



## PREFACE,

Among those who have taken an active part in collecting the records of the descendants of Capt. Anthony Collamer printed in this book may be mentioned :

Hon. Horace Collamore of North Pembroke, Massachusetts, who settled the estate of his father (Capt. Enoch Collamore of Gilman Plain, Scituate, Mass.) in 1824, and became the custodian of many old papers belonging to his ancestors;

## INTRODUCTION.

Tradition has brought down to us the story that the forbears of the Collamores once lived in the north of France, and crossed over into England from Normandy about the year 1066, with William the Conqueror. About one hundred years later a branch of the family is said to have entered with Strongbow into Ireland. The name is associated with Coulommier, a town in France, and signifies "a brave man" or "the great wood". Kollmeyer is the manner of spelling the name in Germany. Branches of the family were numerous in the counties of Devonshire, Warwickshire, and Kent, until near the close of the 17th century, but there are now few of the name in England. The early New England Colonial Records show that Isaac Cullimore, shipwright, settled in Boston, and was made a freeman in 1643. He owned considerable real estate, and was twice married, but left no posterity; and appears to have been no near relative of the Collamores in Scituate, Mass. James Collamore is mentioned as an early inhabitant of Salem, Mass., but left no descendants in the vicinity. The Collamores of Braunton, Devonshire County, England, were a highly respected family, and Sir Thomas Collamore was Vicar of the Church at that place as early as the year 1494. The Collamores of Luscott, in Braunton, recorded a pedigree of eight generations in the Visitation of 1620. Sir John Collamore of Luscott dying in 1605 without an heir, devised his property to his brothers and sisters and to

their children. In his will he mentioned John, Philip, Thomas and Mary, the children of his deceased brother, Peter, who were then living. One of these sons was probably the ancestor of Peter Collamore and of his nephew, Capt. Anthony Collamore, from whom the Collamores and Collamers and Collemers of Massachusetts, Maine, Rhode Island, Vermont and New York branches of the family have sprung.

The Collamores of Little Rock, Arkansas, are descended from Thomas of Wexford, Ireland, born in 1793, who married his fourth cousin, Catherine Cullimore, in 1816.

### ENGLISH RECORD.

In the Visitation of Devonshire, England, published by Vivian, it is recorded that Sir John Collamore of Luscotte, who died in Braunton in the year 1605, mentioned in his will, John, Thomas, Phillip and Mary, the children of his brother Peter, who had deceased. The family of Peter Collamore resided at Northam, across the bay from Braunton, in the country described by Charles Kingsley in his novel entitled "Westward Ho." The Vital Records in the church at Northam show that Thomas, the eldest son of Peter Collamore, was born Sept. 20, 1570, and married Agnes Adams, Jan. 11, 1608. Their children were: John. born Nov., 1608; Mark, born Feb., 1610; Peter, born Dec., 1613; Jone, born Oct., 1616. Peter, the third son, was without a doubt the Scituate emigrant of 1639, John, the eldest son, being the father of Capt. Anthony Collamore of Scituate. The estate of Peter Collamore of Northam was administered by his wife Edith, and by William Blackmore; and the Probate Records of Exeter show the division of property among the children, John, Thomas, Phillip and Mary.

THE PIONEER OF THE FAMILY IN THE UNITED STATES.

Peter Collamore, the first settler in the Colony of Plymouth of that name, came from Northam, Devonshire County, England. In what year and upon what vessel he came the records fail to state. The earliest mention

of him found, is in the year 1639, when for services rendered (probably military) he was awarded 25 acres of land at Namassacusett. This land, which appears to have been west of Massachusetts Bay Path, near "Luddens Ford " at North River, within the limits of what is now the town of Pembroke, was tranferred by him to Ralph Chapman, as shown by the following extract from Plymouth Colony Deed Records, Vol. XII, Page 47: "The Viiz of Oct. 1639. Memorand that Peter Collymer for & in consideration of the sume of six pounds ster. to be payd him the last day of Aprill next by Ralph Chapman of Duxburrow, hath freely & absolutely bargained & sold unto the said Ralph Chapman all those his xxy acres of land & due unto him the said Peter for his services, and all his Right title & interest of and into the same with all & singular th apprtanc & there unto belonging. To have & to hold the said xxv acres of land & all & singuler The apprtenc & thereunto belonging unto the said Ralph Chapman his heirs & assigns forever." A Court of Assistants held at Plymouth Nov. 2, 1640, before Wm. Bradford, Thomas Prence, Miles Standish and others, granted to Peter Collymer xxv acres of land at Namassacusett, "next after the lands there granted are layed forth, without any vacancy." He first settled on Wills Island in New Harbour Marsh, southeast of Coleman's Hill in Scituate, where he owned a house in common with John Harker, a man that had served in the Pequot war in 1637, as shown by the record. His interest in this house he sold to Wm. Wills, Oct. 25, 1642. In 1643 he was on the list of those liable to bear arms in Scituate. Jan. 15, 1644, he took the "Oath of Fideletie." In 1647 he was chosen constable for the town of Marshfield, presented to the Court and sworn. In 1650 and other years he was surveyor of "Hieways" in Scitu-


ate, and was a constable for the town in 1651. Situated a few rods westerly from his first habitation on Wills Island was Brooke Hall Farm on Belle House Neck, owned by Mr. Samuel Fuller. This farm was purchased in 1650 by Peter Collamore and was known for many years thereafter as "Collamore Place." It was located on the south side of the First Herring Brook, about onehalf mile below the Stockbridge Mill, which was built in the year 1640, and stands as an ancient landmark at the present day. The poet Samuel Woodworth, in his song of the "Old Oaken Bucket", refers to this locality when he speaks of

"The wide-spreading pond and the mill which stood by it, The bridge, and the rock where the cataract fell."

#### DEED OF COLLAMORE PLACE.

To all Christian people to whom this present writing shall come. Samuell ffuller of Scitnate in the government of New Plymouth in New England in America sendeth greeting; Know yea that I the said Samuell fuller for and in consideration of a sufficient sum of money in full satisfaction by mee in hand Receved by Peeter Collymore of Scittuate aforesaid, planter, wherewith I doe acknowledge myselfe fully satisfyed contented and payed; and thereof and every pt and pcell thereof exonerate acquite and discharge the said Peeter Collymore his heires, executors administrators and assignes forever by these presents have freely and absolutely bargained and sold enfeffed and confeirmed and by these psents doe bargain sell, enfeffe and confeirm unto the said Peeter Collymore his heires and assignes forever one dwelling house and a barne and Cowhouse with sixteen acars of upland more or lesse being bounded on the west with the land of Mr. William Varssall, on the south with the land

of Resolved White, on the north with the hieway by the herring brook; and on the east with the mersh; allsoe two peells of mersh land conteining twelve acars more or lesse being bounded (one pcell of it) on the west with the upland aforesaid; on the south with the marsh land of Mr. Willam Varssall from a marked stake; on the upland to a marked tree on the south end of beare Island; east with beare Island and on the North to the herring brooke; a small pcell lyinge betweene the herring brooke and the upland; the other pcell of mersh conteining five acars, being pt of pcell of mersh land conteining ten acars in the use of the aforesaid Samuell ffuller; and Willam Wills of Scittuate aforesaid, being yet undevided; and is bounded on the west with the mersh land of Walter Woodward that was once in the tenure and occupacon of Willam hatch senior; on the North and East with the herring brooke; on the south with a little creek toward beare Iland; with all and severall the appurtenances thereunto belonging or any way apperteining; and all my said title and enterest into the said prmeses and every pt and pcell thereof. To have and to hold the said houses upland and meddow unto the said Peeter Collymore his heires and assignes forever. To bee holden after the mannor of east Greenwidge in the County of Kent in free and common soccage and not in capite or by Knights service by the Rents or services thereof and thereby due or of Right acostomed and with Warrantice against all people whatsoever from by or under mee the said Samuell ffuller or by my Right or title claiming any Right title or enterest into the said pmises or any pt or pcell there of; And I the said Samuell ffuller doe allso covenant and promise and graunt by these psents that it shall and may bee lawful to and for the said Peeter Collymore either by himself or his atorney to Record or enrowl these psnts or

Cause them to bee Recorded and enrowlled in the Court at Plym : aforesaid before the Governor for the time being according to the usuall mannor and order of Recording and enrowling evidences in such cases provided; In Wittness whereof I the said Samuell ffuller have hereunto sett my hand and seale the five and twentieth day of March in the yeare of our Lord one Thousand six hundred and fifty. Memorand the words (hieway by the) between the lynes of twelve and thitteen, in the originall evidence were enterlyned before the sealing and delivering heerof.

The 16th day of May 1650 Jane ffuller the wife of Samuell ffuller did com before mee Timothy hatherley asistant to the Governor of New Plym: in New England and did freely acknowledg her willingnes of the within Mencioned sale and did freely Resigne up her Right to Peeter Collymore.

"Collamore Place" was near the banks of North River, where more than 1000 vessels were launched in early days by the inhabitants of the neighborhood. The Collamores were some of them shipwrights and others were part owners in some of the vessels. Peter Collamore owned the sloop "Mayflower," in which he coasted between Scituate and Boston. The following is from the Suffolk County Records for the year 1650: "cert. that the Swal. of Lond. Wm. Green Mr. hath ad for the acc. of Peter Colema 6 packets cont-664 ells net of linnen. Juxt coc. dat. 26 ffeb. 1649."

Not being blest with children of his own, he addressed the following letter to his brother in England, a copy of which is now preserved with old "Collamore Papers" in the keeping of the Society of Mayflower Descendants in Boston, Mass.

(Copy of letter.)

Scituate 20th September, 1653.

Kind and Loving Brother

My kind love and due respects with my wifes remembered to you with our harty prayers to God for your helth and prosperity and my great love and affections towards you will not suffer me to omite any opportunity of wrighting to you the it be long since I have received any from you. The last was three years since Wherein I heard of the death of my deare sister which loss I sadly lament and desire that we may be the more frequent in our corespondancy of writing one to another by reason that God hath taken so deare a friend from us in whoos good society we might have had much comfort if God had sene us worthy to have enjoyed so great a blessing. I dare not laye you of want of love in that I have had no answer to my two last letters because I know not where the fault may be but I earnistly Intreat you to let me heare from you by all convenient opertunityes and I shall not faile to answer if God give me life, for why shall we be as dead one to another while wee are yet alive. My Earnest request to you is that you would send me one of your sonns for since God hath denied us that blessing of our owne of a posterity to succeed us in our generation I know none that more deserve than some of yours who may most fitly serve to beare up our name in New England where God hath cast my lot and blessed

be his name hath made it good for me and I question not but if you think good to send me one of yours which I may keepe as me owne but hee shall if God give him life Injoy as large a portion both of spirituall and temporall blessings as any of the rest of your children. Brother lett me desire you to send one over to me the next yeare by some trusty messenger and if his passage bee not payd I shall Joyfully att his arrivall discharge it to the full with content to the trusty messenger, thus with my love and my wifes owne more presented to you your good wife and children I commit you to God and Right.

According to a family tradition, his nephew, William Blackmore, came first to Scituate, but Peter Collamore insisted on a relative bearing the name of Collamore being ent to him and Anthony Collamore came later in the year 1665. In the Scituate fight of 1676, William Blackmore was killed by the Indians and his house was burned. His children were mentioned in the will of his uncle Peter in Items preceding the names of the children of Capt. Anthony Collamore, his cousin.

(Abstract from Plymouth Judicial Acts, Oct. 5th, 1663.)

"James Doughtey complained against Peter Collymore, in an action of slander and defamation, to the damage of an hundred pounds, for reporting that Thomas Ingham tould him the wife of the said James Doughtey did advise, or put the said Tho Ingham in a way, hoe hee might steale yearne, and make his cloth hold waight, and that by her owne experience, having wool of other psons to spin, and laying it on a dampe flore, it would hold waight and a pritty matter spare."

The jury find for the plaintiffe five pounds damage and the cost of the suite. Judgment was granted, according to the verdict.

In 1672, Peter Collamore and others acquired land at Gilman Plain in West Scituate by an award of Court at Plymouth, and on May 29, 1675, he came into his share of land at Saconet, R. I., through the division of 50 acre lots. Mary, the wife of Peter Collamore, survived her husband about one year, as shown by an inventory of her belongings dated Aug. 12, 1685, preserved among the family papers.

#### WILL OF PETER COLLAMER.

In ye name of God, Amen, the sixteenth day of January, in ye year of our Lord one thousand six hundred and eighty-three, I Peter Collamer Senr of the town of Scituate, in ye Colonie of New Plymouth in New England, husbandman, being sick and weak in body but in sound mind and memory, praise be God therefor, do make and declare this my will and testament, in manner and form following.

First and principally, I commit and commend my soul to God, and my body to ye earth, to be decently buried, in hopes of a glorious reserrection, and concerning ye disposal of my temporal estate, I give and bequeath ye same as followeth, to wit—I give and bequeath unto my loving wife, that now is Mary Collamer, during ye whole term of her ye said Maries natural life my now dwelling house to live in and eight pounds by the year to be yearly paid to her ye said Mary ye one half of ye aforesaid sum

that is, to pay four pounds in current silver money, ye other half in provisions at price current, and all my household goods. And if ye said Mary shall continue or remain my widow until her death then my will and meaning is that she shall have ye final disposing of all my household goods provided her disposal thereof be to ye kindred of my blood (the best feather bed in my house with the bedding, bedstead, curtains and Valance and all other ye appurtenances, to ye same bed belonging, excepted) but if ye said Mary, my wife, shall after my decease, again enter into marriage estate, then my will and meaning is, that all ye aforesaid provision for her ye said Maries maintenance shall forthwith cease determine and expire, and in room thereof she, ye said Mary shall re ceive and have during ye whole term of her natural life, yearly, one third of ye rents of my lands, and one third part of my household goods or movables, to enjoy ye said third part of ye household goods during ye whole aforesaid term of ye said Mary, my wifes natural life and ye same with ye limitation aforesaid at her decease, finally to dispose. And further my will and meaning that ye above said provision for my loving wife Mary Collamer after my decease is intended and shall be in full satisfaction of whatsoever she, ye said Mary may or might claim or demand out of my estate on one account or another whatsoever.

Item. To Peter Blackmore, I give and bequeath all that my marsh lands lying and being in ye town of Scituate abovesaid, and bounded toward ye East by a certain creek commonly called Dammons Creek, and toward ye West by ye first herring brook. To have and to hold ye said marshland to him ye said Peter Blackmore, immediately from and after ye decease of my loving wife Mary Collamer, and to his heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath unto John Blackmore, and

his heire all that my lands at Sareamack. To have and to hold ye said land immediately from and after ye decease of ye said Mary, my wife, or at ye age of twentyone years, and thenceforth forever.

Item. I give and bequeath unto Phebe Blackmore, one cow and forty shillings in money, to be paid to her at ye age of twenty-one years or at or on her wedding day, upon demand.

Item. I give and bequeath unto William Blackmore, and his heirs that my fifty acre lot of land lying and being at Saconet, to be seized of and in ye said land as soon as ye said William shall attain to or be at ye age of one and twenty years, and thenceforth forever.

Item. I give and bequeath unto Mary Collamer, daughter of Anthony Collamer and to her heirs and assigns forever all that my great lot of land lying and being in ye township of Scituate aforesaid and containing sixtyfive acres of land. I give also to her my said cousin Mary, one cow.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my cousin Sarah Collamer, ye daughter of Anthony Collamer abovesaid, ye sum of ten pounds of silver money to be paid to her ye said Sarah Collamer at ye age of twenty-one years, or at her wedding day on demand.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my cousin Martha Collamer, daughter of Anthony Collamer above named, ye sum of ten pounds of silver money, to be paid to her at the age of twenty-one years, or at her wedding day, on demand.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my cousin Elizabeth Collamer, daughter of Anthony Collamer above named, ye sum of ten pounds of current silver money, to be paid to her ye said Elizabeth at ye age of twenty-one years, or at or on her wedding day, on demand. And my will is that any one of ye these last mentioned children shall decease or depart this life before ye age of one and twenty years, that then except in case of marriage before decease, ye ten pounds in money of ye deceased shall be divided between ye two survivors of ye said three children.

Item. I do give and bequeath unto my man William Clift, and his heirs and assigns forever all that my ten acres lot of land lying or being at Saconet, provided one that condition that he ye said Clift, shall prove faithful, trusty and obedient unto my cousin, ye said Anthony Collamer, during ye remaining part of his said Clifts service, which I do by these presents will and appoint him to serve with my said cousin Anthony Collamer.

Item. I do by these my last will and testament declare, constitute and appoint my said cousin Anthony Collamer my rightful and sole heir, and do hereby give and bequeath unto him all my real estate whatsoever and wheresoever it be, Excepting only ye particular parcels thereof otherwise above disposed.

To have and to hold all my upland and marsh land lying and being in ye township of Scituate above mentioned, except as before excepted, with all ye housing, outhousing, orchard and fences, standing or being upon or about ye said land or any part of it, together with my common privilege in ye undivided lands of ye above said town of Scituate, to him ye said Anthony Collamer and ye heirs of his body lawfully begotten or to be begotten, forever, and all ye remainder of my land at Saconet (not above disposed) to have and to hold ye said land to him ye said Anthony and to his heirs and assigns forever.

Furthermore, I do by these presents constitute and appoint my loving cousin. Anthony Collamer, abovesaid sole Executor of this my last will and testament, and do hereby give and bequeath unto him, ye said Anthony, all my personal estate whatsoever it be or wheresoever it be found, excepting only that and so much thereof as is above otherwise expressly disposed.

I give to him ye said Anthony my whole part right and interest in ye sloop called ye Mayflower, and all my silver money, all bills, bonds, mortgages, and all other assurances of debts owing to me, and all debts to me from one person or other, by virtue of any contract or promise, bill bond mortgage, or by any other way or means whatsoever.

And my will is that all ye just debts that I do owe to any person or persons shall be well and truly paid.

And I give and bequeath to my said cousin Anthony all my stock of cattle, husbandry implements, all my arms and amunition and all other my estate, not mentioned, both real and personal, whether in or out of this Colony, and in special ye bed above excepted, there excepted.

And I do hereby revoke and disannul all other former wills and testaments by me heretofore made.

In witness whereof I ye said Peter Collamer, have hereunto set my hand and seal ye first day above written.

## BIOGRAPHY.

Anthony Collamore came from England to Scituate, Mass., in the year 1665, to make his home with his uncle Peter Collamore, whose property was to be his by inheritance. The next year he married Sarah, daughter of Isaac and Martha (Vinall) Chittenden, Jr., of Kent street, Scituate.

He was made a freeman in the Jurisdiction of New Plymouth, May 29, 1670. He was a constable in Scituate in 1671. In 1686 he was made a Lieutenant by Gov. Andros. In 1692 he was commissioned as Captain of a Foot Company by William Phips.

It was customary for the militia to meet at the Collamore homestead in readiness for expeditions against the Indians when occasions demanded. Sometimes a bell was rung to warn the inhabitants in the town of the approach of savages; and the locality became known as Belle House Neck.


# LETTER TO COURT AT PLYMOUTH, NOW PRESERVED IN REGISTRY OF DEEDS.

Anthony Collimore of Scitute; his Suplmt to his Defence touching a paper or—summons—

Jury If I Entred into a Recognizance I Humbly Conwine that it was (as it ought to be) In his late Majties name and therefore that it Cannot be proscuted in any other name.

2. The Condition of the Recognizance was to bring a writt of habeas Corpus—which I did and itt was allowed : and I appeared to prosecute accordingly.

3. The Condition &c. as to the time how many days I must bring my writt &c. before the Courts Is altogether needless and Impertinent: Because the number of days before the Court is not of the Essence of ye obligation.

For where I am obliged to bring such a writt to such a Court I must be sure to bring the sd writt in due forme and time (according to Law) to that Court: so If I be bound in: Es: on Condition to bring a writt of habeus Corpus:: 15: days before such a Court: & the Law did Injoine me to bring my sd writt: 20: days: though my bringing my writt: 15: dayes will Discharge me of my obligation: for what soever is dissmist or Removed from one Court to another (by bond or without bond), due Respect must be had to the Law & Custome more than to the particular time Exprest in the obligation.

besides---

It is not Consistant but rather Repugnant & Contrary to Law: for Whatsoever & Whensoever the Law saith such an act or thinge must be soe : & then done it must be after that manner at that time done : soe where the Law saith such a writt must be delivered before the Jury that is to try the Case.—& one of them be sworne,

It is Enough to bring it in any time that morning before the Jury appear &c.: & too much to bring it In 15 days before.

Therefore it is provided in the Statute 43: Eliz: 5: that no writt of habeas Corpus &c. shall be allowed unless it be before the Jury apear & one of them be sworn any time before & If sufficient & Soe is our Custome in our Courts in England which I hope is a good Example: with the afforesaid Law for ye Imetation.

Plmouth : 9 March 16 168– 10 DEATH OF CAPT. ANTHONY COLLAMORE.

On the rocks near the Scituate shore, since known as Collamore's Ledge, the Captain lost his life by shipwreck in a snow storm in 1693. His body was recovered several days afterwards, and he was buried under arms in the First Parish Cemetery at Scituate Harbor.

The stone marking his grave is located about two rods northeasterly from the Monument to the Men of Kent, on the south side of Meeting-House Lane. The estate of Capt. Anthony Collamore (he left no will) was administered by Sarah, his widow, and Peter, his only surviving son. The children mentioned in the division of the estate were Mary, the wife of Robert Stetson, and her sisters, Sarah, Martha, and Elizabeth. Benjamin H. Harrison, President of the United States, was a descendant of Elizabeth Collamore and her second husband, Timothy Symmes.

The Rev. Deodat Lawson, minister of the Second Parish, dedicated the following poem to the memory of Capt. Anthony Collamore.

#### THRENODIA.

The Great Jehovah is the Lord and King,

Both in the Heavens and on the Earth and Sea; What things Pleas Him in each to pass doth bring,

Nor can He in His Will resisted be. He in his fist retains the Boistrous Winds; And Raging Waters in a Garment binds.

Tis but to Loose His Little Finger then, And the most Furious blasts do Issue thence;

Enough to terrify the stoutest Men,

Nor can they find against it a Defence. Tis but to Slack the binding of the Seas, And they will soon accomplish what He pleas.

December last upon the Sixteenth day, Within the Harbour lay at Scituate; Some Loaden Boats to Boston bound away,

Which for Fair Wind and Weather there did wait, Among the rest was Captain Collamore, Whose sad disaster, we must now deplore.

Some boats with Sailes Expanded led the way,

Out of the Harbour; and did fairly glide; Thus one by one stood out into the Bay,

With Wind at East North East and Flowing Tide, The Captain in the Race did Hoist up Saile, And hasted after with a steady Gale.

He did his best with speed to quit the Shore,

And seemed in his way to Prosper well; He luffs up to the Wind and Northward bore,

For near an Hour as Spectators tell; That so he might be gaining of the Wind, And to his Port the fairer Passage find.

But Dangers great did quickly him Surprize,

The Clouds did gather and obscure the Sun; Winds Whistled, Snow came thick and sea did rise;

And he was at a loss which way to run; As did appear to some that were before, Who quickly after, saw the Boat no more. With him Five Persons more Embarqued were, Two Men, one Woman, and two Ladds beside :

Nor did since that alive on Shore appear;

But were all Drowned in the Ocean wide. No more but two are yet to this day found, Which doth the hearts of their Relations wound.

Whether some hidden Rock with fatal stroke, At once gave Final stop unto their Course :

By which their Stem was Jammd and Boughs were broke, Not able to withstand so great a force,

Thus some conceive who saw and viewed the Rack, Which quickly to the Shore was hurled back.

Or Whether Loaden over deep with Wood, The Swelling Waves did fill her by degrees; If then Frozen Pump would do no good, They soon became a Prey unto the Seas;

Which Violently over them did go,

And bore them down into the deeps below.

What happened to them we can only guess, Because none of them did Survive to tell;

Nor can we think what Anguish did Possess Their Souls, when this Disaster them befell.

We humbly must Adore God's Providence, Who in the Deeps His Judgements doth dispense.

One Ephraim Turner near the fatal place,


Was cast upon the Shore and next day found ; Most sorely batterd on his head and Face,

Who decently was laid into the ground. Relatives of the Rest did search the Shore For thirteen days, but they could find no more.

But on the Fourteenth day one did espie

A Corps he judgd was Captain Collamore; Yet could not know him to a Certainty,

By anything, but by the Cloaths he wore. His Form and Visage utterly was lost, Having by Waves and Rocks been so long tossd.



His Friends, His Neighbors, and Relations all, Prepare his Funeral to Solemnize;

His Souldiers also at the mournful call,

Appear with Drooping hearts and Dripping eyes, With many Tears they laid him in the dust, To wait the Resurccion of the Just.

And now although Relations of the Rest,

Know their own Sorrows and Distress of mind; While for the quieting their troubled Brest,

They in the Creature no relief can find, Our Duty binds us all to Sympathize With such as Mourn in their Adversities.

But Publick Persons are a Public loss,

Because more useful, and more Eminent; They in their places were the greater cross,

And the more sad Occasion to Lament. The Death of Collamore we must bewaile, Our Glorys going when the Faithfull faile.

What Offices he bore of any kind,

He did adorn with Carriage full of Grace; His Modest, Humble, Condescending mind,

Could freely yield to any in their Place. To all Degrees above him and below, His rightly Ordered Courtesy did flow.

Unto this Province and the Government,

He was a Faithful and a Constant Friend; In all the troubles which they underwent,

And what he had, was willing to Expend; For the Promotion of the Publick good, At any time in what he understood.

In Scituate let each Inhabitants

Greatly lament this worthy Persons fall; Both Rich and Poor his Courtesy want,

Who still was ready to oblige them all. It was to many, by Experience known, He valud others good before his own.

- He was the Captain of the War like train, Love was his Banner, Love was his defence :
- Their Chearful Service was returnd again,

His Acceptation was their Recompence. In that Great Company Command he bore, Where Mustered two hundred men and more.

- In Judgment found, in Life Upright with all, A Zealous Member of the Church was he;
- His Studies and Endeavours waer not small,

That to Christs Kingdom might Enlarged be. A Deacon also Faithful to his trust, To do that onely which was right and Just.

The North Society in Scituate,

Hath lost a Leading Man, and Loving Friend; Who ready was with Person and Estate,

On evry good Occasion help to lend. His Care and Conscience plainly did appear, To settle and maintain Gods Worship there.

A Faithful constant Husband to his Wife, He also Tender was and Provident;

True Peace they cherished, and banished Strife, Enjoying what they had with good Content.

Gods Blessing on their care and Industry, Did yield them Comfort and Prosperity.

A Father carefull of his Children too, Whose Love to Souls and Bodies did Extend; He spared not the best that he could do,

In Warning them to mind their latter end. He did his just Commands meekly Dispense, And they did humbly yield Obedience.

He was a Master full of Gentleness,

Whose care it was things honest to Provide ; Obliging thus his Servants Faithfullness,

And he did in their diligence Confide. So that to Serve him we may well Conclude, Was rather Freedom than a Servitude. But God hath by his Sovraign Providence, Of such an Usefull Man this place bereft; A deep Affecting and Afflicting sense,

Is well becoming each one that is left. We all in his remove a loss sustain, Which sure God onely can make up again.

Since therefore All things come alike to All,

### BIOGRAPHY.

PETER, the only surviving son of Capt. Anthony Collamor, was a yeoman and cordwainer. He was an active man in the South Parish and in Scituate town affairs, where his name was one of ten recorded in the Record.

He pastured his horses and cattle with those of his neighbors on the "Common Lands" of the town. The Town Clerk's books describe the brands and earmarks of each man's property.

He also owned land at Little Compton, Rhode Island,

but none of the Collamor family ever settled in that locality; and he disposed of his interests there by several deeds recorded soon after the year 1700. The homestead of 53 acres at Belle House Neck, which had come to him through his father and great-uncle Peter Collamor, "by way of Intailment", he deeded to his eldest son, Anthony, reserving to himself "the Easterly end of the Dwelling House where I now live".

His son Anthony dying in 1746, the second son (John) became the responsible head of the family. To this son he sold the land on Wilson's Hill adjoining the former site of the Second Parish Meeting-House, which had previous to that time been used by some families in the neighborhood as a burial pasture.

To all Christian People to whom these Presents shall come, Peter Collamor of Scituate in ye County of Plymth in New England, Yeoman, Sendeth Greeting—Know ye that I the said Peter, In consideration of forty Pounds, old Tenor Bills, to me in hand paid by John Collamor of Scituate aforesaid, Yeoman, Do hereby Give, Grant, Bargain, Sell, Convey and Confirm unto him said John Collamor, his Heirs and Assigns Forever Two Acres of Land lying in said Scituate, called the Burying Place Pasture, Bounded North Westerly on ye Town Road, South Westerly on Doct Otis Land and North Easterly or Easterly on the Land which did belong to Joseph Neal. It being a triangular Piece of Land.

To have and to Hold to him said John Collamor, his Heirs forever.

Peter Collamore's wife (Abigail) inherited property from her father (Tobias Davis of New Roxbury), which she bequeathed by will to her descendants. The names Abigail and Davis have been perpetuated in the Collamore families from her day to the present generation.

The 21st day of April anno domini 1750—I, Abigail Collamer of Scituate in the county of Plymouth in New England Widow & Relect of Mr. Peter Collamer Late of Scituate Dec. being aged & Infirm of Body but of sound mind and memory—Do make this my last Will & Testament. First—I recommed my Soul to God that gave it and my Body to the Earth to Desent Burial at the Discretion of my Executors hereafter named & Touching my worldly Goods I devise of the same in manner Following that is to say—

Item—I give & bequeath unto my sons John Isaac & Thomas Collamer & my Daughters Mary C., their heirs and assigns forever all my Land or rights of L and Lying and being at a place called New Roxbury to be Equally Divided among them they paying to my two Daughters Abigail Bourne and Sarah Curtis to each of them the sum of two pound and 10 shillings in Silver money at 6 shillings and Eight pence to pay One year after my Decease.

Item—I give to my daughter Mary Collamer my Gold Necklace & my silver Thimble and all my wearing Clothes and suits of Curtains.

Item—I give to my daughter Abigail Bourne 2 Pounds & ten shillings in silver money at 6 shillings & 8 pence to Ounce in one year after my decease to be by John Isaac Thomas & Mary Collamer.

Item—I give to my daughter Sarah Curtis the above mentioned sum of 2 pounds 10 shillings in silver money at 6 shillings & 8 pence to be paid in one year after my decease by John Isaax Thomas & Mary Collm.

Item—I give to my grandchildren the children of my son Anthony Decd each of them a Gold ring & each of them the ring with the posey, Abigail Collamer upon it, to be given to them as they shall come of age by my Exec.

Item—I give to my Grandson Davis Collamer my Gold Buttons.

Item—I give to my Exec all the Rest of my Estate which is not before given away in my Will.

And Lastly, I do hereby appoint my said son John Sole Executor of this, my Last Will in Witness Whereof I have hereunto sett my hand & Seal the day and Year.



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### BIOGRAPHY.

Anthony Collamore, Jr., married Marcy, daughter of Barnabas and Hannah (Turner) Barker of Scituate. They resided at Collamore Place, Scituate, until the year 1779, when it was sold to Nathaniel Waterman, Jr., and they then removed to Malta, Saratoga County, N. Y., and engaged in farming. Before the Revolution, Anthony Collamore, Jr., was an active ship-builder on the banks of the North River in Scituate. #### BIOGRAPHY.

Anthony Collamer, Esq., enlisted from Scituate, Mass., at the age of 21, for three years' service in the Continental Army. He was described as being of light complexion and had dark hair. Stature, 5 feet 9 inches. He joined Capt. Nathaniel Winslow's company, Col. Thomas Marshall's regiment, as a private, Feb. 12, 1777. He was promoted to corporal Nov. 1, 1777. He marched from Boston to Bennington, Vt. He was also corporal in Capt. Jacob Wales' company, Col. Thomas Marshal's regiment, mustered at West Point. He was in command at Tarrytown in January, 1779. He was Sergeant in Capt. Turner's (6th) company, Col. Benjamin Tupper's (10th Mass.) regiment, engaged Dec. 18, 1779, for the entire war. For more than 40 years he carried a British bullet in his leg; and he finally died from blood poisoning during the amputation of that member. His name was on the pension list for Addison County, Vt. At the end of his military service he settled in Monkton, Vt., and was a gentleman highly respected in that community. In the Methodist Episcopal Church he was class leader for many years, and when he died he declared his room was full of angels:

### BIOGRAPHY.

Hon, Jacob Collamer, otherwise known as Judge Collamer, was a man of great intellectual endowment. He ably filled many positions of honor and trust during the more than forty years of his active career. Graduating from the University of Vermont in 1810, he studied law in St. Albans, and was admitted to the Bar in 1813. As a Lieutenant of Artillery he took part in the frontier campaign in 1812. Residing in Royalton, he was selectman of the town in 1821-1822. He was Attorney for Windsor County between 1822-1824. He delivered the address of welcome to Gen. Lafavette on behalf of the citizens of Royalton on the occasion of that distinguished man's visit in June, 1825. He united with the First Congregational Church of Royalton in 1826; removed from Royalton to Woodstock in April, 1836; was made an honorary member of Woodstock Lodge, No. 31, F. and R. M. He served in the State Legislature four successive years; was Assistant Judge of the Supreme Court from 1833 to 1842; represented the 2nd Vermont District in Congress from 1843 to 1849. He was also Professor and Lecturer at Woodstock Medical College during these years. The degree of L.L. D. was conferred upon him by the University of Vermont in 1850, and by Dartmouth College in 1855. He was Postmaster General under President Zachary Taylor in 1850, resigning with other members of the Cabinet on the President's death.

He was made Circuit Judge in the fall of 1850, which position he resigned in 1854 to take his seat in the United States Senate as an anti-slave Whig, which office he held until the time of his death. He served as Chairman of Committees on Post Offices and Post Roads, and was also Chairman of the Library Committee. He was the first choice of Vermont as a presidential candidate in the Republican National Convention of 1860.

Judge Collamer, one writer says, carried the Ten Commandments written in his face. He did not always ally himself with the winning side. He was the Chairman of the Committee on Public Domains and submitted a minority report on the situation in Kansas in 1855. Senator Sherman said of it, "In the majority report the true issue is smothered; in the minority report it stands forth as a pillar of fire to guide the country."

Senator Douglas said, of all men in debate he dreaded to meet Senator Collamer. Senator Blaine called him the wisest man he ever knew, and Sumner named him the Green Mountain Socrates. The greatest effort of his life was his speech denying the power of the President to declare peace by proclamation to the seceeded States. Of this speech Sumner declared that it was the brightest and most glorious moment of his long life.

Judge Collamore drew up the great Act of July 13, 1861, giving extraordinary powers to the President and the first congressional sanction to the war. He was a trusted friend and counsellor of President Lincoln.

In 1864 he introduced a bill placing enlisted negroes on the same footing as white troops. The State of Vermont honored itself by having his statue placed in the old Hall of Representatives in Washington, D. C.

Sarah, the wife of Samuel, was appointed as guardian of the minor daughters by the Probate Court, May 13, 1766. The Deed Records show that James Thompson sold 100 acres of land in Topsham to William Collamer, Jan. 14, 1804.

## BIOGRAPHY.

John Collamore, yeoman, when he became of age, left the ancestral farm on Belle House Neck and established for himself a home on Gilman Plain, in West Scituate. He married Margaret, daughter of Enoch Whiton. Their dwelling on the northeast side of the Boston-Plymouth Stage Road, was also favorably known as a tavern for many years, and the house is at the present day (1915), in a good state of preservation. He inherited property from both his father and his mother. In 1747 he was appointed to administer the estate of his father (Peter Collamer), his brother (Anthony) having died in 1746. He was a member of the Second Parish Church in Scituate. In the year 1750 he was summoned to sit on the Grand Jury at Plymouth. In his will, dated April 15, 1755, he appointed Margaret (his wife) executrix of his estate. He gave to son Enoch "The farm where I now

dwell, on the northerly side of road, being 30 acres, and part of farm on southerly side of road where barn stands, being 35 acres." He also gave son Enoch and daughters Sarah, Mary and Betty, in equal shares, "all my land at Spring Brook and Black Pond Hill, in Scituate, being 26 acres. Also all my Land in the Easterly parts of this Province at a place called Muscongus and all the real estate which my Mother Abigail Collamer gave me in her Will."

### BIOGRAPHY.

Benjamin Collamer enlisted for the French and Indian War in 1757, giving his occupation as innholder; and went on the expedition to Canada. John Collamore having died in 1755, his widow no doubt employed Benjamin to assist about the inn and farm in general. Who he was and where he came from is not found on the records. The Plymouth Probate Office shows an administration by Thomas Cushing, trader, of Scituate, in 1803, on the estate of Benjamin Killamore (alias Collamore), Shipwright. His daughters, Mary, Sarah and Betty, were named after the sisters of Capt. Enoch Collamore. On the Lexington Alarm, April 19, 1775, Benjamin Collamore was a Private in Capt. John Clapp's company, Col. John Bailey's regiment of Minute men. From May 3, 1775, to Aug. 1, 1775, he served as a Private in Capt. Elijah Crocker's company, Brig. Gen. Thomas' regiment. He joined the Continental army Nov. 7, 1777, for three years, as a Private in Capt. Winslow's company, Col. Marshall's (2nd Plymouth County) regiment. He enlisted Apr. 13, 1780, as a Private in Capt. Phineas Parker's company, Col. Jed. Baldwin's regiment of Artificers. Age, 55 years. Stature, 5 ft. 9 in.; complexion, light; occupation, carpenter. He is also reported to have been in Col. Moses McFarland's (Invalid) corps, stationed at Boston; transferred from Capt. Noah Nichols' company of Artillery Artificers, Gen. Knox's Brigade of Artillery. On list of U.S. pensioners, Dec. 31, 1787, was the name of Benjamin Killmore, returned by John Lucas, Commissary of Pensions, Capt. McFarland's company, reported disabled by a rupture and the loss of his right eye. He was pensioned Sept. 1, 1782. His residence adjoined the Second Parsonage lot, in Scituate. Before his death in 1803, he deeded one-half his farm to Bill Corlew, one-quarter to his daughter, spinster Rhoda Orcutt; one-quarter to his daughter, widow Betty Stetson. The inventory of the estate of George Stetson, mariner, of Scituate, made in 1800, states that his house was built on land of Benjamin Collamore.

Benjamin Collamore, Jr., at the age of 23, enlisted from Pembroke in March, 1777, in Capt. Winslow's company, Col. Bailey's regiment, for three years. (Copy of a Writ among papers.)

Then and there in our said Court to Answer unto Enoch Collamore of said Scituate, Gentleman, Administrator of all and singular the goods and chattle rights and credits of Margaret Collamore late of Scituate in the County of Plymouth widow, Deceased, in a plea of the case, for that Whereas the said Benjamin of said Scituate on the first day of December in the year of our Lord Seventeen Hundred and Seventy-two by his note of Hand of that Date by him subscribed for the value:

Received promise of the said Margaret, the intestate who was then and there in full life to pay her, two pounds sixteen shillings on demand with Interest, which the said two pounds and sixteen shillings and Interest on the same, The said Enoch avers to be more than the sum of four pounds, yet the said Benjamin tho' often requested hath never yet paid the same to the said Margaret in her life time nor to the said Enoch since the decease of the said Margaret although he was often requested. But still neglected it to the said Execution and the trust of the said Enoch as Administrator of her estate. To the damage of the said Enoch in his capacity (as he saith) the sum of twenty pounds, which shall then and there be made to appear, with other due Damages. And have you there this Writ, with your Doings therein.

#### BIOGRAPHY.

Capt. Enoch Collamore married Hannah, daughter of Pyam Cushing of Hingham, and resided in the house where he was born, it having been willed to him by his father, who died when he was but ten years of age. He was a prominent, active and useful citizen in the town of Scituate. On the Lexington Alarm, April 19, 1775, he was a Sergeant, and marched as a Minute-man in Capt. John Clapp's company, in Col. John Bailey's regiment. From 1777 to the end of the war he was one of the Committee of Correspondence, Inspection and Safety. In 1787 he was on a committee to consult for the general good of the town and prepare instructions for their representatives. He served the town in the State Legislature for a number of years. He was captain of the Scituate militia.

Capt. Collamore's name is among those that organized the Universalist Church Society in West Scituate. In early life he signed his name as Collamer; but after the Revolution he signed it as Collamore, conforming to the spelling in the county of Devonshire in England, from which his ancestors had come.

## BIOGRAPHY.

Colonel John Collamore, eldest child of Enoch and Hannah (Cushing) Collamore, was born in Scituate, Mass. He was a farmer—an enterprising and progressive man, who cultivated the acres of his ancestors with success. Like others of his race, he was prominent in the affairs of his native town. He always took great interest in military affairs. In the thirty years from the time he received his first commission as ensign from the Hon. Samuel Adams, Nov. 23d, 1795, until the expiration of that of Colonel, given him by Gov. John<sup>\*</sup>Brooks, May 3d, 1820 (which he resigned in 1825), he was a commissioned officer in the militia of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. It is recorded that he was never superceded, and never but once absent from any regularly appointed training or review. In civil life he served as Selectman, Assessor, Justice of the Peace, and was a member of the School Committee. For several years he was on the Board of County Commissioners. Colonel John Collamore was a member of the convention held in 1820 to revise the State Constitution. He was a deacon in the Baptist Church of Hanover, of which he was long an honored member, and was widely esteemed as a man of sterling integrity and fervent piety. He was twice married, first to Michal Curtis, daughter of Ebenezer Curtis of Hanover. Her grandfather, Bazaleal Curtis, was made one of the Committee of Correspond, Inspection and Safety for Hanover in 1775. Colonel John Collamore married second, Polly Little of Marshfield, Mass.

## PERSONAL

Miss Helen Collamore well represented the finer side of Boston life. She disbursed charity and helpfulness in a quiet, personal way, and in large measure; and gave her fortune to a wide range of good causes and charities at her death.

## BIOGRAPHY.

John Collamore, Jr. married Catherine, daughter of Jabez and Christiana (Spear) Hatch. She was born in Boston, Sept. 2, 1801. Her mother was daughter of Poole Spear (Deputy Sheriff) by his first wife, who was Christiana Turner of Pembroke, Mass. John Collamore, Jr. removed from Scituate at the age of 21, and began his mercantile career in Boston in 1823, being admitted to the firm of Collamore, Churchill & Co., importers of china and glass ware, his uncle, Horace Collamore, retiring from the firm at this time on account of poor health. The business was later carried on under the firm name of John Collamore & Co. Mr. Collamore retired from the firm in 1861, and with their wives he and his brother made a tour of Europe. The wives both died before the journey was completed. Mr. Collamore was a director in the New England Glass Co., the Fireman's Ins. Co., and many other corporations. He was a man universally esteemed. For a long period of years he was senior deacon of the First Church of Boston. His last residence was at No. 115 Beacon St.

Andrew Fuller Collamore, brother of John Collamore, Jr., was a member of the firm of John Collamore & Co. He was engaged to be married to Miss Ellen Manning of New York City, and while on the journey for that purpose on the steamer Atlantic, he lost his life when the vessel was wrecked near Fisher's Island in Long Island Sound, Nov. 27, 1846. The bell of the steamer for many days tolled from its position on the rocks, and the incident is referred to in a poem written by Mrs. Sigourney, entitled, "The Bell of the Atlantic."

> "Toll for the lover lost, To the summoned bridal train; Bright glows a picture on his breast, Beneath the unfathomed main. One from her casement gazeth Long o'er the misty sea; He cometh not, pale maiden, His heart is cold to thee."

Ebenezer Collamore removed from Scituate, Mass., to New York City, and established himself in the china and glass ware business at No. 31 Maiden Lane in 1832, removing to No. 151 Broadway in 1835, and to No. 293 Broadway in 1849. He resided near St. John's Park. On retiring from business in 1861 he made a two years' tour of Europe with his brother John and their wives, the wives both dying before the return to America.

# BIOGRAPHY.

Davis Collamore, twelfth child of Colonel John and Michal Curtis Collamore, seventh generation of the name in America, was born at Scituate, Plymouth Co., Mass. Having received a good academic education, he left home at the age of sixteen, went to New York to live with an elder brother, Ebenezer, and to commence his business life. Ebenezer was an importer of fine china and glassware at 151 Broadway. His home was in the neighborhood of St. John's Park.

After six years with his brother, during which Davis learned the business and also made a thorough study of ceramics, he founded the house of Davis Collamore at 595 Broadway, which continued practically unchanged till 1886, when it was made a stock company, with Mr. Collamore as president. Davis Collamore died on August 13, 1887.

Highly endowed with what has been so aptly called "the gentle genius of taste," Mr. Collamore devoted himself to developing the artistic branch of his business. He soon became a connoisseur whose opinion was sought on these subjects. He did much to cultivate the public taste and to increase the love and understanding of ceramic art. He was the soul of honor and a man of spotless integrity. As a young man he was a member of the Seventh Regiment, and was on duty the night of the famous Astor Place riots. Always a loyal Republican, a staunch supporter of the national government during the Civil War, his commercial probity enabled his firm to meet every obligation through all commercial crises.

Although always a resident of New York City, Mr. Collamore had a summer home in West Orange, New Jersey, where he had an estate of seventy acres on the eastern slope of the Orange Mountain, commanding a fine view of New York, fourteen miles distant.

During the early agitation of the subject of good roads in the Oranges, Davis Collamore, as a public-spirited citizen, served on the Township Committee, and as chairman of the Road Board was largely instrumental in securing the adoption of the Telford system at that time conceded to be the best form of road building. He was one of the original twelve members of the New England Society of Orange.

From his Pilgrim ancestors he inherited all the characteristics of resolute courage and devotion to duty which marked "the sturdy settlers of the Plymouth Colony." It is interesting to note that both paternal and maternal grandfathers were members of the committee of Correspondence, Inspection and Safety, 1775.

Though reserved in manner and of a dignified bearing, he was very hospitable and a charming social campanion. All those who knew him bear testimony to the uprightness and purity of his life and to the many attributes which marked him pre-eminently the Christian gentleman.

Davis Collamore married Hannah Augusta Fisk, a Bostonian by birth, daughter of Sewall Fisk, and a direct descendant of David Fisk, who came from England to Watertown, Mass., in 1642, and whose English record traces back in the direct line to Symon Fisk, Lord of the manor of Studaugh, Parish of Laxfield, County of Suffolk, England, in the reign of Henry VI, 1309-1422.

George Enoch Collamore was one of the six sons of Col. John Collamore that engaged in the china and glass ware business. Gilman Collamore conducted a china and glass ware business at No. 731 Broadway, New York City, for several years, and then removed it to No. 19 Union Square. He made many visits to foreign countries in the development of his business; and was one of the first to go to Japan in the interest of that business after the ports were opened to our trade. He resided in New York City during his business career. He was a man of stainless integrity, of the highest sense of honor, and of many amiable qualities, and had the respect of all who came in contact with him.

Fourteen years after Mr. Collamore's death, his widow married (in 1902) Justice Henry Bischoff, Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, one of the ablest and most distinguished jurists of his time. # BIOGRAPHY.

Dr. Anthony Collamore graduated from Harvard College in 1806. He settled in Pembroke, Mass., as a practicing physician, where he lived and labored most acceptably in his profession for thirty-nine years, leaving at his decease, which occurred in the sixty-first year of his age, the enviable record of "a well spent life".

His most intimate friend, the Rev. Morrill Allen, said of him, "His labors and usefulness were not confined to the duties of his calling alone. He was a valuable counsellor in business concerns. So great was the confidence in his integrity and fidelity that trust concerns multiplied on his hands; but he carefully guarded against the interference of other affairs with professional duties."

For one term Dr. Collamore represented the town of Pembroke in the State Legislature, but declined to serve a second term. He was a member of the Massachusetts Medical Society. He was a devout Christian and a member of the Unitarian Church of his town, and for the last twelve years of his attendance of twenty years he officiated as one of its deacons.

Henry Harrison Collamore followed the sea as mariner and master, and in the United States Navy in early life. Jan. 7, 1863, he was appointed Acting Master's Mate, and served on the ships Macedonia, North Carolina, and iron frigate Roanoke of the North Atlantic Squadron. In the spring of 1864 he was commissioned Acting Ensign, and served on the United States ship Maratanza, off Wilmington, N. C., until May, 1865. 

### BIOGRAPHY.

Gilman Collamore was one of Boston's true-born noblemen. He first saw the light of day at No. 73 Salem St., Boston. He attended the Boston Latin School and the Chauncy Hall School, and took many prizes in his classes. His kindly disposition made him a great favorite among his teachers. His society was much valued by those who knew him, both in youth and mature manhood. For

thirty years he was financial manager for the importing house of Robert G. Shaw and Co. He held many positions of trust. Among others, he was a director of the Maverick National Bank in East Boston and of the Old Colony Railroad Company. He was treasurer of the Boston Screw Company; also of the Huron Mining Company; also trustee of the Boston Water Power Company. In early married life he resided on Bow St., in Charlestown, Mass. His death occurred at his residence at No. 666 Tremont St., Boston.

## BIOGRAPHY.

John Hoffman Collamore was educated in Boston, at the old Salem Street School and at the Chauncy-Hall School. Afterwards he entered mercantile business, as appears from the city directory for the years between 1840 and 1845. He was among the first to volunteer to go in the sloop-of-war 'Jamestown' to the aid of the starving Irish. For nearly twenty years he travelled in foreign lands, canoeing on many of the larger rivers of Germany and France. He was allowed to follow the French army during the war with Austria and Italy. He also visited Mexico, South America, and the Hawaiian Islands. He was possessed of much property on Salem street and the Hoffman House on Columbus avenue was the largest building of its kind in the city at that time; it was erected by him. He was much interested in Masonry

and was given the 33rd degree. The Order was favored with many costly gifts from him, and he provided in his will that the most of his estate should ultimately be given to them. The name of John Hoffman Collamore was added to the roll of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts, May 16, 1892, and he was elected a member of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, Feb. 7, 1894.

### BIOGRAPHY.

Gen. George W. Collamore studied law and was admitted to the Suffolk County Bar Nov. 27, 1852. A partnership was formed with Mr. John A. Andrew, who was afterwards Governor of Massachusetts. The office of Collamore and Andrew was on Court St., Boston, until 1856. Mr. Collamore was a Democrat and Mr. Andrew a Republican. In an attempt to visit Kansas in 1855, Mr. Collamore, we are told, was met on a steamboat by some men from Missouri, who made a Republican of him in five minutes, and he returned East. But the next year he took his family, settled in Lawrence, Kansas, and was afterwards an active anti-slavery man.

He was on the Board of Regents of the State Agricultural College in 1863. Serving as Quartermaster-General in 1861, he was very active in securing military protection for the State. The U. S. Government had withdrawn the protection of its troops from the vicinity of the city of Lawrence, thinking their presence not necessary. It was surprised by Quantrell's band of raiders at daybreak, Aug. 21, 1863. They killed 183 persons and burned many buildings. Mr. Collamore, as mayor of the city, had worked many hours without rest, and came home early in the morning, leaving firearms at his office, and went immediately to bed, and was asleep when his house was surrounded. His dwelling was in the western part of the city, but was almost the first to be visited, as the band wished to make him a prisoner. The raiders met Mrs. Collamore at the door, and not liking her answers to their questions, they slapped her in the face. They then entered the house. Finding the son Peter in bed, they threw him out of the window, then set fire to the house. Peter, who was sick with fever, and supposed to be near death, ran away and hid himself in a cornfield.

He was none the worse for his experience, eventually recovering his health. Mr. Collamore, with a neighbor, entered a well under the ell of his house, hoping to find security from the band. After their departure, the cover of the well was removed, but no answer being made to calls to them, another neighbor descended the well, and was killed by the gases, as Gen. Collamore and his companion had been.

Lieut. John Hoffman Collamore, eldest son of Gen. George Washington Collamore, was wounded by a shot from Quantrell's band of raiders when his father's house was surrounded. He was the target for many bullets as the raiders passed his body lying by the roadside, and his clothing was filled with holes; but the first shot was the only one that penetrated his flesh. Soon after this event he enlisted as a private in a Kansas regiment. When 19 years of age he was appointed second lieutenant in the 3rd regiment Mass. Heavy Artillery, mustered at Boston Oct. 14, 1864. He was made first lieutenant Sept. 1, 1865, and saw much rough service with the Army of the Potomac. On one occasion he succeeded in delivering an important message, after six other men had been shot from their horses in making the attempt. Being a large man, with robust frame, he had no fears for the diseases that took away many of his fellow officers. However, he finally succumbed to malignant fever and was sent North, where he died the last day of the war, Sept. 17, 1865.

## BIOGRAPHY.

Hon. Horace Collamore was educated at the Academy in Hanover, Mass., with a view to professional life. In 1811 he entered the china and glass ware business at No. 31 Marlboro (now Washington) St., Boston, under the firm name of Hastings and Collamore. Afterwards he carried on the business alone at No. 48 Marlboro St., and later took a partner, the firm then being Collamore &

Churchill. Failing health induced him to retire from the confinement of a store to life on a farm. He purchased an estate in North Pembroke, Mass., formerly oocupied by Dr. Jeremiah Hall, in 1821, and for the remainder of his days engaged in agricultural pursuits and conducted a country store. The Boston-Plymouth line of stage coaches made a change of horses at his stables for many years. He was President of the Plymouth County Agricultural Society for several years, and often contributed articles to agricultural journals. In the years 1841 and 1842 he was Representative to the General Court; and in 1853 he was Senator from Plymouth District. He was a part owner in several vessels built on the North river between 1821 and 1840. He was Brigade Major and Inspector of the First Brigade, 5th Division, Mass. militia. Postmaster for many years. Trustee of Hanover Academy, in which he took a great interest and in which most of his children obtained an education. His home was one of hospitality. With a large family of children, connected at one time with seventy-five cousins of mature age, life was always busy on the farm. With a great gathering of relatives and friends, he and his wife celebrated their golden wedding in 1864.

## BIOGRAPHY,

Dr. Francis Collamore attended Hanover Academy, and afterwards went to Harvard Medical Lectures in years 1843 and 1844. He received his degree from Dartmouth College in 1847. He studied medicine with Dr. Bartlett of New Bedford; also with his uncle, Dr. Anthony Collamore of North Pembroke. He began to practice at Braintree, Mass., but left that place on the death of his uncle and located in North Pembroke, where he labored for sixty-three years, serving as Town Clerk twelve years, School Committee thirty years, Town Treasurer seventeen years. He was administrator of many estates, Secretary and Treasurer of the Marshfield Agricultural Society thirty years. Representative in the State Legislature in 1881. He was historian of his native town, and at the time of his death was one of its leading citizens. Dr. Francis Collamore and his wife took a deep interest in the affairs of the First Parish (Unitarian) Church of Pembroke, of which they both were members, and of which he was a deacon for many years. He was the senior member of the Massachusetts Medical Society at the time of his death.

A survey of his career as set forth in the preceding paragraphs must suggest to the thoughtful a life of ceaseless activity. Half a century as beloved and skilled family doctor in a community where physicians are few, is in itself quite enough scope for the average man. When one adds to this the important civic offices assumed from time to time, the posts of trust and honor in the church, agricultural and medical societies—one marvels at the record. And it was all done so calmly, unhurriedly, with such old-fashioned faith and fervor, and the wisdom of ripe experience.

Next to his religious faith—unobtrusive, but deeprooted in his nature—and love of his family, was his sincere patriotism.

For the most part, Doctor Collamore was a man of deeds rather than words; deeds that touched so many lives and spheres of endeavor with beneficence that they have piled up for him, like the stones of a cairn, his enduring memorial.

Leander Collamore studied at Hanover Academy and at Phillips Exeter Academy, and was graduated at Dartmouth College in 1856. He had the profession of law in view, but in the exciting time of the Kansas crusade he went to Lawrence as correspondent of the Boston Herald and the Old Colony Memorial. After eighteen months' residence in the West he died from fever. He was a polished scholar and graceful writer.

Isaac Collamore in his will left to his sons Davis and Peleg the 'homestead and 36 acres of land in Scituate and the pew in the West Meeting House.' Each son deeded his share in the property to their brother-in-law, Nehemiah Randall, in 1770. At this time Davis was a yeoman in the town of Scituate. There appears to be no record of what later became of him. He left no children so far as known. As a Minute-man he marched in Capt. ## BIOGRAPHY.

Peter Collamore, tanner, settled near the head of Greenland Bay, in the town of Bristol (now Bremen), Maine, about the year 1765. His house was on a hill adjoining a mill pond, the locality being known to this day as "Peter's house hill." He was long remembered for his kindness towards all his neighbors. He did military duty during the Revolution by patrolling the seacoast. The ruins of his tanyard are still visible.

Isaac Collamore, brother of Peter, was a captain of militia, and at the end of the war he was chosen by the town of Bristol to serve with others on a committee to see that no "refugee having taken position under the British flag during the late war shall be suffered to return". Capt. Isaac Collamore was married, first, to Miss Anna Dresso, Jan. 2, 1785, and, second, to Jane Robinson, Feb. 9, 1809, at Bristol, Me. No record of children has been found.

Joseph Collamore, brother of Peter, sold his land in Scituate, Mass., near Mann's Corner (now in North Hanover, Mass.), in 1762, and then removed to St.

George, Maine. No record of descendants has been found. His namesake, Joseph (son of his brother Peter of Bristol), was without doubt the successor to his estate, taking also a wife from St. George before he removed to Lincolnville, Maine.

## BIOGRAPHY.

Peter Collamore, Jr., succeeded his father in the tanning business at the head of Salt Pond until about the year 1827, when he sold to Waterman F. Keen, mariner, lots numbered 192 and 203 on the east side of Greenland Mill Pond, containing 68 acres. He afterwards dwelt on Bremen L. I., Me., in a house now occupied by the family of Mr. McClain (1913). He was a large and very powerful man, and the part he took in the capture of the British privateer (the "Crown") in the war of 1812 has become a household story among his descendants to the present day. About April 23, 1813, a number of citizens residing in the vicinity of Muscongus Harbor, Me., met and decided to procure a vessel and capture an 8-gun tender to H. B. M. frigate Rattler, which for some time had greatly interfered with fishing vessels along the coast. They secured the sloop "Increase", armed themselves with muskets, boarding-pikes, and a small swivel gun. Commodore Samuel Tucker took charge of the vessel, with its 96 volunteers.

After several days of cruising, an armed schooner was sighted off Pemaquid Point, Aug. 26th. Commodore Tucker kept nearly all his men below until, as the vessels neared each other, the pilot of the schooner recognized Tucker and informed her captain, adding "there will be hot work". The captain of the schooner, which proved to be the Crown (6 guns, 25 men), tender to the frigate Rattler, immediately opened fire. The crew of the Increase sprang on deck, and the spirited fire of their muskets soon silenced the guns of the tender. One of the crew of the Increase, of giant proportions (Peter Collamore, Jr.), was ordered to stand ready to throw a kedge anchor on to the Crown as a grappling iron. Seeing this "giant fellow" standing ready to throw the anchor, knowing that his men had gone below, and that the sloop had taken the wind out of his sails, the captain called for quarter. The schooner surrendered and was taken to Muscongus Harbor and the crew lodged in Wiscasset jail. The Crown had a full supply of provisions and ammunition from Halifax. These were distributed among the people of Bristol and near-by towns, who were much in need of them.

### BIOGRAPHY.

Joshua Collamore during the early part of his life resided near the village of Assinnipi, in the town of Scituate, Mass. About the year 1765 he removed to Medumcook (now Friendship), Me. He was one of the most active men in that settlement and acted as a legal adviser. The court house being in the western part of the county, at Frankport, those who attended were obliged to sleep on the floor or in barns, or sit up all night. He, with others, signed a petition, Jan. 4, 1747, for a court house near the centre of the county. He was Ensign in Capt. Cornelius Bradford's (Medumcook) company, Col. Thos. Goldwaith's 2nd regiment of militia, in Lincoln County, in 1771. With Abiah, his wife, and others of the town, he signed a covenant July 14, 1774, not to purchase British goods while the port of Boston was closed. For many years he was a Deputy Sheriff. About the year 1800 he removed his place of abode from Friendship, Me., to Union, Me. He married Abiah, the widow of Cornelius Morton, who was the daughter of Abiah and Mary M. Wadsworth of Medumcook. Her grandfather was Elisha Wadsworth of Duxbury, Mass., and the Elisha Collamore mentioned in the U.S. census of 1790 as an adult living at Barrettstown, and who also deeded land in that vicinity, was probably her son (named for his grandfather Wadsworth). Abiah, the wife of Joshua Collamore, on May 9, 1803, deeded to her son Lebbeus 100 acres of land at Medumcook, "a certain farm or tenement being the farm which did belong to my former husband, Cornelius Morton. The History of Union, Me., shows the names of Joshua and Alpheus Collamore in the list of members of the Methodist Church in the year 1808. In the year 1798 Joshua Collamore paid a U.S. Direct Tax on 200 acres at Friendship and occupied a house belonging to Charles Samson.

### BIOGRAPHY.

Elisha Allen Collamore was a shipwright, being employed at various places in Canada and New York State. With his brother Thomas, he built the "Cobourg," said to have been the first steamboat launched in Canadian waters. It was in use for 15 years in Rice Lake, but not being a paying venture in that locality, it was decided to move it into Mud Lake. The water between the two lakes was too shallow for the boat to float through, so they sawed it through the middle and slid the forward portion across, on the ice, but a thaw came, so it was impossible to get the other portion across, and tradition says, "the first steamboat built in Canada was a mile from stem to stern."

Elisha Allen Collamore married his wife at Elisburg,near Sackett's Harbor, N. Y., and some of his children were born in that vicinity. He and his wife joined the Unitarian Church in 1829. His wife died in the town of Greece, N. Y., and he soon afterwards removed to Canada and remained there for 14 years until his death, which was caused by drowning, by the overturning of a boat he was sailing down the Atonahee River to deliver to a man in Petersburg for whom he had built it. His body was recovered two weeks after the accident and was buried in Petersburg.

Jacob Valentine Collamore was born at Hanford's Landing, in the town of Greece, Monroe County, N.Y. near the city of Rochester. His mother dying soon after his birth, he was taken to Canada by his father, where he lived until he was fourteen years of age. At this time they went from their home to Young's Mills, on the Atonahee River, to build a boat. When the boat was completed, they started down the stream in it to deliver it to the purchaser, who resided in Petersburg, twelve miles away. Elisha, the father, was steersman, and his son Jacob was the pilot. It was at a time when the water in the river was very high and the river bottom was full of rocks, which made navigation very dangerous. While attempting to make a landing, the boat was overturned by swift currents, and they were thrown into the water. Jacob swam for the shore, but the strong tide drove him back, until at last he succeeded in catching the branches of an overhanging tree two miles below the point of the wreck. The body of his father was found two weeks later at a place eight miles below where the boat capsized. After this experience, Jacob was taken by his sister to Cleveland, Ohio, where he obtained a position in the Dunham House (now the Forest City Hotel). Thence he went to the Empire House in Akron, Ohio, and afterwards he removed to Warren and Youngstown, Ohio, and to Greenville and Sharon, Penn., where he was educated to be a practical engineer and iron and brass founder. At the age of 21 he was a finished workman, and was employed in Pennsylvania for many years as a foreman in works where they built an engine every day in the year.

In 1861 he joined the army with his brother Thomas. He was in Co. B of the 57th Penn. Infantry, and saw service for three years and forty days in the Army Corps of the Potomac. This regiment was credited with thirtytwo battles during the Civil War. In 1870 he went West as a pioneer with the Greely Colony, and located at Fort Collins in Colorado, where he resided for a number of years, building foundries and machine shops in Denver and other places. The last thirty years of his life have been spent as an engineer at West Unity, Ohio. He was an active member of the Methodist Church. He belonged to Ring's Post, No. 637, G. A. R. Also belonged to West Unity Lodge, No. 638, I. O. O. F.; also to Superior Lodge, No. 179, A. F. and A. M.

Church in that city, June 4, 1837. He was authorized by vote of the town of Pembroke, March 14, 1812, to repair the bass viol in the Parish Church.
