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GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

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SEPTEMBER 15TH, 1864.

A meeting was called of the relations, descendants of early settlers of Avon, N. Y., viz: Pierson, Waterous, Hosmer, Martin, Little, &c., and convened at the old Brick Church at East Avon. One hundred and forty-four were present. John Pier-on of Danville, Ill., was chosen president; F. B. Pierson of Avon, vice-president; G. C. Pierson and Van R. Pierson, secretaries. Necessary committees were chosen — friendly interchange of thought and feeling expressed, and addresses made. A motion was made that a committee be selected from the different families here represented, to ascertain the genealogies and historical reminiscences, to be revised and printed, and that a subscription be obtained to defray expenses of compiling and printing the same. Refreshments were provided and partaken of with a peculiar zest; then addresses from Messrs. A. Dana and W. H. C. Hosmer; resolutions, thanks and farewells. Adjourned to meet again October, 1865.

The second meeting was held October 3d and 4th, 1865, at the same place. In absence of president and vice-president, Dr. G. W. Hanna of E. Mendon, N. Y., was called to the chair; S. A. Whitbeck, secretary. The committee for publishing the book of Genealogies reported nothing had been done. Some letters had been written and no answers received. A resolution was taken to re-appoint the committee, they to devise the best mode of proceeding, to gather materials, publish the book and collect funds from those wanting copies of the same. Committee: Dr. J. A. Bennett, John T. Hall and Samuel Waterous. Dr. Bennett delivered an address; Mrs. Mary E. Randall read a poem. Then followed a sumptuous repast in the church—then again called to order, the names of those present were recorded, and seven reported died since our last meeting. The doxology was sung; the benediction pronounced by Rev. Mr. Lusk, and our gathering dispersed to meet again on the first Wednesday of September, 1866.

SEPTEMBER 4TH, 1866.

Our annual family gathering again is called to order by F. B. Pierson, president, at Dr. Taintor's house. The weather unpropitious, rain falling, &c. Last year's report read, also a letter from Dr. J. A. Bennett, resigning his position as chairman of book committee, which resignation was accepted; also a motion made and carried to add Rev. E. B. Walsworth of Oakland, California, J. H. Boughton, Stephen Hosmer, Dr. Taintor and S. A. Whitbeck to this committee.

SEPTEMBER 5TH, 1866.

Met in the Baptist Church, as the Brick was undergoing repairs. Rev. E. B. Walsworth offered prayer. Short addresses were made by Hon. S. Lord, E. B. Walsworth, Amos Dann, W. H. C. Hosmer and others. Resolutions were made, and it was moved that W. H. C. Hosmer be added to the book committee. Five deaths were reported since last we met. Motions were made and carried that these reports be put on record—that friends send notices of births, marriages and deaths occurring among us, to the president or secretary—also, that we meet again on the first Wednesday of October, 1867. The friends then adjourned to the house of F. B. Pierson and partook of refreshments upon tables spread in the front yard, after which our pleasant meeting was broken up, each carrying delightful memories of the gathering of 1866.

OCTOBER 2D, 1867.

Our adjourned meeting was called to order by John Pierson of Illinois; F. B. Pierson appointed temporary chairman; S. A. Whitbeck, secretary; committees on organization, introduction, fare, publication, &c., &c., were chosen. It was then resolved that W. H. C. Hosmer be invited to address the meeting; that in addition to the finance committee there be a treasurer appointed; Dr. S. Taintor was chosen treasurer. The following were read from the committee on resolutions:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting, a portion of the descendants of the first settlers of the town of Avon, N. Y., that it is our duty, as it is our unfeigned pleasure, to cherish a filial reverence for the memory of our fathers and mothers, whose graves are near the spot on which we now meet.

Resolved, That we, their children, grand-children, and great-grand-children, hold in sacred memory, the sturdy and unshaken virtues of our fathers and mothers, in encountering the trials and hardships of a then howling wilderness, that they might insure a competence to themselves, and an independence to their posterity.

Resolved, That in the humble annals of our organization, kept alive by annual family re-unions, worth will be rewarded with an appropriate record, and a memorial be presented of our loved and lost, more touching than inscriptions stamped on brass, or carven on stone.

Judge Pierson moved the following addition:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting that the old Pioneers, and their descendants of Avon, without reference to inter-marriage with, or ties of blood, that unite them to the founders of this association; be invited to co-operate with us, at our annual meetings; that we reverence the names of Wiard, Markham, Merry, More, and all others identified with Avon, and honor their sacred memories in common with our own immediate ancestors.

The report of deaths of eleven was given.

The question was then proposed, Shall we meet next year? and answered unanimously that we meet the first Wednesday of Oct., 1868.

OCTOBER 7TH, 1868.

Another year has passed, and finds us assembled.

Remarks are made by Revs. Mr. Brown, Mr. Page and John F. Bliss, the first pastor of the church.

He came to Avon in 1810. There was then no church, no minister. He preached in a school-house near Geo. Hosmer's, Esq. Had twenty-three hearers the first Sabbath, thirty-six the second, and so increased until they numbered two hundred. Was called by Dr. Bingham. Names were now recorded, numbering one hundred and twenty-five. The record of the dead of the year showed that ten had gone.

Judge Pierson wished to bring forward an old subject proposed at our first meeting; therefore,

Resolved, That the long spoken of book, embracing the genealogy, be published by a committee, to be appointed at this meeting.

Resolved, That a committee of two be appointed, with power to call in a third person, to aid if necessary.

Resolved, That S. Amanda Whitbeck and John Pierson be that committee.

W. H. C. Hosmer was added.

Put in motion and seconded that funds be raised, and put into treasurer's hands.

W. H. C. Hosmer then read a poem.

James Kneeland, Esq., of Milwaukee, suggested that we meet again first Wednesday of October, 1870; therefore,

Resolved, That this meeting, when closed, adjourn to October, 1870, and notice be given by circulars previously issued. And now farewell, and the meeting of 1868 is among the things of the past.

AVON, Oct. 5TH AND 6TH, 1870.

Again we are convened. Our president is here, none the older in appearance than in 1864. Our vice-president, too, still the princely farmer of Avon. The blessing of our Heavenly Father was craved, and praise and prayer to Him were given. Records of all our past meetings were read. The dead of the past two years numbered twenty-seven. Letters were read from Rev. C. Waterhouse, of Mount Vernon, N. Y.; Mrs. M. W. Mix, of Wheeling, Va.; C. S. Bingham, a son of Dr. Bingham, and others. The following resolution was read:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to raise funds from the relatives and friends, in order to defray all the expenses of publishing the genealogical book.

James Hosmer, Dr. S. Taintor and F. B. Pierson were made that committee. S. A. Whitbeck added:

Resolved, That we print the book, if they are ordered and paid for in advance, five hundred copies.

Many gave their names, and a number of copies were taken. Some absent were assessed and notified of it. Names of those present were recorded. A communication from John I. Kelsey was read (extracts found at the close of the book.) Dr. H. W. Pierson, a descendant of Abraham Pierson, first president of Yale College, gave some interesting remarks, read the will of A. Pierson, written two hundred years ago. Claimed kindred with us, though the broken link in the chain is not found. Judge Pierson then read the following resolutions:

Resolved, That this family meeting entertain a sincere feeling of friendship and gratitude to our distinguished friend, Col. W. H. C. Hosmer, for his consistent attention at the family gatherings, and aiding by his kindness and talent to make our meetings agreeable and pleasant.

Resolved, That we cannot but feel a pride in knowing that he is a descendant of one of the noble men that first settled Avon, then truly the home of the Indian, and indeed a howling wilderness.

Resolved, That we, as the descendants and relatives of the Pioneers of Avon, N. Y., render our sincere thanks, and they are hereby most cheerfully awarded to our gifted relative, Mrs. Sarah Amanda Whitbeck (a grand-daughter of Mr. Joseph Pierson, one of the Pioneers of Avon), for her constant and cheerful services as secretary to these family meetings almost from their commencement.

Resolved, That we are under lasting obligations to her for the indefatigable labors, which have devolved upon her, in collecting and arranging the family records, with a view to their publication, and the able manner in which she has performed the most difficult undertaking.

Resolved, That in consequence of the high estimation we all entertain of the worth and virtues of our esteemed relative and friend, that the resolutions be added to the family book.

Resolved, Also, that her name be added to the book, as the main author and assiduous laborer in the publication thereof.

He then bade us all farewell. He was the first to suggest these meetings, and now felt that this must be the last to him, that if others wish at any future time to call another meeting, it can be done.

Rev. Mr. Nutten made some remarks that these are precious meetings, we are one brotherhood, same blood, kindred, &c. Mrs. J. E. Puige made motion that thanks be expressed to the people of Avon, for their kind hospitality and bountiful entertainment. The hymn, "Blest be the tie that binds," was sung, and prayer offered by J. R. Page, farewells said, and our meetings ended.

We cannot trace, as one has, our pedigree to, or cannot say that we are grandsons of "Abraham, Isaac and Jacob," but if philanthropy, religious tendency, usefulness "in their day and generation," may be inherited qualities, then we may claim kindred with others of the name of Pierson. the day appointed for her marriage; her intended not knowing of her death until he came to her father's house. She is said to have been a beautiful young lady.

Ephraim, third child of Ephraim and Hannah Pierson, born 1759, m., in Vermont, had four children. He, in company with some others, took a drove of farm stock (said to be hogs) to Boston, and chartered a ship to Havana, and while off the coast of the Southern States they were captured and robbed by Spanish pirates. He remained South ten years, acquired property, came back within ten miles of his former home, and hearing that his wife had again married, returned and lived the remainder of his days in Charleston or Savannah. His son, some years after, went and found his grave.

Jessie, fourth child of Ephraim and Hannah Pierson, born May 6th, 1761, in Connecticut. Married Lydia Stevens of Wells, Vt., April 15th, 1784; died Jan. 10th, 1837. Lydia, his wife, born May 17th, 1792, died Jan. 8th, 1849. Jessie Pierson came with his family to Avon in February, 1805. Bought the farm three-quarters of a mile east of East Avon, then owned by his brother Joseph. Here he remained until his death. The same farm was afterward owned by his son David, and now occupied by Dr. James E. Jenks. Jesse was a man of large proportions, and had a loud, strong voice. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

“Mr. Perry was one of the first settlers of the present town of Pavilion, having come in the fall of 1809. He walked from Massachusetts, carrying upon his back a pack containing all his earthly possessions. He spent his first winter in Middlebury, awaiting the arrival of a land agent of whom he might procure a farm, which he owned at the time of his death, and upon which he had resided continually for sixty years. Mr. Perry was an industrious, honest farmer, a good example of the old time yeomanry. He was always quiet, and unobtrusive in his manners; upright and honorable in his dealings with others, and eminently practical and consistent in his Christianity. He served with patriotic energy in the war of 1812, and was honorably discharged at its close. Died at Pavilion Centre, Thursday, June 8th, 1870; aged 89 years.” Amanda, born July 2d, 1798; married Ephraim Judd, Sept. —, 1817; now lives in Ypsilanti, Mich. Ephraim, born Oct. 13th, 1800; was killed by a horse at the age of thirteen. Babe, not named, born Jan. 18th; died Feb. 3d, 1802. Hiram, born Sept. 21st, 1805; married Amy Lovisa Hendee, Oct. 23d, 1827; now resides in Avon, N. Y.

Benjamin Pearson was the pioneer of his family of five brothers to the Genesee country, preceding them a few years, and in traveling became acquainted with his wife when stopping at her father's house in Geneva, N. Y. He first took up the "Ball Farm," in Honeoye or Mendon, and helped build the first saw-mill in town, or at what is now called Norton's Mills, and is said to have drawn to it the first log. Not being able to obtain satisfactory title to the property in Mendon, after two years' stay, he removed his family, then consisting of a wife and infant daughter, taking them and his effects upon a home-made sled drawn by a yoke of oxen, following an Indian trail through the woods to the farm one mile and a half east of East Avon, where he lived and died. He endured the trials and privations incident to a new country. At that time he was obliged to go to Geneva to mill, being forty miles. He kept a public house for many years and was widely known and respected. In military tactics he took an active part and rose to the rank of colonel of cavalry. His large, noble form and strong voice, gave to him a fine commanding appearance on horse. His death was sudden, although it was supposed to be approaching. But as many of his friends had died, showing no indications of immediate change, so with him. He was sitting in a large chair (being plethoric, he could rest better there), late in the evening, no one in the room but a colored boy, who saw his arm fall at his side. Soon after the boy had laid it up, it fell again, and he called some member of the family who came and found that his spirit had fled. He was a prominent member of the Baptist Church for many years.

John Pearson lived in Duanesburg, N. Y., upon patent land until 1796, when, to carry his idea that he would leave his family "upon land with free title, clear of incumbrance," he removed to Hartford, now Avon, and in company with his mother-in-law, Canada (formerly Waterous), purchased 400 acres of land of John Beach, and lived upon the farm until he died. The farm is now occupied by Mr. Anderson.

The Indians were then so numerous that the family were afraid to go out of doors at night. Mr. P. brought a grindstone with him into the country, which the Indians soon found would sharpen their tomahawks, and they, knowing of the fear of the family, would strike their hatchets into the logs, and give an Indian whoop; but afterward, they became very civil and docile.

Mr. P. built the first frame building, two stories high, and it was named "John's industry, and Rebecca's economy." He also built a store upon the north side of the road, where he established an extensive trade. He was a man of positive and decided character, and met with success in all that he undertook. His first house, a log one, was not all shingled, and he went nine times on horseback, each time bringing shingles in front of him, to cover the rest of his house. He went seven miles in March, to chop down trees; and to the town of Livonia to get apple trees, which he set out, and from which his daughter picked apples only a year or two ago. He would take in exchange for goods, horses, cattle and farm-stock; take these to New York or Philadelphia, replenish his stock of goods, and

return home—taking four to six weeks to perform the trip—mark his goods, telling his clerks “I paid for this, so and so,” and all without the aid of pen and ink; casting his accounts in his head, and correcting figures made by his men. He carried on various branches of business: had a hat factory, from which he supplied a portion of the Western world with hats; an ashery; improved his own premises by building barns, &c. One incident, characteristic: He bought a pair of oxen of a stranger, paid him, but looked upon him with a little suspicion. The next morning he said to his men: “Are such oxen in the field?” They answer: “No;” nor could they find where they got out. He says, “Bring me such a horse, saddled and bridled,” takes his cane, and starts away. He reached Genesee river bridge, but could not hear of them; returned to the public house, and found that such a man with oxen had been there; he went to Leroy, to Bergen, and discovered his oxen in a field; asked a Mr. White who was the owner; proved and claimed them as his own, and started for home. He had not rode far when he met the man of whom he bought them. He dismounted from his horse, slapped him upon the shoulder, and said: “You are my prisoner!” The man replied: “For God’s sake don’t expose me, it is my first offense!” The stranger paid him for his trouble: Mr. P. came home, and says: “Ask me nothing about it.”

In the fall of 1812, he built the brick store and public house on the south-east corner of the square at East Avon, and said: “We must build a meeting house.” The meeting house was not built until some time after his death. He had scarcely completed the store and building, but had rented it to Maj. Boughton, and was seized with a prevailing epidemic of that year, and died in the midst of his cares, and in the prime of life. Maj. Boughton was killed at the battle of Black Rock, brought to Avon and buried.

Mr. Pearson’s house was the home of the minister, and from his door none ever went hungry or naked. He died, leaving hopeful evidence that he had found peace with God during his brief illness, not willing to be allowed to sleep until he found rest in Christ; bade all about him farewell, and urged them to prepare to meet him in heaven.

His funeral sermon was preached by Rev. J. Barnard, of Lima, from the text "I had fainted, unless I had believed to see the goodness of the Lord, in the land of the living."—*Psalms* 27: xiii.

HOSMER FAMILY.

First Generation.—Thomas Hosmer, born 1604, at Hawkhurst, county of Kent, England; married, first, Frances; married, second, Mrs. Katharine Wilton (now Wil-son), May 6th, 1679, of Northampton, Mass.; died April 12th, 1687; was buried at Northampton, Mass. This is one of the oldest grave-stones in the old burying-

ground of that place, yet it has decayed very little, and the letters are as plain as those engraved the previous year, to the writing of this. The inscription is as follows :

" THOMAS
HOSMER, AGED
83 YEARS. HE
DYED APRIL 12TH,
1687."

The foot-stone is nearly as large as the head-stone, and has on it the initials " T. H." Thomas, with his brother James, left England bound for New England, April 9th, 1635, on board of the ship Elizabeth de London, captain William Stagg, and landed at New Town, now Cambridge, Mass. Thomas was of the goodly number who went with Hooker in June, 1636, to settle Hartford, Conn. His will, dated February 7th, 1685, is recorded in the Hartford Probate Court, at Hartford, Conn. He went to Northampton, a few years prior to his death, to live with a daughter by name of Hunt. James was one of the first settlers of Concord, Middlesex county, Mass., as early as the fall of 1635, at which period (September 3d) that town was organized. He died in 1685. His descendants have, in general, been industrious, peace-loving, home-abiding and honest. Those who were living at the time of our Revolutionary War, served in the Continental Army, both as officers and privates. Abner Hosmer, one of his descendants, was one of the first and early *martyrs* to the cause of our National Independence in 1776. He was a private in Capt. Davis' company, and fell at the first fire of the British on the memorable 19th of April, 1776, at Concord. He was shot through the head, and killed instantly. A monument of granite was erected a few years ago, to the memory of that little band of *patriots* who fell on that day, a few rods westward of the public road, near the house of the Rev. Dr. Ripley, who gave the land for the purpose, at the place where the old " North bridge," of Concord, crossed the river. This monument bears the following inscription :

" Here, on the 19th day of April, 1776, was made the first forcible resistance to British aggression; on the opposite bank stood the American military; here stood the invading army, and on this spot, the first of the enemy fell in the war of the Revolution, which gave Independence to these United States. In gratitude to God, and in the love of freedom, this monument was erected, A. D., 1836."

Timothy was a pioneer of Avon. His son, William T., says: "I shall not refer back farther than the part he took in the revolution. He entered the service as surgeon to Meigs' regiment, in the Connecticut line, and continued in the service, I believe, until the close of the Revolution. After peace he continued the practice of physic, in Farmington, Conn., until he took up his residence in Avon, March, 1793. My father, William Judd, Thomas Lewis, and William Wadsworth, of Farmington, and Isaiah Thompson, of Southington, purchased of Phelps & Gorham, the township of Avon, for two shillings and eight pence per acre. They gave, I believe, eight pence per acre extra, for the choice of townships. William Judd, William Wadsworth, and Thomas Lewis, sold their interest in the purchase to Jeremiah Wadsworth, of Hartford, except one thousand acres, which William Wadsworth gave to his brother Gad. My father removed from Farmington in February, 1793, and arrived at Avon in the fore part of March following, and Genesee river was then the western boundary of civilization in America, in the latitude, if we except the settlements made by the French, among the Indians. At the organization of the county of Ontario, my father was appointed one of the Judges, and as the office of First Judge became vacant he was appointed chief, or First Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, and continued in office until he was constitutionally disqualified (being limited to the age of sixty, if I recollect right)." George Hosmer pursued classical studies when a boy, under

The late John Greig, of Canandaigua, was a fellow-student. In the war 1812 he was aid to Maj.-Gen. Amos Hull, William Howe Cuyler, being his brother aid. He was in the battle of Black Rock, and when ordered to bring up Blakeslee's regiment was marked by Indian sharpshooters, who twice wounded his horse, cutting off the spur from his right heel without injuring his person. In breaking through the Indian line, he rode side by side with the luckless Colonel Seymour Boughton, who was brained by a tomahawk. For more than twenty years he was District Attorney, and his memory is cherished by surviving friends. Y., as a preacher of the gospel; preached there six years, at Clarkson five years, at East Gainsville and Castle eight years, and other places two or three years; was a Congregational preacher about twenty-eight years, when he became a Baptist; was an agent for the American and Foreign Bible Society about six years; health then failing, he, with his wife, retired in their old age. Mrs. Bliss was always esteemed by all her acquaintance, as housewife, as minister's wife, as a christian; as a neighbor and friend, she has very few equals. "Martin, Plymouth county, Devon, originally from Kent. Capt. John Martin, of this family, went round the world with Drake, in 1577. Gruls on a chevron, or, three talbots passant sable. Crest on a globe, or a falcon rising argent gorged with a ducal coronet. The tradition in the family is, that the father of William Seaborn Martin emigrated from Plymouth, England, and that his son was born on the passage to this country. William Martin, or William Seaborn Martin, as he is familiarly known by his descendants, and his wife Abigail, were admitted to the first church in Woodbury, Conn., on his removal there, August 30th, 1685. She was the daughter of Jonathan Curtis, of Stratford, Conn.; born October 17th, 1671. They were married June 25th, 1685, when she was about fourteen years of age. He died July 4th, 1715. His widow survived him some twenty years, and died January 4th, 1735. He was buried near the center of the old burying ground in Woodbury, and a coarse native stone on which was chiseled "W. M.," July 4th, 1715, was set up at the head and foot of his grave. These stones have been removed in digging other graves, and now lie on the ground near the place of their original location. He then went to Avon and entered into partnership with John Pearson, in the mercantile business at the red store, about one mile east of the brick church in East Avon. He continued this partnership only one year, when he purchased a farm just west of the village, upon which he erected a small dwelling, and soon thereafter, appropriating the front part of his house for a store, commenced business on his own account, and continued it successfully until near the time of his death. Bradley Martin was one of the early settlers of the town of Avon, and took an active part in all the enterprises of the day. He was a successful merchant, and ever sustained a high character for honesty, intelligence and public spirit, and died much lamented by all who knew him. His wife, Harriet Byron Hull (step-daughter of John Pearson), was born at Salisbury, Conn., November 20th, 1785; died at the residence of her daughter at Salem, N. Y., October 26th, 1862. DEATH OF GEN. BENJ. C. CUTLER.

Proceedings of a Public Meeting held in the Hall of the House of Representatives on the evening of October 19th, 1868.

On motion of Judge Merrill Ashurst, Governor R. B. Mitchell was called to the chair, and on further motion, Col. James L. Collins and Hon. Joab Houghton, were elected vice-presidents.

On motion of Joseph Purcell, Esq., Maj. Cyrus H. De Forrest and David J. Miller, were appointed secretaries.

On motion of Judge Ashurst a committee of seven was appointed by the president to draft resolutions expressive of the sentiments of the meetings; upon which committee were appointed: Judge Merrill Ashurst, Gen. H. H. Heath, Hon. R. M. Stephens, T. F. Conway, Esq., Col. N. H. Davis, Capt. John Pratt, and Capt. E. D. Thompson.

The committee then retired and soon after returned and reported the following preamble and resolutions, which, after several addresses, eulogistic of the merits and excellences of the deceased, by gentlemen present, were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, Divine Providence has, in his inscrutable dispensations, stricken from our midst our highly esteemed and beloved fellow-citizen Benjamin C. Cutler (at the time of his death Surveyor General of New Mexico), who, in all the walks of life, either as a soldier or a citizen, won for himself the esteem of all and the character of an honest man; and who by the urbanity of his manner, disinterestedness of his acts, his social and genial qualities, amiability of disposition and by his noble and generous heart, drew around him a host of admiring friends wherever he was known, and who in the pride and vigor of his manhood and usefulness, has been suddenly cut off, and whose untimely loss we now mourn. Be it therefore

Resolved, That we, the citizens of Santa Fe, will ever cherish the remembrance of the spotless integrity, genial and social qualities, and the high toned disinterested life of our worthy fellow citizen, Gen. Benjamin C. Cutler, who departed this life on the 18th inst.

Resolved, That in his loss New Mexico has lost one of her most useful and honest public officers, and this community one of its most valued fellow citizens.

Resolved, That we sincerely sympathize and condole with the family and relatives of the deceased in the hour of their sad bereavement.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the relatives of the deceased; and that the papers of this Territory, the San Francisco and Sacramento papers, the Army and Navy Journal and the newspapers of his eastern residence be requested to publish these resolutions.

The meeting, on the motion of Mr. Conway, adjourned *sine die*.

At a meeting of some descendants of these families—pioneers of Avon—October, 1857, the following resolution was passed:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting that the old pioneers and their descendants of Avon, without reference to inter-marriage with, or ties of blood, that unite them to the founders of this association, be invited to co-operate with us at our annual meetings that we reverence the names of Wiard, Markham, Merry, More, and all others identified with Avon, and honor their sacred memories in common with our immediate ancestors.

Col. William Markham first settled at Bloomfield, and moved to Hartford (Avon) in 1790. Capt. Ganson claimed title to lands now called the Markham Farm, under an Indian grant; that failing, the Colonel became vested in fee to the soil. This splendid estate is now occupied and possessed by his son Guy. His son Vine died a few years ago in Michigan. Ira, another son, resides in Rush. Wayne Markham having lost sons and daughters, also his wife, now resides with a married

grand-daughter, at Kalamazoo, Mich. The Colonel's daughters are living. Caroline, married to a second husband, resides near Webster's Mills, N. Y. Matilda is the widow of the late venerable Dr. Socrates Smith, one of the pioneer physicians of Rush, N. Y. Mrs. Whitney resides in Michigan. Col. Markham was a man of energy and public spirit. In his latter years he labored under aberration of mind. Think he was the first representative in Assembly from old Ontario. Guy's only son, a young man of great worth, bears his grand-father's name.

Dr. Charles Bingham was born in Bozra, Conn., in 1784; studied medicine with Dr. Scott, of Bozra, and in 1807 was admitted to practice; moved to West Avon, N. Y., in 1810, where he practiced his profession until 1820, then removed to Mt. Morris, where he died in 1842.

John L. Kelsey, son of Jehiel Kelsey, one of the pioneers of Avon, writes to Col. Hosmer:

"That on the Fourth of July, 1804, I was ushered into existence. Your grand-father Hosmer, as I have been credibly informed, was the attending physician, and he asked of my parents the privilege of giving me the name of John Independence Kelsey, which name I still continue to reply to. My father at that time was an officer, and belonged to a company of troops, then at Avon, and commanded by Col. Benjamin Pierson. The company by order of the commandant were notified previously to appear at what is now West Avon village, on that particular day (the 4th), for company parade and military instructions at 9 o'clock A. M. But the circumstances of the ease at his home would not allow of his appearing in due time. Consequently, he was weighed and found wanting; but, at eleven o'clock, he was enabled to meet his fellow officers and soldiers upon parade, and announced to them that a son had been born to him, who had been weighed, and found not wanting.

"Time quietly passed on, and the sun continued to rise and set as usual. I intend here to state to you the privileges and privations that the young in those days were subjected to, and compare them with the situation of the youth of the present age. My parents resided on the farm belonging to Judge Hosmer, M. D., being the same now occupied by Justus Williams, until I was four years of age. My father then purchased of James Wadsworth, Esq., the farm now occupied by David Brooks, Esq. From this place my parents began to send me to school, located, I think, near the residence of Mr. Hillman. I suppose my parents sent me to this place to give my young ideas a shoot; but I have since thought how sadly they failed. The distance being so far they hired me a boarding-place near, but one night was as long as I could remain from home, and I was better prepared to run than to read my book, as I had frequent occasions to try my speed with the young Indians, that almost daily visited us during the first thirty years of my life, from Canewaugus. The first school teacher's name was Miss Dolly Pierce, a sister of Job Pierce, who was engaged in the mercantile business, in a brick building, which now forms a small part of the northeast corner of the U. S. Hotel, at West Avon.

"As soon as I was old enough to ride the horse, to plow the corn, stir and rake the hay, and milk the cows, I was kept at home during the spring, summer and autumnal months. My father always called me out before sunrise in the morning, and sent me into the field with my feet bare, the ground covered with severe frost and snow, to bring up the cows and horses. You may ask, 'Why did you not have shoes to wear?' They were not to be had—no maminoty shoe and clothing stores. I never had a pair of boots until I was eighteen years old. I never had a suit of clothes, nor half a suit from a store of any kind, until I was twenty-one years old. The day that I was twenty-one my father presented me with what he termed my freedom suit. It consisted of a beautiful piece of blue broad cloth, coat, vest and pants, cut and made by A. C. Way, Esq., at that time a resident of Avon, now of Rochester city. The style of garment at that time was a tight, snug fit, and the first time that I enjoyed the extreme pleasure of wearing a new broad cloth suit was upon the fourth of July, at a dancing party, and after being engaged a number of hours, becoming animated, my whole body expanded to such a degree that my new coat burst open upon the back, and was entirely ruined, and it was many a day before the breach was repaired. My mother always, in my younger days, made my clothing from tow and linen that I had assisted my father in raising. She cut and made the garments from cloth directly from the loom, which produced the same effect as a flesh brush. In those days children were not clad with cotton flannel and other flannels whose nap was soft and fine. The most of my school days were spent in attending the school taught in a brick building, now torn down, then stood near the residence of Lewis W. Beecher, a few rods east of George Hosmer's residence. I here give the names of all the gentlemen teachers that I can recall to mind: Champlin, Elisha Crocker, John F. Bliss, Newhall, Green, Gibbs,

Barlow, Augustus A. Bennett, Amos Dann. The school numbered generally through the winter months from fifty to eighty scholars, of both sexes, from the age of four to eighteen years. On the opposite side of the highway were a number of acres of land, thickly covered with beautiful hickory and hazel-nut sprouts, from which the teachers supplied themselves with what they thought were the necessary means of governing the youth in their care. My parents presented me with Webster's old spelling-book, which was the principal book I used during my school days. The youth of the present age do not appreciate the advantages they enjoy in obtaining an education, nor the various modes of enjoyment afforded them.

"Frequently have I walked with my mother from our home, on Sabbath days, to the brick Presbyterian church at East Avon. My parents have always required and advised me to attend some place for religious worship on every Sabbath; also to respect the political and religious sentiments of my friends. How often I think in my leisure moments of the many schoolmates and associates of my youthful days, whose names I well recollect, and whose countenances are as familiar to-day as the sun that rises each morn. A great portion of the different individuals constituting the following named families have passed into a future existence: The Piersons, Hosmers, Wards, Littles, Ladds, Lawrence, Bond, Rogers, Gilberts, Simons, Merry, More, Waterous, Eggleston, Whitney, Clarkson, Hutchins, Barrow, Austin, Ensworth, Bingham, Pierce, Clark, Newberry, Wadsworth, Finley, Markham, Gillett, Nowlen, Hawley, Riggs, Demings, Chapels, Chappels, Wards, Forsyth, Bliss, Bancroft, Wright, Adams, Pelton, Ganson, and a host of others.

"I have kept a diary for the past twenty-five years of my life, in which I have recorded my daily transactions in business, the name of every person with whom I have dealt, the name of all visitors and visits made, deaths and marriages in my vicinity, the weather of each day, the highest price of wages, the price paid for all kinds of merchandise from a shoe-string to a cultivated farm. For fifty years past I have not been confined with sickness five days at any time, never paying for medicine purposes ten dollars in my life. I never used tobacco in any form, except to destroy insects and vermin upon my animals. No lady can charge me with the filthy crime of staining her pleasant abode or furniture with the nauseating juice, smoke or snuff. I have not used to exceed one gallon of all kinds spirits. A trifle of tea and coffee, has, so far, proved sufficient for me. Until within the last three years the sun has not risen or set when I was in bed. My life has been actively spent in agriculture. I have seemed to pass along life's rugged way with ease and unexpected success.

"In October 12th, 1837, I married Eliza, daughter of John Cutler, of Lima, with whom I lived nine years. On the first day of June, 1848, I married Mrs. S. T. Palmer, who still remains with me. In June, 1848, I removed to the town of Riga. Time has passed rapidly away. I have buried seven brothers and sisters, a father and mother, a beloved wife, and an only daughter; none left of my family but myself and son.

"Now, friend H., I have noted down a very few of the events of my life, and how gratifying and interesting it would be if every one of our youth associates would write a similar chapter, and cause it to be added to your valuable work of pioneer reminiscences. I say to our friends, present and absent, so sound the bugle that we may know where you are stationed, and at the next annual meeting of this happy company, present sketches of events of your lives.

I can well recollect going to mill on horse-back. I have frequently met with the Indians at their dances; but they have all passed away. I well recollect the first covered buggy I ever saw—it belonged to Rev. John F. Bliss. We frequently rode to church in company with others, in a crazy, rattling lumber wagon, with naught for seats but rude boards, put cross-wise upon the box. Occasionally an humble chair was used for the advanced members of the family. The elliptic spring was on the edge of the wagon-box, and now your children and mine cannot ride to mill, meeting, or market without the steel spring, plank and rail-road going Jehu-like at two-forty time. Happy am I to witness the rapid progress being made in the arts and sciences of the present age.

"I have this season threshed my grain upon the farm (September, 1870), by steam power. Forty-five years ago I did it with the flail.
