THE PHI BETA KAPPA SOCIETY.

The Phi Beta Kappa Society was founded December 5, 1776, at William and Mary College, Williamsburg, Virginia. It was a social and literary society, and John Heath was its first president. The Society continued its career until 1781 when, owing to the British occupation of the Peninsula in that year, its activity was suspended. It was revived in 1849 and continued until 1861, when, at the outbreak of the Civil War, the records of the Society were transferred for safe-keeping to the Virginia Historical Society. In 1895, when the original chapter was again revived, they were given back to the old College of William and Mary. Bushrod Washington, John Marshall, Madison, Mason and Lee are illustrious names found upon the roll of the half hundred members of the original chapter of the Phi Beta Kappa.

Following their desire to extend the organization and to unite the educated men of the country, other chapters were started. Elisha Parmale, one of the original members of the Phi Beta Kappa at Williamsburg, was authorized to establish chapters at Yale and Harvard. In November, 1780, the Yale chapter was instituted, and in 1781, the Harvard chapter was organized. These were to be known respectively as the Alphas of Connecticut and Massachusetts Bay. Six years later (1787) the Alpha of New Hampshire was established at Dartmouth College.

The Phi Beta Kappa was originally a secret society, but in 1831 the oath of secrecy was abandoned. It rapidly became an organization devoted to scholarly affairs and a brotherhood of scholars. This has been its chief distinction for more than half a century and the rolls of the Society are to-day made up of the graduates of high standing—the honor men—of the American colleges represented in the fraternity.

Phi Beta Kappa has been the occasion of many notable gatherings of American scholars, and many noteworthy contributions to American literature. Such men as Emerson, Holmes, Longfellow, Story, Kent, Webster, Choate, Sumner, Wendell Phillips, and a host of others equally illustrious, have graced the Harvard, Yale,

and Dartmouth Phi Beta Kappa days, and have placed the ideals of American scholarship upon the highest plane.

A new era began in the history of the Phi Beta Kappa in 1881, when the Harvard chapter, anxious to promote a close union and a wider sphere of recognition for the Society of Scholars, proposed a convention of delegates from all the existing chapters. This Convention met in Cambridge, Mass., June 30, 1881, and the results of its labors were the creation of a permanent representative body, known as the National Council of the Phi Beta Kappa Society and the adoption of a Constitution for the government of the United Chapters (1882), as the national organization was henceforth to be known.

The First National Council met at Saratoga, September 5, 1883, and thirteen chapters were represented. Since that date six triennial congresses of the United Chapters have been held at Saratoga, in the month of September, the last on Sept. 7, 1898. At these sessions matters of vital interest to the United Chapters are considered and applications for the establishment of new chapters are acted upon.

In 1889, a model constitution and a form of charter for new chapters were adopted and "the *superior* limit of membership" in each chapter was fixed at one-fourth of each graduating class.

The constitution of the United Chapters, the "model constitution" for new chapters, and the charter of the Beta Chapter of Maine are given below.

In 1900, a Phi Beta Kappa Hand-book and General Address Catalogue of the United Chapters was published. The book was compiled by the former secretary of the United Chapters, Rev. E. B. Parsons, D.D., Williamstown, Mass., and it contains besides the addresses and personal data of the Phi Beta Kappa members of the United States, historical and descriptive information concerning the Society and its administration, and facts about the customs, procedure, statistics, and emblems of the organization.*

The total number of members of the Phi Beta Kappa is seventeen thousand five hundred, about sixteen thousand having taken the B. A. degree.

The watchword of the Society is the Greek (Homeric) phrase :

" Φιλοσοφία Βίου Κυβερνήτης."

The emblem is a gold key. While the inscriptions upon the key are not uniform, it is usual to find inscribed on one side the letters S. P. (*Societas Philosophiae*), together with the name, college and class of the owner; on the other side Φ . B. K., the initials of the Society's watchword; either seven or nine stars, indicating the seven or nine original chapters, and the date of the organization of the first one in Virginia, Dec. 5, 1776.

Constitution and By-Laws of the United Chapters.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

COMPOSITION OF THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

The National Council of the Phi Beta Kappa Society shall consist of the Senators hereinafter spoken of, and of delegates from the several Chapters of the Society. Each Chapter shall be entitled to send three delegates, who shall be graduates of at least five years' standing and members of the Phi Beta Kappa Society, but not necessarily of the Chapter by which they are chosen.

ARTICLE II.

THE SENATE.

The Senate shall originally consist of twenty Senators, chosen by the delegates at the first session of the National Council, from the Society at large. These shall be divided into two classes, whose terms of office shall expire at the adjournment of alternate regular sessions of the National Council. At every subsequent regular session the places of the outgoing class shall be filled by election as follows: On the day preceding the first day of each regular session of the National Council, the Senate shall meet, and shall nominate fifteen candidates in addition to the members of the outgoing class for the ten vacant seats, and also two candidates for the unexpired term of each Senator who may have died or resigned since the last regular session. Other persons not nominated by the Senate may be presented as candidates at the time of the election. Of every ten members whose terms of office shall expire, one may be elected by the Council Senator for life. In every election of Senators a majority of the votes cast shall be required to

elect, and in such elections the outgoing Senators shall have no vote. The Senate may fill vacancies in its own body till the next meeting of the National Council.

ARTICLE III.

OFFICERS OF THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

The officers of the National Council shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer, and such others as may be found necessary from time to time. The President shall be chosen from among the Senators.

ARTICLE IV.

SESSIONS AND FUNCTIONS OF THE COUNCIL.

The National Council shall meet every third year at such place and time as shall have been determined by the officers of the United Chapters, and shall proceed at once to the election first of its officers and next of the Senators. The National Council shall make such rules as may be found necessary for the carrying out of any provision of this Constitution.

ARTICLE V.

THE SENATE AND ITS FUNCTIONS.

During the sessions of the National Council the Senate shall have no separate existence, but its members shall take their places with the delegates as members of the National Council, voting with the delegates as well upon all other matters as upon the election of officers and Senators, except as provided in Article II. When the National Council is not in session, the Senate shall constitute an independent body, charged with the duty of representing the Phi Beta Kappa Society and speaking in its name, and exercising, in addition, the functions of a permanent Executive Committee of the National Council. It shall hold its meetings at such times and places as it shall determine, being first called together by that Senator, who, at the original election of the Senate, shall have been elected by the largest number of votes. It shall recommend candidates for election as Senators. It shall also have power to call an extra session of the National Council. It shall furthermore prepare and recommend to the consideration of the National

Council such matters as it may deem proper. It shall transmit its lists of candidates and of matters recommended for discussion, by the hands of the secretary, to the presiding officer of the National Council, immediately upon its organization being completed. It shall also transmit, in the same manner, to the National Council a report of its doings between the sessions of the Council. Nothing herein shall be so construed as to derogate from the right of the National Council to appoint Committees to sit between sessions, independently of the Senate, and to report at the next session.

ARTICLE VI.

NEW CHARTERS.

Applications for charters shall, in all cases, be made to the Senate, at least six months before the regular session of the National Council; the Senate shall at once notify all the Chapters of such applications, and such applications shall be reported to the National Council with the recommendation of the Senate at the next meeting of the Council, and shall be passed upon by the Council, which shall have exclusive power to grant charters. But no charters shall be issued without the consent of delegations representing a majority of the Chapters.

ARTICLE VII.

BY-LAWS AND RULES OF ORDER.

The National Council at any of its sessions, and the Senate at any time, may respectively make such By-Laws and Rules of Order as may be thought expedient for their use, provided the same be not inconsistent with any of the provisions of this Constitution. A quorum of the National Council shall consist of delegates from a majority of the Chapters and not fewer than three Senators; the Senate shall determine the number which shall constitute its quorum. (The present number is five.)

ARTICLE VIII.

RIGHTS OF CHAPTERS.

Nothing contained in this Constitution shall be construed as empowering the Senate or the National Council to restrict or abridge the rights or privileges now exercised by existing Chapters, except as expressly provided herein.

ARTICLE IX.

AMENDMENTS TO THIS CONSTITUTION.

No change shall be made in this Constitution unless the same shall have been proposed at the session of the National Council next preceding the session at which the proposed change is voted for; and no vote shall be had upon any such proposed change except at a stated hour previously ordered by the meeting,—and no amendment shall be made without the concurrence of the delegations of two-thirds of the Chapters represented in the Council.

ARTICLE X.

ADOPTION OF THE CONSTITUTION.

This Constitution shall take effect when ratified by fourteen Chapters. (Sixteen Chapters ratified it before July, 1883.)

 BY-LAWS.

I.

ELECTIONS AND OFFICERS.

All elections shall be by ballot. The President shall preside over the meetings of the Council. In his absence the Vice-President shall perform his duties. When both are absent a president *pro tempore* shall be chosen *viva voce*. The Secretary shall keep the records of the Council, conduct its correspondence, and send to the Senate and to each Chapter a certified report of the proceedings of each session. The Treasurer shall collect and disburse all funds of the Council, and report at each session thereof.

(At the Council of 1892, the Treasurer requested that the financial report be submitted to an auditor appointed by the President after its presentation.)

II.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

- (1) Calling the Roll. (2) Reading the minutes. (3) Re-

ports of officers. (4) Communications from the Senate on nominations. (5) Election of officers. (6) Election of Senators. (7) Communication from the Senate on new Chapters and other matters. (8) Miscellaneous business.

III.

VOTING.

In all cases not otherwise provided for by the Constitution each senator and delegate present shall be entitled to cast one vote. (In establishing new Chapters the Constitution requires a vote by delegations, each delegation having one vote.)

IV.

ASSESSMENTS.

Each Chapter shall pay to the Treasurer a triennial assessment of five dollars.

(The Council of 1883 voted that the first assessment should be due in 1884. Each successive assessment becoming due in periods of three years from that time, 1887, 1890, 1893, 1896, 1899, and so on.)

V.

PROCEDURE.

The proceedings of the Council, in all cases not provided for in the Constitution, or the By-Laws, shall conform to the rules laid down in Cushing's Manual.

VI.

ENDORSEMENT OF NEW CHAPTERS.

All applications for future Chapters shall have the endorsement of at least five existing Chapters prior to presentation to the Senate.

VII.

AMENDMENTS.

These By-Laws, or any of them, may be suspended, altered or amended at any meeting of the Council by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Council present and voting.

BETA CHAPTER OF MAINE.

At the Fifth Triennial Council of the Phi Beta Kappa, held at Saratoga, Sept. 11, 1895, a charter of the Phi Beta Kappa was granted to Colby College (then known as "Colby University"). The petitioners for the charter were: Rev. George Dana Boardman Pepper, D.D., LL.D.; Professor Laban Edwards Warren, LL.D.; Professor William Augustus Rogers, Ph.D., LL.D.; Rev. Henry S. Burrage, D.D.; Rev. William H. Spencer, D.D.; Rev. Benaiah Longley Whitman, D.D.

All of the petitioners are members of the Alpha of Rhode Island, (Brown University), with the exception of Dr. Pepper, who is a member of the Beta of Massachusetts, (Amherst College).

A preliminary meeting for organization was held by the charter members at the residence of Dr. G. D. B. Pepper, Waterville, Jan. 3, 1896. Dr. H. S. Burrage was elected Chairman and Professor L. E. Warren, Secretary.

The Chapter Constitution recommended by the National Council was adopted; and committees were appointed to prepare suitable by-laws, to define the terms of admission, and to prepare a list of candidates for membership from classes prior to 1896. President Nathaniel Butler, of Colby College, was chosen permanent President, and Professor Wm. A. Rogers permanent Secretary of the Chapter.

Several meetings were held at short intervals within the next few weeks. By February 26 the work of organization was completed, and 197 of the graduates of the College were elected to membership in the Chapter. Several members of the Faculty of Colby, but graduates of other colleges, were also elected.

By-Laws were adopted and in accordance therewith, the following additional officers were chosen: Prof. James William Black, Ph.D., Treasurer; and Principal Franklin W. Johnson and Hon. Percival Bonney were elected members of the Executive Committee. The conditions of eligibility to membership in the Phi Beta Kappa and the method of election are defined in the Chapter Constitution and By-Laws.

Several modifications of the By-Laws were made at the annual meeting of the Chapter, June 26, 1901, and it is in their amended form that they appear below.

The Beta Chapter holds its regular annual meeting on Tuesday of Commencement week, the last week in June. The first annual meeting occurred June 29, 1896, and this was followed by a banquet in honor of the organization of the new Chapter which was attended by one hundred and four members. The principal speakers were President Nathaniel Butler, President of the Chapter; Leslie C. Cornish, of Augusta; Rev. Henry S. Burrage, D.D., of Portland; and Harris Merrill Plaisted, of Summerville, S. C.

At the second annual meeting, June 28, 1897, the second reunion and banquet occurred and it was attended by seventy-five members. The speakers were Rev. Francis W. Bakeman, D.D., Chelsea, Mass.; Dr. William Mathews, Boston; Hon. S. S. Brown, Waterville; Norman L. Bassett, Augusta; and Professor Edward W. Hall, of Colby.

On June 29, 1897, the Rev. George C. Lorimer, LL.D., of Boston, delivered an Oration before the Chapter, and on June 28, 1898, President William R. Harper, LL.D., of the University of Chicago, was the Phi Beta Kappa Orator of the Chapter.

Brethren of the Phi Beta Kappa: Greeting.

Whereas, The National Council of the United Chapters of the *Phi Beta Kappa Society* has by resolution duly adopted on the 11th day of September, 1895, decreed the establishment of a Chapter of the *Phi Beta Kappa* in connection with *Colby College* at *Waterville, Maine*; and has directed the Senate by the President and Secretary to issue a charter in the name of the National Council: Now, therefore, by virtue of the aforesaid act of the Council and the authority delegated to us, we do hereby incorporate and establish you and such others as you may hereafter elect and associate with yourselves, in conformity to the law of the *Phi Beta Kappa Society*, into a separate and subordinate branch of said society to be known and called the *Beta Chapter* of the *Phi Beta Kappa* in the State of Maine; hereby granting unto you and your successors all the powers, privileges, and benefits thereunto appertaining, in as full and ample a measure as the brethren of the other and existing chapters enjoy; at the same time enjoining upon you in the organization and conduct of the new chapter, and as a condition upon which this charter is granted, strict compliance with the Constitution of the United Chapters and the Model Constitution herewith transmitted to you.

In witness whereof the said Senate has caused the seal of the United Chapters of the *Phi Beta Kappa* to be affixed hereto, with the signatures of the President and the Secretary.

CHAPTER CONSTITUTION.

[*Recommended by the National Council.*]

1. This society is one of the co-ordinate branches of the body known as *The United Chapters of the Phi Beta Kappa* and shall be called the Beta Chapter of the *Phi Beta Kappa Society* in the State of Maine.

2. The object of the Phi Beta Kappa Society is the promotion of scholarship and friendship among students and graduates of American Colleges.

3. The members of the Chapter shall be elected *primarily* from the best scholars of the graduating classes of the college, *secondly* from those graduates of said college whose post-graduate work entitles them to such honor, and *lastly* from any person distinguished in letters, science or education; provided, however, that the selections from each graduating class do not exceed one-fourth of the number graduated. But the Chapter may make further limitations or restrictions.

4. In addition to scholarship, good moral character shall be a qualification of membership, and any member who is found to have lost this qualification may be expelled from the society by a four-fifths vote of the members present at a regular annual meeting of the society.

5. This Chapter shall send a delegation to represent it at each National Council of the United Chapters, shall contribute its equal part to the financial support of the United Chapters, and shall conform to the Constitution of the United Chapters and all the lawful requirements of the National Council.

6. This Chapter shall, by the enactment of suitable by-laws, provide for its election of officers, the initiation of members, the conduct of its meetings, and for such other matters as it may deem wise so to regulate.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The officers of the society shall be a President and a Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected at each annual meeting of the society.

SECTION 2. The President and Treasurer shall discharge the duties usually devolving upon these officers.

SECTION 3. The Secretary shall receive, file and answer, when necessary, all communications made to the society, and shall report his doings at each annual meeting.

Within a fortnight after each annual meeting of the society, the Secretary shall send to all the other branches of *Phi Beta Kappa* a letter containing the names of the members admitted during the current year, the names of the officers, and any other information which it may be important to communicate.

He shall also keep a fair and full record of the proceedings of the society at their meetings; and whenever he may be absent, the society shall appoint a secretary *pro tempore*. He shall also give notification of all meetings as the President may direct.

SECTION 4. The Executive Committee of the society shall consist of the President, the Secretary and Treasurer, and three additional members to be chosen by the society by ballot at the regular annual meeting. The government of the Chapter shall be vested in this Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II.

MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. This Chapter shall hold a regular annual meeting on Tuesday, immediately preceding Commencement, at such place and hour as the Executive Committee may appoint.

SECTION 2. At the annual meeting the Secretary shall read the Constitution of this Chapter.

SECTION 3. At the regular annual meeting of the Chapter, shall occur the election of members of the Senior class entitled to elec-

tion and the nomination of candidates for election to honorary membership.

SECTION 4. Special meetings may be held at the call of the Executive Committee, at such place and time as it shall deem proper. The Executive Committee shall issue such call whenever requested in writing to do so by five members of the Chapter.

SECTION 5. The Secretary shall cause notice of the annual meetings to be published in one or more daily papers of this city, at least two days before the time of such meetings.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERSHIP.

SECTION 1. Within the limits prescribed by the Constitution, viz: that no more than one-fourth of the entire number of graduates for any year shall be elected, only those students shall be eligible whose average rank for the entire course upon the records of the College at the end of the Senior year shall be ninety per cent. Further, each Division of Colby College (Men's and Women's) shall be entitled, within the charter limit, to the number of members *proportional* to the number of graduates in each Division of the College. In other words, not more than one-fourth of the graduates of *each Division* are eligible to active membership in the Chapter, and of this number, only those who have attained an average rank of ninety per cent. for the entire course.

The names of these students, upon the nomination of the Faculty of Colby College at a meeting held prior to the date of the regular annual meeting of the Chapter, shall be presented to the Chapter at its annual meeting. After their election, these students may signify their acceptance of election, receive formal recognition, and enroll their names in the book of the Society. Those who fail to do so, except for good and sufficient reasons, shall be regarded as having declined their election. In case any member elected fails to notify the Secretary and remit his initiation fee to the Treasurer within twenty days after notification, he shall be deemed to have declined the election.

In the case of students who have been admitted from other colleges to advanced standing in Colby College, their rank at such other colleges shall be taken into account in considering their eligibility to election to membership.

SECTION 2. Members of other Chapters of *Phi Beta Kappa* shall

have the rights of honorary membership in the Beta Chapter of the State of Maine, but they shall not have the right to vote in its proceedings.

SECTION 3. No graduate of another college, where there is a branch of *Phi Beta Kappa*, shall be elected to membership in this Chapter until the permission of that Chapter shall have been secured.

ARTICLE IV.

HONORARY MEMBERS.

SECTION 1. Persons of distinction may be made honorary members of the Chapter, but such members shall not be entitled to vote at the meetings of the Chapter.

SECTION 2. Honorary members shall be elected only at the regular annual meeting of the Chapter. Nominations for such election, made in accordance with Section 4 below, must have been presented to the Executive Committee prior to the regular annual meeting.

SECTION 3. Upon balloting for the admission of honorary members, if more than three negative votes shall have been cast, the candidate shall be declared not elected. When only three negative votes shall have been cast, the President shall give the persons so voting an opportunity to state their reasons, if they shall see fit to do so. The society shall then proceed to a second ballot, and if, upon such ballot, no more than three negative votes shall have been thrown, the person for whom the ballot is thrown shall be declared elected.

SECTION 4. A person may be nominated by the Executive Committee to honorary membership on the written request of at least ten members.

ARTICLE V.

ELECTIONS.

SECTION 1. The officers of the Chapter shall be elected at the regular annual meeting, to serve for one year, or until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE VI.

FUNDS.

SECTION 1. There shall be an initiation fee of two dollars.

ARTICLE VII.

QUORUM.

Ten members present at any meeting shall be regarded as constituting a quorum for the election of members and for the transaction of any other business.

ARTICLE VIII.

AMENDMENT.

No addition, alteration or amendment shall be made to these By-Laws without the consenting vote of three-fourths of the number present at a regular meeting of the Chapter.

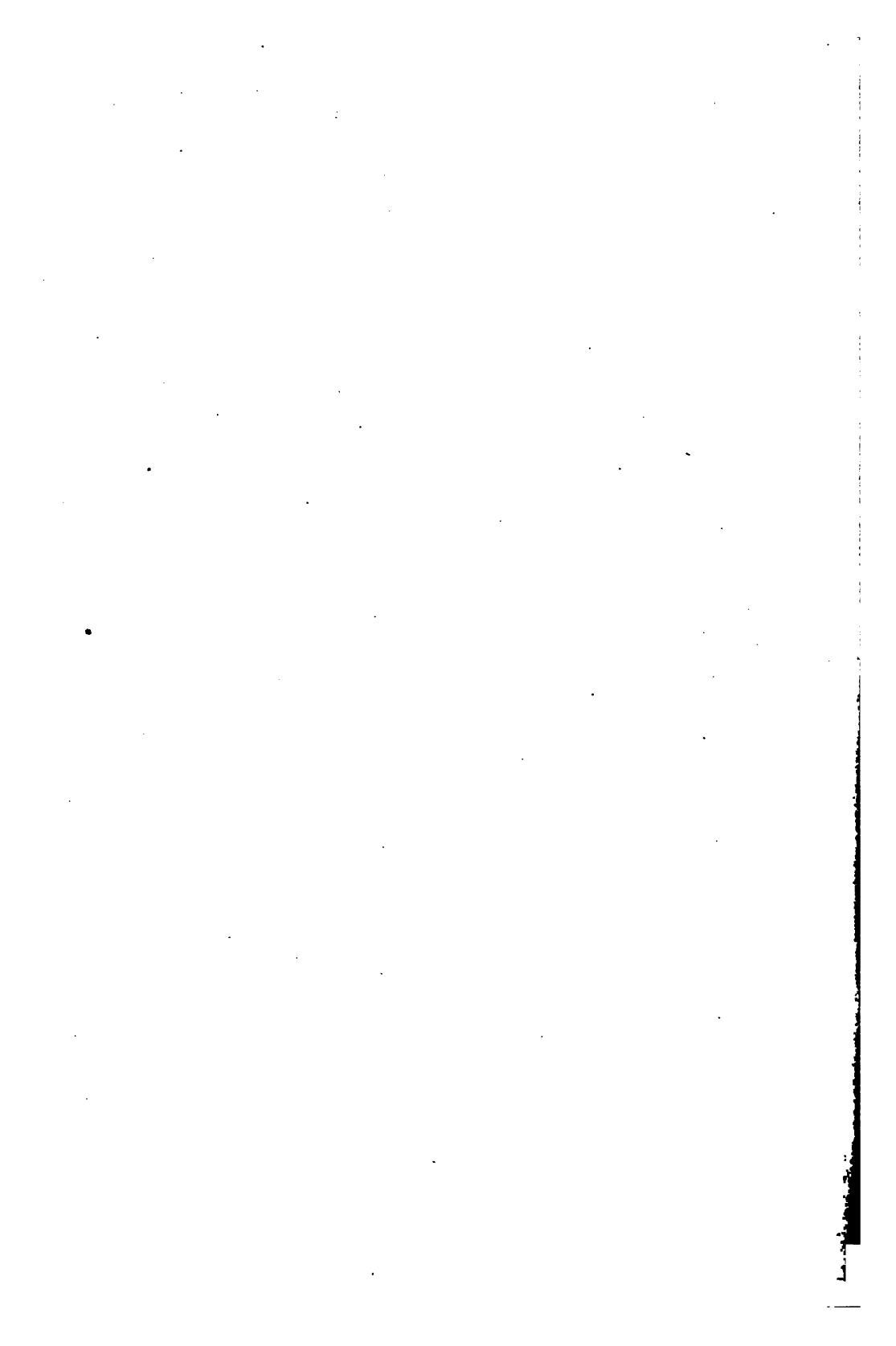

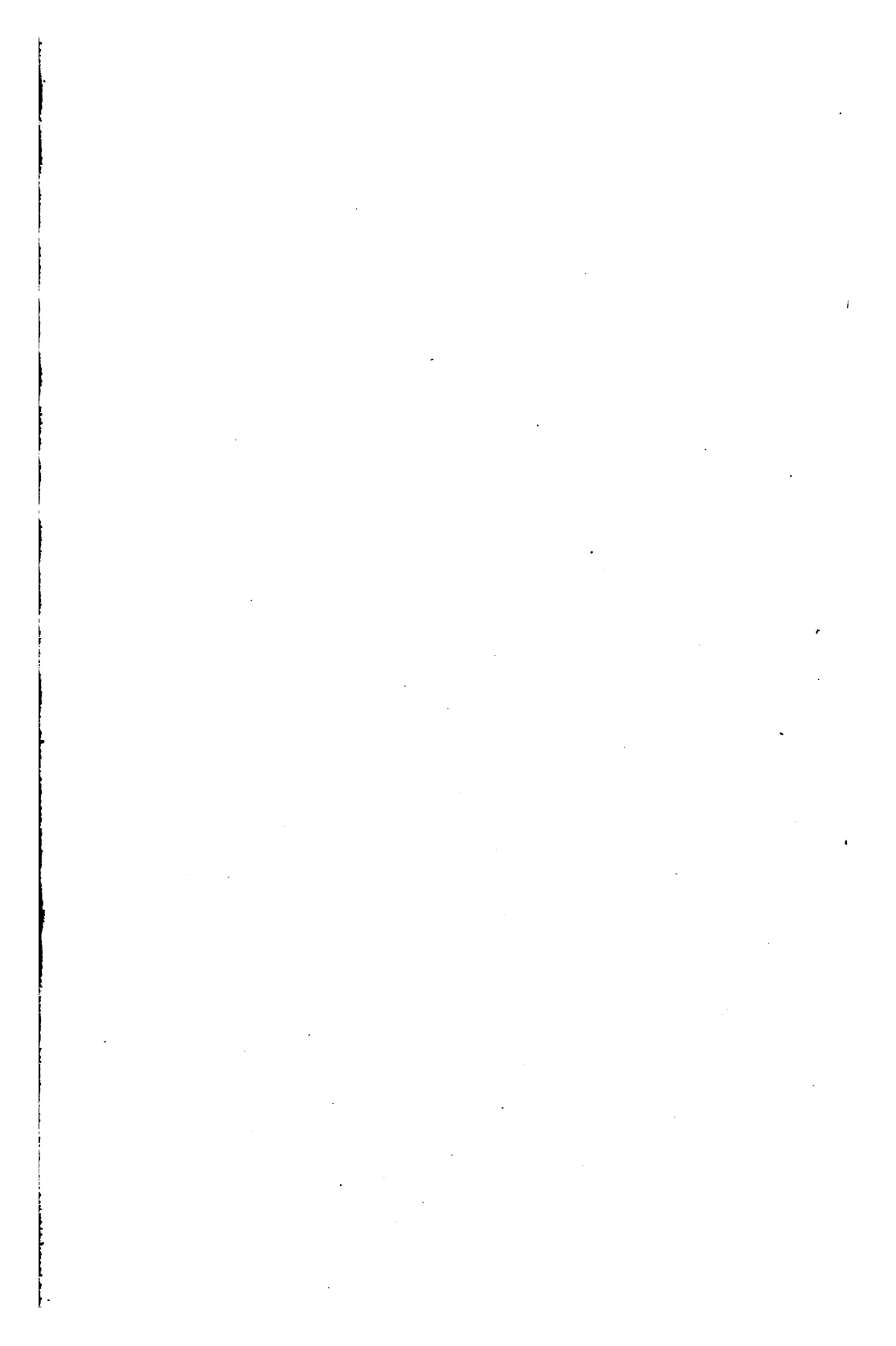

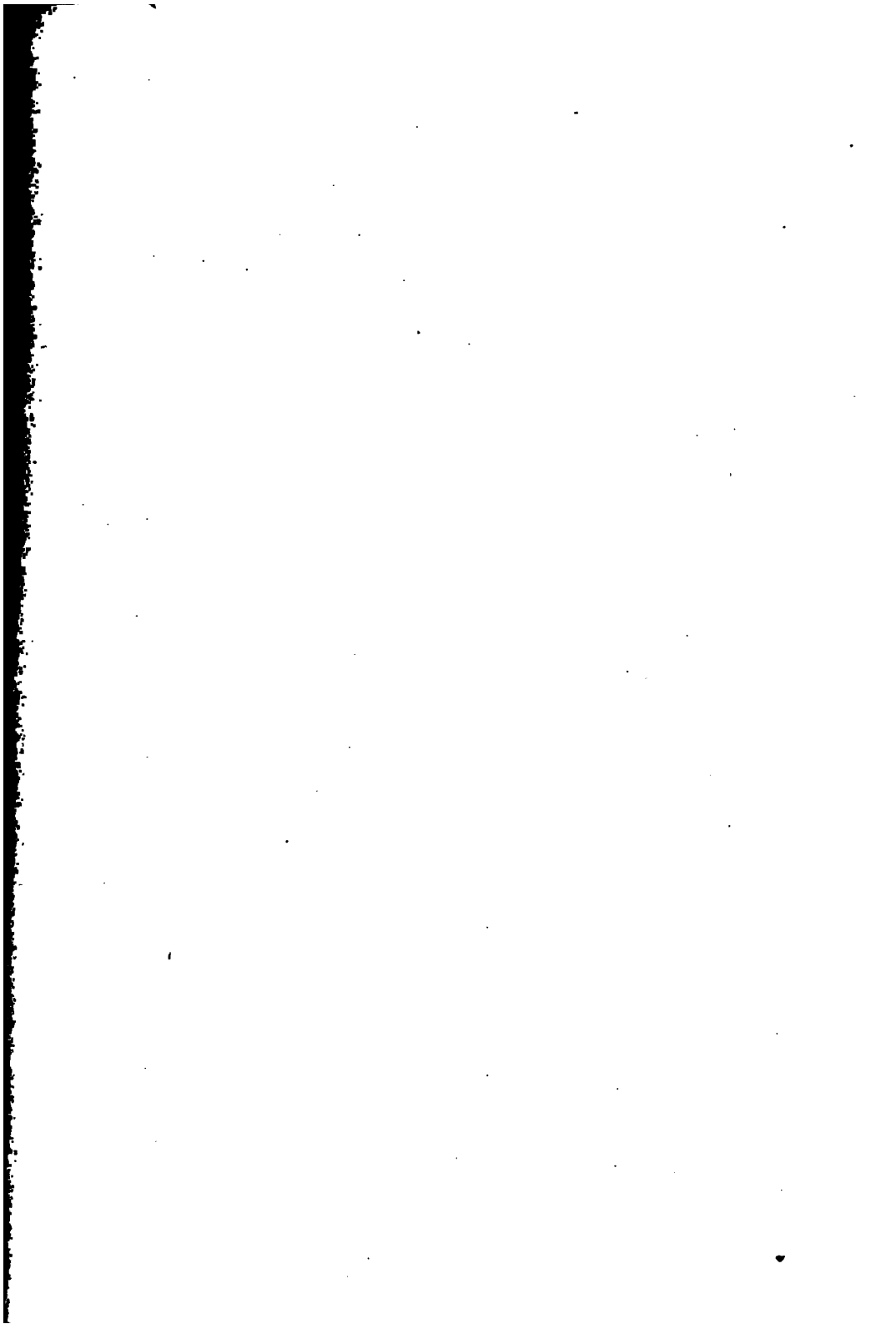
