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PREFACE.

To compile a correct record of the Bertolet Family in America is a difficult task; to include all branches of the name so that none are omitted is well nigh impossible. Nevertheless, the editors of this work have endeavored to do these things, and errors or omissions are due to many and intricate branches and ramifications of those tracing their lineage to Bertolet ancestry.

Too much credit cannot be given to Mr. Daniel H. Bertolet, of Pottstown, Pennsylvania, the genealogical editor, who, for a great many years, has given his time and means to the work. The genealogical portion of book is almost entirely the result of his labors.

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INTRODUCTION.

The Bertholet Family, says the Dictionnaire De La Noblesse De France was originally from Britanny where it comprised several branches. The particular branch given at length in this dictionary is that from the Isle of Orleans erected into a Comte under the name of St. Laurent.

Simon Bertholet, one of the name, had, by his marriage to Catharine Germain, four children. After enumerating a long succession of offspring from Simon, through his second son Francois (born 1626) and Etienne, second son of Francois (born 1663), being of a line of soldiers, counsellors, &c., this French authority states generally that there are other families of the name, one of which lived in Britanny, one of the old French provinces in the northwest part of France, situated in the peninsula formed by the English Channel on the one side and the Atlantic Ocean on the other.

The Bertholets in France were early identified with the Huguenot faction in religion and politics. This was the name given to the Protestants of France about the middle of the Sixteenth Century and it derived its origin from the meetings held by the Protestants at Tours, who used to assemble at night near the King Hugo Gate. The people regarded King Hugo as a spirit. A monk therefore in a sermon declared the Protestants ought to be called "Huguenots" as kinsmen of King Hugo because they would only go out at night as he did. The name spread rapidly and came into universal use.

In the movement of which the Huguenots were a part, we see the uprising of the masses against the religious and political intolerance of the times. The first French civil war was as early as 1560 when the Huguenots fought for religious freedom, which was soon followed by the atrocious massacre of St. Bartholomew, at Paris, August 22, 1572, in which thousands of Huguenots were slain in cold blood.

These reformers contended not only for religious toleration but also for a wider sphere of personal liberty. Hence the reli gious movement was projected dangerously far into the political field, and during the palmiest days of toleration, Protestantism was a sort of religious democracy within the French kingdom.

The Huguenots, being a large faction and led by men high in the councils of the Nation, for many years enjoyed that comparative immunity from persecution which is accorded to a party strong enough to be feared. Their status was legally fixed and their safety secured by what is known as the Edict of Nantes. promulgated in the year 1508, by Henry IV, then King of France. The power of the Catholic party increased to such an extent from this date on that it gradually felt itself strong enough to cut loose from all alliances with the Huguenot party, and finally to crush it entirely. Accordingly on October 18, 1685, Louis XIV issued the famous revocation of the Edict of Nantes. This was unquestionably the most suicidal act of any sovereign of modern times. Stripped of all their civil and political rights, their property confiscated, hundreds of thousands of Huguenots made a rush for the border. Nearly all the Protestant countries of Europe by proclamation invited the fleeing hosts to their realms. Thousands, however, perished in their attempt to escape. In a short time, half a million of the best people of France found asylum in other lands.

Among those affected by this drastic proscription were many bearing the name of Bertholet. It is not known where they all went. Some to the Protestant portions of Germany, some to Italy, where in Lombardy to-day the name is found. We do know, however, that the immediate ancestors of the American Bertolets came to and settled in Chateau D'Oex, Canton Vaud, Switzerland, where Jean Bertolet was born and from whence he departed for Minfeld, in the Bavarian Pfalz, Germany, and after fourteen years residence there, coming, in 1726, to America.

In America, prior to and during these troublous times, quite a number of Huguenot colonies were planted, principally in New York, Pennsylvania and South Carolina. In Pennsylvania, the first record we have of the Bertolet Family is that of Peter, brother of Jean, who settled in Oley, Berks County, in 1720, on land near what is known as Oley Line, which the Commissioners

of the Province of Pennsylvania, by their warrant, dated March 25, 1720, granted to him.

Further information concerning Peter Bertolet is brief (see p. 207). He left descendants whose lineage is traced in later pages of this record. By far the greater number of Bertolets in America are descended from Jean Bertolet and it is of him and his offspring that this work mainly treats.

It seldom happens that so remarkable and interesting a document as the passport, or more properly speaking, testimonial of character, which was given to Jean Bertolet by his home anthorities when he left Europe for America, is preserved to his descendants. Yet so it is, for the original, clearly written upon parchment, with signatures and seal intact, is to-day in the possession of Israel M. Bertolet, of Oley, Pennsylvania, a direct descendant.

This document written in the German language, reads as follows:

"We, the undersigned High Bailiff of the Church of the illustrious Count Palatine of Guttenberg, attest herewith in virtue of this letter that the bearer hereof, the worthy, well-reputed and discreet Jean Bertolet, born at Chateau D'Oex in Switzerland, in the District of Bern, with his wife, has for fourteen years resided constantly in this place, as occupants of the adjoining farm belonging to the august Chapter of Seltz, conducted himself piously, honorably, uprightly and justly, and in such manner as becomes an honest man of a laudable conduct, so that we of him as well as of his wife cannot otherwise speak than to their honor and praise;

"Inasmuch as this couple with their five children under the hope of improving their best interests and opportunities, desire to remove themselves to the new country of Pennsylvania, there to settle themselves peaceably, and are wholly resolved and determined upon the same: Therefore, we, obedient to our numerous duties and station and service, respectfully and in a friendly manner, solicit and request for the aforesaid Jean Bertolet and his wife Susanna, and their five children, not only that they may pass all places free and without hindrance, but besides, on account of their respectable conduct, that there be extended to them every desired aid and assistance.

"To such are we on similar occasions in the most friendly manner ready and willing to reciprocate the kindness.

"To this we, besides our subscribed names, append our usual scal.

"So given and done in the Upper Official District of Minnefeldten, the twenty-ninth day of the month of April as men enumerate, one thousand seven hundred and twenty-six.

(Seal) Nicholas Schoenlaub, Councillor. Hans Ehrhart Beyer, Clerk of the Court."

The passport is particularly interesting in that it furnishes several important clues to Jean Bertolet's early personal history. It tells us that, (1) he was born in Chateau D'Oex, Switzerland, (2) he lived in Minnfeldten (now known as Minfeld) in Germany, for fourteen years, and (3) he had a wife Susanna and five children with whom he emigrated to Pennsylvania on or after April 29, 1726. From other sources we have it that his father's name was Jean, his wife's family name was Harcourt, and that the Bertolet family was not native to Switzerland, but came originally from France—some say from Britanny in the northwestern part of the country, others say from Picardy, now the arrondissement of Pas de Calais, in the northeastern corner.

To prove the accuracy of the statements found in the passport, to investigate traditions of the family's origin, and, if possible, to supplement them with more precise information, the writer in the summer of 1913 visited some of the places named. It is the purpose of the remainder of this sketch to set down briefly the information gathered, with some few inferences to be drawn therefrom.

The town of Chateau D'Oex was first visited. It is in the district of D'Enhaut, Canton Vaud, Southwestern Switzerland, and has 3,500 inhabitants. One starts from Montreaux at the eastern extremity of Lake Geneva, and by electric railway known as the Montreaux-Oberland-Bernese railway, crosses the mountains to the valley in which Chateau D'Oex nestles, a two hour ride. The town bears the same name as the valley, and is 3,500 feet above sea level. The little river La Sarine tumbles through it. The valley is most picturesque and charming. High mountains surround it

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on all sides, and Chateau D'Oex is a starting point for many M-pine climbing trips. The chateau from which the place took its name stands on top of a little round hill overlooking the town. It was formerly the residence of the chief family of the district but is now a church. The French language is almost exclusively spoken here, and nearly all the people are Lutheran in religion. The chief industry of the valley is cattle raising. Chateau D'Oex has grown from a typical Alpine village into quite a resort. A number of good hotels are found, patronized both summer and winter by visitors seeking rest or recreation.


Consultation of the local directory disclosed the fact that a number of Bertolets, (spelled Bertholet), are living there to-day. The writer was referred to Mr. Victor Bertholet, an inspector of cattle for the district. He proved to be a very pleasant and intelligent gentleman, about sixty years of age. He said that he had taken no special interest in the genealogy of his family, and knew nothing of the Jean Bertolet who went to America. He knew, however, that the family was not originally Swiss but came from France in earlier days, in consequence of religious persecutions, and that they were Huguenots. In this he is supported by Prof. L. Ganty-Berney, local historian, who writes of the people of the valley, "The original inhabitants were joined by certain French families whom religious persecutions drove from their own country" (Pays-D'Enhaut Vaudios-Chateau D'Oex, page 9). Mr. Bertholet said that the present members of the family are more numerous at Rougemont, a village of 1,000 souls, five miles to the east, and that he was born there, his grandfather's name having been Jean David Bertholet. He stated that both the villages of Chateau D'Oex and Rougemont were formerly included in a general district bearing the name Chateau D'Oex.

The Rougemont directory showed frequent recurrences of Bertholet names, such as David Bertholet, innkeeper, another David, a shoe-maker, Julius, a merchant, still another David, a butcher, and so on. "The village is one of the rare places in the Alps which has preserved a real originality. The houses are all wood, of the old Swiss chalet style, a romantic and very ancient place" (Ganty-Berney's History).

No birth, marriage, or death records of the time of Jean Bertolet were available at Chateau D'Oex or Rougemont. Such as may have existed at the time and have been preserved, are now at Lausanne, the capital of the canton. The writer was not able, owing to lack of time, to visit Lausanne and examine these records. Mr. Bertholet undertook to have a search made to learn if there is an entry among them of the birth of Jean Bertolet, forwarding his findings, if any, to America. At the date of this writing no communication on the subject has been received, and it is quite probable that no record was found.

Minnefeldten was next visited. This place, now called Minfeld, is in that part of Germany known to-day as the Bavarian Pfalz. It is about 250 miles north of Chateau D'Oex, and is reached by rail down the valley of the Rhine through Bern and Basel to Karlsruhe. At Karlsruhe one changes to the Kandel-Winden-Landau branch railway. From Karlsruhe the train runs west to Kandel, about 14 miles, crossing the Rhine midway. Landau is about 12 miles beyond Kandel. At the latter place the train is left and one must drive about three miles to Minfeld. The village is on the west side of and ten miles distant from the Rhine. It numbers 1,000 inhabitants, whose sole pursuit is farming. None of the people live immediately upon the land they till, but go out in the morning from the village to their fields, returning at night.

The present Burgomaster of Minfeld is Gustav Beyer. He proved to be a kind and hospitable old gentleman, a retired farmer. His house, typical of all others in the village, was very ancient, the exterior walls plastered, with timbers exposed. Upon learning the writer's mission, Mr. Beyer showed the liveliest interest. A photograph of Jean Bertolet's passport was shown to him and to his son Charles, who read it without the least difficulty. Mr. Beyer expressed great astonishment at the sight of a document issued by his predecessors in office nearly two centuries before. He was particularly struck at the sight of the signature of an ancestor. Hans Ehrhart Beyer, on it. He produced a history (Beitrage Zur Geschichts der Dörfer Minfeld und Freckenfeld), written by Johannes Walter, of Landau, and turning to the roll of town officers for the year 1726, found them to have been the same

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persons whose signatures are affixed to the passport. Mr. Beyer understood the reference to the farm belonging to the Chapter of Selz which, according to the passport, was occupied by Jean Bertolet, and said he was acquainted with the property but that it was no longer so owned or named.

Upon being questioned on the subject, Mr. Beyer could recall no one by the name of Bertolet presently or within his recollection living in the community, and asserted it to be his belief that there had been none for a great many years, as he had never in his private or public capacity, heard the name before. Being told that Jean Bertolet's wife was Susanna Harcourt, living before her marriage near Landau, he said that he was acquainted with people by that name, and that it was well known in the neighborhood.

Mr. Beyer undertook to search for a record of the marriage of Jean Bertolet and Susanna Harcourt, and was singularly successful. At Barbelroth, a farming village two miles from Minfeld, in the parish of Barbelroth, he procured for the writer the following certified copy of the marriage record of the parties in question, taken from the marriage register of the Church Book:

"Married: On February 2, 1712, after three announcements in the church at Barbelroth, Jean Bertolet, son of Jean Bertolet, late of Chateau D'Oex, with Susanna, daughter of Jean Harcourt, of Muhlhofen,

Certified to at Barbelroth, 17 September, 1913.

Wambsgaus, Minister."

Muhlhofen is a farm village three miles north of Barbelroth, five miles north of Minfeld, and distant four miles from Landau. In addition to the marriage record, there is among the baptismal records of the church at Barbelroth, the following:

"1720. To Jean Bertolet and Susanna, his wife, born a daughter, Esther."

Of the five children referred to in the passport, this is the only one of whose birth a formal record was found.

The third place visited was St. Pol. in France, the chief town of the arrondissement of Pas de Calais, formerly Picardy, a three

hours' ride from Boulogne. The place has a population of 5,000. All the records of the district are kept at the Town Hall (Mairie). There are alphabetically arranged lists of inhabitants, going back hundreds of years. In spite of careful search back to the year 1600, the lists failed to show any one bearing the Bertolet name, or anything like it, inhabiting the district since that date. The conclusion is forced on one that the family was not native to this part of France. Time did not permit a visit to Britanny, on the northwest coast.

Summarizing these investigations, the writer believes the following facts to be fairly well established. The ancestors of Jean Bertolet left France (probably some part of Brittany) through religious persecutions, shortly after 1685, and with others of their friends and neighbors, settled in and about the village and district of Chateau D'Oex, Canton Vaud, Switzerland, Jean Bertolet's father's name was also Jean. The name seems to have persisted as a family name, to modern times. Jean Bertolet was born in Chateau D'Oex, but when a young man went to Minfeld, near Karlsruhe, Germany, in which neighborhood were living other French refugee families. There he married Susanna Harcourt. daughter of Jean Harcourt, a farmer of Muhlhofen, nearby. They settled down on a farm in the neighborhood for fourteen years, had five children, and then, in April, 1726, left for Pennsylvania. Doubtless, Jean Bertolet was the only one of the name who came to or ever lived at Minfeld, for there is absolutely no record or knowledge of any one else bearing the same family name in the community. 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JEAN BERTOLET-IN AMERICA.

In the fall of 1726, Jean Bertolet, with his wife and five children, Abraham, Maria, Jean, Esther and Susanna, arrived in America. He chose as his home a fertile spot in the heart of the Oley Valley, Berks County, Pennsylvania. When Jean Bertolet settled here Reading was unknown and hardly a house marked the spot where it now stands. Most of the country which is now thickly settled and in a high state of cultivation was then covered with forests occupied chiefly by Indians and wild beasts.

It is said he came to Oley, Pennsylvania, because his wife's sister, Anna Maria Weimer, a widow who married Isaac DeTurck, had with her husband come to America in 1709, and after living in New York about three years, settled in Oley some time in 1712.

One of the first substantial houses in Oley was built by Jean Bertolet in 1731. The date was cut upon the frame over the door. The location selected by him is delightful. No part of the valley excels it for agricultural purposes. Several of the now adjacent farms were then included in his land.

In his new home, as in the old across the water, Jean Bertolet directed his chief efforts to the cultivation of the soil. In addition, however, he exerted himself to secure the education of his children. To this end he engaged, among others, Dr. George De Benneville, founder of Universalism in America, who preached, practiced medicine and taught at the same time, and who, on September 24, 1745, married Jean Bertolet's daughter Esther. (See page 155, for sketch of Dr. George DeBenneville.

In addition to the passport previously described and of equal if not greater interest as a relic of Jean Bertolet, is his Bible, now owned by Sarah Bertolet, of Oley. It was printed in 1507 in Geneva, in the French language, and on the title page is found the following inscription:

"La Bible, qui est Toute La Saineta Ecritures.— Par François Perrin pour Antoine Vincent, MDLXVII." On the fly leaf is written, doubtless in Jean Bertolet's hand-writing,

"Le present Bible apartien à Jean Bertolet." (This Bible belongs to Jean Bertolet.)

In addition to the text there is a written family record containing the names of his wife and five of his children, those of Frederick and Peter being omitted. These entries appear in the following order:

Susanna Bertolet: "The Lord has enriched her with His good and Holy Spirit so that she may grow in His fear and love in order that every day of her life she may be agreeable to Thee, her Creator, by being humble and patient to His will." Amen Abraham Bertolet, ist geboren December 11, 1712.

Maria Bertolet, ist geboren July 12, 1715.

Jean Bertolet, ist geboren September 28, 1717.

Esther Bertolet, ist geboren August 12, 1720; married Dr. George DeBenneville, emigrant.

Susanna Bertolet, ist geboren November 17, 1724.

The following children were born in America. Their names do not appear in the Bible:

Frederick Bertolet, born 1726 or 1727.

Peter Bertolet, born 1728; died September 2. 1744, at Bethlehem, Pa.; buried in Moravian Cemetery.

On April 4, 1757, Jean Bertolet sold his homestead farm in Oley to his son Frederick, who apparently lived with him. The original deed is now in possession of Mrs. Catharine Parker, No. 441 South Sixth Street, Reading, Pa., a direct descendant of Frederick. It is signed in Jean Bertolet's own hand, in two places, first at the foot of the deed, where the signature is accompanied by a seal, and again on the back of the deed, where the signature follows a receipt for the purchase money.

Jean Bertolet died in 1757, aged about seventy, having had the following children: Abraham; Maria, married to Stephen Barnett; Jean: Esther, married to Dr. George De Benneville; Susanna, married to Jacob Frey; Frederick; and Peter, who died before maturity. Jean Bertolet is supposed to have been buried in the family burial plot on his farm near Oley Line, and the Berto-

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let Family Association, on Sept. 4, 1902, erected thereon to his memory a granite stone suitably inscribed.

According to a paper read by Benjamin Bertolet, of Philadelphia, on Dec. 21, 1891, at the 150th anniversary of the Moravian Church held at Bethlehem, Pa., Jean Bertolet was more or less closely associated with Count Zinzendorf, the Great Moravian churchman. Mr. Bertolet, in part, writes:

"Count Zinzendorf left his Saxon home to join the Moravians in this country, accompanied by his daughter, the Countess Benigan, then sixteen years old, and others. They landed in New York on December 1, 1741. Four days later, after having held meetings in that city and Long Island, they left for Philadelphia, and arrived December 10, 1741. Here they occupied a threestory brick house on the east side of Second Street, above Race. Without any delay, the Count began a series of religious meetings in his house which immediately became popular. These meetings soon became known as Haus Versammlungen (House meetings).

On the 18th of December the Count, with his companions, began a notable journey to Bethlehem. They went first to Germantown, where the Count remained over night, with Rev. John Bechtel, one of the early Pietists, and a member of the Reformed Church. On the following day, they set out for Weigner's home, a wayside house at Skippack, where they passed the night, and the next day journeyed onward. On the 21st they arrived at Bethlehem

"Count Zinzendorf with an energy he possessed to a surprising degree did not make a protracted stay in Bethlehem, for on Christmas day, a few hours after those impressive services in the log house from which Bethlehem was named, the Count journeved to Oley, where he preached at the house of the French Huguenot, by the name of Jean Bertolet. From thence he journeyed to Ephrata to investigate the cause of one Habrecht, who had left the Brethren to join the Mystic Monks."

It would appear from the foregoing and from what follows, that Jean Bertolet was personally and deeply interested in the religious movements of the times. For Mr. Bertolet in his paper, con-

tinues .

"On Friday, January 12. 1742, the first Synod assembled in Germantown, at the house of Theobald Endt, clockmaker, who lived on the west side of Germantown Avenue, near Queen Street. This notable gathering included representatives from the hermits on the Wissahickon, the Zionistic Brotherhood, besides the regular denominations like the Dunkards, Mennonites, Reformed, and Lutherans, and was intended to unite all the Germans into one colony under the bonds of Christian unity.

"This record shows that Jean Bertolet was present and that Count Zinzendorf called on his old friend. The second meeting was held in the fall of 1742 at the house of John DeTurck, of Oley, son of Isaac DeTurck, who was married to a sister of Jean Bertolet's wife."

These gatherings resulted in the organization of a religious society, irrespective of any denomination or creed under the name of the "Vereinigte Skippacke Brüder," or "The United Brethren of Skippack."

"Andrew Eshbach was introduced to the Oley people and acted as their preacher for several years, having no doubt been sent there by the Moravians of Bethlehem. He lived for a time, in 1741, with Jean Bertolet. A list is given of the persons who took part in a great revival throughout Oley. Among them were Jean Bertolet, his wife, and sons.

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ABRAHAM BERTOLET BRANCH.

2. ABRAHAM BERTOLET was born December 11, 1712, in Minfeld, Germany, and died in July, 1766, in Oley. He was the oldest son of Jean Bertolet and was fourteen years of age when he came with his parents to America in 1726. In 1735 he was married to Esther DeTurck, of Oley, Pa. She was the daughter of Isaac DeTurck and was born September 29, 1711; died May 17, 1798.

Abraham Bertolet bought a farm in Oley Township from Esther DeTurck, sister of Isaac DeTurck, containing one hundred and thirty-eight (138) acres. This farm has from that day to this remained in the family and is now the property of Israel M. Bertolet, a direct descendant.

The location of what was then Abraham Bertolet's farm is a beautiful one and has many superior advantages. Running water abounds and beside a gushing spring Abraham Bertolet selected a fine site for a house which he built in 1736. It is a substantial structure of stone, two stories high, and was followed by the larger dwelling immediately adjoining erected in 1772 by his son Daniel.

10. Daniel Bertolet (Abraham², Jean¹), oldest son of Abraham and Esther Bertolet, was born May 9, 1741, eleven years prior to the erection of the County of Berks as a county separate from Philadelphia, on his father's farm in Oley Township, and died November 19, 1797. In 1772, having then become the owner by inheritance of his father's farm, he built thereon a large two-story stone dwelling house close by the original house erected in 1736. Both these houses are standing to this day, the later being used as the mansion house of the farm. In 1787 Daniel Bertolet built a large barn on the property. Daniel Bertolet (72) was a farmer, sawyer, poet and preacher. Persons still living who knew him describe him as a man of iron will, marvelous industry and deep convictions. He might be called a type of inherited physical, mental and moral qualities developed to a high degree; a true descendant of his great-grandfather, Jean Bertolet, of whom he often spoke as the French Huguenot, who voluntarily exiled himself for conscience sake.

In personal appearance he was of the middle height, broad and well proportioned. An intelligent visitor at his house has said that he reminded him of Benjamin Franklin as portrayed by pen and brush. His character was many sided. His industry was wonderful. He tilled his farm, worked in his smithy, built a saw-mill in 1810 on his property and operated it until old age weakened him; he engaged in various business enterprises, and withal found time to read, write and preach. One might dwell at length upon his worldly enterprises, successes and failures, but to his posterity, his moral characteristics, spiritual development and religious activities are more important and interesting.

His early education and training was largely under Quaker influence. As a child he was sent to the Quaker School in Oley, near Pleasantville, and as he grew older his time was much spent in company with Quakers, living in the neighborhood. These early teachings and associations tended largely to form his character and ideas. For instance, he imbibed the Quaker opposition to war and was opposed to resort to arms for the settlement of national disputes. His opposition to slavery may also be traced to this influence. His kindly spirit to his neighbors and friends was doubtless another product of these influences, and it is remembered of him that he would, on principle, return good for evil.

From early youth Daniel Bertolet was as much concerned with the things of the spirit as with those material. His was an observant, imaginative and introspective mind. His spiritual condition in his young manhood became a matter of great concern to him. The manner in which he first gained definite direction on what he himself called the "road to salvation" is thus described by one to whom he related the occurrence.

One Sunday while riding through a wood, he came upon a company of people. They were listening to a charcoal-burner, preaching. He lived in a but in the forest, tending his fires during the week and preaching on Sunday to those who cared to hear. Daniel Bertolet stopped to listen and the spell of the preacher fell upon him. As he tells it, the listeners were filled with an "holy awe." and he became deeply convinced of his helplessness and need of salvation. He returned home to his wife and told her his experience. Shortly thereafter, in 1800, he became acquainted with Rev. John Walter, a co-laborer with and successor to Jacob Albright, founder of the Evangelical Association. It happened in this way: A young man on horseback stopped at his house and asked food for himself and beast. He was reserved in manner, but impressive in appearance. He ate his meal and left without telling his name or business. Moved by some impulse, Daniel Bertolet ran after the stranger and induced him to return. He learned who and what he was and soon came under his influence. From that time his house became a preaching place for the "Albright Brethren," as they were then called, and he connected himself with the organization, allowing the use of his house as headquarters for the brethren in Olev and the vicinity. He was liberal in his religious hospitality, for not only those of his adopted faith, but all ministers of evangelistic type were received and allowed to preach there. In a record kept by him, covering a period of twenty years, we find among these the names of Rev. Peter Beaver, an early Methodist minister and grandfather of the late Gov. James A. Beaver: Rev. John Weinbrenner, founder of the Weinbrennarian Church, John Kimmel, and many others. magnificent old elm, which stood until recent years in the meadow of his farm, was, in fine weather, the scene of many of these religious gatherings.

Daniel Bertolet was closely identified with the early history of the Evangelical Church. He became a lay preacher, participating in the great Orwigsburg revival in 1821, and was regularly ordained in 1832. He became a member of the first Board of Publication of the Evangelical Association in 1816, and in 1820 with Rev. John Dreisbach published a small hymn book called "Geist-



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liche Viole." Here his genius for lyrical composition found vent and a number of his works were incorporated in the hymnal. Doubtless the best known of these, as well as the most expressive of the spiritual melody and feeling with which his soul was always full is the following:

> Die Wasserbäche rauschen dar, Die Stern am Himmel leuchten klar, Die kühlen Winde wehen; Es folgt die ganze Creatur Dem grossen Schöpfer der Natur, Wie dieses wohl zu sehn.

Allein der arme Mensch ist blind, So lang er lebet in de Sünd Und ist noch unbekehrt, So wiederstrebt er seinem Gott Und was sein theures Wort gebot Er auch nicht gerne hört.

O weh! O weh! der armen Welt, Die nur bemüht um Gut und Gelt! Wie wird as endlich gehn! Gott sagt uns ja in seinem Wort, Wer lebt in seinen Sünden fort, Kann vor ihm nicht bestehn.

Drum eil, wer sich erretten will, Die Zeit verflieszt, ach steht nicht still. Es geht zur Ewigkeit! Wie wichtig, wichtig ist die Sach! O Seele, denke diesem nach, Und mache dich bereit!

Wie mancher, eh' er sich's versah, So war der Todes-Bote da Und machte bald em End! Drum, sichrer Sünder! säume nicht. Es folgt gewisz ein streng Gericht Dem, der nicht Jesum kennt.

Hör' seine Stimm', weil er dir ruft. Such du auch Ihn, weil er dich sucht! Jetzt ist die schöne Zeit. Jetzt hast du noch Gelegenheit. Drum schicke dich, mach dich bereit, Es gilt in Ewigkeit. The author of this hymn himself tells its inspiration. On a clear, windy evening in March, the moon and stars shining brightly, he came home from a prayer-meeting. The waters of the stream flowing by his house were swollen from the melting of Spring snows, and rushed along tumultuously in their course to meet the sea. He was filled with awe at the glory and power of the Creator of these things, and with deep feeling for the many worldly persons who have no thought of their Maker or their future. Moved by these reflections he composed the hymn.

Daniel Bertolet's literary activities were not, however, confined to religious topics. Whenever his soul was stirred over the prevalence of some vice or great wrong his expression found itself in verse. Thus we find among his poems one, among others on the subject, denouncing in scathing lines the use of tobacco by the clergy. Four of the verses are typical:

"Duwack's brüder, singe' lieder, Wenn das maul ist voll geschtank; Gott sie dank, ich bin es ledig, Es machet mich fast krank."

Strong drink, slavery and infant baptism, to which he was radically opposed, and in fact many of the political, social and moral topics of his day called forth his ready muse, and we find among his poems a number dealing with these subjects.

Being utterly regardless of the opinion others might have of him or his beliefs, he took no pains to conceal them. His prejudice against tobacco became a fixed idea, so much so that in his old age, when perhaps years had told upon his mental powers, he caused a printed sign to be put up at his door forbidding indulgence in the weed on the premises.

He was a "rank abolitionist," but his Quaker-like opposition to war ranged him on the side of those who opposed the conquest of the South and the abolition of slavery, by force of arms. While he had the satisfaction of living to see the day when all slaves were freed, he never ceased to regret the means by which the fact was accomplished.

When Daniel Bertolet became an Evangelical, that Church had no house of worship in Oley or the vicinity. For years its communicants held services at each others houses. This continued until 1842 when he set apart a lot of ground on his farm near Friedensburg, and built a meeting house thereon. This he offered to give to the local congregation. He was informed by the authorities of the parent Church that under its laws all church property had to vest in the Evangelical Association itself and that local congregations could not own church property. The idea of control over a house of worship intended for his friends and neighbors, vesting in a distant body of comparative strangers, was exceedingly repugnant to the donor. In the dispute which followed the disposition of this property Daniel Bertolet became so offended that he withdrew his offer, left the church, and never rejoined it, remaining until the end of his life independent of all church ties.

The building and grounds which he had set apart for religious uses were thrown open to all preachers of the gospel of any Protestant faith, and until his death were frequently used by itinerant evangelists and ministers of all shades of doctrine or belief. At his death, in 1868, Daniel Bertolet, by his will, left the building with six acres of land, including the family burial ground, and \$2,000.00 in money, to trustees, to be incorporated by the Court, as a Union Church and Cemetery. The corporation was organized in 1870, the building enlarged, a cemetery laid out, and the property has since that time been devoted to general burial purposes regardless of the religious faith of the lot holders. A number of re-unions of the Bertolet Family have been held there in recent years, within a stone's throw of the last resting place of this interesting character.

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cluding the running of the batteries at Vicksburg, receiving honorable mention in dispatches.

In May, 1863, while on duty, Dr. Bertolet was incapacitated by a sun stroke, from the effects of which his physical condition gradually grew worse until he died, May 1, 1868, at Frankfort-on-the-Main, while traveling in Germany with the hope of regaining his health. Under the care of the Masonic Order, of which he was a member, Dr. Bertolet's body was buried in the Friedhof (cemetery) at Frankfurt.

Daniel Nicholas Bertolette (406), son of Isaac and Christina (Griesemer) Bertolet, was born January 22, 1851, in Oley, Pa., and moved with his parents to Reading, Pa., in 1854. He received his early education in the local schools of Reading, graduating from the High School in 1866. He read medicine with Dr. Charles H. Hunter, and later with Dr. Samuel L. Kurtz, both of Reading, and graduated in March, 1872, from the Jefferson Medical College at Philadelphia. After graduation he was made a resident physician at Blockley Hospital, and on June 23, 1873, was appointed an Assistant Surgeon in the United States Navy. He continued in active service until January 22, 1913, when, having reached the statutory age, he was placed on the retired list of the navy as a Medical Director.

During 40 years of active service, Dr. Daniel N. Bertolet, was attached to various war vessels and visited most of the maritime nations. He took part in the Virginius affair in 1873-4. In 1887-89 he spent a season in the Arctic regions beyond the Behring Sea. In 1891 he was sent as Special Commissioner to Uruguay, Paraguay and Argentine Republic, carrying to those Republics the personal invitation of the President of the United States to take official part in the Columbian Exposition at Chicago in 1803. While on this mission, Dr. Bertolet visited nearly every Province of these countries, ascended the Upper Parana River to view the great water fall of the Yguassu and penetrated into the wilderness of Brazil.

Dr. Bertolet was sent by the Government in 1803 as a Naval Delegate to the Convention of Military Surgeons at Chicago. In

1896, he was present at the coronation of the Czar, Nicholas II of Russia at Moscow, as a member of the Commission representing the Government of the United States. He served in the Spanish War in 1898, and in the Philippine Revolution following in 1901.

In 1900, Dr. Bertolet attended the Thirteenth International Medical Congress, and the Ninth International Congress of Demography and Hygiene at Paris, as senior official delegate from the United States. He now lives at Reading, Pa.

JACOB BERTOLET (188) was born, lived and died on the old homestead in Oley, near Friedensburg. Like his father, he was a farmer, sawyer and preacher. He was very actively engaged in lumbering, and a great many magnificent oak trees which grew in the forests of the neighborhood were by him converted into timber at his saw mill.

After the death of his father, he improved the property, which descended to him by will, by erecting thereon a large addition to the barn and other farm buildings. He also increased the capacity of the saw mill. Like that of his father, his life was a very active one. He took a great interest in the religious affairs of his community, and was a member of the Evangelical Association, having by it been licensed as a local minister. Religious, as well as secular literature, claimed much of his time, and he spent some part of every day in reading. His literary language was German, and for this tongue he had the greatest admiration, and often expressed his regret that it was declining in purity and use in the community.

Jacob Bertolet was a stanch Abolitionist before and during the Rebellion, although he took no part in the war.

In 1876, two years before his death, writing of his farm and the surrounding country, Jacob Bertolet said:

"The farming land is very productive; the formation there and for miles around is limestone, a valuable quarry of which is found on the farm. The water, strange as it may seem, is not altogether limestone, its composition having an equal quantity of gravel. A branch of the Manatawny Creek, which rises in the hills above Friedensburg several miles to the west, flows eastwardly through the southern portion of the farm. The stream is strong during most of the year and affords sufficient water power to operate a number of grist mills and saw mills on its banks."

Israel, M. Bertolet (415) was educated in the schools of Oley, and at the Oley Academy, and in 1860 was licensed to teach. He taught five terms, four in Oley and one in Heidelberg Townships. He also conducted a subscription school at the Oley Academy for one term during the Civil War. In 1867 he removed to Reading.

Pa., and was employed by the East Penn Railroad Company, living in that city for twelve years. In the Spring of 1876 he was elected the first Alderman of the newly constituted Eleventh Ward, and served until his father's death in 1878, when he resigned and returned to Oley. Dr. Peter G. Bertolet (190) studied medicine under Dr. Joseph Pancoast, of Philadelphia, and later graduated from the University of Pennsylvania. He took up the practice of his profession in Oley, where he continued to live until his death. During the Civil War he was examining surgeon in the Provost Marshal's office at Reading.

Dr. Bertolet, during his practice in Oley and vicinity, interested himself in the local history of the township, and gathered considerable material which he designed to publish in a book under the title of "Fragments of the Past History of Oley." His premature death prevented the publication of this work and the manuscript is now in the possession of the Pennsylvania Historical Society of Philadelphia. A quotation from the manuscript is here printed:

"CHAPTER I.

"A FEW GENERAL REMARKS ON THE VALLEY OF OLEY.

"The Valley of Oley comprises an area of about thirty square miles, and is situated in the eastern portion of the County of Berks, five miles east of Reading. It is almost entirely surrounded by hills, shut out as it were from the rest of the world.

"The Indians thought it resembled a kettle and called it 'Oleka' (kettle), hence the name Oley. "The Germans construed it Oleich, signifying oil, considering that an appropriate appellation from the superior fertility of the soil. "The name Oley has been applied to the township comprising the greater portion of this valley.

"The surface is beautifully undulated and the numerous streamlets which spring from the surrounding hills irrigate it from all sides.

"It was here that the favorite game of the Indians was found in abundance. It constituted a hunting and fishing ground to which they were specially partial, and the sovereignty over which was oft disputed among themselves.

"The valley is watered by tributaries of the river Schuylkill, the Monocacy Creek, a small stream winding through the western border, and the Manatawny, much the larger of the two. The latter is formed by numerous streamlets rising in the range of hills to the east and north, running through the whole length of the valley on its eastern border and leaving it in a southeasterly direction. Near the place of exit of this stream are visible remains which induced some to believe that this was once a lake. It has a fine descent and furnishes many excellent water powers.

"There are indeed few sections of the country of the same extent so richly supplied with water clear from the crystal fountains

like this.

"CHAPTER II.

"FIRST SETTLERS OF OLEY.

"When the first white man or European came to this place he found it inhabited by Indians. It was one of the favorite hunting grounds in which abounded the game of their choice, and the cornfields afforded more abundant yields than some of the adjacent neighborhoods. The first settlements were made towards the close of the seventeenth and beginning of the eighteenth centuries.

"There are papers of land titles in possession of some of the inhabitants, dated May 7, 1682 (O. S.), which was the time that William Penn took possession of the Province of Pennsylvania.

"If this shows nothing more, it proves at least that this spot attracted attention thus early, while it is highly probable that actual settlements had been made even prior to this.

"We must also infer from this, that the valley was thoroughly prospected and surveyed and claims of tracts located.

"Many of the first settlers of Oley were French Huguenots, refugees who fled from their native country under the persecution which prevailed in the reign of Louis XIV, and which became so unendurable after the death of the 9,000.

"Somewhat later, Queen Anne, upon her accession to the throne of England, in 1702, induced many of these oppressed Protestants, French, German and English, to emigrate to America.

"These were some of the principal pioneers of the place. They came to this wilderness in search of homes and an asylum for religious freedom. They were the fathers of thrifty descendants.

* * * Such is the lineage of many families now residing in Oley, bearing the names of their fathers and some of the original estates are yet in possession of their descendants.

"The names of the Huguenots, who settled here, were DeTurck, LeVan, De LaPlancke, Bertolet, Berdos, De Long, Sheradin, Lorah, &c. Few, if any, of these names have become extinct, but on the contrary most have multiplied and so extensively that members of their families are now settled all over the wide Union.

"Members of the Society of Friends, called Quakers, also made some early settlements in Oley. These, like the Huguenots, were refugees, but came mainly from England; some German Quakers from Germany also found their way hither. These also fled their native land on account of oppression and persecution.

"These people were especially annoyed toward the close of the reign of the arbitrary James II, backed by the malicious Jeffreys, of whose doings the history of the dismal dungeons of Old Bailey and Newgate will show us awful testimony.

"These also came hither in search of homes, where they might breathe the air of religious liberty, and to their honor be it spoken they not only sought to secure this boon unto themselves, but they maintained and extended the same privilege to others who came to settle with them. Among these were Anthony Lee, from whom has descended a numerous family. Also George Boone, Sr., the grandfather of the Kentucky pioneer, and of several others whose names have become prominent. But most of their descendants have removed to other sections and comparatively few of these are remaining in this neighborhood.

"As some of these were not actual followers of William Penn in his second visit to the country, they must have arrived shortly after. Johannes Keim was for some time his nearest neighbor. He had settled in the northeast of the valley, now a portion of Pike Township. From him have descended the families of that name.

"The Yoders, a family of Swiss, made a settlement near 'Crooked Dam,' on the Manatawny. The precise date of their arrival is unknown, but they figure conspicuously in the early history of this place.

"It is thus seen that others were added to the Huguenots and Quakers, and later still an accession of French and Germans, who made no particular religious profession. Herbeins came from France, so did Reiff. It is said Griesemer was from Germany.

"Much of the land of the valley is now under cultivation; that not under the plough is heavily wooded. Such was not the case upon the arrival of the first inhabitant. Timber was only found along the water courses in the northeast portion, while the greater portion had none. It was in consequence of this that the first settlements were made along these wooded districts in preference to the west which at that time were considered far less in value.

"CHAPTER IV.

"PROSPECTING PARTIES.

"It is said that an exploring party traveled through this valley (Oley), about the middle of the seventeenth century and on their way fell in with a company of Indians, with whom they had a bloody encounter. This is said to have occurred at or near the spot now occupied by the Olev churches, but by whom this expedition was led, their numbers, from where they came or their destination, is veiled in mystery. They were probably a party of Swedes, for they made settlements about and shortly after this time along the river Schuvlkill in this state. Some fabulous tales of flitting ghosts are yet extant in the neighborhood where this is said to have taken place. This was often repeated to us in our boyhood. We were told that these ghosts would at times become visible and not unseldom so conspicuous in the dusky moonlight as to alarm not only the credulous people while passing along this place, but even fractious horses would take fright and run away. It is a fact that some landmarks are still known as Swedish lines, and so mentioned in some deeds, showing that Swedes must have taken surveys here at an early date.

"Yost Yoder, or Joder, according to the original orthography, the pioneer of this family, selected his farm in a very desirable location on the banks of the Manatawny. While Yost was measuring off his farm one day with a surveyor he ran regular courses in

straight long lines until he came close to a very fine spring. The surveyor remarked:

"'You will, of course, have me run straight out to the place of beginning, which will include this beautiful and desirable spot in your tract?'

"'No,' was the reply, 'we will leave this for others. The spot is inviting and may before long tempt some one to settle here and thus secure me a neighbor'

"This frankness was but a type of the man. Generous, kind and always knew how to appreciate friends. This incident shows that he was the first to locate land in that quarter, since it is seen that all around him was still public domain. In consequence of this, the Manatawny has received the name 'Crooked Dam' at this place. Even the farm, according to Yoder's desire, soon got a settler and still retains the appellation, 'the Crooked Farm,' or 'Grummen Platz.' (This incident from Mrs. J. Reppert, grand-daughter of Yost Yoder.)

"Another party of three brothers named Rhoades, also prospected this section for a home. As they threaded their way through Oley one day they halted at the beautiful spring, where now stands the fine farm house of Daniel G. Guldin, near the 'Yellow House.' After reposing a short time and refreshing the inner man they counseled together for a while whether to locate there or not. After a deliberate examination, they concluded that the soil was too rich. They finally took up land on the 'All Sorts' range in Amity and settled there.

"CHAPTER V.

"INDIAN VILLAGES AND DWELLINGS IN OLEY.

"The Indians of this section possessed characteristics in common with this people. They had some villages, and may in that respect be regarded to have been of a less roving disposition. They established rather permanent homes as their numerous graves would go to show, and in this respect differed from their Iroquois neighbors to the north.

"I. A few of these villages are marked on the maps, as they were found when the whites came here. One was located a little

north of the Moravian school house, near the foot of Grand Hill. Some of the huts in which they secured their corn are still discoverable. They also had a burying ground at this place and marks of their graves could be seen quite recently.

"There is a fine spring nearby this place, now occupied by Jared Hoch's farm buildings. They had erected several small houses, occupied by a numerous family for a long while after the whites had settled the neighborhood. They were expert archers, and lived mainly by hunting and raising a little corn.

"They called frequently upon their neighbor, Leinbach, who had settled close by them, for some milk and other necessaries of life. They were inoffensive, and in course of time became intimate with Leinbach, who often accompanied them on their hunting and fishing excursions.

"2. Probably the largest village in this valley was located near the farm of Thomas P. Lee, and we infer from the extensive burying ground, orchards, &c., that it must have been a home of considerable prominence. The location was a beautiful one, a fine spring of crystal water still marks the spot, the Manatawny, then abounding in fish, flows close by the place.

"We were told by the quite old residents that they remember a number of wigwams here which they frequently entered in their childhood when they associated with the children of these Indians.

"They had cleared a pretty large field for the cultivation of corn and planted apple trees and peach trees. Some of the former were standing until a few years ago. It was in 1856 that the last remaining one was broken down by a storm. This one was standing in David Bertolet's field, adjoining Lee's. Amos Lee, father of Thomas P. Lee, told us that when he was a lad he often visited these tawny neighbors and remembered well that in peach time he never came away empty-handed.

"A few rods further could be seen, until recently, marks of numerous graves, but the land is now cleared and placed under cultivation. Some of these graves were opened a few years ago, but nothing was found in any worthy of note. This place was long known by the name of 'Lee's Field," or 'Leen Feldt' grove, after the first settler.

"3. A pretty large Indian family resided for a long time after the whites had settled here on the banks of the creek a short distance above the house of Mrs. Charles Yoder. They were expert basket-makers and had gained considerable celebrity in this branch of industry. But, unfortunately, they took special fancy to 'fire-water' and often became boisterous and threatening to the whites. It was supposed that these became subsequently allied with 'Brandt's' desperadoes.

"4. Some Indians also had their homes at the beautiful spring at the side of the Clay Slate Hill, at present the estate of Daniel Bertolet, Sr. Another habitation full of interest was found on the same property. This was a beautiful alcove formed by nature of projecting rocks of limestone, close by the side of Furnace Creek. It is a sort of bluff. This alcove was walled up at the sides. The remains of this were still to be seen quite recently.

"It must have afforded quite a secure retreat. In it they had fire-places, the effects of the fire being visible on the stone as we saw them removed; even the solid rock was burnt red to fully one foot in depth over a considerable space, while its superficial surface was burnt to lime, which was still as white as snow. Charcoal and ashes were also found in abundance, showing that the Indiaus mus have lived here for many days, and that they often sought the sweet shelter in this cove by their own fire-side, when storms and tempests surged without.

"What a romantic picture when we come to take a glance at this humble home of the red men. Let us imagine that we could behold them seated peaceably in their cove beside a blazing fire, returned from the chase, narrating their wondrous deeds, the murmuring brook at their feet, the thick woods of tall and heavy timber filled with game. We might ask, 'Are they not happy living under their eternal rock?' and 'Why may not this be a lasting home for a long posterity of the red man?'

"But, alas, not so. The surrounding forest has dwindled away for the wise designs of the new settlers. Their great hunting grounds are now consecrated to the tiller of the soil, while their habitation of nature furnished superior materials for rearing the elegant mansions of civilized inhabitants." II. ELIZABETH BERTOLET³ (Abraham², Jean¹), second daughter of Abraham and Esther DeTurck Bertolet, was born in 1742. She was married to John, son of John and grandson of Isaac DeTurck. He was born August 25, 1741.

12. Samuel, Bertolet³ (Abraham², Jean¹), second son of Abraham and Esther DeTurck Bertolet and grandson of Jean Bertolet, was born at Oley, Pa., on September 14, 1743, and died January 1, 1805. He is buried on his own land, now the Bertolet Burying Ground at Frederick, Montgomery County, Pa. In 1771 he was married to Esther, the oldest daughter of Jacob and Susanna (*nce* Bertolet) Frey. They were first cousins. She was born in Frederick Township, August 26, 1756, and died June 12, 1788.

SAMUEL BERTOLET (12) lived on his father's farm in Oley until 1770, when upon the death of Jacob Frey, husband of Susanna Bertolet (6), in April 26, 1770, his widow called him to her assistance, on the farm at Frederick. Samuel Bertolet lived with the widow Frey one year, when he married the oldest daughter, Esther Frey, his first cousin.

Jacob Frey was building a new two-story brick house and Samuel Bertolet assisted Mrs. Frey to complete this unfinished house. In the western gable is a stone marker—J. F. 1770. On the front, over the middle window, we find a brown stone marked S. B. 1771. This house is known as the Frey and Bertolet's Homestead.

Samuel Bertolet was a prosperous businessman, and was extremely influential in his neighborhood. He led an earnest, exemplary, Christian life, and was a deep student. He fostered religion and was an intelligent observer of events. He remained on the farm with Mrs. Susanna Frey up to the spring of 1777, when a call came to serve his country in the Continental Army. In his enlistment his name is printed as Samuel Bartly. The name under the French pronunciation is given thus: Bar-to-la; the "e" takes the sound of "a", the "t" being silent.

During the Spring of 1777 all young men of proper age to serve in the Pennsylvania Militia were called, to assemble in each township, at their division headquarters, and especially so in the eastern counties, when General Howe was preparing to invade the state of Pennsylvania.

May 6, 1777, Frederick Antes was appointed Colonel of the 6th Battalion of the Pennsylvania County Militia; his regiment was composed of eight companies from the following townships: Douglass, New Hanover, Upper Hanover, Frederick, Limerick, Marlborough, Perkiomen and Salford. Frederick Weiss was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel. Jacob Bishop was appointed Major. William Antes, Esq., was appointed Sub-Lieutenant and Pay Master. Michael Dotterer was appointed Captain of Frederick

erick Township Militia; he received his commission May 12, 1777, and served in that capacity with the Frederick Township Militia for that year.

The company was composed of the following, as found in the Pennsylvania Archives: Peter Acker, Francis Bart, Jacob Belts, Samuel Bartly (Bertolet), Conrad Bickard, Henry Boyer, Jacob Bauer, Philip Boyer, Jacob Christman, Jacob Detweiler, etc.

William Antes, the Sub-Lietutenant, appointed Samuel Bertolet in the Commissary Department to assist in obtaining supplies and to have supervision over the teams.

The regiment, after it was fully formed and organized, proceeded to Newton, Bucks County, Pa., near Trenton, on the west bank of the Delaware River. From this point, the regiment followed the army to Philadelphia, where Washington established his camp on the hillside, now Falls-of-Schuvlkill. From this point Washington's Army traveled to the Brandywine on the 11th of September, 1777. During the battle the militia, including Samuel Bertolet's regiment, had charge of the stores on the Chester Road. Washington's Army sustained a defeat and retreated to Chester that night, and next day went back to the old camp at Falls-of-Schuylkill. Two days later part of the army had another engagement at Bucks Tavern, where some of the militia had a clash with the English. On September 16, 1777, they also fell back, and on the 18th the forward guard of the militia crossed the Schuylkill at Parkersford, passed up and established Camp Pottsgrove at Fagleysville, Pa. General Washington arrived in camp with his army on the 21st of September, 1777.

General Washington and some of the staff officers were quartered with Colonel Frederick Antes; the other members of the staff were quartered with his neighbor, Samuel Bertolet, where the Army Camp Headquarters were established. The army remained here up to the 26th of September, when it moved to Pennypackers Mills. A granite marker was erected by the Montgomery County Historical Society at Fagleysville, Pa., in honor of this encampment, known as Camp Pottsgrove. This marker was unveiled Saturday, May 31, 1913.

From Pennypackers Mills the army moved toward German-

town, where Washington had another engagement with the British Army, October 4, 1777, which ended the campaign, and the militia was discharged for the year.

General Wayne had orders to remain in Chester County with part of his brigade and some of the militia to guard and protect the army while crossing the Schuylkill at Parkersford, September 19, 1777. General Muhlenberg says the army was wet breast-high in crossing the Schuylkill River; that same night the British attacked General Wayne by surprise at Paoli, where he suffered a severe defeat and a large number of the soldiers were killed.

Samuel Bertolet's teams were in this engagement. The surprise was so sudden that they had to fly in every direction, and from here his teams hauled the wounded soldiers to the Swamp Reformed Church Hospital. After this defeat the army went into their headquarters in Samuel Bertolet's barn on his farm. This barn was built by William Frey in 1738. Mrs. Elizabeth Bertolet Frey used to say that "the barn was full of horses, even the threshing floor, and they fed the grain in the sheaves to the horses while the army was encamped there."

Samuel Bertolet continued on the Frey farm and during the winters of 1777 and 1778 furnished supplies and grain to the army at Valley Forge. General Washington made a special trip during the cold and bleak winters of 1777 and 1778 to Falchner Schwamp. Frederick Antes and Samuel Bertolet were urged by him personally to send more stores and provisions to the camp at Valley Forge, and on this occasion Washington remained some eight or ten days with Colonel Antes. This tradition was handed down by Mrs. Samuel Bertolet to her family.

On December 31, 1789, Samuel Bertolet purchased from Adam Wartman, forty-five acres of land in New Hanover Township, including what later became known as the old Bertolet Mill, now Grubb's Mill, the old property included the water rights, and was located along the banks of the Swamp Creek and along the road leading from the Frey-Bertolet homestead. The original mill and dam was built about 1783 by Henry Antes, the father of Colonel Frederick Antes.

When Samuel Bertolet came into possession of the mill prop-


erty it was located near the dam and along the road. This location was not pleasing to the new owner as the spring floods and ice would surround his mill, so he dug the head race along the hillside about 500 yards to the present location of the mill, where he rebuilt it in 1803, and it is still in a good state of preservation. This mill was in the Bertolet family for 65 years. The old mill ground the grain for the Revolutionary Army while Samuel Bertolet was serving in the army and while they were encamped at Camp Pottsgrove.

Samuel Bertolet was a man who took great pride in his sons and provided each of them with a home as they grew to maturity. To his oldest son, Abraham, he assigned the mill property. For his son Jacob he bought a farm in Limerick Township, near Linfield, in the Schuvlkill Valley. For his son Samuel he bought a mill property on the French Creek, near Pughtown, Pa. When he made his will he never mentioned these three sons, as he had already provided for them. In his will he only speaks of his two younger sons, John and Daniel, between whom he divided his 200-acre farm. To John he gave the homestead, with 100 acres of land, and to Daniel he gave 100 acres of unimproved land. He reserved from the land he gave to Daniel 80 perches as a burying ground for his family. This burying ground was incorporated April 21, 1800, by his descendants, as the Bertolet's Burving Ground Association of Frederick Township, Montgomery Countv. Pa.



Abraham Bertolet (82), during his lifetime a resident of Frederick Township, kept a record of the state of the weather from January 1, 1831, to October 3, 1857. It was generally known in the vicinity that he made daily notations and more or less curiosity has been expressed as to their character. An examination of the manuscript shows that Mr. Bertolet confined himself mainly to noting the changes of the weather from day to day and mentioning events of interest which transpired in the neighborhood. He did not register the degrees of temperature, from which it is inferred that he did not have the benefit of a thermometer in his studies. He is not given to predictions; frequent allusions are made, however, to the bright sky tints of morning and evening, which are such a favorite basis with Pennsylvania folk for conjecture of the weather, morgenroth and abendroth.

This weather history is written in the German language in a plain hand, in home-made books, the size of a quarter of foolscap and without covers. The paper is browned with age. Each book has twelve pages, and upon each page are the observations for a full month. Usually but a single line is devoted to a statement of the weather-phases of a day, and frequently at the bottom of the page a concise summary is given of the general state of the temperature during the month.

Upon the death of Mr. Bertolet, his manuscript weather record came into possession of Elias Fagley, Esq., of Fagleysville, Pa. We herein reproduce some of the most notable entries. These carefully kept chronicles of the weather indicate the type of character possessed by their author. He was painstaking, observant, and methodical in his habits; a thoughtful, upright citizen; well-poised in judgment, exerting an influence for good upon the community in which his lot was cast.

"1833.

"April 4, 1833. Variable; evening, lightning, thunder and rain. August 31, this month closes very dry. October 29, severe frosts, snow squalls, cold. November 13, clear, fair and warm, evening great display of fallong stars in the heavens. In this year occurred the sublime meteoric shower all over the United States, which is described by a writer in the following words:

"The most wonderful shower of shooting stars which has ever been

recorded is that of November 13, 1833. The whole firmament over all the United States being then for hours in fiery commotion. No celestial phenomenon has ever occurred in this country, since its first settlement, which was viewed with such intense admiration by one class in the community, or with so much dread and alarm by another. From two o'clock until broad daylight, the sky being perfectly serene and cloudless, an incessant play of dazzlingly brilliant luminosities was kept up in the whole heavens.'

"1837.

"Mr. Bertolet mentions the magnificent Aurora Borealis covering the whole heavens November 14, 1837. At Philadelphia it was described as follows: 'At a late period, the lights were again visible and between nine and ten o'clock exceeded in extent and brilliancy anything of the kind ever before witnessed in this region. A broad field of crimson flame stretched from nearly a western course and reaching the eastern hemisphere encompassed the heavens with a brilliant glory of indescribable beauty and magnificence. The sky itself was remarkably clear and cloudless and the celestial phenomenon, a full moon, and innumerable stars were all the time distinctly visible.

Daniel Bertolet (91) was known as the farmer, brick manufacturer and builder, of Frederick Township. He was born on the Frey-Bertolet homestead. When his father, Samuel Bertolet, died he was but nine years of age, and for the following twelve years worked on the farm, of which he was to get one hundred acres by his father's will. He took possession of this unimproved land on November 14, 1817.

The following year he built a large barn on the land and a temporary frame shop, in which his sister Esther kept house for him. After the completion of his barn he at once set to work to build a large two-story stone house, which he completed in the year 1819. These buildings are still in a good state of preservation, and are now owned by Michael W. Wagner.

He was then ready to enter extensively upon the business of farming, but he was first confronted with great labors because a large part of the ground was covered by a dense forest. When he took possession of the property he had about 30 acres of clear land, and the timber to erect his buildings cleared about 10 more acres. Little by little he kept on cutting down his timber land in order to enlarge the cultivated fields. In after years he often related the hardships and trials which he and his wife endured.

In the Spring of 1835 he bought 35 additional acres of land from the estate of John Nyce, nearly all of which was clear, and on which a log house stood. The land adjoined his farm on the west and gave him about 80 acres of clear ground for farming purposes.

In the Spring of 1845 he began manufacturing brick. By this time he had a large family, eight of his children being boys. The youngest son, however, died early. All were required to take a hand at the home work; some to help at brick making and others with the farm work. In this way his sons learned the brick manufacturing business. This industry helped considerably in the con-

sumption of the forest wood on Daniel Bertolet's land, and he in the course of time cleared by this means over 100 acres. Having thoroughly established himself in the business of brick making he supplied material for most of the buildings which were at that period erected in the neighborhood. All the old brick houses around Frederick, Montgomery County, contain material of his making.

In the Summer of 1846, Daniel Bertolet extended his activities by engaging in the erection of houses and other buildings. He first built a two-story brick addition to his own stone house. During the same Summer he was one of the promoters of a project to build the Bertolet Mennonite Meeting House. The arrangements for this project were made at the mill office of Samuel H. Bertolet, on a damp, rainy afternoon in September. Those present were Daniel Bertolet, accompanied by his son Benjamin, Samuel H. Bertolet, Esq., and John Hunsberger. They agreed that each of them would pledge himself to contribute \$100 toward the erection of the Meeting House. They further agreed that the work shoud go on when an additional \$100 was subscribed. This was afterwards made up by the following men: John Bertolet, \$25.00; Abraham F. Bertolet, \$25.00, and Henry H. Bertolet, \$50.00.

At a later meeting a controversy arose as to where the Meeting House should be built. Samuel H. and Henry H. Bertolet and John Hunsberger wanted it built on the 80 perches reserved by Daniel Bertolet's deed setting apart a burial plot, but three of the brothers, viz., Abraham, John and Daniel Bertolet, opposed this plan. In order to settle the difficulty, Daniel Bertolet offered the piece of land lying between the burial plot and the land of Isaac Stetler, containing about half an acre. This he agreed to give for \$25.00 and his offer was immediately accepted. Daniel Bertolet was appointed superintendent to erect the building at this meeting, and it was agreed that the work should be started after corn husking in October, and that the building should be under roof and enclosed so that the interior work could be done during the Winter. By the latter part of November this was accomplished, and in the following Spring the Meeting House was plastered

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and all the work completed by Whitsuntide Sunday, May 23, 1847. The dedication of the structure followed shortly.

The deed to the land on which the building was erected is dated April 1, 1847. In it Daniel Bertolet reserves the following:

"In trust for the use as a Meeting House by the Society of Mennonites, and the inhabitants who are now buried in the grounds adjoining said tract, known as the Bertolet Burying Ground, together with the privilege of bringing their ministers and using the Meeting House for funeral purposes."

It is, however, a fact that the first use of this place for religious and burial purposes dates back a little over one hundred years prior to the above date. Thus, we read in the "Perkionien Region," Vol. 2, page 123, that about the end of the year 1736 a difference arose between Henry Antes and Rev. Boehm, pastor of the Reformed Church at Falkner's Swamp, and the former becoming acquainted with Bishop Spangenburg, a Moravian minister, joined that denomination. Being a man of decided convictions and sincerity, Henry Antes was known as a very pious layman of the town of Frederick. He instructed his neighbors at his home, where he conducted frequent prayer meetings. On April 24, 1740, there was held a great religious meeting at Henry Antes' house, attended by George Whitfield, the revivalist, who came from Philadelphia. The number of people assembled on this memorable occasion is given as two thousand, coming from all directions

These meetings long continued at this place, even after Henry Antes, who took offense at the introduction of the gown for ministers by the Moravians, left the Church and joined the Reformed Church. For they were kept up by Jacob Frey and his wife, Susanna B. Frey, who was a very pious and inspiring woman. The influence of these prayer-meetings never left the neighborhood.

Daniel Bertolet was a man of strong convictions and a very thorough Bible student. It is said that he was more familiar with the Bible than any person in the community. Ministers of different denominations were accustomed to call on him for his views on the Scriptures.

He was also interested in education, for in the Fall of 1856 he took a leading part in a movement inaugurated by some of the citizens of Frederick and vicinity to establish an institution of learning there. A meeting was held at Isaac Stetler's store and steps were taken to organize and establish the "Frederick Institute." A subsequent meeting was called to name a Board of Directors. Those chosen were: Robert Vaughn, A.M., President; Franklin Gerhart, Secretary: Daniel Bertolet, Treasurer, and Isaac Stetler, Christian Stetler, Peter Faust, Sr., and Rev. A. L. Dechant, Directors. Subscriptions were taken and the neighbors responded liberally. Three acres of land at \$100 per acre were purchased from Christian Stetler, and the board designated Daniel Bertolet as General Superintendent of the construction of the buildings. It was decided that he should start the work early in the following Spring. On March 25, 1857, he, with a number of men, broke the first ground for the "Frederick Institute." His son, Benjamin Bertolet, the author of this sketch, was one of those in the party, and the work was watched with interest by nearly all those who had taken part in the organization of the institution. The building was completed in the following October, and was dedicated by Rev. Bomberger, later Dean of Ursinus College, and Rev. Dechant.

Mr. Vaughn was the first principal of the school. He filled the office five years, and during his term the school prospered. Upon his resignation, to take up the study of the ministry, the school began to go back. The interest on a mortgage, which had been placed on the property by the directors, could not be met and finally the mortgage was foreclosed, the property sold by the sheriff and Daniel Bertolet, in order to save an unpaid claim he had against the building, was obliged to buy the property at the sheriff's sale. From this time on the school was conducted by various teachers, but did not prosper, passing through various hands, until October 18, 1895, when its then owner, a Mr. Scholl, having died, the property was offered at public sale. The sale was attended by Rev. N. B. Grubb, who was one of a committee appointed by the Mennonite Conference, to find a site for an Old People's Home, and by Benjamin Bertolet, and these gentlemen

obtained an option upon the property. Finally, on March 24, 1896, at the summer home of Mr. Benjamin Bertolet, in Frederick, it was decided to purchase the building and its grounds, to be used thenceforth as a Mennonite Home for the aged. In recognition of the services rendered in consummating this project, Mr. Benjamin Bertolet was chosen as first President of the Board of Managers of the home, which has ever since prospered and rendered splendid service to the aged of the Mennonite and other denominations.

Daniel Bertolet, the subject of this sketch, after completing the Mennonite Meeting House herein referred to, bought many small plots of ground running from 10 to 30 acres. These he improved by the erection of new buildings, and sold. The last house built by Daniel Bertolet was one of brick below Stetler's store on the main highway. He built this in 1858 as a residence for himself and wife, and he died there ten years later. In 1887, after the death of his wife, Catharine, the property was bought by his son, Benjamin Bertolet, to be used as a summer residence, and it was afterwards sold on April 1, 1913, to Milton Erb.



Here he lived all his life and became one of the most prominent men of that vicinity. His farm duties he varied with those of stock-raising and dealing. The business proved remunerative. 

This business proved very congenial and for eighteen years he conducted it with much success, retiring from active participation in its affairs in 1909.

Early in 1910 he built a new home on the banks of the historic Brandywine, where he hoped to spend the happy evening of his life surrounded by his family and friends. He did not live long to enjoy it, dying in November of the same year.

He was one of Wilmington's best known men, and his death caused general regret. He was one of the organizers and charter members of St. Stephen's Evangelical Lutheran church in that city, and remained a member and trustee until his death. Although he and his children were born in Pennsylvania, he became very strongly attached to Wilmington and took a deep interest in its affairs. He was very genial, broad-minded and tolerant. While his personal convictions were strong he respected those of others. His life was simple, hospitable and unostentatious.

On July 30, 1898, Levi A. Bertolette was elected the first president of the Bertolet Family Association, which office he held continuously until his death, for a period of twelve years. He was a typical Bertolet and took great pride in his family, and interest in its history.

ESTHER BERTOLET AND DR. GEORGE DeBENNE-VILLE.

5. Esther Bertolet, second daughter of Jean and Susanna (Harcourt) Bertolet, was born in Minfeld, Germany, on August 2, 1720, and died March 7, 1795. On February 24, 1745, she was married to Dr. George DeBenneville, founder of the Universalist Church in America, son of George DeBenneville. He was born July 26, 1703, in London, England, and died March 19, 1793.

The history of the Huguenot branch of the DeBenneville family, from Rouen in Normandy, France, is one of peculiar interest and historic value. The Roman Catholics of the family were closely associated with the French Court and public affairs. The Protestant branch, however, maintained much of its prestige, as shown by its relations with the Protestant Court at Holland.

George DeBenneville, Sr., was born at Rouen, the capital of the French province of Normandy on the right bank of the Seine, date unknown. He married a Granville, both being connected with the ennobled families of their country. Having adopted the tenets of John Calvin, then rapidly spreading through France, the DeBenneville's became odious to the government and, under the designation of Huguenots, were severely persecuted.

Upon the invitation of King William II, who had lately acceded to the throne of England, George DeBenneville, Sr., with his family and connections, removed to England, where they were kindly received by the Court.

His wife, whom he married in 1697, bore him nine children within five years, having had twins four years successively, and died upon giving birth to her youngest son, George DeBenneville, on July 26, 1703. Whether any other than the youngest of her children survived her is not known, inasmuch as her son Dr. George DeBenneville, during his protracted life seemed studiously to avoid all reference to his family or ancestry. A tradition, however, exists that one sister lived and was married into the peerage.

George DeBenneville, the father, also died when his son was still in childhood. Upon the death of the mother, Queen Anne, who entertained for her a deep attachment, in fulfillment of a promise, took charge of the infant and appointed a nurse for him. Upon the death of Queen Anne, in 1714, the boy, then eleven years of age, was consigned to the care of an uncle.

Although an orphan, his education was carefully directed and every attention paid to the highest development of his mind. He was well educated in theology and medicine, and spoke many European languages very fluently.

Among his varied studies that of navigation was believed to be of most importance for his future. To complete his training in this line, he was sent to sea in a vessel of war attached to a small fleet, then on its way to the Coast of Barbary, conveying presents and to renew the peace with Algiers, Tunis, and Tripoli.

While at Algiers he received his first religious awakening, and for fifteen months he was in a state bordering on despair by reason of inward doubting concerning his salvation. His friends, believing him to have become melaucholy and bereft of his senses, caused prayers to be offered in the churches in his behalf. He was constantly visited by the clergy, who would console him with the idea that he had not committed any great sins and had only been acting conformably to his rank and station.

Under such prostration and anguish of mind, the universal love of God to his creatures and the eventual restoration to holiness and happiness of all of Adam's race was made manifest to him and he began to promulgate everywhere this conviction.

His beliefs obtained great notoriety, as on all occasions, wherever he went he was zealous in urging them upon everyone. The Protestant clergy became uneasy at his conduct. They expressed doubt as to his being a true Protestant, soliciting from him a written confession of his faith. This request he met by appearing before them, replying to their questions, repudiating predestination, and boldly enunciating the tender mercies and unalloyed love of Christ for all mankind. They then expelled him from their church membership, and he now only associated with those whom he found leading lives of retirement.

He next became impressed with the thought that he should go and preach the Gospel in France, and being stricken with a severe illness, he yielded himself to the duty, so that, upon an immediate restoration to more than usual health, he prepared to enter upon the work. In 1720, he secured his passage at Dover for Calais, and, immediately upon his arrival at the latter place began to proclaim in the market the eternal love of God and boundless salvation through Christ. As soon as he had ceased he was arrested and taken before a magistrate, who, after reprimanding him, informed him that his conduct was in violation of a royal enactment and had him removed to prison.

After a few days he was again conducted before the tribunal and interrogated at great length as to who he was and by what authority he preached. To all of these questions he frankly replied that he was moved by the especial grace and love of God to teach the nation.

As this was his first offence, he was sentenced to eight days in prison, after which he was conducted beyond the bounds of the city and informed that if he was a second time found similarly engaged his life would be seriously endangered.

He, however, remained in France about two years (1722) preaching the Gospel in Normandy, his father's country, associated with Durant de le Cheverette, Dumoulin, and others. Frequently to the number of three hundred or more assembled in the forest and passes of the mountains for the worship of God. During these two years, many of them were arrested, sometimes through informers among their own brethren who would tell the soldiers of their places of meeting. Many were hanged, others whipped by the hand of the executioner and branded with hot irons, their goods confiscated. Others were condemned to the gallows, but all this did not appear to terrify, discourage or weaken them.

On one occasion at Dieppe, Durant and DeBenneville were taken prisoners, held for about one month, then condemned to death—Durant to be hanged and DeBenneville to be beheaded. They were conducted together to the place of execution. Durant while singing the 116th Psalm, met his fate joyfully, after which

DeBenneville was placed on the scaffold and his eyes ordered to be bandaged, which upon his earnest request was omitted. Falling upon his knees he fervently prayed God would not require his blood at their hands. The executioner then proceeded to bind his hands, and while thus engaged, a courier arrived from the king, Louis XV, with a reprieve.

He was then conveyed to a prison at Paris and there confined for some time, but finally, at the intercession of the queen, he obtained his liberty. He now went to Germany (1722-23), where he applied himself to the study of the language, which after much difficulty he acquired. Here and in Holland he lived for about eighteen years, gaining a large acquaintance with the noble as well as the lower classes, and zealously devoting himself to his mission. His labors were so great that he became very ill and for a long time lay at the point of death. He recovered, however, and as soon as he had regained his strength he began with unabated zeal to preach the gospel of Universalism.

In 1741, at the age of thirty-eight, he left Europe for America and arrived at Philadelphia, where he was met by Christopher Sauer, a printer, of Germantown, who took him to his residence and made him stay there. An interesting reminiscence is given by Mrs. Anne DeB. Mears, as follows:

"One night Mr. Sauer dreamed that a vessel had arrived at Philadelphia having on board a person who was very ill, and in his dream he was told to bring him to his home. He awoke and finding it but a dream, he again fell asleep, whereupon the dream was repeated. Mentioning it to his wife the next morning, she urged him to do as he was told. He drove into the city, six miles distant, and made inquiry at the wharf. The captain of a vessel informed him that he had a very sick man aboard, whom Mr. Sauer at once removed to his carriage and took to his home, where he was restored to health. This man was George DeBenneville."

Mr. Sauer, in addition to his printing establishment, kept a drug store. After DeBenneville's recovery, the latter being skilled in medicine, assisted his benefactor in the preparation of prescriptions.

It was not long after this that Jean Bertolet, of Olev, paid a visit

to his friend Sauer at Germantown. When DeBenneville entered the room, Bertolet urging the necessity of a physician in the Oley settlement, persuaded DeBenneville to accompany him to his home on the frontier, which he did. Here he at once embarked in his profession, also preaching his doctrine of universal redemption, and conducting a school.

Here and throughout the length and breadth of the land he could preach the Gospel to attentive hearers without the interruptions of persecution or the embittered tendencies of reproach. Scattered and sparse as the population then was, crowds attended his sermons wherever and whenever he delivered them. His liberal education now proved of service as his knowledge of chemistry and botany gave him a reputation as a physician and he acquired an extended celebrity from the success that attended his practice. His enthusiastic energies of mind and character seemed to have admitted of no repose. When free from other duties, the pen was always in his hand and it is surprising to know how he could have accomplished so much. Though many of his writings have become lost, vet in the German and French language, and principally upon the all-absorbing topic of religion, there exist large quarto tomes of 200 and 300 pages, each closely written by him in his small, peculiar and condensed style.

His correspondence also must have been very extended, embracing largely his friends in Europe, as well as those now abounding in America. Letters from Count DeMarsey and many of the pious recluses, the Youngs, of the Oley Hills, and many to his children, are yet numerously preserved by his posterity.

Having in common endured persecution for conscience sake, and affiliated closely in mind and view, it is not surprising that a close attachment subsisted between Jean Bertolet and George De-Benneville.

It was while George DeBenneville was acting as preceptor in the school in Oley that he became infatuated with Esther Bertolet. A few years later, on February 24, 1745, they were married at the Bertolet homestead. Esther Bertolet was then twenty-five years of age, and Dr. DeBenneville was forty-two. From this union sprang many men and women of note in every activity of American life.

In 1745, being excluded from preaching at the Moravian Mission, George DeBenneville secured a tract of one hundred and thirty-two acres in Oley Township, then in Philadelphia County. On this tract he erected a stone mansion originally thirty-six feet in front on the public highway, thirty feet deep, with three rooms on the first floor and four on the second. The window arches were of English brick and the windows had twenty panes, each seven by nine inches. On the second floor he arranged a large room or hall as a place of worship and for a school room. It would seat fifty people, and, taking in the entrance hall, could accommodate one hundred people within hearing of his voice. The hall was entered from the outside by a stairway over the main entrance below. In the cellar of the mansion was a fine spring, used for baptismal purposes. In this hall DeBenneville held regular services, expounding his doctrine there until he removed to Green Lane, Germantown, Pa., in 1757.

This removal from Oley was not so much on account of the Indian outbreak at the time as from a desire to be nearer to a more social life. He did not like retirement. It was to please his wife that he remained in Oley, as she was unwilling to leave as long as her father, Jean Bertolet, lived. He died in 1757 and this decided the change.

Dr. DeBenneville rented a large mansion on the York Road, where he resided until the Spring of 1759, when he purchased a property of twenty-two acres with a dwelling, which he improved

and to which he removed the same year. Here he enjoyed an extensive practice, being consulted in Philadelphia and for miles around. Upon his death he left his practice to his youngest son and namesake. In connection with the practice of medicine, he conducted an apothecary shop, in which he trained his son and successor, thereby giving him a knowledge of drugs and herbs known to the pharmacy of those days.

Some time before his death, Dr. DeBenneville set aside a tract of a half-acre on his property at Branchtown, Philadelphia, for burial purposes.

In his domestic routine, Dr. DeBenneville exemplified the goodness of his life. He held family prayers, morning and evening, and on his knees implored for those about him and all humanity, the bestowment of that universal love and redemption, which he had taught publicly in persecution and toil on two continents. He dressed in black silk velvet, with knee-breeches, silver buckles and the "cocked hat" of the times.

Dr. DeBenneville, although not an ordained preacher, taught the faith not only in France, Germany and Holland, but in eastern and western Pennsylvania, Maryland and in Virginia. All denominations opened their houses to him, and in turn he refused to accept any remuneration for his preaching, saying that he had all he needed in the way of this world's goeds.

During one of his preaching tours in Western Pennsylvania, while among the Indians, he found many of their number ill. He brought the great chiefs together and taking them into the forest pointed out to them many medicinal herbs, the uses of which he taught them. They deeply revered him and in their visits to Philadelphia always sought out the great "Medicine man."

After removing, in 1768, to Milestown, when his health began to show signs of decline, he often during his last years visited Oley and preached to his former fellow-worshipers.

His most faithful friend and pastoral associate, Rev. Elhannan Winchester, was with him much toward the end. He was from Massachusetts, originally a Baptist, who, in 1780, became a convert to Universalism.

Rev. James Shrigley, pastor in Reading for many years, and

later a resident of Philadelphia, in an historical address, delivered to the pilgrims of 1890 at the Shrine of their faith in Oley, said:

"I place his (George DeBenneville's) name at the head of all our Church fathers in this country. True, he was not an organizer, because there was nothing but himself to organize, and he was well organized.

"Murray learned his doctrine from a book entitled, 'Reil's Union'; Winchester received his from Seigvolck's 'Everlasting Gospel,' and Conrad Beissel, though half a score years earlier than DeBenneville accepted the faith of his forefathers in the land of his birth. But George DeBenneville was a discoverer and therefore greater than any one of these who received their faith from others. DeBenneville was the peer of them all. No man taught him; no man even intimated to him that God would have mercy on all men; he received his message direct from Heaven. It was not his mission to formulate creeds and confessions of faith. He wasted no time on non-essentials. His great object was to induce men and women to become truly religious."

In 1753, when still preaching at Oley, at the suggestion and with the co-operation of DeBenneville, Klein Nicholas' "Everlasting Gospel," attributed to Siegvolck, the first book published in America in defense of Universalism, was translated into English and issued from the German press of Germantown, Pa. The first teaching of the doctrine of Universal Restitution in Reading, Pa., was by Rev. Theophilus Fiske, in June, 1829. He had been invited thither by the elder members of the Keim family as a memorial to their mother, Susan DeBenneville, daughter of the founder of the faith.

The society which grew out of his teachings was regularly organized in 1831 and a church edifice, then the third of the faith in Pennsylvania, was erected with funds largely contributed by George DeB. and Benneville Keim, two of his grandsons.

In 1890, during the dedication of a beautiful sandstone structure on the site of the old one, a large memorial stained-glass window was placed by the founder's great-granddaughter, Harriet DeBenneville Keim. The window contains the inscription, "One Father,

On June 12, 1890, during the session of that great convention of Universalists, the assemblage in a body made a pilgrimage to the founder's homestead and the parent place of worship in America, in Oley. Here, in a befitting manner, they honored the memory of the founder of American Universalism. Services were held in the ancient hall on the second story according to the accepted faith.

At a banquet one hundred and sixty Universalist pilgrims sat down under the very roof and within the very wall in which the first doctrines of universal redemption in America were taught by Dr. George DeBenneville, of Oley. They also assembled around the crystal spring where so many had been baptized in the faith, and sent up a prayer of remembrance and reverence to the memory of the founder of the doctrines which they held. The same fountain of health-giving water bursting through the limestone rock not over fifty feet away sent forth the same as of yore a stream sufficient to turn a mill.

Dr. DeBenneville and his wife were buried in the old cemetery at Branchtown, Philadelphia. The inscriptions on their tombstones read as follows:

As captain of the company thus raised, he was attached to the Fourth Pennsylvania Regiment under Colonel Butler. At the battle of Brandywine he was severely wounded and was carried to Philadelphia, where his Quaker relatives refused to admit him to their homes. But the wounded captain recovered.

He was the virtual founder and patriarch of the town of Cata-

wissa, Pa. Here he held the office of magistrate and infused his energy into the inhabitants. Through the difficult country, now traversed by the picturesque Catawissa Railroad, he laid out and built the first carriage roads, connecting the valleys of the Susquehanna and the Schulykill.

George DeBenneville Mears (636) entered the office of Jay Cooke, the distinguished financier, in 1861. When the 5-20 U. S. bonds were negotiated he had the entire charge of their sale. The Secretary of the U. S. Treasury, Salmon P. Chase, in the Lincoln Cabinet, complimented him on his business qualifications. Although but twenty-two years of age, and having but little experience in matters of that kind, not a bond was lost and everything over which he had charge was reported correct.

Joseph Brown Mears (637) entered the Second Anderson Troops, afterward the Fifteenth Pennsylvania Cavalry, when he was but seventeen years of age. He was engaged in the Battle of Murfreesboro in Tennessee. After the battle he was taken ill with pneumonia and sent to the Nashville Hospital, where he was attended by his mother, from January, 1863, until April, when he was discharged. His health was so impaired that he never thoroughly recovered, but lingered until 1868 when he died.

Harriet DeBenneville Keim (139) lived and died, at the age of 97, at "Solitude," an estate within the limits of Philadelphia, bordering along the Old York Road.

There were three houses on the estate, massive old Colonial structures, with walls three feet thick, impervious alike to the chill blasts of Winter and the heat of Summer. She lived in the largest of these.

Philadelphia's city plans for a long time before her death did not countenance the existence of the estate, almost in the heart of the city. Officially, it did not exist. On the city map the streets were cut through, and to look at the map in 1900 one would not have known that "Solitude," with its broad acres and century-old trees, was still there. But it was generally understood that the property would not be disturbed during her (Mrs. Keim's) lifetime, for the traditions so dear to her had not failed to appeal also to the city officials. But since the streets are cut through and the primitive forest and green fields have been converted into building lots, more than one act of little less than sacrilege has been committed.

Directly at the intersection of what is now Ninth and Rockland Streets is a vault containing the bones of a dozen British officers. There is a well authenticated tradition in the family that the oldest of the three houses was the recognized place of consultation for Cornwallis and his staff during the British occupation of Philadelphia. The room in which these conferences were held was known as the Cornwallis room.

The officers whose remains lie beneath what was once the velvet sloped lawn died in the hospital and were placed there for temporary interment. But they were never removed, as the mistress of "Solitude" would never permit it.

The first occupant of the farm-house of whom there is any record was Mrs. Keim's grandfather, John Roberts, whose father, Thomas Roberts, was a personal friend of William Penn. Thomas Roberts was a Welsh gentleman.

When the war of the Revolution broke out, John Roberts, the oldest son of Thomas Roberts, was living there, a widower, with his two daughters and son. In September, 1777, the southward swerving of the struggle brought his isolated home into the midst of stormy activity. It was mainly, no doubt, the entire seclusion of the spot which led to its being chosen by Cornwallis as his council place. Perhaps, too, in the case of the younger officers, there may have been a subtle attraction in the glimpses of the quiet home life, and the fair faced Quaker maidens.

Cornwallis gave the young ladies passes through the British lines into the city and, as none of their neighbors shared that privilege, they did shopping and carried friendly messages for all. Romantic journeys there must have been when the young girls, Eleanor and Ann, mounted on their sleek pomes, rode away across the creek through the richly wooded northern liberties, past the British barracks and down to the home of their sister, Mrs. Evans, on Arch Street.

When the British officers were buried, standing in a little circle about the vault, was young George DeBenneville, M. D. (40), a lad of fifteen. The younger DeBenneville, the lad who saw the redcoats laid away in their last resting place, was married a few years later to Eleanor Roberts, one of those gentle riders, who carried good cheer across the Wingohocking during the sad days of '77 and '78. Their daughter, Harriet DeBenneville Keim, passed the greater part, including the closing hours, of her beautiful life amid the scenes so dear to her, amid the recollections of a past which was dead to all save her active mind.

Despite her advanced age, Mrs. Keim, until within a few days of her death, continued to remain young in spirit while her every faculty remained unimpaired. She never wore glasses and often in the dead of night—for insomnia was her greatest affliction—this wonderful old lady might have been seen reading by the light

of a wax candle, a distrust of modern lighting methods being one of her old-fashioned convictions.

Mrs. Keim may be credited with the unique distinction of never having used a steel pen. Although her financial interests were large—to say nothing of her private correspondence—she adhered to the quill pen of her ancestors and nothing could induce her to write with a modern pen. Her library, stocked as it was with musty old volumes, many of them bearing the imprint of the first American publishers and others of even earlier date, would delight the bibliophile.

Even until the last, she was still fond of entertaining and never lapsed from the courtly grace which seemed a part of her. Her treasures were many and priceless. She would show you a portrait in oils of George Washington from the inspired brush of Benjamin West. She would bring out bits of silk and explain that they were from the same piece of goods as Martha Washington's inauguration gown. She would tell you that her mother, wife of George DeBenneville (40), and Martha Washington patronized the same dressmaker and that is how the remnants came into her possession.

The entire place had a delightful flavor of real Colonialism. Mrs. Keim's china closet would have distracted a present-day professional collector, many rare pieces having been brought from India by a sea-going brother, Dr. John DeBenneville.

VI.

SUSANNA BERTOLET FREY.

6. Susanna Bertolet, third daughter of Jean and Susanna (Harcourt) Bertolet, was born November 17, 1724, at Minfeld, Germany. She was married to Jacob Frey, the second son of William Frey, and grandson of Heinrich Frey, who, as the first German settler in Pennsylvania, arrived on the banks of the Delaware in the early Summer of 1680. He sailed from Rotterdam on the good ship St. Markus, Captain Sauder, master. He is said to have been born in Altheim in 1653, but his parents at this time lived in Heilbron. Heinrich Frey was a wood-worker, and Joseph Plattenbach, his companon, who hailed from Bruchsal, was an iron-worker. Following are extracts from a sketch of Heinrich Frey and his family, contributed by Benjamin Bertolet (223):

"Heinrich Frey and his friend, Joseph Plattenbach, soon after their arrival in Philadelphia, erected a temporary house and shop in the vicinity of Front and Arch Streets, Philadelphia. Here they came in contact with some Indians and by them were led to the eastern hillside of Germantown, where they made a bargain with them. The Indians presented them with a large tract of land, probably 1,000 acres. Mrs. Anne DeB. Mears found in her historical researches that Heinrich Frey later took the land by legal warrant from the proper authorities. As to where the two friends settled on the land is not definitely known, but tradition points to a place where three Indian trails joined, one leading over the hills into Germantown, another taking the course of what is now the Old York Road, and the third running along the route of what is known as Rising Sun Lane.

"A legendary and probably fanciful account of the acquisition of this land is found in an old German book by L. W. Wollenweber, translated by Daniel K. Cassel. It tells how Frey and Plattenbach became acquainted with an Indian of the Leni Lenapes, named Usquerat, who invited them to visit the village of his tribe not far away. After spending the night at the village and being

nospitality received by the chief, Ianane, they were asked the next morning to accompany him. He led them to the top of a hill just as the sun was rising. Having reached the summit, the Indian Chief addressed his guests and because of their kindness to his people, made them a present of a large tract of the surrounding country. After marking the boundaries, as shown them by Ianane, the two friends named the tract "Aufgehende Sonne" (Rising Sun), in remembrance of the time of day when they had received their gift.

"It was at this spot that the first permanent colony was founded by the two German pioneers, and the village, called "Rising Sun,"

soon became a center.

"William Penn did not come to Pennsylvania until 1682, but prior to his arrival his visits to Holland, Switzerland, and Germany caused a great many emigrants to come to America to settle in his proposed colony. This is illustrated in a letter written to Heinrich Frey by his father from Heilbron, Germany:

"'HEILBRON, February 6, 1681.

"DEAR SON:

"'Your letter from far-away America reached us by the hand of the brave Captain Sauder and it gave us great joy. And when a few days later the father of your true friend came to see us, our joy was beyond measure.

"'America, according to your writing, must be a beautiful land. We rejoiced greatly that your home is with such good, God-fearing people, and that the Indians in your community are peace-

loving people, and

"'Dear Henry, since you have been away from us the conditions in South Germany have become very much worse. The French have wrought much devastation and this is pressing us very hard at this time, and, besides this, we are now suffering the plague of high taxes.

"Thousands would gladly leave the Fatherland if they had the means to do so. A merchant from Frankfurt was with us last week and informed us how along the Rhine a number of families had banded together and are planning to accept the invitation of an Englishman named William Penn, who recently visited that

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community, to settle in that beautiful land and there establish new homes. After I had received the information I went at once to our pastor, whose parents live in Worms, on the Rhine, and begged him urgently to learn what truth there was in these reports and to find out if possible if there would be any opportunity for us to join them and go to the new world. He then informed me that these reports were all true and that he was informed by one who has inside knowledge, that in a place called Kreigsheim, near Worms, many were preparing themselves to go to the new world. When I gave the good man your letter to read he was greatly surprised and said, that you were on the land to which these emigrants were going. It is the good Providence of God that has shown these burdened people so glorious a land. We also and the Plattenbach family, are only waiting for a good opportunity when the dear Lord will bring us to you.

"'Your brother, Peter, is learning shoe-making and will soon be free. America is the only dream of Elizabeth and Catharine, who, only six years old, ask us daily, Will we soon be going to our brother in America?

"'Your dear mother as also your brother and sisters greet you heartily and pray to the dear Lord that He may protect and keep you.

Your true Father,

"'HEINRICH FREY.'

"After the arrival of the Mennonites, in 1683, Heinrich Frey soon disposed of his large landholdings among the newcomers. Until 1689 we do not hear a great deal of him, but at that time he appears again in Germantown, and when the number of town lots there was increased from fourteen to fifty-five, he became the owner of lot No. 18.

"On February 26, 1692, Heinrich Frey was married to Anna Catharine, the daughter of his friend, Weigert Levering. Frey was then thirty-nine years of age and his wife about eighteen. The following is a copy of their marriage certificate:

"'This present certificate witnesseth that the said Heinrich Frey and Anna Catharine Levering have this day solemnized such their marriage by taking one another as husband and wife according to the law of the country, before me, in the presence of us, whose names are hereunder written, at Germantown, the 26th day of the second month, A. D. 1692.

"'Francis Daniel Pastorius,
"'Justice of the Peace.

- "'X Dass ist Heinrich Frey's Mark
- "'X Dass ist Anna Catharine Frey's Mark
- "'X Dass ist Weigert Levering's Mark
- "'X Dass ist Magdalena Levering's Mark

"Frey and his wife soon after their marriage moved to what is now known as Roxborough. Here most of his family was born. The following are the names of their children:

"Heinrich Frey remained with his family on his land at Roxborough until about 1712, when he sold all his holdings there. In that year he bought 200 acres of land in Towamensing Township, along Towamensing Creek, in what was then Philadelphia County, from Benjamin Fairman, for the sum of thirty-three pounds. This was part of a very large tract, first taken up by William Smith, of Bronheim House, in the County of Wilts, England. The deed was dated March 2, 1682. The tract then contained 1.250 acres, all wilderness, partly covered by the villages of Indians on the sunny slope along Towamensing Creek. A celebrated Indian Chief, Caciequl, lived there, concerning whose tribe there are many interesting traditions.

"After Heinrich Frey bought this land he with two of his sons, Jacob, aged 19, and William, aged about 17, filled their knapsacks with food for a week and walked from their Roxborough home to

the new purchase. They made a clearing and erected a log house which was ready for occupancy by the following spring. Their new home was about eighteen miles due north from Roxborough.

"Heinrich Frey lived on the property at Towamensing for upwards of 20 years, until within two years of his death, when he joined his son Jacob, for whom, together with his son William and nephew Andrew, he had taken up 650 acres of land in what became known as the Falckner Swamp district.

"When Falckner Swamp Valley was opened for settlement, William Penn issued letters patent on October 25, 1700, granting to the Frankfurt Company, as follows:

"'Twenty-two thousand acres of land, in the Province of Pennsylvania, fronting on the River Schuylkill near the mouth of the Manatawny Creek, and to the mouth of the stream known as Sprogell's Creek, as the line runs, nearly parallel between New Hanover and Frederick Township, on the northwest side and extending northeast a distance of 12 miles, containing about 22,000 acres.'

"The valley took its name from Daniel Falckner, who settled in Germantown and was appointed as attorney for the Frankfurt Company. Falckner consummated the sale for the Frankfurt Company, the tract comprising New Hanover, Pottsgrove, Douglass, and Upper Hanover Townships. Falckner also sold to one William Steele 3,000 acres in Frederick Township, in the valley adjoining the New Hanover Township tract, on the southeasterly side.

"On January 30, 1716, Heinrich Frey bought from William Steele 650 acres of the 3,000 acres of land. The tract was situated on Swamp Creek, a branch of the Perkiomen Creek, within the limits of the present county of Montgomery. Two hundred acres of this he sold to his son, Jacob Frey, in 1717; two hundred and fifty acres he sold to his nephew, Andrew Frey, and the remaining two hundred acres he sold to his son, William Frey. All three of them had their cabins on William Frey's tract, near a mineral spring.

"Heinrich Frey seems to have lived with his son Jacob during

the last two years of his life. On October 12, 1732, two years before his death, by a deed recorded in Montgomery County, he and his wife, Anna Catharine, conveyed to Jacob all his property, in return for which the latter was to maintain his parents until their death, as well as maintain the three unmarried daughters, Elizabeth, Rebecca and Amelia, until their marriage or until they attained the age of eighteen.

"Heinrich Frey died in 1734 and is buried on the 200-acre tract bought by him for his son William. His grave is in the Frey Burial Ground, now the Bertolet Burying Ground (incorporated), in Frederick Township, Montgomery County. In 1910 his descendants erected a tablet at his grave.

"William Frey, the second son of Heinrich and Anna Catharine (Levering) Frey, at once took possession of his 200-acre allotment, and with his brother Jacob and cousin Andrew built cabins thereon near the site of the present old stone house. William was born at Roxboro in the year 1695, and lived there with his parents until his father had sold all his land there. He was married in 1723 to Veronica Markley, of Skippack, Pa. They had the following children.



"William Frey took part in the religious movement which grew into the Moravian Church, and his sons and daughters held positions of usefulness in the educational and mission work of the society. His daughter, Veronica, sailed with her husband, Joseph Miller, from New York on January 9, 1743, for England in the ship "Jacob," which carried a company of Moravians. She and her husband were afterwards stationed at the Brethren's Institution in Germany.

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"William Frey died June 15, 1768. His will was probated September 5, 1768, at Philadelphia, No. 203. It is recorded in Will Book "O," page 268. He appointed Peter Herbein, of Oley, and his son Jacob as executors. He bequeathed to his oldest son, Henry, 10 pounds, and the residue of his estate to the rest of his children equally excepting Jacob, for whom he had provided in his lifetime.

JACOB FREY, the second son of William and Veronica Frey, was married to Susanna Bertolet, third daughter and fifth child of Jean Bertolet. They had the following children:

"Jacob Frey died April 26, 1770, leaving his widow, Susanna Bertolet, and six small children to survive him. Her nephew, Samuel Bertolet (12), came to her assistance with the work on the farm, and remained with her. In 1771 he married her oldest daughter, Esther, who died January 12, 1788, leaving her husband and three sons. Samuel Bertolet continued to live on the farm with his aunt, and, on January 26, 1790, he married her fourth daughter, Elizabeth, a sister to his first wife. On February 1, 1805, Susanna Bertolet Frey having died, Samuel Bertolet took title to the farm.

7. FREDERICK BERTOLET² (Jean¹), youngest surviving son of Jean and Susanna (Harcourt) Bertolet, was born during the winter of 1726-7, in Oley, Berks County, Pa., shortly after the arrival of the family from Minfeld.

In 1750-1 he was married to Esther LeVan, daughter of Abraham and Catharine VonWeimer LeVan, who, like the Bertolets were Huguenots, and had emigrated to Oley. She was born August 5, 1732. After the death of Jean Bertolet, Frederick continued to live on the farm with his mother, all his brothers and sisters having previously married and removed elsewhere. Here he remained until his own death, twelve years later, in the Spring of 1769. The cause of his premature death at the age of forty-two is unknown. He was buried in the family burying ground on the farm. Whatever marker was placed upon his grave has long since disappeared and the exact location of his grave is now uncertain.

Frederick Bertolet (7) was the only one of Jean Bertolet's sons who remained at home and assisted his father in the management of the farm. In 1757 his father, on his death-bed, deeded the homestead to Frederick, who was then about thirty years of age.

The following is a copy of the deed, now in the possession of Mrs. Catharine Parker, of Reading, Pa., a direct descendant:

"This Indenture, made the eleventh day of the fourth month in the year of our Lord, 1757, between Jean Bertolet, of Oley, in the County of Berks, Yeoman of the one part and his son, Fred-

erick Bertolet, of the same place, Yeoman of the other part, Whereas John Penn, Thomas and Richard Penn, Esquires of the proprietaries and governors in chief of the province of Pennsylvania, by this Patent or Grant of the 6th of April (4 mo.) Anno Domini, 1734, did Grant and Confirm unto the said John Bertolet, a certain tract of Two Hundred Acres of land, situate in Oley Township, Beginning at a Post in the line of John Shiers land, Thence by the same North twenty degrees, East One Hundred and fifty eight perches to a post, Thence by vacant land North Seventy degrees West Two Hundred and thirty perches to a Black Oak, Thence by vacant land South Twenty-five degrees West One Hundred and Fifty eight perches to a Hickory, Thence by land of Thomas Ellis South Seventy Degrees East Two Hundred and Forty four Perches to the place of beginning. To Hold to him the said John Bartolet his heirs and Assigns forever under the yearly Ouitrent of one silver shilling for every hundred acres or value thereof in Coin Current, etc.

Frederick Bertolet's estate was not settled until ten years after his death, when most of his children had attained their majorities. The property contained two hundred and twenty-one acres, and was appraised at five thousand pounds. John, the oldest son, secured the homestead, together with a large portion of the farm, while the other children agreed to accept money equivalent for their shares.

The following papers are on record at Reading, Pa.: "To all people to whom these presents shall come,

"Abraham Bertolet of Manheim Township, in the County of Berks and State of Pennsylvania, Yeoman send greeting: Whereas Frederick Bertolet (alias Bartley) father of the above-named Abraham Bertolet became in his lifetime lawfully seized in his demise as of fee, of and in a certain messuage or tenement and plantation situate in Oley Township in the County of Berks, aforesaid, adjoining the land of the late John Bertolet, John Lesher. and others containing 221 acres more or less and being so thereof seized, died intestate leaving a widow to wit, Esther and seven children to wit: John, Catharine, Susanna, Esther, Elizabeth and Frederick and said Abraham, to and amongst whom the estate of the said intestate did descend and come; And Whereas upon the petition of John Bertolet, eldest son and heir-at-law of the said Frederick Bertolet, deceased were had in the Orphans' Court of the said County of Berks on the 23d day of March A. D. 1799 and at other times that the real estate of the said Frederick Bertolet intestate having been duly valued and appraised at 500 pounds by an inquest awarded by said Court adjudged and confirmed to the said John Bertolet, eldest son and heir-at-law of the said intestate, his heirs and assigns forever, he giving bonds with sufficient securities for the payment of the shares and dividends of his brothers and sisters therein according to law, as in and by records and proceedings of the said Court, recourse thereto being had more fully will appear and the said Abraham Bertolet to avoid taking Continental money did agree with the said John Bertolet to take one hundred and thirteen pounds in gold or silver or coin as and for his full share and dividends of and in the real estate of their said father, Frederick Bertolet, deceased,

"Now know ye that the said Abraham Bertolet does hereby confess and acknowledge that he has had and received of and from his said brother John Bertolet, the said sum of one hundred and thirteen pounds in gold and silver and coin which sum he agrees to take in full satisfaction for his whole share and dividend of and in the real estate of his said father. Therefore, do I by these presents acquit and release and forever discharge the said John Bertolet his heirs, executors and administrators of and from all accounts in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 4th day of February 1796.

His name on the muster-roll of that company appeared as "John Frederick Bertolet," which was written thus in order to distinguish him from another John Bertolet, who was in the same company. There is no record that this company ever engaged in battle. Its term of service was short, but it was hastily organized on several occasions when the British were in the vicinity of Philadelphia. Its mission consisted chiefly in guarding provision trains up and down the Schuylkill Valley.

PETER BERTOLET BRANCH.

Peter Bertolet, a brother to Jean, arrived in this country some time prior to 1720. For a long time this branch of the family claimed direct descent from John, the son of Jean Bertolet; but it is now conceded that the persons appearing in this chapter are descendants of Peter, and not Jean Bertolet.

From the writings of Dr. Peter G. Bertolet, now in possession of the Historical Society of Philadelphia, concerning the township of Oley and vicinity, it is learned that one of Jean Bertolet's brothers also had emigrated to this country and located on the farm later occupied by Peter H. Snyder. It is recorded that this family suffered severe sickness, nearly all of them having died and been buried on the estate, though the spot is much neglected. In 1891, Daniel H. Bertolet, while visiting near the Oley Line Hotel, found that the tombstones were gone and that few traces were left, as the ground had been tilled for some years. At the same time he learned that Peter H. Snyder, then the occupant of the farm, held the deed whereby Elizabeth Bertolet, widow of Peter Bertolet, transferred to Jonathan Herbine the tract of one hundred acres.

The deed reads as follows: "To All People To Whom These Presents Shall Come. Elizabeth Bertolet of Oley in the county of Philadelphia, Widow and relict of Peter Bertolet late of Oley aforesaid, yeoman deceased Sendeth Greeting, Whereas the late commissioners of Property by their Warrants of the twenty-fifth day of March (Anno Domini) 1720 did for the consideration therein mentioned grant the said Peter Bertolet to take up the quantity of one hundred acres of land in Oley aforesaid under certain conditions and subject to the yearly Rent in the said mentioned and reserved. In pursuance of which said warrant there was surveyed unto the said Peter, a certain tract of land situate in Oley aforesaid: Begining at a post in line of land then of John Elrick Hageman but now of Jonathan Harbine (1737), Thence extending by the same and Abraham Harbine's

land southeast one hundred and six perches and a half to a post, thence by the said Abraham Harbine's and vacant land northeast one hundred and fifty nine perches to a hickory tree marked for a corner. Thence by vacant land, northwest, one hundred and six perches and a half to a post, thence by land then vacant but now of the said Elizabeth, southwest one hundred and fifty nine perches to a place of beginning. Containing one hundred acres and an allowance of six per cent, as in and by said warrant and return of Survey remaining in Secretary's office may appear. And Whereas the said Peter Bertolet by his last will in Writing of the tenth day of February 1727, probated August 3, 1734, did devise in these words. I will and give all my estate to my wife Elizabeth Bertolet that she may give, sell and dispose, of the same, according to her will and pleasure, during her widowhood. Shortly after making the said will, the said Peter Bertolet died without altering or revoking the same or any part thereof, as by the Will duly proved and entered in the Register general's office appears. And Whereas, the consideration money in the said recited Warrant mentioned for the most part thereof at the time of the death of the said Peter, remained unpaid and the said condition unperformed. Therefore that the same consideration money may be paid and the said conditions may be performed. KNOW VE that the said Elizabeth Bertolet for and in consideration of the sum of (Fourty-five Pounds) lawful money to her in hand, paid by said Ionathan Harbine.

"To have and to hold the said described tract of land Premises hereby granted or (mentioned so to be) with the appurtenances unto the said Jonathan Harbine, his heirs and assigns, To his and their use and Behalf forever; Under the yearly Quitrent and other reservations and conditions and subject to the payment of the consideration money in the said recited warrant mentioned.

"In witness whereof the said Elizabeth Bertolet hath hereunto put her hand and seal the seventh day of May in the year of our Lord One Thousand seven hundred and Thirty seven (1737).

"The Mark of Elizabeth (X) Bertolet.

"Sealed and delivered in the presence of us

The next we know of Elizabeth, widow of Peter Bertolet, is the granting of letters of administration of her estate after her death, the record whereof is found in Philadelphia County and reads as follows: "Know all men by these presents that We, John Bertolet of Germantown (saddler) son of Elizabeth Bertolet Late of Germantown, aforesaid widow (dec'd), Lawrence Switzer of the same place, yeoman, Dewalds End of the same place, Trader, are held and firmly bound unto William Plumstead, Register General for the probate of Wills and granting Letters of Administration in and for the Province of Pennsylvania,

"In the sum of three hundred pounds lawful money of the Province.

"The 5th day of August 1747.

"The condition of this obligation is such that the bondsmen make true and perfect inventory of all the possessions of said Elizabeth Bertolet which amount to 198 pounds, 19 shillings, 10 p.

The Germantown *Telegram*, of February 12, 1890, in an historical article about "Bustleton and Vicinity," speaks as follows of an old stone dwelling, the former residence of Edward Bertolet and his sister. Sårah:

"The lowest part of the house is toward the city. It was built in 1797. The parents of the brother and sister who lived there are named William and Mary, while the grandparents were Dr. John and Katie Bertolette.

"The grandfather is said to have taken a very large apple, such as country people love to preserve, and presented it to Lafayette at Holmesburg, in 1824. The general is said to have received the man warmly, no doubt because he had French blood in his veins. A brother of Edward and Sarah Bertolet lives at Spencerville, Montgomery County, Maryland, and thither they are about to remove. Mr. Ackland, who lives on the Oxford Pike, near Frankford, has bought the old place with its old-fashioned house and expects to live there. He proposes to cultivate flowers on the farm.

"Dr. John Bertolette practiced medicine here for many years. He died at this place and was buried in the Friends Graveyard at Frankford. The original family were French people, perhaps Huguenots. As Protestants, they fled from France to Germany

under a danger of persecution. Thence they went to England. They came over with the DeBennevilles, (?) who were leading residents at Milestown and were related to them by marriage. The wife of Dr. John Bertolette was of the Cornel family, who owned the Saul properties near Saudiford. In 1727, John Ashton, grandson of Joseph, deeded the Bell's corner property to Joseph Ashton. In 1748, Joseph Ashton deeded the place to Isaac Ashton. In 1795, Eunice Ell's widow, daughter of Benjamin Ashton, conveved it to John Bertolette."

For a number of years prior to 1898 a movement had been on foot to organize a Bertolet Family Association and to hold reunions. The matter was first attempted by Nelson Bertolette (1212), son of Levi A. Bertolette, who was deeply interested in the family genealogy. After the death of Nelson A. Bertolette, Daniel H. Bertolet (538) took up the idea with renewed vigor. He consulted many members of the family and it was finally agreed to send out notices for a family picnic to be held at Ringing Rocks Park, Pottstown, Pa., on Saturday, July 30, 1898.

The notice stated that Daniel H. Bertolet, of Philadelphia, would be at the park with his full record of the Bertolet genealogy, which would be open for corrections and additions. It further requested that all participants furnish a complete record of their families, for which a blank form was found on the back of the notice.

The minutes of the meeting held at Ringing Rocks tell the story of the first re-union:

RINGING ROCKS PARK, POTTSTOWN, PA. July 30, 1898.

The meeting was called to order by Daniel H. Bertolet, of Philadelphia, Pa., and was opened with prayer by Israel M. Bertolet, of Oley, Berks County, Pa.

Ira D. Bertolet, of Philadelphia, was made temporary secretary.

Levi A. Bertolette was elected president, or chairman, of the organization and opened the meeting with a brief speech. Samuel E. Bertolet, of Reading, Pa., was elected permanent secretary.

Israel M. Bertolet, of Oley, Pa., first vice-president.

Benjamin Bertolet, of Philadelphia, second vice-president.

Daniel H. Bertolet, of Philadelphia, corresponding secretary.

Nathan Bertolet, of Pughtown, Chester County, Pa., financial secretary and treasurer.

Ira D. Bertolet moved that an advisory board of nine, in the form of a committee, be appointed by the chair, subject to the approval of the organization; seconded by Israel M. Bertolet.

It was moved and seconded that the officers of this meeting act in concert with the members of the advisory board. The following board was appointed.

It was then moved by Benjamin Bertolet that the committee and officers meet after the meeting. The motion was adopted

A paper was read by Daniel H. Bertolet, of Philadelphia, Pa., reciting his researches into the family records. The meeting adjourned.

Following continued correspondence between the secretary, officers and advisory board, it was decided to hold a second reunion. To this end, invitations were issued by the corresponding secretary, calling for a re-union of the Bertolet family to be held on August 5, 1899, at Carsonia Park, near Reading, Pa.

The minutes of this re-union follow:

After a morning spent in greetings, at 2:30 p. m. the regular meeting was

called to order with President Levi A. Bertolette, Wilmington, Del., in the chair.

After an appropriate address by the president concerning the success of the gathering and thanking all present for attending, the election of officers was called for.

All the officers of the past year were re-elected, as follows:

President, Levi A. Bertolette, Wilmington, Del.

Vice-Presidents, Israel M. Bertolet, Oley, and Benjamin Bertolet, Philadelphia, Pa.

Reording Secretary, Samuel E. Bertolet, Reading, Pa.

Corresponding Secretary, Daniel H. Bertolet, Philadelphia.

Treasurer, Nathan Bertolet, Pughtown.

As advisory board, the chair re-appointed those who had served in that capacity the year preceding.

Following the election of officers, new basiness was immediately called for, Daniel H. Bertolet, Philadelphia, moved that the organization adopt the name "Bertolet Family Association" as a permanent one, which motion was seconded and carried. The secretary and corresponding secretary made a report of the work done during the year in these capacities.

A motion by Benjamin Bertolet, of Philadelphia, to the effect that a committee of five be appointed by the chair to act as finance committee, and along that line to take necessary steps for the collection and publication of the family history, was seconded and carried.

It was also moved and seconded that a voluntary contribution be immediately taken for the defraying of current expenses. This motion was carried.

A motion that the next meeting of the Association be held the succeeding year was carried unanimously.

At the request of many of those present, the chair called upon Mr. DeB. Randolph Keim, Reading, Pa., editor and published of "The Keim and Allied Families," a magazine devoted exclusively to the publication of genealogy and family history, to address the meeting. His remarks were very well chosen and the speaker immediately gained the attention of his audience on account of the extent and precision of his knowledge of family matters. Mr. Keim, in his closing words, alluding to the ladies in a happy strain, the chair reminded the organization of the debt it owed to that part of its membership, and, wishing a response from them, called upon Mrs. DeB. Randolph Keim, Reading, to favor the meeting with the ladies' point of view. Mrs. Keim, in a few energetic words, offered one of the most important suggestions of the day, to the effect that a committee of ladies be appointed by the chair to be known as the "Women's Reception Committee," thus giving the ladies a needed representation in the affairs of the Association.

The suggestion was well taken and the chair appointed as members of that committee:

Mrs. DeB. Keim, Reading, Pa.

Mrs. Louise Frame, Reading, Pa.

Mrs. H. A. Bowers, Reading, Pa. Mrs. Mary Davis, Reading, Pa.

Papers were read on "The Occasion and its Incidents," by Samuel E. Bertolet, of Reading; "The Bertolet-Frey Ancestry," by Benjamin Bertolet, and "The Bertolets of To-day," by Daniel H. Bertolet, of Philadelphia, the latter being a general summary of the condition and situation of the family at the present time.

After the reading of these papers, Mr. Benjamin Bertolet spoke earnestly with reference to the duty, as well as the necessity, resting on the Association to renovate the grave and yard where the bones of Jean Bertolet, the founder of the family, lie buried. To this end, he moved that the advisory board be instructed to proceed in the matter and make a report at the next meeting. This motion was seconded and carried.

A finance committee was appointed in accordance with a previous motion composed of the following:

Dr. Daniel N. Bertolet, Reading.

Dr. John M. Bertolet, Reading.

Samuel E. Bertolet, Reading.

Immediately after the announcement of this committee, the meeting adjourned upon a motion to that effect.

The third Bertolet re-union took place at Mineral Springs Park, Reading, Pa., on August 5, 1900. The minutes are as follows:

After a morning spent in greetings, with lunch at one o'clock, the third re-union of the Bertolet Family Association was called to order at three p.m.

In the absence of President Levi A. Bertolette, who wrote stating that he would be unavoidably prevented from attending the re-union, the meeting was called to order by the first vice-president, Israel M. Bertolet, Oley, Pa. After a short prayer and an address of welcome, the Association immediately proceeded to business.

The minutes of the meeting held the previous year at Carsonia Park were read and approved. The Association then proceeded to the election of officers.

On motion, seconded and duly carried, the officers of the previous year were all unanimously re-elected without the formality of nomination and ballot.

Under reports of committees, the finance committee was responded for by Daniel H. Bertolet, Philadelphia, who stated that there had been no regular meeting of his committee, but that all the work had been done by correspondence and personal interview.

Under the initiative of this committee on the day of the re-union, subscriptions were taken in order to raise a fund for the purchase of a head-stone to the grave and the renovation of the burial place of the founder of the family in America, Jean Bertolet.

A considerable sum was subscribed, the various amounts to be collected from the subscribers when the full sum desired should be subscribed, when the steps to be taken in the expenditure of the fund should be definitely decided upon by the committee appointed for that purpose. The sum of one hundred and fifty dollars was considered necessary to meet all requirements, of which about one-half was subscribed on the day of the reunion.

The women's committee was reported for by Mrs. DeB. Randolph Keim, Reading, who said that the committee had met and made various arrangements and preparations in the way of entertainment and refreshment. They had incurred some expense, the amount of which was reported by Mrs. Charles Hunter, Reading. To defray this expense a collection was taken. The committee strongly recommended that their views be consulted more freely in the selection of the time and place of future reunions, so that they might be aided in their arrangements.

Under new business, it was moved and seconded, that a board of trustees of the Association be elected consisting of three members, whose terms of office should be five years.

This motion was amended and the amendment seconded, to the effect that the term be three years instead of five. The motion with the amendment was carried.

Nominations for trustees were then called for, the following being placed in nomination:

Israel M. Bertolet, Oley, Pa.

Daniel H. Bertolet, Philadelphia, Pa.

John M. Bertolet, Reading, Pa.

Wellington Bertolet, Reading. Pa.

Israel M. Bertolet, Daniel H. Bertolet and Wellington Bertolet, having received the highest number of votes, were declared elected.

A motion was made by Benjamin Bertolet, Philadelphia, that the board of trustees take steps toward incorporation and the formulation of by-laws. This motion was seconded and carried.

On motion to the effect that steps be taken to discover the exact spot, if possible, of the grave of Jean Bertolet, or to try to remove all reasonable doubt as to the location, the chair appointed the following committee for that purpose;

Samuel E. Bertolet, Reading, Pa. Jacob D. Bertolet, Pottstown, Pa. Daniel H. Bertolet, Philadelphia, Pa. DeB. Randolph Keim, Reading, Pa.

Following this a paper was read by Benjamin Bertolet, Philadelphia, entitled, "A Reminiscence of the Religious Life of Jean Bertolet." it was full of information derived from the most reliable and available sources.

The chair then re-appointed the advisory board of the previous year as well as the woman's committee, putting at the head of the latter, Mrs. H. A. Bowers, Reading, and Mrs. Charles Hunter, Reading.

It having been decided to meet again the following year at a time and place to be determined later, upon motion, the meeting adjourned. There were present at this third re-union more than 150 persons from all parts of the state and adjoining states.

The fourth re-union was held at Sanatoga Park, Pa., on August 31, 1901, and the minutes are as follows:

The business meeting of the Association was called to order by President L. A. Bertolette, and opened with prayer offered by the Rev. Nathaniel Bertolet Grubb. In the absence of the secretary, the corresponding secretary, Daniel H. Bertolet, kept the minutes. The minutes of the meeting of 1900 were read by the secretary pro tem and approved.

The committee on monument reported subscriptions amounting to \$70.00, and \$33.00 of this amount paid up. The corresponding secretary reported

expense for printing and postage \$6.25.

The nomination and election of officers was then proceeded with. The following were elected: President, Levi A. Bertolet; First Vice-President, Israel M. Bertolet; Second Vice-President, Beniamin Bertolet; Recording Secretary, Samuel E. Bertolet, Corresponding Secretary, Daniel H. Bertolet, 206 High Street. Pottstown, Pa.; Treasurer, Nathan E. Bertolet.

The advisory board was chosen as follows: Wellington Bertolet, Reading; Daniel N. Bertolet, Philadelphia; Ira D. Bertolet, Philadelphia; Joseph M. Bertolet, Spring City; Samuel Bertolet, Williamsport; Calvin Bertolet, Norristown; Frederick Bertolette, Mauch Chunk; Samuel Bertolet, Frederick: Ephraim Bertolet, Pottstown.

The committee on charter reported progress.

Under new business, it was moved and seconded by Benjamin Bertolet that the grave of Jean Bertolet be repaired and kept in good condition, and from three to five dollars expended for the purpose, if needed. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that the re-union next year be held at Mrs. Josephine Bertolet Jack's residence in Oley, Pa. Motion carried.

Short addresses were delivered by Dr. James Bertolet, of Letonia, Ohio; Rev. N. B. Grubb, pastor of the First Mennonite church, Philadelphia, and

Daniel H. Bertolet, Philadelphia. The latter read the "Passport" issued to Jean Bertolet prior to his passage to America, which "Passport" has been translated from the German to the English language. He also reported steady work on his genealogical book. Contributions to defray current expenses amounted to \$12.66.

A motion to adjourn was carried and the meeting adjourned.

The fifth re-union was held at the residence of Mrs. Josephine Bertolet Jack, in Oley, Pa., a sister of Levi Bertolet, president of the Association, who lived on a farm within a half mile of the small cemetery where Jean Bertolet lies buried. During the year, prior to this re-union, the committee having the matter in charge, had purchased and erected a memorial stone at the grave of the founder of the family. The minutes of the re-union follow:

JACK'S FORM, NEAR YELLOW HOUSE, OLEY, PA., Sept. 4, 1902.

The fifth meeting of the Bertolet Family Association was held at the above place on Thursday, Sept. 4, 1902. At eleven a. m. the unveiling of the Jean Bertolet memorial stone took place in the old Family Burial Ground, about two miles from Oley Line. More than 200 were present. The ceremonies were opened with prayer by the Rev. N. B. Grubb, Philadelphia. He was followed by Samuel E. Bertolet, Esq., Reading, who for the memorial stone committee, presented the stone to the Association. The address of acceptance was made by Levi A. Bertolette, Wilmington, president of the Association. The business meeting, after lunch on the lawn of Mrs. J. B. Jack's residence, was called to order by President L. A. Bertolette at 2 p. m. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The treasurer reported funds in the treasury amounting to \$62.60; expenditures, including expenses of incorporation, \$42.33, leaving a balance in his hands of \$10.23.

The monument committee, D. H. Bertolet, chairman, reported as follows: The contract for the making and erection of a suitable memorial stone was awarded to Mr. Shenton, of Pottstown, his bid having been \$125.00. The Association having been incorporated during the year, the secretary was directed to read the charter, which was immediately adopted.

By-laws for the government of the Association were then adopted and ordered inscribed in a book suitable for that purpose.

The Association afterwards proceeded to the election of officers under the new by-laws. The following were elected;

President, Levi A. Bertolette. Wilmington, Del.; First Vice-President, I. M. Bertolet, Oley, Pa.; Second Vice-President, Benjamin Bertolet, Philadelphia, Pa.; Treasurer, Dr. Isaac B. Yeakel, Bally Pa.; Recording Secretary, Samuel E. Bertolet, Reading, Pa.; Corresponding Secretary, Daniel H. Bertolet, Pottstown, Pa.; Trustees three years, Wellington

Bertolet, Reading, Pa.; Israel M. Bertolet, Oley, Pa. Trustees, two years, Samuel H. Bertolet, Reading, Pa.; Benjamin Bertolet, Philadelphia, Pa.; Trustees for one year, Dr. Heber Plank, Morgantown, Pa.; Dr. Charles S. Bertolet, Reading, Pa.

After the election of officers the meeting adjourned.

As appears by the foregoing minutes, the Bertolet Family Association had during the previous year been incorporated by the court of common pleas of Berks County. The charter granted by the court, as well as the by-laws adopted by the Association, are here printed in full:

BE IT KNOWN, that the subscribers, having associated themselves together for the purposes below set forth, and being desirous of becoming incorporated agreeably to the provisions of the act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An act to provide for the Incorporation and Regulation of certain Corporations," approved the twenty-ninth day of April, Anno Domini one thousand eight bundred and seventy-four, and its supplements, do hereby declare, set forth and certify that the following are the purposes, objects, articles and conditions of their said Association, for and upon which they desire to become incorporated:

1. The name of the corporation shall be "The Bertolet Family Association."

11. The purpose for which the corporation is formed is the collection and preservation of matters of historical family interest and the restoration or preservation of property associated with the progenitors of the Bertolet family in America.

111. The place where the business of the said corporation is to be transacted is Reading, Berks County, Pennsylvania.

IV. The corporation is to exist perpetually.

EY-LAWS.

ARTICLE 1.—Name.

The name of this Association is "The Bertolet Family Association."

ARTICLE II.—Officers

Sec. 1. The officers of the Association shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, and six Trustees, who shall constitute, together with the officers named, the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. The President, Vice-Presidents, Secretaries and Treasurer shall be elected at the regular meeting, and shall hold office for the term of one year from the time of their election, or until their successors are chosen.

Sec. 3. In case of death, resignation or disability of the Secretaries or Treasurer, the vacancy shall be filled by appointment of the President.

ARTICLE III.—President and Vice-Presidents.

Sec. 1. The President shall preside at the meetings of the Association and of the Executive Committee. He shall, with the Secretary, sign all written contracts of the Association and approve and attest all bills for expenses, &c., contracted by the Association. He shall appoint all committees provided for by these By-Laws, whose members are not elected by ballot, and all such other special committees as may be necessary. He shall perform such other duties as the Association may assign to him,

Sec. 2. In the absence of the President, the Vice-Presidents in the order of their seniority shall perform his duties.

ARTICLE IV.—Recording Secretary.

The Recording Secretary shall keep the records of the Association and shall make and keep a record of all persons who are or have been members of the Association, and shall draw all orders on the Treasurer.

ARTICLE V.—Corresponding Secretary.

The Corresponding Secretary shall give notice of all meetings of the Association and of the Executive Committee, and shall conduct all the correspondence of the Association.

ARTICLE VI.—Treasurer.

The Treasurer shall collect and keep all moneys of the Association. He shall keep the accounts of the Association and report thereon at each regular meeting of the Association. He shall pay all bills of the Association on orders drawn by the Recording Secretary, when attested by the President.

ARTICLE VII.—Executive Committee.

Sec. I. The Executive Committee shall have general charge of the affairs and funds of the Association, and shall formulate such measures and

plans as may be necessary for the guidance of the Trustees in the management of the Association, and shall act in a general advisory capacity.

Sec. 2. The Executive Committee shall meet before every regular meeting of the Association, and at such other times as may be designated by the President.

ARTICLE VIII.—Trustees.

Sec. I. There shall be six Trustees, of whom two shall be elected at each annual meeting.

Sec. 2. They shall have full power to manage the affairs of the Association in detail, take personal care of property, &c., and shall carry out the instructions of the Association and the suggestions of the Executive Committee in every particular, when in accord with the purpose of the Association, its Charter and By-Laws.

Sec. 3. The Board of Trustees shall by its chairman submit at each regular meeting of the Association a general report of the actions of the Board.

ARTICLE IX.—Committees.

The President shall at every meeting of the Association appoint a Finance Committee of five members, a Ladies' Auxiliary Committee of five members, and such other Committees as may be necessary for special purposes.

ARTICLE X.—Membership.

Sec. I. Any adult, male or female, either by birth or marriage interrelated with the Bertolet Family, may upon signing these By-Laws, become a member of this Association and may hold office and be permitted to vote at any election or take active part in the meetings, unless such person or persons shall be objected to by a majority vote of the Executive Committee. Any minor, male or female, so inter-related, may upon the same conditions become an associate member, but shall not be permitted to hold office or vote at any election. Such minors shall when arrived at full age be considered active members with full privileges.

Sec. 2. Persons not so related as above may be elected honorary members by a majority vote of the Association.

ARTICLE XI.—Suspension and Expulsion.

Any member may be suspended or expelled for wilful infraction of any By-Law, or for acts or conduct which may be deemed injurious to the interests or hostile to the objects of the Association by a vote of three-fourths of the members of the Executive Committee present at a meeting.

ARTICLE XII.-Meetings and Elections.

Sec. I. There shall be a regular meeting of the Association at such time and place as shall be determined upon by the Executive Committee. At

such meeting a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and such Trustees as are necessary shall be elected by ballot. Vacancies shall also be filled by ballot at such meeting. In all cases a plurality of votes cast shall be necessary to elect.

Sec. 2. The order of business at the regular meeting shall be as follows:

Order of Business.

- (1) Reading of Minutes of last Regular Meeting and of Special Meetings held subsequent thereto.
 - (2) Elections.
 - (3) Report of Executive Committee.
 - (4) Report of Treasurer.
 - (5) Report of Trustees.
 - (6) Reports of Special Committees.
 - (7) Unfinished Business.
 - (8) New Business and Miscellaneous Business.
 - (9) Adjournment.
- Sec. 3. Special meetings shall be called by the President on recommendation of all the Trustees.
- Sec. 4. Nominations for office shall be made in open meeting, and those persons nominated shall be elected by ballot. Where only one candidate is nominated for an office, the Secretary may, on motion, be instructed to cast the deciding ballot.
 - Sec. 5. Ten members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XIII.—Amendments.

These By-Laws may be amended at any meeting of the Association, regular or special, by two-thirds vote of all members present. Notice of proposed amendment shall be given in the announcement calling such meeting.

Re-unions of the Bertolet Family Association continued to be held during successive years at Frederick, Montgomery County, Pa., on August 3, 1903; at Oley, on September 2, 1904; at Carsonia Park, near Reading, on September 7, 1905, and in Oley again on August 25, 1906. After that year, however, meetings were only held bi-ennially, viz.: at Ringing Rocks Park, near Pottstown, on August 29, 1908; in Oley, Pa., on August 27, 1910, and at the same place on July 27, 1912.

The meetings in Oley have all been held at the Union Church and Cemetery Grounds, set apart in 1842 by Daniel Bertolet (72), (see page 31), and after his death incorporated in 1870 for gen-

eral burial purposes.

The history of the Association and the incidents of the reunions can be told no better than by reproducing here the minutes of the various re-union meetings:

Frederick, Montgomery County, Pa., August 3, 1903.

The sixth meeting of the Bertolet Family Association was held at the Bertolet Mennonite Burial Ground, Frederick, Pa. The formal business meeting was called to order at 2 p.m., Vice-President Israel M. Bertolet being in the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted without correction. Election of officers followed. On motion of John L. Bauer, which motion was seconded and carried, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot for the re-election of all the old officers. The Secretary having done so, the following officers were declared elected:

President, Levi A. Bertolet,

First Vice-President, Israel M. Bertolet.

Second Vice-President, Benjamin Bertolet.

Recording Secretary, Samuel E. Bertolet.

Corresponding Secretary, Daniel H. Bertolet.

Treasurer, Dr. Isaac Yeakel,

Two Trustees to serve for a term of three years were similarly elected. They were, Dr. Heber Plank, Morgantown; Dr. Chas. S. Bertolet, Reading.

The Treasurer's report was read and ordered spread upon the minutes. It showed receipts, including \$125 for Jean Bertolet memorial stone, amounting to \$129.75, and expenditures amounting to \$129.55, leaving a balance of twenty cents.

Under new business it was moved, seconded and carried that a committee of three be appointed by the chair to solicit subscriptions for a permanent fund. The chair appointed Benjamin Bertolet, Philadelphia; Israel M. Bertolet, Oley, and Daniel H. Bertolet, Pottstown.

As a Woman's Auxiliary Committee, the chair appointed Mrs. H. A. Bowers, Mrs. Charles Hunter and Mrs. Keim, all of Reading; Mrs. Daniel H. Bertolet, of Pottstown, and Mrs. Minnie McMurtie, of Philadelphia.

A general collection of funds was taken, which amounted to \$15.15.

Addresses were made by the following: DeB. R. Keim, Reading; Frederick Bertolet, Esq., Mauch Chunk; Rev. N. B. Grubb, Philadelphia. A paper on the "Settlement of Falkner Swamp, Montgomery County," was read by Benjamin Bertolet.

Moved and seconded that the time and place of the next meeting be left to the trustees. Motion carried. The meeting then adjourned.

OLEY, BERKS COUNTY, PA., Sept. 3, 1904.

The seventh meeting of the Bertolet Family Association was held in Oley Township, near Friedensburg, on the grounds of the Union Church

and Cemetery Company, formerly known as Bertolet's Cemetery. The business meeting was called to order at 2 p. m. with the president, Levi A. Bertolet, in the chair, who called on Rev. 1. S. Stahr, of Friedensburg, to open the meeting with prayer.

The treasurer's report was called for and showed receipts on hand from the last meeting of \$15.35, expenditures during the year \$8.00; leaving a balance of \$7.35.

He was followed by Dr. Daniel N. Bertolet, Rev. N. B. Grubb and Mrs. DeB. R. Keim.

The president re-appointed all the standing committees, after which the meeting adjourned.

Carsonia Park, Reading, Pa., Sept. 7, 1905.

The eighth meeting of the Bertolet Family Association was held at Carsonia Park, Reading, Pa.

The morning was passed in greetings of old friends and relatives.

At noon luncheon was served by the Ladies' Auxiliary Committee

The business meeting was called to order at 2 p.m. with the president, Levi A. Bertolet, in the chair. Rev. Silas W. Grubb opened with an appropriate prayer.

The minutes were read and approved. The meeting then proceeded to elect officers of the Association for the ensuing year. The following were placed in nomination:

First Vice-President, Israel M. Bertolet.

Second Vice-President, Benj. Bertolet.

Recording Secretary, Samuel E. Bertolet.

Corresponding Secretary, Daniel H. Bertolet

There being only one nominee for each office, it was moved and carried that the secretary east the ballot. This being done, the foregoing were declared elected.

The treasurer's report was heard and ordered spread upon the minutes

and adopted.

It was moved and seconded that the secretary be instructed to get a release from the heirs of John and Daniel Bertolet, late of Oley Township, of all their claim, right or title to the cemetery in Oley where the memorial stone has been erected. This motion was discussed at length, but was not carried.

The collection taken at this point for defraying ordinary expenses amounted to \$13.36. Bills were presented for printing, postage, refreshments, &c., amounting to \$14.85. These bills were ordered paid by the treasurer.

There being no further business, a motion to adjourn to meet again in two years was put and carried, whereupon the president declared the meeting adjourned.

A collection was taken amounting to \$20.46. Bills for current expenses, aggregating \$9.00, were presented and ordered paid.

Addresses were delivered by Mr. Ira D. Bertolet and Rev. N. B. Grubb, after which the meeting adjourned to meet again at the call of the executive committee.

It was during the period following the incorporation of the Association and the erection of the Jean Bertolet Memorial that the publication of the Bertolet family genealogy and memoirs was brought forward most strongly and prosecuted to a conclusion.

The publication committee provided for at the August 27, 1910, re-union consisted, as appears by the minutes, of only five members, including the president of the Association. The president, Levi A. Bertolette, appointed Daniel H. Bertolet, Rev. N. B. Grubb, S. E. Bertolette and DeB. R. Keim to serve on this committee with him. On June 7, 1913, the then president of the Association, Israel M. Bertolet, enlarged the membership of the publication committee so as to include, in addition to the persons named, the following: Ira D. Bertolet, Philadelphia, Pa.; Benjamin Bertolet, Philadelphia, Pa.; Calvin M. Bertolet, Germantown, Pa.; Daniel A. Bertolet, 416 West Airy Street, Norristown, Pa., and Dr. Daniel N. Bertolet, Reading, Pa.

The committee was organized by appointing Israel M. Bertolet as chairman and Samuel E. Bertolet, secretary and treasurer.

Subscriptions aggregating \$1,000 to pay for the publication of the book were obtained, and it was ordered that five hundred copies be printed and offered to subscribers at \$2.00 each, subscribers to receive a volume for every \$2.00 subscribed.

The publication committee designated Daniel H. Bertolet, Rev. N. B. Grubb, Dr. D. N. Bertolet and Samuel E. Bertolet as an editorial committee, and the genealogical and literary contents were prepared under their supervision.

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
