

Usually she's home by 8:30, and the family has dinner.



































































#### Helping Us Get Through It!



The series also offers an opportunity for members of the local community to discover and share the assets of the college that lie beyond the classroom.

#### Oct. 3

#### The Quaint and Curious Persian Gulf War

#### Dennis Murphy, Department of Government

Though the Persian Gulf War ranked high in newsworthiness, it directly touched few American lives. The indirect effects, however, are of great moment. This talk will examine the reasons the war was fought, the way it was fought, and the long-term consequences of its nebulous conclusion.

#### The Resurrection of Frankenstein

#### Lorie Roth, Department of Languages, Literature, and Dramatic Arts

Like the monster resurrected in countless Frankenstein movies, so too the novel on which the Frankenstein stories are based has lately been reanimated. Originally written 175 years ago by an eighteen-year-old pregnant unmarried woman, the book *Frankenstein* died quickly and was buried by the literary establishment for over 160 years. This lecture will discuss the premature burial and the renewed life of Mary Wollstonecraft Shelley's novel *Frankenstein*.

#### Cedric Stratton, Department of Chemistry and Physics

Nobel Laureate Linus Pauling studied chemical bonds, using accurate caloric information on heat generated in different reactions. He devised a formula which developed a single number for each element (called electronegativity) which he used as a predictor for a wide variety of chemical phenomena. This lecture/demonstration will present several rapid and spectacular oxidations, with comments. Positively no mathematics needed.

The Atlantic Coast of the United States, and especially Georgia, has extensive salt marsh estuarine ecosystems. These salt marshes are extremely productive of living matter and are a link between terrestrial and marine ecosystems. This presentation will explore the importance and ecology of salt marshes.

#### Wage Craft and the Measure of Man in Plato's Republic

#### Tom Cooksey, Department of Languages, Literature, and Dramatic Arts

All people seek their own advantage, says Thrasymachus the Sophist. To counter this, Socrates introduces the distinction between the craft itself (*techne*) and the parallel craft of wages (*misthoutikos techne*). The latter seeks its own advantage to support and maintain the practice of the former. What seems a facile ploy is in fact crucial to **J** Socrates' conception of justice, opening an ethical space that explores what it means to be a human being.

#### The United States Economy and Global Competitiveness

#### Yassaman Saadatmand and John Kearnes, Department of Government

The rise of Japan, the economic integration of Europe, and the deindustrialization of the United States have transformed the American economy. Almost every day a U.S. company is forced to trade its leading-edge technology to a foreign corporation for cash to stay alive. At issue is how the United States will face this global competition. The lecture will survey the various approaches which have been suggested to help the United States maintain its position in the global market place.

#### Issachar Jacox Roberts: A Missionary Maverick in China

#### George Pruden, Department of History

The Rev. Mr. Roberts (1802-71) served as a Baptist missionary to China from 1837 to 1867, a period of dramatic changes in China's relationship with western powers. Roberts was from Tennessee, the American frontier at that time, and he exemplified the independent spirit of his background. He was one of the pioneers in American Protestant missions to China, and his checkered career reflected cultural tensions within the United States as well as in its relations with China.

#### May 7

#### Heavy Metal: Toxic Metal Poisoning in Fact and Fiction

#### James Byrd, Department of Chemistry and Physics

Since antiquity, toxic metals and metalloids have been tools of the trade of poisoners in both life and literature. These substances (e.g., arsenic and mercury) also have many household and industrial uses that can lead to accidental exposure resulting in sickness or death. From the Mad Hatter to Minamata, from Emma Bovary to Velma Barfield, examples of intentional and unintentional poisonings from history and literature will be examined to determine which is stranger, truth or fiction.

#### The Politics of American Literature

#### Carol Andrews, Department of Languages, Literature, and Dramatic Arts

During the sixties and seventies, as a result of the Civil Rights and feminist movements, American literary scholars began to rediscover writers previously lost, forgotten, or suppressed. 
