



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INTRODUCTION.

ANY years ago I began the accumulation of material for the purpose of eventually compiling a genealogy of my ancestors by the name of Kent. In my work among the court, town, county, church, and military records, I copied every item containing the name of Kent. In proving that certain of these records or documents related to my own family, I had to locate each one, and in so doing weave chain after chain which I have since by voluminous correspondence and contributions from interested descendants followed down in many families.

I have inserted at the beginning of this book the Kent arms, but have not attempted to identify them as belonging to any particular branch. I give below the descriptions, and will leave the identifications to those who wish to study them out from the data given here or elsewhere:

ARMS AND CRESTS OF THE KENT FAMILY.

- I. Kent-Egleton (Baronet, extinct, 1848), County Suffolk, England; Arms: gules, three roses erminois; Crest: a lion's head, erased or, collared gules. Authority, Burke.
- II. Kent of Thatcham, County Berks; also, Gloucester, Lincoln, Warwick, Wilts, and York; Arms: azure, a lion passant guardant or; Crest: a lion's head erased erminois, collared, lined, and ringed azure (granted by Richard St. George). Authority, Burke (see X. below).
- III. Kent (no county given); Arms: quarterly gules and or, on a label of three points, sable nine bezants. Authority, Burke.

- IV. Kent, Counties Suffolk and Wilts; Arms: gules, three cinque-foils, pierced erminois (registered at Ulster office). Authority, Burke.
- V. Bartholomew Kent, Esq. (Ulster's office, 1821); Arms: sable, three lions passant, guardant, two and one argent. Authority, Burke.
- VI. Kent (no county given); Arms: per fesse, or and sable, a pale and three water borjets countercharged. Authority, Burke. [Note.—The three water borjets in plate are not correct, but should be expressed by a symbol resembling the capital letter M crossed by a horizontal bar.]
- VII. Kent (no county given); Arms: argent, a fesse gules (a variation of this is gules, a fesse argent). Authority, Berry's Encyclopedia of Heraldry.
- VIII. Kent (no county given); Arms: gules, a chief argent.
 Authority, Burke.
 - IX. Kent, Ireland; Crest: a bridge of three arches proper.
 Authority, Fairbairn's Crests.
 - X. George Charles Kent, Esq., of Parkhouse, County Suffolk; Crest: a lion's head crased or, collared and armed sable. Authorities, Burke and Fairbairn Crests.
 - XI. Kent (no county given); Crest: a wolf's head couped.

 Authority, Fairbairn's Crests.
- XII. Kent, County Northampton; Crest: a talbot's head couped; gules, charged on the neck with a cinquefoil erminois. Authority, Fairbairn's Crests.

I have published all of my accumulated material, that others may have the benefit of my work in directions other than that of my own family. I have assorted and arranged what I could in continued lines and branches. Some mistakes are found in records, many contributions have contained flagrant errors, printers sometimes make mistakes, and I have probably not been free from criticism in that direction. All I can say to those who find errors is to first prove yourself right, then to correct in your own and your families' copies. I hope many by the

CHAPTER I.

THE DESCENDANTS OF JOHN KENT, OF DEDHAM AND CHARLES-TOWN, MASS., AND TRACES OF HIS POSSIBLE ENGLISH ANCESTRY. A.D. 1295 TO A.D. 1897.

In the year 1295 Kents were residents of Sherbeck, Eng., and in that year, together with other families, they joined in a deed conveying three acres of land in a part of that parish, called Stampedeyl, to John Birning, of St. Botolph, and Alicia his wife.

In the Registers of Ecclesfield Parish Church we find that at Birley on Mch. 10, 1389, John Quenson surrenders one messuage, three acres, to Robert Kent. That on July 14, 1409, John Hartley and Harry Horner surrendered messuage and lands to Richard Kent. In 1431-7 Robert Kent surrenders land to John Shagh, of Southey. In 1448 John, son of Robt. Kent, jr., claims to hold messuage land and wood in Woodseats which were conceded to sd Robt. Kent, and jouna, wife of sd Robt., claims \(\frac{1}{3} \) of messuage and above land and wood. In 1449 John Kent, son and heir of \(Robt. \), seeks adm. to messuage and 13 acres in Birley. In 1535 Robt. Kent surrenders one croft called Jenfield to John Hurton, & one on Shirecliffe Hill in Birley to John Oxspring. In the poll tax 2 Richd II. appear. Cecilia Kent iiijd. Robertus filius ejus Agnes filia ejus iiijd. Burials, 1567, mense Septembris Catherin Kent, sepult. xxvj' die. 1574 Mense Octobris. Joan Kent, sepult ijdo die. 1558 mense Augusti, Edward Kent, sepult xvj to die. Mense Septembris Robt. Kent sepult xij' die.

In a list of Gentry returned by the Commissioners of the County Cambridge, A.D. 1433, is

JOHN KENT, Papworth — Agnes.

In a list of Bailiffs and Mayors of Yarmouth, County Norfolk, 1529, is John Kent.

In the Registers of St. Mary's, Reading, Berkshire, are Maud Kent, bapt. Dec. 24, 1538. John Kent, bapt. Nov. 5, 1539. Alice Kent, bapt. Dec. 25, 1541.

Reading — St. Lawrence's Church. On a marble gravestone in the chancel is this inscription: "Hic jacet Johannes Kent, quondam Burgenfit de Reding, et Johanna Uxor ejus. Quorum

animabus proficietur Deus - Amen."

In English thus: "Here lieth John Kent, formerly Burgess of Reading, and Johanna his Wife, upon whose Souls God have Mercy, Amen."

VISITATION OF BERKSHIRE, 1566.

Hildesley, of Benham and Brimpton. William Hydesley, of Benan, Co. Berks, had issue Alyce, mar. to John Kent, of Sylchester, Co. South'ton, yeoman.

The following is an abstract from Somersetshire Wills: Gilbert Cogan of Bristol Merchant. Will dated Apr. 14, 1543; proved Nov. 29, 1543, by Margaret, the Reliet [28 spert]. To be buried at S¹. John the Evangelist. My sonsin-law Robert Newbone & Mathew Kent. My children, Ann, Paul, John & Margaret. My wife Margaret Exīx. My brothers John Kent & Robert Newbone. Overseer, John Keene, esq., to whom my great Signet ring — John Ken witness.

From Parish Church Register, Halifax, Yorkshire, I glean that in 1545 were mar. Apl. 12, Richard Mylner to Agnes, relict of John Kent. Apl. 20, Henry Kent to Margt relict of Rich. Haldworth.

In Rotherham, Eng., were mar. Feby. 6, 1559, John Kent to Johan Dweke.



It is curious that Pope, who had great taste in landscape gardening, sprang from the neighboring valley of Worsborough, and that Kent, the artist, who did much to improve the public taste in gardening, was a native of Rotherham.



Ireland, in his "History of Kent County," says that "Kent's Chantry, now called the Chantry Farm, acquired the former of those names from a chantry having been founded there by one John Kent, in the reign of Edward IV., who endowed it with a handsome income to support the officiating priest. It was suppressed in the reign of Henry VIII., and the site granted to Thomas, Lord Cromwell, who soon exchanged it with the king for other purposes."

Kew House, at Kew, was improved and ornamented by Kent, for the Princess Dowager.

At Devonshire, Thos. Noble, of Exeter, mar. a dau. of John Kent, and had issue.

In the Poll book for the election of one Knight, county of Southampton, are John Kent, Minsted, Edw. Kent, Eling, John Kent, Gosport, and John Kent of Winchester, Isle of Wight.

The following are from the Registers of the Church of St. Botolph, and are important in that the dates coincide with the age of JOHN KENT, OF DEDHAM:

John Kente, son of John, christened Dec. 13, 1601, was buried Apl. 5, 1602. On Apl. 10, 1603, Mary, and on Oct. 5, 1606, Rachell, dan's John Kent, were christened.

JAN'Y 6, 1608, John, son of John Kente, was christened.

Nov. 8, 1668, Elizabeth, dau. Benj. and Ann Kent, was bapt.; also, May 5, 1672, John, son of John and Mary Kent; also, Jan'y 2, 1669, Hannah, dau. Henry and Susannah Kent.

From records in Henlow (Bedfordshire): " Edward Kent,

m. Elizabeth, d. of (? Nicholas) Harding, of Northill, spr. abt. 30. Her parents dead, m. l., dated 20 Nov., 1624, to be m. at St. Matthew's, Friday St., London; also in Henlow: 1628, Dec. 12, Kent, John, bur. 1630, Jun 24, Kent, Edward S. of Edward, Junr. bapt. 1631, Jul 22, Kent, Edward S. of M^r. Edward, bur."

The following may have been the ancestor John: "Secundo die Septembris, 1635. Their under written names are to be transported to S^t. Christophers, embarqued in the 'William and John,' Rowland Langram, M^t. have been examined by the Minister of Gravesend, and tooke the Oaths of Alleg. and Suprem. die et A° p'." Jo: Kent—23.

In an old will of Samuel Purchas, rector of St. Martin's, near Ludgate, Eng., dated May 31, 1625, proved Oct. 21, 1626, he leaves to his son Samuel a portion of land "lately bought of my brother William Purchas, and by him purchased of one Kent, ats Reynolds," etc.

Inq p. m. 14 Car I. Robert Kent, of the City of London, haberdasher, seized of the lands aforesaid, by an Indenture of 6 Car. This family of Kent of Tranmore terminated in an heiress, Elizabeth, married about the time of Charles II. to Edward



Parish of Felkirk, Doneaster, the Church Records: "There is a memorial in the church of Mrs. A. ry Kent, who died 16 May, 1683, placed there by her nephew, Sir Ralph Radchlife; married, first, to Mr. James Birkhead, and 2dly Mr. Benjamin Kent."

JOHN KENT, born in England, came to Dedham, Mass., in 1645. His brother Joshua was in Dedham in 1643, but was sent to England in 1644 with a testimonial from the church; and when he returned, in 1645, he brought two brothers, the above John and Joseph, who settled in Bristol county.

John was received into the church in Dedham May 16, 1652. He was a freeman in 1654, and appears as a witness to the will of John Lauson, of Dedham, dated Dec. 15, 1660. On March 21, 1662, he mar. Hannah Grizold, Grizwold, or Grissell, as it is variously recorded; she d. in Charlestown, Mass., Jan. 9, 1690–1. On April 13, 1673, John and his wife Hannah were admitted into the church at Charlestown by dismissal from Dedham, from which place they moved to Charlestown. In 1678 and 1679 he was chosen as one of the "Tythingmen," and under Andros was taxed in 1688 for 1 head live stock and 7 acres land. He had children:

JOHN,² son of John,¹ was mar., Dec. 22, 1692, by William Bond, Esq., Justice of the Peace, to Sarah Smith, of Charlestown, where they lived until 1698, when they moved to Scituate. Here Mr. Kent built ships until his removal, in 1709, to Marshfield. At Marshfield he is described in 1709 as a Yeoman, in a deed of property which he purchased to occupy.

Charles Little of Marshfield, Joyner, in consideration of £542, paid by John Kent, of Marshfield, yeoman, conveyed all my housing & lands in Marshfield, that is to say all my farm which my hond father Isaac Little, Esq., late of Marshfield, decd purchased of Ralph Powell of Marshfield & of Martha, his wife, by deed dated April 6, 1687. Dated, Dec. 8, 1709.

In 1709-10 John Kent was chosen on a commission to divide the Common and undivided lands of Marshfield.

Marshfield, February, 1709, Memorandum:

"That we whose names are hereunto subscribed Proprietors in the Common and undivided lands in the Township of Marshfield, do hereby, each of us for himself, freely give and grant unto Mr. James Gardner and his heirs for ever a quantity of the Common and undivided lands in the sd Township, to be computed according to the respective sums herein following, set down against our names, and to be deducted out of the respective sums, which were rated to the last Province tax, for our real estate." Among the list of names occurs that of John Kent—

"Whereas at a Meeting of the Proprietors of the Common lands of this Town on the 3d day of April 1710 last past, said Proprietors made choice of us, the subscribers to order how the Rate that the Common lands were to be divided by, should be brought to Record viz. by taking of from Tenants or persons rated for any Real Estate other than their own, and place what is so taken of to the Landlord or owner thereof, in pursuance whereof we have this 9 day of Jany

1710 ordered and determined ad removals as followeth," etc.

"So that the rate which shall be for the proportioning of each Proprietors share in the Common lands in the Township of Marshfield is ordered as followeth," etc. In the list of names given is that of

John Kent. 1 6 0

"At a Meeting of the Proprietors in Marshfield Octo. 9th 1710. The Proprietors underwritten drew the several lots afflat to their names." Among the names is that of John Kent.... Division 29-58

"Whereas at a Meeting of the Proprietors of the Common and undivided lands in the Township of Marshfield on the 3 day of April last past st Proprietors made choice of us to make even pounds of the whole rate, in pursuance whereof we have this 9 day of January 1710, ordered and rated st Proprietors as followeth," &c.

In 1709-11 he was designated as husbandman, and by the division of public lands in Scituate he received a portion.

John Kent of Scituate, husbandman, in consideration of £3 paid by Joseph Neale, of Scituate, husbandman, conveyed 10 acres of land in Scituate, which was granted to s'd John Kent, Esq., by the Town of Scituate at their meeting held March, 1706 & 7. Dated, April 3, A.D. 1708 & 9.

John Kent, of Marshfield, in consideration of £100 paid by Joseph Taylor of Marshfield, conveyed 10 acres meadow land in Scituate, bounded by land of

Nath! Winslow, & others. Dated, Dec. 25, 1717.

In 1710-11 he bought and sold land in Marshfield.

John Kent, of Marshfield, in consideration of £20 paid by Joseph Rose, Jr. of Marshfield conveyed 2 lots of land in Marshfield, containing about 26 acres. Dated, March 2, 1710.

John Kent of Marshfield, Husbandman, in consideration of £5 paid by



Joseph Chiles, of Marshfield, Mason, conveyed all my common land & allotment in Marshfield. Dated, Dec. 10, A.D. 1711.

In 1716 he is called John Kent, Gentleman.

Indenture made Feb'y 13, A.D. 1716, Between John Kent of Marshfield, Gentleman, & Commist in consideration of £105 paid by said Commist conveyed 25 acres of upland in Marshfield bounded by meadow of Joseph Taylor & others.

Indenture made Feb'y 13, A.D. 1716, Between John Kent of Marshfield, Gentleman, and Commissioners, in consideration of £150 paid by Commission John Kent conveyed his portion of farm on which he lived, bounded by meadow of

Capt. Winslow & others.

In 1724-5 he was sent as Representative to the General

Court of Massachusetts from Marshfield.

In 1725-6 he was one of the Selectmen of Marshfield. He died in 1753, and his will, made in 1750, together with the papers connected with the settlement of his estate, are here given.

In the name of God, Amen, the first day of May A.D. 1750. In 1759 The First Parish of Cambridge, for the third time within ten years, asked the General Court to annex a portion of this town adjoining it to Cambridge to pay minister's taxes. The town opposed this petition by a strong remonstrance signed by Edward Sheaffe Jr. John Foye and Ebenezer Kent (3).

Capt Cornelius White, John Jones, Abijah Thomas and John Phillips with a copy of this Petition by reading the same to them respectively, or by leaving an attested Copy at each one of the Houses belonging to the persons above named that so they shew Cause, if any they have, on the last Tuesday of January, next, why the Prayer thereof should not be granted.

Luther Sampson, of Marshfield, moved to Readville, Me., and founded the Wesleyan Seminary at Kent's Hill, which was settled by Nath'l Ford, Nath'l Thomas, and Nath'l Kent, of Marshfield, and Kent soon dying it was named in his honor.

ELISHA,³ son of John; ² mar. June, 1741, Susanna Ford, and both were living in 1786. He was Ension in the Militia; a "mariner" in 1744; a "yeoman" in 1759; he became gentleman in 1767. He resided in Marshfield. During the Revolution he was appointed one of a committee to consider what should be done "in the alarming crisis of affairs." During 1776–77–80–81 he was a selectman of Marshfield. At a meeting held Jan. 19, 1776, he was appointed on the "committee of correspondence." He was certainly a leader in public affairs during the Revolution, as is shown by the records.

Ford likewise members of said Committee, and others, his Neighbours, if requisite, which appointment he readily accepted of. And upon the 19th Day of April 1776 the Sloop Sally arrived in the North River, so called, in consequence of which, the said Elisha Kent immediately informed the Chairman of said Committee that such Suspected Vessel had arrived, upon which Intelligence the whole committee assembled & took into their Custody the Said Sloop with her Cargo & Appurtenances, together with the following Torry Refugees Viz. Cornelius White, Commander of said Sloop, Benjs. Stockhridge, Elisha Ford John Baker, John Tilden, Stephen Tilden, Silvanus White, Warren White, Nath! Gardener, Joseph Young, Ephraim Little, after which proceedure the Committee aforesaid thought fit to desire the Committees of the Neighbouring Towns to act in Consort with them relative to said affair, with which they readily complied & proceeded as follows Viz The Committees of the aforesaid five Towns Viz Scituate, Marshfield, &c met in order to Consider & determine what was proper to be done with the Said sloop, Cargo & Refugees & fully considering the matter, determined to send the said Refugees to Goal & ordered said

Sloop with her cargo &c to be taken into the Custody of a Sub-committee chosen out of the joint Committee aforesd, till the general Assembly of the Colony should otherwise order - and choose a committee to represent the matter to the general Assembly of the Colony who accordingly made a Representation of their Doings to said Assembly - Said Sub-committee as aforesd Viz Elisha Kent Lemuel Delano, and Nath! Ford Capt Wm Clift and Capt Wm. Thomas in the name and by Virtue of their appointment took said Vessel Refugees &c Into their Hands, care & keeping as Trustees to the joint-committee afores4, who appointed them till otherwise ordered The major part of said Sub-committee proving in the opinion of said committee untrustly, at a meeting of the aforesaid committees they ordered Said Vessel, Effects &c into the hands of another Sub committee Viz Capt Wm Clift Samuel Oakman & Capt Seth Hatch, who have the Same in their Hands in Trust, till otherwise ordered as aforesaid - Since which the aforesd. Lemuel Delano, Elisha Kent & others have libelled Said Vessel Cargo & Appurtenances - and said Committee by their Agents have claimed in their Capacity as Committees of Correspondence in trust for Said Colony a Right in Said Vessel and Appurtenances and have Defended the Same thro' a Court of Admirality in which Judgment went against them, thro meer Want of Power to act in Such a public Capacity. But have apealed upon said Judgment being fully Sensible that said Vessel was not captured by Said Delano and others as set forth in said Libel:

But that Cornelius White Master of said Sloop and the said Refugees did voluntarily surrender themselves to the Committee afores⁴, and Mercy of their Country-men Therefore we the subscribers Agents choosen by said joint Committee to defend said Action humbly Desire your Honors Order and Direction, relative to Said action, that we may be better enabled to conduct with Propriety

At this time he was a resident of Rumney Marsh, later called North Chelsea, Mass., being a member of Rev. Thos. Cheever's church, and some of his children are buried there. About 1750 he moved to Grove Hall, West Roxbury, Mass., where he kept an inn on the estate now occupied by a consumptives' home. He belonged to the 1st Church of Rox., and some of his family are buried at "Peter's Hill." The year of his death, 1767, he deeds land. His wife succeeded him as innholder as late as Feb. 2, 1781. There was a Jacob Hasey Kent christened in Trinity Church, Boston.

The estate of ten acres, originally the homestead of Samuel Fayson, was owned

at Brunswick & officiated as Chaplain to the Garrison there

In the House of Represent Read & ordered that the sum of Twenty Pounds be allowed & paid out of the publick Treasury to the memorialist, to be applied to & for the Support of a Chaplain for the Garrison & Inhabitants of Brunswick the year Currant, and that the Chaplain be subsisted out of the Province Stores In Council, Read & Concur'd. — Consented to J Belcher.

He was installed as pastor of the Congregational Church, Marlborough, Mass., Oct. 27, 1733, succeeding Robert Breck. The town records refer to his dismission, Feb. 4, 1735, as follows:

"The Town granted a salary of one hundred and eighty pounds per annum in passable bills of public credit, if he shall see cause to accept of the care given him by the Church and Town, and to Continue so long as he shall be their minister and to rise and fall according to Silver, which is now current at twenty shillings an ounce. For settlement he was allowed four hundred pounds. There seem to have been some marked defects in his ministerial qualities which soon resulted in his dismission. Under the date of Oct., 1733, there is the following reference to him in the Records of the Marlborough Association, which met that day at Framingham:

" 'The Rev. Mr Smith had invited the Southern Association (by which means we had the benefit of their advice and assistance in the difficulty before us relating to Mr Benjamin Kent, ordained at Marlborough; - great complaint being made about the world, of his principals. Mr Kent was present, and very freely Submitted himself to our inquiries and examination, Mr. Loring

&c., &c.

"The Church Records also show that there was great dissatisfaction with his control of the church and population. Scarcely had be been settled when Benjamin Wood, who seems to be a prominent member of the society, brings some grave charges against him. He calls him a 'profest Arminian' and says that his want of orthodoxy has made a 'great noise almost over all of the Province,' that the 'nearest neighboring Ministers refused to assist in his ordination,' and also charges him with contradictory statements. The opposition to him increased and kept the church in commotion during the entire year 1734; and at length a council was called. Feb. 4, 1735, to investigate the matter, and give their advice. The result of that council has fortunately just been recovered, and is full of important information. It appears from this document that, in the estimation of the council, the charges of being a 'profest Arminian,' of 'profane and Scandalous conversation,' were fully anstained, &c., &c., &c.

"The council judged and advised that the Rev. Mr. Benj. Kent be suspended from preaching the word or administering the holy sacraments until the 27th of May next, &c., &c. Mr. Kent's ministry probably closed with the decision of this council. No record now remains that he ever retracted his errors, or was ever again restored to his regular standing as a minister of the gospel. He probably withdrew at once, leaving the church as we know in a divided state. An action was brought against the town to recover the sum of £400, which was voted to him as a 'Settlement,' and the case, after a prolonged litigation, was finally decided in his favor."

He was not succeeded until June 11, 1740, when Rev. Aaron Smith, of Marlborough, was ordained on a salary of £80 a year.

Benj. Kent was a humorist, not sufficiently reverent of things divine to please his straight-faced contemporaries. He was full of fun, drollery, humor, and had an unmethodical, irregular head, but his thoughts were good and expressions happy. After leaving the ministry he studied for the bar, where he became celebrated for his "eccentricity and wit." During the years 1757-67 he practised in Worcester County, but he became famous in Boston, where he was a leader among men, — a contemporary of Hancock, Adams, Franklin, and Otis, — and he was Att'y General of Massachusetts. When the Ministry became advised concerning the Riots which followed the Seizure of the sloop Liberty, they gave orders for two regiments te sail for Boston from Ireland. Although what was intended to be brought about by Governor Bernard was kept secret, Yet the Town had good renson to believe that troops were at hand. Therefore a Town-meeting was summoned, which met on the 12th of September, of which, as usual, Mr Otis was Moderator. At this meeting the following record was made: "Whereas it bath been reported in this Town-meeting, that his Excellency the Governor has intimated his apprehensions, that one or more regiments of his Majesty's troops are daily expected to be here, Voted, that the Hon Thomas Cushing, Richard Dana, Samuel Adams, Dr. Joseph Warren, John Rowe, John Hancock, and Benjamin Kent, Esquires, be a Committee to wait upon the Governor, if in Town, humbly requesting that he would be pleased to communicate to the Town the grounds and assurances he may have thereof."

At a merry dinner of the brethren of the Bar we find Kent, doubtless with a very excellent satire for those times, presenting a project for an Act of Parliament against Devils.

His theory of life and religion was that this existence was only one - and perhaps not the first one - of an unending series of periods of probation, and so of advancement. This was too original and devoid of Biblical authority to please the Bostonians of that day. When the troubles between the Colonies and the mother country came to a head, Kent went to Halifax, thereby giving currency to the opinion that he was a Loyalist refugee, though there seems some reason to doubt the propriety of thus ranking him.

Your Memorialist will esteem this Indulgence in your Honors as a Singular Favor, and as in Duty bound shall ever pray &c BENJAMIN KENT

son Benjamin if living, the property being located on north side of Town House in Boston.

Feby 1-1785

In the House of Representatives — On the petition of Ezekiel Kendall Setting forth, that Benjamin Kent and others bath obtained an erroneous Judgment against him, Resolved that the petitioner serve the said Benjamin Kent and others with a copy of his petition and this resolve, fourteen days before the second Wednesday of next Sitting of the General Court, that the said Benjamin Kent & others may appear on the same day, and shew Cause, if any they have, why the prayer of the petitioner should not be granted, and all process on the said Judgment shall be stayed in the meantime

In Senate Read & Concurred

Benjamin's son-in-law, Sampson Salter Blowers, was probably instrumental in effecting Mr. Kent's removal to Nova Scotia. Judge Blowers was engaged with Adams and Quincy in the defence of Capt. Preston, in the Boston Massacre trial, being a Loyalist. In 1801 he was Chief Justice of Nova Scotia. In 1784 he was residing in New York City with his wife, and through his attorney and "good friend," Samuel Danforth, M.D., of Boston, sold to Elisha Sigourney for "gold and silver" his dwelling house and land in Boston, situated on Southack's court, and bordering on lands owned by John Winthrop, Capt. John Phillips, and His Excellency John Hancock. As late as 1818 he joins with his wife and Elizabeth Kent in a paper as stockholders in Bank of U.S., Boston.

Inscription on Tomb, St. Paul's Church, Halifax, N.S.

In memory of the Honorable Sampson Salter Blowers for five and thirty years president of H.M. Council and Chief Justice of Nova Scotia. A learned, careful and impartial judge — an able and faithful servant of the crown and a true friend to this province. Of a strong and discriminating mind and sound judgment. Amiable and benevolent in manners and disposition exemplary in conduct and of the strictest integrity. After a long career of labour and usefulness, honoured and esteemed by all he resigned his office and passed the decline of life in peaceful retirement, and died on the 25th. of October A.D. 1842 at the age of one Hundred years.



Sampson Salter Blowers graduated in 1763 at Harrard with Jonathan Bliss. They studied law together in the office of Lieut. Gov. Hutchinson. At the evacuation of Boston, 1776, he went to England and after a time to New York, and from there in 1783 to Halifax. Chief Justice Blowers left all his wenlth to William Blowers Bliss, second son of Chief Justice Jonathan Bliss of New Brunswick.

Judge Bliss of Nova Scotin died about 10 years ago.

Mch. 22, 1897.

Judge S. S. Blowers d. 1842 — 100 years old.

Hon. Benj. Kent, who was a friend of *Benj. Franklin*, was in Halifax prior to 1785. He is buried with his wife in a tomb in the old graveyard opposite the Government House at Halifax, N.S. The inscription reads as follows:

"Sacred to the memory of Benjamin Kent late of Boston, New England, barrister-at-law, who died on the 22nd day of October 1788 in the 81st of his age; and also his wife, who departed this life on the 2nd day of August 1802, in the 80th year of her age."

His widow, Elizabeth, hought, in 1796, of Thomas Oxnard, merchant, and Edward of Portland, land near the Town House in Boston. She also joined with Judge Blowers and wife and Eliz. Kent, the same year, in a deed of sale of property, viz.: "brick dwelling house and land on North side of State St. 'Boston' formerly called King St. in which they formally lived," by the north end of the Town or Court House.

BENJAMIN³ and his wife ELIZABETH, dau. of JACOB HASSEY,

had children:

In 1782, when a resident of New York City, she was taken very ill, and her father asked that she be allowed to return to Mass., as appears heretofore. It may have been a refusal of this petition that decided her father Benjamin to take up his residence in Windsor, and then Halifax, Nova Scotia, with Judge Blowers. She is buried with her husband

in Camp Hill Cemetery, Halifax. On his tomb is this inscription:

"Here also rests the mortal remains of his wife Sarah Blowers, endeared to her friends by many virtues. She closed her exemplary life on the 8th of July, 1845, at the age of 88 years."

SAMUEL,³ son of Joseph,² mar. Nov. 27, 1740, Rebecca (b. Sept. 12, bapt. 18, 1720), dau. of Joseph Adams. She was admitted into the Cambridge church May 20, 1739, the Precinct church Sept. 9, 1739, and d. 1773. He and his son Sam'l resided in Charlestown, Cambridge, and Somerville—at the latter place in a low hip-roofed house at the corner of Garden Court. When a blacksmith he had an apprentice who died Sept. 12, 1759. He was also possibly the schoolmaster of West Cambridge, or of outside of the Neck, in May, 1768. Certain it is that he was selectman of Charlestown in 1767, 1770, and 1771, and that it was his estate that was burned by the British June 17, 1775, at a loss of £5 on buildings and £80. 10s. on lands, trees, and fences. He d. May 21, 1771, aged 57. The following may not refer to him:

The "Boston News Letter" of July 17, 1760, contains a long advertisement in relation to the "Scheme of a Lottery" which the town had permission to make to raise money for paving the highway in this town from the Ferry to the Neck (Charlestown). The managers were James Russell, Caleb Call, Isaac Foster, Nathaniel Rand, David Newall, Samuel Kent and Jabez Whittemore.

He bought this house of James Smith in 1743, paying "69 oz. 15 dwt. troy weight coin silver sterling alloy." Wyman claims that David removed to Philadelphia. In any case he d. Boston, 1759, leaving two chil.:

Peter Thacher, at Brattle St. Church, Boston, to Charlotte, dau. of John Vinal, by whom he had 4 chil. He d. Mch. 26, 1812, aged 55. His estate was settled in 1813, and Charles Kent, of Boston, app. guardian for the chil. She d. May 9, 1845 (1848?), at Cincinnati, O., aged 80. Maj. Ebenez.



Kent's father and grandfather were sea captains and d. abroad. He was an officer in the Revolution, being Ensign and later CAPTAIN of the Watertown Artillery. 

WILLIAM AUSTIN,⁵ son of Ebenez.,⁴ Ebenez.,³ John,² moved to Concord, N.H., in 1789, where he was elected representative 1795, 1801, '03, '04, and *State Senator* 1809, '13, '14. He held the office of hogreeve 1791–1800. Was a shareholder in Concord Bridge 1795, the Federal Bridge 1798. In 1788 he made a deposition in Boston. He was but a boy when the British burned Charlestown, Mass., where he was living with his mother. The dwelling-house and a small store of the mother was consumed, and the family lived in an interior town for months. On their return to Charlestown he became apprentice as a tin-plate worker in the shop and store of Deacon Newell, of Boston. This business, together with the West India trade, he continued in Concord.

By act of the Legislature, June 18, 1806, he is named as one of the incorporators by the name of the President, Directors and Company of the Concord Bank, "for a period of twenty years, with a capital of not less than \$50,000 nor more than \$200,000 in specie." In proceeding to organize for the transaction of business under their charter, special difficulties were encountered, growing chiefly, it is said, out of questions of location and management. Already there was a "North End" and a "South end" interest. In the former was lion. Timothy Walker, and in the latter Col. William A. Kent. The result, however, was two banks went into operation under the same charter, one called "The Upper Bank," and the other "The Lower Bank," each claiming exclusively to be the "Concord Bank" of the Lower Bank. Joseph Thorne of Hopkinton was president, and William A. Kent cashier.

By request of William A. Kent and others, in 1810, the Selectmen of this year laid out a lot in which to confine swine found running at large. As a compensation for the land taken, among the awards is to William A. Kent

twenty-five cents.

At the annual town meeting in March, 1813, some of the volunteer soldiers attempted to vote contrary to the decision of the Moderator, Col. William A.

Kent, thus referred to in the town records:

"Voted, That the conduct of one McCoy, a volunteer in the service of the United States, and not belonging to this town in attempting yesterday in defiance of the Moderator of the Meeting to Vote for State and County officers—deserves Severe Censure: but his act of Collaring the Moderator while in the exercise of his official duty we Consider an outrage of the most destructive Character



"Voted - That the thanks of this Meeting be given to William A Kent Esq, the Moderator, for his temperate, resolute and judicious conduct upon that occasion"

SIXTH COMPANY OF VOLUNTEERS, 1814.

The meeting preliminary to forming the above company was held September 10, at Stickney's Hall: Col. Wm. A. Kent, chairman; Seth Tucker, clerk. A committee consisting of Col. Wm. A. Kent, Stephen Ambrose, Jonathan Eastman, Isaac Dow and John George, reported preamble and resolution which was adopted. Hon. Wm. A. Kent among others was appointed a committee to give information and form a plan, etc., for the association which was duly organized.

Town offices &c.: March 12, 1805. Representative, William A. Kent. March 14, 1809, & March 13, 1810. Moderator, William A. Kent. March 9, 1812. Moderator, William A. Kent. March 12-13, 1811. Auditor, William A. Kent. March 9-10-1813. Moderator, William Austin Kent.

Col. Wm. A. Kent, as a young man, dressed neatly and expensively. In 1833 he sold one acre of land near the Unitarian Church to Mr. Call for \$3,500. In Feb., 1833, Mrs. Kent 3 max was quite feeble and had a severe cough. She d. on the 28th. after being an invalid for many months. Her first husband left her an annuity of \$4,000, but she left no will and only one child. Mrs. Nash, and her child. The weather was cold and blustering on the day of her fineral, and the snow blew greatly.

W. A. Kent's affairs, politically and financially, worried him during the latter part of his life, being very much depressed at times. He was Justice of the Peace 1796. He received his commission as colonel from being aid to Gov. Gilman several years. He gave the land on State St. for the 1st Baptist Church.

ERECTION OF THE STATE HOUSE.


In 1816 the inhabitants of the South End were in favor of the location at or near where the State House now stands. Especially interested and active in securing their object were the late Col. William A. Kent, Gov. Isaac Hill and

THE LOT ON which the State House is erected. Containing about two acres formerly belonged to the estate of Peter Green, Esq., - On the north-east part of it stood the house of Capt. Peter Robertson, which house was sold to Mr. William Kent and moved to Pleasant Street where it still stands.

MARCH 11th, 1818. William A. Kent appointed on a Committee to visit the

SEPTEMBER 2, 1819. Richard Bradly was appointed an agent to settle or defend the suit commenced against the town of Concord by Ephraim Farnum, Jr. This Suit was to recover from the town the Value of a horse belonging to Mr. Farnum, hired to Col. William Kent to go to Boston, and which horse, with a chaise, run off a bridge, just north of the house of the late Dea. Wilkins in the time of a high freshet, and was drowned. Mr. Farnum failed to recover.

AT THE ANNUAL Meeting in March, 1821, upon recommendation of a Committee previously appointed, Consisting of Samuel Sparhawk, Charles Walker and William A. Keni, the town Voted to provide a book "for the purpose of entering therein all returns of roads."



MAY 28, 1824. On Tuesday morning, the 18th instant, at nine o'clock, the corner stone for the new brick meeting house now building in this town by the First Calvinistic Baptist Society of Concord. The house is located on the east side of State street, on land presented to the Society by the Hon. William A. Kent, about forty rods south of the State House.

Tur. 48th anniversary of American Independence was celebrated on Monday,

the 5th of June. An original Song by George Kent, Esq., was sung.

1826 — At the Annual town Meeting in March William A. Kent, Joseph Walker and Abel Hutchins Were chosen a "Committee to take into Consideration the subject of Selling the interest or right the town may have in the meeting-house."

In 1829 William A. Kent, Robert Davis and Joseph Low were appointed a Committee to invest the principal of the Parsonage fund in bank stock, or Such public Stocks as, in their judgement would be for the interest of the town. The Same Committee were authorized to make a Similar investment of the School and Literary Funds belonging to the town.

NAMES OF STREETS [1834].

The Street west of Green Street recently laid out through land of George Kent should be called Spring Street and shall extend from Pleasant Street northerly to Centre Street. The plot of ground appropriated by George Kent Esq. for a public Square Containing about five acres, lying between Merrinack and Rumford Streets, Shall be called Rumford Square. The committee appointed to name Streets were — William A. Kent, Abiel Walker and Timothy Chandler.

JUNE 22d [1825] Concord was honored by the presence of the immortal La Fayette. Great preparations were made for his reception. Met on the town line between Concord and Pembroke, he was addressed by the Hon William A Kent, Chairman of the Committee of arrangements as follows: . . During his sojourn in town the General was the guest of Hon. William A. Kent, at whose house a great number of ladies and gentlemen had the pleasure of a private introduction to him.

The first public Measures for a temperance Society in Concord were taken on Fast Day, April 1, 1830, by a meeting of the Old North Church on Thursday the 8th at the Town Hall a constitution was adopted, a Society organized and officers chosen. William Kent was chosen one of the executive Committee.

On Tuesday evening April 6th, 1830, a meeting was held at the Town Hall in Concord to consider the project of a railroad through this State and Vermont. Hon. William A. Kent was chosen chairman. The project was approved and a Committee appointed to correspond on the Subject, viz.: William A. Kent, Timothy Chandler, Dudley S. Palmer, Stephen Ambrose, Jeremiah Pecker, Joseph Low, George Kent, Samuel Coffin, Samuel Fletcher and Asa McFarland.

A PUBLIC DIRNER was given in Concord, by the Whigs of New Hampshire, on the 30th of September, 1834, the toasts were read by George Kent, Esq.

AT A SPECIAL TOWN MEETING, October 10, 1836, William A. Kent, Robert Davis and Joseph Low, having charge of the parsonage and school funds, were authorized to invest the same in two hundred shares of the Concord Railroad. The same Committee were empowered and directed, for and in behalf of the town, to subscribe for 500 shares of Concord Railroad stock, and to borrow a sum not exceeding \$30,000, at not more than six per cent interest, redeemable after 1845.

Special Meetino, June 15, 1839. Insane Hospital. Robert Davis, William A. Kent and Joseph Low were appointed a committee to secure said sum (income accruing from the surplus revenue of the United States, now received by the town.) William A. Kent was appointed on a committee to locate the site.

IN THE SUMMER OF 1835 George Thompson, a celebrated anti-slavery lecturer from England, came to this country, and in the month of August visited Concord. Sept. 4 a meeting was advertized to be holden at the Court House, to be attended by George Thompson and John G. Whittier. This notice produced

intense excitement.

Gen. Robert Davis, chairman of the board of selectmen, called on Georgs Kent, Esq., a friend of Mr. Thempson, and advised that the meeting should not be held. At the hour appointed persons of both parties began assemble at the Town Hall. Soon three men were seen approaching, of whom one was supposed to be Thompson. These three were immediately assailed by the multitude with tumultuous shouts. Dirt and gravel were thrown at them, and they were followed to the house of Col. William A. Kent when the people were assured that Thompson was not one of the number. Next the multitude—about two hundred—went to the house of George Kent, Esq., where Thompson was hospitably entertained. Aware of their approach, Thompson left the house, and Mr. Kent also withdrew, leaving the house in charge of Mrs Kent. Just at this time Gen. Davis arrived and ascertained that Thompson was not in the house, and that Mrs. Kent was sick, notified the people, and all moved off together.

WILLIAM A., 5 mar. 1st, in Hanover, Mass., May 3, 1792, Charlotte, youngest dau. of Rev. John and Rebecca Mellen, of Hanover, Mass., by whom all of his children were born. She was mar, by her father, and was sister of Prentiss Mellen, Chief Justice of Maine. She d. May 6, 1820, aged 52. He mar. 2nd, Margaret Tucker, a widow of Roxbury, Mass., who d. Feb. 28, 1833, aged 57. He retained his usual health until a week before his death, Apl. 7, 1840, from inflammation of the bowels. His first wife, Charlotte Mellen, was admitted to the 1st Cong. Ch. of Hanover, Mass. (her mother from the Church of Christ, Lancaster, 1784), Aug. 8, 1790. Her sister Mary mar. Dr. Nathl. Parker, of Salem, Mch. 12, 1787. Her mother d. Jany. 10, 1802, of asthma, aged 75. Her father, the Rev. John, b. Hopkinton, Meh. 14, 1722, grad. Harvard Coll. 1741, settled Sterling, Mass., then in Hanover, Mass., and d. Reading July 4, 1807. (See Church and Cemetery Records, Hanover, by Briggs.)

Moody Kent in his diary writes:

Mr. Mary Kent, the mother of Col. Wm. A. Kent was b. abt. 1737. She had 8 brothers one went to sea & died abroad at the age of 28, another was a Goldsmith & Jeweller and boarded in the same family 26 years, he d. at the age of 67 unmarried. The other was a brazier, mar. dau. of the late Dr. Rand of Cambridge or Charlestown & Sister of Dr. Rand of Boston whom I have seen. He had several (6) children to witone who died young and unmarried & whom I knew nothing about, David who is perhaps still living, Gen Austin the sheriff of Middlesex, was probably b. abt. 1774. he is rich & respectable & has never been married, Wm. Austin is a lawyer settled in Charlestown He was a junior at II. C while I was Freshman. I suppose he must be about 50 years old. b. about 1776. He once fought a duel & was wounded. Mrs. Brooks is now a widow & lives in Charlestown or somewhere in that region & has several children as I am told Mrs. Adams, the wife of Dr. Adams a physician lived when young at Concord, and is often named by Concord people. They aiways speak of her as

amiable & in all respects a worthy woman. She has several children I have seen

her but know not much about her.

"M" Kent was mar to . . . Kent about the year . . . and by him had 3 children, Huldah Ebenezer & William Austin Huldah is M" Evans whom I have known so long in Concord and W" Austin is the Col whom I have known as long. Ebenezer I never saw I believe he lived in Charlestown & died there since I came to Concord. He has been represented to me rich, to be a good husband & he probably died poor leaving several children but no wife Charles Little in Pittston Va is said to be a merchant Lucy was in Concord when I came here. She went to Virginia about 1810. Mary is M^{rs} . Porter in **Dover, and** Eliza is M^{rs} . Tucker lives in Boston and has a large family."



I give and bequeath unto my daughter Vesta Sprague, wife of George Sprague of Duzbury the feather bed that she now has in her possession. Fourth. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Susan Kent one feather bed. Fifth. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Lucy Robbins, wife of William A. Robbins of Boston one feather bed. Sixth. I give, bequeath and devise unto my daughter Susan Kent, a convenient right in my dwelling-house, and a comfortable support from my estate during her life, if she should need it over and above her own means of support. All the rest, residue and remainder of my estate both real and personal, I give, bequeath and devise unto my son, William M. Kent, with the understanding that he has the right to improve and care for his own benefit, and for the comfort of his parents. Lastly, I hereby appoint my said son, William M. Kent sole executor of this my last will and testament, and that he may not be required to give surety or sureties on his official bond.

BENJAMIN,⁵ son of Samuel,⁴ Samuel,³ Joseph,² born May 25, 1794, in that part of Somerville which was originally Cambridge. He grad. Harv. Coll. 1820, when he entered the Theological School, Cambridge, and was ordained June 7, 1826, as colleague with Rev. Dr. John Allyn, of Duxbury.

Extract from Sermon preached at the Ordination of The Rev. Benjamin KENT, as Associate Pastor with The Rev. John Allyn, D.D., in the Congregational Church in Duxbury, June 7, 1826, by Convers Francis, minister of Watertown. Text, 2 Corinthians, i. 24. "Not for that we have dominion over your faith, but are helpers of your joy."

"But from the general considerations suggested by the text, it is more than

time to turn to the thoughts, which belong more immediately to the present occasion. At the altar of the sanctuary, we hallow the tie, which binds together the pastor and the flock, - and may God make the union long, and bright, and happy. Our young friend, who is about to be stationed in this field of sacred duty, is not now for the first time brought to reflect on the obligations and the responsibleness of the Christian ministry. He has before thought of them much and anxiously; and he enters upon this consecrated relation with all that solicitude, which youth and inexperience may well be expected to feel at such an hour as this. But we are persuaded, he comes hither 'in the fulness of the blessing of the Gospel of Christ, prepared to give his best faculties, and his purest affections, an offering in the holy service of his Master. We trust that, animated by the willing kindness, the unfeigned respect of the people to whom his labors are now to be devoted; aided by the affection, the experience, and the wisdom of the associated pastor, who has stood before him, and will now stand with him in this place; and whose hands and heart he has come to strengthen; and — more than all — guided by light and girt with power from on high, he will find relief from every anxiety, solace in every trial, and a blessing on every effort. May God give him the portion of that servant, whom the joyful sentence, 'Well done,' shall finally welcome to reward and glory in the upper world.

'To the senior pastor, who has so long labored and watched for the welfare of his people, this must be a day of deep interest. It presents to him, we believe, 'a helper of his joy,' one who will lighten his burdens, diminish his cares, and

brighten the decline of life. . . . This Christian church and society cannot be insensible to the solemn interest, which the occasion has for them. The relation, in which they will stand to each of their pastors, is of a tender and sacred character. We cannot suppose, brethren, that your confidence, gratitude, and respect towards him, who has so long been with you in the work of the ministry, will decline. And your junior pastor, we doubt not, you will receive as 'the minister of God for good' to you. We congratulate you on the prospect of your connexion with one, whom we can with such heartfelt sincerity recommend to your confidence, and who, we have so many reasons to believe, will be a blessing to you. If you would make him happy, love and cherish religion; let him not spend life and grow old without seeing any fruit of his exertions: let him not carry with him to the bed of death the agonizing thought,

that he has lived and labored in vain."

The charge was given by John Allyn, D.D., of Duxbury. Extract from the charge: "My young friend, we are henceforth to labor together; and may God prosper our mutual efforts to strengthen the things which remain and are ready to die, and God grant you many years of usefulness and happiness. You must increase, but I must decrease. Having for some time felt my incompetency to discharge all the duties expected of a minister, and having wished for an associate, my satisfaction is this day completed by a connexion formed with one, whose general principles coincide with my own, the purity of whose motives I have no cause to doubt, and of whose friendship I entertain the fullest assur-. I have the strongest disposition, though not ability, to alleviate your burdens and facilitate your labors, and the most sanguine expectation that our mutual esteem and affection will increase with increasing intimacy. take great pleasure in making you acquainted with the members of this Society, and with the whole circle of those who have been the pleasant objects of my regard for many years; and henceforth there can be no greater joy to me than to see your children and mine walking in the truth. From this people may you have a like experience of kindness with myself, and a much larger experience of success. I congratulate myself on this occasion with the thought, that the good cause will be built up, and that I may have a few years more to witness your success, together with the improvement and happiness of this kind, candid, and generous people, from whom I have received so many proofs of affectionate regard. Unmingled good we are neither of us to expect in our mutual connexion. Occasional discrepancies may grow out of the dissimilarity of our minds, educated as we have been at very different periods, the interval between which has been marked by great changes of opinion and character; but I have the fullest reliance on your discretion to overlook any difference as to the best means, while we are perfectly agreed as to the ends to be pursued. I shall re-joice to see this house again filled under your acceptable ministry, and to witbeloved Society. And when the chief Shepherd shall appear, may you, my brother, receive a crown of glory that fadeth not away."

B. Loring, of Andover, then made an "Address to the People."

(In a Genealogy of the Bradford Family one Rev. Benj. Kent appears to mar. Eleanor, 1802.)

"Myles Standish probably built his house about the time of his first coming to Duzbury, or about the year 1632. It was occupied by him until his death in 1656. His son Alexander then succeeded to the estate who it is said built an addition to it, in which he kept a store; and in corroboration of this tradition, it may not be known, that leaden weights have been found in the remains of this part of the building. A few years ago, when discoverles were first made here by Mr. Kent, the foundation stones were nearly in their original positions. About twenty or more years ago Mr. Kent, then pastor of the church in the town, first opened the ground about the site. Many curiosities were found, a buccaneer

gunlock, a sickle, a hammer, a whetstone, a scythe wedge, a sword-buckle, other buckles, etc., and other things have been ploughed up in various parts of the town. Many of these curiosities are in the cabinet of the Rev. Benjamin Kent, whose museum, at the close of his labors in Duxbury, contained upwards of four thousand specimens, collected by many years' assiduous attention to the subject. Rev. Benjamin Kent was ordained as colleague to Dr. Allyn, on the 7th of June, 1826. After a short, but trying and very laborious ministry, he was obliged to ask his dismission, which was granted on the 7th of June, 1833. 'The time has not yet come when it would be becoming to speak of his faithful labors, among a people, who by him were much beloved, and from whose midst he was separated not without deep sorrow. To the unwearied labors of Mr. Kent, the town owed much for the establishment at that time of a High school, which chiefly through his instrumentality was commenced, and by his exertions a sum sufficiently large was raised for its maintenance, and teachers, eminently qualified for the duties of instructors, were procured. It was first under the charge of Rev. Dr. Geo. Putnam of Roxbury, who was succeeded by Mr. William Augustus Stearns, who has since been settled as pastor of the church at Cambridgeport."

Mr. Kent became a member of the Dorchester Antiquarian and Historical Society in 1857. He preached in Norton, Mass., the summer of 1851, as did also Charles Briggs. In 1833 Mr. Kent moved to Roxbury, where for several years he taught a private academy for young ladies. He was afterwards, for a number of years, Librarian of the Roxbury Atheneum. Mr. Kent was a great lover of antiquity. He ransacked garrets, collected many autographs and literary documents of the Pilgrims, and made several discoveries of interest. He d. Taunton, Aug. 5, 1859, aged 65, leaving a wife and four daughters.

SAMUEL,⁵ son of David,⁴ David,³ Joseph,² John,¹ was a shipbuilder at Scituate Harbor, Mass. He later blt. at So. Boston for Messrs. Lincoln & Wheelwright, being succeeded there by his brother-in-law, Capt. Noah Brooks. (See Briggs' History of Shipbuilding on North River.) He returned to Scituate, where he d. Aug. 5, 1829, aged 56 yrs., and he is buried in the cemetery on "the Hill" opp. the Unitarian Church and James Library at Norwell, formerly So. Scituate. He was a man of commanding presence, over six feet in height, straight, and well built. He mar. in 1799 Hannah, dau. of Capt. Noah Brooks, of So. Boston, who had one sister, wife of Wm. Bradford, of Kingston, and another, the wife of Hon. John Holmes, of Maine. She descended from William Brooks, who appears in Scituate, 1644.







NOAH BROOKS, 6 b. 1806; was a prominent shipwright of So. Boston. He is described as a large and impressive man, being over six feet tall, and of fine proportions. Before he married he made one trip to Europe. He d. Jan'y 19, 1861, aged 55, and is buried in Augusta, Me., where he went to reside before his second marriage, being united with the South Congregational Church of Augusta in 1843. His 2d wife, who was Mary Ann Pettingill, of Augusta, whom he mar, 1840, became a member in 1842. He mar. 1st, Elizabeth Ellms, dau. of Josiah Dunham, who was b. 1815, and d. Sept. 27, 1838, aged 23 years. She is buried with her eldest daughter at Forest Hills Cemetery, Mass. He was one of the first Aldermen of Boston, and during this period the most influential man of the peninsula. The interests of So. Boston never lacked advocacy while he held a position in the City Government. A recent writer says of him: "He was thoroughly democratic in his habits and instincts. I think he was the most unselfish man I ever knew, and very strong in his friendships."





GEORGE, son of William A., grad. Dartmonth Coll. with A.M. in 1814. He studied law and adm. to the bar 1817. He settled in Concord, where he was Cashier of the Concord Bank in 1821. In 1828 he represented the town at the General Court. He was a trustee of Dartmonth College for several years, resigning in 1840. In 1832 he delivered the Phi Beta Kappa oration. (One George Kent was schoolmaster in Dist. No. 5.) George was Editor and part proprietor of the "N.H. Statesman and Concord Register," a semi-weekly paper started in Concord in May, 1842. Under President Lincoln he was Consul at Valencia, Spain. When 82 years of age he was clerk in the

Treasury Department at Washington.

George Kent mar, a lady of means. He had a fund of political knowledge dating back twenty years and more, and gloried in his memory of political events. He lived a very quiet life, varying little from his beaten track, both in business and social pursuits, year after year. In 1833 he was chosen a deacon of the Orthodox Church after declining the nomination. About 1834 he had accumulated quite a large property, and during the wild speculations of 1835 he, with others, purchased lands in Maine and made many thousands of dollars. At Concord he bought the Green estate for \$5,000. He sold half of it for \$10,000 and retained the balance. In July, 1834, Mrs. Kent became quite feeble and he took her to Hampton His income at this time was large, and he gave much . time to and joined the Anti-slavery Party, being drawn into it, so it is said, by his wife, her sisters, N. P. Rogers, and Geo. When the academy was built in Concord some illfeeling existed between the Orthodox and Unitarians as to who should have control, but it was finally settled. Mr. Kent took a prominent part. He was fond of conversing with traders, farmers, stage-drivers, and speculators, especially when about 40 yrs. of age. In 1835 Mrs. Kent had recovered her health and good spirits, seeming to enjoy the world and her husband's riches highly. There was no house in the town furnished more expensively or in better taste. Both George and Wm. A. Kent spent most of their time during the latter part of their lives in Concord at the bank, in "elegant leisure."

George 6 mar. Lucia Ann, dan. of Hon. Daniel Farrand of Burlington, Vt., a decided abolitionist, with unusual energy of character. During the excitement of 1835 she showed her decision of character by taking a colored woman to her pew in church. When her house was assailed in search of George

Thompson, Mrs. Kent, although in feeble health, boldly met the assailants at the door, and assured them Thompson was not there.

He was admitted as Counsellor in the Supreme Court in 1827, which year he was also appointed Chief Justice of the Court of Sessions. He formed a partnership with Judge Jonas Cutting in 1831. "Colby" conferred the honorary degree of LL.D. on him in 1821. In 1828-29 he was sent to the *Legislature* from his district. In 1829 he delivered the Fourth of July oration at Bangor. He was elected Mayor of Bangor in 1836 and 1837, and was Governor of the State of Maine in 1838, being a Whig. He was also governor He was Trustee of the Insane Hospital. 1842 made a commissioner by the State Legislature, representing the State in the negotiations of the Ashburton Treaty at Washington. In 1849 he was appointed by President Zachary Taylor Consul to Rio de Janeiro. In 1859 he was appointed to a scat upon the bench of the Supreme Court of Maine, holding office until 1873, when he left the bench and went to Europe. Among those who own lots in Mt. Auburn Cemetery, Mass., are Edw. Kent, Chas. C. Kent, Mary C. Kent, and Alvah B. Kent. An incident of his life in Augusta is mentioned in the local history: At 10.30 P.M. one night a fire broke out in a clothing store; the then Governor Kent was in town and present at the fire; he "worked like a Trojan at the brakes of one of the engines, and a part of the time in wielding the heavy fire hook."

He is described in July, 1833, as being 31 yrs. old, large, "fut and healthy," full of vivacity and good humor, temperate, and

taking a lively interest in passing scenes; a favorite at the bar, pleased with his profession, enjoying life, and with a fair prospect of becoming eminent. In Aug., 1834, he had business transactions with Moody Kent at Concord.

The 44th was assigned to Longstreet's Corps, Army of Northern Virginia. At the battle of Selma, Apl. 2, 1865, he served as surgeon. In 1652 the parliament resolved that this should be sold, and it was purchased by John Trenchold. On the Restoration it came again into the king's hands, who granted a lease to Lord Moore. Some years after it was granted by lease from the Duke of Cornwall to Mr. Kent, distiller, who had a large distillery thereon.

JOSEPH KENT¹ appears in Dedham, Mass., in 1645, where he arrived from England in company with his brother Joshua, who had previously resided there. There was a Joseph in New Hampshire, 1689. There can be but little doubt that *Elizabeth Harder* of Braintree was connected with this family, as is shown in her will, viz.:

WILL OF Elizabeth Harder, I, 4th, 1664. I Elizabeth Harder of Buainthee, doe make this my last will, God having given mee only one Daughter, which is my only Childe. I: doe give and bequeath my whole estate, mooveable & Imooveable unto her, her heirs & assigns forener, excepting such legacyes as are heerafter Specified. & doe Constitute & ordain her my sole executrix of this my Last will & Testament & Doe Intreate my Louing Friends, William Needham & Samuel Tomson, of Brantrye to be my Overseers. COURT ACTION. 1675. Joseph Kent of Swansey complained against Nicholas Tanner of the same town for detaining and hindering of him of his right of what he was attested to in Swansey; and for withholding a copy of the records of his attestation notwithstanding authority against it. The jury find for the

plaintiff. Samuell Dunham being one of the jury.

Court Oudeas. June 7, 1681, Joseph Kent was mentioned to be propounded to be a freeman. June 6, 1682, Joseph Kent was made a freeman. July 7, 1681: "Forasmuch as there have bine some differences lately amongst the inhabitants of the towne of Swansey, respecting the laying out of lands in that towneshipe, this Court doth heerby rattify and confeirme whatsoever the former comitty have don respecting the pmises, and have made choise of Capt. John Browne, Leift Willam Ingraham, Sergeant Hugh Cole, Samuell Luther, Joh Winslow, and Joseph Kent, to be a comittee in the townes behalfe for the regulateing of matters in difference concerning lands alreddy layed out in that townshipe, and what defects doe or shall appear unto the said comittee above named, shalbe made up of the lands undevided, and for any further devision of lands in the towne, that are to be devided, that it may be don and yformed by the propriators, they haveing liberty by this order to choose a comittee for the lawing out of land according to the three fold ranke."

"In reference unto sixteen or seaventeen bushells of Indian corne, taken from Joseph Kent, of Swansey, and improved for the releife of some souldiers, in the time of the late Indian warrs, this Court have ordered that it, or the vallue

thereof, to be repayed by the Treasurer."

Charles V. Chapin, of the City Registrar's office, City Hall, Providence, R.I., has the following to say regarding Joseph:

We know that Joshua went to England in 1644, and returned next year with his two brothers. After that date John Kent is mentioned several times in the records previous to 1673, when he was received into the church at Charlestown. Joseph Kent is mentioned in the tax-rate of 1659. In 1664 Elizabeth Hardier of Braintree left 10 shillings each to John and Joseph Kent, and 20 shillings each to Joshua Kent's three daughters. From this we may reasonably infer that Joshua, John, and Joseph of Dedham held a similar relationship to her. But we have no record of Joseph in Dedham after 1659. The first we hear of Joseph is in Block Island. This island was settled in 1661, largely by Braintree people. When Joseph went to Block Island I do not know. Shellield, in his history, says: " Joseph Kent of Swansca joined the settlement in 1661 or 1662." What his authority is I do not know. I have examined the Block Island records, which are in bad condition, and can find nothing. He was certainly in Block Island May 4, 1664, when he petitioned the legislature. The fact that this Joseph named his sons Joseph, Samuel, and Joshua, and that John Kent of Charlestown named his sons John, Joshua, Joseph, Samuel, and Ebenezer, would be some indication of a relationship to each other and to Joshua. I also find in Plymouth Col. Records that in 1681 Joseph Kent was appointed guardian of Joseph Cahoone, and that in 1690 Hannah, dau. of John Kent of Charlestown, married Joseph Cahoone. Perhaps Hannali became acquainted with him in the house of her uncle Joseph.

Baylies gives Joseph Kent as the signer of a covenant in Swansea in 1669, but I doubt if he was there as early as that. The latter names on that document



probably came later than the date of drawing it up. The Swansea records say Joseph Kent was admitted an inhabitant 15 Dec., 1673, and his name frequently

appears in the records after that, but not before.

Arnold in his History of State of Rhode Island, Vol. 1, p. 306, says: "May, 1664. The first regular assembly, as established by the Charter, met at Newport in May. The affairs of Block Island were definitely settled at this session. Three messengers, James Sands, Thomas Terry, and Joseph Kent, appeared from the Island to signify their obedience to His Majesty's will."

There appears to be some question as to who Desire, the wife of Samuel, was. She appears to have been mixed up with the family of her son-in-law, Samuel Gray. I give a few of the interesting items that have appeared in relation to this question:

WILMINGTON, N.C., Nov. 17, 1860. Editors N.E. H. & G. Register: When at the North, in the early part of the fall, I visited the ancient burying-ground at Barrington, R.I., on the point of land opposite Warren. On one of the gravestones is the following inscription:

"M" Desire Kent, Wife of M' Samuel Kent, of Barrington was the first
English woman's Gran daughter on New England. Died Feby 8 AD. 1762 aged

about 94 years."

And on another, next to the above, is this inscription: " Ensign Samuel Kent, who died 1737 aged 70.

You will of course understand that this Mrs. Desire Kent was the granddaughter of Mary Chilton. She was the daughter of Edward Gray, who married the daughter of John Winslow (brother of Edward), who married Mary Chilton. You are also aware that much controversy has arisen as to who was the first person that landed from the "Mayflower" on Plymouth Rock.

Now, I have never understood that the descendants of Mary Chilton claimed that she was the first person who landed, but the first woman of the " Mayflower's" passengers. And this is no unreasonable supposition, to say nothing of tradition. I find the question was fairly argued in favor of the claims of Mary Chilton of having been the first woman who stepped upon the rock in Russell's "Pilgrim Memorials," third edition, 1860; and the inscription on Mrs. Desire



Kent's tombstone, made, I suppose, very soon after her death, certainly strengthens the position there assumed. As a descendant of Mary Chilton, through the Mrs. Kent referred to, I feel a personal interest in the matter, therefore send you this memorandum.

Kent. In the Register, Vol. xv., p. 12, a correspondent states that Desire Kent (widow of Samuel) was the granddaughter of Mary Chilton (who married John Winslow) and daughter of Edward Gray. This statement must be wrong, for according to good authority Desire (the daughter of Edward Gray) married Nathaniel Southworth, and furthermore the age as given makes it evident on comparing with the records that it is not the same individual. I have obtained a record elsewhere of the death of Desire Kent stating that she died Feb. 8, 1763, aged 90 years, lacking a few days. This record I consider as giving the age more exact than the inscription on the gravestone as quoted by your correspondent. My reasons for writing are: 1. To correct the statement made. 2. Because I am somewhat interested to know who were the parents of the said Desire Kent, and I thought if you would print a few lines calling for information some one might respond who possessed the desired knowledge.

The following are from the Boston "Evening Transcript":

Who was Desire Kent, widow of Samuel Kent, who died Feb. 8, 1762-3? Her gravestone in Barrington, R.I., states that she was the "First Englishwoman's granddaughter on New England," whatever that may mean. She is said to have been the granddaughter of Mary Chilton, but that cannot be. I think that she was the daughter of Thomas Cushman and Ruth Howland of Plymouth.

C. V. C. thinks that Desire Kent was the daughter of Thomas Cushman and Ruth Howland. According to the Cushman genealogy that cannot be, since they had but one child, Robert, born Oct. 4, 1664. By his second wife, Abigail Fuller, he had four sons. I am a descendant in the seventh generation from Thomas, the father of this Thomas Cushman.

ing It the Town Clerk and Divers other Princaple Inhabitants then Declared to the Selectimen that their Proceedings was Contery to Law, The aboves. Luke Thurston Declared Constning the sd Questioned persons that they Claimed as their Right to vote and he knew no Law to the Contery, for the Law was onte, The Selecttmen Instead of Regulating the meeting Suffered all persons to Croud up to the Box where the votes ware put in, In Greate Disorder and Confusion withoute Trying them by the st Lists that ware objected against (Except some few persons) And the st Sellectmen alowed some of them to vote when Tryed by sd. Lists, and found not Quallified, which friegular Procedings of the sd Selecttmen Caused very Greate Disturbance in the meeting. The Town Clerk and Divers others of the Princaple Inhabitants affors⁴ Requsted That the votes so Irregularly and unfairly put into the Box might be put oute againe, and the meeting Regulated according to Law, that there might be a Legall and fair Choice. But the sd Selectimen utterly Refusing all Attepts of that Nature, Turned over the Box Sorted the Votes, and Declared that the set Luke Thurston was chosen Moderator aboute Twenty or Thirty of the Inhabitants affost then objectted against the Legallity of the Choice and Desired the sd. Selectimen, that since there was but Two men voted for for moderator (Except Two Single Votes) the matter might be Desided by Numbering the Poles or any other way Propper to Try a Choice fairly And Further Told them, that if they would Regulate that Choice they would Joine with them in the Choice of Town officers otherwise they would withdraw from the meeting. But the Selecttmen Refused so to Do And the st Luke Thurston Assuming the Place of Modcrator who with a party went on in such Irregular manner Suffering persons to Vote not Quallified by Law. Whereupon your Petitioners with others being the Greatest Number of Legall voters then Present (as we appehend) withdrew from the meeting, which Proceedings of the sd. Sellectimen and moderator your Petitioners cannot but think are altogether unreasonable and conterey to Law and have a Tendancy to Bring Greate Confusion on the Towne, the Cunstables and Divers other Town officers Refusing to Take the oath of their Respective offices alledging the Illegality of the meeting for their Excuse Your Pettitioners therefore Humbly pray that your Excelency and Honours would Take the Premises Into your wise Consideration and Supersede the Proceedings of sd. meeting and make nul and voide the choice of the Town officers then so unfairly made, and Give order for another meeting that so there might be opportunity for a Regular and fair Choice, or other wise Direct as In your Greate wisdom shall be tho! fit and Convennant, and your Pettitioners as In Duty bound Shall ever pray Joseph Kenl







THOMAS KENT, b. in England, emigrated with his wife to Gloucester, Mass., prior to 1643. He had a house and land near the burying ground in the West Parish, sometimes known as Chebacco, and now as Essex. He may have been connected with Richard of Newbury who received a grant of land also near Chebacco river in 1635. He appears among a list of 82 settlers, all the known proprietors of land in Gloucester from the time of its settlement to the close of 1650. Gloucester was probably chosen by these proprietors on account of its value as a fishing post. The waters of Massachusetts Bay have for their extreme northern barrier the rocky promontory of Cape Ann, extending from the mainland nine miles, being about five miles in width and jutting boldly out into the open sea; once heavily wooded with valuable timber, but with a barren soil and cold cli-One would think that these conditions were little adapted to attract the agriculturist Thomas Kent to these shores.

of William Meades, which, in 1655, he recorded to his brother Samuel; together they bought of Thomas Prince, in 1657, 18 acres of land on the west side of Little River, where a house and land was situated that Thomas, in 1667, sold to Richard Dike. " It is probable, judging from the names in this petition and from the allotments of lands, that most, if not all, of the old Ipswich grantees had taken advantage of the privilege accorded to them in the regrant. . . . were all from Ipswich, while ... Samuel Kent ... were Essex county men and probably associated with the Ipswich men in the original grant."



On the destruction of the town of Brookfield Samuel moved to Suffield, Conn., in 1678. On Sept. 8, 1686, he sold his house lot and rights in Brookfield to John Scott, Sen., of Suffield, whose sons Ebenezer and William, in 1703, sold the same to Thos. Barnes of Brookfield. But should the House Come in with the Board by giving a Bounty or Premium, the undertakers would not be well able to go on with & perfect what they proposed & are cujoined to do, to entitle them to a Reward; And altho' the Encouraging the Manufacturing the Produce of this Countrey may greatly tend to bring the Inhabitants out of Debt. Yet should a Bounty only be given for the bringing forward such manufactories. The Treasury will stand charged annually with Considerable Sums of money which will be a means rather of enhaussing than lessening the Debts of the Province, by Vast Increase of the publick Debts & needless Burthen put on this People. 

The records set forth that about this time [1778] John Kent was chosen "Vendew" master "to Sel the Stel Sent to the town from ye Bord of War."

John Kent was Selectman in 1778, 1782, 1783, 1784, 1785.

In 1805 the Baptists living in Southwick, who had been attending church in Suffield, Conn., determined to have preaching at home, and accordingly organized a Society whose original members were Mehitabel and Deborah Kent, Elizabeth Kent, et al.

West Springfield. Delegates to Constitutional Conventions, 1787: James Kent. First Baptist Church. J. H. Kent served this church as paster from May 1, 1864, to March, 1866.

Sonthwick. The settlement of Southwick proper did not begin until 1706, when it was incorporated as a district. Previous to that year it was a portion of Westfield. Among the early settlers were John Kent.... From the town records, under date October, 1781, it is learned that the settlers in Southwick at that time included Josiah Kent, Ezra Kent, John Kent.

The only public graveyard of the town of Southwick is found about one mile south of Southwick Village. Among those of the early settlers whose graves are in this city of the dead, Ezra Kent, 1811, aged 86; Elizabeth his wife, 1803, aged 72.

The Boston alarm of September, 1774, had set over forty thousand soldiers all through New England on the march for the day as promptly as might have been the case in our days of telegraph. But even more marvellous was the speed with which the news of the battle of Lexington the next year got to the Connecticut river. The British soldiers left Boston before daybreak on the 19th of April, 1775, and on the 20° CAPT. ELHIU KENT, within an hour's notice, was at the head of a Suffield company of fifty-nine men and a provision wagon rushing for Springfield, where they took supper and pressed on at once.



He held successively the offices of Master in Chancery, Recorder of the City of New York, Judge of the Supreme Court, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chancellor of the State of New York. He retired from the Chancellorship at 60 yrs. of age, in accordance with the State Constitution. He then became Professor of Law in Columbia College, and gave to his profession his "Commentaries on American Law," which have become a necessary reference to every lawyer and a textbook in every law school in the Union. The following letter speaks for itself:

Honolulu, Oct. 18, 1839.

To His Majesty Kammahamaha III.:

The American people have heard much of the king, chiefs, and people of the Sandwich Islands. It is a high gratification to the writer that he now has the pleasure of visiting your majesty's possessions, and to mark the advance of

institutions of which he has heard much and with which he has not been disappointed by his inspection of them since his arrival at this place. Your majesty will believe me when I assure you that, at home, the missionaries to your possessions have the confidence of the American nation; and that the American government gives your majesty its cordial wishes for the advance of every valuable institution tending to the promotion of intelligence, morals, and the Christian religion among your subjects. That I may evince to your majesty my own feelings of interest, I herewith beg you to accept "Kinki's Commentances," a work in four volumes, which contain the collected knowledge of one of our greatest men and most able jurists, who has, for his leavning and his worth, the confidence and admiration of the people of the United States. The Rev. M. Richards, who I am happy to learn has accepted the appointment as your majesty's interpreter, will find these volumes of great service in illustrating the great and general principles of the laws of civilized nations; and be enabled, so far as they may be applicable in forming the jurisprudence of your majesty's government, to present to your majesty's consideration the interesting subjects on which these volumes treat. Most assuredly and cordially, and with great respect your friend,

Westford, "Forge Village." On the west side of Beaver Brook, near the bridge, was located a house known as the Cogswell place. It was once a hospital for small-pox patients. Following the road to the village we find the next house called the Kent place, at the corner of the road leading to Westford Centre, where was also a blacksmith's shop. Next was the l'atch house, occupied by Isaac Patch and Elisha Kent. The latter had two wives and five children; the last wife being a sister of Asa Wright.



CAMP NEAR SHARPSBURG, MD., Sept. 22, 1862.

DEAR MOTHER:

As this is our third day of rest, I must try to write you a letter after so long a silence. I haven't had time to write before since I left the hospital, only just enough to let the folks know I was alive. Have marched every day—been in three or four battles and skirmishes, etc., which I call rather rough on a sick man, but my health and strength are steadily improving, I think, so I shall be able to go through the campaign if I escape the bullets. I was in the battle on the (South) Mountain Sunday evening, was out skirmishing pext morning before breakfast; after breakfast I heard where there was a squad of rebs, and taking a couple of boys with me went and got them, nine in all. Some of them were inclined to show fight, but when they found Sharpe's rifles bearing on them they concluded to surrender. We followed the retreating rebels that day till we got into an artillery fight; next day we had a skirmish just at night. Wed. morning they got us up at daylight, and marched us to the battlefield, and didn't we got a hot breakfast that morning! We were engaged about four hours, tho' it did not seem fifteen minutes to me. We had been fighting in line some time when the Adjutant caught the colors and rushed ahead, saying, "They are running, come on, boys!" Quickly as I could gather up a box of cartridges I had lying on the ground loose, I followed, and was so busy loading and firing I saw nothing of a brigade of rebels coming down on our left till I heard a Licut, sing out, "Retreat, boys, we are surrounded!" Upon that I started to go back to the cornfield through which we had advanced, but I found I was so lame and tired I could hardly walk. I tell you, the excitement of the battlefield will tire a man beyond anything I ever experienced. I could see nothing of the Adjt., but on looking around again I saw the rebs coming down on us in the form of a V. Just then our colors dropped, the bearer being wounded; I turned back into the storm and picked up the colors and the gun and brought them off in safety. Then we rallied a few men round the old flag and took our stand behind Battery B. The battery boys were afraid they would lose their guns, and wanted to limber up and be off, but we told them their guns should not be taken, and General Gibbon put in a double charge of grape and sighted the gun himself. When that charge went into the ranks of the rebels it lifted a whole windrow of them twelve feet into the air. I saw whole bodies, arms, legs, and all sorts of fragments above the corn for a moment, but they, the rebs, stopped coming towards us about that

time. That discharge carried whole rails from the fence clear into their ranks. As I was coming off the field a solid shot came bounding over the fence into the road. I stopped just in time to save myself; the next step would have been in its track. I was out on the battlefield yesterday and counted about eighty dead where we fired on them. One of the prisoners said Sharpe's rifles were too sure for them. I fired thirty-six rounds as coolly as if shooting at a target. Should have fired more, but the officers told us to save our ammunition as the rebs were saving theirs. We piled a perfect windrow under the fence, where they lay, but it cost us dear. Our Col. and Sergt.-Major were wounded; our Adjt, 2nd Lieut. of our Co., and 1st Lieut. of Co. B killed. Capt. of Co. A and Lieut. commanding Co. C and Lieut. of Co. B wounded. Two men killed and ten wounded. out of the seventeen in our Co. who went into battle. But the Iron Brigade stood its ground till reënforcements came up, and now hardly numbers 300 guns. An officer told the Col. commanding our brigade he never saw men stand against such odds and in such a fire, and it was a shame if they put us in again, but we are good for twice our number yet. My sheet is full, so once more good-by. From your aff. son,

DARIUS EDMUND, son of Moses, Moses, Cephas, was b. at Dorset, Vt., Feb. 22, 1813, and in 1823 the family moved to St. Lawrence Co., N.Y. From his boyhood he was thoroughly disciplined in the school of poverty incident to those pioneer times. As he grew to manhood he became very active, and most of his life was closely identified with the business interests of northern New York, being prominent in agricultural and real-estate transactions which gave him an extensive acquaintance through St. Lawrence Co. and vicinity, where he was

known to nearly every inhabitant. He was a man of untiring industry, of remarkable energy and unremitting zeal, and he was eminently successful. His most distinguishing characteristics were undoubtedly a certain spirit of self-reliance and indifference to the sentiments of such as might disregard his ways of thinking or distrust his methods. In the prime of life it was seldom that his judgment failed him, or that he undertook an enterprise that miscarried. His strong personality led him to disregard the conventionalities of society. Pronounced in his dislike for pretension, whether in religion, politics, dress, or social distinction, he was wont to place the real above the fanciful, character above reputation, substance above show, virtue above moral vencer. In 1842 he mar. June Green of Hopkinton, N.Y., a benevolent, loving, and faithful woman, who d. Dec. 24, 1884. His home was at Potsdam, N.Y., for many years, but during the last twenty years of his life he resided at Westfield, N.Y., where he died at his residence on First street Mch. 2, 1886, at 73 years of age.

LUCIAN HERVEY, son of Moses, Moses, Cephas, mar. at Lawrence, N.Y., June 9, 1849, Mary Fay McEwen, who was b. Feb. 20, 1824, at Hinesburgh, Vt. The paternal uncestors of Lucian were a hardy, long-lived race of people, whose names have been closely identified with the history of New England from the time of the early English colonies. But while such a staunch paternity bequeathed to the subject of this sketch a generous legacy of qualities of heart and brain, by some mischance the wheel of fortune east to his lot the impediments of poverty and a frail physique with which to overcome the many adverse elements which thickly beset his path. When but six years of age he was taken with his parents, under trying circumstances, to St. Lawrence Co., N.Y., the journey being made in the old-style overland manner by ox-team, in the middle of a severe winter, and through an almost unbroken wilderness. Among the misfortunes of this two-hundred mile journey overland were the loss of household goods and narrow escape from freezing. At their destination, after settling in a small aboriginal hamlet consisting of ten rude log dwellings, the destitute family began the struggle for existence. the constraints of physical disability on the part of the parents, with the barren condition of the locality in which they pitched their misfortunes, and especially the embarrassments attendant upon the lack of means with which to get a start, this struggle

amounted to little less than a mortal combat. So much, indeed, were the manual services of Lucian and his brother in demand that their only opportunity for schooling was during the severest winter weather; but these opportunities were in no way neglected — everything in the way of good books which they were able to obtain being eagerly studied. After becoming of age Mr. Kent acquired, by his own efforts, an academical education, and was thereby enabled to maintain a livelihood by teaching — a profession which he followed for many winters with marked success. He was married in the summer of 1849. Since this time Mr. Kent has followed exclusively the occupation of farming. He resides, 1897, at Westfield, N.Y., and though in his eighty-second year leads a very active life, both physically and intellectually. Besides doing a great amount of manual labor, consistent with early habits, he improves his spare intervals reading newspapers, magazines, and the latest works of philosophy and science, being a constant student of the leading questions of the day and always abreast of the times, which was well illustrated by his latest poetical work, "Financial Apparitions," written during the recent presidential campaign. For the source of Mr. Kent's inspiration as a poet the reader is referred to his preface to "Sunshine and Storm."

Dr. Cutler. at that time president of this university, wrote: "I have no better man here than Henry Kent." engaged in teaching for a time, and afterward was a member of the firm of Hermon L. Kent & Co. his brothers he was engaged in the manufacture and sale of paper for a number of years. He was a com-

petent and successful business man, and travelled

extensively through the United States upon business and pleasure. That he had a decided taste for literature is attested by the book entitled "Graphic Sketches of the West," written by him, and published about the time of his death. He died very unexpectedly at Canon City, Col., June 25, and was buried at his home in Westfield, N.Y., Sunday, June 29, 1890.

Here was interred the body of William Son of Richard Kent Gent, on the 12 day of April in the 40th year of his age Anno Dom. 1724 Her lyes the body of Eliz, daughter of William Kent of Iekles Hall Gent, who dy'd the 1st and was bury'd y°. 2st. day of September A.D. 1727 aged 11 years and 4 months

RICHARD KENT, senior (maltster), arrived in Ipswich, Mass., in 1634, in the "good shipp Mary & John" of London, Robt. Sayres, master. Having on Meh. 26, 1633, taken the oath of supremaey and allegiance to pass for New England. On Meh. 4, 1634, he was made a freeman; and in May, 1635, moved to Newbury. The same year he was allowed to build "another wear" on Chebacco river and enjoy the profits, and was one of seven men chosen to manage the affairs of the town. He resided on Kent street with his wife Emma, and d. June 11, 1654. His wife d. June 10, 1677. One of the bequests in his will reads as follows:

"Also I give the first Salmon that is eaught in my wier yearly to Mr. Noyes, and the second to Mr. Rogers till my son be nineteen years of age," etc., and after that his son might do as he "saw good."

Other papers of record relating to Richard Kent, senior, I give below:

The Settlers passed up the Sound [Plum Island Sound] till they reached the beautiful Quascacuquen, as the Indians called it, which the early records call the "Great River," and we in later times the river Parker in honor of the first minister. At a short distance up, making in the whole passage not over five miles, they landed on the north bank, just below where the hridge stands to-day; and there, tradition has it. Nicholas Noyes, a consin to Mr. Parker, and whose descendants are many at this day, and not a few distinguished men, first leaped to the shore. The little company consisted of twenty-two men, their wives and children, and servants. They were Mr. Henry Sewall and his servants—he was the rich man of the party, and had abundant cattle: William Moody, his wife, and four sons; Anthony Short, Henry Short and wife; Mr. John Spencer, Mr. Nicholas Easton, his wife, and son John; Richard Kent, Sr., and Stephen Kent, with their wives; Mr. Thomas Parker, &c., &c.

January 18th, 1638, It was ordered that Richard Knight, James Brown and Richard Kent shall gather up the first payment of the meeting house rate and the towne rate within one fourteenight on the penalty of six shillings and eight pence apiece (Town Records).

M' Bradstreete, M' Dudley, Innior, Capt Dennison, M' Clarke, of Newberry, M' Woodbridge, M' Battye, M' Batter M' Winsley, Hen: Bilye, Giles Firman, Rich'd Kent & John Sauders are allowed (upon their petition) to hegin a plantation at Merrimack and shall have liberty to associate to them Such others as they can agree upon; & if any difference fall out amongst the planters about the Seate of their towne, or receiving of other associates, or alotnient of lauds, that then this Court or the Counsell Shall not order in it—

ON THE 15TH MAY 1649 the town of Newbury petitioned the General Court for a grant of the whole island (Plum Island); the town stated in their petition that: " The substance of our desire is that, if, after you have heard and perused what we say, that in right Plum Island belongs not to us, yet out of your Just favor it may be granted to us to relieve our pinching necessities without which we see no way to continue or Subsist, Our fears were occasioned by a petition which was preferred to the last General Court for it, Our apprehensions of our right to it are, First, because for three or four miles together there is no channel betwixt us and it. Second, because at low water we can go dry to it over many places in most with carts and horses, which we usually do, being necessitated so to do since our gift to Rowley on the Court's request and promise that we should have anything in the Court's power to grant, Thirdly, because the Court's order gives all lands to dead low water mark, not exceeding one hundred rods, to towns or persons, where any lands do so horder, In many places Plum Island is not ten rods, at no place one hundred rods from low water mark, Fourth, because we can only improve it without damage to our neighbouring plantation, which none can do without much damage to your petitioners, if not to the ruining of both the meadow and corn of your petitioners and so forth. The premises considered, we hope (and doubt not) this honorable Court will see just what grounds to answer on request and confirm the Island to our town, and we shall always, as in duty we are bound, pray and so forth

In answer to this petition, the Court, October seventeenth, 1649, granted two-fifths of the island to Newbury, two-fifths to Ipswich, and one-fifth to Rowley.

The lots of land in the new town were laid out, and the town records, under date of Jan. 11, 1644, say: "It is ordered [&c &c &c] as hereinunder by names and figures appear: Richard Kent Sr."

The only printed genealogies of the Kent families that I have found are in a volume entitled the "Historical and Genealogical Record of the First Settlers of Colchester County," Nova Scotia. In this volume is the family of Alex. Kent of Truro, an officer in the British Army. Also the descendants of James Kent of Halifax, who was b. in Alloa, Scotland, in 1749, and whose descendant, William, b. Apl. 27, 1822, moved to the U.S.

Cyrus Kent appears with rank of Private on Muster Roll of Capt. John Pierce's Co. of the 15th Mass. Regt., Col. Timothy Bigelow, for Jan.—June, 1780, dated Robinson's Farms, July 27, 1780; enlisted March 1, 1777, for three years; discharged March 1, 1780.

Cyrus Kent appears in a Descriptive List of men raised to reinforse the Continental Army for the term of six months, agreeable to resolve of June 5, 1780. Age 30 years. Stature 5 ft. 4 in. Complexion Negro. Residence Boston. Arrived at Springfield July 2, 1780. 3d Division marched to camp July 3, 1780, under command of Lieut. Daniel Frye of the Artifleers.

Cyrus Kent appears in a descriptive list of enlisted men. Age 30 years. Stature 5 ft. 5 in. Complexion Black. Residence Boston. List dated Boston, July 22, 1780. Term of enlistment 3 months. Capt. Wise's Co., Col. Edward Proctor's (Boston) Regt. Marched under Brig. Gen. John Fellows.

Cyrus Kent appears with rank of Private on Muster and Pay Roll of Capt. Alexander Hodgdon's Co., Col. Ebenezer Thayer's Suffolk Co. Regt., for service at Rhode Island on the alarm of. . . . Time of enlistment July 26, 1780. Time of discharge Oct. 30, 1780. Time of service 3 mos. 8 days, 3 days' travel included. 3 mos. levies, raised to reënforce Continental Army.

CHAPTER VI.

RICHARD KENT, JR., OF IPSWICH, 1634, NEWBURY, 1635, WHO DIED WITHOUT ISSUE.

RICHARD KENT, JR., arrived in Ipswich in 1634 in the same ship with *Richard*, senior, who was possibly his father or cousin. He removed to Newbury in 1635 and soon was joined by his brother *James*, whose only son *John* inherited Rich., Jr.'s, estate on Kent's Island. Richard, Jr., was one of the early proprietors of Newberry and one of the *grantees* of the town of Salisbury, but had no land assigned him there. He was accompanied from England by his wife, Jane, who d. June 26, 1674; he then mar. Joanna, willow of Nicholas Davidson of Churlestown, Jan. 6, 1674–5. He d. Nov., 1689, without issue. The following papers give some idea of the man, and that possibly he came from the ISLE of WIGHT:

WILL OF NATHANIEL BRADING in which he mentions his father, Mr. William Brading of the Isle of Wight in the parish of Godsall. "Whereas my uncle Mr. Richard Kent of the parish of Newbury in the Colony of New England hath by his letters being in the Custody of my abovesaid father made me an assurance of the inheritance of his estate after his decease. I do therefore in ease of his decease bequeath that portion of estate whatsoever it shall be unto my brothers James and John Brading and my sister Ruth Brading, &c. &c. Dated in Augustin Bay in the Isle of Madagascar this sixteenth of November Anno. Dii 1645 Proved 1 July 1648."

The Names of Such Passengers as took the Oathes of Supremacy, & Allegiance to pass for New England in the "Mary & John" of London, Robert Sayres master 26th mar. 1633

The following are the names of the most wealthy of the grantees, with the number of acres which were granted them [1635, p. 19] affixed to their names. To each of the first settlers was granted a house lot of at least four acres, with a suitable quantity of salt and fresh meadow: Richard Kent, junior, 134. Stephen Kent, 84.

General Court, on petiton of Mr. Bradstreet, Mr. Dudley, Jr., Mr. Batter, Mr. Winsley, Capt. Dennison, Mr. Clark, Mr. Woodbridge, Mr. Battye, Henry Bilye, Giles Firman, Richard Kent, and John Saunders granted leave for them to begin a plantation at "Merrimack." This grant was obtained Sept. 6, 1638. How much territory was included in this grant does not appear from the record, nor was that an important consideration at that time. It would not interfere with the rights of either Newbury or Hampton, and no other settlements were within range to the westward. Of the twelve who obtained this grant but two lived and died in Salisbury, viz., Samuel Winsley and Henry Bilye. Messrs. Bradstreet, Batter, Dennison, Clarke, Woodbridge, Firman, and Kent gave their names and influen. 1 to the measure, but never settled in the new plantation.

From the proprietors' book of records, folio forty-four, I make the following extract: . . . Stephen Kent Richard Kent junior and others — 91 in all:

It is declared and ordered hereby, December Seventh 1642, according to the former intentions of the towne that the persons only abovementioned are acknowledged to be freeholders by the towne and to have proportionable right in all waste lands, commons and rivers undisposed, and such as by, from, or under them, or any of them or their heirs, have bought, granted and purchased from them, or any of them, their right and title thereunto and none else.

Kent's Island. This year (1647), February seventh, "the men deputed to order the affaires and exchanges of the new towne" granted to Richard Kent, junior, the Island, which is still called Kent's Island, and is still owned by his descendants. It is thus mentioned in the records. After noticing "the tenn acres of upland which the towne granted him on the island over the little river, and sixty four acres of marsh," it grants him "all the rest of the upland and marsh on the island over the little river being one hundred and Seventy acres or thereabouts, being formerly granted to particular persons." The remainder of the island the said Richard Kent, junior, obtained either by purchase or exchange, either with the town or individuals, "all which land in the island above mentioned being two hundred and fifty-eight acres or thereabouts to enjoy to him his beires forever," and so forth. "Town Records."

The estate was kept in the family for many years by the will of Richard Kent, Jr., who bequeathed it to his oldest male descendant. In process of time a Mrs. Kent had twins, and through the carelessness of the nurse it was impossible to prove the precedence of either, and consequently a John or Joseph and a Stephen each claimed as the oldest son the whole estate. There was another brother, Moses, who took no part in the quarrel, but finally the General Court annulled the proceedings and the property was divided among the three. The island remained divided until the time of the father of the late Pant Kent, who became possessed of the whole, and from him it finally passed into the hands of Joshua N. Kent...

November 20th, 1652. There was voted by the major part of the towne: "that M' Woodman, Richard Kent, junior, lieutenant l'ike and Nicholas Noyes, should be a committee for the managing the business of the schoole."

1654. Kent's Island, with sixteen cows and four oxen on it, was let this year, for seven years, by Richard Kent, to Launcelot Granger for forty-six pounds a year.

(Wills in Suffolk Co.) A list of debts due to the late Martine Stebbins Victualer Anno 1657, 1658-1659. Richa Kent et al.

(1658) agt. the next Generall Court to Ino. Emery Ino. Webster, & such others as are named in the papers brought into the Court, to appears before the Generall Court in October next, to answer wi is lajd agt them for theire abusine in that petition yt Heñ Short Rich Kent, Rich Knight, Nicō Nojes & Authony Somersby then also appears, & make good wt they Chardge agt the other persons.

To ye honouved Generalt Court assembled at Boston Sepr—11th—1666 The humble Petition of the Inhabitants of the towne of Newberry may it please the bonouved Gen^{II} Court, your Petitioners being informed that Letters are lately come from his Ma^{tic} to the councill of this Colony expressive of his ill resenting of their proceedings in reference to his Commissioners lately sent hither, insomuch that his Ma^{tic} hath thereupon required some principall Persons to be sent from hence with command upon their allegiance to attend his ma^{tics} pleasure in order to a finall determination of such differences & debates as have happened between his Ma^{tics} sayd Commissioners & the Governm¹ heere: which Declaration of his Ma^{tic} they cannot but looke upon as a matter of Such great importance, as it doth justly call for all manner of most serious consideration what is to be done in reference thereunto, wherefore that they might neither be wanting to yourselves in withholding any due Encourag^{mi} that their Concurrence might afford in So arduous a matter, nor to themselves & the Country in being involved by their Silence in the dangerous mistakes of persons (how ever otherwise wek



minded) inclining to disloyal principles. They desire they may have liberty without offence to propose some of their thoughts & feares about y' matter in hand unto your Serious deliberation. Yow Petitioners humbly conceive that those who live in this age of the world are as much as any others concerned in that advice of the wiseman to keep the Kings Commandmi because of the Oath of God & not be hasty to goe out of his Sight, that doth whatsoever pleaseth him, wherefore they desire that seeing his Matth halready taken no little displeasure agi us for or seeming to disowne his jurisdiction over o' effectual care may be taken least by refusing to attend his maj^{thes} order for the Cleering of o' right in that particular we should plunge o'Selves into greater disfavour & danger.

Our receiving a Charter for the planting of this Colony from his matter royall Predecessors with the confirmation of the Same obtained by our late Address from his own royall Person Sufficiently declares the place to be part of his matter dominions & o'Selves his Subjects, the web allso is further testified unto by the first Governour Mr Mathew Craddock his being recorded Furatus defide & obedientia &c. before one of the masters in Chancery; whence it is evident that if any proceedings of Ours have given occasion to apprehend that wee believe his Mathe hath no jurisdiction over vt. what speedy course had need be taken to free ourselves from the suspicion of So dangerous an offence & to give his Matte all due Satisfaction in that Behalfe. It is not easy to determine whether Such an assertion were more derogating from his matter Honour or destructive to or owner wellfare. It were too much presumtion for Subjects to Vye with their Prince upon the points of his Soveraignty & Jurisdiction. The doubtfull interpretation of the words of a Patent (web, word is no reason to hope they should ever be construed to the divesting of a Soveraigne Prince of his regall power over his Naturall Subjects) is to fraile a foundation to build So transcendent an immunity & priveledge upon Your Petitioners shall never be unwilling to acknowledge how much they with others are bound to yourselves & others in your capacity for your abundant paines & travell in upholding the goverm of this Colony & maintaining the liberty thereof & they doe professedly declare themselves willing to run any hazards with you in order . . . regular defence & Securing the Same & are very unwilling to reflect on the persons of them . . . have so much reason to honour & respect: but in things of so great weight wherein the honour of Allmighty God, the Credit of the Gospell as well as the interest of their owner persons & estates are Concerned they hope & earnestly desire that no party will irrestibly earry on any designs of dangerous consequence as to necessitate their brethern equally engaged with them in the same undertaking to make their particular Addresse to his matic & declaration to the world to Cleare themselves from the imputation of dissefection or disloyalty to the person or goverm¹ of their lawfull Prince & Sovernigne Wherefore your Petitioners do humbly intreat, that if any occasion hath bin given to his Matic So to resent any of or former proceedings, as in his Letters is held forth, that nothing of that nature be farther proceeded in: but on the contrary that Application be made to his Matte by meet persons chosen & Sent for that end, to Cleare o'Selves & acting from Such Construction least otherwise that wen if ducly improved might have bin as a cloud of the latter raine be turned into that weh in the conclusion may prove more terrible than the roaring of a Lyon Thus craving your favourable interpretation of what is heere humbly presented. Your Petitioners Shall be ever obliged to thankfullnesse &c

To the honored Court now sitting at Ipswich, March thirtieth 1669. We whose names are underwritten for ourselves and others the Inhabitants of Newbury, doe humbly present, though to our great grief, that Mr. Edward Woodman Spake in a town assembly before strangers publiquely on March first 1669, that Mr. John Woodbridge was an intruder, brought in by craft and Subtility, and so kept in notwithstanding he was voted out twice, which we know to be untrue, and look upon as Scandalous. Also he said to Mr Parker that he was an apostate and backslider from the truth, that he would set up a prelacy, and have



more power than the pope, for the pope had his council of cardinals, that his practice or actings did not tend to peace or salvation, that he was the cause of all our contention and misery. That you are no apostate and backsilder. Also he said to captain Gerrish that he was no lover of the truth, that his gray hairs would stand where captain Gerrish his bald pate would, all which we lumbly conceive tends not only to the reproach of the parties concerned, but to the great disturbance of our peace both civil and ecclesiastical, and therefore leave it to the serious consideration of this honored court for Some suitable redress as they shall think meet

Witnesses Nicholas Noyes Ensign John Knight Thristram Coffin Thomas Hale Senior Joseph Muzzey Nathaniel Clarke Richard Kent Jr. Henry Short Anthony Somerby

Another long paper is on record on the above subject signed by *Richard Kent* and others to the court sitting at Ipswich, 28th April, 1669.

ON THE NEXT DAY, March 23 (1670), Mr. Parker and some brethren with him sent the following paper to Mr. Woodman's party: . . . (Signed by) Thomas Parker, Names of those who adhered to Mr. Parker and did not act on Mr. Parker's sentence: John Kent, James Kent, Richard Kent, and others.

At the April term, 1671, of the Court at Ipswich the following complaint was entered (on the same and presented by) Richard Kent, Daniel Pierce, Senior.

The following are the names of Mr. Parker's party: Richard Kent, John Kent, James Kent et al. — whole number 41.

To the Honord, Gen'll Court Assembled at Boston May 11th, 1670 The petition of Sundry the Inhabitants of Nubury on behalfe of themselves & others Humbly Shewing - That when and while as the printed Law page 56:5:4 Stood in full forse And as wee Humblie Conceive not yett repealed or made Void by any other law, That Archelaus Woodman was ordely nominated & chosen by their Company for their Lemt. And John Knight for Ensigne in presence of Major. Denison & others, But the late Law published May: 69: then under Suspenc their Establishmi at Countie Court was not preented for avoiding all appearace of offence to Authority, which Delay hath unexpectedly occasioned Verie uncomfortable Comotons, in Sorone & trouble to the Successive Gen'il Courts And to Some present of qualitie in other respects, as is not unknowne to the Worshple Majo Gen'll Leverett & Majo. Denison But for as much as by ye Evidence of ye all disposing & onely wise God the Authority thereof is reserved unto this Honorb Court And nothing acted in these places by any other prsons for ye two years now past Since the for8d Choice so made by the Companie Our most Humble petition is that According to ye wonted elemencie of this Hon'bl Court unto the Humble Addresses of their Suppliants in like Cases. That the Said Woodman And Knight may by this Honorb Court be accepted & Confirmed in those respective places which yor petition" Doe Humblie Conceive the . . . of all things thereto relating duly Considered (whatever otherwise Hath any ways fallen from Any Amongst us) may & will to yo' Wisdomes appeare both Just & Equall, And most conducing to a Lasting prace Among yor people here which after long and grevious Contentions through Abundant mercy accompaning the Indeavers of some neibo churches, is beyond expectation to y' rejoycing of many hearts now lately Attayned the Continuance whereof if God so please, through yo' favourable aspect on yo' petition. Herin to be more firmly rooted & Increased is Verie Humblie & heartily desyred by us. Yo' most Humble S'r' & Suppliants

ARCHDEACONS OF SUDBURY, COUNTY CAMBRIDGE.

1621. Theophilus Kent; he was a sufferer in the grand rebellion.

PARISH OF ROTHERHAM.

The family of Kent, who have been numerous in the parish of Rotherham, and have produced several elergymen, may seem to have a claim to William Kent the artist, who did so much to improve the public taste in gardening. Vertue says that he was a native of Yorkshire, and the following entry in the parish register of Rotherham agrees well with the time of his birth: 1684, March 27, bap. William Kent.

THE CHURCH. INSCRIPTIONS.

Kent, William, son of Richard of Kimberworth, gent., died 16 Sept., 1680, aged 10. Elizabeth, his wife, buried 30 May, 1693, aged 49. Richard of Kimberworth, gent., died 29 June, 1711, aged 67. William, son of Richard, gent., died 12 May, 1724, aged 44. (Several others of recent date.)

CHESHIRE RECORDS. Harrwich Hundreds. Rectors of Coppenhall: George Massy (...) resigned the living on a pension of five marks, payable out of its fruits, and his successor William Kent (probably of a family of that name settled in or about Northwich) also resigned on a similar pension, "out of the Chapel fruits."

HARLEIAN SOCIETY RECORDS. Marriage Allegations in the Registery of the Vicar-General of the Archbishop of Canterbury:

The men whose names are contained in the within written list are Shipt upon the acc^t of John Rose & company on board the Jam^a Merch^t to be landed & disposed of in Barbados or in Jamaica: John Rose.

Receipt for one hundred *Prisoners* on M^r Nepho's Acco to be Sent to Barbadoes Prisoners in Dorchester Goale to bee Transported: Peter Kent.

JAMES KENT, bro. of Richard Kent, Jr., and Hunt, in his "Hist. of Essex Co.," says son of Richard, Sr., landed first at Ipswich in 1634, and proceeded by water to Newberry in 1635.

"1633. First settlers of Newbury, uniform tradition asserts that they came by water from Ipswich, through Plum Island sound and up the river Quascacinquen [now river Parker] to the place they had selected as their future habitation. Tradition asserts that they landed on the north bank of the river, about one hundred rods below the spot where the bridge now stands, and that Nicholas Nayes was the first person who leaped ashore. The company was few in number, and probably consisted of Mr. Henry Sewall and servants, William Moody, his wife and four sons, Andrew Short, Henry Short and wife, Mr. John Spencer, Mr. Nicholas Easton, his wife and son John, Richard Kent, Senior, and Stephen Kent, brothers, with their wives, Richard Kent, Junior, and James Kent, brothers," etc., etc.

Persons admitted to ffreedom by this Court [19 May, 1669] & those y't tooke their oaths are set downe first, y't y't tooke it not are und y' line: James Kent, Newb. Jno Kent.

He probably mar. in this country, as no wife is mentioned on his arrival from England. He left one son, John, who inherited Kent's Island from his uncle Richard, Jr., and thence in perpetuum to the eldest male heir, viz.: John's son, Col. Richard, and to his son, Capt. Richard.

After careful research I think it probable that the John Kent of Newberry referred to in the following items was John, son

of James, as above:

On February ninth, 1683, the Court of Assistants "order that the port of Boston to which Charlestown is annexed, and the port of Salem, to which Marblehead, Beverly, Gloucester, Ipswich, Rowley, Newbury and Salisbury are annexed, as members, shall be the lawful ports of this Colony, where ships and other vessels shall lade or unlade any of the plantation's enumerated gnods, or other goods from foreign parts and no where eise," and so forth.



This occasioned the following petition: "To the honored general court now Sitting in Boston, the humble petition of some of Newbury Wee humbly crave the favour that your honors would be pleased to Consider our little Zebulon and to ease us of that Charge which at present we are forced unto by our gooing to Salem to enter our vessells and thereby are forced to stay at least tow days before we can unload, besides other charges in going and Coming — That some meet person might be appointed to receive the enter of all Vessells, and to net and doe according as the law directs in that case and we shall be bound forever to pray for your honors. May, fifteenth 1683"

John Kent and 10 others.

August 22d, 1689 Brig "Merrimack" of Newbury, Captain John Kent, was Captured by pirates in Martin Vineyard Sound.

Ang. 19th. 1689 The Conneil, having been informed, that Thomas Hawkins and others were acting as pirates order the sloop "Restitution" with forty men, Joseph Taxter, master, to go after them. These pirates took &c. &c. They captured the brig "Merrimack" of Newburyport, Capt. John Kent, on the 22nd in "Martin Vineyard Sound."

1689 — Capt Peas sent after Pirates in the sloop "Mary" of Boston He came up and fought one in "Martin Vineyard Sound." Capt Pease is killed, but the pirate is taken by his crew.

(In a foot-note to the above from Mr. Felt's "Annals of Salem.") These Pirates Captured the Brig Merrimack of Newburyport, Capt. John Kent on the 22d in Martin Vineyard sound.

They killed him and wounded some of his crew.

EXTRACT FROM DEPOSITION OF THOMAS POUND THE PIRATE.

Boston 19th Octobr 1689. On or about the twentyeth day of August met with a Briganteen belonging to Newbury, John Kent master from New Yorke, and sent the Boat with flour or flive hands on board said Briganteen, and brought her neer to o' Sloop's side, out of which Briganteen wee tooke Eighteen halfe barrels of Flower, two hogsheads of Sugar and one hogshead of Rhum and three small Armes and so dismist the Briganteen.

JULY 24, 1690. Writt to Major Saltonstall and sent him a Barrel of Salt in Token of my Remembrance of him and sympathy with him in his dangers and confinements, dwelling in a fronteer Town as he does &c Sent & Skipar Jno. Kent of Newberry.

March 2. 1704 Resolved that the sum of Sixteen Pounds & sixteen Shillings & ten Pence be allowed & paid out of the publick Treasury, to the persons respectively to whom the same is due in full of an acet presented Viz. To John Woodman for Ferriage Three Pounds five shillings & four Pence. To John Kent master of the Sloop "Planter" Nine Pounds. To divers Persons sent Post & Four Ponnds eleven Shillings & Six pence. Web Resolve being Read at the Board was Concurred and is Consented to J. Dudley.

April 24th. 1711 John Kent of the island had his barn burnt by tobacko with six oxen and four calves and a goose, that was bringing young ones. (Sewall's diary.)

JOHN,² "only son and heir" of James,¹ was b. 1641, and d. Jan. 30, 1717-18. Over his grave is a freestone slab resting on brickwork which states that he d. in his 78th year. His wife is buried in the same graveyard back of the old Town Meeting House. He mar. Feb. 24, 1665, Mary (or Malby) Hobbs, who d. Sept. 8, 1725, aged 82. John Kent² owned half of Kent's Island; the other half was given to his son by his

great-uncle Richard, for whom he was named. There was a house on the island standing in a pear orchard at the south of an old barn owned by Joseph, then Paul, but John probably resided in the old homestead built in 1700, and still standing in 1830. He appears to have been a man of property, of energy, and good character.

RICHARD, son of John, James, mar. 1st, 1709, Sarah Greenleaf, possibly a relative of Judge Greenleaf, whose dau. mar, C. J. Parsons. Richard and Sarah had nine children, all of whom d. under 20 years of age except Richard.4 Mr. Kent was Col, in the militia and a Justice of the Peace, when these offices were deemed more honorable than they are at the present In 1733 he acted as a Justice in Boston. He resided in Newburyport most of the time, but not on Kent Island; and he was engaged in trade, accumulating considerable property. His 1st wife d. Apl. 12, 1723; and he was mar. 2d, by Rev. L. Bradstreet, Sept. 8, 1724, at Charlestown, to Widow Hannah Carter, dan. of Rev. Nath'l Gookin, Pastor of Church of Christ in Cambridge, and widow of Vincent Carter of Charlestown, whom she mar. Aug. 10, 1711. Col. Richard d. in 1740, aged 67. His 2d wife, who survived him several years, is said to have been somewhat of a grave formal person of the old school, and anxious to maintain her rank in society. She d. Mch. 20, 1758, in her 67th year; a commemorative sermon was preached by Rev. Mr. Lowell. Her will was proved Apl. 3, 1758, and she made devise to son Nath'l Carter, and to her children by Col. Kent. Col. and Mrs. Kent are buried on the

top of "Burying Hill, near the old mill and pond," and placed over the grave is a heavy freestone slab, with a slate in the shape of a heart let into it, bearing an inscription. Mrs. Kent by her first husband had a son Nath'l Carter, who became one of the three richest merchants of his time in Newburyport.

The following, taken from court, State, and town records,

indicate that Col. Kent was held in high repute:

MAY 28 1718 THE NAMES OF THE REPRESENTATIVES County of Essex — Newbury Cpt Richard Kent

May 27, 1719 The names of the Representatives County of Essex ---Newbury -- Cpt Richard Kent

Nov 5, 1719 A message came up from the House by Cpt Probble & Cpt Kent to desire that his Excellency would lay before the l'apers relating to the Danger from the Indians & the Papers relating to the abuses in Pitch & Tar.

JUNE 15, 1721 A Petition of Richard Kent of Newhury Esq. Shewing that at a Court of Quarter Sessions of the peace held at Newbury in September last, he preferred a Complaint Sette forth that being possessed in Fee of a house & Land near a place called Watts Cellar in Newbury which he had Quietly Enjoyed for some considerable time, and Improved and fenced in the Land without any disturbance, but that on or about the 17th of Sept. Jonathan Greely, Elias Pyke and Anthony Downer, under pretence of a Warri Granted by Henry Sommerly Esq! did come to the petitioners house & pull Down the Garden Fence and did spoil and wast the St. Garden to the gr! Damage of the petitioner that the sd Court Continued the Consideration of his sd. Complaint to Dect Following, That the petitioner supposing that the Court would act no further on his Complaint, Title of Land being Concerned in the Controversy, did bring his writt of Trespass upon the case against the sd Jonathan Greely. Elias Pyke and Anthony Downer, for Illegally, pulling down and Carrying away his Garden fence, to be tried in December last, but it being alleged that the petitioners complaint aforementioned was under Consideration of the Court of General sessions, at the same time Holden. JOSEPH,⁵ son of Capt. Richard,⁴ Col. Richard,³ mar. 1st, Jane Moody, Aug. 3, 1768; she d. Nov. 1, 1783, after giving him 8 children.

Deacon Joseph Hale was the common ancestor of the Moodys and Joseph Kent. Sam'l Moody d. Apr. 4, 1675. "He was," says Moody Kent, son of Joseph, in his diary, "the common ancestor of my sister Nancy and her husband. He left 4 sons, to wit.: William, John, Samuel, and.... Samuel Moody first named was the great-grandfather of Paul Moody the father of Enoch, and Samuel Moody secondly named was the grandfather. The same Samuel Moody first named was the great-grandfather of my mother, and his son John was her grandfather. She, therefore, and Paul Moody were second cousins, and Nancy, her daughter and my sister, was the third cousin, by the mother's side, of Enoch Moody, her husband; of this relation I never heard them or any of my relatives speak, and I am doubtful whether any of them ever traced it. It does not appear in Coffin's book, and probably he knew nothing about it. Our relations by the Kents, the Hales, and the Moodys are very numerous. I could even now trace many of them, so far as to get their names, the times of their birth and of their death, but this, if I can go no further, is bardly desirable. If I could also obtain an account of their history and character, their sayings and doings, I would willingly take some pains to pursue the investigation. Jane Moody was the daughter of John Moody of Newbury, Mass., and born on what was called the ridge road, one of the old roads from Newburyport to Boston, and not far from the M.H. where, in her day, old Doetor Tucker preached. There were two sons and two daughters who lived to be married; one, John, lived on the home place, was married to Miss Little, who lived not far from his place; by her he had children, and died at the age of 48 and was buried at the graveyard back



of Dr. Withington's M.H., and not far from the spot where the Kents were The other son was the Rev. Amos Moody, who was graduated at H.C. in the year 1759, at the age of 20. Studied divinity under the direction of Rev. Dr. John Tucker; was settled in the year 1765 in Pelham, N.H., as the successor of James Hobbs, then recently deceased, soon afterwards married with his widow, ten years older than himself; was several years afterwards dismissed from his charge without any imputation on his moral character; continued to live in the same town, and once or more represented it in the General Court, till the year 1819, when he died at the age of 80, and not far from the same time his wife died at the age of 90. They had no children. He lived a quiet, unambitions life, and left a small property. Sarah, one of the two daughters, was married at the age probably of more than 20 and less than 30 to a Mr. Strang of Connecticut, and they were settled in Coventry in that State. I wrote to my friends, Sol. Paine and wife of Canterbury, Conn., and they promised to make enquiry, if opportunity offered, but I have received no information from them on the subject. The other daughter was Janc, my mother, born 1742; was married to my father in 1768, bore him 8 children, and died 1st Nov., 1783, in the 42d year of her age. She was buried near Dr. Withington's M.H., and a slate is erected at her grave with this inscription: 'In memory of Jane Kent, wife of Mr. Joseph Kent, who died Nov. 1st, 1783, in the 12d year of her age.' When my mother died I was only 44 years old. I have only one distinct recollection of her, when she was laying in the coffin in the front of the old house where she had lived, and the people were assembled in the room to attend the funeral ceremonies. Some one took hold of my arms and lifted me up, so that I looked on the face of my mother. My father spoke to me of her sometimes, and in a manner which convinced me of his great respect of her abilities and his strong attachment to her person. My brother Paul, in answer to my enquiries, related to me something of her sayings and doings. Lucy Hiddens or Mrs. Deacon Silas Pearson, after she had become very old, told me she nursed my mother when she was confined at the birth of her eldest children; and she told me as many things respecting my venerated parent as a person of 96 years old could be expected to remember."

JOSEPH and JANE MOODY KENT had children:

I. Joseph, 6 b. June 22, 1769. His bro. Moody wrote of him as follows:

"In his early days he attended the town schools, and worked on the farm. He became desirous to go to sea, and my father becoming part owner of a fishing schooner, my brother went in her several voyages to the Grand Bank fishery. Afterwards he went in a merchant vessel to the West Indies one voyage, from which he returned home in safety, and still attached to the course of life he had chosen. On his return from his second voyage he was seized with a violent fever which carried home in a few days, on the 11th of Sept., 1791, at the age of 22 years. I have 5 letters written by him to his parents, in terms of affection, and giving a brief account of his health, the good terms on which he lived with his associates, and his prospects. I have also a pine box which he made whon he was on a fishing voyage and gave me. At the time of his death he was said to be engaged to be married to Miss Joanna Little, who was afterwards married to Mr. Little of Newbury, her native town."

II. Daniel, b. . . . , 1770; d. Oct. 13, 1783, aged 12, eighteen days before the death of his mother.

V. Nancy, b. Jan. 21, 1777, in the homestead on Kent Island, where her brothers were born.

She attended the little school-house across the meadow. In her youth she had a violent fever, Dr. Swett attending her. She mar., in 1799, Enoch, bro. of Samuel and Nathan Moody before mentioned, and they soon moved to Hallowell, Me., where she d. Aug. 14, 1812-13, and there lies buried; also her sister-in-law, Mrs. Sam'l Moody. She had 5 chil.: 1. Daniel, d. aged 4; buried Byfield. 2. Sarah, d. aged 7; buried Hallowell. 3. Enoch, d. aged 17, of fits. 4. Mary Jane, b. 1801; living 1856; unmarried. 5. Samuel, b. 1810; mar. Martha, only dan, of Dr. Dean Robinson, of Newbury.

VI. Moody, 6 b. Apl. 22, 1779.

VII. PHILIP, b. 1781.

"At the death of his mother," writes his bro. Moody, "he was sent to a Mrs. Poor to be nursed and cared for in his infancy. At a suitable age he was taken home and sent to the town school across the meadow, and also to Mr. Nath'l Moody's school in the Morse house near the Littles in Newbury. When he reached a suitable age he was placed in the store of Farris & Stocker, a respectable mercantile house in Newburyport, as a clerk or an apprentice. In this station he so conducted himself as to acquire the confidence and esteem of those respectable merchants, and among his associates he maintained the reputation of an intelligent and amiable young man. At the age of about 26 he was sent to the West Indies as supereargo; was seized with the yellow fever in the port to which he was sent, and in a few days died."

VIII. DANIEL, b. 1783; d. young. Of him his bro. Moody writes as follows:

"At the death of his mother was placed with his brother Philip at Mrs. Poor's to be nursed. With his brother Philip and me he attended school at the Morse house; and in Dec., 1790, he, with his brother Philip and me, attended school at Oldtown lower green. To get to and from school we were obliged to cross the mill river on the ice, which, when the tide was down, lay in cakes on the bank, with large chasms or openings between them. On the 15th of Dec., 1790, I, with my two brothers, Philip and Daniel, were on our way to school, and were crossing the river. Directly opposite to the place where we were the ice was thrown into such position that it was difficult there to pass. We walked down the river till we found a better place to get off, and I ascended the bank, and supposed they were following me. On looking back I saw them both in the water struggling to keep up. I impulsively rushed down the bank and to the water (it was what is called a breathing hole, where the current was so strong as to prevent the water from freezing), took hold of Philip's band as he held it out of the water, and pulled him out on the ice. By this time

poor Daniel was under the ice and drowned. We all of us wore mill caps. Philip had lost his in the water, and was entirely wet, and the weather was very cold. I placed my cap on his head and hurried him as fast as possible to the house, about half a mile distant. My father and one or more of my brothers with an axe immediately went to the spot. They reported on their return that the mere weight of the axe broke the ice where I stood to pull out my brother Philip, and that the escape of us two was almost miraculous. The next spring the body was found and buried in the burying-ground near Mr. Withington's M.H., where so many of the Kents lay buried, as before mentioned."

JOSEPH KENT mar. 2d, Oct. 2, 1785, Jane, the widow of Capt. Wm. Willcomb. By Joseph Kent she had 3 children. Moody Kent writes in 1856 of Jane, his stepmother, as follows:

"June Dole was the maiden name of my father's second wife. She was born in Newbury, Oldtown, about half a mile from Oldtown bridge, on a spot which has been pointed out to me. Her father was a blacksmith, and she had one sister and two brothers; possibly she may have had other brothers and sisters of whom I never heard. She was born, I think, in 1748; while young she was married to . . . Moody, and lived with him in Independence street, Newburyport. He was a man of feeble health, and in the course of two or three years after they were married he died child-less. They never had children or a child. In no long time the widow married with Capt. William Willcomb, a ship-master, engaged in the West India trade; with him she lived two or three years. He was lost at sea, I think in the year 1781, his wife baying borne him no children. I have seen several letters written by Capt. Willcomb to his wife. The letters express no fondness, and yet they cannot be called cold, or wanting in such expressions of attachment as might be expected from him to his wife, with whom he lived on good terms. In 1785, if I mistake not the year, my father was married to the widow. She was then 37 years old; having been twice married, but having had no children by either of her husbands. I was once told by my brother Paul that my father was acquainted with her before her marriage with Mr. Moodly, but whether the acquaintance was in any degree intimate I never knew. My father once told me that my mother, on her death bed, advised him to marry again, but to marry a woman who had no children. Immediately after the marriage my father moved his wife home to the Island, where they lived till 1799, when they removed to Newburyport, and took a house in State street, nearly opposite that of Mr. Brown, the Dalton house, - and there continued till her death, in the year 1801, with a consumption. She had been afflicted some time, say two or three years, with this disease. She died at the age, I think, of 53."

"At the age of about 30, and for several years, my father was engaged in a lawsuit with his twin brother Stephen in respect to Kent Island. Stephen commenced an action and endeavored to prove hinself the older of the two, but failed in the attempt, and the island remained as it had been before in the joint occupation and ownership of the two brothers. Out of this suit there grew an alienation which always continued. The brothers were never reconciled. Perhaps it is not quite proper to say the alienation grew wholly out of this lawsuit. The brothers were different in their tastes and their views of life, their habits of thinking, and also in the character and dispositions of their wives. Notwithstanding the expense of this lawsuit, and other considerable expenses, my father by

skilful management of his farm gained from year to year and made a respectable estate. He engaged also in Grand Bank fishing to some advantage, and sent adventures to sea and made something in that way, and he loaned money at interest with judgment and skill, and purchased State securities and possibly made something in that way. By both his wives he had 11 children, to all of whom he afforded means of education better than was common at that time, and two of whom were graduated at H.C. in the years 1795 and 1801, wholly educated at the expense of their father. On the 19th day of July in the year 1802, in his 62nd year, he died and was buried in the graveyard near Dr. Withington's M.H., where the bodies of several of his relatives restawaiting the resurrection."

JOSEPH 5 and JANE DOLE KENT had children:

IX. Jane, b. June 22, 1786. Moody Kent writes:

"Her early days were spent on the Island, with such advantages of education as her older brothers and sister had enjoyed. She was, I suppose, thirteen years old when she removed with her parents to Newburyport. At the death of her father she was probably about 16 years old. My brother Amos or Paul was appointed her guardian and she resided in his family, with the exception of perhaps about a year that she resided with her sister, Mrs. Moody, in Hallowell, Me. In the year 1810—I put down dates from memory - she married with Roswell Stevens, Esq., May, 1810, who had then been in the practice of the law about three years, in Pembroke, N.H. In the year 1811 she bore her husband a daughter, - her only child, Sarah, - now the wife of James Wilson, Esq., of Pembroke, by whom she had 2 chil.: 1. Moody Kent of Concord or Pembroke; 2. Jane, mar. . . . Millar. In the year 1813, in the month of January, at the age of 26, she died of a consumption. Some letters written by her are still extant, and her relatives and acquaintances now living cherish her memory.'

X. SARAH, b. Šept. 18, 1787. Moody writes of her:

"At 14 years old, at the decease of her father, her brother Paul or Amos was appointed her guardian. She lived a part of the time at Chester, with her brother Amos, and some part of the time at Hallowell, with her sister Naney. Feby 22, 1808, she being then a little more than 20 years old, and having finished a visit at Amherst, among her acquaintances and friends, was on her return to Chester with her brother Amos, his wife, and two of his children in a double sleigh. When they reached Thornton's Ferry, the safe place of passing had been rendered obscure by a fall of snow the night previous. My brother drove on the river, and on ice thin and weak. It broke, let in the horses and the sleigh, and those in it were overturned into the river. Mrs. Kent and the two children were rescued, but poor Sarah was drowned. She was amiable and pleasant, and much beloved by her relatives and acquaintances, and her decease, of course, much deplored."

XI. Joseph, b. Feb., 1791. Of him Moody Kent writes:

"Being only 11 years old at the decease of his father, a guardian was to be appointed, and his brother Amos was appointed to that office. During the minority of the ward he passed his time for the most part with his guardian at Chester, and nearly all the remainder with his uncle Paul at Newburyport. When young he married with Miss Little, the daughter of Amos Little of New-

bury, and purehased himself, from the property left him by his father, a house and about a dozen acres of land near Oldtown lower upper green, and opposite the dwelling house of the late Rev. Dr. John Tucker, still standing. In February, 1821, he died, at the age of about 30, of a consumption. His wife bore him three children: two daughters and a son Paul, b. 1817, never married. The elder daughter, Jane, b. 1815, mar. Mr. Poor and died childless. The younger daughter, Sarah, b. 1819, was never married, and died of a consumption. The son learned the trade of a blacksmith and set up his business, near his mother, when he died of bronchitis, if I was rightly informed, unmarried. The widow is still living (1856), never having been again married. So that of my brother Joseph there is no posterity living; and of his mother, my father's second wife, there are only three descendants, to wit: Sarah Jane Wilson, the wife of James Wilson, Esq., before mentioned, and their two children: Moody Kent Wilson and Jane Wilson, both unmarried."

STEPHEN, son of Capt. Richard, Col. Richard. His nephew Moody writes of him as follows:

" Stephen Kent was born 20th May, 1741, N.S., and had the common advantages of school education. When he was 19 years old his father died, leaving him and his twin brother Joseph in possession of Kent's Island, which, by the terms of the entail, belonged to the elder of the two. As it could not be ascertained which of the two was the older it seemed to them and their friends just that they should enjoy the property in common. When Stephen was 21 years old, and possibly less, he was married to Mary Gerrish, a daughter of Col. Gerrish, a man of some note in Newbury, living some three or four miles from the Island. In the course of a few years Stephen, by the advice of his father-in-law, commenced an action against his twin brother for the recovery of the Island. To succeed in this action he must have proved that he was the older of the two. He failed to do so, and the Island was held in common by the two brothers as it had been before, but the intercourse between the two brothers was in consequence of the action entirely broken off. Stephen Kent entired his part of the Island with no great skill and industry, and when his sons were old enough he left the care and the work chiefly to them. Neither the father nor the sons made many improvements, nor sought to increase their crops by a departure from the common course of husbandry. The father delighted in the work of the mechanic, and for one who was untaught, he made punts, floats, wherrys, wheels, carts, piggins, &c., which answered the purpose of such things exceeding well. In the course of the war time, he commanded for a short time a company of men stationed on Plum Island. In no part of his life was he ambitious to acquire wealth or public distinction, yet he took an interest in politics, read much in the newspapers, and expressed his opinions on the great questions of the day. He was a temperate man. Nearly all his time he spent in his house and shop. In the government of his family he was somewhat absolute, but not, I think, tyrannical. Doubtless he was a passionate and quick-tempered man, but I do not believe he was a malicious or revengeful man. On all subjects his information was limited, and of course he had strong prejudices, yet he was not wanting in readiness of perception, memory, and natural sagacity. After he became an old man, and was confined to his house, I made it a point when at the Island

to call upon him, and he always seemed to take my calls in good part. the year 1827, at the age of 86, he died, having been in his last years well cared for by his only daughter. He left to his children, as heirs at law, his half of the Island, and I think a small farm in Daytown.

Stephen Kent's wife, Mary Kent, a daughter of Col. Gerrish, as before mentioned, was born, I think, in 1737, and she was three or four years older than her husband. She had a brother, Col. Jacob Gerrish, a schoolmaster, who was never married, and another brother Stephen, who was married and had a family of his own, and a sister who was married and married and had a family of his own, and a sister who was married and lived in West Newbury. These brothers and this sister she seldom, if ever, saw in her latter days. She may have had other brothers and sisters; I know not. This old lady, Mrs. Stephen Kent, lived till the year 1817, when she died at the age of 80, leaving no enemy behind her. Stephen Kent and wife had eight children, two of whom, I think both girls, died in infancy, or early childhood, and the other six — five sons and a daughter lived to a considerable age and were married. I was well acquainted with each of the six when they were young, and I knew something of them in their latter days."

In the "Lexington Alarms" of the Revolution Stephen Kent appears with rank of 2d Lieut. on Lexington Alarm Roll of Capt. John Moody's Co., Col. . . . Rogt., which marched on the alarm of April 19, 1775, from . . . to . . . Length of service 6 days.

The above may have been Stephen⁵ of Newburyport, but certain it is that Capt. Stephen Kent who appears in the following two records is he:

Stephen Kent appears in A Return of Men enlisted into the Continental Army From Essex Co. of 2d Regt., dated Essex, Feb. 16, 1778. He belonged to Newburyport, enlisted for Newburyport for term of 3 years. Joined Wheelwright's Co., Col. Ebenezer Francis' Regt.

Stephen Kent appears with rank of Drummer on Continental Army Pay Accounts of Capt. Donnell's Co., Col. Crane's Regt., for service from Jan. 23, 1780,

to Dec. 31, 1780. Residence "not given."

Stephen Kent appears with rank of Drummer on Muster Roll of Capt. Nathaniel Donnell's Co. of the 3d Artillery, Massachusetts Regt., Col. John Crane, dated West Point, Jan. 9, 1781. Enlisted Jan., 1780, by Capt. Donnell. Term of culistment "During War." Residence "Newburyport."

Stephen Kent appears in A Return of Men Enlisted into the Continental Army, dated Jan. 1781. Enlisted Jan. . . , 1780, by Capt. Donnell. Served in Capt. Donnell's Co., 3d Artillery Regt. Term of enlistment during war. He belonged to Newburyport. Reported Drummer.

Stephen Kent appears in a List of Men mustered in York County to serve in Capt. Daniel Wheelwright's Co., Col. Ebenezer Francis' Regt., by a return made by Nath'l Wells, Muster Master, April 17, 1777. Residence Sanford. Term of enlistment 3 years, or during war.

Stephen Kent appears with grade of Private on A Depreciation Roll of Col. Michael Jackson's Regt., to make good the depreciation of wages for the first three years' service in the Continental Army, from 1777 to 1780.

Stephen Kent appears in a Statement of Continental Balances with rank of . in Col. Tupper's Regt. Time engaged for "during war." Certified July 5, 1780.

Stephen Kent appears with rank of Fifer on Continental Army Pay Accounts of Capt Francis' Co., Col. Tupper's Regt., for service from May 2, 1777, to Dec. 31, 1779. Residence Sanford.

Stephen Kent appears with rank of Fifer on Continental Army Pay Accounts for 1780, of Capt. Francis' Co., Col. Tupper's Regt., "no date given." Residence Sanford.

MOSES, 5 son of Capt. Richard, 4 Col. Richard, 3 served in the Revolution as recorded below. He mar. Judith (Greenleaf?) and d. Feby. 26, 1786, aged 34. She d. 1817, aged 67. They had one child:

John Kent appears with grade of Private on A Return of Capt. (late) Israel Davis' Co., Col. Wigglesworth's Regt., in service Sept. 15, 1777. Reported deceased.

Benjamin Kent in the Revolutionary Records appears with rank of Private on Lexington Alarm Roll of Capt. Jeremiah Page's Co., Col. . . . Regt. which marched on the alarm of April 19, 1775, from Danvers. He belonged to Danvers. Length of service 2 days; marched 40 miles.

Benjamin Kent appears with rank of Sergeant on Pay Roll of Capt. Nathaniel Jarvis' Co., Col. Henry Jackson's Regt., dated "At Camp." Providence, Sept. 9, 1778, for service from May 31, 1778, to June 30, 1778. Time of service I month.

Benjamin Kent appears with rank of Sergeant on Pay Rollof Capt. Nathaniel Jarves' Co., Col. H. Jackson's Regt., dated at camp, Providence, Sept. 9, 1778, for service from June 30, 1778, to Sept. 1, 1778. Time of service 2 months.

Benjamin Kent appears with rank of Private on Muster and Pay Roll of Capt. Ichabod Pinkham's Co., Col.... Regt. Time of enlistment March 24, 1780. Time of discharge April 24, 1780. Time of service 1 mo. Service at Boothbay, paid by resolve of Oct. 2, 1781.

Benjamin Kent appears with rank of Private on A Warrant to pay officers and men borne on a roll bearing date Nov. 6, 1781, of Capt. Ichabod Pinkham's Co., Col. . . . Regt., service at Boothbay, 1780.

First Church of Pittsfield. In 1809 a petition was presented to the General Court, asking that a poll-parish by the name of "Union Parish" be incorporated in the town of Pittsfield, an act was passed, and among the names appears Benjamin Kent.

Danvers, Essex Co., Hist. of Baptist Society. At a meeting early in 1786 Nathaniel Putnam, Benjamin Kent, and Samuel Pindar were chosen to provide preaching for that year. On the 17th and 18th days of September, 1817, the Salem Baptist Association met with the New Mills people, etc., etc., including Benjamin Kent. They met at Mr. Hutchinson's house to perfect arrangements.

Messrs. Kent, Porter, and Hutchinson were detailed to see that provision was made for the care of horses; Dea. Porter, Messrs. Kent and Hutchinson "to attend in the galleries and place the people at the best advantage to prevent disorder." Rev. Mr. Chaplin, Messrs, Kent and Hutchinson were appointed to make a division of the guests among the people, etc.

ON THE 12TH OF FERRUARY, 1819, the act was passed incorporating the First Baptist Society in Danvers. Among the original incorporators appear Benj. Kent, Benj. Kent, Jr., Jos. Kent, John Kent.

THE FIRST MEETING under the new act was held at Schoolhouse No. 2, on Monday, March 29, 1819, at six o'clock P.M., to choose officers and levy a tax for support of the gospel and other expenses for the ensuing year. . . . Thomas Putnam, Moses Black, and Benjamin Kent were elected assessors.

IN JANUARY, 1826, Gideon Foster, Benjamin Kent, and Briggs R. Read were commissioned to draft a bill and secure its passage by the Legislature authorizing the taxation of pews. Such a bill became a law in the following March. May 1st (1829) John Porter, Benj. Kent, and Benj. Porter were chosen to ar-

range for dedication.

May 25th, Mr. Kent and Daniel Hardy were authorized to sell the pews in the new church at public auction by bidding for choice over and above the appraisal, the appraisal to cover the cost of the house, and they were also directed "to obtain a logal title to the land under a part and adjoining said meeting-house of the family of the late Captain Thomas Putnam, deceased." Benjamin Kent was appointed deacon 1823.

Committees appointed "to supply preaching": 1810. Benj. Kent et al.

FOR SOME MONTHS efforts were made to form a union with certain early Unitarians at New Mills. The first standing committee were at once instructed to consider the expediency of hiring the old Baptist meeting house, which had been removed in 1828. The committee hired the old meeting-house at forty-five dollars a year. . . . The old house was hired again, but the contract was made not without hitterness. Major Black and John Page now owned eleven-sixteenths of the building and were willing enough to let their part at forty-five dollars, but Deacons Kent and Hardy of the Baptist Church, owners of the other fivesixteenths, charged one hundred dollars for their share.

EDUCATIONAL. Among names of North Danrers young men and women who were at Pembroke Academy about 1840 appears Sarah A. Kent.

Among the "first families" of New Mills there were . . . Deacon Benjamin Kent, shipbuilder.

The muster roll of the New Mills minute-men: Benjamin Kent, Private.

BEFORE THE WAR (1812). Pindar, Kent, and Fowler were parties to a contract to build a three hundred and fifty ton ship for a London house. Capt. John Lee was sent from England to superintend her building. Impending hostilities prevented the owners from rigging and fitting her, and as long as she remained on the stocks the builders could not, according to contract, demand their pay. Capt. Lee refused to allow her to be launched, but all the carpenters mustered one night and slid her into the water. The builders might better have thrown up the hargain and make the most of the ship, but they choose to bring a fruitless suit against the American agent of the Englishmen, and in the meantime the good ship, utterly uncared for, floating with the tides, rotted in the river-

Calvin Putnam established the present extensive lumber business on the site

of Deacon Kent's ship-yard about thirty-five years ago (1888).

Fire Department, 1826. The men who ran with the machine this year at New Mills: Benjamin Kent, Jr., John Kent.

In camp on Long Island June ye 10, 1776. I have nothing to Send you but love, I hope I shall have some money soon, Capt Wade is well. This letter comes by Colol Little's Brother, who came here, he and Capt Kent of Newbory to see their frinds: and if there Should he any Gentlemen in Ipswich that should come this way I should be very glad to have you send me a Pair of shirts, But I would not have you be uneasy about it, for when I can't do no longer I can by some hear, though Linnen is Extrem Dear.

Richard Kent appears among a List of Deserters from Capt. Lyman's Co., Col. Elisha Porter's Regt., dated July 22, 1776. Age 24 years; stature 5 ft. 7 in.; complexion light; place of residence Northompton. Date of desertion June 14, 1776.

Richard Kent appears with rank of Seaman upon A List of Prisoners who were returned by exchange to Newport, R.I., Feby. 11, 1777. Residence Cape Cod.

Richard Kent appears with rank of Private on Muster and Pay Roll of Capt. Caleb Kimball's Co., Col. Jacob Gerrish's Regt. Time of enlistment Feb. 3, 1778. Time of discharge April 3, 1778. Time of service 2 months 2 days. Regt. of guards stationed at Winter Hill.

Richard Kent appears with rank of Private on Muster Roll of Capt. Samuel Huse's Co. of the Guard Regt., Col. Jacob Gerrish. Dated Winter Hill, May 11, 1778. Enlisted April 3 (year not given). Reported on command.

Richard Kent appears with rank of Private on Muster and Pay Roll of Capt. Huse's Co., Col. Jacob Gerrish's Regt.—Time of enlistment April 3, 1778.—Time of discharge July 4, 1778.—Time of service 3 months 2 days.

Richard Kent appears with rank of Private on Muster and Pay Roll of Capt. Benjamin Godfrey's Co., Col. Zenath Winslow's Regt. Time of service 5 days. "Dates not given." Service in Sept., 1778.

MARINER, 5 son of Richard, 4 John, 3 John, 2 mar. Sally Gaye of Bradford, Mass., b. Feb. 2, 1761. He moved to Derry from Newburyport about 1803. Geo. W. Kent of Gridley, Ill., writes:

"There is a tradition in our family that the English branch of this family was founded by one of three brothers who came from Normandy with William I. and settled in Kent Co., and took to themselves the name of the county, and each built a castle there, where are now the ruins of two castles, and one that is occupied which is said to have been theirs."

Mariner⁵ and Sally Gage Kent had six sons and one daughter. Among the children were:

PAUL, son of Joseph, Capt. Richard, writes his brother Moody:

"Went to Newburyport to learn a trade, I think that of a blockmaker, but after a short time deserted and returned home; he made up his mind to go to sea and engaged to go on a certain vessel, but for some cause became

discontented, left her, and engaged to go in another vessel, again became discontented and returned home. In no long time he determined to get a college education and went to Dummer Academy to fit himself to enter, and he continued about 9 months and abandoned that plan. Afterwards, in the year 1799, when he was 27 years old, he married with Alice Thurlow of Newbury, a distant relation of his, and then about 20 years old, and resumed his farming business. Not being quite contented with his farming business he engaged in trade in Newburyport and continued in that business about 2 years in partnership with Silas Moody. They were not successful, and my brother returned again to the island, engaged again in farming, and followed that business till the time of his death in March, 1851, when he was 78 years and about 3 months old. My brother's wife died March 20th, 1835, at the age of 57, and about one month before the death of her daughter Alice. Upon the death of his wife l'aul is said to have been afflieted with the complaint common to the family, hypochondria."

AMOS, son of Joseph, Capt. Richard, mar. Nov. 27, 1799, Abigail, dan. of Joshua Atherton of Amherst, N.H., where she was b. Oct. 22, 1775, and d. at Boston, Feb. 9, 1860. He d. at Chester, N.H., June 18, 1824; of him his bro. Moody writes:

"My brother Amos was fitted for college partly under the instruction of Benj. Rolf of Rolfe's lane in Newbury, partly at Dunmer Academy, under the instruction of the celebrated Samuel Moody, and partly under the guidance of the Rev. Isaac Smith. He entered Harvard College in 1791, and was graduated in 1795; then read law three years in the office of William Gordon, Att'y General of N.H., at Amherst; was admitted to the bar in 1798; settled in Chester, N.H., and there continued in the practice of his profession until his death in 1824."

In Chase's History of Chester, N.II., I find the following items of interest:

On Monday the tenth day of February, Anno Domini 1800, a number of the inhabitants of the town of Chester, met at the lower meeting-house in said town, to determine on some suitable mode of paying respect to the memory of Gen. George Washington. After choosing Joseph Blanchard, Esq., moderator of the meeting, and Amos Kent, Esq., clerk, the following resolves were unanimously passed. . . . Amos Kent, Esq., was appointed as one of a committee to carry the resolves into effect, and to make such other arrangements as they shall think suitable on the occasion.

At the annual meeting Amos Kent was appointed on a committee to make report on the expediency of the revision of the Constitution.

1808. At a town meeting held Sept. 26 Amos Kent was appointed one of a committee to consider the propriety of preparing a respectful petition to the President of the United States, praying him to suspend the operation of the laws laying an embargo on the ships and vessels of the United States so far as relates to Spain and Portugal and their respective colonies.

1818. In the Presbyterian tax and account book is a copy of a communication addressed to the wardens, stating that for a number of years they had been members of the parish, but that the causes that induced them to join no longer continued, and asked not to be considered members. Dated March 4, 1818.

Among the signers: Amos Kent.

On a retition dated Chester, June 9th, 1802, praying that they (your petitioners), with such others as may hereafter become proprietors with them, be a body politic and corporate for the purpose of making a turnpike road from Concord Bridge to Chester east meeting-house: Amos Kent et al.

June 19, 1804. Amos Kent and others were incorporated into Chester Turnpike Corporation. The stock was divided into three hundred shares, of which ten were taken by Amos Kent. The shares were assessed ninety dollars each.

Anti-Slavert Movement, 1835. Mr. Thompson went to Concord and took lodgings with George Kent, and was there mobbed.

MOODY,⁶ son of Joseph,⁵ Capt. Richard,⁴ was a man of strong likes and dislikes, methodical, outspoken, and critical. He kept a voluminous diary, writing in full each day about the people he met and what he did. These valuable volumes, which he indexed and had bound, together with his other manuscripts, he left with instructions in his will not to disturb them for twenty years. Through the kindness of Mrs. Chas. Carruth of Cambridge, the proud custodian of them, I have examined and drawn largely from them in preparing this book. He writes of himself as follows:

"I lost my mother when I was four and a half years old, and so lost the benefit in a great measure of her guidance and instruction, which I have no doubt would have been very important and useful to me. My father did for me all a father could do. In my boyhood I attended the town school across the meadow with other boys of my age in the neighborhood. When I was about 16 years old I was sent to Byfield Academy, then under the charge of Rev. Isaac Smith, and there fitted for college. I was thought to make respectable progress in my studies, perhaps a little better progress than was made by my associates in that school at that time. I entered Harvard College in 1797 and was graduated in the year 1801 with a fair reputation for scholarship, good morals, and good disposition. After a short time I entered the office of the Hon. William Gordon at Amherst, then Atty. Genl. of New Hampshire. While I was a student in his office Mr. Gordon died and I completed my course of study in the office of Charles H. Atherton in the same town. In the year 1804 I was admitted to the bar in Hopkinton, and in Sept. of that year I commenced the practice of my profession in Deerfield, N.H., and there continued to Sept., 1809, when I removed to Concord, N.H., and there resumed the practice of my profession and continued it till March, 1832, when I gave up practice from 1832 to 1841. I passed my time in travelling, making long stops in several cities, and every year passed several months in Concord and Pembroke attending to my affairs. From 1841 to this time, Oct., 1856, I have passed nearly all the time in Concord and Pembroke attending to my affairs, in reading, writing, and conversation with my friends."

Moody Kent d. Feb. 1, 1866, at Pittsfield, N.H., aged 89 years, leaving a large fortune. He left a large legacy to the State Industrial School in Hillsborough Co. He never married.

RICHARD, son of Capt. Stephen, Capt. Richard, mar. Miss Kezar, and lived in Daytown and Newbury. He was a genealogist; a man noted for his peaceable offices wherever needed.

He left sons and daughters when he d. in 1839, aged 77. He is buried at Byfield.

March 25, 1781. Among the bills approved of by the governor appears An Act for Apportioning and establishing the possessions of the heirs at law of Richard Kent, son of Richard Kent, late of Newbury, deceased, to a certain

Island called Kent's Island in Newbury aforesaid.

JUNE 18, 1812. In the House of Representatives, on the petition of the assessors of the Parish of Byfield, in the County of Essex, praying leave to abate certain ministerial taxes assessed against Richard Kent and others, inhabitants of said Parish, as set forth in said petition. Resolved, That the prayer of the said petition be granted, subject to the conditions agreed upon and offered them by the said Parish at a legal meeting thereof, held on the 21st day of April, A.D. 1812. In Senate, read and concurred. Approved by the Governor.

JOHN,6 son of Capt. Stephen,5 was a man of retiring habits. When young he had a courtship with Lydia Thurlow which was broken off by Sewell Woodman, who was ready to marry her at once. He mar. late in life Miss Northend, and d. in Feb., 1838, leaving no children.

The following John Kent I have been unable to locate; some students claim he belonged to the Charlestown branch of the Dedham family, others that he descended from the Newbury

LIEUT. JOHN KENT came to Conn. from Mass. abt. 1727 (supposed from Charlestown?). The first mention made of him in the Middletown records was Mch. 28, 1728, when "JOHN KENT CORKER" bought a lot of land of Daniel Starr. STEPHEN KENT, b. England, 1607, was a prominent man in Newberry from 1638 until 1646, when he moved to Haverhill. In 1665 he settled in Woodbridge, N.J. Cothin, in his history, says that Stephen was brother of Richard, senior, and that he came to Newberry in 1635, but if so he went home again and returned in 1638, in the "Confidence" from Southampton, with wife Margery and four or five servants. In his case is observable how readily the officers of the custom-house acquiesced in false statements to avoid the arbitrary orders of the Lords of Trade and Plantations, for his age is marked 17, that of his wife 16, and George March, servant, 16; besides Hugh March, 20; Anthony Sadler, 9; Nicholas Wallington, a poor boy, without any years; and Rebecca Kent, 16, called servant perhaps to increase the delusion. He was older, probably, for he was sworn a freeman 22d May, 1639.

1646, on a petition of those who were opposed to the removing of the meeting house, appears Stephen Kent. Shortly after this petition was presented, three of the petitioners removed from Newbury. Mr. Greenleaf went to Boston, Stephen Kent moved to Haverhill, etc.

"Stephen Kent 12 shillings" signed to an agreement to pay Mr Jewett his proportion of twenty pounds to purchase his house and land which the contractors give to John Johnson, provided he live here seven years following the trade of a blacksmith, in doing the town's work, etc.

ABOUT 1650 two orchards were planted, one by John Clement and the other by Stephen Kent. As near as can be ascertained, the former was situated a



little north of the cemetery, probably under the shelter of the adjacent hill; and the latter near the house where the late Samuel W. Ayer lived.

THE FOLLOWING TABLE contains the valuation of those to whom house lots were laid out at various times, but whose names do not appear previous to 1650: Steren Kent £200.

Dec 15. 1651 - Granted by the major part of the inhabitants, that Isaac Cousins shall have a sixth part of a Saw Mill or mills: and that Mr. Clement Job Clement, Stephen Kent, William White and Theophilos Satchwell shall join with him, together with any others that they shall agree with, Provided that Mr Coffin have liberty to have a sixth part of it if he come to be an inhabitant in this town. The mill to be set up upon the river, called Thomas Hale's River [Little River] They are to make use of no timber that is within three miles from the Meeting-house; except it be pines or hemlock: They are to pay for the use of the town every twelfth hundred: &c &c The second division of ploughland was laid out on the 7th of June 1652. The proportion was four acres to one acre This division Commenced at the head of Pond Meadow, and of house lots extended North, east, and west, Forty one persons received a share in the divis-The following are the names 14. Stephen Kent 224 acres.

ATT A SECOND SESSION of the Generall Court held at Boston the 19th of the 8th Moth. Año 1652 Steven Kent of Haverill, beinge fined ten pounds for Suffring five Indians to be drunken in his howse, is hereby ordered to pay the ad ten poundes to the Selectmen of the sd towne of Haverhill within one moth, who shall therewith satisfy for the cure of one of the sd Indians, who was hurt by the cunstable when he was aphended; & in case of his refusall, the marshall shall bereby fetch the sd ten poundes from Steuen Kent, with charge for his paynes & deliuer it accordingly.

ATT A GENERALL COURT of Election, held at Boston, the 18 of the 3d Moth, Anno 1653. Stephen Kent, beinge fined fine pounds for Selling to much Strong liquors to the Indians, desireing the abatement of his sd fine, is denyed.

At a town Meeting held February 9, 1654 liberty was granted to Stephen Kent to place a wear in Little River, to catch alewives, or any other fish, if he would sell to the inhabitants of the town "what alewives they stood in need of." This is the first notice we have of these fisheries, which were afterward carried on to a considerable extent.

At the close of the summer of 1665, says Coffin (History of Newbury), by invitation of Governor Carteret of New Jersey, several persons went from Newbury and settled in a township, which in honor of the Reverend John Woodbridge of Newbury was called Woodbridge. Of these emigrants some returned, others remained and became distinguished both in civil and military life. Among them were Captain John Pike, ancestor of Gen. Zebulon M. Pike, killed at the battle of Queenstown, in 1812; Thomas Bloomfield, ancestor of Joseph Bloomfield, for some years Governor of New Jersey; John Bishop, Senior and Junior; Jonathan Haynes, Henry Jaques, George March, Stephen Kent, Abraham Toppan, Jr., Elisha Ilsley, etc., etc. Governor Carteret, John Ogden, and Luke Weston, on the 21st of May, 1666, says the Hon. William A. Whitehead (Coll. of New Jersey Hist. Soc., Vol. I.), "entered into an agreement with Daniel Peirce and his associates for settling two townships; and on the 11th of December, 1666, in consideration of £80 sterling, they transferred to Peirce for that purpose one-half of the tract known as Arthur Cull [Achter Kol] or Amboyle [Amboy], as originally granted by Governor Nicolls, extending from the Raretan



to Rahawack [Rahway] river and running back into the country, according to the Indian deed. This deed was confirmed by another of similar tenor, dated 3d December, 1666, on the back of which Peirce endorsed the names of those interested with him in the grant 'that is for the accommodating of the town now called Woodbridge,' he to have the first choice. His associates were Joshua Peirce [his son], John Pike, John Bishop, Henry Jaques, and Hugh Marche of Newbury; Stephen Kent of Harcrhill: Robert Dennis of Yarmouth, and John Smith of Barnstable in New England. On the same day Peirce was commissioned deputy surveyor to lay out the bounds of Woodbridge. On the 1st of June, 1669, he and his associates received a charter."

Stephen Kent¹ mar, his first wife, Margery..., in England, By her were born most of if not all his children. He mar. 2d. Ann..., who d. May 3, 1660. He mar. 3d, Eleanor, widow of William Scadlock of Saco, Me., May 9, 1662. He had children:

It is said that "Steven" brought with him from England a daughter named Mary, who mar. Dec. 4, 1656, John Rolfe. Stephen is spoken of in 1670 as having a son-in-law, John Ford.

STEPHEN,² son of Stephen,¹ mar. Dec. 25, 1683, Jane Scott, and d. in 1729. Although mar. in Woodbridge, N.J., he evidently inherited land in Mass.

The lots in the fifth division of land (Haverhill) were drawn Nov. 20, 1721, and as showing who or rather whose representative were the commoners at this time, the list is well worth inserting: 14. Stephen Kent.

The fact that all these names except seven are to be found in the records within three years from the date of the Indian deed, and before the town was incorporated, shows clearly who were at this time considered to be the proprietors of the undivided lands in the town. They were the heirs and assigns of the original purchasers.

Stephen ² mar. twice. His will, dated Apl. 11, 1726, leaves his movable property to his wife Abigail for bringing up his two children, John ³ and Abagail. He mentioned David ³ as his oldest son, dan. Hannah, and son Stephen.³

STEPHEN and JANE SCOTT KENT had children:

It is barely possible that DAVID PAUL KENT of N.Y. City descended from this branch of the family, and possibly from David or David.



DAVID PAUL was b. in N.Y. City about 1815-18, and tradition says christened in St. Paul's Catholic Church, but that is a very modern church and I have failed to find any information there. I have also had the records of St. Paul's Episcopal Church examined and the priest in charge of St. Michael's consulted regarding its records, but found nothing. St. Peter's has disappeared. David P. Kent was of a restless, roving nature, frequently absenting himself from his family for months, and was of a reticent nature. In 1838 he went East, presumably to visit his old home in New York. In 1842 he moved his family from Meadville, Penn., to Massillon, O. In 1848 he absented himself from his family, going to Columbus, O., where he d. Oct. 20, 1848, of cholera. Tradition says he was son of Abraham Lewis and Faith Viola Kent and that he had bro's Timothy, Henry I., and Rudulph, and sisters Athetha and Hester Susan. David P. ran away while an apprentice and completed his trade in Newark, N.J., 1836-7. He then went to Hollidaysburg, Penn., where he met Margaret Parks, dan. of George and Catharine (James) Parks, who was b. at Elizabethtown, Pa., Dec. 25, 1813; d. Massillon, O., May 13, 1895. He mar. her Sept. 8, 1837, and moved to Petersburg, thence to Meadville, Penn., and in 1842 to Massillon, O. They had 4 sons and 2 daughters. SOLDIERS IN KING PHILIP'S WAR.

On December 27 (1675) he (Capt. Prentice) rode into Pomham's county (now Warwick, R.1.) and destroyed many wigwams of an Indian Village, but found no Indians, on January 21, he was again Scouting, and met a party of Indians, of whom two were captured and nine killed. On the 27th the army started in pursuit of the enemy, and after several days' marching returned to Boston, and the Massachusetts men were dismissed, for the time, to their homes. In 1702 Hannah Kent, Alias Mansu, reliet of Wm. Kent, late of Boston, deceased, leases for 30 years land to Thos. Walker et al., "northerly end of Boston near Halcey's Wharf," paying therefor "one Indian corn upon each Ist day of May yearly." They agree to creet a good brick tenement with shops; also land in "Southerly end of the town of Boston, Easterly side of highway leading to Roxbury;" also other land. This lease was discharged 1733.

Anno 1714. The Names of the Inholders or Taverners and of the Retailers without Doors in Boston viz⁴. Inholders, Hannah Kent.

The House & Land I give to my Great Grand Daughter Mary Glover Daughter of my Grand Child John Glover aforesaid and her heirs & assigns forever, and the piece of Land to my Great Grand Son John Glover. Son to John Glover aforesaid and to his heirs and assigns forever - Item - I give and bequeath to Great Grand Daughter Hannah Glover aforesaid my great Silver Punch Bowl and my silk Petty coat wrought with with Silver and gold thread and Laced and my Bed & Bedding which I leave in my Chamber with all the Chambers Furniture not before Divided to either of my Grand Children and to her heirs & assigns forever. Item, I give and bequeath to my Grent Grand Daughter Mary Glover aforesaid my great Silver Tankard and to her heirs & assigns forever -Item - all the rest of my estate which Consists in money, wearing Clothes Plate and Books I give and bequeath equally between my two Grandsons Denn Glover & John Glover and to their heirs forever - I Constitute and appoint my Friend Mr. Owen Harris of Boston aforesaid Mathematick School master the only and sole executor.

. Bessie, b. May 10, 1882. Thomas, son of William M., was educated in the public schools of Buffalo, and entered the office of Marling & Burdett as an architectural draughtsman. In 1891 he became deeply interested in mission work, and devoted some time to it in the Canal-street mission. He soon became convinced that it was his duty to go to a foreign field. After spending some time in the training college in New York, he fixed on the Central Soudan as the place of his future labors. With a companion, Walter Gowans of



Toronto, he sailed in Oct., 1893, for England as an independent missionary. In England they took as a third companion a young man named Rowland V. Bingham, and the three sailed from Liverpool for Africa on Nov. 4, 1893, and landed at Lagos, the chief town on the coast of Guinea, and formerly the centre of the slave trade. Soon after their arrival they were all three attacked with coast fever; but Thomas Kent and Walter Gowans soon recovered; and, leaving Bingham behind, they started for Kano, their objective point, with 20 natives earrying 60 lbs. apiece. Kano was the commercial centre of the country, and was beyond any missions then established. After getting as far as Bida Kent turned back to get a further supply of provisions at the coast. It was on his way back that he was attacked with fever at Bida, and there he died Dec. 8, 1894. Bida is a city northeast of the Nigor, and was lately invaded by the forces under Sir George Goldie. Thomas Kent accomplished more in the way of exploration than missionary work, and his diary of his travels and a map of the country drawn by himself are in the possession of his father.

JOHN KENT, who on Feb. 14, 1711, was mar, in Boston by *Mr. Samuel Miles* to Abigail Andrews, I have been unable to locate. He d. May 5, 1720, leaving widow and children.

Cutter Memorial.

Jonathan Cutler was born in Holliston Nov. 6, 1735, and received from his father's cetate the south part of his farm, and built his house one-half mile west of S. Morse Cutler's. He was esteemed a devout Christian, became a Separatist, established public worship at his house, and every Sabbath when supplies failed his brother Moses used to speak, and here his brother Ebenezer took his first lessons in preaching. He married Jerusha Blake of Wrentham, Mass., Dec. 8, 1763, who married for her second husband Joseph Kent of Uxbridge May 27, 1799.

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
