





Representatives of about 200 colleges, universities, and learned societies joined more than 100 members of the faculty and staff of Stetson University in the academic processional which preceded the formal inauguration of Dr. Pope Alexander Duncan as the seventh president of Florida's oldest institution of higher learning.

The ceremony was grounded in ancient academic tradition. The representatives of the universities filled in, led by the man from the oldest in the nation—Harvard. Dr. Duncan came last in the procession behind the Stetson mace bearer. Dr. J. Ollie Edmunds, Chancellor of the university, presided during the service, and Dr. John Pelham, chairman of the board of trustees, conducted the investiture of the new president with the presentation of the traditional symbols of office—the charter and presidential medallion.

In his inaugural remarks, the new president issued a four-point moral and intellectual charge to the community, to the faculty, and to the student body. He spoke of the need in the university to produce unity in the curriculum, to provide leadership through a commitment to a set of values, to respond to the needs of the adult community, and to find ways to finance higher education in a time of a shrinking student market and inflating costs. Dr. Duncan concluded his statements by saying "I am not frightened by those who would write off the independent college. Certainly some will fail—but not institutions with tradition, commitment, a clear mission, quality, and a constituency—and Stetson has them all."






