**W**HEREAS the Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Nova Scotia, with the Legislative Council and Assembly of the said Province, did on the fourth day of April, A.D. 1871, pass an Act, which has been transmitted, entitled as follows, viz: "An Act to regulate Pilotage in the Bras d'Or Lake, in the Island of Cape Breton."

And whereas the said Act has been laid before the Governor General in Council, together with a Report from the Minister of Justice setting forth that he is of opinion that it was not competent for the Legislature to pass such Act, and therefore recommending that the said Act should not receive the confirmation of the Governor General.

His Excellency the Governor General has thereupon this day been pleased, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, to declare his disallowance of the said Act, and the same is hereby disallowed accordingly.

Whereof the Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Nova Scotia, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

### A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS on the TWENTY-FIFTH day of the month of OCTOBER, last past, We thought fit to prorogue Our Parliament of Canada to the NINTH day of the month of DECEMBER, instant, at which time at Our City of Ottawa, you were held and constrained to appear: Now KNOW YE, that for divers causes and considerations, and taking into consideration the ease and convenience of Our Loving Subjects, We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council for Canada, to relieve you, and each of you, of your attendance at the time aforesaid, hereby con- voking and by these presents enjoining you, and each of you, that on THURSDAY, the EIGHTEENTH day of the month of JANUARY next, you meet Us, in Our Parlia- ment of Canada, at Our City of Ottawa, there to take into consideration the state and welfare of Our said Dominion of Canada, and therein to do as may seem necessary. HEREIN FAIL NOT.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed. WIT- NESS, Our Right Trusty and Well-Beloved, The Right Honorable JOHN, BARON LISGAR, of Lisgar and Bulleborough, in the County of Cavan, Ireland, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and a Baronet, one of Our Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Dis- tinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor General of Canada, and Gov- ernor and Commander-in-Chief of the Island of Prince Edward. At OUR GOVERNMENT HOUSE, in Our CITY of OTTAWA, in our Dominion, the SIXTH day of DECEMBER, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in the Thirty-fifth year of Our Reign.

## PARLIAMENTARY NOTICES.

### NOTICE.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE,

Ottawa, 2nd January, 1871

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,— shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specify- ing the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one news- paper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in ne Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intend- ing to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval be- tween the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

### BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to speci- fy from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provin- ces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

## CONVERSION OF DEBENTURES INTO STOCK.

All 5 per cent. currency Debentures may be converted into 5 per cent. stock at par, whatever may be the period for which the Debentures have to run.

All 6 per cent. currency Debentures not maturing before January 1878, when the 6 per cent. stock is redeemable, may be converted into 6 per cent. stock at par.

The six per cent. currency Debentures issued in 1868 on which there is an endorsement that they are convertible into stock may be so converted at par.

Six per cent currency Debentures maturing before 1878 may be converted into stock upon application to the Treasury Board, and at such rates as the Board may direct in each case.

In case it should be desired to convert any 5 per cent. or 6 per cent Debentures payable in London into stock, application must be made to the Treasury Board in each case

In the three first cases above mentioned the Debentures may be sent in to the Receiver General or to any Assistant Receiver General upon which a certificate of stock will be issued. If the case should be one which has to be submitted to the Treasury Board, the application should be sent to the Secretary of the Board with full particulars as to the nature of the Debentures.

## DEBENTURES PAYABLE IN CANADA.

For the convenience of the holders of Debentures payable in Canada, the coupons will for the future be payable by the several Assistant Receivers General. Coupons of Debentures of the late Province of Canada will be paid either at Ottawa or at Montreal or Toronto.

Coupons of Debentures of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick will be paid at Halifax and St. John respectively.

Coupons of Debentures of the Dominion will be paid either at Ottawa or by any of the Assistant Receivers General in the several Provinces of the Dominion.

As the coupons must be verified where the Debentures Books are kept, before payment, coupons of the late Province of Canada or of the Dominion if required to be paid elsewhere than at Ottawa, must be presented to the Assistant Receiver General where they are to be paid, who will give a receipt for them in a form furnished to him, and transmit them to Ottawa for verification, from whence he will receive authority to pay them. As a few days must thus elapse between the presentation of a coupon and its payment, they may be presented if desired before they are due, and upon being verified they will be paid by the Assistant Receiver General when due.

As the books of the old Debentures of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are kept at Halifax and St. John, no delay is necessary for verification in those cases.

If any holder of a Debenture payable in Canada wishes to convert it into Dominion Stock, 6 per cent Debentures may be so converted into 6 per cent Stock, and 5 per cent Debentures into 5 per cent Stock at par. In this case the Debenture must also be sent to Ottawa for verification, whereupon the certificate of Stock will be issued.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE,

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any the rights or property of other parties, or relate to

any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,— shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specify- ing the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one news- paper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intend- ing to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval be- tween the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to spec- ify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provin- ces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

## CONVERSION OF DEBENTURES INTO STOCK.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed. WITNESS, Our Right Trusty and Well-Beloved, The Right Honorable JOHN, BARON LISGAR, of Lisgar and Bailieborough, in the County of Cavan, Ireland, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and a Baronet, one of Our Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor General of Canada, and Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Island of Prince Edward. At OUR GOVERNMENT HOUSE, in Our CITY of OTTAWA, in our Dominion, the TWELFTH day of JANUARY, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, and in the Thirty fifth year of Our Reign.

NOTICE.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE,

Ottawa, 2nd January, 1871

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work the

granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

CONVERSION OF DEBENTURES INTO STOCK.

All 5 per cent. currency Debentures may be converted into 5 per cent. stock at par, whatever may be the period for which the Debentures have to run.

All 6 per cent. currency Debentures not maturing before January 1878, when the 6 per cent. stock is redeemable, may be converted into 6 per cent. stock at par.

The six per cent. currency Debentures issued in 1868 on which there is an endorsement that they are convertible into stock may be so converted at par.

Six per cent. currency Debentures maturing before 1878 may be converted into stock upon application to the Treasury Board, and at such rates as the Board may direct in each case.

In case it should be desired to convert any 5 per cent. or 6 per cent. Debentures payable in London into stock, application must be made to the Treasury Board in each case.

In the three first cases above mentioned the Debentures may be sent in to the Receiver General or to any Assistant Receiver General upon which a certificate of stock will be issued. If the case should be one which has to be submitted to the Treasury Board, the application should be sent to the Secretary of the Board with full particulars as to the nature of the Debentures.

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work, the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any the rights or property of other parties, or relate to

any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

## CONVERSION OF DEBENTURES INTO STOCK.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE,

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any the rights or property of other parties, or relate to

any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,— shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specify- ing the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one news- paper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intend- ing to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval bet- ween the abutments or piers for the passage of rats and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

### BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to speci- fy from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provin- ces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

To all to whom these Presents shall come, or whom the same may in anywise concern, GREETING :

### PROCLAMATION.

**W**HEREAS in and by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in the thirty-first year of Our Reign and intitled "An Act providing for the organization of the Department of the Secretary of State of Canada and for the management of Indian and Ordnance Lands" it is amongst other things, in effect, enacted that the provisions in the eighteenth and the four next following sections, that is to say, the nineteenth, twentieth, twenty-first and twenty-second sections of the said Act, contained, shall extend to such Indian Lands only as the Governor, from time to time, by Proclamation, published in the "Canadian Gazette" declares and makes subject to the same, and so long, only as such Proclamation remains in force.

AND WHEREAS it has been deemed expedient by Our Governor of Canada that the said provisions should be extended to the several tracts of land hereinafter mentioned and called, known and used as Indian Reserves respectively, being Lands or Roads or allowances for roads running through any lands belonging to or occupied by any tribe, band or body of Indians, situate and being within the Province of Nova Scotia and hereinafter particularly described.

NOW THEREFORE KNOW YE THAT WE, taking the same into our Royal consideration and approving of the extension of the provisions of the said sections of the said act to the said several Indian Lands hereinafter mentioned and every part thereof, DO HEREBY declare and make subject to the provisions of the eighteenth, nineteenth, twentieth, twenty-first and twenty-second sections of the act of the Parliament of Canada, made and passed in the 31st year of Our Reign and entitled "An Act providing for the organisation of the Department of the Secretary of States for Canada, and for the management of Indian and Ordnance Lands."

All and singular the following Indian Lands situate in the Province of Nova Scotia being lands or roads, or allowances for roads, running through any lands belonging to or occupied by any Tribe, band or body of Indian that is to say:--

No. 1. The Magamatakook or Middle River Reserve, in the County of Victoria.

No. 2. The Wykokomah Reserve (including Indian Island), in the County of Inverness.

No. 3. The Malagawatch Reserve on Great Bras D'Or Lake, in the said County of Victoria.

No. 4. The Escasene Reserve, on East Bay, Cape Breton, in the said County of Inverness.

No. 5. The Chapel Island Reserve, and the Reserve on the mainland adjacent thereto, and the Reserves on Ambrose and Maurice Islands.

No. 6. The Bear River Reserve in the Counties of Digby and Annapolis.

No. 7. The Reserve at Cegumcega Lake, in the said County of Annapolis.

No. 8. The Reserve on the New Liverpool Road, in the said County of Annapolis.

No. 9. The Reserve on Cegumcega Lake aforesaid, in the County of Queens and the Island in the said Lake adjacent to the said last mentioned Reserve.

No. 10. The Reserve on Ponbrook Lake in the said County of Queens.

No. 11. The Reserve at Port Medway in the said County of Queens.

No. 12. The Reserve on the River Medway in the said County of Queens.

No. 13. The Reserve on Shubenecadie Lake in the County of Hants.

No. 14. The Reserve on Indian Brook in the said County of Hants.

No. 15. The Reserve on Trysamis River in the County of Halifax.

No. 16. The Reserve at Sambro Harbour in the said County of Halifax.

No. 17. The Reserve on the road between Sheet Harbor and Musquodabort Lake in the said County of Halifax.

No. 18. The Reserve at Ship Harbor, Great Lake in the said County of Halifax.

No. 19. The Reserve at New Germany on Wallah Bay Lake in the County of Lunenburg

No. 20. The Reserve on Nine Mile Lake, near New Ros in the said County of Lunenburg

No. 21. The Reserve on Gold River in the said County of Lunenburg.

No. 22. The Reserve adjoining Franklin Mann, in the County of Cumberland.

No. 23. The Reserves at Ponquet and Little River, respectively in the Canso Road, in the County of Antigonish and

No. 24. The Reserve on the Straits of Northumberland in the County of Pictou.

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any the rights or property of other parties, or relate to

any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,— shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specify- ing the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one news- paper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intend- ing to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval be- tween the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

## BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to speci- fy from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provin- ces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,— shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one news- paper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intend- ing to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval be- tween the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to speci- fy from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provin- ces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

## CONVERSION OF DEBENTURES INTO STOCK.

All 5 per cent. currency Debentures may be converted into 5 per cent. stock at par, whatever may be the period for which the Debentures have to run.

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,— shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specify ing the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one news- paper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intend- ing to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of ratts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

### BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specifi from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provin- ces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

CONVERSION OF DEBENTURES INTO STOCK.

All 5 per cent. currency Debentures may be converted into 5 per cent. stock at par, whatever may be the period for which the Debentures have to run.

All 6 per cent. currency Debentures not maturing before January 1878, when the 6 per cent. stock is redeemable, may be converted into 6 per cent. stock at par.

The six per cent. currency Debentures issued in 1868 on which there is an endorsement that they are convertible into stock may be so converted at par.

Six per cent currency Debentures maturing before 1878 may be converted into stock upon application to the Treasury Board, and at such rates as the Board may direct in each case.

In case it should be desired to convert any 5 per cent. or 6 per cent Debentures payable in London into stock, application must be made to the Treasury Board in each case

In the three first cases above mentioned the Debentures may be sent in to the Receiver General or to any Assistant Receiver General upon which a certificate of stock will be issued. If the case should be one which has to be submitted to the Treasury Board, the application should be sent to the Secretary of the Board with full particulars as to the nature of the Debentures.

*Communications by Telegraph.*

Adverting to that portion of Paragraph 213 of "Regulations and Orders for the Active Militia," &c., 1870, directing that "Communications by Telegraph are only to be made in cases of emergency, or when the information sought, or ordered to be conveyed cannot be received in time by Post," and to Circular No. 20 from the Department of Militia and Defence drawing attention to it—notwithstanding which, resort appears to have been had to the Telegraph line in a large number of cases seeking or conveying information which was not rendered necessary by any emergency, or which could have been received in time by the ordinary postal conveyance. Notice is, therefore, hereby given to all Militia Officers, that no accounts for such service will in future be paid, except in cases where a strict adherence to the regulation, above referred to, has been observed.

ACTIVE MILITIA.

*Enrolment and Discharge.*

With reference to the expiration of periods for which militiamen have volunteered to serve in corps of Active Militia, it is the duty of Captains to endeavour to keep their corps full by the enrolment from time to time of other men, to fill the places of those whose period of service has expired and do not desire to re-enrol for a further period, or who have been discharged. Such men as complete their full period of three years continuous service in any corps, are entitled to discharge in time of peace without giving six months notice.

WHEREAS in and by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in the thirty-first

year of Our Reign and intituled "An Act providing for the organization of the Department of the Secretary of State of Canada and for the management of Indian and Ordnance Lands" it is amongst other things, in effect, enacted that the provisions in the eighteenth and the four next following sections, that is to say, the nineteenth, twentieth, twenty-first and twenty-second sections of the said Act, contained, shall extend to such Indian Lands only as the Governor, from time to time, by Proclamation, published in the "Canada Gazette" declares and makes subject to the same, and so long, only as such Proclamation remains in force.

AND WHEREAS it has been deemed expedient by Our Governor of Canada that the said provisions should be extended to the several tracts of land hereinafter mentioned and called, known and used as Indian Reserves respectively, being Lands or Roads or allowances for roads running through any lands belonging to or occupied by any tribe, band or body of Indians, situate and being within the Province of Nova Scotia and hereinafter particularly described.

NOW THEREFORE KNOW YE THAT WE, taking the same into our Royal consideration and approving of the extension of the provisions of the said sections of the said act to the said several Indian Lands hereinafter mentioned and every part thereof, DO HEREBY declare and make subject to the provisions of the eighteenth nineteenth, twentieth twenty first and twenty second sections of the act of the Parliament of Canada, made and passed in the 31st year of Our Reign and intituled "An Act providing for the organisation of the Department of the Secretary of State of Canada, and for the management of Indian and Ordnance Lands."

All and singular the following Indian Lands situate in the Province of Nova Scotia being lands or roads, or allowances for roads, running through any lands

### NOTICE.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE,

Ottawa, 2nd January, 1871

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Québec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

#### BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

### CONVERSION OF DEBENTURES INTO STOCK.

All 5 per cent. currency Debentures may be converted into 5 per cent. stock at par, whatever may be the period for which the Debentures have to run.

All 6 per cent. currency Debentures not maturing before January 1878, when the 6 per cent. stock is redeemable, may be converted into 6 per cent. stock at par.

The six per cent. currency Debentures issued in 1868 on which there is an endorsement that they are convertible into stock may be so converted at par.

Six per cent. currency Debentures maturing before 1878 may be converted into stock upon application to the Treasury Board, and at such rates as the Board may direct in each case.

In case it should be desired to convert any 5 per cent. or 6 per cent. Debentures payable in London into stock, application must be made to the Treasury Board in each case.

No 1.

### ACTIVE MILITIA.

#### *Precedence of Inspectors of Artillery.*

1. Adverting to No. 1 of General Orders (19) 1st September, 1871, which is hereby cancelled, it is to be understood that to enable Officers of the Royal Artillery, who are lent by the Imperial to the Dominion Government as Artillery Inspectors and Instructors, to carry out properly the inspection and superintend the training of Artillery and Engineer Corps, such directions and orders as these officers may find it necessary to give from time to time on matters affecting Engineer and Artillery Drill, care of Stores, "Matériel," &c. in possession of corps, are to be considered as emanating from the Adjutant General and obeyed accordingly. The officers above alluded to take rank, precedence and command in the Militia according to their dates of commissions.

#### *Command, "A" and "B" Batteries.*

2. No. 18 of General Orders (24) 20th October, 1871, is hereby cancelled. The Schools of Gunnery at Kingston and Quebec (A and B Batteries) which form part of the Active Militia, will be under the command of the officers commanding the respective Military Districts in which those Batteries are stationed, in all matters relating to military command, discipline, supply, clothing, &c., and in accordance with Paragraphs 117 and 382 of the Regulations and Orders for the Active Militia, 1870. The Brigade Major being the proper channel of communication, and medium for conveying orders between officers commanding Districts, and commanders of corps. Adherence to this rule is to be as strictly observed by the commandants of A and B Batteries, as by those of other corps.

#### *Notification of vacancies.*

3. The Commandants of A and B Batteries will notify through the respective Brigade Majors and Commanding Officers of Districts, for the information of the Adjutant General, whenever there are vacancies in the respective Batteries for the admission of officers, non-commissioned officers and gunners of Artillery Corps, for purposes of duty and instruction, and they will transmit through the same channel such periodical States and Returns as may from time to time be required.

#### *Inspections.*

4. The Commandants of A and B Batteries will however in their capacity as Inspectors of Artillery when required to make periodical inspections of Artillery and Engineer corps continue to report on the result of such inspections direct to the Adjutant General, and whenever it is desirable to make such inspection due notification will be transmitted by the Adjutant General to the Inspectors of Artillery detailing the corps, time, and place of inspection.

#### *Corps on duty.*

5. It is notified for general information that the officers, non-commissioned officers and men belonging or attached to the Schools of Gunnery at Kingston and Quebec (A and B Batteries) as well as those belonging to the Provisional Battalion of Riflemen now on duty in the Province of Manitoba, are under the same general system relative to command, discipline, supply and supervision applicable to all corps of the Active Militia when placed on duty, as defined in the Militia Act and Orders and Regulations of the Active Militia—and all officers, non-commissioned officers and men belonging to the above named corps are reminded that so long as they are retained on Military duty they are for purposes of discipline under the Queen's Regulations and Articles of War—(This paragraph No. 5 to be read on three successive full parades of A and B Batteries of Artillery and the Provisional Battalion of Riflemen now on duty in the Province of Manitoba.)

*National anthem.*

6. Paragraph 12 of the Regulations and Orders for the Active Militia, &c., 1870, is hereby amended by substituting for the words "first part of a slow march" on fifth line, the words "the first part of the National anthem (8 bars)."

year of Our Reign and intituled "An Act providing for the organization of the Department of the Secretary of State of Canada and for the management of Indian and Ordnance Lands" it is amongst other things, in effect, enacted that the provisions in the eighteenth and the four next following sections, that is to say, the nineteenth, twentieth, twenty-first and twenty second sections of the said Act, contained, shall extend to such Indian Lands only as the Governor, from time to time, by Proclamation, published in the "Canada Gazette" declares and makes subject to the same, and so long, only as such Proclamation remains in force.

AND WHEREAS it has been deemed expedient by Our Governor of Canada that the said provisions should be extended to the several tracts of land hereinafter mentioned and called, known and used as Indian Reserves respectively, being Lands or Roads or allowances for roads running through any lands belonging to or occupied by any tribe, band or body of Indians, situate and being within the Province of Nova Scotia and hereinafter particularly described.

No. 5. The Chapel Island Reserve, and the Reserve on the mainland adjacent thereto, and the Reserves on Ambroise and Maurice Islands.

No. 6. The Bear River Reserve in the Counties of Digby and Annapolis.

No. 7. The Reserve at Cegumcega Lake, in the said County of Annapolis.

No. 8. The Reserve on the New Liverpool Road, in the said County of Annapolis.

# PARLIAMENTARY NOTICES.

## NOTICE.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE,

Ottawa, 2nd January, 1871

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of ratts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

### BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

### CONVERSION OF DEBENTURES INTO STOCK.

All 5 per cent. currency Debentures may be converted into 5 per cent. stock at par, whatever may be the period for which the Debentures have to run.

All 6 per cent. currency Debentures not maturing before January 1878, when the 6 per cent. stock is redeemable, may be converted into 6 per cent. stock at par.

The six per cent. currency Debentures issued in 1868 on which there is an endorsement that they are convertible into stock may be so converted at par.

Six per cent. currency Debentures maturing before 1878 may be converted into stock upon application to the Treasury Board, and at such rates as the Board may direct in each case.

In case it should be desired to convert any 5 per cent. or 6 per cent. Debentures payable in London into stock, application must be made to the Treasury Board in each case.

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

### BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE,

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

## BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

## CONVERSION OF DEBENTURES INTO STOCK.

All 5 per cent. currency Debentures may be converted into 5 per cent. stock at par, whatever may be the period for which the Debentures have to run.

All 6 per cent. currency Debentures not maturing before January 1878, when the 6 per cent. stock is redeemable, may be converted into 6 per cent. stock at par.

The six per cent. currency Debentures issued in 1868 on which there is an endorsement that they are convertible into stock may be so converted at par.

Six per cent. currency Debentures maturing before 1878 may be converted into stock upon application to the Treasury Board, and at such rates as the Board may direct in each case.

In case it should be desired to convert any 5 per cent. or 6 per cent. Debentures payable in London into stock, application must be made to the Treasury Board in each case.

In the three first cases above mentioned the Debentures may be sent in to the Receiver General or to any Assistant Receiver General upon which a certificate of stock will be issued. If the case should be one which has to be submitted to the Treasury Board, the application should be sent to the Secretary of the Board with full particulars as to the nature of the Debentures.

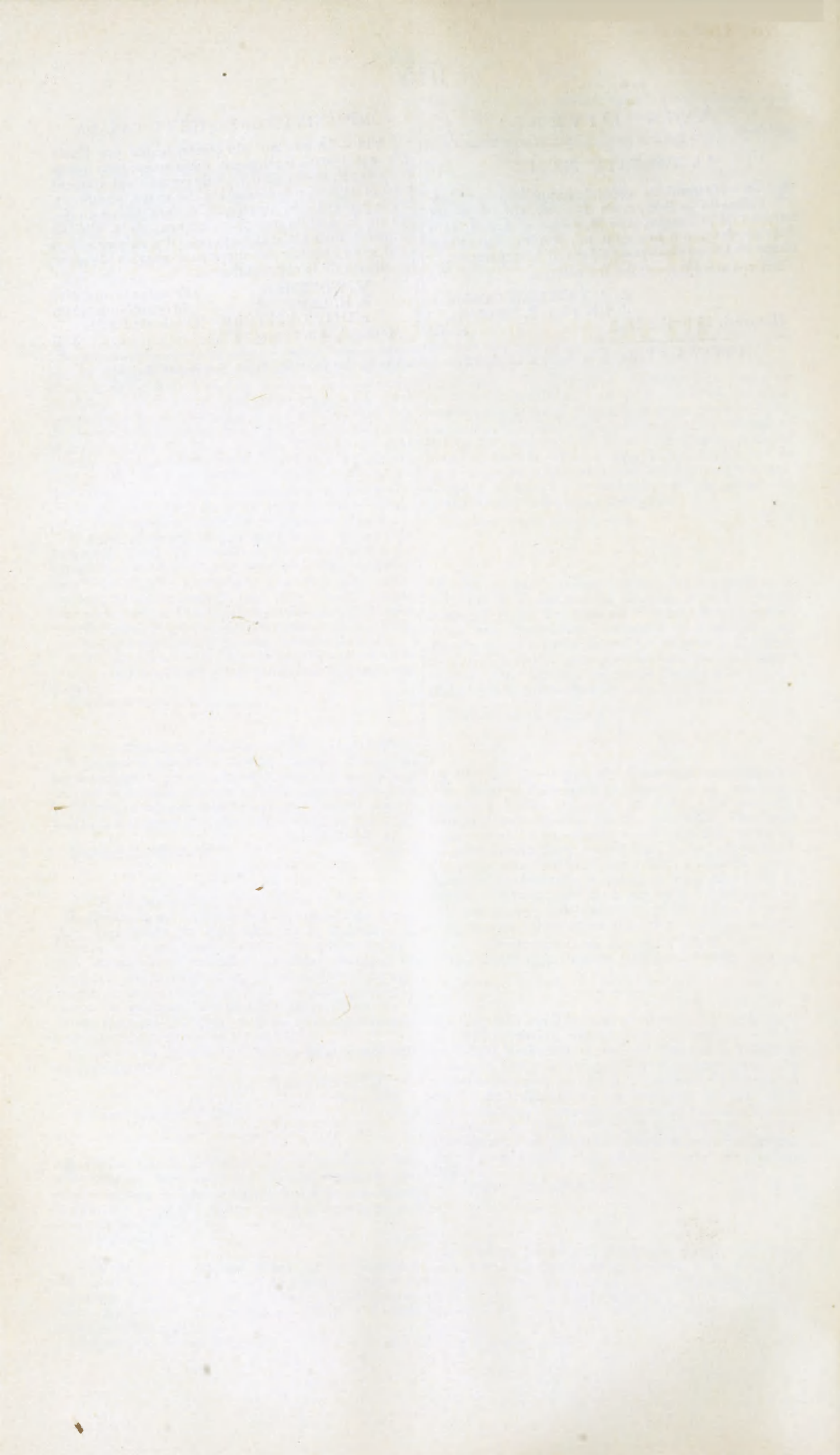

GENERAL ORDER (8).

### ACTIVE MILITIA.

1. Adverting to General Orders (6), 8th March, 1872, it is to be understood that the cancelling of No. 1 of General Orders (19), 1st September, 1871, does not alter the rank or status of the Officers concerned, in their capacities as Inspectors of Artillery.

2. In reading paragraph 2, of No. 1 of General Orders 8th March, 1872, the words "Schools of Gunnery at Kingston and Quebec (A and B Batteries)" to be omitted, substituting therefor "A and B Batteries at Kingston and Quebec."

3. With reference to paragraph 3 of the same General Order, for the words "A and B Batteries," on first line, to the word "Batteries," inclusive, on the fifth line, *read* "Schools of Gunnery, will notify Commanding Officers of Military Districts direct, whenever there are vacancies in the respective Schools of Gunnery."

The States and Returns alluded to in the same paragraph will be confined to matters of supply, except when otherwise specially ordered.

*Correspondence, Artillery and Engineers (Province of Quebec.)*

4. Correspondence on all Regimental matters relating to Field and Garrison Batteries of Artillery and Companies of Engineers, in the Province of Quebec, (matters affecting clothing or discipline excepted) will in future be forwarded by Officers commanding Military Districts, in that Province, to the Commandant of the School of Gunnery at Quebec, in his capacity as Inspector of Artillery. ### NOTICE.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE,

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

### BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

CONVERSION OF DEBENTURES INTO STOCK.

All 5 per cent. currency Debentures may be converted into 5 per cent. stock at par, whatever may be the period for which the Debentures have to run.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE,

*Ottawa, 2nd January, 1871*

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

CHAMBER OF THE SENATE.

Ottawa, Thursday 11th April, 1872.

This day, at THREE o'clock P. M., HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL proceeded in state to the Chamber of the Senate, in the Parliament Buildings, and took His Seat upon the Throne. The Members of the Senate being assembled, His Excellency was pleased to command the attendance of the House of Commons, and that House being present, His EXCELLENCY was pleased to open the FIFTH SESSION of the FIRST PARLIAMENT of the DOMINION OF CANADA, with the following Speech from the Throne :

*Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate :*

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons :*

The auspicious recovery which the mercy of Providence vouchsafed from the well nigh mortal illness of the Prince of Wales, called forth a universal expression of joy and thankfulness throughout the Empire. All classes of the people testified their deep sense of relief from the anxieties of a long and painful suspense, by joining their beloved Queen in a public Thanksgiving, which proved in vastness of attendance and unanimity of feeling the grandest and most impressive ceremony ever witnessed in the British Capital. I invite you to follow the good example on the fifteenth day of this month. It was thought advisable to defer the solemnity until after the meeting of Parliament, and I feel assured that the Members of the two Houses, as well as all Her Majesty's faithful subjects throughout the Dominion will be anxious to unite in celebrating the occasion with all becoming observance and loyal alacrity.

Your Meeting has itself been postponed to a later season than usual, upon considerations of Imperial as well as Colonial interest, and at the instance of Her Majesty's Government.

The young Province of Manitoba was, last September, threatened with an invasion of lawless persons from the United States. Prompt measures for resistance were adopted by the local authorities and attended with the best results. In order to re-assure the people of the Province, and to prevent a recurrence of the outrage, I ordered a force of two hundred Militiamen to be sent to Fort Garry. Notwithstanding the inclement season of the year the troops surmounted the difficulties of the march with energy and success, thus proving not only their own discipline and endurance, but also the value of the route through our own Territory. The accounts of the expenditure occasioned by this expedition will be laid before you, and you will be requested to pass a Bill to indemnify the Government.

A copy of the Treaty made at Washington last year between Her Majesty the Queen and the United States of America, in which the Dominion has so great an interest, will be laid before you. So much of the papers and of the completed correspondence as can be made public without injury to the interests of the Empire or of Canada, will also be at once submitted for your information, and your attention will be invited to this important subject.

A conference was held at Ottawa in September last, on the subject of Immigration, at which the Government of the Dominion, as well as those of every Province, were represented. A scheme for joint and several action was provisionally arranged, to which I invite your attention. I do not doubt that you will be inclined to make ample provisions for the encouragement of Immigration with the maintenance and extension of which the development of the vast natural resources of Canada is so vitally interwoven.

Since last Session the union of British Columbia with Canada has been happily consummated, and her representatives now take part in your deliberations.

In order to open up and settle the fertile Territories of the North West, and to link British Columbia therewith, it will be necessary for you to make provision for the construction of a Railway to the Pacific Ocean, in conformity with the terms of Her Majesty's Order in Council, uniting British Columbia with the Dominion. An appropriation was made in the last Session for the preliminary Survey of the route for this Railway. The work has been diligently prosecuted, and a report of the progress achieved will be laid before you.

You will, I trust, concur with me in thinking that the long contemplated improvement and extension of our system of Canals ought to be vigorously prosecuted. The rapid increase in the trade of Canada, and the importance of competing for, and accommodating the commerce of the Great West, render it necessary that the means of transport by water should be cheapened and facilitated. I have to request your serious consideration of this subject, and in connection with it, the expediency of providing a direct water communication between the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the Bay of Fundy.

The decennial Census having been taken last year, the duty of re-adjusting the representation in Parliament, of the four Provinces originally constituting the Dominion, devolves upon you now, according to the terms of The Union Act. A measure for the purpose will accordingly be submitted for your consideration.

Among other measures, Bills will be presented to you relating to the Judges of Superior Courts—to the regulation and management of the Public Lands and Mines of the Dominion in Manitoba and the North West Territories, and for the amendment of the laws relating to the Public Health.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons:*

The accounts of the past year will at once be laid before you, and likewise a statement of the Receipts and Expenditure of the current year, up to the close of the last month.

It is gratifying to me to be able to announce to you that the revenue for the past, as well as that for the current year, will be considerably in excess of what was estimated, and that consequently there is no reason to apprehend embarrassment from the immediate commencement of the contemplated public improvements.

The Estimates for the ensuing year will be submitted to you, and I trust that you will be of opinion that the supplies which my Government will ask you

to vote for the service of Her Majesty, can be granted without inconvenience to Her Canadian subjects.

*Hon. Gentlemen of the Senate:*

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons:*

I have all the more satisfaction in recurring to your counsel and assistance at this period, inasmuch as I may congratulate you on the general prosperity of the country, and the fortunate issue of the steps taken to unite and consolidate the vast territories which now form the Dominion.

I feel assured that you will continue to devote the same assiduity as in the past to the augmented labours, which the exigencies of more numerous constituencies and a wider sphere of operations demand at your hands, and I earnestly pray that your efforts in the path of duty may be so happily guided as to maintain peace and justice in all the borders of the land, and ensure the happiness and lasting welfare of all classes of its inhabitants.

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend

to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

## BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

### CHAMBRE DU SÉNAT.

Ottawa, Jeudi le 11 Avril 1872.

Aujourd'hui, à Trois heures P. M., SON EXCELLENCE LE GOUVERNEUR GÉNÉRAL s'est rendue, avec le cérémonial ordinaire, à la Chambre du Sénat, dans l'édifice du parlement, et a pris son siège sur le Trône. Les Membres du Sénat étant assemblés, il a plu à Son Excellence d'y faire requérir la présence de la Chambre des Communes, et cette Chambre s'y étant rendue, Son Excellence a ouvert la CINQUIÈME SESSION du PREMIER PARLEMENT de la PUISSANCE DU CANADA, par le Discours suivant du Trône :

*Honorables Messieurs du Sénat,*

*Messieurs de la Chambre des Communes,*

L'heureuse guérison qu'une Providence miséricordieuse a accordée de la maladie de bien près mortelle du Prince de Galles a provoqué une expression universelle de joie et de reconnaissance dans toutes les parties de l'Empire. Toutes les classes du peuple ont manifesté leur sentiment profond de soulagement de leur anxiété pendant une longue et pénible incer-

titude, en se réunissant à leur Reine bien-aimée dans des actions de grâce publiques, qui ont produit par le nombreux concours des populations et l'unanimité de sentiment la cérémonie la plus grandiose et la plus impressive dont on ait jamais été témoin dans la capitale de l'Empire. Je vous invite à suivre ce bon exemple la quinzième jour du présent mois.

Il a été jugé à propos de remettre la cérémonie jusqu'après la réunion du Parlement, et j'ai l'assurance que les membres des deux Chambres, aussi bien que tous les fidèles sujets de Sa Majesté dans toute l'étendue de la Puissance, s'empresseront de s'unir pour célébrer l'occasion d'une manière convenable et avec une loyale ardeur.

Notre réunion a elle-même été retardée plus que d'ordinaire par des considérations d'intérêt impérial, aussi bien que d'intérêt colonial, et à l'instance du Gouvernement de Sa Majesté.

La jeune Province de Manitoba fut, en Septembre dernier, menacée d'invasion par des gens sans foi ni loi des Etats-Unis. Les autorités locales adoptèrent de promptes mesures de résistance qui furent suivies des meilleurs résultats.

Pour rassurer le peuple de la Province, et prévenir le retour d'un semblable outrage, j'ordonnai l'envoi au Fort Garry de deux cents miliciens.

Malgré l'inclémence de la saison, les troupes surmontèrent les difficultés de la marche avec énergie et succès, donnant par là la preuve non-seulement de leur propre discipline et constance, mais de plus l'excellence de la route à travers notre propre territoire.

Les comptes de la dépense qu'a entraînée cette expédition seront mis devant vous, et vous serez priés de passer un Bill pour indemniser le Gouvernement.

Une copie du traité fait à Washington l'année dernière entre Sa Majesté la Reine et les Etats-Unis d'Amérique, dans lequel la Puissance a un si grand intérêt, sera mise devant vous.

Tous les papiers et correspondance close, qui peuvent être rendus publics, sans préjudice aux intérêts de l'Empire ou du Canada, vous seront aussi soumis de suite pour votre information, et vous serez appelés à prendre en considération cet important sujet.

Il fut tenu à Ottawa en Septembre dernier une Conférence sur le sujet de l'Immigration, à laquelle le Gouvernement de la Puissance, ainsi que ceux de chaque Province étaient représentés. On en vint provisoirement à un projet pour une action conjointe et séparée, auquel j'appelle votre attention. Je ne doute pas de votre disposition à pourvoir amplement à l'encouragement de l'Immigration, au maintien et à l'extension de laquelle le développement des vastes ressources naturelles du Canada, est si vitalemment lié.

Depuis la dernière Session s'est heureusement consommée l'Union de la Colombie Britannique avec le Canada, et ses représentants prennent maintenant part à vos délibérations.

Pour ouvrir et établir les fertiles Territoires du Nord-Ouest, et y relier la Colombie Britannique, il sera nécessaire que vous pourvoyiez à la construction d'un chemin de fer jusqu'à l'Océan Pacifique, conformément aux termes de l'ordre de Sa Majesté en Conseil unissant la Colombie Britannique à la Puissance. Il fut fait à la dernière Session une appropriation pour l'exploration et arpentage préliminaire de la route pour le chemin de fer. L'ouvrage a été poursuivi avec diligence, et il sera mis devant vous un rapport des progrès faits jusqu'à ce jour.

Je me flatte que vous partagerai avec moi la pensée que l'amélioration et l'extension, depuis si longtemps projetées, de notre système de canaux devraient être poursuivie avec vigueur.

L'accroissement rapide du commerce du Canada, et l'importance de concourir pour le commerce du Grand-Ouest et de le faciliter, exigent que les moyens de transport par eau soient rendus moins coûteux et plus faciles.

J'ai à vous prier de donner votre sérieuse attention à ce sujet, ainsi qu'à la convenance de pourvoir à l'établissement d'une communication directe par eau entre le Golfe St. Laurent et la Baie de Fundy.

Le recensement décennal ayant été pris l'année dernière, il devient de votre devoir maintenant de ré-ajuster la représentation en Parlement des quatre Provinces composant en premier lieu la Puissance, conformément aux termes de l'Acte d'Union. Il sera en conséquence soumis à votre considération une mesure à cet effet.

Entre autres mesures il vous sera présenté des Bills relatifs aux Juges des Cours Supérieures, — à la réglementation et à la régie des terres publiques et des mines de la Puissance dans Manitoba et les Territoires du Nord-Ouest — et pour l'amendement des lois relatives à la santé publique.

*Messieurs de la Chambre des Communes*

Les comptes de l'année dernière seront de suite mis devant vous, ainsi qu'un état des recettes et dépenses de l'année courante, jusqu'à la fin du mois dernier.

Il m'est agréable de pouvoir vous annoncer que le revenu de l'année dernière, de même que celui de l'année courante, excéderont de beaucoup l'estimation qui en a été faite, et que conséquemment il n'y a aucun lieu de craindre des embarras du commencement immédiat des améliorations publiques projetées.

Le Budget pour l'année qui suit vous sera soumis, et je me flatte que vous serez d'avis que les Subsidés, que mon Gouvernement vous demandera de voter pour le service de Sa Majesté, pourront être accorder sans inconvénient pour Ses Sujets Canadiens.

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval bet-

ween the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

CONVERSION OF DEBENTURES INTO STOCK.

All 5 per cent. currency Debentures may be converted into 5 per cent. stock at par, whatever may be the period for which the Debentures have to run.

All 6 per cent. currency Debentures not maturing before January 1878, when the 6 per cent. stock is redeemable, may be converted into 6 per cent. stock at par.

The six per cent. currency Debentures issued in 1868 on which there is an endorsement that they are convertible into stock may be so converted at par.

Six per cent currency Debentures maturing before 1878 may be converted into stock upon application to the Treasury Board, and at such rates as the Board may direct in each case.

In case it should be desired to convert any 5 per cent. or 6 per cent Debentures payable in London into stock, application must be made to the Treasury Board in each case

In the three first cases above mentioned the Debentures may be sent in to the Receiver General or to any Assistant Receiver General upon which a certificate of stock will be issued. If the case should be one which has to be submitted to the Treasury Board, the application should be sent to the Secretary of the Board with full particulars as to the nature of the Debentures.

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also; at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval bet

ween the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

## BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

### CHAMBRE DU SÉNAT.

Ottawa, Jeudi le 11 Avril 1872.

Aujourd'hui, à Trois heures P. M., SON EXCELLENCE LE GOUVERNEUR GÉNÉRAL s'est rendue, avec le cérémonial ordinaire, à la Chambre du Sénat, dans l'édifice du parlement, et a pris son siège sur le Trône. Les Membres du Sénat étant assemblés, il a plu à Son Excellence d'y faire requérir la présence de la Chambre des Communes, et cette Chambre s'y étant rendue, Son Excellence a ouvert la CINQUIÈME SESSION du PREMIER PARLEMENT de la PUISSANCE DU CANADA, par le Discours suivant du Trône :

*Honorables Messieurs du Sénat,*

*Messieurs de la Chambre des Communes,*

L'heureuse guérison qu'une Providence miséricordieuse a accordée de la maladie de bien près mortelle du Prince de Galles a provoqué une expression universelle de joie et de reconnaissance dans toutes les parties de l'Empire. Toutes les classes du peuple ont manifesté leur sentiment profond de soulagement de leur anxiété pendant une longue et pénible incer-

titude, en se réunissant à leur Reine bien-aimée dans des actions de grâce publiques, qui ont produit par le nombreux concours des populations et l'unanimité de sentiment la cérémonie la plus grandiose et la plus impressive dont on ait jamais été témoin dans la capitale de l'Empire. Je vous invite à suivre ce bon exemple la quinzième jour du présent mois.

Il a été jugé à propos de remettre la cérémonie jusqu'après la réunion du Parlement, et j'ai l'assurance que les membres des deux Chambres, aussi bien que tous les fidèles sujets de Sa Majesté dans toute l'étendue de la Puissance, s'empresseront de s'unir pour célébrer l'occasion d'une manière convenable et avec une loyale ardeur.

Notre réunion a elle-même été retardée plus que d'ordinaire par des considérations d'intérêt impérial, aussi bien que d'intérêt colonial, et à l'instance du Gouvernement de Sa Majesté.

La jeune Province de Manitoba fut, en Septembre dernier, menacée d'invasion par des gens sans foi ni loi des Etats-Unis. Les autorités locales adoptèrent de promptes mesures de résistance qui furent suivies des meilleurs résultats.

Pour rassurer le peuple de la Province, et prévenir le retour d'un semblable outrage, j'ordonnai l'envoi au Fort Garry de deux cents miliciens.

Malgré l'inclémence de la saison, les troupes surmontèrent les difficultés de la marche avec énergie et succès, donnant par là la preuve non-seulement de leur propre discipline et constance, mais de plus l'excellence de la route à travers notre propre territoire.

Les comptes de la dépense qu'a entraînée cette expédition seront mis devant vous, et vous serez priés de passer un Bill pour indemniser le Gouvernement.

Une copie du traité fait à Washington l'année dernière entre Sa Majesté la Reine et les Etats-Unis d'Amérique, dans lequel la Puissance a un si grand intérêt, sera mise devant vous.

Tous les papiers et correspondance close, qui peuvent être rendus publics, sans préjudice aux intérêts de l'Empire ou du Canada, vous seront aussi soumis de suite pour votre information, et vous serez appelés à prendre en considération cet important sujet.

Il fut tenu à Ottawa en Septembre dernier une Conférence sur le sujet de l'Immigration, à laquelle le Gouvernement de la Puissance, ainsi que ceux de chaque Province étaient représentés. On en vint provisoirement à un projet pour une action conjointe et séparée, auquel j'appelle votre attention. Je ne doute pas de votre disposition à pourvoir amplement à l'encouragement de l'Immigration, au maintien et à l'extension de laquelle le développement des vastes ressources naturelles du Canada, est si vitalemment lié.

Depuis la dernière Session s'est heureusement consommée l'Union de la Colombie Britannique avec le Canada, et ses représentants prennent maintenant part à vos délibérations.

Pour ouvrir et établir les fertiles Territoires du Nord-Ouest, et y relier la Colombie Britannique, il sera nécessaire que vous pourvoyiez à la construction d'un chemin de fer jusqu'à l'Océan Pacifique, conformément aux termes de l'ordre de Sa Majesté en Conseil unissant la Colombie Britannique à la Puissance. Il fut fait à la dernière Session une appropriation pour l'exploration et arpentage préliminaire de la route pour le chemin de fer. L'ouvrage a été poursuivi avec diligence, et il sera mis devant vous un rapport des progrès faits jusqu'à ce jour.

Je me flatte que vous partagerai avec moi la pensée que l'amélioration et l'extension, depuis si longtemps projetées, de notre système de canaux devraient être poursuivie avec vigueur.

L'accroissement rapide du commerce du Canada, et l'importance de concourir pour le commerce du Grand-Ouest et de le faciliter, exigent que les moyens de transport par eau soient rendus moins coûteux et plus faciles.

J'ai à vous prier de donner votre sérieuse attention à ce sujet, ainsi qu'à la convenance de pourvoir à l'établissement d'une communication directe par eau entre le Golfe St. Laurent et la Baie de Fundy.

Le recensement décennal ayant été pris l'année dernière, il devient de votre devoir maintenant de ré-ajuster la représentation en Parlement des quatre Provinces composant en premier lieu la Puissance, conformément aux termes de l'Acte d'Union. Il sera en conséquence soumis à votre considération une mesure à cet effet.

Entre autres mesures il vous sera présenté des Bills relatifs aux Juges des Cours Supérieures, — à la réglementation et à la régie des terres publiques et des mines de la Puissance dans Manitoba et les Territoires du Nord-Ouest — et pour l'amendement des lois relatives à la santé publique.

*Messieurs de la Chambre des Communes*

Les comptes de l'année dernière seront de suite mis devant vous, ainsi qu'un état des recettes et dépenses de l'année courante, jusqu'à la fin du mois dernier.

Il m'est agréable de pouvoir vous annoncer que le revenu de l'année dernière, de même que celui de l'année courante, excéderont de beaucoup l'estimation qui en a été faite, et que conséquemment il n'y a aucun lieu de craindre des embarras du commencement immédiat des améliorations publiques projetées.

Le Budget pour l'année qui suit vous sera soumis, et je me flatte que vous serez d'avis que les Subsidies, que mon Gouvernement vous demandera de voter pour le service de Sa Majesté, pourront être accorder sans inconvénient pour Ses Sujets Canadiens.

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

## BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval bet-

ween the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

### BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

ACTIVE MILITIA.

*Regulations.—Artillery and Engineer Corps.*

The following Regulations regarding Corps of Artillery and Engineers in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec will be adhered to for the future.

(1.) No Officer will be promoted to the rank of Captain of a Battery, unless he has obtained a First Class Gunnery Certificate, or unless he has passed a satisfactory examination before the Inspector of Artillery and Engineers of the Province. Unless holding certificates of qualification in their respective arms all first appointments of officers in Artillery and Engineer Corps will be Provisional.

(2) No Battery of Artillery or Company of Engineers will be accepted and published in General Orders till inspected and approved by the Inspector of Artillery and Engineers of the Province.

(3.) The minimum standard of height for all non-commissioned officers and men of Artillery and Engineer Corps will be 5 feet 6 inches, and chest measurement 34 inches (excepting Trumpeters and Field Battery Drivers.)

(4.) With the view of securing officers of considerable scientific knowledge for Artillery and Engineer Corps, District Staff Officers will be good enough to endeavour to obtain the services of Civil Engineers, Surveyors, Architects, or other similarly educated gentlemen for Commissions, particularly in Engineer Corps. The Inspectors of Artillery and Engineers, will, on being notified by District Deputy Adjutants General, examine candidates for commissions or appointments in all Engineer Corps, and as far as possible those for Artillery Corps.

(5.) The Dominion Inspector of Artillery and Engineers will endeavour to carry out the spirit of these Regulations as far as practicable in the case of Artillery and Engineer Corps in the other Provinces of the Dominion, and District Deputy Adjutants General in those Provinces will be good enough to render him all the assistance in their power in so doing

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval bet-

### BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements Juring six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

REGULATIONS.

1st.—Limit.

The limits of the Ferry shall extend to a distance of three miles above and below the wharf at the village of Campbellton, in New Brunswick, and to a similar distance above and below the usual Ferry landing at Cross Point, in the Province of Quebec.

2nd.—Landing Stages.

Suitable landing stages or wharves serviceable at all states of the water in the River must be constructed on both sides subject to the approval of the Department of Inland Revenue.

3rd.—Ferry Boat.

During the first year after the execution of the lease, the lessee shall provide and maintain a vessel propelled either by steam or by oars, suitable for the conveyance of passengers, horses, cattle and all ordinary vehicles with safety and reasonable dispatch and such vessel shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Inland Revenue. After the lapse of one year the lessee shall, if required so to do by the Minister of Inland Revenue, place on the Ferry and maintain during the period of the lease a suitable vessel propelled by steam. Such vessel shall be of sufficient size for the safe conveyance of passengers, horses, cattle, vehicles and other effects, and shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Inland Revenue, and the lessee must obtain therefore and produce when required a certificate of fitness, safety and sufficiency from the Dominion Board of Steam Boat Inspectors.

4th.—Number of Trips.

During the season of navigation the Ferry Boat shall commence running daily—Sundays excepted—at six o'clock a. m. and shall continue to cross from each side every hour thereafter until eight o'clock p. m.

5th.—Tariff of Charges.

The maximum charges for Ferrying shall be as follows:—

6th.

The Ferry boat shall be placed on the route fully completed and equipped and the Landing Stages shall be fully constructed on or before 1872.

7th.

The lease will be granted for a period of five years from the day of 1872.

8th.

The Lessee will be required to give two sureties satisfactory to the Department of Inland Revenue,

who shall be held jointly and severally with the principal in the sum of \$ for the full compliance of the Lessee with the term of the Lease.

Ninth.

The right will be reserved to the Department of Inland Revenue of rejecting the Ferry Boat or Landing Stages or either of them should any of them be deemed unsuitable for the service, or unsafe to the public, or inadequate to meet the public wants. The right is also reserved to the Governor in Council to modify the maximum tariff should it be deemed expedient in the public interest to do so, and the Governor in Council may declare the lease forfeited and void whenever it shall be satisfactorily shewn that the Lessee fails to comply with the conditions thereof.

Tenth.

The Lessee of the Ferry shall at all times during the continuance of the lease carry over and across the Ferry without fee, toll or reward, all mail matter, militiamen, soldiers or sailors when provided with proper passports or under the charge of their proper officer or officers, and it shall be lawful for the said Lessee to commute the rate of passenger fees.

Eleventh.

A notice of the rates of Fares and Tolls to be charged for Ferrage shall be put in a conspicuous place near the Ferry landing on both sides and also on board the Steam Ferry Boat employed.

The proposals must state the amount which the party tendering is willing to pay per annum for the privilege referred to, which amount will be payable in advance, the terms of the lease being for five years from the 1st July, 1872.

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

#### BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

### CONVERSION OF DEBENTURES INTO STOCK.

All 5 per cent. currency Debentures may be converted into 5 per cent. stock at par, whatever may be the period for which the Debentures have to run.

REGULATIONS FOR THE ANNUAL DRILL  
OF 1872-73.

## DOMINION OF CANADA.

The Annual Drill for the Military year 1872-73, of the Active Militia, will be carried out in the following manner:—

1. Camps of Exercise will be formed in every Military District at which the Cavalry, Field Artillery and Infantry Corps will be concentrated in tactical Brigades and Divisions of the three arms for sixteen days Drill and manœuvres. Officers, non-commissioned officers and men attending such Camps will be paid and supplied during the period as if called out for actual service.

2. The Brigades and Divisions will be under the personal command of the Deputy Adjutants General commanding the Militia in Military Districts who, accompanied by the permanent District Staff Officers, will encamp with the Troops during the whole period the Camps are in operation in order to superintend the Drill and Target practice of Corps, carry out the supply and transport arrangements, as well as to take Military command and regulate all duties in Camp.

3. In the absence of the Deputy Adjutant General of the District the officer appointed to act for him will take command.

The 50 rounds to be distributed as far as practica-  
 ble as follows, and from such guns as may be consi-

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18. The Senior Cavalry Officer present in Brigade  
 and Division Camps of Exercise will command the  
 Cavalry Regimentally.

19. The Senior Artillery Officer present in Brigade  
 and Division Camps of Exercise will command the  
 Field Artillery Regimentally.

20. All Divisional Staff Officers required to act tem-  
 porarily during the period District Camps of Exercise  
 are in operation will be nominated by Deputy Adju-  
 tants General commanding in Military Districts.

21. In all instances where a Division is assembled,  
 Deputy Adjutant's General will nominate the Senior  
 Regimental Medical Officer of the District to act as  
 Principal Medical Officer of the Division, and should  
 the services of such Officer not be available, the next  
 in order of Seniority in the District available will be  
 appointed to perform the duty.

The Medical Officer acting as Principal Medical  
 Officer of a Division will have general supervision  
 over the medical and sanitary arrangements of all  
 Corps in Camp in addition to the medical charge of  
 his own Corps; should there however be an Assistant  
 Surgeon present with his own Corps, he will be re-  
 lieved from Regimental duty during the period the  
 Division is assembled

In Brigade and Battalion Camps of Exercise the  
 medical arrangements will be carried out Regi-  
 mentally:—

22. Field Officers should be selected to act on the  
 Staff of Divisions as Brigadiers, Asst. Adj'ts. General,  
 and Asst. Qr. Masters General; Captains as Brigade  
 Majors; active and intelligent Subalterns as Orderly  
 Officers. Captains having higher rank by Brevet to  
 be eligible for any of these temporary Staff appoint-  
 ments in connection with Camps of Exercise.

PAY AND ALLOWANCES.

23. All officers, non-commissioned Officers and  
 men, belonging to Corps of the Active Militia, ordered  
 to attend at Camps of Exercise for sixteen days conti-  
 nuous drill will receive the daily net rate of the pay  
 of their rank, and rations free of cost will be issued  
 to them. Regimental Officers who may be required

to act temporarily in a higher Regimental position than their actual rank will only receive the pay of their actual rank.

The following are the established net rates of pay per diem, viz :

#### ARTILLERY.

Pay of Non-commissioned Officers and men to be the same as allowed for "A" and "B" Batteries (Schools of Gunnery, King-ton and Quebec), viz :

24. The authorized number only of Officers and Non-commissioned Officers, according to the establishment of the respective Companies, Troops, Battalions and Corps will be allowed.

Except in special cases where a greater number of Officers and men have been authorized as the maximum therefor, the following will be the strength of the several Corps of Active Militia.

Each Troop of Cavalry, Garrison Battery of Artillery, Company of Engineers, or Rifles or Infantry—should consist, according to its respective service of a Captain, a Lieutenant a Cornet, a 2nd Lieutenant or Ensign—3 Sergeants, 3 Corporals, a Trumpeter or Bugler, and not exceeding 48 privates, except in cases where a greater number of privates has been specially sanctioned.

Each Field Battery of Artillery should consist of a Captain, two 1st Lieutenants, a 2nd Lieutenant, a Sergeant Major, four Sergeants, four Corporals, four Bombardiers, a Trumpeter, a Farrier, and 59 Gunners and Drivers, including Wheelers, Collar maker, and Shoeing Smith. 51 horses exclusive of Officer's horses, and four spare horses.

Companies mustering at the time of Annual Drill at Camp much below their strength will be considered non-effective as such, and the individuals attached temporarily to other Companies or Corps.

All officers not belonging to the permanent Staff with the exception of Supply Officers appointed to act temporarily on the Staff of Brigades and Divisions at the annual Camps of Exercise, will receive in addition to the net rate of pay of their respective ranks an allowance of two Dollars per diem with rations for themselves and one horse each for the days they are so employed in such Camps of Exercise together with a horse allowance of one Dollar per diem provided they bring with them to the Camps of Exercise horses of a suitable description, but in no case except when otherwise specially authorized shall they receive more than sixteen days pay and allowances.

The Supply Officers at the Annual Camps of Exercise, irrespective of rank will receive a sum of \$5 per diem during the period they are employed as such, with rations for themselves and one horse each to cover all claims for pay and allowances.

Officers on the permanent Staff of the Militia while holding any acting appointment at the annual Camps of Exercise will receive the allowance of two Dollars per diem with rations for themselves and one horse each together with the authorized rate of horse allowance, but they will not receive any addition to their ordinary pay.

The non commissioned officers appointed to act as Staff Sergeants at the various Camps of Exercise will receive 20 cents per diem in addition to the Regimental pay of their rank with rations, from the time they are placed on duty until released therefrom.

25. In cases where Corps are directed to perform their Annual Drill Regimentally at local Headquarters in such manner and at such time as may suit their own convenience, the rate of drill pay only will be allowed to officers and men, as provided for in the Regulations authorized for corps performing annual drill at local head quarters in the Regulations for the annual Drill of 1870-71, and no rations can be issued to them.

#### RATIONS.

26. The daily scale of ration for each officer, non-commissioned officer and man at camps of exercise will be as follows :

1½ lb. of bread.
1 lb. of meat
1 lb. of potatoes.
2 oz. of sugar.
¼ oz. of coffee.
¼ oz. of tea.
½ oz. of salt.
1 oz. of pepper.
2 oz. of cheese.
1 oz. of pearl barley.

Pay and rations will be issued to the Officers, non-commissioned officers and men for the day or days only that they are actually present in camp.

Tents, blankets and fuel for cooking will be supplied to all corps attending Camps of Exercise organized for sixteen days continuous drill and manoeuvres.

One dollar per diem, as horse allowance, will be allowed to Staff Officers and mounted Officers of Infantry, as well as to officers, non-commissioned officers and men of mounted Corps for one horse each, also for every horse attached to Field Batteries of Artillery, but this allowance will be issued only for the day or days during which such horses may be required and which can be certified as having been actually and necessarily present at the drills at any such camp. Forge also for said horses will be issued in kind at Camps of Exercise organized for sixteen days continuous drill on the following scale.

10 lbs. Oats and
18 lbs. Hay for each horse certified to.

27. Every Troop, Company or Corps, attending Brigade Camps will bring with them their own Camp kettles Tins or cooking utensils, and in consideration thereof a special allowance of \$6 per Troop or Company who actually perform the Drill in Camp will be allowed and may be charged at the end of the Acquittance Rolls, on a certificate from the Commanding Officer at the end of the roll, that they have been provided by the Troop, Company or Corps. and on the breaking up of the encampment the camp kettles will be taken in charge of the Quarter Masters of Battalions, or Officers Commanding Corps.

28. On the day of Assembly, Staff Officers will be in attendance as the various Corps reach the Camping ground, and will shew the respective Corps where, and how, they are to encamp, which should be in accordance with the plan prescribed in paragraphs 239 to 250 of the "Regulations and Orders for the Active Militia," whenever circumstances and the nature of the ground may admit. Marching in States by Corps to be given to Staff Officers immediately on arrival.

29. Camp Equipage will be issued at Divisional Camps of Exercise under the superintendence of the Asst. Quarter Master General of the Division, at Brigade Camps of Exercise by the Camp Quarter Master, such Equipage will be taken over by these officers from Corps on the breaking up of the encampment, and all damages to or loss of Camp Equipage will be deducted from the men's pay and assessed before the Corps leave Camps. Officers commanding Troops, Companies and Corps will be careful to make this known to all under their command.

30. Fourteen clear days will be spent by all Infantry Corps in Camp one day will be allowed such Corps, to proceed to and one day to return from the Camp a period of sixteen days in all, during which time all officers, non-commissioned Officers and men being then on military duty will be governed by military rules and subject to the Queen's Regulations and articles of War as defined by the Militia Act of the Dominion.

#### TRANSPORT.

31. Local arrangements for transport of all corps proceeding to and from the Annual Camps of exercise by rail or steamboat, will be made by Deputy Adjutants General Commanding Military Districts. The transport of corps to be by those railway and steamboat lines whose tenders have been approved of at head quarters.

32. As companies or corps resident along the lines of railway or steamboat routes are to be taken up by train or boat *en-route*, it will simplify settlement of accounts if the several station masters or agents will forward the officers and men on the written order of the captain of the company or officer commanding the battalion or corps. After the camp is broken up, special covering requisitions, to replace the written orders, are to be made out by the Deputy Adjutant General commanding the district to be sent in as vouchers with the account.

33. Accounts for transport in any district are to be sent in the first instance to the Deputy Adjutant General of the district for examination and certificate before transmission to head quarters for payment.

In cases where the same railway or steamboat company performs transport services in different military districts, the account for such transport are to be made separately for each district so as to facilitate examination, All transport is to be charged for at the rate per mile named in the contract, and a column is to be ruled in each account, wherein the number of miles travelled in each instance is to be clearly shewn.

34. When railway or water communication is not available for the whole journey, and corps are not marching by road to camps of exercise, an allowance in lieu of transport for such portion of the distance necessarily travelled over ordinary roads at the rate of six cents per mile for each officer, and three cents per mile for each non-commissioned officer and man, whose corps or company head quarters are distant more than three miles from the place of encampment, will be allowed proceeding to camp—the same rate to be allowed for the return journey, and the amount is to be added to the company pay-lists and paid to the captain before leaving camp.

35. Officers commanding Infantry companies or corps will require each man to provide himself before leaving home with a sufficient quantity of cooked rations for the day or days proceeding to camp. and for which a sum of 25 cents per diem will be paid to each officer and man for the day or days occupied in travelling to camp.

36. Whenever circumstances will admit companies and battalions of Infantry whose local Headquarters are within one days march of the Camp of Exercise, should be encouraged to march by road to and from such camp—fifteen or sixteen miles to be considered a days march for Infantry.

37. Troops of Cavalry and Field Batteries of Artillery, whose local Headquarters are within two or three days march of their District Camp of Exercise, should in like manner whenever circumstances admit, be encouraged to march to and from the same by Road. \$1 per man per diem to cover the expense of rations and lodgings for the man and horse, will be allowed to officers and men of the Cavalry and Field Artillery whilst on the line of march, to and from Camps of Exercise; in such cases no allowance in lieu of transport will be admitted. The above sum of \$1 per man per diem to cover all expense attending the subsistence and transport of Mounted Corps marching to and from Camps of Exercise.

38. During hot weather officers commanding corps on the line of march to and from the Camps of Exercise, will be careful to march their men during the cool hours of the early morning and afternoons, halting to rest the men in woods or sheltered places during the heat of the day.

#### UNIFORM AND EQUIPMENT.

39. Officers of all corps whilst attending Camps of Exercise will only be required to wear the established undress uniform of their respective corps.

40. Mounted officers and men will bring with them to camp, horses of a proper description.

41. Commanding officers of corps will take care that the men under their command are supplied with such necessaries as they may require for sixteen day's service. Every man should come to camp in marching order, provided with a great coat, change of shirt and socks, tin plate, drinking cup, water bottle, havresac, knife, towel, soap, &c., and each man's hair should be cut close according to the military pattern previous to going into camp.

42. Officers commanding Infantry corps will take special care that their men are provided with boots of a proper description suitable for marching, such boots should be broad soled and low heeled, fitting the wearer easily; White covers or Havelocks for forage caps may be worn by both officers and men at the discretion of Commanding officers of corps, provided uniformity in the corps is observed.

43. Officers commanding Infantry corps will be responsible that every company brings with it to camp the necessary cooking utensils, also one spade, one pickaxe, one chopping axe per company, and one pail and wash dish for every ten men.

#### PAY REGULATIONS FOR THE GUIDANCE OF BATTALIONS.

44. Every Battalion and Provisional Battalion, will be provided with a regular appointed paymaster, or officer to act as such who will be responsible for the correct and punctual fulfilment of the duties prescribed.

45. Immediately on the assembling of corps in camp, Battalion Paymasters will draw up an accurate Nominal and Numerical Roll of the officers,

non-commissioned officers, and privates of their Corps, with a column of remarks shewing when any man becomes non-effective, a copy of which Roll with an abstract, shewing the actual strength of the Corps or Battalion in camp must be forwarded through the Commanding Officer, to the District Paymaster, accompanied by an estimate on form to be furnished, of the amount of pay required for the period of drill.

46. It will also be the duty of Battalion Paymasters to collect from the Captains of Companies the Acquittance Rolls after being duly signed, and which must bear the *genuine* signature of each Active Militia man, and pay only will be issued to the officers, non-commissioned officers, and men of the Active Militia for the day or days they are actually present on duty with their Corps in Camp.

47. Commanding officers of Corps and Paymasters will be held responsible that the Acquittance Rolls are completed, together with accounts for camp kettles and the special Transport allowance, authorized, properly signed, and examined, at least two days before the Camp breaks up.

48. The Annual Drill Pay will be issued to Captains of Companies in the presence of the Battalion Paymaster by the District Paymaster who will be present in Camp with the pay, at least one day previous to the breaking up of the Camp, by which means the men can be paid before they are dismissed to their homes.

49. The whole of the officers, non-commissioned officers, and men, will be paid before leaving camp, and those non-commissioned officers, and men winners of Government money Shooting Prizes, will likewise be paid at the same time, on the certificate of the Musketry Instructor, countersigned by the commanding officer of the Corps and approved by the officer commanding the Camp.

50. No individual can under any circumstances receive officers pay who has not been regularly gazetted as an officer, and appointed to do duty in a Battalion or Corps or on the Militia Staff, and no individual can receive pay as a non-commissioned officer or private, who is not regularly enrolled in a Corps of Active Militia, and whose name is borne on the Service Roll of such Corps. No pay can be granted for brevet rank of any kind.

51. No expenditure connected with the camps, other than for the services herein provided for, will be sanctioned, unless authority for the same has been previously obtained.

52. A muster parade will be held of every Corps and Battalion of Active Militia at the time of the Annual Drill in the presence of the Deputy Adjutant General or Officer Commanding in the District, and the District Paymaster, at which every officer, non-commissioned officer, man and horse belonging to the corps will be present. Officers commanding Troops, Batteries, and Companies will bring with them to this Parade, the Service Rolls of their Companies. The Roll of the Corps will be called by the Regimental Paymaster and checked from the Service Rolls of Troops, Batteries, and Companies, by the District Paymaster, in presence of the Deputy Adjutant General or Officer Commanding the District.

Pay will be allowed only for such officers, non-commissioned officers, men and horses, as are actually present on the muster parade, or who can be satisfactorily accounted for as on duty at the time.

The officers and staff sergeants appointed to act temporarily on the Staff at Camps of Exercise will

be mustered on a separate Pay List, by the District Paymaster.

## SUPPLY REGULATIONS.

53. When the formation of a Camp of Exercise is authorized at any place under the above regulations, the Deputy Adjutant General of the District within which such Brigade Camp may be formed will call for tenders from tradesmen in the locality by advertisement in some local newspaper, and by causing handbills to be posted prior to date of assembly in camp, for supplies of food, fuel wood, forage, and straw required for issue during the continuance of the camp. Tenders for approval of the Minister of Militia and Defence, to be sent in on blank form, with printed conditions thereon, as supplied by the Department—and some known person residing in the locality of the proposed camp should be named in the advertisement and handbills, from whom persons desirous of tendering for supplies may obtain the necessary blank forms to enable them to do so.

54. Previous to the assembly of the corps in camp a supply officer will be named, who will be under the immediate direction of the officers commanding the camp, and whose duty will be to receive supplies from the several contractors, see that they are strictly in accordance with contract, and, when approved, to issue the same on ration returns, or requisitions to the several corps in camp entitled to receive them. It will also be his duty, immediately after the breaking up of camp, to make up his accounts of receipts and issues, and certify the accounts of contractors in accordance therewith,—also to send through Officer Commanding Camp for District Paymaster an abstract of receipts and issues, with the original Ration Returns and requisitions as vouchers for the accounts to be paid.

55. Rations will be drawn for use by the several Corps upon daily Ration Returns. The necessary printed forms will be supplied by the Department.

56. The commanding officer of any corps is allowed to draw rations only for the actual number of officers, non-commissioned officers, and men of his corps present in camp for the day such rations are required.

57. The officer commanding the camp will make requisition upon the supply officer, for such rations as may be required for the Division or Brigade Staff doing duty in camp.

58. The daily supply of rations for battalions to be asked for and received from issuing officer in bulk—the distribution to companies therein will be made by the battalion quarter master.

59. The same form to be used by troops, batteries and companies, and the Ration Returns, when received by the quarter master from the several companies in battalion, will form the basis for his demand upon the issuing officer for the rations in bulk required for the day for his battalion. The accuracy of this return No. 176, can be checked by the Daily Parade State No. 164 of the corps or battalion, and should any excess of rations be drawn by any corps, the same will be made good by such corps.

The description of supplies and conditions for their receipt in camp, inspection, issue, and payment will be as under:—

### MEAT.

60. The beef shall be ox or heifer; the mutton shall be wether or ewe. Both to be of the best

quality, properly fed, and to be slaughtered well at least twelve hours before the time of issue. The beef to consist of equal proportions of fore and hind-quarters; the heads, necks, offal, and the shank for four inches above the knee, and upper hock joint, to be excluded, and none of the suet to be withdrawn. The quarter of beef to weigh not less than 100 lbs. The carcasses of mutton to weigh not less than 32 lbs.

61. The contractor shall deliver the beef aforesaid at his own expense, into the camp issuing store for inspection, at hours to be appointed by, and on the orders of, the proper officer. The issues to be made in the proportion of five days beef and two days mutton in each week.

62. The contractor must, as directed, cut the meat in pieces of such size as may be required for issue; and also provide, without charge, suitable weighing scales, for use in camp by the officer appointed to receive and issue rations.

63. As only the number of pounds of meat actually required for issue to the force in camp will be paid for, the charge of any surplus which may have been delivered by the contractor on any day in excess of the actual quantity required for issue that day, must be assumed by such contractor.

#### BREAD.

64. The bread shall be sweet and wholesome; to be made of inspected strong superfine wheat flour of the best quality, with sound hop and malt yeast; to be baked on tiles or bricks, without pans or shapes, in loaves of 2 lbs weight each. To be 12 hours drawn from the oven before delivery, and to keep sweet and good for 24 hours afterwards.

65. The contractor shall deliver the bread aforesaid at his own expense, at the camp store at hours to be appointed by, and on the orders of the supply officer.

#### POTATOES.

66. The potatoes to be of good size, sound and free from decay, and to weigh 60 lbs. per bushel.

#### PEARL BARLEY;

The Pearl Barley to be good and similar in quality to sample, submitted by Contractor with his tender for the supply, and to be delivered at the Camp Issuing Store, in packages of such weight as or may be directed by the Supply Officer.

#### CHEESE.

The Cheese to be good and similar in quality to sample, submitted by Contractor with his tender for the supply, and to be delivered at the Camp Issuing Store, in packages of such weight as or may be directed by the Supply Officer.

#### COFFEE.

67. The coffee to be pure, browned and ground, according to sample submitted by the contractor with his tender for the supply, and to be delivered at the Camp issuing stores in packages of such weight as may be directed by the Supply Officer,

#### TEA.

68. The Tea to be good and similar in quality to sample submitted by the contractor with his tender

for the supply, and to be delivered at the Camp issuing stores in packages of such weight as may be directed by the Supply Officer.

#### SUGAR.

69. The Sugar to be bright muscovado of good quality, according to sample submitted, and free from adulteration, to be delivered in packages under same regulations as provided for Coffee and Tea.

#### SALT AND PEPPER.

70. The salt to be the ordinary coarse table salt. The pepper to be black, to be free from adulteration, and to be ground. Both salt and pepper to be delivered in packages as provided for coffee, tea and sugar.

#### FUEL WOOD.

71. The Fuel wood shall be of good quality, sound, seasoned and sufficiently split, and shall be cut in the winter preceding the first delivery. Logs of a large size with projecting knots, or crooked, raft or drift wood, or wood which appears to have been in the water, shall not be accepted.

72. The Contractors shall deliver the wood at the Camp at the time appointed, and shall stack it one cord high for examination and measurement.

73. The Ration of Fuel wood for issue will be one inch Running Measure. Officers Mess, consisting of 8 or more Officers, 12 Rations daily. Officers Mess, of not less than 8 officers,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  rations each daily. Non-Commissioned officers and men, cooking allowance, each of  $\frac{1}{4}$  of a ration, or one ration to 4 men.

#### FORAGE.

74. The forage shall be of the best quality, good, sweet, dry and clean. The Oats to weight not less than 36 lbs. per minot, or 34 lbs. per bushel. The Hay to be sweet and clean, and free from weeds and thistles.

75. The Contractor shall deliver the forage at his own expense at the camp forage store at the time appointed by the supply Officer, and maintain therein a reserve equal to one weeks supply for the horses in camp. He shall also keep an agent at the camp store to issue the forage as it is required, upon the cheques or orders of the supply officer.

76. The forage to be calculated and issued in rations, consisting of 10lbs oats, and 18lbs hay, Extra Forage, which may be required in addition to the rations, shall be calculated at per 100lbs. Each ration of hay to be tied up in a separate bundle, when issued by contractor.

77. The contractor shall furnish, when required by the supply officer, bran in lieu of oats, in the proportion of 14lbs. bran for a ration of oats; but not beyond one ration of bran to each horse per week except for sick horses, for which rations of bran shall be supplied daily by the Contractor when required.

#### STRAW IF REQUIRED.

78. The straw shall be oaten, clean, dry and free from thistles and weeds. To be delivered in bundles of 12lbs. each at the camp store in such quantities and at such times as may be required.

79. The issue of straw for men when under canvas will be contingent upon the officer commanding the camp certifying to the issue being necessary.

80. When straw is so required to be issued the scale will be as follows, and is not to be exceeded:—12lbs. per man, which is considered sufficient for the whole period of the encampment, whether used in the shape of loose straw, or converted into mats. When straw is issued for the use of troops, it should be made into mats and not left loose in the bottom of the tent. Mats may be best made as follows:—The straw is twisted into ropes; two rows of tent pegs are driven into the ground parallel to one another and two feet apart, and the ropes passed round the pegs to form the web. Other straw ropes are interlaced, so as to form the woof, and an excellent mat is made in a short time. Each man should have two mats, one for his head and shoulders, the other for his legs. Four men will make the mats for an entire tent in one day, two twisting the ropes and two weaving.

81. No straw will be allowed for those tents for which tent flooring is supplied, and tent flooring will not be issued to corps under canvas except when they are encamped in the vicinity of a District store, and there is a supply available for issue.

82. Palliasses will not be supplied to corps under canvas.

#### CONDITIONS TO BE OBSERVED.

83. If any contractor shall fail to deliver at the time and place appointed any of the supplies contracted for and required in camp, the supply officer shall, under direction of the commanding officer, forthwith purchase the supplies which may be deficient, and the extra cost, if any, of the articles purchased, shall be deducted from any sums which may become due to such contractor.

The officer commanding may, whenever he deems fit, appoint a Board to inspect any supply offered by any contractor for issue, and if the Board be of opinion that the supply offered is not of the quality specified in the contract, it shall be rejected, and the supply officer, under direction of the commanding officer, shall, without further appeal, purchase the necessary supply in place of that rejected, to be paid for as provided in the preceding clause.

The value of the several supplies furnished under contract will be paid by the Department of Militia and Defence through the District Paymaster on final completion of contract. Accounts in duplicate must be prepared on the prescribed form, and the receipts of the receiving officer must be attached as vouchers.

Payment will only be made to contractors for the actual quantity issued as rations to Corps in camp of such supplies as are contracted for.

#### MEDICAL REGULATIONS.

§5. The medical arrangements for every battalion and corps will be carried out regimentally under

the direction of the senior medical officer of the district in divisional camps of exercise, acting as principal medical officer of division. A portable medicine chest, with the requisite supply of medicine, &c., will be furnished by Government to every battalion of infantry, field battery of artillery, and Regiment of cavalry; on the breaking up of camp these medicine chests will be returned into the district military store, and such medicines, &c., as may have been expended, replaced in order that they may be at all times available for actual service.

86. In brigade or battalion camps of exercise, the medical arrangements will be carried out regimentally, under the direction of the medical officer of each battalion and corps.

87. A medical inspection of every officer, non-commissioned officer and man will be made, if possible, before the men leave the corps or company head quarters; when that is not possible, then the medical Examination must be made immediately after the concentration of the corps or battalion.

88. This inspection is with a view of ascertaining, 1st. Whether the man is labouring under disease of any kind at the time, such as rheumatic affections; diseases of lungs or heart; or any of the viscera of the abdomen; or under any form of syphilitic disease; or is short sighted; or has any disease or injuries of any of the joints; or badly shaped feet or overlapping toes which would prevent his marching; 2nd. of ascertaining if the man has any predisposition to any of the above diseases, or has recently suffered from any of them, or if he has any other disqualification which may render him unfit for service, or predispose him to become inefficient from exposure.

89. Such men, if any be found, are not to be permitted to go to, or remain in camp, as well for their own sakes, as to prevent claims for compensation being made upon the public on account of illness on the part of men who are not fit for service.

90. Medical Officers of Corps or Battalions will, as soon as practicable, examine all their non-commissioned officers and men to ascertain if they have either had small pox or been vaccinated; and they will vaccinate, with as little delay as possible, all those men who have neither had small pox nor been already vaccinated.

91. The Medical Officer of each Corps or Battalion will make out a sick report every morning and transmit a copy to the Commanding Officer of the battalion; and if attached to a Division, a copy also to the Principal Medical Officer of the Division; he will also inspect all prisoners before they are brought before the Commanding Officer. (Form of sick report, A.)

92. The Surgeon of each Battalion will keep an admission and discharge Book, of all cases taken into Hospital, according to Form B.

93. Every Surgeon will give a receipt for all articles of medical equipment which may be issued to him for the use of his Corps or Battalion, for the care and proper expenditure of which he will be responsible; and on being relieved from duty he will return all medical stores, articles of equipment and medicine remaining unexpended into the District Stores, with a list of the materials which have been expended by him, on complying with which his receipt will be returned to him.

94. One medical officer will be detailed daily for duty in the camp, as medical officer of the day. This officer will remain in the camp during his

tour of duty ; and a medical officer will be detailed daily for duty at the rifle range, and attend during the rifle practice. With the exception of those detailed for the above duties, all medical officers will attend and accompany their corps upon the occasion of brigade and other field days.

95. Such wine or spirituous liquor, as may be prescribed for use in cases of illness must if procured be paid for by the person requiring same. The attention of medical officers of corps is specially called to paragraphs 138, 140, and 141 of the Orders and Regulations of the Active Militia.

96. No expense to be incurred by medical officers on account of Government without previous authority for such being obtained.

97. Medical officers will, from day to day, keep a list of the names of all men and officers to whom medicines or medical advice may be given during the 16 days' drill,—according to Form A, page 54, Regulations for the Active Militia,—stating the medicines given in each case, and transmit a copy to head quarters on the breaking up of camp, together with a list of such medicines as have been expended.

98. In any cases of serious illness or accident, the medical officer shall, in conjunction with the commanding officer of the corps, make such immediate arrangements as may be necessary, sending the Patient if possible at once to his home or the nearest Hospital ; he will make a minute report to head quarters of all circumstances connected with the case ; and he will make a weekly report of the state of his patients, through the commanding officer to head quarters.

99. The medical officer of the day will inspect the camp and vicinity, the guard tents, cooking kitchens, latrines, &c., and will report any dirty or unhealthy condition of the camp to the commanding officer of the Camp.

#### SELECTION OF SITE FOR ENCAMPMENT.

100. The following are the principles which have mainly led to the established forms of military encampment, and, however troops may be encamped, these principles should govern the disposition of the camp.

1st.—The front of the camp should correspond in extent with the front occupied by the force when deployed in line.

2nd.—The means of passing freely through the camp with a large front should be maintained.

3rd.—The tents, bivouacs, or huts should be disposed with a view to the greatest amount of order, cleanliness, ventilation, and salubrity.

4th.—The camp should be as compactly arranged as the above considerations permit.

101. Battalion tents should never be arranged in a double line ; short single lines are best. The tents in line should be separated from each other by a space at the very least equal to a diameter and a half of a tent, and the farther the lines can be conveniently placed from each other the better. Where troops are at a distance from an enemy, and are to remain some time in camp, and ground is available, the camps may be formed at double intervals.

102. Whenever troops remain in camp more than three days, tents should be struck every two days. All arms, straw, and blankets be removed from the ground covered by the tent, and the ground should be swept clean with a broom, or branches of trees, and left exposed to the sun and wind. Blankets, clothes, &c., should be spread out to air, and the tent roughly pitched in the intervals of the camp

with slack ropes, and the fly loose to allow it to be well blown about ; tents should never be pitched in the intervals. Men invariably at night urinate round the tent and consequently pollute the ground.

103. Whenever troops remain more than one night in camp, the tent flies should be rolled up the first thing every morning ; in rainy weather, the fly may always be rolled up on the lee ward side of the tent.

104. As a rule, the doors of the tents should face the head of the column, but this rule should never prevent their being turned away from the prevailing wind.

105. Trenches should be dug round tents, and a drain should connect these trenches so that the water may not lodge in them, but may run freely off. The first wet day after the camp is formed, officers commanding companies should personally examine the ground on which their companies are encamped, and should see that proper drains are constructed ; half-an-hour's work on a wet day, when the natural run of the water can be seen, will do more to keep the camp healthy than a day's labour in dry weather.

106. In encamping large bodies of troops, it is very desirable that a sketch of the ground, no matter how rough, showing the place to be occupied by each corps, should be prepared beforehand ; by this means the officer charged with forming the encampment can in a few minutes place the whole of the camp-colour men, so that when the regiments arrive they may proceed at once to the position assigned to them. Cavalry and Artillery should never be placed on a flank, unless the latter may be necessary for defensive purposes, in which case the guns should be protected by a strong guard of Infantry. The reason for this is that, in case of attack, mounted corps take longer to turn out, and the horses, if frightened, are apt to produce much confusion.

107. The Commissariat Depot should be placed in a central position, with easy access to all parts of the camp, and close to a good road by which supplies can be brought up. The Engineers usually encamp close to Head-Quarters of the Division.

#### WATER SUPPLY.

108. Few things are of more importance to the well-being of troops when encamped, than a plentiful supply of pure water.

109. Water is usually obtained from streams, ponds, or existing wells. When troops are encamped for a considerable time, or when stationary depôts are formed on the line of communications, it may be necessary to sink wells, make reservoirs, and lay pipes.

110. From whatever source the water supply is derived, it is absolutely requisite that it should not be polluted. The officer entrusted with the duty of forming the encampment will therefore post sentries over it, taking them from the first troops that arrive on the ground ; when the camp is completely formed, a regular guard will be posted over the water supply. If the supply is from a stream, great care should be taken that the watering place for the men should be distinct from that for the animals. The latter must be lower down the stream than the former, and it is advisable to send patrols up the stream to prevent men washing or bathing in it.

111. All washing in the neighborhood of wells or watering places used for drinking, should be strictly forbidden, as the foul water percolates through the soil.

112. If the stream have a muddy bottom, great care should be taken not to stir up the mud by dipping vessels into it; small field pumps, which form an article of Engineer equipment, should be fixed and the supply obtained in that way. If the stream be shallow, dams should be made on it; these are easily constructed with a few pickets and sods,—a small piece of tarpauling may be used with great advantage for the purpose of making them water tight. A barrel sunk in the bed of the stream affords a convenient place into which to dip the sucker of the pump, or collect water.

113. Filters can be easily made by placing two barrels one within another, and ramming the place between with clean straw, coarse sand, and charcoal if it can be procured, or branches of trees with the bark taken off. The water is allowed to flow into the outer barrel and rises through holes pierced in the bottom of the inner barrel. In a standing camp, if the water is not good, charcoal should be made, and the water regularly filtered: an average of 1 gallon per head is sufficient for troops when encamped; if in standing camp, this allowance should be increased, as men should be encouraged to wash themselves as much as possible.

114. If the banks of the stream or pond are steep, they must be cut down so as to allow the animals to drink easily. If the soil is muddy, branches of trees, fascines, and stones should be let down to prevent the animals sinking in the mud. A horse, bullock, or mule drinks about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  gallons at a time, and takes about 2 minutes to drink, or, if unavoidable confusion be allowed for, about 3 minutes. The time requisite to water any number of animals may therefore be easily calculated by the number that can drink at one time is known. If many animals have to be watered, and the frontage is small, the hours at which each corps is to water should be laid down, to avoid unnecessary crowding.

115. An officer should invariably accompany all cavalry parties, and instructions should be given that each horse as soon as he has drunk should leave the water, and the party should fall in at a little distance clear of the next comers.

116. If the animals have to be watered at a very shallow stream, it should be deepened, either by making dams or by excavating the bottom; animals drink more rapidly when the water is from 4 to 5 inches deep than if it be shallower.

117. There are three kinds of pumps generally used for military purposes.

1. A small hand, lift and force, pump with flexible hose. This will draw water from 18 feet and throw it about 16 feet, working with a lift of 18 feet and a throw of 7 feet (the height of an ordinary water cart); it will yield 7 gallons per minute.

2. The Norton tube well. This consists of tubes driven into the ground with a monkey, and with a pump screwed on the top. One of these wells takes about 3 hours to fix it; it will yield about 7 gallons per minute, and will keep three horses drinking at one time. *These pumps are very useful in searching for water.*

3. The "Bastier Pump" is a pump with an endless chain, working over a wheel; it yields from a depth of 45 feet (worked with two men), 2,200 gallons per hour.

118. If the water supply is from wells, troughs should be provided for the animals to drink out of. These may be made by simply excavating the ground and roughly paving it with stones, or they may be made of wood or sheet iron if it can be procured.

#### LATRINES.

119. Latrines should be made by fatigue parties as soon as the troops arrive on the ground, the places having been previously marked out for them by the quarter-masters of corps and battalions. The trench should be made as narrow as possible, and about four feet deep, a rail or post supported upon forked posts at both ends, and about eighteen inches from the ground, laid along the edge, will serve for the men to sit on, and the whole should be screened with bushes, trees, or lumber from public view.

120. *A fatigue party should throw a couple of inches of earth over the soil every day. This, if carefully done, will prevent all smell.*

121. When the trench is filled up, another one should be dug near it.

122. The camp police and sentries should have orders to prevent the men from committing nuisances in the vicinity of the camp.

#### CAMP POLICE.

123. At every camp of exercise, a certain number of men are to be detailed as a military police force, the strength of which will vary at the discretion of the officer commanding the troops encamped, according to circumstances. The military police to consist partly of infantry and partly of cavalry, who will, at stated times and in rotation, patrol in the vicinity of the camps, for the preservation of good order, and to suppress all irregularity of conduct on the part of the troops. The men detailed for duty as military policemen, should wear a piece of white cotton or linen fastened on the right arm above the elbow, or some such distinguishing badge, and officers and men of all corps attending camps of exercise should be warned to obey their orders, and to afford them every support.

124. At divisional camps of exercise, the military police will be under the orders of the Assistant Adjutant-General.

125. At brigade camps, under the Brigade-Major, and at all camps, a Non-commissioned Officer will be appointed by the officer commanding to act as Provost-Serjeant.

126. In cases where camps are formed in the vicinity of towns or villages, should the civil authorities require any support to the civil force during the period such camps are in operation, the assistance or co-operation asked for is to be promptly afforded by the officer commanding.

#### DUTIES IN CAMP.

127. The ordinary routine duties to be observed in these camps of exercise will be such, modified by circumstances, as would be observed by Her Majesty's regular troops under similar circumstances as laid down by Regulations.

128. One gun will be fired by the field battery at day-break, immediately after which the *Reveille* will be played by bands or corps of drums and fifes belonging to battalions appointed daily for this duty in succession; and at sunset another gun will be fired, when the *Retreat* will be sounded in the same manner as detailed above. As a general rule the breakfast hour will be at 8 a.m., dinner at 1 p.m., and the evening meal at 6 p.m. Tattoo will be sounded at half-past nine, when the reports will be collected and handed to the field officer of the day by orderly officers of battalions and corps; and at ten o'clock



the bugle will sound for lights to be extinguished ; after which no one will be allowed out of camp except passed by authority, and all officers and men are to sleep in Camp.

129. There will be a field officer and medical officer of the day appointed daily in Brigade Orders, and in addition to the supply officer, they will form the Board of Inspection and Examination as to the quality of the provisions supplied by the contractors for issue to the troops. The decision of the officers composing this Board will be final as to the rejection or otherwise of the daily rations ; and when such are passed, no complaints will afterwards be admitted as to quality. This Board will assemble at the time of the delivery of the Provisions in Camp, and the officers composing it are to be very punctual in their attendance at the proper hour, in order that the troops may obtain their provision supplies without unnecessary delay.

#### DISTRIBUTION OF RATIONS.

130. Simultaneously with the assembly of the above Board of Examination, the Quarter Masters, and Quarter Master Sergeants of Corps, accompanied by the Orderly Corporals of Troops, Companies or Corps, and one Orderly from each of the Troop and Company Messes, will attend at the place appointed for the receipt and issue of Rations, and after Quarter Masters have received over from the Supply Officer, in bulk, the quantity of provisions their respective Corps are entitled to, they will distribute to the Orderly Corporals of Troops, Companies and Corps, the quantities such Corps have to receive, when the same will be sub-divided into the proper proportion for each Mess by the Orderly Corporals.

131. It will be the duty of the Orderly Sergeants of Troops, Companies, and Corps, to furnish the Quarter Masters of Corps with the daily Ration return of such, upon which Quarter Masters will base the general Ration Return for the Supply Officer who is charged with the receipt, custody, and issue of all provisions, fuel, forage required for the use of the Troops, and his duties are detailed under the head of Supply Regulations.

132. The Assistant Adjutant General at Divisional, and the Brigade Major at Brigade Camps of Exercise, is the proper channel through which all orders are received and issued to the troops.

133. The Assistant Quarter Master General at Division Camps, and the Camp Quarter Master at Brigade Camps, will issue to, and take over from, the various corps, all articles of camp equipage. They will issue daily the ball ammunition required for target practice by the Companies and Corps detailed, also blank ammunition when required for field days, and they will exercise a general supervision over the cleanliness of the camp. One tent will be allowed for every ten men, and one non-commissioned officer will be placed in charge of such men. One tent will be allowed to every Regimental Field Officer, and one tent for the Company officers, one tent to each Surgeon, and another tent as the Regimental Hospital tent, one tent as Commissariat Store when no better place for storage can be obtained, one guard tent to every Battalion, one tent will be allowed to each of the Staff Officers and one marquee tent to every Battalion and Regiment for the officers mess.

134. The Musketry Instructor will attend daily to the musketry instruction and target practice of

the troops during the period of exercise ; he will see that officers understand and carry out the system of registering in the returns the points obtained by the men ; he will be constantly present at the Rifle Range during the target practice, to take general superintendence and control of the system of firing ; he will be the referee and sole umpire, in all cases of dispute as to accuracy of marking, &c. ; he will be responsible for the target practice returns, which, on the conclusion of each day's firing, he will carefully collect and record, initialing the whole for purpose of verification, handing in the same to the officer commanding the camp in accordance with such instructions as may be issued ; he will also carry out any further orders connected with musketry instruction which may be issued by the officer commanding the camp.

135. It will be the duty of Brigade Major to keep the roster of all Brigade duties and to issue daily to the Adjutants of Corps the Orders for the following day, and Adjutants are to attend at the Brigade Major's tent at the hour appointed to receive such orders.

136. The Orderly Officer will perform such duties as the Deputy Adjutant General or the Officer Commanding the Brigade may direct.

137. It will be the duty of Adjutants to keep the Officers' roster of duty for their respective Corps, and to promulgate under instructions from their Commanding Officers the necessary orders ; the Sergeant Major will give out the orders of the day to Orderly Sergeants of Troops, Companies and Corps, and keep the non-commissioned officers duty roster.

138. There will be an Inlying Piquet told off daily from every Corps in Camp, whose duty it will be, under the Officer Commanding the Brigade and Field Officer of the day, to patrol in the vicinity of the Camp or in such other places as may be directed, for the purpose of supporting the camp police if necessary, checking any irregularities on the part of any men belonging to their own Corps, and bringing back any unauthorized absentees to Camp, but except under urgent and unavoidable circumstances, the piquet of one corps will not interfere with men of another.

139. Officers Commanding Brigade Camps will take care that the number of men detailed daily for guard and sentries, also for Regimental duties, do not exceed the usual number authorized by the Queen's Regulations and the customs observed in the Regular Army.

140. A Field Officer of the day, taken in succession according to seniority from all Regimental Lieut.-Colonels and Majors, will be detailed daily in Brigade Orders.

141. Canteens for the supply of such extra provisions or articles as may be required, be (to enable the men to purchase for themselves such additional provision supplies, as butter, milk, eggs, cheese, &c., as they may desire), will be allowed in Camp at the discretion of the Officer Commanding ; but under no circumstances will spirituous liquors of any kind be allowed into Camp ; and it will be a special duty of the Field Officer of the day and Camp Police to visit frequently all Canteens, to take care that this order is strictly observed. In the event of any Sutler selling or bringing spirituous liquor into Camp, he is to be turned out, and not re-admitted.

142. The necessary forms of marching in, and marching out states, ration and musketry returns,

&c., required, will be furnished from Head Quarters to Deputy Adjutants General Commanding Districts for distribution to Corps; but officers Commanding Battalions and Corps will be required to furnish the necessary regimental stationery, Daily Parade States, Guard and Sick Reports—as heretofore—and all Corps will bring with them their Regimental and Company Order and Default-er Books.

#### DISCIPLINE.

143. Unless strict discipline be observed men cannot be formed into an effective military body—good discipline is acquired by a constant and habitual obedience to orders without murmur and without question—the officers, non-commissioned officers and men of all corps are reminded of this and they should bear in mind that during the period of Annual Drill they are for purposes of Military discipline under the Queen's Regulations and Articles of War the same as if employed on actual service as defined in the militia act of the Dominion.

144. Commanding officers of corps in dealing with any cases of irregularity which may occur, are in all first offences not of a serious or aggravated nature to have recourse to admonition, but on repetition of offence the minor punishment authorized should be enforced according to the nature and degree of the offence, every repetition of an act of drunkenness will be visited by the stoppage of one day's pay, and the confinement to Camp of the Offenders at the discretion of the Commanding Officer, and with a view to the prevention of irregularities, every effort should be made by Commanding, and all other officers, to stop the introduction of all spirituous and intoxicating liquors into Camp, for it may generally be relied on that when drunkenness can be prevented there will be no crime.

145. In the event of any man being found with spirituous liquor in his possession while in Camp, or bringing the same into Camp, the liquor is to be immediately thrown away, and the man should be punished by his Commanding Officer.

146. The minor punishments that may be awarded by Commanding Officers are confinement to the Camp for any period not exceeding 14 days, and stoppage of pay accompanied by confinement to camp for repeated drunkenness. Men awarded punishment of confinement to Camp by their Commanding Officers will not be allowed beyond the precincts of the Camp (except on duty), during the period of confinement to Camp awarded, and they will in addition to taking their own share of Brigade and Regimental duty, be employed as an extra duty, under the direction of the Camp Quarter Master, in preserving the cleanliness of the Camp.

#### TARGET PRACTICE REGULATIONS.

147. The carrying out of the Annual Target Practice of the Militia of the Dominion is of primary importance. The non-commissioned officers and men of all corps armed with the Snider Rifle will fire five rounds at 200 yards, five rounds at 400 yards, and five rounds at 600 yards, and money prizes with badges will be given by Government to the best shot in every Company, Corps, Battalion and Military District, who perform the prescribed course of Target Practice at the annual drill, as follows, viz. :—

148. To the best shot in every Company or Corps,

\$5, with badge. To the best shot in every Battalion, \$10, with badge. To the best shot in every District, \$15, with badge; and the Adjutant General of Militia will give a prize of \$50, with a silver medal, to the best shot with the Snider Rifle in the Active Militia of the Dominion for the year 1872.

149. The annual target practice of all Brigades, and Batteries of Artillery, whenever practicable, will be carried out with Field Guns, or guns of position at their disposal, under special instructions from the Inspectors of Artillery—and money prizes, with Artillery badges will be given by Government:

To the best shot in every brigade or Field Battery of Artillery, \$10, with badge. To the best shot in every Garrison Battery, \$5, with badge, and \$5 in addition if no prize is drawn by Battery for rifle shooting. Troops of cavalry, or other corps armed with the Snider Carbine, will fire five rounds at 200 and five at 400 yards, the best shot in such corps will receive a prize of \$5, with badge—and where troops of cavalry are formed into a regiment, a prize of \$10, with badge, in addition to the troop prizes, to the best shot in such Regiment. The Grand Trunk Brigade will carry out its annual target practice at such times during the season as may be directed by the Commandant, and will be entitled to receive the prizes before mentioned, and this brigade will also be entitled to receive the district prize of \$15. To entitle a company or corps to compete for and receive the above prizes, not less than  $\frac{2}{3}$  of its establishment or authorized strength must be present at the time and perform the prescribed annual drill and target practice (the men to be *bona fide* enrolled members of the same according to the Militia Act) their names being duly registered in the company target returns. To entitle a battalion or brigade of artillery to receive the battalion prize, all its companies or batteries must have been exercised, and have established a figure of merit, as laid down, and with the strength as mentioned above, at the prescribed course of target practice at the annual drill. The above prizes for good shooting will only be open to the non-commissioned officers and men of the Active Militia, and officers are not to practise during the annual course prescribed for the non-commissioned officers and men. It is directed that the target shall be 4 feet wide at 200 yards, bulls-eye 8 inches square, and two feet centre; at 400 and 600 yards, 6 feet wide, with a bulls-eye 2 feet square and a centre 4 feet square. Bulls-eye to count 4, Centre 3, and an Outer 2, at all ranges. Position when firing shall be, standing at 200, kneeling at 400, and any position at 600 yards, but without artificial rests.

150. The figures of merit for a company, battalion or district, will be obtained by dividing the total number of points obtained at the three ranges,—200, 400, and 600 yards—by the number of men actually firing, and carrying out the quotient to two places of decimals.

151. The best shot in the company, battalion, district, and Dominion, will be that man who obtains the greatest number of points at the three distances, viz. : 200, 400, and 600 yards.

152. Ties will be decided by the greatest number of points obtained at 600 yards; if still a tie, by the greatest number at 400 yards; if still a tie, by the greatest number at 200 yards; if still a tie, by the inverse order of shots counting backwards from 600 yards. And to decide ties for the Adjutant General's prize, the score of each shot made by

district prize winners, will be furnished in detail by Deputy Adjutants General to head quarters.

153. The prescribed course of Target Practice will be performed by the different Companies, under the command of the Captains, who will keep and sign the register of each man's performance, certifying the same as correct.

154. At the conclusion of the training the Register of Target Practice will be sent by the Brigade Musketry Instructor to Brigade Majors, who will make out District Returns from the Company Returns and forward them to the Deputy Adjutants General, for transmission to Head Quarters.

155. The greatest possible accuracy must be observed in keeping the Registers, as on these depend the selection of individuals for the Annual Prizes.

156. As a general rule, there should be two markers in each butt, one N. C. O., and one man of a different Company to the one firing—and a Bugler at the firing point.

157. The Musketry Instructor will be on the ground during the time each Company is firing its course, to see that the course is conducted according to Regulation.

158. To prevent accidents occurring, the following rule is to be strictly observed.

The squad will form up ten paces in rear of the firing points, "ground arms," and retire six paces in rear of the arms, which are not to be taken up except by word of command. The squad commander will remain at the firing stake, and call up each man successively who will fire his five rounds in succession, and then rejoin his squad, his score having first been read to him. The squad commander will be careful to caution his man as to the target he is to fire at, and see that he is aiming at it, and that no shot is fired until the flag or disc is entirely down. No loading to be permitted except at the firing stake. No one but the squad commander or scorer is to be permitted within ten paces of the firing point.

#### FIELD EXERCISE AND EVOLUTIONS.

159. As a general rule, when not otherwise directed by officers commanding at Camps of Exercise there will be three daily parades for drill for all companies and corps of infantry, not engaged at target practice, at the following hours, viz. :—

160. At 6 a.m., for company drill under captains or officers commanding companies, superintended by the field officers; at 10 a.m., for battalion drill under commanding officers of battalions and at 3 p.m. or such other times as the Deputy Adjutant General, or senior officer commanding may direct for brigade drill and exercise.

161. At the morning parades for company drill, under captains or officers commanding companies, the movements and exercises contained in part II. of the Infantry Field Exercise Book (latest edition), will be practised from pages 58 to 101, and especial care will be taken to instruct each company in the mode of skirmishing as laid down at page 91 to 101, every company officer will also be practised at these morning parades in the mode of sizing, forming and telling off a company, also in the proper mode of inspecting a company, and in the manual and platoon exercise; the men will be instructed in the manual exercise prescribed for the short rifle, except as regards the mode of fixing and unfixing bayonets, in which instance the directions laid down for the long rifle will be followed. All orders contained in the Field Exercise for the

guidance of troops carrying the short rifle, are applicable to men although armed with the long rifle, and whilst performing the platoon exercise, both officers and men are to be instructed in position and aiming drill, as laid down in the book of Rifle Exercises and Musketry Instruction at page 176 to 185. Officers and men will also be practised in the mode of mounting and reliving guard, in marching reliefs, in posting and relieving sentries, in challenging at night, in receiving grand or visiting rounds, and in paying the proper compliments, and the non-commissioned officers and men will be instructed in the mode of saluting, as laid down in section 6, part I., page 14, of the Field Exercise. It is not necessary that the men should be instructed in the slow step.

162. At the parades for battalion drill, the Field Officers and Adjutants will be mounted, and the companies equalized. The strength of each company when formed for drill purposes to be not less than twenty files. Battalions will be practised in the mode of firing, prescribed at page 106 of the Infantry Field Exercise Book, when the battalion is in line at close order, in forming advanced and rear guards, and in skirmishing as directed at page 205 to 224; they will also be practised in the few simple movements required from Infantry when in action as laid down in the Field Exercise Book.

163. Whenever the brigades parade for field manoeuvres, the whole of the corps will attend (the necessary guards and one cook per troop or company only being left in camp). At these parades the troops will be drawn up in such manner as the officer commanding may direct, and if circumstances admit should then move off a short distance from camp in column of route, throwing out advanced, flank and rear guards, moving always as if in the close vicinity or actual presence of an enemy, deploying from time to time as circumstances and the nature of the ground may suggest into a line of battle, each arm of the service being posted so as to afford mutual support. The usual positions for field artillery when moving with a brigade is laid down at page 278 of the Infantry Field Exercise Book, and the principles upon which these manoeuvres should be conducted in contradistinction to mere drill, is explained at page 279.

164. The established rule relative to the employment of Horse and Field Artillery, when manoeuvring directs that officers commanding divisions or detached brigades, should indicate to the officer commanding artillery under their orders, the general object of the movements about to be executed, and these officers should give directions to the captains of Batteries, as to the best mode of co-operating with and supporting them.

Officers commanding batteries should be permitted (under the direction of their own commanding officers), to use their own judgment in selecting the best positions to enable them to operate with advantage either in covering an attack or retreat, conforming of course as much as the nature of the ground will permit, with the movements of the corps to which they are attached.

Any special directions received by the Officer commanding Artillery, from the Officer in command of troops, relative to any change in the disposition of the batteries during the movements, will of course be promptly carried out.

A battery ought not to be exposed to the risks of infantry fire, unless under unavoidable circumstances which occasionally occur in action.

165. The brigades should be practised in taking up

positions for defence, or forming for purposes of attack, in the mode of attacking and carrying positions, and in retiring as if in presence of a superior force, in regular military order, from one position to another, the various arms supporting, covering, and relieving one another in retreat. Whenever circumstances will admit the troops should be exercised, whilst taking up positions for defence, in creating artificial where nonatural cover is available, by constructing shelter trenches, for the infantry in the manner laid down in the Field Exercise Book, and in throwing up breastworks to protect the field batteries. Very valuable practice may also be afforded on these field days by dividing brigades into two forces, under commanders previously named in brigade orders, one side to act on the offensive, and the other on the defensive. The officer commanding the Division with suitable Staff Officers, acting as Umpires. The troops on these occasions being supplied with blank ammunition. By carrying out properly the above system of practical field days, and sham battles, officers and men are best instructed in their duties, and their military intelligence becomes greatly developed.

#### CAVALRY.

166. The drill for all troops of cavalry and mounted corps, when such are not required for brigade exercise, will be carried out regimentally by the officers commanding, and the mode of forming advanced and rear guards practised as laid down in the cavalry regulations; also the mode of extending as mounted skirmishers, and in firing with blank ammunition when mounted, whenever circumstances will admit.

The necessary instruction for cavalry corps is detailed in the Cavalry Drill Book of 1st August, 1869, and in addition to the introductory remarks contained in that code of instruction, particular attention will be paid to sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7, comprising military equitation.

#### FIELD ARTILLERY.

167. Whenever possible, the Annual Shot and Shell Practice of Batteries of Field Artillery will be carried on during the time the Battery is in Camp; if there is no available range, or if the firing of shell would be attended with danger, the practice will be deferred till a suitable range can be obtained.

168. Requisitions for Ammunition and all other stores necessary to complete the equipment will be forwarded by Officers Commanding batteries prior to the commencement of the Drill Season.

169. No annual training of a Field Battery will be considered effective unless during that time at least one march of twenty (20) miles, or thereabouts, has been made, with limbers and waggons properly packed, all entrenching tools, camp equipage, small arms, &c., strapped in their places; on these occasions officers commanding will mount their Detachments when the state of the roads admit of it.

170. During the period allotted to "Regimental Drill" in camp, officers commanding will select the most simple and useful of the movements laid

down in the "Manual of field artillery exercises." The drivers will be instructed in riding, driving, cleaning harness, &c., the gunners in gun drill, dismounting and mounting guns, righting guns which have been upset, changing wheels, removing disabled field artillery, &c.

171. Where facilities exist, officers commanding should practice those under their command in throwing up cover for guns in action, moving guns and horses over walls, ditches, ravines, small streams or other obstacles, and without adhering to strict rules, endeavour to stimulate the ingenuity and interest of all concerned.

172. On the conclusion of the training and return of Field Batteries to their respective Head Quarters, all harness, saddlery, carriages, waggons and small stores will be replaced in the sheds in a perfectly clean state and fit for immediate service; the drivers cleaning the harness, the gunners the guns and waggons. Officers commanding field batteries will be held responsible at any time when their batteries are suddenly ordered out, that the service ammunition and other necessary stores are complete and in good order.

173. Lieutenant-Colonel French, Inspector of Artillery and Warlike Stores, and Commandant of the School of Gunnery, "A" Battery, Kingston, will transmit to Head Quarters a detailed report on the Annual Inspection of all Artillery Corps in the Province of Ontario, and a special report on the School of Gunnery, "A" Battery, Kingston.

174. Lieut.-Colonel T. B. Strange, Inspector of Artillery for the Province of Quebec, and Commandant of the School of Gunnery, "B." Battery, Quebec, will transmit to Head Quarters a detailed report on the Annual Inspection of all Artillery Corps in the Province of Quebec, and a special report on the School of Gunnery, "B." Battery, Quebec.

175. Lieut.-Colonel Jago, New Brunswick Artillery, will make the Annual Regimental Inspection of all Artillery Corps in that Province, transmitting his report thereon to Head Quarters.

176. The Annual Regimental Reports of the Inspectors in that special arm of the service to be transmitted to the Adjutant General at Head Quarters not later than 1st November, 1872.

177. The annual drill of all corps for 1872-73 to be completed before 31st October, 1872, and the Annual Inspection Reports and Target Practice Returns of Corps transmitted by Deputy Adjutants General along with their own annual Reports to Head Quarters immediately after the inspection of the whole of the Corps in the respective Districts is concluded, to enable the Adjutant General to prepare his Annual Report on the state of the Militia in proper time for presentation to Parliament.

PROPOSALS will be received by the undersigned until Tuesday the 25th day of June, from persons desirous of leasing the privilege of ferrying across the Restigouche River between Campbellton, New Brunswick and Cross Point in the Province of Quebec, in accordance with the terms of the Order in Council of the 23rd March, 1872, and under the conditions therein established, which are as follow, viz:—

#### REGULATIONS.

##### 1st.—Limit.

The limits of the Ferry shall extend to a distance of three miles above and below the wharf at the village of Campbellton, in New Brunswick, and to a similar distance above and below the usual Ferry landing at Cross Point, in the Province of Quebec.

##### 2nd.—Landing Stages.

Suitable landing stages or wharves serviceable at all states of the water in the River must be constructed on both sides subject to the approval of the Department of Inland Revenue.

##### 3rd.—Ferry Boat.

During the first year after the execution of the lease, the lessee shall provide and maintain a vessel propelled either by steam or by oars, suitable for the conveyance of passengers, horses, cattle and all ordinary vehicles with safety and reasonable dispatch and such vessel shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Inland Revenue. After the lapse of one year the lessee shall, if required so to do by the Minister of Inland Revenue, place on the Ferry and maintain during the period of the lease a suitable vessel propelled by steam. Such vessel shall be of sufficient size for the safe conveyance of passengers, horses, cattle, vehicles and other effects, and shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Inland

Revenue, and the lessee must obtain therefore and produce when required a certificate of fitness, safety and sufficiency from the Dominion Board of Steam Boat Inspectors

##### 4th.—Number of Trips.

During the season of navigation the Ferry Boat shall commence running daily—Sundays excepted—at six o'clock a. m. and shall continue to cross from each side every hour thereafter until eight o'clock p. m.

##### 5th.—Tariff of Charges.

The maximum charges for Ferrying shall be as follows:—

For a two horse cart or conveyance with driver, each way.....	40 cts.
For a one horse cart or conveyance with driver, each way.....	30 cts.
For one horse, each way.....	10 cts.
For each head of horned cattle.....	10 c s.
For each head of sheep or swine, each way.....	5 cts.
For a passenger.....	5 cts.
For every 100 lbs of freight.....	3 c's.

##### Sixth.

The Ferry boat shall be placed on the route fully completed and equipped and the Landing Stages shall be fully constructed on or before 1st July, 1872.

##### Seventh.

The lease will be granted for a period of five years from the first day of July, 1872.

##### Eighth.

The Lessee will be required to give two sureties satisfactory to the Department of Inland Revenue, who shall be held jointly and severally with the principal in the sum of \$2000 for the full compliance of the Lessee with the term of the Lease.

##### Ninth.

The right will be reserved to the Department of Inland Revenue of respecting the Ferry Boat or Landing Stages or either of them should any of them be deemed unsuitable for the service, or unsafe to the public, or inadequate to meet the public wants. The right is also reserved to the Governor in Council to modify the maximum tariff should it be deemed expedient in the public interest to do so, and the Governor in Council may declare the lease forfeited and void whenever it shall be satisfactorily shewn that the Lessee fails to comply with the conditions thereof.

##### Tenth.

The Lessee of the Ferry shall at all times during the continuance of the lease carry over and across the Ferry without fee, toll or reward, all mail matter, militiamen, soldiers or sailors when provided with proper passports or under the charge of their proper officer or officers, and it shall be lawful for the said Lessee to commute the rate of passenger fees.

##### Eleventh.

A notice of the rates of Fares and Tolls to be charged for Ferrage shall be put in a conspicuous place near the Ferry landing on both sides and also on board the Steam Ferry Boat employed.

The proposals must state the amount which the party tendering is willing to pay per annum for the privilege referred to, which amount will be payable in advance, the terms of the lease being for five years from the 1st July, 1872.

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Bank or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act, shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Québec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Canada.

BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

CONVERSION OF DEBENTURES INTO STOCK.

All 5 per cent. currency Debentures may be converted into 5 per cent. stock at par, whatever may be the period for which the Debentures have to run.

## NOTICE.

PROPOSALS will be received by the undersigned until Tuesday the 25th day of June, from persons desirous of leasing the privilege of ferrying across the Restigouche River between Campbellton, New Brunswick, and Cross point in the Province of Quebec, in accordance with the terms of the Order in Council of the 23rd March, 1872, and under the conditions therein established, which are as follow, viz:—

## REGULATIONS.

## 1st.—Limits.

The limits of the Ferry shall extend to a distance of three miles above and below the wharf at the village of Campbellton, in New Brunswick, and to a similar distance above and below the usual Ferry landing at Cross Point, in the Province of Quebec.

## 2nd.—Landing Stages.

Suitable landing stages or wharves serviceable at all states of the water in the River must be constructed on both sides subject to the approval of the Department of Inland Revenue.

## 3rd.—Ferry Boat.

During the first year after the execution of the lease, the lessee shall provide and maintain a vessel propelled either by steam or by oars, suitable for the conveyance of passengers, horses, cattle and all ordinary vehicles with safety and reasonable dispatch and such vessel shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Inland Revenue. After the lapse of one year the lessee shall, if required so to do by the Minister of Inland Revenue, place on the Ferry and maintain during the period of the lease a suitable vessel propelled by steam. Such vessel shall be of sufficient size for the safe conveyance of passengers, horses, cattle, vehicles and other effects, and shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Inland Revenue, and the lessee must obtain therefore and produce when required a certificate of fitness, safety and sufficiency from the Dominion Board of Steam Boat Inspectors.

## 4th.—Number of Trips.

During the season of navigation the Ferry Boat shall commence running daily—Sundays excepted—at six o'clock a. m. and shall continue to cross from each side every hour thereafter until eight o'clock p. m.

## 5th.—Tariff of Charges.

The maximum charges for Ferrying shall be as follows:—

For a two horse cart or conveyance with driver, each way.....	40 cts.
For a one horse cart or conveyance with driver, each way.....	30 cts.
For one horse, each way.....	10 cts.
For each head of horned cattle.....	10 cts.
For each head of sheep or swine, each way.....	5 cts.
For a passenger.....	5 cts.
For every 100 lbs of freight.....	3 cts.

## Sixth.

The Ferry boat shall be placed on the route fully completed and equipped and the Landing Stages shall be fully constructed on or before 1st July, 1872.

## Seventh.

The lease will be granted for a period of five years from the first day of July, 1872.

## Eighth.

The Lessee will be required to give two sureties satisfactory to the Department of Inland Revenue,

who shall be held jointly and severally with the principal in the sum of \$2000 for the full compliance of the Lessee with the term of the Lease.

*Ninth.*

The right will be reserved to the Department of Inland Revenue of repeating the Ferry Boat or Landing Stages or either of them should any of them be deemed unsuitable for the service, or unsafe to the public, or inadequate to meet the public wants. The right is also reserved to the Governor in Council to modify the maximum tariff should it be deemed expedient in the public interest to do so, and the Governor in Council may declare the lease forfeited and void whenever it shall be satisfactorily shewn that the Lessee fails to comply with the conditions thereof.

*Tenth.*

The Lessee of the Ferry shall at all times during the continuance of the lease carry over and across the Ferry without fee, toll or reward, all mail matter, militiamen, soldiers or sailors when provided with proper passports or under the charge of their proper officer or officers, and it shall be lawful for the said Lessee to commute the rate of passenger fees.

*Eleventh.*

A notice of the rates of Fares and Tolls to be charged for Ferrage shall be put in a conspicuous place near the Ferry landing on both sides and also on board the Steam Ferry Boat employed.

The proposals must state the amount which the party tendering is willing to pay per annum for the privilege referred to, which amount will be payable in advance, the terms of the lease being for five years from the 1st July, 1872.

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act, shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Excellency a Bill intituled :—

“ An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defraying certain expenses of the Public Service for the financial years ending respectively the 30th June 1872 and the 30th June 1873 and for other purposes relating to the Public Service,” to which I humbly request Your Excellency's assent.

To this Bill the Royal Assent was signified in the following words :

In Her Majesty's name, His Excellency the Governor General thanks her loyal subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill.

After which His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to close the FIFTH SESSION of the FIRST PARLIAMENT of the DOMINION with the following

SPEECH :

*Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate :*

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons :*

I have much satisfaction in relieving you from an attendance in Parliament which cannot fail to be inconvenient to many of you at this season of the year. I thank you therefore all the more for the time and attention which you have diligently bestowed on the discharge of your public duties.

The interest and importance of various questions which have been discussed and decided will render the Session memorable in the annals of the country.

Your adoption of the Articles of the Treaty of Washington which affect Canadian interests, has placed in a clear light your determination to share the fortunes of England. The generous disposition evinced under the trying circumstances of the time has added strength to the honorable position of Canada, both as regards the British Empire and the United States.

The vast project, of which you have so wisely matured the conditions for carrying a Railway to the shores of the Pacific, will open a new pathway for England as well in peace as in war, to the East, and will, I trust, be productive of the most essential benefits to this Dominion by giving facilities to traffic of all descriptions, enhancing the value of the public lands, promoting their settlement, and drawing closer the ties which bind the sister Provinces together by easier access and multiplied intercourse.

Few who have not considered the subject have any adequate conception how large an extent of economical advantage, the possession of great navigable Rivers like the St. Lawrence and its tributaries comprises. The outlay you have sanctioned on their improvement, and on that of the auxiliary canals, is a safe investment. It will be amply and speedily repaid by the augmented volume of trade flowing down all the channels opened to its course, for it will be swollen by the confluence of your own accumulating productions with those of your Western neighbours.

It is highly satisfactory that the condition of the revenue is so prosperous as to enable you to advance the interests of the Country by commencing the construction of these works at once, without delay or misgiving.

*Gentlemen of The House of Commons :*

In Her Majesty's name I thank you for the supplies which you have so cheerfully granted.

I heartily congratulate you on the prosperous condition of the revenue, and on your having been enabled by the repeal of the duties on tea and coffee to diminish the burdens of the people.

*Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate,*

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

The joint address with which you have honored me on the eve of my departure is most agreeable to my feelings.

I shall I assure you hold in grateful recollection all my life the expression of your respect and esteem.

I have watched with deep interest in my official capacity the proceedings of four Sessions, and made myself otherwise acquainted with the views and wishes of the Parliament and people of Canada, and I earnestly hope that the good intelligence which prevails between them and the people of England may last constant and unimpaired for generations to come.

I have now the honor to bid you farewell, with those serious thoughts which the word farewell naturally awakens, with every acknowledgement of the many courtesies and the effective assistance which I have received at your hands and with the most cherished and ardent wishes for the welfare of the Dominion, with which I rejoice to think that my humble name has been connected by an honourable tie for more than three years.

**P**ROPOSALS will be received by the undersigned until Tuesday the 25th day of June, from persons desirous of leasing the privilege of ferrying across the Restigouche River between Campbellton, New Brunswick, and Cross point in the Province of Quebec, in accordance with the terms of the Order in Council of the 23rd March, 1872, and under the conditions therein established, which are as follow, viz :—

## REGULATIONS.

*1st.—Limits.*

The limits of the Ferry shall extend to a distance of three miles above and below the wharf at the village of Campbellton, in New Brunswick, and to a similar distance above and below the usual Ferry landing at Cross Point, in the Province of Quebec.

*2nd.—Landing Stages.*

Suitable landing stages or wharves serviceable at all states of the water in the River must be constructed on both sides subject to the approval of the Department of Inland Revenue.

*3rd.—Ferry Boat.*

During the first year after the execution of the lease, the lessee shall provide and maintain a vessel propelled either by steam or by oars, suitable for the conveyance of passengers, horses, cattle and all ordinary vehicles with safety and reasonable dispatch and such vessel shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Inland Revenue. After the lapse of one year the lessee shall, if required so to do by the Minister of Inland Revenue, place on the Ferry and maintain during the period of the lease a suitable vessel propelled by steam. Such vessel shall be of sufficient size for the safe conveyance of passengers, horses, cattle, vehicles and other effects, and shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Inland Revenue, and the lessee must obtain therefore and produce when required a certificate of fitness, safety and sufficiency from the Dominion Board of Steam Boat Inspectors.

*4th.—Number of Trips.*

During the season of navigation the Ferry Boat shall commence running daily—Sundays excepted—at six o'clock a. m. and shall continue to cross from each side every hour thereafter until eight o'clock p. m.

*5th.—Tarif of Charges.*

The maximum charges for Ferrying shall be as follows :—

For a two horse cart or conveyance with driver, each way.....	40 cts.
For a one horse cart or conveyance with driver, each way.....	30 cts.
For one horse, each way.....	10 cts.
For each head of horned cattle.....	10 cts.
For each head of sheep or swine, each way.....	5 cts.
For a passenger.....	5 cts.
For every 100 lbs of freight.....	3 cts.

*Sixth.*

The Ferry boat shall be placed on the route fully completed and equipped and the Landing Stages shall be fully constructed on or before 1st July, 1872.

*Seventh.*

The lease will be granted for a period of five years from the first day of July, 1872.

*Eighth.*

The Lessee will be required to give two sureties satisfactory to the Department of Inland Revenue,

who shall be held jointly and severally with the principal in the sum of \$2000 for the full compliance of the Lessee with the term of the Lease.

*Ninth.*

The right will be reserved to the Department of Inland Revenue of rejecting the Ferry Boat or Landing Stages or either of them should any of them be deemed unsuitable for the service, or unsafe to the public, or inadequate to meet the public wants. The right is also reserved to the Governor in Council to modify the maximum tariff should it be deemed expedient in the public interest to do so, and the Governor in Council may declare the lease forfeited and void whenever it shall be satisfactorily shewn that the Lessee fails to comply with the conditions thereof.

*Tenth.*

The Lessee of the Ferry shall at all times during the continuance of the lease carry over and across the Ferry without fee, toll or reward, all mail matter, militiamen, soldiers or sailors when provided with proper passports or under the charge of their proper officer or officers, and it shall be lawful for the said Lessee to commute the rate of passenger fees.

*Eleventh.*

A notice of the rates of Fares and Tolls to be charged for Ferrage shall be put in a conspicuous place near the Ferry landing on both sides and also on board the Steam Ferry Boat employed.

The proposals must state the amount which the party tendering is willing to pay per annum for the privilege referred to, which amount will be payable in advance, the terms of the lease being for five years from the 1st July, 1872.

To all to whom these Presents shall come, or whom the same may in anywise concern, GREETING :

## A PROCLAMATION.

JOHN A. MACDONALD,  
Attorney-General,  
Canada.

WHEREAS in and by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in the Session

thereof, holden in the thirty second and thirty third years of Our Reign, being chapter twenty-four, and intituled : "An Act for the better preservation of the peace in the vicinity of Public Works," it is, amongst other things in effect, enacted that our Governor General, in Council, may, as often as occasion requires, declare by Proclamation that, upon and after a day therein named, the said Act shall be in force in any place or places in Canada therein designated, within the limits, or in the vicinity whereof any Railway, Canal, or other Public Work is in progress of construction, or such places as are in the vicinity of any such Canal or Railway, or other work as aforesaid, within which he deems it necessary that the

said Act shall be in force and that the said Act shall, upon and after the day so to be named in any such Proclamation, take effect within the places designated in such Proclamation.

AND FURTHER that upon and after the day so to be fixed in such Proclamation and during such period as the said Proclamation may remain in force, no person shall, at any place within the limits specified in such Proclamation, barter, sell, exchange or dispose of, directly or indirectly, to any other person, any alcoholic, spirituous, vinous, fermented or other intoxicating liquor, or any mixed liquor, or part of which is spirituous or vinous, fermented or otherwise intoxicating, nor shall expose, keep or have in his possession for sale, barter, or exchange, any intoxicating liquor; but that the section of the said Act, now in recital, should not extend to any person selling intoxicating liquors, by wholesale, and not retailing the same if such person be a licensed Distiller or Brewer.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient that the hereinbefore, in part recited Act, as amended by a certain other Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in the thirty third year of Our Reign and intituled "An Act to amend an Act for the better preservation of the Peace in the vicinity of Public Works," should be, in so far as regards the sections hereinafter mentioned, be in force in the places and within the limits hereinafter designated and described.

NOW THEREFORE KNOW YE that WE by and with the advice and consent of our Privy Council for Canada, do hereby declare that, upon and after this twenty fifth day of May instant, the hereunder mentioned sections of the said Act intituled "An Act for the better preservation of the Peace in the vicinity of Public Works," that is to say: the eleventh, twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth, fifteenth, sixteenth, seventeenth, eighteenth, nineteenth, twentieth and twenty first sections thereof—shall be in force in the places in Canada and within the limits hereinafter designated and described, that is to say: in, over and along that certain portion of the line of "The Intercolonial Railway, now in progress of construction, known as "Section No. 10" and "Section No. 16" respectively, and for a distance of four miles from the said line of Railway, and the works thereof, on either side thereof; the said Sections of the said Railway commencing at the point at which the said the Intercolonial Railway crosses the Chaplin Island Road, near the Town of Newcastle, in the County of Northumberland, and extending Northerly along the line of the said Railway to the point of intersection thereof with the Napissiquet River, in the County of Gloucester: excepting, however, from the operation of this Our Royal Proclamation all that portion of the said Town of Newcastle which may be comprised within the said limit of four miles from the line of the said Railway.

Of all which Our loving subjects, and all others to whom these presents may come, or whom the same may, in any wise concern, are hereby required to take notice and to govern themselves accordingly.

A PROCLAMATION.

H. BERNARD, Deputy of the Minister of Justice, Canada. } WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Canada, passed in the Session thereof, held in the thirty-first year of Our Reign, intituled: "An Act, relating to Quarantine and Public Health," it is, amongst other things, in effect, ENACTED, that the Governor in Council may, from time to time, make such regulations as he thinks proper concerning, amongst other matters, the entry or departure of boats or vessels at the different ports or places in Canada, and concerning the landing of passengers or cargoes from such boats or vessels, or the receiving of cargoes or passengers on board the same, as may be thought best calculated to preserve the Public Health, and for ensuring the due performance of quarantine, by, and in respect of vessels, passengers, goods, or things, arriving at any port within Canada, to which he things it right for the preservation of the Public Health that such regulations should apply, and for the thorough cleansing, and disinfecting of such vessels, passengers, goods, or things, so as to prevent, as far as possible, the introduction or dissemination of diseases into, or in Canada, and may appoint or remove such officers as he may deem necessary for so doing, and assign to them, respectively, such powers as he may think required for carrying out the provisions of such regulations, and may, from time to time, revoke or amend the same, or any of them, and make others in their stead, and may impose penalties, forfeitures or punishments for the breach thereof; which regulations shall be notified, by Proclamation, published in the Canada Gazette, at least twice, and the production of the copies of the Gazette, containing any such Proclamation, shall be evidence of the making, date, and contents of such regulations. AND FURTHER, that such regulations shall have the force of law during the time they respectively remain unrevoked, unless they be expressly limited to be in force only during a certain time or at certain times or seasons, in which case they shall have the force of law during the time, and at the times and seasons during, or at, which they have been limited to be in force; and that any person disobeying any such Regulation may be prosecuted for a misdemeanor, punishable by fine or imprisonment, or both, as the Court may direct, or otherwise such person may be sued for the penalties contained in such regulation.

AND WHEREAS, by certain Regulations, amongst others, made by Our Governor General of Canada in Council, under, and in pursuance of the authority of the Act hereinabove in part recited, duly notified by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing date on the twenty-third day of May, in the thirty-first year of Our Reign and twice published in the CANADA GAZETTE, it was provided and declared, amongst other things, as follows: FIRST,—That all boats, ships, and other vessels, except the Canadian Mail Steamers, which henceforth, and during the eight months next following the first day of April in each and every year, shall arrive in the Port of Quebec, from any port or ports, place or places, in Europe or elsewhere out of Canada, by way of that part of the River St. Lawrence which is below Grosse Isle, and which shall have, at the time of their said arrival, or shall have had during their passage from the places where they respectively cleared, any person on board laboring under Asiatic Cholera, Fever, Small Pox, Scarlatina, or Measles, or other infectious and dangerous disease, or on board of which any person shall have died during such passage, or which, being of less tonnage than seven hundred tons measurement, shall have on board thirteen or more steerage passengers, or which, being

of greater tonnage than seven hundred tons measurement, shall have on board fifty or more steerage passengers, or which shall have come from some infected port, shall make their Quarantine at Grosse Isle, in the River St. Lawrence, and there remain and continue until such boats, ships or vessels shall be discharged from such Quarantine, by such license or passport and discharge, given without fee or emolument of any kind, as shall be directed or permitted by such order or orders as shall be made by the Governor, with the advice of the Privy Council, and until the said boats, ships and vessels shall respectively have performed such Quarantine, and shall be discharged therefrom by such license or passport and discharge as aforesaid, persons, goods, or merchandise which shall be on board such boats, ships, or vessels, shall not come or be brought on shore, or go or be put on board of any other ship or vessel in Canada, except on Grosse Isle aforesaid, when duly required, by competent authority. SECOND—That all boats, ships and vessels which henceforth, and during the eight months aforesaid, shall arrive at the Port of Quebec, from any port or ports in Europe, place or places, or elsewhere as aforesaid, of the class or description hereinbefore mentioned, as are liable and bound to make their Quarantine at Grosse Isle, do make their further Quarantine in the Harbour of Quebec, according to the regulations thereafter provided.

AND WHEREAS, OUR said Governor General in Council hath this day been pleased to make, under the authority, and in pursuance of the said above in part recited Act, a certain regulation in amendment of the said regulations above in part recited, which said regulation is in the words following, that is to say:—

The exception from Quarantine in favor of the Canadian Mail Steamers coming up the River St. Lawrence, which is established by the regulations now in force, under the "Quarantine and Health Act of 1868," and promulgated by Proclamation of the twenty-third day of May, A. D., 1868, is hereby suspended, and shall be of no effect whatever from this date until the first day of December next, or such earlier day as may be limited by any future Proclamation issued to that end: And all such steamers, from this date, until the first day of December next, or such earlier day, shall be held to be, and shall be, in all respects, subject to all the requirements and provisions of the said regulations, as though such exception had not therein been made in their favor, save only in so far as the same are expressly derogated from or modified hereby, as follows, that is to say: All such steamers, whenever a medical officer shall have been appointed to discharge that duty, may be by him boarded at Father Point, and inspected while *en route* for Quebec; and thereupon, in case it is found that they have not, and during their passage from the places where they respectively cleared, have not had, any person on board laboring under any infectious and dangerous disease, they may pass on without stopping to their destination,—and, in case it is found that they have, or during their passage from the places where they respectively cleared, have had, any person on board laboring under any infectious and dangerous disease, they shall make their Quarantine at Grosse Isle, or may pass on without stopping to their further Quarantine in the Harbor of Quebec, in the discretion of such medical officer,—and shall, in either of such last mentioned cases, make their further Quarantine in the Harbor of Quebec in such manner and for so long as the Inspecting Physician at Quebec may deem requisite,—and may, by such inspecting Physician, be ordered back to Grosse Isle if he shall deem that course requisite, in like manner as any other vessel may,—and whether so stopping at, or sent back to Grosse Isle, or not, may be so dealt with, as regards the landing of their mails, and otherwise, as the Medical Superintendent at Grosse Ile or such Inspecting Physician (as the case may be) shall, in his discretion direct.

NOW KNOW YE, THAT WE do hereby COMMAND and ENJOIN UPON ALL OUR loving subjects, that they do take notice of and obey the said regulation so this day made as aforesaid, and govern themselves accordingly.

Of all which our loving subjects, and all others whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

#### BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

Après quoi il a plu à Son Excellence le Gouverneur-Général clore la cinquième session du Premier Parlement de la Puissance par le

DISCOURS suivant :

*Honorables Messieurs du Sénat,*

*Messieurs de la Chambre des Communes :*

C'est avec beaucoup de plaisir que je vous décharge de vos travaux parlementaires, qui ne peuvent être qu'une source d'inconvénients pour plusieurs d'entre vous à cette époque de l'année. C'est pourquoi je vous remercie d'autant plus du temps et de l'attention que vous avez diligemment donnés à l'accomplissement de vos devoirs publics.

L'intérêt et l'importance des diverses questions qui ont été discutées et résolues, rendront la session mémorable dans les annales du pays.

Votre adhésion aux articles du traité de Washington affectant les intérêts canadiens a mis au grand jour votre détermination de suivre la fortune de l'Angleterre. La disposition généreuse que vous avez montrée dans ces circonstances critiques a renforcé la position honorable du Canada, à la fois, par rapport à l'empire Britannique et aux Etats-Unis.

Le vaste projet dont vous avez si sagement mûri les conditions pour construire un chemin de fer jusqu'aux rives du Pacifique, ouvrira à l'Angleterre, en temps de guerre comme en temps de paix, une nouvelle voie de communication avec l'Orient, et produira, je l'espère, les avantages les plus importants pour la Puissance en facilitant le trafic dans toutes les branches, en augmentant la valeur des terres publiques et en favorisant leur établissement, et en resserrant davantage les liens qui attachent les Sœurs Provinces ensemble par un accès plus facile et en multipliant les relations entre elles.

Bien peu de ceux qui n'ont pas soigneusement considéré le sujet, ont pu suffisamment concevoir l'étendue des avantages économiques découlant de la possession de grandes rivières navigables comme le St. Laurent et ses tributaires. 24. Il ne sera pas alloué un plus grand nombre d'officiers et de sous-officiers que le nombre autorisé pour former l'effectif des compagnies, troupes, bataillons ou corps de milice.

A l'exception des cas spéciaux où il aura été permis d'employer un plus grand nombre d'officiers et de soldats, la force des différents corps de milice active sera comme suit :

Dans chaque troupe de cavalerie, batterie d'artillerie de place, compagnie d'ingénieurs, ou de carabiniers ou d'infanterie—il y aura, suivant son service respectif, un capitaine, un lieutenant, un cornette, un 2nd lieutenant ou enseigne—3 sergents, 3 caporaux, 1 trompette ou clairon et pas plus de 48 soldats, si ce n'est dans le cas où un plus grand nombre de soldats aura été spécialement autorisé.

Dans chaque batterie d'artillerie de campagne il y aura un capitaine, deux premiers lieutenants, un second lieutenant, un sergent major, quatre sergents, quatre caporaux, quatre bombardiers, un trompette, un maréchal et 59 canoniers et conducteurs, y compris les hommes de roues, le bourrelier, et le maréchal ferrant; 51 chevaux, non compris les chevaux des officiers et quatre chevaux de rechange.

Les compagnies qui, à l'époque des exercices annuels au camp, seront trop faibles en nombre, seront considérées comme non effectives, et leur personnel sera attaché à d'autres compagnies ou corps.

Tous les officiers, n'appartenant point à l'état major permanent, à l'exception des officiers des vivres nommés pour faire le service temporairement dans l'état major des brigades et des divisions aux camps d'exercice, recevront, en sus de la solde quotidienne accordée d'après leurs grades respectifs, une allocation de deux piastres par jour avec rations pour eux et pour un cheval chacun, le temps qu'ils seront employés dans les camps d'exercice, et de plus une piastre par jour pour chaque cheval, pourvu que le cheval amené au camp soit propre au service, mais dans aucun cas, excepté sur autorisation spéciale, ils ne recevront pas plus que seize jours de solde et d'allocation.

Les officiers des vivres, aux camps d'exercice quelque soient leurs grades, recevront une somme de \$5 par jour tout le temps qu'ils seront employés comme tels, avec rations pour eux et pour un cheval chacun, ce qui devra couvrir toutes les réclamations qu'ils pourraient faire pour solde et allocations.

Les officiers de l'état-major permanent de la milice, lorsqu'ils occuperont un poste *per interim* aux exercices annuels en campement, recevront une allocation de deux piastres par jour avec rations pour eux et pour un cheval chacun, et aussi l'allocation accordée pour les chevaux employés au camp, mais leur salaire ordinaire ne sera pas augmenté.

Les sous-officiers nommés pour faire le service de sergents d'état-major aux différents camps d'exercice recevront, en sus de la solde relative à leurs grades dans les corps de milice auxquels ils appartiennent, 20 cents par jour avec rations à compter du jour où ils auront été mis en devoir jusqu'à celui où ils auront été déchargés.

25. Dans le cas où des corps de milice auront reçu ordre de faire leurs exercices annuels à leurs quartiers généraux, de la manière et à l'époque qui leur conviendraient le mieux, les officiers et les hommes ne recevront que la paie autorisée pour les exercices, tel que pourvu par les Règlements de 1870-71 relatifs aux corps de milice qui font leurs exercices annuels à leurs quartiers généraux; et il ne leur sera fourni aucune ration.

#### RATIONS.

Les tentes, les couvertes, le bois pour la cuisine, seront fournis à tous les corps qui fréquenteront les camps organisés pour les seize jours continus d'exercices et de manœuvre.

Il sera alloué une piastre par jour, comme allocation pour chevaux, aux officiers de l'état-major et

aux officiers à cheval de l'infanterie, de même qu'aux officiers, sous-officiers et soldats des corps à cheval, pour un cheval chacun, et aussi pour chaque cheval attaché aux batteries d'artillerie de campagne, mais cette allocation ne sera accordée seulement que pour le jour ou les jours où ces chevaux auront été requis, avec certificat qu'ils ont été nécessaires et réellement présents aux exercices à aucun des camps. Le fourrage pour ces chevaux sera aussi fourni, aux camps organisés pour les seize jours continus d'exercice, de l'espèce et en quantité comme suit: 10 livres d'avoine et 18 livres de foin.

27. Chaque troupe, compagnie ou corps, qui assistera aux camps de brigade apportera avec lui ses marmites, sa ferblanterie ou ustensiles de cuisine, et pour ces articles, il sera accordée une allocation de \$6 pour chaque troupe ou compagnie qui aura réellement fait l'exercice en campement; cette somme pourra être portée à la fin du rôle des reçus avec certificat de l'officier commandant, au bas du rôle, que ces articles ont été fournis par la troupe, la compagnie ou le corps; et à la levée du camp, les quartiers-maîtres de bataillons ou les officiers commandants des corps prendront la charge ou le soin des marmites du camp.

28. Le jour du rassemblement, les officiers d'état-major assisteront à l'arrivée des différents corps au lieu du campement, pour leur montrer où et comment ils devront camper; ce qui devra se faire conformément au plan prescrit dans les paragraphes 230 à 250 des "Règlements et Ordres pour la milice active," en autant que le pourront permettre les circonstances et la nature du terrain. Chaque corps, à son arrivée, remettra immédiatement aux officiers d'état-major un état ou retour de route.

29. Les équipages de camp seront délivrés aux camps de division, sous la surveillance de l'assistant quartier-maître de la division: aux camps de brigade, par le quartier-maître de camp; ces officiers, à la levée du camp reprendront ces articles de tous les corps, et tout dommage fait aux articles de camp ou la perte d'aucun d'eux, sera estimé et la valeur déduite de la solde des hommes avant que le corps laisse le camp.

Les officiers commandant des troupes, des compagnies et des corps auront soin tout particulièrement de faire connaître cela à tous ceux qui seront sous leur commandement.

30. Tous les corps d'infanterie devront passer quatorze jours complets en campement: à ces corps il sera alloué une journée pour se rendre au camp, et une autre journée pour en revenir, ce qui fera en tout une période de seize jours, durant laquelle tous les officiers, sous-officiers et soldats seront gouvernés par les règles militaires et sujets aux règlements de la Reine et aux articles de guerre, tel que défini par l'acte de milice de la Puissance.

#### TRANSPORT.

31. Les arrangements locaux pour le transport de tous les corps, soit pour se rendre aux camps d'exercice soit pour en revenir par chemin de fer ou bateau à vapeur, se feront par les députés adjudants généraux qui commandent les districts militaires. Le transport des corps de milice devra se faire sur les lignes des compagnies de chemin de fer et de bateau à vapeur dont les soumissions pour ce service, auront été approuvées aux quartiers généraux.

32. Comme les compagnies ou corps qui résident le long des lignes de chemin de fer ou sur la route de bateaux à vapeur, devront passer par ces lignes ou routes en se rendant aux camps ou en revenant, les comptes se trouveraient beaucoup simplifiés si les maîtres ou agents à ces stations, consentaient à passer les officiers et les hommes sur un ordre écrit du capitaine de la compagnie ou de l'officier commandant le bataillon ou le corps. Après la levée du camp, le député adjudant général devra remplacer ces ordres écrits par des réquisitions spéciales, à l'effet de couvrir ces dépenses, et qu'il enverra avec son compte comme pièce justificatives;

33. Les comptes pour transport dans tout district devront être d'abord envoyés au député adjudant général du district pour être examinés et certifiés, avant d'être transmis aux quartiers généraux pour paiement.

Dans le cas où la même compagnie de chemin de fer ou de bateau à vapeur transportera les troupes de différents districts militaires, le compte pour ce transport devra être fait séparément pour chaque district militaire afin d'en rendre plus aisé l'examen.

Tout transport devra être porté dans le compte à tant par mille, au taux spécifié dans le contrat, et le compte devra comporter une colonne où sera mentionné le nombre de milles parcourus par chaque personne.

34. Lorsque tout le voyage ne peut pas se faire par chemin de fer ou par eau et que la distance au camp est plus de trois milles, il sera alloué pour le transport, six cents pour chaque officier et trois cents pour chaque sous-officier et soldat par mille nécessairement parcouru pour se rendre au camp et en revenir, ce montant devra être ajouté sur le bordereau de la compagnie et payé au capitaine avant de laisser le camp.

35. Les officiers commandant des compagnies ou corps d'infanterie devront avoir soin et exiger que chaque homme se munisse lui-même, avant son départ, d'une quantité de rations cuites, suffisante pour le jour ou les jours passés à se rendre au camp, et pour cela les officiers et les hommes recevront chacun la somme de 25 cents par jour pour le temps qu'ils auront mis à se rendre au camp.

36. Autant que les circonstances le permettront, les compagnies et les bataillons d'infanterie dont les quartiers généraux ne sont pas à plus d'une journée de marche du camp d'exercice devraient tâcher de faire le trajet à pied, aller et revenir—quinze ou seize milles sont considérés comme une journée de marche pour un corps d'infanterie.

37. Les troupes de cavalerie et les batteries d'artillerie de campagne dont les quartiers généraux sont à deux ou trois jours de marche du camp d'exercice du district, devraient pareillement s'efforcer de faire cette marche, aller et revenir; pour cela il sera alloué une piastre par jour pour chaque homme, le temps que l'on mettra à se rendre au camp et en revenir. Cette somme devra couvrir toutes dépenses le long de la route pour la subsistance et le logement des hommes et des chevaux. Dans ces cas aucune allocation au lieu de transport ne sera accordée.

38. Pendant les grandes chaleurs, les officiers commandants des corps, auront soin de profiter des heures du matin et du soir pour le temps de la marche, et de choisir, pour faire halte sur le haut du jour, des endroits à l'ombre.

#### UNIFORME ET EQUIPEMENT.

39. Les officiers, pendant qu'ils fréquenteront les camps d'exercice, seront tenus seulement de porter la petite tenue de leurs corps de milice respectifs.

40. Les officiers et les hommes à cheval devront amener avec eux, aux camps, des chevaux d'une description convenable.

41. Les officiers commandant des corps devront voir à ce que les hommes sous leur commandement, soient munis de tout ce qui leur sera nécessaire pour les seize jours qu'ils seront en service. Chaque homme devra venir au camp en tenue de route, pourvu d'une capote, d'une rechange de chemise et de chaussons, d'une assiette de fer blanc, d'un gobelet, d'un bidon, d'un havresac, d'un couteau, d'une serviette, savon, etc.; et les cheveux devront, avant l'arrivée au camp, avoir été coupés militairement.

42. Les officiers qui commandent des corps d'infanterie, prendront tout particulièrement soin de voir à ce que les hommes soient pourvus de bottes convenables pour la marche, et ces bottes devront avoir la semelle large, le talon bas et leur faire aisément. Les officiers et les hommes pourront avoir pour leur bonnet de police (*forage caps*) une couverture blanche à la discrétion des commandants des corps, pourvu cependant qu'il y ait uniformité dans le corps où cela sera en usage.



43. Les officiers commandant des corps d'infanterie seront tenus responsables de voir à ce que chaque compagnie emporte avec elle au camp, les ustensiles nécessaires de cuisine, de même qu'une bêche, une pioche à deux pointes, une hache, et pour chaque dix hommes un sceau et un bassin.

RÈGLEMENTS CONCERNANT LA PAIE POUR LA  
CONDUITE DES BATAILLONS.

44. Chaque bataillon et bataillon provisoire sera pourvu d'un payeur régulièrement nommé ou officier tenant lieu de payeur, lequel sera responsable de l'exécution correcte et ponctuelle des devoirs qui lui seront prescrits.

45. Dès que les corps de milice seront rassemblés dans le camp, les payeurs de bataillon prépareront fidèlement un rôle nominal et numérique des officiers, sous-officiers et soldats de leur corps, avec une colonne de remarques pour y noter lorsqu'un homme est devenu inefficace. Une copie de ce rôle, avec un extrait montrant la force actuelle du corps ou bataillon qui est dans le camp, doivent être envoyés, par l'entremise de l'officier commandant, au payeur du district, accompagnés d'une estimation—sur des blancs qui seront fournis—du montant d'argent requis pour le temps des exercices.

46. Il sera aussi du devoir des payeurs de bataillon de voir à ce que les rôles de reçus que leur remettront les capitaines de compagnie soient dûment signés et portent la véritable signature de chaque homme de la milice active. Les officiers, sous-officiers et soldats de la milice active seront payés seulement pour le jour ou les jours où ils auront réellement été présents, et en devoir avec leur corps dans le camp.

47. Les officiers commandants des corps et les payeurs seront tenus responsables du complètement des rôles de reçus, ainsi que des comptes pour les marmites de camp et l'allocation spéciale pour transport, lesquels devront être autorisés, dûment signés et examinés au moins deux jours avant la levée du camp.

48. Le paiement pour les exercices annuels sera fait aux capitaines des compagnies, en la présence du payeur du bataillon, par le payeur du district qui sera présent au camp, avec l'argent, au moins une journée avant la levée du camp; par ce moyen les hommes pourront être payés et soldés avant de s'en retourner.

49. Tous les officiers, sous-officiers et soldats seront payés avant de laisser le camp, et les sous-officiers et soldats qui auront gagné des prix donnés en argent par le gouvernement, pourront pareillement et en même temps être payés, sur le certificat de l'instructeur de mousqueterie, contre-signé par l'officier commandant du corps, et approuvé par l'officier commandant du camp.

50. Personne, sous aucun prétexte, ne pourra recevoir la solde d'officier, si elle n'a pas été régulièrement gazettée comme officier, et nommée pour faire le service dans un bataillon ou corps ou dans l'état-major de la milice; et personne aussi ne pourra recevoir la solde du sous-officier ou du soldat à moins d'avoir été régulièrement enrôlée dans un corps de la milice active, et avoir son nom entré sur le rôle de service de tel corps. Aucune paie ne sera accordée pour un grade titulaire quel qu'il soit.

51. Toute dépense ayant rapport aux camps, en dehors de celles pourvues pour les services mentionnés ici, ne pourra être sanctionnée à moins d'en avoir obtenu autorité d'avance.

52. Pendant les exercices annuels, il y aura une parade-revue de chaque corps et de chaque bataillon de la milice active, en présence du député adjudant général ou de l'officier commandant du district, et du payeur du district, à laquelle seront présents tous les officiers, sous-officiers et soldats ainsi que les chevaux appartenant au corps de milice. Les officiers commandant des troupes de cavalerie ou des batteries apporteront avec eux à cette parade, les rôles de service de leurs compagnies. Le payeur régimentaire fera l'appel du corps en revue, et les rôles de service des troupes, batteries et compagnies seront vérifiés, en même temps par le payeur du district en présence

du député adjudant général ou de l'officier commandant le district.

Ne seront payés que les officiers, sous-officiers, soldats et chevaux qui auront été présents à cette parade-revue ou qui se trouvaient en devoir au temps de l'appel.

Les officiers et les sergents d'état-major nommés pour faire temporairement le service dans l'état-major aux camps d'exercice, seront passés en revue et payés d'après un bordereau à part par le payeur du district.

RÈGLEMENTS POUR LES APPROVISIONNEMENTS.

53. Dès que la formation d'un camp d'exercice aura été autorisée en vertu des règlements ci-dessus, le député adjudant-général du district, où doit se former ce camp de brigade, demandera des soumissions de la part des marchands de la localité par un avis inséré dans un journal du lieu, et en faisant poser des affiches, avant la date du rassemblement dans le camp pour fournir les vivres, le bois, le fourrage et la paille, nécessaires pour tout le temps du campement. Les soumissions pour l'approvisionnement du ministre de la milice et de la défense, devront être envoyées sur des formules, avec les conditions y imprimées, telles que fournies par le département—l'avis et les affiches devront comporter le nom d'une personne bien connue dans la localité où doit être établi le camp, afin que ceux qui désirent faire des soumissions puissent s'adresser à cette personne pour en obtenir les blancs ou formules dont ils auront besoin.

54. Avant le rassemblement des corps dans le camp, il sera nommé un officier des vivres qui sera sous la direction immédiate des officiers commandant le camp, et qui sera chargé de recevoir les approvisionnements des différents contracteurs, de voir à ce que les effets soient strictement conformes à ceux mentionnés dans le contrat, et, lorsqu'il les aura approuvés, il les délivrera, sur réquisitions ou rapports pour rations, aux divers corps dans le camp qui ont droit de les recevoir. Immédiatement après la levée du camp, il devra préparer ses comptes pour tout ce qu'il aura reçu et délivré, et certifiera les comptes des contracteurs en conséquence,—il devra aussi envoyer par l'entremise de l'officier commandant le camp, pour le payeur du district, un extrait des effets reçus et délivrés avec l'original des rapports et réquisitions pour rations comme pièces justificatives pour le paiement des comptes.

55. Les retours pour les rations nécessaires aux différents corps se feront tous les jours, sur des formules ou blancs fournis par le département.

56. L'officier commandant d'aucun corps n'aura pas droit de se faire donner plus de rations que ce qu'il lui en faudra pour l'espace d'une journée pour ses officiers, sous-officiers et soldats présents alors dans le camp.

57. L'officier commandant le camp enverra à l'officier des vivres, sa réquisition pour les rations nécessaires à l'état-major de la brigade faisant le service dans le camp.

58. La quantité des rations journalières pour les bataillons se demandera en gros, et sera reçue de même de l'officier chargé de la distribution—la distribution des rations aux compagnies sera faite par le quartier-maître du bataillon.

59. Les troupes, les batteries et les compagnies suivront la même formalité, et les rapports pour rations fournis au quartier-maître par les différentes compagnies en bataillon, serviront de base pour sa demande à l'officier de distribution pour les rations en gros, nécessaires au bataillon pendant la journée. L'exactitude de ces rapports No. 176, pourra être vérifiée sur l'état de parade journalier No. 164, du corps ou du bataillon, et si un corps se faisait donner plus de ration qu'il ne lui en faut, il lui en serait tenu compte.

La qualité des approvisionnements, et les conditions pour leur réception dans le camp, leur inspection, leur distribution et leur paiement seront comme ci-après, savoir :

## VIANDE.

60. Elle sera de bœuf ou de jeune vache, de mouton ou d'agneau, le tout de bonne viande marchande de la meilleure qualité, bien engraisée et tuée avec soin au moins 12 heures avant livraison. Le bœuf sera fourni en proportions égales de quartiers de devant et de derrière ; les têtes, les cous, les morceaux de rebus, la jambe à quatre pouces au-dessus du genou, et le bout du jarret sont exclus, et aucune portion du suif ne devra être retranché. Tout quartier de bœuf devra peser au moins 100 livres. Les carcasses de mouton devront peser au moins 32 livres.

61. Le contracteur livrera à ses propres frais le bœuf ci-dessus mentionné au dépôt des vivres dans le camp pour y être inspecté, et aux heures qui lui seront fixées par l'officier à qui il appartient. Les livraisons se feront pour chaque semaine dans la proportion suivante ; bœuf pour cinq jours et mouton pour deux jours.

62. Le contracteur devra, sous la direction de l'officier proposé à la livraison des rations, couper la viande par morceaux et de la grosseur voulue, et aussi fournir des balances convenables sans rémunération extra.

63. Comme il ne sera pas payé plus de livres de viande que ce qu'il en faudra pour la force en campement, tout surplus que pourra avoir livré le contracteur au-dessus de qui sera nécessaire pour tel ou tel jour, doit rester à la charge du contracteur.

## PAIN.

64. Le pain devra être bon et fait de farine de la meilleure qualité, appelée superfine inspectée, de blé, avec levure d'houblon pur et de malt ; on le fera cuire sur des tuiles ou briques, sans casseroles ou moules, chaque pain devra peser deux livres. Il ne devra être livré que 12 heures après sa sortie du four, et devra se conserver bon pendant 24 heures ensuite.

65. Le contracteur livrera son pain à ses propres frais, au dépôt du camp, d'après les ordres de l'officier des vivres, et aux heures qui lui seront fixées.

## POMMES DE TERRE.

66. Les pommes de terre devront être d'une bonne grosseur, saines, et de 60 livres au minot.

## ORGE PERLÉ.

L'orge perlé devra être bon et de la qualité des échantillons fournis par le contracteur dans sa soumission pour approvisionnements, et sera livré au dépôt de livraison du camp en paquets du poids que jugera à propos d'ordonner l'officier des vivres.

## FROMAGE.

Le fromage devra être bon et de la qualité des échantillons fournis par le contracteur dans sa soumission, et déposé au dépôt de livraison du camp comme l'article ci-dessus.

## CAFÉ.

67. Le café devra être pur, rôti et moulu, suivant les échantillons fournis par le contracteur dans sa soumission pour cet objet, et sera livré au dépôt de livraison du camp en paquets du poids que jugera à propos d'ordonner l'officier des vivres.

## THÉ.

68. Le thé devra être bon et de même qualité que les échantillons présentés par le contracteur dans sa soumission pour cet article, et sera livré au dépôt de livraison dans le camp, en paquets du poids que jugera à propos d'ordonner l'officier des vivres.

## SUCRE.

69. Le sucre devra être du sucre brillant de Muscovado, de bonne qualité, conformément à l'échantillon soumis, et sans aucun mélange, livré en paquets d'après les mêmes règlements que pour le café et le thé.

## SEL ET POIVRE.

70. Le sel devra être du gros sel ordinaire de table ; le poivre, noir, moulu et sans aucun mélange, le tout livré en paquets, tel que voulu pour le café, le thé et le sucre.

## BOIS DE CHAUFFAGE.

71. Le bois de chauffage devra être de bonne qualité, sain, sec et fendu d'une manière raisonnable, il devra aussi avoir été coupé pendant l'hiver précédant sa livraison. Les grosses buches avec des nœuds projetés, ou tortueuses, les bois de grève ou tout autre bois qui paraîtra avoir séjourné dans l'eau, ne seront pas reçus.

72. Les contracteurs livreront le bois au camp au temps qui leur sera fixé, et le pileront d'une corde de haut pour être examiné et mesuré.

73. La ration de bois de chauffage pour livraison consistera en un ponce, mesure courante. Pour l'ordinaire des officiers (mess), au nombre de 8 ou plus, 12 rations par jour. Pour l'ordinaire des officiers, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$  ration chacun par jour. Les sous-officiers et soldats, allocation par la cuisine, le  $\frac{1}{4}$  d'une ration, chacun, ou une ration pour 7 hommes.

## FOURRAGE.

74. Le fourrage devra être de la meilleure qualité, sec et net. L'avoine ne devra pas peser moins de 36 livres, par minot ou 34 livres par boisseau. Le foin devra être net et bon, sans chardons ni mauvaises herbes.

75. Le contracteur livrera le fourrage à ses propres frais, au dépôt de fourrage dans le camp, et au temps qui lui sera fixé par l'officier des vivres. Il y maintiendra en réserve une quantité égale de fourrage à ce qu'il en faudra pour la dépense des chevaux dans le camp pendant une semaine. A ce dépôt, il devra aussi garder un agent pour livrer, sur des chèques ou ordres de l'officier des vivres, le fourrage lors qu'il en sera nécessaire.

76. Le fourrage sera calculé et livré par rations qui consisteront en 10 livres d'avoine et 18 livres de foin. Le fourrage extra, dont on pourra avoir besoin, en sus des rations, sera calculé par 100 livres. Chaque ration de foin devra être liée en bottes séparées lors de la livraison par le contracteur.

77. Le contracteur, lorsque requis par l'officier des vivres, fournira du son au lieu d'avoine, dans la proportion de 14 livres de son pour une ration d'avoine ; mais il ne sera pas donné plus d'une ration de son par semaine à chaque cheval, excepté pour les chevaux malades pour lesquels le contracteur, lorsque requis de le faire, fournira des rations de son tous les jours.

## PAILLE SI ON EN A BESOIN.

78. La paille devra être celle d'avoine, bien nette, sèche et sans chardons ni mauvaises herbes. Elle devra être livrée en bottes de 12 livres chacune, au dépôt du camp en telle quantité et lorsqu'on la demandera.

79. La livraison de la paille aux différents corps sous les tentes dépendra de l'officier commandant le camp, et sera fournie sur son certificat.

80. Lorsque l'ordre aura été donné de livrer la paille, elle le sera d'après l'échelle suivante, et cette quantité ne devra pas être outre passée :—12 livres pour chaque homme, ce qui est jugé suffisant pour tous le temps du campement, soit que l'on s'en serve à son état normal ou qu'on la convertisse en nattes. Lorsque les troupes se serviront de paille, on ne devra pas la laissée libre dans le fond de la tente, mais on devra en faire des nattes. Ces nattes de paille se font de la manière suivantes : on file la paille en cordes, puis on plante dans la terre deux rangées de chevilles de tente parallèles l'une de l'autre à deux pieds de distance, on étend la corde de paille sur les chevilles d'une à l'autre, puis on entrelace d'autres cordes de manière à former un tissu, et en très peu de temps on se fait ainsi une natte. Chaque homme doit avoir deux nattes, une pour la tête et les épaules et l'autre pour les pieds. Quatre hommes peuvent dans une journée faire les nattes nécessaire à toute une tente ; deux occuper à filer la paille et les deux autres à tisser les cordes.

81. Il ne sera pas accordé de paille pour les tentes munies d'un plancher, et ces tentes ne seront délivrées qu'aux corps campés dans les environs du magasin du district, pourvu cependant qu'il y en ait de disponibles.

82. Il ne sera pas fourni de pailles aux corps qui ont de tentes.

#### CONDITIONS A OBSERVER.

83. Si un contracteur manquait de livrer au temps et au lieu désignés quelques-uns des approvisionnements requis dans le camp et pour lesquels il aurait pris un contrat, l'officier des vivres sous la direction de l'officier commandant, achètera immédiatement les provisions qui pourraient manquer, et si elles lui coûtaient plus cher que le prix auquel elles avaient été contractées, l'excédant serait déduit de l'argent qui pourrait être dû à ce contracteur.

L'officier commandant pourra, lorsqu'il le jugera à propos, nommer un bureau pour inspecter un article quelconque offert par un contracteur, et si le bureau est d'opinion que cet article n'est pas de la qualité spécifiée dans le contrat, il sera rejeté, et l'officier des vivres, sous la direction de l'officier commandant, achètera, sans en appeler ailleurs, l'article nécessaire pour remplacer celui qui aura été rejeté, lequel sera payé tel que pourvu dans le paragraphe plus haut.

La valeur des divers articles fournis par contrat, sera payée par le département de la milice et de la défense, par l'entremise du payeur du district, lorsque le contrat aura été rempli. Les comptes en double doivent être faits sur les formules prescrites, et les reçus de l'officier qui reçoit l'argent doivent y être attachés comme pièces justificatives.

Les contracteurs ne seront payés que pour la quantité de rations réellement délivrées aux différents corps dans le camp, pour lesquelles ils auront pris un contrat.

#### RÈGLEMENTS MÉDICAUX.

85. Les arrangements médicaux pour chaque bataillon et corps de milice seront réglés régimentairement par le plus ancien officier de santé du district, lequel agira comme premier officier de santé du camp d'exercice de division. Une pharmacie portative, contenant toutes les médecines nécessaires, etc., sera fournie par le gouvernement à chaque bataillon d'infanterie, batterie d'artillerie de campagne, et chaque régiment de cavalerie. A la levée du camp, ces pharmacies portatives seront remises dans le magasin du district militaire et les médecines, etc., qui auraient été dépensées, seront remplacées afin qu'elles puissent être en état de servir en tout temps pour le service actif.

86. Dans les camps d'exercice de brigade ou de bataillon, les arrangements médicaux se feront régimentairement sous la direction de l'officier de santé de chaque bataillon ou corps.

87. Autant que possible les officiers, sous-officiers et les soldats passeront une inspection médicale avant de laisser les quartiers généraux de leur corps ou compagnie, et lorsque l'on aura pas été capable de le faire avant, ils devront passer cette inspection dès que le corps ou bataillon aura été concentré.

88. Cette inspection est exigée en vue de s'assurer, 1o. Si l'homme souffre alors de quelque maladie, tel que rhumatisme, maladie de poumon ou de cœur, de quelques viscères de l'abdomen, ou autre sorte de maladie syphilitique; s'il a la vue courte; s'il a quelque jointure affectée; s'il a les pieds formés de manière à le gêner dans la marche; 2o Si l'homme a quelque prédisposition à quelqu'une des maladies ci-dessus, ou en a récemment souffert, enfin s'il y a chez lui quelque chose qui le rende impropre au service militaire.

89. S'il se trouve des hommes qui soient affectés tel que ci-dessus, on ne devra pas leur permettre d'aller au camp, non plus que d'y demeurer, tant pour leur propre bien que pour prévenir toute réclamation de compensation pour cause de maladie.

90. Les officiers de santé, de bataillon ou de corps de milice, examineront, aussitôt qu'ils le pourront, leurs sous-officiers et soldats afin de s'assurer s'ils ont eu la petite vérole, ou s'ils ont été vaccinés; et vaccineront, aussitôt que possible, ceux qui n'auront pas eu cette maladie ou qui n'auront pas été vaccinés déjà.

91. Le médecin de chaque corps ou bataillon fera tous les matins un rapport de santé dont il transmettra copie à l'officier commandant le bataillon; et s'il est attaché à une division, il en transmettra aussi une copie au premier officier de santé de la division; de plus il inspectera tous les prisonniers avant qu'ils soient amenés devant le commandant (formule de rapport de santé, A.)

92. Le chirurgien de chaque bataillon gardera un registre des admissions et des décharges de tous ceux envoyés à l'hôpital, d'après la formule B.

93. Chaque chirurgien donnera un reçu pour tous les articles médicaux qui lui seront délivrés pour l'usage de son corps de milice, et sera responsable de l'emploi de ces articles. Lorsqu'il sera relevé de son office, il remettra dans les magasins du district toutes les médecines et les effets s'y rattachant qui n'auront pas été dépensés, en même temps qu'une liste de ce qu'il aura dépensé, et pour ce, son reçu lui sera remis.

94. Tous les jours un médecin sera envoyé en devoir dans le camp, comme officier de santé du jour. Cet officier restera dans le camp pendant son tour de service; un autre sera envoyé aussi tous les jours au lieu du tir à la cible, et y restera présent tout le temps de la pratique. A l'exception de ceux détachés pour les services ci-dessus, tous les officiers de santé accompagneront leurs corps les jours de parade ou de sortie en brigade.

95. Le vin ou toute autre boisson spiritueuse qui pourra être prescrite, en cas de maladie, devra être payée par la personne qui s'en servira. Les officiers voudront bien porter une attention toute spéciale aux paragraphes 138, 140 et 141 des Ordres et Règlement pour la milice active.

96. Les officiers de santé ne devront faire, pour le compte du gouvernement, aucune dépense sans en avoir auparavant obtenu la permission.

97. Les officiers de santé auront soin de garder une liste des noms de tous les soldats et officiers auxquels ils auront donné des médecines, ou des avis pendant les seize jours d'exercices, conformément à la formule A. page 54 des règlements pour la milice active, mentionnant les médecines administrées dans chaque cas. A la levée du camp, ils devront transmettre une copie de cette liste aux quartiers-généraux, et en même temps une liste des médecines qu'ils auront dépensées.

98. Dans les cas de maladie ou d'accidents sérieux, l'officier de santé, conjointement avec l'officier commandant du corps de milice prendront tous les arrangements immédiats qui pourront être nécessaires, soit qu'ils envoient immédiatement le patient chez lui si c'est possible, ou au plus proche hôpital, et feront sans délai un rapport minutieux, de toutes les circonstances ayant trait au cas, et l'enverront aux quartiers généraux. Toutes les semaines l'officier de santé préparera un rapport de l'état de ses patients, et l'enverra aux quartiers généraux par l'entremise de l'officier commandant.

99. L'officier de santé du jour visitera le camp et ses alentours, les tentes de corps de garde, la cuisine,

les lieux d'aisance, etc., et fera rapport à l'officier commandant du camp de toute malpropreté ou place malsaine qu'il aura pu remarquer.

#### CHOIX DU SITE POUR CAMPEMENT.

100. Ci suivent les principes qui ont surtout conduit à l'adoption des formes de campement militaire qui doivent prévaloir dans la disposition d'un camp, quelque soit la manière dont sont campées les troupes.

1o. Le front du campement doit correspondre en étendue avec celui occupé par la force déployée en ligne.

2o. Les tentes doivent être déposées de manière à permettre de circuler librement à travers le camp, et sur le front du camp garder un grand espace.

3o. Les tentes, bivouacs ou cabanes doivent être disposés avec symétrie et de manière à faciliter le plus possible la ventilation, la propreté et la salubrité.

4o. Le camp doit être arrangé dans un espace aussi compacte que puissent le permettre les considérations ci-dessus.

101. Les tentes de bataillon ne doivent jamais être plantées sur une double ligne; les lignes courtes et simples sont préférables. Les tentes en ligne devront être séparées l'une de l'autre par un espace égal au moins à une fois et demie le diamètre d'une tente; et plus les lignes pourront être convenablement placées loin l'une de l'autre, le mieux ce sera. Lorsque les troupes sont éloignées de l'ennemi, et qu'elles doivent passer quelque temps campées, les camps peuvent être formés à doubles intervalles si le terrain le permet.

102. Lorsque les troupes demeurent dans un camp plus que trois jours, les tentes doivent être levées tous les deux jours. Toutes les armes, la paille et les couvertes doivent être enlevées du lieu couvert par la tente, et le terrain doit être bien nettoyé, soit avec un balai ou des branches d'arbre et laissé exposé au soleil et au vent. Les couvertes et les habillements, etc., doivent être étendus à l'air et les tentes dressées imparfaitement dans les intervalles du camp, laissant les couverts et le volant libres au vent. Les tentes ne doivent jamais être dressées dans les intervalles. Les hommes durant la nuit, invariablement urinent près de la tente et gâtent le terrain.

103. Lorsque les troupes demeurent plus qu'une nuit campées, les volants des tentes doivent être d'abord roulés tous les matins. Dans les temps pluvieux le volant peut toujours être roulé du côté de la tente dessous le vent.

104. Comme règle générale, la porte des tentes doit faire face à la tête de la colonne, mais cette règle ne doit pas intervenir lorsque la porte se trouverait à recevoir le vent de front.

105. Des tranchées doivent être pratiquées autour des tentes, et des égouts doivent communiquer avec ces tranchées afin que l'eau n'y séjourne pas, et s'en écoule facilement. La première journée de pluie après l'établissement du camp, les officiers commandant des compagnies, examineront eux-mêmes le terrain où sont campées leurs compagnies, et verront à ce que les égouts soient convenablement faits. Une demi heure d'ouvrage, dans un jour pluvieux, lorsque le cours naturel de l'eau est facile à voir, fera plus pour tenir le camp dans un état de salubrité, que ne le ferait une journée d'ouvrage dans un temps sec.

106. Lorsqu'il s'agit de faire camper un corps considérable de troupes, il serait très à propos qu'un dessin quelque grossier qu'il soit, du lieu que doit occuper chaque corps, fut préparé d'avance; par ce moyen l'officier chargé de l'érection du campement, peut en quelques minutes placer tous les porte-étendards et faire en sorte que les régiments, à leur arrivée, puissent immédiatement se rendre chacun à la place qui lui est assignée. La cavalerie et l'artillerie ne doivent jamais être placées sur le flanc, à moins que cette dernière n'y soit nécessaire pour des fins de défense; dans ce cas, les canons doivent être protégés par une forte garde d'infanterie. La raison pour cela, c'est que dans un cas d'attaque, les corps à cheval prennent plus de temps pour se mettre sur pied et que les chevaux, s'ils sont effrayés, peuvent jeter la confusion parmi les troupes.

107. Le dépôt du *commissariat* doit être placé dans un lieu central, ayant un accès facile pour toutes les parties du camp et près d'un bon chemin pour pouvoir y porter commodément les provisions. Les ingénieurs doivent généralement camper auprès des quartiers généraux de la division.

#### APPROVISIONNEMENT DE L'EAU.

108. Il y a peu de chose qui soit d'une plus grande importance pour les troupes campées, que l'eau fournie en quantité et pure.

109. On se procure ordinairement l'eau des courants, des réservoirs ou des puits. Lorsque les troupes sont campées pour un temps assez considérable, ou que des dépôts stationnaires sont formés sur la ligne des communications, il peut être nécessaire de creuser des puits, de faire des réservoirs, et de poser des tuyaux.

110. Quelque soit la source, d'où l'on puise l'eau, il est d'une nécessité absolue qu'elle ne soit pas souillée. L'officier chargé de la formation du campement posera en conséquence, près de cet endroit, des sentinelles qu'il prendra parmi les premières troupes qui arriveront. Lorsque le camp sera complètement formé, une garde régulière devra être postée pour la surveillance de l'approvisionnement de l'eau. Si l'on prend l'eau d'un courant, on aura soin que l'endroit où on la puisera pour les hommes soit distinct de celui pour les animaux; ce dernier doit être au dessous de l'autre, et il serait à propos d'envoyer une patrouille au dessus de cet endroit pour empêcher les hommes de s'y laver ou de s'y baigner.

111. Tout lavage, dans les environs d'un puits ou d'un endroit où l'on prend l'eau pour boire, est strictement défendu parce que les eaux sales s'infiltreraient à travers le sol.

112. Si le courant à un fond vaseux on aura soin de ne pas remuer la vase en plongeant les seaux dans l'eau; dans ce cas, des petites pompes, qui doivent former partie de l'équipement des ingénieurs, peuvent y être fixées pour puiser l'eau. Si le courant n'est pas profond on y construira des écluses; ce qui se fait facilement au moyen de piquets et de gazon.— Un morceau de toile goudronnée servirait avec avantage pour rendre ces écluses étanches. Un baril plongé dans le lit du courant serait très-avantageux pour y puiser l'eau ou y fixer une pompe.

113. On peut facilement faire un filtre au moyen de deux barils placés l'un dans l'autre, et en remplissant l'espace entre les deux de paille propre, de gros sable et de charbon de bois lorsqu'on peut s'en procurer, ou des branches d'arbres après en avoir enlevé l'écorce. L'eau est jetée dans le baril extérieur et s'élève dans le baril intérieur par des trous pratiqués dans le fond de ce dernier. Dans un camp permanent, si l'eau n'est pas bonne, on doit faire du charbon de bois, et filtrer régulièrement l'eau. Les troupes qui sont campées, consomment en moyenne un gallon d'eau par jour par tête; mais dans des camps permanents cette proportion doit être augmentée, parce que les hommes doivent être encouragés à se laver autant que possible.

114. Si les bords du courant sont escarpés, on doit les aplanner de sorte que les animaux puissent facilement aller boire. Si le sol est vaseux, on doit le couvrir de fascines, de pierres, etc., afin que les animaux ne s'y enfoncent pas. Un cheval, un bœuf ou un mulet, boit environ 1½ gallon à la fois, et prend à peu près 2 minutes pour boire, ou 3 minutes, si par l'empressement il devait en résulter de la confusion. Le temps nécessaire pour faire boire aucun nombre d'animaux peut facilement se calculer d'avance en connaissant le nombre qui peut boire en même temps. Lorsque l'on a un grand nombre d'animaux à faire boire, et que l'espace est étroit, chaque corps doit avoir ses heures fixes afin d'éviter tout encombrement.

115. Un officier doit invariablement accompagner tout parti de cavalerie, et ordre doit être donné que chaque cheval après avoir bu laisse l'abreuvoir, et que le parti se mette en rang à une petite distance pour ne pas nuire aux nouveaux arrivants.

116. Si le courant où doivent boire les animaux est très-peu profond, on devra le creuser ou y construire une écluse; les animaux boivent bien plus promptement.

ment si l'eau a une profondeur de 4 ou 5 pouces, que si elle est moins profonde.

117. Il y a trois espèces de pompes généralement en usage pour les fins militaires.

1. Une petite pompe portative foulante avec boyaux flexibles, prenant l'eau à 18 pieds et la rejetant à environ 16 pieds, travaillant par une hauteur de 18 pieds, et l'élevant à 7 pieds (la hauteur d'une charrée ordinaire pour l'eau) ; elle peut fournir 7 gallons d'eau par minute.

2. Le puits-siphon de Norton, qui consiste en tubes enfoncés dans la terre au moyen d'un mouton (monkey) avec une pompe vissé sur le sommet. Il faut environ trois heures pour fixer une de ces pompes. Son pouvoir est de 7 gallons par minute et peut fournir à trois chevaux buvant à la fois. *Ces pompes sont très utiles pour la recherche des sources d'eau.*

3. La "pompe Bastier" qui consiste en une chaîne sans fin, et travaillant sur une roue. Elle peut prendre l'eau à une profondeur de 45 pieds et donner 2,200 gallons d'eau par heure (deux hommes la font mouvoir.)

118. Lorsque l'on prend l'eau des puits, ceux-ci devront, pour y faire boire les animaux, être pourvus d'auges faits de bois ou de feuille de tôle si l'on peut s'en procurer, ou simplement d'une citerne creusée dans la terre et grossièrement boisée de pierres.

#### LIEUX D'AISANCES.

119. Les lieux d'aisances doivent être faits, par des hommes de corvée, aussitôt que les troupes sont arrivées sur le terrain du campement ; les endroits pour cela, doivent avoir été marqués d'avance par les quartiers-maîtres de corps ou de bataillon. La tranchée doit être pratiquée aussi étroite que possible et de quatre pieds environ de profondeur, on posera sur le bord, à dix-huit pouces de terre, une pièce de bois pour servir de siège ; le tout devra être enclos de branches d'arbre ou de planches pour cacher la vue du public.

120. *Des hommes de corvée devront tous les jours jeter une couple de pouces de terre sur les ordures, afin qu'il n'y ait pas de mauvaise odeur.*

121. Lorsqu'une fosse ou tranchée est remplie il faut en pratiquer une autre auprès de la dernière.

122. La police et les sentinelles du camp doivent avoir ordre d'empêcher les hommes d'être cause d'aucune nuisance dans les environs du camp.

#### POLICE DU CAMP.

123. A chaque camp d'exercice, il devra être détaché un certain nombre d'hommes pour agir comme police militaire, dont la force variera suivant le besoin des circonstances à la discrétion de l'officier commandant des troupes campées. La police militaire, composée d'hommes, partie de l'infanterie et partie de la cavalerie, fera, aux heures désignées et à tour de rôle, la patrouille dans les environs du camp, pour y faire observer l'ordre et supprimer toute irrégularité de conduite de la part des troupes. Les hommes détachés pour faire le devoir de police militaire, devront porter un morceau de coton ou linge blanc attaché sur le bras droit au-dessus du coude, ou toute autre marque distinctive, et les officiers et les hommes de tous les corps qui fréquenteront les camps d'exercice doivent être avertis d'obéir à leurs ordres et de leur prêter main forte dans l'exécution de leurs devoirs.

124. Dans les camps d'exercice de division la police militaire sera sous les ordres de l'assistant adjudant-général.

125. Dans les camps de brigade, elle sera sous les ordres du major de brigade, et à tous les camps, un sous-officier sera nommé par le commandant pour faire le service de prévôt sous-officier.

126. Lorsque des camps sont formés auprès des villes ou villages, si les autorités civiles demandent le support des troupes dans le temps que ces camps seront en opération, l'officier commandant devra sans retard leur prêter toute assistance possible de sa part.

#### DEVOIR DANS LE CAMP.

127. Les devoirs ordinaires de routine à remplir dans ces camps d'exercice seront, à part les modifications exigées par les circonstances, les mêmes que ceux remplis par les troupes régulières de Sa Majesté en pareil cas, suivant la teneur des règlements.

128. Au point du jour un coup de canon sera tiré par la batterie de campagne, après quoi sera sonné le réveil par les corps de tambours et de fifres appartenant aux bataillons nommés chaque jour à tour de rôle pour ce service ; et au coucher du soleil on tirera un autre coup de canon, et aussitôt sonnera la retraite en la manière ci-dessus spécifiée. Règle générale, le déjeuner sera à 8 heures a.m., le dîner à 1 heure p.m. et le souper à 6 heures p.m. Le *tattoo* sonnera à neuf heures et demie, et alors les officiers d'ordonnance de bataillons ou des corps recueilleront les rapports, et les remettront à l'officier supérieur du jour. A dix heures, le clairon sonnera l'extinction des lumières. Après cela aucune personne n'aura la permission de sortir en dehors du camp, sans une permission expresse de l'officier à qui il appartient de la donner, et tous les officiers et soldats devront coucher dans le camp.

129. Il y aura un officier supérieur, et un officier de santé du jour de nommés chaque jour dans les ordres de brigade, et avec l'officier des vivres ils formeront le bureau d'inspection pour l'examen des provisions fournies par les contracteurs pour l'usage des troupes. La décision des officiers qui composeront ce bureau sera sans appel, soit pour le refus ou autrement, des rations de chaque jour ; et lorsque celles-ci auront été acceptées aucune plainte ensuite quant à leur qualité ne sera écoutée. Ce bureau s'assemblera à l'heure de la livraison des provisions dans le camp, et les officiers qui en feront partie devront être ponctuels à se rendre à l'heure indiquée afin que les troupes puissent recevoir leurs provisions sans retard inutile.

#### DISTRIBUTION DE RATIONS.

130. En même temps que s'assemblera le bureau ci-dessus désigné, les quartiers-maîtres, les sergents quartiers-maîtres des corps, accompagnés des caporaux de service des troupes, compagnies ou corps et un sous-officier du jour de chacun des ordinaires (messes) de troupe ou de compagnie, seront présents au lieu désigné pour la réception et la livraison des rations, et lorsque les quartiers-maîtres auront regu en gros de l'officier des vivres, la quantité de provisions auxquelles ont droit leurs corps respectifs, ils distribueront aux caporaux de service les quantités que ces corps doivent recevoir, pour être ensuite subdivisées par les caporaux de service, en la proportion voulue pour chaque ordinaire (mess).

131. Il sera du devoir des sergents d'ordonnance de troupe, compagnie et corps, de fournir aux quartiers-maîtres des corps, le rapport de rations de chaque jour, sur lequel les quartiers-maîtres baseront le rapport général de rations qui doit être passé à l'officier des vivres chargé de la réception, de la garde et de la livraison de toutes les provisions, combustible, fourrage, nécessaires pour les

troupes, et ses devoirs sont particularisés dans le chapitre des réglemens pour les approvisionnements.

132. Le canal par où devront passer tous les ordres pour les troupes, est, aux camps d'exercice de division, l'assitant adjudant-général, et à ceux de brigade, le major de brigade.

133. L'assitant quartier-maître-général, aux camps de division, et le quartier-maître de camp aux camps de brigade, délivreront aux divers corps tous les articles d'équipage de camp et ces derniers les leur remettront après la levée des camps. Ils livreront chaque jour les munitions nécessaires pour la pratique du tir, de même que les munitions à poudre, quand on en aura besoin pour les grandes parades, et exerceront une surveillance générale sur la propreté du camp. Il sera alloué, une tente pour chaque dix hommes qui seront sous la charge d'un sous-officier ; une pour chaque officier supérieur de régiment ; une pour les officiers d'une compagnie ; une pour chaque chirurgien, une autre qui sera la tente de l'infirmerie régimentaire ; une pour être la tente du *commissariat* lorsque l'on ne pourra pas se procurer d'autre lieu plus avantageux pour cette fin ; une tente de garde pour chaque bataillon, une pour chacun des officiers de l'état-major ; et une autre tente (*marquee*) pour chaque bataillon et régiment pour l'ordinaire (mess) des officiers.

134. L'instructeur de mousqueterie assistera tous les jours à l'instruction de mousqueterie et à la pratique du tir pendant la durée des exercices ; verra à ce que les officiers comprennent et exécutent le mode de garder les registres des points obtenus par les hommes au tir ; sera constamment présent au lieu du tir pendant les heures de pratique, afin de veiller et conduire lui-même le mode de tirer et sera le seul juge dans les cas de différend sur l'exactitude des points marqués, etc. Il sera aussi responsable des rapports de la pratique du tir, et chaque jour après que le tir sera fini, il recueillera soigneusement ces rapports auxquels il apposera ses initiales en cas de besoin de vérification, et les remettra à l'officier commandant du camp en conformité des instructions qui pourront être données à cet effet ; et enfin il exécutera tout ordre, ayant trait à la mousqueterie, que pourra prescrire le commandant.

135. Il sera du devoir des majors de brigade de garder un registre de les tous devoirs de la brigade, et de donner chaque jour, aux adjudants des corps, les ordres pour le jour suivant, et les adjudants devront se présenter à la tente du major de brigade à l'heure fixée pour recevoir ces ordres.

136. Les officiers d'ordonnance rempliront tous les devoirs que le député-adjudant-général ou l'officier commandant de la brigade prescriront.

137. Il sera du devoir des adjudants de garder un registre des devoirs des officiers dans leurs corps respectifs, et de promulguer, d'après les instructions de leurs officiers commandant, les ordres nécessaires ; le sergent major donnera les ordres aux sergents d'ordonnance des troupes, compagnies et corps, et gardera le registre des devoirs des sous-officiers.

138. Il y aura tous les jours un piquet de nommé dans chaque corps en campement, lequel, sous les ordres de l'officier commandant de la brigade et officier supérieur du jour, sera chargé de faire la patrouille dans les environs du camp, ou toute autre place, où il sera jugé à propos de l'envoyer, pour aider la police du camp, s'il y a nécessité, à empêcher toute infraction aux ordres qui pourraient être faite par les hommes appartenant à leur corps, et de ramener au camp, quiconque se serait absenté

sans permission ; mais, à l'exception de circonstances urgentes et inévitables, le piquet d'un corps ne devra pas se mêler des hommes d'un autre corps.

139. Les officiers commandants des corps de brigade auront soin de voir à ce que le nombre des hommes désignés chaque jour pour le corps de garde, faire les sentinelles, et pour les devoirs de régiment, ne dépasse pas le nombre autorisé par les réglemens de la Reine, et les coutumes observées dans l'armée régulière.

140. Un officier supérieur du jour, pris à tour de rôle, et suivant le rang d'ancienneté parmi les lieutenants-colonels et les majors de régiment, sera chaque jour désigné dans les ordres de brigade.

141. Des petits magasins, pour la fourniture des provisions ou articles *extra* dont on pourra avoir besoin seront permis dans le camp à la discrétion du commandant (afin que les hommes puissent se procurer à leurs propres frais les effets qu'ils pourraient désirer, tels que beurre, lait, œufs, fromage, etc. ;) mais sous aucun prétexte, les boissons alcooliques ne seront tolérées dans le camp, et il sera du devoir tout spécial de l'officier supérieur du jour et de la police du camp de visiter souvent ces sortes de magasins pour voir à ce que cette défense soit strictement obéie. s'il arrivait qu'un vivandier se permit d'apporter ou de vendre des boissons alcooliques dans le camp, il devra être chassé et ne plus être admis de rechef.

142. Les blancs nécessaires pour les retours de marche, de parade, de rations et de mousqueterie dont ces camps de brigade auront besoin, seront fournis et envoyés des quartiers-généraux aux députés adjudant généraux pour être par eux distribués aux corps de milice, mais les officiers commandant des bataillons ou corps, devront fournir la papeterie nécessaire, les retours journaliers de parade, les rapports de la garde et des malades—comme auparavant—et tous les corps emporteront avec eux leurs livres d'ordres de régiment et de compagnie, et le registre des punitions.

143. A moins d'une stricte discipline, il est impossible de former les soldats en un corps militaire effectif et formidable—la bonne discipline ne s'acquiert que par une obéissance constance et habituelle aux ordres, sans murmure et sans question.

Les officiers, sous-officiers et soldats doivent tous être imbus de ces principes, et se rappeler que pendant la période des exercices annuels, ils sont, en ce qui regarde la discipline militaire, guidés par les réglemens de la Reine et sujets aux articles de guerre de même que s'il étaient employés en service actif, tel que défini dans l'acte de milice de la Puissance.

144. Les officiers commandants des corps, pour une première offense, de nature peu sérieuse, n'auront recours qu'à une leçon d'avertissement, mais pour la répétition de l'offense, ils ne devront infliger que la moindre punition autorisée suivant la nature et le degré de l'offense ; toute répétition d'ivresse sera punie par le retranchement de la solde d'un jour, et par la mise aux arrêts, à la discrétion de l'officier commandant ; et afin de prévenir autant que possible les offenses, le commandant, et tous les autres officiers feront tous leurs efforts pour empêcher l'introduction dans le camp d'aucune boisson spiritueuse ou enivrante, car, il est reconnu que les crimes ou les offenses ne sont le plus souvent que les suites de l'ivrognerie.

145. Dès qu'un homme sera trouvé avec des liqueurs spiritueuses en sa possession, pendant qu'il sera dans le camp, ou en emportant dans le camp, la liqueur lui sera immédiatement otée et jetée, et il devra être puni par son officier commandant.

146. Les moindres punitions que puisse infliger les officiers commandants sont les arrêts dans le camp pour toute période qu'ils jugeront à propos, mais qui ne devra pas dépasser 14 jours ; et pour une cause d'ivresse répétée, aux arrêts, sera ajouté le retranchement de la solde. Tout homme qui aura été mis aux arrêts par son officier commandant, n'aura pas la permission de dépasser les limites du camp (si ce n'est lorsqu'il sera de service) pendant toute la durée de sa punition, et en sus de sa part des devoirs à remplir dans la brigade et dans son régiment, il sera employé, et cela comme service *extra*, sous la direction du quartier-maître de camp, au maintien de la propreté dans le camp.

#### RÈGLEMENTS POUR LA PRATIQUE DU TIR À LA CIBLE.

147. La pratique du tir à la cible, pour la milice de la Puissance est d'une importance majeure. Les sous-officiers et soldats de tout corps armé de la carabine Snider, tireront cinq coups à 200 verges, cinq coups à 400 verges et cinq coups à 600 verges ; et le gouvernement accordera des prix en argent avec décorations, au meilleur tireur dans chaque compagnie, corps, bataillon et dans chaque district militaire, qui aura suivi le cours des pratiques du tir à la cible aux exercices annuels. Ces prix seront accordés comme suit :

148. Au meilleur tireur dans chaque compagnie, \$5, avec décoration. Au meilleur tireur dans chaque bataillon, \$10 avec décoration. Au meilleur tireur dans chaque district, \$15, avec décoration ; et l'adjudant-général de la milice donnera un prix de \$50 avec une médaille d'argent au meilleur tireur, avec la carabine Snider, dans la milice active de la Puissance, pour l'année 1872.

149. La pratique annuelle du tir à la cible pour toutes les brigades et batteries de campagne, lorsque cela sera praticable, se fera avec des canons de campagne, ou de position, à volonté, sous instructions spéciales de l'inspecteur de l'artillerie—et des prix en argent avec décorations d'artilleurs, seront donnés par le gouvernement. Au meilleur tireur dans chaque brigade ou batterie d'artillerie de campagne, \$10 avec décoration, au meilleur tireur dans chaque batterie de garnison, \$5, avec décoration, et \$5 en sus, si la batterie ne reçoit pas de prix pour tir à la carabine.

Les troupes de cavalerie, ou autres corps, armés de la carabine Snider, tireront cinq coups à 200 verges, et cinq coups à 400 verges ; le meilleur tireur de chacun de ces corps recevra un prix de \$5, avec décoration,—et lorsque les troupes seront formées en un régiment, en sus du prix de chaque troupe séparément, il y aura un prix de \$10, avec décoration, pour le meilleur tireur de ce régiment. La brigade du Grand Tronc, pratiquera son tir annuel à la cible à l'époque de la saison que le jugera à propos le commandant, et elle aura droit aux prix ci-dessus mentionnés ; elle aura droit aussi de concourir pour le prix de \$15 accordé au meilleur tireur du district. Pour qu'une compagnie ou un corps puisse concourir pour les prix ci-dessus et les recevoir, il faudra que les  $\frac{2}{3}$  au moins de sa force autorisée soient présents et aient fait les exercices annuels, et la pratique du tir à la cible prescrits (et les hommes devront être *bonâ fide* enrôlés et membres de tel corps ou compagnie conformément à l'acte de milice, et avoir leurs noms dûment enregistrés dans les rapports de la pratique du tir de la compagnie.)

Un bataillon ou une brigade d'artillerie ne pourra recevoir le prix de bataillon, qu'en autant que toutes ses compagnies ou batteries se seront exer-

cées, aient fait le nombre de points de mérite tel qu'établi au cours prescrit de la pratique du tir pendant l'exercice annuel, et soient en nombre suffisant tel que ci-dessus mentionné. Le concours pour les prix ci-dessus ne sera ouvert que pour les sous-officiers et soldats de la milice active, les officiers ne devant pas pratiquer pendant le cours des exercices prescrit pour les sous-officiers et les soldats. La cible devra avoir, à 200 verges, 4 pieds de large, avec un *bull's eye* de 8 pouces carrés, et un *centre* de deux pieds ; à 400 et 600, elle sera de 6 pieds de large, avec un *bull's eye* de 2 pieds carrés et un *centre* de 4 pieds carrés. Le *bull's eye* contera 4 points, le *centre* 3, et le *outer* 2, à toutes les distances. La position pour tirer sera, à 200 verges, debout, à 400, à genou, et à 600 la position sera libre, mais sans se servir d'appuis artificiels.

150. Les points de mérite pour une compagnie, un bataillon ou un district s'obtiennent en divisant le nombre total des points faits aux trois distances—200, 400 et 600,—par le nombre d'hommes qui ont réellement tiré, et en ajoutant après le quotient, s'il en reste, pas plus de deux décimaux.

151. Le meilleur tireur dans une compagnie, un bataillon, un district ou dans la puissance, sera celui qui aura fait le plus grand nombre de points aux trois distances, savoir : 200, 400 et 600 verges.

152. Tout nombre égal de points se décidera par le plus grand nombre de points obtenus à 600 verges. S'il y a encore égal nombre de points on passera au nombre de points obtenus à 400 verges ; s'il y a de nouveau un égal nombre de points, on ira au nombre de points obtenus à 200 verges ; et enfin s'il y a encore égalité de points on prendra pour la décision, les derniers coups tirés qui ne comportent pas un égal nombre de points, en commençant par la distance de 600 verges, et pour la décision des nombres égaux de points obtenus pour le prix de l'adjudant général, un détail du tir des gagnants de prix de district devra être envoyé à l'adjudant général aux quartiers généraux.

153. Les différentes compagnies suivront le cours prescrit de la pratique du tir à la cible, sous le commandement des capitaines, qui devront garder un registre de ce qu'aura fait chaque homme, et qu'il devront signer et certifier comme correct.

154. A la conclusion des exercices, le registre de la pratique du tir sera envoyé par l'instructeur de mousqueterie de la brigade, aux majors de brigade qui prépareront les rapports de districts sur les rapports de compagnie, et les enverront au députés adjudants-généraux pour être par eux transmis aux quartiers généraux.

155. Les registres devront être tenus avec le plus grand soin possible, parce que c'est de là que dépend le choix de ceux qui auront des prix.

156. Comme règle générale, il devra toujours se trouver deux personnes pour la marque des points, un sous-officier et un soldat d'une compagnie étrangère à celle qui tirera. Il devra toujours se trouver aussi un trompette sur le lieu du tir.

157. L'instructeur de mousqueterie devra se trouver sur les lieux lorsqu'une compagnie tirera afin de veiller à ce que le tir se fasse suivant les règlements.

158. Afin de prévenir tout accident on devra strictement observer la règle suivante : —

L'escouade se formera à dix pas en arrière du point de tir "armes à terre" et se retirera à six pas en arrière des armes qui ne devront être prises qu'au mot de commandement. Le commandant, qui se tiendra auprès du point du tir, appellera à tour de rôle chaque homme pour tirer sans inter-

ruption ses cinq coups et après que son nombre de points lui aura été lu, il rejoindra l'escouade. Le commandant de l'escouade aura soin tout particulièrement d'avertir chaque homme sur ce qu'il a à faire pour tirer, surtout de ne pas tirer avant que le pavillon scit entièrement abattu. On ne devra charger son fusil qu'au point du tir. Personne autre que le commandant de l'escouade ou le marqueur ne pourra s'approcher à plus de dix pas du point de tir.

#### EXERCICE ET EVOLUTIONS EN CAMPAGNE.

159. Règle générale, lorsque les officiers qui commandent les brigades, n'en décideront pas autrement, il y aura chaque jour trois parades pour l'exercice toutes les compagnies et corps d'infanterie qui ne seront pas occupés à la pratique du tir, aux heures suivantes, savoir :—

160. A 6 heures a. m. exercice de compagnie sous la direction des capitaines ou autres officiers qui commandent des compagnies, surveillées par les officiers supérieurs ; à 10 heures a. m. exercice de bataillon sous la direction des officiers qui commandent des bataillons ; et à 3 heures p. m. ou autre heure que le député adjudant-général ou l'officier *senior* commandant pourra ordonner pour les exercices de brigade.

161. Aux parades du matin pour l'exercice de compagnie, sous la direction des capitaines ou des officiers commandant des compagnies, les mouvements et les exercices contenus dans la partie II du livre des exercices d'infanterie (dernière édition) se pratiqueront depuis la page 58 jusqu'à page 101, et on prendra un soin bien particulier d'enseigner à chaque compagnie la manière d'exécuter les exercices d'escarmouche, tels que dictés depuis la page 91 à la page 101. Chaque officier de compagnie s'exercera aussi à ces parades du matin, sur le mode de placer les hommes par rang de taille, de ranger une compagnie et d'en compter les hommes, de même que sur le mode à suivre pour l'inspection d'une compagnie, et pratiquera le maniement des armes et les exercices de peleton. Les soldats pratiqueront le maniement des armes prescrit pour la courte carabine, à l'exception de ce qui regarde le mode de mettre et remettre la baïonnette, pour lequel on suivra les instructions données pour la longue carabine. Tous les ordres contenus dans le livre des exercices (Field Exercises) pour la conduite des troupes qui portent la courte carabine, s'appliquent pareillement aux hommes armés de la longue carabine, et pendant le cours des exercices du peleton, on devra enseigner aux officiers comme aux soldats la position à prendre et la manière de mirer suivant la teneur du livre des exercices et de l'instruction de mousqueterie depuis les pages 176 à 185. On enseignera aussi aux officiers et aux soldats le mode de monter et de relever la garde, de poser et de relever les sentinelles, de donner le qui-vive pendant la nuit, de recevoir les visites des postes et de payer les compliments convenables. Les sous-officiers et soldats devront être instruits sur la manière de saluer, telle que donnée dans la section 6, 1ère partie, page 14 du livre des exercices (Field Exercise). Il n'est pas nécessaire d'instruire les hommes à marcher lentement.

162. Aux parades pour exercice du bataillon, les officiers supérieurs et les adjudants seront à cheval, et les compagnies égalisées. La force de chaque compagnie, formée pour des fins d'exercice, ne devra pas être de moins de 25 hommes. On exercera les bataillons sur la manière de tirer, voir page 106 du

livre des exercices pour l'infanterie (Infantry Field Exercise Book) ; lorsque le bataillon est en ligne à rangs serrés, on lui montrera à former une garde avancée et une arrière garde ainsi que le mode de faire l'escarmouche, page 205 jusqu'à page 224. Les mouvements que doit connaître l'infanterie lorsqu'elle est en action devront aussi être enseignés tels que prescrits dans le livre des exercices.

163. Toutes les fois que les brigades paraderont pour les manœuvres en campagne, tout le corps devra être présent (ne laissant dans le camp que les gardes nécessaires et un cuisinier pour chaque troupe ou compagnie), A ces parades les troupes seront rangées en la manière que l'officier commandant jugera à propos, et si les circonstances le permettent elles s'avanceront, en colonne de route, à une petite distance du camp, détachant des gardes d'éclaireurs, de flanc et pour l'arrière, continuant toujours d'avancer comme étant en présence ou dans les environs d'un ennemi, se déployant de temps en temps suivant que pourront le permettre les circonstances et la nature du terrain en ligne de bataille, plaçant chaque arme du service de manière à pouvoir se supporter mutuellement. La position que doit occuper généralement l'artillerie de campagne lorsqu'elle est en mouvement avec une brigade, est décrite à la page 278 du livre des exercices (Field Exercise Book,) et les principes d'après lesquels ces manœuvres doivent se faire en contraste avec les simples exercices, sont expliqués, à la page 279.

164. La règle établie, relativement à l'emploi de chevaux et d'artillerie de campagne, dans ces manœuvres, veut que les officiers qui commandent des divisions ou des brigade détachées, indiquent à l'officier commandant l'artillerie sous ses ordres, l'objet général des mouvements qu'il va exécuter et ces officiers, doivent marquer aux capitaines de batteries les directions à prendre pour coopérer avec eux et les aider le plus avantageusement.

Les officiers qui commandent des batteries doivent avoir la permission (sous la direction de leurs propres officiers commandants) d'user de leur propre jugement sur les meilleurs positions à choisir pour leur aider soit à opérer avec avantage une retraite, soit à couvrir une attaque, conformant, autant que peut le permettre la nature du terrain, leurs mouvements avec ceux du corps auquel ils sont attachés

Toute ordre spécial cependant, reçu par l'officier commandant l'artillerie, de la part de l'officier commandant des troupes, relativement aux dispositions à prendre dans ses mouvements, doit être promptement exécuté.

Une batterie ne doit jamais être exposée aux feux de l'infanterie, à moins de circonstances inévitables, et ce qui arrive quelquefois pendant l'action.

165. Les brigades doivent être enseignées à prendre des positions avantageuses pour la défense, ou à se former en ordre de bataille pour l'attaque, sur le mode à suivre pour attaquer et emporter des positions, pour retraiter comme étant en présence d'une force supérieure, le faisant régulièrement et dans un ordre militaire ; à laisser une position pour en prendre une autre, sur les différents supports à amener pour se couvrir et se relever mutuellement pendant la retraite. Toutes les fois que l'on exercera les troupes à prendre des positions pour la défense, on devra autant que cela sera praticable, leur enseigner à se créer des abris artificiels, lorsque la nature ne les offrira pas, en construisant des tranchées pour protéger l'infanterie, en la manière donnée par le livre des exercices en campagne, et en élevant des ouvrages d'épaulement pour protéger les batte-



ries de campagne. On peut aussi, pendant ces jours d'exercice en campagne retirer un grand avantage des manœuvres, en divisant les brigades en deux forces dirigées par des commandants que l'on nommera d'avance dans les ordres de brigade ; l'une des forces agissant sur l'offensive et l'autre sur la défensive, le commandant de la division assisté d'un nombre convenable d'officiers de l'état-major agissant comme arbitres, dans ces occasions les troupes devront être pourvues de minutions à poudre seulement. En mettant convenablement en pratique, ce système d'exercices de batailles simulées, les officiers et les soldats apprendront mieux leurs devoirs et cela contribuera pour beaucoup au développement de leur intelligence militaire.

#### CAVALERIE.

166. Les exercices, pour toutes les troupes de cavalerie et les corps à cheval, lorsqu'ils ne seront pas requis pour l'exercice de brigade, se feront en régiment sous la direction des officiers commandants, et le mode de former des gardes avancées et des arrières gardes se pratiquera tel que donné dans les règlements pour la cavalerie, de même que le mode de s'étendre en tirailleurs à cheval, et de tirer aussi à cheval avec des cartouches à poudre seulement lorsque les circonstances le permettront.

L'instruction nécessaire pour les corps de cavalerie est particularisée dans le livre des exercices de cavalerie du 1er août 1869, et en sus des remarques préliminaires contenues dans ce code d'instruction, les sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 et 7, qui comprennent l'équitation militaire, devront tout particulièrement être étudiées.

#### ARTILLERIE DE CAMPAGNE.

167. Autant que possible, la pratique annuelle du tir, avec boulets et bombes, des batteries d'artillerie de campagne devra avoir lieu durant le temps que la batterie sera en campement.

S'il n'y a pas de lieu propice pour le tir, ou si le tir offrait quelque danger pour le public, la pratique devra être différée jusqu'à ce que l'on puisse obtenir un endroit convenable et sans danger.

168. Les officiers commandant des batteries enverront leurs réquisitions pour munitions et tous les effets et articles nécessaires pour l'équipement complet, avant le commencement de l'époque des exercices.

169. Nul exercice annuel par une batterie de campagne ne sera considéré efficace, à moins qu'elle n'ait, durant ce temps, accompli une marche de vingt milles ou environ, avec avant-trains et caissons, tous les outils de tranchée, équipage de campement, armes portatives, etc., le tout en ordre et à sa place respective ; dans ces occasions les officiers commandants monteront leurs détachements lorsque l'état des chemins le permettra.

170. Durant la période accordée pour l'exercice de régiment en campement, les officiers commandant choisiront les mouvements les plus simples et les utiles du "manuel des exercices de l'artillerie de campagne." On enseignera aux conducteurs à monter et à guider les chevaux, à nettoyer les harnais, etc, aux canonniers les exercices de canons, à monter et à descendre les canons, à les relever lorsqu'ils ont été renversés, à chançer les roues, enlever de l'artillerie qui a été démontée, etc.

171. Lorsque les officiers commandants en auront la facilité, ils devront montrer à leurs hommes à élever des abris pour les canons en action, à faire mouvoir les canons et les chevaux par dessus des murs, leur faire passer des fossés, des ravins, des petits cours d'eau ou autres obstacles, et sans s'at-

tacher strictement aux règles, s'efforçant de stimuler l'habileté et les intérêts de tous ceux concernés.

172. A la conclusion des exercices, au retour des batteries de campagne à leurs quartiers-généraux, tous les harnais, selles, voitures, caissons, et les menus articles seront replacés à l'abri dans les hangars, après avoir été bien nettoyés et mis en état de pouvoir être pris pour un service immédiat. Les conducteurs devront nettoyer les harnais, et les canonniers, les canons et les caissons. Les officiers commandants des batteries de campagne seront tenus responsables en tout temps où leurs batteries pourront être subitement requises pour le service, du bon état dans lequel elles devront se trouver, ayant toutes leurs munitions de service et autres effets nécessaires.

173. Le lieutenant-colonel French, inspecteur d'artillerie et de munitions de guerre, et commandant de l'école d'artillerie batterie "A" de Kingston, transmettra aux quartiers généraux un rapport détaillé de son inspection annuelle des corps d'artillerie dans la province d'Ontario et un rapport spécial de l'école d'artillerie, batterie "A", de Kingston.

174. Le lieutenant-colonel J. B. Strange, inspecteur d'artillerie pour la province de Québec, et commandant de l'école d'artillerie, batterie "B", de Québec, transmettra aux quartiers généraux, un rapport détaillé de son inspection annuelle des corps d'artillerie dans la province de Québec, et un rapport sur l'école d'artillerie, batterie "B" de Québec.

175. Le lieutenant-colonel Jago, artillerie du Nouveau-Brunswick, fera l'inspection annuelle de tout les corps d'artillerie dans cette province, et en transmettra un rapport aux quartiers généraux.

176. Les rapports annuels des inspecteurs pour cette arme du service devront être transmis à l'adjudant général aux quartiers généraux pas plus tard que le 1er novembre 1872.

177. Les exercices annuels de tous les corps pour l'année 1872-73, devront être terminés avant le 31 octobre 1872, et les rapports annuels d'inspection, ainsi que ceux de la pratique du tir, transmis aux quartiers généraux par les députés adjudants généraux en même temps que leurs propres rapports annuels, immédiatement après l'inspection de tous les corps de milice dans leurs districts respectifs, afin de permettre à l'adjudant général de préparer son rapport annuel sur l'état de la milice en temps convenable pour pouvoir être présenté à la législature fédérale.

Des débarcadères convenables et auxquelles on pourra aborder, quelque soit le niveau d'eau dans la rivière, seront construits aux deux extrémités de la traverse et avec l'approbation du gouvernement.

The Adjutant General feels confident that the individuals selected for this honorable service will prove by their conduct and good discipline as well as by their skill in the use of the rifle, worthy representatives of their country and of the military force to which they belong.

In announcing the despatch of this Detachment the Adjutant General desires to call the special attention of the non-commissioned Officers and men of the Active Militia, now performing or about to perform their annual course of target practice in the various camps of exercise, to the event, in the hope that it may tend to promote increased emulation and efficiency.

Should circumstances admit of the annual despatch of a similar detachment to England, in selecting individuals due regard to character and conduct will invariably be paid, for although skill in the use of the rifle is indispensable, respectability of character in a representative of the Dominion is of primary importance.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS in and by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in the Session

thereof, holden in the thirty second and thirty third years of Our Reign, being chapter twenty-four, and intituled: "An Act for the better preservation of the peace in the vicinity of Public Works," it is, amongst other things in effect, enacted that our Governor General, in Council, may, as often as occasion requires, declare by Proclamation that, upon and after a day therein named, the said Act shall be in force in any place or places in Canada therein designated, within the limits, or in the vicinity whereof any Railway, Canal, or other Public Work is in progress of construction, or such places as are in the vicinity of any such Canal or Railway, or other work as aforesaid, within which he deems it necessary that the



said Act shall be in force and that the said Act shall, upon and after the day so to be named in any such Proclamation, take effect within the places designated in such Proclamation.

AND FURTHER that upon and after the day so to be fixed in such Proclamation and during such period as the said Proclamation may remain in force, no person shall, at any place within the limits specified in such Proclamation, barter, sell, exchange or dispose of, directly or indirectly, to any other person, any alcoholic, spirituous, vinous, fermented or other intoxicating liquor, or any mixed liquor, or part of which is spirituous or vinous, fermented or otherwise intoxicating, nor shall expose, keep or have in his possession for sale, barter, or exchange, any intoxicating liquor; but that the section of the said Act, now in recital, should not extend to any person selling intoxicating liquors, by wholesale, and not retailing the same if such person be a licensed Distiller or Brewer.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient that the hereinbefore, in part recited Act, as amended by a certain other Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in the thirty third year of Our Reign and intitled "An Act to amend an Act for the better preservation of the Peace in the vicinity of Public Works," should be, in so far as regards the sections hereinafter mentioned, be in force in the places and within the limits hereinafter designated and described.

NOW THEREFORE KNOW YE that WE by and with the advice and consent of our Privy Council for Canada, do hereby declare that, upon and after this twenty fifth day of May instant, the hereunder mentioned sections of the said Act intitled "An Act for the better preservation of the Peace in the vicinity of Public Works," that is to say: the eleventh, twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth, fifteenth, sixteenth, seventeenth, eighteenth, nineteenth, twentieth and twenty first sections thereof—shall be in force in the places in Canada and within the limits hereinafter designated and described, that is to say: in, over and along that certain portion of the line of "The Intercolonial Railway, now in progress of construction, known as "Section No. 10" and "Section No. 16" respectively, and for a distance of four miles from the said line of Railway, and the works thereof, on either side thereof; the said Sections of the said Railway commencing at the point at which the said the Intercolonial Railway crosses the Chaplin Island Road, near the Town of Newcastle, in the County of Northumberland, and extending Northerly along the line of the said Railway to the point of intersection thereof with the Napissiquet River, in the County of Gloucester: excepting, however, from the operation of this Our Royal Proclamation all that portion of the said Town of Newcastle which may be comprised within the said limit of four miles from the line of the said Railway.

Of all which Our loving subjects, and all others to whom these presents may come, or whom the same may, in any wise concern, are hereby required to take notice and to govern themselves accordingly:

A PROCLAMATION.

H. BERNARD, Deputy of the Minister of Justice, Canada. } WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Canada, passed in the Session thereof, held in the thirty-first year of Our Reign, intitled: "An Act, relating to Quarantine and Public Health," it is, amongst other things, in effect, ENACTED, that the Governor in Council may, from time to time, make such regulations as he thinks proper concerning, amongst other matters, the entry or departure of boats or vessels at the different ports or places in Canada, and concerning the landing of passengers or cargoes from such boats or vessels, or the receiving of cargoes or passengers on board the same, as may be thought best calculated to preserve the Public Health, and for ensuring the due performance of quarantine, by, and in respect of vessels, passengers, goods, or things, arriving at any port within Canada, to which he things it right for the preservation of the Public Health that such regulations should apply, and for the thorough cleansing, and disinfecting of such vessels, passengers, goods, or things, so as to prevent, as far as possible, the introduction or dissemination of diseases into, or in Canada, and may appoint or remove such officers as he may deem necessary for so doing, and assign to them, respectively, such powers as he may think required for carrying out the provisions of such regulations, and may, from time to time, revoke or amend the same, or any of them, and make others in their stead, and may impose penalties, forfeitures or punishments for the breach thereof; which regulations shall be notified, by Proclamation, published in the Canada Gazette, at least twice, and the production of the copies of the Gazette, containing any such Proclamation, shall be evidence of the making, date, and contents of such regulations. AND FURTHER, that such regulations shall have the force of law during the time they respectively remain unrevoked, unless they be expressly limited to be in force only during a certain time or at certain times or seasons, in which case they shall have the force of law during the time, and at the times and seasons during, or at, which they have been limited to be in force; and that any person disobeying any such Regulation may be prosecuted for a misdemeanor, punishable by fine or imprisonment, or both, as the Court may direct, or otherwise such person may be sued for the penalties contained in such regulation.

AND WHEREAS, by certain Regulations, amongst others, made by Our Governor General of Canada in Council, under, and in pursuance of the authority of the Act hereinabove in part recited, duly notified by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing date on the twenty-third day of May, in the thirty-first year of Our Reign and twice published in the CANADA GAZETTE, it was provided and declared, amongst other things, as follows: FIRST,—That all boats, ships, and other vessels, except the Canadian Mail Steamers, which henceforth, and during the eight months next following the first day of April in each and every year, shall arrive in the Port of Quebec, from any port or ports, place or places, in Europe or elsewhere out of Canada, by way of that part of the River St. Lawrence which is below Grosse Isle, and which shall have, at the time of their said arrival, or shall have had during their passage from the places where they respectively cleared, any person on board laboring under Asiatic Cholera, Fever, Small Pox, Scarlatina, or Measles, or other infectious and dangerous disease, or on board of which any person shall have died during such passage, or which, being of less tonnage than seven hundred tons measurement, shall have on board thirteen or more steerage passengers, or which, being

of greater tonnage than seven hundred tons measurement, shall have on board fifty or more steerage passengers, or which shall have come from some infected port, shall make their Quarantine at Grosse Isle, in the River St. Lawrence, and there remain and continue until such boats, ships or vessels shall be discharged from such Quarantine, by such license or passport and discharge, given without fee or emolument of any kind, as shall be directed or permitted by such order or orders as shall be made by the Governor, with the advice of the Privy Council, and until the said boats, ships and vessels shall respectively have performed such Quarantine, and shall be discharged therefrom by such license or passport and discharge as aforesaid, persons, goods, or merchandise which shall be on board such boats, ships, or vessels, shall not come or be brought on shore, or go or be put on board of any other ship or vessel in Canada, except on Grosse Isle aforesaid, when duly required, by competent authority. SECOND—That all boats, ships and vessels which henceforth, and during the eight months aforesaid, shall arrive at the Port of Quebec, from any port or ports in Europe, place or places, or elsewhere as aforesaid, of the class or description hereinbefore mentioned, as are liable and bound to make their Quarantine at Grosse Isle, do make their further Quarantine in the Harbour of Quebec, according to the regulations thereinafter provided.

AND WHEREAS, OUR said Governor General in Council hath this day been pleased to make, under the authority, and in pursuance of the said above in part recited Act, a certain regulation in amendment of the said regulations above in part recited, which said regulation is in the words following, that is to say:—

The exception from Quarantine in favor of the Canadian Mail Steamers coming up the River St. Lawrence, which is established by the regulations now in force, under the "Quarantine and Health Act of 1868," and promulgated by Proclamation of the twenty-third day of May, A. D., 1868, is hereby suspended, and shall be of no effect whatever from this date until the first day of December next, or such earlier day as may be limited by any future Proclamation issued to that end: And all such steamers, from this date, until the first day of December next, or such earlier day, shall be held to be, and shall be, in all respects, subject to all the requirements and provisions of the said regulations, as though such exception had not therein been made in their favor, save only in so far as the same are expressly derogated from or modified hereby, as follows, that is to say: All such steamers, whenever a medical officer shall have been appointed to discharge that duty, may be by him boarded at Father Point, and inspected while *en route* for Quebec; and thereupon, in case it is found that they have not, and during their passage from the places where they respectively cleared, have not had, any person on board laboring under any infectious and dangerous disease, they may pass on without stopping to their destination,—and, in case it is found that they have, or during their passage from the places where they respectively cleared, have had, any person on board laboring under any infectious and dangerous disease, they shall make their Quarantine at Grosse Isle, or may pass on without stopping to their further Quarantine in the Harbor of Quebec, in the discretion of such medical officer,—and shall, in either of such last mentioned cases, make their further Quarantine in the Harbor of Quebec in such manner and for so long as the Inspecting Physician at Quebec may deem requisite,—and may, by such inspecting Physician, be ordered back to Grosse Isle if he shall deem that course requisite, in like manner as any other vessel may,—and whether so stopping at, or sent back to Grosse Isle, or not, may be so dealt with, as regards the landing of their mails, and otherwise, as the Medical Superintendent at Grosse Ile or such Inspecting Physician (as the case may be) shall, in his discretion direct.

NOW KNOW YE, THAT WE do hereby COMMAND and ENJOIN UPON ALL OUR loving subjects, that they do take notice of and obey the said regulation so this day made as aforesaid, and govern themselves accordingly.

Of all which our loving subjects, and all others whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

#### BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

ON this day at three o'clock in the afternoon His Excellency THE RIGHT HONORABLE FREDERICK TEMPLE, EARL OF DUFFERIN, one of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight of the Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick, and Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, proceeded to the Council Chamber of the Executive Council of the Province of Quebec, in the City of Quebec.

His Excellency having been, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, dated at Westminster on the Twenty-Second Day of May, in the Thirty-Fifth Year of Her Majesty's Reign, constituted and appointed by Her Majesty, Governor General in and over Her Dominion of Canada, took the oaths prescribed by the instructions passed under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet to the said Frederick Temple, Earl of Dufferin, before four of the Judges of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Record of the Province of Quebec, within the said Dominion, by whom they were tendered and administered to His Excellency.

His Excellency then received an Address in reference to his assumption of the Government of Canada, from the Mayor and Corporation of the City of Quebec, presented to him by the Mayor accompanied by the Members of the City Council, and Addresses by the same subject were presented by Deputations from the Board of Trade of the City of Quebec and the St. Patrick's Society of the City of Quebec.

WHEREAS Her Majesty the Queen, by Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster, on the Twenty Second of May, in the Thirty Fifth year of Her Majesty's Reign, has been graciously pleased to constitute and appoint me to be Her Majesty's Governor General in and over the Dominion of Canada, for and during Her Majesty's will and pleasure, and Her Majesty did thereby authorize and command me to do and execute all things in due manner that should belong to my said command, and the trust reposed in me according to the several powers and directions granted or appointed me by that Her Majesty's Commission, and of the Act of Parliament passed in the Thirtieth year of Her Majesty's Reign, and entitled "The British North America Act, 1867," and the instructions given me with such Commission, or by such further instructions as may hereafter be given by Her Majesty under Her sign manual and signet, or by Her Majesty's order in Her Privy Council or through one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and according to such laws as are now and shall hereafter be in force in the said Dominion; Now Know YE, and I have therefore with the advise of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, thought fit to issue this Proclamation to make know Her Majesty's said appointment; and I do also hereby, and with the same advise, require and command that all and singular Her Majesty's Officers and Ministers in the said Dominion of Canada, do continue in the execution of their several and respective offices, places and employments, and that Her Majesty's loving subjects and all others whom it may concern, do take notice hereof and govern themselves accordingly.

To all to whom these presents shall come, or whom the same may in any wise concern.—GREETING :

### A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS Her Majesty was graciously pleased, by Her several Royal Letters Patent, bearing date at Westminster, on the twenty-ninth day of December, in the thirty-second year of Her Reign, to constitute and appoint the Right Honorable Sir John Young, now the Right Honorable John Baron Lisgar, of Lisgar and Bailieborough, to be Governor General of Canada, during pleasure. AND WHEREAS, by the above mentioned Letters Patent, it is PROVIDED that, in case of the death, incapacity or absence, out of Her Majesty's Dominion of Canada, of the said the then Right Honorable Sir John Young, the powers and authorities, therein granted him, shall be given and granted to the Lieutenant Governor, for the time being, of Canada, or in the absence of any such Lieutenant Governor, to such person as Her Majesty, might, by warrant under Her sign manual and signet, appoint to be the Administrator of the Government of Her said Dominion or, in the absence of any such Lieutenant Governor or person appointed as aforesaid, to the Senior Military Officer, for the time being in command of Her Majesty's Regular Forces in Her said Dominion; such powers and authorities, to be by him executed and enjoyed during Her Majesty's pleasure; AND WHEREAS by reason of the absence of the said Right Honorable John, Baron Lisgar, of Lisgar and Bailieborough, from and out of Canada, and of any Lieutenant Governor of Canada, and by reason of Her Majesty not having appointed any other person to be the Administrator of the Government of Her said Dominion, and under and by virtue of the provisions in the aforesaid Letters Patent contained, the Administration of the Civil Government of Canada and the execution of the powers and authorities in the said Letters Patent contained, have devolved upon me as being the Senior Military Officer Commanding Her Majesty's Regular Forces in the said Dominion of Canada; I have, therefore, by and with the advice of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, thought fit to issue this Proclamation to make known the same. AND I do hereby require and command that all and singular Her Majesty's Officers and Ministers in the said Dominion of Canada, do continue in the execution of their several and respective offices, places and employments; and that Her Majesty's loving subjects and all



others, whom these presents may concern, do take notice thereof and govern themselves accordingly.

A PROCLAMATION.

JOHN A. MACDONALD, } WHEREAS in and  
Attorney-General, } by an Act of the  
Canada. } Parliament of Canada  
passed in the Session

thereof, holden in the thirty second and thirty third years of Our Reign, being chapter twenty-four, and intituled : "An Act for the better preservation of the peace in the vicinity of Public Works," it is, amongst other things in effect, enacted that our Governor General, in Council, may, as often as occasion requires, declare by Proclamation that, upon and after a day therein named, the said Act shall be in force in any place or places in Canada therein designated, within the limits, or in the vicinity whereof any Railway, Canal, or other Public Work is in progress of construction, or such places as are in the vicinity of any such Canal or Railway, or other work as aforesaid, within which he deems it necessary that the said Act shall be in force and that the said Act shall, upon and after the day so to be named in any such Proclamation, take effect within the places designated in such Proclamation.

AND FURTHER that upon and after the day so to be fixed in such Proclamation and during such period as the said Proclamation may remain in force, no person shall, at any place within the limits specified in such Proclamation, barter, sell, exchange or dispose of, directly or indirectly, to any other person, any alcoholic, spirituous, vinous, fermented or other intoxicating liquor, or any mixed liquor, or part of which is spirituous or vinous, fermented or otherwise intoxicating, nor shall expose, keep or have in his possession for sale, barter, or exchange, any intoxicating liquor; but that the section of the said Act, now in recital, should not extend to any person selling intoxicating liquors, by wholesale, and not retailing the same if such person be a licensed Distiller or Brewer.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient that the hereinbefore, in part recited Act, as amended by a certain other Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in the thirty third year of Our Reign and intituled "An Act to amend an Act for the better preservation of the Peace in the vicinity of Public Works," should be, in so far as regards the sections hereinafter mentioned, be in force in the places and within the limits hereinafter designated and described.

NOW THEREFORE KNOW YE that WE by and with the advice and consent of our Privy Council for Canada, do hereby declare that, upon and after this twenty fifth day of May instant, the hereunder mentioned sections of the said Act intituled "An Act for the better preservation of the Peace in the vicinity of Public Works," that is to say: the eleventh, twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth, fifteenth, sixteenth, seventeenth, eighteenth, nineteenth, twentieth and twenty first sections thereof—shall be in force in the places in Canada and within the limits hereinafter designated and described, that is to say: in, over and along that certain portion of the line of "The Intercolonial

Railway, now in progress of construction, known as "Section No. 10" and "Section No. 16" respectively, and for a distance of four miles from the said line of Railway, and the works thereof, on either side thereof; the said Sections of the said Railway commencing at the point at which the said the Intercolonial Railway crosses the Chaplin Island Road, near the Town of Newcastle, in the County of Northumberland, and extending Northerly along the line of the said Railway to the point of intersection thereof with the Napissiquet River, in the County of Gloucester: excepting, however, from the operation of this Our Royal Proclamation all that portion of the said Town of Newcastle which may be comprised within the said limit of four miles from the line of the said Railway.

Of all which Our loving subjects, and all others to whom these presents may come, or whom the same may, in any wise concern, are hereby required to take notice and to govern themselves accordingly:

A PROCLAMATION.

H. BERNARD, } WHEREAS by an Act  
Deputy of the Minister } of the Parliament  
of Justice, Canada. } of Canada, passed in the  
Session thereof, held in the thirty-first year of Our  
Reign, intituled: "An Act, relating to Quarantine  
and Public Health," it is, amongst other things, in  
effect, ENACTED, that the Governor in Council may,  
from time to time, make such regulations as he  
thinks proper concerning, amongst other matters,  
the entry or departure of boats or vessels at the different  
ports or places in Canada, and concerning the  
landing of passengers or cargoes from such boats or  
vessels, or the receiving of cargoes or passengers on  
board the same, as may be thought best calculated to  
preserve the Public Health, and for ensuring the due  
performance of quarantine, by, and in respect of  
vessels, passengers, goods, or things, arriving at any  
port within Canada, to which he things it right for  
the preservation of the Public Health that such regulations  
should apply, and for the thorough cleansing,  
and disinfecting of such vessels, passengers, goods,  
or things, so as to prevent, as far as possible, the  
introduction or dissemination of diseases into, or in  
Canada, and may appoint or remove such officers as he  
may deem necessary for so doing, and assign to them,

respectively, such powers as he may think required for carrying out the provisions of such regulations, and may, from time to time, revoke or amend the same, or any of them, and make others in their stead, and may impose penalties, forfeitures or punishments for the breach thereof; which regulations shall be notified, by Proclamation, published in the Canada Gazette, at least twice, and the production of the copies of the Gazette, containing any such Proclamation, shall be evidence of the making, date, and contents of such regulations. AND FURTHER, that such regulations shall have the force of law during the time they respectively remain unrevoked, unless they be expressly limited to be in force only during a certain time or at certain times or seasons, in which case they shall have the force of law during the time, and at the times and seasons during, or at, which they have been limited to be in force; and that any person disobeying any such Regulation may be prosecuted for a misdemeanor, punishable by fine or imprisonment, or both, as the Court may direct, or otherwise such person may be sued for the penalties contained in such regulation.

AND WHEREAS, by certain Regulations, amongst others, made by Our Governor General of Canada in Council, under, and in pursuance of the authority of the Act hereinabove in part recited, duly notified by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing date on the twenty-third day of May, in the thirty-first year of Our Reign and twice published in the CANADA GAZETTE, it was provided and declared, amongst other things, as follows: FIRST,—That all boats, ships, and other vessels, except the Canadian Mail Steamers, which henceforth, and during the eight months next following the first day of April in each and every year, shall arrive in the Port of Quebec, from any port or ports, place or places, in Europe or elsewhere out of Canada, by way of that part of the River St. Lawrence which is below Grosse Isle, and which shall have, at the time of their said arrival, or shall have had during their passage from the places where they respectively cleared, any person on board laboring under Asiatic Cholera, Fever, Small Pox, Scarlatina, or Measles, or other infectious and dangerous disease, or on board of which any person shall have died during such passage, or which, being of less tonnage than seven hundred tons measurement, shall have on board thirteen or more steerage passengers, or which, being of greater tonnage than seven hundred tons measurement, shall have on board fifty or more steerage passengers, or which shall have come from some infected port, shall make their Quarantine at Grosse Isle, in the River St. Lawrence, and there remain and continue until such boats, ships or vessels shall be discharged from such Quarantine, by such license or passport and discharge, given without fee or emolument of any kind, as shall be directed or permitted by such order or orders as shall be made by the Governor, with the advice of the Privy Council, and until the said boats, ships and vessels shall respectively have performed such Quarantine, and shall be discharged therefrom by such license or passport and discharge as aforesaid, persons, goods, or merchandise which shall be on board such boats, ships, or vessels, shall not come or be brought on shore, or go or be put on board of any other ship or vessel in Canada, except on Grosse Isle aforesaid, when duly required, by competent authority. SECOND—That all boats, ships and vessels which henceforth, and during the eight months aforesaid, shall arrive at the Port of Quebec, from any port or ports in Europe, place or places, or elsewhere as aforesaid, of the class or description hereinbefore mentioned, as are liable and bound to make their Quarantine at Grosse Isle, do make their further Quarantine in the Harbour of Quebec, according to the regulations thereinafter provided.

AND WHEREAS, OUR said Governor General in Council hath this day been pleased to make, under the authority, and in pursuance of the said above in part recited Act, a certain regulation in amendment of the said regulations above in part recited, which said regulation is in the words following, that is to say:—

The exception from Quarantine in favor of the Canadian Mail Steamers coming up the River St. Lawrence, which is established by the regulations now in force, under the "Quarantine and Health Act of 1868," and promulgated by Proclamation of the twenty-third day of May, A. D., 1868, is hereby suspended, and shall be of no effect whatever from this date until the first day of December next, or such earlier day as may be limited by any future Proclamation issued to that end: And all such steamers, from this date, until the first day of December next, or such earlier day, shall be held to be, and shall be, in all respects, subject to all the requirements and provisions of the said regulations, as though such exception had not therein been made in their favor, save only in so far as the same are expressly derogated from or modified hereby, as follows, that is to say: All such steamers, whenever a medical officer shall have been appointed to discharge that duty, may be by him boarded at Father Point, and inspected while *en route* for Quebec; and thereupon, in case it is found that they have not, and during their passage from the places where they respectively cleared, have not had, any person on board laboring under any infectious and dangerous disease, they may pass on without stopping to their destination,—and, in case it is found that they have, or during their passage from the places where they respectively cleared, have had, any person on board laboring under any infectious and dangerous disease, they shall make their Quarantine at Grosse Isle, or may pass on without stopping to their further Quarantine in the Harbor of Quebec, in the discretion of such medical officer,—and shall, in either of such last mentioned cases, make their further Quarantine in the Harbor of Quebec in such manner and for so long as the Inspecting Physician at Quebec may deem requisite,—and may, by such inspecting Physician, be ordered back to Grosse Isle if he shall deem that course requisite, in like manner as any other vessel may,—and whether so stopping at, or sent back to Grosse Isle, or not, may be so dealt with, as regards the landing of their mails, and otherwise, as the Medical Superintendent at Grosse Isle or such Inspecting Physician (as the case may be) shall, in his discretion direct.

NOW KNOW YE, THAT WE do hereby COMMAND and ENJOIN UPON ALL OUR loving subjects, that they do take notice of and obey the said regulation so this day made as aforesaid, and govern themselves accordingly.

Of all which our loving subjects, and all others whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a Notice, clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz:

*In the province of Quebec*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

*In any other Province*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper, in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

54. Before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving due notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

Extracts from the Code of Rules of the Senate of Canada.

## BILLS OF DIVORCE.

71. Every Applicant for a Bill of Divorce is required to give notice of his intention so to do, and to specify from whom and for what cause, by advertisements during six months in the "Official Gazette," and in two newspapers published in the District, in Quebec, or County, or Union of Counties in the other Provinces, where such applicant usually resided, at the time of the separation, or if the requisite numbers of papers cannot be found therein, then in the adjoining District, or County, or Union of Counties.

72. A copy of the Notice, in writing, is to be served at the instance of the Applicant, upon the person from whom the Divorce is sought, if the residence of such person can be ascertained; and proof on oath of such service, or of the attempts made to effect it, to the satisfaction of the Senate, is to be adduced before the Senate on the reading of the Petition.

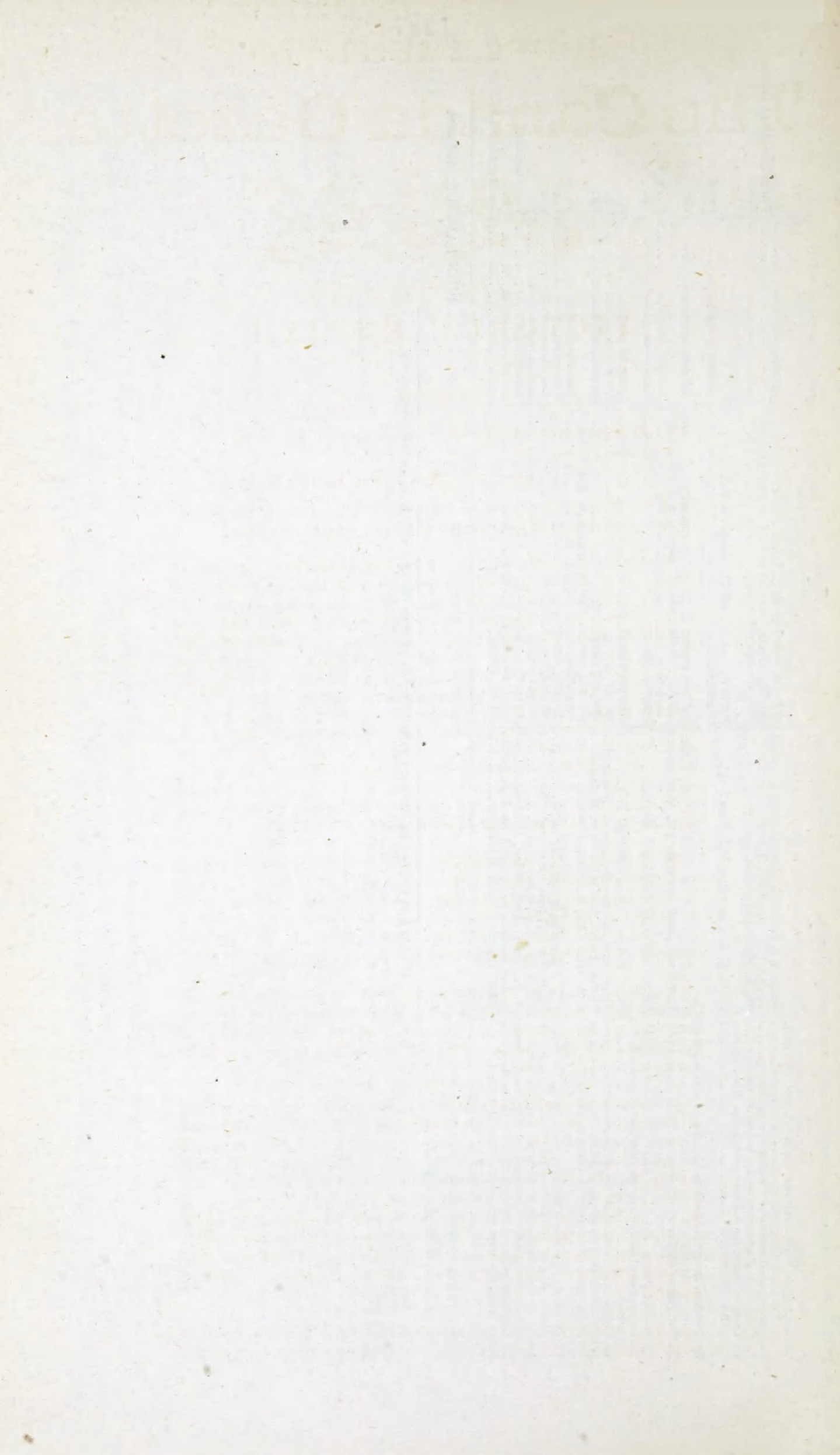

CAP. I.

An Act to amend the Act respecting the Statutes of  
Canada.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

**H**ER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate  
and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:

1. All the original Acts, passed by the Legislatures of the late Provinces of Upper or Lower Canada, or of the late Province of Canada, transferred to and deposited of record in the office of the Clerk of the Senate, and also all original Acts of the Parliament of Canada heretofore assented to, or hereafter to be assented to by the Governor General, and all Bills reserved for the signification of the Queen's pleasure, and assented to or disallowed by the Queen in Council, shall be and continue to remain of record in the custody of the Clerk of the Senate of Canada, and such Clerk, as Custodian thereof, shall be known and designated as "The Clerk of the Parliaments." And every thing now required by the Act intituled: *An Act respecting the Statutes of Canada*, or by any other Act of the Parliament of Canada, to be done by the Clerk of the Senate, as Custodian of the said Acts or any of them, shall be done by the Clerk of the Parliaments.

2. The Clerk of the Parliaments shall have a Seal of Office, and shall affix the same to certified copies of all Acts intended for the Governor General or the Registrar General of Canada or required to be produced before Courts of Justice, either within or beyond the limits of the Dominion of Canada, and in any other case, when the said Clerk may deem it expedient.

3. All copies of the Acts above referred to, so certified by the Clerk of the Parliaments, shall be held to be duplicate originals, and also to be evidence, as if printed under the authority of Parliament by the Queen's Printer, of such acts and of their contents.

4. As soon as practicable after the prorogation of every session of Parliament, the Clerk of the Parliaments shall obtain from the Queen's Printer a sufficient number of bound copies of the Statutes of Canada passed during such Session of Parliament, and shall deliver to the Governor General one copy duly certified, for transmission to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, as required by the British North America Act, 1867, together with certified copies of all Bills reserved for the signification of the Queen's pleasure, and one like copy of the said Acts in the English and French languages to the Registrar General of Canada.

5. The Clerk of the Parliaments shall also furnish certified copies of any of the Acts above mentioned to any public officer

or party applying for the same; and upon all such copies the said Clerk of the Parliaments shall, before delivering the same to such officer or party, receive from such party a fee at the rate of ten cents for every hundred words in the certified copy and certificate; and all sums so received by him shall form part of the contingent fund of the Senate.

6. All certified copies required for the public service shall be obtained from the Clerk of the Parliaments through the Secretary of State of Canada.

7. The Clerk of the Parliaments shall insert at the foot of every such copy so required to be certified, a written certificate, duly signed and authenticated by him, to the effect that it is a true copy of the Act passed by the Parliament of Canada, or by the Legislature of the late Province of Canada, or of the late Province of Upper Canada or Lower Canada (*as the case may be*) in the \_\_\_\_\_ session thereof, held in the \_\_\_\_\_ year of H. 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## CAP. VIII.

### An Act to amend the Act relating to Banks and Banking.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

**I**N amendment of the Act passed in the thirty-fourth year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act relating to Banks and Banking,"—Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:

1. Whereas by the fifteenth section of the Act cited in the preamble, it is provided that every Bank to which the said Act applies, shall be exempt from the tax on the average amount of its notes in circulation, to which other Banks will continue liable, and from the obligation to hold any portion of its capital in Government Debentures or debentures of any kind, and the Bank of British North America is one of the Banks to which the said Act applies, and is so described in section seventy-six, and is subject to the obligations in consideration whereof the exemptions in the said fifteenth section were granted, but by a clerical error in the seventy-second section, enumerating the sections which apply to the said Bank, the said fifteenth section was omitted, and it is expedient to remedy such error,—therefore, and for the removal of doubt, it is declared and enacted that the said fifteenth section shall apply to the said Bank, and shall be held to have so applied from the time when the said section came into force with respect to the Banks mentioned in the Schedule to the said Act.

2. And whereas it is provided by Acts of the Parliament of Canada, that Banks shall not be liable to incur any penalty or forfeiture for usury, and may stipulate for, take, reserve, or exact any rate of interest or discount not exceeding seven per centum per annum, and may receive and take in advance any such rate, but no higher rate of interest shall be recoverable by the Bank;—and whereas in some of the Provinces of Canada, laws may be in force, imposing penalties on parties other than Banks, for taking, or stipulating, or paying more than a certain rate of interest, and doubts may arise as to the effect of such laws

in certain cases, as to parties other than the Bank, to negotiable securities discounted or otherwise acquired and held by any Bank,—therefore it is, declared and enacted, that no promissory note, bill of exchange or other negotiable security discounted, by, or indorsed or otherwise assigned to any Bank, to which any such Act of the Parliament of Canada as aforesaid applies, shall be held to be void, usurious, or tainted by usury, as regards such Bank or any maker, drawer, acceptor, indorser, or indorsee thereof, or other party thereto, or *bonâ fide* holder thereof, nor shall any party thereto be subject to any penalty or forfeiture, by reason of any rate of interest taken, stipulated or received by such Bank, on or with respect to such promissory note, bill of exchange, or other negotiable security, or paid or allowed by any party thereto to another in compensation for, or in consideration of the rate of interest taken, or to be taken thereon by such Bank,—but no party thereto, other than the Bank, shall be entitled to recover or liable to pay more than the lawful rate of interest in the Province where the suit is brought, nor shall the Bank be entitled to recover a higher rate than seven per cent. per annum; and no innocent holder of or party to any promissory note, bill of exchange, or other negotiable security, shall in any case be deprived of any remedy against any party thereto, or liable to any penalty or forfeiture, by reason of any usury or offence against the laws of any such Province respecting interest, committed in respect of such note, bill or negotiable security, without the complicity or consent of such innocent holder or party.

3. It shall be lawful for any Bank to which the Act first herein cited applies, (including the Bank of British North America, and La Banque du Peuple) to receive deposits from any person or persons whomsoever, whatever be his, her, or their age, status or condition in life, and whether such person or persons be qualified by law to enter into ordinary contracts or not, and from time to time to repay any or all of the principal thereof and to pay the whole or any part of the interest thereon, to such person or persons respectively, without the authority, aid, assistance, or intervention of any person or persons, official or officials, being required, unless before such repayment the money so deposited in and repaid by the Bank, be lawfully claimed as the property of some other party, in which case it may be paid to the depositor with the consent of the claimant, or to the claimant with the consent of the depositor, any law, usage, or custom to the contrary, notwithstanding:—Provided always, that if the person making any deposit, as aforesaid, could not, under the law of the Province where the deposit is made, deposit and withdraw money in and from a Bank without this Act, then and in that case the total amount of deposits to be received from such person on deposit shall not at any time exceed the sum of five hundred dollars.

4. No such Bank shall be bound to see to the execution of any trust whether expressed, implied, or constructive, to which any deposit made under the authority of this Act may be subject; and, except only in the case of lawful claim by some other party before repayment, the receipt of the person in whose name any such deposit stands, or, if it stand in the name of two persons, the receipts of one, and if the names of more than two persons, the receipt of a majority of such persons, shall be a sufficient discharge to all concerned for the payment of any money payable in respect of such deposit, notwithstanding any trust to which such deposit may then be subject, and whether or not the Bank sought to be charged with such trust, (and with whom the deposit may have been made), had notice thereof; and no such Bank shall be bound to see to the application of the money paid upon such receipt, any law or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

5. The provisions contained in sections forty-six, forty-seven and forty eight of the Act cited in the Preamble are hereby extended to cereal grains in process of being converted into malt or flour, and to malt and maltsters, and also to hogs when converted into bacon and hams.

6. The provisions of the second paragraph of the fifty-first section of the said Act as to the sale of stock, bonds, debentures and securities in case of default to pay the debt for securing which they were acquired by a bank, may be departed from or varied by any agreement between the bank and the owner of such stock, bonds, debentures or securities, made at the time at which such debt was incurred, or if the time of payment of such debt has been extended then by an agreement made at the time of such extension.

7. Any bank advancing money in aid of the building of any ship or vessel, shall have the same right of acquiring, and holding security upon such ship or vessel while building and when completed, either by way of mortgage, hypothec, hypothecation privilege or lien thereon, or purchase, or transfer thereof, as individuals have in the Province wherein such ship or vessel is being built, and for that purpose shall be authorized to avail itself of all such rights and means of obtaining and enforcing such security, and shall be subject to all such obligations, limitations and conditions, as are by the law of such Province conferred or imposed upon individuals making such advances.

8. In all matters relating to bills of exchange and promissory notes, the following and no other shall be observed as legal holidays, non juridical days or that is to say:—

1. In the Provinces of Ontario, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia,—

Sundays,  
New Year's Day,  
Good Friday,  
Christmas Day,

The birthday (or the day fixed by Proclamation for the celebration of the Birthday) of the reigning Sovereign.

Any day appointed by Proclamation for a public holiday, or for a general fast, or a general thanksgiving throughout the Dominion; and the day next following New Year's Day and Christmas Day, when these days respectively fall on Sunday.

And in the Province of Quebec the same days shall be observed as legal holidays, with the addition of,—

The Epiphany,  
The Annunciation,  
The Ascension,  
Corpus Christi,  
St. Peter and St. Paul's Day,  
All Saints Day,  
Conception Day.

2. And in any one of the said Provinces of the Dominion any day appointed by Proclamation of the Lieutenant-Governor of such Province for a public holiday or for a fast or thanksgiving within the same.

3. And with regard to bills of exchange and promissory notes, whenever the last day of grace falls on a legal holiday or non-judicial day in the Province where any such bill or note is payable, then the day next following not being a legal holiday or non-judicial day in such province shall be the last day of grace as to such bill or note.

4. All provisions of any Acts or laws or portions of Acts or laws heretofore in force in any of the said Provinces or of the Dominion inconsistent with the provisions of this section are hereby repealed.

9. This Act shall apply to the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, only.

## CAP. IX.

An Act to amend the chapters six and seven of the Statutes of 1871, relating to Savings Banks.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

**I**N Amendment of the Act passed in the thirty-fourth year of Her Majesty's reign, and intituled: "An Act to provide additional facilities for depositing Savings at interest, with the security of the Government, and for the issue and redemption of Dominion Notes,"—Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

1. Whereas by the sixteenth section of the Act cited in the preamble, it is provided that any surplus or deficiency in the property and assets as compared with the liabilities of the St. John's Savings Bank (New Brunswick), shall be taken into account, and a proper allowance made therefor, in the settlement of the accounts between the Dominion and the said Province, and it has been found expedient and has been agreed, that the following provision be made in lieu of that so made as aforesaid, therefore,—the surplus of the assets and property over the liabilities of the said St. John's Savings Bank, on the first day of July, 1871, which has been ascertained to be thirty-nine thousand five hundred and sixty dollars and forty-four cents, shall be left in the hands of the trustees of the said Savings Bank, to be by them appropriated and paid over for such local purpose or purposes of public interest, in the city of St. John, as may be approved by the Governor in Council,—and so much of the said section or Act as may be inconsistent herewith, is hereby repealed.

2. And whereas the affairs and business of the Northumberland and Durham Savings Bank have been wound up and the institution has been closed, in view of the approaching expiration of the Act under which it was constituted, passed by the Legislature of the late Province of Canada in the session thereof, held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, and intituled: "An Act to encourage the establishment of, and to regulate Savings Banks in this Province,"—and there is no charitable institution to which the surplus of the assets of the institution over its liabilities ought to be distributed under the said Act,—Therefore the surplus of the assets of the said Savings Bank over its liabilities, on the tenth day of April, 1872, which have been ascertained to be eighty-seven thousand six hundred and sixty-nine dollars and ninety-one cents, shall be left in the hands of the Trustees of the said Savings Bank, or the majority of them, to be by them appropriated to some local purpose or purposes of public interest, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council.

3. And for the avoidance of doubt by reason of a discrepancy between the English and French versions of the eighteenth section of the Act passed in the thirty-fourth year of Her Majesty's Reign, and intituled: "An Act respecting certain Savings' Banks in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec,"—it is hereby declared that the English version of the said section is correct, and that for the expression *capital versé*,—in the second line of the said section as printed in French by the Queen's Printer, the expression *capital souscrit* ought to have been and is hereby substituted, and the said section and Act shall have effect as if such substitution had been made at the time of the passing of said Act.

## CAP. X.

An Act relating to Bills of Exchange and Promissary Notes.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

**W**HEREAS doubts exist as to the time of the maturity of a Bill of Exchange or Promissary Note payable at a month or months after date, and it is desirable to set such doubts at rest: Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada declares and enacts as follows:—

1. Every Bill of Exchange or Promissary Note which is made payable at a month, or months, from and after the date thereof, becomes due and payable on the same numbered day of the month in which it is made payable, as the day on which it is dated, unless there is no such day in the month in which it is made payable, and in such case it becomes due and payable on the last day of that month, with the addition in all cases of the days of grace allowed by law.

## CAP. XI.

An Act to repeal the duties of Customs on Tea and Coffee.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

**H**ER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:

1. All the duties of Customs whether, specific or *ad valorem*, now payable on Tea or Coffee imported into Canada, shall be repealed upon, from and after the first day of July in the present year, 1872: Provided that Tea and Coffee on which such duties have been paid, may be re-bonded and re-warehoused at any time before the Twenty Ninth day of June in the same present year, under such regulations (if any), as the Governor in Council may see fit to make, and that on their being so re-bonded and re-warehoused, the specific duties paid on such Tea and Coffee shall be repaid to the owner thereof, as a drawback, by the Collector of Customs at the port where they are so re-bonded and re-warehoused, or by the Receiver General.

## CAP. XII.

An Act to amend an Act of the present Session, and to enable the Governor in Council to impose a duty on Tea and Coffee imported from the United States, in the case therein mentioned.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

**I**N amendment of the Act of the present Session, intituled, "An Act to repeal the duties of Customs on Tea and Coffee," Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

1. Provided always, that if at any time any greater duty of customs should be payable in the United States of America on tea or coffee imported from Canada, than on tea or coffee imported from any other country, then the Governor in Council may impose on tea or coffee imported into Canada from the said United States, a duty of customs equal to the duty payable in the United States on tea or coffee imported from Canada: Provided that tea or coffee imported into Canada from any country other than the said United States, but passing in bond through the United States shall be free from duty.

## CAP. XIII.

An Act to re-adjust the Representation in the House of Commons.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

WHEREAS, by the Census of the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in accordance with the British North America Act, 1867, the Province of Ontario is entitled to six additional members in the House of Commons, the Province of Nova Scotia to two additional members, and the Province of New Brunswick to one additional member, the same being severally in excess of the number of members of the House of Commons for each of the said Provinces, as provided by the British North America Act, 1867: And whereas it is expedient otherwise to re-adjust the boundaries of certain of the electoral districts; Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

1. The House of Commons shall consist of Two hundred members, of whom Eighty-eight shall be elected for Ontario, Sixty-five for Quebec, Twenty-one for Nova Scotia, Sixteen for New Brunswick, Four for Manitoba, and Six for British Columbia.

2. The Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, shall, for the purposes of the election of Members to serve in the House of Commons, continue to be divided into the electoral districts established by the British North America Act, 1867, each represented as it now is, except where altered by this Act, as follows, that is to say:—

## ONTARIO.

1. The County of Huron shall be divided into three Ridings, to be called respectively the North, the Centre and the South Riding, each of which shall be an Electoral District and shall return one member:

The North Riding to consist of the Townships of Howick, Ashfield, West Wawanosh, East Wawanosh, Morris, and Tarnberry;

The Centre Riding to consist of the Townships of Colborne, Hullet, McKillop, Tuckersmith, Grey, the Town of Goderich and the Village of Seaforth;

The South Riding to consist of the Townships of Goderich, Stanley, Hay, Stephen, Osborne, and the Village of Clinton.

2. The County of Grey shall be divided into three Ridings, to be called respectively the North, the East, and the South Riding, each of which shall be an Electoral District, and shall return one Member:

The North Riding to consist of the Townships of Holland, Sullivan, Sydenham, Derby, Sarawak, Keppel, and the Town of Owen Sound;

The East Riding to consist of the Townships of Proton, Melanethon, Osprey, Artemesia, Collingwood, Euphrasia, and St. Vincent;

The South Riding to consist of the Townships of Normanby, Egremont, Bentinck, and Glenelg.

3. The Townships of Morrison, Ryde, Muskoka, Draper, Oakley, Wood, Monck, Macaulay, McLean, Medora, Watt, Stephenson, Brunel, Humphrey, Cardwell, Stisted, Chaffey, Christie, Monteith, McMurrich, Matchitt, Ryerson, Spence, McKellar, McDougall, Ferguson, Carling, Hagerman, Croft, Chapman, Ferrie, Mackenzie, Wilson, Brown, Blair, Mowat, Cowper, Conger, Parry Island, Parry Sound, Aumick Lake Territory, Maganetawan, and all other surveyed townships lying north of the North Riding of Victoria, and south of the Nipissing District, shall form the Electoral District of Muskoka, and shall return one member.

4. The City of Toronto, shall be divided into three Electoral Districts, to be called respectively West Toronto, East Toronto and Centre Toronto, each of which shall return one member:

West Toronto to consist of the wards as at present constituted of St. Andrew, St. George and St. Patrick;

East Toronto to consist of the wards as at present constituted of St. David and St. Lawrence;

Centre Toronto to consist of the wards as at present constituted of St. John and St. James.

5. The City of Hamilton shall return two members.

6. The City of Ottawa shall return two members.

7. The County of Haldimand, shall consist of the Townships of Oneida, Seneca, Cayuga North, Cayuga South, Rainham and Walpole.

8. The County of Monck, shall consist of the Townships of Canborough, and Moulton and Sherbrooke and Dunn, and the Village of Dunnville (taken from the County of Haldimand) the Townships of Caistor and Gainsborough (taken from the County of Lincoln) and the Townships of Pelham and Wainfleet (taken from the County of Welland).

9. The County of Wellington shall be divided into three Ridings, to be called respectively the North, Centre, and South Riding, each of which shall be an Electoral District, and shall return one member ;

The North Riding to consist of the Townships of Maryborough, Minto, Arthur, Luther, and Amaranth ; and the Villages of Mount Forest and Arthur ;

The Centre Riding to consist of the Townships of Pilkington, Elora, Nichol, Fergus, Garrafraxa West, Garrafraxa East, Peel, and the Village of Orangeville ;

The South Riding to consist of the Townships of Puslinch, Guelph, Eramosa, and Erin, and the Town of Guelph.

10. The North Riding of the County of Victoria shall include and consist of the same Townships as it did before the passing of this Act, except those included by this Act in the Electoral District of Muskoka.

11. The townships of Hagarty, Richards, Sherwood, Burns and Jones, shall be added to and included in the South Riding of the County of Renfrew.

#### QUEBEC.

1. So much of sub-sections twenty-six and twenty-seven, of section one of chapter seventy-five of the Consolidated Statutes for Lower Canada, intituled, "An Act respecting the division of Lower Canada into counties, and the boundaries of certain cities and towns for the purpose of Representation in the Legislature," as refers to the limits of the counties of Quebec and Portneuf, is hereby amended, and the parish of Saint Felix of Cap Rouge, as erected for civil purposes by Proclamation of the Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Quebec, bearing date the Eleventh day of March, in the year of Our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Seventy-two, shall form part of the county of Quebec, in so far as relates to the election of members of the House of Commons of Canada, and every part of the said parish which at the time of the passing of this Act was included in the county of Portneuf, shall be detached from the county of Portneuf, and shall be attached to the county of Quebec, for the electoral purposes hereinbefore set forth.

2. The City of Montreal shall be divided into three Electoral Districts to be called respectively Montreal West, Montreal Centre, and Montreal East, each of which shall return one member ;

Montreal West to consist of the wards as at present constituted of St. Antoine and St. Lawrence ;

Montreal Centre to consist of the wards as at present constituted of St. Ann, West Ward, Centre Ward, and East Ward ;

Montreal East to consist of the wards as at present constituted of Lewis, St. James, and St. Mary.

#### NOVA SCOTIA.

The counties of Cape Breton and Pictou shall each return two members.

#### NEW BRUNSWICK.

The Electoral District of the city and county of St. John as now existing, shall return two members.

#### MANITOBA.

1. The Electoral District of Selkirk, shall consist of and comprise, of the Provincial electoral divisions recently established by the proclamation of the Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba, for the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba, those known as :—

Headingley, or No. 8 ;

Saint Charles, or No. 9 ;

Saint James, or No. 10 ;

Saint Boniface, West and East, or Nos. 11 and 12 ;

Winnipeg and Saint John, or No. 18 ;

Kildonan, or No. 19 ;

And shall return one member.



2. The Electoral District of Provencher, shall consist of all the settlements on the Red River, and in the neighborhood lying between the south line of the Electoral District of Selkirk and the frontier of the United States, including the settlements on the Seine, at Oak Point, or Saint Anne, and shall return one member.

3. The Electoral District of Lisgar, shall consist of all the settlements on the Red River and in the neighborhood between the north line of the electoral district of Selkirk and the northern frontier of the Province, including those at Broken Head River, and shall return one member.

4. The Electoral District of Marquette, shall consist of all the settlements on the Assiniboine and Lake Manitoba, and all other settlements to the westward of the western line of the electoral district of Selkirk, and shall return one member.

#### BRITISH COLUMBIA.

1. The Electoral District of New Westminster shall consist of "New Westminster District" and the "Coast District," as defined in a public notice issued from the Lands and Works Office in the said Colony, on the 15th day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, by the desire of the Governor, and purporting to be in accordance with the provisions of the thirty-ninth clause of the "Mineral Ordinance, 1869," and shall return one member.

2. The Electoral District of Cariboo shall consist of "Cariboo District" and "Lillooet District," as specified in the said public notice, and shall return one member.

3. The Electoral District of Yale shall consist of "Yale District" and "Kootenay District," as specified in the said public notice, and shall return one member.

4. The Electoral District of Victoria shall consist of those portions of Vancouver Island, known as "Victoria District," "Esquimalt District" and "Metchosin District," as defined in the official maps of those districts which are in the Land Office, Victoria, and are designated respectively, "Victoria District Official Map, 1858," "Esquimalt District Official Map, 1858," and "Metchosin District Official Map A.D., 1858," and shall return two Members.

5. The Electoral District of Vancouver shall consist of all the remainder of Vancouver Island, and all such Islands adjacent thereto, as were formerly dependencies of the late Colony of Vancouver Island, and shall return one Member.

3. This Act shall take effect upon, from, and after the termination of this present existing Parliament.

#### CAP. XIV.

An Act to amend *The Interim Parliamentary Elections Act, 1871.*

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

**I**N amendment of *The Interim Parliamentary Elections Act, 1871*, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

#### PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

1. The second and fourth sub-sections of the second section in the Act cited in the preamble are hereby repealed.

2. In the Province of Ontario, subject to the special provisions hereinafter made, the qualification of voters at elections for members of the House of Commons shall be that established by the laws in force in that Province on the twenty-third day of January, 1869, as the qualification of voters at elections for members of the Legislative Assembly, and the voters' lists to be used at elections of members of the House of Commons shall be the same as if such elections were of members of the Legislative Assembly on the basis of the qualification aforesaid, and the polling sub-divisions or wards shall be the same as if such elections were for members of the Legislative Assembly; and the returning officer shall provide a polling place for each such sub-division or ward in the most central and convenient place for such elections.

3. The oath or affirmation to be required of voters in the said Province, shall be that prescribed by the fifty-fourth section of chapter six, of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, and no other, except only in the electoral districts of Algoma and Muskoka, as hereinafter provided.

4. In the Electoral Districts of Algoma and Muskoka, the persons entitled to vote at elections for members of the House of Commons shall be male persons, of the full age of twenty-one years, subjects of Her Majesty by birth or naturalization, and not otherwise disqualified, being at the time of the election, owners of real estate in the Electoral District for which they claim to vote, of the value of two hundred dollars or upwards, or householders in the same, and having been such owners or householders, during the six months next preceding the election; subject to the following provisions:

1. In any place in the said Electoral District of Muskoka, for which voters' lists have been made, the same provisions shall apply as in other electoral districts in the said Province, and the oath or affirmation to be required of voters shall be the same:

2. In other places in the said Electoral District of Muskoka, and in the whole of the Electoral District of Algoma, the oath or affirmation to be required of voters, shall be varied by omitting the words "that you are (*name of voter*) whose name is entered on the list of voters now shewn to you," and inserting instead thereof the words "that you are the owner of real estate in this Electoral District, of the value of two hundred dollars," (*or* "that you are a householder at in this Electoral District, (*as the case may be,*) and that you have been such owner, (*or* such householder,) during the six months next preceding this election."

5. In the said Electoral Districts of Algoma and Muskoka, the like rules shall be observed and the like instructions given, for the conduct of and proceedings at elections of Members of the House of Commons, as were observed and given at the now last election of a Member of the House of Commons for Algoma; except as regards the qualification of electors, and the oath or affirmation which may be required of them, which shall be as hereinbefore provided, and except also as to those townships and places in which voters' lists have been made, to and in which the laws relating to the qualification of voters and the conduct of and proceedings at elections in Electoral Districts other than Algoma, shall apply and be observed.

6. It shall be the duty of the returning officers of the North Riding of Norfolk, and the South Riding of Oxford respectively, on receiving the writs of election for the next general election, to extract from the voters' list of the Town of Tilsonburg the names of the several voters on such list entitled to vote in their respective ridings of such returning officers, and to place such names on supplementary lists, to be signed by the said returning officers respectively, and to be delivered by them to the proper Deputy Returning Officers, for the purpose of enabling the persons named in such lists to vote at the next election.

#### PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA.

7. In the Province of Nova Scotia, the revisors under chapter twenty-eight of the Acts of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, passed in the year 1863, intituled: "An Act to regulate the election of Members to serve in the General Assembly," for the Revisal District number two of the County of Victoria, in the said Province, or for any other revisal district in the said Province in which the requirements of the fourth section of the Act hereby amended may not have been complied with, may and shall within six weeks after the passing of this Act, prepare and file with the clerk of the peace the alphabetical list of electors qualified to vote in the said revisal district number two, or any other such revisal district as aforesaid, at elections of Members to serve in the House of Commons of Canada, in the manner prescribed by the Act hereby amended; and for any neglect or wilful breach of duty under this Act the revisors shall be subject to the penalties prescribed in section twenty-four of the Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia above cited; and the lists of electors so made shall be of the same effect and serve for the same purposes as if made within the time limited by the Act hereby amended, and the like provisions of the said Act of Nova Scotia shall be applicable to the said lists; and the lists made for like purposes in and for the revisal districts numbers one and three of the said county, or in any other

revisal district, in conformity to the said Act, are hereby confirmed and made valid.

8. Nothing in this Act shall prevent the effect of any Act passed during the present session respecting certain polling districts in the county of Inverness.

PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

9. In the Province of New Brunswick, the polling districts and polling lists shall be the same as if the elections were for Members of the Legislative Assembly, notwithstanding any changes that may have been made in such polling districts and lists since the first day of July, 1867.

PROVINCES OF MANITOBA AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

10. In the Province of Manitoba, the qualification of voters shall, in places (if any) for which voters' lists have been made for the Legislative Assembly, under any Provincial law in that behalf, then in force, be the same as that established by such law, and such lists shall be used at the elections, but if no such lists have been made, and in places for which such lists have not been made, the qualification shall be that established by the Act of the Parliament of Canada, 33 Victoria, chapter 3,—and in all respects (except as aforesaid as to the qualification of voters) the like laws and rules shall be observed, and the like instructions given, for the conduct of and proceedings at elections of members of the House of Commons, as were observed and given at the now last elections of members of the House of Commons in the said Province.

11. In the Province of British Columbia, the qualification of voters shall, in places (if any) for which voters' lists have been made for the Legislative Assembly under any Provincial law in that behalf, then in force, be the same as that established by such law, and such lists shall be used at the elections, but if no such lists have been made, and in places for which such lists have not been made, the qualification shall be the same as at the last election of Members of the House of Commons, and in all other respects the like laws and rules shall be observed, and the like instructions given, for the conduct of and the proceedings at elections of Members of the House of Commons, as were observed and given at the now last elections of Members of the House of Commons in the said Province.

GENERAL PROVISION.

12. If any candidate who shall not have been returned is proved guilty before the proper tribunal for using, during any such election means of corruption, he shall be incapable of being a candidate or being elected or returned during the Parliament for which such election was held.

CAP. XV.

An Act to compel Members of the Local Legislature in any Province where dual representation is not allowed, to resign their Seats before becoming Candidates for Seats in the Dominion Parliament.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

HER MAJESTY, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows :—

1. No person shall be eligible to, or be capable of being nominated to or voted for, or of being elected to, or of sitting or voting in the House of Commons, who, on the day of the Nomination at any election to the House of Commons, is a Member of the Legislative Council or Assembly of any Province in which, by Law, Members of the Senate or House of Commons are rendered

incapable of being appointed to, or of sitting or voting in the Legislative Council, or of being elected to, or of sitting or voting in the House of Assembly thereof, or who, on the day of any such Nomination is a Member of the Legislative Assembly in any Province in which, by Law, after the dissolution of the present House of Commons, the sitting or voting as a Member of the House of Commons by such Member of the Legislative Assembly, will have the effect of voiding his election to the Legislative Assembly thereof and vacating his seat, or of rendering him incapable of sitting or voting in the Legislative Assembly of such Province.

2. If any such Member of a Provincial Legislature shall, notwithstanding his disqualification as in the preceding section mentioned, receive a majority of votes at any such election, such majority of votes shall be thrown away, and it shall be the duty of the Returning Officer to return the person having the next greatest number of votes, provided he be otherwise eligible.

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### CAP. XVI.

An Act to provide for the Revisal of Voters' Lists for Elections to the House of Commons, in a certain Revisal District of the County of Victoria, Nova Scotia.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

**W**HEREAS the Revisors in the Revisal District number two, of the county of Victoria, Nova Scotia, neglected to prepare the proper Voters' List, within the time prescribed by the *Interim Parliamentary Elections Act, 1871*: For remedy thereof, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

The Revisors under chapter twenty-eight of the Acts of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, passed in the year 1863, intituled "An Act to regulate the Election of Members to serve in the General Assembly," for the Revisal District number two of the County of Victoria, in the said Province, may and shall within six weeks after the passing of this Act, prepare and file with the clerk of the peace the alphabetical list of electors qualified to vote in the said Revisal District number two, at elections of Members to serve in the House of Commons of Canada, in the manner prescribed by the Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in the now last session thereof, and intituled "An Act to make temporary provision for the Election of Members to serve in the House of Commons of Canada;" and for any neglect or wilful breach of duty under this Act the revisors shall be subject to the penalties prescribed in section twenty-four of the Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia above cited; and the list of electors so made shall be of the same effect and serve for the same purposes as if made within the time limited by the said Act of the Parliament of Canada, and the like provisions of the said Act of Nova Scotia shall be applicable to the said list; and the lists made for like purposes in and for the Revisal Districts numbers one and three of the said county, are hereby confirmed and declared valid.

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## CAP. XVII.

An Act to divide certain Polling Districts in the County of Inverness, in the Province of Nova Scotia, and to provide for Voters' Lists therefor.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

HER MAJESTY, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows :—

1. In the County of Inverness, in the Province of Nova Scotia, two new Polling Districts are hereby constituted, and shall be formed as follows :—

(1.) The Polling District number seventeen shall comprise and consist of so much of the present Polling District number five, as lies to the north of the main Post Road from Port Hood to Broad Cove Interval; and the polling place shall be at or near Poplar Grove;

(2.) The Polling District number eighteen shall comprise and consist of so much of the Polling District number eleven, as lies to the north of the Cheticamp Settlement; and the polling place shall be at or near the Pleasant Bay Post Office.

2. The Returning Officer shall, from the lists of Voters which would be used if this Act were not passed, make out lists of Voters for the said new Polling Districts, and for the Polling Districts numbers five and eleven, as hereby altered, and shall furnish for each of the said four Polling Districts, a copy of the list made for it.

3. This Act shall apply only to elections of Members to serve in the House of Commons of Canada.

4. So much of any existing law as may be inconsistent with this Act is hereby repealed.

## CAP. XXVI.

An Act respecting Patents of Invention.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

HER MAJESTY, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows :—

Preamble.

## PATENT OFFICE CONSTITUTED.

1. There shall be attached to the Department of Agriculture, as a branch thereof, an office to be called the Patent Office; and the Minister of Agriculture for the time being shall be the Commissioner of Patents; and it shall be the duty of the said Commissioner to receive all applications, fees, papers, documents and models for patents, and to perform all acts and things requisite to the granting and issuing of patents of invention; and he shall have the charge and custody of the books, records, papers, models, machines, and other things belonging to the said Office.

Minister of Agriculture to be commissioner of Patents of Invention.

2. The Commissioner shall cause a seal to be made for the purposes of this Act, and may cause to be sealed therewith patents and other instruments and copies proceeding from the Patent Office; and all Courts, Judges, and other persons whomsoever shall take notice of such seal, and receive impressions thereof in evidence, in like manner as impressions of the Great Seal are received in evidence, and shall also take notice of and receive in evidence, without further proof and without production of the

Seal to be made and impressions thereof to be received in evidence.

originals, copies or extracts certified under the seal of the said office to be copies of or extracts from documents deposited in such office.

**3.** The Commissioner may, from time to time, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council, make such rules and regulations, and prescribe such forms, as may appear to him necessary and expedient for the purposes of this Act, and notice thereof shall be given in the *Canada Gazette*; and all documents, executed in conformity with the same and accepted by the Commissioner, shall be held valid so far as relating to proceedings in the Patent Office.

Commissioner to make rules.

Publication and effect.

Deputy Commissioner and Clerks.

Employés in Patent Office not to be concerned in patents.

Exception.

**4.** The Deputy of the Minister of Agriculture shall be the Deputy Commissioner of Patents of Invention; and the Governor in Council may, from time to time, appoint such clerks and officers under him as may be necessary for the purposes of this Act, and such clerks and officers shall hold office during pleasure. No officer or employé of the Patent Office shall buy, sell or acquire, or traffic in an invention or patent, or rights to patents therefor; and every such purchase and sale, and every assignment or transfer thereof, by or to any officer or employé as aforesaid, shall be utterly null and void. But this shall not apply to any original inventor, or to the acquisition by bequest.

Annual report and list of patents.

Publication of specifications.

**5.** The Commissioner shall cause a report to be prepared annually and laid before Parliament of the proceedings under this Act, and shall, from time to time, and at least once in each year, publish in the *Canada Gazette* a list of patents granted, and may with the approval of the Governor in Council, cause such specifications and drawings as may be deemed of interest, or essential parts thereof, to be printed from time to time for distribution or sale.

#### WHO MAY OBTAIN PATENTS.

Any person may obtain a patent for his invention not having been then in public use in Canada for more than one year.

Form of patent.

Proviso: what shall not be patentable.

As to inventions for which foreign patents have been taken out.

Representatives of inventor may obtain the patent.

**6.** Any person having invented any new and useful art, machine, manufacture, or composition of matter, or any new and useful improvement on any art, machine, manufacture, or composition of matter, not known or used by others before his invention thereof, and not being in public use or on sale for more than one year previous to his application, in Canada with the consent or allowance of the inventor thereof, may, on a petition to that effect presented to the Commissioner, and on compliance with the other requirements of this Act, obtain a patent granting to such person an exclusive property therein; and the said patent shall be under the seal of the Patent Office and the signature of the Commissioner, or the signature of another member of the Privy Council, and shall be good and avail to the grantee, his executors, administrators, or assigns for the period mentioned in such patent; but no patent shall issue for an invention having an illicit object in view, nor for any mere scientific principle or abstract theorem.

**7.** But an inventor shall not be entitled to a patent for his invention, if a patent therefor in any other country shall have been in existence in such country more than twelve months prior to the application for such patent in Canada; and if during such twelve months any person shall have commenced to manufacture in Canada the article for which such patent is afterwards obtained, such person shall continue to have the right to manufacture and sell such article, notwithstanding such patent; and under any circumstances, where a foreign patent exists, the Canadian patent shall expire at the earliest date at which any foreign patent for the same invention expires.

**8.** The patent may be granted to any person to whom the inventor entitled under the sixth section to obtain a patent has assigned or bequeathed the right of obtaining the same, or in default of such assignment or bequest, to the executors or administrators or assigns of the deceased inventor.

9. Any person, who has invented any improvement on any patented invention, may obtain a patent for such improvement, but shall not thereby obtain the right of vending or using the original invention, nor shall the patent for the original invention confer the right of vending or using the patented improvement.

As to patents for improvements on patented inventions. Proviso.

10. In cases of joint applications, the patent shall be granted in the names of all the applicants; and in such cases, any assignment from one of the said applicants or patentees to the other or to any person, shall be registered in like manner as other assignments.

As to joint application for patent.

#### CONDITIONS AND FORMALITIES.

11. Every inventor, before a patent can be obtained, shall make oath, or, when entitled by law to make an affirmation instead of an oath, shall make an affirmation, that he verily believes that he is, or, in the case of the inventor being deceased, the applicant shall make oath or affirm that the person whose assignee or representative he is, was the inventor of the invention for which the patent is solicited, and that the several allegations in the petition contained are respectively true and correct. Such oath or affirmation may be made before any Justice of the Peace in Canada; but if the inventor or the applicant is not at the time in Canada the oath or affirmation may be made before any Minister Plenipotentiary, *chargé d'affaires*, consul, vice-consul or consular agent, holding commission under the Government of the United Kingdom, or any Judge of the country in which the applicant happens at the time to be.

Declaration to be made by application for a patent.

Before whom.

12. The petitioner for a patent shall for all the purposes of this Act elect his domicile at some known and specified place in Canada and mention the same in his petition for a patent.

Applicant to elect a domicile in Canada.

13. The applicant shall, in his petition for a patent, insert the title or name of the invention, and shall, with the petition, send in a specification, in duplicate.

Particulars required in application.

14. The specification shall correctly and fully describe the mode or modes of operating contemplated by the inventor; and shall state clearly and distinctly the contrivances and things which he claims as new and for the use of which he claims an exclusive property and privilege; it shall bear the name of the place where it is made, the date, and be signed by the inventor if he be alive, (and if not by the applicant) and two witnesses; in the case of a machine the specification shall fully explain the principle and the several modes in which it is intended to apply and work out the same; in the case of a machine or in any other case where the invention admits of illustration by means of drawings, the applicant shall also, with his application, send in drawings in duplicate showing clearly all parts of the invention; and each drawing shall bear the signature of the applicant or of his attorney and shall have written references corresponding with the specification, but the Commissioner may require further drawings or dispense with any of them, as he may see fit; one duplicate of the specification and of the drawings, if there are drawings, shall be annexed to the patent of which it forms an essential part, and the other duplicate shall remain deposited in the Patent Office.

Specification and drawing, form of and what to show.

Commissioner may require further drawings.

Drawings how disposed of.

15. The applicant shall also deliver to the Commissioner, unless specially dispensed from so doing for some good reason, a neat working model of his invention on a convenient scale, exhibiting its several parts in due proportion, whenever the invention admits of such model; and shall deliver to the Commissioner specimens of the ingredients, and of the composition of matter sufficient in quantity for the purpose of experiment, whenever the invention is a composition of matter; provided such ingredients and composition are not of an explosive character or otherwise dangerous, in

Working model to be delivered to the commissioner.

Or specimens of ingredients.

Exception as to explosive materials. which case they are to be furnished only when specially required by the Commissioner, and then with such precautions as shall be prescribed in the said requisition.

CONTENTS, DURATION, SURRENDER, RE-ISSUE OF PATENTS AND DISCLAIMERS.

Contents of patents. **16.** Every patent granted under this Act shall contain the title or name of the invention, with a reference to the specification, —and shall grant to the patentee, his executors, administrators, and assigns, for the period therein mentioned from the granting of the same, the exclusive right, privilege and liberty of making, constructing and using, and vending to others to be used, the said invention, subject nevertheless to adjudication before any Court of competent jurisdiction.

Conditions.

Duration of patents and periodical extension—not exceeding fifteen years in all. **17.** Patents of invention issued by the Patent Office shall be valid for a period of five, ten or fifteen years at the option of the applicant; but at or before the expiration of the said five or ten years, the holder thereof may obtain an extension of the patent for another period of five years, and after those second five years, may again obtain a further extension for another period of five years, not in any case to exceed a total period of fifteen years in all; and the instrument delivered by the Patent Office for such extension of time shall be in the form which may be from time to time adopted, to be attached, with reference, to the patent, and under the signature of the Commissioner, or of any other member of the Privy Council in case of absence of the Commissioner.

Form of extension.

Patent or extension to be examined by Minister of Justice before granted. **18.** Every patent and instrument for the extension of time as aforesaid shall, before it is signed by the Commissioner or any other member of the Privy Council and before the seal hereinbefore mentioned is affixed to it, be examined by the Minister of Justice, who, if he finds it conformable to law, shall certify accordingly, and such patent or instrument may then be signed and the seal affixed thereto, and being duly registered, shall avail to the grantee thereof.

In certain cases of error &c., the commissioner may cause a new patent to issue, on amended specification. **19.** Whenever any patent shall be deemed defective or inoperative by reason of insufficient description or specification, or by reason of the patentee claiming more than he had a right to claim as new, but at the same time it appears that the error arose from inadvertence, accident or mistake, without any fraudulent or deceptive intention, the Commissioner may, upon the surrender of such patent and the payment of the further fee hereinafter provided, cause a new patent, in accordance with an amended description and specification to be made by such patentee, to be issued to him for the same invention for any part or the whole of the then unexpired residue of the period for which the original patent was or might have been, as hereinbefore directed, granted; —In case of the death of the original patentee or of his having assigned the patent, a like right shall vest in his assignee or legal representative: The new patent, and the amended description and specification, shall have the same effect in law, on the trial of any action thereafter commenced for any cause subsequently accruing, as if the same had been originally filed in such corrected form before the issue of the original patent.

Effect of new patent and specification.

Patentee may disclaim anything included in the patent by mistake. **20.** Similarly, whenever by any mistake, accident or inadvertence, and without any wilful intent to defraud or mislead the public, a patentee has made his specification too broad, claiming more than that of which he or the party through whom he claims was the first inventor, or has in the specification claimed that he or the party through whom he claims was the first inventor of any material or substantial part of the invention patented, of which he was not the first inventor, and to which he had no legal right;—the patentee may, on payment of the fee hereinafter provided, make disclaimer of such parts as he does not claim to hold by virtue of the patent or the assignment thereof:—such disclaimer

Form.



shall be in writing, and in duplicate, and attested in the manner hereinbefore prescribed for a patent, one copy to be filed and recorded in the office of the Commissioner, the other copy to be attached to the patent and made a part thereof by reference, and such disclaimer shall thereafter be taken and considered as part of the original specification. Such disclaimer shall not affect any action pending at the time of its being made, except in so far as may relate to the question of unreasonable neglect or delay in making it. In case of the death of the original Patentee or of his having assigned the patent, a like right shall vest in his assigns or legal representatives respectively, any of whom may make disclaimer. The patent shall thereafter be deemed good and valid for so much of the invention as is truly the disclaimant's own and not disclaimed, provided it be a material and substantial part of the invention, and definitely distinguished from other parts claimed without right; and the disclaimant shall be entitled to maintain a suit for such part accordingly.

Disclaimer not to effect pending suits.

In case of death of patentee.

Effect of disclaimer.

#### ASSIGNMENT AND INFRINGEMENT OF PATENTS.

**21.** The Government of Canada may always use any patented invention, paying to the patentee such sum as the Commissioner may report to be a reasonable compensation for the use thereof.

Government may use patented invention.

**22.** Every patent for an invention whensoever issued shall be assignable in law either as to the whole interest or as to any part thereof, by any instrument in writing; but such assignment, and also every grant and conveyance of any exclusive right to make and use and to grant to others the right to make and use the invention patented, within and throughout Canada or any part thereof, shall be registered in the office of the Commissioner, in the manner from time to time adopted by the Commissioner of Patents for such registration; and every assignment affecting a patent for invention shall be deemed null and void against any subsequent assignee unless such instrument is registered as hereinbefore prescribed, before the registering of the instrument under which such subsequent assignee may claim.

Patents to be assignable.

To be registered on pain of nullity.

**23.** Every person who, without the consent in writing of the patentee, makes, constructs or puts in practice any invention for which a patent has been obtained under this Act or any previous Act, or procures such invention from any person not authorized to make or use it by the patentee, and uses it, shall be liable to the patentee in an action of damages for so doing;—and the judgment shall be enforced, and the damages and costs that may be adjudged, shall be recovered in like manner as in other cases in the Court in which the action is brought.

Remedy for infringement of patent.

**24.** An action for the infringement of a patent may be brought before any Court of Record having jurisdiction to the amount of damages asked for, and having its sittings within the Province in which the infringement is said to have taken place, and being, at the same time, of the Courts of such jurisdiction within such Province, the one of which the place of holding is nearest to the place of residence or of business of the defendant; and such Court shall decide the case and determine as to costs. In any action for the infringement of a patent, the court, if sitting, or any Judge thereof in chambers if the Court be not sitting, may, on the application of the plaintiff or defendant respectively, make such order for an injunction, restraining the opposite party from further use, manufacture, or sale of the subject matter of the patent, and for his punishment in the event of disobedience to such order, or for inspection or account, and respecting the same and the proceedings in the action, as the Court or Judge may see fit;—but, from such order, an appeal shall lie under the same circumstances and to the same Court, as from other judgments or orders of the Court in which the order was made.

Action for infringement of patent.

Injunction may issue.

Appeal allowed.

Court may discriminate in certain cases.

**25.** Whenever the plaintiff fails to sustain his action, because his specification and claim embrace more than that of which he was the first inventor, and it appears that the defendant used or infringed any part of the invention, justly and truly specified and claimed as new, the court may discriminate, and the judgment may be rendered accordingly.

Defence in actions for infringement.

**26.** The defendant, in any such action, may specially plead as matter of defence, any fact or default which, by this Act, or by law, would render the patent void; and the Court shall take cognizance of that special pleading and of the facts connected therewith, and shall decide the case accordingly.

#### NULLITY, IMPEACHMENT AND AVOIDANCE OF PATENTS.

Patent may be declared void in certain cases, or valid only for part.

**27.** A patent shall be void, if any material allegation in the petition or declaration of the applicant be untrue, or if the specifications and drawings contain more or less than is necessary for obtaining the end for which they purport to be made, such omission or addition being wilfully made for the purpose of misleading; but if it shall appear to the Court that such omission or addition is simply an involuntary error, and it is proved that the patentee is entitled to the remainder of his patent *pro tanto*, the Court shall render a judgment in accordance with the facts, and determine as to costs, and the patent shall be held valid for such part of the invention described; and two office copies of such judgment shall be furnished to the Patent Office by the patentee, one to be registered and to remain of record in the office, and the other to be attached to the patent, and made a part of it by a reference.

Copy of judgment to be sent to Patent Office.

Patents to be conditional for the manufacture in Canada of the thing patented;

**28.** Every patent granted under this Act shall be subject and expressed to be subject to the condition that such Patent and all the rights and privileges thereby granted shall cease and determine and the patent shall be null and void, at the end of two years from the date thereof, unless the patentee, or his assignee or assignees, shall, within that period have commenced, and shall, after such commencement, continuously carry on in Canada the construction or manufacture of the invention or discovery patented, in such manner that any person desiring to use it may obtain it, or cause it to be made for him at a reasonable price, at some manufactory or establishment for making or constructing it, in Canada, and that such patent shall be void if, after the expiration of twelve months from the granting thereof, the patentee, or his assignee or assignees, for the whole or a part of his interest in the patent, imports, or causes to be imported into Canada, the invention for which the patent is granted; and provided always, that in case disputes should arise as to whether a patent has or has not become null and void under the provisions of this section, such disputes shall be settled by the Minister of Agriculture, or his deputy, whose decision shall be final.

and of the patentee's not importing it into Canada.

Proviso :]

Commissioner may extend to term for manufacture in Canada.

2. Whenever a patentee has been unable to carry on the construction or manufacture of his invention within the two years hereinbefore mentioned, the Commissioner may grant to the patentee a further delay on his adducing proof to the satisfaction of the Commissioner that he was for reasons beyond his control prevented from complying with the same, but no such further delay shall be thus granted in any case in advance of the time hereinbefore prescribed.

Proceedings for impeachment of patent.

**29.** Any person desiring to impeach any patent issued under this Act, may obtain a sealed and certified copy of the patent and of the petition, affidavit, specification, and drawings thereunto relating, and may have the same filed in the office of the Prothonotary or Clerk of the Superior Court for the Province of Quebec, or of the Court of Queen's Bench or Common Pleas for the Province of Ontario, or of the Supreme Court in the Province of Nova

Scotia, or of the Court of Queen's Bench in the Province of New Brunswick, according to the domicile elected by the patentee as aforesaid, or in the Court of highest jurisdiction in the Province of Manitoba or British Columbia, which Courts shall adjudicate on the matter and decide as to costs. The patent and documents aforesaid shall then be held as of record in such Court, so that a writ of *scire facias* under the seal of the Court grounded upon such record may issue for the repeal of the patent, for cause as aforesaid, if upon proceedings had upon the writ in accordance with the meaning of this Act, the patent be adjudged to be void. Scire facias may issue.

**30.** A certificate of the judgment voiding any patent shall, at the request of any person or party filing it to be of record in the Patent Office, be entered on the margin of the enrolment of the patent in the Office of the Commissioner, and the patent shall thereupon be and be held to have been void and of no effect, unless and until the judgment be reversed on appeal as hereinafter provided. Judgment voiding patent to be filed in Patent Office.

**31.** The judgment declaring any patent void, shall be subject to appeal to any Court of Appeal having appellate jurisdiction in other cases over the Court by which the same was rendered. To be subject to appeal.

PATENTS ISSUED UNDER FORMER LAWS.

**32.** All patents issued under any Act of the Legislature of the late Province of Canada, or of Nova Scotia or of New Brunswick or of British Columbia, and all patents issued for the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, under any Act of the late Province of Canada, and all patents issued under the "Patent Act of 1869," to the date of the coming into operation of the present Act, shall remain in force for the same term and for the same extent of territory, as if the Act under which they were issued had not been repealed, but subject to the provisions of this Act in so far as applicable to them. Existing Provincial and Dominion patents to remain in force.

2. And it shall be lawful for the Commissioner, upon the application of the patentee named in any such patent, being the inventor of the subject matter of the patent, if the subject matter of the patent has not been known or used, nor with the consent of the patentee on sale in any of the other Provinces of the Dominion, to issue on payment of the proper fees in that behalf a patent under this Act extending such Provincial patent over the whole of the Dominion, for the remainder of the term mentioned in the Provincial patent. Extension Provincial patents to other Provinces, on certain conditions.

**33.** All the records of the Patent Offices of the late Province of Canada, and of the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and British Columbia, shall be handed over by the officers in charge of them to the Commissioner of Patents of invention, to form part of the records of the Patent Office for the purposes of this Act. Records of Provincial Patent Offices to be handed over to the Commissioner.

TARIFF OF FEES.

**34.** The following fees shall be payable to the Commissioner, before an application for any of the purposes hereinafter mentioned shall be entertained, that is to say: Tariff of fees.

On petition for a patent for 5 years.....	\$20 00

On petition to re-issue a patent after surrender, and on petition to extend a former patent to the Dominion, for every unexpired year of the duration of sub-patent, the fee shall be at the rate of ..... 4 00

On office copies of documents, not above mentioned, the following charges shall be made :—

For every single or first folio of certified copy..... \$0 50

For every subsequent hundred words (fractions from and under fifty being not counted, and over fifty being counted for one hundred)..... 0 25

For copies of drawings.

**35.** For every copy of drawings, the party applying shall pay such sum as the Commissioner considers a fair remuneration for time and labor expended thereon by any officer of the department or person employed to perform such service.

Fees to be in full of all services.

**36.** The said fees shall be in full of all services performed under this Act, in any such case, by the Commissioner or any person employed in the Patent Office.

Fees to form part of Con. Rev. Fund. Exception.

**37.** All fees received under this Act shall be paid over to the Receiver General and form part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada, except such sums as may be paid for copies of drawings when made by persons not receiving salaries in the Patent Office.

Return of fees in certain cases only.

**38.** No fee shall be made the subject of exemption in favor of any person; and no fee, once paid, shall be returned to the person who paid it, except:

1. When the invention is not susceptible of being patented;
2. When the petition for a Patent is withdrawn;

And in every such case the Commissioner may return one half of the fee paid;

Case of withdrawal.

And in the case of withdrawal, a fresh application shall be necessary to revive the claim, as if no proceeding had taken place in the matter.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

Intending applicant for a patent may file a caveat.

**39.** An intending applicant for a patent who has not yet perfected his invention and is in fear of being despoiled of his idea, may file in the Patent Office a description of his invention so far, with or without plans, at his own will; and the Commissioner, on reception of the fee hereinbefore prescribed, shall cause the said document to be preserved in secrecy, with the exception of delivering copies of the same whenever required by the said party or by any judicial tribunal—the secrecy of the document to cease when he obtains a patent for his invention; and such document shall be called a *caveat*: Provided always that if application shall be made by any other person for a patent for any invention with which such *caveat* may in any respect interfere, it shall be the duty of the Commissioner forthwith to give notice by mail to the person who has filed such *caveat*, and such person shall within three months after the date of mailing the notice, if he would avail himself of the *caveat*, file his petition and take the other steps necessary on an application for patent, and if, in the opinion of the Commissioner the applications are interfering, like proceedings may be had in all respects as are by this Act provided in the case of interfering applications: Provided further, that unless the person filing any *caveat* shall within one year from the filing thereof have made application for a patent, the Commissioner of Patents shall be relieved from the obligation of giving notice, the *caveat* then remaining as a simple matter of proof as to novelty or priority of invention if needed.

Effect of caveat

Proviso: duration of caveat.

Commissioner may object to grant a patent in certain cases.

**40.** The Commissioner may object to grant a patent in the following cases :—

1. When he is of opinion that the alleged invention is not patentable in law ;
2. When it appears to him that the invention is already in the possession of the public with the consent or allowance of the inventor ;
3. When it appears to him that there is no novelty in the invention ;
4. When it appears that the invention has been described in a book or other printed publication before the date of the application, or is otherwise in the possession of the public ;
5. When it appears that the invention has already been patented in Canada (or elsewhere, when the case is one within the seventh section of this Act,) except, however, when the case is one in which the Commissioner has doubts as to whether the patentee or the applicant is the first inventor.

41. Whenever the Commissioner objects to grant a patent as aforesaid, he shall notify the applicant to that effect and shall state the ground or reason therefor with sufficient detail to enable the applicant to answer, if he can, the objection of the Commissioner.

Commissioner to notify ground of objection to applicant.

42. Every applicant who has failed to obtain a patent by reason of the objection of the Commissioner as aforesaid, may at any time within six months after notice thereof has been addressed to him or his agent, appeal from the decision of the Commissioner to the Governor in Council.

Appeal by applicant to Governor in Council.

43. In case of interfering applications for any patent, the same shall be submitted to the arbitration of three skilled persons, one of whom shall be chosen by each of the applicants, and the third person shall be chosen by the Commissioner or by his deputy or the person appointed to perform the duty of that office;—And the decision or award of such arbitrators, or any two of them, delivered to the Commissioner in writing, and subscribed by them or any two of them, shall be final as far as respects the granting of the patent ;

Arbitration in case of interfering applications.

2. If either of the applicants refuses or fails to choose an arbitrator, when required so to do by the Commissioner, the patent shall issue to the opposite party;—And when there are more than two interfering applicants, and the parties applying do not all unite in appointing three arbitrators, the Commissioner or his deputy or person appointed to perform the duty of that officer, may appoint the three arbitrators for the purposes aforesaid.

The same : Appointment of arbitrators.

3. The arbitrators so named shall, before a judge of any court in any of the Provinces of Canada, subscribe to the following oath :

Their oath of office.

“ I, the undersigned (A.B.), being duly appointed an arbitrator under the authority of the forty-third section of the Patent Act of 1872, do hereby solemnly swear (or affirm, as the case may be), that I will well and truly perform the duty of such arbitrator on the interfering applications of (C.D. and E.F.) submitted to me.”

4. The arbitrators, or any one of them, after having been so sworn, shall have the power of summoning before them any party or witness, and of requiring him to give evidence on oath, orally, or in writing (or on solemn affirmation, if the person be entitled to affirm in civil matters), and to produce such documents and things as such arbitrators deem requisite to the full investigation of the matters into which they are appointed to examine, and shall then have the same power to enforce the attendance of such witnesses, and to compel them to give evidence, as is vested in any court of law in civil cases, in the Province in which the arbitration is to be had ; and any wilfully false statement made by any such witness on oath or solemn affirmation, shall be deemed to be wilful and corrupt perjury ; but no such party or witness shall be compelled to answer any question, by his answer to which he might render himself liable to a criminal prosecution ;

Powers of arbitrators to summon and swear witnesses.

Wilful false evidence to be perjury.

5. The fees for the services of arbitrators shall be a matter of agreement between the said arbitrators and the parties, and shall be paid by the parties naming them, respectively, except those of

As to fees to arbitrators, and by whom paid.

the arbitrator or arbitrators when named by the Commissioner of Patents, which shall be paid by the applicants jointly.

Documents to be open to inspection.

44. All specifications, drawings, models, disclaimers, judgments, and other papers, except *caveats*, shall be open to the inspection of the public at the Patent Office, under such regulations as may be adopted in that behalf.

As to clerical errors.

45. Clerical errors happening in the framing or copying of any instrument of the Patent Office, shall not be construed as invalidating the same, but when discovered they may be corrected under the authority of the Commissioner.

Destroyed patent may be replaced.

46. In case any Patent be destroyed or lost, others of the like tenor, date, and effect may be issued in lieu thereof, on the party paying the fees hereinbefore prescribed for office copies of documents.

As to use of patented invention in foreign vessels.

47. No patent shall extend to prevent the use of any invention in any foreign ship or vessel, where such invention is not so used for the manufacture of any goods to be vended within or exported from Canada.

Patent not to affect a previous purchaser of the invention.

48. Every person who before the issuing of a patent has purchased, constructed, or acquired any invention for which a patent has been obtained under this Act, shall have the right of using and vending to others, the specific article, machine, manufacture or composition of matter patented, so purchased, constructed or acquired before the issue of the patent therefor, without being liable to the patentee or his representatives for so doing; but the patent shall not be held invalid as regards other persons by reason of such purchase, construction or acquisition, or use of the invention by the person first aforesaid, or by those to whom he may have sold the same, unless the same was purchased, constructed or acquired or used for a longer period than one year before the application for a patent therefor, which circumstance would then have the effect of making the invention one having become public and in public use.

Proviso: As to other persons.

Patented articles to be marked as such.

49. Every patentee under this Act, shall stamp or engrave on each patented article, sold or offered for sale by him, the year of the date of patent applying to such article, thus:—"Patented 1872,"—or as the case may be; and any such patentee selling or offering for sale any such patented article not so marked, shall be liable to the punishment of a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars, and, in default of the payment of such fine, to imprisonment not to exceed two months.

Penalty for default.

Falsely marking any thing as patented, to be a misdemeanor.

50. Whosoever writes, paints, prints, moulds, casts, carves, engraves, stamps, or otherwise marks upon anything made or sold by him, and for the sole making or selling of which he is not the patentee, the name or any imitation of the name of any patentee for the sole making or selling of such thing without the consent of such patentee—or without the consent of the patentee, writes, paints, prints, moulds, casts, carves, engraves, stamps, or otherwise marks upon anything not purchased from the patentee, the words, "Patent" "Letters Patent," "Queen's Patent," "Patented," or any word or words of like import, with the intent of counterfeiting or imitating the stamp, mark, or device of the patentee, or of deceiving the public and inducing them to believe that the thing in question was made or sold by or with the consent of the patentee, or whosoever puts to sale as patented, any article not patented in Canada, for the purpose of deceiving the public,—shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and shall on conviction be punished therefor by fine, or by imprisonment, or both, in the discretion of the Court, before which the conviction shall be had; but the fine shall not exceed two hundred dollars, nor shall the imprisonment exceed three months.

Punishment.

51. Any person wilfully making or causing to be made any false entry in any register or book, or any false or altered copy of any document relating to the purposes of this Act, or who shall produce or tender any such false or altered document, knowing the same to be such, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by fine and imprisonment accordingly. Making false entry or copy in matters subject to this Act to be misdemeanor.

52. Chapter thirty-four of the Consolidated Statutes of the late Province of Canada, respecting Patents for Inventions,—Chapter one hundred and seventeen of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia (third series),—Chapter one hundred and eighteen of the Revised Statutes of New Brunswick, and “The Patents Ordinance, 1867,” of British Columbia, “The Patent Act of 1869,”—and any Act amending any of the said Acts or Laws, or any other Act relating to Patents, are hereby repealed, in so far as they or any of them may be inconsistent with this Act, or make any provision in any matter provided for by this Act, except only as respects all rights acquired and penalties or liabilities incurred under the said laws or any of them, before the coming into force of this Act, as to which they shall remain in force, and nothing in this Act contained shall affect any suit pending in any court of law or equity at the time of the coming into force of this Act. Inconsistent enactments repealed. Exception.

53. In citing this Act it shall be sufficient to call it “The Patent Act of 1872.” Short title.

54. This Act shall commence and take effect on the first day of September, 1872. Commencement of Act

## CAP. XXVIII.

### An Act to amend the Immigration Act of 1869.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

IN amendment of the Immigration Act of 1869, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

1. Whenever a vessel carrying emigrants, not cleared under the sanction of the Imperial Commissioners of Emigration, arrives in her port of destination in Canada, not carrying a surgeon, and on board of which proper measures for the preservation of the health of the passengers and crew during the voyage have not been observed, the medical officer shall report the fact to the Collector of Customs, and a duty of two dollars for each passenger or immigrant above the age of one year, shall be paid by the master of the vessel to the Collector of Customs at the port, and the vessel shall not be admitted to entry until such duty be paid; and the duty shall be applied in manner provided by section two of the said Act, in respect of the duty imposed by the said section two, which duty shall be and is hereby repealed as respects immigrants by vessels arriving in Canada on or after the tenth day of July, 1872, and the duty of two dollars imposed by the present section in the case herein mentioned shall thereafter be the only duty payable in respect of immigrants.

2. In sections eighteen and nineteen of the said Act, the hour of six o'clock in the afternoon is hereby substituted for the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon, and the said sections shall be construed and have effect accordingly.

3. The words—“The quarantine and health Act of 1868” in section eleven of the said Act are hereby repealed, and the words “Any quarantine Act or regulation then in force” shall be substituted for them as part of the said section.

4. If any contract be made or any bond or note given by an immigrant before leaving Europe for Canada, to repay in Canada any sum of money advanced to him or her for or towards defraying his passage money, or towards defraying any other expense attending his immigration, such sum shall be recoverable from the immigrant in Canada, according to the terms of such instrument, by suit in any court in Canada having jurisdiction in civil cases to the amount demanded,—and if any immigrant in consideration of money advanced as aforesaid engages and binds himself or herself to enter the service of any employer in Canada on his or her arrival there, in any capacity, and to work for and serve such employer in such capacity during any certain time, not exceeding six months, and at any named rate of wages, and afterwards refuses or neglects on his arrival in Canada to perform such engagement, such refusal or neglect on the part of the immigrant to perform such obligations undertaken by him or her in such instrument shall be an offence cognizable before any one Justice of the Peace under the “Act respecting the duties of Justices of the Peace out of Sessions in relation to summary convictions and orders” and punishable by fine not exceeding twenty dollars and costs, and by imprisonment until such fine and costs be paid.

5. No licensed Immigrant Runner, or agent or person acting on behalf of any steamboat company, railway company, or forwarding company, or hotel, or boarding-house keeper or his agent, shall go on board any vessel bringing immigrants into any port, or book or solicit any immigrant passenger by such vessel, before the immigrant passengers are landed, from such vessel, unless authorised by the Immigration Agent under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for any contravention of this section; and no such vessel shall be admitted to entry until the Immigration Agent at the port has visited her, and has notified the Collector of Customs that he has done so: and any such vessel arriving in port, shall hoist such signal as may be determined on by the Immigration Agent at the port, who shall communicate it through the superintendent or other proper officer to the Pilots for the port, and it shall be the duty of the Pilot of the vessel to see that such signal is hoisted and kept up during daylight, until the Immigration Agent has visited the vessel.

6. If any complaint be made to the Minister of Agriculture against any railway company, or other incorporated company, for any offence or contravention of this Act or of the Imperial Passenger Acts of 1855 and 1863 or of any other Act or Law in any matter relating to immigrants or to immigration, the said Minister may cause such inquiry as he may think proper to be made into the facts of the case, or may bring the matter before the Governor in Council to the end that such inquiry may be made under the Act respecting inquiries concerning Public Matters; and if upon such inquiry it appears to the satisfaction of the said Minister, or of the Governor in Council, as the case may be, that the company has been guilty of such contravention, the Minister or the Governor may call upon the company to make such compensation to the party or parties aggrieved, or to do such other thing as shall be just and reasonable, or may adopt measures for causing such proceedings to be instituted against the company as the case may require.

7. Any person licensed under section twenty-two of the Act hereby amended, or any person in his employ, selling to any immigrant a ticket or order for the passage of such immigrant, or the conveyance of his luggage, at a higher rate than that for which it could be purchased directly from the Company undertaking such conveyance, or any person purchasing any such ticket from an immigrant for less than its value, or giving him in exchange for it one of less value, shall thereby incur a penalty of twenty dollars for each such offence.



8. If both the immigrant parents, or the last surviving immigrant parent of any child, or children, brought with them in any vessel bound to Canada, should die on the voyage or at Grosse Isle, Lawlor's Island, Partridge Island, or elsewhere in Canada, while yet under the care of any Immigration Agent or Agents, the Minister of Agriculture, or such officer as he may depute for the purpose, may cause the effects of such parents or parent to be disposed of to the best advantage in his power, or in his discretion to be delivered over to any Institution or person assuming the care and charge of such child or children.

9. The Medical Superintendent at Grosse Isle may, from time to time, with the consent and approval of the Minister of Agriculture, make such regulations as he may deem necessary for enforcing order and ensuring the health and comfort of immigrants there; and such regulations being published in the Canada Gazette, shall be in force, and any contravention thereof shall be deemed a contravention of this Act, and shall be punishable by such penalty as may be assigned by such regulations in each case.

10. The Governor in Council may by Proclamation, whenever he deems it necessary, prohibit the landing in Canada of any criminal, or other vicious class of immigrants to be designated in such Proclamation, except upon such conditions for ensuring their re-transportation to the port in Europe whence they came with the least possible delay, as the Governor in Council may prescribe; and such conditions may, if the Governor in Council deems it necessary, include the immediate return, or the return with the least possible delay of the vessel and such immigrants to the said port, such prohibited immigrants remaining on board until such return of the vessel.

11. Every master or other officer, seaman, or other person employed on board of any vessel, who, while such vessel is in any waters within the jurisdiction of the Parliament of Canada, under promise of marriage, or by threats, or by the exercise of his authority, or by solicitation, or the making of gifts or presents, seduces and has illicit connection with any female passenger, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be punished by imprisonment for a term not exceeding one year, or by a fine not exceeding four hundred dollars; provided that the subsequent intermarriage of the parties seducing and seduced, may be pleaded in bar of conviction.

12. Neither the officers, seamen, or other persons on board of any ship or vessel bringing immigrant passengers to Canada, or any of them, shall while such vessel is in such Canadian waters as aforesaid, entice or admit any female immigrant passenger into his apartment, or visit or frequent any part of such ship or vessel, assigned to female immigrant passengers, except by the direction or permission of the master or commander of such vessel, first made or given for such purpose; and every officer, seaman or other person employed on board of such ship or vessel, who violates the provisions of this section shall incur a penalty equal in amount to his wages for the voyage during which the said offence has been committed. Any master or commander who while such vessel is in such waters as aforesaid, directs or permits any officer or seaman or other person on board of such ship or vessel, to visit or frequent any part of such vessel assigned to immigrant passengers, except for the purpose of doing or performing some necessary act or duty as an officer, seaman or person employed on board of such vessel, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of twenty-five dollars for each occasion on which he so directs or permits the provisions of this section to be violated by any officer, seaman or other person employed on board of such vessel; provided always that the provisions of this section shall not apply to cabin passengers, or to any part of the vessel assigned to their use.

## CAP. XXIX.

An Act to provide for the incorporation of Immigration Aid Societies.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

**F**OR the purpose of encouraging and facilitating immigration into Canada, from the United Kingdom and other parts of Europe; Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

1. The Minister of Agriculture shall, from time to time, divide each of the several Provinces of Canada into immigration districts; in each there shall be an immigration office and an immigration agent, and such division, and any alteration thereof shall be notified in the *Canada Gazette*, and each such district shall be known as the immigration district of the place where the immigration office is kept.

2. In each immigration district, an Immigration Aid Society or Immigration Aid Societies, for the purpose of assisting immigrants to reach Canada from Europe, and to obtain employment on their arrival in Canada, and of enabling persons in Canada in want of laborers, artisans, or servants, to obtain them by such immigration, may be formed under this Act; each such society consisting of not less than twenty-five persons, whether resident or not in the immigration district, agreeing to form such society, and to subscribe among them, as the capital of the society, not less than five hundred dollars, in shares of twenty dollars each, one-half of which at least shall be paid, on subscribing the declaration of membership hereinafter mentioned, into the hands of a person agreed upon as their secretary-treasurer by the persons (not being less than twenty-five) present at the meeting at which it is agreed to form such society.

3. The persons agreeing to form such Society shall elect or agree upon a President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, and Board of Management, composed of not less than five members, including the officers above mentioned, and shall adopt a constitution and by-laws, and shall respectively sign a declaration to the effect following: "We, the undersigned, hereby associate ourselves together as "The Immigration Aid Society No....., of the Immigration district of ....., and we hereby bind ourselves to observe and obey all the requirements of *The Immigration Aid Societies Act, 1872*, and to pay respectively into the hands of the Secretary-Treasurer the amount of stock set opposite our respective names, one-half on subscribing this declaration, and the other half by the instalments and in the manner hereinafter provided; and we further bind ourselves to observe and obey the constitution and by-laws of the Society, which are as follows:"— Then shall follow the constitution and by-laws, which shall declare the object of the Society to be those mentioned in section two and such other special objects (if any) as it may be thought necessary to enumerate; and shall contain the names of the first President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, and members of the Board of Management; the place where the Society will have its office and hold its meetings; the manner in which the remainder of the stock of the Society shall be paid up; the annual subscription to be paid by members, if such subscription be deemed advisable; the admission of new members; the duties and powers of the Board of Management and officers; the time during which the officers and other members of the Board of Management shall remain in office; the regular meetings of the Society, and the mode of calling and holding special meetings, and the quorum, and mode of voting thereat; the mode of filling vacancies among the officers and members of the Board of Management, or the performance of their duties by others during their absence; the period for which the Society shall continue, and the mode of dividing its assets at the end of such period, or its profits from time to time during such period; and generally such provisions as may be deemed necessary or expedient for the well-working of the Society and the attainment of the objects for which it is formed; then shall follow the signatures of members, and in columns opposite thereto, the amounts of stock for which they respectively subscribe, and the amounts paid up: the declaration shall then be dated and attested by the signatures of the President or Vice-President and of the Secretary-Treasurer.

4. The declaration shall be made in duplicate, and the duplicates shall be delivered or sent by the Secretary-Treasurer to the immigration agent of the district, who shall compare it with this Act, and with such instructions as may have been given him on the subject by the Minister of Agriculture, and who, if he has any doubt as to its being conformable to this Act and to such instructions, may forward it to the Minister for his opinion; and if it be not found so conformable, the immigration agent shall return both duplicates to the Secretary-Treasurer, informing him of the fact and of the objection to which the declaration is liable; but if it be found to be so conformable, he shall certify the fact under his hand on both duplicates, and shall retain and keep one of them in his office, and shall return the other to the Secretary-Treasurer.

5. If there be no other Immigrant Aid Society in his district, the immigration agent shall treat the Society as number one, and shall fill the blank left in the declaration for that purpose with that number, but if there be another or others, he shall give each a number in the order in which he certifies the declarations, and shall fill the blank in each with its proper number, according to such order.

6. As soon as the declaration is approved and certified as aforesaid, the Society shall be a corporation, or body politic and corporate, by the name taken in the declaration, including the number.

given it by the immigration agent, and shall have all the powers, rights and immunities assigned to corporations by the Interpretation Act, including the right to have a corporate seal if they think fit, but it shall not be necessary that the corporate seal (if they have one) should be affixed to any document in order to make it the act or deed of the corporation, but it shall be sufficient for that purpose that the document be signed by the Secretary-Treasurer, and countersigned by the President or Vice-President of the Society, as such, or by the person or persons acting *pro tempore* in their stead, nor shall the authority or capacity of any person signing the same, or his signature, be called in question by any but the corporation, and if not so questioned shall be admitted in evidence without proof; and any document purporting to be the duplicate copy of the declaration signed by the proper immigration agent, shall be admitted as evidence of the facts stated therein, without proof of his signature, unless it be called in question by himself, or by the Minister of Agriculture, or by his authority.

7. The Society shall have power to enter into agreements and contracts, either with members of their corporation or with others, for any purpose relating to immigration, and to lend and to borrow money, and to take or give any security for the same, and to become a party to any promissory note, bill of exchange or other negotiable security or instrument, in the manner provided as to other documents by section six, and may receive assistance in money or otherwise from municipal or other corporations, or from any institution, society or person, towards enabling them to attain the objects of this Act, on such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon, not inconsistent with this Act or with law: Provided always, that the total amount of the liabilities of the Society shall never exceed the amount of its capital subscribed, but not paid up, and the members of the Board of Management shall be personally liable for any excess.

8. The Society may receive applications from persons desiring to obtain artisans, workmen, servants or laborers from the United Kingdom, or from any part of Europe, and may enter into any lawful contracts with such persons, including the obligation on the part of such persons to employ the immigrants referred to on their arrival in Canada, in any manner, at any rate of wages, and for any period, under such penalty as damages for non-performance as may be stipulated in such contract, and may receive in advance all or any part of the money to be expended by the Society, or take security for the repayment of all or any part thereof to the Society, by instalments, or in one sum, as may be agreed upon.

9. The Secretary-Treasurer shall forthwith transmit every such application, with the requisite information and details, to the immigration agent of the district, with the amount the Society has undertaken to advance towards defraying the expenses to be incurred in complying with the application, in paying or partly paying the cost of the ocean passage and other travelling charges of the emigrants required from their home in Europe to the place in Canada where they are required.

10. The Immigration Agent shall forthwith transmit every such application and the money received by reason thereof, to the proper Immigration Agent or Sub-agent of the Dominion, in the United Kingdom or elsewhere, who shall thereupon take the necessary steps for procuring and forwarding to the proper place in Canada, such immigrant or immigrants as may be required by the application; and the Immigration Agent shall from time to time furnish the Minister of Agriculture with such information and details respecting such applications as the said Minister may require.

11. If it be the intention of the Society, or of the applicant, that the whole or part of the money advanced towards defraying

the expenses of immigration, shall be repaid by the immigrant, either in one sum or by instalments, it shall be the duty of the Immigration Agent or Sub-agent of the Dominion in Europe making the arrangements for the passage of the intending immigrant to Canada, to take from such immigrant an undertaking binding him or her to repay such money to the Society in Canada in one sum or by instalments, at certain periods, and with interest or without interest, according to the instruction given by the Secretary-Treasurer to the District Immigration Agent, and communicated through the Minister of Agriculture to the Immigration Agent or Sub-agent in Europe, and he shall witness the execution of such instrument; and if any sum of money has been advanced to the immigrant for like purposes, by any society, or institution, or individual in the United Kingdom, such sum may, with the consent of such society, institution, or individual, be included in the amount for which such instrument is given, and may be recovered by the Canadian Society aforesaid, and being so recovered shall be paid over without charge to the society, institution, or individual by whom it was advanced, to whom as well as to the Canadian Society, the Agent or Sub-agent of Immigration witnessing the execution of the instrument shall notify any such amount.

**12.** Any sum due as an instalment upon any such instrument shall be recoverable, in any way in which a like sum is recoverable in the place where the suit is brought, although the instrument includes a further sum not then due.

**13.** Any immigrant, who might make such instrument as aforesaid, may in like manner execute an instrument, witnessed as above provided, binding himself or herself in consideration of the sum advanced by the Society therein named to accept employment of the kind to be therein stated from any named person in the Immigration District in which the Society is formed, or with any person in such district whom the Society may designate to the immigrant on his or her arrival in such district, at a rate of wages to be named in the instrument, and for a term to be also therein named, and to serve such person faithfully in such employment during such term, and to allow such person to deduct from his or her wages, at a period or periods to be designated in such instrument, such sum or sums as shall be also therein designated, and to pay the same to the Society, on account of any money due by the immigrant to it; and such instruments may be enforced by the Society, accordingly, by civil suit in any court having jurisdiction to the amount then due, against the immigrant; and any refusal or neglect on the part of the immigrant to perform any of the other obligations undertaken by him or her in such instrument, shall be an offence cognizable before any one Justice of the Peace, under the *Act respecting the duties of Justices of the Peace, out of Sessions, in relation to Summary Convictions and Orders*, and punishable by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars, and costs, and by imprisonment until such fine and costs be paid; and the fine if paid shall belong to the Society, and be paid over to it by the Justice of the Peace; but the payment of such fine shall not prevent or affect any civil remedy of the Society under such instrument.

**14.** In this Act the expression "Minister of Agriculture," includes any deputy or officer authorized to perform the duty or exercise the power in question;—the expression "Immigration"—or "Immigrant," includes "Emigration" or "Emigrant," when it refers to the act of leaving or to a person about to leave Europe for Canada;—any negotiable or other instrument authorized by this Act may be drawn in any European language understood by the person executing it, and sums of money mentioned therein may be expressed in any currency used in the country where it

is executed, and shall be held to mean equivalent sums in currency of Canada;—and the word “Society” means the Immigration Aid Society which the context indicates or refers to.

15. This Act may be cited as “The Immigration Aid Societies Act, 1872.”

CAP. XXX.

An Act respecting Trade Unions.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

HER MAJESTY, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows :

SHORT TITLE.

1. This Act may be cited as “The Trade Unions Act, 1872.”

CRIMINAL LAW AMENDED.

2. The purposes of any Trade Union shall not, by reason merely that they are in restraint of trade, be deemed to be unlawful, so as to render any member of such trade union liable to criminal prosecution for conspiracy or otherwise.

3. The purposes of any trade union shall not, by reason merely that they are in restraint of trade, be unlawful so as to render void or voidable any agreement or trust.

4. Nothing in this Act shall enable any court to entertain any legal proceeding instituted with the object of directly enforcing or recovering damages for the breach of any of the following agreements, namely :—

1. Any agreement between members of a trade union as such, concerning the conditions on which any members for the time being of the trade union shall or shall not sell their goods, transact business, employ or be employed.

2. Any agreement for the payment by any person of any subscription or penalty to a trade union.

3. Any agreement for the application of the funds of a trade union,—

a. To provide benefits to members ; or

b. To furnish contributions to any employer or workman, not a member of such trade union, in consideration of such employer or workman acting in conformity with the rules or resolutions of such trade union ; or

c. To discharge any fine imposed upon any person by sentence of a court of justice ; or

4. Any agreement made between one trade union and another ; or

5. Any bond to secure the performance of any of the above mentioned agreements :—

But nothing in this section shall be deemed to constitute any of the agreements above mentioned unlawful.

5. No Act in force in the Dominion providing for the constitution and incorporation of charitable, benevolent or Provident Institutions shall include or apply to trade unions, nor shall this Act apply to any trade union not registered under this Act.

## REGISTRATION OF TRADE UNIONS.

6. Any seven or more members of a trade union may by subscribing their names to the rules of the Union, and otherwise complying with the provisions of this Act with respect to registry, register such trade union under this Act, provided that if any one of the purposes of such trade union be unlawful such registration shall be void.

7. It shall be lawful for any trade union registered under this Act, to purchase or take upon lease in the names of the trustees for the time being of such trade union, any land not exceeding one acre, and to sell, exchange, mortgage, or let the same, and no purchaser, assignee, mortgagee, or tenant, shall be bound to inquire whether the trustees have authority for any sale, exchange, mortgage or letting, and the receipt of the trustees shall be a discharge for the money arising therefrom; and for the purposes of this section every branch of a trade union shall be considered a distinct union.

8. All real and personal estate whatsoever belonging to any trade union registered under this Act, shall be vested in the Trustees for the time being of such trade union, appointed as provided by this Act, for the use and benefit of such trade union and the members thereof, and the real or personal estate of any branch of a trade union shall be vested in the trustees of such branch, and be under the control of such trustees, their respective executors or administrators, according to their respective claims and interests, and upon the death or removal of any such trustees the same shall vest in the succeeding trustees for the same estate and interest as the former trustees had therein, and subject to the same trusts, without any conveyance or assignment whatever, save and except in the case of Dominion Stock which shall be transferred into the names of such new trustees; and in all actions, suits, or indictments or summary proceedings before any court of summary jurisdiction, touching or concerning any such property, the same shall be stated to be the property of the person or persons for the time being holding the said office of trustee, in their proper names, as trustees of such trade union, without any further description.

9. The trustees of any trade union registered under this Act, or any other officer of such trade union who may be authorized so to do by the order thereof, are hereby empowered to bring or defend, or cause to be brought or defended, any action, suit, prosecution, or complaint in any court of law or equity, touching or concerning the property, right, or claim to property of the trade union,—and may, in all cases concerning the property real or personal of such trade union, sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded in any court of law or equity, in their proper names without other description than the title of their office: and no such action, suit, prosecution, or complaint, shall be discontinued or abated by the death or removal from office of such persons or any of them, but the same shall be proceeded in by their successor or successors as if such death, resignation, or removal had not taken place; and such successors shall pay and receive the like costs as if the action, suit, prosecution, or complaint had been commenced in their names for the benefit of or to be re-imbursed from the funds of such trade union, and any summons to such trustee or other officer may be served by leaving the same at the registered office of the trade union.

10. A trustee of any trade union registered under this Act shall not be liable to make good any deficiency which may arise or happen in the funds of such trade union, but shall be liable only for the moneys actually received by him on account of such trade union.



**11.** Every treasurer or other officer of a trade union registered under this Act, at such times as by the rules of such trade union he should render such account as hereinafter mentioned, or upon being required so to do, shall render to the trustees of the trade union, or to the members of such trade union at a meeting of the trade union, a just and true account of all moneys received and paid by him since he last rendered a like account, and of the balance then remaining in his hands, and of all bonds or securities of such trade union, which account the trustees shall cause to be audited by some fit and proper person or persons by them to be appointed;—and such treasurer if thereunto required, upon the said account being audited, shall forthwith hand over to the trustees the balance which on such audit appears to be due from him, and shall also, if required, hand over to such trustees all securities and effects, books, papers and property of the said trade union in his hands or custody; and if he fail to do so the said trustees may sue such treasurer in any competent court for the balance appearing to have been due from him upon the last account rendered by him, and for all moneys since received by him on account of the said trade union, and for the securities and effects, books, papers and property in his hands or custody, leaving him to set off in such action the sums, if any, which he may have since paid on account of the said trade union; and in such action the trustees shall be entitled to recover their full costs of suit, to be taxed as between attorney and client.

**12.** If any officer, member or other person being or representing himself to be a member of a trade union registered under this Act, or the nominee, executor, administrator or assignee of a member thereof, or any person whatsoever, by false representation or imposition obtains possession of any moneys, securities, books, papers or effects of such trade union, or having the same in his possession wilfully withholds or fraudulently misapplies the same or wilfully applies any part of the same to purposes other than those expressed or directed in the rules of such trade union, or any of them, the magistrate or justices having jurisdiction in cases of complaint for offences under this Act, for the place in which the registered office of the trade union is situate, upon a complaint made by any person on behalf of such trade union, or by the Registrar, may by summary order, order such officer, member or other person, to deliver up all such moneys, securities, books, papers or other effects to the trade union, or to repay the amount of money paid improperly, and to pay, if the court thinks fit, a further sum of money not exceeding one hundred dollars, together with costs not exceeding five dollars, and in default of such delivery of effects or payment of such amount of money, or payment of such penalty and costs as aforesaid, the said court may order the person so convicted to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for any time not exceeding three months:—Provided that nothing in this Act shall prevent the trade union from proceeding by indictment against the said party: and provided also, that no person shall be proceeded against by indictment if a conviction has been previously obtained for the same offence under the provisions of this Act.

#### REGISTRY OF TRADE UNIONS.

**13.** With respect to the registry, under this Act, of Trade Unions, the following provisions shall have effect:

1. An application to register the trade union and printed copies of its rules, together with a list of the titles and names of its officers, shall be sent to the Registrar under this Act;
2. The Registrar upon being satisfied that the trade union has complied with the regulations respecting registry in force under this Act, shall register such trade union and such rules;
3. No trade union shall be registered under a name identical with that under which any other trade union has been registered, or so nearly resembling such name as to be likely to deceive the members or the public;

4. Where a trade union applying to be registered has been in operation for more than a year before the date of such application, there shall be delivered to the Registrar, before the registry thereof, a general statement of the receipts, funds, effects and expenditure of such trade union, in the same form, and showing the same particulars as if it were the annual general statement required as hereinafter mentioned to be transmitted annually to the Registrar ;

5. The Registrar upon registering such trade union shall issue a certificate of registry, which certificate, unless proved to have been withdrawn or cancelled, shall be conclusive evidence that the regulations of this Act, with respect to registry, have been complied with ;

6. The Governor in Council may from time to time make regulations respecting registry under this Act, and respecting the seal, (if any) to be used for the purpose of such registry, and the inspection of documents kept by the Registrar under this Act, and respecting the fees (if any) to be paid on registry not exceeding the fees specified in the second schedule to this Act, and generally for carrying this Act into effect.

14. With respect to the rules of a trade union registered under this Act, the following provisions shall have effect :

1. The rules of every such trade union shall contain provisions in respect of the several matters mentioned in the first schedule to this Act ;

2. A copy of the rules shall be delivered by the trade union to every person on demand, on payment of a sum not exceeding twenty-five cents.

15. Every trade union registered under this Act shall have a registered office to which all communications and notices may be addressed ; if any trade union registered under this Act is in operation for seven days without having such an office, such trade union and every officer thereof shall each incur a penalty not exceeding twenty-five dollars for every day during which it is so in operation.

Notice of the situation of such registered office and of any change therein, shall be given to the Registrar and recorded by him ; until such notice is given the trade union shall not be deemed to have complied with the provisions of this Act.

16. A general statement of the receipts, funds, effects and expenditure of every trade union registered under this Act shall be transmitted to the Registrar before the first day of June in every year, and shall show fully the assets and liabilities at the date, and the receipts and expenditure of the trade union, during the year next preceding the date to which it is made out, and shall show separately the expenditure in respect of the several objects of the trade union, and shall be prepared and made out to such date, in such form, and shall comprise such particulars, as the Registrar may from time to time require ; and every member of, and depositor in any such trade union, shall be entitled to receive on application to the Secretary or Treasurer of the trade union, a copy of such general statement without making any payment for the same. Together with such general statement there shall be sent to the Registrar a copy of all alterations of rules, and new rules and change of officers, made by the trade union during the year preceding the date up to which the general statement is made out, and a copy of the rules of the trade union as they exist at that date.

Every trade union that fails to comply with or acts in contravention of this section, and also every officer of the trade union so failing, shall each be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty-five dollars for each offence.

Every person who wilfully makes or orders to be made any false entry in or any omission from any such general statement, or in or from the return of such copies or rules or alterations of rules shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars for each offence.

**17.** The Registrar General of Canada shall be the Registrar under this Act;

The Registrar shall lay before Parliament annual reports with respect to the matters transacted by him as such in pursuance of this Act.

**18.** If any person with intent to mislead or defraud gives to any member of a trade union registered under this Act, or to any person intending or applying to become a member of such trade union a copy of any rules or of any alterations or amendments of the same, other than those respectively which exist for the time being, on the pretence that the same are the existing rules of such trade union, or that there are no other rules of such trade union, or if any person with the intent aforesaid gives a copy of any rules to any person under the pretence that such rules are the rules of a trade union registered under this Act which is not so registered, every person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

**19.** All offences and penalties under this Act may be prosecuted and recovered under the Act passed in the Session held in the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty's Reign and intituled, *An Act respecting the duties of Justices of the Peace out of sessions, in relation to summary convictions and orders*, as amended by the Act passed in the the thirty-third year of Her Majesty's Reign and intituled, *An Act to amend the Act respecting the duties of Justices of the Peace out of sessions, in relation to summary convictions and orders*, and any Act passed in the present session amending the same; Provided that the complaint or information shall be brought heard, and determined before some Stipendiary or Police Magistrate or other functionary having by law the powers of two Justices of the Peace, if the offence was committed in any city, town or place in which any such Magistrate or functionary has jurisdiction, and if the offence be committed elsewhere, then before two Justices of the Peace:—Provided that,

1. The description of any offence against this Act in the words of this Act shall be sufficient in law, and

2. That any exception, exemption, proviso, excuse, or qualification, whether it does or does not accompany the description of the offence in this Act, may be proved by the defendant, but need not be specified in the information, and if so specified and negatived, no proof in relation to the matters specified and negatived shall be required on the part of the informant or prosecutor.

**20.** If any party feels aggrieved by any order or conviction made in determining any complaint or information under this Act, such party may appeal therefrom in the manner and subject to the conditions provided with respect to appeals from summary convictions and orders by the Acts cited in the next preceding section of this Act, or any Act amending them which may be passed in the present session.

**21.** No person who is a master, or the father, son or brother of a master, in the particular trade or business in or in connection with which any offence under this Act is charged to have been committed, shall act as a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, in any case of complaint or information under this Act, or as a member of any court for hearing any appeal in any such case.

#### INTERPRETATION.

**22.** In this Act, the term "Trade Union" means such combination, whether temporary or permanent, for regulating the relations between workmen and masters, or for imposing restrictive conditions on the conduct of any trade or business, as would if this Act had not been passed, have been deemed to be an unlawful combination by reason of some one or more of its pur-

poses being in restraint of trade :—Provided that this Act shall not affect,—

1. Any agreement between partners as to their own business ;
2. Any agreement between an employer and those employed by him as to such employment ;
3. Any agreement in consideration of the sale of the goodwill of a business, or of instruction in any profession, trade or handicraft.

**23.** Any statute or law inconsistent with this Act is hereby repealed, but such repeal shall not affect any case pending before any court or tribunal at the coming into force of this Act, which shall not apply to any such pending case.

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## SCHEDULES.

### FIRST SCHEDULE.

*Matters to be provided for by the Rules of Trade Unions registered under this Act.*

1. The name of the trade union and place of meeting for the business of the trade union.
2. The whole of the objects for which the trade union is to be established, the purposes for which the funds thereof shall be applicable, and the conditions under which any member may become entitled to any benefit assured thereby, and the fines and forfeitures which may be imposed on any member of such trade union.
3. The manner of making, altering, amending and rescinding rules.
4. A provision for the appointment and removal of a general committee of management, and of a trustee or trustees, treasurer, and other officers.
5. A provision for the investment of the funds, and for an annual or periodical audit of accounts.
6. The inspection of the books and names of members of the trade union by every person having an interest in the funds of the trade union.

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## CAP. XXXI.

An Act to amend the Criminal Law relating to Violence, Threats, and Molestation.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

**H**ER MAJESTY, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows :—

1. Every person who does one or more of the following acts, that is to say :—
  1. Uses violence to any person or any property,—
  2. Threatens or intimidates any person in such manner as would justify a Justice of the Peace, on complaint made to him, to bind over the person so threatening or intimidating to keep the peace,—

3. Molests or obstructs any person in manner defined by this section,—

With a view to coerce such person,—

(a) Being a master, to dismiss or cease to employ any workman, or being a workman, to quit any employment, or to return work before it is finished;

(b) Being a master, not to offer, or being a workman, not to accept any employment or work;

(c) Being a master or workman to belong to, or not to belong to, any temporary or permanent association or combination;

(d) Being a master or workman, to pay any fine or penalty imposed by any temporary or permanent association or combination;

(e) Being a master, to alter the mode of carrying on his business, or the number or description of any persons employed by him,—

Shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be liable to imprisonment, with or without hard labor, for a term not exceeding three months.

A person shall, for the purposes of this Act, be deemed to molest or obstruct another person in any of the following cases; that is to say,—

1. If he persistently follows such other person about from place to place;

2. If he hides any tools, clothes, or other property owned or used by such other person, or deprives him of, or hinders him in the use thereof;

3. If he watches or besets the house or place where such other person resides or works or carries on business, or happens to be, or the approach to such house or place, or if with two or more other persons he follows such other person in a disorderly manner in or through any street or road:—

Nothing in this section shall prevent any person from being liable under any other Act, or otherwise, to any other or greater punishment than is provided for any offence by this section, but so that no person shall be punished twice for the same offence:

Provided that no person shall be liable to any punishment for doing or conspiring to do any act, on the ground that such act restrains or tends to restrain the free course of trade, unless such act is one of the acts hereinbefore specified in this section, and is done with the object of coercing as hereinbefore mentioned.

#### LEGAL PROCEEDINGS.

2. All offences under this Act, shall be prosecuted under the provisions of the Act passed in the session held in the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty's reign, and intituled "An Act respecting the duties of Justices of the Peace out of sessions, in relation to summary convictions and orders," as amended by the Act passed in the thirty-third year of Her Majesty's Reign, and intituled "An Act to amend the Act respecting the duties of Justices of the Peace out of sessions, in relation to summary convictions and orders," and any Act passed in the present session amending the same; provided that the complaint or information, in any such case, shall be brought, heard and determined before a Stipendiary or Police Magistrate, or some other Functionary having under the said Acts, the powers of two justices of the peace, if the offence be committed in any City, Town or place in which any such Magistrate or Functionary has jurisdiction; and if the offence be committed elsewhere, then before two Justices of the Peace; Provided that the description of any offence under this Act in the words of this Act, shall be sufficient in law:—and that any exception, proviso, excuse or qualification, whether it does or does not accompany the description of the offence in this Act, may be proved by the defendant, but need not be specified in the information or complaint, and if so specified and negatived, no proof in relation to the matter so specified and negatived shall be required on the part of the informant or prosecutor.

3. If any party feels aggrieved by any summary conviction or order under this Act, such party may appeal therefrom in the manner and subject to the conditions provided in the Acts mentioned in the next preceding section, in cases in which an appeal is allowed by the said Acts.

4. No person who is a master, or the father, son, or brother of a master in the particular manufacture, trade, or business, in or in connection with which any offence under this Act is charged to have been committed, shall act as a magistrate or justice of the peace, in any case of complaint or information under this Act, or as a member of any court for hearing any appeal in any such case.

5. So much of any Act or law as may be inconsistent with this Act, is hereby repealed; provided that such repeal shall not affect anything duly done or suffered, or any right acquired, or any liability, penalty or forfeiture incurred, before the passing of this Act, or any proceeding pending at the time of the passing thereof, for enforcing any such right, liability, penalty or forfeiture.

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## CAP. XXXVII.

An Act to extend the Canadian Tariff of duties of Customs and Excise, and certain Acts relating to Customs and the Revenue, to the Province of British Columbia.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

WHEREAS, by the Act passed in the thirty-fourth year of Her Majesty's reign, and intituled: "An Act respecting the force and effect of the Acts of the Parliament of Canada, in and in relation to the Province of Manitoba, and the Colony of British Columbia when it becomes a Province of the Dominion," it is, among other things, in effect enacted, that "such provisions of the customs laws of Canada (other than such as prescribe the rates of duty) as may be from time to time declared by the Governor in Council applicable to the Province of British Columbia after its admission into the Union, shall apply thereto and be in force therein accordingly;" and that "such provisions of the laws of Canada respecting the Inland Revenue (other than those fixing the amount of duties) as may be from time to time declared by the Governor in Council applicable to the Province of British Columbia after its admission into the Union as aforesaid, shall apply thereto and be in force therein accordingly," it being provided that the said provisions should nevertheless be void in so far as they might be inconsistent with the order of the Queen in Council for the admission of British Columbia into the Union;—and whereas by the agreement between the Dominion and the then Colony of British Columbia for its admission into the Union, and the order of Her Majesty in Her Privy Council founded thereon, and declaring such Union, it was provided that the existing Customs Tariff and Excise Duties should continue in force in British Columbia until the railway from the Pacific coast and the system of railways in Canada are connected, unless the legislature of British Columbia should sooner decide to accept the Tariff and Excise Laws of Canada, and certain provisions were made to have effect until such assimilation of the Tariff and Excise Duties of British Columbia and of the Dominion, and no longer; and whereas the Legislature of the said Province, at the last session thereof, by an Act passed on the twenty-seventh day of March in the present year, 1872, decided to accept the Canadian Tariff of duties of Customs and Excise, and it is expedient to extend the same, and certain Acts of the Parliament of Canada relating to Customs and matters of Revenue, to the said Province: Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

1. In this Act, the expression "the said Province" means the Province of British Columbia.

2. The Canadian Tariffs of duties of Customs and Excise or Inland Revenue, shall be and are hereby extended to the said Province and shall be held to have been so extended and to have been in force therein upon and since the twenty-seventh day of March, 1872.

3. All those enactments and provisions of the Acts of the Parliament of Canada, enumerated in this section, each respectively as amended by any subsequent Act or Acts, which fix the duties of Customs and Excise, shall be held to have been extended and to have applied to the said Province upon, from, and after the day last aforesaid,—and the remaining enactments and provisions of the said Acts,—(except such as relate solely to matters of excise other than the tariff of duties or the department of Inland Revenue, and subject to the provisions of this Act or of any other Act of the present session,) are hereby extended to and shall be in force in and apply to the said Province of British Columbia, upon, from, and after the first day of August in the present year, 1872, that is to say:—

1. The Act passed in the thirty-first year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act respecting the Customs;"

2. The Act passed in the said year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act imposing Duties of Customs, with the Tariff of Duties payable under it;"

3. The Act passed in the said year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act constituting the Department of Customs;" as to all matters (if any there be) as to which it is not so extended by the Act first cited in the preamble of this Act;

4. The Act passed in the said year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act to amend the Act of the present session, intituled: "An Act imposing Duties of Customs, with the Tariff of Duties payable under it;"

5. The Act passed in the thirty-third year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act to amend the Acts respecting Customs and Inland Revenue; and to make certain provisions respecting Vessels Navigating the Inland Waters of Canada above Montreal,"—section twenty two being declared to apply to those inland waters only of the said Province to which the Governor in Council may from time to time declare it applicable;

6. The Act passed in the thirty-fourth year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act to amend the Acts relating to Duties of Customs;"

7. The Act passed in the thirty-first year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act respecting the Inland Revenue;"

8. The Act passed in the thirty-first year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act constituting the Department of Inland Revenue;" as to all matters (if any) to which it is not extended by the Act first cited in the preamble of this Act;

9. The Act passed in the thirty-first year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act to increase the Excise Duty on Spirits, to impose an Excise Duty on Refined Petroleum, and to provide for the inspection thereof;"

10. The Act passed in the said year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled: "An Act for better securing the payment of the Duty imposed on Tobacco manufactured in Canada;"

11. The Act passed in the thirty-fourth year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act to amend the Inland Revenue Act, 1868, and to alter the Duties of Excise chargeable in the Province of Manitoba;"

12. The Act passed in the thirty-first year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act respecting the Collection and Management of the Revenue, the Auditing of Public Accounts, and the Liability of Public Accountants;"

13. The Act passed in the thirty-third year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act to explain and amend the Act respecting the Collection and Management of the Revenue, the Auditing of Public Accounts, and the Liability of Public Accountants;"

14. The Act passed in the thirty-fourth year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act for the prevention of Corrupt Practices in relation to the Collection of the Revenue;"

15. The Act passed in the thirty-third year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act respecting the Coasting Trade of Canada."

4. Such enactments and provisions of the Acts mentioned in the next preceding section as may not be in force under it, shall come into force in the said Province from the time when they may respectively be declared by the Governor in Council applicable to the said Province, and to be in force therein, under the power to that effect given by the Act first cited in the preamble to this Act, and the said power shall extend as well to all regulations made or to be made under the enactments and provisions so to be extended by the Governor in Council as to the said enactments and provisions themselves.

5. Provided always; That all duties (according to the Canadian Tariff) collected and all things done in the said Province between the said 27th day of March and the first day of August, 1872, in conformity to the Acts mentioned in the third section of this Act, or to any Acts of the legislature of the said Province then in force, shall be held to have been lawfully collected and done.

6. The application of the Acts cited in the said third section, to the Province of British Columbia, shall be subject to the following provisions:—

1. In all the said Acts, the expressions "Canada," "Dominion of Canada," or "Dominion," shall be construed as including the said Province;

2. All regulations made by the Governor in Council under any of the said Acts (except such as relate to matters of Excise and Inland Revenue) in force on the said first day of August, 1872, in the other Provinces of the Dominion generally, shall be in force in and apply to the said Province of British Columbia, until revoked or altered;

3. The writ of assistance mentioned in the 92nd section of the Act first cited in section three of this Act, (31 V., c. 6,) may be granted by any Judge of the Supreme Court of the said Province; the expressions "County Court or Circuit Court," in the 99th, 100th, 101st, 115th, or any other section of the said Act, shall include any County Court, Circuit Court, or other Court in the said Province having jurisdiction in civil cases, to the amount of two hundred dollars; and the 102nd section of the said Act shall apply to suits for penalties or forfeitures brought in any Superior Court in the said Province; and the 139th, 140th, and 141st sections of the said Act shall apply to the said Province, and to the effect of the repeal by this Act of any Customs Act or Ordinance of the legislature thereof, as respects regulations and orders made by the Lieutenant Governor of the said Province in Council, and officers of the Customs, and bonds given by them or goods taken out of bond, in like manner as they applied to the other Provinces herein mentioned, and to the regulations and orders relating to duties of Customs, and the officers employed in the collection or management thereof in such other Provinces;

4. The Act thirteenthly mentioned in section three of this Act (33 Vict., c. 8) shall apply to any duty or toll, forfeiture, or penalty imposed by the Legislature of British Columbia, or by the Parliament of Canada.

7. So much of the following Acts, Ordinances, or Proclamations heretofore in force in British Columbia; that is to say:—

1. The Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of the said Province, known as "The Southern Boundary Act, 1860;"

2. The Ordinance of the Legislature of the said Province, known as "The Harbour Dues Amendment Ordinance, 1865;"

3. The Ordinance of the said Legislature, known as "The Customs Declaratory Ordinance, 1867."



4. The Ordinance of the said Legislature known as "The Customs Ordinance, 1867;"

5. The Ordinance of the said Legislature known as: "The Customs Amendment Ordinance, 1870;"

6. The Ordinance of the said Legislature known as "The Customs Repeal Act, 1871;" and

7. The Ordinance of the said Legislature known as "The Excise Ordinance, 1867;"—

As imposes any duty of Customs or Excise, shall be held to have been repealed upon, from, and after the said twenty-seventh day of March, 1872, and so much of the remaining portions thereof and of all other Acts, Ordinances, Proclamations, or Laws, or parts thereof as may be inconsistent with this Act or the Acts hereby extended, or to be extended by Order of the Governor in Council, to the said Province, or which make any provision for any matter provided for by the said Acts other than such as is made by the said Acts, or the portions thereof so extended, respectively, shall be repealed from and after the time of such extension: Provided always, that such repeal shall not affect any duty payable, or any forfeiture or penalty incurred under any enactment or provision hereby repealed before the repeal thereof; or any suit, prosecution, or proceeding, pending, or to be brought for the recovery thereof; or the appointment of any officer of Customs or Excise, or any bond given by any such officer and his sureties for securing his good conduct and faithful performance of his duties, unless or until such appointment is annulled or otherwise made void by competent authority under the Acts hereby extended to the said Province, with respect to all which the enactments and provisions hereby repealed for other purposes, shall remain in force.

8. Nothing in this Act shall prevent or impair the effect of the 10th section of the Act of the Parliament of Canada (34 V., c. 13) first cited in the preamble to this Act, by which it was provided that:—

"All the enactments and provisions of the Acts of the Parliament of Canada, passed in the first, second, and third sessions thereof aforesaid, or in the present session, relating to the Executive Government and the several departments thereof, and the Civil Service of the Dominion, the Legislature and Legislation, the Senate and House of Commons and the proceedings therein, the independence of Parliament, and the qualification or disqualification of Members of the last mentioned House, the vacating of seats therein, and the filling of vacancies, the Public Works of the Dominion, and the Postal Service, shall, in so far as they may not be inconsistent with the provisions of any Order of the Queen in Council, made under the authority of the 146th section of the British North America Act, 1867, have the same force and effect in and in relation to the Colony of British Columbia, after its admission into the Union under such Order in Council, as they then have in and in relation to all the other Provinces of Canada;" and all the said enactments and provisions are hereby declared to be, and to have been, from the time of the admission of British Columbia into the Dominion, in force in the said Province, in so far as they are not inconsistent with the said Order of the Queen in Council.

9. This Act shall be known and may be cited as "The Revenue Laws Extension Act, 1872."

## CAP. XXXVIII.

An Act to extend certain Laws relating to matters connected with Navigation, to the Province of British Columbia.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

**H**ER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

1. Upon, from, and after the first day of January, next after the passing of this Act, the Acts hereinafter mentioned of the Parliament of Canada, that is to say:—

1. The Act passed in the thirty-first year of Her Majesty's Reign, and intituled "An Act respecting the Navigation of Canadian Waters;"

2. The Act passed in the same year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act relating to Light-houses, Buoys and Beacons," as amended by the Act passed in the thirty-third year of Her Majesty's Reign, chapter eighteen;

3. The Act passed in the same year of Her Majesty's Reign, and intituled "An Act respecting the treatment and relief of Sick and Distressed Mariners, as amended by the Act passed in the thirty-third year of Her Majesty's Reign, chapter nineteen; and,

4. The Act passed in the same year of Her Majesty's Reign, and intituled, "An Act respecting the Inspection of Steamboats, and for the greater safety of Passengers by them," as amended by the Act passed in the session held in the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty's Reign, chapter thirty-nine;—

Shall be and are hereby extended to and shall be in force in the Province of British Columbia, and all enactments or laws theretofore in force in the said Province, inconsistent with the said Acts, or making any provision in any matter provided for by the said Acts, other than such as is made by the said Acts, shall be repealed on and after the said day.

2. The like rate or duty shall be levied and collected under the Acts mentioned in the third paragraph of the next preceding section, on every vessel arriving at any Port in the said Province, on or after the day last aforesaid, in like manner, by the like officer, and subject to the like provisions and exceptions, and to be applied in like manner, as if the said Province were expressly mentioned in the said Acts wherever the Provinces of Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are mentioned therein.

3. The like rate or duty and inspection fees shall be payable on and after the day last aforesaid under the Acts mentioned in the fourth paragraph of the next preceding section, but one by the owner or master of every steamboat in the said Province of British Columbia, as are payable in other Provinces of the Dominion, and payment thereof may be enforced in the like manner, as if the said Province had formed part of the Dominion at the time of the passing of the said Acts; and the word "Dominion" or "Canada" in the said Acts shall be construed as including the said Province.

4. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the Acts last above mentioned, the Governor in Council may during ten years from the passing of this Act, exempt Inspectors of Steamboats or Engineers of Steamboats in the said Province of British Columbia, or at any Port or place therein, from the Examination required by the said Acts, previous to their appointment or their acting as such Inspectors or Engineers, and from acting as members of the Board of Inspectors.

5. Sub-section six of section seven of the said "Act respecting the Inspection of Steamboats, and for the greater safety of Passengers by them," shall not during two years from the passing of this Act, apply to boilers made during that time in British

Columbia, as regards the iron of which such boilers are made, nor to steamboat boilers made before the passing of this Act or before the expiration of the said two years, until such boilers are declared on inspection to be no longer fit for use.

CAP. XXXIX.

An Act respecting the shipping of seamen in Nova Scotia.

[Assented to 14th June, 1872.]

**H**ER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

1. In the construction and for the purposes of this Act (if not inconsistent with the context or subject matter) the following terms shall have the respective meanings hereinafter assigned to them, that is to say,—  
 "Ship," shall include every description of vessel used in navigation not propelled by oars:—  
 "Master," shall include every person (except a pilot) having command or charge of a ship:—  
 "Seaman," shall include every person (except masters, pilots and apprentices duly indentured and registered) employed or engaged in any capacity on board any ship:—  
 "The Board of Trade," shall mean the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council, in England, appointed for the consideration of matters relating to trade and foreign plantations.
2. The Governor in Council may establish a Shipping Office at each port in the Province of Nova Scotia where a Custom House is situated, and may, from time to time, establish Shipping Offices at other ports in that Province, as he may deem advisable.
3. The Governor in Council may, subject to the provisions of this Act, appoint Superintendents of such offices, to be called Shipping Masters, who may appoint any necessary Deputies, Clerks and Servants, and shall, subject as hereinafter mentioned, have complete control over the same, and be responsible for every act done by such Deputies, Clerks or Servants; and all acts done by or before such Deputies, shall have the same effect as if done by or before such Shipping Masters.
4. No person selling any spirituous liquors, and no tavern-keeper or boarding-house keeper, shall be eligible for the situation of Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master.
5. The Governor in Council may direct that at any place in the said Province in which no separate Shipping Office is established, the whole or any part of the business of the Shipping Office shall be conducted at the Custom House; and thereupon the same shall be there conducted accordingly; and in respect of such business, such Custom House shall for all purposes be deemed to be a Shipping Office, and the Chief Officer of the Customs there, if no other Shipping Master has been appointed, shall for all purposes be a Shipping Master, and be held and deemed to have been appointed as such within the meaning of this Act.
6. All Shipping Masters, and all Deputies, Clerks and Servants appointed as aforesaid, shall before entering upon their duties give such security (if any) for the due performance thereof as the Minister of Marine and Fisheries may require; and if in any case the Minister of Marine and Fisheries has reason to believe that any person appointed by any Shipping Master does not properly discharge his duties, he may cause an investigation to be made, and may direct the dismissal or suspension of such person, and may

provide for the temporary performance of his duties until another person is properly appointed in his place, or during his suspension, as the case may be.

**7.** All Shipping Masters, deputies, clerks and servants so appointed as aforesaid shall,—before entering upon their duties, take and subscribe the following oath before any Magistrate:—

“I, A. B. do swear that I will faithfully perform the office, and  
 “duty of Shipping Master (or Deputy Shipping Master, or as the  
 “case may be,) according to the true intent and meaning of the  
 “Act respecting the Shipping of Seamen in Nova Scotia, passed  
 “by the Parliament of Canada, in the thirty-fifth year of Her  
 “Majesty’s Reign, that I will not, either directly or indirectly,  
 “personally or by means of any other person or persons on my  
 “behalf, receive any fee, reward or gratuity whatsoever by reason  
 “of any function of my office as Shipping Master (or Deputy  
 “Shipping Master, or as the case may be), [except such as are  
 “allowed to me under the said Act], and that I will act without  
 “partiality, favor or affection and to the best of my knowledge.  
 “So help me God.”

**8.** It shall be the duty and general business of Shipping Masters,—

To afford facilities for engaging seamen, by keeping registers of the names of such seamen who may apply to them for engagement, and registers of all seamen shipped or discharged by them, which registers shall be open for public inspection;

To superintend and facilitate the engagement and discharge of seamen in manner hereinafter mentioned;

To provide means for securing the presence on board at the proper times of men who are so engaged, when requested so to do; the expense of such service to be defrayed by the master, owner, or agent of the ship requiring the presence of men on board;

To facilitate the making of apprenticeships to the Sea Service;

To perform such other duties relating to Merchant Seamen and Merchant Ships as are hereby, or may hereafter under the powers herein contained be committed to them;

And every agreement in writing required to be entered into by part the first, “*Of Shipping and Seamen*,” of chapter seventy-five of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, third series, shall be signed before a Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master;

And all such business transacted at any Shipping Office in Nova Scotia, shall be under the immediate control and supervision of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

**9.** No person other than the Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master shall hire, engage, supply or provide a seaman to be entered on board any ship, except as hereinafter provided; and if any person, other than a Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master, exacts or receives from the master of any ship, any sum of money as a reward for procuring a seaman to serve on board such ship, such person shall on conviction thereof, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding eighty dollars, nor less than twenty dollars.

**10.** No owner, part owner, master or person in charge of any ship, or ship’s husband, or consignee, shall knowingly receive or accept to be entered on board such ship, or permit to remain on board the same any seaman who has been hired, engaged, supplied or provided to be entered on board thereof contrary to the provisions of this Act, or who has been engaged or hired to be entered on board any other ship.

**11.** No person shall employ any person other than a Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master for the purpose of hiring, engaging, supplying, or providing seamen to be entered on board a ship; and any person knowingly employing any other person for any of the purposes aforesaid, shall, upon conviction thereof,

forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding forty dollars for each offence.

**12.** Any person guilty of any of the offences above described shall forfeit and pay for each and every seaman hired, engaged, supplied or provided to be entered on board, or for every seaman knowingly received or accepted to be entered on board, contrary to the provisions of this Act, a sum of money not exceeding forty dollars upon conviction thereof, for each offence, although several seamen be included in the same contract, or several seamen be received or permitted to remain at the same time.

**13.** The sum of fifty cents shall be payable upon each engagement of a seaman effected before a Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master in Nova Scotia, as hereinafter mentioned; and the sum of thirty cents shall be payable upon each discharge of a seaman shipped in Nova Scotia, effected before a Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master in Nova Scotia, as hereinafter mentioned; and any Shipping Master, or the deputy, clerk or servant of any Shipping Master, may refuse to proceed with any engagement or discharge unless the fee payable thereon is first paid.

**14.** Every owner or master of a ship engaging or discharging any seaman or seamen in a shipping office or before a Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master in Nova Scotia shall pay to the Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master the whole of the fees hereby made payable, in respect of such engagement or discharge, and may, for the purpose of in part reimbursing himself, deduct and retain in respect of each such engagement or discharge from the wages of all persons so engaged or discharged, a sum not exceeding one-half the amount so paid to the Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master.

**15.** Any Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master, or any clerk or servant in any Shipping Office in Nova Scotia, who demands or receives any remuneration whatever, either directly or indirectly, for hiring or supplying any seaman for any ship, except the lawful fees payable under this Act shall, for every such offence, incur a penalty not exceeding forty dollars, and shall also be liable to be dismissed from his office by the Governor in Council.

**16.** Every Shipping Master appointed under this Act shall make and sign, and transmit to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, on or as soon as possible after the last day of June, and the last day of December in each year, a return of all the fees received by him and his deputy under this Act during the half year ending on such day.

**17.** The Governor in Council may, from time to time, dispense with the transaction before a Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master, or in a shipping office, of any matters required by this Act to be so transacted; and thereupon such matters shall, if otherwise duly transacted as required by law, be as valid as if transacted before a Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master or in a shipping office.

**18.** In so far as may be consistent with the provisions of any act of the Imperial Parliament in force in Nova Scotia, and with the terms of existing treaties between Her Majesty and foreign powers respectively, and the rights, privileges and immunities secured to the consuls, vice consuls, commercial and other duly accredited agents, subjects, and citizens, of such foreign powers respectively, the provisions of this act shall extend and apply to ships in the merchant service of foreign countries, and to all persons in relation to such ships, in the same manner as the same extend and apply to ships in the British merchant service, and to similar persons in relation to such last mentioned ships; and no justice of

the peace shall entertain or act upon any complaint or information under this act, by or against any person belonging to or connected with any such foreign merchant ship, and not being a subject of Her Majesty, or exercise jurisdiction under this act over or at the instance of any such person, without the consent of both parties to such complaint or information, or the consent in writing of the consul, vice consul, or commercial or other duly accredited agent of the country to which such ship belongs, first had and obtained, unless the parties to such complaint or information be subjects or citizens of a country or countries, by the terms of treaties in force between Her Majesty's Government, and the government or governments of which country or countries it is stipulated that the assistance of British Courts and magistrates shall be granted to the subjects or citizens of such country or countries, or one of such parties be a subject or citizen of any such country, and the other a subject of Her Majesty.

**19.** Every Shipping Master and Deputy Shipping Master appointed under this Act, shall give all the assistance in his power towards carrying into effect the objects of the Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom passed in the Session thereof, held in the twenty-second and twenty-third years of Her Majesty's reign, Chapter forty, "*for the establishment of a Reserve Volunteer Force of Seamen, and for the government of the same*" in such manner as the Board of Trade, at the instance of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, may direct; and every such Shipping Master and Deputy Shipping Master shall for this purpose have the power to call for such answers or information concerning reserve men from the masters of and other persons belonging to British merchant-ships as may be necessary or desirable in order to enable him to render such assistance as aforesaid, or to make any returns which the Board of Trade or the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty may require; and every Master or other person belonging to a British merchant-ship, who, when duly called upon by any such Shipping Master or Deputy Shipping Master, omits or refuses to give any such answer or information as aforesaid, which it is in his power to give shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars.

**20.** The powers and authority conferred, and the duties imposed upon the Registrar of Shipping at Halifax, by section thirty-nine of chapter seventy-five of the revised statutes of Nova Scotia, (third series) shall extend and belong to Shipping Masters and Deputy Shipping Masters appointed under this Act, and shall be exercised and performed by them according to the circumstances of each case, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council.

**21.** So much of the provisions of part the first, "*Of Shipping and Seamen,*" of chapter seventy-five of the revised statutes of Nova Scotia, (third series) as is inconsistent with the provisions of this act, is hereby repealed; but this repeal shall not affect the past operation of any of such provisions, or the validity of any thing already done, or any right, title, obligation or liability already accrued thereunder.

**22.** This Act shall apply to the Province of Nova Scotia only, and shall be in force at and with respect to such ports only in the said Province as shall be appointed for that purpose from time to time, by Proclamation, under an Order or Orders of the Governor in Council, and the provisions mentioned in the next preceding section shall continue to apply wherever this Act shall not be in force.



















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
