More especially, we acknowledge indebtedness to the compiler for his indefatigable perseverance, industry, and zeal in the collection of such extended statistic and biographic records.

Had we even imagined the labor and patience requisite to such an enterprise, we should not have ventured beyond our original plan.

Well aware that we are to be assailed by diverse critics, we nevertheless have the consciousness of ultimate approval in the preservation at least of valuable records.

Our only regret is, that the labor co-operative with the compiler should not have been taken up by more competent hands.

INTRODUCTION.

It is a duty we owe to the patrons of the book to be exceedingly chary of words. Well we know that the printer's inexorable rule plies over and estimates every comma; and the money that friends have sent in advance so confidingly, and that subscribers are so cheerful and prompt to pay us, must infallibly go to re-imburse the cost of the outlay. Therefore we are admonished to be economical. Yet we must be entertaining. Still more, we are bound to be correct, — to be systematic. We make a book that the public will get hold of: we cannot keep it from them. Every one who has married in this connection of name will be directed hither, sooner or later. The book will go immediately to the great libraries of the land. Woe if there be an error! Learned people will criticize; and we shall be brought exceedingly low in the estimation of strangers, if there is aught unsuited to common opinion. But we rise from all doubt or concern as to the reception of the book among the family. It has been looked for with unflagging expectation. The researches have been conducted with zeal, and with a feeling of pious service to the past. Withal, to the divine blessing it is commended, with earnest wish that the offering may be of aid in one of the departments of service to mankind; that the gracious intent of the design may be perceived; that its merits may be appreciated; that no unjust calculation may be formed of its purpose, and therefore no disappointment.

Ample time has been had; so that no one may believe that we have been hurried or worried in what may be considered a vast undertaking. Look at the encouraging aid we have received! When the erudite and accomplished past Lieutenant-Governor of Massachusetts wrote us a long letter of intelligence, and ministers of the gospel were writing in answer to queries we have propounded in aid of this work, the impression came with grateful force to us, that this was a name well favored. How few, thought we, of the many family-names, in common, every-day use, have had the attention of the wise and good devoted to their historical investigation, and a special

chronicler employed to write a book thereon! It will admonish the inheritors thereof certainly to be good in their day and generation; to try and live good lives, be more and more pure and virtuous as days increase, and help to make the public life better, that we may not be destroyed as a nation for want of the requisite collective amount of virtue to save a people. Various pleasant sentimental thoughts occur in the passage of the separate departments of the work under our hand. Pleasant sunny days roll over the task. Brooding nights, rich in reflective opportunity, have flitted quietly away since we have begun the work; and here it is at length, not all that we could do to it, but all that the rapid movement of life permits us to separate from the living present, and devote to the dear and honored past.

And now our business and retired friends of abundant and competent means will please bear in mind, that this book is placed for disposal at a marketable rate of price, which covers not the cost; for we could not accumulate pelf while contemplating and preparing this exalted theme. Let us be therefore in reception of douceurs of that which you cannot always retain, and afford a lucrative example, to make this vocation well rewarded, and so creditable for future followers.

EARLY ORIGIN OF THE NAME.

Monday, June 16, 1862, one of the most fresh and lovely mornings of the month, the ready attention of the ever-accommodating Mr. Sibley, of Gore Hall, Cambridge, enabled me to devote a forenoon study in the spacious and retired alcove, where I took down tome after tome of the huge British Commission Records, — the source of early mention of this name.

Huntedon, Huntend, Huntyngton, and various other modes of protracting the monosyllable, are in frequent use in Bedford, Northumberland, Gloucester, &c.; occasionally Hunte and Hunt', which we may suppose to be a contraction acquired of one of these longer and unwieldy names. Hund is in the Welsh Chronicles; and we get, among living persons, a tradition that one family came from Wales. Hunter is exclusive in Scotland, as the "Inquisitiones Generalis" shows; though not one Hunt in that worthy chronicle.

Rymer's "Fædera" supplies the name of Roberte le Hunt in Lancashire, 1327. Inq. Post. Mort. &c. t. Edward III., 1327-77, p. 219, has Johannes Hunt de Spryngefeld ten' vocat' le Huntes ut de honore de Peverel. Essex Co., John and ux. Juliana, Southampton. John, fil de Richard le Hunte, left five acres land in Kirkley and Laverton, Yorkshire. Williamus de Chuton comes Hunt de Maxstocke, Warwick-

shire; Walter Hunt, Somersetshire. Rev. Thomas Hunt left sixty acres land in Lincolnshire.

Time of Henry VIII., 1509–47, Sir T. D'Arcy sues Henry Hunte, of Rothwell, Yorkshire. James Hunt in right of father vs. H. Hill and others for lands in Hillington Manor, Middlesex, &c. John and Thomas Hunt were of Rothwell.

Richard Hunt rs. Smyth sues for land in Bekkyngham, Aldensha.

Time Edward VI., 1547-53, Richard Hunt rs. Thomas Hyde sucs for lands at Lyme Hurst. T. Knolles rs. Edward Hunt, Richard Hale, and others, for title to Conscoghe Manor, in "Lancashire Pleadings" to be found.

Parliamentary writs furnish us Adam le Hunt, 1295, at Nottingham; John le Hunte, of Shaftesbury, 1302; Ralph le Hunt, Sussex, distrained to receive knighthood; Ralph of Southampton, 1305; Walter of Sussex; Walter of Cambridgeshire, 1297. A large number of extracts were made which are of no value here, and merely encumber the page, to prove tedious, and give no link to the American emigration. Sufficient that the name is of the most eminent respectability in the various counties. It is often referred to in the Journals of the House of Lords and Commons, "Gentleman's Magazine," and through innumerable British periodicals; establishing the name English unquestionably. It is the most easy English guttural in the language: sever the II, and the name is readily understood in the provincial mode of pronouncing. It requires no labial help of the vocal organs; and, without a tongue, a person could utter this name in the dialect of Wales.

Its meaning, by the word, simply is "to pursue;" and is applied to the sports of the chase, — to follow game. Hunting is understood as pastime, and more especially English pastime. The chase implies the hunter and his hounds on a jaunt for pleasure, — healthful recreation that is considered by the higher classes, and is the national amusement of the land whence we derive a lineage. The name is found quite common, although, in the sister isle, "fair Erin;" as many others are there by transplantation. We have not neglected this auxiliary help to our collection; and the fair sons and daughters of this race will be pleased in after-times to take up our book, and see some trace of their lineage.

RESEARCHES IN ENGLAND.

It is many months since a commission was sent to Mr. Somerby, the unrivalled and esteemed investigator of old English records, to look up what could be found of some of the early settlers of this country by the name of Hunt. His researches have been completed; and we now present, in fair lines of type, what is evident from the

worn and dusty papers vigilantly inspected in his diligent search for the identical first-comers hither. He is successful in determining, nearly to a certainty, the origin of William Hunt, of Concord, Mass., as coming from Yorkshire. There are more records gathered, which we do not print; and those interested are welcome any time to examine.

The early English home of Enoch Hunt, the founder of the large Weymouth line, was previously ascertained.

Not enough evidence springs up to offer as certainty on the other American lines, concerning their definite starting-point in the European world; although quite a large research has been taken for this especial object, and we may be well satisfied ascertaining thus much.

Very confident we feel that our good friends will praise us for getting by Mr. Somerby so many precious memorials of the dear and treasured English names, and excuse our not further advancing in this almost limitless department of inquiry.

All of which have an early founder migrating here, and leaving a numerous posterity to the present day, dispersed, however, remotely from the first locality.

MISCELLANEOUS BRANCHES.

These comprise brief descents known of early settlers, not long continued; and desultory pedigrees of all extents in later times.

The plan of a line is to begin with a historical outline; then give tables of descent in a regular form, earried along by number from the first ancestor; then add a summary of the *allied names*, with facts not in the tables.

The Concord Line varies from the others in plan, being collected and arranged first, and more thoroughly obtained than most others; and it is designed to exhibit a peculiarity of arrangement considered to be of much facility. This form is alphabetical throughout; and the line of descent does not flow consecutive, as in the others, but by reference of letter.

Various schedules will follow after the production of the main contents of the volume, according to the space admissible; which, at this stage of printing, cannot be determined. Wait upon us, kind friends, in cheerful support of our undertaking; and let resources flow to us, which will be reverently and carefully garnered, and the due result of patience, prudence, care, and toil, eventually be seen in a worthy success of our efforts.

AMESBURY LINE.

The more recent researches made, June 19, 1862, at Amesbury, afford good evidence of the early ancestors of this line. In 1677, Edward Hunt, with others, took the loyal oath of fidelity. In 1727, he left an estate of twenty-nine pounds. Five years after, the estate of his son John, amounting to the larger sum of two hundred and seventy-four pounds sterling, was administered by his brother-in-law David Clough, and distributed to the heirs. Then, in a course of years, Nathaniel Hunt, about to pass from this sublunary state, made his will, 1774; after which surviving six years, and then left his homestead to sons Nathaniel and Henry, and gifts to son Zaccheus; to three daughters, one of them called Anna; and two grandchildren, daughters of Moses Hunt. The whole estate, including seventeen acres of land, was computed at the moderate sum of fifty-seven pounds three shillings and eightpence. The family names, by a careful comparison of records, are in the tables duly arranged.

Migrations of the family soon were made to Vermont, New Hampshire, and New York. In the neighboring city of Newburyport are now descendants.

We are in receipt of a letter from Dr. Charles W. Hunt, of Laconia, N.H., dated March 28, 1861. He gives a tradition of three brothers, — Philip, Humphrey, and William, — originating in Amesbury; the last going to Guilford, Philip to Sanbornton. Enoch, his great-grandfather, was a soldier in the Revolutionary War, and filled appointments of trust. At the surrender of Burgoyne, he passed the sword of the general to Gen. Gates. Burgoyne smote his sword over the pommel of his saddle, and broke it, saying "he never would surrender it, except in fragments, to a boy." That boy was Enoch Hunt. He was also one of the aids of Gen. Gates.

Dr. Hunt's location is a hundred miles north of Boston, on the Boston, Concord, and Montreal Railroad. His father has a farm on the shore of Winnipiseogee Lake, where there are two steamers running daily during summer. A few miles from the village are the mountains. The scenery all about is delightful. The place was once called, by Hon. John P. Hale, the Switzerland of America. Dr. Hunt promises to make our stay pleasant, if business or pleasure call us that way.

Horace Hunt writes from Haverhill, N.H., March 3, 1861. Grandson of Henry Hunt, who lived to be quite aged, at Kingston, N.H.; had four brothers; Zebulon and Daniel all that are remembered. He had five sons, — Moses, now somewhere in Northern Vermont; Nathaniel and Thomas, deceased; Henry, of Peru, N.Y.; and Caleb Hunt. Horace is a graduate of Dartmouth, 1847. His brother, Caleb S., a graduate of same, 1832, married a daughter of Lieut.-Gov. John Reed, born 1810.

Jona. T. P. Hunt writes us, Sept. 4 and Nov. 11, I861. His tradition is, that his great-grandfather came from England to Newbury or Amesbury. His grandfather carried on iron-works at Gilmanton. His great-uncle Moses lived on the old homestead, at Kingston, N.H. He was a fifer in the army of the Revolution: his brother Henry was also on the rolls. Both from Hawke, N.H. J. T. P. Hunt, Esq., is Agent of the Manchester Gaslight Co.; and Director, for 1861, in the Amoskeag Manufacturing Co.

Nathaniel Hunt, of Newburyport, had family, presumed to be of this line of descent.

Sept. 12, 1861. — The amiable and intelligent old lady, Miss Abby Hunt, at the corner of Lime and School Streets, Newburyport, was called upon this day, and told of the family connection, which somewhat confirms part of this line of records; and the memoranda taken by Messrs. G. W. and W. L. G. H. form No. 121 of our file of documents. The house where the old lady resides is the house where she was born, and was built by her father Nathaniel, prior to his marriage to Miss Woodwell. How touching and tender are the blessed reminiscences of the olden time around this venerable family home!

June 19, 1862. — This day a jaunt was made to the venerable town of Amesbury, the settling-place of Edward Hunt; and the early lines of ancestry found very distinct on the ancient records, which have been brought into a good form of copy. Thence to the charming town of Kingston, where more particular record of the later lines of this descent were made evident. The old book has "Feb. 24, 1729–30: Paid to Mr. hunt for keping scool the sum of £16: 5." No settler, we think, but some collegiate gentleman there for a term. Thence to Exeter, where classification was easily made for part of the list of names previously found. Rev. E. Nason, the most diligent and highly versed antiquary in the State, invited me to his study, and made an hour pass quite pleasantly. His collections are a wonder.

THE CONCORD LINE.

This department of the book was the earliest prepared. My attention was first invited to the subject on the 9th of January, 1861, by letter from W. L. G. Hunt, Esq.; and, at that time, the proposition to enter upon the labor was not acceded to. On the 15th of the next April, a personal interview was had with Mr. Hunt; and the fulfilment of the task of obtaining extensive pedigrees of the various families was at once entered upon. From that time to near the close of the year, the families of many descendants have been visited; more correspondence has been opened, and the various depositories of ancient records reached by diligent travel; and the whole subject has been held in attentive consideration, to make it yield the fruits of good inquiries and careful research. A file of correspondence recently accumulated by Mr. Hunt was the first material to apply to the work. The preparation of this for ready use was effected by making an index of the name of every person and place with great minuteness. Then the researches of Mr. Somerby at Cambridge, &c., in a volume of moderate size, was also indiced.

The earliest call for the additional genealogies was made April 17, at 83, Chelsea Street, to the family of Mr. Samuel C. Hunt, who has been resident in Charlestown nearly forty years, — a respected and substantial citizen, engaged in West-India goods and produce-business, and who is recollected to have entertained the venerable Revolutionary patriot, Capt. Josiah Cleveland, who died at his house, from the fatigue incident to his reception by the citizens on a public day, several years ago. The Biblerecord of Mr. Hunt's family was exhibited by his accomplished daughter, Miss Olive C., a select-school preceptress of marked ability, and a faithful sabbath-school teacher in the Episcopal Church of St. John's, in Charlestown. Mr. Hunt's eldest son was ready to depart that day, and has since gone, to the war-department, in the commissary staff. Next, Mr. Reuben Hunt was visited, No. 3, Washington Street; and the record of his family, all ready prepared, was brought to these pages. He has been many years in town, from Concord. Is a somewhat retired and settled gentleman, having pursued an industrious career in the morocco-manufacturing business in past years. His son, R. Hunt, jun., Esq., was well versed in some points of my inquiry;

and entries are, in accordance, made on various pages. April 19, visited the law-office at East Cambridge, supervised then by J. Dana, Esq. There are records of the early marriages, births, and obituaries of the inhabitants of Middlesex County, returned to this office of the court in ancient time. I gathered several of our name, and they are distributed in these pages.

Also in Session Court Book, 1736, &c., pp. 52-53, it appears that Jeremiah Hunt gave bonds for fifty pounds, as ferryman from his landing-place on south side of Merrimack River, over Concord River to Chelmsford, thence over Merrimack River to the old landing-place in Dracut, for ten years. He has heretofore kept boats only on the south side of the river; and there appears to Court the necessity of a boat on the north side of the river; and he is afterward to be provided with a third boat. Page 82: Heirs of Jeremiah Hunt petition to keep the ferry; granted Aug. 30, 1737.

Volume 1748 to 61, p. 300: William Hunt licensed to keep a ferry from Tewksbury to Dracut; to have a half-penny for a single person, one penny for man and horse. Fifty pounds bond.

Thaddeus Hunt, constable, allowed fifteen shillings at court, Sept. 18, 1781.

April 20, visited house of John A. Hunt, No. 80, Sullivan Street. His Bible-record, and the information politely furnished by Mrs. Hunt, are upon the pages.

Visited, at 151, Chelsea Street, Widow Elizabeth Hunt, who intelligently has furnished various particulars of Jonathan Hunt's family, leading to a knowledge of his pedigree. This great-hearted and philanthropic lady has adopted and supported five children, having none of her own, —three of her sisters' children; viz., John, who bears the name of Hunt, and has wife and child in Franklin, N.H.; Margaret Jane, married a Burnham; Martha, married Norman S. Cate, of East Cambridge. Ann, daughter of Henry or Sylvester Hunt, she also adopted, who married a Newton. Judith married an Emerson. Mrs. Hunt is of the Baptist persuasion; and, it is needless to say, is eminent in Christian life and character. The record of Mr. Hunt's family was shown to me in a pulpit-Bible, of the weight of twenty-five pounds, for which he paid twenty-five dollars.

Other families of different branches, not of this descent, were called on; whose records are retained now by me.

April 22 and 23 are occupied with the records of probate of estates; and the exceedingly precious memorials in this office will be reverently displayed, as the reader follows me, line by line. First, the actual document was unrolled by me which is the will made and subscribed by William Hunt, Oct. 21, 1667, and codicil added 23, 8, 1667; which was proved in court, Dec. 17, 1667. The paper is of dimensions, fourteen and a quarter by eleven and a half inches, as I measured, — yellow with age, but firm and legible. The contents will be found on another page. Looking thence to vol. iii. pp. 63, 64, and 65, the estate of William Hunt, at Concord, was £596. 12s.; at Marlborough, £36. 18s.: being 6 acres with house; lot, 4 acres; lot, 6 acres;

10 acres meadow; 11 acres meadow; 5 acres meadow; 25 acres upland; 208 acres, 2d division; 25 acres upland; 5 acres meadow; 11 acres meadow; 212 acres, 2d division; 7 acres, with house; 5 acres meadow; 86 acres, 2d division.

Next in time, Isaac Hunt's estate was apprized Dec. 12, 1680, £270. 168. April 5, 1681, the widow Mary was granted administration. April 6, 1686, the children had guardians. All of Concord.

Next, Samuel Hunt, of Concord, left estate, £146. 15s. 3d. Widow Ellen, administratrix, Jan. 6, 1695-6.

Next, Isaac Hunt, of Sudbury, left widow Mary; appointed administratrix, Jan. 20, 1717–18. Inventory, dated Dec. 25 (he having died the 6th), enumerates "a bought servant-maid, £8; eight lots of land, 290 acres, with two houses, &c.; viz., lots of 68, 38, 33, 33½, 2½, 37, 87 acres in Lancaster. Land in Rutland, £5. Whole, £1,477. 58. Lengthy proceedings are on this estate for fourteen years. The children have guardians. Mrs. Hunt marries a Leland; the only daughter marries a Leland. The widow's account is brought in, naming her brother, Samuel Willard; which is the proof we have for this name in family alliance: and the son Isaac is administrator of the same estate, March 26, 1722, after the decease of his mother, Mrs. Leland.

Next, Nehemiah Hunt, of Concord, makes will, Oct. 20, 1718; proved Nov. 18, 1718. Gives to wife Elliner, son-in-law Samuel Hunt, and nephew Peter Davis, small legacies; residue, after death of wife, to his brothers and sisters. Inventory, Dec. 3, 1718: buildings and lands, with right in two grants, £318; total, about £425 (not cast up). Aug. 16, 1722, the land, 120 acres, was divided between Peter Davis and D. Whitaker. It lay in north part of Concord.

Next, Nehemiah Hunt, sen., of Concord, intestate. Admn. to widow Mary, October, 1726. Estate: house, barn, and about one acre, b. southerly on the way to Blood's, all others on William Hunt, £94; 27 acres, b. S. by Concord River, £300; 2 acres, northerly side of above, £3. 10s.; 13, &c., acres, 1st division, £35; 3\frac{1}{4} sheep-commons, 3\frac{1}{4} more, £6; undivided common, £1; right in Concord Village, £15, — £465. 10s. The heirs' names appear: Eliza Hopkinson being deceased; and the eldest son, Nehemiah, had left no issue.

Next, Thomas Hunt, of Sudbury, leaves widow; to whom administration was granted Oct. 27, 1727. Estate, £655. 5s. 10d. Martha, the widow, married James Jackson; and to him was administration on the unadministered estate granted, after her death, June 8, 1742.

Next, Jeremiah Hunt, of Tewksbury. Administration to William Stickney, of Billerica, upon application of widow Mary. June 6, 1737, inventory: 95 acres westerly side of Concord River, in Chelmsford; lot on Meeting-house Hill; 3 acres on River-meadow Brook; house and 29 acres, homestead, — £1,099. 0s. 6d. July 14, 1738, guardianship of children was allowed.

Next, Samuel Hunt, jun., of Tewksbury. Administration to Samuel Hunt, jun.

[Samuel, grandfather of the last, was still living], Dec. 11, 1738. Inventory, Dec. 8, 1738: farm in New London, Conn., bounded S. on Volintown, W. on Plainfield, N. on Killingsly, E. land not laid out, — being 400 acres, — £300; 280 acres in Tewksbury, southerly side of road from Hunt's Ferry to Andover Line, £560; 20 acres, south end of his father's farm, £30; 93 acres, homestead and buildings, £1,500. Heirs sign, 1740.

Next, Capt. Samuel Hunt, of Littleton. Administration to Jos. Baker, Aug. 20, 1739. Dinah the widow. Inventory, Aug. 24, £941. 2s. 9d.: viz., house, barn, and 20 acres, £483; 11 acres woodland, £77; 4 acres plough-land, on Plain, £40; right in new township, £20; right in North Yarmouth, £50, &c.

Next, Mrs. Ellen Hunt, of Concord. Administration to Nathaniel Russell, of Littleton, Dec. 2, 1739. Inventory, £34. 4s., Dec. 28. The heirs petition, she having died about a month ago, that Russell, and not Eben Davis, may be administrator, Nov. 30, 1739.

Next, John Hunt, of Tewksbury. Administration to brother Peter, March 17, 1741. Inventory, May 30, £981. 14s.: includes sixscore acres, and buildings, £900.

Next, Jonathan Hunt, of Billerica. Administration to brother Samuel, Aug. 8, 1746.

Next, Ebenezer Hunt, of Concord. Will, March 15, 1748. All to wife. Proved April 10, 1749.

Next, John Hunt, of Concord. Will, Dec. 25, 1751. To sons and daughters named. Proved May 14, 1765.

Next, John Hunt, jun., of Concord, aged forty years, "frequently exercised with convulsive fits." At desire of father, John Hunt, Abishai Brown named as guardian, June 3, 1752. Feb. 15, 1762, Simon Hunt appointed in room of Brown.

Next, John Hunt, of Tewksbury, for certain reasons, has guardian over his estate for a time. Inventory taken July 14, 1755, £152. 4s.; including about 70 acres land, with his part of an old house with brother Nathaniel. Guardianship ends 1759.

Next, Thomas Hunt, of Concord. Administration to widow Elizabeth, Feb. 17, 1767. Inventory, Feb. 25, £178. 6s. 8d.

Next, Jasper Daniels Hunt, son of Daniel Hunt, of Holliston, heir of his grandfather, Jasper Daniels. Guardianship, 1776.

Next, Simon Hunt, jun., Concord. Will, Jan. 11, 1777; proved Sept. 2, 1777. Wife Anna; grandson Thomas, son of Thomas deceased; 1st daughter, Hannah, a maintenance; 2d daughter, Submit Hosmer; 3d daughter, Mary Heald; 4th daughter, Anna Billing; youngest son, Thaddeus.

Next, Simon Hunt, Concord. Will, Oct. 24, 1786; proved March 8, 1791. Wife Mary; sons Simon, Ephraim, John, Reuben (exr.), Joseph; daughters Mary Wheeler, Miriam Barrett; heirs of Ruth Brooks, deceased, viz. Asa and Ann.

Next, Nehemiah Hunt, Concord. Administration to son Nehemiah, March 8, 1786. Inventory, April 14, £801. 13s. 5d., including house, &c., and 6 lots land. Widow Submit; ten children. Dower of widow distributed June 13, 1792.

Next, Nancy and Lucy Hunt, under fourteen, children of Simon Hunt, jun., by his late wife Lydia, daughter of Timothy Brooks. Guardianship to father, June 13, 1787.

Next, Nehemiah Hunt, Tewksbury, house-joiner. Administration to brother Noah, April 9, 1789. Inventory, £88, 13s. 9d., and 8 acres in Tewksbury.

Next, Timothy Hunt, of Littleton, cooper. Administration to father John, June 18, 1792.

Next, Anna Hunt, of Concord, widow. Administration to Abner Wheeler, March 11, 1795. Son Thaddeus, and Samuel Heald, husband of daughter Mary, apply.

Next, William Hunt, of Sudbury. Will, Aug. 28, 1797; proved May 11, 1802. Three sons, seven daughters (married). Inventory, July 1, 1802: half of 100 acres in Sudbury; total, \$2,409.20.

Next, Eliphalet Hunt, rendered "Life," of Tewksbury. Administration, Sept. 17, 1800, to father Peter, the only heir. Inventory, June 25, 1800, \$251.25.

Next, Nathaniel Hunt, Tewksbury. Administration, May 1, 1812, to Josiah Brown. Inventory, \$495.05, June 6, 1812, including about 30 acres land. Distribution to heirs, 1814, — five sons, daughter Betty, and administrator of daughter Sarah, administrator of daughter Doreas, administrator of daughter Rebecca.

Next, Dr. Joseph Hunt, Concord. Will, May 25, 1812; proved June 10, 1812. Wife Lucy; son Henry; grand-daughter Lucy, daughter of son Joseph deceased.

And more were taken off, not relating to this descent, which will be ready for other lines when called for.

April 25, a tour was made to Lincoln, where a few records were found. Mr. Haman Hunt, ticket-master at railroad, was very affable and intelligent on subjects of inquiry. At Concord, a large research was made, and is embodied on the pages. Abel and Daniel Hunt appear to be the only men of long standing, in this original abode of the family, who have retained the name.

April 30, a visit was made to the venerable registry of deeds; and, combining what Mr. Somerby obtained early, the whole result of copying shows a sufficiently large amount of landed estate to have made the proprietors feel rich, and perhaps enable those who have inherited to define their present localities with exactness. It will not only be followed with interest by the close reader, but referred to, by the aid of our careful index of localities, for frequent illustrations.

Lib. liii. 30: Samuel Hunt, of Harvard, and wife Tabitha, sell Thomas Rand, of Weston, right in the widow's thirds of Geo. Parkhurst's estate, Nov. 14, 1753.

Lib. lix. p. 360: This deed shows that John Hunt, of Concord, married Mary, daughter of Thomas Brown, of Concord.

Lib. lxiv. p. 328: John Hunt, of Hasanimisco, son of Isaac Hunt, of Sudbury, sells J. Gibbs 30 acres in Sudbury, Jan. 28, 1733-4; recorded Oct. 31, 1765. [Modern name is Grafton. John settled in Hardwick finally.]

Lib. lxvii. 236: John Parker, tanner, and wife Abigail; Benjamin, Samuel, and Solo Kidder, — grandchildren of Samuel Hunt, — sell land in Tewksbury, Nov. 23, 1759; recorded, 1767.

Moses Adams to Abida Hunt, of Holliston, 60 acres in Holliston; also 4 acres meadow-land, by deed dated Feb. 18, 1746, and recorded Nov. 1, 1793, book exiv. page 208.

John Marshall to Abida Hunt, of Holliston, 1 acre, adjoining Hunt's other land, by deed dated Nov. 14, 1752, and recorded Nov. 1, 1793, book 114, page 209.

Thomas Marshall to Abida Hunt, of Holliston, 1 acre, adjoining Hunt's land, by deed dated Nov. 14, 1752, and recorded Nov. 1, 1793, book exiv. page 210.

I find no other transaction by Abida or Abidah Hunt within the time mentioned.

Wednesday, May 1, 1861. — Proceeded to East Sudbury, and looked over the new copy lately made from the old records of Sudbury; thence to Old Sudbury, and copied gravestones; then to Jonas S. Hunt, who is town-clerk. The very extensive records there, and Mr. Hunt's oral information, have largely added to pages of pedigree. The church-record, at Mr. Shaw's, and the private records formerly kept by Rev. J. Bigelow, owned now at Mr. Hurlburt's, were afterwards examined and comprised. Mr. Aaron Hunt, a courtly and intelligent old farmer, was called on the next morning; and the record of his family Bible was submitted for copy. Mr. Israel Hunt, near by, was visited; and the family Bible was likewise shown, and the record copied. Mr. Hunt has lived a scafaring life several years. He sailed to St. Petersburg in 1806, in brig "John," of Newburyport, Capt. Swett, owned by Capt. Coffin; and has been to Liverpool, Stockholm, and Copenhagen. Very glad to state what particulars of his family would be serviceable for the work, and proffered the hospitalities of the house with politeness. Examined next the gravestones of a burial-yard not very remote. Called next at John Hunt's, a venerable man in years, yet apparently many years younger: furnished with readiness the Bible-record, &c. Next visited Mr. Andrew Hunt's family. Two family Bibles contained the records. One was "Teprell, of Ann Street, Boston edition," 1824; the other, modern, large, gilt-edged. Nahum Thompson's family record was then called for, and copied for these pages.

At the southerly village, Messrs. C. and E. Hunt rendered an account of their families by the records in the Bible; and the verbal information of Mr. Gardner Hunt placed several particulars right, by his recollections of past generations. Passing a few doors beyond Mr. Hunt's store, called then at Widow Elizabeth Hunt's; and by Mr. Nichols B. Hunt was readily placed in possession of the family statistics there. A fine ride in Mr. Hunt's cariole brought me to Mr. Reuben Hunt's, on way to Saxonville. The record of his family was briefly given verbally; and the collections of the tour thus closed, and the cars soon after taken for Boston.

May 6. — Several Boston citizens were visited in quest of their family records of the golden past, either of the rich and momentous or the simple and ordinary; all alike, in combination, possessing value.

Mr. Nehemiah Hunt, No. 15, Ash Street, was the first of this family descent who

was reached, after calling upon several of different branches. A fine family Bible there, and I believe all the particulars are had correct. Much of the intelligence here was verbal, and of the previous generation.

At No. 63, Eliot Street, resides the family left by Mr. Charles S. Hunt, formerly of the custom-house. A circular piece of antique written work contained data of 1758, &c.; and the other records later, in a family Bible, entered very elaborately and minutely to the day of the week.

Mrs. James Hunt and family, corner of M'Lean and Blossom Street, were ascertained to be of this descent; and welcome was afforded to a copy of their family Bible and to verbal minutiæ of information.

May 7. — The records of the city of Boston, so abundant, and so laboriously prepared by indices for examination, were first this day entered upon; and, on many days subsequently, they were reverted to for all particulars that might concern our inquiry. The pages contain the facts, as classified and applied to all of this descent; and many more are gathered for other pages.

May 8. — Rode to Salem for the valuable Essex registries here. Record of Samuel Hunt's family, who so early came to Ipswich from Concord, are found on county books here, all so nicely copied by Mr. Kimball, always so competent and careful. On early book of court-records here, it appears that Edmund Baters, of Salem, being indebted to Peter Hunt, of Coffenswell, Co. Devon, for £18, constitutes John Goodman and Thomas Clarke, attorneys, to collect of Francis Simpson, of Marblehead, and pay, &c., Aug. 26, 1657.

Essex Deeds, lib. iii. 311: Samuel Hunt, of Ipswich, buys of F. Wainwright about one acre salt marsh, at Grape Island, 1673.

Lib. iv. 122: Deposition of Samuel Hunt, and wife Elizabeth, is taken, 1677, concerning their father Joseph Redding's lot of land. Page 123: Likewise deposition of Samuel Hunt, sen., and Samuel, jun., 1677. More land on Plumb Island is sold in two deeds by Samuel Hunt.

Lib. v. 434 (¼ page): Goodman Palmer, of Rowley, engages lands to his son at marriage with Elizabeth, only daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth Hunt, 1691. Page 597: Elizabeth Hunt gives two sons, William and Joseph Hunt, estate which was her father's, 1690; acknowledged 1693. Page 598: Elizabeth Hunt, "being by my dear and honored father Joseph Reddings, of Ipswich, made his sole executrix, have made division of estate left at mother's decease to eldest son Samuel, to deare and only daughter Elizabeth Palmer, and to two other children, William and Joseph Hunt;" receipt of legacy, £52, — March 26, 1690-1; signed by Samuel Hunt of Concord, Mary Hunt. Page 600: Samuel Hunt of Ipswich, and wife Elizabeth, convey to Joseph Hunt, of Ipswich, all their estate, in consideration of a maintenance, May 11, 1693.

Lib. ix.: Joseph Hunt, of lpswich, sells Joseph Andrews, of Bocksford, 8½ acres on Plumb Island, 1693.

Lib. xi. 56: William Hunt, of Ipswich, glazier, buys of J. Lee 7¹/₄ acres in Ipswich, July 3, 1695.

Lib. xvi. 41: William Hunt, of Ipswich, glazier, buys of Francis Palmer, of Rowley, and wife Ann, all rights given to his wife, Elizabeth Palmer, by J. Redding, for £10, Dec. 17, 1698; recorded 1703.

Lib. xxii. p. 113; Joseph Hunt, late of Ipswich, now of Stonington, sells William Hunt, for £140, all lands in Ipswich given by grandfather Redding.

Lib. xxx. 77: William Hunt, 1710, of Ipswich, glazier, and wife Sarah, sell, for £80, lands bought of brother Joseph, March 19, 1714-15.

Lib. xxxii. 55: William Hunt, jun., and wife Sarah, sell D. Corning 12 acres marsh, in Ipswich, £87, April 3, 1717.

Lib. exxvi. 84: William Hunt, of Norwich, glazier, sells Thomas Lord $7\frac{1}{4}$ acres, Plumb Island, June 1, 1744; recorded May 4, 1769.

At Salem, Lewis Hunt was the earliest ancestor of the families now residing there. Called on William Hunt, in the Asiatic Building, who is interested in the Hunts of his lineage.

The census for 1850, 1855, and part of 1860, has been viewed, and facts drawn for the work. The registration from 1845, annual, kept at State House, has furnished some data.

May 23. Proceeded to Holliston, and examined the records of the town, contained in six small quartos, marbled-paper covers, and of about a hundred pages each, and one larger volume. Then looked over church-records. John L. Hunt, of this town, is from a line of Hunts in Vermont. Came to Milford, the large and flourishing boot and shoe town, the interests slightly dashed now by imminent war-news. Calling at store of Hiram Hunt, was referred to Adam Hunt (since postmaster of Milford). Three family Bibles afforded a harvest of data quite acceptable for the book. Thence, under the guidance of Deputy-sheriff J. D. Hunt, after calling at his house, and obtaining the family-record exhibited by the Bible, and by information of several members of the family there visiting, proceeded to the office of the town-clerk, and found ready accessible the old books of Milford; and then, calling upon the venerable Deacon Rockwood, saw the old church-book of Second Church in Mendon, now appertaining to Milford. Parish-records, kept by Clark Ellis, were then visited, without any thing of note there. Called on Mrs. Lowell Hunt, who related, with much politeness, whatever circumstances of her husband's family might be considered additional to the book. A kind, thoughtful, and intelligent lady Mrs. Hunt is. Leonard Hunt was visited, at work in his garden, and gave reference to Mr. Ballou for the very few facts there would be of his family.

Went on to Hopedale, a mile or two out of the village of Milford. Rev. Adin Ballou has the great family Bible, — Isaiah Thomas's Worcester edition, 1791, once the property of Perly Hunt, Esq.; cost ten dollars. Four or five well-filled columns made a marked addition to hitherto accumulated facts. This Bible is an especial relic of trust with Mr. Ballou, for the perusal, at all times, by any of the family. A worthy and pious memorial it is. The next day looked over Mendon records, finding a few early items. Dr. Metcalf has given much research to this town-history of person and place. Thence to Uxbridge. Hunts were here from Gloucester, R.I., descendants of John.

Came on to the lively village of East Douglas. Here are the descendants of Ezekiel Hunt, who came to town more than a hundred years ago, and established the trade of a blacksmith; which resulted in the growth of the axe and cutlery works here, which have a world-wide fame for their excellent manufactures. Tradition is adhered to, that Ezekiel was from Ipswich; and to that is superadded England: while the Ipswich (Mass.) records make it greatly evident he was the son of Ezekiel Hunt, of the third generation from the first settler at Concord. Absolute certainty we have not to afford; yet it seems so certain by all appearances for, and none against, this conclusion, that we are strengthened to admit upon the pages all the family-groups of this line, as descendants of William Hunt, of Concord.

Charles A. Hunt, at the Axe-works, where the records of the town are kept in the counting-room safe, made several items more clear by personal knowledge of various facts of interest. With Mr. Hunt, proceeded to Mrs. Balcom, the venerable daughter of Ezekiel Hunt, who enjoys an intelligent and happy old age. Every effort was used by the old lady to make a sure recollection of essential portions of her father's early life.

Called at Anderson Hunt's house, and copied the record of the Bible. Called next at Leander B. Hunt's house, obtaining oral intelligence from Mr. and Mrs. Hunt, as well as the Bible register. Called at William Hunt's cottage on the hill, not obtaining any record. Called on Deacon Warren Hunt, the principal in the manufactory of the superior cutlery stamped w. Hunt. The family of Deacon Hunt and of his son were readily obtained, mostly as of record in family Bible. His son, F. W. Hunt, lives next door, in a mansion of great elegance, on the main street. The East-Douglas band were not far away up the street, just at this period of time, playing one of their skilful and delightful melodies of evening music; and, if the toilsome gathering of facts this day becomes illustrated on the printed page, it may be a happy reflection for the musicians, that their charming performance honored the labor, and visit to their village, of the humble and painstaking genealogical traveller, who may rarely come again, and whose pious task for the day may thus be distinguished, although he knows not that the compliment was intended. Mr. Joseph Hunt, at his house, related the facts to be supplied for his family, and was courteous and minute in explaining all that occurred of mention or inquiry. This visit ended the research.

Saturday, May 25, 1861.—At the Worcester law-office, devoted three hours to the two books of marriages in the county-towns; and some of the name found not to be readily had elsewhere.

The registry of deeds for many years was next investigated, and the outline fact of conveyances of a great number of Hunts taken, to make identities certain, and open new references.

Called at A. A. Hunt's house, and received an assurance of some memorials of the Hardwick families, which have been received since by letter.

May 26. — At Paxton. Heard Rev. Mr. Phipps preach. In the interval of worship-hours, examined the old records of the town. Another service, by Mr. Jones, in Paxton or Spencer. Records of Spencer Church seen after service.

May 27. — Town-records of Spencer were examined, and contents for this work noted. Continued on the road to Leicester. A very few items there. Arrived at Worcester. One or two items only, derived from the city-records. Then called at Widow Luther M. Hunt's. Next at Luther Stone's house, and a few family records obtained.

At the Probate Office. Went through this rich collection of wills, &c., of the Hunts, so as to determine family lineage. First, upon vol. xii. page 542, Ebenezer Hunt, of Paxton. Inventory, £495, 18s. 9d.: comprising part of house, and 57 acres land, £200; pew in Paxton Meeting-house, £10; Dorothy Hunt, administratrix, March 1, 1774. Division, 1779: one-third to widow; one-third to Thomas Hunt; to Joseph, $17\frac{1}{4}$ acres; to Jonathan, $71\frac{1}{2}$ acres; to Jazaniah, $23\frac{1}{2}$ acres; to Deliverance, wife of Thaddeus Easterbrooks, $21\frac{1}{2}$ acres; to Dorothy, $10\frac{3}{4}$ acres; the pew, two-sixths to widow, two-sixths to Thomas, two-sixths to other heirs.

Next, John Hunt, of Hardwick. Inventory, £5,365. 0s. 2d., March 28, 1778; Aaron Hunt, administrator. Page 564: Distribution, — widow Patience, one-third; Samuel, eldest son, having quit his share, balance to John, Moses, Joseph, Hannah wife of Nathan Wheeler of Stratham, Mary wife of James Wright, — the other children. Vol. xv. p. 107.

Next, Deliverance Hunt (widow of Ebenezer). Inventory, £691. 1s. 9d., Jan. 3, 1778; her dower apprized March 6, 1780 (warrant), £5,360. 10s. Next, Dorothy Hunt, of Paxton. Will, May 4, 1774; proved Aug. 7, 1774. To son Ebenezer, the great Bible, books, and effects; to Deliverance Hunt, and her daughters Deliverance and Dorothy, under eighteen years old, articles of furniture; to grandson Thomas Hunt, £38. 13s. 4d., when twenty-one years old, "if he is in the land of the living;" residue of money to grandsons Joseph and Jona. Estate, £2,690. 19s.; dollars, sixty for one, Sept. 1, 1780. Vol. xvi. 224.

Next, vol. xx. 446, $2\frac{7}{8}$ pages: Patience Hunt, of Hardwick. Will, Oct. 28, 1782; proved 1784. And, in furtherance of the investigations to procure the material to compose the columns of pedigrees, visits have been made, and repeatedly, to some localities, as may be here enumerated, — to Massachusetts Historical Rooms, Genealogical Rooms, State Library; archives in Secretary's Office, for census, registration, and military rolls; Boston Registry; Charlestown Records; Suffolk Probate and Deeds, &c.; Harvard-College Library, &c.

July 9, took the cars for Ipswich, Mass., and compiled from the records serviceable facts. Ezekiel Hunt appears not to have been a resident there near the year 1760: the widow of Ezekiel, sen., was there in 1784.

July 24, proceeded by railroad to Andover, Mass. At the town-clerk's house, examined the old records of Andover, with the discovery of some essential facts as are comprised in the pages. Next called at Mr. Chandler's house; and was there made acquainted, by Misses Hannah J. and Mary B. Hunt, with the statistics of their family by recollection, and with much cheerfulness and alacrity. The excellent young ladies are exemplary members of the ancient church at Andover; and their names will be found in the printed roll of that society recently issued from the press.

Called on Madam Elizabeth Hunt, in the west part of Andover, whose memory was vivid and of avail in determining some points to certainty.

The burial-ground near by contained several headstones of the family.

Thence to Windham, N.H., with one or two items of record; then to Londonderry, with no success in finding the name; then to Litchfield, where the early records have been lost; then to Merrimack, with but one or two items of records discovered. Mrs. Riddle, formerly Elizabeth Hunt, of Goffstown, I called on, who is of the Milton Family.

July 26, came to Nashua: called at apothecary's shop of J. Earle Hunt, who related his pedigree minutely; thence to residence of Nehemiah Hunt; then to City Hall, where the records of Old Dunstable were subsequently examined, together with all the more modern city-books.

Then by cars to Amherst: looked over a variety of land-conveyances, some of which were of the special line of Hunts. Vol. xlvii. p. 223: Willard Hunt, of Dublin, buys of Spalding land and buildings in Hancock, near New Boston, N.H., \$500, Nov. 24, 1795, &c. At county-clerk's office, looked over census of 1850 and 1860, with the addition of many miscellaneous names to my copies.

The Probate Records were next viewed. Mrs. Hannah Hunt, formerly Cum-

mings, inventory, Nov. 6, 1789, £400, vol. iv. 161. Isaac Hunt, of Hancock, made will June 5, 1839; codicil, Jan. 29, 1841; proved Nov. 2, 1841. To son Moses, \$1; daughter Betsy Wilds, \$10; daughter Harriet Hunt, \$1 and the Tyrrel Farm; daughter Hannah Dodge, \$1; daughter Sarah Hunt, \$1, and land bought of Tenny; daughter Elvira Dodge, \$1; son David, 281 acres in Antrim, 30 acres in Nelson, 52 acres and three other lots in Hancock, 48 acres in Stoddard. Vol. xlviii. p. 145.

Jeremiah Hunt, of Dunstable. Will, Dec. 22, 1827; proved Feb. 7, 1844. To wife Esther and three children. Witness, John Hunt. Vol. xlviii. 340.

Again at Nashua, where the records were now examined with good success. Called on Mrs. Rufus Williams, three miles from the city, and heard from her orally a recital of her abundant recollections of her grandfather's family, which add very materially to the collection. She is a lady of portly size, and of merry good humor in conversation; and expressed a desire to see the work in print, and have a copy. Her grandfather was Deacon Hunt, and one of the best men.

Six valuable gravestones were copied at the burying-place, near Willard's Hotel. Tyngsborough was then reached, and records examined without success here. Billerica records were soon after submitted to a research, and additional information here found. Tewksbury records then were carefully examined, and a great deal here added.

July 28. — Visited Thomas Hunt, about two miles from Lowell, one of the worthy and substantial men of whom our annals are full: as the intelligence had been received by letter for these pages, but slight additional facts were added. The solid and excellent hospitality of his mansion, and the society of himself and amiable daughters up at Lowell to attend divine worship, made a marked feature in this summer tour, agreeable and very much appreciated. A family burial-place is on Mr. Hunt's farm: old stones were copied.

Mrs. Samuel J. Hunt and sons were called upon in the interim of public worship, and the particulars of the family furnished with readiness and attention. Called on Mr. Jona. Hunt, who furnished the memorials of his family Bible.

July 29. — Went up to Dracut: but one or two items for us on the town-books. Down again to Lowell, and copied from the scanty records there are there of the past. But, contented with all, returned well laden to Boston in the express-train.

Roxbury records, families in Boston, and various other sources of information, have been visited with eminent success.

The great number of letters that have been received, and the very choice, diligent, and careful character of some of the lines of correspondence we have had, merit very high encomiums. We accord, to all who have been kind in replying, a great measure of praise.

WILLIAM HUNT.

William Hunt, one of the first settlers of Concord, was made freeman, June 2, 1641. He was a large landed proprietor, and left considerable estates to his sons. He removed to Marlborough, and died in October, 1667, having made his will on the 21st of the same month. His first wife, and the mother of his children, was Elizabeth —, who died at Concord, Dec. 27, 1661; and, in 1664, he married Mercy, daughter of —— Hurd, whose first husband was Thomas Brigham; and, second, Edmund Rice.

The following is a copy, rerbatim et literatim, of the will of William Hunt, now on file at the office of probate, in Cambridge:—

METHOD.


The posterity of William Hunt is now arranged according to the method adopted originally for this family alone; referring, for the name of every person desirable to find, under the initial beginning letter of the given name; and so tracing to father, &c., by each gradation, to the original ancestor. It is thought, by the compiler, to be a better method than ever adopted. Those who do not think so will find all the other lines arranged differently; and therein they will be suited. This line was the initial

work of the whole collection. Most of all the researches have been instituted to make this more perfect; and it is offered as a complete combination of all that has been received of the pedigrees of this line, after a great and thorough research; and is believed to be as full list of the descendants, of this name at least, as to show to all now living, who are traceable in this line, the greater portion of their ancestors correct. The miscellaneous pedigrees may possibly include some few traceable in this line. With a very slight study, and without labored explanation, we feel confident that all interested in inquiring will easily make way in these pages with pleasure and satisfaction.

It may be well to add, that to each head of a group is affixed reference to the previous generation; as, "son of ——," &c. Thus turning, by the alphabetical direction of the name, to a forward or a past page, the trace is easily made through to the one progenitor of this line. The next words give the wife's name, and the date of marriage, if it is not indicated as of publishment. The first row of figures in the column of the family group is data of birth, unless signified as of baptism. The superior figure to a name in the group carries that in continuation for a new group. The date subsequent to a name is of decease. The surname or married name subsequent to a daughter is again taken in the schedule of alliances.

Spaces are left for the family to fill by a type impression, or by ink or pencil, where we have not got name or date. It is all easy. No explanation is needed. We know we write for intelligent and discerning people.

Lower (in his 'Surnames') includes the Hunts among the sixty commonest names in England. This fact betokens vitality of race: for 'Hunt' is not like 'Baker' and 'Smith,' which, being trades, must have given separate origin to many families, entirely distinct from each other. The Hunts have never been a great folk: but there has been, about most of them that I have known, a certain sort of steady pertinacious permanency and vitality, which has shown itself in a disposition to own a little land, work on it, and transmit it to their children: and the putting into practice this characteristic naturally implies a fair amount of industry, temperance, and general good morals. And these qualities form the basis of the great New-England character, which, struggle against it as they may at the South and in the Middle States, will one day give the law to the Western Continent. Hon. Ezra Hunt, of Bowling Green, Mo., died in Troy, Lincoln County, in that State, Sept. 19, 1860, aged seventy years. He was in attendance upon the Circuit Court in session there, in his usual health. Having spoken on a case in his charge in the afternoon, and having eaten his supper, after the adjournment of the court, he said he was not very well; went to a fire in a retired room at his lodgings; was conversing with a lady, with apparent cheerfulness, when he suddenly appeared to be falling from his chair. He was caught; and physicians were called, who found that the vital spark had fled, and he ceased to live. He was a native of Massachusetts; born in Milford, th April, 1790. He was fitted for college at Leicester Academy, and was distinguished for his knowledge of mathemamatics and the exact sciences; and at Commencement, when he graduated, the subject assigned to him was "The Study of the Mathematics." Immediately after leaving college, he was appointed Preceptor of Leicester Academy; where he remained until the autumn of 1817, when he went to Cambridge for the purpose of studying divinity. He remained there, with the exception of four months devoted to keeping school in Lincohn, Mass, until May, 1818; when he went to Pulaski, West Tennessee, and took charge of an academy, on a salary of seven hundred dollars per annum. He was invited to remain another year, with a salary of twelve hundred dollars; but declined. While in charge of the Academy in Pulaski, he pursued the study of the law under the direction of the late Judge William C. Carr. He practised three years in the town of Lonisiana, in Missouri. From this place he removed to St. Charles, in the same State.

In 1831, he removed to Bowling Green, Pike County, Mo. He was appointed, Jan. 6, 1836, Judge of the Circuit Court for that judicial district, with a salary of a thousand dollars per annum; and discharged the duties of

Much pleased with the brief call upon Mr. Hunt, - an upright, worthy, intelligent, and courteous man; and has beautiful and affectionate children remaining of his large and interesting family.

The dry branches of genealogical trees bear many pleasant and curious fruits for those who know how to search after them; and not less interesting, to the capable investigator, are the results of historical studies. The interest which has grown up throughout the country, during the last fifteen or twenty years, in these departments of literature, is a proof of great advancement in elegant culture, and in the enjoyment of the poetry and romance of the past; as if, by a long circle of cultivation, we came round again to the natural graceful pride of nation and family, which nourish the virtues and furnish the literature of savage and half-savage races. It is, perhaps, not generally known that there are State historical societies, often with large and valuable collections and libraries, in at least sixteen States, besides a number of similar county, town, and other local associations; and that, in our practical, money-loving American hearts, family pride has worked so effectually as to cause the compiling and publishing (since the first-published American genealogy of the respectable name of Stebbins, 12mo, Hartford, 1771, pp. 24) of not less than one hundred and seventy family genealogies, or collections, of them. — New York Independent.



At the very early age of twelve, entered Judge Turner's office, and began the study of the law. Admitted to the bar at twenty years of age. From that period, constantly (except while serving the town or commonwealth in civil or military offices) engaged in a large and tolerably lucrative practice of law. When twenty-one years old, became a member of the State Legislature; and for seven years continued youngest member of that body. Democracy is his political faith. A member of all the Constitutional Conventions within fifty years past. Assistant-Judge of Court of Common Pleas, 1844. Resident at St. Alban's since 1804, the Judge now enjoys a retirement from the cares and labors of a professional life; yet, if the hour of our country's danger should approach, he may be once more sought for wise counsels, like CINCINATUS at the plough, and await again the entire acceptance and happy approval of his worthy fellow-citizens for some other distinguished office in their gift.

Of an ardent and generous temperament, the Judge has, of late years, adopted what are considered very broad and liberal views in matters of religion. His first consort—a lady esteemed, deeply beloved, in the blessed smetity of the faith—departed this life in the tender communion of the Roman-Catholic Church; and, some time after (June 7, 1852), the Judge and his present estimable lady were Continued in the same ancient faith, finding belief, doctrine, comfort, in the same which has been a rock of trust for a hundred generations. Saints, martyrs, apostles,—what a glorious host bear them company! Taking down Gahan's "Church History" (Philadelphia, 1832, p. 360) from our shelves, we are astounded at the succession and honors in the old Church. Sweet ministrations of the saintly, all along the stream of time, to cheer those benighted ages of the past! Wonderful memories! Golden hopes of coming ages!

Portraits of the Judge and of the late Henry J. (his excellent son, who won a noble and independent fortune, and, having thus "finished his course," welcomed death, and is lately enshrined in the silent earth), and of his daughter-in-law, the bereaved widow, are in the elegant hall of the mansion in Chelsen; and the representations are beautiful. Gladly would we make room for copies among these pages. A photograph of the mansion, modern and superb, we long to get, with its sunny slopes of ground, innumerable flowers in the garden, and choice view of the meandering Mystic,—charming stream. Soft, delicious, and yet majestic, is this region in the steady light of a glorious, warm August afternoom.

Before the period of mourning for the deceased has passed, we make, on this select page, a memorial of one whom we can hardly realize as gone. Amid the most pressing season of enterprise and usefulness, the hand of Death snatches ruthlessly the favored ones least to be spared. Mr. Hunt had come near the climax of his energetic career of business life, and could about be ready to abide richly, for some anticipated years, in the contented affluence to which he was entitled. The cup of balm, almost ready, would seem to be changed to gall. Yet not so. The retrospection of his life is a presage that the reward is high for him in the future, for which he eagerly longed; and the benediction of our Saviour upon the mount, "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they SHALL see God," we confide in as intended for our friend, so gentle, attentive, and considerate in all the walks of private and domestic life. Mr. Hunt's business life was multiform; in the tenor of his irrepressible activity, strength, and native ability. Born of a farmer's prolific family, he was bred to the trade of a carpenter, and some time followed that. Then, at some period of life, was at New Orleans, conducting business as a grocer. Again, engaging, to better advantage, in business in Boston as a plumber, making twenty thousand dollars, and not lucky to save that from a final loss. Carrying on several years the occupation of a cutler, he was well known. Embarking in the manufacture of enamelled leather, he acquired forty thousand dollars; out of which the world likewise gets the better advantage by his loss again. In 1859, with his esteemed partner, E. S. Goodwin, formed the New-England Belting and Hose Company, manufacturing superb articles, not of the ornamental, but of the USEFUL description, which enter largely into commerce, and are of standard repute. Rubber goods, also, is an article included. He opened, in Alexandria and Washington, stores for the sale of commodities; and has kept his bow always bent. His life, we believe, was of unswerving integrity throughout, and in exact conformity to the cardinal points of true mercantile honor; and, yet more, with a conscience void of offence toward God and toward man. "Remember me, O my God! for good." - Neh. xiii. 31.

Major Perley Hunt, oldest son of Daniel and Mary (Phillips) Hunt, was nearly forty years postmaster and merchant of his native town; and, for half a century, the most active and conspicuous of its citizens in all that related to the welfare of neighborhood, town, and State.

Liberal and democratic in his religious and political views, he was always earnest and decided in proclaiming them; a great admirer of Jetierson and Jackson, and always a staunch friend of the Democratic party. His natural and unaffected courteousness and geniality endeared him greatly, and made firm friends of all acquainted with him. For a long series of years, he was honored with the most important offices in the gift of the town, and was frequently elected to the State Legislature. Rarely, if ever, has the decease of any citizen of Milford been more deeply and generally lamented.

Thursday, April 25, 1861. - A bright day was selected to visit the eminence, near the Main Street, ancient and sacred as the resting-place of the fathers. The stones are nearly all of the common blue slate, many of magnificent size, and protected by numerous thorn-bushes, not now in leaf, offering sharp resistance even to the inquirer, with reverent purpose, seeking memorials of the cherished dust. A sightly cemetery is close in view, with much of the modern white marble; and lower on the street is another large and old ground, with no names of ours. Twenty-two more of our name are commemorated on the high ground: viz., John Hunt and wives Mary and Dorothy; Nehe-MIAH and wife MARY; NEHEMIAH 2 NEHEMIAH 4 and daughter MARY; REUBEN and MIRIAM, children of Reuben and Rebecca; Deacon Simon and wife Mary; Simon (1702, in twentieth year); Simon 2 Thaddeus and widow ELIZABETH; THOMAS 4 THOMAS 6 THOMAS 8 WILLIAM and widow MARY (double stone); and MERCY, w. of David Whittaker, daughter of Nehemiah Hunt, who departed this life, Nov. 29, 1733, in the fifty-fourth year of her age.

The Life of William Hunt.

He was born in England about the year 1605, two years after the tedious but glorious reign of the Maiden Queen had ended, and the mild and pacific James Stuart had come from his native realm to rule the three kingdoms; and all the nation was glad at the happy change. It was a

pleasant time to live in England. There was no very great emigration taking place, and no serious occasion for people to leave their native land to get a living. King James gave to his subjects the Bible in the same form we use this day; and learning and wisdom received happy impulses from the new light diffused by revelation, spreading its lustre more widely over civilized life. Our ancestor partook, in his daily career, of the free average advantage which a somewhat middling position in social rank allowed to realize the benefits flowing to the interior social state of the people from the refreshing access of intelligence and progress ra-pidly accelerating. His joyous days of childhood and youth passed into ripe manhood. Getting forward in life beyond the perils incident to all conditions, amid the protecting influences that guard the English home, - as from the early consecration at the baptismal font by the revered pastor, to the gradual growth in school and church attendance; under parental or friendly care, coming to know and practise industry and every good accomplishment that could be an attribute of the intelligent and likely young man; then to the blissful married state, and to be father (before he left England) of at least two sons, - gifts tender and promising to infold and bring over from the Old World hither, to bear fruit and multiply, replenish the wilderness, and give seed for yet countless generations.

Not long after the bright and happy state of conjugal life had been entered by our revered ancestor, the policy of public affairs grew gloomy: and the hearts and wishes of worthy subjects of the king inclined them to leave the land of their nativity; to forsake the castled hills and sumny dales that they were so familiar with; to separate from the neighborhood of the kind and friendly nobility of the land, the earl and the earl's daughter, whose presence was always inspiring; to go from the domain of the good duke, who was so firm in Parliament to support the living interests of the kingdom, the strong arguer for right, and a pillar of the realm. Could William Hunt go with his friends and neighbors, and build a commonwealth, and hope to live? Ah! the effort was made; the achievement apparently has been accomplished. He sailed in the year 1635, with his companions, away from Old England, giving up more especially the succoring and sustaining influences of the best home society, - old neighbors, helpful and friendly (dear, good souls, known from childhood), - willing to lose all comforts and nurture so well accustomed. Greater sacrifices were to be made; the rich and blessed communious of early friendship were to be cut off. These quiet,

homely English folk were going in a merchant vessel to sea. A ship took them with goods, eustomhouse certificates, charts, compasses, sailing gear, ocean fare, and all things strange and unused, in hazard of all dangers of the deep. The company arrived safe. From different counties came the hardy settlers. The goodly and godly Peter Bulkley, Capt. Willard, the Wheelers, Thomas Bateman, and others, are all familiar to the page of history. The weary and faithful craft came to anchor at the quay in Boston. No inducement for the stanch husbandmen was there to remain, and get subsistence in town: so they came up soon to Musketaquid, now changed (from the barbarous Indian) to the sweet and intelligent name Con-CORD, for town and river. Had they a dictionary to help them find this good name? We will take down Walker's edition, and we find, -

"CONCORD, noun substantive. Agreement between persons and things; peace, union, harmony;

eoncert of sounds."

It was the sentiments of the hearts of our Christian forefathers that moved them to bestow this choice name. The township, six miles square, was regularly bought of the Indians. The bargain was made by Capt. Willard and others, at the house of Mr. Bulkley, with Squa Sachem, Nuttunkurta, and others, of odd and long names; and the pay was duly delivered. The land was swampy in some places, with none but Indian paths, about one foot broad, and anon a broad plain, with thick, prickly bushes. Plenty of deep woods, where "sweet ferne" grew so abundant, that in summer, under the sun's rays, the strong aroma thereof caused many to faint, and fallen trees impeded very much the early proprietors. Uplands they had, and meadows which overflowed at times with water unexpectedly, as the old records say. They could make hay. Fish were caught. Alewives were plenty, even to bestow to enrich the ground.

The habitation of our ancestor was built, like the others, by digging into the bank of the hill, driving posts into the ground, and covering the top and sides with brushwood. This might be called a mere wigwam; and so were the beginnings of his American home. In process of time, land was divided, and the town-business organized; and affairs were conducted. He was one who petitioned the Governor and Assembly, in the year 1645, concerning matters of finance.

Indians were near neighbors of the Concord people a great while. Their red faces and uncouth habits were not very congenial to the inborn and hereditary tastes of Mr. and Mrs. Hunt and the children, and to the other settlers from the fertile and good-mannered counties of England. Christian efforts to civilize and train the ignorant to the practice of religion and peaceful arts was the commanding sentiment of these refined and superior men and women; thereby promoting content, peace, and amity. Labor was severe to bring the fruits

of the earth forward. A very unyielding soil it was in some places. Final success was their blessing, in the comforts of a good living and gradual

civilized prosperity. Misapprehension of the style of men who early eame over is apt to be formed by those in no wise students of antiquity; as if the emigrant was a mere ditch-laborer, or a wanderer with a pack on his back, in uncouth, ill-made, slovenly garments, with speech thick and barbarous, in no manner agreeable or polite; impatient, blustering, or profane perhaps. The old Puritan English settler was a man for us to revere and honor, a true gentleman. We elaim for the Concord patriarch an unsullied record, which we have diligently examined and profoundly meditated upon, and now bring reverently forward to place as history for all coming time. He had given all his children scriptural names; and we may be sure, from the subsequent prosperity in life of the three sons who extend the name, that they were "brought up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." Their souls could here be strongly knit together in tender and affectionate communings upon the sacred themes of Holy Writ. Being often told of England, their minds would desire to partake of the great delights of refinements common in their ancestral land; and, devoid of that opportunity, the privilege of such reading as prevailed would be eagerly Thus pious books which were brought over, and the rich pages of Holy Seripture, might leave an impress effectual upon their forming and active minds. Goodness, purity, and virtue, tempered with the FEAR OF GOD, amid the drear wilderness, were their characteristics. Call to mind, for the moment, the idea of intelligent human life, especially of the young and beautiful, being bestowed on this wild spot of earth, where only was the Indian and beast heretofore triumphant. The grateful presence of "the white face," like a saintly benediction, was a charm to the poor red man, when it looked only in joy and love. If we walk the streets of Boston, it has been said, now in this year of 1862, the observer, with an open and clear eye, cannot pass the most comely young men of the city, without a heart burning with tenderness and love. Their apparel graceful and rich, and countenances handsome, exquisitely beautiful, are symbolic of all beauty and sweetness within, and of the large grace of mind and character, which can, by no possibility, belong but to the GOOD, trained up as such in parental care, and inherently such by conditions which are absolute and beyond discussion. In as high ratio of excellence may we be justified in viewing those sons of English nurture, - the beloved children of the Concord settler. Nehemiah, Samuel, and Isaac grew to manhood in the fresh and improving agricultural region of the country, conversant with its charms, and enjoying its delights. The heavy care of all needful labor was sustained by the elders; and the

young were, as now, happy exempts. The young American of two centuries ago excelled the world in natural quality. By regular and long English descent, the attributes of that nation for clear, Saxon beauty of physiognomy, and often stately symmetry of form and accurate personal grace, all cherished, harmonized, and made perfection by temperance in food, exercise, avoidance of the vile drug tobacco, no knowledge whatever of fiery drinks, strict regard to rules of life inculcated by the teachers and ministers, all graces and restraints blended to form these young men to strength and excellence. A type of perfect English beauty of countenance, as of a young man, was exemplified by the Prince of Wales, when we saw him a year ago in Boston. Clear, open, bland, pure as pearl, a most sweet and pressing benediction was in that look of love, wherever he turned a glance. The face being an index, what exceeding loveliness of person, nay, of heart and soul, may we know he possessed!

We can have now, by what is adduced, some glimpse or impression of the personelle of the father and of the sons from whom a long, flourishing line is derived. They are the multiple of a race for the future, which no man can number. Whether God, in his providence, will bring them through as he has conducted the past generations, prescience even may not know. We may trust his promises, that "seed-time and harvest shall never fail;" and He, who careth even for the sparrows, will still rear up the sons of men, who are of more value, if they will obey. We may also remember the mighty promises to the just, the righteous, who see God, live by faith, and have his eternal rewards.

Our pious, noble-hearted, and revered ancestor, after taking to his bosom a second wife, closed his useful life in the town of Marlborough in 1667. Domestic joys attended him to the last. Peace in his Saviour's promises, hope almost amounting to certainty he had of a life beyond the grave. Ours be his example, his faith, his reward!

The name is also found in York-SHIRE; whence we get such extracts of records as show (on page 7) the parentage of our ancestors, the Hunts, with a very confident cortainty. And therefore Robert Best doubtless braved the perils of the ocean, side by side with the Concord settlers; coming here and dwelling near his own kin, and leaving to them his entire worldly effects, when the close of life drew near.

Mr. Kittredge, is a just and affectionate tribute to her remarkable goodness and worth.

Mrs. Caroline A. Hunt was a daughter of Nahum Fisher, Esq., of Westborough. On the 28th of October, 1845, she was married to W. L. G. Hunt, Esq., of the same place. After a distressing sickness of less than a week, during which, till within a few hours of her death, her disease had occasioned little alarm, she died, at three o'clock in the morning of March 11, aged twenty-five years. The funeral-services on the occasion were held in the Evangelical Church, attended by a large concourse of afficted relatives and sympathizing friends.

In April, 1837, at the age of sixteen, Mrs. Hunt, with many of her associates, made a public profession of her faith in Christ, uniting with the Evangelical Church. Though, as she says in a note written a few weeks before her marriage, she was the subject, even from early childhood, of serious impressions, and often of much alarm, in view of her condition as a sinner, yet it was not till she was nearly sixteen years old that her heart was moved with any love to God. If, from the natural cheerfulness of her disposition, her piety assumed less the appearance of rigid devoutness, there is reason

to believe it was nevertheless sincere and filial, and that her hope was heartily and strongly fixed in Christ as her only Saviour, on whom she seemed confidently to lean in the extreme sufferings of her sickness, and in whom to rest as her surety for the life that is to come.

During the last year and a half or two years of her life, her mind, though losing none of its buoyancy, was evidently impressed in no ordinary degree with the shortness of life, and the importance and value of a sure and living hope of heaven. Her correspondence during this period abounds with allusions and remarks which seem to indicate that God was preparing her for the early grave, which the issues of his providence have shown was before her. The scenes of those two years, which with many in like circumstances are wont to engross the heart and mind, and awaken day-dreams of earthly happiness never to be realized, seemed with her to awaken more serious and earnest thought of the frailty of earthly good, and the importance of a quickened energy in preparing for heaven.

"That life is long which answers life's great end."

A sermon of great excellence and appropriateness was preached by Rev. Charles B. Kittredge, pastor of the Evangelical Church at Westborough, March 13, 1846, on the afflicting oceasion of the funeral of Mrs. Hunt. It was printed by Henry Mason, 18, Exchange Street, Boston, 1846, pp. 16, for a limited distribution.

Mr. Hunt has been member of the Baptist Church in New Salem and Prescott forty-six years. Several years a teacher of the common schools. In mercantile business thirty-five years. Postmaster over twenty years. Selectman and assessor a long time. Justice of peace over thirty years; and now in service as county commissioner, Franklin County. Has been blessed greatly in pious and affectionate consorts, patterns of Christian virtue; making earth's pilgrimage for him smooth and happy, even toward Zion's hill.

JOEL HUNT, ESQ., OF MEDWAY (see p. 64). — Notice by Rev. Dr. Ide.

Died Sept. 1, 1852, Joel Hunt, Esq., aged seventy. He left behind him to mourn his loss a wife and ten children. He was a kind husband and an affectionate and indulgent father. Few men would be more missed in their families than he. His good sense, his kind heart and social nature, made him a pleasant companion everywhere. A man of native talent, an independent thinker, a shrewd observer of the world, he had acquired a rich fund of practical information, which often served to render his conversation both instructive and entertaining. His store of anecdotes was inexhaustible. Something appropriate and striking from this source seemed instantly to occur to his mind on every subject and occasion on which he chose to speak. In this way, he could at pleasure excite a smile, or draw a tear; illustrate a truth, or administer a reproof; compliment a friend, or retort upon an adversary. He was a useful citizen, much engaged in the business of the town, and of individuals who sought his counsel and his aid; and his accommodating spirit often led him to neglect his own business for the sake of giving aid to others. He was frequently elected to some of the most important offices in the gift of the town, and discharged the duties of these stations with credit to himself and satisfaction to his friends. He was good to the poor and afflicted; always on hand in the day of trouble. A friend to law and order and good morals, he exerted himself for the promotion of these in the community in which he lived. He was a cheerful supporter of the gospel, and a regular attendant upon its institutions. He spake freely, especially in his last illness, of the sanctity of the sabbath, the value of the Bible as the word of God, and of the truth and importance of that religion which it inculcates. His death is deeply lamented, not only by his bereaved family and the religious society of which he had been a fast and active friend for forty years, but with sorrow by all who knew him.*

The newer ground adjacent, not before examined, commemorates Capt. Humphrey (p. 60), Miss Jane (p. 63). "ELLEN M., died April 9, 1861, aged twenty-three years. That life is long which answers life's great end" (p. 52). This young lady perished in the Concord River by voluntary drowning. She was a graduate of the State Normal School, and a very accomplished scholar. Exceedingly lamented by dear friends.

MOSES HUNT, ESQ., OF MILFORD (see p. 73).

Administration was granted on his estate, eight hundred and sixteen dollars and seventy-two cents, to Perley Hunt, Nov. 1, 1816 (Norfolk Records, vol. xxv. 65). He was educated at Harvard College in the splendid class of 1811. Gov. Everett, of the same year, occupies in the College "Triennial" the largest share of the honors in that distinguished record. Another classmate, a beloved Boston divine, writes, "I was intimately acquainted with him in our college-days. He was highly esteemed and respected by the whole class. He took rank as the first mathematician in it, and prepared the mathematical theses exhibited on its behalf on commencement-day. He also appeared, on that occasion, in a conference with William P. Mason and John A. Shaw. He was the strongest man in the class; we thought him a perfect athlete: but he was of a most kind and gentle nature, the friend of every one. No one need have coveted a more honorable, as no one could have enjoyed a more unsullied, repute. It gives me a sad pleasure to revive these recollections of an old friend.

ROBERT HUNT OF SUDBURY.

An inventory of the estate of Mrs. Susan Hunt of "Soodberie" was taken 24 (9), 1642, £48. 11s. 2d. Sworn before the governor. It is conjectured that she was the widow of Robert. The great obscurity of record indulges an expectation of more light eventually on this lineage; and with confidence these names are placed in this proximity to the Concord settler.

SUDBURY BURIAL-PLACES.

Their situation is attractive, verdure charming, loneliness delightful. Enough of an almost imperceptible spice of neglect, as usually pervades rural grounds, makes these quite inviting. An abatement of the rigid care of such places is a signal that the rigor and exclusive solemnity of grief has declined, and gentle forgetfulness has kindly come, and the memory of the departed is surrendered somewhat to the generous keeping of universal humanity. It is so much less obtrusive for a casual loiterer, with picty enough to sanctify his humble purposes, to pass into a partially broken gateway, or get over a dilapidated fence, and employ himself briefly in one of these forgotten retreats, - look over the moss-grown inscriptions, and ponder quietly upon the past. It is a relief, a refreshment. These opportunities are wanting in the overgrown city or town. . . . In the Central Ground, commemoration is made of the following, in contiguous order: William Hunt; Mary, relict of William; Elisha, son of William and Mary; Mary, wife of John; 13 Mary, daughter of Henry; Lucy, wife of Gardner; — on a fine spire of marble, William, " wife Thankful, sons Abel and Asahel; 1—Peter, 7 May 17, 1819 (correct p. 92); Martin (son of Jonas, drowned); JOANNA S., daughter of Sewell Hunt; HAMAN and AUGUSTUS (tomb, 1833); WIL-LIAM HUNT (tomb, 1835).

In precinct, on the hill, William Hunt 14 and son William; John; 25 John F. and Mary L., children of John; Asahel 2 ($\frac{k}{2}$), 1853; Israel Hunt's tomb, 1845.

In the lower-village ground, where the great monument stands, ELISHA HUNT; SALLY, wife of Elisha; ALICE, wife of Reuben Hunt.

DUXBURY LINE.

EDMUND HUNT was an inhabitant of Duxbury early as 1637. It is supposed that he arrived from England, and first located at Cambridge. We learn that Edmond Hunte, from Co. Norff., was a stranger; residing in London, at Bishop'sgate Ward, in 1595. We find, by the "Commission Records" (see p. 2), Edmund Hunte, Lawrence Baguely, and others, were sued by Nicholas Longford and others, for the recovery of Chorlton Moor, in Manchester Parish, Lancashire (41 Q. Eliz.), 1599. As the name Baguely (now Bigelow) prevailed early near Cambridge, it is possible these same parties came over. At Cambridge, in 1635, Edmund Hunte's possession is discovered for us by Mr. Jacobs, the suare and responsive city clerk, who sent us a research, March 15, 1861 (Doc. 10): viz., house and about a half-acre in the West End, bounded south-east by John Barnard, south-west by Christopher Ken, north-west by J. Bosworth, north-east by the Common; also about three acres in West-end Field, bounded south-east by Robert Daye, south-west by highway to Fresh Pond, northwest by Garrard Hadden, north-east by highway to Great Swamp. In 1636, he sold Joseph Isaack his house and half-acre of land, and about three and a half acres in West Field, and two and a half acres meadow to be laid out at Fresh Pond. Mr. Savage (historian) arranges Edmund Hunt of Cambridge as also of Duxbury. We conclude likewise; and that he sold out, for the purpose of removing, in 1636.

It is presumed he was a man in advanced years. We get no positive evidence of the names of his sons, or a certainty that he is the parent of those proximate to him in the line. We make the descent definite only from Samuel, whom we suppose to be his youngest son. From him the line follows authentically to the present day. Aided by the superior "History of Duxbury, 1849, pp. 360," very strong on main points,—a work due to the early devotedness of Mr. Winsor, and produced by him, with the most patient and perfect eare, before he left study at college (as W. H. Montague, oracular in book lore, informs us); and the ancient infallible registries of the Old-Colony deeds and probate, with the excerpta of town-records, such as have survived an early destruction, sent by the excellent town-clerk, Mr. Peterson; and

the family records that have been sent us, — we present as complete genealogy as we are enabled to by the material to us extant. It could not be made as numerous as any other line. The good quality may amend the quantity.

Mattakeeset was the original name of the Duxbury Plantation, part of the Old-Colony ground, in close proximity to the harbor where the Pilgrims landed and stayed. Laved by the resplendent ocean, and protected by the same defences that engird the Plymouth line of coast, this was a marvellous good and inviting spot for the early colonists, too closely abridged at their earlier landing-place. Alden, Standish, Brewster, Prence, were spared by their comrades, in 1632, to make the place permanent; and they drew settlers rapidly around them. In a few years, our ancestor joined them; and his name, very prolific elsewhere, became implanted and flourishing with the most precious seeds of the "Mayflower" and other kindred Pilgrim stock, to make the wilderness a garden, and the solemn roar of ocean, for ages undisturbed, mingle with the glad notes of advancing civilization and prosperity. Different from the characteristics of the richly embosomed rural settlements, of which we otherwise treat, must be the style of these people of the maritime border. The thick and hardy forest here afforded timber to become material to erect vessels, engaging in adventurous fisheries, for which the place is famed; and the skill in building gradually grew to the art of constructing ships of the greatest magnitude. Navigation has also become a prominent business here. A proud roll of ship-masters this place shows, - men who do business in the mighty waters, grappling with the ocean in its fury, sailing when stars light and guide the way through the pathless deep and to foreign lands, where the highest skill is requisite to conduct safe and profitable returns. We now enter upon the genealogy. All who compose the various families share in the avocations peculiar to the seaport. Captains and tradesmen are of the number. Manufacturers and artisans there are, if we do not exactly specify. Industry, goodness, grace, are qualities of all our worthy people in this line; and we have been happy, very happy, in worthily bestowing labor on the records of this deserving portion of the extensive name which we honor. May their lives, however exposed and perilled, be perpetually sanctified by Christian grace; and a harbor in HEAVEN, capacious and deep, await all souls when earth's voyage is ended!

... "The bounding ocean smiles,
When the quick winds uprear it in a swell,
That rolls in glittering green around the isles.
Where ever-springing fruits and blossoms dwell.
It is a joy no gifted tongue can tell,
To hurry o'er the waters when the sail
Swells tensely, and the light keel glances well
Over the curling billow, and the gale
Comes off from spicy groves to tell its winning tale."

On an old record where we look and find a marriage put down; merely the names, date and minister's name, how much is left untold; not a word of the preliminary matters, or of the subsequent happiness of the committal parties in their after life. In want of further certainty, we may go back to the first days of the young couple, and try and learn how the first attraction grew; how the beauty, innocence and joy of the young friends became mutually winning, at school, church or in the family circle. Or not as far remote, when on the eye of mature life these destined partners became specially endeared to each other: the fulness of charms in the surpassing loveliness of the maiden finding a complete counterpart in the intelligent and brave young man. They had opportunities to be acquainted. Fondness of each other and willing social freedom soon ripened to Love, whose weird and magic touch converts the world. Then such perfect relish as each had for the other in all they could do or say, made no other society so pleasing as to spend all their days together. It is idle to look at the adjustment of affairs to secure the desired ultimate MARRIAGE. Very plain and practical are some of the considerations. The scruples of the mother of the dear expectant bride must be adroitly turned. How many misgivings she has before she can surrender this daughter, choicely reared, wholesome and delicate as a sea-bird in all her affinities, so tender and useful at home, to go and be the close companion of a "man" not knowing what it all will amount to. Not certain that he will be a true and provident husband, of pure and rational habits; — he may come with wine and tobacco and nauseate her luxuriously clean and comfortable household, furning her apparel, endangering her food, disordering the brains of her children, or he may come home with such talk as they have in the forecastle. - Oh ho! some may laugh at the old lady's fantasies.

On the other hand, the mother of the bridegroom has her weakness. Shall her darling boy so scrupulously just and pure, bashful, modest and good, be allowed to go and marry a woman that she does not know "all about." Will the wife keep the castle when he is gone, take good care of all things at home, tend the children, look after the poultry, keep the cream and butter regular, make and mend, wash and bake, be tender and precions with him in all the intimacies and confidence of married life—all the unspeakably delicions sacraments of the marital state which can never be conspicuous. But scruples quickly vanish. The young couple go boldly forward, make the engagement, summon the company, order the feast, pay the minister, have a good time and are Marriero. And if the old minister does not forget to set the record down in his almanae and send it to the town clerk, a great many years after, the genealogist goes to the book and finds "By Rev. Mr. —, Mr. — and Miss — , the — day of —, 16**."

NEW-JERSEY LINE.

This department of the work is the result of such correspondence as has been forwarded. The earliest, No. 40, April 16, 1861, from Miss Hetty Hunt of Princeton, forms the basis of authority from which we proceed. The excellent writer passed from earth to the immortal state last February, accepting with joy the promised rest with the Saviour in heaven. The cold gloom of the season of her departure was richly brightened by the most glorious hopes of futurity.

"The storm that wrecked the wintry sky No more disturbed her sweet repose Than summer evening's latest sigh That shuts the rose."

The cherished letter that we first gct makes known that John Hunt emigrated from Devonshire, Eng., to New York; then settled in New Jersey. He married an aunt of the first Bishop Moor. The tables of pedigree duly show the process of the generations forward. The coat of arms is extant; and a copy, nicely made, was enclosed to us. The figure of a mastiff chained surmounts the shield, which has three mastiffs' heads. A more close description we may yet give. The motto is, "Faithful to the end,"—worth fields of emblazonment.

This line of family, it will be seen, has spread to Alabama, Kentucky, and North Carolina; some to Huntsville, Mo.

Next letter, No. 231, written by Rev. Benjamin Hunt from Michigan, Dec. 11, 1861, supplies one uncertain branch of family.

Next, 242, Dec. 19, 1861, from Perry, N.Y., furnishes a branch of John Hunt's posterity. Writer is Rev. Sanford Hunt, member of Methodist General Conference of Preachers.

Next, 281, from Westly P. Hunt, adds to the descent of the main line essentially.

Letters 345, 374, 386, from Miss Sue E. Hunt, grand-niece of Miss Hetty Hunt, display the high interest in our object, so grateful to us to perceive; and the beautiful

handwriting of her epistles, and elaborate style of the communications, bear testimony to the graceful intellectual culture of the writer, and a character of superior loveliness. On her has the mantle of her endeared relative fallen worthily.

We cannot allege a great degree of completeness to this line. So far from being full is it, that were it not for being so well provided by letters of interest on the main outline of the construction, and comprehending in its lineage the ever-lamented Capt. William Hunt, mysteriously lost in the ill-fated "Levant," the degree of prominence we give would perhaps not be accorded to our limited offering for this important line; and yet we could not feel satisfied in placing the New-Jersey Line among our miscellaneous. And thus we submit the best we can supply; knowing that, although it is only proportional, it is exceeding careful and good, all that we do offer.

New Jersey was settled by the Danes in 1624. Colonies of Swedes and Fins came in 1627. The English arrived in 1640, but were soon displaced by the Swedes and Dutch. In 1655, the Dutch obtained the ascendency. In 1664, supremacy was acquired by the English. In 1676, reconquered by the Dutch, it was divided into East and West Jersey; which were re-united, under the power of the English, in 1702. In 1738, a king's governor held sway. Ever memorable for the triumphant fields of Princeton, Monmouth, and Trenton, this territory shared greatly in the disasters and the glories of a protracted Revolutionary struggle. Closely adjacent to New York, the histories of both regions and characteristics of people are similar. Civilized culture is prevalent; for religion has had its sway, in whatever peculiar forms have been most congenial to the good inhabitants of the domain, in the days that are past. It is the momentum of favorable and powerful beginnings that secures for the individual or people the mastery of the present hour.

EXCERPTA.

ABRAHAM HUNT was appointed postmaster of Trenton, under the Colonial Government; and, after the Declaration, was re-appointed by the postmaster-general, Benjamin Franklin. W. P. Ilunt has both commissions in his possession. Mark K., daughter of John Hunt, Newtown, N.J., born Aug. 22, 1818; married Daniel Radd of Chester, N.J.

Daniel Hunt of Hunterdon County, of late years had sons moved to near Lebanon, Ohio; and daughter, Mrs. Hanna, who had two sons, the eldest, Daniel Hanna, moved, in 1860, to Polo, Ill. (Letter 1). Rev. Robert C. Hunt, who writes to us Dec. 17, 1861 (No. 238), was native of Laning, N.Y. Thomas Hunt, an inhabitant of Stillwater, N.J., was captured at his log-hut by a party of Indians, and taken to Canada, during the French War (cir. 1755), and, three years afterwards, was exchanged. He returned home, and lived to an advanced age. He had an elder brother, who was away at the time of capture, an officer of the Colonial troops (Barber's Ilist. Coll. p. 479).

The term "ob. single," which we use in the tables, signifies that the person "died either unmarried or without issue."

NEW-YORK LINE.

We take pleasure in being candid to our readers of these pages, in admitting, with not much reluctance, that here are records that we have not seen with our own vision, strongly and surely as we have brought to the investigation of some of the other departments of the labor. Bolton's "History of Westchester, N.Y.," is so admirable, however, as to make it needless indeed to visit those early haunts in hope of any thing now accessible. That affords us the main staple of the offering in this line. There is much other. An agreeable surprise was Miss Mary Ann Hunt's charming letter from West Farms, dated Feb. 13, 1862, and which is placed No. 292 in our richly burthened letter-file; then another, March 24, good, though not as long as the first. She gathers for us from historic lore; and our readers now shall enjoy and feel sure of the recital.

Thomas Hunt was of Rye, N.Y., less than thirty miles north-east of the capital, as early as 1652. The revered tradition claims an ancestry for him direct from Thomas Hunt of Shropshire, Eng., who was a high-sheriff in 1656, and a colonel in the Parliamentary service. Loyal, honorable, and, with the remembrance of after-ages to follow, passing to his final reward in the year 1669. Farther remote, the dimmer and quite uncertain light upon the genealogical track indicates Richard Hunt of Shrewsbury, a bailiff, &c., of good honors and renown, to be in the high line of parentage to our American pioneer. So impracticable to be duly certified of the truth thereof, we are not willing to accept the tradition as a verity at this point. We have a grounded descent from Thomas Hunt of Rye unquestionable. He bought, in 1652, a liberal quantity of land at Throckmorton's Neck; and, many years after, the Grove Farm was confirmed to him by the Governor's patent. Hunt's Point he was possessed of in 1686.

His domestic life was cheered by an alliance in marriage with Elizabeth, the accomplished daughter of Edward Jessop, who was opulent; and, by his generous will, half of the lands called West Farms came to this family. The name has not been lost in all the mutability of time. He closed his earthly probation a few days following Oct. 6, 1694, —the day he made his last will and testament.

Edward, a brother of Thomas Hunt, is told of in another chronicle.

Thomas Hunt the younger, the son of Thomas Hunt, duly accomplished a length of years. The society of his affectionate consort Elizabeth, who was related to Lord Gardiner's family of England, was continued to him until 1724; when, at the mature age of fifty-nine, she was called to the joy of rest. The good and faithful book of Mr. Bolton tells the record of her burial-place; and also the inscription of her husband, who followed her Oct. 25, 1739, aged seventy-three.

Thomas Hunt, his son, outlived his father only ten years. Sarah Ward was his happy choice in the conjugal relation.

His son Thomas, born 1727, was attached to the army of the Revolution, and a personal friend of Gen. Washington; and at the Point occurred more or less incident connected with the Commander-in-chief in the story of those days.

The old house, now a hundred and seventy-one years old, was bombarded by the British. A ball passed through the shutter, and lodged in the chimney. After removing to Duchess County, Mrs. Hunt did not long survive. She left twelve children. Her sister, the Widow Drake, being left with three children (one of whom became father of Joseph Rodman Drake, Esq.), consented to smooth the declining path in life of the venerable man; and they were united in the holy state of matrimony. A life of eighty years crowned his head with honor. He was temperate, just, patient, and brave, so his gravestone lovingly records. Thomas, his son, left two daughters. Joseph, the next, had four sons and one daughter (whose valued correspondence aids the facts of this sketch). The eldest of the four, Thomas Hunt, left four sons, — Thomas (a captain in the public service), Joseph, James, and Hugh.

James B., second of Joseph's sons, left two sons, — Charles J. and Joseph.

Capt. Thomas has a son of four years old, the gem that tips this chain of pedigree; and who, when two hundred years have rolled away, will perhaps be as reverenced as is now the ancestor of the two hundred years past.

Augustine Hunt forms the ancestry of Hunts who are in New Jersey, &c. Rev. Holloway Whitfield Hunt informs us, under date of Dec. 24, 1861, from Schooley's Mount, that his grandfather lived in Wyoming Valley; bought thirty thousand acres of "Election Land" (so called), along the flats of Tunkannock Creek, a branch of the Susquehanna. Being persecuted by the Indians, he retired to Orange County, N.J.,—his final residence.

A proficient in the arts and science, conversant in medicine and theology, he became, to an extent, the instructor of his son Holloway, whose ambition was aroused to become eminent in life. The grandmother, deeply imbued with faith and prayer, instilled in the impressible heart of her dear son the noble principles of religion. Early leaving the patriarchal home, he crossed into New Jersey, the region of schools and colleges; a modest youth, with one silver dollar and a plain suit of clothes, all he

possessed: but with a heart strong in reliance upon God, with aims noble, and trust implicit, his course was soon rapid and successful.

At the age of twenty-six, he was called to the pastorate of the Presbyterian Church in Newton, N.J. Spending seven years there, he succeeded Rev. John Hanna in charge of the churches of Bethlehem and Kingwood, Hunterdon County. During a long and prosperous life, he there ministered to a people who loved and esteemed him.

A man of comely presence, of full height, of dignity and courteous address, and voice melodious with tones like trumpet and flute combined, he was indeed a marked man, and peculiarly favored in the pleasant estimation of all who knew him. He closed his life, A.D. 1858, in good old age, rich in faith, and unblemished in name. His son graduated at Princeton, 1794. Educated well his sons, and left them a competent estate, with his blessing, prized far beyond.

Holloway W., David, and H. W., 2d, cousins, were students and graduates together at Princeton in 1818.

In 1826, Rev. H. W. Hunt, who writes to us, selected Schooley's Mount—a high, fruitful, and beautiful table-land in Morris County, N.J.—as his home; where he was united to his beloved consort, Miss Amanda Hann, in 1849, heiress of Lawrence Hann, Esq., a highly respected German gentleman of wealth.

Dr. W. A. A. and Dr. E. M. Hunt's courteous letters exhibit the collateral relatives of the above.

Dr. Samuel M. Hunt writes us from Killawog, N.Y., March 26 and April 30, 1862. The recollections of his mother, now ninety-two years old, affirm Japheth Hunt, his grandfather, to be as remote as definite knowledge affords of his ancestry. He lived in Nobletown, N.Y., a great many years, in the practice of medicine, near Spencertown and Hillsdale, and what is now Austerlitz, Columbia County, N.Y. He had a nephew, Pelatiah Hunt, and two brothers, quite wealthy, residing at no great distance. Another nephew, John Hunt, kept tavern at a place called Huntsville, ten miles above Unadilla, on the Susquehanna River.

Ransom, son of John, has been a member of the Legislature, and rather an influential politician.

Dr. Hunt mentions a tradition, in this particular branch, of "three brothers" having early come from England or Wales. It appears to us that we have elsewhere heard of a similar tradition; and it is, no doubt, worthy of allusion. There are known cases of four or more brothers coming over, and some sisters.

Dr. Japheth was a surgeon in the army; and, it is added, probably was first from Berkshire County, Mass. What now follows of Dr. John W. Hunt will have a touching interest for all who bear the name to which he was a distinguished ornament and honor.

EULOGIES ON DR. J. W. HUNT.

State Historical Society, special meeting, in Executive Committee, Tuesday evening, Dec. 20, 1859, George P. Delaplaine, Esq., presiding; Prof. Ezra S. Carr, of the State University, rose and said,—

Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Historical Society, —I have been requested to make a few remarks concerning the life and public services of one who has been called, in the prime of manhood, to exchange life, usefulness, the charms of home, and household ties, for an early grave.—I come, at your bidding, "to fling my pebble on his cairn;" conscious that many of you who were wont to meet him at the stated gatherings of this society, many who were more familiar with his private and personal history, could do better justice to the subject and the occasion.

Dr. John Warren Hunt was born in Upper Lisle. Broome County, N.Y., Feb. 28, 1826; and was the second son of Dr. Samuel M. Hunt of that place. I remember him first as a bright, intelligent lad of fourteen, greatly interested in the geological explorations then progressing in his native town. He assisted me in collecting some of the fossils now in the cabinets of the State University and the Geological Hall at Albany, and accompanied me in my examinations of neighboring localities. Soon after this time, he entered Homer Academy, where he remained several years. Leaving the academy, he commenced the study of medicine, first with his father, and afterwards, under my instruction, at Castleton, Vt., where he distinguished himself among a large body of students for his rigid economy and abstemiousness and close application. The peculiarities of his mind were apparent in his choice of studies; the literature and science of the profession being more attractive to him than those specific studies which are essential as preparation for its practice.

He left Vermont before completing his course, but subsequently received from Castleton Medical College the degree of Doctor of Medicine; and I next heard of him in Wisconsin, where he arrived in June of 1849. He first settled in Delafield, where he experienced the anxieties and vicissitudes of a physician's life, and where some members of this society first knew and befriended him. Dependent upon his own exertions, and generous to a fault, but for the kindness of those friends, whose favors he delighted in acknowledging, he could not so soon have risen to a station of responsibility and usefulness.

In January, 1851, he was appointed Assistant-Secretary of State by William A. Barstow, then Secretary; removed to Madison, and, with the exception of a part of Col. Robinson's secretaryship, continued to serve in that capacity until January, 1857,— a period of five years. In this office he gained a knowledge of public affairs and public records which has become proverbial.

During the first four years of his residence in our State, while the order of the Sons of Temperance was vigorous, Dr. Hunt was actively engaged in furthering its interests. He was their Grand Scribe, and, for a time, edited the "Old Oaken Bucket,"—a neat quarto, which was the organ of the order. Upon the decline of popular interest in that organization,

Dr. Hunt became interested in Masonry, which he believed to contain all the advantages of associated effort in the cause of temperance, charity, and social brotherhood. Masonry attracted him by its imposing ceremonies and its historical associations. He was a diligent student of its literature, and revered it as the asylum of Democracy, in times when, by means of mystic rites and symbols, architects and artisans hid their secrets of chemistry and metallurgy and natural philosophy from the eyes of popes and princes, who feared the spread of knowledge among the people. To him it was an inheritance from the age of chivalry, when men armed and battled for a rood of land in Palestine as now they would not for an empire. He knew that, by its aid, arts were protected, and the marvels of Gothic architecture given to the world. In common with all imaginative minds, he enjoyed those forms that seem to link the present with the past; which make the symbolic "work" of the Masonic Lodge, as it were, commemorative of the operative work which built Strasburg Cathedral and the noblest edifices of Great Britain.

Dr. Hunt was, for many years, one of the most active and prominent Masons in the State. He presided for a long time over the *Hiram Lodge* in this city, and for the past two years has been the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Wisconsin, Grand Secretary of the Grand Chapter, Grand Recorder of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters, Grand Recorder of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templars of Wisconsin, Commander of the Robert McCoy Commandery at Madison; and was, at the time of his death, High Priest of the Royal Arch Chapter in this city.

To his zeal and industry in the discharge of all these offices, his Masonic brethren bear grateful testimony. He died at his post. The records of these various offices bear traces of his busy pen until within a few days of his death. Besides attending personally to an enormous correspondence and these records, he published, in the last two years, proceedings of nine different Masonic bodies with which he was connected; making no less than seven hundred and forty-eight octavo pages.

In those charities which are enjoined as the first of Masonic duties, in sympathy for the sick and afflicted, Dr. Hunt was never wanting. Many friends had he among the poor and lowly. He could not see a brute beast, much less a human creature, suffer, without pain. He gave lavishly, and without ostentation.

As a justice of the peace in his ward, an officer of the Dane Cavalry, a member of the Hook and Ladder Company, and as deputy county-treasurer, he served the young city of his adoption. As a trustee of the Baptist Society, he labored for its prosperity, and gave cheerfully and liberally to the erection of its edifice, and support of its ministry. Formerly an officer of the Madison Institute, he contributed to it also, and lamented the suspension of its usefulness.

The number of societies, having for their object benevolence and the public weal, to which Dr. Hunt belonged, and contributed from his moderate income, is a sufficient evidence that benevolence was a distinguishing trait in his character.

For the past six years, he has been the recording secretary of this society. He has always been a steady contributor to its library, and in many ways has aided to advance its interests. One of his last acts was to send a large contribution of pamphlets, ancient almanacs, and other literary matters; thus evincing his continued interest in it.

He was himself a contributor to the literature of Wisconsin. His first publication was

the "Wisconsin Gazetteer," issued in 1853, — an octavo volume of two hundred and fifty-six pages, the first work of its kind published here, and still valuable as a book of reference. The next was the "Wisconsin Almanac and Annual Register," — a valuable statistical work of ninety-six pages, which had a general circulation, and was regarded as furnishing the most reliable information concerning the political and industrial condition of the State. During the same year, he visited Toronto, Montreal, and Quebec, on the occasion of the celebration of the Grand-Truuk Railway, and wrote for the "Argus and Democrat" a series of descriptive letters, over the signature of "Kewassa;" and, the following year, another series from the Lake-Superior country, over the same signature. The latter originally appeared in the "Milwaukie Wisconsin."

Loving books, with them he furnished his modest dwelling. There you will find the most valuable geographical and statistical library in the State, with nearly every thing in standard literature, and much that is curious and rare.

He loved art too, and a few copies of the best ideals embellished his home. Into that home, so changed and desolate, we will not enter, save to leave upon its threshold our memorial garland. As brother, husband, father, we know he is mourned there by bruised hearts. As a friend, many of us can bear witness to his unselfishness and fidelity.

Industrious to the last, his physician and friends found him always among his papers and books, at work himself, or dictating to the willing hand which divined his every wish. They always found the ready welcome, the cheerful word.

He spoke of death as he would speak of a journey; regretting it for the sake of his young and devoted wife; of his child, who would never know a father's love; but for himself willing that "God's will be done." On the 12th of December, 1859, just as the wintry day was closing, he peacefully closed his eyes upon the scenes of earth and the faces of those he loved, and breathed out his life in one farewell sigh.

"When fruil nature can no more,
Then the spirit strikes the hour;
My servant Death, with solving rite,
Pours finite into Infinite."

Those very characteristics which gave Masonry such a hold upon the imagination and heart of our friend inclined him toward those religious denominations which have an historical association. He believed that, through the Established Church, from the glorious company of apostles and martyrs, an influence had descended, especially powerful for the regeneration and sanctification of men. Though he did not live to receive from the hands of the venerable bishop confirmation and communion, he died a Christian, in the hope and promise of a happy immortality,

That Dr. Hunt was appreciated in the community which he had served in such various capacities was evidenced by the mournful throng which followed his remains to their last resting-place. High and low, rich and poor, native and foreign born, mingled in that solemn procession. Beside the companion of his early youth, they laid him down to his long shumber; and over his dust were heard the voices of brothers in arms, speaking "rest to his ashes, and peace to his soul."

The Chair appointed Mr. Draper, Prof. Carr, and Judge Atwood, a Committee to report suitable resolutions; who, through their chairman, submitted the following, the adoption of which was moved by Prof. Conover:—

Resolved, That we have heard with deep regret the death of Dr. John W. Hunt, one of the corporate members of this society, for the past six years its recording secretary, and always prominent among its friends and contributors.

Resolved, That, in the death of Dr. Hunt, we feel sensibly the loss of an earnest co-worker in the field of historical and statistical research and collection, and a friend of his race, whose varied sphere of usefulness in society will long remain unoccupied; and that we tender to his bereaved family our heartfelt sympathies and condolence.

Resolved, That in respect for the memory of our late lamented associate, Dr. Hunt, the society do now adjourn; and that the secretary be directed to furnish a copy of these proceedings to the family of the deceased.

Judge Atwood then rose, and made extended and cloquent remarks, less specific, but of great beauty and force.

The resolutions as reported were then unanimously adopted; after which, on motion of S. V. Shipman, Esq., copies of the eulogies just delivered were requested for the archives of the society. — Adjourned.

NEW-YORK LINE.

His share of the purchase of Middelburg of the Indians, in 1656, was £1. Jan. 9, 1662-3, was chosen one of seven men to conduct the affairs of the town. In 1663, was, with other leading men, denounced for resisting Dutch authority. aiding to form a junction with the Connecticut In February, 1663-4, was chosen, with six others, "in the name of his majesty, Charles II.," to town-office in Hastings (the new name of Middelburg) for the ensuing year. In 1664, admitted as freeman of the Colony of Connecticut. Was chosen surveyor to view the "Indian reserved lands" the town was to purchase. In 1665, April 21, commissioned lieutenant of the military in Newtown (the new name of Hastings) by Gov. Nicoll. November, 1666, to April, 1668, town-overseer. Jan. 4, 1666-7, was one of eleven landholders who agreed to enclose their lands in a single field for cultivation. March 6, 1666-7, after having been appointed by the town to get a draught of boundaries, he became one of the patentees of Newtowne, in the West Riding of Yorkshire, upon Long Island. April 2, 1667, chosen constable. About 1668, his house and barns and all his effects were destroyed by fire, together with corn collected for rates. April, 1670 to 1672, chosen town-overseer. January, 1667-8, was chosen permanent surveyor. In 1671, the first church edifice in Newtown was erected on a gore of land appropriated for the church by Ralph Hunt. The site is at the corner of the Main Street and Jamaica Road, - the "corner house," recently owned by Peter Durvea. Sept. 6, 1673, was sworn to office as schepen, or magistrate, upon the re-instating of Dutch authority. He ob. early 1677. His dau. was first w. of Theophilus Phillips; and had Theophilus, May 15, 1673; William, June 28, 1676, of New York; Philip, Dec. 27, 1678, of Lawrence, N. J.

AVID.† During the presence of the British Army at Tarrytown, N.Y., about 1776, a large David.† corps of troops were surprised at a tavern by Major David Hunt. He proceeded from Westchester with a few volunteers, arranging the march so as to arrive about dusk. After darkness had fairly set in, he surrounded the house with his party; and, at this moment, the unsuspecting enemies were engaged playing cards. Major Hunt, arming himself with a club, gave the signal of attack; and the whole party rushed simultaneously in, headed by the major, who exclaimed, as he raised his weapon, "Clubs are trumps, gentlemen!" During the desperate struggle that ensued, John Archer attempted to kill several of the soldiers, and was only prevented by the major, who, arresting his arm, observed, "Sir, the highest sense of honor in a soldier is to protect the lives of his prisoners." After a short but ineffectual resistance, the enemy surrendered, and were led off in triumph to the American quarters.

Crompond, twenty miles below West Point, was the rendezvous of a party of mounted volunteers of the army in 1781. Out on an expedition, one of them, HUNT, received a dangerous wound through his shoulder and lungs. The air escaped at every breath. Dr. Eustis came to the lines; dilated the wound in the breast; and as the patient was athletic, and had not sustained a very copious loss of blood, he recommended blood-letting. He eventually recovered by the free use of the lancet, and such abstemious living as reduced him to the greatest extremity.

Hunt's Bridge (put down on the map of Westchester County) was commanded by the Heights of Kingsbridge, fortified in 1776. It was destroyed; and, after the battle of White Plains, it was reconstructed by the British. There is a Hunt's Bridge station on the Haer-

lem Railroad.

Hunt's Point, situated at the south-east extremity of the Great Planting Neck, called by the Indians Quinnahung, in the village of West Farms. This property has been occupied by the Hunt Family near a hundred and twenty years. First derived by the Jessop alliance. In 1688, Thomas Hunt, of the Grove Farm, granted his son Thomas a hundred acres on south of Gabriel Leggett's land, bounded easterly and southerly by Bronx River. It is now the property of Daniel Winship, who married Eliza, widow of Richard Hunt. The old grange, erected in 1688, occupies a beautiful situation near the extremity of the Point, overlooking the East River and Flushing Bay.

Hunt's Hill was occupied by the American forces. Near Kingsbridge and the River Bronx.

St. Peter's Church Burial-ground, in Westchester, contains memorials of the Hunts.

Westchester County. — The freeholders loyal to the king and General Assembly assembled at White Plains, April 11, 1775, at a general meeting. The Loyalists, on the 13th, drew a protest against the action of the meeting. Among them appear John, Joshua, Enoch, John, Jr., ISRAEL, BENJAMIN, ELNATHAN, JAMES, JOHN, and PHINEAS HUNT; JOHN HUNT added to the list. Col. Lewis Morris of Morrisiana, chairman of the meeting, answered the protest with a list of names he declared to be non-voters, and many under age; among them, John, JOHN, Jun., JOSHUA, JAMES, and ISRAEL HUNT. Notwithstanding the protest, deputies were chosen to the Provincial Congress, which adjourned from New York to White Plains; and there, on the 9th July, 1776, the Declaration of Independence was received and read in front of the court-house.

Winter-Hill Burying-ground contains precious

memorials of the Hunt name.

REFERENCES. — Bolton's "Westchester" is so thoroughly used, that a list of the pages would be multitudinous. Thanks to the author of this great work. James Riker, jun.'s, splendid "Annals of Newtown," New York, 1852, pp. 437, has been exhausted of every mention of our name.

Explanation. — The signs used to avoid the frequency of figures signify, *, "first;" +, "second; " 1, "third; " §, "fourth; " ||, "fifth;" ¶, "sixth." Thus we contrive to give for the name that begins a column, as in the fifth group, the number containing one (21), and carry along throughout the consecutive increase (always adding for some surplus which we do not get); getting to the midst, for instance, at 233, is WARD, the third of the group, but the second son (†). The SIGN indicates the order of the sons, yet it is only used when the name goes forward to make a new family; using a figure with the sign only once in any one group. Smaller groups we sometimes commence with the half-decimal 5, so as to keep the consecutive number near true. In Miscellaneous (3), the signs are merely used to signify successive persons of same name.

THE NORTHAMPTON LINE.

PROCEEDING thus far, and now in the midst of the acute and diligent labor of separating and arranging multitudes of desultory pedigrees and those more compact, it is a congratulation that we are thus far forward favorably. Figuratively it may seem that "getting into print" is like embarking on a passage to sea: and now in the middle of our voyage, we feel that we are in deep water—many fathoms beyond soundings. Our "lines" have been east in pleasant places, amid goodly heritages. The scourging auxieties and solicitudes that we should get right on important bearings are all dissipated, and we now move serene and confident in onward progress. The early omens of our beginnings, like the last land birds at the mast-head, are now all inland and invisible. Our flag flies high and unchallenged. There are no "cruisers" in our seas. Cloudless skies front our vision and shine from above; and no speck of disaster or rivalry is in our whole horizon. Gales steady and prosperous speed us.

This Northampton Genealogy may be termed the Regal Line; very distinguished as it has been for wealth, learning and political power. The baton of gubernatorial authority, honorable as the olden sceptre of Judah, has been intrusted to this tribe, in three instances; being the only cases of such advancement that we can record in the family history. Alabama, for an early territorial Governor, enjoyed the appointed administration of Seth Hunt, a man of shining ability. New York, the "Empire State"—larger than many European kingdoms, requiring almost superhuman energy of management, gave a majority of her popular vote to Washington Hunt for one official term as chief magistrate. Vermont, close adjacent to New York, with less territory and population, but with people no less intelligent and discriminating, elected Jonathan Hunt Lieutenant-Governor of the State.

Also, it will be seen that from this stock we get several representatives to Congress, honorable and fair men as have been produced for that body. Method of the genealogy is similar to others.

Mrs. Hannah Cleveland, a native of Northampton, died at Skeneateles, Onondaga County, N.Y., June 14, 1861, at the remarkable age of a hundred and four years and seven months. She was the daughter of Jacob Parsons. Her mother was a Hunt, and sister of the late Deacon Ebenezer Hunt of this town. Her parents had seven daughters, whose names were Esther, Beulah, Priscilla, Eunice, Hannah, Thankful, and Mercy. One attained the age of ninety-nine, another ninety-eight, and another over ninety years. President Dwight, who presided over Yale College twenty-one years, was her playmate; and the late Gov. Caleb Strong, her neighbor. The latter, who was only a few years her senior, died at the ripe age of seventy-five, forty-two years ago. Mrs. Cleveland was married, in 1781, to Nehemiah Cleveland, and was the mother of twelve children, - eight of whom are still living. There are also thirty-nine grandchildren, and more than forty great-grandchildren. Her husband died in 1843, having lived with her sixty-two years. The preservation of her mental and physical faculties was unusual and wonderful. She delighted in the quotation of biblical precepts to a period of only a few weeks previous to her death. The following, which she recited a few weeks since, was an auspicious favorite; revealing, with rare felicity, the sequel of her long and illustrious life: "Trust in the Lord, and do good; so shalt thou dwell in the land, and verily thou shalt be fed." She was buried on Sunday, the 16th, with honors appropriate to her remarkable longevity and eminently religious life.

"Hall's Eastern Vermont" tells us that Jonathan Hunt cleared land at Guilford in 1758, since occupied by Elisha Haynes; that he (Major Hunt) was on a committee, in 1780, to consider the union of New York and Vermont; went with a message to Gov. Clinton at Philadelphia, concerning the difficulty with New York; made an affidavit, which was read in Congress in 1780; was one of the seventy-six claimants to lands in Vermont which had been ceded to New York, and received \$948.23 of the \$30,000 awarded; was sheriff of Windham County, and served an execution on Timothy Church of Brattleborough, who resisted, and was rescued Aug. 8, 1782; and petitioned Government concerning the release of the famous Major Shattuck; was an associate censor, in 1786, to revise the Constitution, &c.

Obituary of Gov. Hunt.

Diel at Vernon, Vt., on the 1st instant, the Hon. Jonathan Hunt, Esq., in the eighty-fifth year of his age, —one of the first settlers of Northfield, Mass. In early life, he shared in the fatigues and anxieties incident to the perilous state of those who plant themselves in the wilderness, liable to privations and the depredations of savages. Persevering industry, strict

integrity, laudable ambition, and well-deserved promotion to many honorable offices, civil and military, to that of lieutenant-governor of the State, rendered him a distinguished character during the struggles of the New-Hampshire grantees and the New-York claimants during the Revolutionary War, the formation of this State, its union with the United States, and the foundation of our State government. Although his advanced age was subject to severe pains and many infirmities, yet his mind ever appeared remarkably strong, his perceptions clear, and judgment correct. The principles and practice of industry, virtue, and religion, he greatly respected and encouraged, and the ministry of the gospel he liberally supported; and, while his hospitality and kindness to the deserving were extensively exercised, indolence and rice found in him an open and uniform reprover. He preserved through his long life, and amidst his temporal prosperity, the most unassuming and unaffected deportment, and, what is always highly honorable in the rich as well the poor, the reputation of an honest man.

Obituary of Mrs. L. Hunt.

"At Vernon, on the 29th June, 1834, Mrs. Levinah Hunt, widow of the late Gov. Hunt, aged eighty-five years. Mrs. Hunt possessed superior intelligence, with interesting suavity of manners. In prosperity she never appeared elated, nor on afflictive scenes unduly depressed. She uniformly manifested sincere piety, amiable, deep-rooted, and reasonable; well qualifying her for the pleasing society of persons of congenial principles and acquirements. Yet, to her, 'sweet home' was always the centre of temporal happiness. Though her bodily health has long been tender and delicate, yet with a life devoted to industry and economy, and with a heart overflowing with charity and benevolence, that happiness was diffused around her in the performance and superintendence of all the social and domestic duties of life, extending even to the humblest being within the sphere of her influence. She was deservedly beloved by all. Many affectionate friends will long remember the order and regularity which ever pervaded every thing pertaining to her hospitable mansion. To the sick and unfortunate, and especially to the neighboring poor, such were her numerous expressions of kindness and generosity, that she may truly be considered as carrying to the grave with her their blessing and their gratitude, mingling with their lamentations. As she never made an enemy while living, her memory will always

remain sacred in the hearts of all who knew her. As a wife, a mother, a friend, a neighbor, a Christian, she was a pattern worthy of all commendation, and the imitation of all; ever exhibiting an excellent illustrative of the happy effects, even in this life, of that gospel which she early embraced, and ever followed as her religious creed, as her only rule of faith and practice. A faithful retrospect of her life, confirmed by her patience and calm submission during her last sickness, and her peaceful death, are subjects calculated to afford the most consoling evidence to her amiable daughters, who witnessed the closing scenes, to her aged and absent brothers, and her other surviving relatives and friends, that her dissolution is only a removal from this imperfect state of probation to that superior world of spirits, where she partakes, in full fruition, of those inconceivable entertainments which are prepared for all who love God, and follow the gospel of his dear Son.

Arad, 75 Gen., of Hinsdale, N.H., s. of Samuel. 25 It would be difficult to do an exact measure of justice in a proper mention of the character of Gen. Hunt. The youngest of FOUR brothers, all men of altitude and force, superior for business, and taking a prominent hold on all matters uppermost to the attention of leading men in a new region of settlements, the general was as prosperous and distinguished in his separate interests as any one at this day would be glad to find matter of record. We have some veneration for such men, as of an age gone by. They seem ponderous and almost impracticable to us. We, merely standing at the desk, with a pen in hand, feel diminutive, and as if we ought, rather than attempt to balance such men in our ounce scales, construct a solid platform, and adopt a broad standard of avoirdupois weight, to ascertain their due preponderance in the scale of civil, social, and political life. Two of the brothers were joint in frequent transactions in lands; and a great many separate conveyances show that they were variously active in purchasing territory, thus accommodating those who wanted money,

and, at the same time, supplying suitable farms for new settlers; gradually accelerating the growth of the southern part of Vermont to what it has now become. They were ready to loan money, and hold remote lands as security; and sometimes be willing to consider the same as a purchase, when the apparent advan-tage of the borrower so inclined. The enhanced value of five thousand acres of land in Albany, Vt., which the general donated to Middlebury College, has proved a substantial testimonial of his wisdom and liberality. Gen. Hunt was courier from a convention in Vermont to the General Assembly at New York in 1775. He was a delegate from Hinsdale to a convocation called at Westminster in June, 1776 (Hall's Eastern Vermont, 1858, pp. 799, pages 226, 257). We might trace the progress of the brothers into eminence in political life: but we see evidence that their prosperity was in landed and living interests; and what more by commonsense people could be wished? It is sufficient that a nomination was to be made for lieutenantgovernor of the State; and we know not why either of these mutually reliant brethren might not have been selected. The strength of one was that of the whole. The second brother was the fortunate eandidate; and they all sustained him with their sympathy, when in that arduous and honored position.

The general resisted the allurements of married life; and, totally engrossed with the cares of business, as near as we learn, was contented to go, unfruitful in posterity, to the peaceful repose of the tomb, in an honorable old age. The inscription at his grave, in Vernon, Vt., on the side of the beautiful Connecticut River opposite from Hinsdale, where he lived, was

copied for us, July 9, 1861:-

"Gen. ARAD HUNT died Feb. 18, 1825, Ae. 82."

John, St. Rev., of Boston, s. of John, St. 1744. The Rev. John Hunt, A.M., pastor of the Old South Church in Boston, died 30th December, A.D. 1775, aged thirty-one years. As orator, scholar, and divine, he gave bright presages of future eminence; and his brief but exemplary life he devoted to the good of his fellow-men, until he was summoned to higher services.

By consent of his friends in Northampton, where he drew his first and last breath, the church and congregation in Boston, who ordained him 25th September, A.D. 1771, and whose ornament he shone until death, have raised this memorial of his worth; his more lasting praise being in heaven, to shine as the stars for ever and ever. Note. — The foregoing inscription was written by a distinguished character in Boston, at the request of the deacons of the Old South. The monument from which it is taken was prepared at Hartford, and sent to Northampton, 1811, — thirty-six years after the death of Mr. Hunt. The Revolutionary War prevented Mr. Hunt's people from showing this tribute of respect to his memory at the usual time.

In a sermon, delivered at the funeral of Mr. Hunt, from Job xiv. 19, by the Rev. John Hooker of Northampton, the following paragraphs oc-

cur:

"His public services, as long as he lived, everywhere met with singular approbation. He was truly a workman that needed not to be ashamed. In prayer he was peculiarly copious, grave, and solemn, with an unusual variety and pertinency of sentiment and language; and perhaps in no part of public exercise did he more excel than in this. As a preacher, he was eminent. His compositions were correct, manly, and elegant. His sermons were rational, judicious, and instructive; enriched with striking and important sentiments; adorned with a variety and noble turns of thought; enlivened by a strong, animated, and delicate style; recommended by a delivery remarkably grave, deliberate, and emphatical, with a pathos and energy becoming the pulpit, and calculated to give every idea he meant to convey its full weight upon the mind.

"He loved and he preached the peculiar doctrines of the gospel as they were understood by the fathers of his country, but with a most agreeable openness and candor of mind. The doctrine of redemption, through a Mediator and atoning sacrifice, he was particularly attached to, and dwelt much upon it in the course of his life; and it was the hope and comfort of his heart

in death."

House of Representatives. Mr. Everett, of Vermont, rose, and addressed the House as follows: -

"Mr. Speaker, - It has become my painful duty, on behalf of my colleagues, to announce to this House the death of one of their number, - the Hon. Jonathan Hunt. On this occasion I may be permitted to say, that he has long been a member of this House, and that the talents and assiduity with which he executed his duties in this place were alike honorable to himself, to this House, and to his constituents. I have known him long; I have known him well: and a purer spirit never inhabited mortality. His place in this House may indeed be filled; but the void in the affections of his family and friends can never be filled."

Mr. Everett then submitted the following resolu-

"Resolved, That the members of this house will testify their respect for the memory of Jonathan Hunt, deceased, late a member of this House from the State of Vermont, by wearing crape on the left arm for the remainder of the present session of Congress."

A resolution was subsequently adopted, by which Messrs. H. Everett, Choon, Slade, E. Everett, Taylor, Choate, and Candish, were appointed to superintend the ceremonies at the funeral: which should be attended on Wednesday by the Speaker, officers, and members, according to usage.

The House then adjourned to Thursday.

DEATH OF MR. HUNT.

The news of the death of the Hon. Jonathan Hunt, which took place in Washington City on the morning of the 15th inst., will probably have been generally disseminated among our readers ere the reception of this paper. By this sudden and unlooked-for event, the State has been deprived of an able and faithful representative in the National Legislature, and our community of a member who was very generally and very highly esteemed in all the relations of social life. We speak to those who knew him well when we say, that the character of Mr. Hunt, for professional uprightness, political independence, and unsullied integrity in his private affairs, was not surpassed by that of any man in the community. Attended from early youth by all the allurements which wealth can furnish, few men have arrived at the meridian of life through a course of more uniform industry and perseverance, or have used with greater moderation, and less attempt at show, the goods of Providence. Aged forty-two. Died May 15, 1832. (News of the day.)

Obituary of Arad Hunt.

Died at Vernon, Vt., Aug. 30, Arad Hunt, Esq., aged forty-three. Although our deceased friend was born to those flattering expectations upon which are usually founded sanguine hopes of happiness, it was not his fortune to realize, to any enviable extent, this grand object of human desire and pursuit. While in the first bloom of manhood, he was assailed by a disease which neither admitted of cure, nor scarcely the hope of mitigation. During the last eight or nine years of his life, he was confined almost exclusively to his bed; suffering, from alternate distress and lassitude, the slow exhaustion of an originally vigorous constitution. That he always suffered with exemplary fortitude, or that in him patience had its perfect work, even the tenderness of friendship will not affirm. It should be remembered, however, that his were trials of no ordinary kind, either in respect to their severity or duration; and that there is scarcely a more difficult attainment in life, or a spectacle more worthy of admiration, than that of a mind naturally ardent, and eminently fitted for the active pursuits of life, which cannot only contemplate, with unbroken equanimity, the wrecks of its dearest and fairest hopes, but also endure, with unruffled serenity and cheerfulness, the daily and nightly anguish of a protracted and hopeless malady. He possessed intellectual powers, which, if developed under happy auspices, would probably have led to distinction in any congenial walks of life. A love of books solaced the more tranquil hours of his confinement. His reading was various; and, in some departments of knowledge, his information was uncommonly extensive and accurate. Although some of the leading circumstances of his early life were not altogether propitious to a well-balanced character, he possessed many moral endowments, a high sense of honor, a scrupulous love of truth and justice; and free candor and stability were among the primary elements, and indeed formed the basis, of his character. With a hand munificent, and a heart susceptible of the warmest friendship,

he held every past kindness and service in grateful remembrance. In the education and welfare of his family, his abundant means were liberally and judiciously dispensed. On the whole, the composition of his moral character was more remarkable for strength than symmetry; and the movement of his mind, for rapidity and energy than gentleness and equability. Life had long been a burthen to him; and he contemplated the prospect of futurity, if not with cheerfulness, yet without dismay.

and abroad.

Dr. Hunt possessed an iron constitution, and had enjoyed uninterrupted health for more than twenty years, until within about three months, when it began to yield. From this time he gradually declined until his death.

At Northampton, Mass., Aug. 24, 1838, at the residence of her mother, Miss Frances A. Hunt, daughter of the late Dr. David Hunt, aged twenty.

The numerous friends in this city of this interesting young lady, among whom she spent almost the last six or eight months of her life, claim the privilege of mingling their sympathies with those of her "natal spot" who have so recently dropped the tear of sorrow over the clods of the

valley where she lies.

Suddenly has she passed from us; but she has passed into the heavens of eternal glory, "to go no more out for ever." Yes: our friend was a Christian, early nurtured for the paradise above. The last autumn, she came on a visit to this city, gay, and thoughtless of eternal things; and, for some months, mingled with the gay and fashionable in the frequent parties of the pleasure-seeking, where, from the natural buoyancy of her spirits, her cup of joy seemed ever full and overflowing. Yet the solemn caution, "Remember, for all these things, God

will bring thee into judgment," at times gave her an anxious thought. Early in the revival with which we were recently blessed, through the faithfulness of her religious friends, she commenced, with great seriousness and deliberation, to contemplate the greatest of all questions, "Am I prepared to meet my God?" The conviction of the utter destitution of such preparedness seized her mind with such power, that she confessed the deepest solicitude to know what she must do to become reconciled to God. Nor did she hesitate or philosophize when directed to Him who is "the way and the life," but, with the simplicity of a little child, confessed her sins, acknowledged the justice of that law by which she felt herself condemned as a transgressor, and east herself at the feet of her Saviour, "whose blood alone eleanseth from all sin," with entire faith in his ability to save her; and, as his character as Mediator and Redeemer of his people became more fully understood, so greatly did she admire and adore it, that she expressed a strong desire to become entirely consecrated to the service of Him who had done so much for herself and a ruined world. To this end, she made the Bible her daily study, and such books as Baxter's "Saints' Rest" and the "Corner Stone" her daily reading; and so ardent were her aspirations for holiness, that she reluctantly passed an hour in company, except when it might be spent in strictly religious conversation and spiritual improvement. Every hour not thus spent she regarded lost, and used to mention it with deep regret. She often remarked, that it was matter of great surprise to her, that, in their calls and social interviews, Christians said so little on the subject which is delightful above all others, as it is above all others important. But now she mingles with a company in which there is no alloy; and the fire of a Saviour's love, which had just kindled on the altar of her heart, now burns with a purer and holier flame, as she tunes her harp of gold to the sweet song of heaven.

Died in Cambridge, June 9, 1835, Ebenezer Hunt, Esq., of this town, aged sixty. Mr. Hunt left town a few weeks since, with hope of recovering, in a measure, that health and strength which had been very much impaired by protracted and painful illness, and which hitherto he had borne up against with great fortitude and resolution. But his constitution, no longer able to sustain these repeated attacks, yielded without further struggle to the decay of nature.

Mr. Hunt was extensively known abroad, and highly respected and honored at home. The death of such men is of itself, without public comment, calculated to produce more than ordinary sensation in the minds of the community; while the thousand social, fireside, and domestic ties that are severed by so painful an event are too sacred to be brought before the world. His memory will long be cherished by a large circle of friends.

Dr. Orrin Hunt was a native of Lebanon, Conn. He was born in that part which is now the town of Columbia.

He read medicine with Dr. Fuller of that place, who sustained a high reputation in his profession; and was subsequently connected with the State Institution, the Retreat for the Insane, at Hartford. Dr. Hunt enjoyed the full confidence of his distinguished teacher.

Dr. Hunt located in Bolton, and was successful in medical practice, and esteemed as a citizen. He afterwards removed to Glastenbury, and there also enjoyed the reputation of a skilful and faithful doctor. He continued to be much employed in Bolton; and, after a few years, returned to that place.

Dr. Hunt was taught, by affliction in his family and by protracted suffering in his own person, to mingle sympathy with his prescriptions for others; and his visits were thus rendered peculiarly welcome and soothing.

An acquaintance of nearly forty years enables the writer to speak of the estimation in which he was held by his patients. They looked upon him as a friend; and the medicines administered were the more effective and beneficial from the confidence he inspired, and the fellow-feeling and kindness manifested.

His Christian influence was much valued, and his death deplored as a great loss (Letter 203).

Mr. Hunt is a son of Sanford Hunt, Esq., of

Livingston County, N.Y.; and was born in Windham, Greene County, N.Y., on the 5th of August, 1811. He is a descendant from good Revolutionary ancestry; his kindred, on both sides, having been engaged in the war of the Revolution. His grandfather was a surgeon in the army, and lost his life in the service. The young patriot, Natham Hale, whose heroic but melancholy death created a profound sympathy in the hearts of all the patriot leaders, was a brother of his maternal grandmother. Others of his family rendered good service to their country at a time when patriotism required deeds instead of words.

In the year 1818, his father removed to Portage, Livingston (then Alleghany) County, where he still resides. Mr. Hunt, at the age of eighteen, removed to Niagara County, and, in 1830, commenced the study of the law; and, in 1834, he was admitted to the bar of the supreme court. He has never been actively engaged in the duties and labors of that profession, as the care of large landed interests absorbed a great share of his time for many years. Such, however, was the confidence reposed in his integrity and capacity, that in 1836, at the age of twenty-five years, he was appointed to the office of first judge of the court of common pleas in the county of Niagara, and was probably the youngest judge of a court of record who had then ever been appointed in the State. He discharged the duties of the office for five years, and declined a re-appointment which was tendered to him, and the acceptance of which was urged upon him by the members of the bar of the county. In the discharge of the judicial duties of his office, he exhibited in a high degree the possession of those rare faculties for which he has since been distinguished in the National Legislature, - self-possession, quickness of perception, sound judgment, and great amenity of temper.

Mr. Hunt was an active member of the Democratic party until the election of Mr. Van Buren to the Presidency in 1836. He had, however, at all times, been an advocate and warmly in favor of the leading measures now regarded as Whig doctrines. His attachments to party were not sufficiently strong to restrain the expression of his opinions on important measures; and he dissented in toto from the policy of Mr. Van Buren's administration in regard to internal improvements, the tariff, the currency, and the public finances.

During several years, whilst engaged in discharging the duties of a judicial station, Mr. Hunt withdrew from all active participation in political contests; though he was not unobservant of the course of events, nor careful to conceal his opinions, which were well known in the community.

"In the year 1842, he was strongly solicited to become the candidate of the Whig party for representative in Congress. Consulting only his own disposition, he would have declined the offer: but his friends were urgent; and he was nominated, without a dissenting vote, by the Whig District Convention. He was elected by a decisive majority. His personal popularity was great; so much so, that many of the opposite party gave him their suffrages, knowing that his voice and his vote must, in many important measures, be found against their own principles. Of the estimate which his constituents placed upon his character, no stronger evidence need be adduced than a statement of the fact, that he was, without solicitation, regularly nominated for the same office, and re-elected by largely increased majorities" ("Biographical and Political History of Congress"). In 1848, he was urged to become a candidate for the fourth term, but peremptorily declined.

We can only refer to some of his speeches and reports as showing his views on various political topics, and his mode of enforcing them. In general, it is sufficient to say, that he has acted at all times cordially with the Whig members of Congress on important occasions, and has exercised a large influence on the action of his associates. The fertility of his mind and the soundness of his judgment were early perceived and acknowledged in that body, and he was very soon recognized as a safe counsellor and prudent leader; while the courtesy of his manner, and kindliness of his disposition, created warm personal attachment, in many instances, among his political opponents.

On the subject of a change of the naturalization laws, Mr. Hunt's course in Congress was equally explicit and determined. In December, 1845, and soon after the general organization of the "Native-American" party, a petition from the General Assembly of Massachusetts was presented. asking "for such amendments to the naturalization laws as would protect the ballot-box and the elective franchise from abuses and frauds." gave rise to a protracted and animated debate. The ground assumed by Mr. Hunt on this question was fair and liberal, and such as, we are assured, received the general concurrence of the country, though it ran counter to the ultra sentiments of many gentlemen on both sides of the line of moderation which separates the extreme conservative from the radical demagogue, reekless of results.

On the great question of the day,—the Wilmot Proviso,—Mr. Hunt has, from the first, acted with firmness and decision. His views are unquestionably those entertained by the great mass of all parties in the North; and as he is known to be always moderate in the expression of his sentiments, and conciliatory in his bearing, his remarks are worthy of record. On giving his vote, on one occasion, in favor of excluding slavery from our newly acquired territories, he said,—

"Slavery having been extended over the Loui-

siana and Florida purchase, and finally over Texas, the Free States have pronounced, 'Thus far, and no farther.' We insist that this common government of ours shall not be employed to spread slavery over territory now free; that human bondage shall not be carried into other lands, under our national flag; and that our armies shall not go forth, under the colors of freedom, as the propagandists of slavery. That, sir, is the lofty attitude and the unalterable purpose of the North. In this there is no abolitionism to justify the incessant denunciations that have been heard. Gentlemen seem to deceive themselves by neglecting a distinction too obvious to be overlooked. We aim, not to abolish, but to preserve. Where slavery exists, we leave it untouched; where freedom prevails, we demand that you shall not abolish it. While gentlemen denounce the abolition of slavery as treasonable and criminal, I hope they will indulge us if we protest against the abolition of freedom in California, New Mexico, and Chihuahua." Mr. Hunt here expressed his surprise at the remarkable language of the gentleman from Pennsylvania (Mr. C. J. Ingersoll). "I am speaking of the opposition to slavery and its extension which exists in the Northern States.

"He said it was a 'new sentiment held by men, without reason and without argument; nothing but a sentiment, and not a very wholesome sentiment either.' It is difficult to characterize an expression like this, coming from the representative of a Free State, without transcending the limits of parliamentary order. 'A sentiment'! Yes, sir, 'a sentiment'! It is a sentiment which the Almighty has implanted deeply in the human heart, and no earthly power can eradicate it. It may be insulted and overborne, and trampled in the earth; but, thank God, it can never be extin-The fires of martyrdom have been guished. kindled often to subdue it, but in vain. It has seemed to expire on many a battle-field, but only to revive with new energy and beauty.

"It is the spirit of liberty, which is inherent in the soul of man. It is the sentiment which has inspired the friends of freedom in every age. Why, sir, it was 'a sentiment' which impelled the Pilgrims to encounter the perils of the ocean, and the privations of a life in the wilderness, to establish freedom of conscience, and secure civil liberty for themselves and posterity.

"The American Revolution was the offspring of a sentiment: the right of man to self-government is a sentiment. Let the gentleman sucer: it is a sentiment as eternal as the throne of Divine Justice, from which it emanates. It may never warm the heart of that gentleman; he may speak of it in tones of levity and ridicule: but, fortunately, a general truth is not weakened by individual exceptions."

In defending the course of the Whigs in Congress on the Mexican War, and in regard to the principles which should control the government

in dictating peace, he remarked,—
"It had been said that there were some politicians who were always ready to surrender territory that was in dispute. It had become very common in these days to cast indiscriminate reproach on those who preferred to settle vexed questions of boundary in a pacific manner. To claim all, and concede nothing, was now held to be the quintessence of patriotism; but he would recognize no such test.

"He wanted to see these questions discussed in an honorable and a candid spirit, according to the moral considerations of right and wrong. was for respecting the rights of others, without surrendering our own. There was a class of politicians who seemed disposed to make use of all questions touching the foreign relations of the country, merely as means and instruments of party aggrandizement and the acquisition of power; and hence they contrived to present these questions in such a form as to compel the minority to vote against them.

"This attempt to present the minority before the country in the unpopular light of a peace party was wholly without foundation. It was not justified by their acts, neither would it be. Gentlemen seemed to think that power and patriotism were identical; and, because they had all of the one, they must, of course, monopolize the other. But, if it was glory to maintain the national rights and vindicate the national flag, that was a glory shared

equally by both sides of the House.

"The gentleman from Virginia (Mr. Dromgoole) has alluded to the objects of the war, and the spirit in which he would wage the contest. While he would pursue the Mexicans in a spirit of vengeance, his patriotism revels in the prospect of large indemnities of land and money. National honor is also to be measured by leagues; and all our wrongs, real or imaginary, will be healed by the addition of fresh provinces and enlarged dominion. Mr. Hunt would pursue the contest in a different spirit. He wished to see it prosecuted with decisive force and efficiency, till we could secure an honorable peace; but, when the time shall arrive to dictate the terms of peace to Mexico. he hoped to witness a display of justice and generous magnanimity. If we could conquer our own rapacity, and restrain the lust of territorial acquisition, we should achieve a moral victory more glorious than the trophies of war. In imposing the conditions of amity, he hoped we might exhibit a spirit of moderation and forbearance becoming a great republic conscious of its power. By our rectitude and generosity in the hour of victory, we might yet do something to restore the drooping honor of the country. When that hour should come, we must not disguise it from ourselves that appearances were against us.

"While we are strong and powerful, Mexico is

feeble and distracted; and we are already in possession of a vast territory which was recently wrested from her by our own people. But a war is upon us; and, while it continues, it must be prosecuted with vigor; and men of all parties must co-operate, by united counsels and common efforts, to bring the struggle to a speedy and honorable termination."

On the Oregon question, the annexation of Texas, and the subject of a tariff for the protection of domestic industry, Mr. Hunt's opinions were often and fully expressed. It is not too much to say, that they were always liberal, comprehensive, and just. They will bear an attentive perusal when the partisan asperities of the day, and the passions elicited by the occasion, shall have been forgotten; but it is impossible to give separate passages from these speeches which would do jus-

tice to the speaker or the subject.

At the organization of the Congress of 1847, Judge Hunt was appointed chairman of the Committee of Commerce. — a station which, in importance, is second to but one in the House. On this committee he has rendered the country essential service, as all will bear witness who regard the importance of our external and internal commerce. Amongst other labors and services in this station. the most useful and interesting was unquestionably the preparation of the report of that committee on the memorial of the Chicago Convention, and the veto message of President Polk, which was presented to the House on the 23d June, 1848. In all its parts, it is a production of great vigor and masterly comprehension. We can only quote a few passages relating to the importance of bestowing a fostering care on all works calculated to increase and enlarge our internal commerce: -

"Whilst our commerce with foreign nations," says the report, "yields to the government the revenues necessary to its support, and brings the fruits and fabrics of every elime in return for our surplus productions, the commerce among the States, stimulated by freedom of intercourse, has been still more rapid in its progress, and has reached a higher point of value. Independent of the interchange of commodities between the States for domestic consumption (which far exceeds in amount our entire foreign trade), the main bulk of our foreign commerce is derived from and forms an ingredient in the internal trade of the country. Our exports must be first conveyed from the producer, by the navigable waters of the interior, to the seaboard: our imports are conveyed inland, by the same channels, to the remotest points of consumption. Every increase of foreign commerce necessarily swells our internal trade; and the elements of each are so blended and intermixed together, as to form, in reality, one great common interest, identified with the national prosperity, and presenting equal claims to the encouragement and protection of government. If any discrimination were admissible, the internal trade may be said to be of paramount importance, since it is of the first necessity to the people, larger in value, and, in point of fact, includes the transit of a large share of the commodities composing our commerce with other countries. Viewed as objects of national concern, no line of distinction can be drawn between these great interests. It requires a perverse ingenuity to separate them, and define where either begins or terminates. Indeed, it may be affirmed that the safe and convenient navigation of our lakes and rivers is indispensable to the prosperity of the foreign as well as the inland trade of the countries.

"It will be perceived that the protection of navigation, whether along the seaboard or in the interior, on all the great channels of trade, is a subject, not of mere local or sectional concern, but of high national interest, affecting the whole Union and all its parts. Each of the thirty States composing the Union is connected with the navigable waters, either of the sea, the lakes, or the rivers. Each is concerned in the safe and easy navigation of all the channels over which the national commerce is borne. Every State in the interior may claim an interest in the safety and sufficiency of the harbors on the coast, through which their productions must pass in quest of a foreign market. The States on the seaboard are no less interested in the navigation of the Western waters, through which the States are enabled to carry on a constant interchange of commodities at home, and to send forward the agricultural products which form the main bulk of our foreign trade. What section so isolated in position as to be unconcerned in the navigable waters which carry forth our vast and varied productions? The growth and expansion of our inland commerce is the surest indication, as it is one of the chief sources, of our unexampled prosperity and progress.

"Complete and adequate protection can be given only through the agency of a general system, national in its character, comprehending the whole Union and its entire navigation. It must be broad and pervading, embracing every section, and reaching every channel of national commerce. By the adoption of a national plan resting upon sound and enlightened principles, every portion of the Union will derive its equitable share of the common benefit, and no part will have reason to complain of injustice or inequality. Such a system will insure that free commercial intercourse between the States which was a leading object of the Fede-

ral Constitution."

The report contains a masterly review of President Polk's famous veto message. The positions assumed by the President are so completely annihilated, as to render their revival a work of impossibility. Among other things, the President virtually assumed the ground, that the obligations

of the government, concerning the regulation of commerce and navigation, are impaired and lessened by the expansion of our national limits; which is thus noticed in the report:—

"If we concede the force of this reasoning, we must also admit that it has been fortified by the addition of ten degrees to our possessions on the Pacific coast since the date of the message. But the committee are hardly prepared to admit the doetrine, that the powers or obligations of government, concerning the regulation of commerce and navigation, are in any degree impaired by the expansion of our national limits. On the contrary, it is conceived that the vast extent of our navigable waters, and the relative augmentation of our commerce, impose commensurate duties upon The responsibility of government is rather increased than lessened by the growing importance and magnitude of the subject. If appropriations in furtherance of navigation are to be abandoned or diminished by reason of our geographical extension, it follows that every new accession of territory brings weakness instead of strength, and the protection of what we have is inconsistent with further acquisitions. Unless the capacity of the government is equal to its territorial expanse, it results that the nation is too large for the Constitution, and the agency of the federal power must fail to accomplish the great ends of its creation. The argument of the President on this point is hardly consistent with the known fact, that every addition of territory heretofore acquired has been sought mainly, or at least ostensibly, with a view to commercial advantages. Louisiana was purchased, at a cost of fifteen millions, to secure the free navigation of the Mississippi. Florida was obtained, at a great cost, because its possession was deemed necessary to the protection of our commerce on the Gulf. We have waged a bloody war, and finally stipulated by treaty to pay many millions of purchase-money, to secure the ports of California on the Pacific.

"After paying such enormous sums to obtain the command of these great highways of commerce, is it rational to contend that Congress has no power to make them available by removing the impediments which obstruct their navigation?

"Is it constitutional and wise to exhaust millions in the removal of political restraints, if the government be really incompetent to touch those natural obstacles which are far more fatal to freedom, and security of trade? Is the government supreme in its power to acquire, and yet impotent to improve? all-powerful to purchase or annex ports and rivers, and devoid of faculty to clear them out, and make them accessible to shipping? The Executive recently offered Mexico five millions of dollars for a right of way across the Isthmus of Tchuantepec. Without discussing the expediency of offering so large a sum for the privilege of opening a commercial communication

through a foreign country whilst we refuse a single million to improve the commercial channels within our limits, it may be well to inquire if the President seriously intended to pay five millions for a right of way which the government has no constitutional capacity to execute. Perhaps it would be difficult to present a more complete illustration of the fallacy of this branch of the President's

"A country possessing such unrivalled resources and advantages, boasting a commerce so magnificent, and a chain of navigable waters almost boundless in extent, can afford to clear its rivers from snags, and furnish safe harbors for shipping. Whatever additional expenditures may be demanded by the necessities of an expanding commerce will be more than compensated by the consequent increase of revenue."

Mr. Hunt originated the only measure as yet adopted for establishing the semblance of a government in California. The bill extending the revenue laws to that country, and establishing ports of entry there, was introduced by him; and to his vigorous efforts its success may, in no small

degree, be attributed.

In February, 1849, and before the close of his congressional term, Mr. Hunt was elected Comptroller of the State of New York by a vote almost unanimous; and, immediately after the adjournment of Congress, he removed to Albany, and entered upon the duties of the office. Having the management of the finances of the State, and a voice in the Canal Board, the office is one of the first importance in the State. That he will discharge the duties of the station creditably to himself, and advantageously to the State, will not be doubted by any one who is acquainted with his capacity for the management of important interests, and his aptitude for the ready discharge of complex and laborious duties. The offices he has held have come to him unsought: they were freewill offerings from those who repose confidence in his sound judgment, capacity, and integrity.

In private life, few men have more devoted friends. Urbane to all, charitable to all who differ from him in opinion, possessing a generous disposition, a heart flowing with kindness, and a temper rarely disturbed by any event, he seldom loses a

friend or finds a personal enemy.

In the autumn of 1849, he was chosen, by the people, comptroller for two years. In the autumn of 1850, was chosen Governor of New York for a term of two years. He was a candidate for the ensuing term, but was unsuccessful. chairman of the Convention at Richmond for the nomination of Bell and Everett for the Presidency in 1860. Although indifferent to any more public favor, his name was used by the "People's Party" as their candidate for Congress from his district at the recent autumnal election, 1862; and was defeated by the opposition.

DOCUMENTS.

I. A GOOD CHRISTIAN FAMILY MEMOIR.

My grandfather's name was William Hunt. He married Mary Crosby. Grandfather died when he was about fifty years old. I believe my grandmother lived to be about eighty. She was a woman of a remarkable memory. She had a thorough knowledge of the Bible: it was a lamp to her feet, and a light to her path, and the guide of her life. She was one of those blessed old Puritan mothers, who helped lay the foundations of our Christian institution. After her husband's death, she gathered her family around the family-altar, and sought God's divine blessing upon her family, and also at the family-board. member of the Congregational Church in Vernon, Conn.; where she and her husband lived after their marriage, and where they also died and were buried. They rest from their labors, and their works do follow them. My father was their youngest child. I have often heard my father speak of the religious instruction he received from that devoted mother. His name was Jesse Lyman Hunt. He was born in Vernon, Conn., Aug. 14, A.D. 1776. He was married in the year 1804, April 26, to Temperance Bugbee, daughter of Capt. Hezekiah Bugbee of Woodstock, Conn. They purchased a home, and established themselves as a family, in Woodstock. His wife was born in Woodstock, Jan. 17, 1781. They both thought they gave their hearts to God, and professed their faith in Christ, and united with the Congregational churches in the towns where they were born. [See tables.] The three children were all born in Woodstock, Conn. Our parents were trained up by pious, devoted mothers. They believed in a COVENANT-KEEPING GOD. They felt it a duty and a privilege to dedicate their children to God. They wanted the seal of that covenant placed upon their foreheads. They wanted them all embraced in that covenant God made with his people a great while before. I think that they entered into that covenant with a solemn sense of their obligation to God, and the part they had got to act in the matter. I think so; because I know how soon they began, and how faithfully they continued, that instruction which was calculated to make them wise unto salvation. In short, those three children (Hannah, Lucy, and James) had a mother that taught them how to live and how to die. We, as a family, had a great many trials and a great many blessings. Those three children were all converted when they were young, and all united with the Congregational Church. I know that covenant-keeping God was faithful to fulfil his promises to that family. We, as a family, were all united in the service of Oh! how we used to pray, and sing God's praises, and go to the house of God, toge-I think it may be said, we were a household of faith where Jesus loved to dwell. We, as a family, knew what it was to love God and love each other. But the time arrived when those family ties which bound us together on earth were to be severed. When we saw those seeds of dissolution springing up, oh! how we wept! How we prayed, "O my God!

must it, shall it, be so?" Oh! how hard to say, "Thy will, O God! be done"! God offered us the rich consolations of his Spirit. Hannah was afflicted with a tumor, which told us she must soon leave us. She told us she was perfectly resigned to the will of God. She could say, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished my course: henceforth there is laid up for me a blessed crown, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me at that day; and not only to me, but to all those that truly love God." Lucy was laid low upon a bed of sickness and death at the same time. She was one of those lovely girls whom Jesus loved most dearly. We watched with deep anxiety when that messenger of death should enter to execute that dreadful summons, and take away those two lovely daughters and sisters. A few days before that final separation on earth was to take place, Hannah requested her brother to get her into a chair, and convey her to the room where lay her dying sister Lucy. As she looked into the face of that dying sister she loved so well, a silent tear stole down her cheek. She could not speak. She immediately calmed her feelings, and addressed herself in these words: "Lucy, we must soon die. You will go first: I shall soon follow you. We shall soon be together again where Jesus is." Who would not say, "Let me die the death of the righteous; let my last end be like his"? They were lovely and pleasant in their lives; and, in their death, they were not divided.

James L. Hunt was married to Betsey Warren, Jan. 3, A.D. 1836, in the town of Killingly, Conn. She was born in Killingly, April 6, 1817. She obtained a hope in Christ before she was married. She united with the Congregational Church in Brooklyn, Conn. After she was married, when we commenced to live together as man and wife, we erected an altar for the worship of God. We endeavored to live from day to day as it becometh the servants of the living God. We enjoyed the blessings of our heavenly Father, - that blessed promise to thee and thy seed after thee. [See tables.] "One generation passeth away; another takes their places." How true it is, all are born to die! The next death we have to record is of Lucy Elmira; which occurred Feb. 3, 1845, under very afflicting circumstances. She was scalded. It was a very sad and heart-rending affliction to her parents; but they had to give her up to him who said, "Suffer little children to come unto me, and forbid them not; for of such is the kingdom of Heaven." But God is preparing a cup of affliction for the family, more bitter than any thing that has been administered as yet. That husband has one of the kindest and best of companions. Those five remaining children have a very kind and tender mother, who toils incessantly, night and day, in administering to the wants of the family. God comes in a very sudden and unexpected manner, and lays her low upon a bed of death. But God is with her there. She bore her sufferings with Christian fortitude. She exhibited the most heavenly spirit I ever witnessed. The last sabbath she spent on earth was a solemn one for the family. She requested her husband to call her family into the room where she was, and read a chapter in the Bible, and seek God's divine blessing to rest upon us as a family. The husband and father attempted to perform that duty; but, in view of that cup which was being administered, oh! how could be pray audibly? He attempted it; but he failed. The next day, her physicians told she must die. She was perfectly resigned to the will of God. She called her family around her dying bed, and gave them the counsel of a dying godly mother. After that, I believe, she sweetly fell asleep in Jesus. She died at Central Falls, R.I., March 2, A.D. 1852. "What was our loss was her gain."

God has promised to bless the families who put their trust in him; for God ordained the family relation from the beginning. The present wife and mother enters upon her duties with a solemn sense of her obligation to God; she being a member of the Free-will Baptist Church of Pawtneket, Mass., and a consistent Christian. She has proved herself worthy to fill the place. She has nobly and faithfully performed the duties required of her, and has won the love and esteem of all the family. Surely, how good God has been to us as a family!

The next death to record in the family is James Elmar, who died suddenly, Oct. 6, 1853. While the young and the middle-aged have been taken away from us, some have lived to good old age. The father and grandfather, Jesse L. Hunt, was taken sick, and died very suddenly, Nov. 19, 1857, in the eighty-second year of his age. His wife remained to spend a few more years of dreadful pain and suffering; but we all must yield to the grim messenger of death. Temperance Hunt, wife of Jesse L. Hunt, died May 31, 1861, in her eighty-first year. God's promise was fulfilled to her: "Honor thy father and mother, that thy days may be long in the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee." Those that have been taken from us have all been buried in the old family burying-ground in South Woodstock, Conn.

Henry B. Hunt, before spoken of, is in Silver City, Nevada Territory.

Erastus M. Hunt is a worthy member of the Fourth Baptist Church in Providence. He is now in the army of the United States. He was married to Amanda Ann Taylor, Nov. 24, 1859. She is also a member of the church and a consistent Christian. Mary Elizabeth Hunt, their first child, was born in Johnson, R.I., June 22, 1861.

I have spoken of what God has done for us: to him belongs all the glory.

In the name of God Amen. the last Will and Testament of me Ebenezer Hunt of Lebanon the County of Windham and Colony of Connecticut made this 14th day of January A.D. 1742-3.

IMPRIMS. I give and bequeath to my well beloved wife Hanah all my in door Household goods my riding Mare and a Cow she paying to my two daughters Sibyl and Beulah the value of Seven pounds lawful money aggreed to be paid out of my House hold goods as they shall be Prized within one year after my decease

ITEM. I give and bequeath to my beloved Sons namely my sons Stephen Ebenezer William and Daniel all my wearing apparrel—to be equally divided between them together with what I have heartofore given them to be their portion.

ITEM I give and bequeath to my beloved Daughters namely Hanah & Abigail five shillings apiece lawful money

ITEM 1 give and bequeath to my beloved daughter Esther fifty shillings lawful money

ITEM I give and bequeath to my two Daughters—namely Sibbil & Bulah fifteen pounds Lawful money apiece

I give and Bequeath to my two sons—Simeon and Phineas all my Estate both Real and personal which I have not heretofore in this Instrument given away to be equally divided between them Excepting only I give to my son Phineas my Shop which I weave in—with all my weaving Instruments of all sorts and the use of half the Barn for the space of ten years—He the s'd Phineas doing his equal part to keep the Barn in repair—they the s'd Simeon and Phineas paying all the legacies which I have heretofore ordered my Excentors to do equally and all my debts and Funeral-charges also to be paid by them equally.

I do also ordain and appoint my two sons Simeon and Phineas to be my Executors.

III. DR. EBENEZER HUNT.

A drug-store in Northampton was established, in 1769, by Dr. Levi Shepherd and Dr. Ebenezer Hunt. At the close of the Revolutionary War, about the year 1783, this copartnership was dissolved, and Dr. Hunt continued the business. About the year 1797, Dr. Hunt admitted his son Ebenezer as a partner with him; the firm being styled E. Hunt and Son. Dr. Hunt, sen., retired from the business a few years thereafter; E. Hunt, jun., continuing alone until 1828, when Winthrop Hillyer became associated with him; the name of the firm being E. Hunt and Company. In 1836, Mr. Hunt retired; and Mr. Hillyer, in connection with a silent partner, continued the business, under the name of W. Hillyer and Company, until 1842.

Died on the 26th December, 1820, the Hon. Ebenezer Hunt, M.D., aged seventy-six. Sir Francis Bacon remarks, "that it is as natural to die as to be born, and perhaps as little painful;" and it may be added, there are few men who possess such a hold upon the gratitude, or such elevation in the esteem, or interest in the affections, of their cotemporaries, as to excite, in any considerable number of them, more regret when they leave the world than pleasure when they enter it. The one is but the introduction to a state of diversified existence,—a state of trial, and consequently of solicitude and pain: the other, to him who has rightly estimated and wisely performed the business of life, is the termination of every vicissitude of temptation and suffering; the harmonious close, which, like concords in music, are rendered more sweet by the painful dissonance that precedes them. Yet, though the mind is satisfied with this reflection, the heart often rejects it, especially when the finger of Providence touches us nearly, and present bereavement presses upon the soul. The dominion of the understanding over the affections in such case is impotent, and, in most cases, more partial than we are willing to admit.

The instances of general affliction springing from the same source, we have remarked, are rare. Yet, when the Father of his Country died, it was otherwise; and, in a more limited degree, when a late distinguished citizen of the Commonwealth died; and, still more recently, when he who is the subject of these reflections was summoned from this to a brighter world. Dr. Hunt, although he was honored with the confidence of his fellow-citizens, and was early called to the discharge of the various municipal duties of the town in which he lived and in which he was born and died; although for many years he was a representative in the General Court, and a senator of the Commonwealth; although he was member of several learned societies, and a vice-president of that in which he was professionally most interested, and, in these several departments, acquitted himself with no ordinary ability, — yet in his capacity as a physician he is most to be admired; and in that capacity his loss is most felt, and within the sphere of his extensive practice most lamented. There is something in the character of a family physician very interesting, and in his relation to his fellow-beings peculiar. To other men we commit our property and our reputation; but, to him, our lives. He is to us a kind of guardian angel, to avert or mitigate the natural evils of life; and when he, in turn, who has raised us from sickness, is laid low, and the speaking eye which has cheered us asks in vain for relief, we feel emotions, not of grief merely, but of grief heightened by obligation and gratitude, sympathy and nature.

Perhaps there was never a more tender or attentive physician than Dr. Hunt, or one who realized more impressively the importance of his office; and there have been but few more skilful or more extensively useful. And, what fills the circle of a medical man's character, and renders it perfect, he was a gentleman and a Christian. For more than half a century, his house was the abode of hospitality; and wherever, among his patients or his friends or human-kind, he found poverty in affliction, he relieved it, and with the unostentatious good nature which satisfies want without exciting feelings of dependence, and creates obligation without extorting from gratitude a pledge for its discharge.

About a year since, conscious that he had advanced to the last verge of life, he adjusted all his concerns with this world, and waited for his summons to the other. He died after years of usefulness that shed a radiance upon the past, and with the hope that cheered him in his prospects of the future.

V. DRS. DAVID AND EBENEZER HUNT.

New Meeting-house. — The ground-plot for a meeting-house for the new Congregational society has been purchased on the corner, south-west of the Bank, called Dr. Hunt's Corner. It contains twenty-two or twenty-three square rods, and is an eligible situation. The price given for it is three thousand dollars, or about fifty cents per square foot.

This corner was a part of the highway, or common, until King Philip's War, in 1676; when about half an acre was given by the town to William Smead, who had been driven within the palisades by the Indians. It was afterwards owned by Thomas Alvord and others until 1730; when it was sold, with a house, barn, and hatter's shop, to Deacon Ebenezer Hunt, for a hundred and thirty pounds, in the depreciated currency of that day; equal, perhaps, to a hundred and fifty or a hundred and sixty dollars. After remaining in the Hunt Family a hundred and three years, Dr. David Hunt, a grandson of Deacon Ebenezer Hunt, has sold about one-fourth of the half-acre, without any buildings, for three thousand dollars. The large clm-tree east of the corner was set out in 1744, — eighty-nine years ago. The tree at the corner is not so old.

VII. COPY OF SAMUEL HUNT'S WILL.

In the Name of God Amen — I Samuel Hunt of Northfield in the County of Hampshire and Province of Massachusetts Bay in New-England Gentleman, being considerably advanced in years & feeling in myself the decays and infirmities of old age, and disposed whilst (through divine Goodness) I am blessed with the use of my memory & understanding to make my last will & Testament. And first of all I give my soul to God who gave it me: and my Body to the dust to be decently interred, hoping & believing that soul and Body will be hereafter reunited & raised to a glorious and blessed immortality — and my worldly estate, I give and devise as follows, viz,

To my Dear wife Anne Hunt I give the use and improvement of one third part of all my Real estate wheresoever the same is Situated to hold during the term of her natural life.

To my Eldest son Samuel Hunt, I give & devise all the real estate I have in the town of Charleston & westmoreland, in the Province of New Hampshire, and one right of land in the town of Rockingham in the Province of New York as tis said, to have & to hold to him & his heirs &c.

To my second son Jonathan Hunt, I give & devise forty acres of Land being the southerly half of the Lot of Land I bought of the Wrights, in that part of the town of Hinsdale that is situated on the west side of Connecticutt River with all the Buildings thereon — and a fourth Division Lot I bought of Ebenezer Warner lying westerly of & adjoining to said forty acres, & also three acres of land I own in the Island meadow, so called, — and fifty seven acres of land at the south or lower end of the fifth or Mr Doolittles meadow, so called, & half my saw mill, with all the privileges & appurtenances thereof, standing on the first Salmon Brook so called, to have & to hold to him & his heirs &c.

To my youngest son Arad I give and devise, forty acres of land being the northerly half of the Lot I bought of the Wrights in that part of Hinsdale, situate on the west side of Connecticutt River, & my Lot called Burts Lot lying westerly of & adjoining to said forty acres, & also the Lot in the same division with the last, I bought of Moses Field & my Farm with the Buildings thereon, which was Lieut Sargeants, deceased, which I purchased of his widow & Heirs lying at the lower end of Fort Dummer meadow, so called, & the remainder of my land in the fifth or Mr Doolittles Meadow, so called, afores⁴, at the northerly end thereof and in Cold spring meadow or at the Cold spring, so called, and also the other half of my saw mill on the first salmon Brook, so called, & my farm in winchester in the Province of New Hampshire, called the Countrey Grant to him & his heirs.

All the remainder of my lands in the towns of Hinsdale (on both sides of Connecticutt River) and New Guilford, I give and devise to my two Sons Jonathan and Arad above named, to be equally divided between them, to hold to them & their heirs respectively.

To my third son Elisha I give & devise all my Real estate in the towns of Northfield & warwick (Lands & Buildings) to have & to hold to him & his heirs forever, as also my Negro Boy named Mishap.

To my five Grand Sons (sons of my Son & Daughter Hubbard), I give and devise three

hundred acres of land in an additional Grant to the town of Keene in the Province of New Hampshire.

The remainder of my Real Estate lying in the Provinces of the Massachusetts Bay, New Hampshire, New York & the Colony of Connecticutt, I give to my four Sons, Samuel, Jonathan, Elisha & Arad, & to their heirs &c, to be equally divided between them to hold forever.

To my Eldest Daughter Anne Hubbard I give & bequeathe the sum of two hundred pounds,

I Jonathan Hunt of Vernon in the County of Windham and State of Vermont, Esquire, being advanced in years, but of sound and competent mind and memory, blessed be Almighty God for the same, do make and publish this my last Will and Testament, in manner following, that is to say — First of all I commend my spirit unto God as to a faithful Creator, and my body I direct to be interred in decent manner at the discretion of my Executors, who are hereby directed to pay all my just debts and funeral charges, and touching that worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me, I dispose thereof as follows —

First, I give and devise to my wife Lavinia one half of my home farm in Vernon aforcsaid, with half of the Mansion House and buildings thereon, and the right and privilege of cutting and taking from any woodlands in said town whereof I may die seised, wood and timber necessary for fuel, buildings and fences, to have and to hold the same for and during her natural life. I do also give and bequeath to my said wife one half of the farming tools, household goods and furniture, and one half of the Stock, meaning neat cattle, horses, sheep and swine, of which I shall be possessed at the time of my decease, excepting however from the same any special bequests I may herein after make of any part thereof — I also give to my said wife one third part of the grain and provisions and one half of the hay I may have on hand at the time of my decease — I also give and bequeath to my said wife the sum of one hundred dollars, to be paid to her quarter yearly from the time of my decease.

I give and devise to my eldest son Jonathan and his heirs forever, all the Real Estate whereof I am seised, lying in Heath in the County of Franklin and Commonwealth of Massachusetts, also all the Real Estate which I have and hold in severalty or in common with others, lying in the towns of Whittingham, Wilmington, Wardsborough, Dover and Brattleborough, in the County of Windham aforesaid, excepting in the town of Brattleborough so much as is herein after devised in trust for my daughter Fanny and her children. I also give to my said son Jonathan two shares in the Windham Turnpike Company, and a horse to be selected by him after his mother shall have chosen one for herself.

ITEM. I give and devise to my youngest son Arad and to his heirs and assigns, all the Real Estate whereof I am seised in Vernon aforesaid, lying north of the Road leading from the meeting house by Eliakim Stebbins's to Guilford line, excepting however the devise herein before made to my said wife, and also about forty acres of land lying on the north line of Vernon aforesaid, herein after devised in trust for Fanny and her children. Reprinted, for private distribution, from the new "American Cyclopædia," vol. ix.: "HUNT, Thomas Sterry, an American chemist, mineralogist, and geologist, born in Norwich, Conn., Sept. 5, 1826. His early education was obtained at the academy and grammar-school of his native town. He studied for a while with a view to the medical profession, but was subsequently induced to devote himself to chemistry; and accordingly, in 1845, became a private student with Prof. B. Silliman, jun., in Yale College; where he was also subsequently chemical assistant to Prof. Silliman, sen. . . . After two years' study in the Yale Laboratory, he was offered, by the late Prof. James F. W. Johnston, the post of chemical assistant in his newly established school of agricultural chemistry in Edinburgh; but he declined this overture, in order to accept the post of chemist and mineralogist to the Geological Commission for the survey of Canada, still in progress, under Sir W. E. Logan. He had previously been named to the same post in the Geological Survey in Vermont, then in progress; which he declined. His labors in the Canadian survey have contributed greatly to advance our knowledge both of the scientific and economical geology of Canada

geology of Canada. "His earlier studies were especially directed to organic chemistry, then assuming shape from the labors of Liebig, Dumas, Laurent, and Gerhardt. It was as the reviewer, interpreter, and critic of these chemists, that Mr. Hunt first became known. Boldly attacking the views of the rival schools of Giessen and Montpellier, he developed, from the germs contained in some of the papers of Laurent, a system which may be said to be essentially his own. In this system, he deduces all chemical compounds, organic and inorganic, from simple types, which are represented by one or more atoms of water of hydrogen. These bold views he maintained, at first single-handed, in a series of papers which appeared in successive volumes of the 'American Journal of Science' from 1848 to 1851; but they were at length accepted by Williamson and Brodie in England, by Wurtz in Paris, and at last by Gerhardt himself. This happy conception of Mr. Hunt will rank in the history of the science with the compound radical theory of Liebig, and the law of homologous series of Gerhardt. Its author has now the satisfaction of seeing it generally received, although it is often erroneously attributed to the chemists last named; who were, however, led by Mr. Hunt by two or three years, and who historically are his followers.

Mr. Hunt's philosophical views in chemistry and physics have plainly been influenced by the study of Kant, and, still more, of Hegel and This may be seen in his essays on 'Solution, Chemical Changes, and Atomic Volumes,' which appeared first in the 'American Journal of Science,' but were republished in England and Germany. In these he attacks the long-established atomic hypothesis, and all its consequences; and asserts that chemical union is interpretation, or rather identification. His researches upon the atomic volumes of liquids and solids were a remarkable anticipation of those of Dumas; while, by his views on the polymerism of mineral species, he has opened a new and as yet unexplored field for

mineralogy.

"These philosophical studies have, however, only been incidental to Mr. Hunt's more serious labors of research in chemical mineralogy and chemical geology. These researches, still in progress on the sedimentary rocks of Canada and its mineral waters, have already contributed essentially towards obtaining more just views of chemical geology, and a more rational theory of rock metamorphism, while serving to

clucidate the rocks of Canada, in aid of the researches of Sir W. E. Logan in the stratigraphical geology of that country. Thus the analyses and chemical researches of Mr. Hunt have demonstrated that the wide-spread alteration and crystallization of the sedimentary rocks, constituting what is known as normal metamorphism, have been produced by the intervention of alkaline waters; and his conclusions were speedily confirmed by the recent experiments of Daubrée. In some of his recent papers, Mr. Hunt has discussed the theory of igneous rocks and of volcanic phenomena from a new point of view; and has, in a forcible manner, revived the almost forgotten views of Herschel and Keferstein, who placed the seat and source of all these in the sedimentary deposits of the earth's crust. He undertakes to show, that the chemical re-actions established in these sediments by the ascending heat of the earth's nucleus will explain all volcanic and plutonic phenomena. He has farther discussed the chemical condition of a cooling globe (such as the primal earth is assumed to have been); and essays to show how the present chemical conditions of the sea, the atmosphere, and the solid rocks, have been produced by the slow operation of natural causes. In his lately published researches on the formation of gypsums and magnesian rocks ('American Journal of Science, [2], xxviii.), he has, by the discovery of new and most important re-actions of the salts of lime and magnesia, been able to resolve, in a rational way, the knotty problem of the formation of these rocks, and refute the ordinary hypotheses of their origin. His memoirs of the Serpentines, or Ophiolites, and on Euphotide and Saussurite, among others in chemical lithology, are noticeable for laborious and successful research.

"Besides the contributions of Mr. Hunt to the 'American Journal of Science' and to the London 'Philosophical Magazine,' the Royal Society, the French Academy of Sciences, &c., we may notice his share in the reports of the geological survey of Canada, for the last ten years. He is also the author of a summary of organic chemistry, forming a part of Prof. Silliman's 'First Principles of Chemistry.' Mr. Hunt was one of the English members of the international jury at the Great Exhibition at Paris in 1855, where he attracted attention by his contributions to the Geological Society of France and the French Academy. At that time, he was decorated, by Napoléon III., with the Cross of the Legion of Honor. In addition to his duties as a member of the Geological Commission of Canada, Mr. Hunt is Professor of Chemistry to the Faculty of Arts in the University of Quebec, where he lectures in the French language. In 1854, he received

the honorary degree of A.M. from Harvard College; and, in 1857, that of Doctor of Science from the University of Quebec. He is a member of various learned bodies; and, in 1859, was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of London. A complete list of Mr. Hunt's scientific memoirs would occupy more space than our limits permit. In the second series of the 'American Journal of Science,' alone, he has published seventy-one papers since 1846.

"It will give much pleasure to the friends of scientific education and of the M'Gill University to be informed, that, at a late meeting of the Board of Governors, T. Sterry Hunt, Esq., Sc. D., M.A., F.R.S., &c., was appointed to the Chair of Applied Chemistry and Mineralogy now created in the Faculty of Arts. While the eminent qualifications and high reputation of Dr. Hunt shed lustre on this new chair, the University has conferred an important benefit on the country, and especially on this city, in placing within the reach of young men, entering on those professions in which a knowledge of practical chemistry is of importance, advantages which they have heretofore been obliged to seek abroad. There can be no doubt, that, in this great centre of manufactures and medical education, a large number of students will be found ready to avail themselves of the means of scientific training thus offered.

"It is proper to add, that the University is enabled to extend its usefulness in this direction chiefly through the liberality of two of its friends, — William Molson. Esq., who has erected the laboratory building; and another gentleman, who for the present withholds his name, who contributes the salary of the Chair,—leaving merely the apparatus and incidental expenses to be provided for by the University.

"The present appointment does not interfere with the Professorship of Chemistry in the Medical Faculty, so long and efficiently held by Dr. Sutherland: Dr. Hunt's duties being limited to the students in arts, and to special students in practical chemistry: while the removal of mineralogy from the Chair of natural history will enable Dr. Dawson to devote himself more exclusively to other departments of that extensive subject; thus rendering the course of natural science in M'Gill University one of the most complete to be found anywhere. Dr. Hunt retains his connection with the Geological Survey of Canada; and, in adding thereto the function of a public teacher, only conforms himself to the established practice of the officers of the Geological Survey of Great Britain."

Rhode Island is and has been the abode of the most admirable people either in New England or on the American continent. Early a refuge from ecclesiastical persecution, here the followers of Roger Williams, and of his easy, secure, and solid system of religious belief, from a mere handful have become a great and extended people of migration and permanent settlement. Banking, insurance, and manufactures are conducted here with prodigious facility by a people skilled and reliable, who thoroughly understand what they are about, and possess the confidence of the community everywhere abroad who value integrity and a perfect dependence upon good business capacity and punctual trustworthiness.

Providence — doing honor to its blessed name — is one of the sweetest cities to go and visit or abide in that we can believe to exist in any latitude lower than paradise itself. Is there a heart's wish, even only to be whispered, that cannot be indulged (if it is on virtue's side) among the impassioned and generous city people, so free and amiable in intercourse of acquaintance and friendship? We are right glad to place a lineage of the name of Huxr in this locality; and believe, that, with better fortune in getting replies from North Kingston and other Bay settlements, we could have been more perfect.

SALEM LINE.

Several years after the original planting of the settlement at Salem, Mass., Lewis Hunt established his abode and left posterity. Within a century past, Thomas Hunt came from one of the British kingdoms and selected this place for the residence of his family. The data of the family of the first, are furnished with eminent kindness and good favor by Rev. John Lewis Russell; and are corroborated in part by some parallel collections of G. R. Curwen, Esq. Of the second branch we get what is related by the descendants (especially Mr. Stanley,) and what the Records exhibit to enhance and strengthen the whole; making a thorough and valuable lineage.

Salem, as it appears at this day, surviving all that has been peculiarly notable in past history, does not do much discredit to the good name first given it with high regard to scriptural significance. "The city of our God" is a proud nomenclature, and it is well it should ever be honored. The worthy Annalist, who has been laborious and exact, supplies a good History which may be resorted to with great confidence for any other than special researches in genealogy. This delightful city, and its localities and personages of the past, seems imbued with many pleasant associations in the mind; as if the place had been looked upon and had felt (amid all its higher and abundant blessings,) the untroubled and resplendent look of some good man of genius like Hawthorne; who by his entrancing stories, like those of "Twice told Tales" and others of his mint of mind, had sublimated every thing of low degree, and made every spot and person elevated to his pure tastes and sweetly illustrious.

The old "Lewis Hunt House" he has celebrated in his elegant romance The House of Seven Gables. Thanks to the dear and good author who amuses so ingeniously and with power. Going often through the many interesting streets of this city, a new charm pervades the way each time. Ancient houses are clustered thick; and the more modern, with large garden appendage, are stately and invite a longing eye to explore their splendor and beauty. As the people are enriched by the products of the India trade, relics and curiosities are to be seen in the houses of the opulent. We pass the superb shops, visit the wharves where are moored the tall ships unlading their commodities, and see the storehouses ready to crush with the weight of rich goods. And the imagination may readily invest many localities with the tokens of Asiatic magnifi-

cence. The tramping elephant in the profound and unpenetrated jungles of his native wilds, and all the host of Eastern celebrities — the fruit of ages of oriental wisdom and toil, are uppermost in the vivid picture the mind easily gets of the phenomena they have here of things rare and elegant. The records of the past are fine. It seems that no other City Clerk could respond to our call for examination of the books with so much princely dignity as this worthy incumbent. Or at the Court House, especially the Probate and the Law office, no other officers in the world could show us so much suavity and ready facility. And it is worth a more lengthy pilgrimage than we make, to come and encounter the beauteous faces and eloquent eyes of the young, touched with every charm that virtue gives, making us feel refined and happy when here, and ready to yield them every attribute our mind can give, because we know their gracious surroundings.

The increase afforded to this lineage is not very great, yet the superiority of the locality and of the community constrains us to place these pedigrees as a separate line. A larger neighboring city has more genealogies which are desultory and not extended, therefore such do not make a "Line" but are miscellaneous.

Increase of numbers has its blessings. A large community, a large city or town, is like a great audience or assembly of persons temporarily together; they are all on the watch and keep each other in cheek: there is not freedom but conformity, not ease but gentle restraint. When a person knows there are plenty of others near, beside, before, and around, - ready to hear, see, know and comment on all that transpires, there will be that wholesome fear to do wrong, that sensibility of the pleasure of doing right which is always approved and administers so greatly to the security, the happiness and the advancement of the great commonwealth of human interests. It is true that in closely compact society there is much occurs that touches and affects the individual, peculiarly personal, that becomes quickly observable, and that one would think rather ungenerous and unfair for others to be prompt to notice to a disadvantage, yet it is best never to despair; but sweetly to tolerate this "surveillance of society" which is so annoying to the lover of individual privileges, yet is so vastly effectual to help us, urge us, and maintain us steady in that onward course which never ceases till time shall be merged in eternity, and all things be revealed without shadow or concealment.

"Died on the 25th of September, in Providence, at the residence of her brother-in-law, S. R. Weeden, Miss Caroline Blanding Hunt, daughter of the late Allen Hunt, Esq., of Seekonk, in the twenty-first year of her age.

"Caroline Blanding Hunt, the subject of the present notice, was one in whom rare intellectual endowments blended, in attractive union, with the liveliest Christian virtues. Features expressive of earnest thoughtfulness, a heart all sympathy and tenderness, and piety of the liveliest east, rendered her at once the light and the joy of the family group, the social circle, and the church. As a daughter, she was characterized by a cheerful obedience; as a sister, by a constant and untiring affection; as a friend, she was ever true; and as a Christian, ever faithful. Age respected her for her thoughtfulness, and decision of character; youth loved her for her cheerfulness, and admired her for the qualities of her mind; and children now weep over her grave, because her winning look and gentle voice shall no more drive away their youthful sorrows nor gladden their mirthful hearts. With Nature she loved to hold communion; and such communings prompted the expression of her feelings in poetry, which her diffidence kept hidden from any but her intimate friends, but which was often beautifully written, and rich in poetic merit.

"But it is on her Christian character that her friends now most fondly dwell. The Congregational Church in Seekonk mourns the loss of a consistent and active member. Professing her faith in a crucified Redeemer at the early age of thirteen years, her path has since been the 'path of the just.' The sabbath school was the object of her warmest sympathy, of her active zeal, and of her most fervent prayers. To her class she was ever faithful.

"For some time past, she had indulged the presentiment, that she could not linger long on earth; that the Master would soon call for her. The language marked by her pencil some time before her death, as consonant with her feelings, is most striking: -

'I would sleep where the church-bells aye ring out, I would rise by the house of prayer, And feel me a moment at home on earth; For the Christian's home is there."

The above tribute to the memory of Miss Hunt, by one who knew her well, is copied from the Boston "Recorder." That which follows was prepared

by another hand: -

"Caroline was one of those blessed spirits that never die. When called to remove from one of the Father's 'mansions' to another, from the 'earthly house' to that 'not made with hands,' they disappear from our sight, it is true, but still live in our hearts, and seem to be present with us almost as if the sweet tones of their voices were yet sounding in our ears. We cannot realize that they are gone, to be here no more; nor divest ourselves of the idea, that we shall soon see them again.

" It is not easy to understand the secret of that power which is given to a very small portion of our race, by which they are enabled so to enshrine themselves in the hearts of their friends as to retain a place in the imagination, as if still present, long after they have passed away. Its effect has been beautifully described by Sprague in the elegant lines, beginning, 'I see thee still;' and all who were intimately acquainted with Miss Hunt can testify that she possessed it in an eminent degree.

"Her frank and cordial manner, her ready wit, the activity of her imagination, and the strength and ardor of her affections, combined to render her interesting as a companion, and invaluable as

"When, at the age of thirteen, Caroline applied for admission to the church, she writes, ' My first thoughts on the subject of religion may be dated back to the days of my dear departed mother. As soon as I was old enough to think and understand, she used to read the Bible to me, and tell me of God's great goodness and loving-kindness to us in sending his Son to die for us; but what most affected my mind was her frequently taking me aside, and praying with me.'

"In her journal, which she commenced keeping at a very early age, and in the little poetical effusions which she was in the habit of writing, frequent allusions are made to this dear friend of her childhood, who was indeed worthy of the best

affections of her children.

"With a heart capable of strong attachment, however, and with affections ardent, it was impossible that she should be destitute of enjoyment

while dwelling in the bosom of a still numerous family, all of whom loved her most earnestly. We may well suppose, therefore, that she still enjoyed many happy hours in the 'sweet home' of her childhood during the interval that occurred between the death of her mother and that of her father, - a period of more than nine years.

"This event - so sudden, so severely afflictive, and followed by so many circumstances calculated to lacerate the feelings and depress the spirits of one so sensitive - might well have been regarded as sufficient to complete 'an orphan's woe,' had it not been followed by another, almost as sudden and distressing; which did, indeed, cause her cup of sorrow to overflow. Allusion is made to the death of her brother.

"He was but a few years older than herself, and had been her most intimate playmate and companion from her earliest childhood. After the death of her father, she seems to have clung to him more closely than ever; and, when he was taken, she was lonely indeed.

"It could hardly be supposed, however, that feelings so intense could always continue in the breast of a girl of sixteen. Nor was she always sad, although subject at times to deep depression of spirits; but in pursuing her studies, in teaching, attending to household duties, and especially in ministering to the wants and cheering the heart of her aged grandparent with whom she lived, her mind gradually recovered from the double shock which it had received, and assumed a healthful activity. In her earlier years, she had probably indulged in visions of future distinction as a writer; encouraged doubtless to believe that the talents which she possessed would eventually win for her a place among the children of song. Such hopes, however, were early dismissed; and, whenever she wrote, it was to give expression to the thoughts which were floating through her mind in the manner that seems to have been most natural to her, or, as was the case in a few instances, to please her friends. The sentiment of the following verse is more than once expressed in her writings, and seems to have been the result of a deliberate determination to abandon all hopes of fame: -

'I cannot write; for on my burning brow The laurel wreath would wither, fade, and die: Adieu, false hopes of fame! which even now Too oft within my soul forbidden fly.

"The spirit which was the light of many hearts How desolate is now the home where once dwelt that happy family! how cheerless the hours to her who has seen one generation after another fall by her side, but who had hoped to be blessed with the presence of this sweet comforter until her own weary pilgrimage should

DEAR SIR, - It gives me much pleasure to respond to your request in regard to the Hunt Family. The information is quite limited, and that will be only from early recollections. We know but little of our ancestors beyond our grandfather. He was a native of Braintree, Mass. His name was David Hunt: and we think his father's name also was David, and his grandfather's was John.

He was, by his own account, born in Braintree or Quincy, July 18, 1745. His father died while he was very young; and this left him quite ignorant of his family connections. He had one sister, Mary, who married James Tirrell, and were supposed to have settled in Quincy. He was apprenticed to a shoemaker at the age of fourteen, and remained till the age of twenty.

One year after, he came to this place, then an almost unbroken wilderness; there being but five families at this time. It was then called New Boston; now, Gray. As one of the early pioneers of a new country, many not only pleasing but thrilling incidents might be related of him; but have no time to do so at so short notice. Being a person of much penetration in regard to the future, he soon became a great landholder. He selected a beautiful rise of land, where he located, and spent the remainder of his days. It is a fine site, and still bears the name of Hunt's Hill. It is now divided into four good farms, and three of them are now occupied by his children and grandchildren. In 1768, he married Miss Sarah Millet of Gloucester, Mass. By this marriage, he had four sons and one daughter; two of which are now living (the youngest son and daughter), both nearly seventy years of age.

He died at the advanced age of seventy-nine, in the year 1824. Much might be said of him in all the relations of life; but there were two predominant principles in his character, - patriotism and benevolence. In him the poor always found

a friend.

His oldest son, David, settled in Gray, Me.; his second son, Moses, in Windham, Me., where

most of his family now reside.

Nathan, the third son, remained at home on the old homestead. He died in 1856, Nov. 23, aged seventy-nine. Israel, the youngest son, settled in Portland, Me. Sarah, the youngest child, married Samuel Hodgdon, and lives on a farm her

father gave her.

His posterity are not numerous. There are some of the third, fourth, and two of the fifth, generation now living. The writer of this sketch is a daughter of Nathan, who married Miss Mary Haskell of Falmouth, Me., who is still living, at the advanced age of eighty-two; with his youngest son, Hiram P. Hunt, constitutes the family at the old mansion. His oldest son, John, lives at Albany, Me. His second son, Elnathan, lives on a part of the original site of Hunt's Hill. The third son settled in Portland, Me.; where he died in the year 1859, leaving a wife and four children. The two youngest daughters are married, and reside in Portland.

After contributing what little information I have (and you can make any selection that is useful), I shall feel myself amply repaid for my trouble, and shall place myself on the list of subscribers for the work.

Mr. Hunt was the youngest among the family left by Nathan Hunt, and a native of the beautiful

town of Quincy, formerly part of old Braintree. Such a world-wide fame as Mr. Hunt has for his peculiar intellectual labors mukes his reputation co-eval with the "Merchants' Magazine," the chef downer of his whole mature life. In that, his ability and excellence stand imperishable.

We therefore hardly need attempt to be minute in any minor particulars; and, it will be seen, we have not obtained the data of the columns perfect. The salutatory address here added is prefixed to the "portrait number" of the "Magazine," CXNI., for July, 1849, vol. xxi., No. 1, pp. 144. The plate of that likeness we have tried in vain to find. The magazine bearing his name is continued to this day.

Office of the "Merchants' Magazine," New York, July 1, 1849.

We feel that we are taking a sort of liberty (a liberty, however, for which we shall offer no apology), in sending to our readers, with the first of the twenty-first volume of the "Merchants' Magazine and Commercial Review," a portrait of the editor.

The motive which leads friend to send to friend the likeness of features, which the intercourse of vears and old associations have rendered interesting, is as natural as it is proper. The intercourse which, during the last ten years, has existed between the editor of the "Merchants' Magazine" and his numerous readers - the silent intercourse of mind with mind, springing out of a common interest, on his part as editor, on theirs as readers, on the same important topics - is not of precisely the same kind as that of friend with friend. We shall not, therefore, presume to speak for the many readers or friends (if they will allow us to call them so) in New York and throughout the United States (cisatlantic and transatlantic), and, we may say, in the four quarters of the "great globe itself," for whom we have labored during the last ten years. What may be their feelings towards the humble individual who has, in this work, put forth his best energies to supply a want long felt, and to furnish to a most enlightened class of readers at once an organ for their views and a magazine of information for their use, it is not for him to guess: but, for himself, he can say, that as he has advanced with his work, every year gaining larger views, and a clearer conception of the extent, the length and the breadth, of the great field of mercantile science which it has been his business and his pleasure to explore; as his information, and sources of information, have increased and multiplied; as, in short, his knowledge of his subject, and with it his love of his subject, have grown and strengthened, - a kindly nearness of feeling has, at the same time, grown up in his own mind towards the large and increasing circle of readers for whom he has labored, and many of whom have

accompanied him with their approval and support from the beginning of the work.

The difficulties which attended that beginning, the labors that had to be performed and the obstacles to be surmounted before the work could be established upon a broad and safe basis, are known best to him who is least willing to speak of them, - the editor himself; but this much we may say, that the idea of the "Merchants' Magazine" was no sudden thought, - was not suggested by mere accident. It was a long time the subject of much thought and deliberation, before any active steps were taken towards carrying it out. In casting the eye around in the difficult search after some useful but unoccupied corner in the wide field of literature, it seemed to the editor as if every point was already occupied, every branch represented, except one, and that the very important subject of commerce and the mercantile interest. On the one hand, the professions -- the divine, the lawyer, and the physician; the farmer also, and the mechanic - had each one or more organs and exponents in the periodical press. Even the railroad interest, new as it then was, had found a voice through the press; while commerce, more or less connected with all other pursuits, was unrepresented. While the business concerns of commerce filled the huge columns of the daily press with advertisements and with shipping intelligence, and with matter relating to the every-day details of merchandise, on the one hand, there was not a single magazine of high or low pretensions, either in America, or, to the best of our knowledge, in Europe, to represent and to advocate the claims of There were one or two dictionaries commerce. of commerce, and a few works intended for practical purposes; but a literature of commerce did not exist, even in name. The idea and the thing itself were yet to be developed. In 1839, the "Merchants' Magazine and Commercial Review" was established, without, we confess, so clear a conception as after-experience has furnished of the full import of the term COMMERCE, in its broadest, largest, and truest sense or signification. Every branch of industry, almost every pursuit, may be said to come within its range. The interests of agriculture and manufactures, which produce, are identified with the interests of commerce, which distributes. The great topics of banking and finance, of railroad and canal communication, of mining, and of navigation by steam and sail, are all involved in the one great topic of commerce. A large part of the legislation of states and nations is devoted to the regulation of commercial operations. Courts of law and equity are daily deciding points in mercantile jurisprudence, growing out of the constantly varying circumstances of commercial enterprise. How liberalizing and expanding are the pursuits of commerce, thus understood, in their effect upon the mind, is obvious, and is often remarked. The wants and the neces-

sities of all nations, of all races of men, form elements in the calculations of the true merchant. He studies the condition and finds out the wants of all, to relieve them. It is his interest, it becomes also his pleasure, to do so. He learns to look upon all nations as knit together by the ties of mutual dependence, to regard all men as kin-The mercantile student learns the same lesson. To teach that lesson HAS BEEN and SHALL BE one of the great purposes of the "Merchants' Magazine." Mr. Hunt was born to the slender fortune of the youngest child of a family of sixteen. His grandfather, by the mother's side, was a clergyman; and it may be considered that prayers and blessings preceded his course in life. We early find the publishment of his banns of matrimony at Braintree, Jan. 10, 1766; then the return of marriage, on a slip of paper dated Feb. 20, 176* (the last figure obliterated), in the registry at Boston among the marriages by John Hill, J. P. He appears to have been active, enterprising, and accumulative, but not finally affluent. In 1775, he sold land in Bristol County; recorded at Taunton. In 1778, he was of Boston; and then bought house and fifty acres land in Abington of M. Bates. In 1782, he sold land he had bought of Actson. In 1783, he made a deed, to which his son Peter was witness. When in Boston, he carried on baking; and was rated in ward two in 1784. In 1787, his rate was £100; and the "taking-list" has the word Rhode Island, where he went a while to live. He also carried on a bakery at Springfield. Finally, his will is recorded at Exeter, N.H.; dated March 6, 1826; proved Sept. 10, 1834 (on vol. lxxxii). He mentions wife and daughters Abigail Safford and Sally Doury (?). John Rogers was executor. The amount of estate left was small. Mrs. Hunt, 1st, ob. June 21, 1813. Both daughters had families. The youngest was Mrs. Millens, as the grandson says, who has kindly and pleasantly aided us.

In the name of God, amen. I, Seth Hunt, of Abington, in the county of Plymouth, yeoman, considering the shortness and uncertainty of this life, and being, by the blessing of God, of sound and disposing mind and memory, do make this my last will and testament as follows; viz.:—

1. After my just debts shall have been paid, I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Mehitable the use and improvement of all my real estate

during her natural life.

2. I also give and bequeath to her all my personal estate, for her use and improvement during

her life.

3. I give to Lydia Shaw of Plainfield, wife of Col. Josiah Shaw, the reversion of a tract of land lying in said Plainfield, which was conveyed to me by Brackley Shaw; she paying to the selectmen of Abington, whenever she shall come into possession of said land, the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, for the use of her brother David Noyes.

4. I give to my nephew John Hunt the reversion of the several pieces of salt and fresh meadow which I own in common with my brother Ephraim Hunt: viz., one piece lying in Quiney, at a place called Squantum; two pieces lying in Weymouth; and also a piece of fresh meadow, containing five

acres, lying on Beaver Brook.

5. I give to my nephews James, Jacob, and Luther, sons of David Noyes, a piece of eedar swamp in Abington, owned in common with Ephraim Hunt; being at the north-east of Thomas Remington's, and is called the Cain Swamp, which was purchased of Messrs. Blanchard and others.

6. I give and bequeath to my nephew Josiah Hunt the reversion of a piece of land lying in said Abington, and is the same land that was set off to me by execution from the estate of Charles Shaw.

REV. ASA HUNT.

It is very likely that more is known of this clergyman of the last century than we are able to produce for this page; and the discrepance between what we furnish and what might have been afforded will be instantly seen by some one or more at a distance to whom we might have applied, had we been cognizant of their knowledge of the subject. Beyond the meagre record of his family on page 258, we turn to Massachusetts Historical Collections, First Series, vol. iii. p. 151: in a historical account of Middleborough churches, prepared by the patriarchal BACKUS (whose name is ever renowned in Baptist annals, and who was pastor of the First Baptist Church in that town), we find, "The Third Baptist Church in Middleborough was constituted in the south-east part, near Carver and Warcham, Aug. 4, 1761. Mr. Ebenezer Jones was the first pastor until 1763. Mr. Asa Huxt, from Braintree, was their second pastor, who was ordained Oct. 30, 1771; and such a blessing was granted upon his labors, as increased the church to a hundred and ninety-five members in 1783. Yet many trying things appeared among them afterward; and he was suddenly taken away by death, Sept. 2, 1791." We should be glad to know, even as of ancient Melchisedek, the beginning of his days, but trust that the requisite statistics are not unknown.

REV. EDWARD TAYLOR HUNT.

Named for the venerated pastor of the "Bethel" in Boston. Letter 218, Dec. 3, 1861, adds to page 269: Mr. Hunt graduated at Brown University in 1848. He taught school in Newark, N.J.; became principal of the seminary, with two assistant teachers and about a hundred pupils. Was ordained on Christmas night, 1851, as pastor of the Baptist Church in Orange, N.J. Has since been pastor of the church in Lansinburg, N.Y.; and now at South Adams, Mass. Has a library, thirteen or fourteen hundred volumes, well assorted, much of United-States history.

How refreshing is it to us, and how luminous is it to these pages, to extend notices of the reverend clergy! It behooves all to wait upon their ministering; and when the scroll of time is rolled up, and the great account called, those who had opportunity may testify they did not neglect this privilege in the day thereof.

ENOCH HUNT.

Middlesex Deeds, xxxv. 334-5, Enoch Hunt, late of Groton, now of Dunstable, and wife Abigail, sell B. Bancroft fifteen acres of land in Dunstable, formerly of Capt. Robert Bartlett of Marblehead, for £20, March 8, 1730-1; recorded 1734. Lib. li. 546, same Enoch and Abigail made deed in 1753 (on Middlesex Records).

Worcester Deeds, xii. 38, Enoch Hunt and wife Abigail (tailoress), both of Dunstable, convey to S. Blood, jun., land in Rutland, inherited of Samuel and Elizabeth Buttrick, 1731; recorded 1738.

Concord Records, page 300, Mary, daughter of Enoch and Abigail Hunt, born March 24, 1730-1; (page 291) ob., aged sixteen days, April 9, 1731.

The evidence, thus all in, left an uncertainty for a long time of this individual pedigree. Saturday, Sept. 13, 1862, at law-office in Suffolk, "Common-plea Cases," 1733-4, John Hunt of Boston vs. Enoch of Dunstable and Samuel of Weymouth. This discovery put the fact nearer of solution. Not till some time after did we discern the palpable certainty, that this is the same who is to be found on page 285. Those who trace that way can make sure.

REV. JOHN M. HUNT

Was settled pastor of the Baptist Church in East Longmeadow, Mass., April 1, 1835; labored five or six years here and in adjoining towns; ob. Sept. 12, 1854 (correct page, 289). Mrs. Stock has four children. Mr. M'Gregory writes Letter 380; mentions his two children, Sarah and Janett.

REV. SAMUEL HUNT

Writes. Feb. 5, 1862 (Letter 289), "His great-grandfather (see page 263) was landlord of the 'Hunt Tavern,' on the road from Boston to Newport, famous in the Revolutionary War; at which, it is reported, Gen. Washington and staff stopped one night. He belonged to a rather gigantic race; his ordinary weight being about two hundred and fifty pounds, his father's being about three hundred. He was born 1712; died 1780." Then follow full particulars of more. (See "History of Mendon Association.")

DAVID HUNT and SARAH M'NAMARA were published in Boston, May 10, 1742. We have not a particle of proof that this alliance applies to David (page 264), but believe that it will prove so.

Sir, — The names that you sent printed you will perceive I have corrected. Mother was Joanna G. Smith. My sister spells her name Lizzie *Marie*. Ira born May 25; Flora, instead of Florence; and Horace *Franklin*. Ira J. Hunt, son of Joseph Hunt of West Randolph, has enlisted, and is out South; also Harrison Hunt, s. of Josiah Hunt, deceased, and grandson of Moses Hunt, Braintrec.

Aside from this,* I have a piece of poetry which I found while looking over some papers,

In our Eden of choice and varied products which emerge to life on the page from an almost pre-Adamite chaos, there is reared and presented one which is the first chosen in the order of alphabet by name, and also the first in local altitude, in the highest degree exalted from an equatorial standard of view.

It is an arctic flower, but hardy and swect, anointed with the balm of our most perfect and tender care, and the first that came to bloom; and it is brought to the highest consummation that the brief period of its culture admitted. It is the precursor or forerunner of more advanced growths. Those who love the similitudes we use will next see prefigured for our genealogical trees the banian, vast and self-multiplying; then the graceful and majestic cedar; the olive, rich and ready to abound; the patriarchal fig-tree; the king-oak, lofty and triumphant; the hardy and uncomplaining pine, and its verdant kindred; with, not last nor least, the tropical shrub, in floral or spicy magnificence; and the vine, in wonderful and surpassing amplitude, overspreading and including all height and breadth in its boundless domain.

My grandfather, William Hunt, was a much valued minister, as also his son Nathan Hunt, in the religious society of Friends. The descendants are numerous, scattered over Ohio, Indiana, and Iowa. None of them that I know of remarkably distin-

guished; but all that I have seen were more, I think, than an average for their intelligence, and goodlooking men and women. The males far exceeded the females: hence the large increase of the name to many hundred from the one pair. About one hundred and twenty-five years since their emigration to North Carolina. Very truly thy friend.

P.S. — When I came to this place from North Carolina in 1815, there was not, if I recollect, twelve of the name in the Directory.

Ep. — We could not attempt to consider the New-Jersey Line complete without some essay of regard to the excellent migration of the family which early proceeded South. To that effect, reminiscences of THE GOOD ALABAMA PLANTER were in quite a state of forwardness for these pages; yet, from the imperfect character of reminiscences as a medium of veracity, and for reasons making us unutterably silent, we cannot allow at this time a composition to come to the columns which would even be supposed slightly to disparage the productions already presented. They rode out the road about a mile, when they came up to a cavalry vidette, who then joined them, and rode out a short distance with them. They had not gone over a half-mile, when Mr. Tanner heard a noise as the cocking of guns; when he immediately wheeled his horse, without signaling the other two, and, in the act of turning, received a full charge of buckshot in his head and neck, he himself barely escaping; as the ball grazed his breast, tearing away his coat, and not touching his body. After wheeling, carried him into town, when he was enabled to give the alarm. Dr. Hunt and the cavalry-man, not hearing the noise, and coming directly opposite the ambush, were both fired into: Dr. Hunt receiving a deadly wound in his body and leg; the cavalryman, a few buck-shot in his leg, - his horse receiving the most of the charge in his head and neck. The doctor still clung to his horse, without speaking a word. The cavalry-man knew his only chance for escape was to make a charge back the way he came. This he concluded to do, when the doctor's horse followed him; the doctor, in the mean while, having fallen from his horse. He was successful, and reached the inside pickets in safety. Dr. Hunt was assistant-surgeon of the Massachusetts Twenty-seventh, and lately assigned to this post as post-surgeon. He was a man universally loved by all who knew him. As a surgeon, he was unanimously liked among the soldiers. He has many friends living in North Carolina, and has been in the habit of spending his winters in this State for several years. His home is in West Boylston, Mass., where he leaves a wife and child. His body has been embalmed, and will be sent to his home by the first steamer."

Schellsburg, Bedford County, Pa., May 16, 1862.

Dear Sir, — I have just received the old family record of my grandfather, and give it you in his own words: —

Benjamin Hunt was the son of Richard and Mary Hunt of the township of Lastock, in the county palatine of Lancaster, in the north-west part of England. Sailed from Liverpool, and landed in Philadelphia in the spring of 1801; having been twelve weeks on the water. Remained there a short time, and then removed to Lancaster, Pa.; thence to Shippensburg, Pa.; and, in 1815, moved to Fort Littleton, Bedford County, Pa. He resided there several years on a farm, and then moved back to Shippensburg, where he ended his days in peace. He and his wife and son Richard are lying in the Methodist Burying-ground of that place. Our family consisted of seven brothers and four sisters; viz., Mary, Joseph, John, James, Charles, Easter, William, Benjamin, Martha, Elias, and Nancy. All lived to be married and have children.

I was born Oct. 10, 1760. In the same month, George III. was proclaimed King of Great Britain. About this time, my honored mother had a good work of grace begun in her mind by the Spirit of God. Very often have I heard her sing with animation the following hymn:—

"Jesus, my King, to thee I bow, Enlisted under thy command: Captain of my salvation, thou Shalt lead me to the promised land.

Thou hast a great deliverance wrought,
The staff from off my shoulder broke,
Out of the house of bondage brought,
And freed me from the Egyptian yoke," &c.

Large Hymn Book, pp. 281, 282.

She continued to persevere in the ways of God through very many sore and severe trials for upwards of forty years, when she was brought to the close of a troublesome life in peace. The last time I saw her was at the door of the house of God called "Zion's Temple," in the town of Manchester, in the fall of the year 1800. My aged and honored father had died only a short time before.

In the twenty-first year of my age, May, 1781, in the parish church of Bolton Le-Moors, by the Rev. James Folds, I was married to Peggy Morris, the daughter of William and Mary Morris of the township of Anderton.

died Oct. 4, 1795. All of these children, except Richard, are mouldering together in the graveyard belonging to the parish church of Dean, about two miles from Bolton Le-Moors. 6. Elizabeth Hunt, b. June 8, 1793; now Mrs. Duncan, widow. 7. Benjamin Hunt, b. June 14, 1795; married. 8. Andrew Hunt, b. Oct. 29, 1797; went West; never heard of. 9. Margaret Hunt, b. Oct. 26, 1799; unmarried. The above were all born in England. 10. William Hunt, b. April 16, 1802. 11. Mary Hunt, b. Sept. 1, 1804; died Nov. 21, 1805. 12. Hannah Morris Hunt, b. Aug. 2, 1807; died June 27, 1823.

Peggy Hunt, wife of Benjamin Hunt, died Oct. 16, 1842, aged about 78 years. "There was hope in her death."

Benjamin Hunt. sen., died April 11, 1853, aged 92 years and 6 months. "There was hope in his death."

The following incident is added to the record, which I give rerbatim: -

"In the month of April, 1791, on the Sunday evening that the Rev. John Wesley's funeral sermon was preached by Mr. Christopher Hopper in the Methodist Meeting-house in the town of Bolton Le-Moors, Lancashire, Eng., a most unpleasant circumstance happened just before the meeting commenced. It was as follows:—

"The meeting-house being very much crowded, and numbers more pressing in, the back of one of the pews in the gallery gave way, with a slight noise. A man standing underneath, up to one of the pillars, heard it, and exclaimed, at the same time rushed forward to take his hat, and make out of the house. The alarm spread over the assembled congregation almost in an instant; and immediately the people all over the house began to make every exertion in their power to get out, and in every direction possible; some at the doors, others at the windows and down the gallery-stairs in shoals, over the heads of each other, like a mighty torrent or the waves of the sea; treading upon one another without mercy or care, insomuch that numbers thought themselves well off by escaping with their lives. Some gave themselves up, stood motionless, and looked for death on the spot. Happily, however, no lives were lost; only one woman, who died shortly after, as was supposed, of the wounds and bruises she then received."

The writer of these lines was present, an eye and ear witness of the whole unhappy circumstance. In about half an hour, all was hushed into silence, and as still as if nothing had happened. The people having returned in again, the house was crowded a second time; and the sermon was begun and ended in peace and profit. (Signed)

BENJN. HUNT.

The above resided until his death in Shippensburg, Cumberland County, Pa. His youngest son was William, b. April 16, 1802; he m. Maria Eichholtz of Lancaster City, Pa., Dec. 30, 1823. She was b. April 26, 1801. Their family consists of, 1. Catherine C. Hunt, b. Nov. 16, 1824. She was m. Dec. 18, 1849, to Lewis Y. Gilbert of Maryland; and are now residing in Atlanta, Ga. They have four children. 2. Caroline E. Hunt, b. April 9, 1827; m. April 22, 1849, to Charles V. Keller; and are residing in Frederick, Md.; have four children. 3. Alfred Hunt, b. Aug. 15, 1830; died Aug. 27, 1831. 4. Mary E. Hunt, b. Aug. 13, 1832; died June 9, 1853. 5. Benjamin H. Hunt, b. June 17, 1835; was married Dec. 25, 1861, to Ruie V. Sill of Bedford County, Pa; is a Lutheran clergyman, and residing now in Schellsburg, Pa.; b. in Baltimore County, Md. 6. Margaret Hunt, b. Sept. 5, 1838; m. Dec. 25, 1860, to Ephraim W. Wilhride; and are living in Mechanicstown, Md.

The father of the above is a Lutheran clergyman, and is now preaching in Williamsburg, Blair County, Pa. The incidents of the family are those that belong to the shady and sunny side of life in a parsonage, — many pleasures and more sorrows.

Richard Hunt, eldest son of Benjamin Hunt, sen., was an eminent vocalist, and is yet remembered by many in this State (Pennsylvania). A number of his compositions are extant. He relates that he was taught music at such an early age, that his teacher placed him on a table, in order to be seen among the other pupils. He died, unmarried, in Shippensburg, Pa.

Benjamin Hunt, sen., whose record I have transcribed, was a manufacturer in England. While in this country, he passed his last days in retirement. If known for one thing more than another, it was his deep and vital picty. He died in his ninety-third year. Until a short time before his death, he was found in the garden among the flowers which he dearly loved. He there lay down, and gently passed away.

To Messes. -----

It is most likely that the connection of your family with mine, if there was any, was very remote. I cannot do less, however, in answer to your respectful circular, than state such facts as may be of some mutual interest. I give you these facts as stated in a "Genealogical Record" (printed) of my good mother's family for the most part, enclosing in brackets what I may add to the printed "Record."

My great-grandfather was named Bartholomew Hunt; and his wife was named Margaret. They are understood to have come from the north of Ireland, and settled in West Jersey; but they may have come by way of the New-England States, inasmuch as they were located in close proximity to a Colony (Greenwich, Cumberland County, N. J.) of that sort. Mrs. Hunt died after giving birth to one son; and it is said, that, leaving this child with friends, Bartholomew Hunt started for North Carolina, but was never afterwards heard from. The child (James B. Hunt) in due time married Sarah Ewing, May 12, 1782. They immediately settled in the first house below the Presbyterian Church in Greenwich; and there continued till Aug. 5, 1824, when he died at the age of seventy-one.

James B. and Sarah Hunt had five children, — Thomas Ewing, Reuben, Sarah, James Booth, and William Ferguson; of whom James B. and Sarah died in childhood.

The eldest, Thomas Ewing, was born March 2, 1783. (He settled on a farm within a mile of the homestead, and there remained until his death. His circumstances were always easy, his position in the community a high one. He was for more than fifty years an elder in the Presbyterian Church of Greenwich.) He was married four times. The first three wives lived but a few years with him; and all the offspring by them died in infancy. His fourth wife was Sarah Clark; and by her he had two children (who are now just entered upon manhood and womanhood). Their names are Thomas E. and Mary. (Thomas died, after a short illness, January, 1859.)

Reuben Hunt was b. Feb. 9, 1785. He is still living on the homestead near the Presbyterian Church. He married Phœbe Noble; and she bare him three children, —Mary Moore, James B., and Eliza. James B. died when twenty-three years old. Mary M. was married to J. Y. Leaming; and died Dec. 28, 1858, leaving four children. (Eliza is a widow, at home with her parents, with one child.)

William F. Hunt was b. Dec. 31, 1792; died June , 1860. He studied medicine at the University of Pennsylvania, and practised it for nearly forty years at Pedricktown, Salem County, N. J. He was married to Sarah Ellis of Burlington County, N. J.; and by her had (three children who died in infancy, and) the following five, now living:—

- 1. Cornelia Smith. After acquiring an education in Philadelphia, she went to teach in the Strabenville Female Seminary, under the charge of her cousin, Rev. Dr. Beatty; and, after teaching a few years, was married to William B. Collier of that place. They have three children (daughters), one of them now teaching in the seminary. Mrs. Collier, as is also the eldest daughter, is a member of the Presbyterian Church.
- 2. Sarah, married Aaron Hewitt; is a member of the Methodist Church, and chiefly remarkable for her patient submission to the evils of an unfortunate marriage. She has four children. Now lives in Camden, opposite Philadelphia.

- 3. James Booth is a market-gardener, in comfortable circumstances, and has for some years occupied the old homestead. He is a member of the Methodist Church, married, and has three children.
- 4. Samuel M. also lives in Pedricktown, where he owns a snug property, and is highly respected. He is a saddler; employs several hands, and prospers. He is also a member of the Methodist Church; is married, and has four children.
- 5. William Ellis (the writer of this communication) was b. Feb. 24, 1833. His parents breaking up housekeeping, he went first to his sister's (Sarah) in Philadelphia; and afterwards, in 1844, to his sister Cornelia's in Steubenville. After a boyhood spiced with much variety, and darkened by some shame, he professed conversion, and united, in his sixteenth year, with the Presbyterian Church. After graduating at Jefferson College, Pennsylvania, he entered the W. Theological Seminary at Alleghany City; and was licensed to preach at the age of twenty-two, and married. In May, 1856, he was ordained and installed pastor of the Coshocton Presbyterian Church by the Presbytery of Coshocton. His wife was the daughter of a well-known citizen of Pittsburg connected with the iron-business; her name, Caroline A. Totten. In 1856, Willie Totten Hunt was born; and Sept. 20, 1858, died. A second child, Charles Bentley Hunt, was b. Nov. 20, 1859.

Hoping that the preceding may enable you to make the proposed record more complete, and desiring to hear again from you, I am

EZRA M. HUNT, M.D., of Metuchen, N.J.; author of "The Patient's and Physician's Aid," New York, 1860, pp. 365. A book so thoroughly replete with every advice essential to maintain or restore health, it is rare to find in such reasonable compass. The whole subject of physic seems attractive in the view of this fresh and charming treatise; and, while we should never venture to enter upon the practice of medicine for jolly, we would delight to read as many such good doctors' books as they see fit to put out. The young and aged can be recommended to keep their fleshly tabernacles delicious to themselves and to the perceptions of others, and thus take a wide step toward godliness (even if devoid of that which cometh from above), by following the pleasant advice of the pages, and be instructed to avoid the noxious, and become accustomed to the beneficent in nature and art. In the doctor's category of poisons in the product of nature, there is a substance succeeding "tartar emetic," and, alphabetically, next to "thorn-apple." Its very name is a scandal to our pure page. The doctor mightily disapproves of it as a condiment. As an ingredient in ointment, he would doubtless approve it; or chemically, for tanning or coloring, it may find a value. How the custom of its use, for chewing and smoking, should ever become engrafted in a white man's daily habit of life, is a mystery. usage can be traced distinctly to the bygone, dingy inhabitant of the forest, stupid, besotted, and debased; and it belongs now entirely to the selfish, idle, and unclean, who have their part in human life. We turn now to something pleasant (p. 359): -

"To those in advancing years.—As life advances, the constitution undergoes certain important changes; and these, in order to secure a healthy old age, must be met by corresponding modifications in the modes of living. There are few who do not at this period suffer from mistakes in earlier life, or who have not formed habits which need to be restrained and controlled by reason and the teachings of experience. The degree of exercise needed at this period is very different from that in early life. The body does not so readily rally from fatigue; and hence exercise should be taken frequently, rather than continuously, and should be such as not to produce exhaustion. A great error is made by many in advancing years, by substituting for a life of activity one of indolent ease. Men naturally look forward to the time when they can live upon the gains of former days; when they may retire from business, and

enjoy themselves in partaking of the bounties of their early industry: but, alas! how unsatisfying is the realization of the hope! When they have gained their wonted desire, such soon learn that employment is necessary both for the health of body and mind, and often in new ventures seek for the occupation they crave. Many are the instances familiar to us, where a sudden change of this kind has been fraught with most serious consequences; and those thus studying their case have often retired into apoplexy, paralysis, or malcontent. It is desirable, it is true, that, at this age, there should be, if cares and labors have been severe, some diminution, but not an entire cessation. It was but yesterday that I accosted an aged German farmer with the expression of surprise, that he should still continue to work so much. 'Ah!' said his son, who stood by, 'father has to work; for, when he stops a few days, he gets sick.' There was philosophy in that reply. Just enough to do is the highest earthly jewel in the crown of human happiness.

"The aged need to guard especially against cold and sudden alterations of temperature. They are more susceptible to intense weather, and are easily chilled. Bronchitis, influenza, and the like, are less easily overcome by them than formerly; and hence they should only expose themselves when in motion. The blood is less active in its circulation; and the extremities, as the feet and hands, should be well protected by woollen covering. In general, the adult requires much less sleep than the younger. Occupation for the mind is as important to the aged as for the body; not severe study or anxiety or continuous reading, but a mild interest in passing events, and a relish for conversation and society. Discouragement and misanthropy are sometimes disposed to steal their way amid the pains of declining life, and grief to hang heavily upon the heart. Nothing sooner brings gray hairs down to the grave; and hence whatever contributes to cheerfulness and happy contentment should be sought.

"There is something venerable and almost sublime in the human form bearing up buoyantly against the vicissitudes of time, with well-sustained powers of body and mind, and with the soul cheered with the hope, after a good old age, of a glorious immortality.

"Rightly viewed, the duty of living as long as we can is as imperative as any other; and the pleasures to be derived, and the good to be secured, by a happy and healthy old age, are such as to form a strong argument for the proper regulation of appetites and passions in manhood and middle life, and for living wisely as we pass to its evening horizon.

'So live, that life shall be no burden;
And, when its setting sun throws shadows
O'er our pathway, let them be such as
Lend our days the evening landscape's charm,
And tinge the heavens with radiance,
Emblematic of re-rising.'"

Following the pages of this worthy book, we find JOHN HUNT was the third of four children of a bailiff, or overseer of a gentleman's farm. He was born at Hykeham Moor, Lincolnshire, Eng., June 13, 1812. His father lived also at Balderton, near Newark, and had been a soldier at the battle of the Nile. John began work on the farm at the age of ten, and was inexpert at labor; being inspired with the idea of military prowess and the glory of war. He continued at the farm till the age of fifteen, and proved of a thoughtful and serious mind, and good memory for learning. When only about eleven years old, he had a narrow escape from death by a fall from a horse. This event helped him to more thoughtfulness of God; but still he remained ignorant of the spiritual truths of religion. His father became impressed with the preaching of the "Ranters," an extremely zealous order of believers; but the son in no manner inclined that way. At the age of sixteen, he had a severe fever; and the thought of death was brought close home. The death of a companion, of the same disorder, alarmed him more; and, after diligent reading and the exercise of prayer (to which he had before been accustomed), the light of God's spirit came, and he felt penitence. As he recovered health, he left the society of former companions, and sought the house of pious neighbors to talk of religion. They prayed with him; and he then, going home, announced his intention of becoming a Christian. When he grew strong, and returned to work, he found a pious young man for a companion, and went to a Methodist chapel, where the services somewhat stirred him; and, at a band-meeting, he arose, and stated the exercises of his mind, and received encouragement to persevere.

He left Balderton, and entered the family of a lady at Swinderby as servant, and joined the Methodist society. Rev. John Smith came there one day to preach; and at a prayer-meeting, holding some direct conversation with the minister, after an agony of uncertainty, he came to the content and peace of an entire reconciliation with Christ, and a perfect sense of the life of conversion. Now about seventeen years of age, the clouds passed away from his mind, and, his heart grown stronger in faith, he began to feel compassion for other souls, and then to suffer persecution for his unusual strict and

exemplary life, not accordant with the loose notions of those around. He engaged at a new place, with Mr. Wilkinson. He enjoyed abundant reading. "Mason on Self-knowledge" was a favorite; but the Bible continued the centre of his system. One Sunday, there being no preacher, he was invited to give a short address at the chapel. He consented, and stood up in great fear; but his heart soon warmed with love, and a fit expression of words came without further difficulty, and to the content of the hearers. He again attempted to speak, upon invitation at another village; but, after a preparation of his thoughts, he suffered confusion, and what momentarily appeared a failure. He spake again at Girton, being urged to fill the place of a minister prevented from coming; and proceeded very well. He soon after allowed his name to be placed on the circuit-list as an "exhorter;" and, after much prayer, he consented to the duty. He felt that he was called on by God to preach, and became more attentive to study and improvement. A new-appointed superintendent of the circuit heard him preach, called to see him, and urged the subject of regularly entering the ministry; but he shrank from this, and his only ambition was to go to the "Cape" as servant to a missionary, and do the farm-work. He gained more power as a preacher while in the service of another Wesleyan, Mr. George Briggs of Potter Hamworth, and preached once in the city.

In May, 1835, after having been proposed by his friends, he was accepted as a preacher. In September, 1835, he entered the Theological Institution at Hoxton. While there, he enjoyed great renewal and quickening, under the influence of Rev. John M'Lean's exertions with the students. "A rich baptism came from Heaven upon all " (p. 56). As time wore on, his heart, overflowing with holy joy, grew rapidly in all knowledge. There was a great outward change in him. Much of his roughness had gone; but all the sterling worth of the man remained uninjured. As he stood up to preach, every thing about him struck the observers with the idea of power. His tall and well-proportioned frame, massive but not stout, broad of chest and large of limb, was the true type of soul within. When he spake, good solid thoughts came forth with natural utterance, in plain, manly speech, sinewy and strong; no affectation, no tinsel, nothing weak, nothing small. Yet, with all this power, there was nothing unwieldy or vulgar. His frank, expressive face had become pale with thought and hard study; and there was a masterly light in his clear, steady eye, that commanded respect; and in every action there was manly grace, free from all coarseness. He preached some time at Oxford. In February, 1838, he received a summons to the Mission-house, to answer a request to go to Africa. The Methodist societies had been stirred by an appeal of pity for the wretchedness of Fiji, about two hundred and fifty miles from Tonga and the Friendly Isles. Mr. Hunt was startled at its suddenness; but hesitated not to address a line to the lady of his love, to whom he was pledged in a waiting engagement of matrimony. Her consent to follow him in this great enterprise being attained, he was married March 6, 1838, to Miss Hannah Summers of Newton-on-Trent. He was ordained (together with Mr. James Calvert) to the work, March 27, 1838, in the chapel at Hackney.

Mrs. Brackenbury of Raithby Hall guaranteed Mr. Hunt's outfit and passage, and fifty pounds annually for three years. The party sailed for Sydney, April 20, 1838; and arrived Aug. 24, staying till Oct. 25; then, in twenty-six days, reached Tonga, where they remained until Dec. 19; and arrived thence at Lakemba, Fiji, Dec. 22, 1838. The next day was Sunday, which they thankfully spent. Hewa was the more immediate scene of labor. Mr. Hunt began his work with all the earnestness of his character, controlled and directed by the strongest religious devotion; "determined, by God's grace, to live entirely to his glory, and the advancement of his blessed cause." His first effort was to learn the language. In about a month, he addressed the people. They were, in general, attentive. This was Feb. 18, 1839, in the afternoon. June 18, Mr. Hunt's journal mentions his first attempt at translating. He went on in the various labor among this terrible community of cannibal Indians, through all the viciosistudes of a missionary's life, until he laid his burden at the foot of the cross in great reluctance, but we may hope with most blessed acceptance at the hands of Him who beholdeth not with the vision of man. In all his detail of tribulation and difficulty, there is heavenly joy appearing, as if the Lord created especial light for the darkest scenes of trial possible to occur. We gather the names of the

James Henry Leigh Hunt, an English poet and essayist, born in Southgate, Middlesex, Oct. 19, 1784; died there Aug. 28, 1859. His father, a West Indian by birth, married an American lady, a native of Philadelphia; and, at the commencement of the American Revolution, was established in that city in the practice of the law. Having warmly espoused the cause of the Crown, he was obliged to leave the country, and settled in England, where he took orders, and for some time officiated as tutor to Mr. Leigh, the nephew of the Duke of Chandos; from whom the subject of this notice was named. Leigh Hunt was educated at Christ's Hospital, London, where he remained until his fifteenth year; at which time he was first deputy Grecian. As this position, however, involved the necessity of delivering a speech in public, and of entering the church, he left the school; and after remaining some time in the office of his brother, who was an attorney, procured a situation in the War Office. At this early age, he was a prolific writer of verses, a collection of which was published by his father in 1801, under the title of "Juvenilia, or a Collection of Poems, written between the Ages of Twelve and Sixteen" (12mo, London). The author, in later life, characterized these juvenile performances as "a heap of imitations, all but absolutely worthless." About this time, he began also to contribute to the periodicals; and, subsequent to 1805, he furnished theatrical criticisms and literary articles to the "News," a Sunday paper established in that year by his brother John, and of which he became a sort of co-editor. A selection from his theatrical articles was published in 1807, under the title of "Critical Essays on the Performances at the London Theatres" (12mo, London). Leaving the War Office in 1808, he established, in conjunction with his brother, the "Examiner," a newspaper, which, under the editorship of the Hunts, attained considerable popularity for its liberal politics, and the high standard of its literary articles, and which is still one of the leading weekly journals of England. At that period of Tory ascendency, the boldness with which the editors discussed public measures did not fail to subject them to persecution; and, on three several occasions, the "Examiner" was prosecuted by Government. On the first occasion, the offence being certain reflections on the rule of George III., the prosecution was abandoned; on the second, for an article against the practice of flogging in the navy, the Hunts were tried before Lord Ellenborough, but, being defended by Brougham, were acquitted; and on the third, for calling the prince regent "an Adonis of 50," they were sentenced to pay a fine of £500 each, and to suffer two years' imprisonment from Dec. 9, 1812. The latter penalty was endured by Leigh Hunt in a manner which converted punishment into a pleasure. By his own taste, and the attentions of his friends, his prison cell was transformed into an elegant apartment, adorned with book-

cases, busts, and flowers; and so far deprived of its original appearance, that Charles Lamb declared there was no other such room, except in a fairy tale. A small yard, upon which the cell opened, in like manner became a garden, with grass-plots, flower-beds, and shade and fruit trees, where, in fine weather, he was accustomed to read and write. His captivity was cheered by visits from Byron, Moore, Charles Lamb, Hazlitt, Shelley, Keats, and others, with several of whom he then became acquainted for the first time; and so agreeable did his life prove, that he found little reason to regret having rejected the offer of the Government not to press the penalties, if he would engage that no similar articles should thereafter appear in the "Examiner." Upon leaving prison, an event commemorated by Keats in one of his finest sonnets, he published several works prepared during his confinement, including the "Feast of the Poets," &c. (8vo, London, 1814); the "Descent of Liberty, a Mask" (12mo, 1815); and "The Story of Rimini" (8vo, 1816), his longest and best poem; and he continued as before to conduct the "Examiner." In 1818, appeared "Foliage," a melange of original poems and translations from Homer, Theocritus, Bion, &c.; and, in 1819, he started the "Indicator," a small weekly journal, on the model of Addison's "Spectator," which was for two years the vehicle of some of his most characteristic essays; and which was followed, in 1822, by the "Indicator and Companion (Selections)," 2 vols. Svo. His reputation as a writer of prose and poetry was now at its height. He gladly accepted an invitation from Byron and Shelley to visit Pisa, and assist them in conducting the "Liberal," a journal intended to represent ultra liberal opinions in literature and politics; a literary partnership jeeringly called by "Blackwood" the "holy alliance of Pisa." He arrived in Italy in June, 1822; and, within a few days after meeting Shelley, witnessed the obsequies of his friend on the share of the Bay of Spezzia. He was not of that practical turn which would have fitted him to battle successfully with the world; and until 1847, when he received from the Crown a literary pension of £200, he was frequently involved in pecuniary difficulties. Amid all kinds of reverses, however, he preserved his cheerfulness and equa-His rank as a poet was established by the publication of "Rimini," which exhibits his sparkling and lively fancy, the affluence of his imagination, and his felicity in word-painting, and at the same time, also, those affectations, and quaint, far-fetched conceits, which characterize all his poetry, and which, at the outset, subjected him to the ridicule of Tory critics. His models were clearly Italian; and his translations from the Italian poets are pronounced by Miss Mitford "some of the very best since Cowley." Many of the qualities of his poetry pervade his prose writings; and his collections of essays have gained a wide popularity by their genial and colloquial tone, the graceful fancies with which they are interspersed, and the learning, taste, and refinement which they reveal. Of this class of his works, Hazlitt says, "Many of his effusions in the 'Indicator' show that he inherits more of the spirit of Steele than any man of his time." As a political writer, he was forcible, just, and considerate; and, in the expression of his liberal opinions, utterly without fear. During the last year of his life, he was collecting a complete and final edition of his poetical works; of which the greater portion received a finishing touch only a month previous to his death. In the United States, where his works are well known, an edition of his poems, collected and arranged by himself, appeared in Boston in 1857 (2 vols. 32mo); and, in the same year, an edition of his works was published in New York (4 vols. 12mo).

Robert Hunt, author, born Sept. 6, 1807, at Devenport, then Plymouth Dock. Mr. Robert Hunt is a self-elevated man of talent. He is now the keeper of mining records at the Museum of Economic Geology, and professor of mechanical science to the Government School of Mines to that institution; one of the "working men of practical science." Popularly, he is best known by his volumes, "Researches on Light," "The Poetry of Science," "Panthea, or the Spirit of Nature," "Elementary Physics," and "Manual of Photography." Mr. Hunt has devoted his attention especially to the chemical influences of the solar rays; and he is the discoverer of several important and curious photographic processes. To him we are principally indebted for a more perfect knowledge than we previously possessed of the influences of light, heat, and actinism (the chemical principle of the solar rays), on the growth of plants. These researches have been published in the "Transactions of the British Association." Mr. Hunt was for five years secretary of the Royal Cornwall Polytechnic Society; during which period he was very actively engaged in investigating the phenomena of mineral veins, and metalliferous deposits in general, for which his residence in Cornwall afforded him peculiar facilities.

THORNTON HUNT, journalist, is the eldest son of Leigh Hunt. The particulars of his career are few; but it is not to be doubted that his exertions have had considerable effect on the course of public opinion. Born 10th of September, 1810, he was educated to be a painter; but the atmosphere of the studio suited him as little as its inactivity of life. By degrees, he crept into literary work; first as a critic on works of art, in which, following the early Italian critics, he sought to give a more matter-of-fact manner to the handling of the subject in the periodical press. Through the late Laman Blanchard, he was introduced to the short-lived morning paper, the "Constitutional;" of the political department of which, the illness of the editors, and other contingencies, left him for a time sole conductor. Meanwhile, he had become thoroughly acquainted with the views of Edward Gibbon Wakefield and of Colonel Torrens on subjects of colonization and political conomy, which powerfully modified his course of action. Throughout he has had the aid and political confidence of some of the most

eminent men of the present day; and it is, we believe, especially so at the present moment. On the break-down of the "Constitutional," he became editor of the "North-Cheshire Reformer," and then of the "Glasgow Argus;" and with considerable additions to his experience of the local workings of our institutions, of trade, and the condition of the people, he returned to town in 1840, and formed a permanent connection among journals of a high class, which has since been extended. The guiding principle of his politics has been the British Constitution, as set forth in its great standards, the Great Charter, the Petition of Rights, and the Bill of Rights, — principles which have taught him, in seeking to sustain, if not to extend, the influence of the monarchy, and to help the peers to a recovery of their waning influence, to extend the franchise to every free-born Englishman paying taxes. Besides a few passing pamphlets, therefore, chiefly on practical subjects (such as colonization and railway business), he has produced no work under his own name, except the "Foster Brother" (1845), an historical romance of the fourteenth century, suggested by his carly residence in Italy, his political studies, and his unbounded admiration for its hero, — the great, patriotic, military statesman, Carlo Zeno.

WILLIAM HUNT, painter in water-colors, was born at No. 8, Belton Street, Long Acre, in 1790. He first exhibited, as a member of the (Old) Society of Painters in Water Colors, in 1824. A great and original artist. Mr. Hunt is not only a masterly artist, but a poet. By an over-mastering sympathy (the poet's prerogative), the objects he paints "are seen and felt by him as they exist, and conveyed by a mystery of art with which we are wholly unacquainted," - writes a critic worth hearing, - "which we are at a loss how to define by any of the known results of genius and practice." As to subject, every exhibition-goer knows how simple is the range. Realities humble and slight have ever been the staple: "Peaches and Grapes," or an "Old Pollard;" a "Basket of Plums;" a group of "Roses," or of "Wild Flowers;" or the "Yellow Corridor" at Mr. So-and-so's: or again, in a style equally individual, deeply felt readings from every-day human nature, "Trampers at Home," "A Farm-house Beauty," "Fast Asleep," a "Sunday-school Girl," "What shall I play?" "Lamplight," &c. People have wondered why so gifted an artist should perpetually repeat what often seems identically the same subject; but, in fact, it is only superficially the same. Because of his deep sympathy with objects "as they exist," he sees endless varieties in them, and delights to exhaust every phase of effect, of color, light and shade, and grouping. These inobtrusive bits of nature "present the perfection of finish;" a perfection, however, not obtained by elaboration. Forty years' practice have brought this about, this marriage of finish and freedom, the last and most difficult of technical achievements; resulting in images of nature, wholly, not partially, accurate and consistent. As for his composition, light and shade, color, these are as quiet in their truth as complete. As a colorist, no less a critic than Mr. Ruskin loves to speak of him as among the greatest in a school (the English) rife with great colorists.

WILLIAM II. HUNT, painter, born at London in 1827. In 1846, was exhibited Mr. Hunt's first picture at the Academy. By 1850, he was already the possessor of a fair position on the Academy's walls, and the subject of general notice. His earlier efforts were adopted from novel and poem: "Dr. Rochecliffe performing Divine Service in the Cottage of Joceline Joliffe at Woodstock" (1847); "The Flight of Madeline and Porphyro," from Keats's "St. Agnes" (1848); "Rienzi vowing to obtain Justice for the Death of his young Brother," from Bulwer (1849). The last-named was purchased by Mr. Gibbons, the well-known collector. In 1850, commenced the new style of treatment; and, on Mr.

Hunt's part, that choice of religious and gradually more mystical subject, whereby he has since made himself best known,—"A Converted British Family sheltering a Christian Missionary from the Persecution of the Druids," followed by the symbolical "Hireling Shepherd" of 1852. Of 1851, his picture was in a different class of sentiment, "Valentine receiving Sylvia from Proteus;" of 1853, "Claudio and Isabella," and "Our English Coasts,"—a beautiful study of the downs at Hastings. Three of these pictures were awarded £50 and £60 prizes at Liverpool and Birmingham. The occult meanings of his "Light of the World" (purchased by Mr. Combe of Oxford, who had also purchased the "Converted British Family"), and of the "Awakening Conscience" of 1854, were at the time expounded with due emphasis in the letters to the "Times" of one powerful with the public,—Mr. Ruskin. Perhaps that complimentary criticism tended to prove even too much; for the appropriate language of one art cannot be translated by that of another. The meaning we can put into words is not the highest or most legitimate a picture can express.

APPENDIX.

LETTER 344.

From the Ex-Lieutenant Governor of Massachusetts.

Bernardston, Mass., May 26, 1862.

Dear Sir, — Yours of 25th ultimo came duly to hand, requesting information respecting the Hunt Family. Possessing something of a genealogical organization and habit, it will give me pleasure to aid you to the extent of my abilities.

Immediately after the receipt of your letter, I commenced making inquiries, and examination of our early records, which are now in my possession. I find by our records that Samuel Hunt of Billerica, and others who were in the Falls Fight, petitioned the Legislature of the Province of Massachusetts Bay in New England, in 1733, for a grant of land lying north and west of Deerfield. "In House of Representatives, read, and voted that the prayer of the petitioners be granted. In Council, read, and non-concurred."—See Court Records, vol. xv. p. 444. The next year, Nov. 28, 1734, a similar "petition was presented by Samuel Hunt of Billerica, for himself and others that belonged to Capt. Turner's company at the Falls Fight," &c., which was granted; and which is the beginning of the history of this town.—See Court Records (Secretary's Office, Boston), vol. xvi. p. 67.

In the first division of land in Fall Town, Samuel Hunt of Tewksbury, son of Samuel Hunt, who was in the Falls Fight, was one of the ninety-seven proprietors in the year 1736; but the name of Ephraim Hunt nowhere appears on our records. Samuel Hunt drew lot No. 5 in the first division of land; No. 12 (Meadow lot) and No. 82, in the fourth division, in 1742. I have not been able thus far to trace his settlement in this town; but I find a Thomas Hunt (of whom more hereafter) was one of the early settlers of that part of Fall Town that is now called Leyden. [Here followed long statistics.]

Guilford, Conn., June 16, 1862.

Dear Sir, — I have received additional records. Lucy, daughter of David Hunt, married Edward Burrall, Esq., of Canaan, son of Orrin, youngest son of Col. Charles Burrall, sen. Issue, 1. Edward of Rock Island, married Ann, daughter of Capt. Jack, who fought at Waterloo, and grand-daughter of a President of King's College, Aberdeen. 2. 
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
