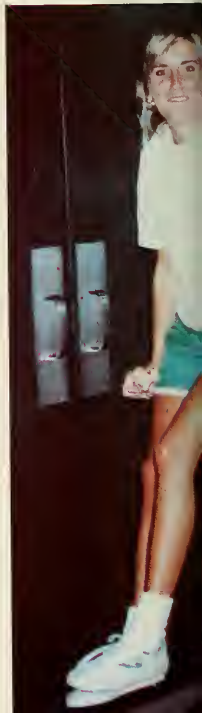

Into the Streets

"Why don't you go Into the Streets?" was the question of Stetson this year. It came with the founding of Into the Streets, a new service program open to any Stetson student. Eager to capitalize on the spare hour or two that a student might have during the week, the program promoted volunteerism in the DeLand community.

Students responded. Some became coaches for YMCA soccer teams, learned to tutor illiterate adults, or staffed a soup kitchen. Others taught crafts at a YMCA after-school program. And the whole campus came together to provide a field day for underprivileged kids from the Head Start center.

Sponsored by Stetson's service groups — YAPI, Circle K, Student Association and Habitat for Humanity — and funded by the Hollis Leadership Development Program, Into the Streets provided volunteer opportunities with community agencies and organized special service events. The officers are: Hilary Catcheran, Chairman; Jane Fleming, Publicity Chairman; Jenny Gewartowski, Special Events Coordinator; Shannon Casey, Volunteer Coordinator; Angie Jimenez, ITS Day Chairman; Ray Heskin, Treasurer; Jarrod White, Secretary.

Said Jenny Gewartowski, who worked with children at Head Start, "It's easy to talk about making a difference, but it's time to stop talking about it and to actually commit to improving the world around you. Through Into the Streets and its programming, I've been able to make a difference."

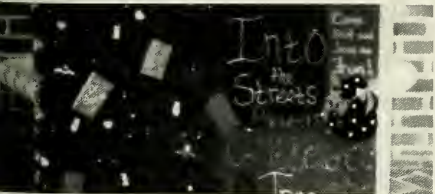

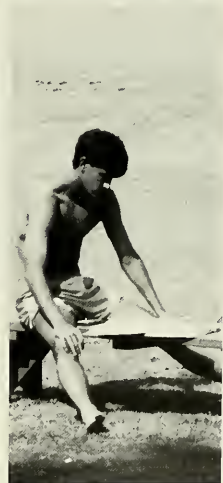

accepted their shirts a few days before sorority bid day on the 25th.

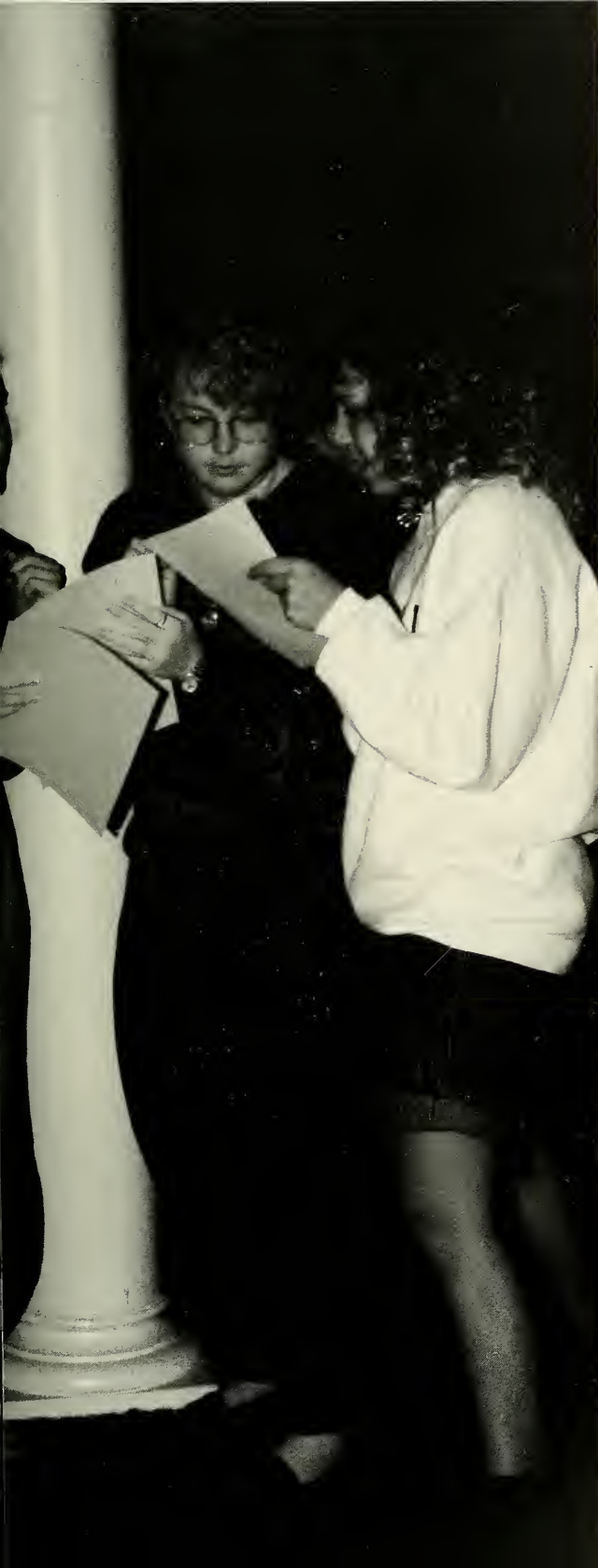

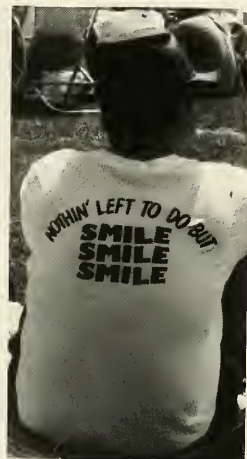

department members forced Pete to leave out the nudity. Nevertheless, the play, about a young man who worshipped horses, dealt with normality and was a success.

"The Diviners" was a fear-jerking tragedy about an emotionally disturbed boy and his older friend who tries to liberate him from his fears. The play was performed outside in the Pit and even got rained out one day. Still, it too was successful.

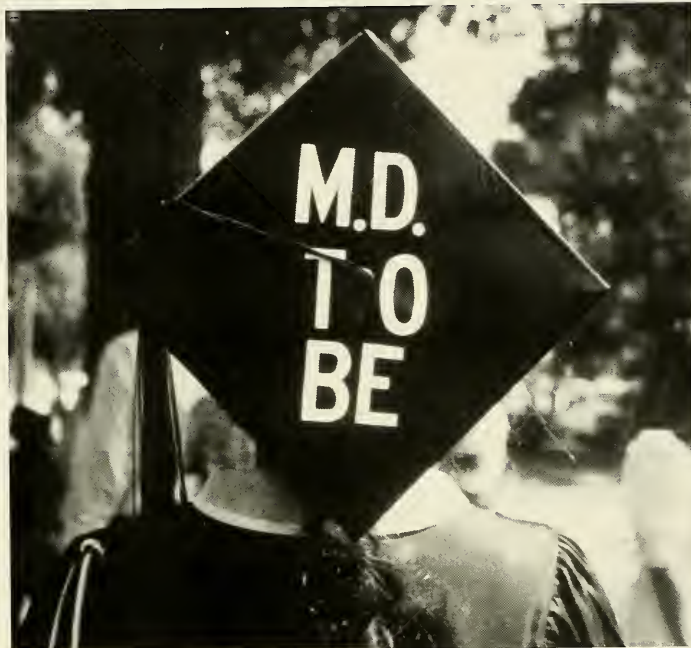

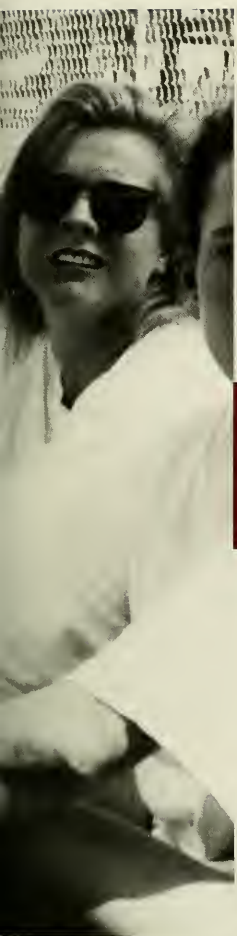

All over campus, people got

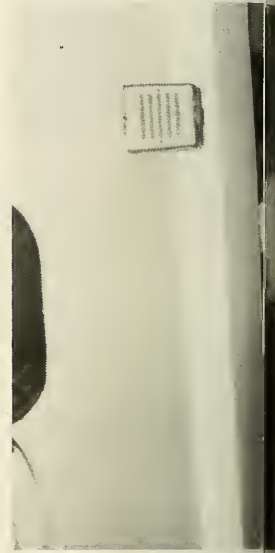
involved in some way to improve the quality of living. Rooms and lobbies were personalized and, a sense of family developed as students shared their daily catastrophes and serendipities.

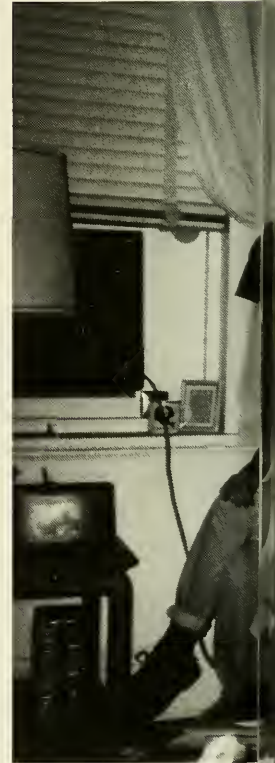

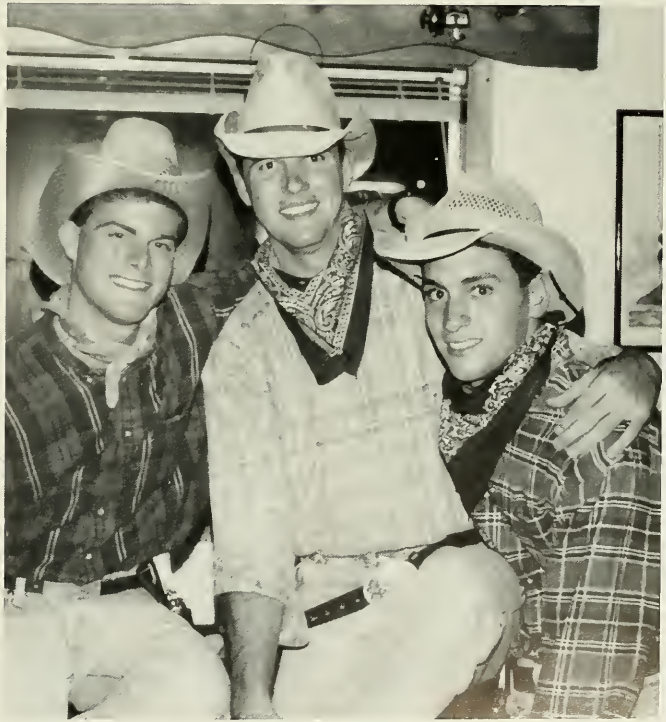
This past year was an active one for the brothers of Delta Sigma Phi. We enjoyed another full year of community service, theme parties, and intramural competitions.

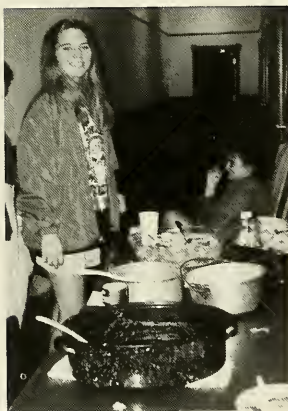
The hall itself was dirty, and the paint was peeling, but there was something about Smith Hall that set it apart from the rest of the residential life - the People.

possible.

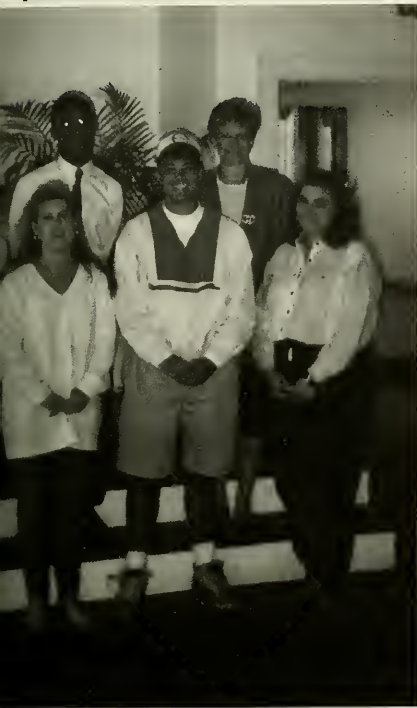

With All Honors Due

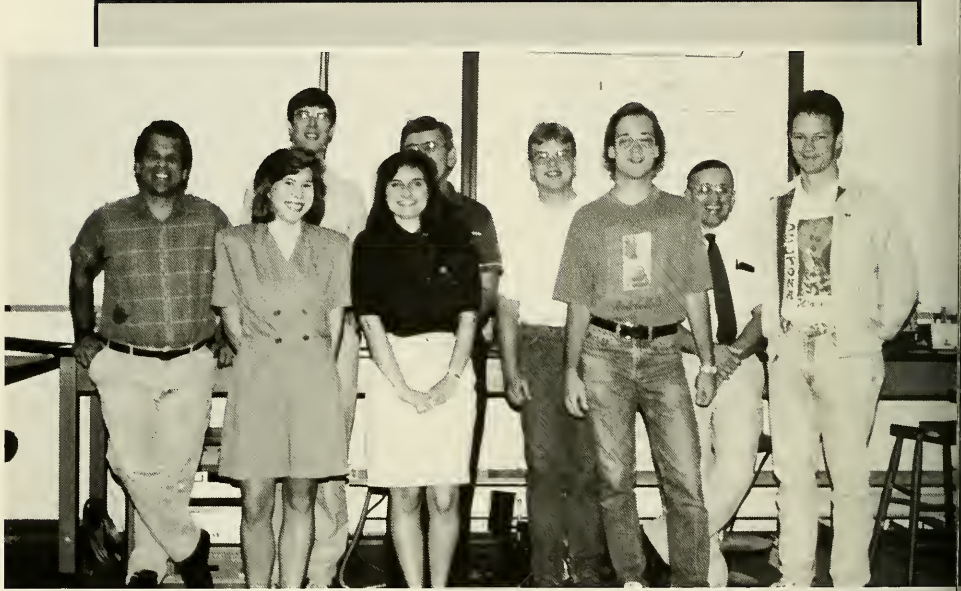

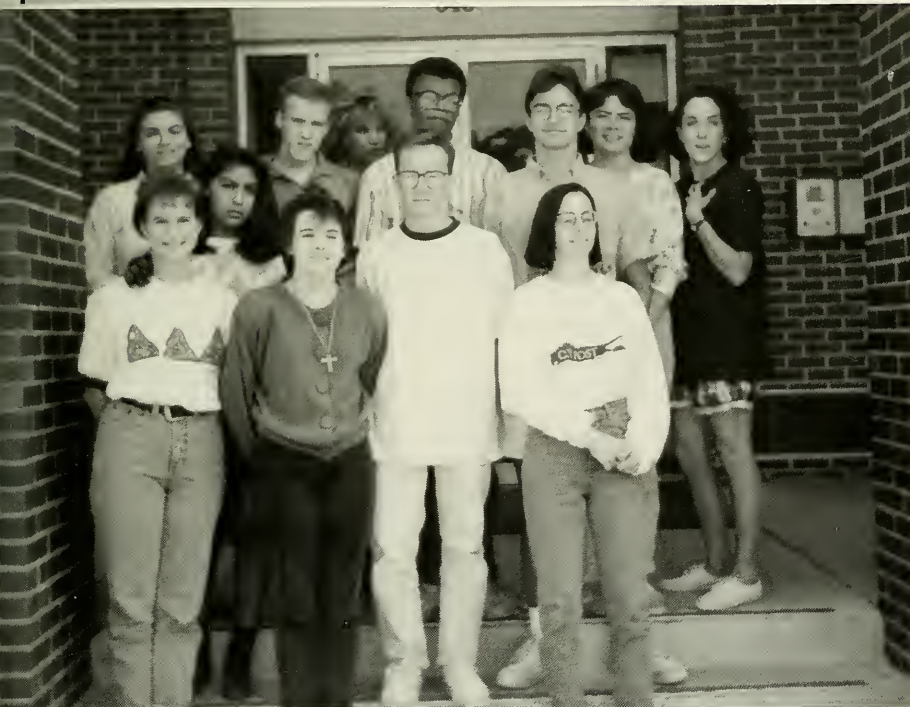

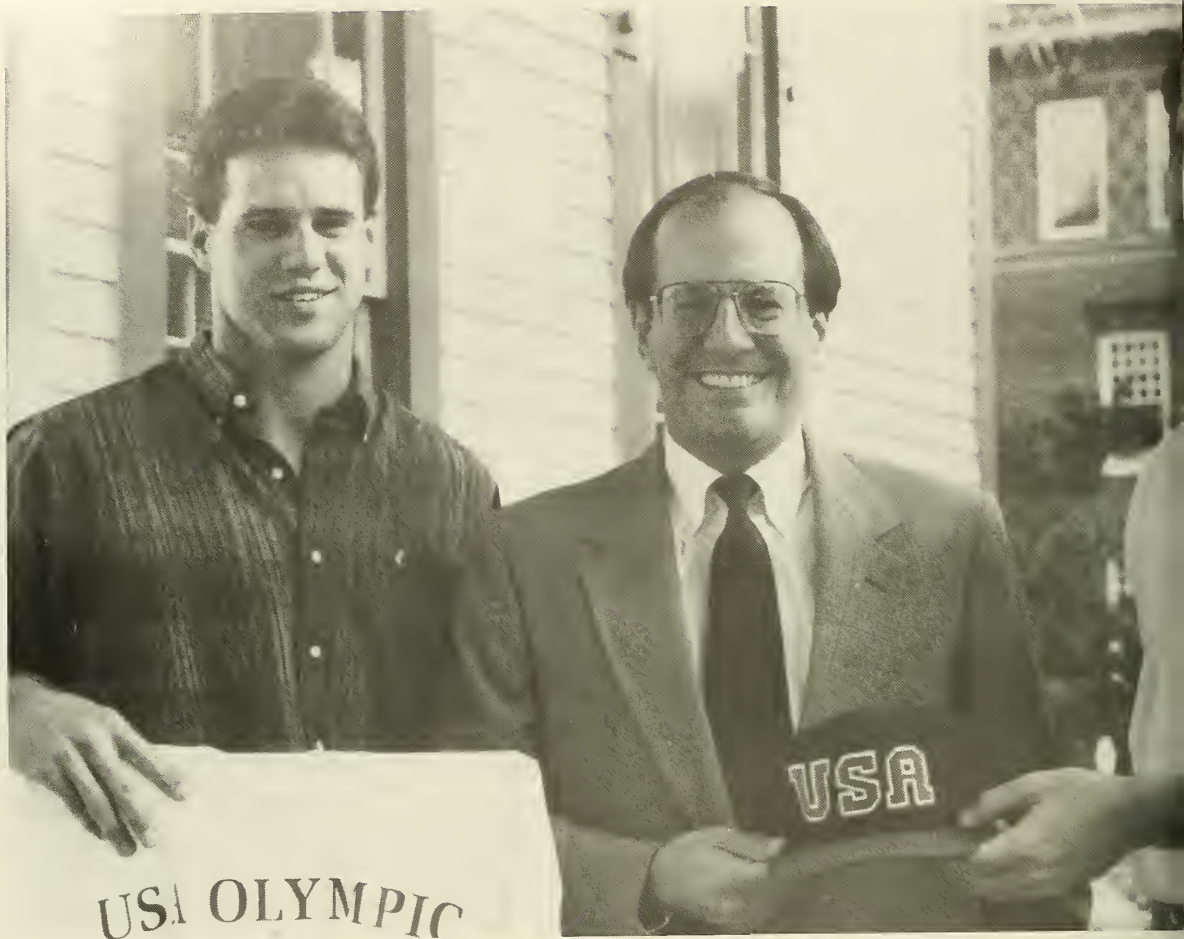

Whether shooting their character shot, the three, or pushing the zone defense, it is obvious that this team was "Too legit To Quit."

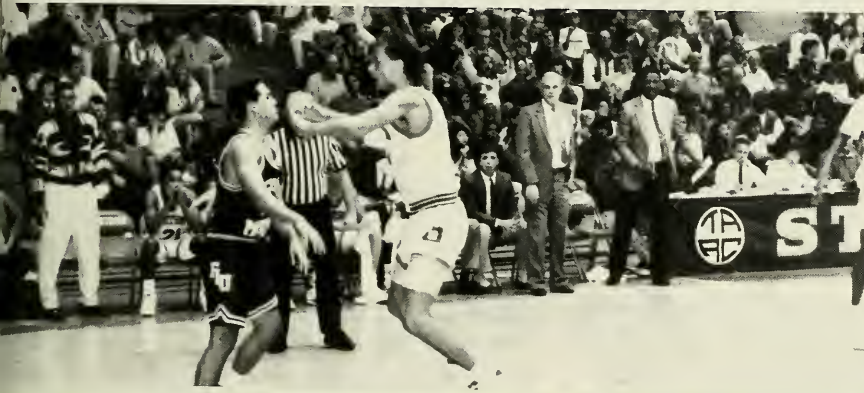

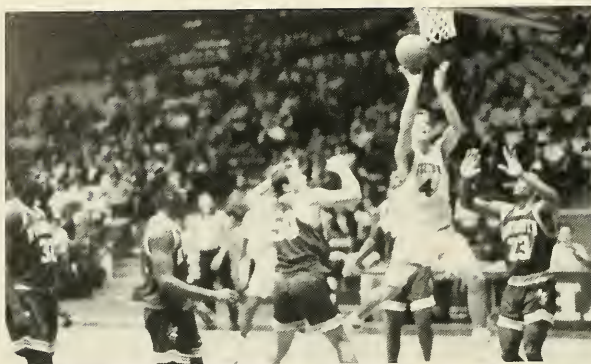

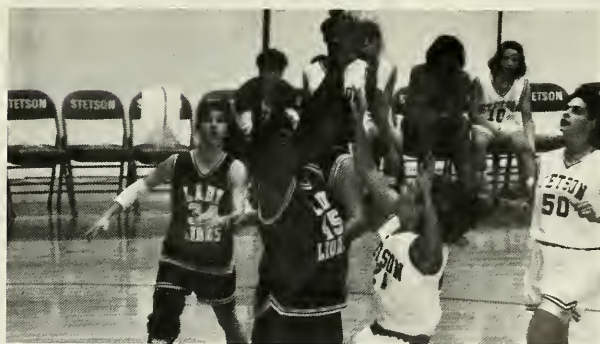

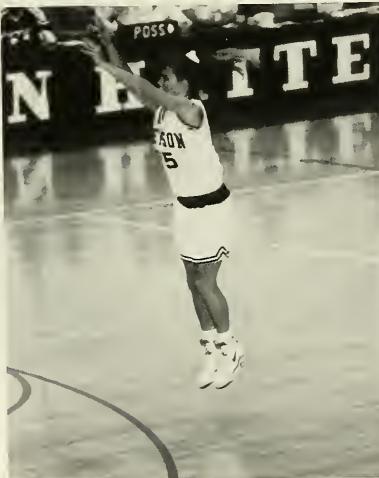

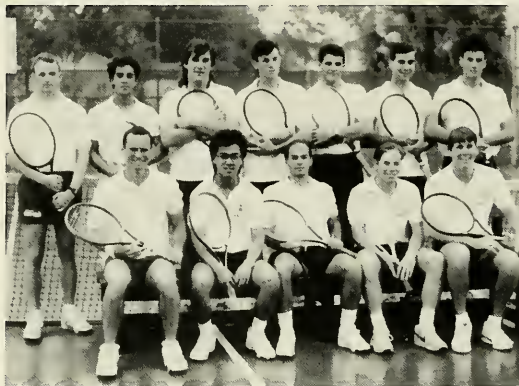

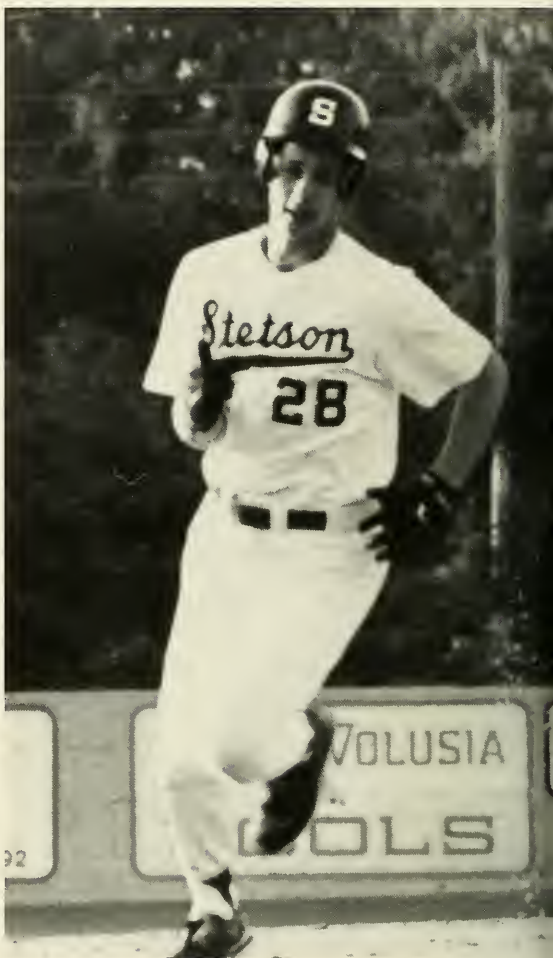
The team showed a continuous improvement throughout the season, relying on their

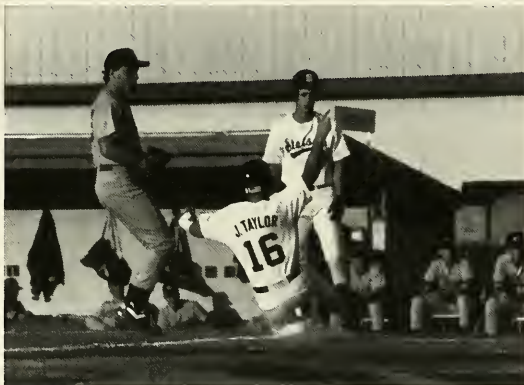
Special honors went out to Wes Weger who was a candidate for All-American and the USA Olympic 40-man team.

Stetson's #16 J. Taylor slides into home to score.

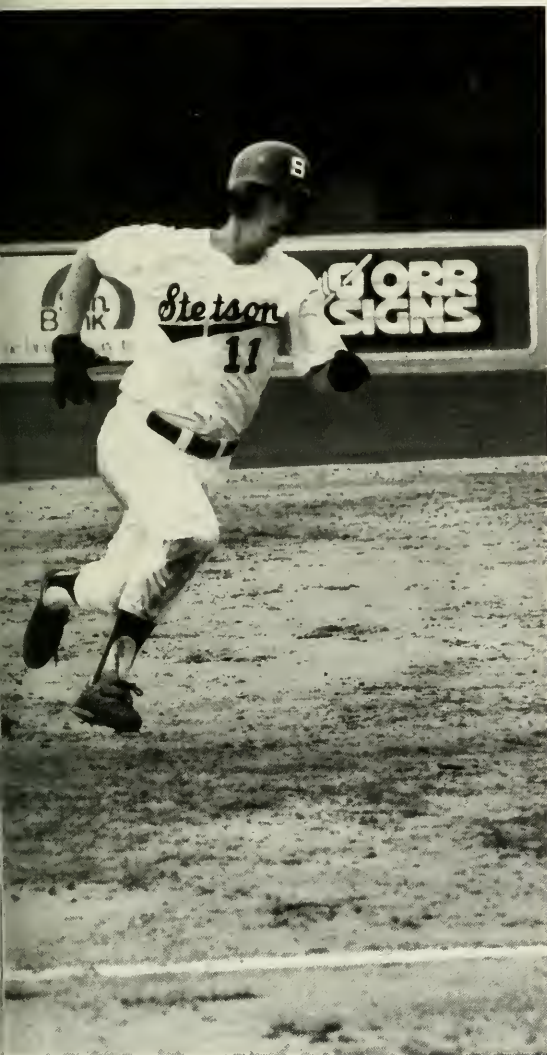

CROSS COUNTRY



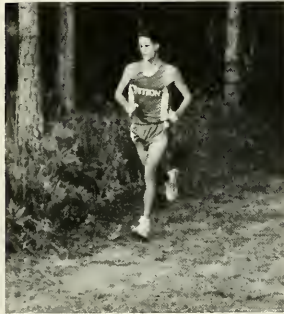

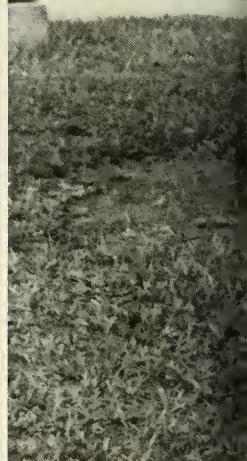

The men's golf team, on the

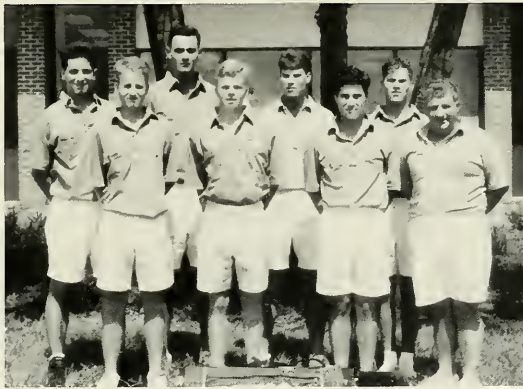
other hand, started out the season with four seniors, three juniors, and only one freshman. They had a strong returning team which promised a winning streak for the Hatters.

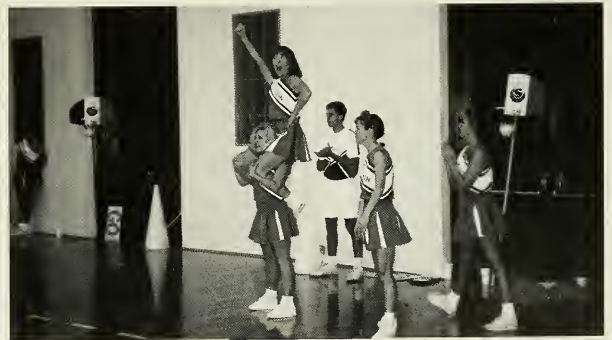
