Eager to capitalize on the spare hour or two that a student might have during the week, the program promoted volunteerism in the DeLand community.

Students respanded. Some became coaches for YMCA soccer teams, learned to tutor illiterate adults, or staffed a soup kitchen. Others taught crafts at a YMCA after-school program. And the whole campus came together to provide a field day for underprivileged kids from the Head Start center.

Sponsored by Stetson's service groups - YAPI, Circle K, Student Association and Habitat for Humanity - and funded by the Hollis Leadership Development Program, Into the Streets provided volunteer opportunities with community agencies and organized special service events.
