


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
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






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RULE FOR THE NUMBERS.

Every individual of the family has been assigned a number if sufficient data were known by which to calculate it.

Every person, of whom more than one or two lines of information is known, has a separate page devoted to him or her, numbered with the number of the person at the *top*, in consecutive order, corresponding to the index of first names.

Note.—This method permits of easy additions and insertions. The numbering of the pages of the book is a separate matter, and is at the bottom.

Ten (10) children are reckoned to each family except when it is known that there were less or no children.

Up to 292, numbers have been assigned by close observance of the above paragraph, keeping as small numbers as possible.

To calculate the numbers for children. If the number of the parent exceeds 292, multiply it by ten, substract 500 from the product, and the result will be the number of the eldest child.

If the number of the parent exceeds 4757, multiply it by 10, subtract 520 from the product, and the result will be the number of the eldest child.

PREFACE.

The compiler of this partial genealogy came into possession of a few notes regarding his immediate family before 1879, and endeavored to straighten them out and fill up the gaps. As all genealogists know, such gap-filling brings in other notes containing other gaps and so ad infinitum. Fifteen years passed and these notes had grown to considerable dimensions. They were founded on correct family records corroborated, as regards the writer's own family, by all the necessary tombstones and based, in collateral branches, on Caulkins, Hinman, Savage, Phillips and similar sources.

It was the writer's good fortune to be in Sheffield, England, in February, 1894, and to find records which, in his opinion (the argument comes later), establish beyond doubt that

- 1. It is impossible to connect the Norwich, Conn., Binghams with any noble family or landed gentry subsequent to 1550 A. D., or with Irish families of that date.
- 2. Thomas Bingham, who was one of the original proprietors of Norwich, came of a father well-to-do in the world and quite able to buy his 18-year-old son a share in that colony.

The writer had concluded to stop his investigations and print his notes when, by a peculiar chain of circumstances, he gained sight of the extensive labors of three others in this field.

- 1. William L. Weaver's notes on the family genealogy, published in the Williamntic Journal, July, August and September, 1863.
- 2. Mr. D. H. Bingham's papers, never finally arranged nor completed. These had long been known to be voluminous and valuable, but had proved an ignis fatuus until, by the help of Mr. Zebina Moses, of Washington, finally discovered to be in the possession of Mr. Bingham's grandson, Capt. W. H. Miller, Quartermaster, United States



Army (permanent address, care of Quartermaster General U. S. Army, Washington, D. C.).

3. The papers of Mr. Walter F. Bingham (now dead, but living in February, 1895, at 1529 Green street, Philadelphia). These were very voluminous and valuable, quite complete and practically ready for publication. These papers were based on D. H. Bingham's work, and are also in possession of Capt. Miller.

After looking over these extensive manuscripts, the writer concluded to complete his work on his own lines, regarding his method of arrangement and numbering the clearest and easiest for reference yet encountered by him; but filling out and completing his own independently discovered and verified data from the three sources mentioned just above. Each of these sources, in the order named, is evidently based on the preceding, and all have been "diligently revised and compared" by the writer with particular reference to the "early fathers" and somewhat, also, for collateral branches, into which, however, the writer never intended to go very deeply.

The writer has intended, when possible, always to quote his source of information. What is given on his own authority he believes will always prove true, and he has been very careful to separate what he *knew* from what he *thought* he knew.

As regards the first Thomas mentioned, as shown by records, as living in Sheffield, England, in 1614, further investigation of records of the Cutlers' Company, of St. Peter's Church, and of Wills (at Wakefield), would undoubtedly open up authentic history for from 50 to 100 years farther back, and the writer hopes some of the family will be enough interested in the matter to do this, now that a firm basis has been established by him for such investigation.

ORIGIN OF THE NAME BINGHAM.

Extracts from "Words and Places," by Isaac Taylor, M. A., Vicar of Holy Trinity, Twickenham, Third Edition, Macmillan & Co., London, 1873.

p. 81. The suffix "ham," which is very frequent in English
p. 82. names, appears in two forms in Anglo-Saxon documents.

One of these, ham, signifies an enclosure, that which hems in—a meaning not very different from that of ton or worth. These words express the feeling of reverence for private right, but ham involves a notion more mystical, more holy. It expresses the sanctity of the family bond; it is the Home, the one secret (geheim), and sacred place. In the Anglo-Saxon charters we frequently find this suffix united with the names of families-never with those of individuals. This word, as well as the feeling of which it is the symbol, was brought across the ocean by the Teutonic colonists, and it is the sign of the most precious of all the gifts for which we thank them. may indeed be said, without exaggeration, that the universal prevalence throughout England of names containing this word Home, gives us the clue to the real strength of the national character of the Anglo-Saxon race. What a world of inner difference there is between the English word home and the French phrase chez nous! It was this supreme reverence for the sanctities of domestic life which gave to the Teutonic nations the power of breathing a new life into the dead bones of Roman civilization.

Cognate with $h\bar{a}m$ (not $h\bar{a}m$), is the German heim, home, which enters so largely into the names of Southern Germany.

Hām is, for the most part, the source of the Frisian suffix um, which fringes the coast line of Hannover and Oldenburg. It should be noted, however, that the suffix um is sometimes only the sign of the dative plural.

The most important element which enters into Anglo-Saxon names yet remains to be considered. This is the syllable *ing*. It occurs in the names of more than one-

p. 83. tenth of the whole number of English villages and hamlets, often as a simple suffix, as in the case of Dorking, Hastings, &c.; but, more frequently, we find that it forms the medial syllable of the name, as in the case of Buckingham.

The syllable *ing* was the usual Anglo-Saxon patronymic. Thus we read in the Saxon Chronicle (A. D. 547).

Ida waes Eopping, Ida was Eoppa's son, Eppa waes Esing, Eoppa was Esa's son.

In fact the suffix *ing*, in the names of persons, had very much the same significance as the prefix Mac in Scotland, O' in Ireland, &c.

p. 85. Speaking of the numbers of places where various family names of ancient origin are to be found, this book further says:

"The Aescings, the royal race of Kent, are likewise found in thirteen places. The Cyllings and the Wealings are found in twelve places; * * * * the Bennings, the Bings, the Bobbings * * * in five."

- p. 90. We find that ing is never a mere suffix; in every case it forms the medial syllable of the name.
- p. 100. The evidence is overwhelming. It proves that the villages of Würtemberg and the villages of England were originally settled by men bearing the same family names.
- p. 101. These Swabian names terminate almost universally in ing-en. The suffix en is usually the sign of the dative plural. Thus Birlingen would mean "at the Birlings'," that is, at the place where the family of Birl lives; * * and it is therefore a question whether the ingen of Würtemberg is not the same as the ingham of England, since we can trace it through the intermediate stages of inghen and inghem. [Bingen, on the Rhine=Bingham (?)—T. A. B.]

p. 102. The Swabians and Angles of Würtemberg may possibly have formed one of the transported colonies of Charlemagne; if, indeed, the Swabian colony was not a settlement brought about at the same time and by the same causes that produced the descents upon the English coast.

p. 328. Ing; Anglo-Saxon; a meadow—e. g., Ingham.

p. 332. Heim; Germany. Ham; England.

a home, e. g. Buckingham.

Um; Friesland.

In the opening of Sir Walter Scott's "Castle Dangerous" it says: "Ings, or flat plains by the sides of the brooks and rivers," termed, farther north, "holms." [cf. "Ing" just above.—T. A. B.]

ORIGIN OF THE BINGHAMS IN ENGLAND.

From the foregoing it seems reasonable to believe that the Binghams were an Anglo-Saxon family.

From what follows it will be seen that the original Binghams may have utterly died out, and that the Binghams everywhere for several hundreds of years past may be descendants of Normans who have really in their beginnings in England, assumed the names from Anglo-Saxon estates, into the possession of which they entered after the Conquest.

I have run across the tradition of a French origin of the Bingham family in my correspondence on genealogical subjects.

A book entitled "The Norman People," published by Henry S. King & Co., 65 Cornhill, London, 1874—author's name not given—says as follows:

p. 158-9. Bingham or <u>de Buisli</u>, from Buisli or Builly near Neûchatel, Normandy (often supposed to be of Saxon origin).

Roger de Busliaco I. held 149 lordships in barony in 1086 A. D., chiefly in York and Notts, which were entitled the "Honour of Tickhill." He also held Sutton, Somerset, from Roger de Arundel. One of his lordships was Bingham, Notts, an estate of great value and importance.

[Note by T. A. B.—Bingham in Nottinghamshire can still be found on Stieler's Hand Atlas, just east of Nottingham town. All the country thence north to Leeds is full of Binghams at the present day, 1896, including Mansfield, Chesterfield, Sheffield, Wakefield, &c.]

Duydale confuses this baron with his son and grandson who bore the same name. The latter suffered forfeiture to Stephen (reigned 1135-1154) and his "Honour of Tickhill" was, in 1156 and 1165, in the hands of the king (Henry II., 1154-1189). See Rot. Pip.; also Liber Niger, by Ed. Hearne.

Jordan and John de Buisli were then his next heirs. The former had issue Richard de Buisli, who held six fees in 1165, and whose daughter carried that estate to Robert de Vipont.

The male representation then vested in the descendants of Richard de Buisli, younger son of Roger de Buisli (Busliaco) I., who founded Roche Abbey, York, 1147, A. D. See Monasticon Angliarum, 1st edit., i. 836.

He had issue Richard and William de Buisli; see same authority.

John de Buisli, son of the latter, granted lands to Roche Abbey—same authority.

The former paid a fine in Bucks in 1158 A. D. See Rot. Pip.—and, possessing Bingham, was thence named.

About 1166 John de Bingham witnessed charters in favor of Ellesham Hospital, Lincoln. See Monasticon Augliarum, 1st edit., ii, 422.

His son Clement was father of Hugh de Bingham living in 1199, who was enfeoffed in his lands at Bingham by Hugh Paganel. See Testa de Neville, Record publication.

The lordship was soon after forfeited.

Robert, brother of Clement, and in 1205, Richard, his son, obtained livery of his lands at Bingham. See Hardy, Obl. et fin., 258.

He was brother of Robert, Bishop of Salisbury, and had issue, William and Robert.

The former possessed Sutton, Somerset, which had descended from his ancestor, Roger de Buisli. See Collinson, Vol. ii, 350.

Robert married the heiress of Turberville, and from him descend the Binghams of Dorset; Earls of Luscan; and Barons Clanmorris.

[Notes by T. A. B.—It will be observed that this pedigree does not agree with that given later from Burke—yet this work just quoted seems to be worthy of attention.]

The query is still pertinent,—Were the Binghams living in Sheffield, Yorkshire, England, A. D. 1600-1650, descendants of the old Anglo-Saxons who gave rise to the name Bingham?—or were they descendants of the Norman de Buisli family (Busliaco in Latin) who assumed the name of Bingham from their conquered estates so named before the Conquest?

CONNECTION WITH ENGLISH NOBILITY.

Burke's "Nobility and Gentry of England" mentions several families of Binghams, giving the family crest and the motto "Spes mea Christus." But, however desirable the crest and motto may seem, there appears to be no legal right at present existing for the Connecticut Binghams to assume either.

For the benefit of those who desire to know how distant the connection is with the nobility of England, the following is given, which can be verified by reference to Burke, and was furnished the writer by Mr. Walter F. Bingham, who also probably furnished it to the California Binghams.

John de Bingham was knighted by Henry I. (1100-1135) and from him descended in the line of primogeniture

- 1. Silvester.
- 2. Geoffrey.
- 3. Augustin.
- 4. William.
- 5. Ralph.
- 6. Ralph, 2d.

This Ralph, 2d, was knighted, and left

- 1. William, living in 1256 A. D.
- 2. Robert, 1st.

[See Great Index of Biographical Reference by L. B. Phillips.] *Robert*, 1st, married, and had *Robert*, from whom descended

This last Robert died in 1561, leaving 8 sons and 2 daughters. One of his children, the seventh son, was Thomas, and there is a



supposition that he may have been the ancestor of the American family. This theory is based

- 1. On the tradition (not yet proved) that he lived in Yorkshire.
- 2. On the fact that he was contemporaneous with the Thomas Bingham born about 1642.

But here is the sticking point.

[If there is truth in this theory, he was probably the grand-father of the first Norwich Bingham and father of (0) in this genealogy; and this theory is quite possible.—T. A. B.]

BINGHAM COATS OF ARMS.

Burke's General Armory, 1884, gives the following:

If the Sheffield Binghams, Yorkshire, in 1600-1650 were entitled to arms, my judgment is that they must have been quite similar to Nos. 8-12, inclusive.

IRISH FAMILY TRADITIONS.

Among all the Binghams the writer has met, the tradition has been general that the American families came from Ireland. The facts appear to be as follows:

Under date of February 2, 1895, Major R. Bingham, of Asheville, N. C., writes that this family certainly came from Ireland, as will be seen under the head of the Irish Bingham family.

General Henry H. Bingham, M. C., of Philadelphia, Pa., is undoubtedly from the same family as the North Carolina Binghams.

Mr. John Edward Bingham, of Sheffield, England, told the writer February 21, 1894, that the Irish tradition existed in his family, although all he knew was that he came from Chesterfield way.

The writer's grandfather, Cyrus Bingham, used to tell the writer's father, Joel Foote Bingham, that his grandfather (Cyrus') used to say that the Connecticut family came from Ireland.

There were Binghams, soldiers, in Ireland in 1586, 1590, 1593, &c. These, or some of them, belonged to the Bingham-Melcombe family of Dorsetshire, still a prominent family. The tombstone of Lieut. Gen. Sir Richard Bingham of this family is in Westminister Abbey. He served in Ireland in Queen Bess' time, and relations of his may, very likely, be ancestors of the present Irish noblemen. A number of Irish Binghams have been famous soldiers. Lord Raglan was a Bingham, and the earls of Lucan are Binghams. One of them, George Charles Bingham, b. 1800, d. 1888, was in the "charge of the Light Brigade" at Balaclava.

As shown above, some of the American Binghams do come of Irish ancestry, but whether the Irish Binghams date from the time of Queen Bess and the Spanish armada or from Cromwell's time, the Connecticut Binghams almost certainly do not come from Irish ancestry of those times, because their forebears were peaceably settled and solidly established in the cutlery business in Sheffield, England, in 1631 and years before; and the Bingham who first came to Norwich, Conn., was baptized in Sheffield in 1642, as shown by still existing church records.

THE TRACING OF GENEALOGIES IN GENERAL.

Extract from "Handbook of Heraldry," by John E. Cussans, London, Chatto & Windus, 1882; p. 284:

The records in the family Bible or other documents of a similar nature will usually give two or three generations; beyond these reference must be made to parochial and other local registers and wills. The latter frequently supply a valuable clue to collateral branches of the family.

[Note by T. A. B.—Wills in England are to be found at Somerset House, London; Peterborough, York, Durham; and for Sheffield, Yorkshire at Wakefield.]

Old numbers of "The Annual Register" and "Gentleman's Magazine" (England), Army Lists, College Registers (England and America) will also in many instances be found of great service.


It would also be advisable to ascertain at the College of Heralds what records, if any, are there to be found.

If the pedigree can be traced up to the middle of the seventeenth century and the family were, at that time, entitled to armorial bearings, the Visitations of the Heralds may carry it three generations higher or more.

In England, county histories, documents in the Public Record Office, particularly Subsidy Rolls (for in them will be found the name of *every* householder assessed) and, in some cases, Municipal Archives and Monastic Chartularies must now be carefully and patiently examined; the genealogist bearing in mind that no reliance can be placed on the orthography of proper names, either of persons or places.

The real labor now commences; and unless the family were, during the sixteenth century, either noble or landed proprietors, further research is almost useless.

Except in a few rare instances, it is utterly impossible to trace a pedigree beyond the time of Richard the Second, 1381-1399; and those persons who assert that their ancestors "came over with the



Conqueror" derive their authority chiefly, if not wholly, from tradition or their own imagination.

For the same reason that it is difficult for such persons to prove their assertion, it is equally difficult to refute it.

Nothing is more common than for a person bearing a certain name to imagine that he is necessarily connected with another family of the same name.

THE ENGLISH ORIGIN OF THE CONNECTICUT BINGHAMS.

On February 21, 1894, the writer saw the well preserved church records at Sheffield, England, and found there recorded certain evidences as to the father of the Norwich settler, Thomas, as well as to the *emigré* himself.

The line of evidence is perfect. The tombstone at Windham, Conn., (see Appendix I.) of the original Thomas Bingham of Norwich records the fact that he came from Sheffield, England, and that his father's name was Thomas.

Upon arrival in Sheffield I found that the city directory for 1893-4 contained the names of thirty-five Binghams. It was known that the first American Thomas came to Norwich in 1660, when he was about 18 years old; and also that in 1642 Sheffield must have been a small town, shown by the said directory to have had then about 2,500 inhabitants. Hence, it was argued that there could have then been but one, or at most two, parish churches. It was found that there was then but one parish church, St. Peter's. This still exists and its records were found to be in fine order and carefully preserved.

It did not take long to find what I was in search of, viz, date of baptism or birth of the first Norwich, Conn., Bingham, names of his father and mother and date of their marriage.

The record of births was looked up as far back as 1590, but I failed to find that of the Thomas Bingham married in 1631. As my own stay in Sheffield was limited by business elsewhere, it does not follow that more time spent would not probably have rewarded my search.

While looking over the records, I was on the lookout for another family of Binghams living in Sheffield in the early part of the seventeenth century, but found none. I incline to the belief from this and other records which I looked at, that there was only this one family of Binghams in that parish at that time, although the surrounding country was then and still is full of them.

It is to be noted that the mother of the first Norwich Bingham was Anna (corroborated by evidence recently found in America), and not Mary, as given on the Windham tombstone. Her last name was Stenton (not Stanton) and this name was observed on one or two store signs of the present city.

The family name Stenton occurs in St. Peter's records before and after 1600, but I did not find this Anna among them.

Sheffield, England, has always been noted for its cutlery, and was so in 1600 and thereabout. Now it is well known what the old English Guilds were and how honorable was the rank of a master in such guilds. In the latter part of the 16th century the master cutlers of Sheffield formed themselves into one association called the Cutlers' Company, and this still exists to-day. The records of this company run back to Queen Bess' time.

In these records I found an entry under date of December 21, 1614, of a Thomas Bingham having been admitted to membership as a master cutler, and his trade mark is given as granted to him

A Henry Bingham also appears on the record before the above Thomas, and he had a trade mark which I failed to copy.

It appears very probable that the Thomas Bingham above mentioned was the father of the Thomas who was married in 1631 and grandfather of the first American Thomas; because

- 1. To become a master cutler required mature age and experience, and he became one in 1614, which would make the date 1631 right for a son of his to be married; and the church records show that a Thomas Bingham was then married and was the father of the first Norwich, Conn., Thomas.
- 2. Although my examination was not exhaustive, I still found no trace of any other than the Thomas Bingham's family who was married in 1631, in the church records of that parish.

If my surmise be true, our records go back to a Thomas Bingham who must have been, at least, say 40-45 years old in 1614, and that would bring his birth 1574-79, or Queen Elizabeth's time.

There is no doubt, however, about the descent of the Connec-

ticut Binghams from Thomas Bingham, of Sheffield, England, married July 6, 1631, and so born not long after 1600.

A young man and a younger son who was an original settler of a foreign colony such as Norwich, Conn., must have had means from his father to buy into the company. The station of a master cutler of Sheffield in 1660 argues a certain amount of wealth and fits the case exactly. Trades ran in families in those days. The eldest son generally succeeded to and carried on his father's trade; the younger sons using their legacies in other ways. In this case the grandfather was very well to do; and no doubt the father was in a position to assist his youngest son by buying him a share in the Norwich colony about to be started—or if dead before 1658-60, to have left him sufficient money for the purpose.

Rev. Joseph Bingham, who wrote the celebrated "Antiquities of the Christian Church," lived at Wakefield, which was then and still is the place of record for wills. Wakefield, Chesterfield, Mansfield, Sheffield and all the country round about would, no doubt, richly repay careful search for history of our family before 1631.

East of Nottingham is a railway station called "Bingham's Road."

If the Binghams of Bingham—Melcombe, in Dorset, are connected with the Connecticut Binghams, the branching of the lines will be found much prior to 1600.

SHEFFIELD, ENGLAND.

At the time of my visit, in February, 1894, I found the following books of value in hunting up the Bingham pedigree—to be bought or seen in public libraries:

The church where the Connecticut Bingham records are to be found is St. Peter's and Holy Trinity parish church, High, Fargate and Church streets.

A Royal Grammar School was founded at Sheffield in 1603 by one Thomas Smith. It was incorporated by King James I. in 1604. The original school was at the head of Townhead street.

It is probable our ancestor went to this school. The records might be examined.

While the Cutlers' Company, of Sheffield, incorporated by King James I. in 1619, still exists, its functions have, of course, changed. It is now rather a "swell" affair, a sort of historical club, and almost entirely composed of rich men, although there is still a strictly business side to it. Each member was in the old days a master cutler, and is so still. But the President of the Company is styled The Master Cutler of Sheffield, is elected annually and gives a banquet on election, something like the Lord Mayors of London. The Sheffield City Directory gives names and dates for all The Master Cutlers.

The Binghams come in as follows:

A. D. 1624, — Bingham.

1881, John Edward Bingham, 1895, Charles Henry Bingham.

In 1894 there were 35 Binghams in the Sheffield City Directory, among them

John Edward Bingham, Esq., J. P. (electroplate, Walker & Hall, Howard St.), lives at West Lea, Ranmoor Park Road. He is Lieut. Col. of the Sheffield Engineer Volunteers (First West York).

He is a fine looking, tall, sandy-complexioned man, with blue eyes. He said he had heard of the tradition that the family came from Ireland, but he took little interest in such matters. His own family came from near Chesterfield.

He was extremely courteous and celebrated our meeting by opening a bottle. He also invited me to extend my visit and stay at his house, which I regretted much that time would not permit me to do.

He also said he had met a Thomas Bingham, of New York, and a David Bingham, of New York and Liverpool (grain merchants).

I also met his only son, also a big fellow, who much resembled his father, named Albert E. Bingham.

Charles Henry Bingham lived at Brinklands, Cavendish Road.

BINGHAM GENEALOGY.

THE CONNECTICUT FAMILY.

The name Bingham is first found in Connecticut at Saybrook. Hinman says this family has been connected by marriage with several of the best families of Connecticut and has produced many excellent men.

Many have been college graduates—among them

Four have graduated at Williams College.

Four had graduated at Yale College by 1850.

One graduated West Point Mil. Acad., 1850.

One was valedictorian at Yale, class of 1852.

One was graduated at Yale, class of 1853.

One was graduated at Yale, class of 1863.

One graduated at Yale, class of 1868, and was a "Wooden Spoon" man.

One was at Yale, in class of 1876, and left while a Senior to go to the Military Academy at West Point, N. Y.

One graduated at Harvard, class of 1887.

The records of the "Cutlers' Company" of Sheffield, England, showed, February 21, 1894, a Henry Bingham, admitted as a master cutler before December, 1614.

December 21, 1614, a THOMAS BINGHAM was admitted as master cutler, and the trade mark was granted him (Queen Elizabeth, 1559-1603; James I., 1603-1625.)

The following data were copied by the writer from the records of St. Peter's and Holy Trinity Parish church, Sheffield, England, February 21, 1894:

Considerable search of later baptisms showed no more of this family.

Miss Calkins in her "History of Norwich" says:

"Thomas Bingham and Mary (? sic) his wife, lived in Sheffield, Yorkshire, England, in the early part of the 17th century, as is proved by an inscription on the tombstone of their son in Windham, Conn. Whether there were other children is not known." [The above data show who the unknown children were. T. A. B.]

In a list of passengers shipped from England to Barbadoes, April 14, 1635, was a William Bingham, 18 years old [New Eng. Hist. and Gen. Reg., 1860, p. 350.]

Hinman says the name of Bingham is first found in Connecticut at Saybrook.

Caulkins says (p. 158): "Before removing to Norwich, he (William Backus, Senior), married Mrs. Anne Bingham and brought with him to the new settlement three daughters, two sons and his wife's son, Thomas Bingham. The three young men were of mature age or near maturity, and are all usually reckoned as first proprietors (of Norwich). The daughters were subsequently united in marriage to John Reynolds, Benjamin Crane and John Bayley." Also

"The death of Mrs. Anne Backus is registered with the Bingham family, thus

"Mrs. Anne Backus, mother of Thomas Bingham, Senior, died in May, 1670."

Perkins says (under heading of First Settlers of Norwich):

- p. 4. "Thomas Bingham, stepson of W. Backus, Sr., alone," that is, having no wife nor children. Also
 - "W. Backus, Sr.; wife, Ann Bingham; child, Stephen (Backus)."
- p. 66. "Wm. Backus, one of the original settlers of Norwich, is supposed to have been an inhabitant of Saybrook, and just before removing to Norwich he married Ann, widow of Thomas Bingham. On his arrival at Norwich his household probably consisted of his wife Ann (Bingham), his son, Stephen Backus (by first wife), and his stepson, Thomas Bingham."
- p. 414. "1. Wm. Backus, b. ; d. before 1664 (see Caulkins, p. 132)."

"m. 1. Sarah Charles, dau. of John Charles, of Brantford, Ct. (Caulkins, p. 157-8)."

"2. Before 1660, Ann (——) Bingham, who d. 1670, widow of Thomas Bingham."

Weaver says: "We find by the records of Norwich that Ann Backus, mother of Thomas Bingham, Sen., d. May, 1670. She was a widow and had been the second wife of the first William Backus, of Norwich."

Now, the tombstone of the original Thomas Bingham, which I have seen, and whose inscription is given in the appendix and also quoted in Caulkins, says his mother's name was Mary.

The Sheffield records which I found and copied, make it Ann. Weaver, Caulkins and Perkins corroborate the English record.

How the tombstone inscription came to be wrong, as it seems without doubt to be, I cannot explain. Thomas' wife's name was Mary.

It will appear later that this Thomas Bingham married into a Saybrook family.

As regards Saybrook records, Mr. Hoadley, the State Librarian of Connecticut, informed me (1896), that there are no records of original Saybrook now known to exist. There is in the State Library at Hartford a manuscript copy of such Saybrook land records as exist, running back to 1650 and thereabout. These are, however, very meagre. Scattered here and there through these records are entries of baptisms, but I did not find either name, Backus or Bingham.

Weaver quotes the following as furnished him by "the venerable Col. Elijah Bingham (4205) of East Haddam, who had it from his father.

"Two brothers came from England and took up their residence in New London, but soon one of them died and his family returned to England. The other brother, whose name was Thomas, soon removed to Windham, where he lived and died, leaving seven sons, all of them over six feet in height. All lived to great age and died in succession as born. They were all religious men, Puritanical in their principles, and much renowned as musicians and singers" (see later on).

"It will be remembered that their father came to America in



the time of Cromwell, and that their mother, Mary Rudd, was very musically talented."

Col. Elijah Bingham adds that a descendant of the brother who died in New London, and whose family returned to England, came back afterwards to America, settled in Philadelphia, and became a wealthy man.

Mrs. Mary Sprague (Bingham) Brown, of Andover, Conn., says (July, 1895), that the original American Thomas Bingham came over "in company with one brother"—and she has proved very accurate in family history. This tradition of brothers agrees with Col. Elijah Bingham's remarks and with traditions in the Vermont and New Hampshire branches of the family.

Summing up the above evidence it appears probable that the original Norwich, Conn., Thomas Bingham, when about 18 years old, as will appear later, came to America with his widowed mother and at least one brother. His father would have been a man of means and position in Sheffield because he was the son of a master cutler, and probably of the very Bingham who was "The Master Cutler of Sheffield" in 1624.


The eldest brother of Thomas, Abel, no doubt succeeded his father in business and stayed in Sheffield.

But Thomas had three other brothers, and doubtless they were all left well off by their father.

They may have gone to New London first. But it seems certain that Thomas and his mother came, at some time, to Saybrook, that she there married again, a Backus, and that the Backuses and Thomas Bingham later went to Norwich and were among its original founders.

It is worthy of note that this Thomas Bingham had a younger sister named Anna; but in view of the evidence, it seems that it must have been his mother Anna (Stenton) and not his sister who married Backus at Saybrook.

Deacon Thomas Bingham was one of the first landed proprietors of Norwich, Conn. His house lot bears date of April, 1660, though he could not have been more than eighteen years old. He was made free from Norwich by the General Court in 1671 and removed to Windham, Conn., where he can be traced for thirty years as Sergeant, Selectman and Deacon of the church.





He was on the first list of approved inhabitants of Windham in 1693.

Miss Caulkins' book contains a map, of which the accompanying plate is a copy, showing how the town was originally laid out and apportioned, and giving the names of the various proprietors.

"Thomas Bingham, four acres; a strip running from the street to the river."

Weaver says that of the history of Thomas Bingham while a resident of Norwich and of his eldest son, Thomas (2), the only one who remained there, but little information is to be gained. The following is the record of the first purchase of Thomas Bingham in Windham:

"Sould to Thomas Bingham, senr., of Norwich, his heirs and assigns, an alotment (of 1,000 acres), as a legate at the South east part of the town, by Capt. Jno Mason's first lot, in consideration of 14 pounds of provision pay in hand towards the charge of the mill."

The above grant was made and pay received by Jonathan Jennings and John Backus as trustees, to defray the town charges to the corn mill, April 21, 1693. The grant was confirmed by the proprietors (of the town), May 30, 1693, at which time Mr. Bingham was a resident of the town, as his name is on the first list of twenty-two "approved inhabitants" bearing that date.

At this time Mr. Bingham was about fifty years of age, and perhaps, with the exception of Cates, the oldest settler in the town.

At the town meeting, May 30, 1693, he was chosen one of the committee to discourse with the Rev. Mr. Whiting in regard to his settlement in Windham. In 1695 he was chosen one of the Selectmen of the town, and is then called Sergeant Thomas Bingham.

At the organization of the first Windham church, December 10, 1700, he was appointed and ordained senior deacon, which office he held until his death.

At the "seating of the meeting house, April 19, 1703, by reason of his age and office he occupied the most honorable position—the seat at the right hand of his wife in the pew."



On being appointed an overseer to the will of John Cates, 1697, he refused to act, stating that he had not "intermeddled with that affair yet."

That Deacon Bingham was one of the most prominent and respected settlers is evident from the positions he occupied and from the deference that was paid him; and he may fairly be considered one of the civil and religious fathers of the town.

Larned's "History of Windham Co." says, Vol. I, p. 71 and seq.

"Thomas Bingham, who had removed from Norwich with a large family of sons and daughters, was an important acquisition (to Windham). He was among those who lived at 'Hither place,' or in the southeast quarter of the town."

An ancient map copied in Larned's book shows "Bingham's Brook" just northwest of Windham Green and emptying into the Williamntic river.

In 1859 a "Jubilee" was held at Norwich, Conn., to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the founding of the town. Prof. Daniel Coit Gilman delivered the historical discourse. This discourse and others delivered at the time have been collected and bound into one volume, to be found in the Penna. Historical Society in Philadelphia, and containing a facsimile of the signature of the original Thomas Bingham, of Norwich, written apparently in 1696!

Deacon Thomas Bingham married Mary Rudd, December 12, 1666. She is supposed to have been the dau. of Lieut. Jonathan Rudd, of Saybrook, and his wife, who was the then celebrated "Bride of Bride Brook" (see Caulkins' History of Norwich, and also History of New London, pp. 48-49). Mary Rudd was born——, 1648, and d. August 4 or 5, 1726.

In a deed recorded at Saybrook (Caulkins), Nathaniel Rudd calls Lieut. Jonathan Rudd his father, and in a similar instrument recorded at Norwich, Thomas Bingham speaks of Nathaniel Rudd as his brother. Hence, it is inferred that Mary Rudd Bingham was dau. of Lieut. Jonathan Rudd.

Some of the Rudds were noted for their musical talents, and it is possible, says Weaver, that the musical faculty, which has been prominent in some branches of the Bingham family, may have been derived from Mary Rudd.

Married Oct. 28, 1697, Ann Huntington, dau. of the first Christopher Huntington, of Norwich, Conn., and his wife, Ruth (Rockwell). She survived her husband. She appears to have been a pious and benevolent woman, a worthy companion of her husband. In her will, dated Jan. 21, 1755, she gives "fifty Spanish milled dollars, or an equivalent thereto, in passable bills of credit, to be committed into the hands of the Revd. Mr. Eleazar Wheelock, of Lebanon, to be by him disposed of and improved for the education of the youth of the Indian Nations of this land, or in propagating religion and learning among them;" besides numerous other legacies to relatives.



ANDOVER, TOLLAND COUNTY, CONN.

It was originally a settlement in the township of Hebron somewhat distant from Hebron "Center." It was settled about 1707 by men from Windsor, Saybrook, Northampton and Long Island.

In 1712 the town of Hebron, comprising Hebron, Andover, Gilead and Marlborough, all in one (religious) society, appointed a committee to procure a minister and agree upon his salary.

Mr. John Bliss, of Norwich, was employed as a minister for the town in 1715. He was ordained in 1717. At that time meetings were held in private houses and sometimes in barns. The so-called "old barn" of the Bingham farm at Andover was often so used.

Mr. Bliss was dismissed in 1734.

In the autumn of 1735 Mr. Pomeroy was ordained.

Andover was set off as a separate (religious) society in 1747. Mr. Pomeroy continued minister until 1747, and after that belonged only to Hebron proper, as minister of the first religious society there.

The inhabitants of Andover as a district (religious) society settled their first minister, Rev. Samuel Lockwood, in 1748, and he continued their pastor until his death in 1791.

Was brought up on a farm but managed to secure a good academic education and afterward studied law with James R. Lawrence, of Syracuse, N. Y. In 1833 he moved to Green Oak, Livingston county, Mich., where he cleared and cultivated a farm and had some local practice in law at the same time. He was postmaster of the town and justice of the peace and was the first judge of probate elected in the county. When Michigan became a state he was elected to the Legislature and was four times reelected, being Speaker of the House three terms. In 1846 he was elected on the Democratic ticket to Congress and was the only practical farmer in that body. He was re-elected in 1848 and in the contest on the slavery question, which followed, he opposed the extension of slavery into the territories and voted and worked for the Wilmot proviso. His record on this subject ultimately separated him from his party but helped materially his future success. Although democracy had once committed itself in Michigan to the support of essentially the same principles as Mr. Bingham advocated, it yielded to the claims of the slave power and Mr. Bingham stood alone among the representatives from Michigan in Congress in his vote and work on this subject. It was this record in Congress more than anything else that gave him first the Free Democratic and afterwards the Republican nomination for Governor in 1854. He was twice elected Governor. He was largely instrumental in securing the establishment of the Agricultural College at Lansing.

In 1859 he was elected U. S. Senator, but served only two years.

In Oct., 1861, he was attacked with apoplexy and died suddenly at his home in Green Oak, sincerely mourned by the people of the whole State.



THE PHILADELPHIA BINGHAMS OF REVOLUTIONARY FAME.

"The Historic Mansions and Buildings of Philadelphia," by Thompson Westcott, Philadelphia, Porter & Coates, 1877, gives a very interesting history of this truly distinguished American family, from which the following main facts are taken:

p. 337 James Bingham died in 1714, leaving considerable landed property. He was a blacksmith and was buried
p. 349 at Christ Church, Philadelphia, December 22, 1714.

James, his son, added to the possessions of the family by marrying a daughter of Wm. Budd, of Burlington, N. J. William, his son, added still more by marrying, in 1745, Mary, daughter of Alderman and Mayor John Stamper. William, of Lansdowne, his son, was born in Philadelphia, April 8, 1752. Graduated at the College of Philadelphia in 1768; was British Consul at St. Pierre Myzene in the West Indies. Remained there during the Revolution. Was agent of the Continental Congress for some years. He amassed great wealth while in the West Indies.

In 1786 he was elected member of the Congress of the Confederation, and served till 1789.

Was captain of a troop of dragoons in 1789, and escorted Mrs. Washington when on her journey to New York to join her husband, then President-elect.

In 1790 he was elected member of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, and chosen Speaker.

In 1795 he was U. S. Senator from Pennsylvania, and held that office until 1801.

Upon his return from the West Indies, he married the beautiful Ann Willing, daughter of Thomas W., October 26, 1780. They made a trip to Europe and were accorded special distinction at various Courts, where they were intimate friends of our American Ministers, 1784-86. Mrs.

Bingham is specially and frequently mentioned in letters from Mrs. Adams and others as admired for her brilliant social qualities.

This Mr. and Mrs. Bingham were very intimate with all the leaders of the new American Republic, including the Washingtons. It was they who persuaded Washington to sit to Stuart, and they presented a Stuart portrait of Washington to the Marquis of Lansdowne, who was a friend of the Willing family.

They lived in a great deal of style outside of Philadelphia, at a place called "Lansdowne," now part of Fairmount Park. The historic house has, however, been torn down, and its site is no longer known.

Mrs. Ann Willing Bingham died in Bermuda, May 11, 1801, aged 37. Mr. Bingham went to Europe shortly afterwards and died at Bath in 1804.

A grandson of this latter William, also named William, was born in 1858.

Nothing appears to be known or, at least, published, regarding the antecedents of the progenitor of this family, James Bingham, the blacksmith, who died in 1714. Search in the Penna. Hist. Society at Philadelphia revealed nothing. It was there said that if any one could trace him farther back it would be Mr. Chas. Penrose Keith, living (November, 1896), at 321 South Fourth Street, Philadelphia.

BINGHAMS IN AMERICA OF IRISH DESCENT.

It appears that several brothers came to the United States in or about 1793 from County Down, Ireland. Major R. Bingham, Principal of the celebrated "Bingham School" (whose brother wrote "Bingham's Latin Grammar"), says that one of those brothers settled in New York, another in Tennessee, and another, his own ancestor, in Wilmington, N. C., where he established the famous school, since removed, and now (1897), in Asheville, N. C.

PEDIGREE OF MAJOR R. BINGHAM.

He says his family were of Scotch-Irish descent, and since Cromwell's time (1599-1658), had lived in County Down, Ireland.

He does not know his great-grandfather's first name, but he was involved in some of the Irish risings of the 18th century.

His grandfather was Rev. William Bingham, who graduated from Glasgow University about 1784. This is one of the brothers above mentioned, who with two or three other brothers came to America in 1793.

His father corresponded until the war of 1861-5 with Dr. Wm. Brewster Bingham, of County Down, who was a kinsman.



Re-elected Clerk of the Courts 1875, and at expiration of term of office elected continuously a member from the First District of Pennsylvania as a Republican, to the 46th, 47th, 48th, 49th, 50th, 51st, 52d, 53d and 54th Congresses. Re-elected again in 1896.

Was Chairman of the Committee on the Post Office and Post Roads of the 47th and 51st Congresses, being the two Congresses when the Republicans had control of the House, and is now a member of the Committee on Appropriations, the most important of all committees. The legislation securing the reduction of postage, letter rates, from three cents to two cents. and from one-half ounce to one ounce weight, were more directly the result of General Bingham's work than that of any other member.

Has been a delegate from the State of Pennsylvania, and from his Congressional District, to the Republican National Conventions of 1872, 1876, 1884, 1888 and 1892.

Was the first Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic for the half or lower Philadelphia District, and the second Commander of Post 1, of Pennsylvania.

About 1792 Mr. de Labeaume, after France had adopted her Republican Constitution, left the country with the first two children by his first marriage, leaving the third, an infant, and came to St. Louis, Mo., where he spent the rest of his life.

His will is on record in St. Louis, Book G, 3, 244, dated Nov. 22, 1817. In it he says

"There are left of my first wife, Adelaide Dutemple, two children, Pierre Auguste and Marie Lucille, and perhaps a third named Theodore, that circumstances compelled me to leave in

France, of whom I never could learn anything and who, I have reason to believe, is dead."

May 8, 1804, Mr. Labeaume purchased from a Jno. B. Paquet a piece of land, 4 by 40 arpents 160, lying about five miles north of the village, on the road to old Fort Bellefontaine and now forming a part of Bellefontaine cemetery.

On this land he built a house of logs, which had only been removed a few years before 1886. Mr. Thomas S. Rutherfurd, his wife and Rosalie Tison remembered it well.

Here he lived until his death, Jan. 4, 1821, leaving eight children, and here his youngest children were born.

At that early period, the country around what is "Baden" of the present day (1886) was called the "White Ox Prairie."



It is inferred they were parents of Jonathan Johnson, bap. Feb. 13, 1736-7; date of birth not of record.

Colonel Johnson was a miller and farmer of Middletown, Conn., and owned all of Hunting Hill, which is just over Panucha bridge. He also owned the greater part of Warwick street and a portion of the southern end of South Main street.

While he was absent at the wars, his family lived quite near the Panucha bridge on South Main street. Mrs. Rose Newell remembers that her mother often sa'd that "Grandpa Johnson's service in the army had much impoverished him."

In "Colonial Records of Connecticut," by Hoadley, 1757-62, Vol. XI, page 227, Jonathan Johnson was by General Assembly made a second lieutenant, March, 1759.

p. 353, He was again made second lieutenant, March, 1760.

p. 485, He was made first lieutenant, March, 1761.

In the State Library in the Capitol at Hartford, Conn., are a number of *unpublished* muster and pay rolls of the French and Indian Wars.



For the year 1758, there is a pay roll of Capt. Timothy Hierlihy's, on which appears: "Sergeant Jonathan Johnson, enlisted March 28, discharged Nov. 16, served 33 weeks and 3 days, entire pay £16. 14. 3."

For the year 1759, there is a pay roll of same captain's company, belonging to the First Conn. Reg't, Colonel (General) Phineas Lyman, on which appears: "Lieut. Jonathan Johnson, entered service March 22, discharged Dec. 16, served 38 weeks and 4 days at 25/ per week—full pay £48. 4. 4."

In the book, "Record of Service of Connecticut Men" in the Revolution, War of 1812, &c., published by authority of the General Assembly, 1889, is found:

- p. 414. Bradley's Battalion, Wadsworth Brigade, 1776, Captain Jonathan Johnson, of Middletown, Conn., noted as re-entering "Connecticut Line."
- p. 420 has a list of his company.
- p. 193 under head of Fifth Reg't, Conn. Line, formation of 1777-1781 is found:
 - Field and Staff, Lieut. Col. Jonathan Johnson, Middletown, commissioned major, Jan. 1, 1777; promoted lieutenant colonel, vice Mead resigned, May 25, 1778, and continued in 1781.
- p. 322 under head of "Second Reg't., Conn. Line, formation of 1781-83" is found:
 - "Field and Staff, Lieut. Col. Jonathan Johnson, Middletown; continued from 1777-81, served to June, 1783."
- p. 360, under head of "Second Reg't Conn. Line, formation of Jan.-June, 1783," is found:
 - "Field and Staff, Lieut. Col. Jonathan Johnson, Middletown; continued from 1781-83, retired with the army, 1783."
- p. 373. Lieut. Col. Jonathan Johnson, of Middletown, is recorded as one of the original members of the Society of the Cincinnati; time of service, June 10, 1776.

It is more than tradition in the family, as shown by first part of above record, that Col. Johnson served seven years in the French and Indian Wars.



He is also said to have been engaged at Germantown and Monmouth and to have wintered at Valley Forge, 1777-8.

In a monthly journal or "orderly book," Lieut. Col. Gray makes frequent reference to Lieut. Col. Jonathan Johnson and reports them both as being at West Point and Peekskill at the time of the arrest of Major Andre. The journal later reports them at Orangetown, N. J.





GEORGE CLARK AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

The following was compiled from sundry published volumes of family records and from the church records of Milford and the Probate records at New Haven, Conn.

1 GEORGE CLARK, the planter, with his wife Sarah and two children, emigrated from England to America in 1637, in company with Rev. John Davenport and his congregation (from Kent and Surrey, near London), together with several other parties of wealth and respectability—the whole forming a considerable colony of persons who, early in 1637, left England to escape persecution on account of their religious belief and to take up their abode in the New World. They landed at Boston, Mass., where they remained about one year; but for several reasons Mr. Davenport, Rev. Mr. Prudden and their companions decided to leave Boston and make their permanent settlement at New Haven, Conn., then known by the Indian name of Quinnipiack. They sailed from Boston, March 30, 1638, and reached Quinnipiack in about two weeks. Mr. Davenport preached his first sermon there on the 18th of April, 1638.

In the year 1639 a part of Mr. Davenport's congregation, including George Clark (1), Peter Prudden and several others, removed from New Haven and settled at Milford, then known by its Indian name of Wopowage, it being about ten miles west of New Haven. They organized a church at Milford, August 2, 1639, with Rev. Peter Prudden for minister, and on the same day the church at New Haven was organized with Mr. Davenport as minister.

George Clark (1) continued to reside at Milford during the remainder of his life. He was a "free planter" and a man of considerable property and influence, being much respected in the church and in the community. He was many times Deputy or Representative from Milford to the General Court of New Haven and Connecticut—the two colonies being separate and distinct

until their union, May 11, 1665, under the name Connecticut. He died in August, 1690, about 80 years of age, leaving a good estate, as appears by his will, dated April 25, 1689, and recorded in New Haven. His wife Sarah died July 19, 1689.

THE WHITINGS.

The Whiting ancestry goes back to William Whiting, Gent., who came from England to Cambridge Mass., in 1633 and was one of the first settlers of Hartford, Conn.; was treasurer of the colony in 1641, magistrate in 1642 and mayor in 1647. His will may be seen in Trumbull's Colonial Records of Connecticut, Vol. I, p. 493.

His son, Rev. John Whiting, of Hartford, b. 1635, graduated at Harvard in 1653 and settled first at Salem, Mass. He was then pastor of the First Church of Hartford, from 1670 to his death in 1689. He married Sybil Collins, dau. of Deac. Edward Collins, of Cambridge, Mass.

Their son, Rev. Samuel Whiting, b. April 22, 1670, at Hartford, Conn., died Sept. 17, 1725. He had married Elizabeth Adams, dau. of Rev. William Adams, of Dedham, Mass., and his wife Alice, dau. of Deputy Governor William Bradford, the son of Governor Bradford, who came over in the Mayflower.

One son of Rev. Samuel and Eliz. (Adams) Whiting was Col. Samuel Whiting, b. May, 1720, at Windham, Conn.; d. 1802.

His son, John Whiting, had 7 children, of whom John William Whiting, husband of (47051), Bingham Geneal., was one.
