Greek organizations gather for the needy

Record 5,800 items given to Hand to Hand organization

Hand to Hand representatives JoAnn Harman and Sam Barnett had to just stop and stare yesterday when they came to pick up about 5,800 items for clothes and the homeless collected by the campus Greek system during Homecoming Week.

"There's no way we're going to fit all of this into our vans," Barnett said with a smile. "We're going to have to make two trips."

Even Homecoming philanthropy enthusiasts Jennifer Borschow and Marc Solomon were surprised at the amount collected by the fraternity-sorority matchups.

"Originally, we were just going to give each matchup a big box for blankets and towels and a small box for toiletries because we didn't expect all of this," Solomon said.

Hand to Hand is a non-profit organization of 300 volunteers who provide food, clothing and moral support to homeless individuals in the District of Columbia and Montgomery County.

The homecoming drive reaped the biggest donation the organization has ever had, Borschow said.

"We chose Hand to Hand because it is a small, local organization," said Borschow. "We like what they do and thought that they could use our help."

Items collected included:

- 219 blankets and towels
- 757 towels and pillow cases

A HELPING HAND

Campus Greeks collected about 5,800 items such as blankets, towels, toiletries and jeans to give to the needy

- 129 pairs of jeans;
- 2,239 toiletries;
- 1,800 cleaning supplies and paper products.

Hand to Hand will give many of the blankets, sheets, pillowcases and towels to Women's Interfaith, an organization that helps directly shelter in Montgomery County, Harman said.

The rest of the items collected go to the people on the streets.

Every Sunday the organization sends two vans to White Horse Freeway, Virginia Avenue, 12th and Pennsylvania Avenue and Constitution Hall, where volunteers hand out hot meals, toiletries and clothes to needy individuals, Harman said.

"All of this comes at a really good time because we were running really low on toiletries and with winter coming, people are really going to need the jeans and blankets," Harman said.

The drive was aimed at the entire campus, like all Homecoming events, but only the Greek system participated in it. "It's just hard to get people outside of the Greek system involved in this type of thing unless they are charity-oriented," Borschow said.

Although the Hand to Hand collection only included the Greek system, the other two philanthropies run during Homecoming

Including students and members of the community, the Terrapin Trot raised approximately \$2,500 for Habitat for Humanity and Maryland Wheelchair Athletic Promotions.

Usually only about 100 people participate in Terrapin Trot, but this year there were over 400 runners and walkers, Solomon said. "There was even a participant in a wheelchair."

Greek social policy revised

Places controls on alcohol use

The Interfraternity Council (IFC) and the Panhellenic Association (PHA) have tightened the existing Greek system social policy, effective since Nov. 1.

The campus approved the amendments — the first made to the policy since 1990 — two weeks ago.

"The new policy is a hybrid (partially) made up of the old policy, and there are parts that are similar to that of other universities," said David Stollman, IFC president. "It sets up guidelines by which a party can be held. The campus is excited that we took the initiative to make the policy more comprehensive and safer."

"Although the new policy allows for more 'unattached' parties, the procedure for having a party has become more structured."

Previously, fraternities were only allowed to have one "unattached" party per semester, Stollman said. Now, fraternities can have an unattached party once a weekend.

An unattached party is a fraternity party not held in conjunction with a sorority.

"There are so many more fraternities than sororities, there is almost a shortage of sororities," Stollman said.

"There are 27 campus fraternities and 16 sororities on campus."

"But with the opportunity for more parties, there are also more restrictions on fraternity and sorority parties."

As part of the new policy, fraternities or sororities must submit a social event registration form to the

Social Responsibility Committee (SRC), which is directed jointly by IFC and PHA social chairpersons.

"The SRC knows where the parties are and gives it more ability to manage the party," Osteen said.

The SRC monitors the parties, he said, and sanctions are issued if there are violations.

Party sites are also now required, in advance of the party, to provide neighbors with phone numbers of two contact people at the party in case a problem arises during the party. The contact people are required to remain sober during the party, Stollman said.

There is also a new stipulation that a party can be closed down if neighbors think it is too loud. Stollman said under the old policy, although noise violations were considered minor infractions, a party could not be shut down for having high noise levels.

Another addition to the existing social policy is that list parties, where guests must be on the list to attend, must be classified as "BYOB" or catered by a professional catering service.

A "bring your own beverage party" requires people who will be drinking to bring their own. However, people who do bring their own are not allowed to bring glass containers, Stollman said.

Stollman said "BYOB" parties are safer than keg parties because the guests must give the beverages to bartenders who then distribute them upon request. The bartenders can use discretion in not serving people who have had too much to drink, he said.

"It helps address liability issues," he said.

Professional caterers can also better monitor underage drinking by checking identifications.

ALPHA CHI OMEGA

The National Convention was held this past summer in St. Louis, Missouri. The little boy, intoned with his Easter basket, is telling you about his close encounter with the big bunny himself. He leans over to tell you exactly what she said.

"Hi," he says solemnly. A man of few words, he goes back to an inventory of his basket.

"Eggs," he intones. His friend, Susan, on whose lap he is sitting, smiles.

Susan Ciardiello, a Kappa Alpha Theta sorority member, has been making friends with boys and girls from Saint Anne's Infant and Maternity Home for three years as part of PACE (People Active in Community Effort). Now PACE's president, Ciardiello, a senior psychology major, is hosting an Easter egg hunt sponsored by the organization and her sorority sisters at their house.

"This is 100 percent rewarding," she says, dodging the straw Easter basket handle headed for her chin.

According to Ciardiello, PACE has been on campus for about 15 years. Every week, she and other PACE members visit Saint Anne's and Saint Elizabeth's Hospital, a mental health facility. The same group of 30- to 35-year-old St. Anne's residents, called the Guardian Angels, stays at the Kappa Alpha Theta house in December for a Christmas party.

"I really enjoy the work," says Ciardiello, who wants to teach after graduation. "Playing with them is a joy. They're so receptive and attentive. There's a feeling you get. I can't describe it." "The college kids with the college kids stimulates the children," says Joyce Reid, senior staff person for the Guardian Angels for two years. The home, a temporary residence for wards of the state, is funded by Catholic Charities. "Some of them are abused, and a lot of them don't have visitors. The college students are great with them. Susan's been coming as long as I've been here."

Veronica Greenhow, a Saint Anne's child care worker who's been there for six years, says that while the children are supposed to stay at the facilities for a maximum of 90

days, some stay as long as two to three years.

"The kids will do anything to stay there," she says. "Some of them have never been out (like this) before they come to us. It's like Christmas every day."

The afternoon's main attraction, the Easter Bunny, spent her time passing out eggs, talking to kids and explaining her mission. The bunny, who during the off season is junior accounting major Kristi Adkins, said the children were slightly fuzzy on her credentials.

"They said, 'Are you a bunny?' Is this your basket?" Adkins said through painted whiskers. "I think they decided that I was an Easter Bunny, and that there were others."

Adkins is no stranger to playing

large animals; in high school, it was "the lion on the float. I was always the sucker in the costume."

After mobbing the bunny, the kids went downstairs and shared spaghetti dinner with the sorority members.

Anny Higgins, a sophomore health education and occupation therapy major, sat between her sisters and a few little sauce mottled kids and talked about why she likes these kinds of activities.

"I did the Christmas party," Higgins says, smiling in the direction of a little girl running in through her basket.

"They have having older kid around, like big sisters. I never had a brother or sister, so I enjoy this, she says.

Sigma Nu turns 75

Sigma Nu, the oldest campus fraternity, is celebrating its 75th anniversary and, with the help of alumni, commemorating its past.

Although Sigma Nu officially began on campus in 1917, its brotherhood was established in 1912 after the only dorm at the Maryland Agricultural College burned down.

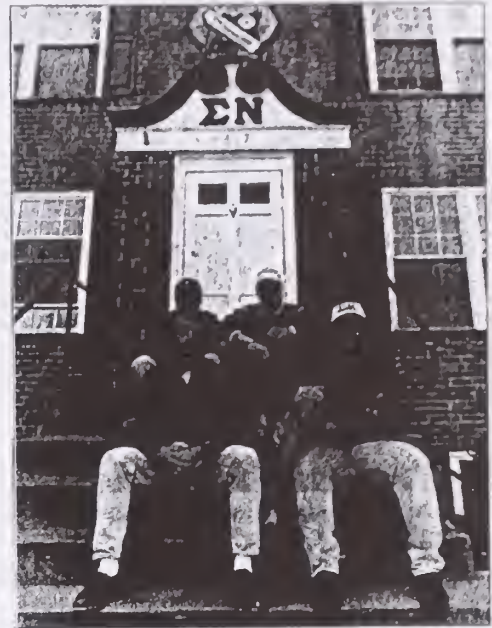

Over that time, many regulations and procedures of the fraternity have changed.

"Fraternities have gone through so many changes in the last 30 years," said alumnus Calvin Clemons, who graduated in 1966. "Women were only allowed on the first floor or the basement [recreation] room. If they came up to the second floor, we threw them in the shower."

"We had to dress for dinner, which just meant a coat and a tie," Clemons added. "So guys would show up to dinner in a coat, a tie and Bermuda shorts."

None of the founding members are still living, but members say the fraternity's beliefs have not changed since the beginning.

"Truth. Love. Honor. Those are our guiding principles," said alumnus Peter Halvorsen, a 1986 graduate and last year's house father.

"[The first chapter] was founded at Virginia Military Institute by three students who were fed up with the VMI bureaucracy," said Chris Ebmeyer, a junior advertising major. "They founded a fraternity based on truth, love and honor. I think a lot of people took that to heart and tried to live it out."

"In 1869, when we were founded, we were founded as a non-hazing fraternity," Halvorsen

said. "That was before all of the publicity surrounding hazing started. The guys who founded the fraternity said, 'Hey, it's stupid. It's wrong. Let's not do it.'"

Like many Greeks, Sigma Nu has a history of community service.

This past year, brothers tutored school children in conjunction with the tutoring program Greenbelt Cares.

Sigma Nu hopes to continue with as much good fortune as it has had the last few years. The fraternity is growing steadily, with pledge classes of about 20.
