

The cross on reverse of Nos. 7, 8, and 9, is of the same type as that on the farthings of 1462, but does not constitute a sufficient difference to decide the point. I have therefore thought it best to keep these pieces together for purposes of comparison, rather than attempt to classify them under the two reigns.

The Act of 1472 states that false coins were made without authority in Cork. Youghal, Kinsale, and Kilmallock (no coins are known from the three latter mints). And by the Act of the year 1876, the coin lately made in Cork, Youghall, Limerick. and other places in Munster, except Waterford, being neither lawful in itself, nor of lawful weight and alloy, was declared void. It would appear, therefore, that the preceding coins were minted between the years 1470-6, the heavy groat, No. 1, probably before 1473.
