**(Statement re Gedeon and Abraham Merlet made at the
above service by C. L. Marlatt:)**

Two additional Huguenot immigrants have recently been honored by having their names recorded in this edifice, namely Gedeon Merlet and his youngest son, Abraham.

Gedeon Merlet was one of many Huguenots who found refuge from religious persecution in Holland during the first half of the 17th century. Under the promise of lands and aid in getting started in the New World, he with some twenty-nine other refugees came over to the New Netherlands in October, 1662, on the ship "Purmerland Church". With him were his wife and four minor sons, namely Joshua, born 1647; Paul born 1654; John, born 1656 and Abraham, born 1658.

Early in the year following his arrival, 1663, Gedeon Merlet, with six other Huguenot immigrants, joined in a petition to the Director General and the Council of New Netherlands for grants of suitable land, provision for temporary subsistence, and seed grain so that, as they stated, "the supplicants may exert their industry and zeal without obstruction in the cultivation of the land, not only for their personal benefit, but also for the welfare and good of the whole country." They also promised ultimately to fully repay the Council for such advances.

This petition, the original of which is now on file in the State archives at Albany, was approved, and in the instance of Gedeon Merlet resulted in the assignment of land to himself and his sons in Staten Island, much of it in the vicinity and possibly covering the site of this Church edifice. Here he lived the balance of his life, and his children grew to manhood.

The fragments of the history of this period which have come down to us, in addition to records of land purchases and transfers, indicate that Gedeon Merlet, during the first British occupancy of New Netherlands, was appointed by Governor Francis Lovelace as a constable in Staten Island - (April 20, 1671). A little later, under the very brief re-occupancy of the Colony by the Dutch, he was appointed by Governor Coive as a magistrate (February 14, 1674). We have no record of his death, which must have occurred prior to 1683, as indicated by the inheritance and division of his land.

Gedeon's youngest son, Abraham, through whom my family is descended, married about 1677 Christence Billieu, daughter of Pierre Billieu - a Huguenot immigrant of 1661 and prominent in the early settlement of Staten Island. Two children came from this union, viz., Margaret, baptized March 31, 1678 and Abraham May 16, 1680.

We have little information as to Abraham, the youngest son of Gedeon, except that he was for a period Collector for the southern part of Staten Island.

The name of Merlet very soon lost its French pronunciation and spelling, changing to Marlet, Marlett and Marlatt, with many other spellings.

From this beginning the Marlatt family has multiplied and spread widely in the United States and Canada.

Mention may appropriately be made here of a descendant of Gedeon Merlet who made a long and earnest attempt to trace and recover the records of the family, namely Mrs. Jane Marlett Taft, wife of the late Chief Justice of Vermont, Russell S. Taft. Unfortunately she did not live to complete her work, but her manuscript is now in my possession, and if not utilized and published, will be filed for permanent record in the Library of Congress in Washington, to be available for future students.

THE WAREHAM (WHELET) FAMILY.

PREFACE: The following is a list of the principal
works of the Wareham family.

In pursuing my study of the Wareham (Whelet) Family, I
have made but slight investigation in France, the country in which
it is first seen, the above spelling, Wareham, seems to have been
the original form used at the present, Gideon Wareham when he
came over from Lyden to New Amsterdam in 1630.

In communication with M. Leon Pigeot, (Licencié en lettres,
résidant à 16 rue Souffler-à-Prince, Paris, France) I have received the following information which
is essential to the present subject of the Wareham family.

"On receipt of your letter dated Dec. 10, 1901, I
made some preliminary researches in the Archives
in this regard:-

Wareham (Whelet) Professor of Theology at the Lycée de
St-Germain (Paris), a writer, was born in Paris, October 7, 1828;
he was educated at the Collège St-Basile (Catholique) and received
his degree in 1851. (I have these documents translated
into English above written across p. 5.)

His brother, Charles H. Wareham, was born in
St-Germain de la Chapelle, Paris, in 1830. He was educated
(Seine St-Denis) and received his degree in 1851.

THE MAILLET (MELLET) FAMILY.

His nephew M. Mellet is a member of the Académie des Sciences et belles-lettres, département of Eure et Loire at Chartres.

This family is throughout Catholic and does not appear to have had protestant ancestors.

NOTE 1,- In the separation of families during the reformation it would seem more than probable that descendants would in France at the present period and descendants of the Huguenot emigrants would trace back to a common Catholic ancestry.

It is perhaps, originally from Beauce (a country of the principal cities were Dreux, Chartres, Chateaudun, extends over four present departments,- Eure et Loire, Loire et Cher, Loiret, Seine et Oise.

Another M. Mellet is mentioned in the history of the département of Eure et Loire and lives in Paris, where Lamiel Mellet is a diminutive of Mellet (Latin, Melis) Mellet, orchard.

According to the book of heraldry, "The armorial titles of Mellets in Brittain, Normandy, Gascony, and France &c. &c."

NOTE 2,- An investigation in the case of Mellet would be interesting and perhaps profitable.

FOREWORD.

The notes and records in this volume relate principally, to that family, in the United States and Canada first known as Mellet or Mallett, and at the present period as Marlett and Mar-latt'.

So far as I can discover, no former effort has been made to gather records under this name, and for that reason I am the more desirous that the results of many years labor on my part shall be preserved for the use of those who in the future may find the interest and opportunity to continue the work.

Thus early I would like to acknowledge my indebtedness for the interest, and, in many cases, enthusiasm with which various descendants in the different branches have seconded my efforts in collecting records and information from their kinsfolk, as this assistance has contributed much to the value of value these pages may contain for descendants in present or future generations.

The records which I have collected in recent generations are of such families as may claim descent from two distinct emigrants, viz:-

1. Gedeon Marlet, a Huguenot who came over Holland in the ship *Burmerian* Charon in Oct. 1688, accompanied with his wife and four children - Joseph (or Josias) 13, Paul (or Paulus), John (Jean) C, Elizabeth, and several other children, who landed at New Amsterdam. (See *Records of the City of New York*, 1688, pp. 616-617, and six others of the same voyage, as petitioned for "land", and

-PREFACE-

A study of the various changes in spelling from the original names of our early immigrants to America will reveal some interesting facts.

Many such changes occurred without a conscious intention, sometimes, perhaps, through illiteracy on the part of the keepers of records or through their efforts to reconcile the spelling with the pronunciation as given them, the name and subject often being of a somewhat doubtful nature. This applies more seriously to the early records outside New England.

In the present volume records have been obtained to original records the exact spelling of names in such records is assured, but it is well known that the first, both printed and manuscript even when officially ordered, are sometimes occasionally unreliable, either through error or through substitution, without explanation, of a name for another of the same sound.

NOTE:- The little volume "Swallow" contains some records from 1603 to 1705 (Book 1.) of the name "Swallow", in modern form, which is the only record in value to determine the reproduction of the original of the name "Swallow" and not necessarily to the "Swallow".

As will be seen, the name of our first known ancestor in France and Holland, as well as under Dutch influence following the emigration to New York in October 1603 to 1671, is "Swallow". This word is considered to be derived from the European blackbird or thrush.

THE WARETT FAMILY.

It is significant that the original transcription of our immigrant ancestors autograph attached to the petition for lands, etc., in 1663, is given as "Gedeon Werlet" - identical with the ancient form of his surname as used in France. Hereafter, - with one exception (see page) until early in the 18th century, Werlet or W'rlett, principally the latter, were the accepted forms in New York and New Jersey, the only localities outside of Staten Island where the name appears, until later migrations occurred to more remote sections.

In the year 1664 the Dutch settlements, which had long been under English influence, together with the remainder of that part, fell under British rule and the Dutch names New York, New Jersey, etc., adopted and the Dutch names of the Netherlands, the Netherlands, etc., were discontinued. The change in the spelling of the name from Werlet to W'rlett, have arisen from its French pronunciation, as the sound of e in words, from which Werlet is derived, is indicated in French by the sound of è in mark, etc., or from the English pronunciation of e in words, or words e-l-s-r-a, h-e-r-b-e-y, s-a-r-r-e-a-n-t, viz: - Al-r, Dar-r, and a-r-r-e-a-n-t- the latter words are the names of the three rivers at present.

In the original or correct pronunciation of the name the accent is placed on the first syllable, thus - W'r-lett,

As a possible and reasonable explanation of the adoption of "W'rlett" I have the suggestion of the name Werlet, research into the name Werlet in the Netherlands, that it is a Dutch name

in New York and New Jersey, commonly pronounced the name 'Marlett', hardly recognizing the first syllable. For the account for the various spellings in the old Dutch records, viz:- Millett, Melatt, Polatt, Malatt and retaining the r -orlett and Marlatt.

The two forms Mar'-lett and Mar'-latt' are those principally used at present by descendants of Gideon Marlett of Staten Island, the former, Marlett, being more generally retained by descendants of those who remained in eastern New York and New Jersey, etc., and Marlatt by descendants of those who soon passed on to western New Jersey, Virginia and further north and west.

The descendants of Gerdoin Marlet ("Major Gerdoin Marlet," p. 24) who removed from Philadelphia to Canada soon after his emigration from France, never seem to have deviated in their branch from the present form, viz:- "Marlet".

In my own branch I have been afforded interesting opportunities for investigation of the name through interviews with the older living descendants and old documents, records, etc. in their possession. As far as possible and perhaps probable confirmation of the later change from Mar'-lett to Mar'-latt', through Dutch influence, I was told by a daughter of Gideon Marlett (John, Thos., Abraham, Abraham, Gideon) that her great-great grandfather (her grandfather) died, by 1785, himself used the earlier spelling, - Marlett'.

This would complete the evidence in this line down to the present generation, that, with the single exception of Gideon's son Gideon, born 1747 and who married a Dutch wife, the Dutch influence,

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"MARLETT".- A recent innovation and now it came to be adopted.

A number of years previous to my translating this work, (somewhere about 1860) my father's eldest brother related to me the following incident.- At one time while visiting the city of New York, and receiving his mail at the general delivery of the post office, he accidentally discovered that a gentleman from Delaware standing near him was also receiving his mail at of the same name. This circumstance naturally led to some conversation on the subject. Some of the stranger's traditions including the coming of the usual "four brothers" has been cursorily verified by investigation. He also stated to have been nearly accurate in their locations, or at least in the locations of their near descendants, viz:- that two settled in New Jersey, one in New Hampshire (or was it Conn.?) and one in lower Canada (Quebec). One of the two in New Jersey, he asserted was his maternal grandfather. In this he was correct. He also declared that the then proprietor of the Franklin House, New York, was a descendant of the New Hampshire (or Conn.) brother. I have never investigated this point.

His declaration that the name originally possessed a final e seemed reasonable, since, unfortunately, led to the possibility of having been neglected at that time by some descendant of John of Antwerp, Co., N. Y., including myself. It has been seen that the name of Frankle is not a substitution for the

name in France, by the autograph of the subject person, nor by other records excepting in one instance, viz:- that of 1671 on p. 27. For *his* in French is *le* p. 27.

Such errors as I have recanted in the edition of the finale in the above instance, prove especially embarrassing in genealogical studies from the difficulty, in general, later corrections, descenders and elimination from records.

As in case of the earlier emigrations, the greater number of those refugees made their way to Holland, and from Holland not a few, between the years 1657 and 1663, crossed over to America. For the most part they were natives of the northern provinces."

The first list includes thirty two whose places of birth are given.

"Other French Colonists whose places of birth are not recorded, emigrated about this time to New Amsterdam by way of Holland". The second list numbering twenty nine contains the name of Gedeon Merlet.

"Though the fact is not expressly stated, it may be presumed that the greater number of these immigrants, like those previously named, originated in the provinces of Picardy, Normandy and Bretagne".

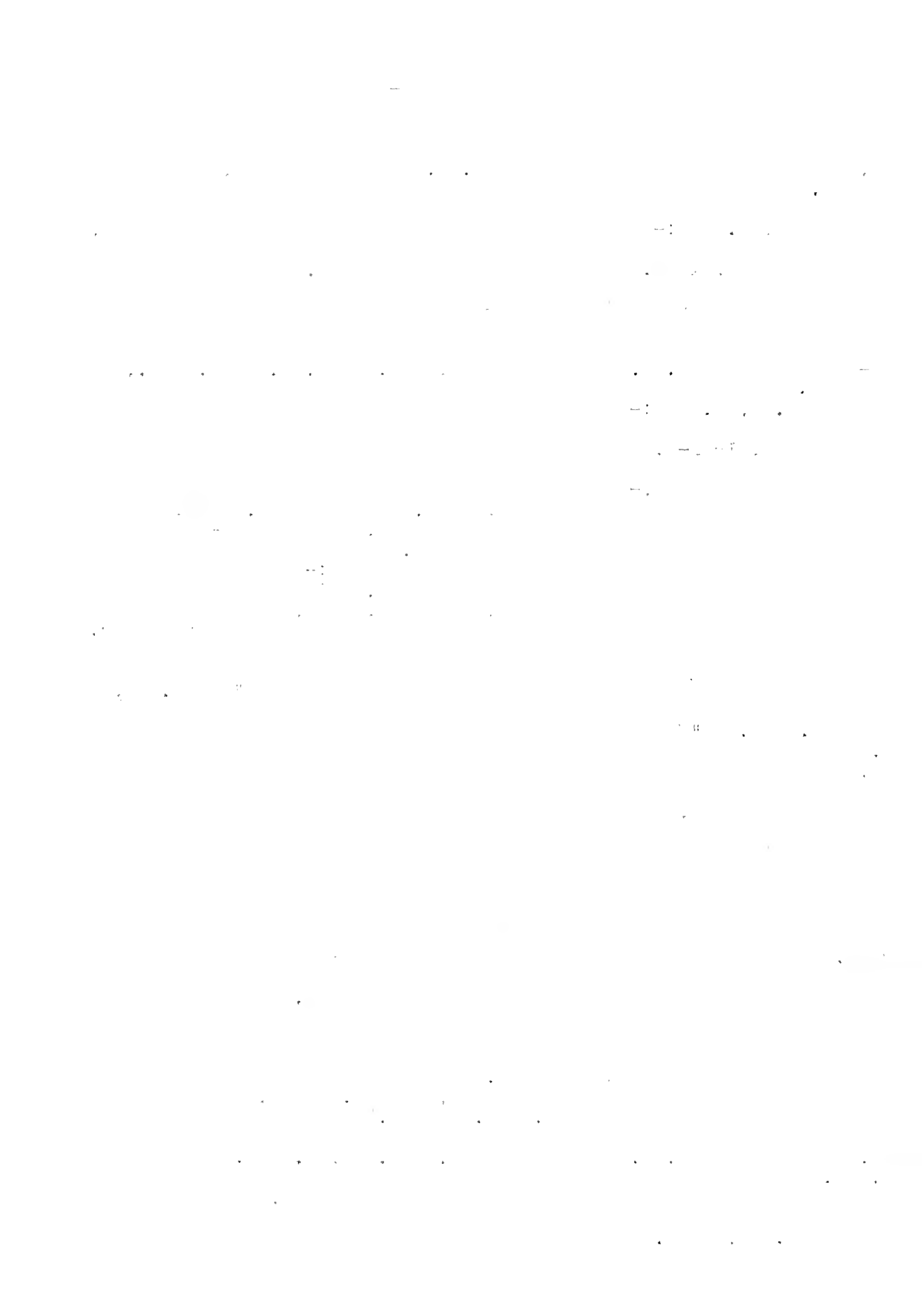

The Family of Josias Vaniston.

As has now been seen, Josua and Paul Vaniston are mentioned in connection with their father, John Vaniston, in 1675, as having patented to them 245 acres of land on the south side of Staten Island and 30 acres of salt marsh land at the mouth of Fresh Kill. March 20, 1683-4, an order was granted on petition of Josias and Paulus Vaniston for a conveyance and division of their "inherited" land, part of which had been sold to Paulus Richards.

Our next record of Josua (French some) or, as he is later known, Josias, is in Woodbridge, N. J., Aug. 21, 1696, when Stephen Kent of Woodbridge sells to Josias Vaniston and Abraham Lentine, 1/2 of Staten Island, 1/2 of land sold in Woodbridge.

Thereafter, in 1700-1, 1705, 1707, 1708 and 1709-10, he is recorded as in Woodbridge.

In 1708 and 1709-10, our latest dates of him, he is disposing of lands in Woodbridge.

Knowledge of Josua Vaniston is derived from a deed and indenture made in New York City in 1702, between Josias Vaniston of New Jersey and John Richard of New York City - "in consideration of the love and benevolence beareth wife Rebecca" Vaniston says that she then kept in 1696- that said land on Staten Island first sold, and that she and her husband had children only.

a.) Paul the second son is mentioned as land holder in Staten Island from March 31, 1873 to March 30, 1887-8. He married Elizabeth Clark and the couple had a daughter, Annemaria or Annetje, who married in 1871. I do not find mention of him outside of Staten Island, or later than 1887-8. (See p. 130, 131, 132, 133.)

In preceding sections I have only mentioned one of our probable descendants of Indian origin, that is, Paul who went from Peter, N. Y., to Canada previous to or about 1800 and who lived with, I think, his own tribe in 1801. (See p. 130-131.)

I call for no opinion as to the date of the arrival of Paul, perhaps from Canada, who, in 1778 with 300 French and Indians stormed Fort St. Joseph and founded Peoria, Ill. (Harrison's "American History", Vol. XV, p. 41.) (See p. 130.)

So far as I can discover Vera M. Marlett, born 1853, in his son Abraham³ baptised May 16, 1680, in New Utrecht, Long Island, has given us the only male grandchild of Gideon Marlett, and it is through him only that I have succeeded in tracing certain lines back to the Huronnet descent.

Previous to the record of Abraham, and his descendants, therefore, I would like to emphasize the fact that these pages include such records as I have been able to discover regarding the descendants of Gideon Marlett with accompanying deductions which have seemed reasonable to me—some of which, perhaps, may be further confirmed, corrected or modified to some extent by later investigation.

That I have been unable to bring various, so far as investigation to a conclusion, has proved a serious detriment I am convinced, but in view of the smallness of the limit to my own efforts, it is to be hoped that the results already rendered will be regarded as a worthy contribution to some future descendant possessed of that compelling interest, and consequent income to pursue the work, not only in France and Holland, but also to complete unfinished investigations on this side of the water. Especially would I recommend a continuance of the investigations herein if it is possible to establish and connect several allied branches with Abraham born 1680 and so with the descent of Huronnet.

unless or, perhaps, until that point is over, I have not deemed it expedient to attempt the arrangement of any part of these records according to the most approved system, viz:- that of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, but preferably retain the more compact or exclusive plan of keeping the different unconnected branches unto themselves or in family groups.

I might add that this work is intended more especially for (genealogically) uneducated descendants, who, I think, will more readily understand the principles presented in family groups, and I believe, also, will more readily generous introduction of explanation and detail, none of which, necessarily, would be eliminated in case of publication.

The unidentified Joseph, born 1682, - and therefore contemporary with Bidson's grandson (Israhel born 1660) - who was in Staten Island in 1706, married, 1707, Rebecca Benfort or Benfert (perhaps Benforth) and I think it is probable that he had been the son either of Josiah, Paul, John or Abraham, who, in 1682, were, respectively, 35, 22, 19 and 14, but I find no record of his birth and so do not know his marriage.

Glen was founded by Capt. Garrison April 10, 1845. It lies in the S. W. angle formed by the junction of the St. Lawrence River and the Ottawa. Principal streets Aurie's Creek, tributary of Ottawa, and Little Creek tributary of St. Lawrence. (First preacher after Revolutionary war was Rev. Isaac H. H. (Rev. Prot. 1845) 1781. This settlement is in Florida.)

Waltville (near Ottawa) (1845) known as "Walt's Swamp" (near Rev.) situated on Ottawa and Erie Canal. Vornessville (Glen p.v.) near center of town near Aurie's Creek (p.v.) on Canal. THE MARLETT FAMILY.

The grantee was "John Marlett of the Co. of Albany in the said Province of New York, Farmer." The land is described as situated in Co. of Albany, N. Y., on the south side of the Mohawk River, to the west side of Arries Kill and to the westward of Fort Hunter from by the name of "Lot No. 1, which begins on the south corner of the land heretofore granted to Capt. John Scott deceased, by a tree marked No. 1, which tree stands one hundred and twenty six chains on a South thirty six degrees West course from the mouth of Arries Kill where it falls into the Mohawk River, and runs West thence North thirty six degrees East twenty five chains, and South sixty eight degrees East twenty three chains and North thence and South thirty six degrees West seventy two chains and North fifty four degrees West thirty eight chains and North thirty six degrees East thirty one chains and West link, and North fifty four degrees West forty three chains to Arries Kill and along the said Kill to the land belonging to the Heirs of Capt. John Scott deceased, and along the said land South fifty four degrees East thirty six chains to the place where it first begins, containing two hundred and fifty eight acres, etc. Sit, Mathew Bender, Frederick Fisher."

The deed above referred to is on record at the town clerk's office, Rome, N. Y.

I quote from Mr. John Holm, concerning the said Marlett (John):- "There used to be a settlement called 'Marlett's town' on the Mohawk River, about five miles

on both sides of Aurora Creek. One of the farms is located to be a little above Miltonville." (This is the old Indian cemetery referred to by Collier in his account of Amherst in 1896, as having but one farm store left standing, that of Jacob Muckenbuser? J. J.)

A piece of paper, very ancient in character in the revolutionary period belonging to Mrs. Harlett (Miss _____, Jeremiah, etc.) of Scherectady, N. Y., dated Oct. 1, 1780, signed by S. E. Kier, states that she would receive payment at "my store at Fort Hunter, Scherectady Co. N. Y." (Printed by G. R. and C. Co. N. Y.)

In the name of God amain. This 9 day of Sept. 1819 I Gideon Marlatt of Marcellus in the county of Onondaga and state of New York being sick in body yet sound in mind thanks be to God for the same and calling to mind the mortality of my body knowing it is appointed for man once to die I do make and acknowledge this my last will and xxx testamentxxx That is to say principally above all recommending my soul to God who gave it and as to my body I recommend to the dust to be ouried in a Christianlike manner at the discretion of my executors hereafter named not doubting but at the general resurrection I shall receive the same again by the power of God. Now as to touching such worldly estate herein it has pleased God to bless me

I give devise and dispose in the following manner, viz: I bequeath to my beloved wife Mary Marlett one third of the income of my real estate for her use during her natural life and likewise give her all my personal property during the same. And whatever personal property may remain after the death of my beloved wife Mary shall be equally divided between (probably my several) daughters or their heirs. Item, I give my son Abram one hundred and seventy five dollars. Item, I give my son John one hundred and twenty five dollars. Item- I give my son William one hundred dollars. Item- I give my son Jeremiah one hundred dollars. Item- I give my son Peter one hundred dollars. Item- I give my son Isaac one hundred dollars. Item- I give my son Thomas one hundred dollars. Item- I give my daughter Polly one hundred dollars. Item- I give my daughters Susannah one hundred dollars. I give my daughter Peggy one hundred. I give to my son Cornelius all my real estate or condition of his paying the fore mentioned sums to the heirs. The installments of payments as follows. First, one hundred and seventy five dollars to my son Abram within one year after my death. Next pay my son John within two years after my death. The remainder to be paid to my other heirs within eleven years after my death. Lastly, I nominate and appoint my beloved friends Lemuel Barrows and William Lander to be my only sole executors of this my last will and testament, revoking and disannulling all former wills made by me and acknowledging this to be my last will and testament. They are buried at Marcellus, Gaen. Co., N. C., in the old "Jackson Cemetery" formerly situated on the road to Marcellus village called the "Gate Road." At this point the direction of the road has been changed, and the entrance to the cemetery is now a quarter of a mile or so north of the road through a field situated about one mile west of Lawrence village.

Cornelius Harlett (Gideon, t.) left in his will that tombstones should be provided for his "venered Father and Mother", and his widow Letty (Step) Harlett carried out these instructions. Gideon died in 1828, but the tombstone erroneously gives the date as 1838. The inscriptions on the tombstones are as follows:-

"Gideon Harlett died Dec. 13, 1828" (should be 1820)

"aged 78 years & 10 mo."

"With a full heart he followed his Father,
"And went with his spirit above;
"Escaped to the Kingdom of glory,
"And lay'd in the bosom of love."
L. Harlett.

The design above the inscription contains a figure in the lower left hand corner. On the right hand side of the figure is the figure of a female reclining, with her hands raised in prayer, her left hand applied to her eyes while she looks towards the upper part of the tombstone at her left, and this is headed by a female figure at the left of the tombstone.

The design above the second and a little larger tombstone is a figure reclining on each side of the inscription:-

Gideon's will, after bequeathing legacies to his other children, left his property to his son Cornelius. The receipts for these legacies are still in existence.

The terms of the will are explained by the fact that in their later years their son Cornelius with his wife was invited to live with and care for them during the remainder of their lives. Through the widow of Cornelius, Mrs. Mary (Stolt) Marlett, we have many tales preserved illustrating the lives and character of Gideon and his wife Mary Blackman.

Some of the more interesting of these tales come to us through Cornelius (Peter, Gideon, John, etc.) and his family, who as his uncle Cornelius was childless, moved to Marcellus after his marriage and lived with his uncle Cornelius (Gideon, etc.) becoming as a son to the old people.

As Mrs. Mary (Stolt) lived to an early eighty seven years of age, these tales are of interest to all of the younger Cornelius. The tale best known and oftenest told among all descendants of Gideon and Mary's children is here related.

From the "Annals of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel," p. 164, we learn that Gammage was named by Sir John Jackson, Oct. 10, 1780.

From the paper of Mr. Corlett (Peter, ...) I quote:-
"While the battle of Johnston was in progress, a British officer in the first rank, Major, Grandfather, was at home with his children. She had just taken a basin of bread from the oven, looking out of the window she saw a party of Indians riding. They were on their way to join Sir John Jackson, the trail was passing by the house of Gidder on the right hand, and proceeded out to the hill visiting the old place, &c. &c.) "She took father, an infant, in her arms and gathering the two older children of the house turned in the opposite direction and fled into the woods. The Indians, devoted to the cause, surrounded the house and it contained. When after the attack to home for weeks went on a few visits were made to the fort occupied by tonight."

Elizabeth Hill was daughter of Caleb (Barber, Barnard,
Jonathan, 2, 1) and Hannah (Hill) Hill. Elizabeth's
youngest dau. Catherine (Marlett) Eaton remembered hearing
her say that she was born in Rhode Island and brought up
in Mass. Her parents were mar. in Swanzy, Va. N., which
at that date (1777) was a part of N. I., but I do not
find the record of her birth in Swanzy.

Her mother died when she was ten months old, (1778) and
her father married and brought up a family by a second
wife, two of the children having the names of Polly
(Mary) and Reuben.

After his marriage Jeremiah kept a hotel on the farm
which was included with the land owned by his father
Gideon (John, Gideon) previous to his (Gideon's) removal to Otsego
Co.

The old hotel building is still standing. It has been
renodeled and is in possession of descendants of Susannah
(Gideon, John, etc.); is in Gaudaurcity district one
mile from the Auriesville post office.

From IV. Susan (Marlett) Henderson, dau. Jeremiah (etc.),
we learn that the minister who married her parents once
visited them at their hotel in Gaudaurcity. Unfortunately
when he arrived there was a dance in progress by the
young people in that vicinity which did not agree with
the good man's strict notions, and he was sorely grieved
at this and the added fact that the refreshments in-
cluded beverages somewhat stronger than tea and coffee.
She related that on one occasion her father, disapproving
of the excessive number of cats on the place, dispatched
seven of them. Within a few weeks thereafter seven of
his horses died and from that time on nothing could
induce him to consent to the killing of a cat.

About 1814 or 15 Jeremiah moved to South Hill, Cort. Co.
of Marcellus, Onon. Co. In 1831 or 32 removed to Fla.,
then called Cicero, on the old Harlin place situated
about one half mile south of the old Norman place.

In 1854 he removed to Granby, Otsego Co., on a farm
about four miles from Fulton. Here Elizabeth, his wife,
died of dropsy, May 1837, and was buried in a hill
cemetery on a school house opposite the farm, and her
youngest daughter Catherine, - never married.

Catherine was seventeen years old at the time of her mother's death, living at home and teaching the school referred to, opposite the farm.

When Elizabeth died the family broke up and removed to Clay for a time, Jeremiah living with his daughter, Rhoda, then with his son, Thomas, near Auburn, N. Y. From there he removed to West Aurora, Kane Co., Illinois, about 1842, living for a time with each of his sons, Gideon, Jeremiah and Peter.

On removing to Illinois Peter occupied a part of Gideon's home on Cor. of _____ and _____ Sts., which house was still standing, well preserved, in 1895.

Afterwards he removed with Peter to a farm in Hill Co., Ill., on the Desplaines River, six miles from Lockport, about twenty miles from Aurora and three from the sea.

Here he died of a fever in 1846. His son David says he is buried twenty miles from Aurora. Cornelius, son of his brother Peter, says at Hagerville, twelve miles or so east of Aurora.

William Nesler, son of his daughter Rhoda, says at Lilledas, Hill Co., Ill. A. (Peter, Jeremiah, etc.) says at Hagerville and Daniel P. (Peter, etc.) at Lockport.

I hope one descendant will try and reconcile these discrepancies. He was a small sized man. Was a fine driver of horse and a lover of fine horses and always kept them. He was once riding by a prize exhibit a large animal and tried to pull him off his horse when they started, but he hung on clinging to the horses neck and on the ground, etc.

(Told by his daughter, Rhoda.) A letter received from Mr. _____ said to _____ of Jeremiah's brother Peter, said:- "I was _____ of _____ used to live _____ Valley, _____ near Auriesville _____ I once heard him say many times that they (your grandfather and grandmother) are 'such good people' - all the so jolly, all the _____ the cook. He said he enjoyed going there with his father because Mr. _____ never forgot to _____ generous sized fried cake."

Many are yet living (1898) who can testify that it is virtue which passes into a far off land and her daughters who lived to come back again, and her sons, all one has ever found lacking in the appreciation of this virtue in others.

Abram (1) enlisted at 17 at Winchester in the Partisan Legion, under Col. Armand for 2 years and later enlisted for the duration of the War. Abram (1) was the tallest man in his company and rode at the head of the column. He was known as a gentleman's son and wore the finest cue, and was one of the best swordsmen and at the close of the war was a member of Lee's Legion.
