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PREFACE.

The basis of this work is a "Genealogy of John Thomson" by Ignatius Thomson, published in 1841 at Taunton, Mass. The matter in his book has been rearranged mainly under the system of the "New England Historic Genealogical Society." To this has been added names of all other descendants I could get, and in the later generations have given many families of daughters and their descendants, which is a variation from the plan in the edition of 1841.

Some items are gleaned from "History of Bridgewater," by Nahum Mitchell, also from "Ancient Landmarks of Plymouth," by Wm. T. Davis.

Mrs. Lydia H. Morton, of Halifax, Mass., has given me valuable information and assistance; in fact, she gave me the only copy she had of the old Genealogy.

Judge Elijah Hayward, of McCollinsville, Ohio, wrote up a partial genealogy of the Hayward and Thomson families, from which I get valuable additions to this work through the kindness of Sarah W. Ames, daughter of Hon. Ellis Ames, deceased, of Canton, Mass., with whom these papers were left.

Thos. Cushman, of Bridgewater, Mass., gave me the use of his MSS. of Thomson records.

To Mr. James M. McKinlay, of New York, I am indebted for the extracts from the Plymouth Colony Records in Astor Library.

The rearrangement of the names in the old edition has been done by Mrs. E. G. Thompson, my wife.

From an article by Mr. E. B. Thompson in New Bedford Mercury of September 24, 1879, I get items of interest.

From Mr. Geo. H. Greene I have received many valuable suggestions. To all who have responded to requests for information I feel especially grateful. I regret that the record of many families is imperfect. I could not get more information.

DIRECTIONS AND ABBREVIATIONS.

To trace back a name. In the index of Thomsons or those other than Thomsons, as the case may be, find the name desired. The number in the index is the genealogical number which will be found in numerical order at left margin of page in the book. From this number go to number of parent in center of page, then find the parent's number in the left margin; again go to number of parent in center of page as before and so on back to number one, the original emigrant.

The following abbreviations are used herein: b, born; d, died; m, married; dau, daughter.

All the dates in this work are in old style prior to 1752, since then they are in new style.

The full faced numbers indicate that the person has a family which appears further on in regular order, and there the history is given more fully.

The generation of any individual is indicated by the number in small type above and at the end of the name.

The genealogical number is sometimes placed after a name to identify it when out of its regular place.

INTRODUCTION.

The name THOMSON has long been known in England, Scotland and Ireland. The first certain knowledge we have of it is from the records of ancient heraldry, when aristocracy invented badges to distinguish the different degrees of family greatness; each spelled the name differently and were considered distinct families; whether, originally, all who bear this name, however spelled, were of the same family, cannot easily be ascertained.

In the southwestern part of England the name was spelled TOMPSON. Rev. John Tompson, who settled in the ministry at Berwick, on the Piscataqua river, was descended from this family. In Ireland it was THOMPSON, and in the south of Scotland it was THOMSON; of this family were James Thomson, the celebrated poet, and Charles Thomson, secretary of the Continental Congress in Revolutionary days. Born in the northern part of Wales, in the vicinity of Scotland, we are led to consider the subject of our sketch a descendant of the Scottish family. The signature to his will is spelled TOMSON.

The circumstance of his youth when he arrived in this country, and the limited means of education which he had, lead us to conclude he did not know his lineage. This may not seem strange or unaccountable when we bear in mind the vast number of persons in Europe who then and even now have no specific knowledge of their grandparents, and in our own country, with all the means of education and records, cases may easily be found where a person could not tell from what nation in Europe his progenitor descended. We naturally look among the best-informed people for correct information: Rev. John Cotton, the first minister in Halifax, Mass., spelled our progenitor's name THOMSON, the records of the town of Mendon spell it the same, and in his deed of Spring-hill it is

spelled THOMSON. The letter *p* was not introduced into the name by any of his descendants till a century and a half had rolled away. Judge Hayward says "the name at first was probably Thomasson, originally the son of Thomas; there does not remain a reasonable doubt that the correct spelling is Thomson, the son of Thom, an abbreviation of Thomasson." Mrs. Lydia H. Morton, of Halifax, Mass., whose opinion is based partly on tradition and partly on what she learned from people of forty or fifty years ago, on this subject, says: "The first two generations spelled their names TOMSON, also generally the third generation did so. The fourth generation thought the name should have an *h*, the name did not seem right; probably the first and second generations did not write and spell very well (many deeds and wills are signed with a mark), but when more learning became common, people began to see how much better the name would look with an *h*, and by common consent it was added. I find on the oldest stones in our cemetery the names of TOMSON only in the third generation, but in the fourth the *h* added. My great grandfather spelled the name without the *h*; my grandfather added it, and it is on his tombstone. IGNATIUS THOMSON would not add the *p* to his name. His brothers and many others, however, did so, which he would not acknowledge and never used it when writing to them. They thought the name looked better with a *p* and continued to use it; others followed. I do not know of a family in town who does not use it, although should you look over the old records or walk over the graveyard you would scarcely find a record or stone that has an *h* or *p* on it, and it is only till late in the last century that the name TOMSON was discarded."

In this work the spelling "Thompson" is introduced in the fifth generation, which seems about the time it was adopted.

From Francis' History of Watertown, p. 131-132, is found: The following named persons with others had plough lands allotted to them February 28, 1636, and were the inhabitants of Watertown: John Tomson 2 acres; John Eddy 9 acres; John

Hayward seven acres; William Swift five acres; Abram Shaw ten acres.

The following extracts pertaining to JOHN THOMSON have been taken from Plymouth Colony Records in the Astor Library, New York. The spelling and contractions are as in the original; quotation marks signify exact copy: "li" stands for pounds, "s" for shillings; in many words u is used for v and in others v for u; the original print is followed. As to extract from Vol. VI, page 238, entry is dated May, 1690, and the matter is dated October, 1690; the discrepancy may be in the original printed copy. In Vol. VII, where it says "John Tompson, a juror," it does not necessarily mean in only one case. The spelling of the name is not uniform, it is given as in the record. Parts of the original records were destroyed. The omissions in the entry in Vol. VIII, page 4, are caused by the injury which the original record had received.

Lieut. John Thomson was evidently a man of consequence in the colony, and it is a source of gratification to his descendants that their family has been here long enough to help make all the history this country has.

Know all men, Present and to Come, that we William Wetyspaquin, Ananeta Tabyas, O. Benatt, Indians, of the Colony of New Plymouth, in New England, for and in consideration of the full and just sum of ten pounds to us in hand already paid before the insealing hereof by John Thompson, Joseph Laythorp and Barnabas Laythorp, all of Barnstable in the Colonie of Plymouth aforesaid, with which sum we do acknowledge ourselves to be fully satisfied, and thereof do acquit and discharge the said John Thompson, Joseph Laythorp and Barnabas Laythorp, their and every of their heirs, executors and administrators forever, have freely, fully and absolutely given, granted, bargained, sold, aliened, enfeoffed and confirmed, and by these presents for us and our several heirs do give, grant, bargain, sell, alien, enfeoffe and confirm unto the said John Thompson, Joseph Laythorp and Barnabas Laythorp, and to their heirs and assigns forever, a tract of land lying and being in the Colony of New Plymouth aforesaid,—bounded Northerly by * * etquash pond, Easterly by quetoquash River and Snepetuitt pond, and so from the Eastermost end and Southermost side of a little neck of land by the said Snipatuitt pond, and so from the Eastermost side of a little pond on a straight line from thence to Dartmouth path an hundred rod southerly from Dartmouth's now bound tree, and so from thence bounded all along by Dartmouth path until we come within sight of Quetequas pond, and from the path upon a straight line to the southermost end of the pond, and by the pond.

To have and to hold all the above bonded land with all and singular the benefits, profits, privileges and hereditaments whatsoever unto the said John Thompson, his heirs and assigns forever; unto the said Joseph Laythorp, his heirs and assigns forever; and unto the said Barnabas Laythorp, his heirs and assigns forever. To the onely proper use and behoof of them the said John Thompson, Joseph Laythorp, their heirs and assigns forever.

In witness whereof we the abovesaid William Watuspaquin, Asanetta Tobias and Benatt have hereunto set our hands and seals this first day of November in the year of our Lord God one thousand six hundred seventy and three, 1673.

Copy of the Will of John Tomson.

Know all men to whom these presents shall come, that I John Tomson Senr, of ye township of Middlebury being at this present day weak in body through my infirmities and diseases that are upon me, but of sound and perfect understanding & memory do make and ordain this to be my last will and testament to continue forever firm and inviolable.

Imprimis. I will & bequeath unto Mary Tomson my beloved wife ye use of one half of my house during her widowhood which half she pleaseth, and ye use of all my household goods during her widowhood, and six cows and a score of sheep, and three or four acres of land lying by my house. All these to have and to use during ye time of her widowhood. And also my will is that ye executors shall see that ye said land shall be improved for her, and they shall be paid out of ye estate. And also I will leave her one hundred pounds in money to dispose to her children as she shall see cause, but if in case she should die intestate my will is that this said hundred pound shall be equally divided among them all sons and daughters, that is my own children & hers. Also my will is that she shall have a cow or a steer yearly for her provisions. And if she cannot spare it out of that stock of cattle then it shall be provided for her out of ye estate. Also my will is that whatsoever provisions and clothing is left at my decease shall belong to ye family. And my wife shall have a double part of it at her disposing. And whereas I gave unto my son John half a score of land formerly and he hath nothing to show for it I now give it him by will

and he shall have fifty acres of land where his house standeth taking it up the whole length. Also I give and bequeath unto my son Jacob the house wherein he dwelleth, and ye fourth part of ye upland that is of ye two hundred acres of upland. And also I do give and bequeath unto my sons Thomas and Peter the one half of my house wherein I do dwell during their mother's life conditionally that they will agree to keep together and maintain their mother's stock of cattle aforesaid. And they shall have the increase both of cattle and sheep, so that they maintain & make good ye principal. And if they should come to some extraordinary losses so that they are like to be losers by it, they shall be considered in ye estate. And my will is that there shall be meadows set apart to keep those cattle during their mother's life. And I do give and bequeath unto my son Thomas all my house and the barn and ye orchard and ye lands adjacent thereabout after his mother's decease that will amount to a fourth part of two hundred acres, only if my son Peter have not land enough fenced and broken up he shall have ye use of two or three acres of land for two years if he desires it. And also I do give and bequeath unto my son Peter that my fifty acres of upland that I bought of John Morton. And whereas I have given to my sons John and Jacob and Thomas three quarters of this two hundred acres of upland, my will is that in ye division the fourth part be left so as to be most suitably divided amongst them all four. Also I give unto my four sons aforesaid a third part of land that was purchased by Captain Joseph Lothrop and Mr. Barnabas Lothrop and myself. And also I give unto my four sons above written ye one half of that third part of upland that was purchased by Captain Church and myself the one half of that third part next to Snipetrists pond and my one sixteen shilling purchase and that which I bought of John Irish, and that tract of land at Assawamsett that I bought of Felix ye Indian, and that which I bought of William Clark formerly called ye Majors' Purchase lying betwixt the two paths. A fifth part of that tract all which I give to them to divide equally amongst themselves. And also I give unto my four sons aforesaid all that my two hundred acres of upland lying between Monponsett Pond and the Little Herring Pond with my four acres of meadow and my two shares and half in ye Great Cedar Swamp and my two shares and half in ye undivided lands, all which shall be equally divided among my four sons aforesaid. Also my will is that my four sons shall have all my tools of all sorts for Carpentry or Husbandry, and also all my arms all to be equally divided among them. Also I give unto my son Peter twenty pounds in money towards ye building him a house besides four or five thousand foot of boards and plank. Also I do give unto my daughter Mary Tabor thirty and five pounds besides w^h is due to me from her husband. Also I do give unto my daughter Esther Read thirty and three pounds besides what is due unto me from her husband. Likewise I do give unto my daughter Elizabeth Swift twenty and five pounds. And also to my grandson

Thomas Swift ten pounds when he cometh to ye age of one and twenty years. And if he should die before then it shall be forthwith paid unto his mother. Also I give unto my daughter Sarah Tomson forty pounds. Also I give unto my daughter Lydia Soul thirty and four pounds besides what she hath had already. Also I do give unto my daughter Mary Tomson forty pounds. Likewise I do give unto my son Jacob a yoke of steers of four years old or upwards or ye value of them. Also I give unto my son Thomas a yoke of steer and two cows or ye value of them. Also I give to my son Peter a yoke of steers and two cows or ye value of them. Also my will is that my four sons John and Jacob and Thomas and Peter Tomson shall be my executors who shall receive what is due unto me and shall pay all my just debts, and shall see that my body be decently buried, and out of my estate to defray ye charges. And whatsoever is left after my and my wifes' decease when all charges is cleared shall be equally divided amongst them, all my children sons and daughters. Thus hoping that this my last will and testament will be kept and performed according to ye true intent of ye same, I commit my body to ye dust and my soul to God that gave it me.

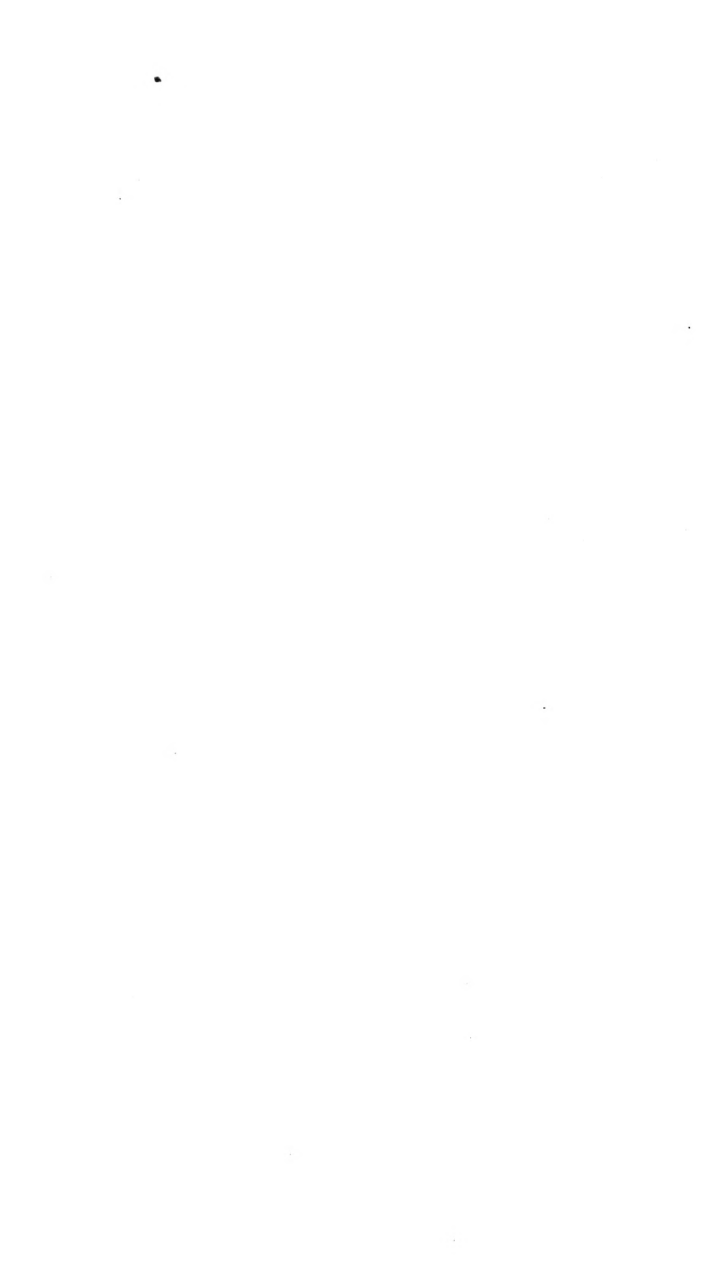

FIRST GENERATION.

I.

JOHN THOMSON was born in the northern part of Wales, in the year 1616. It is said his father died soon after his birth, and his mother married again. "The name of the step-father is concealed behind that impenetrable veil of oblivion which time is spreading over the generations of man." The child lived with and received his scanty education from his legal parents. He came to this country in the third embarkation from England. The second embarkation, which arrived at Plymouth, November 11, 1621, was in the ship "Fortune," Captain Robert Cushman, bringing thirty-five families—the remainder of Robinson's society. The third arrival was two vessels under the patronage of Thomas Weston, a merchant of distinction in London, containing sixty or seventy men; some of them had families, and among the number was JOHN THOMSON, then in the sixth year of his age; they landed at Plymouth early in May, 1622.

The above is taken from Ignatius Thomson's Genealogy of John Thomson. We do not see how this statement can be wholly correct.

The first embarkation, the "Mayflower," arrived in November, and the pilgrims landed on Plymouth Rock December 11, 1620,* O. S.; there were 102 passengers; the second embarkation, the "Fortune," arrived at Plymouth November 23, 1621, with thirty-five passengers; the third embarkation, the "Little James and Anne," arrived August, 1623, with sixty passengers; the foregoing were termed "First comers."

Another arrival was the "Sparrow," in May, 1622, with seven passengers, sent out by Thomas Weston. Still another arrival was the "Charity and Swan," in July, 1622, sent out by Thomas Weston, with sixty colonists for Wessagusset or Weymouth, which visited Plymouth, bringing letters from Mr. Weston to the effect that he had quit the "Adventurers."

We understand that John Thomson came in some one of the above embarkations or arrivals, and landed at Plymouth, but which one is uncertain.

* I get the most of these items and dates from Life of Miles Standish by John S^t C. Abbott, published 1875.

Tradition is silent respecting any incident in his life till he arrived at manhood; then it presents him to us in many events interesting and entertaining. From his will it appears he was a carpenter; besides building houses for others, he built one for himself in each of the places he selected as a settlement, and one for each of his sons, John and Jacob.

Also, with his friend Richard Church, he built the first framed meeting house in Plymouth, in 1637, and sued Thomas Willett, the town's agent, for not complying with the contract. As compensation for his labor the town gave him a deed of a piece of land from the market-house extending back to the herring brook, now called Spring-hill. He was on terms of great intimacy with Richard Church and after his death with his brother Captain Benjamin Church, the Indian fighter.

March 3, 1645, John Thomson purchased of Samuel Eddy a house and garden in Plymouth, near Spring-hill. He married December 26, 1645, MARY COOKE, b. 1626, daughter of Francis Cooke, one of the Pilgrim Fathers who came over in the "Mayflower" in 1620.

His chief business was that of a farmer, and his first appearance in that capacity was at Sandwich. Carpenter work was probably taken up from necessity and not as a trade; being a man fruitful of expedients and of uncommon ingenuity.

He made a purchase in that part of the town called Nobsusset, where he lived a few years, but came to the conclusion that he could better his fortune for himself and children by moving further into the interior. He accordingly selected a place thirteen miles west of the village of Plymouth, on the confines of Bridgewater, Middleborough, and what was then called Plymouth (now Halifax), and purchased land of William Wetis-pa-quin, sachem of the Neponsets, the purchase having been approved by the Court. The deed may be found recorded in Book 4, page 41, in the Registry of Deeds for Plymouth county. The homestead included other purchases than the above deed, in all by estimate more than six thousand acres of land; at the present time it is divided into more than one hundred farms with dwelling houses thereon, commencing at the herring-brook, in the northern part of Halifax, and extending south into Middleborough, the whole distance being nearly five miles. He built a log house in Middleborough, about twenty rods west of the Plymouth line, where he lived until it was burned by the Indians.

It has been handed down by tradition that he first commenced clearing land with reference to locating his house near

where the saw mill of Ephraim B. Thompson now stands. After working awhile he became thirsty and went into a valley near by in quest of water, and finding a lively brook of pure water, came to the conclusion that the spring could not be far away. He accordingly followed the brook up about one hundred rods and came to the fountain-head of pure, gushing water. A clearing was here made and a log house built. The importance of locating near a spring of never failing water, instead of attempting to dig wells, at that time, is apparent when we consider that shovels and spades in those times were made of wood instead of iron; wooden shovels were used by the third and fourth generations from John Thomson. When Ebenezer, a grandson of his, had a wooden shovel pointed or shcd with iron, it was considered a very great improvement and was borrowed by the neighbors far and near. The ancient practice of building dwelling houses near springs and running water accounts for the very crooked roads in many localities of the old colony.

His settlement amidst a surrounding savage enemy must have been attended with many troubles and fearful apprehensions. He must have felt the need of all the confidence in God that the religion which brought our fathers into this country could afford. He felt the necessity of using every precaution which his ingenuity could suggest or his wisdom dictate. Tradition has given us a few incidents illustrating these characteristics.

An anecdote is related indicating a plan which he adopted for his preservation from Indian surprise. He agreed with a man by the name of Jabez Soule, who had settled in the north-western part of what is now called Plympton, to entice a young Indian named Pringle Peter to come and live with them and learn to work and live like the English. They succeeded in their overtures—the Indian came and lived with each of them alternately two weeks. They studied to please him by flattery, and in every little competition of strength or agility, by giving him the advantage or yielding to his superiority. When the Indians agreed to make war on their white neighbors this young Indian would secretly steal away and join them; his absence thus became a warning to immediately repair to the garrison. When they had made peace with the English, this young Indian would return and live with them; by this arrangement he ignorantly became their protector. One day, while this young Indian was at work with him, our ancestor observed to the Indian, "I wonder they never attempted

to kill me." "Master," said the Indian, "I have cocked my gun many a time to shoot you, but I loved you so well I could not."

As the time drew near when open hostilities were about to commence in the terrible war of King Philip, there was a marked change in the demeanor of the Indians; they were generally morose and sullen; at times, however, the opposite; so uncommonly friendly and helpful as to excite serious apprehensions. At one time three came when Mrs. John Thomson was alone and began to behave rudely, kicking over the chairs. One pulled a fish, which was boiling, out of the pot, for which she reprimanded him, at which he drew a knife and brandished it in a threatening manner. She seized a splint broom and drove them out of the house.

At another time, on a sabbath morning, after his wife and children had gone to meeting, several Indians came into his house in a turbulent manner. He was apprehensive that his life was in danger, and seated himself in the corner of the room with the long gun in his lap, having his brass pistol in his hand. They appeared very friendly at times, patting him on the shoulder, and at the same time making efforts to get possession of the gun, at which he would look sternly at them, holding up the pistol; they would then look at each other and step back. After loitering about the house awhile they returned to the forest. A few days later he was absent from home; when he returned at night he inquired of his wife if she had seen any indians. She replied that there had been a number there, and that they were uncommonly friendly and very helpful, following her to the garden and assisting in picking beans. He replied, "There is trouble ahead; we must pack up immediately and go to the garrison."

The teams were put in readiness and a portion of their furniture and goods were loaded, while a part, together with his money, were secreted in a swamp near the dwelling house, and he and his family started before it was dark. They had not gone more than two miles before the light of the devouring flames made sure to them the fate of their dwelling. On the way to the garrison they passed the house of William, Danson, in Middleborough, and urged him to go, but he concluded not to start until early in the morning. Danson had ridden but a short distance in the morning, when, stopping to water his horse, he was shot down by the Indians. The little rill where he was killed is at the present time called Danson's Brook. The next day John Thomson sent one of his sons with two

others from the garrison to the deserted farm. On the way they discovered in the horse path a pair of leather shoes and a beaver hat which belonged to Danson; these they considered to be decoys, and put their horses at full speed. When they returned neither of the articles were there.

At the garrison, those capable of bearing arms, sixteen in number, met and chose John Thomson their commander. He applied to the Governor and council for a commission, but considering the small number of men, they gave him a general commission as Lieutenant Commandant, not only of the garrison, but in the field and at all posts of danger.

“He and his men were very active in forcibly contending with the Indians in 1675, and in Philip’s war of 1676, braving every danger and meeting the enemy at every point where he could be found. Having associated much with the Indians in early life, he made himself acquainted partially with their language, their habits and customs, and from their manners could discern the motives of their conduct. Often did they attempt to waylay and ambush him, but his vigilance never slept, and his prudence and matured judgment effectually guarded his safety. His stern and positive manner awed them into fear, and his inflexible courage subdued them to cowardice. Whenever he came in contact with them he triumphed and they were defeated, until they believed the Great Spirit protected him and that he could not be killed. Tradition gives him credit for having repeatedly saved the settlements at Halifax and Middleborough by his superior skill and well-timed precaution.”

He was equipped with a gun, brass pistol, sword and halberd. The whole length of the gun, including stock and barrel, is seven feet four and one-half inches; length of barrel, six feet one and one-half inches; caliber, twelve balls to the pound; weight, twenty pounds twelve ounces. It is considered to be quite a muscular feat to hold this gun at arms’ length and sight an object. The whole length of the sword is three feet five and one-half inches; length of the blade from the guard, two feet eleven and three-eighths inches. Hudibras has described this sword:

“For want of use it has grown rusty,
And ate into the blade for lack
Of something for to hew and hack.”

This gun and sword are now in Pilgrim Hall at Plymouth, where are collected many other pilgrim relics.

At the commencement of King Philip’s war in 1675, the

Indians became so morose that in the month of June the people from the region around, in all thirty-five families, fled for safety to the fort, which was built near what is called the Four Corners in Middleborough. The Indians would daily appear on the south side of the Nemasket river, opposite the fort, and perch themselves on and about what is called "Hand-rock," and taunt those in the garrison with insulting gestures. Lieut. Thomson ordered Isaac Howland (a distinguished marksman) to take the long gun and shoot one of the Indians. This he did while the savage was on the rock in the attitude of insulting them. The distance from the garrison to the rock was one hundred and fifty-five rods, nearly a half mile. The Indian fell, mortally wounded. Enraged at the fate of their comrade, the others rushed down the hill toward the grist mill (where the Star mills were located). The miller, who was grinding, being signaled from the garrison, placed his coat and hat on a post, which was partially concealed by bushes, as a ruse, and took a circuitous route through the thicket to the garrison. The Indians riddled the coat and hat with bullets and set the grist mill on fire. They carried their wounded companion some two miles to a deserted house on the farm, afterwards owned by Major Thos. Bennet. The Indian died that night and was buried with the usual Indian ceremonies and the house burned. In 1821, one hundred and fifty years after, Major Bennet plowed up some of his bones, a pipe, stone jug, and a knife.

The same year John Thomson, with the other house-holders, was driven back to Plymouth by the Indians, and at the close of the war in 1677, in June, the same families returned and took possession of their estate, accompanied by other families.

In 1677 John Thomson built a frame house near where the former house was burned. It was 38 feet front and 30 feet deep. It had loop holes, and was lined with brick so as to be proof against musket balls. The west front room was 18 feet square, the east room 18 by 12 feet. Each had a fireplace large enough to burn four-foot wood. There was a small window to each room on each side of the house, being seven in front and three in each end. The front part was two stories, the lower story seven feet high; the back part was one story. The floor was laid under the sills. It was heavily timbered, of white oak; the sills, posts and beams were twelve inches square, and other parts in the same proportion. The boards and joists were sawed by hand in a pit forty rods west from the house; the bricks were made southerly from the house. The out-

boarding was oak; there was no plastering; the inside finish was largely of cedar; the walls of one chamber were ceiled with cedar seven feet long, curiously wrought and fluted by hand. Here he lived for the remainder of his life. The house was repaired at different times, and was the residence of the fifth generation from John Thomson. It was taken down in 1838, having been inhabited one hundred and sixty years. Nothing remains except a corner stone, a part of the foundation, which has never been disturbed, and is just as it was placed by the workmen over two hundred years ago. The land where the house stood has ever been owned by the Thomson family. On this ancient homestead are standing many of the "high tap" or "summer sweeting" apple trees, which yield now their prolific crop of golden fruit as they did in the earliest days of the colony. Two trees of this variety, set out by a grandson of John Thomson, standing in view from the site of the old dwelling house, produced, by actual measurement, thirty-five bushels of apples in 1876, at which time the trees must have been at least one hundred and forty years old.

So far, we have only viewed the incidents in the life of John Thomson as related to his worldly concerns. We ought not pass by in silence the great object which led him to come to this country. His moral and religious character contains useful instruction to his descendants, and in many respects reproves them for their degeneracy. His customary hour of rising in the morning was at 4 o'clock, especially on Sunday morning. The breakfast must be closed, even in summer, on or before the rising of the sun. He was a regular attendant on the sanctuary, and by his example showed that he felt the sacredness of liberty of conscience, and was determined to improve it as a precious gift of God. After he had made his clearing and moved into his log house, either he or his wife would go every sabbath to the village of Plymouth, the only place where they had an elder to speak to them, a distance of more than thirteen miles, and the members of the family, male and female, frequently walked that distance to attend meeting at Plymouth, returning home the same day. His wife, one year, on two of the Sundays in June, after breakfast, took a child (Elizabeth) six months old, in her arms, walked to Plymouth, attended meeting and returned home the same day. Nor were his children, to the third generation, less zealous of enjoying the happiness of sanctuary privileges. It was a common practice among them to make a cheese on Sunday morning, in summer, provided they could get it under the press

before sunrise, and then they would prepare to go to meeting. His grandchildren were regularly found among the worshipping assembly on the sabbath. It is stated the children of his son Jacob started one sabbath morning for Plymouth; they had to cross a dismal swamp which lay between where Amasa Sturtevant now lives and where Caleb Loring formerly kept a tavern. They arrived near the swamp before daylight, and were greatly frightened by the howling of wolves; they climbed a large rock which was near Amasa Sturtevant's and tarried there in fearful suspense till the sun arose.

“Compare their zealous attachment to religious worship with those of the present day, and we should little suspect we were the children of such an ancestor. We certainly do not honor his character or feel zealous to assimilate his piety. We feel it a burden to walk two miles to meeting instead of thirteen.”

“This father of warriors and statesmen had but few opportunities for education, and of course his literary acquirements were very limited. Nature, however, had endowed him with a strong, active and vigorous intellect, which he greatly improved by experience and observation. Of many things connected with the times in which he lived, and the well being of society, he seemed to have an intuitive knowledge, but what chiefly supported him in all his trials and privations, and ever sustained him when surrounded by perils, was his firm conviction of the great truths of the Christian revelation, the duties it imposed, the promises it offered and the hopes it inspired. He was pious from a deep sense of his religious obligation. Chastened in his feelings in obedience to the dictates of conscience, he practiced the virtues of humility, meekness and charity from an abiding confidence in the wisdom, justice, and mercy of God. Honesty, integrity and fidelity with him were common and ordinary duties, while those to his Heavenly Father were never avoided or delayed, but with becoming reverence promptly performed. We cannot reflect upon the life of such a man without esteem for his virtues and respect for his character. Greatness was incident to his goodness, and his courage the result of moral rectitude. His example contains the text—it belongs to his posterity to furnish the commentary.”

He closed his industrious and useful life June 16, 1696, nearly 80 years old. He was buried in the first burying ground in Middleborough. His grave is marked by a small

stone, which is said to be the second one erected. The inscription is as follows:

MEMORANDUM.

In memory of
Lieut. John Thomson, who died June 16th, ye 1696, in
Ye 80 year of his age.

This is a debt to nature due ;
Which I have paid and so must you.

Mary, his wife, died March 21, 1714, in the 88th year of her age; buried same place with her husband.

The father making no objection, he married, in his 50th year, the said Mary Morton, she being then 25 years old. Thomas Thomson was a farmer and glazier; he set the diamond glass in lead, so common in those days, and adjusted it to the window sashes. In the division of his father's estate his share contained 700 acres of land, including the ancient dwelling house wherein he lived and died. No man in town was more highly esteemed; none whose counsels were so scrupulously

observed. Possessing a very large estate, he had the means, which he frequently employed, to gratify his feelings of benevolence and charity. Christianity was his all absorbing object. It admonished him in prosperity and consoled him in affliction. Rev. John Cotton, the first minister of Halifax, has given us the following tribute of him: "Thomas Thomson was the wealthiest man in town, but what was more to his honor he was rich toward God. He was just and exact in all his dealings; he made conscience of all his ways; he was food to the hungry, a father to the poor, and a harbor even to the stranger. The two or three last days of his life he seemed to be upheld only to speak forth the praises of God. This he kept doing by turns from Saturday to Monday evening; sometimes he would be blessing God for his goodness; sometimes giving advice to his children and relatives, or to those who visited him. In short, he seemed to be in heaven while he was on earth. He had glorious foretastes of the bliss above; he departed with praises on his lips and with a glorious triumph." He died October 26, 1742, aged 78. Mary, his wife, died March 20, 1781, aged 91.

An incident relative to this man is worthy to be left on record.

At the commencement of the Revolutionary troubles, a man by the name of Taylor deserted the British army, and hired himself to his nearest neighbor. A British sergeant, with a file of men, came to take him; they arrived about mid-day. As the officer was entering the front door Taylor passed out the back way and escaped to a thick swamp. After a fruitless search they concluded Taylor was concealed in the neighboring house. Accordingly they entered Thomson's house, finding him at dinner; they demanded Taylor, threatening to

shoot him if he did not comply. On this he laid down his knife and fork and opened the bosom of his shirt to the officer, who exclaimed, "Deliver up Taylor or I will shoot you," placing his hand to his pistol. "Will you?" says Thomson, rising from the table and taking his gun which hung over his head, "We will see who will get the first fire." This brought the Britisher to his senses, "I do not wish to harm you," he said, "all I want is Taylor." "Taylor is not in my house to my knowledge," said Thomson. The officer replied, "I shall search the house," turning to the door of a room. "Stop!" says the owner, "I have no objection to your searching my house, but you must first ask my leave." After the Revolution closed he settled with his family in the town of Bridgewater, in the state of Vermont. He was a justice of the peace, and died March 5, 1813. His wife died April 9, 1839, in her 89th year.

In 1797 Oakes Thompson left Middleboro and went to the District of Maine to survey, sell, and settle a large tract of wild land of several thousand acres, which had been purchased by his father and called "Thompson's Grant," situated in that part of the District embraced in the towns of Hartford and Peru, in Oxford county. In September following, having abandoned the idea of a permanent settlement in Maine, he was one day "packing up" to return to Middleboro, when, to his surprise, there arrived his father, his brother Cephas, together with his own wife and child Lucy, six months old, who had come with their pots and kettles and household goods for their future home. She had performed the last twelve miles of the journey on horseback with her child in her arms through an unbroken forest, guided only by spotted trees. They erected a frame house and barn in North Hartford on the northwest shore of Whitney Lake, and later a saw-mill. They cleared land and raised crops, which were sometimes destroyed by early frost. In the year 1816 there was a partial famine, and they subsisted chiefly on potatoes and milk; at one time they gave a fine two-year-old heifer for two and one-half bushels of smutty wheat. Their secluded but busy life was not altogether monotonous; the wild Indians, whom they were glad to feed and send on their way as quickly as possible, were wont to visit their house. Around the cheerful hearthstone at night occurred many a scene of gayety, and many a story was there told of personal experiences in trapping wild animals, and in startling adventures with bears. With other pioneers, he established a Baptist church, of which he was a deacon for many years—up to

the time of his death. His son Oakes refers to the regular attendance of his father and mother on Sunday at religious meetings at Livermore Corners, ten miles distant, on horseback, he sitting in the saddle, while she sat sidewise on the horse behind. He also cites an instance of his father's punctuality in devotional exercises. It was his custom to have family prayers every morning, but says that "on one day when my father was engaged in haying on the meadow, half a mile away from the house, I (being only four years old), noticing that there had been no prayers that morning, mentioned the fact to my mother, who at once sent me down to remind him of his omission. He thereupon returned to the house with me, read a chapter, and offered a prayer, and then returned to his work." He d. August 31, 1829. His wife d. October 18, 1860.

After staying there a year, he returned to Massachusetts and married his wife. They went by packet from Boston to Portland, and were two weeks on the way. From Portland they went to Buckfield, and from the latter place they traveled to Hartford, Me., on horseback, finding their way by spotted trees, the bride riding on a pillion behind her husband. After living in Hartford a year and a half, Mr. Thompson exchanged his farm for one in the town of Livermore, where he remained until his death, bringing up a large family of children. During his long residence in Livermore, he enjoyed the respect and confidence of all who knew him, and was often chosen to fill positions of honor and responsibility. In 1812 he was chosen captain of militia. He was one of the building committee of the first church built in Livermore, was a deacon of the Baptist church there for a great number of years, and served as one of the selectmen of the town. In 1816 he was elected representative to the general assembly of Massachusetts from the District of Maine. He drove to Boston, where it was held, with his own horse and carriage. The suit he wore was made of merino wool, sheared from his own sheep, spun and woven in his own house, and sent to Fayette to be colored dark blue and pressed. In this year, 1816, was built the large and roomy house which is still the Thompson homestead, and is owned and occupied by Job Drew Thompson (1888). Something should be said of the mother of this large family. Mrs. Sophia (Drew) Thompson was a woman of great energy and resolution, and of such excellent judgment that her husband was always accustomed to consult her, even in matters of business. These parents lived to see all their children grown up and married, having families

of their own, and all honorable and useful members of society. There have been three reunions of this large family, where all the children and many of the grandchildren were present—the first at the homestead, when forty-five were present; the next, October 29, 1863, at the same place, when fifty-five were present, twenty-six more being unable to attend. Several of the absent ones were in the army, and letters full of affection and encouraging words were sent to them at that time. The third family reunion was held at Skowhegan, Me., on the occasion of the golden wedding of the eldest daughter, Susan D., who married Rev. Charles Miller. Ira Thompson d. February 13, 1857. Cyrus resided in Verona till 1832, when he removed to Le Roy, Genesee county, N. Y., where he remained till 1846; then he removed to the farm in Carlton, N. Y.

He was educated in the common schools of Oneida county and at Hamilton academy, and read law for two years with Jenkins & Hinman at Vernon, but was obliged to relinquish the profession on account of temporary failure of health. In the earlier years of his manhood he was very much interested in the subject of education, and taught twenty terms of district school, besides teaching English grammar by lectures several years when not otherwise engaged in teaching, and was one of the town inspectors of schools both in Oneida and Genesee counties, and town superintendent of schools for one or two terms after taking up his residence in Carlton. He was also a justice of the peace for many years, both in Genesee and Orleans counties.

He was editor and proprietor of the LeRoy Gazette during the years 1839 and 1840, and became warmly attached to the editorial profession, but very much to his regret, was compelled to abandon it in consequence of the business failures of others, and losses which he sustained by reason thereof, and start life anew on the then uncleared and unimproved farm in Carlton, where he spent the last forty years of his long and useful life.

He was a pioneer in the anti-slavery cause, and a delegate from Genesee county to the first anti-slavery state convention, held at Utica, where the convention was broken up by a mob—the members rotten egged out of the city, and compelled to adjourn to, and re-organize at Peterboro, under the protection of Gerrit Smith, who had educated his people to a degree of toleration which enabled them to endure even the then hated abolitionists. He rejoiced that he lived to see the institution of slavery uprooted and annihilated, even though at so great a cost of treasure and life as it involved.

He was honest and upright in all his transactions with his fellow men, a kind husband and indulgent father. A great reader and thinker, he taught his children far more than they ever learned in the schools, and they, though themselves advanced in years and mostly gone out from the old roof tree, will greatly miss the wisdom and instruction which, till sealed by the death stroke which came upon them, ever fell from his lips.

He died at his residence in Carlton, April 24, 1886, of disease of the heart and paralysis, in the eighty-third year of his age.

His funeral took place at his late home, conducted by the Rev. N. Foster Brown, and the large concourse in attendance as well as the words of the preacher, attested the respect in which he was held by his long-time neighbors and friends.

With him, earthly toil and cares have ceased, and the new life in which he so firmly believed, has begun. Loving, grateful hearts appreciate his life labors, and cherish his memory.

From 1849 to 1855 he was foreman in the boot and shoe manufacturing establishment of A. Sherman &

Co. In his early manhood he was profoundly impressed with the enormity of the crime of human slavery, and very naturally espoused the anti-slavery cause. He rejoiced at the events that brought about a political revolution in Michigan in 1854, and contributed not a little with tongue and pen to bring about that result. He was elected in that year register of deeds of Van Buren county, which office he filled two years, when he was appointed deputy secretary of state by John McKinney, which position he held for four years, serving during the last term of Mr. McKinney and the first term of Hon. Nelson G. Isbell. His family removed to Lansing during his stay there. Retiring from the secretary of state's office, he held a clerkship in the auditor general's office for nearly four years, and until, at the earnest solicitation of Hon. E. J. House, then assessor of internal revenue, he with his family returned to Paw Paw and accepted the office of assistant assessor of internal revenue for Van Buren county, in which position he continued for several years. Was partner with Mr. A. H. Herron in a claim agency for a few years. At the republican state convention in 1866, he was quite a prominent candidate for the office of secretary of state; and was enrolling clerk of the house of representatives of Michigan during the session of 1869, following which and for about two years he filled a clerkship in the census bureau at Washington; this practically ended his public life. He was never found wanting in ability, or in any of those elements that go to make up a popular and efficient public officer. He was never a policy man. In all his dealings he was honest and faithful to his convictions of right.

Though not a member of any Christian society, he was a man of deep religious convictions, and of high moral attainments, and sought to live a life void of offense to God and man. He gave liberally for the support of the gospel, and for several years was one of the trustees of the Methodist Episcopal church in Paw Paw. Amid the trials and afflictions of this life he manifested a firm trust in God. When his soul was well nigh overwhelmed, he was wont to repeat that matchless poem of Whittier's, entitled "Eternal Goodness." Intellectually he was far above the average, and could he have had in early life that thorough education which was the ambition of his life to give to his children, he might have held high rank in the field of letters. He had a wonderful memory; he loved the companionship of our standard poets, and had a large portion of the writings of Scott, Whittier and others at

his tongue's end, some of which he has been known to recall and repeat though he had not seen them for twenty or thirty years. He was afflicted with paralysis the last few years of his life. His end was peaceful; without a struggle he passed to the better land. He d. January 10, 1883; his wife d. July 7, 1885; both buried in Paw Paw.

Abbott, hoping in this then new country to make a home for himself and family, and in this he succeeded, for the farm has continued in the family since then.

He was an industrious and skillful mechanic, a man of sanguine temperament, cheerful in every trial or perplexity, always hoping for the best, a kind husband and indulgent father, his memory will long be cherished by those who knew him. He was a firm believer in the Christian religion and for about forty years had been a member of the Methodist Episcopal church. He d. February 7, 1877, in Lansing, Mich.; buried in Keeler. His wife was a faithful and industrious helpmeet, kind and willing, never weary of helping those who needed assistance, never thinking of self if she could do a kindness for others, a true and faithful mother, ever striving to bring up her children in right paths. Thomas became a soldier in Capt. Sears Washburn's Bridgewater company stationed at Plymouth in 1814 and was connected with the old Bridgewater Cadet Rifle company, organized in 1819, of which Mr. Thomas Hooper was afterwards a member. At the age of 21 Mr. Cushman began his career as a teacher and for more than thirty years, with slight interruptions, he continued to be an instructor of youth in Bridgewater and neighboring towns, deeply devoted to his calling and laying deep and broad the foundation of good order and sound morals in the community.

In 1849 and 1850 Mr. Cushman represented his native town in the General Court, and has ever manifested an intelligent interest in public affairs.

Mr. Cushman was the last of the original members of the Church of the New Jerusalem in Bridgewater, and upon the fiftieth anniversary of its organization, in 1883, presented a paper descriptive of the planting of the church and the formation of the society.

In his declining years Mr. Cushman has enjoyed the full possession of his faculties; he has devoted much attention to genealogical research and has welcomed with avidity the publications of the day. In the death of this aged man the town has lost an esteemed citizen, the church an efficient and revered member, and his family circle a devoted father and friend.

From that time, when he was barely 19, until his death, he was almost constantly engaged in the construction and management of railroads. Among the roads which he has built in whole or in part are the Vermont & Canada, the Vermont Central, the New Hampshire Northern, the Atlantic & St. Lawrence, now a part of the Grand Trunk, the New London & Northern, the Boston, Concord & Montreal, the Newport & South Eastern, the Passumpsic, the Frankfort & South Eastern, the Montreal, Portland & Boston, the Woodstock, the Somerset, the Saratoga & Sackett's Harbor, the Eastern, and several of the roads which now form a part of the Old Colony and New York & North Eastern systems. At the time

of his death he was president of the F. & S. E. Railroad, vice president of the M. & W. R. Railroad, vice president of the First National Bank of St. Johnsbury, Vt., and director in several other railroads and financial institutions.

He was a republican in politics, and was in 1860-61, 1866-67, a member of the Vermont house of representatives, and in 1876 and 1880 a member of the senate in the same state. In 1880 a presidential elector. While in the house he opposed a bill to increase the pay of members on the ground that there had been a virtual contract between them and the people to serve for the sum then established by law, and upon the passage of the measure he and one of the senators returned their surplus pay to the treasury; this, it must be remembered, was several years before a similar measure was opposed in the national congress upon the same ground, on which occasion also some of the members returned their back pay. The records of the senate show that in 1876 he returned to the treasury the carefully computed portion of his salary paid him while he was absent from the sessions on a visit to the centennial. In 1876 he was chosen, with an associate, a receiver of the Montpelier & Wells River Railroad, and the property was so handled that it was ultimately returned to the parties in interest with an increased value, forming an honorable exception to the way in which Vermont railways have been managed by receivers. This, with the instances cited from his legislative career, serves to illustrate the method and honorable character which marked all his business dealings.

He has been liberal to both public and private objects. More than one young man, with no other claim upon him than that they were poor, have received from Mr. Thompson the means of procuring a college education, while he has given freely to churches and schools, his gifts to the Lyndon (Vermont) Literary Institution alone aggregating more than \$30,000.

Fortunes which have been made by their possessors are generally of two classes: those which are attended by production, which open up new enterprises, give employment to labor and add to the world's stock of wealth; and those which have caused no new production or wealth, but which spring out of the manipulation of property already in existence and from deals in stocks and securities. Fortunes of the first class are not usually so large as those of the second, but they are more honorable to their possessors and generally more enduring. Mr. Thompson's is emphatically of the class first mentioned, and its making has called into being enterprises that would

probably not otherwise have existed, and has made the poor happier and less poor than they were before. Being fully six feet in height and thoroughly well proportioned, with clear cut features, eyes large and blue, and a great and noble head, Mr. Thompson was a man of striking appearance. He d. He removed to New York in 1837, and was intimately associated with some of our best known writers—Bryant, Longfellow, Halleck, Tuckerman, Hawthorne, and many others. He there painted a large number of portraits of distinguished people, many of which were engraved for publication. Soon after his marriage, in 1843, he returned to his native state to live. Passed a short time in New Bedford, and then settled in Boston for a number of years. Always deeply

engaged in his profession, he had a restless desire to visit the far-famed galleries of art in England, France and Italy, and in 1852 he sailed for Europe and remained abroad seven years, the greater part of the time being passed in Rome. At first he made a few copies from the old masters—Raphael, Guido, Correggio and Titian—but very soon rejoiced in the freedom of being able to devote himself to his own creations, and there conceived and executed some of his finest works: St. Peter Delivered from Prison, Prospero and Miranda, The Mother's Prayer, Angel of Truth, Chastity, and very many Italian studies from the contadini of the country. In 1859 he returned to America and took up his abode in New York, where he remained until his death. In April, 1887, he accepted a position under the United States government as inspector of life preservers, and, notwithstanding his advanced age, was able to attend to the duties of his office promptly and faithfully to within five days of his death, which occurred January 5, 1888. His widow resides at 239 East Twelfth street, New York City.

His father, a portrait painter of some eminence, designed an older son for the profession, and, to give him all opportunity, consigned Jerome to the toils of the farm, severely discouraging the outcroppings of the artist talent which he saw the boy possessed in no small degree. "Where there's a will there's a way," is a true old adage, and Jerome found time, by stealing away into the garret, to do much work in his way. When at work in the field his slate was sure to be hid away in some friendly copse, where it caught many a visit from the persevering boy. A favorite sister shared her sympathy with the closely watched boy, and comforted him much by conniving at and assisting him in his labors. A good story is told of these stealthy interviews and hours absorbed by the pallet in the garret. Jerome had at length succeeded in procuring a real, living sitter in the person of his cousin—since become an eminent minister in the Episcopal church—and all odd hours possible to be subtracted from the barn-yard and field were given to the easel. The picture progressed finely, and was nearly done, when, presto! in came the angry father, knocking easel, artist and all into direful confusion, amid which the sitter escaped and the unlucky boy beat a retreat, first securing his picture, which he preserved as a relic of the disaster. Such being the decided bent of his tastes, it is not strange that he deserted farming as soon as possible. By sign and various ornamental painting he succeeded in laying up one hundred dollars, and with this

stock in trade, accompanied by his good sister, he "started in business," opening a studio at Barnstable, where he painted many portraits, including one of Daniel Webster, who was thereafter his warm friend. By such economy as two such spirits alone could practice, and by dint of perseverance, he obtained a good living, even in that barren spot. The Barnstable "Patriot" relates this incident as showing the rapidity with which he wrought: Some gentleman, who had been abroad, was remarking upon the ease with which some artists whom he had known would accomplish their work in a very short time. Thompson offered to bet that in five minutes he would paint a portrait of any gentleman the party would select, which might be recognized by any one who knew the subject. The bet was taken, and one of the gallant landlords of the Globe Hotel was selected as the sitter. At it Thompson went, painting upon a piece of smooth pine board, and stopped on his task the minute the watch had ticked off five minutes. The result was set upon a post in front of the house, and a little girl passing on the opposite side of the street named the original at once. The bet was immediately paid, and the artist had won a victory. In 1831 the artist and his sister went from Cape Cod to New York City, to cast their bread upon that turbulent sea of "noise and confusion." Here he was not long in winning a position and a handsome support, while his admirable sister as a miniature painter added much to her means and repute as an artist. About 1852 he went to England for study and a wider experience, and there added to his repute considerably, painting portraits of many of the nobility of England and France, returning home with money and added honors. From the time of his return, Mr. Thompson may be said to have found his *forte*. From the study of Claude Lorraine, and Turner, and Hogarth, abroad, he found that his strength lay even more in country scenes and rustic life than in general landscape and faces; and he labored in the pastoral field with the richest success. Among his pictures are: "The Apple Gathering," "The Watering Trough," "Recreation: or, a Picnic Scene in Vermont," "October Afternoon." Of the latter Isaac M. McLellan paid a fine tribute in verse, from which we quote:

"Rare painter! thanks to thee we tend
 For scenes to nature's self so true;
 Thanks, that in nature's frostiest time,
 When tempests veil heaven's glorious blue,

Though hedged by multitudes that swarm
 In splendid square and squalid lane,
 Perennial in thy works we find
 Fair summer's bloom and autumn's wane."

He d. May 1, 1886, at Mount Jerome, his country seat in Glen Gardner, N. J. An abstract from some of the minutes of the National Academy of Design is as follows:

"The Council has heard with deep regret of the death of an old friend and fellow member, Jerome Thompson. Mr. Thompson inherited his love of art from his father, himself an artist of merit; his earliest pictorial efforts were in portraiture. * * * He was well known and esteemed by his contemporaries as a painter of ideal and rural landscape subjects, and his name was at one time familiar to the general public through his series of 'Pencil Ballads,' as they have been called, illustrative of popular songs and verses of the time, as: The Old Oaken Bucket, Home, Sweet Home, Scenes of My Childhood, Coming Thro' the Rye, and Woodman, Spare that Tree, compositions which were reproduced by chromo lithography and steel engraving and scattered widely over the land. He was in all ways a most excellent and worthy man, deservedly honored in his life and sincerely mourned in his death."

Dr. Paxton, his pastor and a distinguished Princeton professor, said to Dr. Patten, its president, that Jerome Thompson was the greatest poet, painter, christian and child he ever met. "Truly, an American painter of American scenes and poetic thought." Most of his works were never exhibited by him. Some of his later works are in Paris, sold to their possessors from his studio. During the last winter of his life he painted with greater power, and more pictures, than ever before in a like period of time. During all his life as an artist he kept a "Book of Advice to Myself," dividing his life into epochs of ten years, comparing and compelling advancement—never commending, always severely criticising himself, never looking backward except for the purpose of going forward. He was a great student, always at work, desperately in earnest and enthusiastic. He spent his summers traveling over the country, even amidst the wildest scenery of the far west, not merely sketching, but making studies of nature with fidelity and love. He left a large collection of studies, and several large and important pictures, including his allegorical pictures, "Beulah Land" and "The Valley of Baca." He owned a farm in Minnesota and a home in the Berkshire Hills of his native state. He understood gardening, loved it, and never

wearied of its labor. On the morning of the day of his death, when too weak to speak, with an arch smile he drew the attention of his wife to the picture his nurse made standing in the sunlight—and later waved his hand as if forbidding tears, and quickly went to Jesus his Savior, in whom he believed. His first wife d. January, 1874 or 1875.

About the age of 21 Mr. Miller took a decided stand as a Christian, and became by conviction a Baptist. He early cherished the desire of becoming a missionary, and gave himself to study for that purpose. Excessive application impaired his health, to recruit which, he took a sea voyage in 1819 and landed in Miramichi, N. B. Here he began work as teacher and preacher, and in 1820 was ordained at Sackville in connection with the meetings of a Baptist association. Four years, with great zeal and success, he did pioneer work over a large region where there are now three or four flourishing Baptist churches. After a three years' pastorate in St. John, he became, in 1826, the first pastor of the Baptist church in South Berwick, Me. He was subsequently pastor in Turner, Me.; Wenham, Mass.; Boston, Livermore, Bloomfield and Farmington, Me. In 1851 Skowhegan became his home for the remainder of his life. Twenty years of self-denying missionary labors in the region of the upper Kennebec, and a brief pastorate in Livermore Falls passed, and Father Miller closed his public labors in the 81st year of his age and the 56th of his ministry. His was a glorious sunset; the public official service closed at 80, but his blessed ministry continued to the end of life. One who knew him well, writes: "Many years Father Miller has been in retirement from the active work of the ministry that he loved so well, but his influence has been mighty and constant all the while, as his interest has been unabated. The churches he had served, the ministers whom he knew, the scattered sheep he had tended so faithfully and lovingly, as well as his own kindred and loved ones, were remembered constantly in this good man's prayers." He d. November 21, 1887, in Skowhegan, in the 94th year of his age. His widow resides in Skowhegan.

In the session of 1888 he was chairman of the committee on probate and insolvency. Early in the session he introduced an order, upon which he subsequently reported a bill, substantially revolutionizing the practice in poor debtor cases. This bill passed the house, and, in an amended form, the senate. It was a most radical measure, completely overturning the old practice, with its notorious abuses, under which the right to arrest men was sold at the rate of a dollar a head, and when, also, in Suffolk county, men were often sent to jail whose only crime was poverty, and many a rich debtor was enabled to defy his creditors. This bill did away with the system of fees for magistrates and conferred jurisdiction upon an established and reputable court, and it has been pronounced by excellent judges to have been the most beneficent and reformatory act of the whole session. He supported the proposition to submit the prohibitory amendment to the people and also all measures to restrict the power of the saloon and to secure the enforcement of existing laws. In the session of 1889 he was made chairman of the committee on judiciary, which is the traditional position of leader of the house, and which requires very frequent participations in debate. Perhaps the most important occurrence of the session was the controversy with the justices of the supreme court. The house, in the exercise of what it claimed to be a constitutional power, asked the opinion of the justices upon certain questions growing out of the laws relating to the public schools. The justices replied declining to give their opinions. This reply was referred to the judiciary committee, on behalf of which Mr. McCall made an elaborate report, maintaining that it was the constitutional

duty of the justices to answer, and embodying this claim in the form of a resolution. After a debate, which was pronounced on all sides to have been one of extraordinary ability, the resolution was passed 168 to 8. Of this action the Boston correspondent of the Christian Union said that it was "a bold and rather startling act," and of Mr. McCall's report, that it was "exceedingly forceful, learned and in parts brilliant." The questions raised by this controversy are receiving a good deal of attention from the law reviews, and are certainly of far-reaching importance. During the presidential campaign of 1888 Mr. McCall served as editor-in-chief of the Boston Daily Advertiser. He was also a delegate from Massachusetts to the national republican convention in 1888, where he made a speech seconding the nomination of Gen. Gresham to the presidency. Address, Winchester, Mass.

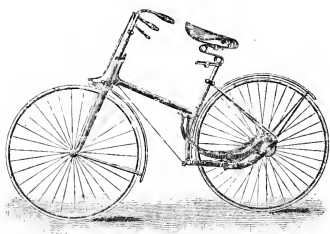

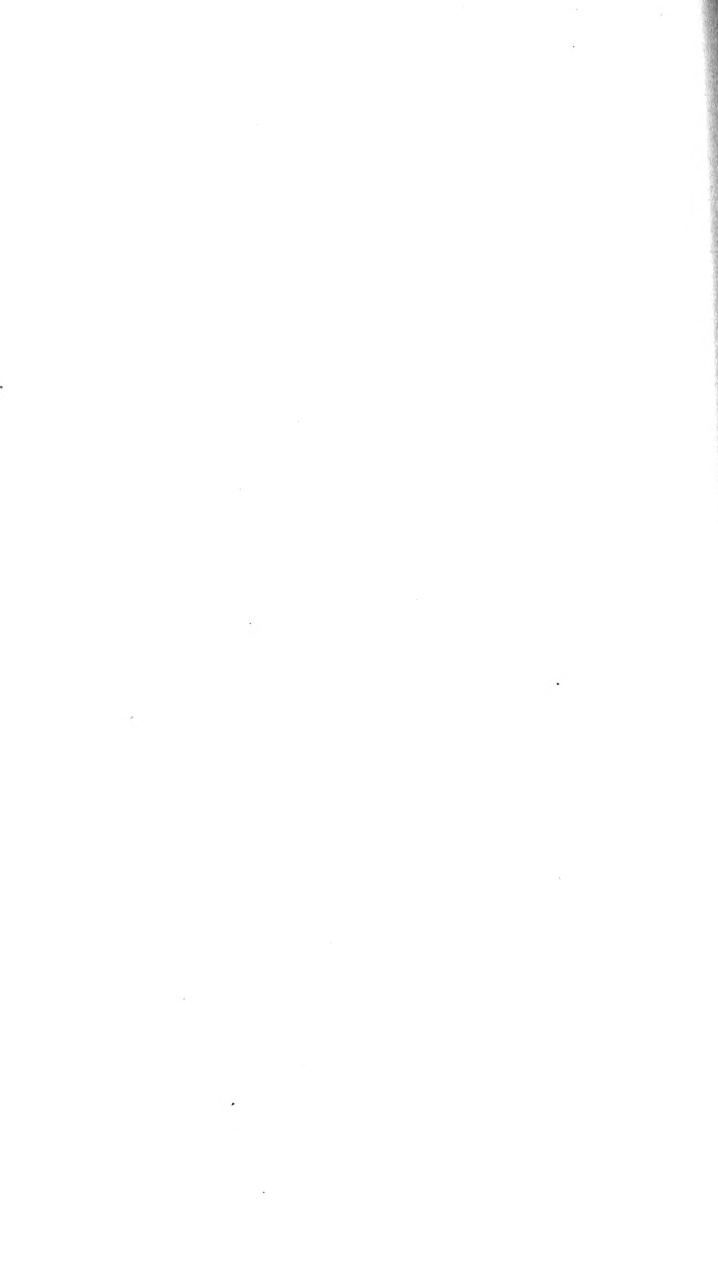
