PREFACE

HE idea of compiling such a record as is herein given had often been suggested by the often been suggested, but the undertaking was not finally launched until the Summer of 1903. In the vicinity of Bearsdale, Macon county, Illinois, Jacob, Samuel and Ephraim Bear, Jr., had lived and reared their large families, but in recent years the children and grandchildren of these old pioneers have become more and more scattered. In the Summer of 1903, some of each branch who had removed to other localities, it so happened, were back in the old neighborhood at the same time, and coming together at the old homestead of Samuel Bear, where his widow and youngest son still reside, it was thought this would be a good time to put the plan into operation. At this gathering were the following persons: Mrs. Hulda Rankin, Mrs. Mary E. Braden, Mrs. Emma Reisinger, Mrs. Mary Bear, Mrs. Sarah M. Bear, Mrs. Ann C. Bear, Samuel E. Bear and wife, and Brice I. Bear and wife. Brice J. Bear, of Bearsdale, Ill., was elected President, and an Executive Committee appointed composed of the following persons: Samuel E. Bear, of Welch, Ind. Ter.; Mrs. Mary E. Braden, of Lake Arthur, La.; Mrs. Hulda Rankin, of White Heath, Ill.; Mrs. Elizabeth A. Troutman, of Decatur, Ill., and Mrs. Emma C. Reisinger, of Bearsdale, Ill. Walter S. Bear, of St. Louis, Mo., was made Secretary, and selected to collect the material for the book. At this time it was not expected to get up anything more than a record of the descendants of Ephraim Bear, Sr., but as old records were found, the plan so unfolded itself that in this volume is given practically a complete record of all the descendants of Jacob Bear, Sr. There are possibly not a dozen names missing in this genealogy, which embraces seven generations from 1747 to 1906.

It has been attempted to give a brief mention of the personality and vocation in life of each person who has, or had reached the years of maturity, but in most cases your Secretary has found it difficult to procure the needed data, due, possibly, to the reticence, or modesty, of many of the friends. His aim has been to avoid any partiality in this regard, but naturally he could use only the data he was able to procure.

ORIGIN

THE German name Bär, meaning a beast, is equivalent to Baer when translated into English, but with few exceptions the true English spelling, Bear, has been adhered to by the family of which this genealogy has been compiled.

Every effort has been made to ascertain the place of birth, or nativity, of Jacob Bear, Sr., but while records have been found which give date of his birth and death, they do not state where he was born. The supposition is had by the older members of the family that he came from Germany, but no positive proof of this fact can be found. Your Secretary, in the course of his investigation, has been in communication with representatives of a good many families of our name, spelling it in different ways, and while it is remarkable that with few exceptions these families had their American origin in Pennsylvania, the connection, if at all, is very remote. It may be possible that could these families be traced in the old country, it would be found they had the same origin. Your Secretary has found two other families besides ourselves who were compiling genealogies at this time. One of these spell the name Bare and the other Bair, and both sprang from Lancaster county, Pa. As far back as can be traced, it seems the Bears (spelling the name in different ways) came over with the Swiss Mennonites about 1700 and settled in Lancaster county. It is possible that our Jacob came from one of these Lancaster county families. It is very probable that he was of Swiss-German origin, as a biographical sketch, written of Ephraim Bear, Jr., before the latter's death, stated the family was of Swiss origin. This was probably written with Ephraim's knowledge, and it is very probable he knew the place of birth of Jacob Bear, Sr., his grandfather. Unfortunately, Ephraim Bear, Ir., died many years before this work was undertaken. In fact, there are none now living of the third generation.

Ephraim Bear, Jr., was evidently much interested in family records, and it was due to his carefulness in this regard we are

able to give a complete record of the family of Jacob Bear, Sr. In an old Bible, which had been the property of his father, Ephraim Bear, Sr., Ephraim, Jr., had copied from other records the names and dates of birth of the family of Jacob Bear, Sr. Where he obtained this information, and what became of the original record, cannot be said. In this same record he had copied the names and dates of birth of the family of his mother's father, Sebastian Bowers. This latter record, however, he obtained from his cousin, Levi Kendig, of Mechanicsburg, Pa., a son of Anna (Bowers) Kendig. Mr. Kendig, who is still living, states Ephraim copied this record many years ago from the Sebastian Bowers' Bible, now in possession of Mr. Kendig.

All the early members of our family spoke German, so we are German in characteristic, whether Jacob Bear, from whom we are tracing, was actually born in Germany or came from German or Swiss-German parentage.

THE OLD HOMESTEAD

A BOUT two and a half miles from Newville, Pa., lies the old homestead of Jacob Bear, Sr., our paternal ancestor, of whose posterity this history is written. It long since passed out of the Bear family and is now owned by David S. Kerr. The old house was torn down many years ago and replaced with a building of more modern design, but on this farm Jacob Bear lived and died, and here he was buried.

On a small plat of ground, on the banks of the Canodoguinett Creek, Jacob, his wife, his sons Isaac, Jacob and Samuel, and his daughters Rebecca and Elizabeth, were buried, following a custom in those early days to bury the dead upon their own ground. In this little enclosure were also buried Elizabeth (Mountz) Bear and Rebecca (Myers) Bear, wives of Ephraim and Samuel Bear, grandsons of Jacob, Sr. This burial ground, in the after years, came to be known as the "Martin graveyard," because of the family of that name then owning the land; but they have not owned the property since 1867.

Jacob Bear bought this land October 13, 1786, from Margery and Walter Denny, and from the records of Cumberland county we give a copy of the deed conveying the property to Jacob Bear.

Deed of Conveyance Margery and Walter Denny to Jacob Bear. This indenture, made this 13th of October, one thousand seven hundred and eighty-six, between Margery Denny and Walter Denny, both late of Westpennsborough township, Cumberland county, and State of Pennsylvania, of the one part, and Jacob Bear, of the township, county and State aforesaid of the other.

Witnesseth that the said Margery and Walter Denny for and in consideration of the sum of one thousand seven hundred pounds, good and lawful money of Pennsylvania, to them in hand paid by the said Jacob Bear before the sealing and delivery thereof, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have granted, bargained, sold, released and confirmed, and by these presents doth grant, bargain, sell, release and confirm to the said Jacob Bear, his heirs and assigns forever, a certain messuage, tenement or tract of land situate, lying and being in Westpennsborough township, Cumberland county, bounded by the following lines (viz.): Beginning at a post on the bank of the Cannedoguinnet Creek, thence by James Graham's land south twenty-six degrees, east forty-two perches and an half to a post, south fifty-five degrees, west twentyeight perches to a post, south thirty degrees, west eighteen perches to an ash tree, south forty-nine degrees and an half, east eighty perches and an half to a post, south forty-one degrees, west one perch to an hickory and south forty-nine degrees and an half east three hundred and ninety-one perches to a corner post of Alexander McKeehen's land, thence by the same south fifty-four degrees, west one hundred and twenty-seven perches and an half to an hickory grub in a line of George Lefeaver's land, thence by the same north three degrees, west twenty-two perches to a white oak and south eight degrees and an half, west thirty-nine perches and three-quarters to a corner white oak of Benjamin Paaton's land, thence by the same north one degree, west eighty-one perches to a stone and north fifty-six degrees and an half west two hundred and eighty perches and an half to a rock on the bank of the above said creek, thence down the same forty-six perches crossing said creek to a white oak, thence by William Griffin's land south eighty-four degrees, west thirty-five perches and an half to a post and north two degrees, west forty-three perches and three-quarters to a post on the line of widow Bovard's land, thence by the same north eighty-four degrees, east forty-two perches and an half to a hickory on the north-westerly side of the aforesaid creek, thence down the same one hundred and three perches and an half to the place of beginning. Containing in all two hundred and sixty acres and the usual allowance of 6 per cent. for roads, etc., with the appurtenances (which said tract was surveyed in pursuance of a warrant granted to the said Margery and Walter Denny, dated the 31st October, 1783) as will more fully appear by a Patent granted unto the said Margery and Walter Denny the 7th day of January, 1786, and signed by the honourable Charles Biddle, Esqr., Vice President of the Supreme Executive Council, etc., etc., and willed by John Denny, deceased, as will be found in his last will and testament, a full and free power to sell and convey unto the said Margery and Walter Denny.

To have and to hold all and singular the messuage, buildings and other improvements thereon erected and made together with all the ways, woods, waters and watercourses, rights, liberties, privileges, advantages, hereditaments and appurtenances whatsoever thereunto belonging and in anywise appertaining and all the right, title, claim, interest, property and demand whatsoever of them the said Margery and Walter Denny their heirs or assigns forever, they the said Margery and Walter Denny do hereby warranty defend against all and every other person or persons lawfully claiming or to claim the same or any part thereof.

In witness whereof the said Margery and Walter Denny have hereunto set their hands and seals the day and year first above written.

Jacob Bear died July 14, 1793, and the records of Cumberland County reveal the following pertaining to the settlement of the estate:

To the Honorable, the Judges of the Orphans' Court of the County of Cumberland:

The petition of Jacob Bear, eldest son of Jacob Bear, deceased, late of Westpennsborough township, Cumberland County, sheweth

That your petitioner's father, the said Jacob Bear, died intestate, seized in his demesne as of fee of and in a plantation and tract of land situate in Westpennsborough township, in the county of Cumberland aforesaid, joining lands of James Graham and Sebastian Bower. That the said Jacob Bear, deceased, left a widow, Catherine Bear, and four children, to wit: Jacob, your petitioner, Rebecca, Ephraim and David. That your petitioner is willing and desirous that the said land be divided amongst the widow and children of the said deceased, if the same can be done

without prejudice to or spoiling the whole, but that if the same cannot be so divided that a just and conscionable appraisement and valuation be made of the said plantation and tract of land with the appertenances.

Your petitioner therefore prays the Court to award an inquest to divide the said plantation and tract of land amongst the widow and children of the said intestate, if the same can be so divided without injury to and spoiling the whole thereof, but if same cannot be so divided without injury to and spoiling the whole that then a just and conscionable appraisement be made thereof agreeably to the acts of Assembly in such case made and provided, and that the inquest make return of their proceedings to the next stated Orphans' Court.

And your petitioner will pray,

JACOB BEAR, Carlisle, 22d October, 1800.

22nd October, 1800. Petition read and inquest awarded.

Then follows an instrument, signed by Samuel Laird, Esq., and William Lyon, Clerk of the Orphans' Court, commanding the Sheriff "that taking with you twelve good and lawful men of Bailiwick, you go to the said plantation and tract of land, situate as aforesaid whereof the said Jacob Bear died (intestate), seized and possessed and by their oaths and solemn affirmations, of the said plantation and tract of land make partition among the widow and children of the said Jacob Bear, deceased, if the same can be done without injury to and spoiling the whole, but if it cannot be so divided that you then cause the said inquest to value and appraise the said plantation and tract of land with the appurtenances, paying due respect to its value, and that the said valuation so made you have distinctly before the Judges of the Orphans' Court in the borough of Carlisle at an Orphans' Court thereto to be held for said county the thirty-first day of March next, under your hand and seal and under the hands and seals of those by whose oaths and affirmations the said partition or valuation shall be made, and have you then there this writ."

Report of the Inquisition is given as follows:

Inquisition indented taken at the plantation and tract of land, late the property of Jacob Bear, deceased, situate in Westpennsborough township, in the County of Cumberland and State of Pennsylvania, the fourteenth day of March in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and one, before John Carothers, Esq., High Sheriff of Cumberland County, by the oaths of James McFarlane, Joseph Purie, Jeremiah McKibben, Jacob Mires, Atchison Laughlin, Jared Graham, Benjamin McKeehan, John Roads, Andrew Heikes, Thomas McIntire, Stephen Rhine and John Dunbar, twelve good and lawful men of the bailiwick of the same Sheriff, who upon their oaths respectively do say that they, together with the same Sheriff, went to the plantation and tract of land mentioned in the within writ whereof the said Jacob Bear died (intestate) seized and possessed and on inquiry do find that the said tract of land cannot be divided to and among the widow and children of the said Jacob Bear, deceased, without injury to and spoiling the whole, wherefore the jurors aforesaid, upon their oaths aforesaid, respectively do value and appraise the said tract of land, with the appurtenances, to the sum of eighteen hundred and sixty-two pounds, five shillings, lawful money of Pennsylvania.

In testimony whereof as well as the said Sheriff as the inquest aforesaid have hereunto set their hands and affixed their seals the day and year above written.

Came into Court John Carothers, Esq., High Sheriff of Cumberland County, and made return of a writ of partition or

valuation of the real estate of Jacob Baer, deceased, tested the thirty-first day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and to the Sheriff directed with an inquisition upon the said estate, made by the said Sheriff and twelve lawful and honest men of his bailiwick, under their hands and seals respectively the fourteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and one, and to the said writ annexed by which inquisition it appeared to the Court that the said Sheriff and inquest had valued and appraised the real estate of the said Jacob Baer, deceased, viz: a certain plantation and tract of land in West Pennsborough Township, in the County of Cumberland aforesaid, joining lands of James Graham and Sebastian Bower to the sum of eighteen hundred and sixty-two pounds, five shillings in lawful money of Pennsylvania, which valuation the Court confirmed.

Whereupon Jacob Baer, oldest son of Jacob Baer, deceased, came into Court and acknowledged in open Court that in consideration of one hundred pounds he had relinquished his right to any more than one child's share of his father's estate, and prayed the Court to confirm the said estate to him and offered to his security, David Snider, of West Pennsborough Township, which security being considered by the Court sufficient, the following recognizance:

CATHARINE BAER VS. JACOB BAER.

CATHARINE BAER | Seventeen pounds, fourteen and ten pence.

David Snider held in six hundred and seventeen pounds, fourteen shillings and ten pence.

To be levied of their goods and chattels, lands and tenements, respectively, on this condition that if the said Jacob Baer do well and truly pay unto the said Catherine Baer, widow of the said Jacob Baer, deceased, the interest arising from the sum of six hundred and seventeen pounds, fourteen shillings and ten pence yearly, and every year during her natural life from and after the thirty-first day of March, A. D. 1802, then these recognizances to be void, otherwise to remain in full force and virtue.

(A memorandum appears stating that "2nd December, 1801, Jacob Baer produced receipt from David Snider, guardian of Rebecca Baer, in full of her share.)

(The same recognizance appears for Ephraim and David, the other two children of Jacob Bear, with the memoranda that Jacob Baer produced receipts, 2nd December, 1801, from "Joseph Whitmore or Widmer," guardian of Ephraim, and from "Abraham Meyer," guardian of David, for their share.)

To be levied of their goods and chattels, lands and tenements respectively on this condition, that if the said Jacob Baer do well and truly pay unto the said Rebecca Bear, Ephraim Bear and David Baer respectively the sum of two hundred and eighty-three pounds, seventeen shillings and five pence on or before the thirtyfirst day of March, A. D. 1802, with interest from the first day of October, A. D. 1801, and also if he pay unto the said Rebecca, Ephraim and David respectively the sum of one hundred and fiftyfour pounds, eight shillings and eight pence, half penny at the death of Catharine Baer, widow of said Jacob Baer, deceased, then these recognizances to be void, otherwise to remain in full force and virtue.

Whereupon it is considered and adjudged by the Court that the said Jacob Baer hold and possess the said plantation and tract of land with the appurtenances whereof the said Jacob Baer died, seized and possessed to him, his heirs and assigns forever under such condition as the said Jacob Baer, deceased, held and possessed the same at the time of his death and subject to the foregoing recognizances.

Under date of April 17, 1804, the records show that Jacob Bear sold 110 acres of the original tract to Emanuel Neiswanger tor "two thousand, one hundred and fifty pounds." Catherine Bear giving the necessary release. The records also show a deed from Jacob Bear to Ephraim's Bear's guardian for 83 acres of the original tract. Other transfers were made in which the names of "David Snider, Ex.," and "George Nailor, Ex.," appear. As is shown elsewhere in this history, David Snider or Snyder, was a brother-in-law of Jacob Bear, Sr., while George Nailor became the father-in-law of David Bear.

A Brief of Title to the farm proper shows a patent deed dated July 7, 1786, from the Supreme Executor's Council to Margery and Walter Denny; deed dated October 13, 1786, from Margery and Walter Denny to Jacob Bear; the land taken by Jacob Bear, Jr., under partition proceedings in 1801; deed dated April 17, 1804, from Jacob Bear to Emanuel Neiswanger; dated April 1, 1829, from Emanuel Neiswanger to Jacob Martin; the land taken by Emanuel and Jacob Martin, eldest and second sons of Jacob Martin, under partition proceedings; deed dated March 31, 1860, from Emanuel Martin to Jacob Martin; deed dated March 20, 1867, from Jacob Martin to William Kerr; and from William Kerr the farm descended to David S. Kerr, its present owner.

GENEALOGY

JACOB BEAR.1

Jacob Bear, according to a record preserved by Ephraim Bear, Jr., "was born in the year of our Lord, 1747, July 14th." This record does not state where. It also has this entry: "Catharine Bear was born in the year of our Lord A. D. 1752 in March." Catharine was Jacob's wife, and her name before her marriage was Snider or Snyder. David Bear, their son, in his Bible recorded the date of marriage of his father and mother, June 10, 1775. He also recorded that "Catherine Snyder" was born in Germany in March, 1752. Seven children were born to Jacob and Catharine (Snyder) Bear, and Ephraim Bear, Jr., in the old Bible that had been his father's, Ephraim Bear, Sr., had recorded the names and dates of birth as follows:

"Jacob Bear was born in the year of our Lord, A. D., 1779, Apr. 19th."

"Isaac Bear was born in the year of our Lord, A. D., 1780,

Nov. 22."

"Rebecca Bear was born in the year of our Lord, A. D., 1782, Aug. 15th."

"Ephraim Bear was born in the year of our Lord, A. D.,

1784, Feb. 7th."

"David Bear was born in the year of our Lord, A. D.,1785, Dec. 9th."

"Elizabeth Bear was born in the year of our Lord, A. D.,

1787, Dec. 20th."

"Samuel Bear was born in the year of our Lord, A. D., 1792, June 8th."

It is very evident that Isaac, Elizabeth and Samuel died in early childhood, as in the partition settlement of the estate of Jacob Bear no reference is given to these three children. Jacob, the oldest son, never married; Rebecca married Henry Birely; Ephraim married Mary Bowers; and David married Esther Nailor. The record referred to gives the date of Jacob Bear, Sr.'s death as July 14, 1793, and that of his wife June 8, 1817. It would therefore seem that Jacob died on the anniversary of the 46th year of his birth. Nothing is known of his personality. His children, Rebecca, Ephraim and David, all manifested a deep religious spirit, and it is very probable they derived the inspiration from their father before them. Bishop J. Dickson, of the United Brethren Church, writes that David Bear told him that Rev. William Otterbein, who was a very noted divine in the early days, one of the organizers and the first ordained bishop of the United Brethren in Christ Church, stopped with his father one time when he, David, was but a boy. It is therefore very likely that Jacob was a man of religious tendencies, and probably a member of the United Brethren Church, to which creed his children gave allegiance.

2 ¹JACOB BEAR,² (Jacob,¹)

Jacob Bear, the oldest son of Jacob and Catharine (Snyder) Bear, was born near Newville, Cumberland county, Pa., April 19, 1779. As is shown elsewhere, after the death of his father, he, as the oldest son, succeeded to the ownership of the 260 acres of land Jacob Bear, Sr., owned near Newville. But little is known of Jacob Bear, Jr., except that he never married,

and during the War of 1812 served as a teamster. His death occurred in 1837 or 1838, of lock-jaw, as a result of cutting his foot while chopping wood.

Rebecca Bear, the third child of Jacob and Catharine (Snyder) Bear, was born near Newville, Cumberland county, Pa., Aug 15, 1782. Her marriage occurred May 15, 1806, to Henry Birely, and to their union were born four

Rebecca Bear was the second wife of Henry Birely, he having been previously married. By his first marriage, Henry Birely had one son, Lewis Birely, of Hamilton, Canada.

Little is known of Henry Birely, but his wife, Rebecca, is remembered as a woman of a very kindly nature. Henry Birely died in 1813. Rebecca, the wife and mother, died at the home of her daughter, Catherine Shellabarger, June 12, 1851.

Probably the most characteristic feature of Ephraim Bear, Sr., was his magnanimous and benevolent spirit. He is remembered by his grandchildren as a man rather short in stature and not heavily built. His hair was snowy white, quite thin on top of his head, and hung in beautiful white ringlets about his neck. He had a very expressive face which beamed with kindness. He had a smile for every one. Even in his old age he was very industrious and felt he must not be idle, and he would sit for hours making wooden garden rakes and similar articles. He was a devout Christian man and lived and died a member of the United Brethren Church. His home near Newville, Cumberland county, Pa., was the scene of many a revival. The people would come for miles around to these meetings, which, when the weather would permit, would be held in Ephraim's barn, and when it became too cold they would conduct the services in his house. At these meetings these Christian people would make manifest a "heart-felt" religion. It is said it was the custom of Ephraim to always pray in German.

Ephraim Bear, Sr.'s occupation in life was that of a farmer, though he was skillful with tools. He and his wife lived in Cumberland county until some time after all their sons, Jacob, Samuel and Ephraim, had removed to Macon county, when they too came West. Mary, the wife and mother, died April 10, 1861. Ephraim made his home with his older son, Jacob, but his death occurred at the home of his son Samuel, of a paralytic stroke, Sept. 27, 1865. Both were interred in Boiling Springs cemetery,

near Bearsdale, Ill.

David Bear and his brother Ephraim were unlike in many respects. David is said to have been a man very resolute and fixed in his opinions and convictions, and determined in spirit. His features were strong and his voice powerful. He was more reticent in disposition than Ephraim, not so easily approached, vet he was charitable in his nature and warm in his friendships. He was a constant reader of the Bible, and was a true Christian man, particularly so in the latter period of his life. In his religious views he had the same set convictions characteristic of the man, and was unwavering and uncompromising in his belief as to what was right and what was wrong. He was baptized in October, 1803, when 18 years of age, by Rev. William Otterbein, who was the first bishop of the United Brethren in Christ church. and of which church David remained a member until his death.

Like his brother Ephraim, David followed agricultural pursuits during his residence in Cumberland county, Pa., near Newville, in which community he was born, grew to manhood, married, and where he reared his own family. He was also very handy with tools, and was of a very industrious turn of mind. Even after he had retired from active life, he would employ the time weaving baskets, and constructing various small articles of practical use. Neatness was a part of all he undertook. The records made in his Bible show him to have been an excellent penman and a good scholar. The entries in this Bible are drawn or printed in a very artistic manner, indicating patient and painstaking care in their preparation. Favorite passages are marked throughout the pages of this Bible, and on one page is written the following in German:

> "I will keep the faith in Christ— Christ's ship cannot founder; If the sea be yet so wild, Yet should mask and sail break, God will not his own forsake."

Esther (Nailor) Bear, or "Aunt Hetty," as she was affectionately called, was amiable and kind, and was never known to show anger. On her death-bed she shook hands with her children and asked them to meet her in Heaven, and judging by the pure lives which they lived, surely this Christian mother's wish was gratified. The following tribute was paid to her memory by Rev. J. G. Shoaff through a newspaper at the time of her death:

"Esther, wife of David Bear, died near Springfield, Cumberland county, Pa., Aug. 13, 1867, aged 79 years, 6 mos. and 13 days. Mother Bear was a native of York county, in this State. She embraced religion in youth about 63 years ago, and held fast the beginning of her confidence firm unto the end. For many months she was unable to attend church, being confined to her room by sickness and infirmity; but during that time she was cheerful and happy, rejoicing in God and her Savior. In her last moments too, she expressed great confidence and peace, exulting in her near prospect of Heavenly joy. Mother Bear was a life long member of the United Brethren Church."

After the death of his wife, David Bear straightened up his business affairs in Pa., and on Oct. 23, 1867, came to Pulaski, Ohio, to live with his son Daniel. Here he lived until the time of his death, May. 22, 1873. He was buried in Shiffler cemetery.

Jacob Byerly was born at Chambersburg, Pa., Feb. 5, 1807, and was the eldest child of Henry and Rebecca (Bear) Birely. In his early life he was a school teacher, and it was then that he adopted the spelling of the name Byerly for Birely, and following his example all the members of the family have spelled the name in the same manner. In 1842, Jacob Byerly took up the daguerreotype, which at that time was a new thing. He continued in that business until 1868, in which year he sold his gallery at Frederick, Md., to his son, John Davis Byerly, for \$2,000. The latter continued the business until 1899, when he in turn gave it up to his son, Charles, and Charles Byerly is to-day conducting the gallery established by the grandfather in 1842.

Jacob Byerly was twice married. His first marriage was on March 29, 1831, to Catherine Bear, his cousin, who was born in Cumberland county, Pa., Apr. 13, 1809, and was the daughter of David and Esther (Nailor) Bear. To this union three children were born. Catherine died May 22, 1841. Jacob Byerly again married on Jan. 23, 1849, his second marriage being to Catherine Elizabeth Hauer, who was born in 1813, and was the daughter of Daniel and Margaret (Mantz) Hauer. This marriage was solemnized by the Rev. Daniel Zacharias, D. D., at the German Reformed Church, Frederick, Md. Three children were born to this union. Jacob Byerly died at Frederick, Md., March 31, 1883, and his second wife, Apr. 2, 1885. They were members of the M. E. Church.


The Shellabarger family is of Swiss origin and was founded in America by Martin Shellenberger, who came to this country in 1770. The name was pronounced Shellabarger by the English speaking people, and consequently when Martin learned to write English, he gave the spelling now adhered to.

David and Catherine (Byerly) Shellabarger owned a farm in Cumberland county, Pa., about 8 miles from Carlisle, and here they reared their family. Eventually they removed to Macon county, Illinois. David Shellabarger died at Decatur, Illinois, Aug. 14, 1884, and his wife Catherine died at the home of their daughter, Mrs. Albert Henkle, at Salina, Kansas, March 30, 1889. Both were buried in Greenwood cemetery, Decatur, Illinois. Their home was a Christian home and their children were brought up under religious training.

John Sterrett, the father of David Sterrett, was born Apr. 20, 1772, and he was the son of David and Rachel (Innis) Sterrett, who were married, so an old record says, "in the year of our Lord God, 1762, in the fifth day of May." It is thus from Rachel Innis that Innis has been handed down as a family name so many

generations in the Sterrett family.

David Sterrett during his residence in Pennsylvania was a farmer, and lived in Cumberland county of that State. Later he removed to Carlisle, the county-seat. About 1859, the family came to Jacksonville, Ill., but remained but a year or two, when they again returned to Carlisle. Later, they once again came to Illinois and this time located at Decatur. Here they lived for a few years and eventually removed again to Taylorville, where Mr. and Mrs. Sterrett both died. Mr. Sterrett's death occurred Oct. 31, 1878, and his wife a year later, Dec. 15, 1879. Both were buried at Taylorville.

The local paper at the time of Mrs. Sterrett's death pub-

lished the following:

"Died—At her residence in this city, of heart disease, on Monday afternoon, Dec. 15, 1879, Mrs. David Sterrett, aged 68

years.

"Mrs. Sterrett was in an eminent degree a domestic woman. She always loved her home, and the pleasures and duties that cluster around the fireside, and in the last years of her life had no higher earthly ambition than to preserve the home influence intact to her children. She was always, during her long life, self-sacrificing and entirely unselfish, greatly given to hospitality, and desirous of contributing to the happiness of others at all times. She was very charitable within her limited means, and took delight in giving a cup of water in her Master's name. She had fixed and settled religious views regarding the great questions of immortality, death and a future existence, even in her girlhood, and after her marriage united with the Presbyterian Church of Carlisle, Pa., still holding her membership at the time of her death.

"As a neighbor she was kind and obliging. As a mother she filled that position to the fullest extent and meaning of the term, always delighting in her children, and training them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. Of her children, three died in her early life and have gone to the spirit land, there to await her coming, and welcome her to the enjoyments of that bright realm; while five survive her to deeply mourn her loss.

"Although from the nature of her disease she at times must have suffered acute pain, so great was her faith in her Redeemer that she was enabled to endure all her sickness with true Christian fortitude and resignation, and to say with the Psalmist: "Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for thou art with me, thy rod and thy staff they comfort me."

"Her mortal remains were laid away tenderly and sadly by her children, friends and neighbors, in Oak Hill Cemetery, by the side of her husband who died only a little over a year ago on Tuesday afternoon, at 3 o'clock."

13 ¹LEAH BEAR,³ (Ephraim,² Jacob,¹)

Leah, the oldest child of Ephraim and Mary (Bowers) Bear, was born near Newville, Pa., on Dec. 15, 1805. To her is given the distinction of having lived the longest of any of the descendants of Jacob Bear, and consequently of any whose names go to make up this history. She died at Orrstown, Pa., March 27, 1896, aged 90 years, 3 months and 12 days.

Leah Bear was twice married. Her first marriage was to Jacob Knisley, who was born on June 20, 1799, and who died at Orrstown, Pa., Sept 3, 1846. Five children were born to their union. After she had been a widow for twenty years, Leah (Bear) Knisley on Jan. 25, 1866, married David Brandt, who had previously married Elizabeth Bear, Leah's cousin, and whose

descendants appear elsewhere in this book. David Brandt was born in Cumberland county, Pa., Aug. 15, 1802, and was the son of Jacob and Elizabeth (Gardner) Brandt. His death occurred at Big Spring, Pa., Nov. 21, 1884.

Leah Bear Knisley-Brandt was in many ways a remarkable woman. She possessed a keen memory and had a happy faculty of recalling the happenings of early life. She had strong convictions and had a strong conviction of the strong convictions of the strong

tions on religious questions and expressed them freely.

She and Jacob Knisley were among the number converted at a revival meeting held in Shippensburg, Pa., by Rev. James Mackey, who was associated with Rev. John Winebrenner in the early forties in establishing churches of God in Central Pennsylvania. Her husband was one of the leading spirits in the building of the bethel of the church of God at Orrstown, Pa., and he was the first person buried in the adjoining graveyard, at which place she lies beside her first husband. Samuel and Jacob Knisley are also buried here.

She had a particular fondness for the friends in the West, and during her life paid several visits to them, the last visit

being in 1880.

Her home was always known as the preachers' stopping place and her hospitality was shared by many of the early preachers of the churches of God. She was kind to the worthy poor and many weary travelers found food and shelter under her roof, she being specially prepared to entertain them.

She lived with David Brandt for eighteen years, at his home at Big Spring, Pa. After his death she lived in Orrstown

until she died at the ripe old age of ninety.

The last chapter of Proverbs, 10-31st, is peculiarly ap-

plicable to her. All of the womanly virtues described therein had their counterpart in Leah Bear, and truly "her children rise up and call her blessed."

14 ²JACOB BEAR,³ (Ephraim,² Jacob,¹)

Jacob Bear, the second child of Ephraim and Mary (Bowers) Bear, was born near Newville, Pa., Nov. 25, 1809, and died at Bearsdale, Ill., Oct. 5, 1891. He was twice married, his first marriage being on April 12, 1831, to Martha Bowman, daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth (Diller) Bowman. Martha Bowman was born near Newville, Pa., July 26, 1809, and died at Newville, Pa., Aug. 13, 1844. Her mother, Elizabeth Diller, is of the same Diller family as Samuel Diller who married Amelia Ann and Rebecca Jane Shellabarger, consequently there is a double relationship between these families. Samuel Bowman was born June 23, 1776, and his wife, Elizabeth, Apr. 24, 1786. They were married Jan. 10, 1804.

Jacob Bear's second marriage occurred at Newville, Pa., Jan. 10, 1845, to Catherine Knisley, who was born in York county, Pa., July 2, 1820. She was the daughter of John and Mary (Noaker) Knisley. This John Knisley was a brother of the Jacob Knisley who married Leah Bear, and thus uncle and niece married brother and sister, and there is a double relationship existing between the children of Jacob and Leah (Bear) Knisley and Jacob and Catherine (Knisley) Bear. Catherine Knisley was left without a mother at the age of 6 years, and Ephraim and Mary (Bowers) Bear took her into their home and raised her as their own child. By her good disposition she won the hearts of all the family, Jacob being no exception, and it is a very natural thing that she became his wife after his first bereavement. After her marriage to Jacob Bear she was known as "Aunt Cousin Katy" to the children of Jacob Knisley, and they always so addressed her on account of the double relationship. "Aunt Cass," as she was most familiarly known, lived to the ripe age of 83 years, 5 months and 4 days, her death occurring Dec. 6, 1903, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Hulda Rankin, near White Heath, Ill. Services were conducted by Rev. Ishler at the home of Mrs. Rankin, but the regular funeral service was held at Boiling

Springs Church, near Bearsdale, on Monday, Dec. 7, 1903, conducted by Rev. I. S. Richmond. "Aunt Cass" united with the church at the age of 18 years and remained a faithful member to the time of her death. The success of this book is due largely to information she was able to give just a short time before her death. She had an excellent memory.

The first three were born near Newville, Pa., and the last four near Decatur, Ill. The three children died near Decatur, and buried in Boiling Springs cemetery.

Jacob Bear removed from Pennsylvania to Illinois in 1852. In company with his younger brother, Ephraim, and Isaac Shellabarger, and their families, he with his family drove overland

to Decatur where they landed on June 3d. Prior to removing to Illinois, he had followed agricultural pursuits. In his early days too, he was a teamster, and with Isaac Shellabarger, would transport merchandise by wagon from Baltimore to Newville. Arriving in Macon county, Ill., Jacob and his family took up their residence temporarily with Joseph Rife, in the Boiling Springs neighborhood north-west of Decatur, until such time as they could get settled. Here among strangers and in a new country it was a most trying time for them, for within six months their three oldest children died of scarlet fever, but with much fortitude and a resigned spirit they bore these hardships. From the home of Mr. Rife they removed to what was known as the "Mound Farm," three miles north of Decatur. Here they lived one year, and there their son Albert Sandow was born. They then removed to a piece of land 5 miles north-west of Decatur, and one mile east of what is now Bearsdale. Here on the raw prairie they began building a home, breaking more of the rich, black soil each year until they had in cultivation 120 acres of as good land as there is in Central Illinois. Here they lived for about 20 years, when Jacob sold his farm to his brother Ephraim, and removed to Friends Creek township, 20 miles north-east of Decatur, where he continued to farm and raise stock, having a fine stock farm with an abundance of running spring water. He later removed to Piatt county, two and a half miles east of Cisco. He then lived about two years near Monticello, Ill., and then returned to Macon county where he lived a retired life for several years or until the time of his death.

In politics, like his brothers Samuel and Ephraim, he was a stalwart Republican, and always took a deep interest in political issues. He held many offices of trust in local affairs. Was justice of the peace for many years, and served also as tax collector, school trustee, and other minor positions. His first presidential vote was cast for William Henry Harrison, and his last presidential vote for Benjamin Harrison 48 years later. In 1861 when the dissolution of the Union was threatened by the secession of the South, he offered his services to the government but was too old to be accepted. It was "Uncle Dick" Oglesby, later governor of Illinois, who said: "Some one must stay at home to take care of the widow and orphans; I will just appoint you to take care of that part of the war." In this it is said that Jacob Bear did his part well.

Jacob Bear was converted early in life. In his youth he was faithful in his duties to God and the church, and was very careful in his outward conduct that he might thus honor his Master, and in the purity of his life was revealed the complete

work of grace. In his early youth he began laying the foundation for the useful and noble Christian character and life he afterwards lived. He was a charter member of the "Church of God" at Boiling Springs, and to this church he was always a faithful adherent both in doctrine and financial support. It is not known how soon he began to think of entering the ministry, but from circumstances gathered it was evidently early in his Christian life. He was always a great Bible student, and had a good education, and in fact taught school early in the '50s after coming to Illinois. He many times preached to good acceptance. Although he did not always take a charge or a regular circuit, he was always ready to do what he could in the cause of the Master. Many times he had regular appointments at out of the way places and often held revivals. In 1868, he and his brother Ephraim held a meeting at Boiling Springs Church at which scores were converted and the church built up. He had a license to preach from the Eldership from the first of the organization until the time of his death, and officiated at many weddings and funerals. He was ever interested in the work and welfare of young ministers, and often gave of his means to these young men to buy books and clothing. He was a man of great force of character, and was radical in his opinions, and yet was as teachable as a child. He loved his Bible, and loved to teach it to the young, yet he would listen attentively to explanations of portions of the Scripture given by much younger people than himself, and when convinced would not demur, but simply accept the truth. A clear, strong moral sense of the right, and the paramount obligation of adhering to the right, and to do the right irrespective of results, were inborn traits of his character. Everybody loved "Uncle Jake," as he was familiarly called, for he was generous to a fault. It is not supposed he was without a fault. Doubtless he had the weaknesses to which the flesh is heir, but the trend of his life was right, his motives pure, and his position clearly defined. He favored no compromise with evil, and believed the right would prevail. In a biographical sketch in the "Church Advocate" by Rev. Allen given of Elder Bear after his death it was said "he was a diamond in the rough," and it was truly said.

From the earliest organization of a Sunday-school at Boiling Springs he was its Superintendent until he removed to another locality. He was a warm supporter of the Sunday-school, and

always said it was the nursery of the church.

Jacob Bear's death occurred at Bearsdale Oct. 5, 1891. after a severe stroke of paralysis from which he never regained consciousness. He had often said he did not want to live to be

a burden to any one, so just as his life's work was done he fell

asleep never to wake on earth.

In the 1892 "Year Book" of the Illinois Eldership was the following mention: "During the year past our ranks have been invaded by death, Elder Jacob Bear having been one from our ministerial roll who was called to his eternal reward. Elder Bear died after a long and useful life in the ministry. He was faithful to his opportunities and has given us an example of dili-

gence and faithfulness worthy of imitation."

Dr. Chas. Manchester, President of Findlay (Ohio) College, said of him: "It was my privilege to become acquainted with Brother Bear in 1888-9 during my pastorate at Decatur, Ill. I preached in the country school house near his home, and although he was getting old he came regularly and was a very close listener. He came also to the city to my meetings, and we had several good heart to heart talks about the Kingdom of Christ. He loved the Church of God and her young ministers; he was anxious to see them loyal and enthusiastic in the gospel message. The burden of his conversation was the cause of the Master. Some one has said 'I am a part of all I have met.' I believe that this good influence of Elder Bear has become, in a small measure at least, a part of me. I am glad that I knew him. I wish I could have known more of him. His life before men was large, but who can measure the influence of a life? God does not accept man's measurements. I know that his influence still lingers with those that knew him and they cherish his memory as one who knew God and sought to please him."

Samuel Bear, third child of Ephraim and Mary (Bowers) Bear, was born near Newville, Pa., March 12, 1812, and died at Bearsdale, Ill., of paralysis, Feb. 20, 1880. He was buried in Boiling Springs cemetery.

Samuel's first marriage was to Rebecca Myers, daughter of Jacob and Lydia Myers. Rebecca was born in Cumberland county, Pa., July 29, 1823, and she died near Newville, Pa., on Dec. 5, 1851, and was buried in the old Bear burial ground on the original Bear farm. Four children were born to this union.

Samuel Bear again married on Jan. 21, 1853, his second wife being Magdaline Ruby Swayer, daughter of Jacob and Julia Ann (Ruby) Swayer. The officiating clergyman was Rev. Joshua Evans, minister of the Evangelical Lutheran Church.




LEAH (BEAR) KNISLEY-BRANDT.

Magdaline Ruby (Swayer) Bear was born June 25, 1818, and died near Newville, Pa., Dec. 8, 1859. Two children were born to this union.

On Feb. 18, 1863, near Newville, Pa., Samuel Bear married the third time. This wife was Ann Catherine Christlieub, daughter of Jacob and Julia (Morrett) Christlieub. She was born near Newville, Pa., Dec. 9, 1829, and is still living, the only survivor of the third generation of this history. She resides with her son, Brice Jacob Bear, on the old homestead at Bearsdale. Four children were born to this union.

Samuel Bear's chief inclination was for tools. When a boy he served an apprenticeship and learned the cabinet maker's trade. In this line of work he was very proficient. He con-

structed his own household furniture, and at the old homestead there are yet many pieces of his handiwork. In that community in those early days a coffin was never made until after an order was received. The undertaker would then construct it according to measure. The subject of this notice would frequently be compelled to remain at his shop all night long to fill an order of this kind, and then after the completion of his task his bench would be his bed and a bunch of shavings his pillow while he caught a few minutes' rest. In due time Mr. Bear invested his savings accumulated during some years at this occupation in a farm of 60 acres lying east of Newville, and here with his wife and small children he lived for some time.

In 1847, he yielded to a desire to see the western country, and with a Mr. Gring he made a trip by stage to Pike county, Ill., near Barry, where lived a brother of Mr. Bear's wife. visiting here for a time they came on to Macon county, near Decatur, where his companion decided to locate. Mr. Bear returned to his Pennsylvania home, but was so enthusiastic in his praises of this western country, that a few years later, in 1852, his brothers Jacob and Ephraim removed to Macon county, Ill. It was Samuel's intention to accompany them out, but the previous winter he had the misfortune to lose his wife, and so deemed it inopportune to make the change. Instead of going West he decided to go into the hardware business at Newville. In Dec., 1859, his second wife died, whom he had married in 1853, and Mr. Bear then determined to join his brothers in Illinois. Accordingly, in the Spring of 1860, about March, Mr. Bear with his daughter and three sons, the older son, John M., having preceded them about a year, left his native State and came to Decatur, Ill. Now, however, it was possible to come by rail, instead of a long overland trip, a much shorter time was occupied in coming by steam. He first settled on a farm in Harristown township, where he lived for three years. In 1863, he paid a visit to his old home in Pennsylvania, when he brought with him to Illinois the wife who now survives him. In this year also he removed to the farm in Hickory Point township where his widow and youngest son still reside. This farm, of which the village of Bearsdale is a part, was purchased by him in 1863, and was from that time his home. Bearsdale was named by his wife, "Aunt Ann," as she is lovingly called by her friends and neighbors, in honor of the Bears, of whom, at this time, there were the three brothers, whose farms were located within a radius of one mile.

Samuel Bear was a Lutheran, and his pew in the Pennsylvania church where he worshiped was the fourth from the front in the center section. Although deprived of worshiping with his

own people after coming West, he was still faithful to attend church service. He was a quiet, unassuming man, but loved and cherished his family and was ever careful for their welfare. In 1862, he was called upon to give his oldest son, John M., to his country's service. This he did without complaint and with apparent cheerfulness, believing it to be a duty. He never shirked duty. Mr. Bear lived an active life until about four years before his death, when he was stricken with paralysis. During his long sickness he manifested much patience, and was kindly cared for by his wife and children. His dying statement was—"I am just waiting until the time comes as a person at a railroad station; when the train comes, I will go."

16 ⁴EPHRAIM BEAR,³ (Ephraim,² Jacob,¹)

Ephraim Bear, the fourth child of Ephraim and Mary (Bowers) Bear, was born near Newville, Pa., July 20, 1818, and died at Decatur, Illinois, Dec. 21, 1893. He was twice married. His first marriage was on Dec. 10, 1844, to Elizabeth Mountz, who was born March 15, 1823, and died March 2, 1848. She was buried in the little private cemetery on the old Bear homestead near Newville. One child was born to this union. Ephraim was again married on September 24, 1849, at Orrstown, Pa., Rev. E. H. Thomas, officiating, to Susannah Hamsher, daughter of Peter and Elizabeth (Kline) Hamsher. Susannah Hamsher was born near Orrstown, Pa., June 3, 1828, and died in Decatur, Illinois, Feb. 13, 1882. Nine children were born to this union. Ephraim and Susannah (Hamsher) Bear were buried in Boiling Springs cemetery, near Bearsdale, Ill.

Mary Elizabeth was born near Orrstown, Pa.; all others near Decatur, Illinois. Elmer Knisley and Ulysses Grant were buried in Boiling Springs cemetery.

Ephraim Bear, of this sketch, lived on a farm in Cumberland county, Pa., near the town of Newville, until thirty years of age. He then removed to Franklin county, where he engaged in the mercantile business until 1852. His health failing, he removed to Decatur, Illinois, where he landed June 3rd of the same vear. He and his family drove overland in the same company as his brother Jacob. The members of this company could have purchased land in Decatur, where the Illinois Central R. R. depot now stands for the small sum of \$1.25 an acre, and the whole block on which the First Methodist Episcopal church of Decatur stood, and which was only recently razed, for \$300. This land. however, at that early time was very unpromising, being marshy and, in many places, covered with water; and the Bears, being of a rural turn of mind, chose land farther out. Ephraim settled in Harristown township, where he secured 120 acres of land for which he paid \$7 per acre, and at once began its development. This is the farm to which his brother Samuel came on first landing in Illinois. Ephraim remained in Harristown township about seven years, after which he removed to Hickory Point township, near where the village of Bearsdale now stands. Here he purchased and improved a farm, and lived on it until 1878, when he removed to Decatur. He still owned this farm at the time of his death. On removing to Decatur, he engaged in the grocery business for four years, after which he lived a retired life.

Mr. Bear and his wife encountered many of the ills and discouragements common to pioneer life. A great deal of malaria in Illinois at this time made it a sickly place, but although many times sick, and with crops sometimes destroyed by storms, yet there was no complaining, but a cheerful and determined effort

to make for themselves a home.

Ephraim, like his brother Jacob, was one of the founders and charter members of the church of God at Boiling Springs. He was always faithful in attendance at all church services, and at any service which tended to develop the moral and spiritual sentiment of the place in which he lived. He was an elder for many years in the Boiling Springs church and later in the Decatur church. He was of a kind and gentle disposition, of refined taste. and possessed of a quiet sense of humor. He was a great lover of nature and held sweet communion with her; and yet, withal, he was firm in his conviction of right, never swerving from the straight path when his mind was once made up. His religious nature predominated. He was very reverent of God's word and of his house, and was greatly disturbed when any one spoke lightly of either. He and his companion made their home the home of God's ministers, and therefore it was known as "The Preachers' Home." After the death of his second wife, who was a warm-hearted woman, and the ruling spirit of the home life, he retired more within his home, and although lovingly cared for by his children, was many times lonely—"homesick," he called it. His last sickness, which extended over a period of one year, was a time of development to all who came in contact with him. His patience was so great, and his faith so strong, it helped all to wish for just such a life, that their end might be like his. It was said by one who stood by in the last moments. "It must be easy to go like that." His last words were, "It is all right; good by."

17 ¹ELIZABETH BEAR,³ (David,² Jacob,¹)

Elizabeth Bear, oldest child of David and Esther (Nailor) Bear, was born near Newville, Pa., Sept. 9, 1807. She married David Brandt, son of Jacob and Elizabeth (Gardner) Brandt, June 11, 1833, and eight children were born to their union. Her death occurred July 19, 1865. The Rev. Z. A. Colestock wrote the following testimonial of her to some publication:

"Sister Elizabeth, wife of David Brandt, died at her residence at Big Spring, Cumberland county, Pa., July 19, 1865, in the 58th year of her age. Sister Brandt was a Christian from her youth. Her house was truly a preachers' home. Our itinerant brethren will not soon forget her unaffected kindness and generous hospitality. She was greatly afflicted for many years, but endured patiently 'as seeing him who is invisible.' Her end was peace."

David Brandt was married three times, and two of his marriages were to Bears. His first marriage was to Barbara Bubb (born April 9, 1809, and died June 14, 1832). They had two children, Samuel and an infant daughter. This Samuel (born May 20, 1830, and died in April, 1882), married Mary Ann Fetterhoff, and to their union were born four children, Aaron, Clinton Harvey, Benjamin Rush and Alta Jenerya, all of whom are now dead but Aaron. This Aaron, as appears elsewhere in this history, married Elverna Maud Hoch, granddaughter of David Brandt and his wife Elizabeth, thus all of David's marriages had some connection with this genealogy of the Bear family, as his third marriage was to Leah Bear-Knisley, as shown elsewhere in this book. David Brandt was born in Cumberland county, Pa., August 15, 1802, and his death occurred at Big Spring, Pa., Nov. 21, 1884, at which place he is buried. He was a farmer, religious, and much esteemed by all who knew him.

Joshua Bear was a minister of the United Brethren Church. He came to Ohio at a very early date, and in 1842 located at Pioneer, in Williams county. Here he took up the work of a missionary, preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ in this new country. The Indians from the reservation farther west in those days would come into this locality to fish and hunt, and Mrs. Bear used to relate to her children, who were all very small when their father, Joshua, died, how the Indians would hover around their cabin and listen to Joshua sing and pray, and early in the morning they would wait at the door with venison for "white man and papoose."

Joshua Bear died Sept. 26, 1846, aged 32 years, 10 months and 6 days. At the time of his death he owned about 100 acres of land, and the old cabin which he erected thereon was torn down only about ten years ago. The town of Pioneer now covers a part of what was his old homestead. He was a devout Christian man and an earnest exponent of the word of God, and although his

career was short, he did his duty and did it well.

Abigal, before her marriage to Joshua Bear, was the

All were born in Cumberland county, Pa., excepting the last three, who were born in Fulton county, Ohio.

Daniel Bear, prior to coming to Ohio, was a butcher as well as farmer. In the year 1848 or 1849 he emigrated to Ohio, first locating on a farm in Mill Creek township, Williams county, and later sold this farm and bought one in Gorman township,

upon which, in addition to his farming, he raised nursery stock. In 1871 he moved to l'ulaski, O., where he had a general store and was postmaster during President Grant's administration. after which he purchased a grist mill at Pulaski. Both Daniel and his wife professed religion in early life and remained firm believers in the atoning grace of God to the last. Daniel Bear was quite a conversationalist, and therefore of a very companionable nature. It is said he was well posted on any subject of the times, and few people were more familiar with the Bible than he, as he was a very earnest student. Mr. and Mrs. Bear died but two days apart, both of paralysis, and were laid away in one grave, the funeral being conducted by Rev. Avers, of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The end of both came so peaceably that one did not know the other was ill. This was certainly a very fitting thing that this venerable couple, who were born in the same year and had lived together for more than fifty-eight years, should have no parting even in death. A local paper at the time published the following obituary:

"Daniel and Sarah Bear (whose maiden name was Rhoads) were born in Cumberland county, Pa., Jan. 21st, and Aug.. 29th, 1816, and died Sept. 4th and 6th, 1894, aged respectively, 78 years, 8 months and 21 days, and 78 years and 8 days. They were united in marriage in March, 1836, and emigrated to Fulton county in the late Fall of 1849, where they continued to live until the year 1871, when they removed to Pulaski. Ten children were born to them, seven of whom are now living. They united with the church in early life. Coming to this part of Ohio when the country was new, they endured the hardships, toil and labor incident to pioneer life. They continued faithful in the discharge of their religious duties always, and when the summons came, they were also ready, the husband preceding the wife to the better world only two days. A kind husband and father and loving mother have gone to their reward. They were

buried in Shiffller cemetery, Saturday, Sept. 8, 1894."

22 ⁶ANDREW BEAR,³ (David,² Jacob,¹)

Andrew Bear, the sixth child of David and Esther (Nailor) Bear, was born in Cumberland county, Pa., Feb. 5, 1818, and died June 6, 1854, at Spring Green, Wis. His wife was Elizabeth Keifer, daughter of Philip and Eva (Radle) Keifer. Her father was German and her mother French. She was born June 16, 1819, near the American side of the Atlantic ocean during the passage of the family to this country, and was given the name of

Elizabeth Cornelia Morioue Goont, Morioue Goont being the name of the captain of the ship, Cornelia the name of his wife, and Elizabeth the name of the ship. She died at Corona, Cal., Sept. 12, 1903, and was buried at Spring Green, Wis. She was married to a Mr. Simpson after the death of Andrew Bear, but whom she also survived. Six children were born to Andrew and Elizabeth (Keifer) Bear.

Like his brother Joshua, Andrew Bear died early in life, and there are but few now living who can remember him. It is said, however, that he married at Lexington, Ohio, where he lived for several years, and came to Wisconsin in 1848. He entered a farm at Spring Green in June of that year, where he lived until he died, June 6, 1854. He was one of the first settlers in Sauk county, Wis., and taught the first school in that county. He is said to have been a very influential man in church matters and a leader in school work. He united with the United Brethren Church at an early age, of which church he remained a consistent member up to the time of his death.

Andrew Bear's sons all spell their name Baer. They changed the spelling to avoid confusion with other families of the same name.

Rev. J. W. Lilly, in writing of Rebecca Martha (Bear) Hoover's death, said as follows:

"Rebecca Martha Hoover, wife of George W. Hoover, died near West Unity, Ohio, Dec. 1st, 1878, aged 58 years, 8 months and 13 days. About twenty-seven years ago, with her companion, she removed from Big Spring, Cumberland county, Pa., to Williams county, Ohio, where she resided until her death. She embraced religion in her youth, and for eight years previous to her coming to Ohio, she was a member of the United Brethren Church. She then joined the M. E. Church, of which she remained a devoted member until her death. For about two years she was severely afflicted; but she bore it with Christian resignation. She adorned her profession by a godly walk, and her Savior, whom she loved and served in health, did not forsake her in her protracted illness. Truly another mother in Israel has gone to her reward, and again has come to pass the prediction of the prophet: 'At even time it shall be light.' May the blessings of heaven rest upon the companion and children left behind, and may they meet mother and wife on the shore of life and light."

George Walter Hoover's meeting, engagement and marriage to Rebecca Martha Bear, is just another story of romance seen every day. When a young man, George Walter Hoover came from Lancaster county, Pa., with a miller, Mr. Ruth. They located near Big Spring, Cumberland county, Pa., and established a mill. Near the mill was the home of David Bear, father of Rebecca Martha. One morning, in the Fall of the year, when the corn had ripened, George was sent by his employer to a farm house some distance from the mill for a corn sheller. On returning with his sheller the wagon upset in front of Rebecca's home and precipitated the sheller onto the road. Rebecca went out to assist the stranger to reload his sheller and repair the broken wagon. Acquaintance ripened into love and love resulted in marriage. In 1852, after the birth of their three older children, Mr. and Mrs. Hoover removed to Mill Creek township, Williams county, Ohio, and cleared a farm. Mr. Hoover erected a log house, consisting of two living rooms, a kitchen and two bed rooms. Here this Christian father and mother reared their family and participated in all the events in their community tending toward the moral elevation of same.

George Walter Hoover enlisted in the Union army, Feb. 24, 1865, in company D, of the 195th Ohio Vol. Inf., and served until Dec. 18, 1865. His regiment was ordered to Harper's Ferry, where they did guard duty for a time and then went into camp at Winchester, Va., where they were at the time of Lee's surrender. The regiment was then ordered to Alexander, Va., for provost and guard duty. Prior to coming to Ohio, and while a young man, Mr. Hoover served seven years in the Springfield Light Infantry, a military organization of Cumberland county,

and received an honorable discharge in 1849.

After the death of the wife and mother, Dec. 1, 1878, George Walter Hoover removed to West Unity, Williams county, Ohio, and every Thursday evening, rain or shine, found him in the second seat in front of the wood stove in the Methodist Episcopal church. His voice would be lifted up in prayer, and his testimony given each Thursday evening, always ending in "Pray for me, my brothers and sisters, that I may prove faithful and meet you all in heaven."

He continued the business successfully until 1899, when he in turn sold to his son Charles and retired from business. Mr. Byerly was immersed by Rev. Samuel Diller died at Decatur, Ill., Jan. 16, 1901, and was buried in Greenwood cemetery. "Portrait and Biographical Record of Macon county, Ill., published in 1893, eight years prior to his death, gave the following full sketch of his life and ancestry:

"Samuel Diller is accounted one of Decatur's most promiuent and substantial citizens and business men. He is identified with many of the leading enterprises and industries of the city, is connected with the Leader Mfg. Co., and is President of the Decatur Brick & Tile Co. He also owns \$10,000 worth of stock in the Salina Flouring Mills, of Salina, Kans., and is largely interested in lands and cattle of Texas. The Diller family was founded in America by Abraham, Francis and Peter Diller, brothers, who were natives of Berne, Switzerland, and emigrated to this country in 1754, locating in Lancaster county, Pa. Peter, a son of Abraham, and the grandfather of this notice, became a resident of Cumberland county, Pa., in 1788, and purchased land from a man by the name of McFarland, who had previously bought it from William Penn. Upon this land was an old fort, formerly used by the whites as a place of safety from the hostile Indians, and this was afterward made use of as a dwelling. Here Peter Diller engaged in farming during his life. After his death, his son John, the father of our subject, succeeded to the estate and occupied the same farm until his death, in 1871, the homestead remaining in the Diller family until 1882. John Diller married Elizabeth Conaway, a native of Pennsylvania, but of Scotch-They had a family of three children who grew to maturity, viz.: Martha, who is deceased; John, a resident of Cumberland county, Pa., and Samuel, of this sketch.

"In the Keystone State, on the 3rd of April, 1827, occurred the birth of our subject. He was reared to manhood upon a farm and acquired an education in the public schools of Pennsylvania. After attaining to mature years, the subject of this sketch was married, in 1854, to Ann Amelia Shellabarger, a sister of D. S. Shellabarger, whose sketch appears elsewhere in this work. Her married life was short, as she died in Oct. 1857, leaving two children, John and Samuel S. The former is Superintendent of a tile and brick factory. He married Miss Maggie Oren, and a daughter, Ida, graces their union. Samuel S. is a ranchman and makes his home in Shackelford county, Texas. Our subject was a second time married. In 1860 he wedded Miss Rebecca Jane Shellabarger, and they have a family of three children, the eldest of whom, Anna L., is the wife of Joseph M. Stuart, who is engaged as shipping clerk in the Shellabarger mill of Decatur. They have two daughters, Edna and Grace. David is engaged in partnership with his elder brother Samuel, in cattle dealing in Texas, and is doing a good business. He married Miss Mattie Miller, a daughter of Supervisor John H. Miller, of Wheatland township, Macon county. Howard, the youngest of the family, is at home.

"Mr. Diller remained in the State of his nativity and carried on agricultural pursuits until 54 years of age, when he determined to seek a new home in Illinois. Accordingly, he came to Decatur, and purchased a fourth interest in the Shellabarger mill, with which he was connected for four years, when he sold out to Shellabarger & Bowers. He then invested considerable in a cattle company in Texas, and also bought a third interest in the Decatur Brick & Tile Works, which he still owns. About twice each year he goes to Texas to visit his sons and look after his large landed and cattle interests. He owns 800 head of cattle, and his sons own as many more. In 1885, Mr. Diller also purchased a large interest in a flouring mill at Salina, Kansas, and has found this a good paying investment. He has been President of the Decatur Brick & Tile Co. for the last seven years, and under his careful management the business has prospered well, now amounting to upwards of \$30,000 annually. He is a director and stockholder of the Leader Mfg. Co. They make brick and tile machinery, the works of the concern being located in the western part of the city.

"Mr. Diller is a man of keen judgment and good foresight; conservative, in that he is not venturesome, and progressive in taking up any new improvement or venture which his judgment approves. In politics he is a staunch Republican, having affiliated with that party since 1856, when its first nominee ran for the presidency. His wife is a member of Grace M. E. Church. They have a beautiful home at No. 631 W. Prairie street, which Mr. Diller erected at a cost of \$8,000. There he expects to spend his remaining days, surrounded by all the comforts and luxuries of life that are furnished him by his handsome competence, the

fruits of his former toil."

Probably no man in Central Illinois is more widely known in commercial affairs than D. S. Shellabarger, and certainly none in Macon county. The following, taken from "Past and Present of the City of Decatur and Macon County," published in 1903,

probably gives as complete sketch of his life, up to that time, as could be written:

"The view-point of the world concerning business has materially changed in the past century. At one time the man of prominence would have nothing to do with trade relations and derived his income from landed estates. To-day the most distinguished men of all nations are they who have controlled the veins and arteries of traffic, and each community points with pride to its industrial and commercial leaders, realizing that to them is largely due the prosperity and development of every locality. 45 years Decatur has numbered David S. Shellabarger among its prominent and progressive citizens. He may well be termed one of the founders of the city, for he has been the promoter of one of its leading enterprises. His connection with any undertaking insures a prosperous outcome of the same, for it is in his nature to carry forward to successful completion whatever he is associated with. He has earned for himself a reputation as a careful man of business, and in his dealings is known for his prompt and honorable methods.

"A native of Cumberland county, Pa., Mr. Shellabarger was born July 11, 1837, in a locality which has been the home of his ancestors through several generations, and in his own liferecord he has followed the industrial trend of the family. His parents, David and Catherine (Byerly) Shellabarger, were also natives of Cumberland county, and in their family of ten children, David S. was the fifth in order of birth. The family home was on the bank of Canadoguinette Creek, about 8 miles from Carlisle, the principal town of the Cumberland Valley region, noted for its beauty and fertility. There on the home farm David S. Shellabarger spent the days of his boyhood and youth, assisting in the labor of field and meadow, while in the district schools he mastered the branches of English learning usually taught in such institution. Reading, experience and observation, however, have largely broadened his knowledge since he left the school room, and he is to-day a man of broad and practical general information. He worked upon the home farm until his 19th year, when he resolved to seek business opportunities in the West, and in the Spring of '56 he located in Decatur, where he soon became connected with the lumber trade. After two years, however, he abandoned the lumber business in order to devote his energies to milling, purchasing a third interest in a small mill, which stood on the present site of the Decatur Milling Company's mill, and which was afterwards destroyed by fire. Although he had no practical experience in his new work, he came of a family of millers, and he possessed considerable mechanical ingenuity. His

grandfather owned a mill adjoining the farm upon which David Shellabarger was reared, and other members of the family had followed the same pursuit. For five years after becoming connected with milling, business was carried on under the name of Henkle, Shellabarger & Co., and in 1863 our subject disposed of his interest in that enterprise and became half owner of a mill. of which he afterward became sole proprietor, his partners being I. Shellabarger and B. Dillehunt, the firm style of I. Shellabarger & Co. being assumed. In 1869 the firm of D. S. Shellabarger & Co. was formed and under the enterprising and liberal management instituted by our subject and his business associates, their enterprise grew to large proportions. Several times the original plant was enlarged, and in 1879 a new mill was built, while the old mill was also retained as a feature of the business. The milling interests of our subject became one of the leading enterprises of Decatur, and the business was the largest of the kind in Central Illinois. Mr. Shellabarger also owned an interest in a mill in Topeka, Kansas, and another in Wichita, which were among the best mills in the Sunflower State. With all the practical details of the business he made himself thoroughly familiar and was thus qualified to supervise the operative department of the enterprise as well as the business features of the office. In May, 1903, he disposed of his milling interests to the American Hominy Company, of which he was formerly a director.

"In 1885, a company was incorporated as the Shellabarger Mill & Elevator Co., with a capital stock of \$150,000, with D. S. Shellabarger, as president; W. L. Shellabarger, secretary, F. D. Shellabarger, treasurer, and L. S. Shellabarger, Supt. Our subject, however, has not confined his attention or limited his energies alone to one line. He was co-operant factor in the establishment of the street car system of Decatur, which superseded the old horse-car system, but sold his interest in the same in July, 1903. He is the vice-president of the National Bank of Decatur; in the Spring of 1903 organized the Decatur Elevator Co., capitalized at \$50,000, of which he is president, and which owns elevators along the lines of the Wabash and Illinois Central railroads. He is also president of the Manufacturers' & Consumers' Coal Co., with mines in Decatur, capitalized at \$100,000. He has aided materially in advancing many interests of the city which have resulted to its benefit and upbuilding, outside of his individual business affairs.

"In January, 1862, occurred the marriage of Mr. Shellabarger and Miss Annie E. Krone, a native of this city, and they have eight children, four sons and four daughters; a son who died in infancy; Adele, the wife of E. B. Hillman, a resident of Peoria, Ill.; William L., sec'y of the Shellabarger Mill & Elevator Co.; Lucian C., who is supt. of the mills; Fred D., who is treasurer of the company; Marie, the wife of Andrew S. Crowder, a real estate dealer in Spokane, Wash.; Grace, the wife of J. F. Allen, of Colorado Springs, Colo.; and Corinne, at home, the latter a graduate

of Mt. Vernon Seminary.

"From the organization of the Republican party down to the present, Mr. Shellabarger has been an advocate of its principles, and when age gave to him the right of franchise he cast his first ballot for Abraham Lincoln, in 1860. He believes it the duty of a true citizen to keep well informed on the issues of the day and to fill capably such positions to which his fellow townsmen shall call him, and in 1869, 1870, and 1871, and again in 1880, he served as a member of the city council of Decatur. In 1872 he was elected mayor and his administration was practical, progressive and resultant. For two terms he represented Decatur township on the board of supervisors, and for twelve years was a member and president of the school board. For many years he has been a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and of Stapp's Chapel, now Grace Church, of which he was one of the founders in 1867. His life has been one of continuous activity in which has been accorded due recognition of labor; and to-day he is numbered among the substantial citizens of his county. His interests are thoroughly identified with those of Decatur, and at all times he is ready to lend his aid and co-operation to any movement calculated to benefit this section of the country or advance its development."

In 1904, Mr. Shellabarger was elected president of the National Bank of Decatur. In that year also, although he did not receive the nomination, his name was placed before the Republican convention as Mason County's candidate for Congress.

Joseph Lindsey Shellabarger lives at Topeka, Kans., and is Sec'y and Mgr. of the Shawnee Milling Co. at that place. He is a member of First M. E. Church of Topeka since 1871, and has been a director of the Free Public Library of Topeka for many years. He was educated at Princeton University, N. J., graduating class of 1858. Served in the Union army from Aug., 1862, to July, 1865, as a member of Co. A, 116th Illinois infantry, brigaded in the second division of the 15th Army Corps (Sherman's). He participated in the campaigns at Vicksburg, Chattanooga, Lookout Mountain, Atlanta, the "March to the Sea," etc., and was mustered out at Washington, D. C., at the end of the war, as First Lt. Mr. Shellabarger then engaged in mercantile business at Decatur, Ill., until 1871, when he removed to Topeka, Kans., where he has been engaged in the milling business continuously to the present time. As a citizen of Topeka he has been identified with its progress and improvement from year to year.


Prominent among the citizens of Springfield, Ill., who in the height of their usefulness were stricken down by the hand of death was John Black, as the following from the Sangamon "Monitor" of Sept. 8, 1888, indicates:

"Died—at the family residence on South Sixth St., between Capitol Ave. and Jackson St., Sept. 7, 1888, John Black, in the 59th year of his age. Funeral Sunday, p. m., at 2.30, from the

family residence.

"The deceased has been confined to his home for months with a complication of diseases, the greatest of which was heart

failure. He was well known in this city and highly respected wherever known. He was a man of positive convictions upon all subjects with which he had familiarized himself, and gave expression to them whenever he felt called upon to do so, fearlessly and freely. A great reader, particularly of the current topics of the times, he was an intelligent and interesting conversationalist upon almost every general topic, and when not familiar with a subject of interest he lost no opportunity of becoming so. He possessed many splendid traits of manly character, and his friendships were of a very warm nature. Although somewhat reserved in making acquaintances he was of a kindly nature whenever his sympathies were enlisted. While he never did anything for mere show or parade he was liberal and generous as many can attest. Mr. Black was a native of Lee, Mass., where he was born March 4, 1829. Our subject comes on his paternal side of good old Revolutionary stock. His grandfather, James Black, a Scotchman, landed in New York City from Glasgow just before the declaration of war in 1775. He enlisted in the cause of the colonists and served with distinction. He was made a captain in the Revolutionary War and his commission signed by George Washington is now in possession of our subject, as is also a book which was among the first ever adopting a system of double entry, and which was used by James Black in Scotland, said book bearing the date of 1765. On the maternal side, our subject traces his ancestry back to Dr. Fuller, one of the passengers on the first trip made by the "Mayflower" in 1620. John Black, an uncle of our subject was American Consul and Consul General to Mexico for the long period of nearly forty years. He went from New York to the city of Mexico to put in machinery in mines, and was then appointed to the Consulship by Jackson and kept there until Lincoln's time, when he resigned and returned to this country. The parents of our subject were William M. and Persis (Fuller) Black. Mr. Black was a thorough New Englander in tastes and inclinations, industrious habits and thrift, by reason of which, coupled with close calculation in all enterprises in which he embarked, and by the exercise of a splendid business judgment, he had gathered around him a very handsome property. He came to Illinois in 1858, directed his energies to building and erected a number of houses in different parts of the city which he would hold until purchasers were found. He and the late Gason L. Henkle became partners in the manufacture of wrapping paper, and erected the mills at Riverton of which he became the sole owner. Mr. Black was married in Decatur, Nov. 1, 1877, to Miss Kate Shellabarger of that city. He was a devoted husband and an indulgent father who idolized wife and children and was

never happier than when sharing his own joys with them or providing some new source of enjoyment for wife and children. The "Monitor" offers its tribute of respect to the memory of an honest man, a kind-hearted, enterprising citizen, a loving husband, and an affectionate father, whose pride was his wife and offspring, a friend whose friendship once gained was as lasting as life and true as steel. Mr. and Mrs. Black became the parents of four children, Katharine, John, Clarence and Julia. Black is the daughter of David and Catherine (Byerly) Shellabarger, natives of Pennsylvania. The family came to Illinois from the Keystone State and located in Decatur in 1862. and Mrs. Shellabarger were married Dec. 25, 1830, and lived to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of wedded life, surrounded by children and many friends. Mr. Shellabarger rounded out a long and honorable career Aug. 15, 1883, at a ripe old age. He was recognized as one of the substantial thorough-going enterprising citizens of Decatur, while he was a resident of that place. The very name Shellabarger furnishes an entree to the best circles of society, and many bearing it have attained to prominence. Mrs. Black's chief care is for her children, as she is a tender, devoted mother. An active member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, she is prominent in various good works. She is possessed of the most sterling qualities of genuine womanhood, and is held in high esteem by all who have the pleasure of her acquaintance."

Mrs. Black still resides, she and her sons, at 412 Sixth

Street, Springfield, Ill.

The following taken from "Past and Present of the City of Decatur and Macon County," published in 1903, gives a very complete sketch of his life and personality:

"On the roll of those who have conferred distinction upon the legal fraternity of Decatur appears the name of Brice I. Sterrett, who was recognized as one of the leading members of the bar of Macon county. He came to this city in 1867 and here died on the 24th of Feb., 1901. Pennsylvania was the State of his nativity, his birth having occurred in Cumberland county, on the 9th of August, 1844. His parents, David and Mary Ann (Byerly) Sterrett, were also natives of that State, living on a farm in Cumberland county and later moving to Carlisle. About 1859, they came to Jacksonville, Illinois, but in a year or two returned to Carlisle, Pa. Later, however, he once more went to the West and this time settled in Decatur, where he lived retired for a few years. He next removed to Taylorville, where both he and his wife resided until they were called to the home beyond, Mr. Sterrett passing away on the 31st of October, 1878, while his wife died Dec. 15, 1879.

"When a small boy, Brice I. Sterrett became a student in the schools of Carlisle, Cumberland county, Pa., where he pursued his studies from 1850 until 1857. He then entered the preparatory department of the Illinois College at Jacksonville, Ill., continuing his studies there in the year 1860-1861. He next entered Dickinson College, at Carlisle, Pa., where he graduated with the class of 1867, winning the degree of Bachelor of Arts on the completion of a law course. With broad general knowledge he took up the study of law, spending a short time in that way in Carlisle, Pa. He then came to the West and located in Decatur, where he became a law student in the office and under the direction of Judge Charles Emerson. In order to supply the funds necessary for the continuance of his legal studies, he engaged in teaching in the common schools of Macon county for two terms. He was admitted to the bar of Illinois before the supreme court of the State in 1868, and then began his law practice in Decatur, where he soon won recognition as a young man of marked ability, of earnest purpose, and of thorough preparation in the law. He prepared all his cases with great precision and after extended research was well qualified to uphold his cause and position. He was also pension agent in Decatur for many years. Eventually on account of ill health he was obliged to give up general law practice after which he devoted his attention to lighter work, such as collecting and other kindred branches usually performed by the members of the legal fraternity. He thus lived a more retired life until his death.

"On the 21st of Oct., 1879, Mr. Sterrett was united in marriage with Miss Clarissa Cline, a native of Lewisberry, York county, Pa., and a daughter of Andrew and Margaret (Foster) Cline, who were likewise natives of York county where they always lived. The father was a farmer and mill man and there he and his wife remained until the tide of life ebbed away. There came to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Sterrett but one child, Mary C. Sterrett, who now resides with her mother and is a teacher in the public schools of Monticello, Illinois.

"Mr. Sterrett held no offices in the city, nor had he sought public notoriety of any character beyond his profession. He was very successful in his law practice here and became a well-to-do citizen, the public recognizing his genuine worth and capability. He was a man of strong mind, of marked individuality, of resolute will, and of honorable purpose. He gave his political support to the Democracy in early life and later became a staunch Republican. For a long period he held membership in the Presbyterian Church of this city and in that faith passed from this life. Mrs. Sterrett and daughter are members of the Presbyterian

Church. Mrs. Sterrett has a residence at 717 West Prairie Avenue where she and her daughter reside and she also owns other property in the city which was built upon and improved by her husband. His interest centered in his family and it was a matter of great satisfaction to him that he could leave his wife and daughter in comfortable financial circumstances. He also left to them the priceless inheritance of an untarnished name and of a memory that is honored by all who knew him."

Robert Wilson Sterrett, sixth child of David and Mary Ann (Byerly) Sterrett, was born in Cumberland county, Pa., Sept 20, 1847. He graduated from Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pa., in 1869. Practiced law in Philadelphia, and also taught a Greek class. He was a fine scholar in languages, being proficient in Greek, Latin, German, French and Spanish, but his health failed and his mind was clouded in the last ten years of his life. He was never married. He had no active membership in any church, but was Presbyterian in tendency. His death occurred at Jacksonville, Ill., Aug. 9, 1886, and was buried at Taylorville, Ill.

Rebecca Jane Sterrett, seventh child of David and Mary Ann (Byerly) Sterrett, was born in Cumberland county, Pa., Oct. 16, 1849. She was married on June 8, 1881, near Lamar, Mo., to George Binkley Wade, who was born June 13, 1846, at Canal Dover, O. He is the son of John Richard and Isabella (Binkley) Wade, and is also a nephew of Ex-Senator Wade, of Ohio. To their union was born one

Charles Frederick Wade died April 12, 1899, and was buried in Mitchell cemetery, near Jasper. The funeral is said to have been one of the largest ever occurring in that vicinity, and was conducted by Rev. Mann, of the Jasper Presbyterian Church.

The public schools adjourned and the pall-bearers were taken from his school fellows.

Mrs. Wade was a dramatic reader before her marriage. She was a member of the Presbyterian Church of Carthage, Mo., at the time of her death, which occurred Aug. 16, 1884. The following obituary was written by her brother, Brice I. Sterrett, and published at the time:

"Died—At the residence of Mr. F. Swhihart, in the northeast part of Jasper county, Missouri, on Saturday night, Aug. 16, 1884, Mrs. Rebecca J. Wade, wife of George B. Wade, in the 35th

year of her age.

"Mrs. Wade, whose maiden name was Sterrett, was born in Carlisle, Pa., Oct. 16, 1849, and united with the First Presbyterian Church of that city when about 16 years of age. Her parents removed to Decatur about 15 years ago and from thence to Taylorville, where her father died in 1878, and her mother in 1879. Mrs. Wade was married June 8, 1881, at the residence of her brother, Mr. Thomas Sterrett, in Barton county, Mo., since which time she has lived with her husband at the residence of Mr. Swhihart. She united with the Presbyterian Church of Carthage, Mo., about three years ago to which she was devotedly attached. Her husband united not long after. She leaves four brothers, a husband and a child and many friends to mourn her loss.

"This brief sketch gives only the meager outlines of a rarely beautiful life and character, in every relation she sustained, as daughter, sister, wife, mother and friend. Her decided Christian character was prominent in all. Her religion was of that decided cheerful type that manifested itself in everything she did. Her nature and disposition were peculiarly amiable and affectionate, and had a winning power over all who knew her. Her life was to all a constant witness to the beauty and reality of the religion of Jesus. Her Christian experience was like the crystal spring, ever sending its streams of refreshing water into her own life and that of others. The closing scenes of her life displayed to an unusual degree the depth of her religious nature and were more like hours of triumph than of dissolution and pain. Although her sickness lasted but a week, she realized from the first that the time of her departure was near, and all the intervals that her strength would allow she spent in making known her plans and hopes for the child and husband to whom she was tenderly attached, and in speaking words of counsel and cheer to those around her, and sending kind messages to the absent. She seemed literally to have reached Beulah land. She felt herself at the threshold of her heavenly home, and thus divine glory illuminated her soul. Her prayers for loved ones were as if she were talking in the very presence of eternal realities."

Mr. Wade has been postmaster at Jasper, Mo., for several

years.

48 'SAMUEL KNISLEY,4 (Leah Knisley,3 Ephraim Bear,2 Jacob Bear,1)

Samuel Knisley, the eldest child of Jacob and Leah (Bear) Knisley, was born near Newville, Pa., March 8, 1826, and his death occurred July 20, 1902. He was twice married, but the father of no children. His first marriage was to Martha Strawbridge, daughter of John and Mary Strawbridge, and she died about the year 1878. His second marriage was to Mrs. Laura (Bricker) Mountz, who died in Jan., 1896. Samuel Knisley was a devout member of the Church of God, and was identified with that Church in many important official relations, being Treasurer of the East Pennsylvania Eldership for many years, and for ten different years was delegate to the General Eldership. He was also a member of the Masons, Odd Fellows and Sons of America. The following, taken from a Shippensburg (Pa.) paper, tells something of his life and how highly he was regarded in the community and section of the State in which he lived:

"Among the first news that reached us on Monday morning last was the fact that Samuel Knisley, one of Orrstown's oldest, most highly esteemed and reputable citizens, had died during the early morning hours of the day and of the week. He had many warm, personal friends in this place, as he had throughout the entire county, where he was so well and favorably known, having filled different public positions, and being prominent in

church, Sabbath-school and all other good works.


"The deceased was born near Newville, Cumberland county, Pa., March 8, 1826. He was the eldest of five children, two sons and three daughters. His only brother was wounded in the battle of Chancellorsville and died in a hospital at Washington. His only surviving sister, Mrs. Laverty, resides in Harrisburg. His ancestors came from Switzerland, his grandparents residing in York county, but he and his father are both said to have been born in Cumberland county. Almost the last 50 years of his life were spent in Orrstown, where he has seen the entire community pass away. Only one person is said to reside in the town who was there when Mr. Knisley moved to that place.




CHRISTIAN THUMA and wife, MARY ANN (BEAR) THUMA. No. 19.

"When two years old, Mr. Knisley, with his parents, moved to Franklin county, on a farm two miles west of Shippensburg, and from there to a farm near Orrstown. When a young man the deceased came to Shippensburg to learn the tailoring trade. In speaking of it within the past year, to one with whom he stood close in spiritual things, he said he was converted at a campmeeting held in his father's grove and was afterward one of a number of young men who formed a young men's prayer meeting, which met in the homes every Thursday evening. It was here he first met and saw Elder Price. He well recalled the early teachings of such men as Winebrenner, McFadden, Maxwell, Thomas, Mooney, Keller, Harn, Mackey and other younger and later day ministers. In 1855, forty-seven years ago, he engaged in merchandising in Orrstown. Here he has remained ever since, and he is the last survivor of the numerous persons associated with him in business during these years.

"In 1879, Mr. Knisley was elected Treasurer of the East Pennsylvania Eldership, which office he still held at the time of his decease. For ten different years, since 1854, he has been a delegate to the General Eldership, the last being in 1902. In connection with Elder Laverty, in 1851, he was largely instrumental in establishing and starting the Shippensburg Academy, for the preparing of young men for college. This was the school which Judge Stewart, and Mr. Snodgrass, of Harrisburg, spoke of in their recent able Fourth of July addresses in this place. He has served as postmaster at Orrstown for a number of terms. In 1871, he was elected treasurer of Franklin county, serving during the years 1872 and 1873, being elected on the Republican ticket; his own district, which was largely Democratic, gave him a majority of 30, something unusual. In all these various positions he came up to the full measure of the honest, upright, conscientious citizen which he always was.

"Mr. Knisley was twice married; his first wife was Miss Martha Strawbridge; afterward to Mrs. Laura H. Mountz, nee

Bricker. He leaves no issue by either marriage.

"The same gentleman above spoken of, as standing in close relation with him, in speaking of him, says: 'His home has always been a preachers' home. We are not sure that the brother always entertained angels, but it has been and was his delight to entertain those who came with the glad tidings of salvation.'

"His funeral, which was largely attended, took place on Thursday at ten o'clock, interment being made in the Church of God graveyard at Orrstown, where his loved ones who have gone before, are buried. As was anticipated, the funeral was largely attended from all sections. The services were in charge of Rev. C. I. Brown, pastor of the Church of God, Shippensburg, who was a personal friend and stood in close relation to the deceased. He was assisted by Rev. C. H. Forney, of Harrisburg, a life-long friend, indeed he was such to the entire ministry of the Church. The services were attended by the Masonic fraternity and the Patriotic Sons of America, both of which organizations he was an honored and most worthy member."

Mary Ann Knisley, the second child of Jacob and Leah (Bear) Knisley, was born in Franklin county, Pa., near Shippensburg, Aug. 1, 1829, and she now resides at Harrisburg, Pa., and is the oldest living branch of this genealogical tree. Her mother, before her, lived to be past 90, longer than the age attained by any other descendant of Jacob Bear, the founder of this family in America. She is an earnest, devout Christian woman and a member of the Church of God. Her marriage occurred at Shippensburg, Pa., on March 2, 1848, Rev. J. C. Owens, pastor of Church of God, officiating, to Rev. Daniel Alexander Lawson Laverty, who was born at Mechanicsburg, Pa., May 20, 1824, and was the son of Patrick and Ann Barbara (Deado) Laverty, from Armagh county, Ireland. To their union were born ten

Rev. Laverty died Dec. 23, 1883, while pastor of the Church of God at Mechanicsburg, Pa., and was buried in St. John's Cemetery at Shiremanstown, Cumberland county, Pa.

Of the peerless character and able ministry of this man of

God, the "Year Book of the Church of God" spoke thus:

"Daniel Alexander Lawson Laverty, the second son of Patrick and Ann Barbara Laverty, was born near Mechanicsburg, Cumberland county, Pa., on the 20th day of May, 1824, and died on the 23rd of Dec. 1883, aged 59 years, 7 months and 3 days.

"In January, 1841, at a meeting of the Union Church in Mechanicsburg, held by Elders J. Winebrenner, E. West and H. Wingert, he was savingly converted to God in the seventeenth year

of his age.

"With about thirty others, he was baptized on Sabbath, January, 1841, in the Trindle spring, near Mechanicsburg, by Elder West. In the afternoon of the day of his baptism his mother departed this life.

"From April, 1842, until the year 1851, his time was prin-

cipally occupied in teaching school.

"In the Fall of 1846, at the East Pennsylvania Eldership, which was held at Mechanicsburg, he was licensed to preach the gospel.

"From this time until 1861 he preached (in connection with

teaching) at Fayetteville and Chambersburg.

"From this time on he devoted his entire time to the ministry, filling most of the principal appointments in the East Pennsylvania Eldership of the Church of God, such as Middletown, Harrisburg, Philadelphia, Mt. Joy, Lancaster and Mechanicsburg.

"He was a man of high social qualities, which made him many friends. He was second to none of his ministerial brethren as a pastor. Here lay his strength. He was one of our most

active Sunday-school workers.

"His funeral took place at Mechanicsburg on the 27th of December, and was largely attended by many of the friends of his former charges, as well as a large number of his ministerial brethren.

"Elder Laverty was an indefatigable worker, and an earnest expounder of the word of God. His social qualities were such that his name became proverbial as a hand-shaker. His earnest, warm grasp of the hand at once convinced you of the state of his heart towards you. He was the children's friend; he had as many little folks to love him as older ones. In Sunday-school he was at home. His voice among the little folks commanded silence and attention. The Sunday-school at Mechanics-burg, Pa., in recognition of his services, held, on January 6, 1884, a memorial service to his precious memory. At Harrisburg, Mount Joy, Newville, and other places, memorial services were held. The East Pennsylvania Eldership, at its sessions held at Lancaster, Pa., expressed the highest enlogy on the worth and labors of Elder Laverty.

"The Church Advocate, editorially, describes the true man in a few words: 'A minister prominent in our councils and in the active service of the Church. He was a useful man, affable, warm-hearted, zealous, keenly alive to the interests of the cause, devoted to the Church, industrious in every department of his call-

ing....as a pastor he had no superior."

Catherine Knisley, third child of Jacob and Leah (Bear) Knisley, was born near Shippensburg, Pa., Nov. 1, 1831. Thus uncle and niece married brother and sister, and there is a double relationship between their children.

John Hamsher was born near Orrstown, Pa., in about 1834. He came to Decatur, Ill., in 1853 or 1854, and in 1855 went back to Pennsylvania where he was married to Catherine Knisley. They then returned to Decatur where they lived continuously up to the time of the death of both. When the Church of God was organized at Decatur, Bethel Church, they were

charter members. Catherine's death occurred Sept. 4, 1862, and she was buried in Boiling Springs Cemetery, near Bearsdale. John Hamsher remarried and his death occurred in 1881. He, too, was buried in Boilings Springs Cemetery, by the side of his wife, Catherine. During his residence in Decatur he was in the harness business, and from 1878 up to the time of his death was in partnership with Charles Cain Bear, whose notice appears elsewhere in this work, and who is still in the harness business at Decatur.

Jacob Knisley, fourth child of Jacob and Leah (Bear) Knisley, was born at Orrstown, Pa., March 10, 1834. He is one of the four in this genealogical record who gave their lives to the Union cause in the war of 1861-65, the others being John M. Bear, Andrew Hirum Bear and Andrew Joshua Thuma. These four died during their enlistment.

Jacob Knisley studied dentistry, had just fitted up an office in Middletown, Pa., and was doing nicely when the war broke out. He left his office intact and it was never his privilege to return to it again. He entered the army service Aug. 12, 1862, as first sergeant, and was promoted to second lieutenant March 7, 1863. He was wounded at Chancellorville May 3, 1863, and died at Washington from the effects of his wounds May 15, 1863. He was buried at Orrstown, Pa. Jacob Knisley was never married. For a time he lived at Decatur, Ill., and owned land near there. In fact, his Uncle Samuel Bear bought a piece of land from him.

Mr. Troutman, however, being of a very ambitious and industrious nature, continues to spend much of his time on his farms, looking after their improvement. 

Alfred Wesley Bear's particular inclination and faculty is for tools and machinery. Anything of a mechanical nature is a delight to him, and his greatest pleasure is in solving its mechanism. He is a practical engineer, carpenter, and miller, being as proficient in one as in the others. Though a man of large frame, he is of quick, restless temperament, and his hands are never idle. His mind being so wrapt up in mechanics, he has not the characteristics that stamp the successful tradesman or man of business affairs.

He was a farmer in his early life, but when the farm did not require his time and personal attention he would do carpenter work, and for more than 20 years he toured that portion of Macon county in which he lived with a threshing machine outfit, in the days when the threshing seasons were long, and when threshers, shellers, and such harvesting machinery were not as plentifully distributed as now. For a number of years his brother William was associated with him as a partner in this work. In 1887, the subject of this sketch embarked in the flour milling business at Lovington, Ill., forming a partnership with Mr. Alfred D. Rebok, under the firm style of Rebok & Bear. Mr. Rebok managed the business and Mr. Bear the mechanical part. They opened up a mill at Lovington and remained at that place for two years, when, in response to inducements made them, they removed their plant to Bloomfield, Stoddard county, Mo., where they increased the capacity of their mill very considerably. Here Mr. Bear remained until 1897. In that year he quit the milling business and removed his family back to Macon county, Ill., and is now living at Decatur. He is a man of simple tastes, and in his social life somewhat inclined to dry humor. He united with the Methodist Episcopal Church when a young man, and is also a member of the A. F. and A. M.

Bessie Ann, the only daughter, died just as she was budding into young womanhood, and her death was a severe shock to her parents, brothers and host of friends. After attending Decatur (Ill.) 

Mary Elizabeth (Bear) Braden is a woman of strong personality, being a potent factor in all that she undertakes, particularly in church and Sunday-school work. She has been a teacher nearly all her life, both in the public schools and also a teacher of music. She is a member of the Church of God, having united with the church when about 12 years of age, and has always been a leader. She as well as her husband were, prior to removing to Louisiana in 1902, prime factors in Boiling Springs Church, near Bearsdale, Ill., which church her father helped to found, and both have served as Sunday-school Superintendent. Mrs. Braden served in that capacity 12 years. She is also an active member of

the W. C. T. U., and of the Ladies' Literary Club of Lake Arthur. She served for 18 months as President of the latter organization.

With his regiment, he was mustered out at Washington, and came home by way of Harper's Ferry on the Potomac, down the Ohio to Indiana, thence across the prairie by rail home. To-day he is proud of the fact that he was a member of the 116th Ill. regiment, and that with all its marching and fighting he was always with his regiment, never rode in the ambulance or had to go to the hospital.

Catherine Elizabeth (Thuma) Sheets died at their home near Portland, Mich., Dec. 3, 1904, of typhoid pneumonia, after only a week's sickness, although her health had been poor for some years. She was a good wife and mother, generous, of a very kind disposition, and a true Christian woman. She was a member of the United Brethren Church, having united May 10, 1902. Isaac James Sheets served nearly three years as a Union soldier during the Civil War. He enlisted Aug. 9, 1862, in company D, 14th Mich. inf., in the army of the Cumberland. After joining his regiment at Nashville, Tenn., they were put on dispatch service until the spring of 1864, when they joined the brigade near Chattanooga, Tenn. In the spring of 1864 they went into the campaign of Atlanta, and from there with Sherman on the "March to the Sea, then from Savannah across the Carolinas to Richmond and thence to Washington. Mr. Sheets was in twenty-one battles and skirmishes, including the battle of Atlanta; where the side of his face was burned by a flying bullet.

David Thuma's occupation has been that of a farmer. He lived in Danby township, Ionia county, Mich., for a number of years, or up to the time of his marriage, Aug. 22, 1862. His brother, Joshua Thuma, had enlisted in the Union army in April, 1862, and after a brief service died June 26, 1862. When the sad news of Joshua's death reached the family in the Michigan home, David, who had arranged to work for his father that Summer, yielding to the noble and patriotic impulse which stirred the hearts of loyal men in those days, decided he must take his

brother's place. Accordingly, on Aug. 24, 1862, he bid his young bride of a few days good-bye and enlisted in the cause of the Union, being assigned to company D of the 14th Michigan Vol. Inf. He left Detroit Sept. 10, 1862, to join his regiment, which was then near Nashville, Tenn., and got as far as Louisville, Ky. The operations of Bragg and Morgan prevented his going any farther, and he was put on guard duty until the last of October, when he was taken sick with typhoid fever. After his convalescence some weeks later, he was once more sent on to join his regiment, but at Bowling Green, Ky., was again delayed by Morgan for some days, but eventually joined his regiment near Nashville. He remained with his regiment, undergoing the hardships and privations incident to the life, up to the time of the historic "March to the Sea" with Sherman. At "Buzzard's Roost," Ga., he was again taken seriously sick and was sent back to Nashville, but became worse and was sent to Louisville, Kv. Here, after two months, he became strong enough to be detailed as a nurse in the hospital, and remained there until near the end of his three years' enlistment. While doing hospital service he witnessed scenes of untold suffering on the part of the sick and wounded, which made a lasting impression upon his memory. He was finally discharged June 12, 1865.

After the war, David Thuma resumed farming. About the year 1870 he removed to a farm six miles from Carson City, Mich., and with his family lived there until 1894, when they removed to their present home in Carson City. He is badly crippled, being at times helpless, and has been compelled to use crutches for more than ten years, yet he bears his affliction with patient fortitude and Christian resignation. He and his wife united with the United Brethren Church Jan. 10, 1872. He came under conviction during his army life and experienced conversion Apr. 13, 1865. He is of a deeply religious nature and his pro-

fession is exemplified by a godly life.

Wrapt in a blanket, and pieces of hard tack boxes providing a casket, the mortal remains of the young hero were buried near the place where he died.

Andrew Hirum Bear is one of the four who gave up their lives in the defence of the union during the Civil War. His career as a soldier was short. Circumstances did not permit him to enlist until April, 1864, when he entered as a private in company K, 111th regiment of Ohio Vol. Inf., second division of the 23d army corps. Not having a very robust constitution the life was too hard for him, but he marched until he dropped by the way, and died in the hospital at Knoxville, Tenn., Sept. 4, 1864. He was buried in the National Cemetery at Knoxville, Tenn., in the Eighth Circle and his grave is numbered 158. He was not only a brave and loyal soldier, but a Christian man, a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church. When he enlisted in his country's defence, he left at home a young and loving wife and a baby daughter, whom he was never destined to see again. Through the courtesy of this only daughter, who is now Mrs. Douglas Cronwell Bigbee, of Jackson, Mich., we quote from some of the letters written by Andrew Hirum Bear to his wife while he was at the front. In a letter dated May 17, 1864, he said:

"We were engaged with the rebels at Dalton, Georgia. Well, Mary, we have had a hard fight with the rebels for about ten days. They fought desperately on both sides but on the 16th day of May we ran them out of their holes and they skeedadled you better believe, and we after them, but our division has been stopped over night and we have not started yet this morning but expect to start again every moment. Well, dear Mary, I was in the hottest of the battle myself, and I thank God that I came out without a scratch while hundreds of poor boys fell all around us, and the shot and shells came like hail and fairly rattled. Samuel had his cap torn with a piece of shell. I do not like to dwell on the subject, so excuse me for the present. During the battle our men captured several pieces of artillery and a great many prisoners, and also one flag, some ammunition, and I don't know what all. The rebels were driven off so fast they left a great many of their dead and wounded on the field, but our men take as good care of them as our own. I hope you are enjoying yourself as well as you can and taking things as patiently as possible, but I must close, and if it is God's will that I should see you again I could tell you a great deal more that I can't write. I suppose my dear little girl can talk and prattle and get into all kinds of mischief by this time. Pray for me.

"Your devoted husband,

ANDREW H. BEAR."

In a letter of June 1, 1864, he wrote:

"Dear Wife:—Pray for me that I may do my duty to God and to my country. Dear ones at home, I think of you and pray for you, and when I wake in the morning my soul breathes a prayer to God in your behalf. When I go into battle I think of you, and I pray God if it is his will that we may meet again and be more faithful to him. I hope and pray that this wicked rebellion may soon cease. Our army at this place is about two hundred thousand, while the rebels, as near as we can learn, are a little over half that number, and if you will conceive a line of battle 10 miles long and three or four columns deep, extending east and west over hills and valleys, you will have some idea of our battle ground.

"Your devoted husband,

"A. H. BEAR."

Every letter he wrote breathes of his devotion to his loved

ones, his country and his God.

Andrew Hirum Bear, before entering the army, was a farmer. It is said he also possessed considerable talent as an artist.

His widow after some years remarried again, and her death occurred Nov. 30, 1896, near Pioneer, Ohio, where she was also buried.

He is a man of simple tastes, and of a quiet, peaceable disposition. He was a brave soldier in time of war and is now a loyal citizen in time of peace.

The first of this stock of Clays in America, and from whom Jeremiah of this notice is fifth in descent was a Hessian, who came across the water from Germany, having been hired out to King George III. to fight against the Colonists. He deserted, however, and joined the American forces, and at the close of the

war sent for his family and settled in York county, Pa.

Jeremiah Clay came to Williams county, Ohio, with his parents in May, 1846, and practically all his life, with the exception of nine years in Goram township, Fulton county, Ohio, and two years in Michigan, has been spent in Williams county. On Feb. 15, 1864, he enlisted in company G, 68th Ohio Vol. Inf., and served until the end of the war, being mustered out July 10, 1865. After the war he returned home and for about three years worked at the carpenter's trade. Since that time, with the exception of six years that he was engaged in the mercantile business at Pulaski, Ohio, he has devoted his time to farming. He made himself familiar with agriculture in all its details and by reason of his thrift and energy has met with marked success. He has always taken a great interest in public affairs and is a strong adherent to the principles of the Republican party. In 1903, he was elected county commissioner for a term of three years. He is a member of Evans Post, No. 149, of the Grand Army of the Republic, and is also a member of the I. O. O. F..



Charles K. Laverty was the eldest of ten children of the

departed Elder D. A. L. Laverty, one of the most prominent and successful ministers of the East Pennsylvania Eldership in his

day.

The subject of this notice was born in Shippensburg, Pa., March 11, 1850. Early in life, when his father was pastor of the church in Philadelphia, Charlie was converted and baptized. In 1875, while Elder Carlton Price was pastor of the Fourth Street Church of God, Harrisburg, Pa., Brother Laverty became identified with the church. During all his subsequent years he was an honored, devoted, faithful member, and for some years an officer in the church, until he was called to join the church triumphant.

In early youth he was thrown upon his own resources. He began his profession career in his uncle Theodore Laverty's drug store, in Middletown, Pa. Later he applied himself assidiously to his work under the direction of Dr. Miller, of Harrisburg, Pa. He continued his close application to study and work until he reached the desired goal, a first class pharmacist.

[In 1896, he purchased a drug store in Duncannon, Pa., which he successfully conducted, subsequently moving to Harrisburg, where for several years previous to his death he laid the

foundations of a prosperous drug trade.]

On November 7, 1881, Brother Laverty publicly plighted his troth with Mary Frances Hess, his father performing the sacred rite. This proved to be one of the wisest steps of his life, as all their subsequent days were radiant with peace, harmony and the love that never faileth.

Charlie was a good boy, and a good man. His likeness to his Master, his deep sincerity and simplicity of heart, his frankness and generosity of nature, his tenderness and solicitation for others, his spirit of meekness and unselfishness made him a man singularly attractive and lovable to all with whom he came in contact.

Sue Swartz graduated from the Mechanicsburg, Pa., High School, and was before marriage a very busy music teacher at home and in Harrisburg. She enjoyed quite a local reputation as an accomplished pianist and organist. 



Boiling Spring Church and Cemetery

Situated about one mile and a half southeast of Bearsdale, Illinois, is Boiling Springs Church and Cemetery. In this little church several generations of the Bear family have worshiped, and for more than half a century some of the family have had a prominent part in its work. In this Cemetery, in one cluster a few feet from the church, are buried Ephraim Bear, Sr., his wife, their three sons, and many of their grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Boiling Springs Church of God was organized at the home of Joseph Rife, Sr., Jan. 17, 1852, by Thomas Hickernell and George Sando. Eighteen persons were received as charter members. Among these were Jacob Bear, his wife, Catherine, their daughter, Elizabeth Ann, and Ephraim Bear, Ir., his wife Susannah, and their daughter, Mary Elizabeth. For a time after the organization, little progress was made, but in July, 1857, a meeting was called at which Joseph Rife, Sr., Robert Henson, and Ephraim Bear, Ir., were elected trustees and a building committee. This committee bought of David Manley two acres of land from the southeast corner of his farm, and upon this was erected the Boiling Springs Church of God. On the evening of Oct. 19, 1887, the church was destroyed by fire, but in due time was rebuilt and rededicated. Since the organization of the Sunday-school fifty years or more ago, with the exception of possibly ten years, some member of the Bear family has been its superintendent. Jacob Bear, Ephraim Bear, Mary E. Braden, Samuel E. Bear, and John N. Bear, have each served in that capacity. John N. Bear is the present superintendent.

Boiling Springs Cemetery was originally a free burial ground, but on Apr. 18, 1887, a charter wa's taken out, and on May 14, 1887, a deed was received from the trustees of Boiling Springs Church for a cemetery plot. Since that time lots have advanced from \$8 to \$20, and there is at this time \$1,000 in the treasury of the Cemetery Association. On May 5, 1897, the cemetery was enlarged by the purchase of additional ground from John Good. The present commissioners of the Boiling Springs Cemetery Association are A. J. Conover, president; Brice J. Bear,

secretary, and J. P. Campbell.

Kindred Families

But one other family has been found which seemed to be connected with our own, and these people spell the name Bair. David Bair married Elizabeth Bowers, while Ephraim Bear, Sr., of our own family, married Mary Bowers, both daughters of Sebastian and Magdeline (Bear) Bowers. David and Ephraim, while of course related by the ties of marriage, were also known as "cousins." However, the several old people with whom your secretary has corresponded state that while they are positive David Bair and Ephraim Bear, Sr. were related yet they were not first cousins. It would therefore seem that Jacob Bear, Sr., the father of Ephraim Bear, Sr., did have kinsmen in this country, but the exact connection will probably never be ascertained.

THE BAIR FAMILY.

The founder of this family in America, or as far back as can be traced, was Benjamin Bear, who had two sons, David and Benjamin. Little could be learned of this Benjamin, Jr., but it is thought one of his daughters, Mrs. Mollie Hopp, is still living at Nevada, Ohio. Benjamin Bear, Jr., died in Wyandot county,

Ohio, many, many years ago.

David Bear, or David Bair, was born in Lancaster county, Pa., Jan. 2, 1792, and died Jan. 26, 1852. From Lancaster county he removed to Westmoreland county, Pa., and there raised a large family. He was twice married. His first marriage was to Elizabeth Bowers, daughter of Sebastian and Magdeline (Bear) Bowers, and to this union were born nine children—Isaac, Benjamin, Sebastian, David, Henry, Jacob, Mattie, Catherine and Leah. His second marriage was to Sarah Bender, and by this wife he had four children—John G., Daniel F., Mary A., and Aaron J. Of the 13 children all are now dead but Jacob A. Bair, of Upper Sandusky, Ohio, and Aaron J. Bair, of Celina, Ohio.

Through the courtesy of Jacob A. Bair we give a brief

record of the families of his brothers and sister.

Isaac Bair married Hannah Lauffer and they had seven children. William, Mary and Susan are dead. Mrs. Lizzie Welty

resides at Irwin, Pa.; Mrs. Lucy Loughner at Manor, Pa., and Mrs. Anna McWilliams and Mrs. Ella Baker at Greensburg, Pa.

Isaac Bair died at the age of 86.

Jacob A. Bair married Amy Uber, and they had nine children, of whom all are deceased but Mrs. J. M. Myers of Piggott, Ark., and E. L. Bair of Wilkinsburg, Pa. Jacob A. Bair is now in his 78th year and has been a life-long member of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Catherine Bair married Uriah Waugaman, and their children were Peter Waugaman, of Saltsburg, Pa., and David and

Hannah, deceased.

David Bair married Susan Hershey and they had eight children. Joe Bair resides at 2022 Center St., Pittsburg, Pa.; Mrs. Anna Nichols at Topeka, Kansas; H. H. Bair at Wilkinsburg, Pa.; Aris Bair at Oil City, Pa.; Jacob Bear at Topeka, Kans., and Frances, Emma and Alice are also married and reside at Topeka, Kansas.

Leah Bair was twice married. She first married Zackary Smeltzer, by whom she had no children. After his death, she married Reuben Allshouse by whom she had four daughters—Mrs. Naomi Berry, of Derry Station, Pa.: Mrs. Della Myers, of

Prairie Depot, Ohio, and Anna and Kate, deceased.

Henry Bair married Lizzie Keener, and of their children Jacob Cyrus Bair and Mrs. Emma Keck are dead; Mrs. Anna Martz resides at Congruity, Pa.; E. H. Bair at Greensburg, Pa.;

and Mrs. Lizzie Jackson at Greensburg, Pa.

Benjamin Bair married Katie Shuey, and of their children Jacob and Daniel are dead; Isaac Bair, Hannah Bair and Emanuel Bair reside at Greensburg, Pa.; David Bair and Joe Bair at Homestead, Pa., and Mrs. Kate Gongaware at Irwin, Pa. Benjamin Bair reached the age of 86 years.

Mattie Bair married Jacob Kemerer, and of their children were John Kemerer, of Manor, Pa.: Mrs. Eliza Mull, of Harrison City, Pa.: Mrs. Susan Holtzer, deceased: Mrs. Sadie Hawk, William Kemerer, Elijah Kemerer, Peter Kemerer and Mrs. Mary Pool, all of Manor, Pa.: and Paul Kemerer, who died in the army.

Sebastian Bair married Naomi Keener, and of their children William Bair is dead, and Mrs. Carrie Hinkley lives some-

where in Conn.

Of David Bair's children by his second marriage, only Aaron J. Bair is living. John G. died during the war, and Daniel

F. and Mary A. died young.

Aaron J. Bair was twice married. He first married Kezia L. Shriner, by whom he had no children. He then married Barbara Winstead-Hale, and their children are Mattie Bair, deceased;

Alpheus Bair, of Neptune, Ohio; Dr. Frank Bair, of Benton, Wis.: William Aaron Bair, of Celina, Ohio; and Ira Bair, Clyde Bair and Arlon Bair, all of Neptune, Ohio. Alpheus A. Bair married Mollie Lutz, and they have three children, Eldon, James and Mary. Dr. Frank M. Bair married E. Alta Milburn, and they have no children. Clyde H. Bair married Maud Stites, and they have no children. Arlon E. Bair married Susie Wollam, and they have no children. Aaron J. Bair resides at Celina, Ohio, and is in his 56th year. He is very prominently connected with the Church of God, and is now a trustee of Findlay (Ohio) College.

THE BOWERS FAMILY.

Because of the close connection of the Bowers and Bear families we give a brief record of the family of Sebastian Bowers.

Sebastian Bowers' wife was Magdeline Bear, but no record has been found that would indicate whether she was related to our family. She was born 15 years later than Jacob Bear, Sr.,

the founder of our family.

Mr. Levi Kendig, of Mechanicsburg, Pa., has several articles which were the property of his grandfather Sebastian Bowers, among them being a hall clock, an arm chair, and the family Bible. The entries in this Bible were all made in German. Below is given a copy of the transcript made by Ephraim Bear, Ir., a good many years ago.

1757, 21 January, I was born. Sebastian Bowers.

1762, 2 October, my wife, Magdeline Bear, was born. Died Jan. 11, 1824, aged 61 years, 3 months, and 9 days.

1781, May 15, we were united in marriage. 1782, May 31, my daughter Barbara was born. 1784, April 26, my daughter Mary was born.

1787, May 28, my daughter Elizabeth was born. 1790, Feb. 6, my daughter Magdeline was born.

1792, October 6, was born to us a daughter, died October 11, aged 5 days.

1794, March 27, my daughter Susanna was born. 1796, Dec. 8, my daughter Rebecca was born.

1799, Aug. 15, my daughter Anna was born.

1802, May 8, my son David was born.

1805, Aug. 27, my son Samuel was born.








"Magdeline Bowers died Jan. 11, A. D., 1824, aged 61 years, 3 months and 9 days."

"Sebastian Bowers died Oct. 16, A. D., 1840, aged 83 years, 8 months and 26 days."

Through the courtesy of Mr. Levi Kendig, of Mechanicsburg, Pa., and his sister, Mrs. Leah (Kendig) Bowers, children of Anna (Bowers) Kendig, we give a further record of the children of Sebastian and Magdeline (Bear) Bowers.

Barbara Bowers married Jacob Myers, and they had one daughter, Martha.

Mary Bowers married Ephraim Bear and their children were Leah, Jacob, Samuel and Ephraim. A complete genealogical record is given elsewhere in this history.

Elizabeth Bowers married David Bair and their children were Jacob A., Isaac, Catherine, David, Henry, Benjamin, Mattie, Leah, and Sebastian. A more complete record is given elsewhere.

Magdeline and Rebecca Bowers married Daniel Darr. Magdeline left no children. Rebecca had two, Samuel and Elizabeth.

Susanna Bowers married John Albert, and their children were Catherine, Martha, Susanna and John.

Anna Bowers married Emanuel Kendig. Their children were Leah (married a Bowers but of a different family), Levi. Elizabeth, Mary Ann, Samuel and David.

David Bowers married Mary Shellabarger, and their children were Isaac, William, Hadessa and Elizabeth.

Samuel Bowers married Ann Bear (ancestry not known), and their children were Magdeline, Martin and Ann Eliza.

An interesting anecdote of Sebastian Bowers is handed down in the Bowers family. Sebastian and his brother were but boys when they came to this country from Germany. A man by the name of Sheets wanted a boy and adopted a novel plan by which to choose one. He took a peck of apples and threw them upon the floor; the boy who secured the most apples was to be his choice. This happened to be Sebastian Bowers, and he remained with Mr. Sheets until the time of his marriage in 1781.

Sebastian Bowers lost all track of his brother after their arrival in this country.

The land owned by Sebastian Bowers in Cumberland county, Pa., joined that of Jacob Bear.

THE SNYDER FAMILY.

As is shown in this history, the wife of Jacob Bear, our founder, was Catherine Snyder. No further record has been found which would give her parentage, but it is positive she had a brother, Rev. David Snyder. It is also thought she had a sister

who married a merchant in Philadelphia, a Mr. Tibbet.

A record of birth and death of Rev. David Snyder and his wife, Elizabeth, was found in the family Bible of David Bear, son of Jacob, Sr. This record states David Snyder was born in 1762 and died Feb. 12, 1819, and his wife was born in 1762 and died Feb. 12, 1826. It is very probable they died childless, as in the probate records of Cumberland county, Pa., it appears that on "13th March, 1828, upon petition of Ephraim Bear, the elder, of the county of Cumberland, to the court thereon sitting, stating that certain estate is coming to his son Ephraim Bear, who is under the age of 14 years, out of the estate of his aunt Elizabeth Snider, and praying the court to appoint a guardian." A similar petition was made for Ephraim's other minor children, Jacob and Samuel, and the record shows Jacob Knisley was appointed.

The records also show that "David Snider" was appointed guardian of Rebecca Bear, on March 31, 1801, when the settling of the estate of her father, Jacob Bear, Sr., was yet pending in

the probate court.
