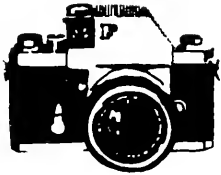


Senior, Martice Armstrong enlists the help of one of the librarians while trying to finish a paper. And who said that English majors wait until the last minute to do their work?

Who did our camera catch in the SDC early last semester? We don't know, but from the looks of these guys maybe we should.

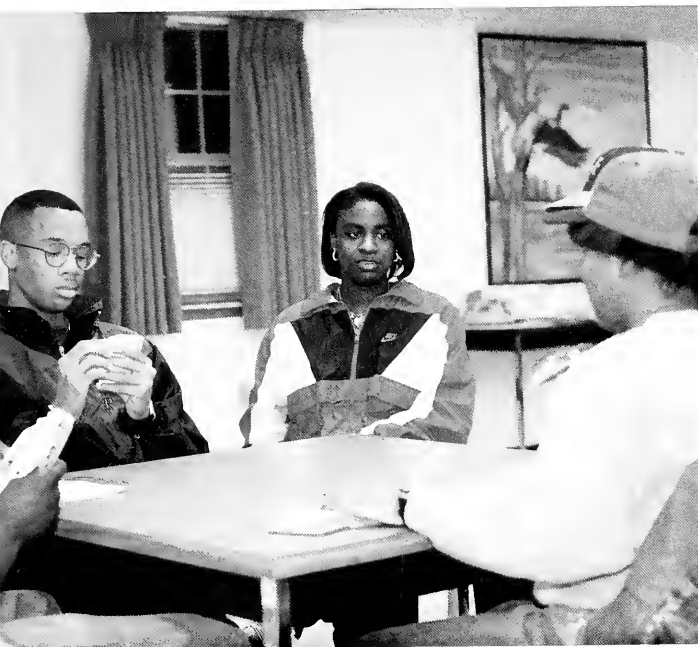

Here's one way to keep out of trouble. Rodney Izzard shows that students don't necessarily have to leave their rooms to have a good time.



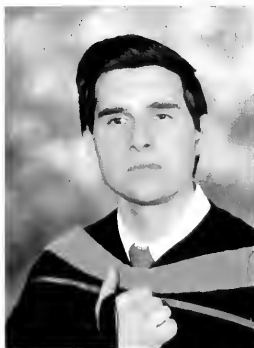

Dr. William P. Hytche



President
University of Maryland Eastern Shore



Dr. William P. Hytche was born in Porter, Oklahoma, and educated in the public schools of Fort Gibson and Fallahassee, Oklahoma. He received his Bachelor of Science Degree from Langston University, and his Masters and Doctorate degrees from Oklahoma State University. He has also studied at the University of Heidelberg (Germany), Oklahoma University, Oberlin College, and the University of Wisconsin at Madison.

He came to the University of Maryland Eastern Shore, then known as Maryland State College, in 1960 after having taught in the public schools of Ponca City, Oklahoma, and Oklahoma State University. Since coming

to UMES, he has served as an instructor in Mathematics, Chairman of the Department of Mathematics, Dean of Student Affairs, and Chairman of the Division of Liberal Studies. He was appointed Acting Chancellor of Maryland Eastern Shore in July 1975 and was given a permanent appointment in June 1976.

Dr. Hytche was appointed by President Bush to serve on his Board of Advisors on Historically Black Colleges and Universities. He also holds memberships in numerous organizations, such as the National Association for Equal Opportunity in Higher Education, and the Delmarva Advi-

sory Council.

Additionally, Dr. Hytche is the recipient of numerous honors and awards. These awards include listings in Who's Who in the World, and Who's Who in America. He was selected as the 1992 recipient of the Thurgood Marshall Educational Achievement Award, sponsored by the Johnson Publishing Company, Inc., and was recently inducted into the Oklahoma State University Hall of Fame.

Dr. Hytche is married to the former Deloris Juanita Cole, and they have three children: Pamela, Jaqueta, and William, Jr., and four grandchildren.

Dorothy Williams Waters was born in Detroit, Michigan on March 19, 1924. She received her elementary and high school training in Roanoke, Virginia. In 1945 she earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in English Literature from Morgan State College in Baltimore, Maryland. She began her professional career as a teacher in the Frederick, Maryland school system, and later taught at the old Somerset High School in Princess Anne, Maryland. In 1969, she began her employment at the University of Maryland Eastern Shore where she taught in the English Department. She was also an instructor at Eastern Correctional Institution.

For many years, she was a test administrator, and later a Supervisor of Testing with the Educational Testing Services. At the time of her death, she was Director of Career Planning and Placement at UMES. Her career in education spanned 45 years. Ms. Waters died on February 9, 1993.

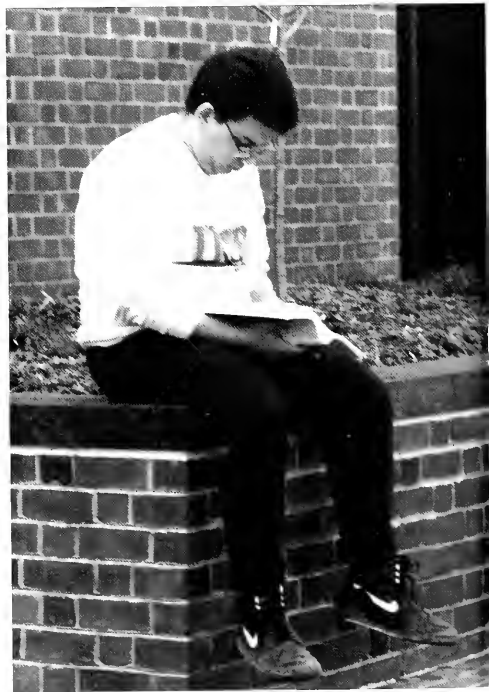

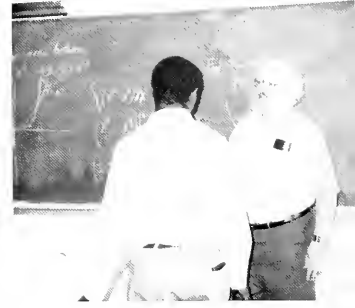

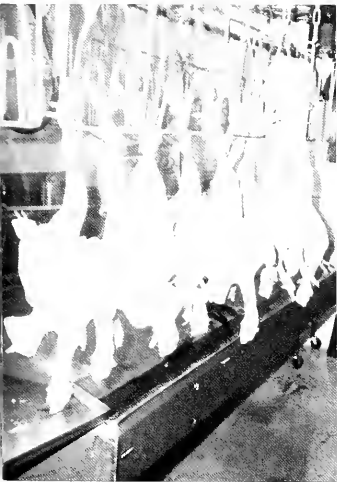

As he excitedly talked about the future of UMES basketball, it became apparent that Rob Chavez and UMES were a perfect fit. Chavez brings a quiet confidence and comfortable presence with him to UMES. He also carries a winning reputation that is needed to reinvigorate a basketball program that has been down in recent years.

Chavez brings a five year Junior College record of 136-24. His reputation as a proven winner is based upon a solid basketball coaching philosophy and a belief in not only himself but also in those around him. Chavez has a unique ability to take a group of players with diverse backgrounds and weave them into a cohesive team with the results being, team achievement and individual success.

Chavez brought with him to UMES impeccable coaching credentials. Following a seven year stint as an assistant coach at three division I universities (Arizona State, Colorado State and Montana State), he was named Head Coach at



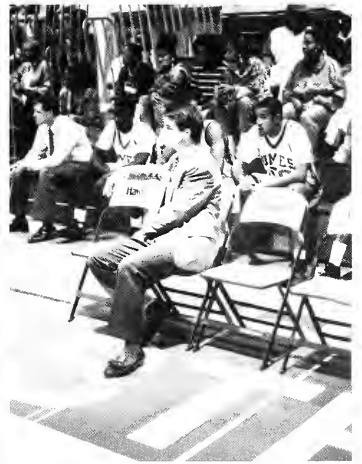
Chemeketa Community College in Salem, Oregon. He continued an established tradition of success and coaching prominence at Chemeketa that included the past home of Rich Alderman (Portland Trailblazers).

Chavez posted the schools best ever won/loss percentage ... 85%, including a pair 30 win seasons and an undefeated 33-0 season in 1990-91. 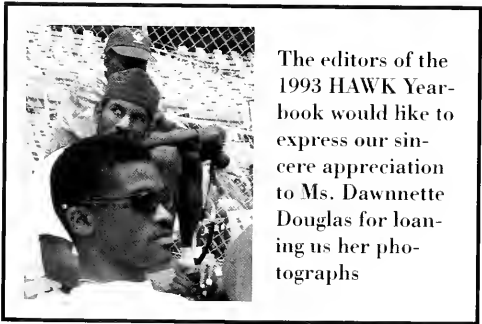
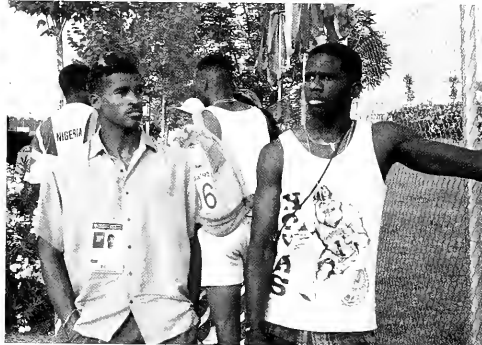

Sharon Richards is a senior majoring in Hotel/Restaurant Management. She hails from St. Kitts and Nevis, a tiny island in the Caribbean locat-

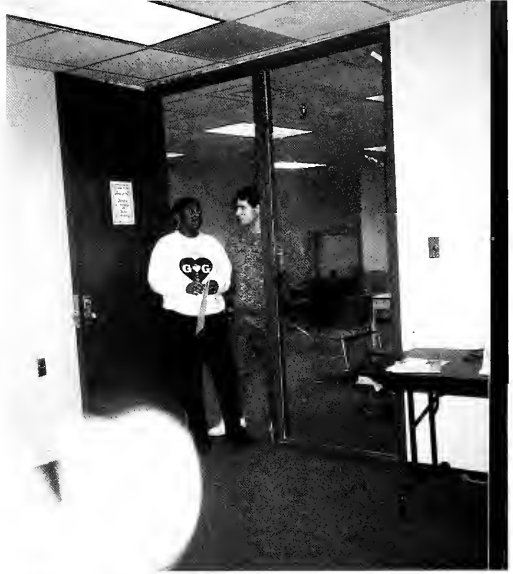

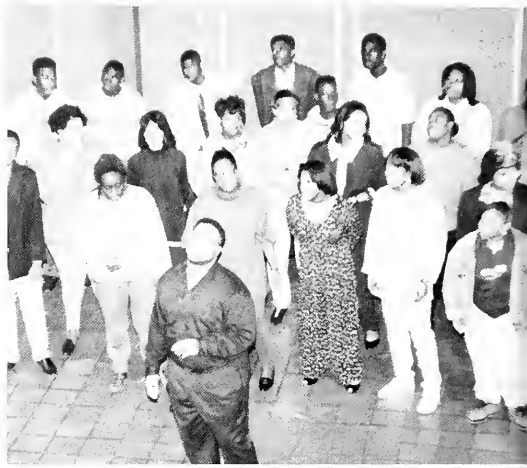

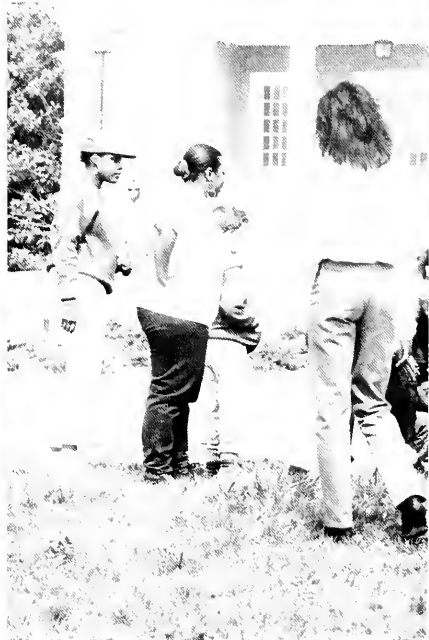

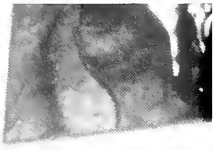
Student Security

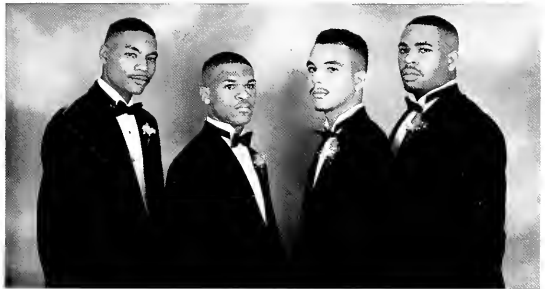

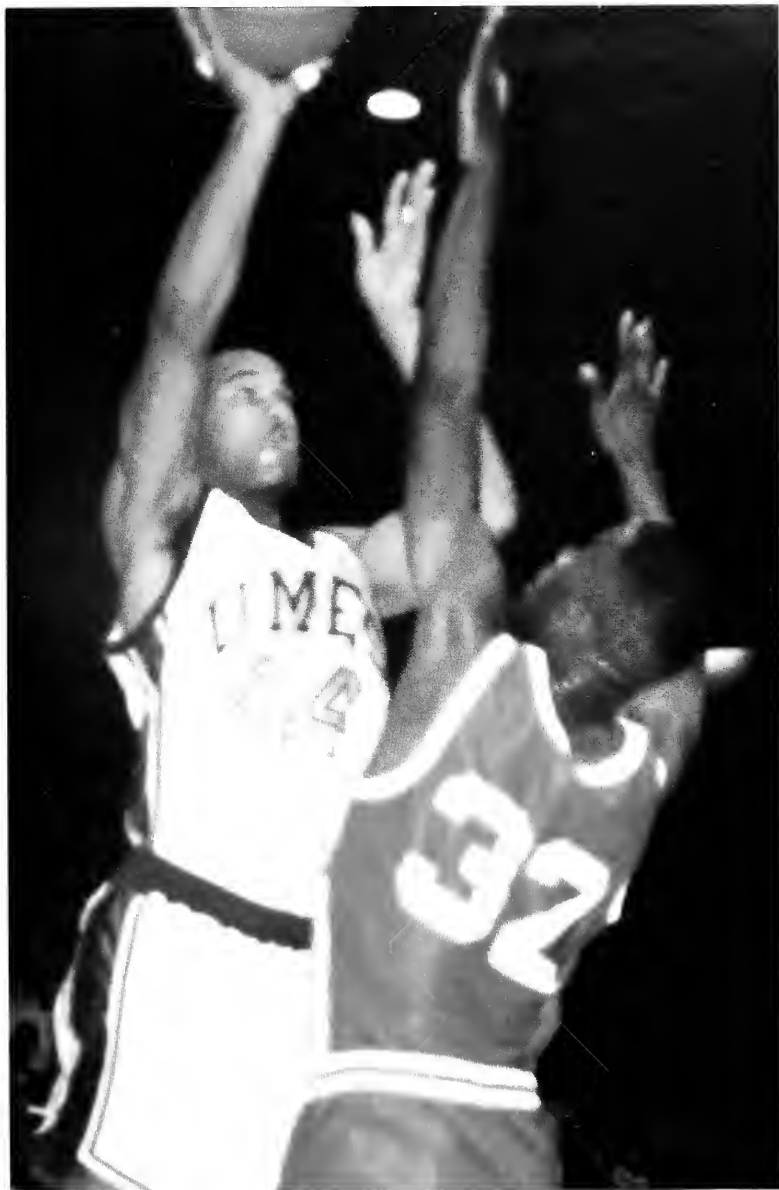

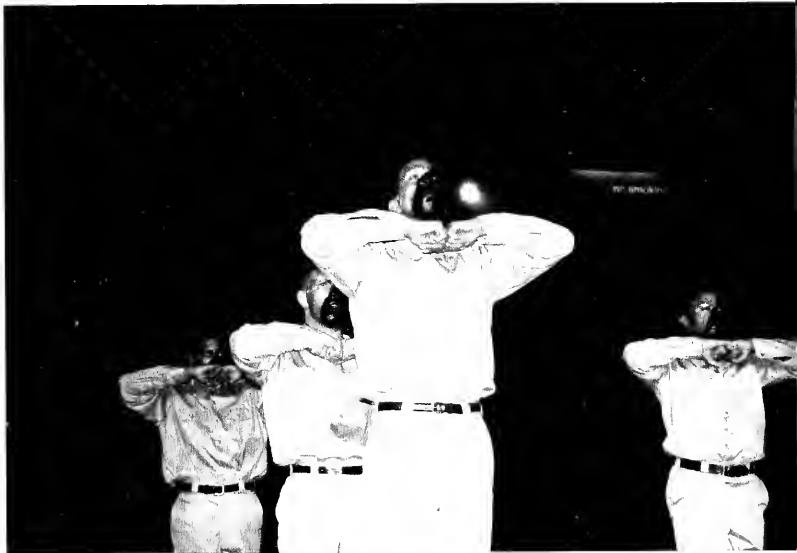

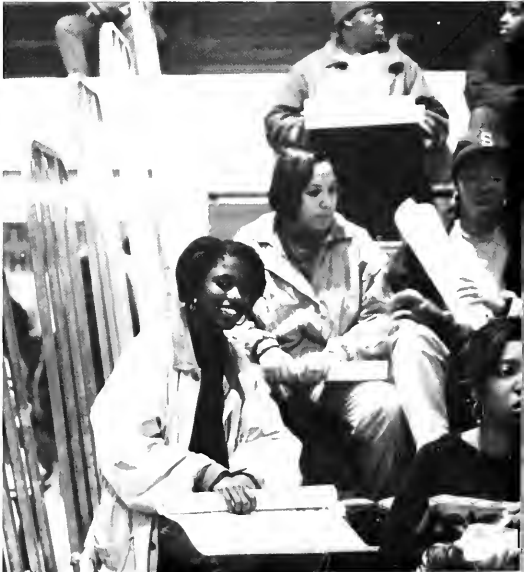

The Honorable Paul Spyros Sarbanes
U.S. Senator from Maryland

Paul Spyros Sarbanes was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1976 and re-elected in 1982 and 1988. He serves as Vice Chairman of the Joint Economic Committee as well as member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and member of the Senate Committee on Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs.

In 1970 Mr. Sarbanes was elected to the first of three consecutive terms in the U.S. House of Representatives. He served on the House Judiciary Committee, Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee and the Select Committee on House Reorganization.

From 1961 to 1970 he was an associate in Baltimore law firms. He served in the Maryland House of Delegates during 1966 to 1970.

Senator Sarbanes earned an A.B. degree magna cum laude from Princeton University and was a Rhodes Scholar at Oxford. He earned a law degree from Harvard cum laude. Born in Salisbury, Maryland, he is the spouse of Christine Dunbar and the father of two sons and a daughter.

RECIPIENT OF HONORARY DEGREE

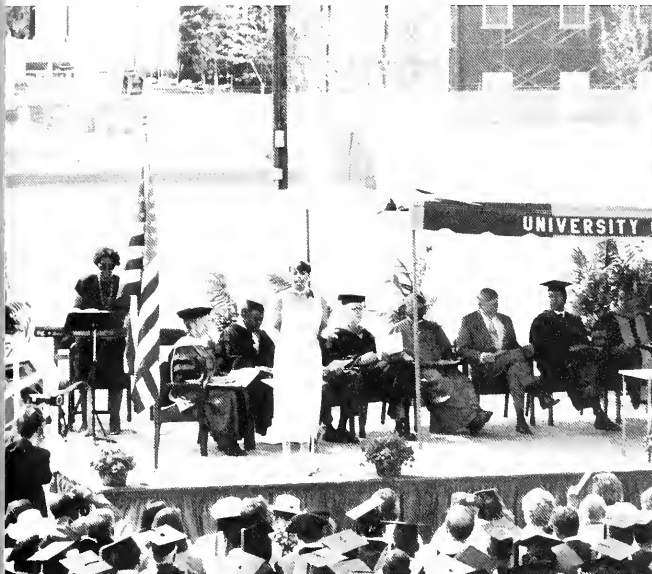
Dr. John S. Toll has shaped higher education in Maryland and elsewhere as an administrator and a scholar. As chief executive of the University of Maryland System from 1978 to 1990, he directed the reorganization that expanded the state's higher education network into the present 15-campus system.

In 1978, Dr. Toll collaborated with Dr. William P. Hytche, chief executive at the University of Maryland Eastern Shore, for a prospectus that led to the first new degree offerings at UMES in more than 30 years. Before becoming chief executive (president, 1978-88; chancellor, 1988-90), Dr. Toll was professor and chairman of the Department of Physics at the University of Maryland College Park. He was president of the State University of New York at Stony Brook from 1965 to 1978.

Born in Denver, Dr. Toll graduated with highest honors from Yale University and earned master's and doctoral degrees from Princeton University. He is the spouse of the former Deborah Ann Tainter and the father of three daughters.
