THE HATHORN FAMILIES OF MAINE AND THE WEST:

WITH ENGLISH AND AMERICAN ANCESTRY.

COMPILED BY REV. CHAS. N. SINNETT, FERTILE, MINN.

This Genealogy was prepared at the earnest request of many of the Hathorn Family in their widely-separated homes in the West. Though far from the old Pine Tree State where their ancestors had fought so bravely in every good cause, and where their honest dealings with neighbors and strangers had made the Hathorn name shine brightly, they felt deeply grateful for all these precious heritages which had been handed down to them. With every one of their successes in life, in the many Western States where they had lived, they felt the inspiration of these lives that had been so grandly lived on the rocky coast of Maine, or under its whispering pines. Their great regret was that, because of their busy lives, they did not know more about their ancestors. They realized, too, that what had been handed down to them from the past was not always to be relied upon. Whenever they had made even slight researches into the family history they had always found that their people had been even of a truer and sturdier type than they had been told. So the appeal grew stronger each twelvemonth, "Out of your forty and more ^{years} of writing of history tell us all that you can of our Hathorn Line in America, and across the seas."

And when this matter was put before the Hathorns of Maine it was found that many of them had the same desire for a Hathorn History as their Western relatives,

Ma. librarians and genealogists joined in this plea, as they had but scanty Hathorne data outside of the line of the famous author, Nathaniel Hawthorne. Even this which they had gleaned for old Town Records, &c., was not always correct.

The author of this work very soon discovered that the task given to him was not an easy one. as the data, held by old families and Town records, were as scanty as those found in print. Many records had been destroyed in the burning of old homes. Others had been written down from tradition, which had always been striving to make all of the Hathornes of Maine, and sometimes all of those in America, to be of the Nathaniel Hawthorne Line.

One who was supposed to be an authority on Hathorne data simply stated, "It took many years for us to learn that our Hathorn ancestor was only a brother of the American ancestor of Nathaniel Hawthorne." There was evidently a shadow of disappointment in this discovery, for nothing was clearly given in regard to the ancestry of the Hathornes of Maine.

The Town Records of Woolwich, Me., which was the early home of the most important branch of the Hathorne Family in Maine, were found to have been poorly kept. Then Rev. Dr. Henry Thayer of 373 W. 116th St., N.Y. City, was pointed out as an authority on these important matters. He had lived in Woolwich, Me., for many years, and had written much on the early history of that town. He promptly replied, but explained that he was now a very old man and could not give much time to the Hathorn records. His answer was briefly this: "The John Hathorne of Sheepscott (Boothbay), Maine, was a a Salem, Mass., merchant, who started into the land business based on an old Indian deed--but that was 70 years before the Hathornes came to Woolwich, Me., and there was no relationship that I could ever discover between these families. Leave this man, John Hathorn, and

William Hathorn of St. Georges River, out of the Woolwich data. These Hathornes of Woolwich, Me., came there from Wilington, Mass., but seem to have originated in Lynn, Mass., four or more generations before. The Hathornes made a numerous tribe in Maine., seven men entering the voting list at Woolwich, Me., between 1766 and 1790. But I have studied them less than any of the other Woolwich families, because of their numbers and the complexity of their history. In a word, a widow Hathorne and four or five sons came to Woolwich, Me., as ancestors of that strong old family there. To separate and unite these families would require the ~~study~~ study of every Town Record for a hundred years. I have most of the marriage dates, and fewer of the death records."

This was all that could be secured from this which had always been reported to be a "mine of treasures." But the author had learned before this "to keep the trail." And after several years of hard work he discovered the important reseraches of Mr. Asbury C. Hathorn of Dresden, Me., and Aurora, Ills., to which his son, Frank E. Hathorn, had aced much. Thus the ancestry of the Woolwich, Me., Hathorns was clearly established. With the help of many other kind friends the work has been pushed forward into its present form.

In the line of the Woolwich, Me., Hathorns the name is spelled, Hathorn, the way that most of these people preferred. The numbering of their generations from the English Ancestor is given because they preferred that method. It is very easy for any one to count down his generation from the American Ancestor, if he prefers that method.

In reply to many queries about the spelling of this family name the author presents the forms found in old documents, though the spelling in England as seen in that line of ancestor, would seem to be correct. Ancient and modern forms of the name: Hawthorne--Hauthorne--Harthorne---Hathorne--- and Hathorn. The Hathorns of Maine claim that their ancestors

changed the spelling of the name to Hathorn, so that their letters from their friends in England would be sure to reach them. Evidently that form of spelling did not long prevail.

Much has been given in this work regarding the descendants of the female Hathorne Lines, as some of the strongest family characteristics have thus been handed down through long generations, and because such lines are almost wholly ignored by many genealogists.

Though Nathaniel Hawthorne's great love for the hills and streams of Maine, and for Bowdoin College where he spent so many happy days, are well known, space has not been given to his records, because they are so well preserved. The ~~interest~~ interest of this work is centered on a Line equally noble and faithful in all walks of life.

"He lived at Georgetown, Me., on the Kennebec River, near where the city of Bath now stands, and was there at an early date. In 1759 what is now Woolwich, Me., was set off from Georgetown, Me."

Sketch from the Bath, Me., Independent, Sept 23, 1911:

"One of the oldest, largest, and best known , families of all Woolwich, Me., bears the name of Hathorne., and all are well-to-do people who have worked hard and won success in their labors. Many of the family have remained at Woolwich, and are reckoned among the most prosperous citizens of the town. Some have held Town offices, and have always held them in a creditable manner. The name of Hathorne is a good one wherever one may go in the town. One of the earliest settlers at Woolwich, Me., was Lt. John Hathorne, who was an officer in the Revolutionary War, and whose body lies buried in the little cemetery at Nequassett, along with those of many good men and true of that period. From him have descended many Hathornes. His son, Daniel Hathorne, was born in Woolwich and lived there all of his life. Something over fifty years ago he passed on to the great Beyond. Daniel Hathorne took the farm on which his son, Albert Hathorne, now lives, and wrested it from the wilderness, cutting off the trees, tearing out the stumps, and making from the forest fertile fields and garden patches. Later on, he sold the place to his son, Hartley Hathorne, and went to a point near Day's Ferry, and built the large, old--fashioned, square,

house which all admire so much. It is one of the oldest houses in the town, having withstood the storms and sunshine of over one hundred years, and is still in a good state of preservation and repair. It was built of good old material, which was then more easily secured than it could be now. To see some of the hoarding in this house would make some builders of to-day envious; great, wide boards, which, though they may have been in service for over a century, are still as sound as a nut. Daniel Hathorne was one of those sturdy old characters, so well identified with the times in which he lived. He was always at work, and always surmounting every obstacle which presented itself. He was a farmer, and yet he did something at fishing in the right season. He cut many trees, and hauled out many logs, and, to add to his occupations, he for many years conducted a saw mill at Woolwich, Me., and at these mills was sawed much of the lumber which is found in the old houses of the town. Many know the Hathorne farm best from the fact that the late Capt. Guy C. Goss, for many years one of Bath, Maine's leading citizens, and prominent shipbuilders, owned this farm, which thus became known as the Goss farm. Some years ago this property was sold to Isaac B. Howard, who is one of the most prosperous farmers of Woolwich, Me. He is getting large crops from this farm of over one hundred acres. Daniel Hathorne still has living a large number of grandchildren and also many great-grandchildren. His removals did not show the spirit of a "rolling stone that gathers no moss," but reveals the excellent traits of his pioneer ancestors richly inherited. He looked over the lands and prospects in new towns as carefully as his ancestors had done when they left their homes in Mass. for the coat towns of Maine. He prospered far more than those whose constant song, was, "This home place is good enough for me!"

He was very practical in all of his plans and dealings. He had a quaint vein of humor, which would surely have given him the opportunity for a ringing laugh that would have made the Maine woods echo joyously if he could have read what a mixture of absurdities one made in writing of his family and Hathorn Line. It is thus expressed, "James Hathorn was of German Extraction, and his children dropped the e and w in their Hawthorne name, so that people would not know their Dutch origin." His pure English origin is clearly seen in the Family History, and he always signed his name Hathorn.

James Hathorn married at Woolwich, Me., Nov 6th 1785
Mary Thwing, born at Woolwich, Me., July 31, 1764; and died in that town, Apr 4, 1805; a woman of sterling qualities; the daughter of Judge Nathaniel Thwing and Abigail Greenough.

she was thus descended from the very enterprising and intellectual families of Mass., members of which early moved to the Pine Tree State. 14 children.

THE RECORDS OF SENAS HATHORN OF THE TENTH GENERATION.

(10th generation) Senas Hathorn b Bowdoinham, Me.,
Mch 24, 1792; d at Athens, Me., Sept 17, 1875, aged 83
years, 5 months and 13 days. He was one of the
sturdiest pioneers of Maine. He had inherited in
large measure the great spirit of enterprise from
his ancestors, and throughout his long and useful
life he cultivated this. "Onward and Upward" was
surely the glowing motto of his life. In 1813, a sturdy
young man of 21 years, he removed from Bowdoinham,
Me., to Solon, Me. He bought a section of Government
land of 160 acres. He had a friend take up the section
of 160 acres next to his, and later on he bought
this fine section of land. This land was bought of
Mass., as Maine did not become a State until 1820.
The capital of Senas Hathorn was a yoke of oxen, and
the \$100.00, which he had earned by very hard, honest
work, and he had grit enough for five ordinary men.
These Hathorn sections of land were about one mile
from the town line of Athens, Me., and half way between
the villages of Athens and Solon, Me. There were no

roads at that time, and people went on horseback along the rough paths through the woods. In the nearest opening in the forest to the east Senas Hathorn's brother Jacob located. It was about one and a half miles to the opening to the west, where lived the Batons, from whom that neighborhood took its name. Senas Hathorn built a cozy home, but not of logs, as was the custom of those days, and he had it neatly clapboarded. There were four rooms, and before long other rooms were added to these. The school of the neighborhood was sometimes held in one of these rooms. In 1859 Mr. Hathorn built quite a large house on the eastern section of his land, and this dwelling is still in good condition. The first house was moved to the other side of the road. In 1870 Senas Hathorn built a barn, 100 feet in length, which is still in fine condition. He was as energetic and skilled farmer as ever lived in New England. He was never found idling away his time, or peddling the idle news of a gossip. In his estimation, any man who spent his time in fishing, was no good. All of his bills were paid very promptly, and a more thoroughly honest man never lived in the Pine Tree State. Senas Hathorn has been described as tall and straight, with dark eyes and brown hair, and fine, white teeth, as he had never used tobacco in any form. When he was advanced in life he still had no use for glasses, and as wonderfully well preserved in all other ways. He was a great reader, and a thorough Christian of the old-fashioned type, always reading daily from the Bible in his home, and having family prayers. He gave long and helpful exhortations whenever "liberty was given" at the preaching services.

He had a great love for his home and children, and hoped that all of his boys might settle near him. He brought them up to work faithfully on the farm. He always said, "My children can learn addition, but not division." These children used to go to school at the house of a neighbor named Eaton, and they followed a path through the woods. They carried a cow bell which they were to ring in case that they met bears, or any kind of trouble. The mother, without their knowing it, often followed them, and always went out to meet them when the school was over. The tradition has been carefully handed down that "no one ever outwitted Senas Hathorn." At one time he wished to buy a ten-acre lot of land. Capt. Eaton, who owned this land, bluntly told him that he would never have one inch of it. Before the sun set that night Senas Hathorn found a man who quickly bought this land, and it was soon a part of the big Hathorn farm. It is said that he used to drive a wonderful horse, a buckskin; she was strong, and could go like the wind. The neighbors constantly said, "Hathorn will get his neck broken, or his head smashed."

But nothing of the kind ever came to pass. The roads were very rough at that time, but he would dash up and down the hills as though only a long strip of prairie was before him. Such a life as his sends inspiration for work, piety, and honest living, down the long generations of the descendants. And the records of the family of Senas Hathorn, and those of the line to the present day, and every one must feel that a life like his was indeed well worth living. His wives were noble Christian women, whose help and cheer was known far and wide.

hard-working, faithful, honest farmer. As he was the
oldest son of the family he was given great tasks
to do, and never shirked them in the least. All that
was placed before him by his father was regarded
as wisely and lovingly planned. When he was but 10
years old he drove a large load of hay up to the
Forks of the River, a distance of 50 miles, over roads
that were anything but easy. He did this carefully. This
was a sample of things which he undertook all along

his faithful way of life. Like many others of his time he was often told of "great opportunities," in new States, and in many other places. But he well knew that it was his father's wish that his sons should stay by the old homestead which he had carved out of the forest. And he staid at home, thus giving great joy to his parents, and in these faithful deeds laid the grand foundations of a truly noble life. And he handed down to his children an example which made that of his own sturdy, noble type. His home was one where the Bible was always honored and where daily prayers were never put aside, no matter what urgent tasks or hard trials weighed upon the days. He was a faithful member of the Solon, Me., Methodist Church. The Pastor of that Church every four weeks held Sunday Services in the waton school house near Mr. Hathorn's home. He always took charge of the music at those services, as he and all members of his father's family were fine musicians. When his daughter had learned to play the Melodeon that instrument was taken to the school house to help in the services, which, largely because of the life and cheer of this noble man, were always largely attended, and through them many were guided to a better life. As Sarah Franklin Hathorn brought up his children to thorough obedience, and dearly loved them, buying them books, musical instruments, and doing all in his power to make them happy and useful. His ideas of education were far in advance of the times in which he lived, and he took great pains to have every member of his large family well instructed, sending them to Somerset Academy, while several of them graduated from Kent's Hill, Me., Academy, with a fine standing in all of their classes. With honest pride he could say, what

the entire neighborhood knew to be a great truth. "Not a black sheep in my flock." Nothing pleased him more than to have his children about him, with a house full of company, and all joining in one of the "Sings", which were known far and wide. He was appointed Justice of the Peace by Governor Coburn, and after that was always spoken of as "Square Hathorn." Though weary with his days of long, arduous work, he always found time to read many good books, and he kept thoroughly posted in the events of the day. During the Civil War he would each day drive five miles to Selon, Me., for the mail, and would return with all the letters and papers for the Waten neighborhood where he lived. When the news came of the death of Abraham Lincoln, his heart was almost broken, and he mourned for him as for a brother. He gave up his dear son, Franklin Augustus, to the service of his country. His prayers for America in these times of sorrow were such that many, who had lost faith in their country and God's care, were led to a firm belief in the righteous ending of the great Civil War struggle. Fenas Hathorn was not much over five feet in height, but his body was strong and hardy, and he was very quick and active in all of his movements. Even in his old age the saying was widely echoed, "Squire Hathorn will always be as spry as a cat." This led him to be promptly on hand at every place where he had an engagement, or where he felt that he could be of any help in the neighborhood. When he was to take any member of the family to school, or to any other place, he expected them to be ready when the horse was at the door. When he found them following his own fine example of promptness his

fine dark eyes closed with pride as he thought of what their punctuality meant for their future successes in life. He was a man of few words, and that twinkle in his eyes meant much to those who knew him well. He bought his father's old home and the 160 acres of land. The new home which he built in 1884, with its cozy rooms, and grassy lawn, is still standing, and is still pointed out as a center of great helpfulness in the old days, while many from coast to coast thank God for its family altar and cheer. Mr. Hathorn was a Granger, and for many years Treasurer of the organization of which he was a member.

One truly says of Elvira (Morse) Hathorn, "She was a sweet lady and a remarkable woman." Another who knew her well writes, "She had dark blue eyes, dark hair, and a light, smooth skin. She was very quick of perception, and had a fine Christian spirit; was always ready to help in every place where there was sorrow or need; and especially ready to overlook the mistakes of others. She never thought that people went to be seen or had. She was so full of sympathy that every one in the neighborhood sought her help and advice on the problems of life. She listened patiently, and helped cheerily, no matter how trivial were the matters that were brought to her. Warmest and faithful, and always ready to have a good joke, and a harmless bit of fun. She could

be stern when any occasion demanded it, and when her mind had been spoken all knew that it was wisely guided, and that nothing could change it---and her children loved her dearly. She could turn her hand to almost any kind of work; to spin the wool and flax was her delight, and during the Civil War she had great pleasure in weaving blankets, towels, or whatever was needed; and she made the cloth for the mens' suits and for the childrens' dresses. She was never idle; if she sat down the knitting was always at hand. Her hair was always neatly combed, and no caller ever came and found her untidy. Wherever she went she looked the true lady that she was. She could speak in public without the least bit of confusion, and often took part in the Grange meetings at Solon, Wv., where she and her husband were very faithful members. She often wrote papers for the Grange, and they had great clearness and helpfulness on whatever subject needed discussion. She was always cheerful and hopeful. Her great faith in God gave her no reason to complain or find fault with her lot. Though she must have known that she was the prettiest woman in the town, she never gave a hint of pride or vanity over this. She wished only to be thought of as a true helper at home and in every neighbor's house where she was needed, no matter how humble the homes might be where she was called. She cared as tenderly for the child of her husband's first marriage as if he had been her own, and it could be truly said of all in her house, 'Her children rise up and call her blessed.' "

 (1st generation) The American ancestor of this line was Major William Hathorne, who was born in England about 1607; died at Salem, Mass., 1681, aged 74 years. He was the son of William Hathorne & his wife Sarah, of Binfield, Berkshire, England. Major William Hathorne's will was published Jan 26th, 1681. He came to America in 1638 with Governor Winthrop in the ship Arbella. He first lived at Rochester, Mass., where he had a grand of land. He was very prominent in the affairs of his time, as is shown by the Mass. Bay Colony Records. He was Deputy to the General Court for 14 terms, admitted a Freeman in 1634, Deputy from Rochester, Mass., 1635 & 1637. He removed to Salem, Mass., and was many times Deputy from that town. In 1644 he was elected Speaker of the General Court for his first term, and he served many other terms. In 1648 he was made Assistant and remained in that office until 1679. He was one of the most influential, energetic, and able men in New England. His military career began at Boston, Mass., in 1629, when he is mentioned as being present at "Training." He was Captain of a 30men, Mass., Company from May, 1646, and was Major before 1656. His religious opinions were severe and bigoted, and he was arbitrary and intolerant in the administration of affairs in the Church and State; yet he was a fearless advocate of the personal right of freedom against the over-reaching authority exhibited by the real emissaries and agents of England. His worth, and the value of his citizenship

to the little village of Salem, Mass., which is called "the foremost of all the Puritan Communities," induced the Salem Town Authorities to urge him to settle in their midst. The voice of the people was thus expressed in Town Meeting. As an inducement for his coming to Salem the town granted him 250 acres of land. His famous descendant, Nathaniel Hawthorne, says of him, "He had all the Puritan traits, both the good and the evil." His wife Anne was a worthy woman.

with A.B. He was Valedictorian of his high

school class, and during his College course he

excelled in literary work, and was a leader in

College and society life. Of a humorous turn of

mind, and brilliant in repartee, his presence was

sought in all of the social gatherings of the

College, as well as at Bath, Me. His poem at

the Bath, Me., Centennial Celebration, was of a

very high order. He was a Democrat, and

accepted a place on the staff of Maine's Governor,

Morris K. Canfield. His first editorial work was

at Jacksonville, Florida, where he lived 1887--

1890, bravely staying there through the

entire yellow fever epidemic, and through the

press rallied aid for Florida. He did this,

though every hour of his stay there meant

the risk of his life. By his meritorious work

he won a place on a journal of N.Y. City,

where he lived 1890--1894. He was witty, facile,

graceful and generous. His story in the "Sales

of Bowdoin College," is the best in that volume.

His place on the N.Y. Commercial was nobly filled.

From 1894 until his death he lived at Montclair,

N.J. From the "History of Maine," Colonel Frank

Warren Hathorne became associated in business with

his father soon after he left College., owing to a severe accident which deprived his father of active participation in any business for some months. He took the entire charge of his father's business in spite of the fact that his design on leaving College was to take up literature as his vocation. He was kept from that purpose until 1885. Thus he gave eleven of what he considered his best years to business pursuits. He never gave up his purpose to take up journalism, and he was strengthened in his purpose through the success of his contributions to both the newspaper press and the current magazines. His various articles were not only readily accepted and published, but were widely read. His faith in himself was made strong by the success of his poem at the Bath, Me., Centennial, Nov., 1861. It was so favorably received and commented on by the entire press of Me., that he impatiently awaited the opportunity to carry out his ambitious journalistic plans. His Democratic political faith, inherited from his father, and from both his grandfathers, made him an active participant in the campaign of 1876 & 1880., as well as in the Maine Gubernational campaign. On the election of Harris W. Plaisted as Governor of Maine he named young Hathorne as a member of his military staff with the rank of Lt. Colonel. He filled that position with dignity and honor until the close of his Chief's administration. In 1885, in company with John P. Varnum, he established the Jacksonville, Florida, Morning News. For two years he successfully conducted that paper under that partnership. In 1887 he was largely instrumental in organizing the Florida Printing & Publishing Company. With a capital of \$100.00. He was Secretary and Treasurer, and the

Morning News and the Evening Herald, two promising journals, were consolidated. Mr. Hathorne was made their editor. In the following May the Florida Printing & Publishing Company, which had changed its name to the Florida Publishing Company, purchased for \$55,000 the Florida Times---Union, which had been established in 1860., by Col. 000000 Chas. H. Jones, and which had the largest newspaper circulation in Florida. The Publishing Co. retained its name, and the name News-Herald became extinct. Col. Hathorne retained his editorial possession under this consolidation. The yellow fever epidemic of 1888, which wrought such havoc in the city of Jacksonville, Florida, did not spare the staff and force of the Times --Union, and during its reign of 56000000 5 months he held his post and saw every member of his editorial staff, and of the business staff as well, stricken with the disease, the editor--in--chief and the city editor proving victims of the scourge. Many of the employees of the publication department fled from the city, and, of those who stood at their posts, over 30 had the fever, and 5 of them died. The death of Martin, the editor--in--chief, in Oct., 1888, forced Colonel Hathorne to assume the editorial charge, and, with the broken staff, he not only carried on the paper, but performed the additional duties of conducting the news service of the Associated Press for the entire State of Florida. In Mch., 1890 he was formally made Managing Editor of the Times--Union, and he conducted the editorial department up to Dec 1, 1893. He then resigned to engage in newspaper and magazine work, but continued his residence in Jacksonville, His political views had meanwhile undergone a radical change. and, from a Southern point of view and local

policy pursued by the South, he became convinced that that section was making a mistake in holding to the relics of the past., especially in their support of the fallacy of free silver. In the autumn of 1895 he visited Bath, Me., and that visit resulted in his renunciation of Democracy as represented by those who controlled the policy of the party, and he sought congenial companionship in the Republican party. He espoused the candidacy of Speaker Reed, for the office of President of the U.S., and, early in Jan., 1896, when about to take a journey to the Far West to gain political information to strengthen his political candidate, he was offered the editorship of the N.Y. Evening Advertiser, and he accepted the position and continued in charge of that great metropolitan journal up to the time of its sale to Hearst in 1897. After that he was Managing Editor of the Newark, N.J., Evening News. Then, in Jan., 1890, he had charge of the editorial page and editorial policy of the N.Y. Commercial. Colonel Hathorne was affiliated with the Owl Club of N.Y. City, Bath, Me. and with the Seminole Elk Club of Jacksonville, Florida. He was a member of the Lotus Club of N.Y. City. In Florida he was a member of the New England Society and the University Association of Florida. He was also a very efficient member of the Board of Trade of Jacksonville, Florida. Colonel Frank Warren Hathorne married Eleanor Löwe Turner who was born at Bath, Me., Sept 24, 1852; and resides at 9 Bradford Place, Montclair, N.J. The daughter of Abram Augustus Turner and Isabel Curtis, both of Bath, Me. She and Col. Hathorne attended the Episcopal Church.
