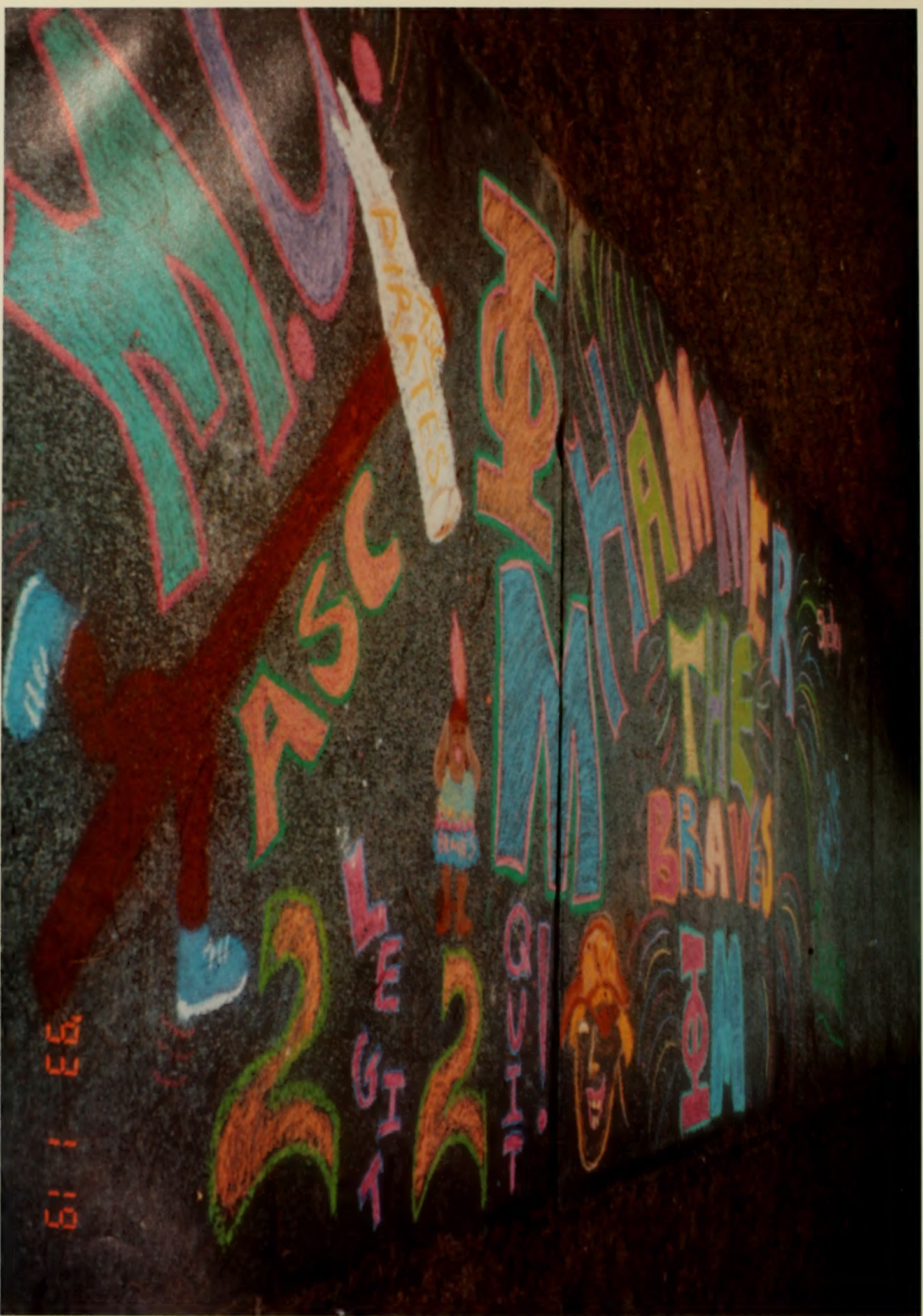

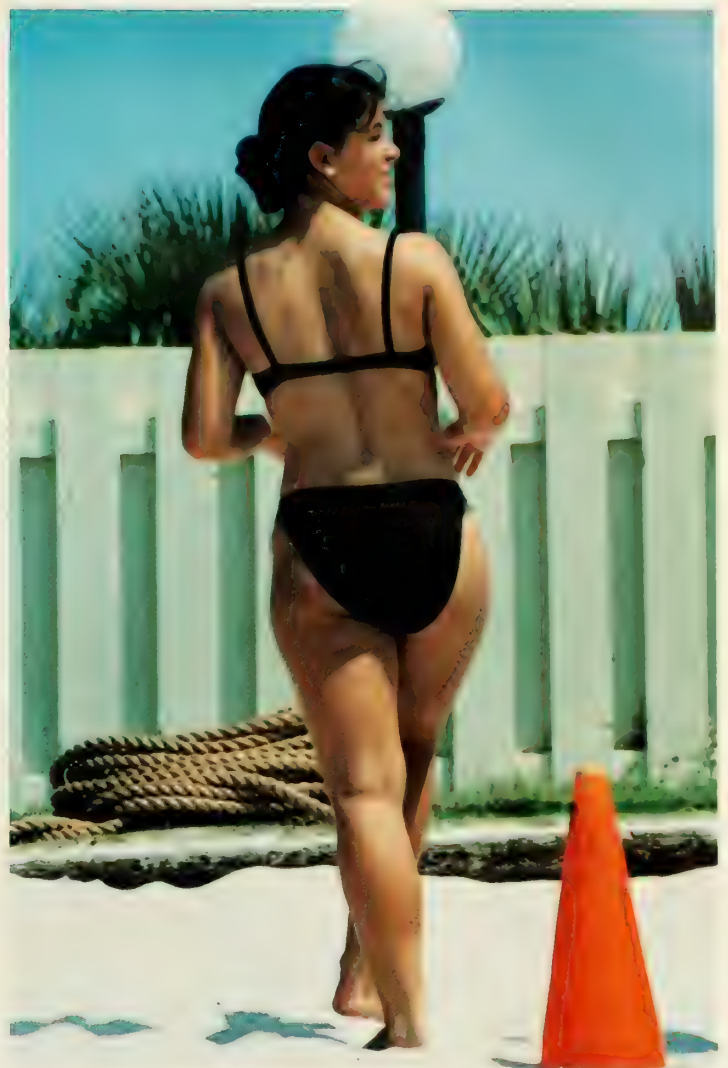

## Milisits post All-American numbers!

Chris Milisits, of Minot, North Dakota, not only posted outstanding numbers on the field, but also in the classroom. The senior catcher finished his final season as a collegiate with a batting average of .386, 5 homeruns, 67 runs batted in, while throwing out 50% of the runners attempting to steal. These numbers were good enough to earn him 2nd Team All-American on the Coach's poll. Off the field, Milisits posted a grade point average of over 3.5, which earned him a spot on the Academic All-American team. Milisits plans to use his education to gain a job with Federal Bureau of Investigation.

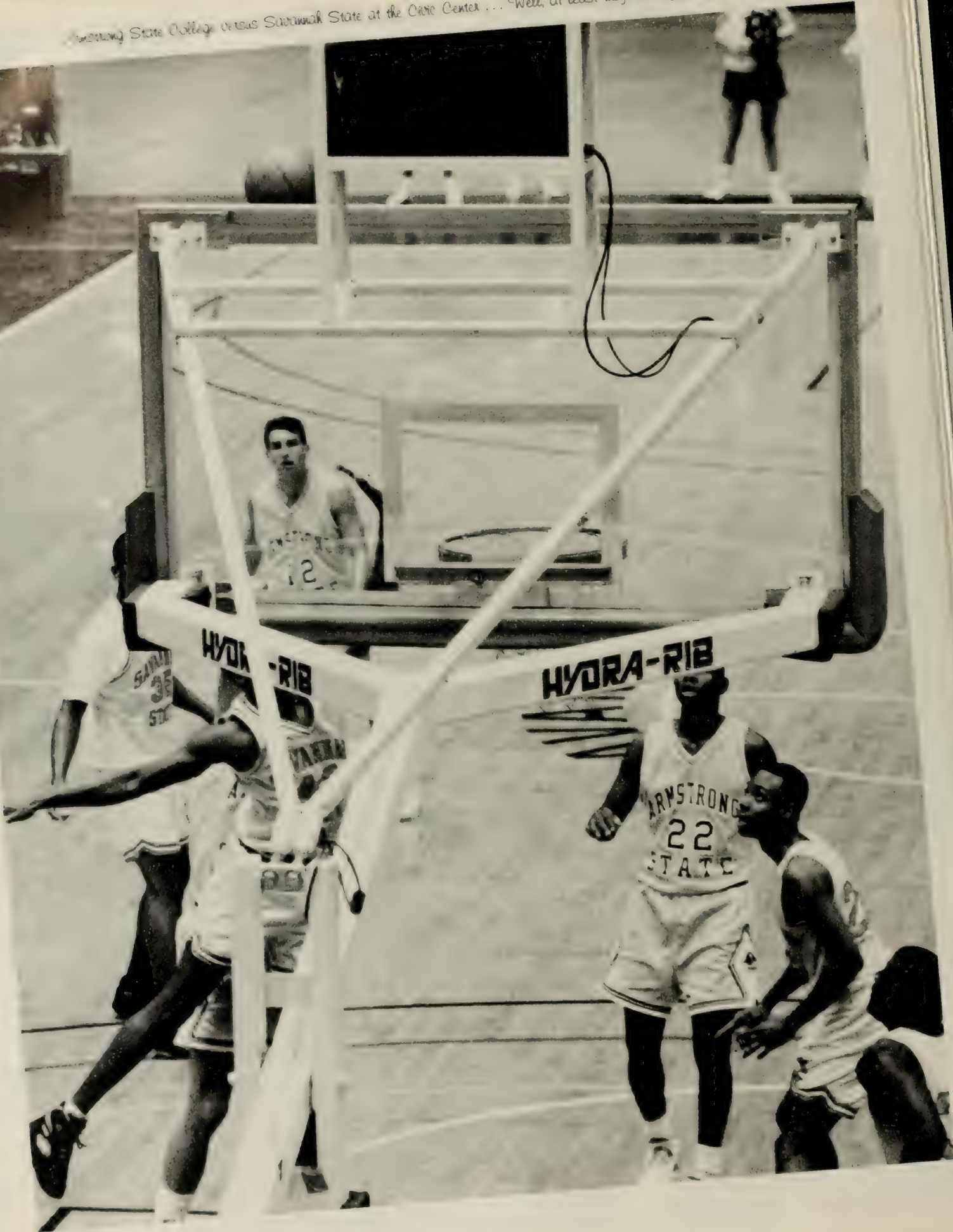

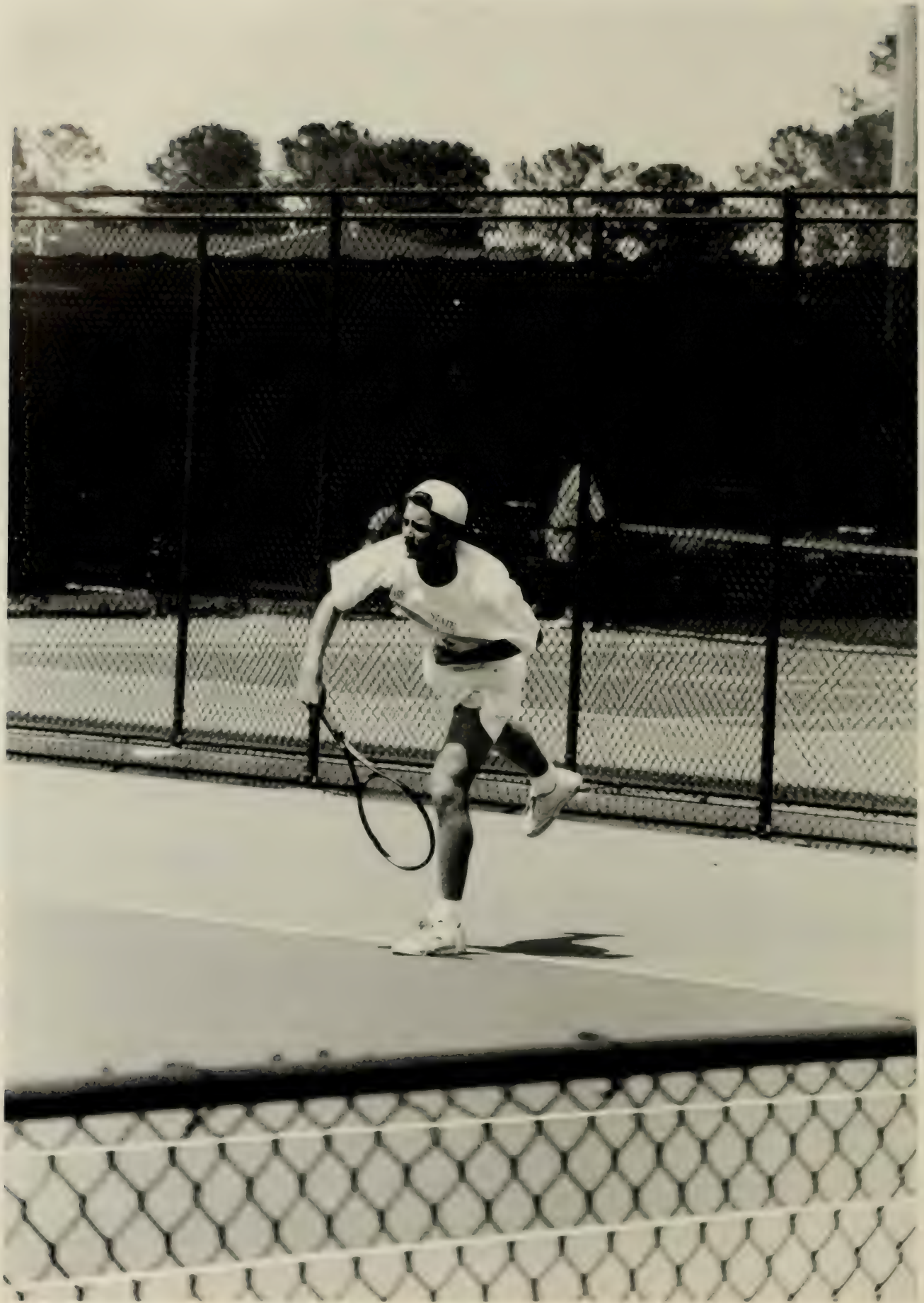

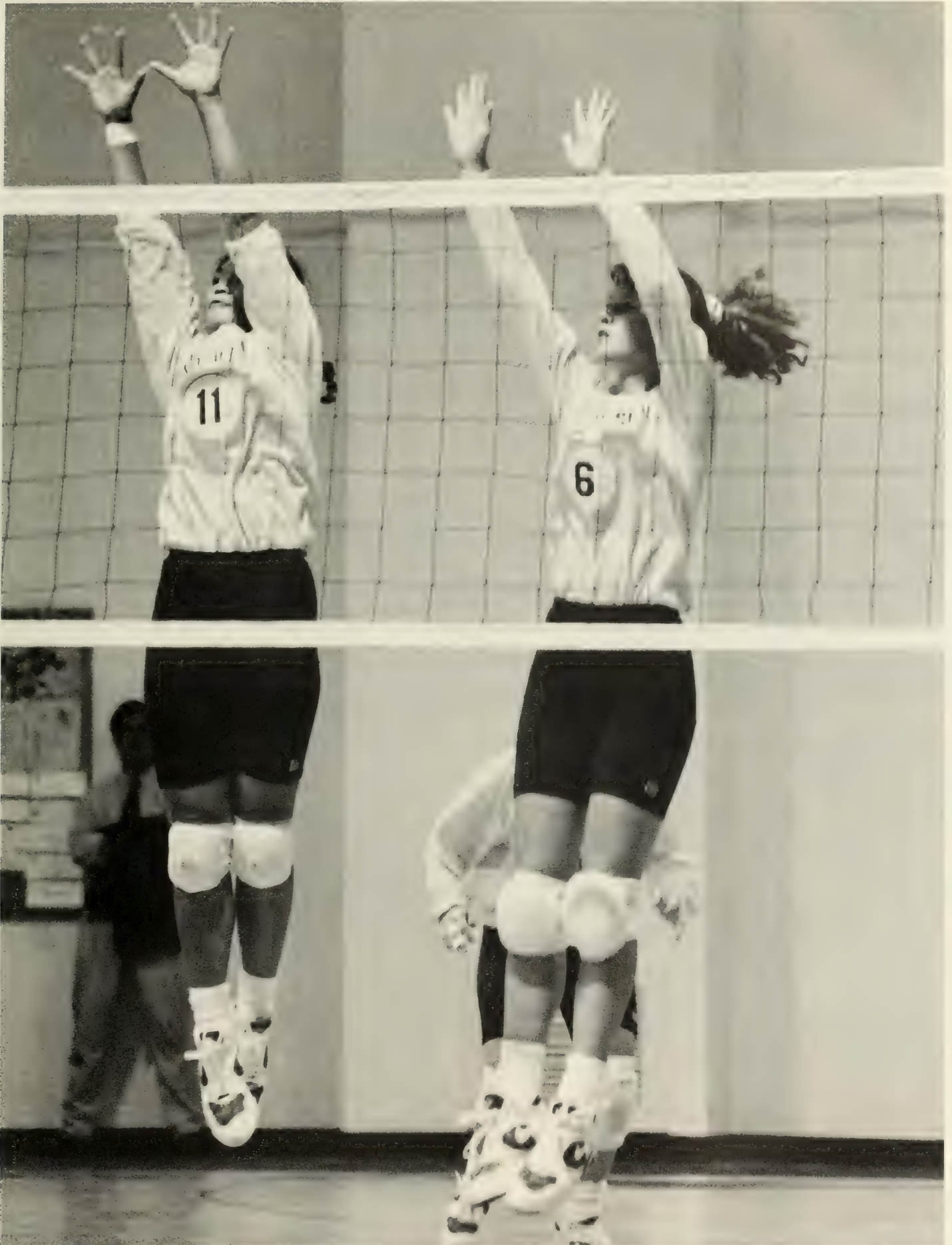

The Women Pirate Basketball team boasted two All-conference Peach Belt Athletic Conference players in Yolande Oliver, a sophomore, and Jennifer Teeple, a freshman.

The women also finished 13th in the nation in defense in NCAA-II, allowing only

59.0 points per game.

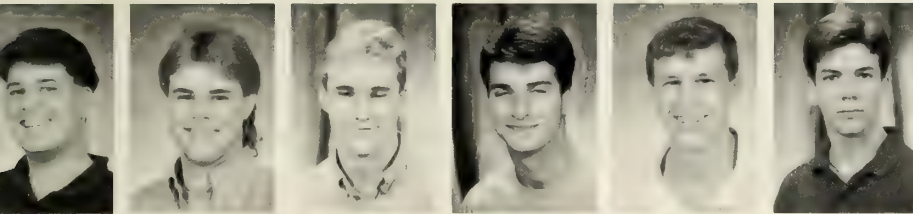

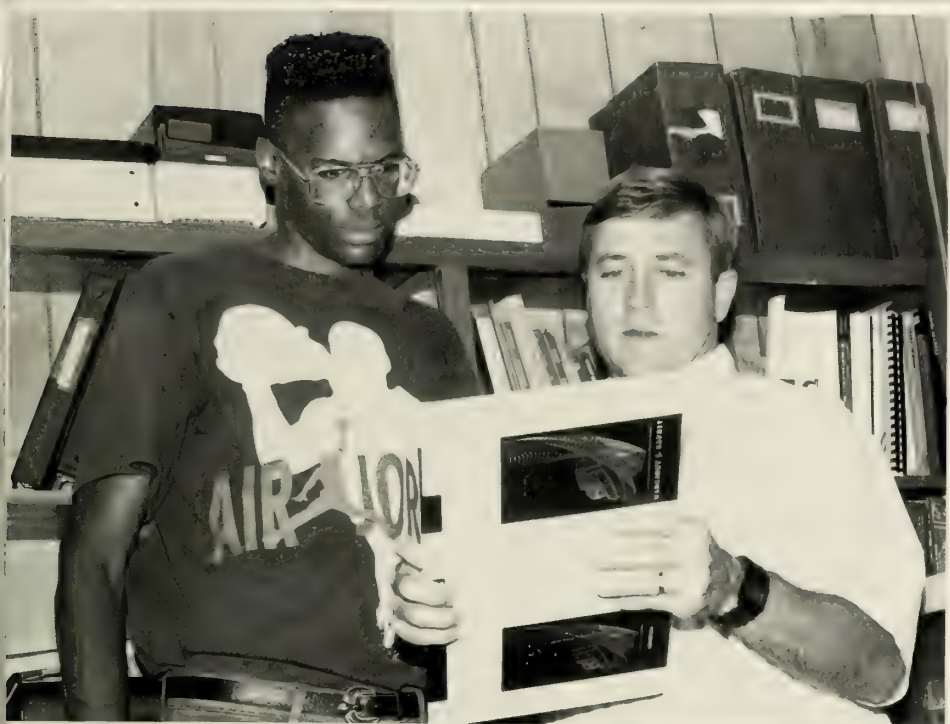

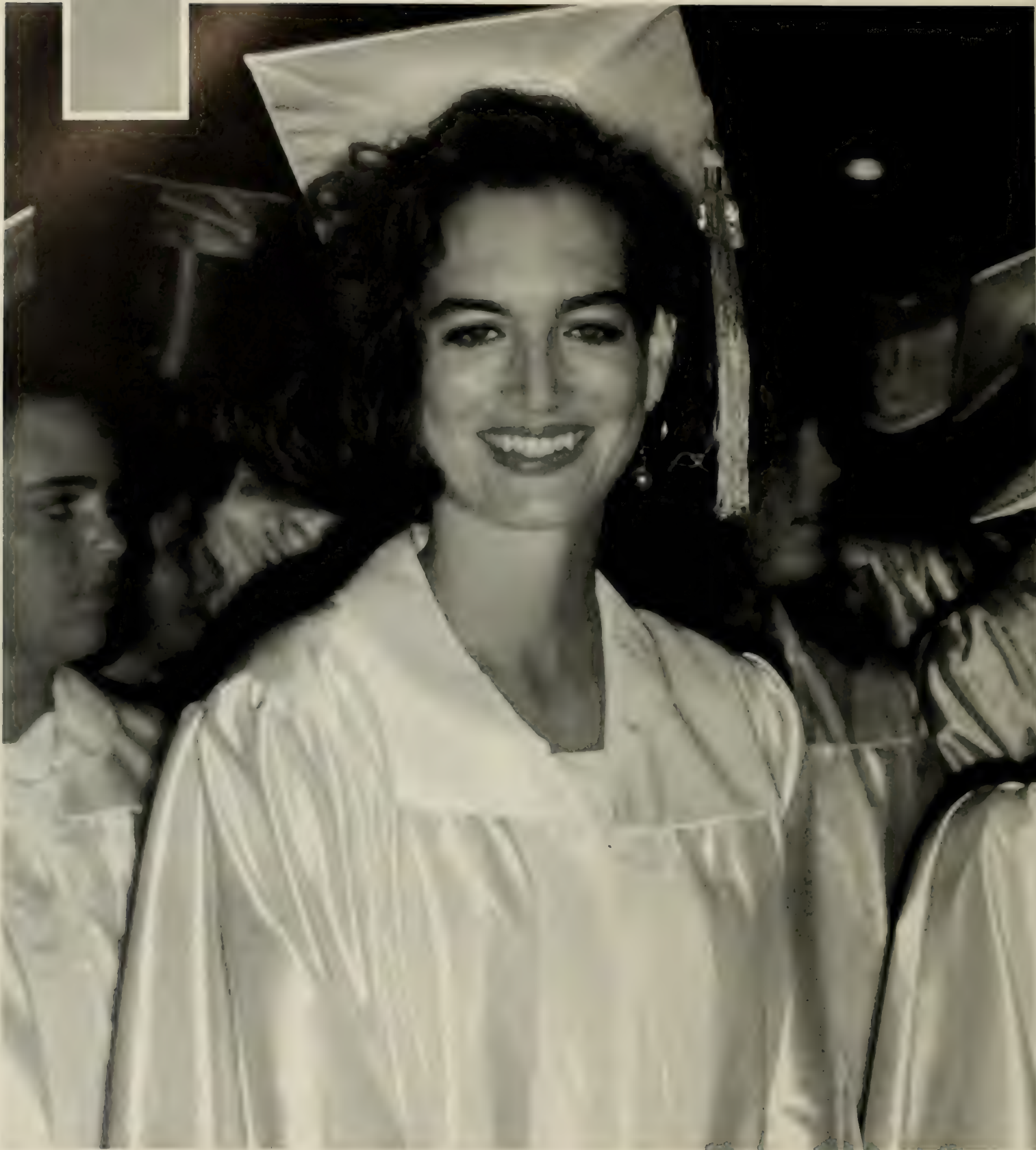

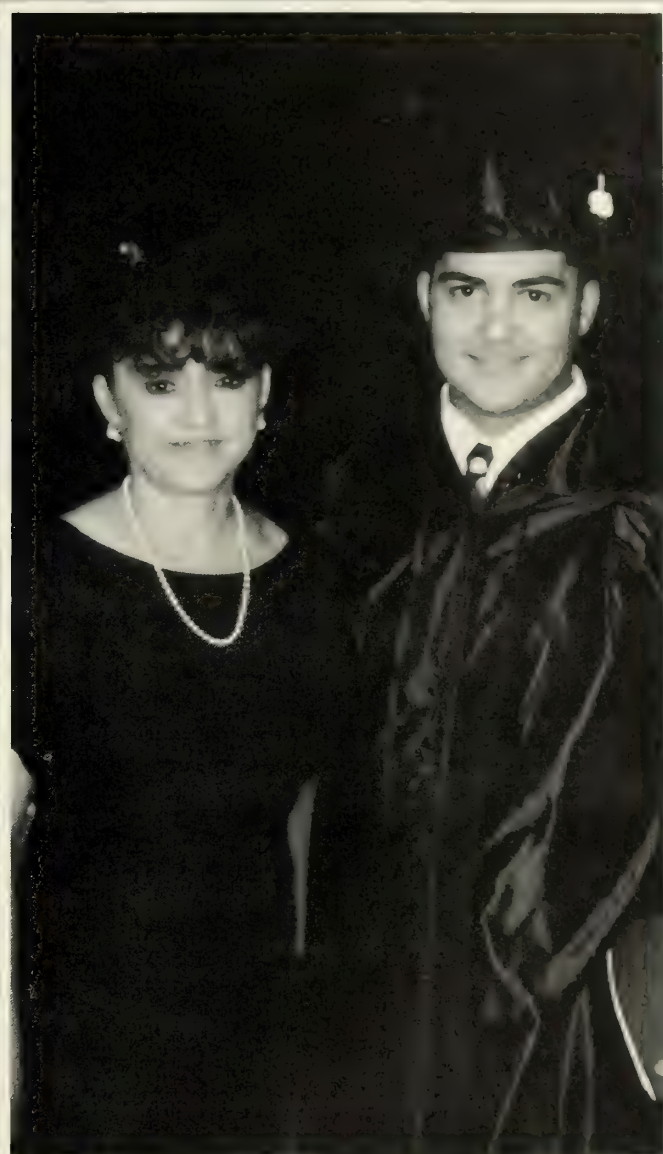

# Pirates on the beach!

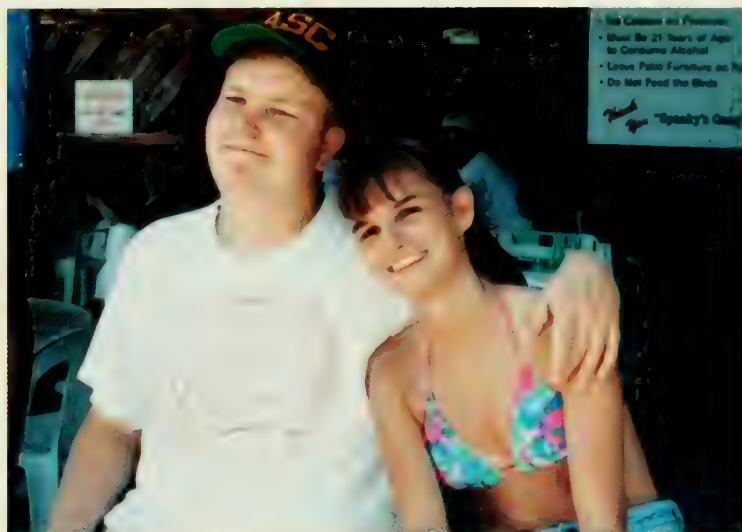

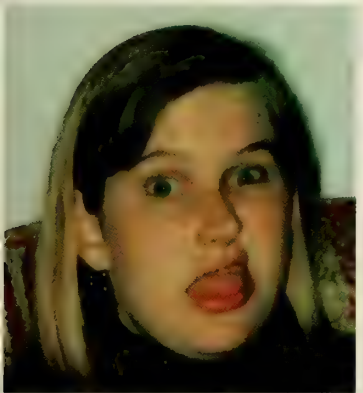

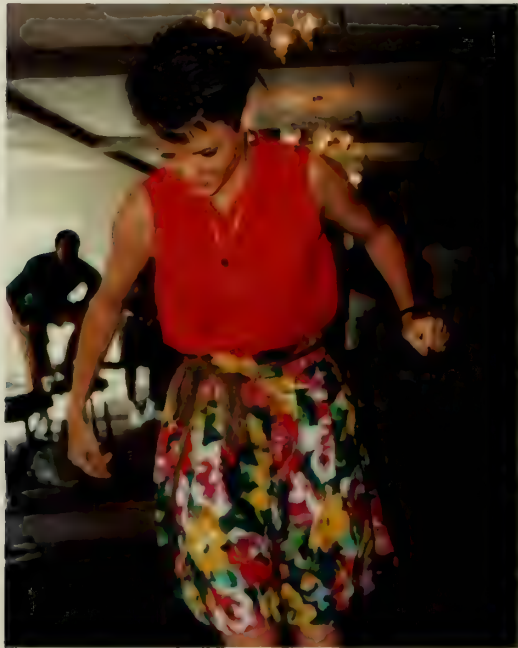

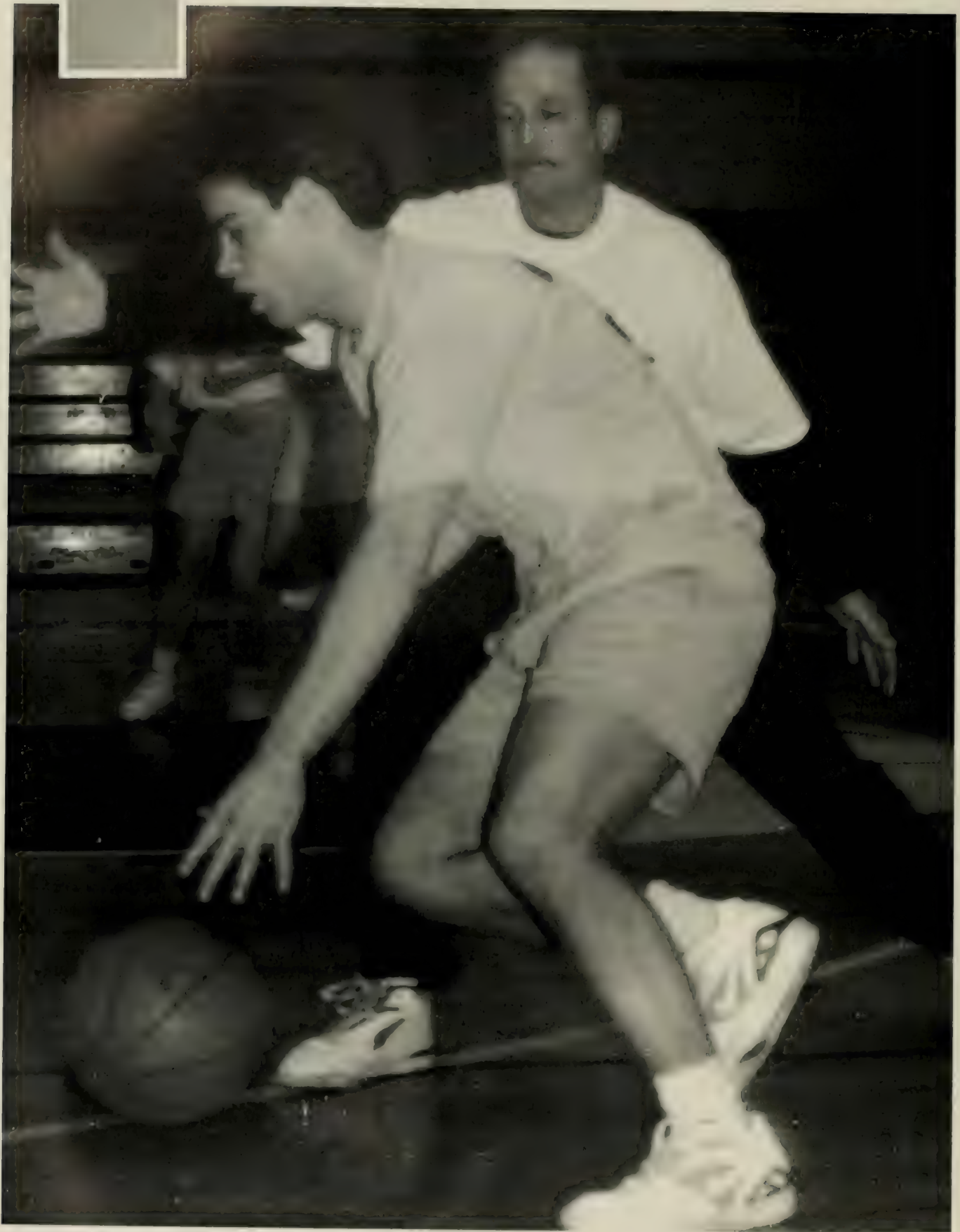

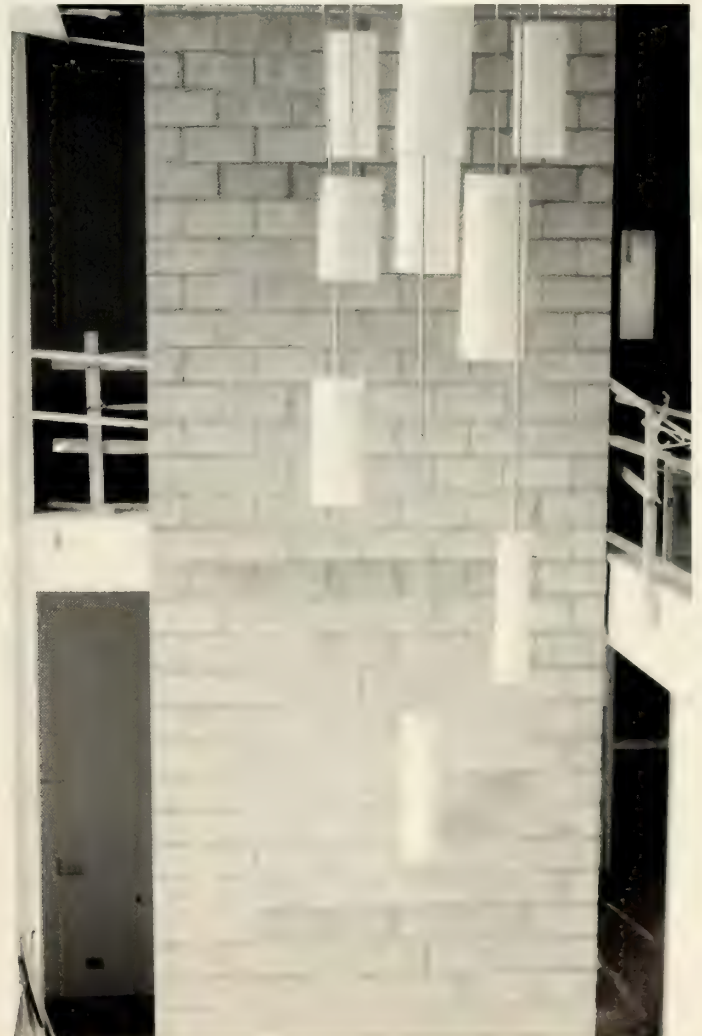
