRANCIS. His name appears as a resident of the town in 1645, but it is not stated at what time he first located there. It is, however, probable that he was one of a party of adventurers who came from Plymouth Colony in Massachusetts several years earlier, to establish homes in the Connecticut Valley.

The name of Richard Francis also appears on the Wethersfield records of 1645. He was probably a brother of Robert, for his name was recorded as a resident of the town the same year; but as nothing further is stated of him it is presumed that he did not remain there any great length of time. It is not unlikely that he may have joined one of the companies of colonists who were called upon to defend the newly formed settlements from the incursions of the hostile Indians, and may have been killed in one of the engagements with the savages.

There can be little doubt that Robert and Richard of Wethersfield came from the Massachusetts Colony, and were


closely related to Richard of Cambridge. More than likely they were nephews and perhaps came to America at the same time.

Note.—"During the war of the American Revolution, Wethersfield Companies were in the most important engagements from Charlestown, Mass., in 1775, to Yorktown in 1781."

"They were considered by far the most accomplished soldiers in the whole American Army."

*There having recently arisen a slight question as to the authenticity of the above motto, it has been thought best to omit it from its former place under the coat of arms.

COAT OF ARMS.

There were four distinct coats of arms borne by the different branches of families bearing the name of Francis—all of which are described in books of heraldry. The one which for many years has been claimed by the Robert Francis branch is the Staffordshire insignia, as here described:

Crest: out of a ducal coronet, a demi-eagle displayed. Colors—coronet, gold; eagle, red.

Shield: field silver; chevron red; three red displayed eagles, two above and one below chevron. (Burke's and Fairbanks' Heraldry.)

Motto: "Ou le sort appelle." (Translation: "Whither fate calls.") (Fairbanks' Heraldry, page 59.) A motto more fitting to the character of the people would be difficult to frame. It implies readiness for emergencies; or adaptability to circumstances or conditions,—peculiar traits as have been portrayed by historians.

"FATE."

"There is no fate beyond our wills," you say—
My little bird knows better far than you;
See how he beats against his prison bars
Those radiant wings that might have scaled the blue.

TO TRACE LINEAGE IN THIS BOOK.

Reading from left to right on top line of each record, the small figure over right hand of each name denotes the generation dating from the common ancestor Robert Francis—thus: Robert¹, John², etc. This indicates that John² was son of Robert¹. The sons of John² are designated by figure³—thus: John³, James³, Thomas³, etc., and the following generation by figure⁴.

It seems that John³ had two sons named John—the first born Sept. 28, 1710, who married Mary Dodd, and had several children. He died May 15, 1738, and the second John was born some six years later, who married Rhoda Wright, and had a number of children. This circumstance gives two Johns in the same family, each designated by figure⁴—a singular coincidence.

At first glance this system may cause a little confusion, yet it is a simple matter to trace the lineage of each member of every family by observing and comparing dates of birth. The names are arranged in alphabetical order. Find whatever name you wish, and the father's name is next to right; the grandfather next; the great-grandfather next, and so on to name of Robert¹.

MARTHA WADSWORTH FRANCIS.

A man of sterling integrity. Kindness and benevolence were marked traits in his character. He was very courteous in manner, having a good word for everybody. He was a true lover of justice; very humane, and earnestly remonstrated against every form of cruelty and vice. A lover of children.

In French's "History of the Artists of Connecticut" is the following quotation: "Long and well known for other good qualities, George Francis also possessed a taste and talent for art, and though 'hidden under a bushel,' was yet enough before the public as to identify his name with the art of the State. He studied under Benjamin West and coloring with Washington Allston; also took some lessons from Trumbull; but his father left him a large business in carriage making in such a way that his son was literally obliged to take it up. Thereafter art ceased to be a profession, but to the end of his life it was an entertaining pastime. His pictures have a decided merit and evinced much artistic skill. In the effect of light and shade he was particularly successful. Mr. Francis was a genial social man; an active member of the 'First Temperance Society,' and a man thoroughly respected." He d. March 7, 1873.

Martha Wadsworth Francis, wife of George Francis, was a lineal descendant of Hon, William Wadsworth, a member of a party of adventurers numbering over one hundred men, women and children, who in the year 1636, under the leadership of Rev. Thomas Hooker, left their homes in Massachusetts and made a long and wearisome journey through a trackless wilderness to the interior of Connecticut, where they settled and founded a colony to which they gave the name of Hartford, now the capital of the state. The famous Capt. Joseph Wadsworth of Hartford, who secreted the Charter of King George in the hollow of an old oak tree, was a son of Hon. William Wadsworth. Sergeant Reuben Wadsworth, the father of Mrs. Francis, was great-grandson of Capt. Joseph Wadsworth and a veteran of the Revolutionary Army. He was in active service in many encounters with the British forces. Was at battle of Bunker Hill, and in Arnold's expedition to Onebec in 1775. He continued in service until wounded at the battle of Yorktown.



Simeon (above) Note.

Five of the Francis brothers and their two sisters, children of Simeon and Mary Ann, decided, after the death of their parents, to leave their old home in Wethersfield and seek a new home in the West. Two members of the family—Charles⁷ and Simeon⁷—left home several years before.

The brothers and sisters first referred to took passage on board the sloop "Falmouth" at Hartford, Conn., Sept. 17, 1829. Their journey was down the Connecticut River and through Long Island Sound to New York City; then up the Hudson River to Albany; thence to Buffalo by Erie Canal. At Buffalo they met their brother Simeon, who had been residing in that city about two years, and who decided to join the party on their trip west.

Embarking on a sailing vessel they proceeded over Lake Erie to Lower Sandusky, Ohio. On landing at that place they procured wagons preparatory for a long ride through the, then, sparsely-settled state of Ohio to Cincinnati. Many hardships were experienced on their slow journey on account of bad roads, poor accommodations for shelter at night, difficulty of procuring provisions, etc.

Wearied from their tedious journey and half sick from exposure and for want of proper nourishment, they finally reached Cincinnati, where they took passage on one of the small steamboats down the Ohio River; then up the Mississippi River to St. Louis, barely escaping with their lives by the wrecking of one of the boats on which they were journeying. They travelled every day for seventy-seven days, resting only on Sundays, to accomplish a journey which now can be made with comfort in less than half as many hours.

They remained together at St. Louis until the summer of 1831, when Josiah went to Springfield, Ill., and issued a prospectus for the *Sangamon County Journal*, soliciting subscriptions for the paper. Simeon and John Newton went later to assist, and the first number of the *Journal* was published Nov. 10, 1831. (History Sangamon Co., Ill.)

When quite a young man he went to New Haven where he served an apprenticeship in a printing office. He afterwards went to New London and in 1824 formed a partnership under the name of Clapp & Francis to publish a newspaper in that city.

Later he married, then sold his interest in the *Journal* and moved to Buffalo, where he formed a partnership under the firm name of Lazwell & Francis, published a paper called the *Buffalo Emporium*. He and his partner were both Free Masons, and the "Morgan Excitement," which broke out soon after, caused a suspension of the paper and the business of the firm was closed in the early part of the year 1828. In 1829, he joined his brothers and sisters who passed through Buffalo

on their way to St. Louis. In 1831 he left St. Louis and went to Springfield, Ill., and in connection with his brothers, Josiah, Allen, and John Newton, published the *Sangamon County Journal* through its various changes to the present daily and weekly *State Journal* which became, and still continues, a very popular newspaper.

During his residence at Springfield, Simeon Francis became a warm personal friend of Abraham Lincoln, who was then a young lawyer living there, and this friendly relationship continued through life.

In 1840 President Wm. Henry Harrison appointed him Indian agent for Oregon: but he soon after resigned, and continued journalism. He, however, sold out his interest in the *Illinois State Journal* in June, 1856, and for a time became engaged in mercantile business, under the firm name of Francis & Barrell.

For several years he was secretary of the Illinois State Agricultural Society. He was a warm personal friend of Stephen A. Douglas, also of Col. E. D. Baker, and it was partly through the influence of Colonel Baker that he decided to go to Oregon and take the editorship of the *Oregonian*, then a weekly newspaper published at Portland, which up to that time had met with but little success. He at once made it a daily paper, and his experience as an editor, and the general knowledge of newspaper work which he possessed, made the *Oregonian* the popular and successful paper which it became and still continues.

In 1862, he resigned the editorship of the *Oregonian* and was appointed by President Lincoln paymaster in the army with the rank of major, and was stationed at Vancouver. He remained in the army several years and was promoted to colonel. In 1870 he retired on half-pay and returned to Portland, Ore., where he spent the balance of his life. He died Oct. 25, 1872.

Simeon Francis had no children, but he and his wife adopted a niece of Mrs. Francis—Ann Douglass, who m. Capt. Geo. Barrell of Springfield, Ill.

He was one of the prominent men of our country who early connected themselves with "the party of liberty." He served as sergeant in a company known as "Patriots" in the wars against the combined forces of French and Indians, in which he did excellent service. He was one of the original settlers of Pontoosuc, Mass. He was one of the signers of a petition to convene a Town Meeting in 1774, "to act, and do what the town might think proper in regard to the invaded liberties and privileges of the country by Great Britain."

He was one of a committee of "three most stout-hearted citizens" appointed to protest against the unjust action of the British Parliament. He was also chosen one of a committee to condemn as enemies of the republic those who were opposed to American liberty, and to make such persons publicly known in order that patriotic citizens might thenceforth break off all intercourse with them.

He was also member of a committee instituted in March, 1776, to declare their indignation at the acts of King George and to ignore him and his authority. This committee declared that independence was a foregone conclusion. As may be well imagined, the "Tories residing about there were rather roughly handled."

Immediately after the disaster at Fort Ticonderoga, William Francis organized a company of forty men, of which he was captain, and marched to Fort Edward to reinforce the army. In 1777, he marched with a company of twenty-two men to join General Stark at Bennington, Vt. On Sept. 30, same year, he marched with a company of thirty men to join General Gates at Stillwater, and remained with General Gates's army until after the surrender of Burgoyne.

In January, 1786, Capt. William Francis was sent by General Patterson of the Berkshire Militia with a company of troops to repel a mob of eight hundred men gathered at Williamstown to defy the Government. The mob was under the command of two notorious rebels: Eli Parsons, and an obnoxious Tory by the name of Wiley. The State troops started from Pittsfield in sleights, and by prompt and rapid movements succeeded in defeating the rabble, only capturing a number of prisoners and driving the others into banishment.

Capt. Francis become a very popular citizen of Pittsfield and was held by his townsmen in extraordinary esteem for his discretion and integrity. He held many offices of trust from the year 1761, even to the time of his death, which occurred March 13, 1818.

The soubriquet of "Governor Francis," by which he was known in later years, is still remembered with reverential respect by persons still living at Pittsfield.

AARON FRANCIS, great-grandson of Richard¹, was born at Milford, Mass., 1751; m. Ruth Standley. Had eight children. He served six years in the War of the Revolution. Was on duty at Lexington Alarm, April, 1775; also at battle of Bunker Hill. Was lieutenant until his term of service expired.

He was a Unitarian clergyman; also Professor of "Pulpit Eloquence and Pastoral Care," at Harvard. Was author of "Life of John Eliot," of "Historic Sketch of Watertown," and "Errors of Education." d. Nov. 27, 1857.

Rev. Convers Francis was son of Convers Francis, who was b. 1767, and m. Susanna Rand 1788.

David, eldest son of Stephen and Nancy Green Francis (David, Stephen, Nathaniel, Nathaniel, John, Richard, b. Boston, Oct. 22, 1779; m. Mary Moore, Feb. 16, 1804. At the age of twenty-two he formed a partnership with Edmund Munroe, under the firm name of Munroe & Francis, as printers, publishers and book-sellers—a firm widely and honorably known to the American reading public of that day. It is noteworthy that the first work issued by the young publishers, under the direct supervision of Mr. Francis, was an edition of

Shakespeare in eight volumes; with one exception, the earliest American edition. David Francis during his entire life was a public-spirited citizen, and an ardent lover of books. The firm of Munroe & Francis existed for over half a century—until the death of Mr. Francis, which occurred March 20, 1853.

The following is an extract from an obituary notice published in a Boston newspaper at the time of his death:

"Mr. Francis was a most active and industrious working man. In early life he connected himself with the philanthropic movements of the time and took an active part in every patriotic and praiseworthy enterprise. He was commander of the Rifle Rangers at its formation, and was a popular officer when that corps was in service at East Boston, during the war of 1812. He was an early member of the Massachusetts Charitable Mechanic Association, and for ten years its secretary. He was several times elected member of the State Legislature. He was a member of the Chauncey Place Church, and for many years its treasurer.

The sterling integrity of his character, the soundness of his judgment, his public spirit, his ready sympathy and aid for the unfortunate and afflicted, and the amenities of his manner will not soon be forgotten by the community in which he has so long been regarded as one of its worthiest and most valued members."

Mr. Francis had seven children.

David Green Francis, son of David and Mary Moore Francis (above), was b. at Boston, July 15, 1817: unin.; d. at New Canaan, Conn., Sept. 13, 1902.

The following obituary notice appeared in New York newspapers:

"With the venerable David G. Francis passes away one of the last of the publishers and book-sellers of the time when the book-shop was—as it cannot be now—one of the chief meeting-places of authors and book-lovers; a centre of scholarly society, and a clearing-house for scholarly exchanges. Mr. Francis, trained in the house of his father, of the old firm of Munroe & Francis of Boston, entered business with his elder brother, Charles S. Francis, in New York in 1846 as book-publishers and book-sellers on a large scale. After the death of his brother, he continued in the book business and published quite a number of standard works. He was a member of the Century Club for many years, where he spent much of his time after retirement from business."

EBENEZER, great-grandson of Richard¹, b. Medford, Mass., Dec. 22, 1743; m. Judith Wood, Jan. 2, 1766. Had five chil-

dren. Moved to Beverly, 1764. Was colonel of the 11th Massachusetts troops in War of Revolution. His regiment occupied Dorchester Heights and was engaged in several actions. Was at battle of Ticonderoga, also at Hubbardston, where he was killed while leading his troops.

EBENEZER, son of Ebenezer (above), b. Beverly, Mass., Oct. 15, 1775; m. Elizabeth Thorndike of Boston, and settled in that city. He was a man of pronounced energy, and possessed excellent judgment. He was chairman of trustees of the Massachusetts General Hospital; then president of same. Was president of the Cochus Manufacturing Company; director in Marine Insurance Company; and in a number of other corporations. Was treasurer of Harvard College, where he introduced new order and system. He was distinguished for strict integrity and great intelligence. He was eminently successful in business and accumulated a large fortune. He had seven children.

EBENEZER, son of Aaron (page 188), b. Beverly, Mass., Oct. 18, 1790; m. Hannah Lincoln Marsh of Hingham, June 21, 1818. Moved to Boston and became one of the prominent builders of that city. Had five children.

EBEN, son of Ebenezer (above), b. Boston, May 29, 1819; m. Mary Hunnewell of Cambridge, June 15, 1843. He was a clergyman of the Universalist denomination. Had four children; d. Oct. 31, 1892.

EBEN CHARLES, son of Rev. Eben, b. at Utica, N. Y., Sept. 6, 1851; m. Gertrude Nourse, Oct. 20, 1886. Moved to Woonsocket, R. I. No children. Cashier of the National Bank at Woonsocket. Has held many offices of trust and honor, and interested in several manufacturing enterprises. Was colonel on staff of Governor Littlefield, 1880-2. Was senator in Rhode Island Legislature, and quite prominent in several civic associations.

John², son of Richard¹, was b. at Cambridge, Mass., Jan. 4, 1650. He m. Lydia, dau. of John Cooper, Jan. 5, 1688. He settled at Medford, Mass., 1680, and was quite an influential

citizen. Had ten children. His daughter Anna m. Benjamin Dana, 1724. His daughter Lydia m. Joseph Tufts. He d. 1728. His wife d. 1725.

John⁴ (John³, John², Richard¹), b. at Cambridge, 1723; d. 1776. He enlisted in Capt. Hull's company, Massachusetts troops, April 9, 1775, for service around Boston. Had six children.

John, great grandson of Richard¹, b. Medford, Mass., Sept. 28, 1753; m. Sarah Babson, July, 1772; m. 2d Elizabeth Hopkins, August, 1780. Had one child—Sallie. He was adjutant in the 11th Regiment Massachusetts troops under his brother Colonel Ebenezer; and after his brother was killed he served under Colonel Benjamin Tupper. He was active in several battles, one of which was the capture of General Burgoyne. At the close of the war he was captain of a military home company. He held various offices of trust in his town; and possessed an amiable and cheerful disposition. He was noted for his hospitality.

Some Prominent Members of other Francis Families.

David Rowland Francis, b. Madison Co., Ky., Oct. 1, 1850. Early in life he settled in St. Louis. He entered Washington University and graduated in 1870. He possessed remarkable energy and activity, and became one of the most enterprising and successful merchants of St. Louis. He was elected president of the Merchants' Exchange, and afterward mayor of the city, during which term of service he was instrumental in bringing about many needed reforms. He was elected Governor of Missouri in 1889, which office he held for four years. In 1896 he was appointed Secretary of the Interior in President Cleveland's cabinet. He was president of the great St. Louis Exposition (World's Fair), and made a grand success of the work.

HARRY H. FRANCIS, son of Thompson W. Francis, was b. in Michigan City, Ind., Feb. 24, 1852. In 1869 he entered Racine (Wis.) College, and graduated in 1873. In the fall of that year he entered the law department of the University of

Michigan, and graduated in 1875. He commenced the practice of law in Indianapolis, which he continued until 1878; then removed to his native city, where he continued to practice law until September, 1879. He afterwards founded the *Michigan City Dispatch*, of which he was editor and proprietor. It was a Democratic paper in politics.

JOHN BROWN FRANCIS, a descendant of Tench Francis, of the Maryland branch (see page 3), was b. in Philadelphia, May 31, 1794. He m. Elizabeth, dau. of Thomas Willing. He went to Rhode Island and settled at Warwick. He was member of the State Legislature from 1821 to 1829, then state senator in 1831. Was Governor of Rhode Island from 1833 to 1838. Was again state senator in 1842. He was United States Senator in 1844. Was elected state senator for the third time in 1849, which office he held for seven more years. He d. Aug. 9, 1864.

John Morgan Francis, was b. in Prattsburg, N. Y., March 6, 1823. His father's name was Richard, who came to this country from South Wales in 1798 and settled first in Herkimer Co., N. Y., and m. Mary Stewart of Litchfield, Conn., in 1804. John Morgan Francis was an apprentice in a printing office in Canandaigua, was afterwards editorial writer for the *Palmyra Sentinel*, and later for the *Rochester Advertiser*. In 1851 he established the *Troy Times*, which became one of the most noted newspapers in the state of New York. He was a member of the Constitutional Convention in 1867; was United States Minister to Greece from 1871 to 4; was Minister to Portugal from 1882 to 4; and Minister Plenipotentiary to Austria-Hungary in 1884. In all these positions he attained prominence and won honorable distinction.

Mr. Francis m. Harriet Elizabeth Tucker, Oct. 8, 1847, a lady of great literary ability and fine social attainments.

Their son, Charles Spencer Francis, succeeded his father as publisher of the *Troy Times*, and like his father held important positions of trust. He was appointed Minister to Greece, also to Roumania and Servia. Mr. Francis was a graduate of Cornell University and was one of the most popular young men in the college.

John Wakefield Francis, M.D., was b. in New York City, Nov. 17, 1789, the same year that Washington was inaugurated President of the United States. His father was born in Germany. He emigrated to this country in 1783 and married a Philadelphia lady of Swiss origin.

John W. was a student at Columbia College and graduated in 1809. He then took a full course of study at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, and received the first degree of M.D. conferred by that college. He became one of the most prominent physicians of New York, as well as one of the most popular and intelligent citizens. He published a number of medical and other books. Dr. Francis was the first president of the Academy of Medicine; was connected with several literary and other societies. He was editor of the American Medical and Philosophical Register, and contributor to several journals. He held a professorship in the College of Medicine and was author of many books. He was a man of a most genial disposition, and exceedingly charitable in the distribution of his gifts. He d. in New York City Feb. 8, 1861.

JOSEPH MARSHALL FRANCIS, D.D., Bishop of Indiana, was b. at Eaglesmore, Sullivan Co., Pa., April 6, 1862. His father was James Booth Francis, who m. Charlotte Augusta Marshall. He was a descendant of Hon. Tench Francis (see below) of the Maryland branch. Bishop Francis was educated at the Episcopal Academy of Philadelphia; then attended Racine College in Wisconsin, and the University of Oxford, England. He was ordained deacon Dec. 21, 1884, and to the priesthood, Dec. 10, 1886, in All Souls' Cathedral, Milwaukee, by the Rt. Rev. E. R. Wells. He was canon of the cathedral in Milwaukee and rector of St. Luke's Church at Whitewater, Wis., successively until 1888. He afterwards went to Japan as missionary of the Episcopal Church, and while there was a professor in Trinity Divinity School, also sub-deacon of that institution for several years. He returned to this country in 1897, and became rector of St. Paul's Church of Evansville, Ind., Jan. 1, 1898. In June, 1899, he was elected Bishop of Indiana, and consecrated September 21 same year. The name of the diocese was changed to Indianapolis in 1902.

Bishop Francis was m. June 14, 1887, to Kate, dau. of George C. and Catherine M. (Green) Stevens of Milwaukee.

TENCH FRANCIS was a descendant of Sir Philip Francis, mayor of Plymouth, England, and son of Rev. John Francis, D.D. (see page 3). One of his daughters, Margaret, m. Chief Justice Edward Shippen. His daughter Elizabeth m. John Lawrence. They also had a daughter Elizabeth who m. James, son of Chief Justice Allen. Anna, dau. of Tench, m. James Tilgham. They had a son, Colonel Tench Tilgham, who was aid-de-camp and favorite on the staff of General Washington. He carried to Congress the news of the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown.

Anne Francis, granddaughter of Tench, m. Hon. James A. Bayard, United States Senator from Delaware.

Thompson W. Francis, b. Lexington, Ky., 1815. He was one of the earliest settlers of Michigan City, Ind., arriving there in 1832. He resided there forty-eight years and at the time of his death, which occurred April 17, 1880, he was the oldest resident. Mr. Francis was a man of strong and positive character, and led a very active life. He was an ardent Republican, and took lively interest in politics. He was one of the foremost citizens, and always labored for advancement of his city's interests. When he passed away he was mourned by all. Had three sons, one of whom, Harry H., was publisher of the Dispatch (see page 193).

Turbutt Francis, son of Tench Francis (above), was b. 1740, and m. Sarah, dau. of Samuel Mifflin, Sept. 26, 1770. He was lieutenant in the Continental Army, and afterwards colonel in the Army of Revolution, where he did good service. He had four children, Elizabeth, Rebecca M., Tench, and Samuel.

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
