- Leader And I heard a great voice out of heaven saying "Behold the tabernacle of God is with men, and he will dwell with them and they shall be his people, and God himself shall be with them, and be their God."

Leader Is this a description of heaven?

- School No; not of heaven itself, but of a place which must be very much like it, for this, as we have just read, is a vision of a holy city called "New Jerusalem" which is to come down from God out of heaven.
- Leader Where will this holy city be located?

School It is as likely to be here as anywhere in the world; for New Jerusalem is a symbol of human society as it will be whenever and wherever God has his way. It therefore stands for any country that is really God's country.

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Half Minute Reports from         The American Missionary Association Fields         FIRST REPORTER       I Speak for the Negro Field         One-tenth of the people of the United States are of Negro blood. Their ancestors were cruely captured, brought to these shores and sold for slaves. Fifty years ago they were set free by Abraham Lincoln. They began their life of freedom without education and without possessions, owning not even the clothes upon their backs. In the course of half a century they have made wonderful progress. Three-fourths of them can now read and write. They own more than a billion dollars' worth of property. In this great war they have made a splendid record as soldiers, yet they still need help. More than anything else they need education. We have among them 26 High Schools and 5 Colleges where we are training leaders, preachers and other professional men, farmers, mechanics and, most of all, teachers. We have also 179 flourishing churches.	<b>SECOND REPORTER</b> I Speak for the People of the Southern Mountains, Three Millions of Them. We Call Them the American Highlanders. They are of the same race with Abraham Lincoln. Shut in by their mountain heights and cut off by their poverty from the life and opportunity of the modern world, they have remained poor, igno- rant and backward. We have among them three High Schools and a College full of ambitious boys and girls of splendid promise. An enormous proportion of the students and graduates of these institu- tions have been following the flag in the great war.	<b>THIRD REPORTER</b> I Speak for the Indian Field There are in this country about 350,000 Indians. They are the first Americans. The whole country once belonged to them. Their old savage plan of living, in which the women did the work and the men went to war and hunted game, is no longer possible in our modern world. They are being civilized and taught the white man's way of living in government schools and their land is being dis- tributed among them that they may use it as farmers. We are helping by churches, Sunday Schools and day schools and especially by our fine Normal Training School at Santee, Neb., to lead them over the perilous bridge from barbarism to civilization. Indians make earnest and devoted Christians and thrifty citizens. The soldiers they sent to the great war were of the bravest sort and were wonderful
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
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as scouts.

FOURTH REPORTER I Speak for the Eskimo Field
Our work hes at Cape Prince of Wales, the extreme northwestern point of this continent where America reaches over with its finger tips and almost touches Asia, close by the Arctic Circle. The peo- ple there once lived in hunger, want and fear in their damp, miserable dugouts through their long, dark winters. Our mission has done wonderful things for them, providing them abundant food through the reindeer herds, confortable homes and a life of happiness. There is now the largest Eskimo village in the world at Cape Prince of Wales. This centers in a Christian church, everybody belongs, everybody goes and everybody sings. But we sorely need, at the present moment, heroic missionaries for our Es- kimo work.
<ul> <li>FIFTH REPORTER I Speak for the Oriental Field</li> <li>This comprises Chinese, Japanese and Hindu settlers on the Pacific Coast and in Utah, immigrants from vast countries beyond the sea, among whom we have a group of flourishing churches and Sunday Schools. These people make generous Christians. They are sending men and money home for the spread of the gospel in the crowded countries from which they came.</li> <li>I speak also for the Hawaiian Islands, largely peopled at the present day by Japanese and Chinese who have come thither to work on great sugar and pineapple plantations. They sorely need the Christian gospel. Here too we have a flourishing church, a Christian Endeavor Society and a Sunday School in the famous Leper Colony.</li> </ul>
SIXTH REPORTER I Speak for the Field of Porto Rico This, our new possession, is a beautiful island crowded with people most of whom are very poor. They have, for centuries, been under the blight of a harsh Spanish rule and of a degraded form of Ca- tholicism. To the blessings of a free and honest government which Unclé Sam has given them we wish to add the blessing of a pure faith. Besides 11 churches we have placed there a beautiful Hospital—for it is a sickly country—where we minister to more than 100 patients a day.
SEVENTH REPORTER I Speak for our New Mexico Field Here lies a group of little, remote, stagnant villages among the mountains settled long ago by Spanish-speaking people from Old Mexico. Here we have schools which are like little, green oases in a desert land. Our teachers at these points are the finest of heroes battling with disease and superstition, introducing Christian ideals and showing the beauty, cleanliness and order of Christian homes. To this field too belongs our Rio Grande Industrial School where boys and girls add to ordinary school duties a training in the practical work of modern life.

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Yes: it certainly would. Whenever we repeat the School Lord's Prayer, "Thy Kingdom come, thy will be done in earth as it is in Heaven," we are praying that our country may become God's country.

Leader What sort of a place will America be when it has become God's country?

It will be a land of genuine liberty, of even-handed School Boys

justice, of equal privileges for all, of clean living and practical righteousness.

It will be an intelligent land, with the best of free Girls schools and libraries, a place where knowledge and wisdom go hand in hand.

It will be a busy land, humming with fruitful in-Boys dustry and therefore a land of plenty, where poverty is unknown; and at the same time a land of leisure, where all the workers, both young and old, shall have ample time for play and full opportunity to enjoy the good things of life.

Girls It will be a land of order and many-sided beauty; a land of happy homes; a land of good will and full of kindness; a land of reverence, whose people love God with all their might and their neighbors as themselves.

Such will be God's America.

Leader Will this New America, like the New Jerusalem, come down from God out of heaven?

> Yes; it will come from the Spirit of God, which descending from heaven moves upon the hearts and works mightily through the lives of men and women. This is going to be God's America because the American people, by God's help, are going to make it such.

When will this work begin?

It has begun already. Our fathers commenced it long ago when they came to these shores seeking to build here a commonwealth of freedom and of faith.

It has been carried on since then by men of the same spirit, of whom Abraham Lincoln is a conspicuous example.

No small progress has been made. We already have one of the freest, happiest lands that the world has ever known, and yet it is far from being completely God's country. Much remains to be done.
