HISTORICAL INTRODUCTION

"THE HOLSTON MARBLES APPEAR TO HAVE BEEN USED LOCALLY FOR TOMBSTONES AT AN EARLY DATE. IN OLD CHURCHYARDS MAY STILL BE SEEN TOMBSTONES DATING FROM THE EARLY PART OF THE 18TH CENTURY CONVINCING PROOFS OF THE ENDURING QUALITIES OF THE STONE. "ROUGHLY DRESSED BY HAND CHISELS FROM STONE THAT WOULD NOW BE CLASSED UNSOUND, THEY STILL RETAIN SHARP AND CLEAR THE TOOLMARKS OF THEIR OLD MANUFACTURERS."

A NUMBER OF THESE OLD TOMBSTONES ARE SEEN IN THE OLD CHURCHYARD ADJOINING THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH AT THE CORNER OF CHURCH AND STATE STREETS, KNOXVILLE, AMONG THEM BEING THOSE THAT MARK THE RESTING PLACE OF GOVERNOR WILLIAM BLOUNT AND OF SAMUEL CARRICK, THE FIRST PASTOR OF THE CHURCH.

THE HISTORY OF THE MARBLE INDUSTRY IN EAST TENNESSEE DATES FROM ABOUT 1838, WHEN THE MARBLE ROOM IN THE CAPITOL AT WASHINGTON D C WAS FINISHED WITH MARBLE TAKEN FROM A QUARRY OPENED BY THE GOVERNMENT IN HAWKINS COUNTY! FOOT NOTES: FOR THIS ACCOUNT OF THE HISTORY OF THE MARBLE INDUSTRY IN TENN, WE ARE INDEBTED TO THE FOLLOWING: THE MARBLE INDUSTRY, "STONE" JULY 1895. IT WAS THE RICH CHOCOLATE AND VARIEGATED MARBLES THAT FIRST ATTRACTED ATTENTION, AND THESE SOON BECAME POPULAR FOR INTERIOR DECORATION AND FURNITURE. OF LATE YEARS, THE PINK AND GRAY MARBLES ARE CHIEFLY IN DEMAND, OWING TO THEIR MORE MASSIVE STRUCTURE, SOFT COLORS AND MORE COMPLETE CRYSTALLIZATION, WHICH PERMITS A HIGHER POLISH.

QUARRYING IN HAWKINS COUNTY

THE HAWKINS COUNTY MARBLES WERE THE FIRST TO ATTRACT NOTICE ABROAD, AND ACCORDINGLY THE EARLIEST SYSTEMATIC OPERATIONS TOOK PLACE IN THIS COUNTY. FOR THIS ACCOUNT OF THE BEGINNINGS OF THE HAWKINS COUNTY OPERATIONS WE ARE INDEBTED CHIEFLY TO SAFFORD.

THE FIRST PERSON TO CALL ATTENTION TO THE MARBLES OF THE TENNESSEE VALLEY SEEMS TO HAVE BEEN DR. TRUST, THE FIRST STATE GEOLOGIST 1831-1840, THOUGH VERY LITTLE APPEARS IN HIS REPORTS CONCERNING THESE DEPOSITS. HE SEEMS TO HAVE RECOGNIZED THEIR IMPORTANCE, HOWEVER, FOR HE TOOK AN ACTIVE PART IN ORGANIZING THE ROGERSVILLE MARBLE COMPANY, THE FIRST SYSTEMATIC EFFORT IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE MARBLE INDUSTRY IN THE STATE. THE ROGERSVILLE MARBLE COMPANY, FORMED IN APRIL 1838, WITH ORVILLE RICE, AS PRESIDENT AND S. D. MITCHELL AS SECRETARY, OPENED A QUARRY ABOUT 7 MILES NORTH OF ROGERSVILLE, ERECTED A MILL AND OPERATED ON A LIMITED SCALE FOR SEVERAL YEARS. THEIR OUTPUT, WHICH AMOUNTED TO SEVERAL THOUSAND DOLLARS ANNUALLY, WAS DISTRIBUTED MOSTLY IN EAST TENNESSEE.

IN 1844 THE COMPANY WAS SOLD TO MR. RICE, WHO CONTINUED THE BUSINESS ON A MODERATE SCALE FOR MANY YEARS BEING STILL IN BUSINESS, ACCORDING TO SAFFORD, IN 1869. MR. RICE NOW TOOK VIGOROUS STEPS TO EXTEND THE USE OF TENNESSEE MARBLE, AND ABOUT THIS TIME BEGAN THE CONSTRUCTION OF A LARGE BRICK TAVERN ON THE STAGE ROAD ABOUT 4 MILES SOUTHWEST OF ROGERSVILLE, WHICH HE CALLED "MARBLE HALL", THE INTERIOR OF WHICH WAS RICHLY AND PROFUSELY DECORATED WITH MARBLE MANTLES, SHELVES, STEPS AND WAINSCOTING. THIS BUILDING, WHICH LATER BECAME A PRIVATE RESIDENCE, WAS REALLY, AS SAFFORD STATES, "A MUSEUM OF THE FINEST MARBLE EAST TENNESSEE AFFORDS." FOR MANY YEARS IT WAS ONE OF THE NOTED LANDMARKS OF THE REGION, BUT WAS DESTROYED BY FIRE A FEW YEARS SINCE. WHEN THE DIFFERENT STATES WERE ASKED TO SUPPLY BLOCKS OF THEIR BEST STONE FOR THE WASHINGTON MONUMENT IN 1848, TWO BLOCKS WERE CONTRIBUTED FROM TENNESSEE. MR. RICE SENT A BLOCK OF THE "LIGHT MOTTLED STRAWBERRY VARIETY." AS HE TERMED IT, CALLED THE "HAWKINS COUNTY BLOCK", BEARING THE INSCRIPTION. "FROM HAWKINS COUNTY TENNESSEE. THE OTHER TERMED THE "TENN STATE BLOCK" WAS SENT TO--AGT BY ACT OF THE LEGISLATURE. THESE BLOCKS WERE FLOATED DOWN THE TENNESSEE RIVER TO CHATTANOOGA, AND THENCE FORWARDED BY RAIL TO WASHINGTON.

IN MAKING SELECTION FOR THE INTERIOR FINISHING OF THE NATIONAL CAPITOL, THE ATTENTION OF THE BUILDING COMMITTEE WAS ATTRACTED TO THESE BLOCKS, AND, ALTHOUGH THEY HAD BEFORE THEM NUMEROUS SPECIMENTS FROM ALL PARTS OF THE UNION, THEY DECIDED IN FAVOR OF THE EAST TENNESSEE MARBLE FOR THE INTERIOR FINISH OF A PART OF THE BUILDING. SOON AFTER AN AGENT WAS SENT BY THE COMMITTEE TO ASCERTAIN IF THE MARBLE COULD BE OBTAINED IN QUANTITY. HIS REPORT WAS AMPLY CONCLUSIVE ON THIS POINT.

THE CONTRACT FOR THIS WORK WAS SECURED BY HUGH SISSONS AND WILLIAM DOUGHERTY OF PHILADELPHIA, PA. AND THEREUPON THEY PROCEEDED TO OPEN A QUARRY ON A LARGE SCALE AT A POINT ABOUT 9 MILES SOUTHWEST OF ROGERSVILLE WHERE THE HOLSTON RIVER INTERSECTED THE MARBLE BELT. THIS QUARRY KNOWN AS THE "OLD DOUGHERTY QUARRY." SOMETIMES CALLED THE "NATIONAL QUARRY" IS LOCATED ON THE NORTH SIDE OF THE RIVER AT THE SOUTHWESTERN

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EXTREMITY OF A RIDGE, AT THE BASE OF WHICH THE MARBLE FORMATION OUTCROPS. THE LOCATION WAS WELL CHOSEN, FOR THE FORMATION HERE WAS THICK AND MASSIVE AND THE BLOCKS WERE EASILY TRANSPORTED TO THE BOATS, BY WHICH THEY WERE CONVEYED TO CHATTANOOGA, AND THENCE BY RAIL TO WASHINGTON. IT IS THIS STONE FROM THE "OLD DOUGHERTY QUARRY" THAT CONSTITUTES ABOUT HALF THE ORNAMENTAL MARBLE USED IN THE NATIONAL CAPITOL. "THE BALUSTRADES, AND COLUMNS OF THE STAIRS LEADING UP TO THE HOUSE AND SENATE GALLERIES, THE WALLS OF THE MARBLE ROOM, AND OTHER PARTS OF THE BUILDING, ARE OF TENNESSEE MARBLE." SEGMENTS OF COLUMNS REJECTED BY THE CONTRACTOR MAY STILL BE SEEN IN THE VICINITY OF THE QUARRY AND ONE THAT ACCIDENTALLY ROLLED OFF THE BOAT IS SAID TO BE RESTING IN THE BOTTOM OF THE RIVER NEAR THE LOADING PLACE.

IN THESE EARLY DAYS, THE METHODS OF QUARRYING WERE OF THE MOST PRIMITIVE CHARACTER. THE DRILLING WAS BY HAND, THE BLOCK WEDGED OUT AND ROUGHLY DRESSED IN THE QUARRY. NO DERRICKS WERE USED, THE BLOCKS BEING ROLLED OUT OF THE QUARRY BY MAN AND TEAM LABOR, LOADED ON WAGONS AND HAULED BY TEAMS TO THE BOAT LANDING.

THE FIRST SUPERINTENDENT OF THE DOUGHERTY QUARRY WAS WILLIAM CANNON. HE WAS SUCCEEDED IN 1858 BY JAMES WRIGHT, WHO CONTINUED IN CHARGE FOR MANY YEARS, AND WAS CONSIDERED BY THE QUARRYMEN OF TENN AS THE PIONEER QUARRYMAN. OPERATIONS WERE INTERRUPTED BY THE WAR BETWEEN THE STATES, BUT WERE RESUMED THEREAFTER AND CONTINUED DOWN UNTIL ABOUT 1891.

THE NEXT QUARRY OPENED WAS THE "CAVE" OR "HASSON'S QUARRY", SITUATED ABOUT ABOUT $4\frac{1}{2}$ MILES NORTHEAST OF THE "DOUGHERTY" AND A LIKE DISTANCE WEST OF ROGERSVILLE. THIS QUARRY WAS OPENED BY MR. JOHN HASSON ABOUT 1857, AND WAS THE FIRST OF THE TENNESSEE QUARRIES IN WHICH DERRICKS AND CHANNELING MACHINES WERE USED. MR. HASSON HAVING INSTALLED HERE THE FIRST CHANNELING MACHINE BROUGHT SOUTH OF THE POTOMAC RIVER.

THE FIRST LARGE CONTRACT WAS FOR BLOCKS FOR THE BALTIMORE CITY HALL, AND THESE LIKE ALL OTHER MARBLE BLOCKS IN THOSE DAYS, HAD TO BE HAULED TO THE RIVER AND BOATED DOWN TO CHATTANOOGA. BUT IN THOSE TIMES THE PRICES OBTAINED WERE QUITE LARGE, AND A GREAT DEAL OF THE MARBLE FROM THIS QUARRY WAS SOLD ABOVE TEN DOLLARS A CUBIC FOOT.

PROMINENT AMONG THE EARLY QUARRYMEN OF HAWKINS COUNTY WAS J. C. STAMPS OF ROGERSVILLE, WHO OPERATED WHAT IS KNOWN AS THE "STAMPS STAR QUARRY" LOCATED ABOUT 2 MILES SOUTHWEST OF THE "DOUGHERTY QUARRY. THIS QUARRY WAS OPENED BY A MR. STUART ABOUT 1874 AND OPERATED BY MR. STAMPS UNTIL 1887, WHEN IT PASSED UNDER THE CONTROL OF SOME CHICAGO PARTIES REPRESENTED BY DR. KERBER OF MOORESBURG. THESE OPERATIONS WERE CONTINUED FOR FOUR OR FIVE YEARS SINCE WHICH TIME THE QUARRY HAS REMAINED IDLE.

ONE-HALF MILE NORTHEAST OF THE STAMPS STAR QUARRY, NEAR THE ROAD LEADING TO RED BRIDGE FERRY, IS THE QUARRY AND MILL OF MR. H B STAMPS WHO, WITH HIS BROTHER, HAS BEEN CONNECTED WITH THE QUARRYING INDUSTRY OF HAWKINS COUNTY FOR MANY YEARS. THIS QUARRY WAS OPENED IN 1887, AND CONTINUED IN OPERATION IN A MODERATE WAY UNTIL RECENTLY, WHEN THE DEMAND FOR THE DARK VARIEGATED MARBLES PRACTICALLY CEASED.

ADJOINING THE STAMPS STAR QUARRY, IS THE EVANS QUARRY, OPERATED EXTENSIVELY FOR MANY YEARS BY THE W H EVANS MARBLE COMPANY, OF BALTIMORE MARYLAND. WITH THE CHANGE IN PUBLIC TASTE FOR LIGHTER SHADES. THIS COMPANY TRANSFERRED ITS OPERATIONS TO THE KNOXVILLE DISTRICT, ABOUT 20 YEARS AGO, WHERE IT HAS CONTINUED TO OPERATE SEVERAL QUARRIES OF POPULAR BRANDS OF GRAY AND PINK MARBLE.

HISTORY OF MARBLE INDUSTRY OF EAST TENNESSEE

OTHER NAMES PROMINENTLY ASSOCIATED FORMERLY WITH THE MARBLE INTERESTS OF HAWKINS COUNTY ARE THOSE OF J H PIER E AND JAMES COOPER OF ROGERSVILLE.

VARIOUS QUARRIES WERE OPENED ON THE BELT NORTHEAST OF THE "OLD DOUGHERTY" QUARRY, ABOUT 20 BEING IN OPERATION AT ONE TIME IN THIS DISTRICT, WITH RO ROGERSVILLE AS THE LOGICAL CENTER OF THE INDUSTRY. MANY WERE OF RELATIVELY MINOR IMPORTANCE, BUT TOGETHER THEY MADE A NOTABLE CONTRIBUTION TO THE OUTPUT OF THE DISTRICT. FIRST, NORTHEAST OF THE "OLD DOUGHERTY" QUARRY ARE THE "FUDGE" AND "McCLURE" QUARRIES. THEN IN ORDER COME THE "PRI E". "KYLE" AND CAVE QUARRIES. FARTHER ON WERE A NUMBER OF OTHER QUARRIES, WHOSE NAMES ARE NOT AVAILABLE.

THE COMPLETION OF THE EAST TENNESSEE, VIRGINIA AND GEORGIA RAIL ROAD (NOW THE BRISTOL CHATTANOOGA BRANCH OF THE SOUTHERN RAILWAY,) AT IN ROGERSVILLE WAS BEGUN BEFORE THE CIVIL WAR AND COMPLETED SOON AFTER ITS CLOSE. PRIOR TO THIS, AS PREVIOUSLY NOTED, THE SHIPMENT OF THE MARBLE WAS ENTIRELY BY WATER TO CHATTANOOGA AND THENCE BY RAIL. IN TIMES OF LOW WATER, HOWEVER, THIS MODE OF TRANSPORTATION WAS OFTEN INTERRUPTED AND AND SUBJECT TO ANNOYING DELAYS AND UNCERTAINTIES, AND THE COMING OF THE RAILROAD WAS WELCOMED AS A HAPPY EVENT.

THE MARBLE WAS R CONVEYED FROM THE QUARRIES TO THE RAILROAD BY WAGON HAULED BY MULE TEAMS, FROM FIVE TO 12 TEAMS AND SOMETIMES 15 BEING REQUIRED FOR EACH WAGON. FROM THE BEGINNING, THE CONTRACT FOR HAULING THE PRODUCT OF THE QUARRIES WAS HELD BY A COLORED MAN, FRED NETHERLAND OF ROGERSVILLE WHOSE EQUIPMENT OF MULES NUMBERED AT ONE TIME ABOUT 100.

THE HAWKINS COUNTY BELONGS THE CREDIT, NOT ONLY FOR INITIATING THE MARBLE QUARRING INDUSTRY, BUT ALSO FOR THE ERECTION OF THE FIRST MARBLE MILLS IN THE STATE. THE FIRST OF THESE APPEARS TO HAVE BEEN A SMALL STEAM MILL ERECTED AT ROGERSVILLE. FINANCIAL EMBARRASSMENT, HOWEVER, SOON OVERTOOK THE PROPRIETORS, AND ITS OPERATION WAS DESULTORY AND SOON CEASED ALTOGETHER. THE STAMPS MILL, NEAR GALBRAITH SPRINGS, WAS ERE~~E~~ ERECTED IN 1900, AND HAS BEEN IN ALMOST CONTINUOUS OPERATION DOWN DOWN TO 18 1912 WHEN OWING TO THE CESSATION IN THE DEMAND FOR THE HAWKINS COUNTY VARIETY OF MARBLE THE MILL CLOSED.

THE PRODUCT OF THIS MILL, AS OF ALL THE HAWKINS COUNTY QUARRIES, WAS ~~BE~~ USED CHIEFLY FOR FURNITURE MANUFACTUR, AND AS THE DEMAND FOR MARBLE TOPPED FURNITURE HAS NOW CEASED THERE IS LITTLE OR NO DEMAND FOR THIS STYLE OF MARBLE. ONE OF THE CHIEF OBSTACLES TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE MARBLE INDUSTRY IN THIS COUNTY, HOWEVER, IS WANT OF SHIPPING FACILITIES MOST OF THE QUARRIES ARE FROM FIVE TO 8 MILES FROM THE RAILROADS, AND THE GREAT EXPENSE OF TEAMING THE MARBLE OVERTHE MOUNTAIN ROADS TO THE RAIL RAILWAY, PREVENTS THIS DISTRICT FROM COMPETING SUCCESSFULLY WITH OTHERS FARTHER SOUTH, WHERE THE QUARRIES ARE LOCATED WITHIN EASY REACH OF THE RAILROAD. GIVEN FAVORABLE RAILROAD FACILIITES, DEPOSITS OF PINK AND GRAY MARBLE, WHICH UNDCUBTEDLY EXIST HERE, WOULD HAVE BEEN ~~BE~~ OPENED BUT UNDER PRESENT CONDITIONS THESE ARE NOT LIKELY TO BE DEVELOPED.

OPERATIONS IN THE KNOXVILLE DISTRICT

IN 1852 MR. JAMES SLOAN OPENED A QUARRY ON A RIDGE ABOUT 2 MI MILES NORTH OF KNOXVILLE, NEAR THE EAST TENNESSEE AND VIRGINIA (NOW THE S.UTHERN) RAILROAD. ONLY THE DARK GR VARIEGATED MARBLE WAS TAKEN OUT AT THAT TIME. OF SPECIAL INTEREST IS THE STATEMENT MADE BY SAFFORD (GEOLOGY OF TENNESSEE 1869, PAGE 237) F OTNOTE.

THAT IT WAS FROM THIS QUARRY THAT " MOST OF THE MARBLE IN THE STATE CAPITOL AT NASHVILLE WAS TAKEN." THIS QUARRY ALSO FURNISHED SOME OF THE MARBLE FOR THE STATE CAPITOL OF OHIO. NOT LONG AFTER THIS COL.

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JOHN WILLIAMS OPENED WHAT IS KNOWN AS THE WILLIAMS OR M MULLEN QUARRY ABOUT TWO MILES EAST OF KNOXVILLE. FROM THIS QUARRY CAME THE STONE USED IN THE BUILDING OF THE MEMPHIS CUSTOM HOUSE. THIS PROPERTY LATER PASSED INTO THE POSSESSION OF THE TENNESSEE PRODUCERS MARBLE COMPANY, BY WHOM IT IS STILL OPERATED.

WHEN IN 1872 THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT UNDERTOOK THE ERECTION OF THE KNOXVILLE CUSTOM HOUSE AND POST OFFICE, IT WAS DECIDED IN CONSTRUCTION TO USE MARBLE FROM THE VICINITY. A QUARRY WAS OPENED NEAR THE FORKS OF THE RIVER, A SMALL MILL ERECTED, AND HERE ALL THE MARBLE USED IN THE BUILDING WAS QUARRIED AND SAWED. LATER MR. GEORGE W. ROSS, WHO WAS THE PAYMASTER OF THE BUILDING, IN PARTNERSHIP WITH MR. WILLIAM PATRICK, OF ST. LOUIS ORGANIZED THE KNOXVILLE, MARBLE COMPANY AND PURCHASED THE SITE OF THE GOVERNMENT QUARRY AND MILL. OTHER MARBLE LAIRS WERE ADDED FROM TIME TO TIME, AND THE BUSINESS WAS PUSHED FORWARD WITH ENERGY. AGENTS WERE APPOINTED IN THE NORTHERN CITIES, WHICH WAS A NEW THING IN THE TENN MARBLE BUSINESS, AND RESULTED IN MAKING LARGE DEMANDS FOR THE COMPANY'S PRODUCT. DURING THE 12 OR 15 YEARS THE QUARRY WAS WORKED, IT PRODUCED A GREAT DEAL OF MARBLE, BOTH GRAY AND LIGHT-PINK VARIETIES, AND AMONG OTHER BUILDINGS FURNISHED, WERE ABOUT 100 CAR LOADS FOR THE NEW YORK STATE STATE CAPITOL AT ALBANY. THE QUARRY WAS WORKED BACKWARD FROM THE RIVER BANK FOR SEVERAL HUNDRED FEET, AND THE EXCAVATION WAS MADE TO A DEPTH OF 25 FEET BELOW THE LEVEL OF THE RIVER. THE MARBLE WAS ALL SENT DOWN THE RIVER ON FLAT BOATS TO KNOXVILLE AND THENCE FORWARDED BY RAIL. AT THE DEATH OF MR. ROSS, WHICH OCCURRED IN JAN 1891 HE STIPULATED THAT THE QUARRY PROPERTIES SHOULD ALWAYS REMAIN IN THE FAMILY AS HE REGARDED THEM LIKELY TO INCREASE IN VALUE.

ONE OF THE PIONEERS OF THE MARBLE INDUSTRY IN THE VICINITY OF KNOXVILLE WAS THE FIRM OF J J CRAIG & COMPANY, WHO OPENED A QUARRY EAST OF THE CITY IN 1878. THE FIRM WAS COMPOSED OF COL J. J. CRAIG, W B McMULLEN AND J M EDINGTON. OTHER PROPERTIES HAVING BEEN ACQUIRED THE COMPANY BECAME INCORPORATED AS THE GREAT SOUTHERN MARBLE COMPANY IN 1884.

IN 1881, MR. JOHN M ROSS, A SON OF GEORGE W ROSS, OPENED WHAT IS KNOWN AS THE "ISLAND HOME QUARRY," ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF THE RIVER ABOUT ONE MILE ABOVE THE COUNTY BRIDGE. THE MILL OF THE KNOXVILLE MARBLE COMPANY OF WHICH COMPANY MR. ROSS WAS THE PRESIDENT NEAR THE QUARRY, CLOSE TO THE RIVERSIDE.

THE REPUBLIC MARBLE COMPANY WAS ORGANIZED IN JUNE 1886 AND BEGAN OPERATING A QUARRY LOCATED NEAR CONCORD, 18 MILES SOUTHWEST OF KNOXVILLE. IN 1892 A QUARRY WAS OPENED ABOUT ONE MILE NORTH OF THE VILLAGE OF LUTTRELL AND A PART OF THE COMPANY'S PLANT WAS REMOVED TO THIS PLACE, THOUGH OPERATIONS WERE CONTINUED AT THE CONCORD QUARRY FOR SEVERAL YEARS BUT WERE FINALLY DISCONTINUED THERE. A STEAM MILL WAS ERECTED NEAR THE LUTTRELL QUARRY A FEW YEARS LATER AND BOTH QUARRY AND MILL HAVE BEEN OPERATED CONTINUOUSLY TO THE PRESENT TIME. (I WISH TO SAY HERE THAT IT WAS FROM LUTTRELL QUARRY SOMEWHERE THAT MY FATHER JAMES ABRAHAM WALKER GOT THE STONE FROM WHICH HE CARVED THE STATUE OF NANCY WARD), The is a large book so I will not quote further from it.

IN 1892, THE REPUBLIC MARBLE COMPANY AND THE ROSS MARBLE COMPANY CONSOLIDATED UNDER THE NAME OF THE ROSS AND REPUBLIC MARBLE COMPANY, WHICH COMPANY NOW OPERATES THE LUTTRELL PROPERTY; AND ALSO QUARRY AND MILL LOCATED ON THE SOUTH-SIDE OF THE TENNESSEE RIVER OPPOSITE THE FORKS, PREVIOUSLY OPERATED BY THE ROSS MARBLE COMPANY.
