INTRODUCTION

By Robert Bruce Bare.

While on a visit to my father, John Bare, of Mount Union, Penna., in the Fall of 1894, I found a letter in his desk addressed to him from Mr. H. O. Lamason, Number 26 Broadway, New York, dated November 16th, 1887, in which he said: "I am engaged in compiling the history of the Baer family, or that part of it which we find in York County," and asked that he give him any information he could of his own and the other members of the family. In answer to my question, asking if he made a reply, he said he had not. I said this would be well to know. We talked it over and he wrote down for me what he remembered of his ancestors, where they lived in York County, the names of some of his relatives, and where they lived. I wrote Mr. Lamason and inquired how he succeeded. As this was about seven years after the date of his letter, no surprise was occasioned by no receipt of a reply. (During the past year I heard that the information he collected at that time had been lost.) Soon after this, I began making inquiries, and asking information from the people whose names father had given me, but with very little success. No one seemed to know of any family Bibles that would have the records for which we were looking. At Thanksgiving time, 1903, on the occasion of a visit of Mrs. Mary S. Devor, of Harrisburg, and her brother, Oscar F. Swope, of Pittsburgh, while we three were going through the Congressional Library, looking at the many things of interest, among which was a collection of early Bibles, Mr. Swope said: "I have an old German Bible at home that has Baer family records in it, back to 1749, and written in German." Here at last, after about

eight years of search, the old family Bible was found. Mrs. Devor brought the record with her on her return home from Pittsburgh, had it translated, and sent it to me. This record encouraged me to begin anew to collect information, and after about two years' correspondence, I succeeded in getting data of the six families mentioned. This was entered in a book and the book sent to Mr. D. M. Bare for his information, and so that he could make a copy of it for his own use. With gratefulness the writer acknowledges the help and assistance of D. M. Bare, Mrs. Mary S. Devor, Martin E. Bare, W. H. Corman, John A. Baer (now deaceased), Mrs. Maria J. Deshler, James H. Baer, Miss Mary A. Bare, George Garver, John Douglas and all the others who so kindly interested themselves in collecting and sending me the data requested, and without whose help it could not have been obtained. Mr. D. M. Bare offered the suggestion that he try to get all the information he could of the present generation, and that I try to get all information available of the early ancestors. In compliance with this idea, the writer has visited the court houses in Lancaster and York several times, in each case with the able assistance of some one familiar with the books, and carefully examined records in the offices of the Recorder of Deeds, Register of Wills and Orphans' Court, and has consulted the Pennsylvania Archives, Histories, Biographies, Genealogies and early Church Records, relating to Lancaster and York counties in the Congressional Library.

We also have had searches and examinations of court and other records made by Robert C. Bair, Esq., of York, who has made a study of "Baer" genealogy for years, by Mr. H. M. North, Jr., of Columbia, and by others. While much information has been obtained, yet we have not been able to definitely locate the homestead of Jacob Baer and his wife, Barbara Schelman, or their ancestors. Even at the early date of 1749,

when Johannes was born, there was a number of families by the name of "Baer" and the multiplicity of the names, Jacob and John, has been confusing, and the custom of settling up estates among themselves by some families without making court records of the settlement, may account for our failure to locate our Jacob. To search for our ancestors, as my time would permit, for about fourteen years and then fail in part to find the information sought is discouraging, yet the task in some respects has been a pleasant one. The knowledge gained of Lancaster and York counties, of our sturdy Pennsylvania German ancestors, the achievements of the German immigrants, who valued their religion and education, built churches and established schools and by their industry and frugality did so much for our grand old Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, makes me feel proud to be a descendant of these people, who until recent years have been without their due share of praise for the important part they played in the settlement of the State.

The records in this volume show that your ancestors were a religious people in their various walks in life, serving God with fidelity and zeal. Will not the present generation, and the generations to follow, each in its turn, as the years roll on, vie with even more fervor than the preceding one, to teach its children from the word of God and by upright lives, lessons in righteousness and sobriety. The church needs the presence, influence and money of godly men in each generation.

INTRODUCTION

By Daniel Mathias Bare.

Under date of January 21st, 1904, one Walter S. Bear of St. Louis, Mo., wrote me, saying that he was about to begin a family history, commencing with his great grandfather, Jacob Bear, who with his wife Rebecca, came from Germany sometime prior to the Revolutionary War, and settled in Pennsylvania. Mr. Bear wanted me to give him such history of our family as I possessed, to see if we were descended from the same original ancestors. After some correspondence we found that as far back as we could trace it, we were of a different ancestry. Mr. Bear found about seven hundred persons, descendants of his great grandparents, Jacob and Rebecca Bear. He finished his work and published his book, entitled "The Genealogy of Jacob Bear," in 1906. About three months after receiving Walter S. Bear's first letter, the writer received a letter from R. Bruce Bare, of Washington, D. C., which began as follows: "Dear Sir: I am a son of John Bare (deceased), of Mount Union, Pa., and am trying to make a record of the Baer, Bear, or Bare family of York county, Penna., etc." Soon after this he informed me that he had located the old German family Bible of Johannes Baer, and that it gave the names of all their children and the dates of their births and other valuable information. From that time on, for the next two years, considerable correspondence passed between us. He was making a record of the information he was gathering, by correspondence, and in 1906 he sent me his book containing the history so far

obtained. The writer made a copy of this record and, probably in so doing, conceived the idea of obtaining the names and dates of births, and as much other information as could be secured of all the descendants of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer. With the information obtained from the record made by R. Bruce Bare, I was enabled to get the names and addresses of some one in each of the families of the second generation. There were seven of these families, those of John, George, Jacob, Daniel, Anna, Benjamin and Barbara. With the information in hand, as above narrated, early in 1908, the writer began a correspondence with the view of obtaining the following facts concerning each individual descendant of Johannes and Anna Maria (Mary) Baer: First, the name; second, the date of birth; third, the date of death; fourth, the occupation; fifth, the church affiliation; and sixth, the present address. While a good many of my letters were not answered, yet I always was able to find some one in each connection who became interested and many of them went to much trouble to secure the information desired. I hesitate to give names of these valued correspondents, because there are too many of them to insert here, but shall name several, whose assistance has been almost invaluable. One among the first was Mrs. Maria J. Deshler, then followed John A. Baer, since deceased; W. H. Corman, A. N. Corman, Mrs. R. Emma Hess, Martin E. Bare, Jacob S. Bare, Mrs. Mary Preston, Hon. A. Fortenbaugh, Mrs. Mary S. Devor, Mrs. Harriet Kettering, G. E. Dunmire, Mary A. Bare and Miss Anna Spanogle. out the able assistance of these just named and many others, the book as now presented could not have been published. They therefore all have my sincere thanks for their valuable aid, and for the inspiration their letters gave me.

As to the nationality of our ancestors, we have not been fully able to satisfy ourselves beyond the fact that they were

German speaking people and that Anna Maria (Beistein) Baer came from Ober Muldan, Darmstadichen, Germany. That fact is established by the Bible record of Johannes Baer.

The same record also states the fact that Johannes Baer was born in Lancaster county, Pa., and that his father's name was Jacob and his mother's maiden name was Barbara Schelman, but we have no certain information as to where Jacob was born. From the Pennsylvania State record at Harrisburg, we have obtained the following information: On the vessel "Joyce," Captain William Ford, Master, sailed from Rotterdam and arrived in Philadelphia November 30th, 1730, there were the following persons: John Bear, aged 40; Anna Maria Bear, aged 43; Hans Jacob Bear, aged 17; Maria Barbara Bear, aged 16 and Hendrick Bear aged 6 years. These names were all recorded on the same page and under the above date, and were probably all of the same family, and I think it is not improbable that the Hans Jacob Bear, aged 17, in 1730, is the father of our Johannes.

If Hans Jacob is our ancestor, the question then arises, what part of Germany did he come from?

Robert C. Bair, Esq., of York, who has probably made a more exhaustive study of the ancestry of the Baer families than any one else, believes that the ancestors of our line came from Switzerland and were of the Swiss Mennonites, who emigrated to this country in large numbers from 1700 to 1750. Many of the Baers of Lancaster County without a doubt trace their origin back to Switzerland, but from the investigation we have made, we have been unable to do so. In fact we believe that our ancestors emigrated from the Palatinate in Germany, for reasons which we will here state. First, Anna Maria Beistien, or Beilstien, the wife of Johannes Baer, was a native of the "Village"

of Ober Muldan Lichtenberg, and in the Landgraviate of Damstadichen." This fact is plainly written in the family Bible of Johannes Baer and is therefore indisputable. Second, Johannes Baer would be much more likely to take as his wife a woman who came from the country of his father and grandfather, than from another country. From the best evidence so far obtained, we conclude that our ancestors, the families of Jacob and Johannes Baer, belonged to the Reformed Church and not to the Mennonite. This we think is pretty certain from the fact that Johannes Baer, in his family record, says that he entered into the state of matrimony, October 26th, 1772, in the town of Lancaster, at the house of Pastor Rev. Charles Lewis Boehme. Hence there can be no doubt but that the Rev. Boehme was the pastor of the family of Jacob Bear. And this fact is confirmed by the statement of Daniel Bare, ninth child of Johannes Baer, who said that his father's family were members of the Reformed Church. We think therefore that the fact is indisputable, that the families of Jacob and Johannes Bear were thus connected with the Reformed Church. But whether Hans Jacob Bear, above mentioned, was our ancestor or not, is not so certain. Yet we are rather inclined to the idea that he was, and as he sailed from Rotterdam, that would indicate that he came from the same Province that his son's wife, Anna Maria Beistien came from, as that would be the proper port for emigrants to sail from, who came from the Palatinate. We therefore conclude that it is not at all probable that Jacob Baer and his ancestors were Mennonites, when we know that he and his family were members of the Reformed Church, at least as early as 1772. And this conclusion is much strengthened by the wellknown fact that denominational lines were drawn much closer one hundred and fifty years ago than at the present time.

It is therefore a well established fact that our ancestors were

a religious people, and their descendants have been a law abiding and home loving people, who generally identified themselves with the churches in the localities in which they lived. The immediate descendants of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer were mostly farmers, as we believe their ancestors were.

We do not believe that our ancestors in their native country belonged to the aristocracy, or to the barons, who held large estates and castles in Germany, but think rather that they were of the common people, as most of their descendants have been. They were of that class that Mr. Lincoln once spoke of, when he said, "The Lord must have loved the common people, or he would not have made so many of them." However many of their descendants have become wealthy and prominent in many walks of life, and this is much more to their credit than if they had been high born and were now descending the scale of good citizenship, instead of advancing, as we believe our people are. In the search for the descendants of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, we have found about 1400 persons scattered over many States. We have made a record of their births and deaths, occupations, church affiliation and present addresses, as far as obtainable. We also have recorded all the history of each person that has been sent us. In many cases we would have been pleased to have given a fuller account of persons than we were able to obtain. We could only record what was sent us, and this fact will account for some records being much more complete than others. The same thing is true in reference to the portraits that have been inserted in the book. Some families have responded much more freely to our request for photographs than others. Our work is now about complete and we submit the same to our subscribers in the hope that the perusal of its pages may prove a pleasant and profitable pastime to all who may be interested in it. Some errors may be found in the book,

but we have labored hard to make it as nearly correct as it was possible to do with the material obtainable.

THE NAME

As to the name, we think the German name of our ancestors was spelled Bär, and this name, we have been informed by a German, who also speaks English, depends for its meaning on whether it is used in speaking of a person or of a beast. To illustrate his meaning, he gave this example: "Henry Bär, while hunting on the mountain, shot a bär. The first Bär being a person's name, would be transcribed into English "Baer," the "ä" in English being "ae." The second bär meaning an animal, would be translated "bear." This corresponds with the translation of our German Bible, which will be referred to further on in this volume.

In the first United States Census, which was taken in 1790, our ancestor, Johannes Baer (Bär) is recorded as John Barr, of Newbury Township, York county, Pa., having the following family: Males of 16 years and upwards, 1; males under 16 years of age, 7; and females including heads of family, 3. This corresponds exactly with our Bible record as to the number of persons. This record, however, would no doubt be the census enumerator's own translation, as he would find Johannes Bär and his family German speaking and German writing people, and would proceed to translate and make his record in English, which we find to be John Barr. However, we have found no record that our ancestor ever wrote his name Barr, but we find in the York county records, that in five different deeds, in which land was conveyed to him, his name was written Behr. These deeds were written between the years 1770 and 1798. And we also find, that in four other deeds, in which property was conveyed to him, his name was written Bear. These last named deeds were written in the years 1781, 1784 and 1785. It may be inferred from this, that Johannes Bär did not write his name in English and that the writers of these deeds made their own translations. We find however, from the records, that the family name was uniformly recorded Bear from the death of the father in 1798 to the year 1826. With these exceptions in a deed, dated April 6th, 1803, "George Bär and Elizabeth, conveyed to John and Catharine Bear, heirs of John Bär, 50 acres of land" and on May 28th, 1820, "one half of 144 acres was conveyed to Daniel Bare." With these exceptions, the records show that at least after the death of Johannes Bär, the spelling for nearly a generation was almost uniformly Bear. That is not only true of our own family, but of other families of the same name, as shown by the county records. The descendants of Johannes Bär at this time spell their names in five different ways, as follows: Bare, Bear, Bair, Baer and Barr. George Bear and his sons, with possibly one exception, continued to spell their name Bear, but some of his later descendants now spell it Bair and Barr. Jacob Bear's name, 1785-1756, appears in the York county records as Bear up to 1826, which is as late as we copied it, but he and Daniel were probably the first to change from Bear to Bare, and their descendants, I think without exception, continue to write it Bare.

John Bear's name appears in the Records as Bear. His name is inserted on his tombstone, John Bare. His son, Jacob M., died in 1843 and is buried in the family grave-yard at Yocumtown. His tombstone reads Jacob M. Bear. John Bear had a son, Abraham. His descendants write their names Baer. Just when Daniel Bare, the sixth son of Johannes Bär began to write his name Bare is uncertain. In the deed referred to above, conveying one-half of 144 acres of land to him in .1820, it was written "Daniel Bare." Benjamin Bear, the seventh and youngest son of Johannes Bär changed from Bear to Bare sometime in the thirties, which his descendants have ever since used. The record shows that after the death of her husband. Anna Maria, wife of Johannes Baer, uniformly wrote her name Mary Bear. In the Census of 1700, there are no names written Bear in Pennsylvania, and but five written Bär. These five all lived in Franklin county. Then follow 12 printed Bare, 12 Bair, 44 Barr, and 95 Bear, showing a large majority at that time favored the latter form of spelling.

THE BAER CEMETERY

The Baer cemetery contains about one-half acre of land, the deed for which is in the hands of Martin E. Bare, of Hummelstown, Pa.

The York County records show that in the year 1793, John Behr, of Newberry Township, with John Neff and John Blough, bought a burial lot, near Shelly's Mill in Newberry Township.

There were two separate deeds made for this cemetery plot. The first one was a conveyance from William Hamersly to John Neff. John Bear and John Plough in trust dated February 16th, 1793, for one-half acre of land, recorded in book O. O. page 426. This deed was not recorded within the time limited by the act of the Assembly. William Hamersly died and willed his farm to his brother, Robert Hamersly, who died intestate and left heirs, Robert and Mary Hamersly, who conveyed it to Adam Kister by courses and distances without making any reserve or exception.

The second deed was from Adam Kister to John Bear, John Hutton and Anthony Yinger, in trust for a burying ground, dated December 10th, 1813, and recorded in book Y. Y., page 406, under date of January 4th, 1814, for as much ground as needed up to one-half acre and their successors, in trust for the purpose of a burying ground for all and every person or persons sect or denomination, whatsoever choosing to make use of the same for that purpose and for no other. This deed was given by Adam Kister to correct the defect in the first deed by reason of it not having been legally recorded.

It will be noted that the first deed, made in 1793, was conveyed in part to John (Johannes) Baer, who died in 1798. Hence the deed made in 1813, was deeded in part to his son, John Baer, 1776-1840.

This burial ground is situated about one-fourth of a mile from Yocumtown, near the road leading from Yocumtown to Newberrytown. It adjoins a fence between two fields, which was about the only fence visible when Mr. Bruce Bare first

visited it. Soon after that discovery was made, a new woven wire fence with locust posts was placed around it. In this cemetery, Johannes Baer and his wife, Anna Maria and at least thirteen of his children and grandchildren are buried.

The following names and dates of births and deaths were taken from the tombstones:

Jacob Bär, born August 29th, 1773, and died May 15th, 1785.

Johannes Baer, born September 29th, 1749 and died Novem-

ber 1st, 1798.

Mary Bear, born June 22nd, 1749 and died May 20th, 1825.

David Bare, born March 5th, 1782 and died May 26th, 1800. Henry Bare, born March 9th, 1775 and died May 8th, 1839. John Bare, born September 6th, 1776 and died January 1st, 1840.

Jacob M. Bear, born April 20th, 1803 and died February 20th, 1843.

Mary Bare, born November 3rd, 1790 and died June 12th, 1844.

Jacob Bare, born July 1st, 1785 and died August 3rd, 1856. B. Bare (son of Benjamin), born May 15th, 1827, died January 23rd, 1832.

Abraham Bare, born September 23rd, 1783 and died Dec-

ember 12th, 1800.

Lydia Bare (daughter Jacob), born June 18th, 1829, and died January 2nd, 1830.

Margaret Bear (daughter Jacob), born April 20th, 1838,

and died December 30th, 1839.

William Henry Bear (son Jacob M.), born September 17th, 1840, and died March 3rd, 1841.

Rebecca Bare (daughter of David), born -----, and died

October 10th, 1851.

The above record was taken from the tombstones in the cemetery. These fifteen names of Baers buried there were all that we were able to decipher, as part of the inscriptions are in German and some so dim that they could not be read. There

are also relatives by marriage buried there. Of these there are Kisters, Schumans and others. This cemetery therefore is largely a family grave-yard and appears to have been used from 1793 to 1856. We do not think that any interments were made since that date. Jacob Bär, the first born of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, is buried in this cemetery, but his death occurred eight years before the cemetery lot was purchased. He was probably buried elsewhere and his remains afterwards removed to this family burial ground.

With a view of having future generations pay due reverence to our dead, we would suggest that some one from one of the later generations living in that community be appointed to look after any repairs necessary to the fence and to keep the grounds in good condition, and that the same person also be the custodian of the deed for the land, with such remuneration as would be right for the services rendered.

EXPLANATION.

The plan of this book is to record the history and biography of each family together, beginning with the oldest, and at the end of the history of each family is placed a summary of all the names in that family, the dates of Births and Deaths, Occupations, Church Affiliations and Present Addresses, as far as obtainable; and, to the Left of Each Name in the summary is placed the Generation to which each one belonged, beginning with Johannes and Anna Maria Baer as the first generation.

We also have aimed to secure as many portraits of our family connection as we could get. We were especially anxious to secure what we could of the older generations. Of these we found five of the second generation, those of George Bear, Jacob Bear, Daniel Bare and Anna (Bare) Miller and Catharine (Mathias) Bare. As far as we were able to learn, these are all of that generation that are in existence. Of the later generation, we have secured something more than one hundred, which have been inserted in our book. They are placed in the family to which they belong. The figure opposite each name denotes the page on which their history will be found.

JOHANNES (1749-1798) AND ANNA MARIA BAER (1749-1825).

A History of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, and Their Descendants.

The descendants of Johannes Baer are fortunate in having preserved his family Bible, in which he has written a plain record of his immediate family. This Bible was printed in Germany at Frankfort on the Main, in the year 1768, and is now in the possession of Mr. Oscar F. Swope, youngest son of Nancy Miller, and Wm. B. Swope. She was the third child of Anna Baer (1789) and Henry Miller. Anna Baer was the tenth child of Johannes and Anna Maria (Mary) Baer.

This record seems to have been written by himself in Germany, and was translated April 8, 1904 by the German teacher of the High School of Harrisburg, Pa., and is as follows:

"I, Johannes Baer, begotten of Jacob Baer, and Barbara, born Schelman in Lancaster County, 1749, entered into the state of matrimony 26th October, 1772, in the town of Lancaster at the house of Pastor Rev. Charles Lewis Boehme. I was married to Anna Maria Beistein. She was born in the village of Obermuldan, Lichtenberg, and in the Landgraviate of Darmstadichen, June 22, 1749, and have by the grace of God begotten with her the following children:

1st. My son Jacob was born 29th August, 1773, and died 15th May, 1785, aged 11 years, 8 months and 15 days.

2nd. My son Heinrich was born 9th March, 1775.

3rd. My son Johannes was born 6th September, 1776.

4th. My son George was born 26th February, 1778.

5th. My daughter Barbara was born 28th September, 1779.

6th. My son David was born 5th March, 1782.

7th. My son Abraham was born 23rd September, 1783.

8th. My son Jacob was born 1st July, 1785.

9th. My son Daniel was born 19th November, 1787.

10th. My daughter Anna was born 31st July, 1789. 11th. My son Benjamin was born 21st February, 1792.

(It will be noted the first child was named for his grand-father, Jacob, and he died, May 15th, 1785, aged 11 years, 8 months and 15 days, and the next child born after his death, July 1, 1785, was also named Jacob.)

The pastor's name was too dim to read, but the following correspondence gave us the pastor's name. August 30, 1908, we received a letter from Rev. J. W. Deshong, of Lancaster, Pa., enclosing a letter from Rev. W. Stewart Cramer, pastor of the First Reformed Church, of Lancaster, Pa., who gives the following from the records of his church: "John Behr, and Anna Maria Beilstein were married by Rev. Charles Lewis Beohme, October 26, 1772."

Johannes Baer, was probably born in Lancaster county, Pa., September 29, 1749, and a few months before he became of age and a little over two years before his marriage, he purchased on June 11, 1770, from Peter Good of Antrin Township, Cumberland County, Pa., two tracts of land, one of 103 acres, and the other 64 acres in Newberry Township, York County, Pa. The name in the deed is written in English, John Behr of Leacock Township, Lancaster County, Pa. The records show that between 1770 and 1790 he purchased four other tracts of land as follows:

April 20, 1781, from James Bane of Yorktown, York County, Pa., 105 acres; June 22, 1784, from Jesse Hayes of Newberry Township, York County, Pa., 50 acres; June 3, 1785, from the same party, 56 acres, 114 P.; April 23rd, 1790, from Edw. Taylor, Newberry Township, 41 A. 104 P. In these four deeds his name is spelled Bear. All these lands adjoined and all were owned by him at the time of his death, which occured, November 1, 1798. His farm was well stocked with horses and cattle, and well provided with farming utensils, and he had about \$4,000 loaned out at interest, showing him to have been a man of considerable means for the time in which he lived. His estate was settled or divided in 1802, his children purchasing the farms as follows, each paying the price fixed by the court.

June 23, 1802, tract No. 1, containing 155 acres, 16 perches, by his son George.

Same date, tract No. 2, containing III acres, 141 perches, by his son Jacob.

Same date, tract No. 3, containing 141 acres, 128 perches, by his son John.

Same date, tract No. 4, containing 16 acres by Philip Berger.

On April, 1803, George sold his farm No. 1 to his brother John, who owned it until his death in 1840. It then went out of the family.

June 23, 1802, John sold his farm No. 3 to George, who sold it the next Spring, April 9th, 1803, to John Blough, Jr., and then moved to near Boalsburg; Center County, Pa.

Jacob owned his farm No. 2, till 1855, about one year before his death.

The following information is taken from the report of Robert C. Bair, Esq., of York, Pa., who made an exhaustive search for information of the records of York and Lancaster counties.

By the will of Mary Bear, widow of John Bear, of Newberry (Mary died in Fairview Township, York County, Pa.) I find she names all of the foregoing as heirs except David and Abraham, who died between the years 1799 and 1801. The will does not mention George, Barbara, Jacob or Benjamin. She names as her executors my two sons, John and Daniel. Witnesses, Samuel Prowell and Isaac Kirk.

The following is an excerpt from York County Court:

"1770 John Behr, of Leacock, bot 103 acres in Newberry of Peter Good, Antrim Township, Cumberland County, Pa. Book D. 258. 1793, John Behr, of Newberry, bought with John Neff and John Blough burial lot near Shelly's Mill, Newberry Township.

1781 April 20, deed of James Bane and Ruth his wife, of York, to John Bear, of Newberry, for tracts in Newberry Township; 105 acres, 53 perches. (This James Bane, in other early deeds is described by himself as of Newberry.)

1784 June 22, deed of Jesse Hayes, and Marjory his wife, to John Bear, 50 acres in Newberry Township.

1785 April 22, Conrad Cox, and Elizabeth Raber, late widow of John Cox, deed for 63 acres in Newberry to John Bear of Newberry.

1785 June 3, Jesse and Marjory Hayes, deed to John Bear for 56 acres, 114 perches in Newberry Township.

1790 John Behr bought 41 acres in Newberry Township from Edw. and Catherine Taylor.

1798 John Behr bought 19 acres in Newberry from Peter Flors.

November 1st, 1798, John Behr died intestate in Newberry. 1799 In Orphan's Court, David Bear, aged 17 years, and Abraham, aged 16 years, minor children of John of Newberry, asked the Court to appoint Emanuel Bear their guardian.

1800 Mary Bear, widow of John of Newberry, asked Court to appoint John Nichols, guardian for her son Daniel, aged 12, and that herself and Jacob Bear (I suppose her deceased husband's brother or cousin), be made guardian for Nancy Anna, aged ten, and Benjamin, aged eight, all of Newberry Township.

1800 Jacob Bear, a minor son of John, of Newberry Township, asks the court to appoint John Nichols his guardian.

1801 December 1, petition of John Bear, second son of John, late of Newberry Township, showed the court that his father John died about three years ago, leaving a widow Mary, and also children, Henry, oldest brother of John, George and Barbara of age and Jacob, Daniel, Anna and Benjamin, minors, under guardians. (David and Abraham are dead.)

1805 Petition prayed, No. 1 tract, 280 acres for himself, and tracts No. 2 and 3 respectively, 11 acres and 18 perches for George Bear, Christian Musser, and Barbara Bear, his wife, eldest daughter and fourth heir of John Bear, late of Newberry Township, execute, quit claim deed to John Blough for 140 acres.

1807 Jacob, Bear, fourth son of John, late of Newberry Township, deceased, takes under writ of partition, tract No. 2 and water rights. The court decreed that Jacob shall pay Henry, John, George, Barbara Musser, Daniel, Nancy Anna and Benjamin 47 pounds each and the widow her dower.

1825 Mary Bear, widow of John Bear, makes her will and dies. The will is dated Fairview Township, December 7, 1824, and probated June 1, 1825. Mary Bear divides her effects among the following children. To Henry and Anna, the widow of Abraham Miller and appoints "My two sons," John and Daniel, executors.

1826 June 6, George Bear and Christian Musser and administrators of Barbara Musser, late Barbara Bear and Jacob Bear, Daniel Bear, Nancy (Anna) Miller and Benjamin Bear, all children of John Bear, late of Newberry Township. Release to John Bear in full for all moneys owing by said John Bear to said heirs.

1826 June 6, Henry Bear, John and George Bear and Christian Musser, administrator of Barbara Musser, deceased. Jacob Bear, Anna Miller and Benjamin, all children of John Bear, late of Newberry, release to Daniel Bear, etc.

1803 John Bear, second son of John, late of Newberry. John Bear of Fairview married, first Catherine Miller, second Barbara Rupp.

1803 April 6, release of Barbara (Bear) Musser to John for 155 acres in Newberry Township. Deed of John and Catherine Bear, his wife, to George Bear, 140 acres in Newberry Township. Deed of George and Elizabeth Bear, his wife, to John and Catherine Bear, 50 acres.

1812 April 15, deed for John and Sarah Taylor to John Bear, 26 acres, tract in Newberry Township.

1820 March 28, deed of John and Barbara Bear, his wife of Fairview to Daniel Bear, of Allen Township, Cumberland County, Pa., one-half of 114 acres, adjoining Jacob Halderman, Samuel Prowell, Esq., Benjamin Bear and other lands of John Bear, it being the same which Christian and Faronice (Varonica) Hursh, did grant to Daniel Bare and Abraham Miller, said Abraham Miller, now deceased, intestate.

1826 June 6, release, of John Bear, George Bear and Christian Musser, administrators of Barbara Musser, to himself, John Bear.

1801 George Bear, third son of John Bear, married Elizabeth Krape December 1, 1801. Petition of George to take tracts No. 2 and 3 of his father John's estate.

1803 April 6, deed of John and Catherine to George, 140 acres in Newberry.

1803 April 6, George Bär and Elizabeth, deed to John and Catherine Bear of Fairview, the heirs of John Bär, 50 acres.

1817 March 3, release of George and Benjamin to John Blough, 141 acres.

1826 Release of George and heirs of John Bear of Newberry, to John Bear.

1826 Release of John, of Newberry, heirs to George Bear.

JOHANNES BAER, 1749-1798.

Johannes Baer, son of Jacob and Barbara Schellman Baer, was probably born in Lancaster county, Pa., September 29th, 1749, and died in York County, November 1st, 1798, aged 49 years, one month and two days. He was buried in the cemetery near Yocumtown, York County, Pa. His wife, Anna Maria Baer, was born in Germany, June 22nd, 1749, and died May 20th, 1825, aged 75 years, 10 months and 28 days. John and Daniel were her executors.

The first born child, Jacob by name, died before he was 12 years old. David died at the age of 18 and Abraham died in the same year, aged 17 years. Henry lived to be 64 years of age, but never married. We therefore have only five sons and two daughters, whose descendants we have been able to trace successfully. These seven children of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer all grew to manhood and womanhood in York County and all married there. George was the first to leave the old Fishing Creek Valley home. He moved to Centre County, Pa., in 1803. John and Jacob both lived and died on parts of the old homestead farm. Anna married Abraham Miller. They lived near the old homestead, until the death of Mr. Miller, which occurred in 1822. About the year 1836, she married Jacob Strominger, who died about 1844. The balance of her life she spent with her son-in-law, Samuel Fortenbaugh, of

Yocumtown, Pa. About 1822, Daniel moved to the Jacob Haldeman farm, on the Susquehanna river, just below New Cumberland, where he lived until 1832, when he moved to Huntingdon County, and was followed by his brother, Benjamin, one year later.

A summary of the Johannes and Anna Maria Baer's family is as follows:

Baer, Jacob, the father of Johannes.

Baer, Barbara (Schellman), the mother of Johannes.

- I Baer, Anna Maria, 1749-1825, wife of Johannes. Reformed.

- 2 Baer, David, 1782-1800, sixth child of Johannes and Anna Maria.


These eight in the Johannes Baer family are not counted in other families.

To enable the descendants to get an idea of the location of the Johannes Baer farms, and of the homes of the families his children intermarried with, and the early churches near, there is printed herewith a map, showing by number the places located by Mr. Samuel F. Prowell. These farms of Johannes were on the main road 9 miles east of Harrisburg and 17 miles west of York.

Newberry was one of the original townships, and a very large one, now very much divided, and was first settled by Quakers from Chester county, who came over from 1734 to 1738, over forty years before our ancestor. Fishing Creek valley was rich, fertile land.

No. 1 and 2 House and mill of Jacob Baer, 1785-1856. Now owned by Samuel F. Prowell, one of the three farms of Johannes, and we think the homestead farm, as there was an old house on this farm, which was torn down about fifty years ago. Another of the three farms, owned soon after his decease by John Ploughman, probably adjoined this on the right. Abraham Miller and wife, Anna Baer, lived in this section, and Benjamin Baer (1792); also from 1816 to 1833.

- 3 Home of John Baer, 1776. One of Johannes farms; now just over the line in Fairview township.
- 4 The large old colonial house on the Kister farm, on which the cemetery is located. This may be the home of the wife of Jacob Baer of Fort Little, Pa. This farm is now owned by Samuel Hykes.
 - 5 Baer cemetery, about 3/8 of mile from Yocumtown.
- 6 Fortenbaugh homestead, was in the family probably 100 years or more; now owned by Mr. Bambarger.
- 7 Peter Mathias' homestead. Part of it in the family now. About 5 miles from "Baers."
- 8 Haldeman farm on Susquehanna river. Daniel Bare (1787) lived there some years.
- 9 Quickel's Church and cemetery at Zion's View (Lutheran) Church records from 1765 to 1833 written in German. Located about 7½ miles from Baer's and 3½ miles from Mathias.'
- 10 Quaker meeting-house, about 1738 to 1811. Sold in the latter year; new one built; see No. 11.
- 11 Quaker meeting-house, present church; since about 1811.





JACOB BAER, 1773-1775.

Jacob Baer, first child of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, was born August 29th, 1773, and died May 15th, 1785, aged 11 years, 8 months and 15 days. It will be observed, that 45 days after the death of this first child, to wit, July 1st, 1785, another son was born to Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, to whom they also gave the name of Jacob. His history, and that of his descendants, will be found in its proper place in this volume.

HENRY BAER, 1775-1839.

Henry Baer, second child of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., March 9th, 1775, and died May 8th, 1839, aged 64 years, I month and 29 days. He never married and he lived with his brother John, and is buried with a number of his brothers and sisters, in the Bare Cemetery, near Yocumtown, York County, Pa. It will be noted, that his brother John, with whom he lived, died less than eight months later.

JOHN BAER, 1776-1840.

History of John Baer and His Descendants.

John Baer, third child of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., September 6, 1776, and died January 1, 1840, aged 63 years, 3 months and 25 days. He lived all his life on the farm formerly owned by his father, and was buried with his parents in the cemetery near Yocumtown, York County, Pa. His first wife was Catherine Miller, with whom he had four sons and two daughters. She died in 1825. His second wife was a widow. Her name was Barbara Rupp. He had no children to his second wife.

The country road was the dividing line between Newberry and Fairview Townships, and his land lay in both townships. John Baer and his wife were both members of the Church of the Brethren. This information as to their church relations was given in a letter dated September 20th, 1908, by Mary Myers, 1643 Susquehanna street, Harrisburg, Pa.

The names of the children of John and Catherine Baer were as follows:

Samuel, Jacob M., Martin, Abraham, Mary, Elizabeth.

Samuel Baer, first child of John and Catherine Baer, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa.

Jacob M. Bear, second child of John and Catherine Baer, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., December 21st, 1803. He was married to Effinda Dunn, February 19th, 1829. She was born April 9th, 1809. Jacob M. Bear lived and died on the same farm that his father, John Baer, lived and died on. Jacob M. Bear died February 20th, 1843, and was buried in the cemetery near Yocumtown, York County, Pa. He and Jacob Kirk were the administrators of his father's estate. This farm of 184 acres was sold April 1st, 1844, to Samuel Miller. They had the following children:

Alfred, Catherine, Darius, Harrison, Margaret Ann, William Henry, John Thomas.

Alfred Bear, first child of Jacob M. and Effinda Bear, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., February 17th, 1830, and died in Schuylkill County, Pa. He was a cigar manufacturer, and was married to a Connecticut lady, name unknown. They had three children, all living in the State of Massachusetts. One daughter, Katie Bear, married to Mr. Lyones, is living in Massachusetts, but her address, as well as the names and addresses of the two sons have not been ascertained.

Catherine, Bear, second child of Jacob M. and Effinda Bear, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., March 30th, 1832, and died December 13th, 1898, aged 66 years. She was a member of the Presbyterian Church at Bellville, Pa. She was married to George W. Dunmire, who was born March 2, 1831, and died June 4, 1902, aged 72 years. They lived in Kishacoquillas Valley, Mifflin County, Pa., on the road leading from Reedsville to Belleville. Mr. Dunmire was a blacksmith by trade and was highly respected by his friends. (Effinda Baer came to live with them after her second husband's death.) They attended the Presbyterian Church at Belleville. They had the following children:

Eathalinda, Clara Emma, Mary Margaret, Georgiana, Effinda Elsie, Alfred, William Henry, George Elmer.

Eathalinda Dunmire, first child of George W. and Catherine Dunmire, was born June 27th, 1853, and died August 3rd, 1853, aged 2 months.

Clara Emma Dunmire, second child of George W. and Catherine Dunmire, was born November 17th, 1854, and died April 27th, 1856, aged over 2 years.

Mary Margaret Dunmire, third child of George W. and Catherine Dunmire, was born April 26, 1856, and died August 29, 1856, aged 4 months.

Georgiana Dunmire, fourth child of George W. and Catherine Dunmire, was born April 16, 1858, and died July 4th, 1858, aged 3 months.

Effinda Elsie Dunmire, fifth child of George W. and Cather-(3)

ine Dunmire, was born three miles from Reedsville, in Kishacoquillas Valley, Mifflin County, Pa., November 2nd, 1859. She was married to William D. Aikins. They live at Reedsville, Pa., and have three children: George M., Emma May and Mary Catherine. William D. Aikins died at his home in Reedsville, June 26th, 1908, and is buried in the cemetery on the hill near Reedsville, Pa. Effinda Elsie (Dunmire) Aitkins is a member of the Presbyterian Church of Reedsville, Pa.

Alfred Dunmire, sixth child of George W. and Catherine Dunmire, was born November 16th, 1860, and died April 16th, 1902, aged 42 years. Was at the time of his death foreman in yards of the Kansas City and Southern Railway Co. He met his death by a pistol, fired by the hand of a drunken man, whose boy had been discharged some days previously by Mr. Dunmire. He left a wife and little daughter, who, as far as we know, reside in Texas. Mr. Dunmire married a lady from Fort Worth, Texas. He had been a railroad man for many years.


William Henry Dunmire, seventh child of George W. and Catherine Dunmire, was born September 21st, 1862, and died October 20th, 1862, aged 2 months.

George Elmer, eighth child of George W. and Catherine Dunmire, was born in Kishacoquillas Valley, near White Hall, three miles from Reedsville, April 14th, 1863. He is married to Carrie Mae Stewart, of Ridgeway, Pa. They have no children at this time, 1908. Mr. Dunmire is the representative of Hollingshead & Campbell, bankers, of New York City. They live in Tyrone, Pa. They are identified with the Episcopal Church, Mrs. Dunmire being a member of that church.

Darius Baer, third child of Jacob M. and Effinda Baer, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., January 3rd, 1834. He was married to Miss Nancy Harvey, of Connecticut. He was a cigar manufacturer by occupation. They had four children:

Alfred N. Baer, unmarried, is living in Philadelphia.

Josephine G. was born November 30th, 1859. She was married to Mr. George G. Richard, and lives in New York City.

They have no children. He is a Methodist, and she is a member of the Episcopal Church.

Winfield Scott Baer was born April 20th, 1861. He is a clergyman in the Protestant Episcopal Church. He was educated at the Philadelphia Divinity School, and was ordained to the ministry in 1889. He has served the following churches as rector: St. Mark's Church, Honeybrook, Pa.; St. Martin's Church, Radnor, Pa.; Grace Church, Sandusky, Ohio, and St. George's Church, Brooklyn, N. Y., of which he is the present honored rector. He was married to Anna A. White, of Philadelphia, Pa. They have the following children:

Allison Harvey Baer, born January 27th, 1885.

Louis Baer, born June 2nd, 1889.

William Whitaker Baer, born January 25th, 1898.

Rhoda Love Baer, born June 14th, 1899.

Nancy Baer, fourth child of Darius and Nancy Baer, died in infancy.

Darius Baer died in 1867, and his wife died in 1864.

Harrison Bear, fourth child of Jacob M. and Effinda Bear, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., April 8th, 1836, and died during the War of the Rebellion, in the army, having been confined to a Confederate prison. He was unmarried.

Margaret Ann Bear, fifth child of Jacob M. and Effinda Bear, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., April 20th, 1838, and died on December 3rd, 1839.

William Henry Bear, sixth child of Jacob M. and Effinda Bear, was born in York County, Pa., September 17th, 1840; and died March 3rd, 1841.

John Thomas Bear, seventh child of Jacob M. and Effinda Bear, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., March 8th, 1842, and died in Philadelphia about 1899. He, too, was a soldier in the Union Army and had also been incarcerated in a Confederate prison. When he was ten years old he went to live with his aunt and uncle, Mary and John Armon, in Huntingdon County, Pa., and remained with them until he became of age.

He was married to Miss Rosalie Rainey, of Philadelphia. They had two sons, Grant Bear and George Bear. Grant Bear lives in Camden, N. J., and George Bear, in Illinois. Address not ascertained.

Effinda (Dunn) Bear, after the death of her first husband, Jacob M. Bear, married David Bear, third child of George Bear, a cousin of Jacob M. Bear, of Rebersburg, Center County, Pa.

Martin Baer, third child of John and Catharine (Miller) Bare, was born in Newberry Township, York County, July 5th, 1805. When a young man he came to visit his Uncle George Baer, then living at Rebersburg, Pa. He secured work in a grist mill, owned by Jacob Wolf, where he worked for some time. After that he taught school for a few terms and then engaged in the mercantile business, in which he continued until his death, which occurred, probably in the year 1836. He died suddenly and was buried in the cemetery at Rebersburg, Pa. He had married Maria Gramley, with whom he had one child, a daughter, Mary A. Bare, who was born November 4th, 1832.

After the death of Martin Baer, his widow and little daughter, Mary A. Bare, went back to York County, and remained there with relatives about six months, after which they returned to Rebersburg, Pa. Finally the widow married Henry Mark and soon afterwards, moved to Venango County, Pa., and a few years later moved to the State of Minnesota.

Henry and Maria Mark had three children, Adam and William, and a daughter who died in infancy. Adam Mark is living at Harmony, Minn., and William lives in Iowa. Mrs. Mark died some years later in Iowa.

Mary A. Bare, the only child of Martin and Maria Bare, married Robert B. Neely, October 31st, 1847. They had the following children:

Mary Jane, Louisa Ellen, John Martin, Margaret Ann, Joseph Bare, Martha Maria, Robert Crawford, Sara Lillian, Emma Celesta, Mildred Elizabeth, Samuel Edgar, Eva May, Ina Belle, James Madison, Wilson Andrew.

Mary Jane Neely, first child of Robert and Mary A. Neely,

was born August 5th, 1848. She is unmarried and lives with her father, Robert B. Neely and is a member of the Methodist Church.

Louisa Ellen Neely, second child of Robert B. and Mary A. Neely, was born November 6th, 1849. She married Frederick Fisher. They had two children, Effie Jane Fisher and Walter Fisher. Both of these children are dead, as is also their father, Frederick Fisher. The family were Methodists. After the death of Mr. Fisher, his widow married Jacob Rapp. They live at Cranberry, Pa.

John Martin Neely, third child of Robert and Mary A. Neely, was born June 29th, 1851. He married Susan Alexander. They had the following children:

Alice Lena, Ethel Grace, Archie Leroy and Ada.

Alice Lena, first child of John and Susan Neely, married John Fuller. They had two children. Claire Fuller and Carl Fuller.

Ethel Grace Neely, second child of John and Susan Neely, was married to Plummer Weikal. They had two children:

Thelma Weikal and Leon Weikal.

John Martin Neely's address is Franklin, Pa. They are farmers and belong to the Methodist Church.

Margaret Ann Neely, fourth child of Robert and Mary A. Neely, was born July 12th, 1853. She married Joseph Lesh. They had the following children:

Edgar, Lura, Myrta, Clinton, Walter, Bessie, Edith and Alice.

Edith and Alice died in infancy. Margaret Neely Lesh died January 2nd, 1908.

Edgar Lesh, first child of Joseph and Margaret Lesh, is a professor in the high school at Sunville, Pa. He is a Methodist.

Margaret Lesh married Frederick Hoover. They had the following children: Edith Hoover and Arthur Hoover.

Myrta Lesh married Lawrence Goodwin. They had one child, Vera Goodwin.

Clinton Lesh married Lois Brown. They had three children. Mildred Lesh, Margaret Lesh and Ruth Lesh. They are farmers and members of the M. E. church.

Joseph Bare Neely, fifth child of Robert and Mary A. Neely, was born April 3rd, 1855. He married Amanda Everett. They had seven children, as follows:

Guy Neely, Mabel Neely, Burton Neely, Gordon Neely, Frederick Neely, Austa Neely and Esther Neely.

Joseph Bare Neely died July 13th, 1907. His family were Methodists and he was a farmer.

Guy Neely married Lucy Kean. They had one son, Theodore Neely.

Martha Maria Neely, sixth child of Robert B. and Mary A. Neely, was born March 29th, 1857. She married David Weikal. They had one child, Elmer Weikal. They are farmers and belong to the M. E. Church.

It would probably be of interest to our readers to learn how we obtained the history of Martin Baer and his descendants. On November 8th, 1909, we issued a circular letter on which we placed a foot-note, which reads as follows:

"We have now pretty definite information of all the different families, except two sons of John Baer, 1776-1840. These are Martin Baer, who it is said moved to Western Pennsylvania, and Samuel Baer, who moved to Ohio first, and afterwards went farther west, and is said to have been killed by the Indians. Persons having any additional information of these men will kindly send it to us."

We received but one answer to this inquiry, that gave us any information. That came to us from Mrs. Maria Deshler of Aaronsburg, Pa. She wrote under date of November 18th, 1909. that she had heard her mother, Elizabeth (Bare) Jordan, tell of a young cousin, by the name of Martin Baer, who came from York County, to visit his Uncle, George Bear. He took work in that neighborhood, but after some time took sick and died, and was buried in the cemetery at Rebersburg, Pa. After receiving this information, we corresponded with Mr. A. N. Corman, of Rebersburg, Pa., who examined the cemetery, but could find no tomb-stone over his grave, nor any record of his burial there; but, from quite an old gentleman, he learned that the widow of one Martin Baer had married a man by the name of Henry Mark, who soon after their marriage, moved to Venango County, Pa., and that their son, Frank Mark, had at one time been a Commissioner of that county. With this information in hand, we wrote to the Clerk of the Commissioner's, who replied, that no person of that name had ever been a commissioner of that county, but that Mr. C. S. Mark, of Polk, Pa., had at one time been sheriff of the county. To him we next wrote and obtained the following information: that he was a nephew of Colonel Henry Mark, who had moved to Iowa in 1855 or 1856. He further stated that Henry Mark had two sons and they also raised a girl, who may have been a daughter of Mrs. Marks by her former husband. She married Robert Neely, whose address Mr. Mark gave us. We had at last found the right source of information and we immediately began a correspondence with Mr. Neely, with the result that we have found the names of 78 additional persons to be added to the family of John Baer, 1776-1840, as given in the foregoing pages.

GEORGE BEAR, 1778-1858.

A History of George Bear and His Descendants.

George Bear, fourth child of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, was born in Lancaster County, Pa., February 26th, 1778, and died in Rebersburg, Center County, Pa., December 31st, 1858, aged 81 years. First married Elizabeth Krape, of York County, Pa., December 2nd, 1800. She was born June 12th, 1778, and died December 10th, 1832, aged 54 years, 5 months and 28 days. The second wife was the widow of John Gramley, whom he married June 21st, 1834. She died August 29th, 1865, aged 78 years, 5 months and 6 days. Her maiden name was Royer. He had no children with his second wife.

The above record was taken from the family Bible of George Bear, originally written in his own hand, as per letter of W. H. Corman, July 13th, 1908. This Bible is now in the hands of Ellen J. Corman, of Rebersburg, Pa.

George Bear and his family were members of the Reformed Church.

Under date of May 8th, 1908, W. H. Corman wrote me that his grandfather invariably wrote his name Bear, and so did his two sons, Adam and William, but Adam's son, William J., writes his name Bair. Mr. Corman says he knows no reason why, nor when he made the change.

Under date of June 30th, 1908, Maria (Jordan) Deshler writes of her grandfather, George Bear: "He was a dear, kind, old man, whom I loved dearly, so very even tempered. When I was a child I would hang about him, he was so kind." She also says in the same letter, "He and his whole house were Reformed Church people," and adds, "My parents (Jordans) and all their house, were members of the Reformed Church.

In the Spring of 1803, he purchased a farm near Rebersburg, from Christopher Spangler. He at once moved on to this farm, cleared it out, and lived on it, and in Rebersburg the bal-

ance of his life. He was a Justice of the Peace there for many years. He was a man of sound judgment and of sterling integrity. Hence, but few appeals were taken from his docket to a higher court. The local newspaper, at the time of his death, spoke of him in part as follows: "In the decease of Esquire Bear, the people of the community have lost a worthy and benevolent citizen, the Church a veteran and devoted member and humanity a faithful and generous friend." His descendants, which are many, may well revere and honor his memory. His large family nearly all lived on farms in that vicinity. The families were generally allied with the Reformed and Lutheran Churches.

George and Elizabeth (Krape) Bear had ten children, as follows:

John, Catherine, David, Elizabeth, Jacob, William, Adam, Anna Mary, Rachel, Anna.

John Bear, first child of George and Elizabeth Krape Bear, was born in York County, Pa., June 18th, 1801. He married Elizabeth Runkle, who lived near Center Hall, Center County, Pa. John "Bear died January 10th, 1852, and was buried at Heckman's Cemetery, near Penn Hall, Pa. His wife, Elizabeth, died and was buried in the same cemetery with her husband. They had the following children:

John R. Bear, first child of John and Elizabeth Runkle Bear, was born in Center County, Pa., April 15, 1824, and died at Dakota, Ill., December 18, 1890. He was a merchant, and also worked in a woolen factory. He moved to Illinois in 1885. He married Julia Swinehart. They had several children. Only one, however, grew up to womanhood, namely, Lizzie M. Bair. She was born April 19th, 1853, and was married to Dr. David H. Mingle, who was a graduate of Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, of the class of 1871. Address, Maxwell, Iowa.

They had the following children:

Bessie M. Mingle, born September 29th, 1875.

James B. Mingle, born December 27th, 1876; died July 13th, 1905.

John H. Mingle, born November 3rd, 1878. David Claude Mingle, born July 2, 1880. Kate J. E. Mingle, born July 11th, 1883. William T. Mingle, born March 13th, 1886. Mayme A. Mingle, born May 19th, 1888. Lizzie M. Mingle, born August 1st, 1890.

Catherine Bear, second child of George and Elizabeth Krape Bear, was born near Rebersburg, Center County, Pa., July 27th, 1803, and died April 8th, 1864. She married David Mark, and lived in Sugar Valley, Clinton County, Pa. David Mark was born February 3rd, 1797, and died June 6, 1874. They had no children. They were farmers and members of the Evangelical Church.

David Bear, third child of George and Elizabeth Krape Bear, was born near Rebersburg, Pa. He was married first, to Catherine Runkle, a sister of Elizabeth Runkle, wife of John Bear. Soon after her death, he married Effinda, widow of Jacob M. Bear, son of John Bear, of Fairview Township, York County, Pa. (David Bear and Jacob M. Bear were first cousins.) David died soon after his second marriage, and his widow then moved to Kishacoquillas Valley, Mifflin County, Pa., where she died. David is buried at Tusseyville, Center County, Pa.

David Bear had the following children, by his first wife, and these children were born near Boalsburg, Center County, Pa.

Benjamin Franklin, George W. Barr, Susan, Sarah.

Benjamin Franklin Bear, first child of David and Catherine Bear, was born at Tusseyville, Pa., November 25th, 1836, and died January 12th, 1906. He is buried at Tusseyville, Pa. He was married twice, first to Lida McCall, with whom he had the following children:

Claude Vienna, Horace Sheridan and Laura.

Claude Vienna Bear, first child of Franklin and Lida Bear, was born February 5th, 1861. She was married to George A. Henney, March 23, 1887. Mr. Henney is a machinist and lives at 512 Fairview avenue, Butler, Pa. They are members of the Reformed Church. They have the following children:

Sumner D, and Mabel A.

Sumner D. Henney, first child of George and Claude V. Henney was born July 24th, 1888. By occupation he is a drug clerk. He is a member of the Reformed Church.

Mabel A. Henney, second child of George A. and Claude V. Henney, was born September 14th, 1889. She clerks in a grocery store and is a member of the Reformed Church.

Horace Sheriden Bear, second child of Benjamin Franklin and Lida Bear, was born March 21st, 1863. He was married to Lula Davis. They have two children, Temple Bear and William Bear. The dates of their births have not been learned.

Laura Bear, third child of Benjamin Franklin and Lida Bear, was born in 1865. She was married to Mr. Luther Hall, August 29th, 1896. They live at Amlin, Ohio, and have two children, Dorris E. and Grace.

Dorris E. Hall, first child of Luther and Laura Hall, was born February 2nd, 1898, and died August 21st, 1898.

Grace Hall, second child of Laura and Luther Hall, was born July 9th, 1905, and died in infancy.

Benjamin F. Bear was married the second time to Margaret M. Bierly. He was a farmer by occupation. He died January 12th, 1906. He and his family belonged to the Reformed Church. They had the following children:

Catherine E., David Gurney, Emma Jane, Ella Nora, James C., Susan Maud.

Catherine E. Bare, first child of Benjamin F. and Margaret Bear, was born July 28th, 1870. She was married to Felix Lee. They had the following children:

Ray E. and Naomi C.

Ray E. Lee, first child of Felix and Catherine E. Lee, was born March 1st, 1892.

Naomi C. Lee, second child of Felix and Catherine E. Lee, was born July 17th, 1904.

Catherine E. Bear is a member of the Reformed Church and lives in Wilkes-Barre, Pa. Mr. Lee is a salesman.

David Gurney Bear, second child of Benjamin F. and Margaret Bear, was born June 8th, 1872.

Emma Jane Bear, third child of Benjamin F. and Margaret Bear, was born June —, 1874, and died September —, 1875.

Ella Nora Bear, fourth child of Benjamin F. and Margaret Bear, was born October 24th, 1877. She is a domestic. Address, 1008 Columbia avenue, Philadelphia, Pa.

James Calvin Bear, fifth child of Benjamin F. and Margaret Bear, was born July 10th, 1878. He is married to Flora Campbell. They had one child that died in infancy. James C. Bear is engineer for the Page Wire Fence Co. Address, Monessen, Pa. They are Methodists.

Susan Maud Bear, sixth child of Benjamin F. and Margaret Bear, was born November 14th, 1882. She is a domestic. Address, Cleveland, Ohio.

George W. Bear, second child of David and Catherine (Runkle) Bear, was born at Lewistown, Pa., October 13th, 1827. He changed the spelling of his name from Bear to Barr. He was married first to Elizabeth Henry, daughter of James Henry, of Allegheny City, Pa., June 17th, 1856. They had one child, David Franklin, known as Frank.

David Franklin Barr, first child of George W. and Elizabeth Barr, was born April 6th, 1860. He is unmarried and lives at Aspen, Colorado, and is interested in silver mines.

Elizabeth (Henry) Barr died April 16th, 1861.

George W. Barr was married the second time May 3rd, 1864, in Elwood, Kansas, to Miss Lucinda Kelsey. With her he had the following children:

Guy C. Barr, second child of George W. and Lucinda Barr, was born June 2nd, 1869. He graduated from the law department of the Missouri University in June, 1893. He married Mary Henderson, July 1st, 1897. They have one child, George C. Barr, born February 22nd, 1903.

Guy C. Barr is a prominent attorney of St. Joseph, Missouri, with office at 519 Francis street, that city.

George W. Barr was in business the most of his life as a merchant. He and his cousin, John R. Bear, began business at Spring Mills, Pa., and remained there until 1852, when he sold

out and moved to Pittsburg, Pa. Here he was engaged in the lumber business until 1857. Then he removed to Elwood, Kansas, where he began in the retail business, but in 1873 he became a partner in a wholesale grocery house of that city. He was Captain of Company B, of the 9th regiment of Kansas Volunteers, during the Civil War. Mr. Barr was a Republican in politics. He was one of the first County Commissioners of Doniphan County, Kansas, in which capacity he served three terms. In 1860 he was elected Mayor of the city of Elwood, then a larger city than St. Joseph, and in the Fall of 1886, he moved to St. Joseph, Mo., where he died January 26th, 1905, in his 78th year, honored and respected by all who knew him.

Susan Bear, third child of David and Catherine Bear, was born in Mifflin County, Pa., July 16th, 1830. She married George Kline, who was born in Perry County, Pa., July 21, 1822. They had the following children:

David B. and Kittie Maria.

Pa., and her fine mental powers have assimilated through reading and observation, an unusual amount of information. She is highly accomplished and was at one time especially proficient in music. During the last years of her parents' life she gave them the most devoted and watchful care, ministering to their every want, and brightening their hours of pain or weariness with filial love. Her kindness of heart has found a wide field of expression in generous assistance to different charities, and she has done much for the Reformed Church, of which she is a consistent member. Neither is she lacking in business ability. Her management of her father's estate as Executrix, under the will, shows rare tact, discretion and firmness of character. Since her husband's death she has done a great amount of travelling through the Southern as well as Western States, spending the Winter of 1906 in California. She sold out in Knox, Pa., in 1907, and moved to Lock Haven, Pa., her present residence. Her husband, Michael Edick Hess, was born in Herkemier County, N. Y., in 1826. Few men have been better known in Venango-Clarion oil fields for the past thirty years. Mr. Hess is a peculiarly or self-made made from a wee boy. At twelve he did inland commerce on the Erie Canal. At sixteen he was a student at Favettville Academy, N. Y., and was companion of William Cleveland, and often saw his younger brother, Grover, former President of the nation. At eighteen, teaching, etc. For fifteen years he dealt in lumber shipping from Catteraugus County, N. Y., to Pittsburg and Cincinnati, and into Kentucky. Here he saw slavery in its milder form face to face. The Civil War disturbed the lumber trade, which the panic of 1857 had somewhat already

demoralized. Mr. Hess then began oil operations at Mecca, Ohio. In August, 1862, in the call for troops from Ohio, he was the first man to put his name down of those who formed the 105th O. V. I. For a year this regiment met the terrors of Morgan, the raider in Kentucky. Mr. Hess was disabled and honorably discharged. Later he re-enlisted, and was promoted from First Lieutenant to Major, and was in active service until the close of the war.—Venango Vindicator.

Major Hess, of Knox, Pa., whose death was noted in last week's issue, was 77 years of age, when the summons came to him Tuesday evening, February 23rd, 1904, to "come up higher," and his spirit passed out to a new sphere. Mr. Hess was in every way worthy of and prepared for his promotion. It came to him while his physical and mental forces were yet unabated and while his heart, his head and his hands were full of work for the betterment of mankind and the glory of his Creator. As a man of God, it is again true that he "walked with God" in the purposes of his life, "and was not, for God took him." Being an earnest, sincere Christian, faithful in all things, it follows that his home was a type of the heaven it was his purpose to gain. As a citizen, he always stood nobly for those things which would purify and uplift the community and was active in performing conscientiously every duty he owed to the people and gave much time to discharging official obligations entrusted to him. In all the relations of life, his words, his actions and his character contributed to the sum of human good. An honor to his race in his day and generation, he has laid down labor for rest, trial for triumph. In politics he was a Republican. -Clarion Democrat.



BARBARA BAER MUSSER, 1779-1823.

Barbara Baer, the fifth child of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, was born September 28th, 1779, and died November 18th, 1823, aged 44 years, 4 months and 15 days. She was married to Christian Musser, who took out letters of administration to settle up her estate on June 6th, 1826.

Christian Musser was born April 5th, 1771, and died February 15th, 1835, aged 53 years, 10 months and 10 days.

Christian and Barbara Musser had one son, John B. Mosser, born February 4th, 1809, and died April 4th, 1848, aged 39 years and 2 months.

John B. Mosser had two children, Henry and Benjamin.

Henry Mosser, first child of John B. Mosser, was born April 9th, 1838, and died May 16th, 1838, aged 1 month and 7 days.

Benjamin Mosser, second child of John B. Mosser, was born November 22nd, 1846, and died October 22nd, 1847, aged 11 months.

The greater part of the foregoing information was taken from the inscription on tomb-stones in Mt. Olivet Cemetery, New Cumberland, Pa. The remains of this family it is said were removed to this cemetery from an obscure burial place in York County, (probably from the Baer Cemetery).

This appears to be about all the information that we have been able to obtain of the Christian and Barbara (Baer) Musser family, although we have made diligent search for additional facts. We however do not understand that they had no other children, except their son John B. Mosser, nor that John B. had no other children but Henry and Benjamin, who were buried with their father and grandparents at New Cumberland, Pa. On the contrary, we are strongly impressed with the idea that Christian and Barbara (Baer) Musser have other descendants, besides those named, probably a number of them, but we failed to find them up to the time our manuscript was placed in the printer's

hands. We hope however that some reader of our history will be able yet to furnish additional information of this family.

The Mussers or Mossers were among the early settlers of Eastern Pennsylvania. In the census of 1790, we find thirty different families in the three counties of Berks, Lancaster and York. Among the names of the heads of these early families were John, Christian, Peter, Michael, Henry, Daniel and one Benjamin. All familiar names of the later generations.

The Mossers, as they now generally write their name, have been a prominent family for the past two hundred years. Christian Mosser was a native of Berne, Switzerland. His son Henry, of Fairview Township, York County, was a blacksmith, farmer and preacher of the Dunkard Society. He married Susannah Neff, whose father owned the Columbia Ferry, which Washington crossed when Congress was convened at York, and on one occasion, this lady, when a child of ten years, had the honor of sitting on Washington's knee while her mother was preparing breakfast. Henry Mosser's son, Daniel, became a bishop of the Mennonite Reformed church of Lancaster County.

Benjamin Henry Mosser, who was married to Elizabeth Rupley, had three brothers—John, New Cumberland, a farmer; Joseph, a Methodist minister, who removed to Decatur, Ill., and Daniel referred to above, a physician and a bishop of the Mennonite church. Benjamin Henry Mosser had a son, Henry R. Mosser, of New Cumberland, who was a member of the National Whig Convention of 1852, that nominated General Winfield Scott for the Presiedncy. He died in 1859. His son, the Rev. Benjamin Henry Mosser, D. D., is at this time the able District Superintendent of the Juniata District of the Central Pennsylvania Conference of the Methodist church, to whom we are indebted for part of the above information.

DAVID BAER, 1782-1800.

David Baer, sixth child of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, was born in York County, March 5th, 1782, and died May 26th, 1800, aged 18 years, 2 months and 21 days. He was buried in the Baer Cemetery, near Yocumtown, Pa.

ABRAHAM BAER, 1783-1800.

Abraham Baer, seventh child of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, was born in York County, Pa., September 23rd, 1783, and died December 12th, 1800, aged 17 years, 2 months and 9 days. He was buried in the Baer Cemetery, near Yocumtown, Pa. It will be noted that three deaths occurred in this family within less than two years, the father, Johannes Baer, having died November 1st, 1798.

F.

JACOB BARE, 1785-1856.

History of Jacob Bare and His Descendants.

Jacob Bare, eighth child of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer. was born July 1, 1785, in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., and died August 5, 1856, aged 71 years, 1 month and 3 days. He was buried in the family cemetery near Yocumtown, Pa. He was first married to Mary Epply, April 28, 1807, who was born November 3, 1790, and died June 12, 1844. His second wife was Nancy Epply, sister of Mary, who had first been married to a man by the name of Grubb. She was born November 6, 1794, and died January 20, 1874, aged 79 years. He purchased one of the farms owned by his father and lived there all his life. He built the large stone grist mill in 1835, now owned by Samuel F. Prowell (1907). He was a strong man; 5 ft. 11 in. tall, and weighed 200 pounds. Under date of September 20, 1908, Mary Myers, 1643 Susquehanna street, Harrisburg, Pa., writes: "Jacob Bare and wife did not belong to the Dunkard Church, though they attended some of their meetings, there being no other denomination in that locality at that time." In conversation with Jacob S. Bare, York, Pa., at Mechanicsburg, Pa., October 13, 1908, he said that he lived with his grandfather, Jacob Bare, from the age of 5 years till he was grown up, and he always understood that his grandparents belonged to the Dunkard Church. They attended that church and dressed "plain," as is the Dunkard custom, and they dressed him "plain" when a boy.

Jacob Bare and Mary (Eppley) Bare had the following children:

John, Ann (Nancy), George, Jacob E., David, Mary, Elizabeth, Samuel, Lydia, Martin E.

John Bare, first child of Jacob and Mary (Epply) Bare, was born September 8, 1808, in Newberry Township, York County, Pa. He was married to Jane Hoops, May 20, 1830. She was born June 28th, 1807, and died August 4th, 1882. He lived on a

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farm in Cumberland County, Pa. In the forties, or sometime after that, he moved to near Springfield, O., and bought a farm 1½ miles north of New Carlisle, Ohio, on which he lived until his death. He was a powerful man, and weighed about 300 pounds. He died at New Carlisle, O., June 9, 1878. They had two children, neither of them living at this date (1908).

William and Lydia.

William Bare, first child of John and Jane (Hoops) Bare, was born in York County, Pa., June 20th, 1831, and died in Miami County, Ohio, April 16th, 1897, and was buried near New Carlisle, O. At the time of his death he owned three fine farms and had considerable money besides. He bequeathed various sums to relatives and to three different churches, and to cemeteries; in all about ten thousand dollars, and the residue to his wife. She, at the time of her death, was worth \$35,000.00 or \$40,000.00. They lived and dressed very plainly but set an excellent table, and were very hospitable and kind. William Bare's wife's maiden name was Almira Thompson. They were not members of any Church, but frequently attended the Presbyterian, and at one time seriously thought of joining that Church. His wife died January 30th, 1906, and was buried with her husband in the cemetery at New Carlisle, Ohio. She probably had a birth-right membership in the Society of Friends (Quakers) at the time of her marriage. The above information was obtained mostly from Rebecca M. Epply, Troy, Ohio. The following additional information was obtained from C. H. Mills, Grove City, Ohio.

"William Bare committed suicide on Good Friday, 1897. He was a very large man; weighed 365 pounds, and was 5 feet around the waist. Was 6 ft. 2 in. tall and increasing in weight. He visited us about six months before he shot himself, and I never saw a more jolly and good-natured man than he was. He was worth about \$60,000.00 when he died and left the bulk of it to a boy he had raised."

Lydia A. Bare, second child of John and Jane (Hoops) Bare, was born in York County, Pa., December 10th, 1832. She was baptized and joined the Christian Church in 1874 and took

a letter to the Methodist Church, March 5th, 1877. She was married to George W. Brown, October 16th, 1884. They had no children. She died May 3rd, 1900, and was buried at New Carlisle, O. Her husband, George W. Brown, died in 1901.

Ann Nancy Bare, who was called Nancy, the second child of Jacob and Mary (Epply) Bare, was born February 7th, 1810, in Newbury Township, York County. She was married to Jacob Fortenbaugh, November 18th, 1830, who was a brother to Samuel Fortenbaugh, who married Mary E. Miller, a daughter of Anna (Baer) Miller. Mr. and Mrs. Fortenbaugh received a rather unique marriage certificate, which was sent to the writer by Mrs. J. H. Fortenbaugh, and is here inserted:

"This is to certify that on the eighteenth day of November, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and thirty, before me, Mills Hays, Esq., a justice of the peace in and for York County, Jacob Fortenbaugh and Nancy Bare, both of the Township of Newbury, were joined in marriage, each of them being of full age, in witness whereof, as well they the same. Jacob Fortenbaugh and Nancy Bare, she assuming the name of her same husband, as I the said Justice and others the witnesses present have here unto subscribed our names that day and year aforesaid.

Nancy Fortenbaugh, M. Hays, Jacob Fortenbaugh, John D. Kecter, Andrew Fortenbaugh, Peter Fortenbaugh, Samuel Fortenbaugh, Benjamin Bare, William Hoopes. Sidney Hays, Christian K. Fortenbaugh. Jane Bare, Phebe Hoopes.

Jacob Bare, Andrew Burger, Jacob Kaylor, Jacob Bare, John Hays, Peter W. Fortenbaugh, Tacob Bare, Esther Keyler, Mary Miller, Mary Hays, Susan Wolf,

Margaret Kreiger."

Mr. and Mrs. Fortenbaugh, after their marriage, moved to near Dover, York County, Pa., where he worked in a tannery for sometime and also taught school. He sold his property at Dover, and in the Spring of 1848, he moved to Perry County, where he purchased a farm and lived on it until near the close of his life. Mr. Fortenbaugh and his family were members of the Church of God. He was an Elder of the Glen Vale Church of God from its organization to his death. His religious convictions were strong and his life was above reproach. By occupation he was a farmer. In the Spring of 1876 they quit housekeeping and went to live with their son, Jacob H. Fortenbaugh, in Cumberland County, Pa. His wife Nancy died soon after on the 22nd of September, 1876, and was buried at Glen Vale church, Perry County, Pa. Her husband died January 12th, 1880, and was buried beside his wife in Glen Vale cemetery. They had the following children:

Andrew, William, Reuben, David, Jacob Henry.

Andrew Fortenbaugh was born September 2nd, 1831, and died in infancy.

William Fortenbaugh, second child of Jacob and Nancy Fortenbaugh, was born near Dover, York County, Pa., August 15th, 1832, and died in Altoona, 1899, and was buried there. He married Ellen Ceanas. To them were born five boys and three girls, but three of them are now living.

Winfield, Harry, Margaret.

Winfield Fortenbaugh is employed by the P. R. R. Co., and lives at Marysville, Pa. He is married to Clara Smith. He is a member of the Church of God and Sunday-school Superintendent at Marysville. By trade he is a stone-cutter.

Harry Fortenbaugh, son of William and Ellen Fortenbaugh, was born in Perry County, Pa. He is married to Lizzie Miller. He lives at Glen Vale, 3½ miles from Marysville, Pa. He is a farmer and attends the Church of God at Marysville.

Margaret Fortenbaugh, daughter of Wm. and Ellen Fortenbaugh, was born in Perry County, and lives in Chicago, Ill. William Fortenbaugh's first wife died and he was married the second time. To this wife were born two children, Evelyn and Bessie, who probably live in Altoona.

Reuben Fortenbaugh, third child of Jacob and Nancy Bare

Fortenbaugh, was born September 21st, 1834, and died September 14th, 1838.

David Fortenbaugh, fourth child of Jacob and Nancy Bare Fortenbaugh, was born October 16th, 1839, and died in June, 1879. He was buried in Fishing Creek Valley, Perry County, Pa. He married Rebecca Billow. They had two children. Both are dead, as is also his wife. His second wife was Sarah Hyssong, whom he married in 1869. They had three children, Ida, Annie and Edward.

Jacob Henry Fortenbaugh, fifth child of Jacob and Nancy (Bare) Fortenbaugh, was born in York County, near Dover, Pa., January 24th, 1844. He was married to Mary Stakemiller in 1866. They had three children, as follows:

Lizzie Ernest, Catherine Viola, May Claire.

Lizzie Ernest Fortenbaugh, first child of Jacob and Mary Stakemiller Fortenbaugh, was born March 12th, 1870. She was married to B. Reilly Shope, a cabinet-maker. They live in Mechanicsburg, and are members of the Church of God at that place. They have four children:

Frances Lillian, Jacob Kenneth, Miriam Isabel, and Mary Elizabeth.

Frances Lillian Shope, first child of B. Reilly and Lizzie E. Shope, was born April 14th, 1892, and died August 12th, 1909. She is buried on the family plot in the Mechanicsburg Cemetery. She had been a member of the Church of God at Mechanicsburg, for over four years, being converted, baptized and taken into the church by Rev. J. R. Stonesifer, when she was 13 years of age. She was also a member of the graduating class of 1909 of the Mechanicsburg High School and was dearly loved by all her classmates and the school. Frances was of a modest disposition, never making a show of her religion or anything she did, but always willing to do for others. Her intellect was beyond her years and there seemed to be nothing she could not do and do well. At home, in school, Sunday-school, Christian Endeavor and church, she was ever ready to do her best. She lived every day, as though it were her last and was thorough in everything. When only a little child, she took an active interest in Sundayschool and Christian Endeavor Society work. She has served as President, Treasurer and Assistant Superintendent of the Junior C. E. Society and after her conversion she took an active part in all church work. Her pastor, Rev. J. R. Stonesifer, thought that Frances would some time become a foreign missionary, but God ordered it otherwise.

Jacob Kenneth Shope, second child of B. Reilly and Lizzie E. Shope, was born November 20th, 1896.

Miriam Isabel Shope, third child of B. Reilly and Lizzie E. Shope, was born December 31st, 1898.

Mary Elizabeth Shope, fourth child of B. Reilly and Lizzie E. Shope, was born August 19th, 1909.

Katherine Viola Fortenbaugh, second child of Jacob and Mary Stakemiller Fortenbaugh, was born December 5th, 1880. She is married to Lewis W. Shaffer, of Dillsburg, Pa. He is shipping clerk for the D. Wilcox Mfg. Co., of Mechanicsburg, Pa. They are members of the Presbyterian Church of Mechanicsburg, Pa.

May Claire Fortenbaugh, third child of Jacob and Mary Stakemiller Fortenbaugh, was born April 9, 1893. She is at home.

Lewis W. Shaffer has the following children: Nell Henrieta, born November 26th, 1899; Robert Carl, born December 20th, 1901; Dorothy Christine, born January 13th, 1904; Theodore Roosevelt, born March, 1905. The last named child is dead.

Jacob H. Fortenbaugh's address is Mechanicsburg, Pa. He is a farmer and truck raiser. He is a member of the Church of God, of Mechanicsburg, Pa.

George Bare, third child of Jacob and Mary (Epply) Bare, was born in Fishing Creek Valley, York County, Pa., November 6th, 1812. He lived in Newberry Township and died in Newberry Township 1850. He is buried in Nicholas Keister's Cemetery, one mile from Yocumtown, Pa. He was married to Mary——. She was born January 17, 1817, and died December 2, 1895. She was buried in Smoketown Cemetery, York County, Pa. They belonged to the Church of God. They had the following children:

Henderson Bare, first child of George and Mary Bare, was born December 19th, 1834, and died April 3rd, 1884, and is buried in the cemetery at Lewisberry, York County, Pa. He was married to Eliza Ann Wollett, who died January 24, 1904, and buried at Lewisberry, York County, Pa. They had two children, a son and a daughter. The son died in infancy, and the daughter's name is Amanda. She was born at Lewisberry, Pa., November 11th, 1860. She was married to J. A. Shelly, who was born July 31st, 1855. He is a druggist in Mechanicsburg, Pa. Their first child, Walter B. Shelly, was born May 21, 1884, and is a hardware clerk. A second child, Mary A. Shelly, was born April 9, 1891, and died one month later.

Martha Ann Bare, second child of George and Mary Bare, was born March 9th, 1837, and died young. She was buried in Keister's Cemetery, near Yocumtown, Pa.

Mary Elizabeth Bare, third child of George and Mary Bare, was born August 4th, 1841, and died young. She was buried in Keister's Cemetery, near Yocumtown, Pa.

Jane Ann Bare, fourth child of George and Mary Bare, was born November 2nd, 1843, and died at Norfolk, and was buried there. She was married to Moses Curren. They were members of the Catholic Church.

Jacob S. Bare, fifth child of George and Mary Bare, was born January 24th, 1845, and lives in the city of York. He was married to Adaline Flury. They had two daughters, Jemima Estella and Daisy Belle.

Jemima Estella, first daughter of Jacob S. and Adaline Bare, died in infancy.

Daisy Belle Bare, second daughter of Jacob and Adaline Bare, was born December 2nd, 1869. She was married to John Grey Diffenderfer, of Wrightsville, Pa., November 26th, 1890, where they now reside. They have the following children:

Olive Adaline, Pearl Vintant, Mary Vernon, Clyde Bare, Earl Cornelius, Nellie Yale.

Olive Adaline Diffenderfer, first child of John G. and Daisy

Jacob E. Bare, fourth child of Jacob and Mary (Epply) Bare, was born October 22nd, 1815, in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., and died November 24th, 1889, at Fort Littleton, Fulton County, Pa. He was married to Lydia Anne Keister, daughter of Christian Keister. He was a miller by trade and later in life became a merchant, which occupation he followed at Fort Littleton for many years. Lydia Anna (Keister) Bare was born August 5th, 1817, and died January 15th, 1891. Jacob E. Bare was a large and powerful man: weighed 285 pounds. He started to work in his father's grist mill at Yocumtown, York County, Pa., and afterwards moved to Maddensville, Huntingdon County, Pa., where he run a grist mill a number of years, after which he bought a farm near Maddensville. In 1867 he bought a store in Fort Littleton, Fulton County, and in this business he continued the balance of his life. He and his wife, with his sons, Henry K. and John K., are buried in the cemetery at Maddensville, commonly known as Walnut Grove Cemetery. He and his wife were members of the Church of God at Walnut Grove. Pa. He moved from York County to Huntingdon County in the year 1839. They had the following children:



DANIEL BARE, 1787-1869.

Daniel Bare, ninth child of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., November 19th, 1787. He married Elizabeth Mathias, a daughter of Peter Mathias, of York County, Pa., of whom a more extended notice will be found in the history of Benjamin Bare. Elizabeth Mathias was a sister of Catherine Mathias, the wife of Benjamin Bare. She was born in York County, June 14th, 1797, and died at her home in Hickory Bottom, three miles east of Woodbury, Bedford County, Pa., December 29th, 1856, aged 59 years, 6 months and 15 days. She was buried in the Reformed Cemetery at the Reformed Church, one mile east of Woodbury, Pa. Daniel and Elizabeth Bare had the following children:

Peter, Mary Ann, Sarah and Daniel Mathias.

Daniel Bare and his wife Elizabeth, joined the River Brethren Church, about 1839 or 1840, and were consistent and devout members of that church the balance of their lives and died in that faith.

Daniel Bare died in Roaring Spring, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Isaac Bowers, June 18th, 1869, aged 81 years, 6 months and 29 days, and was buried by the side of his wife in the Hickory Bottom Cemetery of the Reformed Church.

Daniel Bare grew to manhood in York County, Pa. He was a strong, healthy man and had a capacity for hard labor much beyond the average man. He was less than five feet, six inches tall, but usually weighed about 165 pounds. His first large investment was in partnership with his brother-in-law, Abraham Miller. They bought a farm containing 144 acres adjoining the lands of John and Benjamin Bear and Samuel Prowell. According to the records, this purchase was made in 1820, soon after the close of the war of 1812-15, when land was considerably inflated in price and proved a very unfortunate investment. They paid about \$80 an acre and they were compelled to sell it at about one-third of the price they paid for it, leaving

them both bankrupt. After that he rented the Jacob Haldeman farm on the banks of the Susquehanna River, just below New Cumberland, Pa., where he lived for eight or nine years, after which he bought a farm in Sinking Valley, Huntingdon County, Pa., now Blair, to which place he moved in 1832, remaining there five years. Then he bought a large tract of land, containing 1,500 acres, at Three Springs, in the southern part of Huntingdon County. After living there four years, in 1841 he moved to Hickory Bottom, three miles east of Woodbury, Bedford County, Pa., where he lived for the following seventeen years. There his family, who were then living, grew to womanhood and manhood and during that time his children were all married and began life for themselves. He was a man of limited education and until he was past sixty years of age he spent most of his time farming, but for the last twenty years of his life he was engaged principally in milling and merchandising. During that time he had owned three different flouring mills. He was naturally inclined to a business life and made a success of it.

After the death of his wife, which occurred in 1856, he made his home with his son, D. M. Bare, until 1863. Then for about a year he lived with his daughter, Mrs, Andrew Spanogle, after which he lived the most of his time with his oldest daughter, Mrs. Isaac Bowers, at Roaring Spring, at whose home he died in 1869, at a ripe old age, honored and respected by all who knew him. He was an enterprising and progressive man, ever ready to help any worthy enterprise that would be a benefit to his community. He was a large stockholder and a director in the Woodbury and Pattonsville Turnpike Company. He also encouraged the building of the Huntingdon and Broad Top Railroad, and held some stock in that company. He was a great friend of the public schools and served at times as School Director. He was a man of very generous impulses and many people came to him for assistance; and, if he did not help them, their cases could be put down as quite untrustworthy. He was naturally kindhearted and sympathetic and quite often was imposed on. If he had faith in a man, he would go to any extreme to help him. An incident related to the writer by the Rev. John H. Wilkinson, of Woodbury, Pa., shortly before Mr. Wilkinson's

death, illustrates this element in his character. At one time Mr. Wilkinson was in need of money and he saw Mr. Bare on the street and asked him if he knew where he could get some. Mr. Bare said: "I haven't got it to spare myself, but have you a blank sheet of paper?" Mr. Wilkinson said he had the paper. "Well then," said Mr. Bare, "write your name on it and I will write mine under yours and you hunt the money and when you find it, write a note over our names for the amount you want." He did so and the money was soon forthcoming. He was also at times rather forgetful or absent-minded. Here is an incident in point. He had taken a trip that had occupied several days, and on his return, the last day of his trip, he stopped at a certain store and made a few small purchases. He took from his pocket-book some small money to pay for his purchases and laid his pocket-book on the counter, but forgot to pick it up again, and did not discover his mistake until he got home. So the next morning bright and early he started back, feeling sure he had left it lay on the store counter. The book contained about \$102, but when he got there the book was "bare" of all but \$2. The merchant said that a boy had found the book on the street in that condition. Comment on the merchant's story is unnecessary.

Peter M. Bare, first child of Daniel and Elizabeth Bare, was born in York County, Pa., November 7th, 1819, and died at Three Springs, Huntingdon County, Pa., January 28th, 1839, aged 19 years, 2 month and 21 days. He is buried in the cemetery, near Saltillo, Huntingdon County, Pa. For some years before his death he was in delicate health, being subject to excessive bleeding of the nose.

Mary Ann Bowers, second child of Daniel and Elizabeth Bare, was born in York County, Pa., September 11th, 1824. She was married to Isaac Bowers, who was struck by a passing train on a railroad near Galesburg, Ill., and instantly killed, September 28th, 1875; at the time of his death he was aged 54 years and 14 days. After their marriage they lived on a farm near Martinsburg, Pa., until the year 1865 or 1866, when they moved to Roaring Spring, Pa. They bought part of the Spang farm and Mr. Bowers became a partner in the new paper mill, then being

erected at that place, in which business he continued until the time of his death. They were devout members of the River Brethren Church. After the death of her husband, Mrs. Bowers built herself a house, into which she moved, and there lived the balance of her days, being a widow twenty-seven years. She was familiarly known as Aunt Mary Ann, and was loved and respected by all who knew her. She died April 28th, 1902, aged 77 years, 7 months and 17 days. She was buried beside her husband in the cemetery at Roaring Spring, Pa. They had the following children:

Lydia Ann, Mary Jane, Sarah Ellen, Frank, and Harriet Bowers.

Lydia Ann Bowers, first child of Isaac and Mary Ann (Bare) Bowers, was born at the Bare homestead on Hickory Bottom, Bedford County, Pa., September 21st, 1844. She married Abram K. Bassler, son of Bishop Andrew Bassler, of the River Brethren Church. They were married October 20th, 1864. They had the following children:

Harvey, Ida, Romer, Laura, Myrtle, Mable and Bessie.

Abram K. Bassler, with his family, moved to Dickinson County, Kansas in the year 1879, where they have since lived and where they own a fine farm and are in good circumstances. They are both members of the River Brethren Church of Dickinson County, Kansas.

A. K. Bassler was born in South Woodbury Township, Bedford County, Pa., February 5th, 1840. His present address is Hope, Kansas, R. F. D. No. 2.

Harvey Bassler, first child of Abram and Lydia Ann Bassler, was born August 2nd, 1865, at Waterside, Bedford County, Pa. He married Ruth Lavette in 1902. They live at 514 Harrison street, Elkhart, Indiana. They have no children. Mr. Bassler is a machinist in the employ of the Great Northern Railroad.

Ida Mary Bassler, second child of Abram and Lydia Ann Bassler, was born July 28th, 1867, near Martinsburg, Pa. She married Franklin Deihl, December 19th, 1894. They live at Tenth and Mulberry streets, Abilene, Kansas. He is a hardware

Mary Jane Bowers, second child of Isaac and Mary Ann Bowers, was born at Hickory Bottom, Bedford County, Pa., November 3rd, 1846. She was married to Christopher Stover, a druggist of Roaring Spring. They afterward moved to Altoona, Pa., where Mr. Stover died. They had one child, Gertrude Irene Stover, who was born April 11th, 1872, and died December 28th, 1878, aged 6 years, 8 months and 17 days. She is buried in the cemetery at Roaring Spring, Pa. Mrs. Stover moved from Altoona to Roaring Spring and for years was engaged in restaurant and ice cream business, in which business she was quite successful. She is now living a retired life and is a member of the Church of God.

Sarah Ellen Bowers, third child of Isaac and Mary Ann (Bare) Bowers, was born near Martinsburg, Pa., July 5th, 1849. Sarah Bare, third child of Daniel and Elizabeth (Mathias) Bare, was born in York County, Pa., October 15th, 1826. She married Andrew Spanogle. They took up housekeeping in April, 1849, on the Bare homestead, near Three Springs, Huntingdon County, Pa., but after three years, returned to Morrison's Cove, where they lived until April, 1865, when they moved to Lewistown, Pa., where they both lived until her death. She was

buried in the new cemetery near Mt. Rock Mill, adjoining Lewistown, Pa.

The subject of this sketch, with her husband, early in life became a member of the Church of the Brethren, of which she was an active, faithful, and honored member the balance of her life and died January 13th, 1907, after a lingering illness, loved and respected by all who knew her.

Elder Andrew Spanogle, her husband, is still living (1910). at the advanced age of 87 years, is enjoying good health, and is honored and respected by all who know him. He is most tenderly cared for by his two daughters, Anna Catherine and Flora, at the old homestead at Lewistown, Pa. Andrew Spanogle was elected a minister of the Church of the Brethren in the year 1870. In this position he has faithfully served his Master and his church all these years, and he still takes an active interest in the prosperity of the church of his choice. He was the originator and prime mover in the establishment of a home for old people. This home was first started at Shirelysburg, Pa., where it continued for some years, but it was his opinion that a better location for this home would be in Morrison's Cove. After some investigation, it was decided to locate it permanently at Martinsburg, Pa., where land was purchased and a suitable and substantial brick building was erected, where it has since continued to prosper under the management of a Board of Directors of which Elder Andrew Spanogle is still the honored President. By occupation, Mr. Spanogle was a farmer. For a number of years, however, he was extensively engaged in the tanning business, and afterwards engaged in the milling business, in which business he still has an interest. To Andrew and Sarah Spanogle were born ten children, named as follows:

Elizabeth Spanogle, first child of Andrew and Sarah (Bare) Spanogle, was born at Three Springs, Huntingdon County, Pa. on the 24th of August, 1849. Her early girlhood was spent in Blair and Bedford counties. When 15 years of age she came with her parents to Lewistown, Pa., where she finished her edu-

Lois Spanogle, second child of Harry and Anna Spanogle, was born at Lewistown, Pa., November 9th, 1906.

Joseph H. Spanogle, third child of Harry A. and Annie Spanogle, was born at Lewistown, Pa., January 11th, 1910.

Harry Spanogle, early in life became a minister of the Church of the Brethren and went to Harrisburg, Pa., as pastor of the church in that city, but his health giving way, he returned to Lewistown, Pa., where he took an interest in the Spanogle-Yeager Milling Company and a responsible position in the Mt. Rock mill. He continues in the active ministeral work and is laboring faithfully for the Master in the pulpit and also in the Sunday-school.

Flora Spanogle, tenth child of Andrew and Sarah (Bare) Spanogle, was born in Lewistown, Pa., February 18th, 1869. She finished her education at the Lewistown Academy, presided over by Prof. Riley. In the Winter of 1907 she, with her father (85 years old), and her sister, Anna Catherine, traveled through California, Colorado, Nebraska, Indian Territory and other States. She is a consistent member of the Church of the Brethren and an active and faithful worker in the Sunday-school, and with her sister, Anna Catherine, attends most lovingly to the wants of her aged father.

Daniel Mathias Bare, fourth child of Daniel and Elizabeth (Mathias) Bare, was born in Sinking Valley, then Huntingdon County, now Blair County, Pa., October 24th, 1834. He married Sarah Eby, of Aughwich Mills, Huntingdon County, Pa., a daughter of George and Susan Eby. Through the kindness of Mr. J. Watson Ellmaker, of Lancaster, Pa., who has made a life study of genealogies, we have been able to give a condensed, but rather complete history of the Eby family, back to their native Switzerland, which is here inserted. In a subsequent letter, Mr. Ellmaker wrote that Theodore Eby was a son of Jacob Eby, who was ordained a Mennonite Bishop in 1683.

Theodore Eby was born in Canton Zwich, Switzerland, on the 25th day of April, 1663. From 1704 to 1715 he lived in the Palatinate, and in the Spring of 1715 he came to America and took up land south of the Conestoga Creek, three miles south of the town of Lancaster. Soon after this, however, he moved twelve miles east and took up a large tract of land on the Mill Creek, near the Welsh mountains.

Theodorus Eby's descendants are now scattered over all parts of the United States. Many have become prominent as ministers of the gospel, others as statesmen, lawyers and physicians and in other walks of life. He with many of his descend-

ants, are awaiting the resurrection morning in many of the family burial grounds in the Mill Creek Valley. He probably died in 1730.

Theodorus Eby was a member of the Mennonite Church as were many of his descendants. He was one of the many Swiss Mennonite emigrants who came to America, and who left Switzerland on account of religious persecution. Theodorus Eby's family were all born in the Canton Zwich, Switzerland. He had five sons and one daughter, as follows

Hans, Jacob, Peter, Christian, David and Elizabeth.

Christian Eby married Elizabeth Mayer and Elizabeth Eby married John Bear, a son of John Henry Bear, who settled on the Mill Creek, one mile east of Theodorus Eby's.

Peter Eby was born in 1690, and all of Peter Eby's children were born in Leacock Township, Lancaster County, Pa. Peter Eby had a son, Jacob Eby, whose children were also born in Leacock Township, Lancaster County, Pa., near Zettenrich's church, and Jacob Eby had a son, Benjamin, who was born in 1761. Benjamin Eby married Miss Bear, with whom he had the following children:

Joel, Susannah, Henry, Jacob, George, John Benjamin and Sarah.

These children were all born in Leacock Township, Lancaster County, Pa.

Joel Eby was married to Elizabeth Grush. They had twelve sons and six daughters.

Benjamin Eby's son George was born December 2nd, 1795, and was married to Susannah Lutz, who was born May 2nd, 1795.

George Eby and his wife, Susannah, had the following children:

Jacob, born 1820. Nancy, born 1822. Samuel, born 1824. George, born 1827. Catherine, born 1830. John, born 1832.

Sarah, born September 28th, 1835.

Five of these children were born in Franklin County, Pa., and two in Huntingdon County. Jacob never married. Nancy married Dutton Madden. Samuel married Catherine Morrison. George married Nancy Myton. Catherine married David Bowman. John married Seneretta Holiday and Sarah married D. M. Bare.

Daniel M. and Sarah (Eby) Bare had the following children:

Clara Susan, Ella, Ina, Anna.

Daniel M. Bare was born in Sinking Valley, then Huntingdon, but now Blair County, Pa. In the Spring of 1841 his parents moved to Morrison's Cove, where he grew to manhood at the old homestead on Hickory Bottom, three miles east of Woodbury, Bedford County, Pa., working on the farm until one year after he was married. He also taught school four terms, while living there. In 1858 he moved to Waterside and two years later to Loysburg, Bedford County, Pa., where he lived four years, after which early in January, 1864, he moved to Roaring Spring, Blair County, Pa., where he has ever since made his home. He has been interested in flour mills and in the milling business since 1858. He owns the Roaring Spring mill, but has had it rented for some years past. In the year 1865, he entered into partnership with John Eby, John S. Morrison and Isaac Bowers to engage in the manufacture of paper. A small mill was erected at Roaring Spring and started in 1866 at which place . the manufacture of paper has continued ever since. He has also been engaged in general merchandising most of these years. At present (1010) he is President of The D. M. Bare Paper Company, and also President of the Roaring Spring Bank. In politics he has been a Republican the most of his life, but for some years past has given much more attention to the temperance cause than to any other phase of politics, working mostly with the Anti-Saloon League, believing that the temperance question is by far the most important question now before the American people. He never belonged to any secret order. He served as



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Justice of the Peace, school director and a member of the town council. He has been a member of the Church of God at Roaring Spring for nearly forty years and an elder of the church for nearly that long. He was a member of the Board of Publication of their church literature for twenty-four years and for eight years was a member of the Board of Trustees of Findlay College, conducted under the auspices of the Church of God at Findlay, Ohio. He is now in his 76th year and during the past two years he has spent considerable time in collecting data for a history of the Bare family, which he hopes to complete within the next few weeks from this writing, January 24th, 1910.

Clara Susan Bare, first child of Daniel M. and Sarah (Eby) Bare, was born at Waterside, Bedford County, Pa., April 22nd, 1858. She attended the public schools and completed her education at Grier's Seminary, Birmingham, Pa.

She married Edwin G. Bobb, son of Alexander and Matilda Mattern Bobb. His father, Alexander Bobb, had rather a remarkable war record. It was the 9th day of April, 1861, when the Confederates opened fire on Fort Sumter and on the 30th day of the same month, Alexander Bobb was mustered into the United States service at Harrisburg, Pa., as captain of Company I, 14th Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers. This regiment was placed under the command of General Patterson, who crossed the Potomac into Virginia, July 2nd, and was in service there until the time of his enlistment expired. He was mustered out of service at Harrisburg, August 7th, and on August 14th, same year, he re-enlisted at Hopewell, Pa., in the nine-months' service, as captain of Company C, 133rd Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers. This regiment saw hard service, having been prominently engaged in both the hard fought battles of Fredericksburg and of Chancellorsville. In the battle of Fredericksburg alone it lost 173 men in killed, wounded, and missing. After this term of service had expired, he enlisted again, September 2nd, 1864, for one year, or during the war, in Company H, 208th Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers. This regiment was engaged in the different hard fought battles in front of Petersburg and remained in service until the close of the war. For meritorious service, Captain Alexander Bobb was promoted to major September 7th, 1864, and to lieutenant-colonel April 2nd, 1865. In civil life he has held the offices of constable, school director, councilman, Justice of the Peace, and high sheriff of Blair County, Pa. He was born in York County, March 28th, 1823, and was married February 18th, 1845.

Clara S. Bobb was converted and became a member of the Church of God at Roaring Spring when she was 14 years of age. She has been a consistant and active member of that church ever since. She became a teacher in the Sunday-school at the age of 16, and has continued in that work all these years. For the past fifteen years she has been the enthusiastic teacher of the primary class of that school.

Edwin G. and Clara S. Bobb had the following children: Ralph Daniel and Chester Alexander.

Edwin G. Bobb completed his education at Washington College, Cannonsburg, Pa. He was engaged in the foundry business at Roaring Spring, Pa., for a few years, after which he took a position with the D. M. Bare Paper Company, and for the past ten years has been its general manager. He is also the treasurer of that company. He is also the president of the Roaring Spring Blank Book Company, and the vice president of the Roaring Spring Bank.

Ralph Daniel Bobb, first child of Clara S. and Edwin G. Bobb, was born in Roaring Spring, Pa., October 24th, 1885. He was an amiable and promising boy. He was a graduate of the Roaring Spring High School of the class of 1902. He then went to Juniata College, at Huntingdon, Pa., one year. The next year he went to the Mercersburg Academy, which he attended two years, when he graduated in the class of 1905. The following year he went to Cornell University, expecting to take a four years' course in mechanical engineering. His health, however, gave way near the close of his first year, but he returned to the university at the opening of the term of 1906, apparently in fair health, and began his sophomore year course. His health, however, gave way again, so that he was compelled to leave the university again, never to return to take up his studies. He





placed himself under the care of Dr. Wilson, of Philadelphia, who failed to arrest the disease, but later in the Summer of 1907, advised him to go to a mild climate. With the hope of saving Ralph's life, his parents, with their family, started to San Antonio, Texas, on September 30th, 1907. They remained there until his death, which occurred November 28th, 1907, from valvular heart trouble. The attached clippings will give some estimate of the beautiful life of this young man.

RALPH D. BOBB SUCCUMBS.

Death of Popular Young Man Casts Gloom Over Community.

One of the saddest occurrences in Roaring Spring was the untimely death of Ralph Daniel Bobb, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Bobb, which took place at San Antonio, Texas, Thursday morning, November 28th, whither he had gone with his parents for the recuperation of his health nine weeks ago.

Ralph Bobb had been in ill health for several months, although it was not considered serious, and at the advice of several specialists, of Philadelphia and New York, he went to San Antonio, where the mild climate is conducive to bring health to the indisposed. During his stay there the congenial climate was apparently doing all that had been expected, and he was slowly recovering, until last Thursday morning, when he suffered an acute attack of heart failure, from which he never recovered, but in one brief hour his spirit took its departure to the eternal world. On Friday morning, November 29th, his father and mother and brother started with the remains on the long, sad homeward journey of over two thousand miles, arriving here on a special train at 11:30 a. m. Monday.

The funeral services were held Tuesday morning at the home of his parents in the presence of a large concourse of people, conducted by Rev. George Sigler, D. D., pastor of the Church of God, assisted by Rev. J. H. Price, of the M. E. Church, Rev. Charles Keller, of the Lutheran Church, and Rev. C. H. Grove, a former pastor, now of Mt. Joy. Nearly every family in the town

was represented at the services, besides many persons from Hollidaysburg, Altoona, Lewistown, Reedsville, Everett, Huntingdon, Tyrone, and one of his college chums from Chicago.

The floral tributes were magnificent, notable among the many was one sent by the Beta Theta Pi fraternity, of Cornell University, which fraternity also sent a representative to the funeral in the person of Mr. Lawrence Hallberg, of Chicago, Ill. A strange coincidence at this service was the presence of the last survivor of three chums and room-mates. These three were Messrs. Herbert Jamison, of Chicago, Ralph Bobb, and Lawrence Hallberg, of Chicago. The former died just before Mr. Bobb started for San Antonio, and now the only surviving member attended the funeral of the second.

Mr. Bobb was born in Roaring Spring, October 24, 1885. He attended the public schools, and graduated with honors from the high school in May, 1902. In the Fall of 1902 he attended the Mercersburg Seminary, from which he graduated with honor and great credit in the Summer of 1904. During this term he made one of the best records in his studies and also in athletics, capturing no less than seven valuable prizes, one of them being a gold medal. In the Fall of 1904 he took up the course of mechanical engineering at Cornell University, and was making an admirable record of his course, until the Spring of 1907, when under the strain of severe application, he broke down his health, from which, notwithstanding the best care and medical treatment, he did not recover.

Ralph Bobb was a young man of splendid character. He was kind, genial and affectionate. He made hosts of friends everywhere. No one in his home community was more loved and respected. He did not seem to have an enemy. Old and young, rich and poor—all classes, were treated kindly and courteously, and were drawn instinctively towards him, and everyone spoke well of him. In his seminary and college courses he readily made hosts of friends, and won the hearts of the students, as well as the faculty, by his genial, sunshiny disposition. He possessed the sterling qualities of true American manhood, which win its way everywhere where force and beauty and strength of char-

atcer are recognized. He became a member of the Church of God about five years ago, and was a member also of the young men's Bible class for more than ten years, in the same church, in which relations he was held in the highest esteem. The members of his class presented his family with a beautiful floral tribute in his honor, and attended the funeral in a body.

The family have the profound sympathy of the whole community in their great affliction.

> "Not changed but glorified!" O beauteous thought For those who weep.

Mourning the loss of the dear face departed, Fallen asleep!

Hushed into silence, never more to comfort The heart of men.

Gone like the sunshine of another country Beyond our ken,

How will it look, the face that we have cherished, When next we meet?

Will it be changed—so glorified and saintly
That we shall know it not?

FUNERAL OF RALPH BOBB.

Mr. and Mrs. Edward G. Bobb and their son, Chester, accompanying the remains of their son, Ralph, who died suddenly in San Antonio, Texas, on Thanksgiving Day, as mentioned in last week's Ripples, arrived here shortly after 10 o'clock on Monday morning, by special train from Altoona.

The funeral of that highly esteemed and very popular young man, took place on Tuesday at 10.30 a. m., the services being conducted at his late home, which was crowded with relatives and friends—some from Washington, D. C., Cornell University, Everett, Huntingdon, Hollidaysburg, Tyrone, Martinsburg, Altoona, and New York City. The principal sermon for the occasion was preached by Rev. C. H. Grove, who until a month ago, had been for nine years pastor of the Church of God here, of which Mr. Bobb was a faithful member. Although very deeply affected by his death, his former pastor's sermon was very able and appropriate, as were the brief discourses of Rev. J. H. Price, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and Rev. Dr. Sigler, pastor of the Church of God, who assisted in the services. The Scripture lesson was read by Rev. Dr. Keller, of the Lutheran Church. The floral offerings from his Sunday-school class, relatives and friends were very beautiful and abundant.

His remains were laid to rest in a specially prepared grave in Greenlawn cemetery at this place.

As stated in our letter last week, Mr. Bobb's death is a most sad bereavement to his devoted parents and to his aged grand-parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Bare, of this place, and Major and Mrs. Alexander Bobb, of Martinsburg, with whom the deceased was a favorite grandson.

Of him it could be truthfully said that he had no enemies, because he was entirely unselfish and never thought it a hardship to forego a pleasure for others or to go out of his way to do some one a favor. He was ever watchful of opportunities to help the needy and the principles of the Golden Rule dominated his life. He so lived that when his summons came at 22 years of age he was ready to go. That one so noble and promising should be called away seems a mystery to us, but there is abundant comfort in the fact that by and by we shall see that God knew best.

RALPH DANIEL BOBB, 1905.

Ralph D. Bobb, of the class of 1905, died at San Antonio, Texas, November 28, 1907. For some time his heart had been seriously affected, and when tuberculosis added its fatal touch Ralph's father, Mr. E. G. Bobb, of Roaring Spring, Pa., moved









his family to Texas in the hope that Ralph might be restored to health, but in vain, and on Thanksgiving morning he passed away.

Ralph Bobb was, like Herbert Jamison, who died last September, a boy who stands out prominently from the ranks of those who have gone forth from Mercersburg in recent years. In school he was a clean, manly, trustworthy, painstaking boy. He was not only an excellent scholar, but an athlete of great promise; he was a hurdler of the championship track team of 1905, the team which Jamison captained; in many ways he entered into the life of the school, and in matters of student opinion, he was on the side of right. In the Autumn of 1905 he entered Cornell University, where he more than met the expectations of his friends.

Ralph Bobb was a boy to be loved, admired and respected, and his untimely death comes as a sad blow to all Mercersburg boys who knew him. To the family who mourn his loss the Alumni of the Academy extend their deepest sympathy.

Chester A. Bobb, second child of Clara S. and Edwin G. Bobb, was born in Roaring Spring, Pa., March 21st, 1893. He attended the public schools of Roaring Spring and in September, 1909, he became a student at the Tome Institute at Port Deposit, Md., with his cousin, Russell Garver, who began a three years course at that excellent institution of learning in September, 1908. At this time both these boys are making excellent progress in their studies. Chester A. Bobb has attended the Sabbath-school of the Church of God regularly from infancy on, until he went away to attend school. In January, 1908, he became a member of the Church of God at Roaring Spring, and has been a faithful member of that church since that time.

Ella Bare, second child of Daniel M. and Sarah (Eby) Bare, was born in Pattonsville (now Loysburg), Bedford County, Pa., February 9th, 1862. She attended the public schools and completed her education at Birmingham, Pa. She married Dr. Abraham L. Garver, son of Benjamin Garver, of Shirley Township, Huntingdon County, Pa. They have three children:

Ivan Edison, Russell B. and Vera.

Ella Bare Garver was converted and joined the Methodist

Church of Roaring Spring, when she was about 18 years of age. She has been a faithful and consistent member of that church ever since, taking an active part in all church and Sunday-school work. She has taught a class in the Sunday-school for the past fifteen years.

Dr. A. L. Garver was born at Thisbe, Huntingdon County, Pa., June 17th, 1859. He is the ninth son of Benjamin Garver, who was born near Roxboro, Franklin County, February 12th, 1812, and died at Thisbe, Huntingdon County, Pa., January 16th, 1887. He was the son of Daniel Garver, who came from Dauphin County to Franklin County the latter part of the eighteenth century.

Benjamin Garver spent his early life in transporting freight from Philadelphia and Baltimore to Pittsburg and Wheeling, having charge of one of the Conestoga lines. He was married February 10th, 1838, to Barbara Bender, who was born near Roxboro, Franklin County, January 10th, 1818, and died at Thisbe, Huntingdon County, Pa., October 12th, 1882. They were both of German descent and conversed fluently in the German language, during their entire lives. They were both consistent members of the Dunkard Brethren Church and died in that faith. They were buried in the cemetery at the Stone church in Germany Valley. They spent most of their life in farming in Huntingdon County, Pa. They early learned the habit of thrift and economy, which served them well in later years, as they were destined to raise a large family. To this union were born two daughters and nine sons, all of whom grew to maturity, excepting one daughter, who died at the age of six years. The last child born to this family was Abraham Lincoln Garver, the subject of this sketch, who spent his early life on a farm at Thisbe, in Germany Valley, near Shirleysburg, Huntingdon County, Pa., attending the public schools in the Winter time, and later Juniata College at Huntingdon, Pa., teaching during the Winter months to raise money to attend school during the Summer months. During the Winter of 1879-80, he taught the high school of Roaring Spring, Blair County, Pa., where he met Dr. A. S. Stayer, who persuaded him to study medicine. He completed the course and graduated from Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, Pa.

in the class of 1883. He practiced medicine four years, enjoying a large practice. In 1887, he withdrew from the practice of medicine and entered commercial life. On August 4th, 1885, he was married to Miss Ella Bare, daughter of D. M. Bare. In 1891 he took charge of the Roaring Spring Blank Book Co. as general manager, which was then in its infancy, doing a limited business. He developed it until it has grown to its present large proportion. It is one of the leading concerns of its kind, and ships its product to all parts of the world. Dr. A. L. Garver is a Director and Treasurer of that corporation. He is also vice president and one of the directors of the First National bank, of Hollidaysburg, Pa., and assisted in its reorganization and helped to bring it up to its present high standing among the banks of Central Pennsylvania. He has served on the borough School Board continuously, for a period of twenty-three years and assisted in grading and bringing the schools up to their present standing of a high school of the second grade. He is a member and trustee in the Roaring Spring M. E. Church. Whatever of success in life has come to him, he ascribes largely to his happy union with his wife, who has assisted and helped in the various undertakings, as only a good wife can.

Ivan Edison Garver, first child of Abraham L. and Ella Garver, was born at Roaring Spring, Pa., October 18th, 1887. He was educated at Williamsport Dickinson Seminary, Philips Andover Academy and Harvard University. He is a young man of most excellent character and attainments and is the faithful and able assistant to his father in the Blank Book Co. business.

Russell Bare Garver, second child of Abraham L. and Ella Garver, was born at Roaring Spring, Pa., December 27th, 1892. He is a graduate of the high school of Roaring Spring, Pa., of the class of 1908, and is now attending the Jacob Tome Institute at Port Deposit, Md., in his second year, preparing to enter college. He has always made good progress in his studies and at present is the Exchange Editor of the "Tome." He is a fluent speaker and his present inclination is toward the legal profession.

Vera Elizabeth Garver, third child of Abraham L. and Ella Garver, was born at Roaring Spring, Pa., April 7th, 1898. She

is attending the public schools of Roaring Spring, and is making very good progress. She is a consistent and worthy member of the Methodist Church, having joined that church before she was ten years of age.

Ina Bare, third child of Daniel M. and Sarah (Eby) Bare was born February 14th, 1865, and died February 25th, 1866, aged I year and II days. She is buried in the Roaring Spring Cemetery.

Anna Bare, fourth child of Daniel M. Bare and Sarah (Eby) Bare, was born at Roaring Spring, Pa., October 15th, 1867. She attended the public schools at Roaring Spring, Pa., and completed her education at Williamsport Seminary. In 1894 she married Dr. William McKee Eldon, who was born at Bendersville, Adams County, Pa., November 23rd, 1858. He is the oldest son of John and Martha Eldon. His mother was of German and his father of French descent. His great-grandfather, whose Christian name is unknown to us, lived in England, and for a short time in Ireland, from which country he, with a brother, emigrated to America in the latter part of the eighteenth century. The brother went to Canada and the great-grandfather, the subject of this sketch, settled in Pennsylvania. His grandfather, Robert Eldon, was born on the Atlantic Ocean, three days before the vessel arrived in port. He settled in Adams County and had eight sons and one daughter. They were a patriotic family and three of his sons lost their lives during the War of the Rebellion. Thomas was killed in the Battle of the Wilderness, Joseph in front of Petersburg, and Kaufman starved to death in Libby prison.

John Eldon was a merchant at Bendersville, Pa. John and Martha Eldon had the following children:

William McKee, Russia, Roswell Thomas, Clarence and John.

The last named died at the age of eight years.

Roswell Thomas Eldon is a prominent physician of Altoona, Pa., having graduated from Jefferson Medical College in 1894.

Clarence Eldon is a druggist, having recently taken charge of his brother's drug store at Roaring Spring. He is a graduate

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of Philadelphia College of Pharmacy of the year 1908, earning the degree of Doctor of Pharmacy.

Russia Eldon was married to William Shoemaker. He is a salesman and lives at Carlisle, Pa. The Eldons, not only of John's family, but of Edwin's and William's, were generally inclined to the professions, either as doctors, lawyers or teachers.

William McKee Eldon began the drug business in Dr. Trout's drug store in McConnelsburg, Pa. Two years later he went to Columbia, Pa., and took charge of P. S. Brough's drug store, after which he went to Philadelphia and entered Jefferson College, and graduated from the Pharmaceutical College in 1887, and from the Medical College in 1888. Since that time he has practiced his chosen profession of medicine, and is at present a prominent physician of Roaring Spring, and is a member of the medical staff of the Nason Hospital, of Roaring Spring, Pa.

Anna Bare Eldon, for some years past, has been in delicate health. She has spent parts of several Winters in Florida and in the Winter of 1906 went to Southern California, from which trip she received considerable benefit.

William McKee and Anna Bare Eldon have but one child, Sara Madeline Eldon, born April 17th, 1897. She attends the public school at Roaring Spring, and is an excellent scholar for her age. She will probably be ready to enter the high school at the close of this term, although she is only 13 years of age.

ROARING SPRING, PA.

Daniel Bare, Sr., no doubt, had in mind the excellent location for business at Roaring Spring some years before he bought the property. In the Summer of 1863, the property, then held by Hon. J. B. Mann, of Bedford, Pa., was offered for sale. The property consisted of ninety acres of land and an old grist mill and had two small dwelling houses on it. The price paid for it was \$17,000.00. This purchase was made when Mr. Bare was 75 years of age. His son, D. M. Bare, became a partner in this property and in the business which followed. After taking possession of the property, a small general store was opened. In 1866 the first paper mill was built, and in 1868 the old grist mill

was torn down and the new flouring mill erected. In the year 1886, the first blank book factory was built. This burned down a year later, but was again rebuilt and started in 1887. The first ten years of their existence the paper mill and the blank book factory were run without any profit to the proprietors, but in the course of time, both became good paying properties.

The finished product of the first paper mill for some years was about 3,000 fbs daily. That has been gradually increased until the present daily output is about 56,000 lbs. The first mill employed probably 25 or 30 persons, but for some years past the number has been increased to something over 200. The daily consumption of wood is about 55 cords. The paper made at this mill is machine finished and super calendar book and blank book papers. The largest single customer is the Roaring Spring Blank Book Company, which takes about 150 tons a month. The balance of the product is shipped to New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Cincinnati, St. Louis and other cities. The Roaring Spring Blank Book Co. at present employs about 200 persons in the factory and has ten salesmen on the road, covering practically the whole of the United States and Canada. The success of this company has been due largely to the energy and superior business ability of Dr. A. L. Garver, its General Manager.

When Daniel Bare and his son, D. M. Bare, began business at Roaring Spring (then called Spangs Mills), there were two dwelling houses and a farm house nearby. At present the population is supposed to be about 1,800. The two industries mentioned above have been responsible largely for this increase in population. It contains five churches within the borough limits and a flourishing church of the Brethren less than a mile away. For a number of years the Sunday-school statistics of the State showed a larger percentage of its people attending the Sunday-schools than any other community in the State. It has not had a licensed saloon within its limits for the past twenty-two years, and a large majority of its citizens own their own homes.
















ANNA (Bare) MILLER
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ANNA BAER, 1789-1859.

Anna Baer, tenth child of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., July 31st, 1789, and died May 12th, 1859, aged 69 years, 9 months and 2 days. She was married to Abraham Miller, son of Henry Miller, who was born February 18th, 1789, and died March 18th, 1822, aged 33 years and 1 month. He was a carpenter by trade. They had the following children:

Mary Eve, Henry B., Susan, Nancy, Abraham B.

Mary Eve Miller, first child of Abraham and Anna (Baer) Miller, was born October 20th, 1814, and died October 11th, 1881, aged 66 years, 11 months and 2 days. She was married to Samuel Fortenbaugh, who was born April 14th, 1813, died May 5th, 1866, aged 53 years and 21 days. He was a merchant, and the family were members of the Church of God. They had seven children as follows:

Mary Anna Fortenbaugh was born January 21st, 1836, and died July 20th, 1837.

Abraham Fortenbaugh, second child of Samuel and Mary E. Fortenbaugh, was born August 5th, 1838.

Annie Fortenbaugh, born June 16th, 1841, died September 3rd, 1841.

Samuel H. Fortenbaugh, born December 30th, 1844, died February 22nd, 1851.

Mary Ellen Fortenbaugh, born February 8th, 1849.

Samuel H. Fortenbaugh (second), born April 26th, 1851, died September 21st, 1853.

Robert H. Fortenbaugh was born September 14th, 1854, and died March 6th, 1856.

Anna (Bare) Miller, after the death of her first husband married Jacob Strominger about the year 1836. They had no children. He was a prosperous farmer of York County, and died about 1843-5. After the death of her second husband, she met with a very serious accident, falling on the ice, dislocating her hip, which left her in rather a helpless condition the balance of

her life. She died May 12th, 1859, at the home of her son-in-law, Samuel Fortenbaugh, at Yocumtown, Pa.

Abraham Fortenbaugh, second child of Samuel and Mary (Miller) Fortenbaugh, was born August 5th, 1838, in Newberry Township, York County, Pa. He received a common school education and in 1850 entered his father's store at Goldsboro, Pa. In 1856 he removed to Yocumtown and entered into partnership as a merchant with his father, Samuel Fortenbaugh. He was married January 30th, 1862, to Mary Elizabeth Byrod, of Halifax, Pa. In 1864 he removed from Yocumtown to Halifax, Pa., where he entered into partnership with his brother-in-law, Frederick Byrod (which partnership was dissolved six months later), in general merchandising, a business which he conducted successfully for forty years, retiring from it in 1904. In 1905 he removed with his family to 1713 N. Second street, Harrisburg, Pa. His wife, Mary (Byrod) Fortenbaugh, was born at Elizabethtown, Pa., May 12, 1838. To this union were born the following children:

Seward Byrod, Mary Ellen, Catherine Elizabeth, Samuel B. Seward Byrod Fortenbaugh, first child of Abram and Mary Fortenbaugh, was born February 10th, 1863, and died at Halifax, Pa., February 17th, 1865, where he is buried.

Mary Ellen Fortenbaugh, second child of Abram and Mary Fortenbaugh, was born at Halifax, Pa., November 26th, 1864. Mary Ellen Fortenbaugh was sent at the age of eleven, to a private school kept by Miss Woodward, of Harrisburg, Pa., where she remained five years. Then she entered a Lutheran Seminary, at Hagerstown, Md., from which she graduated two years later, after which she took a course in the School of Design on Broad street, Philadelphia. She afterwards taught drawing, painting and English, in St. Agathus School (Episcopal), at Springfield, Ill., presided over by the Rt. Rev. George F. Sevmour, Bishop of the Diocese. She married Thos, Cox Mather, of Springfield, Ill., a law partner of the present United States Senator Shelby Cullom. In December, 1903, Mr. Mather suddenly fell a victim of appendicitis, from which he died. He is buried at Springfield, Ill. They had two children, Abram and Catherine Laura.

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Abram Fortenbaugh Mather, first child of Thos. and Mary Mather, was born April 20th, 1889, and died May 3rd, 1889. He is buried in Springfield, Ill.

Catherine Laura Mather, second child of Thos. and Mary Mather, was born November, 1891. She resides with her mother at 1102 W. Fayette avenue, Springfield, Ill. They are members of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

Catherine Elizabeth Fortenbaugh, third child of Abraham and Mary Fortenbaugh was born at Halifax, Pa., June 29th, 1867. At the age of thirteen she entered the private school of Miss Woodward, of Harrisburg, Pa., and four years later she became a teacher in that school. In September, 1888, she married Prof. Harris Joseph Ryan, electrical and mechanical engineer, of Cornell University. Mr Ryan is a son of Cashier C. W. Ryan, of the Halifax Bank, who lost his life in defending the funds of the bank from bank robbers in 1901. Prof. Ryan occupied the chair of electrical and mechanical engineering for fourteen years in Cornell University, and in January, 1904, accepted a similar position from the Leland Stanford University, at Palo Alto, California, where they now reside. They have no children, and are members of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

Samuel Byrod Fortenbaugh, fourth child of Abraham and Mary Fortenbaugh, was born at Halifax, Pa., July 31st, 1869. He entered the high school at Ithaca, N. Y., in 1885, for a preparatory course and in 1886 entered Cornell University, from which institution he graduated as an electrical engineer in the class of 1890. Samuel Byrod Fortenbaugh, in July, 1890, took a position with the Brush Electric Company, of Cleveland, Ohio, and had charge of their exhibit at the Chicago Exposition in 1893, after which he resigned his position and returned to Cornell University and took a post graduate course with additional degrees. In 1894 he accepted a professorship of electrical and mechanical engineering in the University of Wisconsin, at Madison, filling this position for four years. He then accompanied Sidney H. Short, formerly president of the Brush Electrical Company, to Preston, England, to assist in the installation of a large electrical manufacturing plant, with which he was connected until 1901, when he accepted the position of electrical engineer in charge of the electrification of seventy-six miles of steam underground roads in London, known as the Yerkes enterprise. He served in this capacity until the completion of the work, covering a period of five years, returning to the States in 1906. He at once accepted the position of electrical engineer with the General Electric Company, of Schenectady, N. Y., where he now resides. On January 10, 1901, he married Florence Cowden, daughter of Frederick and Elizabeth Hatton Cowden, of Harrisburg, Pa., to whom were born two children, Samuel Byrod and Cowden.

Samuel Byrod Fortenbaugh, first child of Samuel and Florence Fortenbaugh, was born in London, England, March 2, 1902.

Cowden Fortenbaugh, second child of Samuel and Florence Fortenbaugh, was born in London, May 17th, 1903. This family are members of the Presbyterian Church and live at 115 Elmer avenue, Schenectady, N. Y.

This record of Abraham Fortenbaugh would be incomplete without recording the most exciting and thrilling event of his life. On March 14th, 1901, two stalwart men, about 22 years of age entered the Halifax National Bank, of which Mr. Fortenbaugh was President, for the purpose of robbing it. There were four persons in the bank at the time the robbers entered, namely, Mr. Fortenbaugh, a friend, and the cashier and teller of the bank. The robbers were armed with four revolvers and immediately covered the four men in the bank with their revolvers and required them to hold up their hands. The cashier was forced to deliver over \$9,000 of cash after which a struggle ensued through the attempt of the cashier to get one of the revolvers. The robber fired twice at short range, one shot of which proved fatal about four hours later. Notwithstanding the cashier's condition he succeeded in getting the robbed in a helpless position, when he (the robber), called on his pal, who was still holding up the other three men at the point of his revolvers, for aid. As he released them and as he passed by, Mr. Fortenbaugh threw himself on the robber's back, and with his arms around him they struggled awhile, but he finally threw Mr. Fortenbaugh to the

floor, and then fired at him, the ball passing through two thicknesses of his trousers, after which he shot the cashier, releasing his pal and then ran out of the bank. As Mr. Fortenbaugh regained his feet, the other robber was making off with the money in a telescope, which contained gags, dynamite, plyers, etc. At this moment Mr. Fortenbaugh threw his left arm around the neck of the robber and with his right hand seized his revolver when he fired the last two shots in it, which proved harmless. Finally Mr. Fortenbaugh overpowered the robber. About this time outside relief came. The other robber was captured outside and both were taken to Harrisburg that day. The next day they were tried for murder and in eight days and seven hours from the time they committed the crime they heard their death sentence and were executed the following January. Mr. Fortenbaugh in relating this thrilling experience, said, "I had fully made up my mind that my end was at hand, and at first trembled with fear, but when my friend Mr. Ryan was fired upon, all my fear left me, and I became more a demon than a human, facing what seemed death, regardless of consequences. An unseen hand preserved me, for which I shall never cease in my gratitude to my Creator." He further says, "The cashier of this bank, Chas. W. Ryan, was a martyr in his devotion to the trust which he held."

Mr. Fortenbaugh has certainly been a power for good in the community in which he lived. He has been an active business man for more than half a century, and in business where much capital has been involved. In addition to the business of general merchandising he has been president of the Halifax Shoe Manufacturing Company, president of the Halifax Mutual Fire Insurance Company, and president of the Halifax National Bank. He is also a director in the Harrisburg Trust Company, and a director in four other banks. He has been councilman, burgess and school director, and a member of the Pennsylvania Legislature of 1874, 1875 and 1876. He is a member and trustee of the Bethlehem Lutheran Church, of Harrisburg, Pa., member of the church council, and treasurer of the Memorial Fund of the church. He is a member of the Dauphin County Historical Society and National Geographic Society, and a Mason in high standing. Mr. Fortenbaugh, during the past fifteen years of his strenuous life, has been obliged to take frequent vacations for his health, mostly in travel, making four trips to Europe, also visiting the Pacific coast and other points of interest. His address is 1713 N. Second street, Harrisburg, Pa.

Mary Ellen Fortenbaugh, fifth child of Samuel and Mary (Miller) Fortenbaugh, was born February 8th, 1849. She was married to Silas Prowell, who was born September, 1845. They were farmers and members of the United Brethren Church. They lived in Fairview Township, York County, Pa., for many years, but removed to New Cumberland, Pa., in 1907. BENJAMIN BAER, 1792-1845.

Benjamin Baer, eleventh child of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., February 21st, 1792. He died in Hill Valley, Cromwell Township, Huntingdon County, Pa., February 15th, 1845. He married Catharine Mathias. They had the following children:

Elizabeth, Abraham, Peter Mathias, John, Susannah, Benjamin, Catherine, Anna, Sarah, Benjamin Franklin.

Benjamin Bear (as he spelled it in his family record) was married in 1816. He purchased a farm near his father's home, at the very high prices prevailing after the war of 1812-15, which he sold at a great loss, in the Spring of 1832. He moved to Sinking Valley, Huntingdon County (now Blair), where he lived about four years, and then moved to near where Tyrone now stands, where he lived for two years. Then in the Spring of 1838 he moved to the Carothers' farm in Hill Valley, Cromwell Township, Huntingdon County, Pa., which he rented for two years and then purchased in 1840. This was a large farm, containing 400 acres, including woodland. It was partly limestone land and one of the best farms in the valley. It was also one of the oldest; the warrant is dated September 17th, 1766. After his death, his sons Peter and John took charge of the farm until 1854, then George Price and wife, Susannah Bare, farmed until 1865. After them came George Garver and wife, Anna Bare, who now own the farm and live there a quiet retired life, while their son, Lloyd P. Garver, does the farming. Benjamin's widow, Catharine, lived there until her death, August 21st, 1892, at the advanced age of 96 years, 6 months and 7 days. (She was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., February 14th, 1796.) She was a devout Christian, a member of the German Baptist Church, and raised her large family in that faith, most of whom united with that Church. Gentle, kind-hearted and generous, ever doing an act of kindness, she was loved and respected by all. They are buried on their own farm, which is about nine miles from Mount Union.

Catharine Mathias and her sister, Elizabeth, who married Daniel Bare, a brother of Benjamin, the father of D. M. Bare, were daughters of Peter Mathias and Nancy Nisley (of Dauphin County, Pa.)

HISTORY OF BENJAMIN BAER AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

Benjamin Baer, eleventh child of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, was born in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., February 21, 1792. Was married to Catharine Mathias, oldest daughter of Peter Mathias, of York County, Pa. They had the following children:

Elizabeth, Abraham, Peter Mathias, John, Susannah, Benjamin, Catherine, Anna, Sarah, Benjamin Franklin.

Elizabeth Bear, first child of Benjamin and Catharine Bear, was born February 9, 1818, in Fishing Creek Valley, York County, Pa. She married Samuel Ray Douglas, who was born in Sinking Valley, Huntingdon County, Pa., May 13, 1813. He was a son of John Douglas, a farmer, living south of Shirleysburg, Pa. He was an elder in the Presbyterian Church for twenty years. Samuel Douglas was an elder for twenty-five years, and his son, John Douglas, succeeded his father, at his death in 1892 and still holds that position, covering a period of 62 years. Samuel Ray Douglas died August 24th, 1892, and his wife, Elizabeth Douglas, died April 2nd, 1892. Both are buried in the cemetery at Shirleysburg, Pa. This family is of Scotch-Irish descent, and were members of the Presbyterian Church. They had the following children:

Benjamin Franklin, James, John, David B., Samuel, Catharine Anna, Sarah Elizabeth, Allen Blair, Theresa Ellen.

Benjamin Franklin Douglas, first child of Samuel and Elizabeth Douglas, was born near Shirleysburg, Pa., April 29th, 1844, and died in Mount Union, November 6th, 1908. He received his education in the common schools, at the Shirleysburg Academy, and Duff's Commercial College, Pittsburg, Pa. He was a veteran of the Civil War. He was a member of Company K, 202nd Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers. He continued in the service until the end of the war and was then honorably dis-

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charged. He was engaged in the mercantile business at Mount Union, and also in the milling business at the same place, and for years was the selling agent for Vermont granite monuments and stone. He married Jennie Smith, of McConnelstown, Pa. They resided in Mount Union and were members of the Presbyterian church of that place. They had the following children:

Cora Madeline and Elizabeth Allen.

Cora Madeline Douglas, first child of Benjamin and Jennie Douglas, was born at Mount Union, February 16, 1871. She was an invalid for years and died April 22nd, 1901.

Elizabeth Allen Douglas, second child of Benjamin and Jennie Douglas, was born at Mount Union, Pa. She is a graduate of the Mount Union High School, the Ladies' Seminary at Birmingham, Pa., and of the Dental College at Philadelphia. She practiced dentistry in Mount Union for a number of years. But recently she married Mr. Jay F. Rummel, a graduate of the Mount Union High School. For some years past he has been a trusted employe in the office of the P. R. R. Co. They live at Mount Union and are members of the Presbyterian Church.

James Douglas (twin with Benjamin Franklin), second child of Samuel and Elizabeth Douglas, was born April 29th, 1844, and died in infancy.

John Douglas, third child of Samuel and Elizabeth Douglas, was born near Shirleysburg, August 17th, 1846. He is a farmer and was for some years the clerk of the Board of Directors of the Poor of Huntingdon County. He is an elder in the Presbyterian Church, having succeeded his father at his death in 1892. On October 26th, 1908, he married Anna Brandt, daughter of Daniel and Elizabeth Brandt. She is a member of the Presbyterian Church. They live at Shirleysburg, Pa.

David B. Douglas, fourth child of Samuel and Elizabeth Douglas, was born near Shirleysburg, Pa., April 19th, 1848. He lived in Shirleysburg and died November 30th, 1890. He was a farmer and stock dealer. He married Martha Brewster, daughter of Henry and Nancy Brewster, who lived in Shirleysbury. Mr. Brewster was a prominent business man and represented Huntingdon County in the Legislature in 1844. Both

were members of the Presbyterian Church. They had one child, Henry Rhea Douglas, born in Shirleysburg, December 30th, 1875. He is a graduate of the Medical Department of the University of Pennsylvania, in the class of 1902. He is practicing his profession in Newville, Cumberland County, Pa.

Henry Rhea Douglas, only child of David and Martha Douglas, is married to Ethel L. Jones, a daughter of Dr. Z. T. Jones and Mary (Hudson) Jones, of Shade Gap, Pa. Both are members of the Presbyterian Church. They had the following children:

Henry Rhea, Jr., Mary Hudson, Martha Brewster, Margaret Robertson.

Henry Rhea Douglas, Jr., first child of Henry R. and Ethel Douglas, was born at Shirleysburg, Pa., August 8th, 1903.

Mary Hudson Douglas, second child of Henry R. and Ethel Douglas, was born at Newville, September 13th, 1905.

Martha Brewster Douglas, third child of Henry and Ethel Douglas, was born at Newville, Pa., February 25, 1907.

Margaret Robertson Douglas, fourth child of Henry R. and Ethel Douglas, was born in Newville, Pa., ———, 1909.

Samuel Douglas, fifth child of Samuel and Elizabeth Douglas, was born near Shirleysburg, May 30th, 1850, and died September 13th, 1851.

Catharine Anna Douglas, sixth child of Samuel and Elizabeth Douglas, was born near Shirleysburg, March 28th 1852. She was an invalid, a victim of rheumatism, for twenty-five years, and for much of this time entirely helpless, although her mind was clear and active to the last. She bore her affliction with great fortitude. She was a member of the Presbyterian Church nearly all her life and died triumphantly in that faith, January 22nd, 1906. She was buried with her parents in the cemetery at Shirleysburg, Pa. After her parents' death she and her brother John kept house together, her brother caring tenderly for her during all the years of her affliction.

Sarah Elizabeth Douglas, seventh child of Samuel and Elizabeth Douglas, was born near Shirleysburg, Pa., August 8th, 1854; died October 14th, 1855.

Allen Blair Douglas, eighth child of Samuel and Elizabeth Douglas, was born near Shirleysburg, Pa., May 20th, 1857; died February 6th, 1872.

Theresa Ellen Douglas, ninth child of Samuel and Elizabeth Douglas, was born near Shirleysburg, Pa., March 28th, 1860, and died February 18, 1872. The death of these usually healthy children, the one aged 15 and the other 12, just twelve days apart, was a very sad bereavement to this family.

Abraham Bear, second child of Benjamin and Catharine Bear, was born in Fishing Creek Valley, York County, Pa., June 12th, 1820, and died June 20th, 1820.

Peter Mathias Bare, third child of Benjamin and Catharine Bare, was born in York County, Pa., December 28th, 1821. He was married February 20th, 1845, to Catharine, oldest daughter of Rev. Andrew and Catharine Spanogle, of Germany Valley, Huntingdon County, Pa., and to this union six sons and one daughter were born. He spent the early years of his married life in farming and in the manufacture of woolen goods in Germany Valley. In 1857 he engaged in the mercantile business in Mapleton, Pa., and in 1859 removed to Mt. Union, Pa., where he continued in the same business in connection with the milling business. He resided almost continuously in Mount Union until his death, which occurred January 4th, 1884. He was buried in the cemetery at the old stone church of the Brethren, in Germany Valley. He and his wife were members of the Brethren Church. After his death, his wife Catharine married Rev. James R. Lane and lived with him in Shirleysburg, Pa., till June 18th, 1898, when her spirit also took its flight and her remains were laid to rest in the cemetery at the old stone church in Germany Valley. After the death of Peter M. and Catharine S. Bare, the following obituary notices appeared in the Mount Union Times, which are here inserted.

PETER M. BARE.

Peter M. Bare died at his home in Mount Union, on Friday morning, January 4th, 1884, from a cardiac affection hastened by a severe cold. Having been about his business but a day or two before, his death was very sudden and unexpected.

He was born in York County, Pa., December 28th, 1821, and was 62 years and I week old at the time of his death. When he was ten years old his father, Benjamin Bare, with his family, removed to Sinking Valley, Huntingdon County, and from thence to the old Bare homestead in Hill Valley in 1838. Peter M. Bare was the oldest, but one, of a family of eight children, who lived to maturity; of whom one brother and three sisters survive him, viz.: John Bare, of Mount Union, Mrs. S. R. Douglas, of Shirleysburg, Mrs. George W. Price, of Fulton County, and Mrs. George Garver, of Hill Valley. The youngest brother, Benjamin F. Bare, was a second lieutenant in Company B., 110th P. V., and died in 1863 from disease contracted in the service. The sisters who are dead are Catharine, who was married to Oliver Colgate, and died in Mount Union in 1864, and Sarah, who was married to George W. Haffley, and died in Hill Valley in 1871.

In 1845 the deceased was united in marriage to Catharine, oldest daughter of Andrew Spanogle, of Germany Valley. Six sons and one daughter were born to them. Two died in infancy. The rest still survive. John S., the oldest, is in business in Mount Union; Mary A., lives with her mother; Benjamin F., is in Nevada; William H., is in Colorado; and Ira L., the youngest, is in Nebraska.

The deceased was for a number of years an active business man, well known in business circles in Huntingdon County. He began his business career as a manufacturer of woolen goods at the woolen factory in Germany Valley. After suffering serious loss through the embezzlement of an agent, he sold the factory and moved to Hare's Valley, where in 1855, he and Thomas E. Orbison erected the first steam saw-mill ever operated in this section. After sawing a couple of years, he went to Mapleton and engaged in the mercantile business, establishing the post-office and the first store ever opened in that now thriving town.

In 1859 he removed to Mount Union to engage in the mercantile business at that place. He did a large business in Mount Union until 1869, contributing in the meantime a very liberal share toward the building up of Mount Union. He erected the store building now occupied by T. H. Adams, the steam mill now owned by Mrs. W. H. Allen, the fine residence now occupied by his family, and several smaller buildings. He was one of the projectors, together with his brother John and General Speer, of the first steam tannery erected here; but he and General Speer withdrew from the enterprise before it had progressed very far. He was also one of the founders of the Union Bank at Huntingdon, chartered under the style of John Bare & Co. During the war he served as one of the County Commissioners, and was postmaster at Mount Union during President Lincoln's first term. He was also a Justice of the Peace, both by appointment and election,

Owing to complications arising from extended business operations, from some of which he suffered very severe financial losses, he failed in 1869; and from the consequent wreck of property he was unable to save anything. This loss of property, together with a serious physical injury that he received a few years ago, made it impossible for him again to follow an active business life, and hastened a death that is deeply lamented by a large circle of kindred and friends.

He was a member of the German Baptist Church. His mortal remains were borne to their last resting place, in Brethren's cemetery in Germany Valley, on Tuesday. Rest in peace.

DEATH RECORD.

Mrs. Catharine Bare.—June 18, 1898.

Death's summons has come again. This time it was to Catharine, wife of Rev. James Lane, of Shirleysburg, who after much suffering passed peacefully and hopefully away on last Saturday evening at 7 o'clock at the good age of 71 years, 11 months and 2 days. She was a daughter of Rev. Andrew and Catharine Spanogle and was born near Newton Hamilton, July 16, 1826.

When about one year old her parents removed to Germany Valley, where her young life was spent. In that rich and beautiful valley, amidst the surroundings of a good home influence and Christian training she laid the foundation of the beautiful and

consistent life she was afterwards enabled to live. When but sixteen years of age she was received into the communion of the Dunkard Church, of which her father was an honored and useful minister, and in which her husband has served for years with much faithfulness and acceptance.

On February 20th, 1845, she was united in marriage with P. M. Bare, to whom she was a good wife and helpmeet for about thirty-eight years, when death removed her husband and left her in lonely widowhood. Four children survive this marriage, one daughter, Mary A., of Philadelphia, and three sons, John S., who is Captain of Company A, 5th Regiment, P. V., stationed at Camp Thomas, Chickamauga, Ga., William, of Deadwood, N. D., and Ira, of North Platt, Neb. Two brothers, Andrew Spanogle, of Lewistown, Pa., and D. B. Spanogle, of Red Cloud, Neb., also survive her.

On February 17th, 1885, she was again united in marriage with Rev. James Lane. She was a good wife to him and a kind mother to his children to a former marriage. For over thirteen years they have walked life's pathway together, affording mutual help and strength to one another. But death has ruthlessly rent asunder this pleasant relation and despoiled this home of its brightest attraction. Ordinarily we would have expected "Aunt Katie" to have been spared many years yet to her home and the community. But disease fastened its fangs upon that body and would yield to no treatment. Her days were numbered, her course was run and her work was done and she was taken home to be with Jesus and the redeemed.

Appropriate services were held in the old stone church in Germany Valley, where she was wont to worship God, at II o'clock on Tuesday, June 21st, 1898, in charge of Rev. H. B. Brumbaugh, of Huntingdon, assisted by Rev. W. S. Long, of Tyrone, and Dr. D. H. Campbell, of Mount Union.

It was very largely attended by relatives, friends and neighbors and was a deeply impressive service. The scripture selected for the funeral discourse was most appropriate: "Thou shalt come to thy grave in a full age, like as a shock of corn cometh in in his season" (Job 5:26). The theme chosen was "A Beautiful



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Life." The death of "Aunt Katie" was a most happy exemplification of the truth and beauty of the text, for a mother in Israel hath fallen, earth is the poorer and heaven the richer because of this translation. Everybody loved her, for she was kind to every one. Love had a large place in her heart, and it manifested itself in doing good unto and helping others. was a most hospitable home. It was always a delight to abide there. She was devoted to her church and was rarely absent from her place. She was deeply interested in the Old Folks Home and did much to comfort and brighten the lives of its inmates. She made a large place for herself in the community and will be greatly missed by her friends and neighbors. Of her it may he said, "she hath done what she could." She now rests from her labors and her works do follow her. Sweet is the comfort that consoles the hearts of the husband and children, who have the sympathy of a host of friends in their bereavement.

John Spanogle Bare, first child of Peter M. and Catharine Bare, was born in Germany Valley, April 3rd, 1847. He was educated in the public schools and grew up in his father's business. On February 4th, 1874, he was united in marriage to Elsie Joanna Shaver, a daughter of Wm. Shaver, and a granddaughter of Major John Shaver, one of the pioneer settlers of the Aughwick Valley. He conducted a general store in Mount Union, Pa., for several years, and in 1885 was elected Register and Recorder of Huntingdon County, and was re-elected in 1887. He was also a member of the State Legislature during the sessions of 1893, 1897 and 1899. He was a Captain in the 5th Regt., N. G. Pa., from 1889 to 1898. He was Captain of Company A, 5th Regt., Pa. Vol., in the war with Spain, and afterwards Major and later Lieutenant Colonel, 5th Regt., N. G. P., and is now holding that rank on the retired list of officers. He has resided in Huntingdon, Pa., since 1885, and is engaged in the lumber business. He and his wife are members of the Presbyterian Church, of Huntingdon, Pa.

Mary Ann Bare, second child and only daughter of Peter M. and Catharine Bare, was born in Germany Valley, February 22nd, 1849. The greater part of her life was spent in the home of her

parents at Mount Union, Pa. After death broke up that home she removed to Philadelphia where she conducts a large boarding house, at the corner of Spruce and Tenth streets, in which business she has been quite successful. She claims the distinction of being the only spinster in the immediate family connection. She is a member of the Presbyterian Church.

Andrew Jackson Bare, third child of Peter M. and Catharine Bare, died in infancy.

Benjamin Franklin Bare, fourth child of Peter M. and Catharine Bare, was born in Germany Valley, November 4th, 1853. In 1871 he went to the gold and silver mining districts of Nevada and Idaho and continued in the mining business until 1885, when his lungs became affected. A year's residence in Southern California failed to restore his health and he came back home to Pennsylvania, where he died May 11th, 1887, at the age of thirty-four years. He was buried at the old stone church in Germany Valley.

Samuel Bare, fifth child of Peter M. and Catharine Bare, died in infancy.

IVilliam Harrison Bare, sixth child of Peter M. and Catharine Bare, was born April 18th, 1857. He went West at an early age and after a wandering career, left Seattle in 1898 for the Klondike country. Since then his family has not heard from him.

Ira Leslic Bare, seventh child of Peter M. and Catharine Bare, was born in Mount Union, Pa., November 24th, 1860. In 1880 he followed the example of his older brothers and turned toward the setting sun. He located in North Platte, Neb., where he engaged in the newspaper business. Since 1884 he has been editor and proprietor of the North Platte Semi-Weekly Tribune. On February 14th, 1888, he married Miss Mary Thompson, of Erie, Pa. They have the following children:

Geraldine Marie Bare, first child of Ira L. and Mary Bare, was born at North Platte, Neb., January 4th, 1889.

Leslie Spanogle Bare, second child of Ira L. and Mary Bare, was born at North Platte, Neb., January 9th, 1899.

Mr. Bare is a prosperous newspaper man. The family belongs to the Presbyterian Church.

John Bare, fourth child of Benjamin and Catharine (Mathias) Bear, was born in Fishing Creek Valley, York County, Pa., February 19th, 1823, and died in Mount Union, August 4th, 1899. He and all his family who have died are buried in the Odd Fellows' Cemetery, Mount Union, Pa. John Bare (spelling changed from Bear after starting to English school), went with his father from the farm in Fishing Creek Valley, York County, Pa., about five miles south of Goldsboro, when he was nine years old, (1832), to Sinking Valley, Huntingdon County, (now Blair county). He lived there about four years and went from there to near where Tyrone now stands, where he remained for two years. In the Spring of 1838 he removed to Carothers farm, of about 400 acres, in Hill Valley, Cromwell Township, Huntingdon County, Pa., where he lived until the Spring of 1854. He then moved to Mount Union (consisting at that time of about five houses), and built his residence, where he lived until his death, August 4th, 1899. After his father's death, February 15th, 1845, he and his brother, Peter Mathias Bare, farmed the homestead until the Spring of 1854, when he began an active business career, during which he did much to develop the natural resources of this section. He built the large grain warehouse and store on Pennsylvania Canal, now owned by Dr. Rhodes, and the dwelling across the street. He formed a partnership with George McLaughlin and they did a large grain business in connection with their merchandising firm, which was dissolved in 1860. He purchased 1,400 acres of timber land on Jack's Mountain, south of the Juniata River, and 700 acres on the north side, from which he peeled oak bark for tanning purposes and shipped to Philadelphia and Baltimore, and also dealt largely in cord wood and ties. He built the first tannery in 1859 and began its operation in 1860, continuing in the business until 1865, when he sold to Jacob Hoffman. About this time the oil excitement broke out and he and his brother Peter went to Franklin, Venango County, and purchased Porter Island, in the Allegheny River, and sunk a well, which proved at first to be one of the best, but gradually declined in its flow. He also built a large hotel in Franklin, called

the Grant House, which in about a year was burned to the ground, being fired by an incendiary. These investments, in the oil regions, were not a monetary success. In 1866 he, with three others, started the Banking House of John Bare & Co., in Huntingdon County, which afterwards became the Union Bank, now the Union National Bank. In 1869 he built a second tannery; this was leased and operated by Wm. H. Rosensteel & Son until 1873. From about 1870 to 1872 he and John H. Miller operated the steam flour mill under the firm name of Bare & Miller and they did an extensive business with the lumbermen in Clearfield County. From 1873 to 1876 he operated the lower tannery and made leather by a new process. It was called Union Crop Leather. His exhibit at the Centennial Exhibition in Philadelphia in 1876 won a diploma and a bronze medal. The burning of the hotel at Franklin was a great loss to him, and this, with large payments of obligations of others for whom he was surety, so crippled him financially that he was unable to pull through the panic of 1873-78, and made an assignment. Because of overwork and worry, his health was so much impaired that for some years he was unable to do much. In 1886 he leased the high grade glass sand, and was instrumental, together with the Speer White Sand Co., of Pittsburg, in building the large plant, known as the Empire Works, opposite Mapleton. It was while engaged in this work early on the morning of July 6th, 1887, while driving across the railroad crossing at the Mount Union station, that his horse and buggy were struck by a fast freight, the horse being instantly killed, the buggy broken to pieces, and Mr. Bare thrown about sixty feet. He was picked up in an unconscious condition and continued so for sometime. His escape was marvelous and in a few months he was able to be about. But he was never the same man after the accident. His nerves were shattered, and his strong constitution was badly broken by that shock. From 1888 to 1801 he continued prospecting about the mountains and ridges, and in 1891 he leased the glass sand rock about one mile west of Vineyard Station, in Mifflin County, and with parties from Pittsburg built the plant now known as the Crystal Sand Works. From 1893 until a year or two before his death, he had been testing and shipping ganister or silica rock,



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(which is used in the manufacture of fire brick) to manufacturers in different parts of the State. He was desirous that a plant of this kind should be built at Mount Union, but this he was not permitted to see. During his busy life he gave employment to many men, and because of his kind and fair treatment he was well liked and respected by all. He was a man of progressive spirit and intelligence and established a select school, in which the higher studies were taught. This school was held for some years in the basement of the Presbyterian Church, a part of which he had fitted up for that purpose. He was a man of liberal spirit and substantially aided both the Presbyterians and Methodists in building their second houses of worship. He took an active part in the incorporation of the town and filled the offices of Burgess, School Director and Councilman. He united with the Presbyterian Church in 1878, in which communion he passed away. Within six months after his death, fire brick works were built by parties he had interested in the stone. These, in a few years, were very largely increased in size and are now one of the largest in the State. An article by J. G. Hicks, in the Mount Union Twice a Week, Oct., 1909, mentions him as follows: "Mr. John Bare planned and fully realized in his mind, and events have long since proven, that he had reasoned carefully, although he did not live to see his long-cherished and wisely thought-out plans brought to perfection, but which now so thoroughly vindicate his at that time—by some people thought to be, but vague theories of a book worm or foolish fancies of a man with a hobby."

His first wife, Elizabeth Ricketts (twin with Rachel), was born in Hill Valley, September 25th, 1829. She died in Mount Union, September 6th, 1865. She was an earnest Christian, a member of the Methodist Church. In late years, a friend in writing of her says, "I spent a part of two years in Mrs. Bare's home and in that time I learned to love and admire her for her gentle nature and her kindness to every one, and especially for her beautiful Christian life. One thing especially impressed me and will always stand out in my memory and that was her great love and loyalty to her heavenly Father. After the noon day meal, it was her custom to quietly withdraw to her room for a season of prayer and devotion and no doubt for His guidance in the rear-

ing of her little children, all of whom that are now living being members of the church of her faith. Her home was always a resting place for the minister of the gospel, as he made his weary rounds on the circuit, a welcome and a Christian home to refresh himself in." Hers was one of those quiet gentle natures of even balance, which nothing seemed to disconcert. She was a daughter of Hezekiah Ricketts, Jr., and Elizabeth Clark.

Hezekiah Ricketts, Jr., was born in Hill Valley, January 22nd, 1792, and died there February 16th, 1853. He lived all his life on the old homestead of his father. He was a prominent and successful farmer. He was a soldier in the war of 1812-15 and a member of Captain William Morris' Company in November, 1813. His wife, Elizabeth Clark (or Clarke), was born February 22nd, 1792. Her parents were James and Elizabeth Clark. They lived on the east side of Chestnut Ridge, almost opposite the Ricketts farm. They were of German descent. After the death of her husband, she removed to Shirleysburg and lived there until her death, September 23rd, 1863. They were Methodists. They had nine children.

Mary Ann, 1818-1896. Single. James D. (9 years.) Hannalı (2 years).

Aaron La Fayette, married twice. Eliza Jane, married John Booher. Rachel, 1829-56, single, (twin with Elizabeth). Elizabeth, married John Bare. Samuel C., married Mary Beers. Catherine J., married Emanuel B. Harencame (who lived on part of old homestead until his death in the Fall of 1908).

Hezekiah Ricketts, Jr., was a son of Hezekiah, Sr., who was born February 22nd, 1754, and died September 16th, 1816. He was a farmer and lived on the homestead in Hill Valley, where he seems to have lived as early as 1784. His wife's name was Hanna Wilcox. She was born February 3rd, 1754, and died in Hill Valley, September 16th, 1818. They had eleven children. Mary, married Joseph Rachold; Lydia, married Samuel Irwin; Rachel, married Leonard Shaver (son of Nicholas, of Aughwick); Hannah, married William Sinkey; Jemima, married Charles Green; Sarah, married James Brady; Elizabeth, married William Clark; Grace, married John Patterson; Joseph, married William Clark; Grace, married John Patterson; Joseph, married







ried, (had 8 boys and I girl); David, single; Hezekiah, married Elizabeth Clark. The Ricketts had a grave-yard on the homestead, where a number are buried. It is fenced and in good condition, located on the part of the farm now owned by Millard F. Swope, four miles south of Mount Union. Hezekiah Ricketts, Sr., lived in Hill Valley, prior to 1784. His father, William, and grandfather, Zachariah, both lived in Rockbridge County, Va., in 1784. They were of English descent. From "Heads of Families, Census of 1790," pp. 124 and 125, we learn the few families by name of Ricketts, Rickets, living in Huntingdon County, were the only ones in the State of Pennsylvania. kiah (Esika), Joanna, Reason, Edward, Chaney, (these last three adjoining each other). Edward, Nathan and Richard. "Jones' history of the Juniata Valley" says the first white settlers in Warrior's Mark were the Ricketts family. Captain Elijah Ricketts was an active and prominent man. His house was made into a fort during the Indian troubles, about 1775-80.

John Bare's second wife, Evaline Gertrude Shaver, was born on the farm just east of Mt. Union, on the Shirley road, January 1st, 1840, and has spent all of her life there and in Mount Union. She united with the Presbyterian church in early youth and has been an active member. She and her daughter, Edith V., and her son, Lloyd S., live in the homestead at Mount Union. She is a daughter of Peter R. Shaver and Margaret Morrow.

Peter R. Shaver was born in the stone house, Mount Union, June 12th, 1813, and died May 5th, 1894, in Mount Union, where he spent the last years of his life as a retired farmer, having lived on the farm adjoining town since his marriage. He was a ruling elder in the Presbyterian church for forty years, in which faith his family was raised. His wife, Margaret Morrow, was born in Path Valley, Franklin County, Pa., September 23rd, 1816, and died in Mount Union, July 24th, 1890. She was a life-long member of the Presbyterian Church. Her father, Prof. James L. Morrow, lived near Hollidaysburg and was Principal of an academy near Chambersburg. For many years he was an elder in the Presbyterian Church. Her mother was Margaret Alexander, of Amberson's Valley, Franklin County, Pa.

Major John Shaver was born in Shenandoah Valley, Va., September 11th, 1762, and died October 16th, 1829. He came to Pennsylvania from Virginia at an early day and settled near Aughwick Mills, Shirley Township. He moved to what is now Mount Union in 1802. He was a prominent farmer and owner of much land. He built the large stone house near where Mount Union now stands and is buried in the cemetery near the house. He raised a large family, who married and made new homes of their own, most all of them adjoining his home or within a radius of three miles. His children:

Samuel, 1795-1870. Married Catherine Vandevander, lived adjoining his father.

Jacob, 1796-1878. Married Jane Morrison. Lived about 3 miles away; near Newton Hamilton. Second wife, Julia Morrison (sisters).

Henry, 1797-1870. Married Hannah Morrison. Lived at mill adjoining his father.

John, 1798-1863. Married Jane Hanawalt. Lived near Aughwick Mills (Sheriff, Huntingdon County). Married second, Sarah King.

Nicholas, 1801-1884. Married Keziah Etnier. Lived at mill adjoining his father.

Ann, 1803-1878. Married John Morrison (1803-1859). Lived along Shirley Road about 3 miles away.

William, 1804-1855. Married Catherine Wallace. Lived adjoining his father.

Catherine, 1808-1863. Married Joseph Lankton. Lived and died on a farm near Lewistown.

George, 1810-1880. Married Margaret McIlhenny. Lived near Ipavia, Fulton County, Ill.

Peter, 1813-1894. Married Margaret Morrow, 1816-1890. Lived adjoining his father.

Major John Shaver was a son of Nicholas Shaver, Jr., who came from the Shenandoah Valley in Virginia, and purchased a farm May 24th, 1785, near what is now Aughwick Mills, Shirley Township, where he lived the balance of his life. He died about 1810. His sons, Peter and John, were appointed administrators of his estate in that year. He owned considerable prop-

erty. His wife's name was Elizabeth. They had the following children: Peter, name of wife, Catherine; John (Major), married Mary Glass. Jacob, married, (lived in Westmoreland County). Leonard, lived in Mercer County, married Rachel Ricketts, daughter Hezekiah, Sr. Phebe, married Casper Booher. Catherine, married Joseph Cochenour. Susannah, married Peter Snyder. A daughter, name unknown, married Ripple. Most all of whom lived in the vicinity of the old homestead.

At one time the Shavers (about 70 in number, counting children), and their relatives, through marriage with the families of Casper Booher, Peter Snyder and Hezekiah Ricketts, Sr., owned one continuous line of adjoining farms about five miles long, extending from the Juniata River at the bend where the Creosoting plant is located, up through Hill Valley, almost to where the Brewster Tannery stood.

The father of Nicholas Shaver, Jr., was Nicholas, Sr. It is said he came from Germany, when Nicholas, Jr., was a small boy, and settled in the Shenandoah Valley, in Virginia, with the early settlers and had two sons and one daughter.

The children of John and Elizabeth (Ricketts) Bare were:

Laura L., Serena, Hulbert Penrose, Robert Bruce, Oscar Deneen, Roy Stone, Flora Belle.

Laura L. Bare, first child of John and Elizabeth (Ricketts) Bare, was born in Hill Valley, Huntingdon County, Pa., September 15th, 1852. She was married to Winfield Scott McPherran, who was born near Spruce Creek, Pa., December 23rd, 1850. He was a son of Adam McPherran, M. D., and Eliza McPherran. Dr. Adam McPherran was a surgeon in the Pennsylvania militia and served as surgeon in the Civil War. He was also a fine sharp-shooter in that war. Winfield Scott McPherran is a graduate of Millersville State Normal School of the class of 1868. After graduating he taught for 17 years as Professor of Mathematics, being City Superintendent, Principal of Shields Normal Academy. At present he is General Agent of Life and Health Insurance and lives in Pittsburg, Pa. They are Methodists. They have the following children:

Alva Guy, Ivan Leroy, Lura Edna Clare, Carrie May and Nannie Floy (twins), Porter Wilson.

Alva Guy McPherran, first child of Winfield S. and Laura McPherran, was born at Coudersport, Potter County, Pa., December 14th, 1874. He was educated at Titusville, Pa., and graduated from Cleveland, Ohio, Commercial College. He was a trusted employe of the P. R. R. Co. at Pittsburg, from 1892 to November 15, 1902, on which date he died of quinsy. He was an athlete, and a Thirty-second Degree Mason. He attended the Methodist Church and Sunday-school.

Ivan Leroy McPherran, second child of Winfield Scott and Laura L. McPherran, was born at Wilcox, Elk County, Pa., September 7th, 1876. He was educated in the Titusville public schools, and graduated at the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy, April, 1900. He was manager of the Davis Drug Co., Warren, Pa., four years and is now half owner in the Jamestown Cold Storage Co., of Jamestown, N. Y. Mr. Wilson is senior partner in the Cold Storage Co. He married Minnie May Wilson, only child of Henry and Clara Wilson, of Jamestown, N. Y. He is a member of the Methodist Church and a Mason, and lives at Jamestown, N. Y.

Lura Edna Clare McPherran, third child of Winfield Scott and Laura L. McPherran, was born at Brookville, Pa., August 17th, 1878. She was educated at Titusville, Pa., and graduated from Pittsburg High School in the class of 1898. She taught in the public schools of Pittsburg until her marriage in 1904, to M. Paul Sullivan, Auditor and purchasing Agent for the Bessimer Coke Co., and the Prowell Coal and Coke Co., Pittsburg, Pa. She died June 22nd, 1906, in Pittsburg, Pa. She was a member of the Methodist Church.

Carrie May McPherran, fourth child of Winfield Scott and Laura McPherran (twin with Nannie Floy), was born at Punx-sutawney, Pa., November 9th, 1880. She was educated in the Titusville public schools, and graduated from the Pittsburg Grammar school. She also attended the Pittsburg High School. She is a music teacher and a member of the Methodist Church, and lives with her parents in Pittsburg, Pa.

Nannie Floy McPherran, fifth child of Winfield Scott and Laura McPherran (twin with Carrie May), was born at Punxsutawney, Pa., November 9th, 1880. She was educated in the Titusville, Pa., public schools. She is a graduate of the Pittsburg High School, and has been a teacher in the Lincoln public school, Pittsburg, Pa., since her graduation. She is a member of the Methodist Church and lives with her parents in Pittsburg, Pa.

Porter Wilson McPherran, sixth child of Winfield Scott and Laura McPherran, was born at Titusville, March 10th, 1888, and died there September 23rd, 1889.

Serena Bare, second child of John and Elizabeth (Ricketts) Bare, was born in Hill Valley, Huntingdon County, Pa., August 13th, 1854. She received a common school education and was a member of the Methodist Church from childhood. She was married, first, to August Swigert. He was born in Germany, and died in California. They had the following children:

Robert Bruce, John Bare.

Robert Bruce Swigert, first child of August and Serena Swigert, was born in Lancaster, Pa., July 16th, 1879, and died in Johnstown, Pa., November 19th, 1886.

John Bare Swigert, second child of August and Serena Swigert, was born at Newport, Pa., March 20, 1882. He was educated in the public school of Mount Union, Pa. He is employed as a foreman in the Fire Brick Works of the Harbison-Walker Co., Mount Union. He married Ida Pearl Parsons, who was born in Shade Valley, Huntingdon County, Pa., June 22nd, 1882. They have one child, Dorothy Geraldine Swigert, born August 15th, 1905.

Serena Bare Swigert was married the second time to Leander Eadler, born in Elizabethtown, Lancaster County, Pa., and lives in Elizabethtown. He is a son of Gottlieb and Christena (1822-1904) Eadler, who lived in or near there all their lives. He is a member of the German Lutheran Church.

Hubert Penrose Bare, third child of John and Elizabeth Bare, was born September 29th, 1856, and died April 9th, 1857.

Robert Bruce Bare, fourth child of John and Elizabeth Bare,

was born at Mount Union, December 19th, 1858. He was educated in the public schools of Mount Union and graduated from Williamsport, Pa., Commercial College 1877. He started out in life for himself at the age of eighteen. He first secured a position in the office of Thompson & Clinger, General Insurance Agents, of Williamsport, Pa. After two years' service in that office, he came to Altoona and took a position in the Car Record office of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, but after a few months' service there he returned to Williamsport for two years, being employed in an insurance office. He then accepted the position of bookkeeper and cashier for the Herdic Phaeton Co., in Washington, D. C., which position he filled acceptably for six years. About that time he took a bookkeeper's examination, held by the U. S. Civil Service Commission, and passed a creditable examination and was assigned to a position in the U. S. William Middleton was a son of Jonas Middleton (1806-1857), and Martha Williams (1805-1876), both born near Heysham, England. They came to Philadelphia in 1850, and died in Washington, D. C.

Dutton Madden in his history of the Madden family, says, "Benjamin Eby's second son, George, married Sarah Baer." John and Sarah (Eby) Garver had the following children:

George, 1833, married Anna Bare.

Nancy, 1835, married to E. X. Myers, moved to Illinois.

Lydia, 1837, married Abraham Lutz.

Rachel, 1840, married Daniel Wharton; live in Mount Union, Pa.

John, 1842, married Anna Bowman; is a German Baptist minister.

Harriet, 1845, married E. X. Myers, second wife.

George and Anna (Bare) Garver were married January 22nd, 1856. They farmed their father's farm in Germany Valley for nine years, and in 1865 moved to their present home, it being the old homestead of Benjamin Bear, on which they have raised their family, and where they are now enjoying the comforts of a retired life. They have for many years been honored members of the Church of the Brethren in which faith they have raised their family. He has been a deacon and the treasurer of the church for 33 years. They had the following children:

Benjamin Franklin, Flora Sarah, Laura Catherine (twins),

Harriet Minnie, Ambrose B., James Howard, Senie R., Lloyd Preston.

Benjamin Franklin Garver, first child of George and Anna Garver, was born in Germany Valley, Huntingdon County, Pa., April 30, 1857. He was married, first, to Emma F. Lutz, who was born May 2nd, 1857, and died January 27th, 1898. She was a daughter of Abram M. Lutz, of Germany Valley. He was married a second time to Jennie N. Ryder, who was born March 3, 1883. She is a daughter of J. S. Ryder, of Path Valley, Franklin County, Pa. They have two children, Anna Elizabeth Garver, born December 26th, 1906, and Irene Garver, born May 19th, 1909. Mr. Garver owns a valuable farm on the Aughwick Creek, near Shirleysburg, Pa. He is a prosperous farmer, and a Director in the First National Bank of Orbisonia, Pa. His address is Shirleysburg, Pa. His wife is a member of the Presbyterian Church.



Sarah Bear, ninth child of Benjamin and Catharine Bear, was born in Sinking Valley, near Tyrone, Pa., January 30th, 1835. She married George W. Haffley. They lived in Bedford County, Pa., three years, and in the spring of 1867, they bought part of the Benjamin Bare homestead in Hill Valley, on which they lived during their life time. They had but one child, Laura S. Haffley, who was born in Bedford County, Pa., June 16th, 1868.

Sara (Bare) Haffley was a member of the Church of the Brethren. She was a devout Christian, a loving and an affectionate wife and mother, and died May 2nd, 1871, and is buried in the Bare Cemetery on the old homestead.

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KINDRED FAMILIES

Under this head we give some information of three different families, as follows:

FIRST.—OF THE PETER MATHIAS FAMILY.

This family is one of interest on account of the marriage of his two daughters by his first wife, Catharine and Elizabeth, to two brothers, Daniel Bare, and Benjamin Bare, sons of our Johannes Baer. The Mathias family was among the earliest settlers of York County and were generally members of the Lutheran church.

We find from the records of Quickel's church, that there were members of six different families baptized there between 1771 and 1827. They were children of the following families:

Henry and Dorthea Mathias. John and Catharine Mathias. Henry and Maria Mathias. Henry and Anna Mathias. Peter and Susan Mathias. Henry and Susan Mathias.

One of these, Daniel, son of Peter and Susan Mathias, born November 11th, 1810, and baptized at Quickel's Church May 28th, 1811, was the uncle of the writer, D. M. Bare. The church named above was situated about three miles from where Peter Mathias lived and is now called Zion's View. Peter Mathias was born July 15th, 1768, on the old homestead farm in Newberry Township, York County, Pa., located two and one-half miles west of what is now York Haven, on the Northern Central branch of the Pennsylvania Railroad, not far from the Big Conewago Creek and about five miles from the Johannes Baer homestead. (See map.) He lived on this farm all his life and died at the home of his son, Daniel, August 21st, 1846, aged 78 years, I month and 6 days. He is

buried in the cemetery in connection with Quickel's (Lutheran) church, of which he was a member, situated at Zion's View, Conewago Township, York County, Pa., about three miles from his home in Newberry Township, (see map) and about six miles north of York. The dates of his birth and death were copied from his tombstone. He was a successful farmer and raised a large number of live stock which were driven to the Baltimore market and sold. After his death the farm was divided into four farms, and his children and grandchildren remained on them for many years, one of which is now occupied by Miss Eliza Mathias and her sister. His descendants are many in that section of York County, at the present time. He was married three times. His first wife was Nancy Nisley of Dauphin County, mother of Catharine and Elizabeth, above mentioned. No record of her birth or death has been found. Her ancestors no doubt were one of the large number of families, by name of Nisley or Nissley, living in the adjoining county of Lancaster. A number of the men of those families were ministers of the gospel. A very devout, religious people. His second wife was Susan Bush, whose parents lived near his own home. Their children were:

John, Jacob, Martin, Daniel, Henry, Peter, Mary (Polly), Susan and Nancy.

John Mathias married Elizabeth Croul, of near Safe Harbor, L'ancaster County, Pa. They had a family.

Jacob Mathias married Susan Shetter from near Strinestown, York County, Pa. They had a family.

Martin Mathias never married.

Daniel Mathias married Catharine Zeigler, of Glen Rock, York County, Pa. They had a family.

Henry Mathias married Sarah Repman of Strinestown, York County, Pa. They had a family.

Peter Mathias married Sarah Malehorn, of near Newberrytown, York County, Pa. They had a family.

Mary (Polly) Mathias married Jacob Fisher of Fishing Creek Valley, Newberry Township, York County, Pa.

Susan Mathias married Peter Grass, of near Manchester, York County, Pa.

Nancy Mathias married George Machlin of near Manchester, York County, Pa. His third wife was Barbara Shuman, a widow, whose maiden name was Detwiler. She was from Lancester County. They had no children. She is buried in the Baer Cemetery. Daniel Mathias, son of Peter, was the administrator of his estate and Granville Mathias, his son, of Goldsboro, was the administrator of Daniel's estate. Granville found a number of old deeds and other papers in the name of Mathias among his father's papers. Those were written in German, and as the two estates were settled up, they were thought to be of no further use and he burned them. Mrs. Daniel Westhaber, of Steelton, a daughter of Daniel Mathias, has the old "grandfather's" clock that belonged to her grandfather, Peter Mathias.

A large part of the information given above was sent in February, 1901, by Mrs. Caroline Orendorf, of Middletown, Dauphin County, Pa., whose maiden name was Zeigler. She had her home for some time with her sister, Catharine, who was the wife of Daniel Mathias, a son of Peter, who lived on part of the old homestead, and at whose home Peter died. Some time in July, 1904, I received a letter from Miss Eliza Jane Mathias, Cly P. O., York County, Pa., a daughter of Peter Mathias, Jr. And some time in April, 1907, from Granville Mathias, Goldsboro, (Etters P. O.) York County, Pa., a son of Daniel.

SECOND.—OF JACOB BEAR, OF NEWBERRY AND FAIRVIEW TOWNSHIP, YORK COUNTY, PA.

Robert C. Bair, Esq., of York, Pa., who made a careful examination of the records of Lancaster and York Counties, in making his report to us of his work, makes the following mention of Jacob Bear of Newberry and Fairview Township.

The particular Jacob, of Newberry and Fairview, who was contemporaneous with your John of Newberry, has interested me in examining your case. Jacob Bear, of Newberry and Fairview had the following children:

Emanuel, Jacob, Susanna, wife of Peter Schrieber; Elizabeth, wife of Christian Burger; Englehart, Barbara, wife of Samuel Johnston; Catherine, wife of Jacob Wolf; Anna, Sarah, wife of Arnold Spink, of Westphalia, (now Wrightsville), York County, and John.

The York County records show that Jacob Bear, of Newberry and Fairview Townships, purchased six different tracts of land aggregating 575 acres, most of it situated in Newberry Township, between the years of 1782 and 1802, all of which he probably owned at the time of his death, except twenty-five acres situated on the Conewago Creek, which he had sold to his son Emanuel, in the year 1800. The records further show that on December 15th, 1815, Emanuel Bear, oldest son of Jacob Bear, of Newberry Township, who died intestate, presented a petition to court on behalf of himself and the children of Jacob Bear, deceased, all of full age as named above. On April 17th, 1817, Emanuel Bear filed an account as administrator of his father's estate, showing a balance in his hands of \$3,678.95. On November 26th. 1824. Emanuel Bear executed a deed to Jacob Bear, of Conewago Township for 153 acres on the banks of the Big Conewago Creek, called "Stoneburg." This Jacob was no doubt Emanuel's brother and second child of Jacob, who died in 1815.

Emanuel Bear, oldest child of Jacob Bear, of Newberry and Fairview, was married to Catherine (her maiden name unknown). He was a prominent and wealthy citizen of that community. He was the guardian of Henry, David and Abraham, sons of Johannes and Mary Baer, of Newberry Township. There was a friendly and close relationship existing between the families of Johannes Baer and Jacob Bear, and to the certain knowledge of the writer received from his father, Daniel Bare, he knows that Emanuel, son of Jacob, was a blood relation of the Johannes Baer family, but whether brothers or cousins he is not able to say.

The following information as to this relationship was received from Mrs. Rebecca (Leffard) Sprankle, the widow of the late Samuel Sprankle, of Altoona. Mrs. Sprankle's maiden name

was Leffard. Her mother was Sarah Bear, a daughter of Englehart Bear or Bair, who died near Warrior's Mark, Huntingdon County, Pa., and with his wife is probably buried in the cemetery at Warrior's Mark. Sarah (Bear) Leffard had a brother, Emanuel Bare, who lived near Shade Gap, Pa., and died in 1901. He was the father of John C. Bare, at present one of the directors of the poor in Huntingdon County, Pa. Englehart Bear was no doubt the son of Jacob, of Newberry and Fairview, who died in 1815.

THIRD.—JACOB BAR, OF CANTON BERNE, SWITZERLAND, THE ANCESTOR OF ROBERT C. BAIR, Eso., OF YORK, PA., HISTORIAN OF THAT BRANCH OF THE BEAR FAMILY.

Jacob Bär, Sr., of Canton Berne, Switzerland, Emigrant, 1709-1717. He was a Mennonite, settled in Chester County, now Lancaster County, Pa. His son, Jacob Bär, Jr., also an emigrant, settled in Earl Township, Lancaster County, and died November, 1769. He was married twice; Barbara or Mary, had issue three sons and two daughters (none by Sarah, the second wife), namely:

First, Jacob, born 1733; married. He died a short time before his father. They had no issue.

Second, Barbara, born 1735; married Michael Kneisely, of Cocalico, formerly of Hempfield, Lancaster County, Pa., issue two sons and seven daughters, namely:

Mary, married Daniel Miller, of Pine Creek Township, Northumberland County, Pa.

Abraham, Malli and Rebecca, of Cocalico, Lancaster County, Pa.

Elizabeth, married George Hildebrand, of Juniata County, Pa.

John Kneisely, of Rye Township, Cumberland County, Pa.

Anna, married Jacob Groff, of Cocalico; Barbara married David Bear, of Lancaster County, and Susanna married George Kneisely, of Shenandoah, Va.

Third, Michael Bar, of Earl, a carpenter, born in 1737. Married Margaret. Issue. Fourth, Mary Bär, born in 1739; married Joseph Hershberger, of Cocalico. Issue, two sons and two daughters, David, Joseph, Barbara (Groff) and Salome (Meyers).

Fifth, Abraham Bair, yoeman of Leacock, born September 7th, 1741, and died March 14th, 1828. Married February 22nd, 1775, to Catherine Worst, of Cocalico. Born June 24th, 1757, and died November 30th, 1840. Issue, five sons and four daughters, viz:

First, Jacob Bair, of Leacock, born October 28th, 1776, and died November 2nd, 1820. Married Catherine Fellsbaum, of Lancaster County, Pa. Issue, five sons and two daughters.

Second, Elizabeth Bair, born July 8th, 1778, died June 1st, 1845. Married John Miller, of Leacock. Issue, four sons and four daughters.

Third, John Bair, of Leacock, born March 22nd, 1781, and died March 4th, 1819. Married Elizabeth Miller, of Lampeter, Lancaster County., born January 11th, 1784 and died July 14th, 1845, a daughter of David and Mary (Soutler) Miller.

Elizabeth (Miller) Bair, married second, David Buckwalter, widower, no issue. By her first husband, John Bair, she had issue, four sons and two daughters.

Fourth, David Bair, of Colerain, Lancaster County, Pa., born March 5th, 1783, and died December 1st, 1849. Married Sarah Miller. Issue, four sons and three daughters.

Fifth, Benjamin Bair, bachelor, born April 30th, 1785, and died May 5th, 1831.

Sixth, Leah Bair, born August 16th, 1791, and died in 1866. Married Christian Zook, of Shippensburg, Pa. Issue, one son, Abraham Zook.

Seventh, Mary Bair, spinster, born March 24th, 1794, and died October 7th, 1852, Shippensburg, Pa.

Eighth, Catharine Bair, spinster, born November 19th, 1795, died April 25th, 1845, near Intercourse, Pa.

Ninth, Abraham Bair, of Leacock, born January 12th, 1798, died February 17th, 1879. Married Magdelene Hoover, issue six sons and five daughters. Of these are David H. Bair, of Philipsburg, Center County, Pa., and Abraham Bachme Bair, York, Pa.

John Bair, of Leacock (second son of Abraham and Catharine Worst Bair), married Elizabeth Miller. Issue, namely:

First, David Bair, banker of Lancaster, Pa., born March 8th, 1806, died October 10th, 1876. Married Mary Burkwalter, only daughter of his stepfather. No issue.

Second, Jacob Bair, of Safe Harbor, Pa., born October 1st, 1808, died March 12th, 1849. Married Elizabeth Bowman. Issue, seven sons and two daughters.

Third, Elizabeth Bair, born July 20th, 1811, died 1876. Married John Shaub. Issue, three sons and seven daughters.

Fourth, Catherine Bair, born April 29th, 1814, died August 18th, 1903. Married, first, Daniel Keeports; issue, three sons and three daughters. Married, second, Joseph M. Elherry, of Lower Chauceford, York County, Pa. Issue, one daughter.

Fifth, John Bair, Ironmaster, of York County, Pa., born May 25th, 1816, died January 30th, 1892. Married May 22nd, 1855, to Susanna Groff, born May 14th, 1827, daughter of David and Anna (Longnecker) Groff, of Lancaster County. Susanna, widow, resides (February 16th, 1910) with her daughter, Mrs. Fulton, in Philadelphia. John and Susanna (Groff) Bair had issue, a son and a daughter, Robert C. and Lizzie.

First, Robert Cabeen Bair, attorney-at-law, York, Pa., was born April 27th, 1856. Married June 30th, 1887, to Ella Nora, daughter of Dr. Henry Lanius and Emma E. (Rieman) Smyser, of York. Issue, H. Snyder Bair, born April 2nd, 1889, of State College, Pa.

Second, Lizzie Bair, married Samuel M. Fulton, of Philadelphia. Issue, two sons and three daughters, Sue B., John C., James S., Kathleen and Naomi.

Sixth, Daniel Bair of Providence, Lancaster County, born August 7th, 1818, and died March 5th, 1901. Married Hetty Shenk, both deceased. No issue.

THE BAER FAMILY ASSOCIA-TION (Incorporated)

The Baer Family Association, this is one of the prominent families of that name whose ancestors settled in Lehigh County, and many of their descendants still live in Lehigh and Berks Counties.

The Baer family association (incorporated), which holds its annual reunion at Kutztown Park, Kutztown, Pa., is made up of the descendants of Johannes, Christopher and Melchoir Baer, There is a tradition that these three persons were brothers, but up to the present time, no documentary evidence has been presented to establish the claim. This much has been established, they came in the same ship (The Phoenix, September 30th, 1743), settled in the same County of Lehigh, then a part of Northampton and were confirmed members of the Reformed church. Most of the Baers, of Berks and Lehigh counties, are descendants of Johannes (Hans) Baer. He settled in Weisenburg township, Lehigh County, some time prior to 1749, on a farm about one mile south of Clausville. In 1750 his name appears on the Ziegel church record, as one of the founders. him and his wife were born four sons, one of whom died in infancy and was buried at the Weisenburg Church. He was born September 9th, 1749. John, Adam, Jacob and Barbara, Johannes died prior to December, 1759. His widow, Regina, was married a second time to Peter Grow, Jr. John moved to Windsor, Berks County, and his descendants live in Hamburg, Windsor, Perry, and Bern townships. Barbara married Henry Fetter and lived in Allentown. Adam located in what is now called "Baer Valley," near the present town of Seipstown. He had seven sons and five daughters. John, Jacob, Daniel, John, Peter, Henry, Jonathan, David, Catharine, married to Moses Cain. Margretha, Elizabeth married Falk.

Jacob, 1745-1810, the youngest son of Hans, obtained the

old homestead and added to it until it embraced over five hundred acres. His wife's name was Elizabeth. She was born March 5th, 1748 and died June 5th, 1818. To them were born twelve children, six sons and six daughters. Among his sons were Jacob and Daniel, who lived and died in Weisenburg. John who moved to Adams County, Henry who moved to Luzerne County and John Adam, who moved to Maxatawny Township near Kutztown.

The children of John Adam were Jonathan, 1796-1878, who lived in Greenwich Township; John, who married Catharine Adam, and had nine children, among whom is Samuel A. Baer, Ph. D., President of Royal Front College, Virginia; Peter, who lived at Raisin, Michigan. His descendants hold yearly reunions. Charles, who lived at Topton, Berks County, and was the father of eleven children, and is the grandfather of the writer; Solomon, who moved to Akron, Ohio. The daughters were: Lydia, Polly, Betsy and Susanna. Melchoir lives in Macunzie Township, Lehigh County, where he owned several large farms. He had eight children, among whom Melchoir and Jacob became the progenitors of large families.

Melchoir, Jr., married Catherine Desch and had ten children: David, Jacob, Polly, Elizabeth, Charles, George, Samuel, Henry, Susan and Catherine.

Jacob was the father of eleven children: Rachel, George, Joseph Melchoir, Samuel, Susan, Judith, Ephraim, Elizabeth, Manasses and Benjamin. Of these Samuel migrated to Mount Wolf, York County, and Benjamin and Manasses to Newberry of the same county. The last of the trio was Christopher, known among his neighbors as Stoffel. Prior to his coming to this county, he had patented to himself 560 acres of land in Whitehall Township, Lehigh County several miles east of Johannes. He had six children: Heinrich, who obtained the old homestead, but sold it prior to 1800, and went to what was then called the west. John moved to Romney County, Virginia, where he died without issue. Melchoir lived in Whitehall Township and had four children. Henry, a grandson still owns a part of the original tract. Jacob, the youngest son of Christopher, settled in Maryland,

where he died in 1823. He was the father of six sons. Solomon, the youngest of these died at Somerset, Pa., in 1883, in his ninetieth year. He was the father of George F. Baer, president of the Philadelphia and Reading Railway, Ex-Judge William Baer and Herman C. Bare, Esq., of Somerset, Pa. The latter is the father of Dr. Herman Baer, who married Mabel McKinley, a niece of President Wm. McKinley. Christophel Baer came direct from Zweibrucken, in Germany, to Pennsylvania. The old Baer homestead in the Palatinate was for generations known as Bären Hutte. When Christophel bought his tract of land, the English agent, eager to transplant the German name Bären Hutte, called it "Bruins Rest." There is also a tradition that one, Peter von Baer, had been married to a daughter of the Count of the Palatinate, and in this way established rank for the Zweibrucken family.

The coat of arms consists of a shield prominently displaying a bear carrying a sheaf of wheat. As stated above, a family association has been formed for the purpose of gathering family data of all those who bear the name of Baer. The stock certificates are issued to any one of Baer descent and who obligates himself to contribute one dollar a year to the association. A life membership certificate may be obtained by paying the sum of ten dollars. Address all communication to the secretary, F. N. Baer, Kutztown, Pa.

CONCLUSION

At last we have finished our search for the descendants of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, and will therefore briefly write up the last chapter of the "Baer History."

In our search we have found something more than 1,400 of these descendants. In the summaries of each family given in this book, there are the names of 1,399 persons. In a few instances we were unable to obtain names. Our correspondents knew that there were a given number of persons in a family, but were unable to obtain the names. This would probably account for, from 20 to 30 additional persons.

There is at least one family that might have added considerable to the above list, if it could have been found. That of Samuel Baer, the first child of John and Catharine Baer, who was born about 1801. He probably married in York county, and moved from there to Ohio, but later on moved farther West, and was reported to have been killed by the Indians.

He had one son, who the writer once met when boys, and he believes he had other children, but we have been unable to locate any of them. Hence it is not improbable that there are as many as 1,500 descendants of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer, of whom something more than a thousand are living at this time. They are mostly of the fourth, fifth and sixth generations. Only three of the third generation were living June 1st, 1910. These are Martin E. Bare, of Hummelstown, Pa.; Mrs. Anna (Bare) Garver, of Huntingdon, Pa., and the writer, D. M. Bare, of Roaring Spring, Pa. Of the seventh generation, we found at the time this book was compiled, fifteen in the John Baer family, fifteen in the George Bear family and three in the Jacob Bare family.

The descendants of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer are scattered over at last twenty-four States and Territories.

The present address of between seven and eight hundred of them will be found in this volume. Our summaries show 233 persons, answering to the name of Baer, written five different ways, as follows: Baer, Baer, Bare, Bair and Barr. A majority of them at the present time are writing it "Bare." Other names are as follows: Of Swopes, 48; of Fortenbaughs, 41; of Fugates, 34; of Anthonys, 25; of Millers, 25; of Spanogles, 24; of Corman, 22; of Garvers, 22; of Douglas, 21; of Stroheckers, 21; of Mansbergers, 18; of Ketterings, 18; of Kleppers, 18; of Krigers, 17; of Bowers, 15; of Harts, 15; of Brumgarts, 15; of Fursts, 15; and of Shaffers, 15. Other prominent families were Dunmires, Zorgers, Myers, Lamisons, Frees, Notters, Basslers, Barndollars, Jordans, Thomas, Schracks, Leases and others.

The occupations and professions of descendants of Johannes and Anna Maria Baer are many and various. Counting by families, there are several hundred engaged in farming. Then follows in the order named:

Merchants, teachers, clerks, salesmen, railroad men, manufacturers, carpenters, clergymen, lawyers, physicians, managers, bankers, etc.

Generally speaking the descendants of Johannes and Maria Baer are a religious people and hold their membership in about 15 different denominations, with those of the Methodist faith largely in the lead. Our record gives the names of 200 Methodists, 119 Lutherans, 104 Reformed, 95 Presbyterians. Then follows in the order named: The Church of the Brethren, the Church of God, the Christian Church, the United Brethren Church, the Evangelical church, the Baptist Church, the River Brethren, the Catholic, and the Congregational Churches.

We do not claim to have a full and complete record of the church affiliation of each person, as in some cases it was impossible to obtain them, and the same is true of the occupations and professions. Yet our record, although not as complete as we would wish it, shows beyond a doubt that our people are both prosperous and religious, and are doing what they can to make this world better and are therefore making the necessary preparations for the life which is to come.

As a family we have been well provided. Our lives have been surrounded with pure, simple, religious environments. In our various undertakings and ventures, we have been prosperous and our health and happiness ideal. Let us therefore "fear God and keep his commandments for this is the whole duty of man," as is given us in the 13th verse of the 12th chapter of Eccl.; and these lines do we most reverently commend to our posterity and our readers.

Our self-imposed task is now finished. It has cost us much labor, but it has also afforded considerable pleasure, and we hope that the perusal of its pages will be a pleasant pastime to its readers, to all of whom we extend our fraternal greetings.
