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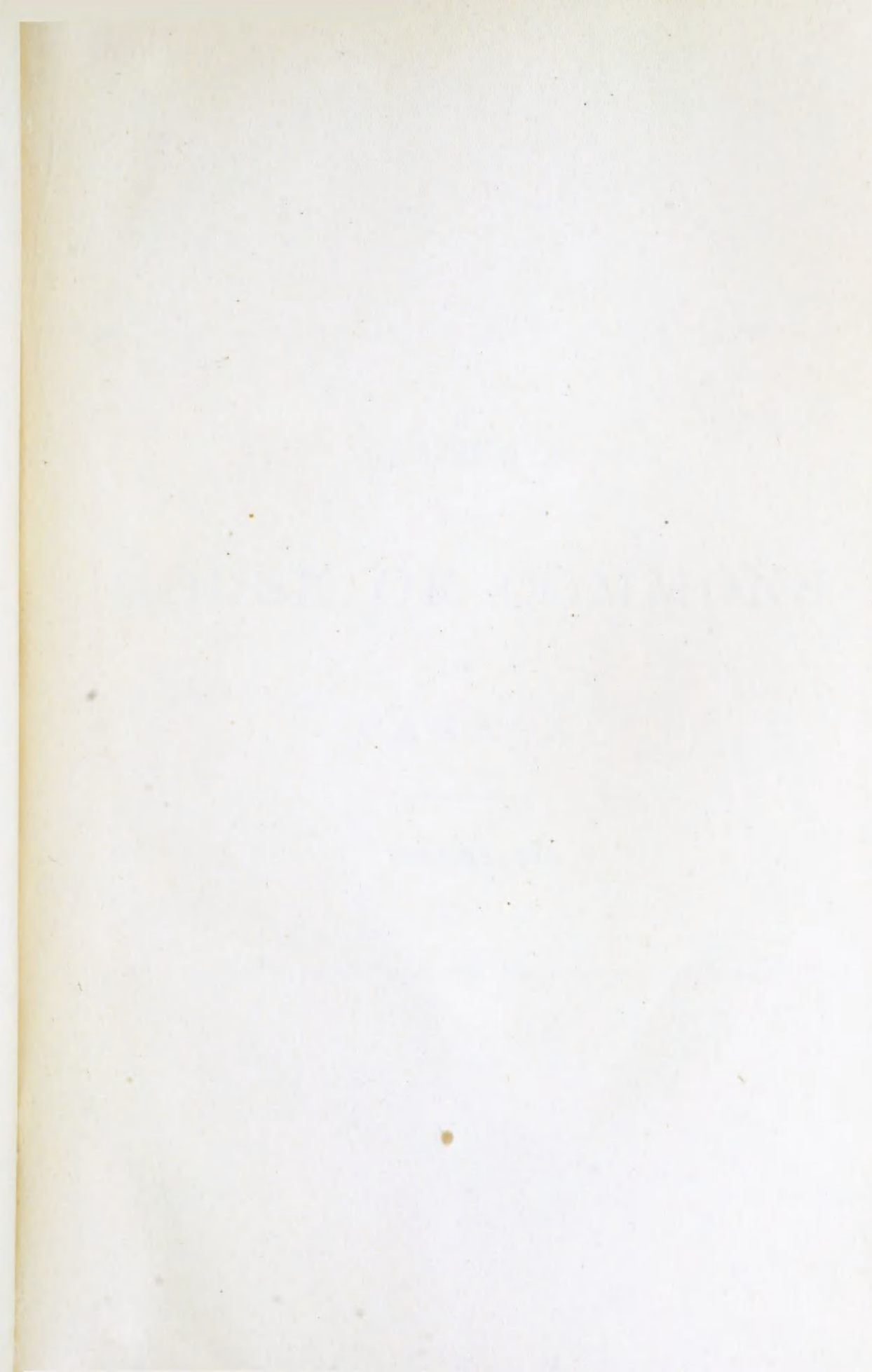

A Message was brought by Captain Ernest John Chambers, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod:—

MR. SPEAKER,

His Excellency the Governor General desires the immediate attendance of this Honourable House in the Senate Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker with The House, went up to the Senate Chamber, and having returned;

Mr. Speaker informed The House, That he had received from the Registrar of the Supreme Court of Canada, a certified copy of the Judgment and Report of the said Court in the Election Appeal for the Electoral District of Wentworth, and the same was read and ordered to be entered in the Journals of this House, and is as followeth:—

The appeal of the above named appellant from the judgment of the Honourable the Chief Justice of the Common Pleas, and the Honourable Mr. Justice Teetzel, two of the Justices of the High Court of Justice for Ontario, sitting as election judges, pronounced in the above cause on the Twenty-second day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and five, having come on to be heard before this Court on Friday, the Second day of June, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and five, in the presence of Counsel as well for the appellant as the respondent, whereupon and upon hearing what was alleged by Counsel aforesaid this Court was pleased to direct that the said appeal should stand over for judgment, and the same coming on this day for judgment this Court did Order and Adjudge that the said judgment of the Honourable the Chief Justice of the Common Pleas and of the Hon-

ourable Mr. Justice Teetzel, sitting as election judges, should be and the same was affirmed, and that the said appeal should be and the same was dismissed with costs to be paid by the said appellant to the said respondent.

And as to the matters and things as to which, by Sections 43 and 44 of the Dominion Controverted Elections Act and Amendments thereto, the learned Judges who tried the matter on the said Election Petition would have been required to report to the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons, I further respectfully certify that the said learned Judges have reported thereon to the Supreme Court of Canada as follows:—

“The undersigned two of the Justices of the High Court of Justice for Ontario assigned to try the above Petition and cross-petition DO HEREBY CERTIFY that on the First and Second days of February, A.D. 1905, at the City of Hamilton, in the above

Electoral District, we held a Court for the trial of and there tried the Petition and cross-petition between the said parties respecting the above Election.

"By agreement between the parties all matters in dispute in the said Petition were comprised in a case stated for the opinion of the Court pursuant to Section 49 of the Dominion Controverted Elections Act, and all charges of corrupt practices were abandoned, and no witnesses were examined at the trial.

"After hearing what was alleged by Counsel on both sides,

"We find and report that neither of the parties to the said Petition and cross-petition, the candidates at the said Election, was duly elected, and that the said Election was and is void.

"In the said Petition and the cross-petition of the respondent charges were made that corrupt practices had been committed at the said Election, but all the said charges were abandoned and no evidence was given in support thereof. We report, therefore, that no corrupt practice was proven before us to have been committed by or with the knowledge and consent of either of the candidates at the said Election.

"We have no means of forming a belief whether corrupt practices have or have not extensively prevailed at the said Election.

"We have no reason to believe that the enquiry into the circumstances of the Election has been rendered incomplete by the action of any of the parties to the said Petition, or that further enquiry as to whether corrupt practices have extensively prevailed is desirable.

THE DOMINION CONTROVERTED ELECTIONS ACT AND AMENDMENTS.

*In re* Election of a Member for the House of Commons of Canada, for the Electoral District of Compton, in the Judicial District of St. Francis, held on the Twenty-seventh day of October and on the Third day of November, Nineteen hundred and four, being respectively the days of nomination and voting.

ARTHUR HERBERT WESTON BAILEY, Mill Superintendent, of the Town of Cookshire, in the District of St. Francis,

*Petitioner;**versus*

AYLMER BYRON HUNT, Merchant, of the Township of Bury, in the District of St. Francis,

*Respondent.*

The Court having heard the parties on the merits of the present Petition to annul and have declared void the above Election, having also examined the record, the statements, declarations and consent of the parties and on the whole deliberated:



Considering that the Petitioner has, by his Petition presented before this Court on the 13th December, 1904, under the said Dominion Controverted Elections Act and Amendments, asked that the Election held for the Electoral District of Compton for the House of Commons of Canada, on the Third day of November, 1904, should be annulled and declared void, and that the said respondent should be also disqualified according to law for among others the following reasons: Because the said Aylmer Byron Hunt was guilty as well personally as through his agents, friends and partisans, with his consent and to his knowledge, of corrupt practices and manoeuvres prohibited by law, before, during and after the Election of a Member to the House of Commons of Canada for the Electoral District of Compton, held on the Twenty-seventh day of October and on the Third day of November, 1904, and that the said Election was vitiated by fraudulent manoeuvres practiced before, during and after the said Election by the Respondent, his agents and friends;

Considering that Petitioner's pretension in his said Petition was that the said Election of the said Respondent was irregular, illegal and null and that the return of the said Respondent as Member of the House of Commons of Canada for the Electoral District of Compton was irregular, illegal and null;

Considering that by the conclusions of said Petition, Petitioner prays that said Election be annulled and declared null and the return of the said Election made by the Returning Officer be annulled and declared null and irregular; that it be moreover declared that the said Respondent has not the right to sit in the House of Commons of Canada, and that he be declared unable, during the period fixed by law, to be elected or to sit in the House of Commons of Canada, nor to vote at an Election of a Member to the said House, nor to fill any position or charge of the Crown or of the Government of Canada;

Considering that the case, after issue joined on said Petition, has been duly inscribed for trial on the 21st day of November, 1905, and that public notice of said inscription has also been duly given;

Considering that on the 21st day of November, 1905, the said Aylmer Byron Hunt, in open Court has admitted, in a writing signed by him and his attorneys, filed in the hands of the Registrar of the Court and duly recorded, that since his recent examination on discovery in this cause, he has received information which leads him to believe that, during the said Election, acts of bribery and corruption were committed by parties acting as agents of said Respondent, but without his knowledge or consent, which acts are sufficient in law to void the said Election and in consequence thereof the said Respondent is willing that the said Election be declared void for and by reason of said acts, but except as above admitted, Respondent persists in his defence;

Considering that on the same day, the 21st November, instant, in open Court, the said Petitioner Arthur Herbert Weston Bailey, has admitted in writing, signed by him and his attorneys, filed in the hands of the Registrar of the Court and duly recorded, that the said Petitioner hereby desists from the charges of corrupt practices alleged against the Respondent personally in connection with the Election of a Member for the House of Commons of Canada, for the Electoral District of Compton, in the Judicial District of St. Francis, held on the Twenty-seventh day of October and on the Third day of November, One thousand nine hundred and four, being respectively the days of nomination and voting, and prays acte thereof;

Considering that there is nothing to indicate that corrupt practices have extensively prevailed at the Election to which the Petition relates;

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time.

Mr. Speaker reported, That when The House did attend His Excellency the Governor General, this day in the Senate Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy, which he read to The House, as followeth:—

*Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:*

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons:*

In again summoning you to meet for the despatch of business, I am glad to be able to congratulate you on the prosperity prevailing throughout the Dominion.

The severe bereavement which Queen Alexandra has sustained through the death of her father, the King of Denmark, has occasioned much sorrow throughout the Empire, and I am satisfied that the warm sympathy of the people of Canada will be readily extended to Her Majesty.

It afforded me much pleasure as the representative of His Majesty to take part in the inauguration of the Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan as constituent members of the Confederation. The universal rejoicing on the assumption of provincial autonomy everywhere visible was gratifying to witness, and I venture to say that in no part of the world could a more contented population be found. The universal sentiment was one of abounding confidence in the future.

The bountiful harvest with which we have been blessed in the past season, together with the continued development of our industries and transportation facilities, have so stimulated business in all parts of Canada and have given such an impetus to our exports and imports that the trade both with the United Kingdom and foreign countries for the current fiscal year gives promise of being the largest on record.

The flow of immigrants seeking homes in the three prairie provinces still continues, and from the present outlook the number will be in excess of any previous year, and it is gratifying to note the increasing proportion from the British Isles.

A treaty on behalf of Canada has now been concluded between the United Kingdom and Japan which it is confidently hoped will largely increase our trade with the people of that progressive Empire. When the formal documents have been received they will be laid before you.

The rapid destruction of our forests now going on will, unless the operations of the lumbermen be prudently regulated in the future, and a system of reforestation adopted, result in grave consequences—affecting the uniform flow of our rivers and limiting our valuable water-powers to a few months in the year. A Bill will be submitted for your consideration empowering the government to set apart forest reserves on lands under its control.

In accordance with the offer made by my ministers to the Government of the United Kingdom, the Imperial treasury has now been relieved from the cost of garrisoning Halifax, and arrangements are in progress for taking over the defence of Esquimalt, and hereafter detachments from the Permanent Force of Canada will have charge of both those important stations.

You will be invited to consider the propriety of making such a change in the fiscal year as will bring it more into harmony with the active business season.

The result of the investigation into the administration of leading life insurance companies in the neighbouring Republic has naturally created some uneasiness in the public mind as to the condition of Canadian companies. A Commission has therefore been issued to enquire into and report on the management and financial standing, not only of companies holding Canadian charters but also of all companies doing business under license in Canada.



Satisfactory progress is being made in the exploration and surveys of the Eastern Division of the National Transcontinental Railway, and it is expected that contracts for the construction of two important sections embracing together about 400 miles will shortly be executed.

The interim report of the Canadian section of the International Waterway Commission will be laid before you. The work of the joint commission has been somewhat delayed owing to a doubt as to the jurisdiction of the American section. The great development of commerce on the waters dividing the two countries and the opportunities for the generating of electric power at many points necessarily evolve questions which can only be dealt with by international arrangement or by treaty. At Niagara the Commission will have to consider how best to preserve the scenic effect of the Falls, while not unduly restricting the use of the flow of the Niagara River so valuable for power purposes.

A report has been received from the Transportation Commission containing several important recommendations; the document will be laid before you.

The legal experts appointed to revise, classify and consolidate the public general statutes passed since the revision in 1886 have completed their task, and it is expected that the Volumes will be ready for distribution before July.

A measure for the better observance of the Lord's Day will be submitted for your consideration.

You will be invited to consider among other subjects Bills to amend the Railway Act, the Fruit Marks Act, an Act respecting Usury and also the Dominion Elections Act.

The accounts for the past year will be laid before you; the Estimates for the nine months, embracing a portion of the proposed fiscal year terminating on the Thirty-first of March, 1907, will be submitted for your approval at an early day.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons:*

I invite your earnest attention to the several subjects I have mentioned and to the general business that will come before you, and I trust your deliberations will be guided by wisdom and moderation.

On Agriculture and Colonization,—which said Committees shall severally be empowered to examine and enquire into all such matters and things as may be referred to them by The House; and to report from time to time their observations and opinions thereon; with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Mr. Speaker communicated to The House, the Report of the Joint Librarians of Parliament on the state of the Library of Parliament. (*Sessional Papers, No. 33.*)

The Honourable Richard Stanislas Cooke and the Honourable Lawrence John Cannon, the undersigned, both Judges of the Superior Court of the Province of Quebec, have the honour of transmitting to you a copy of the judgment rendered by them in this matter, at Three Rivers, on the Twenty-fifth day of October, One thousand nine hundred and five, dismissing the Election Petition of the said Charles Edouard Lesage, and declaring the said Respondent, Hormisdas Mayrand, duly elected Member of the House of Commons, for the Electoral District of Maskinongé.

The undersigned have no notes of the evidence to transmit, as no evidence had been brought before them in support of the said Petition.

The undersigned further report that in the said Petition charges were made that corrupt practices had been committed at the said Election, but it had not been proven that such corrupt practices were carried on by any of the candidates at the said Election, nor to their knowledge and with their consent, nor by any other person; that they have no reason to believe that the enquiry into the circumstances of the Election has been rendered incomplete by the action of any of the parties to the said Petition, or that further enquiry as to whether corrupt practices have extensively prevailed is desirable.

Mr. Paterson, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of this House, dated 17th July, 1905, showing the quantities of anthracite coal imported into Canada in 1904, from Great Britain or elsewhere, called Scotch anthracite coal; the various ports to which the same were brought; whether any steps were taken to ascertain whether the coal so imported was really anthracite, from a commercial or dutiable standpoint; and if any evidence was furnished at the time or times of such importation as to the amount of carbon contained in such coal. All correspondence between the Government, or any Department or official thereof, and the Saskatchewan Valley Land Company, or any officer or person purporting to act for that company, or any person or persons, firm or firms, syndicate or syndicates, from whom the Saskatchewan Valley Land Company acquired any portion of the land grant of the Qu'Appelle, Long Lake and Saskatchewan Railroad and Steamboat Company.

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, copies of all Telegrams, letters, petitions, reports, documents, recommendations, investigations, correspondence and all other communications concerning the appointment and removal of Mr. Alexander Darroch from the position of Collector of Customs at St. Thomas, Ontario.

On motion of Mr. Ingram, seconded by Mr. Blain,

On motion of Mr. Lennox, seconded by Mr. Armstrong,

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, a Return showing the several sums of money paid to Judges, under the provisions of Section 13 of an Act respecting the Judges of Provincial Courts, Chapter 138 of the Revised Statutes, as amended by Sections 7, 8 and 9, of Chapter 52 of the Statutes of 1898, from 30th June, 1903, to 20th July, 1905, and under this Section and Amendment, as enacted by Sections 6 of Chapter 31 of the Statutes of 1905, from the said 20th July to this date; with the items in respect of which the said several payments were made, set out and showing the payments in respect of the period before and since 20th July, 1905.

On motion of Mr. Ames, seconded by Mr. Barr,

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, a Return showing, in respect of every case where, during the year ending 30th June, 1905, and during the six months ending 31st December, 1905, an extension of time within which to complete his entry, has been accorded any homesteader within the territory now included in the Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta; giving: (a) the name of the applicant for said extension; (b) his post office address at the time of original entry; (c) the date and agency of original homestead entry; (d) the location of the land in question, indicating township, range and section; (e) the earliest date at which applicant might have become entitled to secure a patent, had all conditions been promptly fulfilled; (f) post office address of applicant at time of demand for extension; (g) the date of demand for extension; (h) the length of extension granted; (i) the cause of granting extension; (j) the name or names of any and all parties who may have communicated with the department for the purpose of recommending the granting of said extension; (k) the name of the homestead inspector who reported on the case, and whether he advised in favour of granting an extension or the contrary; (l) the name and address of any and every person who shall have applied to record a cancellation against said section or part thereof.

All the above information to be arranged according to agencies.

On motion of Mr. Ames, seconded by Mr. Barr,

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, a Return showing, in the case of every homestead against which, during the year 1904 and 1905, a report of non-compliance with the law, or a demand for cancellation has been received by the Dominion land office or offices; giving (a) the location of said quarter section, range, township and meridian; (b) the name and address of the party by whom the original entry was made; (c) the name and address of the party or parties (if there have been several) who endeavoured to lodge cancellations; (d) the reason alleged by complainants why cancellation of entry should be allowed; (e) whether warning of threatened cancellation was served upon the alleged delinquent; (f) the action taken by the department in each case.

On motion of Mr. Ames, seconded by Mr. Barr,

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, a Return showing the parcels of land, other than railway grants, which, since 1896, have been sold, in the present Provinces of Alberta or Saskatchewan, for irrigation projects; giving in each instance area, location and price obtained, and the name of the company or individual to whom sale was made.

On motion of Mr. Ames, seconded by Mr. Barr,

On motion of Mr. Ames, seconded by Mr. Barr,

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, a Return showing the total number of land patents issued, together with the acreage covered thereby, in and for the territory included within the limits of the present Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, between the year 1872 and the 31st December, 1905, under each of the following forms of grant, stating also whether odd or even sections were affected: commutation grants, homesteads, Manitoba Act grants, military bounty grants, Northwest half-breed grants, parish sales, quit claim special grants, railways, sales of mining, farming, ranching, &c., school land sales, special grants, and all others.

On motion of Mr. Lake, seconded by Mr. Henderson,

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, a Return showing:—1. The number of homestead entries recorded each fiscal year from 1872 to 1905, and also, during the six months ending 31st December, 1905, for the territory comprised in the present Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.



2. The number and percentage of such entries for each year for which patents have, prior to the 31st December, 1905, been granted, or recommendations made for the issue of patents.

3. The number and percentage of such entries for each year that have, prior to the 31st December, 1905, been cancelled.

4. The number and percentage of such entries for each year which, neither patented or cancelled, remained in an incompleated state on the first of January, 1906.

On motion of Mr. Lake, seconded by Mr. Henderson,

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, a Return showing the amount of money scrip redeemed in Dominion land, and the number of acres thus purchased from the Government, (a) in Manitoba; (b) in the Northwest; the figures for each year from 1875 to 31st December, 1905, being given separately.

On motion of Mr. Roche (Marquette), seconded by Mr. Barr,

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, a Return showing:—1. The number of allotments of 240 acres of land, and acreage covered by the same, made between the 1st of July, 1896, and the 31st of December, 1905, to the half-breeds of Manitoba, giving, separately, the figures for each year, and for the final six months.

2. The land scrip, if any, issued during the aforesaid period to colonization companies, giving, in the case of each such company, the name and head office address; and also, giving the face value of such scrip and the year of its issuance.

3. The number and acreage of land scrip issued during the same period, to the Half-breeds of the Northwest (now Alberta and Saskatchewan), giving, separately, the figures for each year and for the final six months.

4. The number of acres of land scrip located within the limits of each of the thirteen Dominion land agencies of Manitoba and the Northwest, between the 1st of July, 1896, and the 31st of December, 1905, the figures for each agency each year to be given separately.

On motion of Mr. Parmelee, seconded by Mr. Cash,

And a Debate arising thereupon;

On motion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, seconded by Sir Frederick W. Borden,  
Ordered, That the Debate be adjourned.

Mr. Borden (Carleton) moved, seconded by Mr. Lennox, and the Question being proposed, That a Select Committee of Nine be appointed to enquire into the Acts relating to Elections to this House, and the prevention of corrupt practices thereat, and the procedure and practice upon petitions relating to such elections, and to report to the House if any changes are desirable therein; that the said Committee have power to send for persons, papers and records; that Three be a Quorum of the Committee;

And a Debate arising thereupon;

At the said trial counsel for the Petitioner adduced no evidence in support of the Petition and counsel for the Respondent, consenting thereto, the said Petition was dismissed without costs.

We find and report that the said Respondent a candidate at the said Election was duly elected.

In the said Petition charges were made that corrupt practices had been committed at the said Election, but all the said charges were abandoned and no evidence was given in support thereof. We report, therefore, that no corrupt practices were proven before us to have been committed by or with the knowledge and consent of either of the candidates at the said Election.

We have no means of forming a belief whether corrupt practices have or have not extensively prevailed at the said Election.

We have no reason to believe that enquiry into the circumstances of the said Election has been rendered incomplete by the action of either of the parties to the said Petition, or that further enquiry as to whether corrupt practices have extensively prevailed is desirable.

7. If under lease or alienation in any way, the amount due the Government for rent or price of sale and arrears.

8. If under lease or alienated, whether the conditions of alienation have been fulfilled.

Mr. Monk moved, seconded by Mr. Barker, That it is desirable that the Government of Canada should recognize in some substantial manner the services rendered during the Fenian Raids of 1866 and 1870, by our Canadian Volunteers;

The Honourable Mr. Justice Sedgewick, acting as Deputy Governor, desires the immediate attendance of this Honourable House in the Senate Chamber.

4. What such rights, powers or jurisdiction, if any, are exercised by any Provincial Government or department thereof?

5. What jurisdiction to legislate is possessed or exercised by, (a) the Parliament of Canada; (b) any Provincial Legislature with respect to: (c) sea fisheries, or (d) inland fisheries in regard to; (e) proprietary rights; (f) licensing; (g) other regulations; (h) control or management.

6. Whether any differences or disputes between any Provincial Government and the Federal Government now exist with respect to any of the matters above mentioned; and, if so, a statement of the exact nature and form of such disputes or differences?

Ordered, That the said Address be presented to His Excellency by such Members of this House as are of the King's Privy Council.

All the above information to be arranged according to agencies. (*Sessional Papers, No. 91b.*)

On motion of Mr. Alcorn, seconded by Mr. Kemp,

"That it does not appear that at the time these contracts were made the alleged Trading Company had any corporate existence, any recognized headquarters, any known directors or officers, that it had any vessels afloat, or possessed any trading or operating facilities of any kind or any agents or agencies effective or otherwise.

"That no evidence has been given to Parliament of the efficiency of its plans and methods of operation, or that it has been primarily instrumental in sending one single immigrant to Canada.

"That the conditions of the contracts are injurious, improvident and absurd.

"That immediate steps should be taken to terminate the existing contract," inserted instead thereof;

And the Question on the amendment being again proposed:—The House resumed the said adjourned Debate.

Ordered, That the Debate be adjourned.

"That the conditions of the contracts are injurious, improvident and absurd.

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“That immediate steps should be taken to terminate the existing contract,” inserted instead thereof;

Return to an Order of the House of the 21st March, 1906, for copies of the Contract, together with plans and specifications, between the Government and the Dominion Coal Company, for the improvement of Glace Bay Harbour for public purposes ; also, copies of all correspondence, telegrams, memoranda, and representations made by delegates, Members of Parliament, or any other persons, having reference thereto ; also, copies of all accounts furnished to the Government for expenditures on Glace Bay Harbour, by the Dominion Coal Company.

105. Return of the number and amount of Policies transferred from assessment section to legal reserve section under Act of 1904, by the Mutual Reserve Life Insur-



ance Company of New York; also, the number and amount of policies written by the company during the year 1905 and the cash payments made thereon.

The Committee recommend that their Quorum consist of Seven Members.

Mr. Grant, from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented to the House the Ninth Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have examined the following Petitions, and find that the requirements of the Rule have been fully complied with in each case, viz.:—

Of the Dominion Fire Insurance Company, for an Act empowering them to change their head office from the City of Vancouver, British Columbia, to the City of Toronto, Ontario.

Of the Central Railway Company of Canada, for an Act to increase their capital stock and borrowing powers and for other purposes.

Of the Windsor, Essex and Lake Shore Railway Company, for an Act empowering them to establish a certain line of car ferries and for other purposes.

Of the Ottawa, Brockville and St. Lawrence Railway Company, for an Act to extend the time for the construction of their railway.

Your Committee have also considered the following Petitions, and find that the notices, while regular in other respects, are somewhat short in point of time; but, as they will mature before the Bills can be considered in Committee, your Committee recommend they be deemed sufficient, viz.:—

Of James Whalen, of the Town of Port Arthur, Ontario, for an Act authorizing the construction of a branch line of railway from the main line of the Southern Central Pacific Railway Company, near Skaist River, British Columbia, to Cold Lake, in the Province of Saskatchewan.

Of James M. McCarthy and others, for an Act of Incorporation under the name of the Frontenac Gas, Light and Power Company.

Of John Thompson and others, for an Act of Incorporation under the name of the Hillcrest Railway, Coal and Coke Company.

Your Committee have also considered the Petition of John Piggott and others, for an Act of Incorporation under the name of the Windsor, Chatham and London Railway Company, and they find that the notice is sufficient for all the purposes of the application, with the exception of the power to operate said railway by electricity.

Your Committee have also considered the Petition of the Standard Trusts Company, for an Act empowering them to extend their operations throughout the Dominion of Canada and elsewhere; and find that the notice was not published at the place where the head office of the company is situated, as required by the Rule; but, as the powers asked for affect the interests of the shareholders only, your Committee recommend that the notice as published be considered sufficient, on condition that the powers asked for be made subject to the approval of the shareholders in the usual way before being exercised.

As the time for presenting Private Bills has expired, your Committee recommend that that portion of the 49th Rule which limits the time for presenting Private Bills, be suspended, in reference to the foregoing Bills.

Mr. Campbell, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented to the House the Seventh Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have had under consideration the following Bills, and have agreed to report the same without amendment, viz.:—

Bill respecting the Rio de Janeiro Tramway, Light and Power Company (Limited).

Bill respecting the Mexican Light and Power Company (Limited); and

Bill respecting the Great Northern Railway of Canada.

Your Committee have also had under consideration the following Bills, and have agreed to report the same with Amendments, viz.:—



Bill respecting the Mexican Consolidated Electric Company (Limited), and to change its name to "Mexican Tramway and Electric Company."

Bill respecting the Qu'Appelle, Long Lake and Saskatchewan Railroad and Steamboat Company; and

Bill to incorporate the Ashcroft, Barkerville and Fort George Railway Company.

Sir Frederick W. Borden, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Supplementary Return (in so far as the Department of Militia and Defence is concerned) to an Order of this House, dated 28th March, 1906, for copies of all Contracts for supplies of food for the permanent military forces and mounted police of the Dominion; also, for all the supplies of food to the volunteers at their annual drill camps last summer; also, for supplies to the military schools of the Dominion. (*Sessional Papers, No. 118a.*)

Mr. Paterson, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency, dated 9th April, 1906, for a copy of all Contracts between the Ross Rifle Company and the Government, or the Department of Militia, for the supply of rifles, ammunition, or other articles, and all Orders in Council, correspondence, reports, documents and papers relating to such contracts or to the subject-matter thereof, or to the operations of the company, or to its dealings with the Government, or any of the Departments thereof, including the Department of Customs. (*Sessional Papers, No. 124.*)

On motion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, seconded by Mr. Paterson,

Resolved, That a Message be sent to the Senate informing their Honours that this House hath agreed to their Address to His Excellency the Governor General, respectfully requesting that His Excellency will be pleased to transmit the joint Address to His Most Excellent Majesty the King, most humbly praying that His Majesty and Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, will honour the Dominion of Canada with their presence at such time as may be selected by His Majesty; by filling up the blank therein with the word "Commons."

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry the said Message to the Senate.

Mr. Templeman, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of this House, dated 23rd April, 1906, for a copy of the Report of A. E. DuBerger, on the drug and proprietary medicine trade of Canada. (*Sessional Papers, No. 125.*)

Mr. Aylesworth, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of this House, dated 5th April, 1906, for a copy of all Petitions, letters, correspondence, reports, memoranda and any other documents respecting the dismissal of Mr. Patrick Walsh from the Postmastership of East Roman Valley, in the County of Guysborough, Nova Scotia. Ordered, That Mr. Clarke have leave to bring in a Bill respecting the Windsor, Essex and Lake Shore Rapid Railway Company.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Oliver, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency, dated 14th March, 1906, for copies of all Contracts and agreements between the Government or any Department of the Government, and the Qu'Appelle, Long Lake and Saskatchewan Railroad and Steamboat Company, and



all Orders in Council, reports, papers, documents and correspondence, respecting:—  
 (a) Any loan to the said company; (b) any indebtedness of the said company to the Crown or to the Government; (c) any lands to which the company might become entitled by virtue of any statute, contract or agreement; (d) any land granted to or earned by the company; (e) the area within which such lands might be selected by the company; (f) any enlargement, change or alteration of the area within which such lands might be selected by the company, or by any purchaser from the assignee of the company.

2. All correspondence respecting the matters above mentioned between the Government, or any Department of the Government, or any official or person acting or purporting to act for the Government and the said company, or any official thereof, or any person acting or purporting to act therefor, or any assignee of or purchaser from the said company.

3. All Orders in Council relating to, touching or concerning the said company's land grant, or the area within which the same might be selected, or any enlargement or alteration of that area.

4. All correspondence between the Government, or any Department or official thereof, and the Saskatchewan Valley Land Company, or any officer or person purporting to act for that company, or any person or persons, firm or firms, syndicate or syndicates, from whom the Saskatchewan Valley Land Company acquired any portion of the land grant of the Qu'Appelle, Long Lake and Saskatchewan Railroad and Steamboat Company.

5. All correspondence between any shareholders or persons interested in the Qu'Appelle, Long Lake and Saskatchewan Railroad and Steamboat Company, with the Government or any Department or official thereof, and all claims and demands made by that company, or by any person interested therein against the Government, in respect of the said land grant, or the selection thereof, or any of the matters above referred to. (*Sessional Papers, No. 112b.*)

"That the contracts were made under a pledge not to disclose the personnel or agents of the alleged company, who are either unknown to the Government, or if known to the Government, have not been disclosed to Parliament, notwithstanding various attempts to secure the information.

"That it does not appear that at the time these contracts were made the alleged Trading Company had any corporate existence, any recognized headquarters, any known directors or officers, that it had any vessels afloat, or possessed any trading or operating facilities of any kind or any agents or agencies effective or otherwise.



“That no evidence has been given to Parliament of the efficiency of its plans and methods of operation, or that it has been primarily instrumental in sending one single immigrant to Canada.

“That the conditions of the contracts are injurious, improvident and absurd.

“That immediate steps should be taken to terminate the existing contract,” inserted instead thereof;

And the Question on the amendment being again proposed:—The House resumed the said adjourned Debate.

And The House, having continued to sit till after Twelve of the Clock on Wednesday morning;

Mr. Macpherson, from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented to the House the Eleventh Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have, in obedience to the Order of your Honourable House, reconsidered their Tenth Report, and beg leave to report in reference thereto, as follows:—

Your Committee are under the impression that some confusion exists regarding their recommendations for the suspension of the 49th Rule. There are two parts to that Rule, the one limiting the time for receiving Petitions for Private Bills, and the other limiting the time for presenting Private Bills.

As regards the first provision of the Rule, your Committee have always recognized that the strongest reasons should be assigned for recommending its suspension, and it has been their usual, though not their invariable, practice to embody such reasons in their Report when making any such recommendation; but, as regards the second part of the Rule, it has never been the practice of your Committee to assign any reasons for recommending its suspension, for the reason that such a recommendation is always made either because the House has previously suspended the Rule, allowing the Petition to be presented, and thus admitting the expediency of granting the legislation asked for (provided that the Rules regarding Notices, &c., have been complied with); or, in cases where the Petitions, though presented within the proper time, have been held back by your Committee for the purpose of allowing the Notices published in connection therewith to more fully mature, or of permitting the applicants to remedy some defect in the Notice before the same is reported upon by your Committee, in either of which cases your Committee are of the opinion that the second provision of the Rule should be suspended as a matter of course.

The latter case was that of all the Petitions referred to in the first recommendation contained in the Tenth Report of your Committee, with the exception of one, viz.: the Petition of Queen's College at Kingston, which was duly received and reported upon by the 10th of April last, nine days before the expiration of the time for presenting Private Bills, but the Bill was only filed on the 7th May, the reasons assigned for the delay being that the Board of Trustees had only approved of the same on the 5th of May.

As regards the second recommendation of your Committee, that the first part of the Rule be suspended, in reference to the Petition of the Twelve-Mile Power Company,

the reason assigned to your Committee for the delay and which was inadvertently omitted from their Report, was, that though the Petition was signed and mailed to Ottawa from Dawson City, in March last, it did not arrive in Ottawa until the evening of the day on which the House adjourned for the Easter vacation, and was consequently too late to be presented within the time prescribed by the Rule.

It is a question with your Committee whether the purposes of the 49th Rule would not be better attained if the Rule, which is most difficult of enforcement, were rescinded, and Private Bills and Petitions therefor were received at any time during the Session, but that certain periods be fixed after which any such Petitions and Bills presented would be liable to an increased fee.

Mr. Campbell, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented to the House the Tenth Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Also, Return to an Order of this House, dated 5th April, 1906, for copies of all Correspondence, reports, telegrams, valuations and memoranda in possession of the Government, or any Member or official thereof, with reference to damages for lands expropriated for railway purposes on the line built between Montague and Cardigan, Prince Edward Island; also, names of commissioners or valuers, or both; copies of all valuations made, by whom made, giving the names and the amounts separately awarded to each; also, list of names of persons who accepted valuers' awards, and also, of persons whose valuations have not been accepted by the Government; also, list of persons who have been paid or accepted valuations. (*Sessional Papers, No. 143.*)

Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of the 9th April, 1906, for a copy of all Contracts between the Ross Rifle Company and the Government, or the Department of Militia, for the supply of rifles, ammunition, or other articles, and all Orders in Council, correspondence, reports, documents and papers relating to such contracts or to the subject-matter thereof, or to the operations of the company, or to its dealing with the Government, or any of the departments thereof, including the Department of Customs.

126. Return to an Order of the House of the 23rd April, 1906, for a copy of the Report made by the Deputy Minister of Labour on the results of his investigation into the importation of Italian labourers to the City of Montreal, in the Spring of 1904.

127. Return to an Order of the House of the 28th March, 1906, for copies of all Correspondence, plans, specifications, surveys, &c., pertaining to relief from River Thames, say between the City of London and Lake St. Clair, for the overflow of water from the said river, pertaining to canal or cut-off to Lake Erie or other points.

Also for a copy of any and all acceptance and acceptances, consent and consents in writing, by or on behalf of said A. D. Davidson, or associates, or any of them, of or to the terms of disposal of lands, set out in said Order in Council, and bearing numbers one to nine, both inclusive, or of or to any of such terms, together with all correspondence and other papers, in any wise relating to such acceptance or consent.

Also for a copy of any and all agreement and agreements in writing, at any time made by the Government, or any Department thereof, with said A. D. Davidson, and associates, or any of them, for sale of lands, based on said Order in Council, approved



24th May, 1903, or on any modification thereof, together with all correspondence and other papers in any wise relating to such agreement or agreements.

136. Mr. Oliver, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of this House, dated 9th May, 1906, showing the total number of Land patents issued, together with the acreage covered thereby, in and for the territory included within the limits of the present Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, between the 1st of July, 1901, and the 31st December, 1905, under each of the following forms of grant: (a) commutation grants, (b) homesteads, (c) Manitoba Act grants, (d) military bounty grants, (e) Northwest Half-breed grants, (f) parish sales, (g) quit claim special grants, (h) railways, (i) sales of mining, farming, ranching, &c., (j) school land sales, (k) special grants, (l) and all others. (*Sessional Papers, No. 162.*)

Also, Return to an Order of this House, dated 23rd April, 1906, showing what Information is in possession of the Department of the Interior, or any Department or Member of the Government, regarding alleged irregular or improper dealings, acts, charges, payments, or accounts of any officer, agent or other person in Great Britain and Ireland, or in Europe, in connection with immigration to Canada: what period is covered thereby; also, what communications, if any, upon or in relation to such matters have been had from or with the High Commissioner for Canada, the Commissioner of Immigration, or others, in writing or otherwise; also, a copy of all correspondence, reports and papers, if any, relating to such matters. (*Sessional Papers, No. 163.*)

Mr. Oliver also laid before the House, by command of His Excellency the Governor General.—A certified copy of a Report of a Committee of the Honourable the Privy Council, approved by His Excellency the Governor General in Council, on the 21st April, 1901, respecting "The Temperance Colonization Society (Limited)," and defining in general terms the mode of dealing with Colonization Companies desiring to have their agreements cancelled and their accounts with the Government closed. (*Sessional Papers, No. 121a.*)

A copy of the estimated cost of the harbour, the statement to include dredging and the breakwater; also, copies of all advertisements calling for tenders, as well as all tenders and contracts and correspondence on the subject; the names of all dredges employed on the works since 30th June, 1896, and their owners; also, copies of all telegrams, letters, reports, petitions, documents, correspondence, investigations and communications of every description in connection with said harbour works; also, a copy of the pay-roll for each year since 30th June, 1896; the names of all foremen, superintendents and inspectors, their length of service as such, and by whom recommended, giving all correspondence in connection with their appointment; and, if dismissed or resigned, state reasons for said dismissal or resignation; the names of all civil engineers employed on the works, and by whom recommended, and all correspondence in connection therewith; also, the name of the person or persons who paid the respective amounts at Port Stanley for material furnished and labour performed. (*Sessional Papers, No. 171.*)

Also, Return to an Order of this House, dated 9th May, 1906, for a copy of the Instructions issued to each grade of civil engineers on the survey of the Montreal, Ottawa and Georgian Bay Ship Canal; also, the names of each of the engineers engaged in the several grades, respectively, including transit men, levellers, rodmen, and chainmen, and the salaries of each. (*Sessional Papers, No. 172.*)

And also, Return to an Order of this House, dated 30th April, 1906, for a copy of all Papers, vouchers and statements in connection with the expenditure of \$1,438.54 on Miminigash Harbour, as per Auditor General's Report, 1905, giving names and amounts paid severally for labourers, names, prices and amounts for supplies of stone, brick, poles, plank, and small payments, &c. (*Sessional Papers, No. 173.*)

PRAYERS.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the following Petition was read and received:—  
Of the Reverend D. H. Taylor and others, of Binbrooke and other places in Wentworth, Ontario; praying that the Lord's Day bill, now before Parliament, may become law.

Mr. Wright (Renfrew), from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented to the House the Twelfth Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have considered the petition of L. S. Robe and others, for an Act of Incorporation under the name of the Twelve-Mile Power Company (Limited), and find that the requirements of the Rule regarding the publication of notices have been complied with.

As the time for presenting Private Bills has expired, your Committee recommend that that portion of the 49th Rule which limits the time for presenting Private Bills, be suspended in reference to the Bill to incorporate the said company.

Your Committee have also considered the Petition of the Royal Victoria Life Insurance Company, for certain amendments to their Act of Incorporation, and find that the petitioners do not intend to proceed with the proposed measure during the present session.

Your Committee have also considered the following Bills from the Senate, and find that the requirements of the Rule have been fully complied with, viz.:—

Bill intituled: "An Act respecting the St. Mary's River Bridge Company; and also

Bill intituled: "An Act respecting the Pacific and Atlantic Railway Company."

Mr. Lemieux, from the Select Committee to whom were referred Bill in further amendment of the Railway Act, 1903, and Bill to further amend the Railway Act, 1903, presented to the House the Second Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have had under consideration Bill in further amendment of the Railway Act, 1903, and have agreed to report the same with Amendments.

Mr. Wright (Renfrew), from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented to the House the Thirteenth Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have considered the following suggested substitute for Rule 55, viz.:—

" 55. There shall be an Examiner of Petitions for Private Bills.

" 2. Petitions for Private Bills, when received by the House, are to be taken into consideration by the Examiner, who shall report to the House in each case, the extent to which the requirements of the Rules regarding Notices have been complied with; and, in every case where the Notice is reported by the Examiner to have been insufficient, or otherwise defective, the Petition shall be taken into consideration (without special reference) by the Committee on Standing Orders, which shall recommend to the House the course to be taken in consequence of such insufficiency of Notice, or other defect therein."

This suggestion, which is based upon the procedure of both Houses of the Imperial Parliament, does not in any way alter the present mode of examining into the proofs of compliance with the Rule regarding notices, but merely changes the method of reporting the results of such examination; and, in the opinion of your Committee, it would, if adopted, greatly expedite the procedure in the case of Petitions on which the requirements of the Rule regarding notices have been fully and properly complied with, and would also avoid the necessity of your Committee meeting, as they frequently have to do at present, merely for the purpose of formally endorsing the report of their Clerk or Examiner in such cases, and would confine their consideration entirely to cases in which the Examiner has reported some insufficiency or other defect in the Notice, thus relieving your Committee of a great deal of purely formal, and, in their opinion, unnecessary work.

For these reasons your Committee recommend that the above suggested Rule be adopted instead of Rule 55.

Your Committee have also had under consideration certain proposed amendments to Rule 51, regarding the publication of Notices of applications for Private Bills; these amendments do not involve any change in the method of advertising prescribed by the Rule, but are suggested with a view of remedying certain defects in the Rule, and providing for certain classes of applications which were apparently overlooked at the time the Rule was framed, such as applications for Acts to continue the Charters of Banks and Insurance Companies, and for the extension of letters patent of invention, &c. The Rule, as proposed to be amended, is submitted herewith, with the proposed amendments shown within brackets.

Your Committee recommend that the said amendments be concurred in.

#### RULE 51.

AS PROPOSED TO BE AMENDED.

(Amendments shown within brackets.)

51. All applications to Parliament for Private Bills, of any nature whatsoever, shall be advertised by a Notice published in the *Canada Gazette*; such Notice shall clearly and distinctly state the nature and objects of the application, and shall be signed by or on behalf of the applicants, with the address of the party signing the same; and, when the application is for an Act of incorporation, the name of the proposed company shall be stated in the Notice.

If the works of any company (incorporated, or to be incorporated), are to be declared to be for the general advantage of Canada, such intention shall be specifically mentioned in the Notice; and the applicants shall cause a copy of such Notice to be sent by registered letter to the Clerk of each municipality which may be specially affected by the construction or operation of such works, and also, to the Secretary of the Province in which such works are, or may be located; and proof of compliance with this requirement by the applicants shall be established by statutory declaration.

In addition to the Notice in the *Canada Gazette*, aforesaid, a similar Notice shall also be published in some leading newspaper, as follows:

A. When the application is for an Act to incorporate.

1. *A Railway or Canal Company*:—In the principal city, town or village in each county [or district] through which the proposed railway or canal is to be constructed.

2. *A Telegraph or Telephone Company*:—In the principal city or town in each Province or Territory in which the company proposes to operate.

3. A company for the *construction of any works* which, in their construction or operation, might specially affect a particular locality; or for obtaining any *exclusive*



*rights or privileges*; or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of others:—In the particular locality or localities which may be affected by the proposed Act.

4. A Banking Company; An Insurance Company; A Trust Company; A Loan Company; or an Industrial Company without any exclusive powers:—In the *Canada Gazette* only.

B. When the application is for the purpose of amending an existing Act.

1. For an extension of any line of railway, or of any canal; or for the construction of branches thereto:—In the principal city, town or village in each county or district through which such extension or branch is to be constructed.

2. [For the continuation of a Charter, or] for an extension of the time for the construction or completion of any line of railway; of any canal; of any telegraph or telephone line, or of any other works already authorized; or for an extension of the powers of a company (when not involving the granting of any exclusive rights); for the increase or reduction of the capital stock of any company; for increasing or altering its bonding or other borrowing powers; or for any amendment which would in any way affect the rights or interests of the shareholders or bondholders or creditors of the company:—In the place where the head office of the company is situated.

[C. When the application is for the purpose of obtaining for any person or existing corporation any exclusive rights or privileges or the power to do any matter or thing which, in its operation, would affect the rights or property of others:—In the particular locality, or localities which may be affected by the proposed Act.]

All such Notices, whether inserted in the *Canada Gazette* or in a newspaper, shall be published at least once a week, for a period of five consecutive weeks; and, in the Provinces of Quebec and Manitoba, shall be published in both the English and French languages, and, if there be no newspaper in a locality where a notice is required to be given, such notice shall be given in the next nearest locality wherein a newspaper is published; and proof of the due publication of notice shall be established in each case by Statutory declaration, and all such declarations shall be sent to the Clerk of the House, endorsed "Private Bill Notice."

Mr. Daniel, from the Select Committee to whom was referred for consideration Bill respecting the Lord's Day, presented to the House the First Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have considered the said Bill and have agreed to report the same with Amendments.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS:

Extras as Sub-sections (8), (9) and (10) of Section 3, to be inserted only if imperative.

(8) Between the 15th of September and the close of lake navigation, carrying grain in trains loaded exclusively therewith, transshipping grain at lake or river ports, and returning grain cars to shipping points.

(9) Loading and unloading at ocean ports and conveying in trains loaded exclusively therewith, freight passing through Canada in bond from one foreign country to another.

(10) Any work which the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada, having regard to the object of this Act, shall unanimously deem necessary to permit in connection with the freight traffic of any railway.

That costs of all parties of applications to the Board hereunder shall be borne by the applicant, and, if more than one, equally.

Notice of application, in which the reasons to be relied on shall be fully set out, shall be given to the Department of Railways.

In all other respects the procedure under the Railway Act, shall, so far as applicable, apply.

Preston, an employee of the Department of the Interior (outside service), and, at present, inspector of Canadian immigration in Europe, who has appeared before one of the Standing Committees of this House, to wit, the Committee on Agriculture and Colonization, has refused to answer questions put to him by the said Committee, concerning the person or persons who compose the said syndicate or association, known as the North Atlantic Trading Company, as appears by the answers of the said witness contained in the report of the said Committee, proceedings and notes of evidence now before this House for consideration;

That it is and always has been the undoubted right and privilege of this House of Commons to have all information which it may desire regarding public matters of every kind and description, coming within the jurisdiction of Parliament, and the refusal of the witness to answer, under the present circumstances, constitutes a breach of such privilege;

That the said William T. R. Preston be summoned to appear at the Bar of this House, according to the law and usage of Parliament, on Wednesday, the 6th day of June, instant, at Four o'Clock in the afternoon, to answer such questions as may be put to him by Mr. Speaker or other Members of this House, and receive such injunctions, orders and monitions as to this Honourable House may seem fit.



Sir Wilfrid Laurier moved, in amendment, seconded by Mr. Fielding, That all the words after "That" to the end of the Question be left out, and the words "the conditions surrounding emigration operations on the Continent of Europe have required the making of exceptional arrangements for the promotion of emigration to Canada; that the persons who formed the company or syndicate, known as the North Atlantic Trading Company, entered into their contract with the Government of Canada on the faith of an assurance that their names would not be disclosed; that such assurance was given by the authority of a responsible Minister of the Crown; that an assurance so given by the Canadian Government to citizens of a foreign country is binding on the Dominion, and, therefore, the House refuses to require or permit any Minister or officer of the Government to violate the engagement so made," inserted instead thereof;

And the Question being put on the amendment; the House divided: and the names being called for, they were taken down, as follow:—

The Sergeant-at-Arms reported,—That in obedience to the Order of the House, J. E. E. Cinq-Mars was in attendance.

The Clerk read, in English, a translation of the Article complained of, that appeared in *La Presse* newspaper, published at Montreal, as follows:—

THE FEDERAL PARLIAMENT.

{Translated from "*La Presse*" of Saturday, 26th May, 1906.}

"Ottawa, 26th.—Since the adjournment of the House on Wednesday, I have not met five Members in the Parliament Buildings; I think they have all left the Capital to breathe fresh country air. Those who reside on the Pacific or the Atlantic coast have accepted the invitations of their Montreal and Toronto friends and have striven to worthily celebrate, far from their homes, the former Queen's birthday—now Victoria Day.

"The political week has been short, and, apart from the Budget Speech, of which we have already spoken at sufficient length, there remains nothing for analysis, unless it be the now antiquated stories of the 'North Atlantic Trading (Company)' and of the *Arctic*.



"It is amusing to watch the Tory newspapers discussing the Budget Speech. Forced to admit that there is a surplus of several millions of dollars, in revenue over expenditure, they vociferate that such a result is due to the policy of the former Tory regime, which the present Government has followed. Needless to insist that the electorate has demonstrated in a very clear manner that it knows its own business on that point.

"When the Liberals were in opposition they blamed the Conservatives for the deficits recorded at the end of each fiscal year; they denounced their policy as a bad one. To-day the Tories are forced to admit that the finances of the country are flourishing, that the fiscal years close with large surpluses; but, they make it a crime for the Government to have increased the sum of expenditures. What a stupid argument! You might as well find fault with a trader who, realizing \$25,000 profits per year from a \$200,000 business, spends more than does his neighbour whose expenses are less, with annual profits of \$12,000, from a business totalling only \$100,000. The expenditure increases with the volume of business. No person will pretend the contrary save the partisan of a fallen political party. These gentlemen clamour about scandal because the expenditures have increased. Full stop; that is all. Let the curtain fall.

"A friend reminds me that, since the opening of the session, I have not been very gentle towards Mr. Foster. That is true; but, how could one remain insensible under the shower of gratuitous insults that this old parliamentarian incessantly outpours in the face of the inhabitants of the Province of Quebec, of the French Canadians, of the Catholics, in fine, of all that is respectable and ought to be respected?

"If only this worthy's sayings were printed nowhere but in *Hansard*; but no; the Parliamentary correspondents of the Tory press drink in his words and transmit them to their papers, which make their precious pages from them. Thus, according to the leading Tory dailies, Sir Wilfrid Laurier would appear to be a political rogue, the late Honourable Mr. Préfontaine a thief, the Honourable the Minister of Finance an arrant liar, the other members of the cabinet political mountebanks and humbugs, our fellow-countrymen simpletons, steeped in ignorance, our clergy a horde of fanatics and hypocrites. And it is Mr. George Eulas Foster, a politician of sorry celebrity, who sings this refrain in the Commons. During the last session his colleague and political associate, Mr. Borden, had started a campaign of the same kind; but, the results of the provincial elections in the Northwest and of the by-elections for the Commons that took place during the recess, had the effect of subduing him, for he seeks to retain the leadership of his party. His garb is perhaps still the same, but he has modified his language.

"Mr. Foster must be answered, not that the articles with which he inspires the Tory press are worth the while; but, because there are certain readers who are given to accepting as true the writings that remain unanswered. Mr. Foster's methods are simple; but, that in which he is above all lacking is a little honesty in his citations. Tuesday last he was caught *flagrante delicto* by the Minister of Finance, who promptly put him in his place. As a general rule, you do not find, in the Tory press, the corrections administered to Mr. Foster; rather do his errors occupy the most prominent place. He parodies the speeches of his opponents, he distorts their ideas, he mutilates their phrases—such are the methods that he uses and abuses. He has but one principle—self-interest; but one desire—to insult. He belongs to the school of lying, hypocrisy and cowardice. In his eyes, the man for whom civic and political virtues are not vain words, is an imbecile, a hot-head. It is useless to broach such matters to him, he would not understand them.

"During the session nine-tenths of my time are devoted to pursuits much more worthy of my attention than he is, and the other tenth is not solely employed in spinning phrases, but in thinking—something that he is at no trouble to do, this man of great ideas!

"BLAISE."

But how could one remain insensible under the shower of gratuitous insults that this old parliamentarian incessantly dashes into the face of the inhabitants of the Province of Quebec, of the French Canadians, of the Catholics, in fine, of all that is respectable and ought to be respected?”

“Thus, according to the leading Tory dailies, Sir Wilfrid Laurier would appear to be a political rogue, our fellow-countrymen simpletons steeped in ignorance, our clergy a horde of fanatics and hypocrites. And it is Mr. George Eulas Foster, a politician of sorry celebrity, who sings this refrain in the Commons.”

“He has but one principle—self-interest; but one desire—to insult. He belongs to the school of lying, hypocrisy and cowardice. In his eyes, the man for whom civic and political virtues are not vain words, is an imbecile, a hot-head. It is useless to broach such matters to him, he would not understand them.”

Mr. Cinq-Mars then replied, as follows:—

Mr. Speaker,—Before giving to this Honourable House the explanation demanded by one of its Members, I desire to declare my respect for those who compose it; and, if I have been pushed to a criticism of one of its Members, it was in consequence of language and a general attitude that I looked upon as a provocation of those who do not participate in his views in matters of a religious and racial character.

Before going further, I claim for myself the privileges of the press which I do not think I have gone beyond in this matter, and I declare that, in my conduct towards Mr. Foster, I acted without any personal animosity and merely in the public interest.

I respectfully submit that the Article to which Mr. Foster takes exception is not a report of the deliberations of the House; but, an editorial which treats of political questions in general and of public men. I make a daily report of the debates in the House for *La Presse*; but, such reports are never published elsewhere than in the news columns of the paper. It is true that my editorial articles are dated from Ottawa, but that is because I reside at the capital. Those articles are not penned in the press gallery. In fact I write those appreciations or criticisms of public affairs and of public men wheresoever I happened to be, be that in Quebec, in Montreal, or any place else. My Article of 26th May, was written during parliament recess, which lasted from 23rd to the 28th May. In reality I am, thus, no more subject to censure than would be a journalist who is not a member of the Press Gallery.

I beg to emphasize the point that, under the present circumstances, my Article in no way affects the dignity of the House.

Might I remark that my political writing is no way exceptional as far as the ordinary tone of present-day polemics is concerned.



You need only recall certain articles in the Ontario and Quebec press to perceive that the one to which Mr. Foster takes exception is far from being as violent and inflammatory in tone. To cite but one example, is it not a fact that a Quebec Conservative organ unceasingly represents our Prime Minister as a traitor to his nationality, a traitor to his religion, that he betrays them each in turn, while the Ontario papers, in their editorials and cartoons, represent him as the instrument and the slave of the Catholic hierarchy? Does not this double-edged attack, in its very exaggeration, demonstrate the falseness of both charges? Yet in almost every succeeding number of these organs the same thing is repeated.

Honourable Mr. Foster finds subject-matter for complaint in my Article, for the injustice of my criticism in representing him as the enemy of the French Canadians and of the Catholics. It would be impossible to read the speeches and writings of the honourable gentleman without feeling impressed with the idea that, in his eyes, the French Canadians are the slaves of the bishops who keep them in ignorance. His thoughts are not always clearly conveyed; but his sarcasms are very expressive. It is easy to understand what he means when he compares the bishops of Quebec to the grand dukes of the autocratic Czar of Russia; when he says that they control, with their influence, the Prime Minister and his colleagues.

Here are the words used by the Honourable Mr. Foster, in the course of the debate on the autonomy of the young provinces of the west:—

(See *Hansard*, 1905, Vol. II., page 2563.)

“And, like the autocratic Czar of Russia, the Prime Minister rushes his Bill in before his Ministers can get together to consult him, declaring the Bill to embody his doctrine and the doctrine on which he is bound to stand. What is the weakness of the Czar of Russia to-day? It is because he does not consult the people; it is worse than that; it is because that, while not consulting the people, he consults only the grand dukes. The Prime Minister of Canada is in the same position to-day. The people, are the 500,000 out in the west for whom he legislates. Who are the grand dukes? We know right well whom he has not consulted, but do we know whom he has consulted if there been any consulting?”

(See *Hansard*, the same year and volume at page 3954.)

Honourable Mr. Foster says: “He has been told times without number to his face in this House, and he has not once risen to deny it, it has been very courteously brought to his attention to-day, and he has thoroughly ignored it, that before he brought down his educational clause on 21st February, 1905, there had been numerous conferences between himself and Monsigneur Sbarretti, with reference to the provisions of that Bill.”

(Again on the same page.)

“Is it proper for the right honourable gentleman, as leader of a Government, to have frequent conferences with the Papal Alegate in Ottawa, with reference to a dominant part of his policy in creating new provinces, and to give the go-by to the representatives of the people of the Government?”

“Mr. Speaker, the right honourable gentleman did not consult the Minister of the Interior, who represents the Northwest Territories, who was their sole representative in the Cabinet, in reference to the educational clauses of the Bill; but, he sits in abject silence and allows me to state here in the House, endorsed by that silence, that he did care to consult the Papal Delegate here in Ottawa. The right hon. leader of the Government, did he consult the Honourable Minister of Finance (Mr. Fielding)? Will the right honourable gentleman tell me now whether he consulted, on that educational clause, more frequently the one than the other, his Postmaster General or the Papal Alegate?”

It also appeared to me, as an impartial journalist, that Honourable Mr. Foster outstepped the criticism that a leader of the opposition has a right to exercise, when he represented the credits of the Province of Quebec to be the outcome of a trafficking

between the Members of that Province and the Government. According to Mr. Foster's theory, subventions were accorded to the other provinces, in accordance with the general interest, and to the Province of Quebec, for the purpose of purchasing its support.

(See *Hansard*, 1905, Vol. I., page 827.)

Mr. Foster says: "My honourable friend knows that when the honourable Minister and the Senator went down there (to Quebec) they went for the purpose of patching up the difficulty in the rank of the party in Quebec. I think this House has also an interest in these cases; sooner or later, the public pays the bill. These rapprochements are brought about, as my right honourable friend has been very skilful and untiring in bringing them about, by the interposition of public moneys and public offices, and so, after this rapprochement is effectually carried out, it will not be many weeks, certainly not many months, before this House and the whole country will know just how much they will have to pay in order to foot the bill for the reconciliation."

And on the next page:—

"Now he makes common cause with the party in Quebec. Does he not recall the adage between himself and Honourable Mr. Mercier, that one was to deliver a majority to the other, and the other was to have the price, whatever he demanded, after the majority had been delivered."

All that speech of Mr. Foster, is in the same strain and same spirit. Could more serious and defamatory accusations be launched against the public men and citizens of a province—these latter being thus represented as a flock of sheep set up for sale and anxious for nothing else than money and preferment?

Would the House kindly permit me to read a few other extracts that tend to justify my criticism and to show that the picture of Honourable Mr. Foster which I drew was not too highly coloured?

(See *Hansard*, 1905, Vol. I., page 29.)

Mr. Foster again: "My honourable friend made an appeal for cordiality and good feeling and for the repression of race and creed issues. No one would join him more heartily in that appeal than myself. My honourable friend will join me in the expression of that wish; but, is it not a fact that he owes the election to this House of some of his supporters to these very racial and creed cries?"

"Some Honourable Members—'No, no.'"

Mr. Foster: "We, I am sure, not only on this side but on that, deplore the absence from this House of my hon. friend from Montmorency (Mr. Casgrain). He was a public man who did credit to his province and this Parliament, and the fact that he is not in his seat to-day is not because his policy was not approved of by his constituency, not because his character was unworthy of their confidence, but, because of race and creed cries which were raised against him."

This language of Honourable Mr. Foster, at the very opening session of a new Parliament, furnishes an idea of his sentiments. He accuses Mr. Parent of having won his election by race and creed cries, which is absolutely false. And, unless one took his words in the sense of a counter appeal to race and religious prejudices in the English-speaking provinces, his expressions have no meaning and are useless.

Mr. Demers, Member for St. Jean et Iberville, accused Mr. Foster of being an enemy of the Province of Quebec and of seeking to have it believed that its citizens are intolerant. These assertions of Mr. Demers were in reply to a speech by Mr. Foster, in which the latter gave vent to his true sentiments.

During the same session Mr. Foster spoke in his derisive style of the influence of the Catholic Church on the people of Quebec, especially in regard to educational matters. I find in *Hansard* one special passage, too lengthy to cite, that fully sustains my contention. (Page 3380.)

Later on we find Mr. Foster carrying on an election campaign in London, Ontario, and appealing to the electorate by asserting that "a vote to Mr. Hyman was a vote for Laurier, Sbarretti and the Hierarchy."



I may be permitted to remark that, in his own province, Mr. Foster was not judged very much differently than I have judged him. In the *Moncton Transcript* of the 16th December, 1899, I find the solemn declaration, amongst others, of Samuel E. McDonald, a respectable citizen of Brunswick. It runs thus:

"The solemn declaration of Samuel E. McDonald, a respected citizen of Brunswick, County of Queen's, Province of New Brunswick, under date 2nd December, 1899, sets forth that at a meeting in favour of the Conservative party, a meeting called by public notice, put up in different places, Mr. Tilley, barrister, of St. John, and Mr. H. B. Hetherington, of Queen's, were the speakers. Mr. Hetherington then declared that the coming elections would not be fought on the political issues, but would be a struggle between Roman Catholics and Protestants, affirming moreover, that if war were to break out between France and England, the people of New Brunswick and of the Maritime Provinces would have to shoulder their muskets and march on Quebec, to defeat the French Canadians before they could offer any other aid to England.

"He further declares that the Liberal party gave all the employments under the Crown to the Catholics.

"The declaration of Mr. McDonald states that those incendiary appeals were coupled with other appeals to the Conservatives calling upon them to select Mr. George E. Foster, as the Conservative candidate in Queen's and Sunbury; and, as a conclusion, Mr. Hetherington, in closing his speech, exhibited a schedule of agreement or promise binding the signing parties to select Mr. Foster as their candidate, who engaged to carry out the programme of Messieurs Tilley and Hetherington.

"The declaration of Frank E. Clark and Amos B. Curry contain a recital of the same facts, with the additional mention that Mr. Hetherington declared: 'It is time to raise a religious cry.'"

I am informed that during the election campaign of 1896, at a public meeting held in Renfrew, Ontario, Mr. Foster pronounced the following: "Would it not be a disgrace and a shame for this fair Dominion of ours to have at the head of the Government a French Canadian and a Catholic at that?"

In the grouping of the foregoing citations, between the lines of which flows an irony that reaches farther than do the ordinary meaning of the words and the sarcasms, so apparently harmless, it is clear that the Province of Quebec, on account of the special character of its population, is very much detested by him; and I said nothing in my Article beyond that which Mr. Foster, himself, would seem to wish to have understood.

One of the points of my article that seemed to affect him the most is that which refers to hypocritical conduct. My only defence on that score will be the calling of attention of the House to the fact that I was merely echoing the expressions of a man who had been for several years his own colleague, for some months his leader, and who was better able and better situated than I ever was to study and appreciate his character—I mean Honourable Sir Mackenzie Bowell.

In requesting the House to pardon my lengthy intrusion upon its patience, I would beg of its members to consider, that as a young journalist, I could not refrain from a lively feeling of indignation in presence of the attacks, as violent as they were unjust, and of the accompanying insinuations regarding the motives—and I might add, the honesty—of his opponents, which I so often heard in regard to men whom the confidence of the people had placed at the head of the country's affairs. As a member of the Liberal party, I thought it my duty to sharply take up such utterances on the part of a public personage. Not having attacked, either in irony, or in sarcasm, or by insinuation the personal honour of Mr. Foster, I beg of the House to believe that I had no intention of being lacking in respect towards one of its members, and that I did not overstep the limits of journalistic privileges, nor the latitude assigned to the liberty of the press.

Moreover, and in fine, I repeat that I did not make any false report of Honourable Mr. Foster's utterances; I was merely penning an appreciation of a public man. My



Article was not a misrepresentation since it was not a report. It was a criticism of a general character, and the exactness of its colouring might be a proper subject for debate; but, elsewhere than here, under the present circumstances, I submit that I, in no way, abused the privileges of Parliament.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier moved, seconded by Mr. Paterson, That Mr. Cinq-Mars be discharged from present attendance at the Bar of this House—but that he remain prepared for being recalled if required.

And the Question being put on the Motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

Mr. Ross (Yale-Cariboo) moved, seconded by Mr. Beauparlant, and the Question being proposed, That this House do now proceed to the next Order of the Day.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier moved, in amendment, seconded by Mr. Paterson, That all the words after "That" to the end of the Question be left out, and the words "the passages in *La Presse* newspaper complained of, pass the bounds of reasonable criticism and constitute a breach of the privileges of this House; that Mr. Cinq-Mars, the writer of the Article, has incurred the censure of the House; That he be re-called to the Bar, and that Mr. Speaker do communicate this Resolution to him," inserted instead thereof;

And the Question being put on the amendment:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

Then the main Question, so amended, being put:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

On motion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, seconded by Mr. Paterson,  
Ordered, That Mr. Cinq-Mars be re-called to the Bar of the House.

The Sergeant-at-Arms reported, That Mr. Cinq-Mars was in attendance at the Bar of the House.

Mr. SPEAKER.—Mr. Cinq-Mars, in respect to the matter as to which you have been summoned to appear before the Bar of this House, I have been instructed to communicate to you the following Resolution which has been passed by the House:—

That the passages in *La Presse* newspaper complained of, pass the bounds of reasonable criticism and constitute a breach of the privileges of this House; That Mr. Cinq-Mars, the writer of the Article, has incurred the censure of the House; That he be recalled to the Bar and Mr. Speaker do communicate this Resolution to him.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier moved, seconded by Mr. Paterson, That Mr. Cinq-Mars be discharged from further attendance;

And the Question being put on the Motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.  
Mr. Cinq-Mars then withdrew.

“Wagner, of Edmonton, by instructions of James A. Smart, the Deputy Minister of the Interior, and on the recommendation of Mr. Oliver, M.P., was appointed to act as interpreter at Edmonton, at \$30 per month, and notified of his appointment in December, 1898, and appears to have entered upon his duties 1st January, 1899;

“That on 26th July, 1900, said Wagner handed in his resignation, but was persuaded by Mr. Oliver, M.P., to retain his position, and did retain his position until dismissed by the Department of the Interior on 1st June, 1901;

“That at various times during his services at Edmonton and afterwards, said Wagner was accused of stealing moneys belonging to immigrants, of converting to his own use moneys received by him from immigrants for payment of homestead fees and for other purposes, was prosecuted both by private parties and by the Department of Justice, was several times tried for said offences, and was at least twice convicted and sentenced to imprisonment at hard labour at Fort Saskatchewan;

“That notwithstanding the above record, said Philip Wagner was on 1st July, 1905, appointed assistant immigration agent at Edmonton, at a salary of \$25 per month, and interpreter at a salary of \$75 per month, making a total salary of \$100 per month;

“That during the local election contest in Alberta, it was brought to the attention of the Minister of the Interior that said Wagner, though an employee of the Department of the Interior, was taking an active part in said election, but the said Philip Wagner is, notwithstanding such offences, still in the employ of the Department of the Interior;

“That subsequent to the said local election, and during the month of January, 1906, formal complaint was made by one W. A. Griesbach, an elector of the City of Edmonton, to the Minister of the Interior, supported by a number of affidavits of the electors of the Province of Alberta, complaining of the interference of the said Philip Wagner in the election in said Province lately concluded, and setting forth specific acts of the said Wagner while an employee of the Federal Government, at a salary of One hundred dollars per month;

“That no opportunity has hitherto been afforded to the said complainant to prove the said charges;

“That, in the opinion of this House, the said Philip Wagner should be forthwith dismissed, or, if he denies the truth of the said charges and allegations, an immediate investigation should be held into the matters aforesaid,” inserted instead thereof;

And the Question being put on the amendment; the House divided: and the names being called for, they were taken down, as follow:—

"(a) The Jones lot, by Alice E. Jones and Abram Jones, her husband, and Elizabeth Milner and Mrs. Matthewson, by deed dated the 15th day of September, 1904, being  $6\frac{3}{10}$  acres in extent, for the sum of \$3,050.

"(b) The Gibson lot, by Margaret Amelia Gibson, and Elizabeth Milner, by deed dated the 14th day of September, 1904, being 3.3 acres in extent, for the sum of \$925.

"(c) the Milner lot, by Jane Milner, by deed dated 6th May, 1905, having an area of  $3\frac{9}{100}$  acres, for the sum of \$1,000.

"(d) The Gibson fraction, by Margaret Amelia Gibson, by deed dated 6th May, 1905, having an area of  $\frac{35}{100}$  of an acre in extent, for the sum of \$100.

"That is to say, the said Matthew Lodge acquired through the said Robert W. Hewson, the entire 13·88 acres in question for the total sum of \$5,075.

"4. Thereafter, the said Matthew Lodge arranged to sell, and did sell, to the Government all the said lands (including the Tannery Lot) for the sum of \$18,880, of which amount the sum of \$5,000 represented the price of the said Tannery Lot; and the said lands were so conveyed to the Government by two deeds dated, respectively, 10th October, 1904, and 29th May, 1905.

"The Jones lot, the Gibson lot, the Milner lot and the Gibson fraction, comprising in all an area of 13·88 acres (which lots had been acquired by the said Lodge for the sum of \$5,075, and a further sum of \$300, paid by the said Lodge to the said Hewson for his services as agent in the said negotiation, making in all the sum of \$5,375) were shortly afterwards sold for the said Matthew Lodge to the Government for the sum of \$13,880, or at an advance of \$8,505.

"5. That the said Hewson could have secured for the Government the said lands at the same price at which he did secure the same by the said Matthew Lodge.

"That the action of the Government, in paying to a middleman the sum of \$8,505 more than was necessary in order to acquire the said property, was unjustifiable, and deserves the censure of this House," inserted instead thereof;

Mr. McKenzie, from the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization, presented to the House the Tenth Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have had under consideration Bill, annexed hereto, "An Act for the prevention of fraud in the Hay Trade," referred to this Committee by the House for report.

Discussion on the said Bill showed such diversities of conditions and views in regard to the Hay trade in Canada, that your Committee find that it is inexpedient to proceed further with this Bill in the current Session of Parliament.

Sir Frederick W. Borden, from the Select Committee appointed to consider Clauses 22 to 29, inclusive, of Bill to amend the Railway Act, 1903, presented to the House the Third Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have had under consideration Bill respecting Express Companies, referred to them on the 6th instant, and while fully approving of the principle thereof, they are of the opinion that the intention and object of the Bill could be more effectively and conveniently attained if its provisions were embodied in the Railway Act; they therefore recommend that the Bill be not proceeded with, but that the draft Clauses submitted herewith, be referred to the Committee of the Whole on Bill to amend the Railway Act, 1903, with a view of having the same inserted in the said last-mentioned Bill, so as to form part thereof.

Your Committee also submit herewith the minutes of their proceedings in connection with the said Bill respecting Express Companies.

DRAFT CLAUSES *re* EXPRESS COMPANIES.

*(Adopted by the Select Committee, 22nd June, 1906.)*

1. For the purpose of this section the expression "express toll" means any toll, rate or charge to be charged by the Company, or any person or corporation other than the Company, to any persons, for hire or otherwise, for or in connection with the collection, receiving, caring for or handling of any goods for the purpose of sending, carrying or transporting them by express, or for or in connection with the sending, carrying, transporting or delivery by express of any goods, or for any service incidental thereto, or for or in connection with any or either of these objects, where the whole or any portion of the carriage or transportation of such goods is by rail upon the railway of the company, and the expression "express toll" also means a toll or rate charge for transportation of goods partly by rail and partly by water, whether such water transportation be in vessels owned, chartered, or otherwise used by the Company.

2. All express tolls shall be subject to the approval of the Board.

3. Tariffs of such express tolls shall be filed with the Board and shall be in such form, size and style and give such information, particulars and details as the Board, from time to time, by regulation or by order in any particular case, prescribes.

4. No express toll shall be charged in respect of which there is default in such filing or which is disallowed by the Board; provided that any company, person or



corporation now or immediately previous to the passing of this Act, charging express tolls may without such filing or approval for a period of six months next after the passing of this Act, or for such further period as the Board allows, charge such express tolls as such company, person or corporation immediately previous to the passing of this Act, might lawfully have charged.

5. The Board may disallow any express tariff or any portion thereof which it considers unjust or unreasonable and shall have and may exercise all the powers with respect to express tolls and such tariffs as it has or may exercise under the Railway Act, 1903, with respect to freight tolls and freight tariffs, and all the provisions of the said Railway Act, 1903, applicable to freight tolls and freight tariffs, in so far as such provisions are applicable and not inconsistent with the provisions of this Section, shall apply to express tolls and tariffs.

6. No Company shall carry or transport any goods by express, unless and until the tariff of express tolls therefor or in connection therewith has been submitted to and filed with the Board in the manner hereinbefore provided, or in the case of competitive tariffs filed in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Board made in relation thereto, nor in any case where such express toll in any tariff has been disallowed by the Board, and every company which carries or transports and every officer or employee thereof, who directs or knowingly permits to be carried or transported any goods by express contrary to the provisions of this sub-section, shall be liable to a penalty, not exceeding one hundred dollars, for such violation.

7. The Board may by regulation or in any particular case, prescribe what is carriage or transportation of goods by express, or whether goods are carried or transported by express within the meaning of this section and the Railway Act, 1903.

The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into a Committee to consider certain proposed Resolutions respecting the granting of certain Railway Subsidies.

*(In the Committee.)*

1. Resolved, That it is expedient to authorize the Governor in Council to grant a subsidy of \$3,200 per mile towards the construction of each of the undermentioned lines of railway (not exceeding in any one case the number of miles hereinafter respectively stated) which shall not cost more on the average than \$15,000 per mile for the mileage subsidized, and towards the construction of each of the said lines of railway, not exceeding the mileage hereinafter stated, which shall cost more on the average than \$15,000 per mile for the mileage subsidized, a further subsidy beyond the sum of \$3,200 per mile of fifty per cent on so much of the average cost of the mileage subsidized as is in excess of \$15,000 per mile, such subsidy not exceeding in the whole the sum of \$6,400 per mile:—

(1) To the Manitoulin and North Shore Railway Company (or to the Canada Central Railway Company, with the consent of the Manitoulin and North Shore Railway Company, and subject to the approval of the Governor in Council), for the following lines of Railway:—

(a) From Little Current thence crossing the Canadian Pacific Railway, at or near Stanley, and thence to Sudbury, not exceeding 64 miles.

(b) From a point on the said line of railway, between Little Current and Sudbury, westerly towards the Algoma Central and Hudson Bay Railway, not exceeding 100 miles; and

(c) From a point at or near Sudbury, northerly, not exceeding 30 miles; the said subsidies being granted in lieu of the subsidies of 64 and 130 miles, granted by Chapter 8 of 1900, Section 2, item 6, as amended by Section 5 of Chapter 7 of 1901, and Chapter 7 of 1901, Section 2, item 14, respectively.

(2) To the Algoma Central and Hudson Bay Railway Company for a line of railway from Sault Ste. Marie to a point on the Canadian Pacific Railway, between White River and Dalton stations, in the District of Algoma, not exceeding 200 miles, and for a line of Railway from Michipicoten Harbour, Lake Superior, towards the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, not exceeding 25 miles; in lieu of the subsidies of 40, 50 and 135 miles, granted by Chapter 7 of 1899, Section 2, item 23, Chapter 8 of 1900, Section 2, item 4, and Chapter 7 of 1901, Section 2, item 20, respectively.

(3) To the Lotbinière and Mégantic Railway Company to extend its railway southerly from a point at or near Lyster, in Mégantic County, to or towards a point at or near Lime Ridge in the Township of Dudswell; in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 8, not exceeding 50 miles.

(4) For a line of railway from Lake Nominigüe to La Lièvre, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 44, not exceeding 35 miles.

(5) For a line of railway from a point on the Intercolonial Railway, at or near Dartmouth, in the County of Halifax, to Guysborough, in the County of Guysborough, with branch lines to a point on the Intercolonial Railway, at or near New Glasgow, in the County of Pictou, and also; to Country Harbour, in the County of Guysborough, not exceeding in the whole 236 miles, in lieu of the subsidies of 116 and 120 miles granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, items 19 and 63, respectively.

(6) For a line of railway from Wellington to Union Bay, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 63, not exceeding 55 miles.

(7) For a line of railway from a point at or near Sharbot Lake or Bathurst Station, in the Province of Ontario, or between those points, via Lanark Village to Carleton Place, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 7 of 1901, Section 2, item 17, not exceeding 41 miles.

(8) For a line of railway from Cape Tourmente towards Murray Bay, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 5 of 1892, not exceeding 20 miles.

(9) To the Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railway Company for a line of railway from Gaspé to a point at or near Causapséal, on the Intercolonial Railway, and from that point to Edmundston, not exceeding 260 miles; and for a line of railway from Paspébiac to Gaspé, as near the shore as practicable, not exceeding 102 miles; in lieu of the subsidies granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 51.

(10) To the Nipigon Railway Company, for the following lines of railway:—

(a) From a point at or near Nipigon Station, on the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, to Nipigon Lake, not exceeding 30 miles.

(b) From a point on Nipigon Bay of Lake Superior to a point on the west of Lake Helen on the line of the Nipigon Railway, not exceeding  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

(c) From a point on the line of the Nipigon Railway, at or near the crossing of the Fraser River, to a point on Lake Jesse, by way of Cameron's Falls, not exceeding  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

(d) From a point on the North shore of Lake Nipigon, northerly, not exceeding 45 miles;

The said subsidies to the said lines being granted in lieu of the subsidies granted by Chapter 34 of 1904, Section 2, item 3, not exceeding in the whole 80 miles.

(11) For a line of railway from Quebec towards Seven Islands, including branches to Murray Bay and Baie St. Paul, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 48, not exceeding 200 miles.

(12) For a line of railway from Roberval, westward, towards James' Bay, in lieu of the subsidies granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, items 11 and 52, not exceeding 100 miles.

(13) To the Quebec Central Railway Company for an extension of its line of railway from St. Francis to St. George, not exceeding 9 miles; and for a line of railway from Scott Junction to the Quebec Bridge, not exceeding 23 miles; in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 46.

(14) To the Western Alberta Railway Company for a line of railway from a point on the United States Boundary, west of range 21, northwesterly, towards Anthracite, in the Province of Alberta, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 34 of 1904, Section 2, item 11, not exceeding 50 miles.

(15) To the Shediac and Coast Railway Company for a line of railway from Shediac to Shemogue and towards Cape Tormentine, in the County of Westmoreland, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 17, not exceeding 38 miles.

(16) For a line of railway from St. Constant in the County of Laprairie and Napierville, through St. Edouard, St. Cyprien and Lacolle, to a point at or near the International boundary line, on the Delaware and Hudson Railway (Grand Trunk), in lieu of the 19 and 12 miles subsidies granted by Chapter 7 of 1899, Section 2, item 10, and Chapter 4 of 1894, respectively, not exceeding 28 miles.

(17) To the Lake Superior, Long Lake and Albany Railway Company for a line of railway from Peninsula Harbour, in a northerly direction, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 76, not exceeding 10 miles.

(18) For a line of railway from Owen Sound in the Province of Ontario to Meaford, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 34, not exceeding 30 miles.

(19) To the Kingston, Smith's Falls and Ottawa Railway Company for a line of railway from Kingston to Ottawa, being a revote of the subsidy granted by Chapter 4 of 1897, not exceeding 101 miles.

(20) To the Lotbinière and Mégantic Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point on its line between Lyster and Lime Ridge, to a point at or near the Bridge over the St. Lawrence, at or near Quebec, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 45, not exceeding 30 miles.



(21) For a line of railway from a point on the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway, near the River Jeannotte to La Tuque, on the St. Maurice River, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 57, not exceeding 35 miles.

(22) To the Halifax and South Western Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point at or near Halifax, to a point at or near Barrington Passage, (except that part east of Bridgewater which formerly formed part of the line of the Central Railway), in lieu of the 68, 77 and 35 miles of subsidies granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 23 (a) and (b), and item 75, respectively, not exceeding 135 miles.

(23) To the Bay of Quinté Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point at or near the Village of Tweed, thence northwesterly, to a point at or near the Village of Bannockburn, in the County of Hastings, being a revote in part of the subsidy granted by Chapter 7 of 1899, Section 2, item 45, and in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 37, not exceeding in all 20 miles.

(24) For a line of railway from a point at or near Baptiste, easterly to a point at or near Renfrew, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 32, not exceeding 75 miles.

(25) For a line of railway from the Station of Lac Bouchette, or from a point about one mile east of the said station, on the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway, to St. André, in lieu of subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 47, not exceeding 13 miles.

(26) For a line of railway from Debert Station, on the Intercolonial Railway, to Debert Coal Mine, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 20, not exceeding  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

(27) For a line of railway from a point at or near Toulon, to a point on the Icelandic River, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 27, not exceeding 35 miles.

(28) To the Ontario, Northern and Temagami Railway Company (formerly the Temagami Railway Company), for a line of railway from a point at or near Sturgeon Falls, in a northwesterly direction, to a point on the westerly shore of Lake Temagami, in the District of Nipissing, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 36, not exceeding 50 miles.

(29) To the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway Company, for a line of railway from Roberval to the Government wharf at Lake St. John, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 40, not exceeding one mile.

(30) For a line of railway from Truro, northerly, towards Brule, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 64, not exceeding 34 miles.

(31) To the Kootenay Central Railway Company, for a line of railway from Golden towards the International Boundary line, via Windermere and Fort Steele, and crossing the Crow's Nest Railway at or near Elko, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 66, not exceeding 186 miles.

(32) To the Brockville, Westport and Sault Ste. Marie Railway Company, the balance remaining unpaid of the subsidy granted by Chapter 3 of 1889, not exceeding \$3,200 per mile, and also, the balance remaining unpaid of the subsidy granted by Chapter 2 of 1890, which was re-granted by Chapter 5 of 1892; the whole not exceeding \$86,800, being a revote of the subsidy granted by Chapter 4 of 1894; and that the said subsidy or so much thereof as has heretofore been agreed upon by the terms of an agreement filed in the Department of Railways and Canals between said Brockville, Westport and Sault Ste. Marie Railway Company and the creditors of said Railway Company, be paid over to the said creditors or the legal representatives of said creditors as mentioned in said agreement.

(33) For a line of railway from Jonquières to La Baie des Ha Ha, in lieu of subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 7, not exceeding 20 miles.

(34) For a line of railway from St. Rose, via the east side of Lake Ainslie, to or towards Orangedale on the Intercolonial Railway, not exceeding 34 miles; and for a



line of railway from a point on the Intercolonial Railway, at or near Mines Road Station, to the wharf at Caribou Cove, not exceeding four miles; in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, items 18 and 62.

(35) For a line of railway from a point at or near Wolfville, on the Dominion Atlantic Railway to the Government Pier, at the Basin of Mines, not exceeding one mile, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 25.

(36) To the Great Northern Railway of Canada for a line of railway in extension of its railway, from a point at or near Arundel to a point in the municipality of the United Townships of Preston and Hartwell, not exceeding 30 miles; and for a line of railway connecting its Montford and Gatineau line with the main line at St. Jerome, not exceeding 22 miles; in lieu of the subsidies granted to the Montford and Gatineau Colonization Railway Company by items 6 and 41 of Section 2, of Chapter 57 of 1903.

(37) To the Great Northern Railway of Canada, for a line of railway from, at or near Garneau Junction, to or towards the Quebec Bridge, not exceeding 70 miles, in lieu of the subsidy granted by item 74, of Section 2, of Chapter 57 of 1903.

(38) For a line of railway from a point at or near Ste. Agathe des Monts Station, towards the Township of Howard, in the County of Argenteuil, passing near Lakes St. Joseph and Ste. Marie, in a southerly direction, not exceeding 15 miles; and for a line of railway between a point in the parish of St. Andrews, in the County of Argenteuil, and a point in the parish of St. Laurent, in the County of Jacques Cartier, passing through the parishes of St. Placide, St. Eustache and St. Martin, not exceeding 38 miles, in lieu of the subsidies granted by Chapter 34 of 1904, items 8 and 9 of Section 2, not exceeding in the whole 53 miles.

(39) To the Kettle River Valley Railway Company, for a line of railway, from Grand Forks, to a point 50 miles up the North Fork of Kettle River, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 67, not exceeding 50 miles.

(40) To the Ottawa Northern and Western Railway for a line of railway from Aylmer to a point of junction with the Interprovincial Bridge approach, in the City of Hull (except that portion thereof beginning at a point of junction with the line of the Hull Electric Railway, in the City of Hull, and terminating at a point on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, at the east end of its Hull Station yard) not exceeding nine miles, in lieu of the subsidy granted by item 12, of Section 2, of Chapter 7 of 1899, and by the first portion of item 13, of Section 2, of Chapter 57 of 1903.

(41) To the Toronto, Lindsay and Pembroke Railway Company, for a line of railway from Golden Lake to Bancroft, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 3, not exceeding 51 miles.

(42) To the Interprovincial and James' Bay Railway Company, for a line of railway from the Lake Temiskaming, at the present terminus of the Canadian Pacific Railway, in a northerly direction, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 42, not exceeding 50 miles.

(43) For a line of railway from Waltham Station to Ferguson Point, in the County of Pontiac, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 43, not exceeding 20 miles.

(44) To the Matane and Gaspé Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point at or near St. Octave, on the Intercolonial Railway, to Matane, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 54, not exceeding 30 miles.

(45) For a line of railway from the Village of Haliburton, via the Village of Whitney, towards the Town of Mattawa, Ontario, in lieu of the subsidies granted by Chapter 7 of 1899, Section 2, item 25, and Chapter 8 of 1900, Section 2, item 9, not exceeding 60 miles.

(46) For a line of railway from Dawson to Stewart River, passing at or near Grand Forks, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 71, not exceeding 84 miles.

2. Resolved, That unless the context otherwise requires, the expression "cost" means the actual, necessary and reasonable cost, and shall include the amount expended upon any bridge up to and not exceeding \$25,000, forming part of the line of railway subsidized not otherwise receiving any bonus, but shall not include the cost of equipping the railway, nor the cost of terminals, nor the cost of right of way of the railway in any city or incorporated town; and such actual, necessary and reasonable cost shall be determined by the Governor in Council, upon the recommendation of the Minister of Railways and Canals, and, upon the report of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals, certifying that he has made, or caused to be made, an inspection of the line of railway for which payment of subsidy is asked, and careful enquiry into the cost thereof, and that, in his opinion, the amount upon which the subsidy is claimed is reasonable, and does not exceed the true, actual and proper cost of the construction of such railway.

3. Resolved, That the subsidies to be authorized towards the construction of any railway shall be payable out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada, and may, unless otherwise expressly provided herein, at the option of the Governor in Council, on the report of the Minister of Railways and Canals, be paid as follows:—

(a) upon the completion of the work subsidized; or

(b) by instalments, on the completion of each ten-mile section of the railway, in the proportion which the cost of such completed section bears to that of the whole work undertaken; or

(c) upon the progress estimates on the certificate of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals, that, in his opinion, having regard to the whole work undertaken and the aid granted, the progress made justifies the payment of a sum not less than thirty thousand dollars; or

(d) with respect to (b) and (c), part one way, part the other.

4. Resolved, That the subsidies to be authorized to be granted to companies named shall, if granted by the Governor in Council, be granted to such companies, respectively; the other subsidies may be granted to such companies as establish to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council their ability to construct and complete the said railways, respectively; all the lines for the construction of which subsidies are granted, unless they are already commenced, shall be commenced within two years from the first day of August, 1906, and completed within a reasonable time, not to exceed four years from the said first day of August, to be fixed by the Governor in Council, and shall also be constructed according to descriptions, conditions and specifications approved by the Governor in Council on the report of the Minister of Railways and Canals, and specified in each case in a contract between the company and the said Minister, which contract the Minister, with the approval of the Governor in Council, is hereby empowered to make. The location also of such subsidized lines shall be subject to the approval of the Governor in Council.

5. Resolved, That the granting of such subsidies, and the receipt thereof by the respective companies, shall be subject to the condition that the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada may at all times provide and secure to other companies such running powers, traffic arrangements and other rights, as will afford to all railways connecting with the railways so subsidised, reasonable and proper facilities in exercising such running powers, fair and reasonable traffic arrangements with connecting companies, and equal mileage rates between all such connecting railways; and the said Board shall have absolute control, at all times, over the rates and tolls to be levied and taken by any of the companies, or upon any of the railways so subsidized: Provided always that any decision of the said Board made under this Section may be at any time varied, changed, or rescinded by the Governor in Council as he deems just and proper.

6. Resolved, That every company so receiving a subsidy, its successors and assigns, and any person or company controlling or operating the railway or portion of railway so



subsidized, shall each year furnish to the Government of Canada, transportation for men, supplies, materials and mails, over the portion of the lines in respect of which it has received such subsidy, and, whenever required, shall furnish mail cars properly equipped for such mail service; and such transportation and service shall be performed at such rates as are agreed upon between the Minister of the Department of the Government for which such service is being performed, and the company performing it, and, in case of disagreement, then at such rates as are approved by the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada; and in or towards payment for such charges the Government of Canada shall be credited by the company with a sum equal to three per cent per annum on the amount of the subsidy so received by the company.

7. Resolved, That as respects all railways for which subsidies are granted, the company at any time owning or operating any of the railways shall, when required, produce and exhibit to the Minister of Railways and Canals, or any person appointed by him, all books, accounts and vouchers, showing the cost of constructing the railway or bridge, the cost of operating it, and the earnings thereof.

8. Resolved, That the Governor in Council may make it a condition of the grant of the subsidies herein provided, that the company shall lay its road with new steel rails, made in Canada, if they are procurable in Canada of suitable quality, upon terms as favourable as other rails can be obtained, of which the Minister of Railways and Canals shall be the judge.

9. Resolved, That whenever a contract has been duly entered into with a company for the construction of any line of railway so subsidized, the Minister of Railways and Canals, at the request of the company, and upon the report of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals, and his certificate that he has made careful examination of the surveys, plans and profile of the whole line so contracted for, and has duly considered the physical characteristics of the country to be traversed and the means of transport available for construction, naming the reasonable and probable cost of construction, may, with the authorization of the Governor in Council, enter into a supplementary agreement, fixing definitely the maximum amount of the subsidy to be paid, based upon the said certificate of the Chief Engineer, and providing that the company shall be entitled to be paid, as the minimum, the ordinary subsidy of \$3,200 per mile, together with sixty per cent of the difference between the amount so fixed and the said \$3,200 per mile, if any; and the balance, forty per cent, shall be paid only on completion of the whole work subsidized, and in so far as the actual cost, as finally determined by the Governor in Council upon the recommendation of the Minister of Railways and Canals and upon the report and certificate of the said Chief Engineer, entitles the company thereto; Provided always:—

(a) that the estimated cost, as certified, is not less on the average than \$18,000 per mile for the whole mileage subsidized;

(b) that no payment shall be made except upon a certificate of the Chief Engineer that the work done is up to the standard specified in the company's contract;

(c) that in no case shall the subsidy exceed the sum of \$6,400 per mile.

Resolutions to be reported.

(4) For a line of railway, from Lake Nominigue to La Lièvre, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 44, not exceeding 35 miles.

(5) For a line of railway, from a point on the Intercolonial Railway, at or near Dartmouth, in the County of Halifax, to Guysborough, in the County of Guysborough, with branch lines to a point on the Intercolonial Railway, at or near New Glasgow, in the County of Pictou, and also, to Country Harbour, in the County of Guysborough, not exceeding in the whole 236 miles, in lieu of the subsidies of 116 and 120 miles granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, items 19 and 63, respectively.

(6) For a line of railway, from Wellington to Union Bay, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 68, not exceeding 55 miles.

(7) For a line of railway, from a point at or near Sharbot Lake or Bathurst Station, in the Province of Ontario, or between those points, via Lanark Village to Carleton Place, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 7 of 1901, Section 2, item 17, not exceeding 41 miles.

(8) For a line of railway, from Cape Tourmente, towards Murray Bay, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 5 of 1892, not exceeding 20 miles.

(9) To the Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railway Company, for a line of railway from Gaspé to a point at or near Causapsca, on the Intercolonial Railway, and from that point to Edmundston, not exceeding 260 miles; and for a line of railway, from Paspébiac to Gaspé, as near the shore as practicable, not exceeding 102 miles; in lieu of the subsidies granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 51.

(10) To the Nipigon Railway Company, for the following lines of railway:—

(a) From a point at or near Nipigon Station, on the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, to Nipigon Lake, not exceeding 30 miles.

(b) From a point on Nipigon Bay of Lake Superior to a point on the west of Lake Helen, on the line of the Nipigon Railway, not exceeding  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

(c) From a point on the line of the Nipigon Railway, at or near the crossing of the Fraser River, to a point on Lake Jesse, by way of Cameron's Falls, not exceeding  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

(d) From a point on the North shore of Lake Nipigon northerly, not exceeding 45 miles;

The said subsidies to the said lines being granted in lieu of the subsidies granted by Chapter 34 of 1904, Section 2, item 3, not exceeding in the whole 80 miles.

(11) For a line of railway, from Quebec towards Seven Islands, including branches to Murray Bay and Baie St. Paul, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 48, not exceeding 200 miles.

(12) For a line of railway, from Roberval, westward, towards James' Bay, in lieu of the subsidies granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, items 11 and 52, not exceeding 100 miles.

(13) To the Quebec Central Railway Company, for an extension of its line of railway from St. Francis to St. George, not exceeding 9 miles; and for a line of railway, from Scott Junction to the Quebec Bridge, not exceeding 23 miles; in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 46.

(14) To the Western Alberta Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point on the United States Boundary, west of range 21, northwesterly, towards Anthracite, in the Province of Alberta, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 34 of 1904, Section 2, item 11, not exceeding 50 miles.

(15) To the Shediac and Coast Railway Company, for a line of railway from Shediac to Shemogue and towards Cape Tormentine, in the County of Westmoreland, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 17, not exceeding 38 miles.

(16) For a line of railway, from St. Constant, in the County of Laprairie and Napierville, through St. Edouard, St. Cyprien and Lacolle, to a point at or near the International boundary line, on the Delaware and Hudson Railway (Grand Trunk), in lieu of the 19 and 12 miles subsidies granted by Chapter 7 of 1899, Section 2, item 10, and Chapter 4 of 1894, respectively, not exceeding 28 miles.

(17) To the Lake Superior, Long Lake and Albany Railway Company, for a line of railway from Peninsula Harbour, in a northerly direction, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 76, not exceeding 10 miles.

(18) For a line of railway from Owen Sound, in the Province of Ontario, to Meaford, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 34, not exceeding 30 miles.

(19) To the Kingston, Smith's Falls and Ottawa Railway Company, for a line of railway from Kingston to Ottawa, being a revote of the subsidy granted by Chapter 4 of 1897, not exceeding 101 miles.

(20) To the Lotbinière and Mégantic Railway Company, for a line of railway from a point on its line between Lyster and Lime Ridge, to a point at or near the Bridge over the St. Lawrence at or near Quebec, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 45, not exceeding 30 miles.

(21) For a line of railway from a point on the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway, near the River Jeannotte, to La Tuque, on the St. Maurice River, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 57, not exceeding 35 miles.

(22) To the Halifax and South Western Railway Company, for a line of railway, from a point at or near Halifax, to a point at or near Barrington Passage, (except that part east of Bridgewater which formerly formed part of the line of the Central Railway), in lieu of the 68, 77 and 35 miles of subsidies granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 23 (a) and (b), and item 75, respectively, not exceeding 185 miles.



(23) To the Bay of Quinté Railway Company, for a line of railway, from a point at or near the Village of Tweed, thence northwesterly, to a point at or near the Village of Bannockburn, in the County of Hastings, being a revote in part of the subsidy granted by Chapter 7 of 1899, Section 2, item 45, and in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 37, not exceeding in all 20 miles.

(24) For a line of railway, from a point at or near Baptiste, easterly, to a point at or near Renfrew, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 32, not exceeding 75 miles.

(25) For a line of railway, from the Station of Lac Bouchette, or from a point about one mile east of the said station, on the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway, to St. André, in lieu of subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 47, not exceeding 13 miles.

(26) For a line of railway, from Debert Station, on the Intercolonial Railway, to Debert Coal Mine, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 20, not exceeding  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

(27) For a line of railway, from a point at or near Toulon, to a point on the Icelandic River, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 27, not exceeding 35 miles.

(28) To the Ontario, Northern and Temagami Railway Company (formerly the Temagami Railway Company), for a line of railway from a point at or near Sturgeon Falls, in a northwesterly direction, to a point on the westerly shore of Lake Temagami, in the District of Nipissing, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 36, not exceeding 50 miles.

(29) To the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway Company, for a line of railway from Roberval to the Government wharf at Lake St. John, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 40, not exceeding one mile.

(30) For a line of railway from Truro northerly towards Brule, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 64, not exceeding 34 miles.

(31) To the Kootenay Central Railway Company, for a line of railway from Golden towards the International Boundary line, via Windermere and Fort Steele, and crossing the Crow's Nest Railway at or near Elko, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 66, not exceeding 186 miles.

(32) To the Brockville, Westport and Sault Ste. Marie Railway Company, the balance remaining unpaid of the subsidy granted by Chapter 3 of 1889, not exceeding \$3,200 per mile, and also, the balance remaining unpaid of the subsidy granted by Chapter 2 of 1890, which was re-granted by Chapter 5 of 1892; the whole not exceeding \$86,800, being a revote of the subsidy granted by Chapter 4 of 1894; and that the said subsidy, or so much thereof as has heretofore been agreed upon by the terms of an agreement filed in the Department of Railways and Canals, between said Brockville, Westport and Sault Ste. Marie Railway Company and the creditors of said Railway Company, be paid over to the said creditors or the legal representatives of said creditors, as mentioned in said agreement.

(33) For a line of railway from Jonquières to La Baie des Ha Ha, in lieu of subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 7, not exceeding 20 miles.

(34) For a line of railway from St. Rose, via the east side of Lake Ainslie, to or towards Orangedale, on the Intercolonial Railway, not exceeding 34 miles; and for a line of railway from a point on the Intercolonial Railway, at or near Mines Road Station, to the wharf at Caribou Cove, not exceeding four miles; in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, items 18 and 62.

(35) For a line of railway from a point at or near Wolfville, on the Dominion Atlantic Railway, to the Government Pier at the Basin of Minas, not exceeding one mile, in lieu of the subsidy granted by Chapter 57 of 1903, Section 2, item 25.

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2. Resolved, That unless the context otherwise requires, the expression "cost" means the actual, necessary and reasonable cost, and shall include the amount expended upon any bridge up to and not exceeding \$25,000, forming part of the line of railway subsidized not otherwise receiving any bonus, but shall not include the cost of equipping the railway, nor the cost of terminals, nor the cost of right of way of the railway in any city or incorporated town; and such actual, necessary and reasonable cost shall be determined by the Governor in Council, upon the recommendation of the Minister of Railways and Canals, and upon the report of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals, certifying that he has made, or caused to be made,

an inspection of the line of railway for which payment of subsidy is asked, and careful enquiry into the cost thereof, and that, in his opinion, the amount upon which the subsidy is claimed is reasonable, and does not exceed the true, actual and proper cost of the construction of such railway.

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(a) upon the completion of the work subsidized; or

(b) by instalments, on the completion of each ten-mile section of the railway, in the proportion which the cost of such completed section bears to that of the whole work undertaken; or

(c) upon the progress estimates, on the certificate of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals, that, in his opinion, having regard to the whole work undertaken and the aid granted, the progress made justifies the payment of a sum not less than Thirty thousand dollars; or

(d) with respect to (b) and (c), part one way, part the other.

4. Resolved, That the subsidies to be authorized to be granted to companies named shall, if granted by the Governor in Council, be granted to such companies, respectively; the other subsidies may be granted to such companies as establish to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council their ability to construct and complete the said railways, respectively; all the lines for the construction of which subsidies are granted, unless they are already commenced, shall be commenced within two years from the First day of August, 1906, and completed within a reasonable time, not to exceed four years from the said First day of August, to be fixed by the Governor in Council, and shall also be constructed according to descriptions, conditions and specifications approved by the Governor in Council, on the report of the Minister of Railways and Canals, and specified in each case in a contract between the company and the said Minister, which contract the Minister, with the approval of the Governor in Council, is hereby empowered to make. The location also of such subsidized lines shall be subject to the approval of the Governor in Council.

5. Resolved, That the granting of such subsidies, and the receipt thereof by the respective companies, shall be subject to the condition that the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada may at all times provide and secure to other companies such running powers, traffic arrangements and other rights, as will afford to all railways connecting with the railways so subsidized, reasonable and proper facilities in exercising such running powers, fair and reasonable traffic arrangements with connecting companies, and equal mileage rates between all such connecting railways; and the said Board shall have absolute control, at all times, over the rates and tolls to be levied and taken by any of the companies, or upon any of the railways so subsidized: Provided always that any decision of the said Board, made under this Section, may be at any time varied, changed, or rescinded by the Governor in Council as he deems just and proper.

6. Resolved, That every company so receiving a subsidy, its successors and assigns, and any person or company controlling or operating the railway or portion of railway so subsidized, shall each year, furnish to the Government of Canada, transportation for men, supplies, materials and mails, over the portion of the lines in respect of which it has received such subsidy, and, whenever required, shall furnish mail cars properly equipped for such mail service; and such transportation and service shall be performed at such rates as are agreed upon between the Minister of the Department of the Government for which such service is being performed, and the company performing it, and, in case of disagreement, then at such rates as are approved by the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada; and in or towards payment for such charges the Government of Canada shall be credited by the company with a sum equal to three per cent per annum on the amount of the subsidy so received by the company.



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8. Resolved, That the Governor in Council may make it a condition of the grant of the subsidies herein provided, that the company shall lay its road with new steel rails, made in Canada, if they are procurable in Canada of suitable quality, upon terms as favourable as other rails can be obtained, of which the Minister of Railways and Canals shall be the judge.

9. Resolved, That whenever a contract has been duly entered into with a company for the construction of any line of railway so subsidized, the Minister of Railways and Canals, at the request of the company, and upon the report of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals, and his certificate that he has made careful examination of the surveys, plans and profile of the whole line so contracted for, and has duly considered the physical characteristics of the country to be traversed and the means of transport available for construction, naming the reasonable and probable cost of construction, may, with the authorization of the Governor in Council, enter into a supplementary agreement, fixing definitely the maximum amount of the subsidy to be paid, based upon the said certificate of the Chief Engineer, and providing that the company shall be entitled to be paid, as the minimum, the ordinary subsidy of \$3,200 per mile, together with sixty per cent of the difference between the amount so fixed and the said \$3,200 per mile, if any; and the balance, forty per cent, shall be paid only on completion of the whole work subsidized, and in so far as the actual cost, as finally determined by the Governor in Council, upon the recommendation of the Minister of Railways and Canals, and upon the report and certificate of the said Chief Engineer, entitles the company thereto; Provided always:—

(a) that the estimated cost, as certified, is not less on the average than \$18,000 per mile for the whole mileage subsidized;

(b) that no payment shall be made except upon a certificate of the Chief Engineer that the work done is up to the standard specified in the company's contract;

(c) that in no case shall the subsidy exceed the sum of \$6,400 per mile.

The said Resolutions, being read a second time, were agreed to.

Ordered, That Mr. Emmerson have leave to bring in a Bill to authorize the granting of subsidies in aid of the construction of the lines of railway therein mentioned.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time at the next sitting of the House.

The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into a Committee on the Bill to amend the Railway Act, 1903.

And The House, having continued to sit in Committee till after Twelve of the Clock on Wednesday morning;

*Wednesday, 27th June, 1906.*

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Marcil (Bonaventure) reported, That the Committee had made further progress, and directed him to move for leave to sit again.

Resolved, That this House will, at its next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee.



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Mr. Speaker acquainted the House, That a Message had been brought from the Senate by their Clerk, as followeth:—

The Senate have passed the Bill, intituled: "An Act respecting Penitentiaries," with several Amendments, to which they desire the concurrence of this House.

And then The House, having continued to sit till eight minutes after One of the Clock on Wednesday morning, adjourned till Eleven of the Clock, A.M., this day.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Maclean (Lunenburg), from the Select Committee appointed to investigate certain charges and expenditures made in connection with the Dominion Government steamer *Arctic*, presented to the House the Second Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

The Select Committee appointed to investigate certain charges and expenditures made in connection with the Dominion Government steamer *Arctic*, has the honour to report that your Committee has enquired fully into the said charges and expenditures, has heard the evidence of all the witnesses produced before your Committee, and has examined all papers, documents and exhibits produced, as appeared by the evidence, exhibits and reports of proceedings herewith submitted.

Your Committee beg leave to present the following as the result of its enquiry and as its second and final report:—

(1) That in the year 1904 the Dominion Government steamer *Arctic* was provisioned and outfitted for 40 men for 1,200 days for a voyage to explore and patrol Hudson's Bay, and the islands and waters north thereof, and to enforce and administer the laws of Canada therein.

(2) That in view of the contemplated expedition of over three years, and of the hardships and contingencies naturally attendant upon such a voyage, and the impossibility of replenishing stores, the quantity and variety of stores, merchandise, supplies and provisions were reasonable and necessary, and were of the best quality.

(3) That all the stores, merchandise, supplies and provisions purchased by the Department of Marine and Fisheries for the said steamer and for the purpose of the said expedition into said waters, were placed on board, and that the said steamer was capable of carrying, holding and accommodating, and did carry, hold, and accommodate all the said stores, merchandise, supplies and provisions, in addition to and exclusive of, any stores carried for and on account of, the Northwest Mounted Police service.

(4) No part or portion of the said stores, merchandise, supplies and provisions were, in whole or in part, improperly diverted for uses other than originally contemplated, by, or for the profit of, any person or persons.

(5) That fair and reasonable prices were paid for the said stores, merchandise, supplies and provisions, with the exception of a quantity of tobacco purchased in Quebec, the particulars of which are as follows:—

805 lbs. smoking tobacco at .. . . . .	95 cents.
200 lbs. chewing tobacco at .. . . . .	78 "

In addition to the prices charged and paid for said 1,005 pounds of tobacco, as above stated, the vendors charged the Department of Marine and Fisheries with the excise tax thereon of 39 cents per pound, amounting to \$391.95. The amount paid for said two quantities of tobacco your Committee find to have been excessive.

(6) That no officers, agents or servants of the Department of Marine and Fisheries unjustly, unlawfully or corruptly profited, in connection with the purchase or disposition of any of the stores, merchandise, supplies and provisions purchased and placed on board the said steamer *Arctic*.

(7) That all stores, merchandise, supplies and provisions not consumed, during the progress of the expedition of the said steamer *Arctic*, as hereinbefore set forth, after making due allowance for depreciation in quantities by reason of natural and

unavoidable causes, are now in possession of, and under the control of the Department of Marine and Fisheries.

(8) That the sum of \$45.30 being the freight charges from Montreal to Quebec on a quantity of bovril and pemmican, purchased from the Bovril Company, Limited, of Montreal, was paid by the agent of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, resident at Quebec, to the Intercolonial Railway, and subsequently, by mistake and without knowledge of the prior payment, the same amount and charge was again paid to the Bovril Company (Limited), by the Marine and Fisheries Department, which amount during the progress of your Committee's investigation, was repaid to the Department of Marine and Fisheries by the said Bovril Company (Limited).

All of which is respectfully submitted, together with the Minutes of the Proceedings of your Committee, the Minutes of the Evidence and all the Exhibits. (*Appendix No. 5.*)

Mr. Miller, from the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, presented to the House the Seventh Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Mr. Maclean (Lunenburg), from the Select Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills, presented to the House the Eleventh Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

On motion of Mr. Derbyshire, seconded by Mr. Schell (Glengarry),

Ordered, That in accordance with the recommendation contained in the Eleventh Report of the Select Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills, the Bill from the Senate, intituled: "An Act for the relief of William Edward Ogden," be placed on the Order Paper this day among Private Bills, for consideration in Committee of the Whole House.

Mr. Gervais, from the Select Committee appointed to supervise the Official Report of the Debates of this House, during the present Session, presented to the House the Third Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

1. That the salary of \$2,000 per annum, at present paid to each member of the staff of Official Reporters of the Debates, be increased to \$2,500.
2. That the salary of \$1,200 per annum, now paid Mr. C. W. Boyce, Assistant to the Chief Reporter, be increased to \$1,500.
3. That the salary paid the Chief Translator, viz.: \$2,000 per annum, be increased to \$2,500, and that the salary paid to each member of the staff of Official Translators be increased from \$1,500 to \$2,000 per annum.
4. That the above-mentioned increases date from the commencement of the present Session.

Ordered, That Mr. Fielding have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the National Transcontinental Railway.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Oliver, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of this House, dated 17th July, 1905, for copies of all Correspondence, documents, and memorials, between the Government or any Member thereof, and the Reverend James Taylor, or any other person, on behalf of the retired servants of the Hudson's Bay Company, in reference to their claim to a portion of the estate of the late Lord Selkirk. (*Sessional Papers, No. 189a.*)

On motion of Mr. Fielding, seconded by Mr. Paterson,

Ordered, That the Bill from the Senate, intituled: "An Act respecting the Sale and Marking of Manufactures of Gold and Silver," be now read a second time.

The Bill was accordingly read a second time; and referred to the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce.

The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into a Committee on the Bill respecting the Lord's Day.

And the House continuing to sit in Committee;  
And it being Six o'Clock, P.M., Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and left it, to resume the same at half-past Seven o'Clock, P.M.

PRAYERS.

The following Petition was brought up, and laid on the Table:—

By Mr. Bourassa,—The Petition of Isaac Cowie and others, of Winnipeg and other places.

Mr. Wright (Renfrew), from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented to the House the Nineteenth Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have examined Bill from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to incorporate the Grand River and Western Power Company," and find that the requirements of the Rule have been fully complied with.

Mr. Maclean (Lunenburg) moved, seconded by Mr. Carvell, and the Question being proposed, That the Second and Final Report of the Special Committee appointed to enquire fully into all the circumstances connected with the purchase and disposal of supplies for the Government steamer *Arctic*, be concurred in.

Mr. Northrup moved, in amendment, seconded by Mr. Stockton, That all the words after "be" to the end of the Question be left out, and the words "referred back to the said Committee for further consideration, with instruction that they have power to report as follows:—

Your Committee, to whom were referred certain charges respecting the *Arctic* investigation, beg leave to report:—

Whereas, specific charges have been made by members of this House, from their seats, to the effect that the supplies which, in the summer of 1903, were purchased by the Department of Marine and Fisheries for the Government steamer *Arctic*, were not all put on board the said steamer, but were in part diverted for other uses by, and for the benefit of, persons still unknown; and whereas like charges have also been made that excessive prices have been corruptly paid for said supplies, and that, in connection therewith, pecuniary benefits were received by officials of the said Department:

A Special Committee be appointed to enquire fully into all the circumstances connected with the purchase of said supplies, the disposal of the same, and the different matters above mentioned, with power to send for persons, papers and receipts, and to examine witnesses on oath or affirmation, and that the said Committee do report in full the evidence taken before them and all other proceedings on the reference.

The only questions therefore referred to your Committee for investigation were:—

(a) All the circumstances connected with the purchase of the supplies for said expedition.

(b) The disposal of the same.

(c) Whether or not said supplies were all put on board the *Arctic*, or were in part, diverted for other uses by and for the benefit of persons unknown.

(d) Whether or not excessive prices were corruptly paid for said supplies, and that, in connection therewith, pecuniary benefits were received by officers of the Department of Marine and Fisheries.

(a) Your Committee find that, although about \$125,000 worth of supplies was purchased from various firms, some to very large amounts, namely, Hamilton & Co., \$5,048.09; Woods & Co. (Limited), \$6,437.20; Hudon & Orsali, \$12,931.13; the Bovril Company, \$19,780, no tenders were invited nor prices even asked for from any firm, nor

was there any limitations to price except that the favoured vendors were informed, by letter sending the order from the Department, that these supplies were to be furnished at the usual market prices, and this, although the vessel did not sail within two months of the sending of the said letter. Your Committee further find that, although it was intended and expected by the Department of Marine and Fisheries, and the commander of the *Arctic* was promised, that the *Neptune* or some other vessel would be sent to the relief of the *Arctic* each year, carrying coal and 50 tons of miscellaneous stores, that Captain Bernier was instructed to send in requisitions for provisions and clothing for three years. He having accordingly sent in his requisitions, which were based not on a trip to the Hudson's Bay, but to the North Pole, where there would be every danger of shipwreck with no hope of additional supplies, these requisitions were wantonly and extravagantly increased by the officials of the Department, in utter disregard of the requirements of the contemplated expedition and the carrying capacity of the *Arctic*. Conclusive proof of this will be found on a comparison of the alleged copy of the original requisition, (which original, although asked for, was not produced with the ship's inventory), in the matter of liquors, wines, lime juice, tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, furs, clothing, and many other items.

Although many officials, including the Minister, Deputy Minister, Commander Spain, the agent of the Department at Quebec, Captain Bernier, and the doctor, seemed to be at liberty to purchase whatever was suggested, no one seems to have exercised any control or displayed any interest in the regulation of purchases or the determination of prices. The expenditures of over \$22,000 for clothing, of \$7,691.11 for an electric lighting plant, whose power was to be furnished by the engines (although it was expected that the *Arctic* would be icebound for eight or more months each year), of \$4,827.27 for medical supplies and appliances, of \$3,500 for tobacco, cigars, cigarettes and pipes, of about \$2,000 for wines and liquors (not including the liberal supply thereof in the medical stores), and the purchase of seventeen dozen packs of cards, amply justify this conclusion. The only consideration of the prices even pretended was by Mr. Semple, who was brought from Montreal to Ottawa to examine the provisions, and he was governed, according to his own evidence, by the two incontrovertible principles that one must assume that the invoice of a reputable friend was correct, and that a person would naturally expect higher prices from the Government than from an individual. Your Committee further find that so large a quantity of stores was purchased that it would be quite impossible to have carried them on the *Arctic*, had they been stowed, as is the practice on every ship on which the safety of the vessel and the lives of those on board are considered. This is established by the evidence of Major Moodie, Captain Bernier and others, that not only were the holds and the private cabins filled with goods, but that a large quantity of cold beef, pork, all the gasoline, and the stores for the Northwest Mounted Police were piled up on the upper deck as high as the bridge, making it almost impossible to climb from one end of the ship to the other; and it must not be forgotten that the *Arctic* was intended to be propelled by sail as well as by steam, and for which she was fitted.

(b) Your Committee regrets that the inaccurate and misleading statements, furnished by the Department of Marine and Fisheries, render it quite impossible for them to decide definitely on the disposition made of the supplies. That Department gave the Committee a statement purporting to show the amount of goods purchased, the amount issued on requisition, and the amount now on hand. The two latter, with the addition of the few trifling quantities, said to have been spoiled or abstracted, corresponding with the former. The evidence, however, of the purser, steward and others, shows that a large quantity of provisions was used in feeding the horde of Esquimaux, at one time numbering 95, but averaging from 50 to 60, who for six or seven months lived around the *Arctic*. A considerable quantity must also have been used for refreshments at the dances, which were given fortnightly on the *Arctic* for the Esquimaux men and women, during the winter spent at Fullerton. The purser, Mr. Weeks, further testified that a large quantity of the stores, having been found to be spoiled,



were thrown overboard, while Mr. Semple, the expert employed by the Government to examine the samples of the provisions before the boat sailed, and who was also engaged, for a month on her return, in taking an inventory, swore at first that 25 per cent of the cargo was destroyed or spoiled, although subsequently he declined to say more than that a considerable quantity of what was now on board had been so lost.

A comparison, too, of the inventory of medical stores taken on board with that taken after they returned, shows that either a large quantity of specific medicines and other supplies had been abstracted, or that an investigation should be held into the conduct of the expedition, during the winter at Fullerton, which was refused by a majority of the Committee. Your Committee also finds that wines, cigars and cigarettes were purchased by the Department of Marine and Fisheries for the personal use of the officers of the Northwest Mounted Police, and were given to them, but no evidence was adduced to justify or excuse such expenditure. Such purchase and disposition of the said supplies was shown by the evidence of Mr. Gregory, Mr. Weeks, Mr. Duchesney and Major Moodie.

(c) As the evidence clearly showed that no attempt whatever was made to check the stores in the various cases and packages received at the boat by the invoices, it was impossible for your Committee to decide whether or not all the supplies were put on the *Arctic*. In the case of goods received from one firm, namely, Hamilton & Co., the purser certified that all had been received, although the invoice called for nine boxes, while his inventory only showed five received. It is claimed that two shipments of bovril and pemmican, and only two, were shipped by the Bovril Company to, and received on, the *Arctic*. The one shipped on August 5th appears to have been received. There is no evidence whatever given by any one that he received the other, and no receipts have been produced. It is true that a couple of witnesses referred to two shipments of bovril, but Captain Bernier, who also spoke of the other shipment, swore that he understood that a shipment of bovril had been made to the *Neptune* at Halifax, but it arrived too late and was returned from there addressed to him on the *Arctic*.

As no witnesses claimed that there were three shipments of bovril received on the *Arctic*, it is plain that unless Captain Bernier is mistaken, one of the shipments of the value of \$1,485 was not received. The carelessness of the Department of Marine and Fisheries is shown as well in the payments for, as in the receipt of the goods. The freight on the larger consignment of bovril was paid by the agent of the Department at Quebec, and refunded to him by the Department, which also added the same amount to the invoice of the Bovril Company and paid the same. An enquiry as to the correctness of the payment was made by the company of the Department, but no notice was taken thereof and no demand for repayment was made until after your Committee had discovered the above facts, when the money was refunded. The failure properly to check the invoices of goods taken on the *Arctic* makes it almost impossible to say whether or not such goods were diverted for other purposes. A large number of boxes of stores were brought to the *Arctic*, but only a few were opened, it being assumed that the contents of the others corresponded with the invoices. A great many of the invoices, when produced, had certificates signed by three and sometimes four persons, generally including captain, purser and steward. On enquiry, however, all these parties admitted that they had not compared the contents of the cases with the invoices, that they did not know what quantities of the various kinds of supplies had been taken on board, and that some had signed because requested to do so by a superior officer, and some because, seeing the signatures of others already appended, they assumed that the goods had been received, and so signed, although personally quite ignorant as to quantity, quality and receipt. Your Committee expresses its regret that not only were the contents of the cases received on board the *Arctic* not compared with the invoices, but that these invoices were laid before them bearing one or more (generally several) of the following certificates: "I certify that the above

was received by me in good order, and the quantity, as mentioned, correct," or "We guarantee that above goods have been received in good order," or "I certify that the above was duly purchased and that the prices paid are fair and just," and signed J. Bernier, C. S. Duchesney (steward), W. H. Weeks (purser), when, in fact, such certificates were given under the circumstances above set forth, and in many cases the goods receipted for had been received (if received) and stowed away on board before the party who signed the receipt had even arrived in Quebec. In many cases it must be evident that the parties so certifying, from lack of business experience, could not have known what the prices of the goods should have been.

The above facts are shown in the evidence of Captain Bernier, Purser Weeks and Steward Duchesney. Your Committee refrains from making any comments on the fact that such unwarranted and misleading certificates were laid before them for the purpose of proving the receipt of the goods purchased for the *Arctic* expedition. In view of the failure to compare goods and invoices, when loading the *Arctic*, and the statement of the Department, above given, that the list of requisitions of goods used, added to the inventory taken after the return of the *Arctic* would, with a few trifling additions which were given, show the amount of goods originally taken on board, it was moved in the Committee as follows:—

"Moved by Mr. Northrup, seconded by Mr. Bennett, that an accountant be employed by the Committee to go through the invoices, the requisitions for supplies, and the inventory of goods on hand to ascertain if the supplies, which were furnished by the Department of Marine and Fisheries for the Government steamer *Arctic*, were not all put on board the said steamer."

This was, however, voted down by a majority of the Committee.

Your Committee is of opinion that such a report from an accountant might have enabled them to give a full and complete answer to this enquiry as to whether or not all the supplies were put on the boat.

(d) Your Committee regrets that, owing to the absence of samples of the various kinds of goods purchased, and the refusal of the majority of the Committee to allow said samples to be produced, or experts to examine the goods now on board, it was prevented from making full enquiry as to whether or not excessive prices were paid for supplies. The following motions were made and voted down by a majority of the Committee:—

"Moved by Mr. Northrup, seconded by Mr. Bennett, that samples of all the different goods on board the *Arctic* be sent to Ottawa for inspection and examination by this Committee."

"Moved by Mr. Bennett, seconded by Mr. Northrup, that two experts, to be named by the mover and chairman, shall be selected to take stock and examine quality and report as to goods now on board the *Arctic*, and reported as unused, and that they be at liberty to examine such goods as they see fit."

"Moved by Mr. Northrup, seconded by Mr. Bennett, that as Mr. Boudreau, who was sent by the Department to supervise the shipping of the goods on the *Arctic*, has admitted that he left the Molsons Bank in consequence of having received commission as a manager of the bank from a customer, that the general manager and inspector of said bank be subpoenaed to give evidence as to the reason why Mr. Boudreau left said bank."

"Moved by Mr. Northrup, seconded by Mr. Bennett, that the motions rejected by the Committee this afternoon be reported to the House forthwith."

Only two samples of all the supplies were brought before your Committee, namely, bovril and pemmican. An expert in the same line of business swore that, if given an opportunity to tender for bovril or its equivalent, he would have tendered and would have supplied an equally good, in fact, practically the same article, for \$1.10 a pound, while the Department paid \$1.65 a pound for 5,900 pounds. While pemmican, as applied to dried buffalo meat, is a well-known article, the same expert testi-



fied that he had never heard of the article purchased under that name which, according to the evidence of Mr. Mitchell, the manager of the Bovril Company, from whom 8,000 pounds were purchased, at \$1.25 per pound, was made of ordinary meat dried and shredded, pounded down, and mixed with fat and currants. In the absence of further evidence as to the cost of pemmican, your Committee can only regret that the name of a well-known article of commerce was applied to a new production wholly dissimilar, and the price paid for which, judging by the materials used, as given by the manufacturer, was grossly excessive. Your Committee also regrets the refusal of the majority of the Committee to hear the evidence of Mr. Van Beaver, an expert from the William Davies Company (Limited), who came from Toronto, was present in the room, and prepared to give evidence to show that the William Davies Company (Limited), if an opportunity of tendering had been afforded, would have tendered for pemmican, so-called, at 35 cents a pound.

In view of the evidence of Mr. Wovenden, and the exercise of their own judgment as to the cost of materials, used in manufacturing pemmican, your Committee finds that the prices paid for bovril as well as pemmican were grossly excessive, and that supplies, at least equally good, could have been obtained at much lower prices, had tenders been called for and competition been allowed. Your Committee deems it its duty, in connection with this purchase, to point out that while 5,900 pounds of bovril were paid for, only 449 pounds were used, during the thirteen months the expedition was absent, leaving 5,461 pounds still on hand, showing that at the same rate of consumption a supply of bovril for over thirteen years was taken on board. Your Committee would also call attention to the fact of the uncertainty of the receipt of one lot of bovril, and the improper payment of freight (\$45.30), the omission to refund same, and the neglect of the Department to demand its return even after its attention was called to the matter, which facts are more fully set out above. Although several members of your Committee endeavoured to secure evidence, as to the prices paid for supplies, they were unable, as witnesses declined to testify unless samples were placed before them, in which case they were prepared to examine the same and put a price on goods corresponding to samples. The evidence of Mr. Semple proved that, before the expedition sailed, he was asked to value the provisions and check the prices paid therefor, and that he came from Montreal to Ottawa, where, in the presence of a number of officials of the Department, he examined samples of, at all events, a great many kinds of provisions in order to be able to express an opinion as to the prices charged. Had samples been provided, or experts been allowed to examine the goods now on hand, your Committee would have been able to give a full and complete answer to this enquiry.

Among the items in the invoice of Amyot, G. Elie & Fils, are 805 pounds of T. & B. smoking tobacco, at 95 cents per pound, and 39 cents excise, amounting in all to \$1.34 per pound. Being informed that Mr. Cockshutt, M.P., of Brantford, was in 1904 engaged in a business dealing in tobacco, he was called as a witness. He testified that during that year the price of tobacco was practically unchanged, and that he purchased T. & B. smoking tobacco in plugs at 67 cents per pound. Captain Bernier testified that this tobacco was in large plugs. Your Committee therefore finds, this evidence being uncontradicted, that on this item there was a profit to the vender of about 100 per cent, over and above the business profit. Your Committee submits that when a fur-lined coat is charged for, as in the account of Woods & Co. (Limited), it is impossible to give the value or fix a reasonable price without seeing the coat, as the varieties of fur-lined coats are almost infinite. This difficulty is not wholly removed when witnesses Weeks, the pursor, Duchesney, the steward, and others, testify that the so-called fur-lined coat was canvass or duck on the outside and sheepskin on the inside. The same difficulty arises with regard to the sleeping bags. For the crew of thirty-four men, twenty-five bags, at \$70 each, for one man, three at \$200 each, for two men, and three at \$225 each for three men. Also, eighty at \$25 each for one man,



were purchased. Without inspection of the bags no one can say positively that the prices were excessive, although they certainly appear to justify such a conclusion. Although a refusal of a majority of the Committee, as above stated, to allow evidence as to the value of the goods purchased, has prevented the Committee from making a full and satisfactory enquiry into the prices, they feel justified in finding that the mere statement of the quantities of supplies purchased is in itself evidence of corruption or of negligence and incapacity so great as to be absolutely incredible and almost criminal. In addition to the articles above-mentioned, 15,000 pounds of wheat biscuits were purchased in London, Ontario, and the freight and packing (\$312), paid in addition to the price of \$862.50, making in all \$1,175.10, another, 15,014 pounds of pilot biscuits were bought in Toronto, at a price of \$895.51, and 643 boxes, at 50 cents each, were allowed for the packing of the same, amounting to \$321.50, and the freight thereon, amounting to \$80.45 was paid to Quebec, amounting in all to \$1,297.41; 584 tins of fancy biscuits were also bought, at a cost of \$523.44 for the contents, and \$292 was paid for the tins in which they were packed, also, \$36.75 for the wooden cases in which the tins were sent to Quebec, amounting in all to \$862.15, without the freight, and \$942.55, including freight. The evidence also shows that over 30,000 pounds of flour was purchased and that the cook baked bread for the expedition all the time it was away.

As above stated, over \$22,000 was spent in clothing for a crew of 34 men, allowing about 700 apiece. To illustrate the expenditure, there were:—

That in view of the fact that the Premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, had been (long before the departure of the vessel) advised by persons in whom he placed confidence, that the quality of the goods was suspicious, and that it was a question as to whether or not the quantity supposed to have been purchased was being loaded on the vessel, it became imperatively necessary that more stringent measures should have been taken to see that the country was not imposed upon either as to quantity or quality of goods alleged to have been supplied.

No evidence was given to justify or explain the feeding of the Esquimaux band of fifty or sixty men and women on the *Arctic*, for six or seven months, out of the

stores purchased for the *Arctic* expedition. As the provisions were purchased on a basis of feeding forty men for twelve hundred days, it is obvious that to increase this number by from 125 to 150 per cent, for six months, would entail a consumption of more than one-sixth of the provisions, which would cost fully \$10,000. As no explanation was even suggested by the Department of Marine and Fisheries, your Committee regrets that its effort to enquire into the reasons for the presence and maintenance of so many Esquimaux was prevented by the majority of its members, who refused to allow questions, enquiring into the conduct of the members of the expedition during the winter, and their relations with the Esquimaux.

Your Committee also regrets that supplies were, in some cases, purchased through the solicitation of Members of Parliament, as evidenced by the purchase of \$1,080 worth of Lacto Globuline, on the recommendation of a Member of this House, as shown in a letter addressed to the firm selling the same, written to the Department of Marine and Fisheries," inserted instead thereof ;

Section 9 of Chapter 111 of the Statutes of 1898 is hereby amended by leaving out all the words down to 'any' in the second line thereof, and substituting therefor: 'The Company may, with the consent of the Governor in Council, enter upon the lands of His Majesty, and may enter upon the lands of.'

"6. Section 10 of Chapter 111 of the Statutes of 1898 is hereby repealed, and the following is substituted therefor:—

"10. The Company may, subject to the provisions of the Railway Act, 1903, transmit messages and communications for the public, and collect rates and charges therefor; but, no rates or charges shall be demanded or taken for the transmission of any message or communication, unless they have been approved of by the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada, and such rates and charges shall be subject to revision from time to time by the said Board.'

"7. Upon the application of any person, within a city, town, village or other territory in which a service is given and where a telephone is required for any lawful purpose, the Company shall, with all reasonable despatch, furnish telephone instruments, and a proper and sufficient telephone service of the latest improved design in use in cities, towns, incorporated villages or townships of the same or about the same size as the place within which the person making such application resides, for any and all premises fronting upon or within one thousand feet of any highway, street, lane or other public communication or place along, over, under or upon which the Company has a main or branch telephone service or system, upon tender or payment of all proper charges and upon payment of rates, semi-annually, in advance.

"8. The Company shall not, in fixing any toll or rate under like conditions and circumstances, make an unjust or partial discrimination between different localities or persons. And the Company shall not make or give any secret or special toll, rate, rebate, drawback, concession or undue preference, and, for every violation of the provisions of this Section the Company shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding One hundred dollars."

The said Amendment, being read a second time, was agreed to.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry back the Bill to the Senate, and acquaint their Honours, That this House had agreed to their Amendment.

Resolved, That the Bill do pass.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry the Bill to the Senate, and desire their concurrence.

The Order of the Day being read, for the second reading of the Bill from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to amend the Criminal Code, 1892, as respects Lotteries;"

The Bill was accordingly read a second time; and committed to a Committee of the Whole House.

Resolved, That this House do immediately resolve itself into the said Committee.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Marcil (Bonaventure) reported, That the Committee had gone through the Bill, and directed him to report the same without any amendment.

Ordered, That the Bill be now read the third time.

The Bill was accordingly read the third time.

Resolved, That the Bill do pass.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry back the Bill to the Senate, and acquaint their Honours, That this House hath passed the same without any amendment.

Mr. Speaker acquainted the House, That a Message had been brought from the Senate by their Clerk, as followeth:—



The Senate doth not insist upon their Second Amendment made to the Bill, intituled: "An Act to amend the Act respecting the Senate and House of Commons," to which the House of Commons hath disagreed.

And the Question being put on the motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

The Second Amendment, being read the second time;

Mr. Aylesworth moved, seconded by Mr. Hyman, That the said Amendment be not concurred in, for the reason that the expression in the Amendment is incomplete and would leave private legislation exempt from the operation of the Act, but that this House will agree to the word "public," if it remain in the clause, being accompanied by the words "the charter of any municipality or" inserted after the word "means," so that the Clause will read:—

(g) "Provincial Act" means "the charter of any municipality or any public Act of any Province whether passed before or since Confederation."

And the Question being put on the motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

The Third and Fourth Amendments, being read a second time, were severally agreed to.

The Fifth Amendment, being read the second time;

Mr. Aylesworth moved, seconded by Mr. Hyman, That the House do not concur in this Amendment "and express matter," for the reason that there would be no restriction at all on express business on Sunday if the Amendment were adopted.

And the Question being put on the motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

The Sixth Amendment, being read the second time;

Mr. Aylesworth moved, seconded by Mr. Hyman, That the House do not concur in this Amendment, for the reason that it is not consistent with the scope and policy of the measure.

And the Question being put on the motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

The Seventh and Eighth Amendments, being read a second time, were severally agreed to.

The Ninth Amendment, being read the second time;

Mr. Aylesworth moved, seconded by Mr. Hyman, That the said Amendment be not concurred in, for the reason that it is opposed to the spirit and scope of the measure.

And the Question being put on the motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

The Tenth, Eleventh, Twelfth and Thirteenth Amendments, being read the second time, were severally agreed to.

The Fourteenth Amendment, being read a second time;

Mr. Aylesworth moved, seconded by Mr. Hyman,—That the said Amendment be disagreed to, for the reason that railways under Provincial authority are already provided for by paragraph (k) Section 3, of the Bill.

And the Question being put on the motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

The Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first and Twenty-second Amendments, being read a second time, were severally agreed to.

The Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Amendments, being read a second time;

Mr. Aylesworth moved, seconded by Mr. Hyman, That the said two Amendments be disagreed to, for the reason that such Amendments materially weaken the sanctions which the Bill was intended to afford.

And the Question being put on the motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

The Twenty-fifth, Twenty-sixth, Twenty-seventh, Twenty-eighth, Twenty-ninth and Thirtieth Amendments, being read the second time, were severally agreed to.

The Thirty-first Amendment, being read a second time;

Mr. Aylesworth moved, seconded by Mr. Hyman, That the said Amendment be disagreed to, for the same reason as that given in the case of the First Amendment.

And the Question being put on the motion:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

On motion of Mr. Aylesworth, seconded by Mr. Hyman,

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Resolved, That a Message be sent to the Senate, acquainting their Honours of the reasons for disagreeing to certain of their Amendments to the said Bill.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry the said Message to the Senate.

Mr. Speaker acquainted the House, That a Message had been brought from the Senate by their Clerk, as followeth :—

The Senate have passed the following Bills, without any amendment:—

And whereas, it appears that the purposes of Parliament in passing the Act (4-5 Edward VII., Chapter 16) would be furthered by the passing of similar legislation by the Parliament of Great Britain :

That the Parliament of Canada believes it is in the interests of British subjects, both in the United Kingdom and Canada, that such legislation should be considered favourably by the British Parliament.

That this resolution be forwarded to the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, in order that such action may be taken thereon as His Majesty's advisers may deem meet.

“MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

“The Commons of Canada have voted the Supplies required to enable the Government to defray the expenses of the Public Service.

“In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Excellency a Bill, intituled: “An Act for granting to His Majesty certain sums of money for the Public Service “of the financial year ending the 30th June, 1906, and the period of nine months “ending the 31st March, 1907,” to which I humbly request Your Excellency's Assent.”

To this Bill the Royal Assent was signified in the following words:—

“In His Majesty's name, His Excellency the Governor General thanks His Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill.”

After which His Excellency was pleased to deliver the following Speech to both Houses:—

*Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:*

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons:*

In relieving you from further attendance in Parliament, I desire to thank you for the care and assiduity exhibited in the discharge of your laborious and exacting duties.

Your invitation to His Majesty the King to visit this part of his Dominions was duly forwarded to Buckingham Palace. That it would be a source of great rejoicing in Canada if His Majesty would favourably entertain the invitation is confirmed by many similar addresses adopted in the several provinces, cities and towns—all expressing the hope that His Majesty may honour us with another visit.

It is very gratifying to note that Canada continues to enjoy a prosperity rarely equalled in the history of nations. The volume of exports and imports, during the year just closed, exceeds that of any previous record. The revenue also shows a remarkable increase, the receipts on account of the consolidated fund having doubled in the last ten years. The large number of Private Bills that have received your approval—having for their object the incorporation of railway and other industrial enterprises—affords additional evidence of the general prosperity prevailing over the Dominion.

The stream of immigrants seeking homes in the Western Provinces continues to flow in increasing volume, and, owing to the favourable conditions now existing in Alberta and Saskatchewan, their vacant lands are being rapidly taken up.

Several Acts of great public utility have been added to the laws in the session now drawing to a close. Among the number, I am glad to note,

An Act for the better observance of the Lord's day.

An Act in restriction of Usury.

An Act to secure the better Marking of Fruit.

An Act requiring that certain articles containing a proportion of gold and silver when offered for sale should be honestly marked.

An Act relating to immigrants and immigration, which, among other provisions, will enable the authorities to deport undesirable persons.

It is earnestly to be hoped that your example, in passing the Act setting apart large areas for forest reserves, will be followed by those Provincial Legislatures having jurisdiction over their public domain; and that a system of reforestation may be adopted in all parts of the Dominion, thereby preserving the uniform flow of our rivers and of our valuable water-powers.

In view of the many important Acts passed, and of the numerous amendments made to existing laws, during this Session, it has been deemed expedient to stay the issue of the volumes of the Revised Statutes, in order that the recent legislation may be embodied.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons:*

I thank you in His Majesty's name for the supplies you have so liberally voted.

*Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:*

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons:*

A copy of the convention regarding commercial relations between Japan and Canada has now been received. The treaty has been duly ratified and exchanged, thereby giving Canada material advantages in our trade with Japan.

I now beg to express the hope that, on your return to your several homes, you will find evidences that the coming harvest will be a bountiful one, thus assuring another year's prosperity throughout the Dominion.

Then the Honourable the Speaker of the Senate said:—

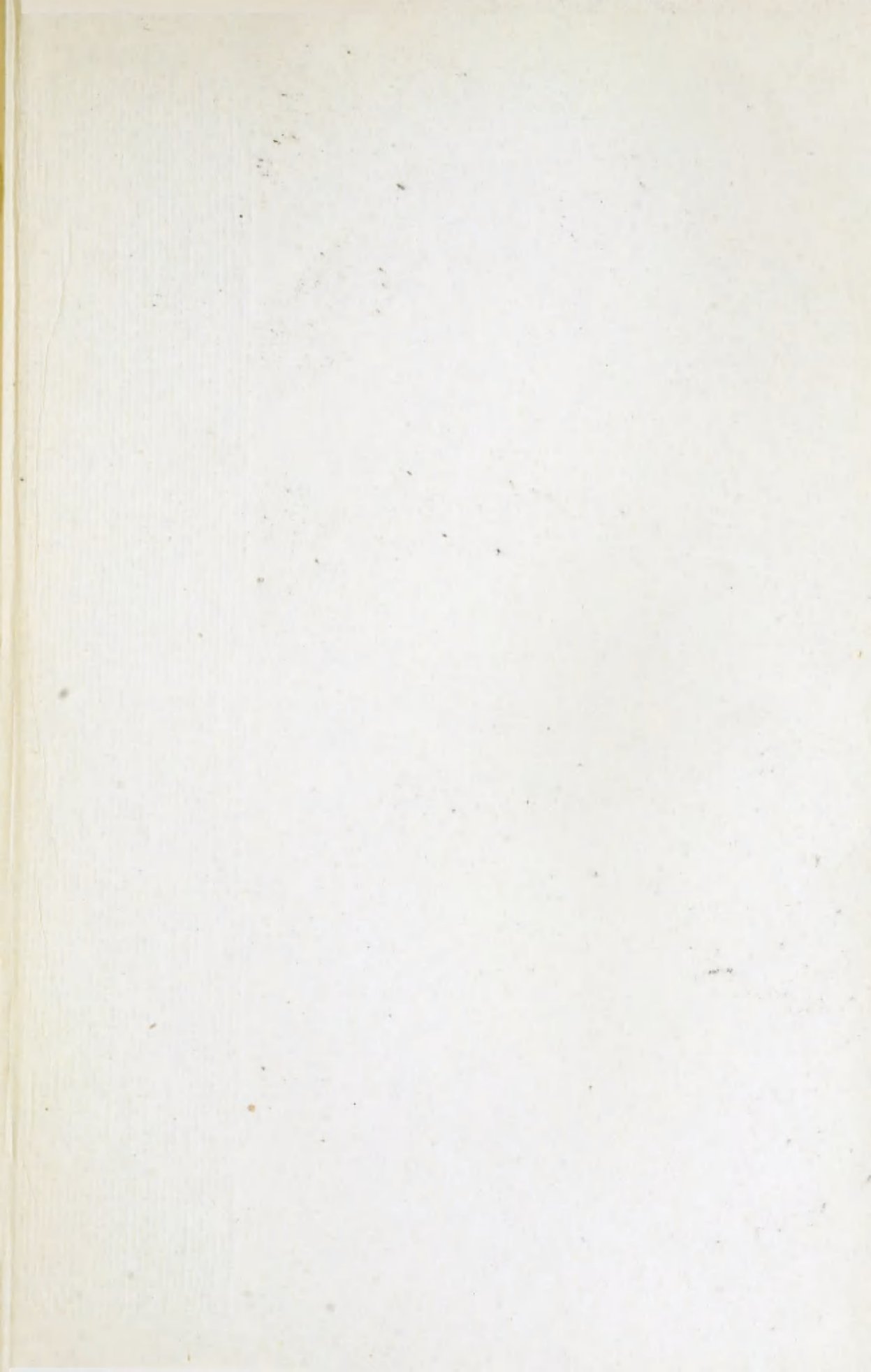
















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
