The will of Abigail Gorham, of Kent, dated Oct. 2, 1805, and probated Jan. 24, 1811, at New Milford, Conn., gave to her daughters Deborah, Abigail, and Lucy, all her household furniture, and to her sons John, James, Seth, Jeremiah, Wakeman, Hezekiah, and Joseph, all her landed estate of every description lying in Kent, or elsewhere. Mrs. Ella Comstock Peckham, of Utica, N. Y., a descendant of John Gorham and his wife Abigail Wakeman, has sent the writer the following list of the children of John<sup>4</sup> Gorham. The baptisms of the first two, Deborah<sup>5</sup> and John, <sup>5</sup> are at Green's Farms. The will of the mother, Abigail Gorham, mentions the seventh child as Jeremiah. The Kent land records, under date of Sept. 4, 1808 (Vol. 2, p. 420), calls the same man Jared, of Vermont. Mrs. Peckham's Bible list of children calls him Jared, and the History of Poultney, Vt., calls him Jared. There were but seven sons.

Daniel.<sup>5</sup> Gorham (Ichabod, <sup>4</sup> Joseph, <sup>3</sup> Jabez, <sup>2</sup> John<sup>1</sup>), born in Fairfield, Nov., 1749, died in Roxbury, Conn., Jan. 25, 1836, in which year his estate was settled. (Woodbury, Conn., Probate Records.) Mary, wife of Daniel Gorham, died in Roxbury, Conn., Jan. 31, 1817, aged 61. Daniel Gorham appears among the Litchfield County pensioners, placed on the pension roll May 15, 1833, age 83. (This agrees with the record of his birth.) There is on record at New Milford, Conn., an agreement between Daniel<sup>5</sup> and his son Daniel,<sup>6</sup> which gives the farm to the son, subject to the life right of the father. It has been claimed that Daniel<sup>5</sup> was the son of Joseph,<sup>4</sup> who died in Norwalk in 1760, and his wife Abigail Lovell, but that Joseph's family returned, immediately after his death,

to Barnstable and Nantucket, where four of his children married. He did have a son Daniel, and the last record of him was in the will of his grandfather, at Barnstable, in 1770. The writer has made many researches to find trace in Connecticut of Daniel<sup>5</sup> the son of Joseph<sup>4</sup> and Abigail (Lovell), but without success. that family are recorded in Connecticut after 1760.

GORDAM.-It having recently been stated in print that John? Gorham (ante, vol. 52, page 358), son of Capt. John! and Desire Howland Gorham, acquired his title of Lieutenaut-Colouel in the Militia, the writer desires to show that he was commissioned Lieutenaut-Colonel of the regular forces, by Colonel Benjamiu Church, in March 1703-4. According to a letter of instructions written by Lieutenant-Governor Stoughton, dated Boston, Aug. 12, 1636, Captain John<sup>2</sup> Gorham was second in command under the then Major Benjamin Church in the expedition against the Freuch and Indians, in that year. This is shown in the History of the Indian Wars, by Thomas Church, with Notes and an Appendix by Samuel G. Drake second edition, 1839, page 249. We find on pages 250 and 252 of this History that Benjamin Church, who had received his own commission as Colonel from Governor Dudley, March 18, 1703-1, at once issued commissions to the officers of his regiment, giving that of Lieutenant-Colonel to John<sup>2</sup> Gorham. On page 281 we flud the names of all of

the Field Officers and Captaius, under date of July 4, 1704.

Since the writer's notes were published in the Rroisium, ante, vol. 50, pages 32-31, the names of the officers and men who took part in the capture of Louisbourg have been published in the Massachusetts Historical Society's Collections. tions, Sixth Series, Vol. X., Pepperrell Papers, Appendix, page 506. The officers of the Seventh Mass. Regiment were in part: Shubael<sup>3</sup> Gorham, Esq., Colonel and Captain, 1st Company, commissioned Feb. 20, 1711; and John Gorham, Esq., Lieut.-Coloucl and Captain, 2d Company, commissioned Feb. 20, 1744. These records show that when "Captain" John Gorham wrote his letter under date of May 7, 1745, to Sir William Pepperrell, he held the commission of Lieutenant-Colonel of the Seventh Mass. Regiment. Upon the death of his father, Colonel Shubael Gorham (Feb. 20, 1745-6), he was given the commission of Colonel of his father's regiment. (Usher Parsons's Life of Pep-

perrell, pages 238-240.)

Dr. Samuel A. Green, of the Massachusetts Historical Society, has kindly called my attention to an interesting point, as follows: "See Paige's History of Cambridge (p. 567), near the bottom of the page, for an instance of a Majorgeneral being a Captain at the same time. It was the case of Samuel Green, FRANK W. SPRAGUE. though he was no kinsman of mine."
