



To everyone else out there, I hope you enjoy the book we slaved over, and I hope all of you critics out there can appreciate the state of confusion that produced this book.

















The senior catcher finished his final season as a collegiate with a batting average of .386, 5 homeruns, 67 runs batted in, while throwing out 50% of the runners attempting to steal. These numbers were good enough to earn him 2nd Team All-American on the Coach's poll. Off the field, Milisits posted a grade point average of over 3.5, which earned him a spot on the Academic All-American team. Milisits plans to use his education to gain a job with Federal Bureau of Investigation.












