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# PREFACE.

The plan of this work is substantially that adopted by the New England Historic Genealogical Society. The male line of descent only is carried out in each generation; the *sons*' names in each list of children having the cardinal number prefixed, under which they appear in the next (their own) generation. Marriages and descendants of *daughters* are given, as far as known, under their *fathers*' names.

A careful inspection of the TABLE OF CONTENTS immediately following will give a clearer idea of the whole work. The five sons of the first George Hayes, forming the *Second Generation*, are there given in *capitals*, and numbered from 2 to 6 inclusive. The *Third Generation* comprises the sons of these five sons, (or those who were heads of families,) given in *small capitals*, and numbered from 7 to 19 inclusive. The names in both these generations go across the page. In the three next generations (IV., V., VI.) they are in three columns, bringing the sons and grandsons of each one of the Fourth Generation opposite his own name. In this

Table are included all names which are numbered; that is, all heads of families in the male line of descent for six generations. The few heads of families in the Seventh Generation will be found under their fathers' names.

Many errors and omissions unavoidable in the progress of the work will be found corrected in the NOTES, pages 221 to 248, to which *special attention* is asked. For the rest, I can safely say that they are not due to carelessness or indolence. The two hundred and fifty records here given have involved much study of family history for ten years,—and for three years past an almost continuous labour, a great deal of journeying, and at least fifteen hundred letters. But the work, the journeys and the correspondence have all been pleasant in themselves, and still more, in the knowledge of the Hayes Family past and present, which they have brought; and I am only sorry that other duties do not leave me time to make this record of it more nearly perfect.

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## HAY AND HAYES

IN ENGLAND AND SCOTLAND.

#### I. THE NAME.

THE Sanskrit root KAK (equivalent in English sounds to HAG or HAGH), meaning to surround or gird, furnishes the mediæval Latin Haya or Haga, Anglo-Saxon Haga or Hege, German Hag or Heck, Dutch Haag or Hague, Danish Havé, French Haie, English Haw, Hay, Hedge, with the Lowland Scotch variations Hag, Haig, Haigh, and Hay. All of these have substantially the same primitive and secondary meanings: (1) a fence or boundary enclosing land, and (2) the space so enclosed, as a park or field.<sup>\*\*</sup>

\* Skeats (Etym. Dict. 1882), who gives most of the above, considers the word allied to the Latin *cingo*, of which I find no evidence; Webster derives *hedge* from the Arabic *haugon*, but gives no authority. The same authorities derive "hay," meaning cut grass, from the Anglo-Saxon *hedwan*, to cut or *hew*. The capital of the Netherlands, "The Hague" (Fr. "La Haye") has its name, no doubt, from the same root as our English "Hay" and "Hayes." "Hagae" in Domesday Book seems to mean town lots; e. g. at Chichester there were in King Edward's time 97½ "hagae," but more houses; at Wallingford "viii hagae destructae," or laid waste, for building the Castle. See Freeman, Norman Conquest, V. 809.

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The Rev. Charles Wareing Bardsley, in his learned and delightful treatise, "English Surnames," says (p. 133, 2d ed.):

"A 'croft' was an enclosed field for pasture. It has given us 'Haycraft,' that is, *hedged-croft*. This reminds us of our 'Hayes.' Chaucer, in his Troilus, says—

> <sup>6</sup> But right so as this holtes and this hayis That han in wynter dedé ben and drye, Revesten hem in greené, when that May is, When every lusty lyketh best to playe.<sup>18</sup>

"A 'hay' was nothing but a 'hedge.' In the Hundred Rolls' we find such names occurring as 'Margery de la Haye' or 'Roger de la Hagh,' or in a compounded form 'Richard de la Woodhaye' or 'Robert de Brodheye.' Of the simple root the forms most common now are 'Hay,' 'Hayes,' 'Haighs,' 'Haigs' and 'Hawes.' The composite forms are endless. 'Roundhay' explains itself. 'Lyndsay' I find spelt at this period as 'Lyndshay,' so that it is not the islet whereon the lind or linden grows, but the hedge of these shrubs.' Besides these we have 'Haywood,' or 'Heywood,' 'Hayland' and 'Hayley.' From the form 'hawe,' mentioned above, we have our 'Hawleys,' 'Haworths,' and 'Hawtons,' or 'Haughtons,' and probably the longest name in the directory, that of 'Featherstonehaugh.' We still talk of the haw-thorn [hedge-thorn] and haw-haw [ha-ha, sunk hedge]. Chaucer uses the term for a farmyard or garth—

> 'Aud eek ther was a polkat in his hawe, That, as he sayde, his capouns had i-slawe.'

"This at once explains such a name as 'Peter in le Hawe' found in the Hundred Rolls. But Chaucer has a prettier use of it than this, a use still abiding in our 'Churchays,' relics of the mediæval 'de Chirchehay.' He speaks twice of the 'Churchhawe,' or graveyard. How pretty it is ! almost as

pretty as its Saxon synonym 'Godsacre,' only that is more endeared to us, inasmuch as since the acre always denoted the sowed land (Latin 'ager'), so it whispers to us hopefully of the great harvest-tide to come, when the seed thus sown in corruption shall be raised an incorruptible body."\*

"An interesting relic of primitive precaution against the straying of animals is found in the officership of the 'Hayward' (or 'Adam le Heyward' as the Hundred Rolls have it), whose duty it was to guard the cattle that grazed on the village common. He was so styled from the Saxon 'hay' or 'hedge' already spoken of. An old poem has it—

> ' In tyme of hervest mery it is ynough : Peres and apples hongeth on bough, The hayward bloweth mery his horne ; In every felde ripe is corne.'

"In 'Piers Plowman,' too, we have the word-

'I have an horne, and be a hayward, And liggen out a nyghtes And keep my corne and my croft From pykers and theves.'

"It will be seen from these two references that his officership was of a somewhat general character. The cattle might be his chief care, but the common village interests were also under his supervision. The term has left many surnames to maintain its now decayed and primitive character; 'Hayward' and 'Haward' are, however, the most familiar."

Knight (Hist. Eng. 1. 236, ed. 1880) says that "'hay' (*haia*) still found in some of our counties, was an enclosed part of a wood to which the deer were driven." (In the "Tinchel" hunt, described by John Taylor, "the Water Poet," 1618; see Cyclop. Eng. Lit. II. 68, and Sir Walter Scott's note, *Lady of the Lake*, C. VI. xviii.)‡ But

the meaning 'hedge' or 'fence' seems to be more common in early times. As Chaucer, again, (Vl. 97,) *Romaunt of the Rose*, 3174:

> "And thereto hadde I so gret ire, That I ne durste the hayes passe ; There was noon hope, there was no grace."

As a surname, the two forms HAV and HAVES seem to have taken deepest root, respectively, in Scotland and England. The lands of Errol were granted by William the Lion, King of Scotland, c. 1185, to *William de Haya*, and for six generations the name appears in that form; afterwards it is recorded as *Hay*.<sup>\*</sup> But hardly less ancient is the name *Haig*, (= Haigh) in the family of Bemerside. In the General Register House, Edinburgh, is still preserved an original charter of "*Petrus de Haga dominus de Bemerside*" to the Abbot and Convent of Melrose, to which the famous "Thomas the Rhymer" of Ercildoune is a subscribing witness, and which, though wanting a date, cannot be later than c. 1240.<sup>†</sup>

"The grandfather of the present [1820] proprietor of Bemerside had twelve daughters, before his lady brought him a male heir. The common people trembled for the credit of their favorite soothsayer. The name HAVES is not found in Scotland, so far as I can learn, except as a variation or plural for HAY; in which form only it occurs in the records of the Lyon Office (the Scottish Heralds' College) and the General Register House.\* In England, on the other hand, the name HAVES is quite common from the fifteenth century down. The *seventeen* Hayes coats of arms given by Burke, in his "General Armory," represent families of the name in London, Westminster, Windsor, Berkshire, Chester, Devon, Essex, Hampshire, Hertfordshire, Kent, and several other counties.† A village in Kent, and another in Middlesex, bear the name of Hayes; the former was the seat of the great Lord Chatham, at which

\* In October, 1883, a thorough search was made in my behalf in the Lyon Office Records, with the permission of George Burnett, Esq., Lyon King of Arms, by his deputy, Mr. R. R. Stodart. Mr. S. writes (1) that "the Registers contain numerous coats of arms for Hay, none for Hays or Hayes"; (2) that he has "never met with any printed or MS. account of a family of Hayes or Hays of Scotland, but has seen the *s* added to the name occasionally, before orthography was settled as it now is."

At the suggestion of Mr. Stodart, a further search was made in the Registers of Wills for the Counties of Perth, Dumblane, and Edinburgh, in the General Register House, by the Rev. Walter MacLeod, of Edinburgh, an expert in such research. He found *fifty-four* wills by persons of the name of Hay, from 1650 to 1700; none of Hays or Hayes (except as a plural of Hay), nor giving among the 171 relatives named any possible trace of George Hayes of Windsor. As the abstracts of these wills sent me have only an antiquarian interest, it is hardly worth while to print or catalogue them here. They represent a great variety of condition, professions and trades; knight and lady, lawyer, physician, soldier, burgher, merchant, slater, violer, bower, tailor, servitor, etc.

† Only three appear to be dated, all of the 17th century. It is a curious coincidence, to say the least, that all but one of these seventeen coats of arms have the principal bearing triple, and fourteen of these are three heads of wild animals; bulls, boars, wolves, lions, tigers, leopards or dragons. he died, and the birth-place of his hardly less illustrious son, the second William Pitt.

We must suppose, then, either that our emigrant ancestor, George of Windsor, added an *s* to his name when he crossed the Border or the Atlantic;\* or that the uniform and immemorial tradition of his Scottish birth and emigration is a myth, and he was an Englishman by descent.

In other words, he was either a Scotch HAV, or an English HAVES.

The former conclusion is suggested as at least probable by my Scottish correspondents,<sup>+</sup> and will be acquiesced in,

+Mr. MacLeod writes (May, 1884): "From the period you mention as that in which George Hayes left Scotland, it would seem that the persecution then prevailing against the Presbyterians had something to do with his emigration. Thousands left the country at that time on that account. If he resided some time in England, that would account for his changing his name to Hayes. There were many families of those times of whom no notice occurs in the registers of wills, although they occupied no mean place in Scottish society. It was a period of great public trouble, and many of the best of the people were disposed to keep themselves and their family matters in obscurity in order to be safe." Col. Henry M. Drummond-Hay, of Seggieden, Perth,-who has given much attention to Scottish (and especially Perthshire) history and genealogy, and has kindly aided my inquiries by a careful study of the Hay family records in several of its branches, and by communication with other members of the family,-writes me (June 14, 1884) expressing, independently, the same opinion :-- that "the name Hayes, little known in Scotland, though so common in England, is doubtless derived from the old form of Hay-i, e. Haye or Haya-with the addition of the s so commonly affixed in England to surnames of one syllable, of which there are many examples, and which was doubtless the origin of the name in the family crossing the Border."

I must acknowledge here the kind offices, in this quest, of A. H. Moncur, Esq., Provost of Dundee, Perth, and of the present Earl of Kinnoull—the latter, especially, as representing a younger branch of the Scottish *De Hayas*, for

I presume, by most of the descendants of George Hayes, especially those most familiar with the strongly-marked Scottish traits, physical and mental, which have characterized the family in every generation since his time to this day.

But, after all, the cautious Scottish verdict must be given as to his Scottish descent, "not proven." And the account here given of the family of HAV, with the vignette of their crest, on page xxxii, are not to be taken as setting forth any claim to descent from William de Haya, as far as the present work is concerned.

assistance in Col. Drummond-Hay's examination of its records at Dupplin Castle; and also of President Hayes, through whom this part of my correspondence in Scotland was begun.

#### II. THE STORY OF THE BATTLE.

THE story of "Haie and his Sons" appears first, so far as I can find, in the *Scotorum Historiae* of Hector Boece (or Boyce), published in Latin, A. D. 1527, and translated (very freely) in John Bellenden's (Ballantyne) *Croniklis of Scotland*, 1533. From the latter work came, no doubt, the quaint narrative of Holinshed's Chronicle, 1587, which I have here given as more intelligible than the still quainter Scotticisms of Bellenden.

The present Historiographer of Scotland, Dr. John Hill Burton, remarks\* that as the earlier Scottish Chronicles of Fordun† and Wyntoun‡ contain no trace of the story, "Hector Boece must lie under strong suspicion of having invented it." He adds that "it has been widely current as a touching example of the simple manners of a primitive people"; and quotes that eminent and profound Scottish antiquary, George Chalmers, as having apparently "yielded his belief to the very picturesqueness of the story." "The narrative," says Chalmers, "of the battle of Luncarty is so artless and circumstantial, as given in Bellenden's Boece, that there is nothing superior to it for simplicity and minuteness in Lord Berners' Froissart."§ To me it seems at least

as probable that Boece found the tradition already long current among the Hays of his time, as that he invented it when they had been for more than three centuries one of the great historical families of Scotland.

But whatever may be its origin, the story is too interesting to be omitted here.<sup>\*</sup> I give it as a mythical introduction, so to speak, to the authentic records of the Hay family, no member of which, as we shall see later on, had set foot in Scotland till near two centuries after the traditional battle of Luncarty.<sup>†</sup> We cannot accept as literal truth, even for the sake of its moral, the instance which the great Scottish novelist puts into the mouth of the Regent Murray:

"HAY was but a rustic before the battle of Luncarty; the bloody yoke actually dragged the plough ere it was blazoned on a crest by the herald. Times of action make princes into peas-

ants, and boors into barons. All families have sprung from one mean man; and it is well if they have never degenerated from his virtue who raised them first from obscurity." *Monastery*, ch. XXXVII.

The King (Kenneth), had come, the story says, the night before, "unto Loncart, a village not far distant from the river of *Taic*, famous ever after by reason of the battell fought then neere unto the same."

"THE Danes being backed with the mounteine, were constreined to leave the same, and with all speed to come forward upon their enimies, that by joining they might avoid the danger of the Scotishmens arrowes and darts; by this meanes therefore they came to hand-strokes, in maner before the signe was given on either part to the battell. The fight was cruel on both sides; and nothing hindered the Scots so much, as going about to cut off the heads of the Danes, ever as they might overcome them. Which maner being noted of the Danes, and perceiving that there was no hope of life but in victorie, they rushed forth with such violence upon their adversaries, that first the right, and there after the left wing of the Scots, was constreined to retire and flee backe, the middle-ward stoutly yet keeping their ground ; but the same stood in such danger, being now left naked on the sides, that the victorie must needs have remained with the Danes, had not a renewer of the battell come in time, by the appointment (as is to be thought) of almightie God.

"For as it chanced, there was in the next field at the same time an husbandman, with two of his sons busie about his worke, named Haie, a man strong and stiffe in making and shape of bodie; but indued with a valiant courage. This Haie beholding the King with the most part of the nobles, fighting with great valiancie in the middle-ward, now destitute of the wings, and in great danger to be oppressed by the violence of his enimies, caught a plow-beame in his hand, and with the same exhorting his sonnes to do the like, hasted towards the battell. there to die rather amongest other in defense of his countrie, than to remaine alive after the discomfiture in miserable thraldome and bondage of the cruell and most unmercifull enimies. There was neere to the place of the battell a long lane fensed on the sides with ditches and walles made of turfe, through the which the Scots which fled were beaten down by the enimies on heapes.

"Here Haie with his sonnes, supposing they might best staie the fight, placed themselves overthwart the lane, beat them

backe whom they met fleeing, and spared neither friend nor fo; but downe they went all such as came within their reach, wherewith divers hardie personages cried unto their fellowes to returne back unto the battell, for there was a new power of Scotishmen come to their succours, by whose aid the victorie might be easilie obteined of their most cruell adversaries the Danes; therefore might they choose whether they would be slaine of their own fellowes coming to their aid, or to return again to fight with the enimies. The Danes being here staied in the lane by the great valiancie of the father and the sonnes, thought verely there had been some great succours of Scots come to the aid of their King, and thereupon ceasing from further pursute, fled backe in great disorder unto the other of their fellowes fighting with the middle-ward of the Scots.

"The Scots also that before was chased, being incouraged herewith, pursued the Danes unto the place of the battell right fiercelie. Whereupon Kenneth perceiving his people to be thus recomforted, and his enimies partlie abashed, called upon his men to remember their duties, and now sith their adversaries hearts began (as they might perceive) to faint, he willed them to follow upon them manfully, which if they did, he assured them that the victorie undoubtedlie should be theirs. The Scots incouraged with the King's words, laid about them so earnestlie, that in the end the Danes were constreined to forsake the field, and the Scots eagerlie pursuing in the chase, made great slaughter of them as they fled. This victorie turned highlie to the praise of the Scotish nobilitie, the whilk fighting in the middle-ward, bare still the brunt of the battell, continuing manfully therein even to the end. But Haie, who in such wise (as is before mentioned) staied them that fled, causing them to returne againe to the field, deserved immortall fame and commendation; for by his means chieflie was the victorie atchieved. And therefore on the morrow after, when the spoile of the field and of the enimies campe (which they had left ovid) [over?] shuld be divided, the chiefest part was bestowed on him and his two sonnes, by consent of all the multitude ; the residue being divided amongst the souldiers and men of warre, according to the ancient custome used amongst this nation.

"The King having thus vanquished his enimies, as he should enter into Bertha, caused costlie robes to be offered unto Haie and his sonnes, that being richlie clad, they might be the more honoured of the people; but Haie refusing to change his apparell, was contented to go with the King in his old garments whither it pleased him to appoint. So entring with the King into Bertha, he was received with little lesse honor than the King himselfe, all the people running foorth to behold him, whome they heard to have so valiantlie restored the battell, when the field was in maner lost without hope of all recoverie.

"At his entring into the towne he bare on his shoulder the plow-beame, more honourable to him than anie sword or battell axe might have been to anie the most valiant warrior. Then Haie being honored of all estates, within certeine daies after, at a counsell holden at Scone, it was ordeined, that both he and his posteritie should be accepted amongst the number of the chiefest nobles and peeres of the realme, being rewarded (besides monie and other great gifts) with lands and revenues, such as he should choose sufficient for the maintenance of their estates.

"It is said, that by the counsell of his sonnes, who knew the fruitfulnes of the soile, he did ask so much ground in those parts where the river of Taie runs by the town of Arrole over against Fife, as a falcon would fly over at one flight. Which request being freelie granted of the King the place was appointed at Inschire for the falcon to be cast off; the which taking hir flight from thence, never lighted till shee came to a great stone neere a village called Rosse, not passing four miles from Dundee. By which meanes all that countrie which lieth betwixt Inschire aforesaid, and the said stone (being almost six miles in length, and foure in breadth) fell unto Haie and his sons. The name of the stone also being called the falcon's stone to this daie, dooth cause the thing better to be beleeved; and well neere all the foresaid ground still continueth in the possession of the Haies unto this day. Besides this, to the further honoring of his name, the King gave him armes three scutcheons gules in a field of silver, a plow beame added thereunto, which he used instead of a battell axe, when he fought so valiantlie in defense of his owne countrie. Thus had the Haies their beginning of nobilitie, whose house hath atteined unto great estimation of honor, and hath been decorated with the office of the constableship of Scotland, by the bounteous benevolence of kings that succeeded. These things happened in the first yeere of King Kenneth."

So runs Holinshed's narrative. But I cannot refrain from quoting just one paragraph from the curious Scottish of Bellenden's Boece, which the reader may compare with the abové.

"Sone after [the battle] ane counsal was set at Scone in the quhilk Hay and his sons war maid nobil and dotad for thair singular virtew provin in this field, with sundray lands to sustene thair estait. It is said that he askit fra the King certane lands liand betwixt Tay and Arole and gat als mekil thairof as

ane falcon flew of ane man's hand or scho lichtit.<sup>\*</sup> The falcon flew to ane town four miles fra Dunde called Rosse and lichtit on ane stane quhilk is yet callit The Falcon Stane and sa he gat al the lands betwixt Tay and Arole six milis of lenth and four of breid quhilk lands ar yit inhabit by his posterite."<sup>†</sup>

#### III. THE HAYS OF SCOTLAND.

PASSING from the shadows of legendary Luncarty into the light of history, we find the Norman-French name DE HAYA, or DE LA HAVE, in France, England and Scotland *successively*, as early as the twelfth century. In the latter country it is certainly the original of the present name and family of HAY. I think there can be no reasonable doubt that the older English Hayes families came from the same source; but of this I have found no positive proof.

Sir Robert Douglas, in his *Peerage of Scotland* already quoted,\* after giving briefly the tradition of the Hays at the battle of Luncarty, says, "This legendary tale has been related merely in order to explain the armorial bearing of the family; for the Hays of Scotland are certainly a branch of the Anglo-Norman Hays, who came into Britain with William the Conqueror. The first person of this name who appears in Scottish record is William de Haya, who settled in Lothian at the end of the twelfth century."<sup>+</sup>

Sir John Bernard Burke, in proof that the surname came from France, adds that "there were lands and a lordship of that denomination in Normandy long before the time of William the Conqueror"; that "Humphrey de Vetulis," of

the well-known family of Pont-Audemar, "married Albreda de la Haye, or Haya";\* that an abbey ("Blanchelande") in the Diocese of Coutances, was founded and endowed by Richard de Haya in 1155;† that "the Hays in Normandy had the same arms with those in Scotland;" and that "there are families of this day in Normandy who trace their pedigree one hundred years before the Conquest."‡

The name of the "Sieur de la Haye" appears in one copy of the Roll of Battle Abbey,—— a document, however, too much interpolated to be of authority for more than an early claim to such distinction. Following first the English his-

tory of the name,—in Domesday Book it occurs only in Somerset, as far as I can learn;\* and thenceforward, as already noted,† in various forms, in the Hundred Rolls, Writs of Parliament, Calendars of Henry Vl., Registers of Westminster, and of Norwich, and other public documents of the thirteenth, fourteenth and fifteenth centuries.‡ Later on we find only "Hayes"; first in the reign of Elizabeth,§ most honourably associated with early efforts for colonization in America, in the person of Edward Hayes, captain and owner of the *Golden Hinde*, the one only ship of Sir Humphrey Gilbert's Newfoundland expedition of 1583, which ever returned to England.

|| To the full and interesting narrative of Edward Hayes, in Hakluyt's Voyages (III. 184), we are indebted for nearly all that is known at this day of that noble but disastrous undertaking, and of the heroic death of its great commander, to whose Christian faith heaven was "as neare by sea as by land." I cannot forbear quoting here the words in which Hayes sets forth the true spirit and motive, in his view, of all English colonization, and which reflect much light on his own character. It is, he says, "the duty of every man of great calling, in whom is any instinct of inclination vnto this attempt, to examine his owne motions; which, if the same proceed of ambition or auarice, he may assure himselfe it

In France, the name "La Haye" is preserved at this day in a village of Touraine, notable only as the birthplace of Descartes. Le Sieur Des Hayes, Baron de Courmenin, was a diplomatist of some note in the East under Cardinal Richelieu, A. D. 1592 to 1632, and in the latter year one of the many victims of his jealous suspicion.\* Charles de la Haye, of Fontainebleau, 1641, was a French engraver, and Reynier de la Haye, a Dutch painter, of 1670, both of considerable merit ;† and Nicholas de la Haye, of Paris, 1725-1802, attained greater eminence as the inventor of modern topographical map-engraving.‡

But when and how came the Norman DE HAVA into Scotland?

It was, in part, from the same love of adventure and conquest, and the same strange "power of absorbing all the cometh not of God, and therefore cannot haue confidence of God's protection and assistance against the violence (els irresistible) both of sea, and infinite perils upon the land; whom God yet may vse as an instrument to further his cause and glory some way, but not to build vpon so bad a foundation. Otherwise, if his motiues be derived from a vertuous and heroycall minde, preferring chiefly the honour of God, compassion of poore infidels captiued by the deuill, tyrannizing in most wonderful and dreadfull manner over their bodies and soules; aduancement of his honest and well-disposed countreymen, willing to accompany him in such honourable actions; reliefe of sundry people within this realme distressed; all these be honourable purposes, imitating the nature of the munificent God, wherewith he is well pleased, who will assist such an action beyond expectation of man." noble characteristics of the people with whom they came in contact, and of infusing their own energies into them," which made the Normans a ruling race in England from the days of Edward the Confessor. But it was more immediately owing to the marriage of Malcolm III. (Cean-mohr) of Scotland, with the saintly Saxon princess Margaret, and the education of their three sons, successively Kings of Scotland, at the court of their sister Matilda, queen of Henry I. When the youngest of these, the "good King David," ascended the throne in 1124, both inclination and policy led him to surround himself with those who had been his companions and friends in England, and to offer them every inducement, in rank and lands in Scotland, to make his country their own. "Why they should have been so loved and courted," says the historian of Scotland, "is one of the mysteries in the history of social influences. What they were at the Court of Edward the Confessor, they became in the Court of the Scottish Kings, from David But they were in fact a civilizing and edudownwards."\*

cating influence over the rude natives of Scotland, even more than over the sluggish Saxons; and not only David, but his successors, Malcolm IV. and William the Lion, had the wisdom to see this truth and to act upon it. Thus most of the great names of Scottish history are from earlier homes in both Normandy and England; Bruce and Balliol, Lindsay, Somerville, Seyton, Melville, Herries, Cunningham, Lockhart, Ramsay, Gordon, Graham, Rosse, Sinclair, Fraser, Ker, Stuart, Wallace, Campbell :---as the old thirteenth century chronicle goes on, "dez Baillolfs, de Bruys, de Soulis, et de Moubray, et le Saynclers; lez Hayes, les Giffardis, les Ramesays, les Berkleys, lez Mountgomeris, lez Fryzers, lez Grames,-et plusours autres." Of these, William the Lion, he says, "enprist od ly en Escoce plusours lez fitz pusnes dez Seygnours Dengleterre qi ly estoient beinnoillauntz, et lour dona lez terres des autres qy ly estoient rebelés."\*

So we first find a DE HAVA in Scotland about A. D. 1153, in the person of William, *Pincerna Domini Regis*, in other words the King's butler or cup-bearer, in the reigns of Malcolm IV. (1153-65) and William the Lion; his name and office attested by his witness to several charters of the former King. He died c. 1170, leaving by his wife Juliana de Soulis of Liddesdale, two sons, William and Robert, who founded respectively the two great houses now represented

by the Earl of Erroll and the Marquis of Tweeddale. But his office of *Pincerna* passed into his wife's family.

It was the second William de Haya to whom King William the Lion granted the lands of "Herrol," now Erroll, in Perthshire, " for the service of two soldiers, with all the privileges competent to a barony," c. 1185.\* Of his six sons, the eldest, David, succeeded him in the barony c. 1195; and of his two sons by Helen, dau. of Gilbert Earl of Strathern, the younger, William, was ancestor of the Hays of Leys, and the elder, Gilbert, was one of the Regents of Scotland in the minority of Alexander III., in 1255. Nicholas, eldest son and successor of Gilbert, was a prominent actor in the troublous times for Scotland which followed that monarch's death, as was his eldest son, Sir Gilbert, and youngest, Sir Hugh, both faithful followers of Robert Bruce for many years from his accession in 1306. On the former the King conferred the hereditary office of Lord High Constable of Scotland, a dignity remaining with the Earls of Erroll to this day, and though now merely honorary, making its bearer the first subject in Scotland, taking precedence of all other hereditary honours.<sup>+</sup> He d. 1330; his son David, who succeeded him, fell at the battle of Durham, Oct. 17, 1346; and Thomas, son and successor of David, lived till 1406, one of the chief men of Scotland under Robert II., whose

third dau. Elizabeth he married, and by whom he had two sons, William and Gilbert. In this Thomas the name first appears in its modern form *Hay*, instead of De Haya or De la Haye; and his great-grandson William became, in 1452, the first Earl of Erroll. The later history of this and other branches of the family—many of whom have been distinguished in civil and military service—is given fully in works on the Scotch Peerage, county families, &c., now accessible to every one.

Edmund Hay of Leys, a great-grandson of the third William de Haya, (son of David, above,) had a second son Peter, who became first Baron of Melginch; and *his* greatgrandson Peter, fourth Baron, had two sons, the younger of whom, George Hay of Kinfauns, was created first Earl of Kinnoull, 1633, and was Lord High Chancellor of Scotland under Charles I.\*

### TO PAGES XXV AND XXVI.

CINCE these pages were printed, I have received the ) results of a search for the name of Hayes in the records of Somerset House, London. They are unimportant except as showing that the name was found in many parts of England in the seventeenth century. In the calendars it occurs ninety-four times in sixteen counties, from 1650 to 1680. Abstracts of twelve wills from 1650 to 1659, and as many administrations from 1655 to 1678, give no trace of any connection with the Windsor family, except possibly in one instance, where a "Robert Heyes" of Northampton (1659), "maultster," names wife Margaret, sons Samuel, Edward, George and Thomas (the three latter minors), and daughters Mary, Sarah, "Kerby" and Abigail. It seems hardly probable that this family (notwithstanding its Christian names and vicinity to Derby) has anything to do with ours, but it may be worth while to follow out this clue hereafter in local records.

I find a "Thomasine," sister of Richard Hayes of Elham, Kent (see note 21, page 228), but perhaps that name was not so uncommon in that day as it seems now. 2

ship between them has yet appeared, but the tradition is somewhat strengthened by their undoubted Scottish descent, their coming to New England in or about the same year, and at least one remarkable coincidence of names.\*

George I.

A MS. record, written or dictated by Ezekiel Hayes I. of New Haven, (b. 1724, d. 1807,) grandson of George of Windsor, says that George Hayes

"Went from Scotland to Derbyshire in England, and lived with his uncle. He was anxious to see London, whither he went. Having received some account of America, he took passage and came to this country. He married, and had three children. His wife died; and also his children. Afterwards he married Abigail Dibol of Long Island, and lived in Windsor, Connecticut, and by her had ten children."

This account appears from the MS. to have been given by George Hayes himself, in substance, to his eldest son Daniel; and is no doubt substantially true, though the same record adds other matter which is too confused and inaccurate to be of any value.<sup>+</sup>

GEORGE HAVES of Windsor married I. Sarah — (surname illegible on Windsor Records), who died at Windsor, March 27, 1683, leaving one child, *George*,

George Hayes died at Simsbury, Sept. 2, 1725; his second wife, and their five sons and six daughters, surviving him. He was probably buried in the older cemetery at "Hop Meadow," near Salmon Brook, which dates from 1683; but no inscription has been found for himself or his wife.

I commit my Soule into the hands of almighty God who gave it, & my Body I commend it to the Earth to be buried in Christian and decent maner by my Executors hereafter named nothing doubting but that I shall receave the same again by the Mighty power of God and in hopes I shall Receave full pardon & Remission of all my sins, through my Blesed Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. And as touching such wordly Estate wherewith the Lord has been pleased to bless me in this life far beyond my desert, I give devise bequeath and dispose of the same in maner and form following.

"First my Will and desire is that all and Every Debt and debts which I owe in Right or Consience unto any person or persons whatsoever be well and truly paid by my Executors hereafter named in Convenient time after my decease. 2<sup>dly</sup> I give and bequeath unto my well beloved wife Abigaill Hayes for her tender and loving care of me in my low & weak Condition my now dwelling house Barn Orchard, home Lot and pasture being my whole homestead and the benefits thereof to have hold and enjoy the same so long and during the term and time, that she shall Remain my widow, and I also give unto her my said wife my Bed and furniture we now Lye on, and so much of my household goods & furniture of Every sort as is needfull for her to keep house withall and one Cow if any to her and her disposall.

"3<sup>dly</sup> I give and bequeath unto my son Daniell the sum of ten pounds more than to any other of my Children (Except it be my Daughter Abigaill) in mony or equivalent thereto out of my Estate when the same may fall to them to be divided. 4thly I Give and bequeath unto my sd Daughter Abigaill five pounds more than to any Child or daughter I have by reason of her Lameness in mony or Equivalent thereto out of my Estate when the same may fall to them to be divided. 5<sup>thly</sup> I give and bequeath to my son Benjamin (beside what I gave him already by Deeds) my ten Acre peice of Marsh commonly called the Bever Marsh, & also my whole part or sheare in oure saw mill at Salmon Brook with this Conditional promise that he the S<sup>d</sup> Eenjamin shall dwell and live with me and support me in all my wants and nessessities and carefully carry on the business Required and usuall to be done and performed in my husbandry on my farm, and to behave himself toward me as a dutyfull Child ought to do towards a dutyfull parent, during my natural Life, and my Will and desire also is, that if I should hapen to Decease in such a time of the yeare so soon, or sooner after my S<sup>d</sup> son has goten in my Crops of grain & hay etc or such other produce of my said farm that the same be not put nor entered in an Inventory but that the same be wholly for the use and benefit of my now present family namely my wife,

my Daughter, Abigaill & Son Benjamin. 6thly I give and bequeath unto my foure sons Daniell George William & Samuell two third parts of my Remaining Estate to be Equally divided between them both in quantity and quality, and the other third part of my S<sup>d</sup> Estate I give and bequeath unto my Daughters Abigaill Sarah Mary Johanna Thankfull & Doritha to be equally divided between them both in quantity and quality when the same shall come to be divided (after the marriage or dower of my S<sup>d</sup> wife, but the out lands may be divided before S<sup>d</sup> marriage or dower of my S<sup>d</sup> Wife. The same to be and remain to them and theire heirs forever, and to have and to hold the same and to theire own disposing. And I do hereby Revoak Disanull and make void and of none Efect all and Every other will and wills and bequeaths before this time by me made, and declare this and none other to be my Last Will and Testament and out of this my Last will and Testament I make and ordain my said well beloved wife, and my loving son Daniell my two Executors & trix in whom I confide and trust to do all and see done in what this my Sd Will is Required. Signed sealed published pronounced and declared by the S<sup>d</sup> George Hays as his Last Will and Testament in presence of us

The five sons and six daughters of George Hayes and Abigail Dibble all married, and all, except perhaps Abigail, left descendants. The births of the four younger children are not found in Simsbury records, but their order is fixed almost certainly by the dates of marriage of two of them, and the fact that the youngest son, Benjamin, appears to have been of age at the date of his father's will.

FIVE SONS OF GEORGE HAYES I.

2. II. DANIEL,<sup>2</sup> eldest son, b. Windsor, April 26, 1686, d. Simsbury, Sept. 23, 1756. In "Queen Anne's War," and when about twenty-two years old, he was taken prisoner by three Indians, almost in sight of his own home, carried to Canada, and kept in captivity more than five years.\* The romantic story of his sufferings and heroism, well authenticated in all essential points, has been told in full in Phelps' History of Simsbury, Hartford, 1845, and in "A Long Journey," by the present writer, Portland, 1876. The substance of it, from Phelps' account, is given here.

"They were nearly thirty days on the journey. At night he was secured by being placed upon his back, with each arm and ankle strongly fastened to a sapling, and with sticks so crossing his body as to be lain upon by an Indian at each side. . . In this manner they proceeded day by day up the valley of the Connecticut River and through the wilderness. The sufferings of poor Hayes were excessive, and almost without intermission. Subjected to hard toil through each day, with no sustenance save what the forests and rivers furnished, and deprived at night of rest, by the manner of binding his limbs, he had that to sustain which, in most cases, would have brought the sufferer to the grave. But Hayes, if he must be a victim, determined that he at least would not voluntarily contribute

to hasten the sacrifice. He possessed the happy faculty of making, at all times, the best of his condition. His cheerfulness, though assumed—his ability to endure fatigue and hardships—and his apparent stoical indifference to his fate, secured the good opinion of his comrades, and tended to lighten his burdens, and, possibly, to prolong his life."

"When they arrived at the great Indian encampment on the borders of Canada, the prisoner was delivered over to the Council of the Nation, to be disposed of as they should adjudge. By their decision, he was doomed to undergo the painful ordeal of 'running the gauntlet.' Being stripped to his skin, and anointed according to custom, he commenced the course; and after many flagellations and hard knocks received, when approaching near the end of the line, being exhausted and faint, he bolted from the course to avoid a blow from an upraised war-club, and sought safety by fleeing into a wigwam, at the door of which sat a superannuated and infirm squaw. He was pursued, but the squaw proclaimed the house sacred, and its inmates protected from injury. Her husband and only son had fallen in war; she claimed the captive, and adopted him as her son. She was destitute, and so infirm as to be unable to walk. The captive provided for her sustenance and fuel; administered to her wants, and devoted to her the kindest attentions. Thus years went on, during which he fared better, perhaps, than most Indian captives; but existence in his condition had few charms, and the future no cheering prospect. He was in bondage, compelled to adopt the customs and modes of life of savages, and deprived of almost every comfort deemed necessary by civilized people Besides, he could entertain no reasonable hope of being restored to his home and kindred,

and his life was at the mercy of savage masters. "He was finally sold to a Frenchman in Montreal, through the agency, it is said, of a Papist priest. His new master was kind, and allowed him many of the necessaries, with some of the luxuries, of life, of which he had been so long deprived. Learning that Hayes was by trade a weaver, he started him in this business, and by allowing him a share of the profits, Hayes was enabled in time to earn money enough to purchase his freedom. The good Frenchman not only emancipated him, but supplied him with clothes, provisions, and a half-breed guide to conduct him safely through the warring tribes on his journey homeward. The guide, proceeding with him as far as Mount Holyoke, pointed out to him the smokes of his friends, "the pale faces," wished him a happy return to his family, and departed to wend his way back to Canada. In about twentyfive days after leaving Montreal, Hayes had the happiness to reach his home, and to exchange hearty greetings and congratulations with his friends, to whom he appeared almost as one raised from the dead. He had heard nothing from his family since his capture, nor had they received any tidings of him. His long absence had extinguished every vestige of hope, and he had for some time been given up as lost.

"With buoyant spirits, renovated courage, and unshaken resolution, he set himself to the task of making up for the *lost time* he had spent among the Indians. His constitution, naturally robust, had suffered nothing by his long captivity, and his ambition had lost none of its fire. He married, settled down upon a farm, and within a short time became a thriving agriculturist."

In 1720, he built the house in which his descendants in the fourth generation were born, (the oldest in the town when taken down in 1871, and whose foundation walls and stone-lined well yet remain,) on the east side of Salmon Brook street, in the lower or southern part of the village. In this house the first Congregational society, of which he and his wife became members at its organization about 1739, met for worship until 1743, when its first meeting-house was built.

A deed to "Danill Hais," "December y<sup>e</sup> last, 1713," two and a half acres for  $\pounds 4$ ; a grant of 120 acres from the Town of Simsbury, cited above, Jan. 2, 1723; and a deed of release from his brothers and sisters, March 22, 1734, are on record at Simsbury. (The latter deed is signed by George, William, and Samuel Hayes, Abigail Tompkins, Sarah Gozard, Mary Rice, Joanna Hillyer, Thankful Holcomb, and Dorothy Dibol, as heirs of "our honoured Father George Hayes.")<sup>\*</sup> He was admitted Freeman Oct.,

\*To this deed (of land granted by the Town as above, and "laid out by us the subscribers, Oct. I, 1733") the sisters *made their marks*, as do their father and brother George in some instruments, while to others their signatures appear. 1717; "was a prominent citizen," says Phelps, "often employed in public affairs, and during many years a pillar in the church at Salmon Brook."\*

The grave of Daniel Hayes in the Old Salmon Brook Cemetery is still marked by a substantial slab of red free-stone, the oldest in the cemetery, with the following inscription, which I copied *verbatim* from the stone on the last day of May, 1875:

On shore he was not always equally successful; ploughing on his W. N. Y. farm, with a yoke of oxen and an old mare in front, the team got mixed; the oxen turned their yoke, and the Captain calls out for help, "The larboard ox has got on the starboard side, and the old mare is hung in the rigging!" When a visit was expected from her, our work was duly prepared, and we were admonished to be very industrious, because grandmother did not like to see little folks idle. Ah, well! many a good lift did those visits give my mother, quilting bed quilts, and helping generally about fitting up the clothing for a large family. I spoke of her passion for worsted work. I have heard her say that on Saturday afternoon, she put it all into her work-basket and pushed it under the bed as far as she could, then taking her prosy knitting-work, she tried to get it out of her mind for Sunday!"

"After grandfather's death," says another, "Grandmother wanted me to sleep with her. She was often wakeful after retiring, and had great difficulty in getting to sleep again. On this occasion, I awoke in the night, and found her very restless. She said 'she could not sleep moonlight nights; the same moon shining in her window was shining on grandfather's grave. She *mast have a meeting* to quiet her.' And she did have one. She repeated a chapter in the Bible, made a long prayer, sang a hymn, (and was sure she got the right pitch, too,) and then repeated the whole of the 'Assembly's Catechism,' question and answer.

"She taught me to knit, and well do I remember that after I thought 1 had well learned, she would take my work, that 1 had toiled over so long, and without stopping for my entreaties and tears, would pull the needles right out and unravel it all, and tell me to do it over ! that whatever was worth doing at all, was worth doing well !"

"Grandmother's great faculty," says another, "was work. She worked from early morn to dewy eve." She knit more stockings, mittens and gloves, wove more rag-carpets, spun and made more cloth, elaborated more wonderful rugs, bags, and lamp-mats, than any other woman of her day and generation; and yet found time to train up her children, do the work of a large family, and 'keep tavern'!

"Her face was most expressive. Her forehead was low, but full, and her hair was black to the last. Her laugh was short and quick. Her complexion was dark. She was not of a hopeful temperament, but was witty, and possessed great force of will."

Her minute and curious diary is in the possession of the family of her granddaughter, Mrs. Larkin G. Mead.

#### \* NOTE ON ZEDEKIAH HAYES.

(Pages 17 and 32 above.) Mr. Geo. E. Hoadley, of Hartford, Conn., has kindly sent me (Aug. 4, 1883) the following note from "a private record kept by the Rev. Allen M'Lean, minister at Simsbury from 1809 more than fifty vears."

"Died, Sept. 10, 1817, ZEDEKIAH HAVES, aged So. He was a beggar by trade, yet he gave uncommon evidence of vital piety." Readers of the Antiquary will admit the possibility of such a character as this Connecticut Edie Ochiltree, but it is not easy to realize it in this day. As the date of his birth as given on pp. 17 and 32 from Simsbury records, is undoubtedly correct, he must have been nearly 87 instead of 80. Besides the children noted on p. 32, he had a dau. SARAH, bapt. July 5, 1764, at "Turkey Hills" (Simsbury), d. inf.; and the two youngest children there given, another SARAH, and DIANTHA (not "Dianthy "), were also bapt. at Turkey Hills, July 21, 1771, by the Rev. Roger Viets, Church of England Missionary at Simsbury, and Rector of "St. Andrew's, Scotland (Bloomfield), and St. Ann's, Salmon Brook." (The latter church stood on the present site of the "Town Hall" in Salmon . . . ok.) (G. E. H.)

He was afterwards for some years in the work of the ministry at Arlington, Vt., and Brighton, Iowa; after 1865 resided with his sons at Muscatine.

Gordon Hayes was a man of unusual ability and excellence of character, and his life, quiet and uneventful as it was in one point of view, would furnish material for a fuller biography of much interest. I gladly avail myself of the following communication from President Porter of Yale College, who was at one time intimately associated with him :—

"The Rev. Gordon Hayes was my next neighbor during my pastorate at New Milford, Conn., from April, 1836, to December, 1842, a period of nearly six years. I saw him very frequently, and had with him a very intimate and confidential friendship; and have passed many delightful hours at his house with him and his bright and happy family. He was thoroughly upright, open-hearted, cheerful, and earnestly Christian, and, at the same time, singularly outspoken and fearless in the expression and defence of his opinions. His parish consisted of a large number of intelligent, bright-minded people, who had been trained in Christian ways, and were characteristically interested in all the Christian and reforming movements of the times, but not altogether agreed in opinion, especially upon the temperance and anti-slavery questions. These topics occupied much of their attention, and the discussion of them kept the people and their minister in a state of brisk effervescence. In all these discus-sions, Mr. Hayes inclined to conservative views; appealing to the Scriptures as the decisive arbiter upon every controverted question, and with an energy, a point, and an imperturbable good nature, which usually gave him the victory. He was often

too much of a literalist in his interpretations and reasonings to satisfy all his brethren in the ministry; but they all had supreme confidence in his practical good sense, and his selfdenying and Christian spirit.

"He delighted in plain living, and independent self-reliance. His plain house, and the few acres of land which were his delight, satisfied all his earthly ambition. He gave a good example of modest independence to a somewhat ambitious people. His cheerful wife and bright-minded children filled his house and his heart with thankfulness and joy, and his hospitable welcome was always ready for his brethren and friends.

"I never knew the reason why he left Washington; and am certain that the parish, in losing him, suffered a loss which was never exactly replaced. I suppose that out of the heats of the reforming effervescences which were abundant in those times, some ill-feeling was engendered, which finally sent him away; but for which he might have ended his life in the beautiful region in which he spent so many happy years.

"I owe his memory a large debt of gratitude for the sweet integrity, the transparent goodness, the sterling good sense, and the large hearted Christian charity, of which I had such intimate knowledge at the beginning of my own life in the Christian ministry."\*

\* May, 1883. Of the fearlessness which was a marked trait of Gordon Hayes's character, his son Daniel says: "In thinking over incidents of his life known to me personally, or which I have heard from others, I am convinced that he either did not know what fear was, or scorned the idea of allowing himself ever to be influenced by it. For instance :—A gentleman in Virginia was boasting of his watch-dog, a savage thorough-bred bull-dog, and telling how many persons had tried in vain to get a coat away from him, when he was lying on it and told to watch it. When he saw Father smile, he said, 'Perhaps you think you can do it ; I will bet you any amount you can't.' Father said, 'I never bet, but I can take a coat away from any dog.' After the owner had prepared him, Father walked up sharply, gave the dog a kick, and said, 'Get out,' and the dog 'got.' He always said that no dog would fight a man who was not afraid of him; but the point with me always was, how not to be afraid."

"To cross weapons with one so keen-minded and outspoken as Mr. Hayes, was considered quite the thing to do by men of inquiring minds and full of debate ; but whoever was tempted thus to measure lances with him, was pretty sure to get worsted in the encounter. No less remarkable was his imperturbable goodnature ; without vindictiveness, and without guile, it never failed him, asserted itself always at the right time, and made its healthful impression on those who

might otherwise have been disinclined to relish his style of maintaining his side of the discussion."

\* " Mrs. Hayes was worthy of the important place she filled as the wife of such a man and such a Minister. She too had character, and conscience, and deep affection ; patience, fortitude, industry, tact and skill. Nobly did she perform her part in the household and the parish, with much sunny cheerfulness, yet with rare discretion and lady-like propriety. She was of noted lineage on both sides. Her grandfather, Dea. John Fassett, was one of the earliest settlers of Bennington; inn-holder; captain of the first military company; representative in the Legislature; an early church member, and leader of the choir, as were his descendants through the first century of the church's history. His son, Col. Benjamin, Mrs. Hayes' father, was a commissary in the Revolutionary Army, and an active business man, filling many civil and military offices, and leaving numerous descendants." (Rev. Of this, and of her traits of character, I give in a note a brief sketch from a memoir written by her devoted friend and schoolmate, Frances E. Willard, and published in the Ladies' Repository for May, 1873.\*

\* "Lillie Hayes Waugh was that rare compound, the ideal missionary actualized. As a child, she was one of the precocious who have good health, and the conscientious who like fun. A superior classical scholar, (studying Latin at the age of seven with her father,) her love for books did not isolate her from other children of her age, in whose circle she was the chief attraction. Her interest was not confined to those of her own age ; but as years wore on, she gathered the little folks around her, wherever she happened to be, and was never happier than when amusing or instructing them. She had the good fortune to be instructed, during all her earliest years, at home ; her father and eldest brother were the teachers to whom she owed the thorough training that brought her fine endowments under her command.

"Her first task in India was to master the Urdu, or Hindustani language, as also the Hindee—a task which she accomplished with great credit to herself and profit to her work—carrying her studies into the Persian also, in order to enrich her Hindustani. On the mission field, she was a quiet, steady worker, and made her labours tell wherever concentrated. At first in charge of the 'Boy's Orphanage' (with her husband)—a most responsible position—then of the 'Girl's Orphanage'; then translating some much-needed volume into the vernacular ; then zealously employed in what is known as the 'Zenana work' of the mission, visiting women of the well-to-do Hindu and Mohammedan families, to give them instruction in needle-work, teach them to read, and tell them about the true way, Her children were 5 s. 1 dau., all but the youngest b. in India :—


the only Saviour and the woman's best Friend. In that work, her knowledge of the language, her well-balanced character, and her sincere piety gave her great influence, and commanded the respect and confidence of all whom she could reach. 'Through the long, hot season,' says one of her co-labourers, 'though frequently the sirocco had blown all night, by six in the morning she would be ready to leave her little children and her comfortable home, and go forth through heat, dust, blinding glare and narrow alleys, to the close, dingy apartments of some native house, where a little school had been gathered. Until ten o'clock she taught, guided the poor and incompetent teachers, and dispensed carefully the Word of Life, often feeling well repaid, and often discouraged. Three afternoons in the week, some of the native teachers came to her house for instruction; there were prayer and class-meetings to be attended; the sick to be visited, and frequently supplied with food from her own table; her children requiring unusual care in that hot climate, and often needing to be carefully nursed through tedious illnesses ; and not least of all was she a true help-meet to her husband.'"

"She left," says her sister, "several translations of Christian hymns (first of all the little prayer, 'Now I lay me down to sleep') into the dialect of Northern India. Thousands of women and children in that land remember 'Lillie Hayes Waugh' with gratitude and affection."

"In May, 1872, while at home with her sister at Ravenswood, Ill., her youngest child became seriously ill; and when, after her long and tender nursing, he grew better, she sickened suddenly. In her delirium she would speak nothing but Hindustani; her thoughts were of the far-off Orient, the unfinished work, the sad-faced friends she had loved and laboured for. And when she seemed better, and the fever went away, and she lay rational and quiet in her room, when they least looked for it, the hour for which all other hours are made, struck softly its summons of release, and the sweet wife, the gentle mother, the unselfish Christian, passed 'beyond our sight, beyond our ken.'"





His love of classical learning, cultivated tastes, remarkable conversational powers and ready wit, his generous hospitalities, and not least, his excellence of personal character, in moral and religious principle, gave him equal eminence in social and literary circles. In mature age, and with a large estate, he retired from the profession of the law, and gave his remaining years, with great ability and faithfulness, to the work of the ministry, in the New School Presbyterian Church; taking no pastoral charge, but labouring zealously and efficiently wherever his services were needed, leaving, like his father before him, a bright example of Christian life and duty in that high office,

Attorney of Alabama under Presidents Van Buren, Tyler and Polk; Colonel in the Mexican war of 1846–8, and promoted for personal bravery. The beautiful Italian villa of "Belmont," near Nashville, still the home of the family, and, with its gardens, conservatories and picture gallery, a centre of attraction for visitors to the capitol, was built by Col. Acklen, and is said to be the finest private residence in the Southern States.

Mrs. Acklen, now Mrs. Cheatham, has, like her father and mother, been distinguished in social life at home, and was received with consideration in the highest circles in Europe, during a residence there in 1865 and later, to complete the education of her children. A fuller account of her (with a portrait) and of her home, Belmont, may be found in Mrs Ellet's "Queens of American Society," 417-20.

Her two sons have followed the profession of their father and grandfather; and the eldest, *Joseph Hayes Acklen*, has since 1871, been a busy and successful lawyer, having offices in New Orleans and Washington; and represented Louisiana in the Forty-fifth, Forty-sixth and Forty-eighth Congresses, being on his first election the youngest member of that body. In addition to his education at home, he passed successful examinations at two European Universities before beginning professional studies.

LEVI HAYES was the ninth of thirty-five Mass. and Conn. men who organized, April 21, 1804, the "Licking Land Co.," and purchased 29,040 acres in what is now Granville, Licking Co., Ohio, for \$48,560. His co-trustees were Lieut. Levi Buttles (properly Buttolph), Job Case, Noadiah Holcombe, and Seth Hayes (bro. of Levi), of Granby; Timothy Rose, Timothy Spelman, Samuel Thrall, Zadock Cooley and Cornelius Slocum, of Granville, Mass., and Russell Attwater and Solomon Noble, of Blandford, Mass. L. H. owned and occupied 300 acres of the best land; was "deacon," town treasurer, grand juror, etc., a prominent man in the community ; d. Oct. 8, 1847, bur. at Granville. His wife, RUHAMAH PARSONS, (3d dau. of Jonathan (s. Dea. Benj., s. Dea. Ebenezer, s. Dea. Benj. from Torrington, Devon, to Springfield Mass., 1636) and Mary (dau. Dea Joseph Merrick) Parsons of W. Springfield,) b. W. Springf., Nov. 11, 1766, d. Granville, O., July 3, 1837, bur. Granville. Both were persons of high character, moral and religious ; remembered as retiring and exclusive in habits ; the husband had considerable literary taste, and a ready talent at versifying, of which he was extremely fond.

daigua, N. Y. In 1798 he removed with his father to Western New York, was educated at Canandaigua Academy, certified as "qualified teacher" at eighteen;\* employed as journeyman printer by James D. Bemis of Canandaigua. 1806, Seward and Williams of Utica, N. Y., 1807, and Leonard Kellogg, Manlius, 1809; in October of that year went to New York, thence in 1810, to Philadelphia, thence to Washington, Easton, Md., and Boston, Mass., working at the same trade. In March, 1812, led by his success in studying French to think of a profession, he began the study of medicine under Dr. William Gamage of Boston, combining it for a time with work at the composing desk; in October, 1812, joined the U.S. Ship Hornet as captain's clerk and acting surgeon's mate, in which duty he made the famous cruise of the Constitution and Hornet, under Commodore Bainbridge and Capt. Lawrence, to the West Indies and South America, and took part in the action between the Hornet and Peacock, Feb. 24, 1813. Returning to Boston at the end of this cruise, he resumed his medical studies, received in 1815 the degree of M. D. from Harvard University, and after a few months as assistant to the late Dr. John C. Warren of Boston, began practice for himself in that city ; while there was member of the Linnæan Society of New England, Massachusetts Medical Society, Handel and Haydn Society, Howard Benevolent Society, Mass. Lodge F. and A. Masons, President of the Boylston Medical Society, Surgeon of the "Winslow Blues," Physician to the

Boston Dispensary, etc. In December, 1817, he removed to Canandaigua, N. Y., (then a centre of social and professional life for Western New York,) where he held the first place in his profession, in that portion of the State, until his early death. He was an untiring and successful student in medicine and surgery, and in many branches of natural science, on which, while living in Canandaigua, he was a frequent lecturer and recognized authority.\* He was also a musician and composer of considerable merit; many years organist of St. John's Church, Canandaigua, skilled also in the flute, violin and piano-forte, at times teaching on all these; the founder and first President of the "Ontario Handel and Haydn Society," and the "Philosophical Institute of Canandaigua." In 1825, he established, in conjunction with several physicians, a medical school at Auburn, which flourished but a short time, but led finally to the establishment of the Medical Department of Hobart College, afterwards merged in the Buffalo College of Medicine. In 1827, he projected and built a curious railway in Canandaigua, the first in New York, and nearly the first in the United States. + Among his inti-

\* E. g. horse-path on one side. The "rolling stock" or car was substantially on the bicycle principle, but might have three or more wheels (in the same plane) four feet in diameter. From a framework of wood and iron depended on either side the "carriage boxes," (which might be likened either to the body of an Irish jaunting car, or a pair of gigantic saddle-bags); and in these was stored the freight, the transportation of which to and from the steamer on Canandaigua Lake, constituted the chief business of the "road." The wheels were kept in place on the rail, and the load balanced by ingenious mechanism which I have not space to describe here; but the nicety of adjustment required for the latter purpose caused finally the abandonment of the road. That such an experiment was successful even for a time seems strange enough, with our present knowledge of railways.

I have also specifications and estimates for a railway projected the next year, 1828, from Canandaigua to Palmyra, 12 miles, and differing but little from those of this day. The rails were to be of cast-iron, 6 feet long and weighing 82 lbs. A company for the purpose was incorporated by the Legislature of New York, I believe ; but the capital required (\$100,000) was probably more than Canandaigua could furnish, even to connect with the "Erie Canal."

For a detailed account of the above, see "An Early Experiment in Railroads," by the writer, Portland, Me., 1878; and for other notices of Dr. Hayes, "George Edward Hayes, a Memorial," by the same, Buffalo, 1882. His journals from 1809 to 1818 (22 small MS. vols.), and numerous letters in my possession, may furnish material for a fuller account of his life; and the latter, as well as the personal knowledge of many friends, attest the high character he attained, and the personal and professional esteem in which he was held. Educated a Congregationalist, he became on his removal to Canandaigua a constant and devout worshipper in the old St. John's Church, led no doubt partly by his delight in sacred music from childhood. The fine organ (as it was thought then) of the old church was procured chiefly by his efforts (in 1825), and in spite of incessant professional duties, he devoted much time and labour to the work of organist and director of the choir.

Dr. Hayes was a man of fine presence, tall and erect, with dark hair and eyes; very handsome in his younger days, and retaining to the last his bright eyes and ruddy checks, in spite of study and over-work.

S., Baltimore, 1847; one of the earliest Presidents of the Young Men's Association of Buffalo; a founder and President of the Buffalo Society of Natural Sciences; member of the Buffalo Historical Society, of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and of the Royal Society of Northern Antiquaries, of Copenhagen, Denmark; Alderman of the City of Buffalo; Vestryman of St. Paul's Church, of which he was a communicant for fifty years; untiring as a student, especially in natural sciences, to which he was accustomed to devote nearly all which he could call leisure time; a man of high and unsullied character in all the relations of-life, and though retiring and almost secluded in his habits, genial and warm-hearted among his friends, and in many quiet ways a benefactor to those in need. Onehalf of the large property acquired in his half-century's residence in Buffalo, he bequeathed by will to found the "Haves School of Natural Sciences" in that city, providing for a suitable building, professorship and free instruction by lectures, under the direction of the Buffalo Society of Natural Sciences.\*

His father, HELON HAVES, (see p. 96 above,) removed from Granby, Conn., to Chenango County, N. Y., and thence in 1834 to Fowler, O. "Here." says the son, "in 1836, [aet. 18,] I went to work at the trade of carpenter and joiner, in summer and fall, going to school in winter. Learning of the 'far west.' on the 19th of May, 1838, I took stage for Cleveland, and there took a steamboat for Detroit, where I waited two days for the first boat for the Upper Lakes, and landed at Milwaukee in the latter part of May. During this voyage the general suspension of specie payments took place, and most western currency was of little value ; but I was not much troubled, as I had but little of any kind. During this panic, no bank notes were received in payment for Government land except those of the State Bank of Missouri."

He worked "at small wages" near Milwaukee till September; "then hired the mail carrier to haul my trunk to Janesville, on Rock River, and I footed it, there being no way of transportation South, except to go down the River. So I bought an old canoe and slipped down the River, hauling ashore at night, and sometimes not until the dim light in the log cabin on the hill showed its twinkling light in the distance,—its inmates shaking with fever and ague, but always

hospitable. But Northern Illinois was thinly settled, and I could seldom reach a place where I could get anything to eat. There was but one mill-dam to obstruct my craft for 200 miles, which I made in four days, passing Rockford, then in its infancy, now one of the largest agricultural manufacturing cities in the United States. At Dixon (then Dixon Ferry), a growing town, I hauled ashore and worked at my trade (at \$2.50 a day), till I had my first introduction to ague and fever. In November, not being able to work, I went farther South for cheaper board, and at Hendersonville boarded and worked with a farmer till March, 1839, when I left Illinois for Iowa, [then just organized as a territory,] with nothing but what I could carry on my back; crossing the Mississippi at Burlington, and Skunk River at Rome, (a town site with one log cabin on the hill,) thence to Jefferson County on the frontier, part of which was Government land, and the rest belonged to the Indians. Of this, Keokuk County, there was but a part of three townships belonging to the United States. Four families had settled here a little before me, (Aaron Hill, two Bennetts, and J. B. Brown,) and made up the whole white population. This was in March, 1839, and here I I had Indians as neighbours until May, 1843; built a mill on the river; am still. was elected the first Sheriff of the county ; have three farms, 544 acres in all, with good buildings, and am engaged in stock-raising ; three railroads now run across or along my farms, and two others cross the county."

In 1858, he was chosen to his first public office, that of City Solicitor of Cincinnati, which he held till the breaking out of the Civil War in 1861, when he entered the U.S. service as Major of the 23d Ohio Volunteers, (declining a Colonel's commission,) and fought his first battle at Carnifex Ferry, W. Va., Sept. 10. From this time he was in active and severe service during every year of the war, and in many of the battles and victories which make up the history of those stirring times, not to be repeated here. South Mountain, (Sept. 14, 1862,) while leading his regiment in a successful charge, he was severely wounded, but soon rejoined the regiment as its Colonel, and in the following year took part in the pursuit and capture of the Confederate leader Morgan, on the border of Ohio; commanded a brigade that year, and a division in 1864; was four times wounded, and had four horses shot under him; promoted Brigadier-General, "to date from the battle of Cedar Creek, Oct. 19, 1864, for gallant and meritorious services at Opequan, Fisher's Hill, and Cedar Creek"; and in March, 1865, promoted Major-General by brevet. In Nov. 1864, he was elected to Congress from Ohio, but continued with the army to the close of the war, resigning June 9, 1865. He served in the House of Representatives with great credit and usefulness, and with special integrity and faithfulness to the public interests, till 1867, when he was chosen Governor of Ohio. He was elected Governor again in 1869, and in 1873, declining an important Federal appointment, returned to Fremont, where, in the following year he inherited the estate of his uncle Sardis Birchard, including his present home. In 1875 he was chosen Governor of his native State for the third time. In this office he exerted himself specially and successfully in behalf of the developement of common-school education, civil-service reform, public charities, especially the soldiers' homes, and the geological survey of the State. In July, 1876, he received the nomination of the National Republican Convention for President, and in the following February, after a contest protracted beyond all precedent in our history, was declared by the special electoral commission duly elected as Nineteenth President of the United States.

In his inaugural address, President Hayes repeated the emphatic declarations made in accepting the Republican nomination, on the principles of reform of the civil service, full recognition of the equal rights of all the States of the Union, without regard to the part which they had taken in the Civil War, liberal and permanent provision for common-school education in every part of the country, and, in fine, supreme regard for all national rather than party interests. His administration was acknowledged by candid men of all parties to be an honest and earnest endeavour to carry these principles into practice, and to have made the pathway to needed reforms much easier for his successors. In some of his most important measures, for the conciliation of the Southern States, the civil service reform, and the resumption of specie payments, he was not sustained by the extreme men, or the mere politicians of his own party. Whatever judgment future years may pronounce upon the policy and ability of his administration, it will not be doubted that in personal and official uprightness of character, he honoured his office, his country, and his name.

Besides his efforts in behalf of general education, President Hayes has given much attention, from early life, to literary and historical studies; was an early member of the "Literary Club" of Cincinnati, an association then and afterwards numbering many eminent names; was one of the founders, and Corresponding Secretary, of the Ohio Historical Society, honorary Vice-President of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, and corresponding member of various historical and literary societies in other States; LL.D. from Kenyon, 1868, Harvard, 1877, Yale and Johns Hopkins, 1880; and while in Congress effected muchneeded improvement as a member of the Committee on the Congressional Library. He is still busy, at his quiet home, in educational and charitable work; is President of the National Prison Reform Association, and of the "John F. Slater Fund" for educating freedmen; Trustee of the Peabody Educational Fund; at the head of the Ohio Commandery of the Loyal Legion, and in many soldiers' and other organizations.



graduated in Theology at Oberlin, O., 1863, A. M. the same year. On the breaking out of the Civil War, he enlisted in the U.S. Service as a private, April 16, 1861, in a company of Ohio Volunteers, which elected him its Captain; but the State quota being full, he did not actually serve until the next year, when he was commissioned Captain in the 103d Ohio, of a company recruited by himself. He was promoted as Lieut.-Colonel and Colonel of his Regiment, and Brigadier-General by brevet "for gallant and meritorious conduct on the field of battle;" took part in the East Tennessee campaign of 1863, and in several battles in and about Knoxville during the siege by Gen. After the defeat of Hood's army, Gen. Hayes went with the 23d army corps to Fort Fisher, N. C., and was present at the capture of Wilmington and Raleigh, and the surrender of Gen. Johnston, remaining in the service until the close of the war. In 1876 he was elected Representative in U. S. Congress from Illinois, and again in 1878, serving in all four years. Since then he has been occupied as a journalist, and is at this time (March, 1884) editor and publisher of the Morris Herald (Hayes and Fletcher), Morris, Ill.

No friendlier or sweeter soul ever left a world which had not spoiled him; to the day of his death he lived the intense and innocent life of youth, carrying into his ripe age the cordial goodwill and the hopeful cheer of his boyhood. He was impatient of nothing but uselessness and unkindness; he was always busy, and always helpful, especially to the friendless and needy; a public-spirited citizen, who rejoiced in every duty to his neighbours and his country. From time to time he was a writer for the press, and in 1873 was editor of the Boston Daily News. But it was as a man of affairs that he was best known, until his daily beneficence made a still wider circle acquainted with him."

Mr. Noyes was greatly interested in family history, and I am indebted to him for much assistance and many valuable notes in the present work, our correspondence beginning in 1876. His widow now resides at Hyde Park, Ill. Their youngest daughter, Mary Louisa, d after long illness, at Hyde Park, Sept. 16, 1883.

<sup>&</sup>quot;As to the tradition of the 'Boston Tea Party,' there can be nothing in it, for he was then a student at Yale, and I doubt if he was ever in Boston. He did not die while *in the act* of preaching; but the people were assembling, and he was preparing to leave his house, but was struck down with paralysis, and I think died the same day. It is said that he first saw his wife, Mary Bliss, in the congregation at Wilbraham, while exchanging with the minister there, and

was much struck with her appearance. They were undoubtedly married at Wilbraham. The old house where her father Oliver Bliss lived, is still in that family, some two miles north of the village, on Springfield Mountain."

"Soon after his marriage, my grandfather built the large house opposite the South Hadley church, where he ever after lived, and where his children and many of his children's children were born. It is now occupied by my cousin G. Morgan Smith. On a small salary, my grandfather gave his children a good education, which he considered of more worth to them than money or fame. His portrait, in my possession, represents him as some 60 or 70 years of age, with "iron-gray" hair combed smoothly down on his forehead, and wearing "bands :" the face is large, and has a benevolent smile. My grandmother is represented with a large cap rising behind and fully covering her head ; she has black eyes and a bright, pleasant face. She had to bear her husband's burdens somewhat in his later years of depression, from the death of a daughter (Harriet) who was then teaching at St. Albans, Vt. and from other causes. My cousin Mrs. Shields, of Nashville, Tenn, has exact duplicates of the portraits, probably by the same artist, William Collins, who was esteemed a fine painter in his day.

"MAY 9, 1781. The MEMORIAL of LUCRETIA JEWETT, of Lyme, (Conn.,) humbly sheweth, that her late husband, Capt. JOSEPH JEWETT, went into the Continental Service, in the defence of this and the rest of the United States, and, in 1776, was captivated on Long Island, and was soon after inhumanely murthered or put to death by our barbarous and cruel enemy, leaving your memorialist with a large family of small children, nine in number, the oldest of which, being a daughter, on the sudden and shocking news of the captivity and murder of her father, was flung into fits of falling sickness, of which sickness she still languishes, and has been and still is a great cost and charge." This was Lucy, who soon after, however, m. David Miner, and d. 1784, leaving a son William, merchant in Charleston, S. C., d. there unm. (Hyde Geneal.) After speaking of the debts of the estate, the memorial proceeds :- "Your memorialist is left to bring up and support said children on the freehold only, and great part of that in lands unim-proved, and of burdensome Taxes, of which Thirty one pounds, fourteen shil-lings is due, more than she can any way pay"; and adds : " The heirs or chil-dren of your memorialist, being all still minors under age, except the aforesaid daughter, who is rendered almost insane by reason of the aforesaid disorder; therefore, your memorialist humbly prays your honours to take her unhappy case into your consideration, and grant her an abatement of said taxes, or that some suitable person may be appointed to make sale of so much lands as to discharge said rates, or in some other way grant relief, as your honours in your wisdom may think best ; and your memorialist as in duty bound will ever pray."

#### She was allowed to sell the lands.

"RowLEY, Mass., is an interesting old farming town, showing in the village a plain, level surface and a triangular common, bordered by shade trees. The objects of interest are Prospect Hill, which is said to be the highest land in the county, commanding a view of much magnificence and great extent; the ancient JEWETT house, a couple of centuries old, or thereabouts, where lived the early settlers of that name, and in one of whose rooms is, or was the veritable old clock,

with its long pendulum still marking off the time as in days of yore; and the ancient burial ground, coeval with the settlement of the town, and always visited by pensive ramblers and people of a genealogical turn. The ground was laid out in 1639, and has been enlarged three times since that period."\*

Patterson<sup>6</sup> for the following vivid sketch of early pioneer life, in a letter from her mother, Mrs. Skinner, to her grandchildren, March 30, 1842.

"My DEAR GRANDCHILDREN: I am going to write a story for your amusement. But you must not expect a learned essay, for I did not have the advan-tages in my youthful days, that young people now enjoy. When I was about twelve years of age, my father moved into the woods, where there was no school; and previous to that time, I was kept at home in the spring of the year, to spin tow, and a part of the summer, to spin wool. Little girls in those days used to spin when they were so small that it was necessary to lay a board upon a block to walk upon. Well, when the spinning was all done, I must stay at home washing days, to tend the baby, and 'do chores.' Yet my Father used to say that he intended to send his girls to school in the winter season until they were fifteen years old. What an education I should have had, if nothing had happened to pre-ent it ! But something did happen ; my Father sold his farm in Connecticut, and moved way up into the Genesee Country ; as much of an undertaking in those days, as it is to go to California now. Well, my Father made, or helped to make, a large stout covered wagon, (my Father could do almost any kind of work,) then voked up two pairs of oxen, and hitched them to the wagon, with a stout horse in front. Then his family, with their clothing, bedding, and as many other things as well could be, were snugly packed into the wagon, and early in the month of April, we started for the 'far west.' We were twenty-one days on the road, but arrived the first of May, [1805,] safe and sound. Well, my Father and his hired man commenced cutting down the trees, and soon had logs enough for a log cabin, which were put together, with the assistance of our neighbours, in such a manner as to make a comfortable summer residence. But the cold weather set in early, before Father had plastered up the holes between the logs, so that our house presented a somewhat picturesque appearance on the outside, in the long winter evenings, resembling a large lantern; very cheering, perhaps, to the weary travellers in the wilderness, though not ex-actly pleasant for the occupants within ; for if the light had free egress from the large pile of wood burning at one end of the house, the wind and snow were just as free to come in through every crack or crevice, without consulting our convenience in the least. Indeed, we were obliged to receive our stormy visitors, at any time when they came along; sometimes when I awoke in the morning, the snow would be two or three inches deep on the top of my bed, and when we came to the 'slicking up,' we would gather a heap, I assure you. Yet if we were encumbered at times, we sustained no real injury ; for I have heard Mother say that her family never enjoyed better health than they did that winter. And if we could not attend school, we found something to do; or rather, our parents

found work enough for us to keep us out of mischief the most of the time. They used to buy cotton wool, and paid as much for the wool, by the pound, as we pay for cheap cotton cloth now. (We could not keep sheep the first year or two.) Mother would card the cotton for us until my sister and I learned to do it for which Father made. The second summer, I think, my Father raised a crop of flax, and soon after, he procured a flock of sheep; and what bunches of yarn were hanging up against the sides of our house! Log houses are *handy* things; we could drive up nails or pegs anywhere without fear of damaging the walls : and if I had one quarter of the yarn that I have seen hanging up in that log house, I should not be afraid of being out of knitting work before I was seventy. I soon learned to weave, and liked the business well; I have woven ten yards in a day of strong coarse cloth, and I have worked just as faithfully and had but two done at the close of the day, when the yarn was fine and tender. We used to spin and weave our sheets, pillow-cases, bed-ticking, table-linen, towels, bags, and our wearing apparel, excepting our Sunday gear. And we were careful to change our dresses when we came home from meeting or visiting. (We did not visit on the Sabbath; O no, people were very strict in those days.) Yes, we changed our dresses when we got home, albeit they were made of calico. I kept a calico dress three years, before it was washed, and without having it badly soiled, either; but times change, and folks change too, even your old Grandmother, for a dress that was made up new for her three months since has already been washed. But I would not have you suppose that there was nothing better than calico worn in those days. Some of the ladies had silk dresses which they had brought from 'down East;' and one young lady of my acquaintance had three, one lead-color, one blue and red, changeable, and one black; but she was a rich man's daughter.\* The men and boys wore homespun altogether, with the exception perhaps of a vest, fine shirt and neckcloth, when they were going to Church, did I say ! That is a mistake, as far as relates to the building; church for Divine service was performed in a barn which was built by one of the first settlers, near the site of the present village. . . We lived three and a half miles from the place of worship, and that distance we used to walk when the weather would admit; but in the winter, Father would yoke up his oxen and hitch them to the sled, and we would ride to ' meeting ' in as good style as our neighbours. We did not stay at home because the weather was unpleasant. half as often as people do now-a-days. And it was so pleasant to ramble in the woods, gathering wild flowers in the summer and nuts in the fall. There were lots of beech-nuts, so many that the hogs grew fat upon them; and the cattle ran in the woods in the summer, living upon leaves and twigs. But in the winter before the land was cleared up so that the farmers could raise hay to keep their stock on, the men would cut down trees enough for the cattle to browse on, and when the snow was very deep, they would shovel a path around the trees, and the cattle would eat the young twigs, and live so through the winter. I believe that horses could not live so, as we had none at that time. A mile from our house was a deep gully, which was a place of resort for the wolves; we often heard them howl there at night, and were once sadly frightened when picking berries in that neighbourhood by what we imagined was a wolf in pursuit of us.

"As soon as my Father could keep a horse, he purchased one; and being a mechanic, he made a cutter. But how to procure a harness was the difficulty. There was no harness-maker, and, I believe no tanner in town at that time; and my parents were not rich, and money was scarce. But it happened that Mother had some stout woolen yarn that she had prepared for a coverlid. She commenced weaving it into tape just wide enough for leading lines. (It was customary, by the way, for farmers' wives or daughters to weave tape for apron strings, &c., and it was pretty, too, when made of fine linen thread.) Two

strips of tape were sewed together, to make it wide enough for collars. bands, &c. Then those strips were doubled and stitched together, and with the addition of some small pieces of leather, and a few buckles, rings and hooks, a good substantial harness was soon completed; and it was a 'dashy' one, too. The yarn being black and red, and intermixed when woven, resembled webbing, such as is used for saddle-girths. We were rather proud of it, and it created quite a sensation, when Father drove to some neighbouring town. Some one called it the 'Presbyterian harness,' and it ever after bore that name. Well, it answered our purpose, just as well as a fifty dollar harness would have done; and corresponded better with the times, when log houses and stumps were seen in every clearing. And many were the rides we had to meetings, singing-schools, and other places, in those good old times, ere the 'Presbyterian harness' was thrown aside. You will wonder, perhaps, if folks had anything in those days that they did not make themselves. Not many things, I assure you. I had a muff and tippet, which I helped to make, of the fur of the black squirrel. Squirrels as well as larger game were plenty then. We were supplied with venison by the Indians, who came into the settlement every fall, for many years, and spent the greater part of the winter in hunting, while their squaws were busy in preparing meat for their future subsistence, or making brooms or baskets to sell for bread.

"At this period of our history, my Father had 50 acres of land under cultivation [near Prattsburgh], with a young orchard and small framed house on the farm. But not being exactly pleased with the country, he sold his farm and removed to Canandaigua, about four miles from the village, and in the next spring I was installed as teacher of the school in our neighbourhood, and might be daily seen surrounded by a number of rosy-faced urchins, some learning their A B C's, some conning their lessons, while others were making black marks on paper, resembling pot-hooks. I had a pleasant school, and the summer passed away without anything of importance taking place; but in the autumn, one of the most important events of my life transpired.

"It was October, [1812,] and some of our friends from other towns were assembled at our house for a social visit, anticipating a merry time, perhaps ; when a young gentleman took me by the hand, and led me to a conspicuous place. What he was going to do or say, I cannot tell ; being somewhat abashed at his boldness. Just then an old gentleman who had noticed us, addressed us in a very solemn manner a few moments ; perhaps I trembled, but I did not run away, but stood listening to his words ; when just as he concluded,—O how can I write it,—he pronounced us man and wife."

A curious instance of family interest and co-operation in the father's work. Recalling the note of the Rev. Isaac Jennings, on p. 92, above, one cannot doubt that the mother also had her full share in it.\*

64. P. 201. The following note is partly in answer to frequent inquiries in the innumerable letters called forth by this work, but mainly for the satisfaction of my own children and those who may come after *them*.

CHARLES WELLS and ROBERT PLINY HAYES were born (the former March 19, 1828, the latter Feb. 25, 1831,) in a (three-story brick) house then standing on the present site of the Congregational Vestry, Main St., Canandaigua. From this house the death of the father and mother, in 1831, transferred the two children to the care of their mother's father (Dr. Richard Wells q. v. p. 135, above) and sisters, in their delightful village home with its "eight acre farm," on Bristol Street. Long before this, and, in excess of a prevailing fashion of those days, before I could speak, I had begun, at an "infant school," a process of "education" hardly interrupted for twenty-one years. In 1837 we both entered Canandaigua Academy, an endowed school then of great repute, with some two hundred men and boy pupils from far and near; our principal teacher being Mr. George Willson, who in 1842 succeeded our cousin Byron Hayes (q. v. p. 145, above) as our guardian. I remained here eight years, R. P. H. ten. The death of our grandfather, Sept. 12, 1841, broke up our second happy home, and from that time we were for several years under the sole care (more devoted and loving than any pen can record) of our mother's eldest surviving sister, Maria H. Wells. At Canandaigua Academy we got most of our Latin, French and mathematics, and not much Greek. In 1845 I entered Hobart (then Geneva) College (under the Presidency of that prince among men in character and attainments, the Rev. Dr. Benjamin Hale); in 1847 went with R. P. H. to Brown University (where he graduated), but re-

turned the next year to Hobart, and graduated B. A. 1849, M. A. 1852.

Baptized in the old Protestant Episcopal Church of St. John, Canandaigua,\* (Aug. 29, 1830, by the Rev. Ravand Kearney, Rector) and trained up from infancy in "Church ways," it was my desire from early childhood to become a clergyman, a purpose never changed, except, for a short time in 1848, in favour of my father's profession of medicine. I was admitted candidate for Holy Orders by the Bishop (DeLancey) of Western New York, Aug. 14, 1849, and after spending a winter in North Carolina (with my mother's cousin, the late Judge Boyden, of Salisbury) returned to Geneva, resuming my college rooms, and completing the Divinity course under the general and personal direction of Bishop DeLancey, our chief instructor being the Rev. Dr. William D. Wilson, now Registrar and Professor of Moral and Intellectual Philosophy in Cornell University. In this miniature Divinity School were the present Bishops of Minnesota, Maine and Wisconsin, the Rev. Drs. Paret of Washington, Clarke of Syracuse, and Gibson of Utica, and others who have since become well-known in the Church; Bp. Neely and Dr. Paret being also my college classmates, and (Deo gratias) dear friends for many years since. I was ordained Deacon July 2, 1852, in Trinity Church, Geneva, by the Bp. (Chase) of New Hampshire (acting for Bp. DeLancey), and Priest, June 28, 1853, in St. Paul's Church, Rochester, by the Bp. (DeL.) of Western New York; was in charge, in that Diocese, of St. Mark's Church, Newark, Sept. 19, 1852, to March 26, 1854, as Rector and Missionary; of St. Thomas' Church, Hamilton, April, 1854, to May, 1855; Trinity Church, Fayetteville, and St. Mark's Church, Jamesville, May, 1855, to May, 1857; St. Stephen's Church, New Hartford, July 17, 1857, to Aug. 30, 1863; and St. Paul's Church, Holland Patent (including Trenton), Aug. 16, 1863, to April 9, 1867; in all these, except New Hartford, serving also as Missionary, and while there, organizing

St. James' Church, Clinton, where I held frequent services; making in all about fifteen years' duty in the Diocese up to 1867. During the last ten of these years, 1857 to 1867, I was Assistant Secretary of the Diocese, and in 1866–7 Acting Secretary; and during several previous years Examiner and Recording Secretary of the Associate Alumni of Hobart College.

In July, 1865, while at Holland Patent, I declined an appointment by the late Bishop (Whitehouse) of Illinois, as his Chaplain and to the charge of the Cathedral, Chicago; but in February, 1867, accepted a similar appointment from the present Bishop (Neely) of Maine, (my classmate and dearest friend, as above noted,) and removed in the following April to Portland, Me., remaining as his Chaplain thirteen years, from April 1, 1867, to May 23, 1880, in the parochial charge, under him, of the Cathedral, and from 1869 (Jan. 4) the first Resident Canon. In 1868 I was elected Secretary of the Diocese; afterwards Registrar, member and President of the Standing Committee, Examining Chaplain,\* Trustee of the General Theological Seminary, and Deputy to the General Convention (1877), holding these offices, except the last, during all or nearly all my residence in Maine. This thirteen years included the beginning (1867), completion and consecration (1877) of the Cathedral in Portland, and the entire re-organization of the general work and canon law of the Diocese, in all of which I was permitted to take an active part; for seven years, also, (from 1872) editing the Diocesan paper, the North East. † It was also my privilege to receive and decline, twice in each case, a general missionary appointment from the late Bp. (Armitage) of Wisconsin, and the Society for the Increase of the Ministry.

† I record also that I took part at Portland, Feb. r, 1870, with the Bishop and the Rev. J. J. Harrison, Chaplain of H. M. S. *Monarch*, in the services at the reception of the remains of GEORGE PEABODY—perhaps the most impressive and imposing funeral ceremonies ever witnessed in this country.

In May, 1880, accepting an election to the charge of St. Peter's Church, Westfield, I returned to Western New York, becoming Rector of St. Peter's May 23; in the following year was appointed Assistant Secretary of the Diocese, and in 1883 member of the Standing Committee, and of the Committee on Canons.

Beginning in 1848, under President Hale, the study of Ecclesiastical Architecture, I was for many years called upon frequently for designs and working drawings for churches (usually for interiors and furniture) in Western New York, and must have made between six and seven hundred of these before going to Maine in 1867. I was a regular and frequent contributor to the old Gospel Messenger, the (old) Churchman, the Church Monthly, and other periodicals, on this subject, and also on church music, diocesan organization and work, and other ecclesiastical subjects; and I think was foremost in the organization of the "Oneida Convocation" of the Diocese of Western New York in 1858, and prepared in 1866 the report to that body on the erection of a new See from the eastern counties of the Diocese, afterwards adopted unanimously by its clergy and laity, but too far in advance of its day to have been made as yet the basis of any positive action. I published in 1859 the New Parish Register, which after a quarter of a century is still in general, perhaps exclusive, use throughout the Church in the United States; and afterwards various instrumenta in parish work, music, &c., hardly worth cataloguing here; the most successful of all, the Rose of Sharon and Exeter Te Deums, being merely adaptations of old music.\*

As I cannot remember the time when I was *not* interested in history (especially American history), biography and genealogy, it was natural that I should make my first essay in these subjects when a schoolboy, I think in 1845, and next at Brown Uni-

versity in 1847-8; happily, however, attempting nothing in print till many years later. In 1872 I was elected a member, and in 1874 Corresponding Secretary, of the Maine Historical Society; and in the autumn of the latter year my attention was turned again to family history by the request of a cousin, Mrs. Robert Mathews, to fill up some entries in the Wells family Bible. The result was a prolonged study and labour, including journeys to old homes of my mother's family, and a correspondence which only genealogists can appreciate, extending over four years, and ending in the printing of a volume of 300 pp., 8vo., "William Wells of Southold and His Descendants, A. D. 1638 to 1878." During this time I wrote for the amusement of my children, and printed in The North East, and afterwards in a little volume, the story of Daniel Hayes' captivity (somewhat enlarged and embellished, but substantially as quoted from Phelps on p. 8, above), under the title of "A Long Journey" (1876). I became in September, 1876, a member of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, and on returning to Western New York in 1880, and resigning membership in both that and the Maine Historical Society, was elected a Corresponding Member of both; in 1881 of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin; in 1883 of the Buffalo Historical Society; and in 1884 of the Webster Historical Society.

I should be untrue to myself, did I end this long note without an expression of thankfulness to Almighty God for the loving kindness and mercy which have followed me all the days of my life; a life whose every year has been full of blessing; begun and to this day continued in the untold happiness of a loving Christian home; a life whose occupations, surroundings, friends and opportunities of study and culture have left hardly anything to desire as far as external circumstances are concerned, and only my own faults, errors and failures to regret.

65. P. 204. ROBERT PLINY HAYES<sup>6</sup> was graduated at Brown University, as stated above, in 1851, a much better scholar than his brother, especially in mathematics, and fitted to excel in civil engineering, which, however, he relinquished for a partnership with his college classmate, John Norris, Jr., of Bristol, R. I., in the manufacture of oakum in that place. This partnership was dissolved in 1855, and my brother then entered the service of the United States Express Company,\* as the one clerk (instead of some thirty as now) of the Auditing Office in Buffalo, and the same year became the Auditor of the Company, a position which he still holds (1884). Of his twenty-eight years' life in Buffalo I am not at liberty to say more than that it was an active, successful and useful one, in many business and social relations, and left many warm friends to regret his recent removal to New York. There—in Buffalo—he was twice happily married, and twice the home thus formed has been saddened and broken by long illness and death.

Mrs. Hayes was a bright example of life, both in her own home, in society, and in Christian work, in all which her force of character, culture and refinement, her sympathy and energy made her a leader and benefactor. She was ready "to minister and to serve wherever there was work to be done for the Master," and alike in life and health, sickness and death, she proved herself a "good and faithful servant."

# HAYES FAMILIES IN AMERICA.

HAVE thought it worth while to give under this head, some brief notices of families of the name of HAVES, of earlier or later settlement in this country, but without any traceable connection with GEORGE HAVES of Windsor. Some have been published elsewhere; others have come into my hands in gathering materials for this history. They may possibly be of some use to future genealogists of the name. I. In the Lists of Passengers for America, transcribed

from MSS. in the Rolls Office, London, by the late Samuel G. Drake of Boston, and printed in the New England Historical and Genealogical Register, XIV. 348–9, I find :--

In the *Hopewell* for the Barbadoes 17 Februarij 1634 John Haies 30.

In the *Paul* of London for St. Christopher's 3 Aprilis 1635 Will<sup>m</sup> Haies 24.

2. THOMAS HAVES of Milford, Conn., 1645, came from Wethersfield (whence Milford was settled in 1639), and was in all probability the father of Serg't Thomas of the same, who m. Milford, Oct. 29, 1677, Elizabeth, dau. of Joseph Peck, and in 1696 was in Newark, N. J., Assessor, and again in 1702. Serg't Thomas had three sons, Robert, Joseph and Thomas, the two latter by a second wife, dau. of Robert Denison of Newark. Robert d. s. p.; the others left desc. in Newark. Joseph had David (who m. and had 5 s. 5 daus.), Samuel (m. Sarah Bruen, had 2 s. 3 daus.), Joseph and Martha (both d. s. p.); the 2d son, Maj. Samuel, served with distinction in the Revolutionary Army, and d. June 1, 1811, aet. 83.\*

"This Bill Byndeth me Thomas Olcott, of Hartford, in New England, to pay or cause to be paid unto Mr. JACOB HAVES, of Manatoes, the Sum of six thousand eight hundred and sixty pounds of good Virginiah Tobaccko, such as Dutchmen do take, some time in December next, in some convenient places either at Nansemond or Newbert's Newes, and in witness whereof I have set my hand, (the said Thomas Olcott is to allowe half the casck and the said Jacob Hayes is to pay for the other half,) this 19th of July, 1650.
