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

Preface

The name Heady is not well known. Every surname dictionary found in several libraries has been searched and the name Heady was not listed. Some persons believe it is derived from another name, possibly Hedden. However, a number of instances have been found where a person is listed as Heady by repeated references recorded by others. Seldom is the name Hedden used in these references. But, as is true with other names, the person recording the name Heady was not always consistent. It has been recorded as Heady, Headdy, and Heddy, sometimes in the same document. It is possible that Heady, Hedden, Hoddy, and other similar names derive from an earlier name that had a similar sound.

The earliest Heady in America to whom a reference has been found is a Richard Heady who came to Virginia in 1654.¹ There was only one reference to him. Some of the Headys in the South may be descended from him, but I am not aware of any research in this direction. Then there is a Thomas Heady, mariner, who bought land in Accomac County, Virginia, circa 1675.² In the same time frame, 1675, a John Heady living in Yonkers, New York, submitted a petition to the local government on behalf of the persons in his community.³ Again, I am not aware of any connection between these Headys and later Headys.

There is evidence of single Heady families living in Northern New Jersey and Connecticutt during colonial times. During the Revolution, Headys from Connecticutt, New Jersey, New York, and North Carolina saw service, although only one person from each state has been found in the service records. Whether these Heady families are related in any way is not known to me.

The best researched Heady family is that of a Thomas Heady who married a Rebecca Stilwell in New Jersey in 1749.⁴ These two spawned a number of Heady clans in Kentucky, Indiana, and points west. Pat Heady Green published a newsletter from November 1971 to October 1974 of the Heady families descended from this couple. This, and another article she wrote entitled "Heady Information",⁵ is the most information you will find compiled about Headys. The "Heady Information" article includes information about Heady families that lived in Hamilton County, Indiana. She admitted that it was just a beginning and there was much yet to learn.

My grandfather, James Lewis Heady, was born in Hamilton County, Indiana, in 1873. Doing research on my family eventually resulted in my discovering these two works of Pat Heady Green. I have learned considerably more about the Headys in Hamilton County than was in these works. The Headys of Hamilton County, Indiana, will be the subject of this book, which will cover four generations, basically the time period of 1820 to 1900. This time period is chosen because 1820 was about when white families began settling Hamilton County and 1900 is about when my grandfather left for the West.

It is common practice in family histories to carry related families (those of married daughters) only one generation. This practice will be followed in most cases. However, there are a few cases where for various reasons more than one generation is included. All surnames that are associated with the Headys of Hamilton County are included in the index. Those that married second generation, or are prominent, include Castetter, Eller, Hardesty, Humble, Lewis, Redwine, Snodgrass, Tharp, Tucker, and Verts.

While I believe this is a significant addition to the compiled knowledge of this family, it is far from complete. My main interest in the beginning was to research my maternal grandfather and his ancestors. Once involved, I decided to learn what I reasonably could about the other Headys in Hamilton County. Some proved easier to research than others. Also, I would be the last to say there is no room for improvement. Hopefully, others with better information will correct any errors and will add to what is here.

A number of sources have been consulted in preparing this history. The work of Pat Heady Green has already been mentioned. Three sources that have been heavily utilized are The Genealogical Society of Utah for county records, The National Archives for census and Civil War Pension information, and newspapers of the period for vital and human interest information. The newspaper information was obtained at the Indiana State Library during a two month research trip to Indiana. In addition to the sources already mentioned there are four other sources utilized. First is a record of the recollections of Martha Heady as recorded by her grand daughter, Freeda George. This record is reproduced in Appendix II. Second is a survey of two cemeteries that are the final resting place for a number of James and Dorotha Heady's descendants. The results of these surveys are presented in Appendix III. The third source utilized is court records. Court houses in Hamilton County and Howard County, Indiana, and Neosho County, Kansas, were visited to obtain records not microfilmed by the Genealogical Society of Utah. Finally, four local libraries deserve mention. The Noblesville-Southeastern Library, the Kokomo Public Library, and the Tipton County Library have excellent collections pertaining to their area. The fourth local library, the Allen County Library, is renowned for its geanealogical collection and had periodicals from many Indiana historical societies.

The source of the facts presented is shown through endnotes with two exceptions. The exceptions are the information contained in Appendixes II and III. Where information comes from these sources, that fact will be noted in the body of the story and by end notes. The reader can refer to the appropriate appendix for the information. In some cases, there may be sources with conflicting information about a fact. When this occurs,

a discussion of the conflicting information will be found in an end note. Each reference is indicated by a superscripted number. These references will be found preceding the Appendices in Notes and References. Since many references use the same source (such as Hamilton County, Indiana, Marriage Records), these references use an abbreviated form. The complete reference is in a preamble to the end notes in Notes and References.

I believe in documenting sources. So the reader may find more references than desired. However, I have found in my own family that "facts" are not always what we think. For example, my grandfather placed the birth of my grandmother (in a document after her death) as Wichita, Kansas. Census data shows her family lived in Cowley County, Kansas. Wichita may be where he met her. So if I show something different from what you believe to be correct, the documentation will show where I got the information. Which is not to say my source is necessarily the last word on the subject.

The text following the Introduction is divided into thirteen chapters and three appendixes. The first chapter is about the progenitors, James and Dorotha Heady. They had eleven children, so each of the next eleven chapters is dedicated to a child and his or her descendants. Chapter 13 is about the Castetter family, which was closely associated with the Headys during this period. Appendix I will summarize information about the families of Thomas Heady, Sr., and Thomas Heady, Jr., that is in *The Heady Family Newsletter*. The contents of Appendixes II and III have already been mentioned.

An explanation is appropriate concerning the way families are presented. The record format will be used. Each generation will be indicated by a superscripted number. For example, the progenitor **James¹ Heady** has the superscript 1, as shown, and all his children will have the superscript 2. However, in a list of children, only the first child will have a superscript. Also, the first time a person is mentioned, their name will be bolded. Then, in a list of children, roman and arabic numerals will be used. The roman numeral will be used to show the order of birth of a child in a family. Every child's name will be preceded by a roman numeral. Some children will also have an arabic numeral in front of their name. This will signify that there will be a further discussion of that person and his or her family. In this case, only birth and marriage information will be shown for that person. Other information, including references will come later. For example, the family of **John¹ and Abigail Smith** would be shown as follows:

Children of John and Abigail Smith are:

- 2. i. John², b. 15 Jan 1835; m. Elizabeth Jones.
 - ii. Elizabeth, b. 27 Feb 1837, d. 10 Oct 1875; m. 10 Mar 1857 in Nowhere Co., Mystate, Alexander Martin, b. 20 Dec 1836, d. 31 May 1870.

Then when it comes time to tell about John², it will look like this:

2. John² Smith (John¹), was born 15 Jan 1835 in Nowhere County, Mystate, and ...

Note that his father is shown in parentheses and italics after John² Smith. His children would be followed by $(John^2, John^1)$ when there is a section discussing them in some detail.

This is my first book on genealogy. As in all efforts of this magnitude involving inexperience, errors can be expected. Considerable effort has been made to avoid errors, but some are sure to be present. Please address any suggestions, additions, or corrections to myself at the address shown in the copyright section.

Introduction

Following the revolutionary war, the territory between the Ohio and Mississippi rivers and south of the Great Lakes was ceded to the Federal Government by the colonies in the process of ratifying the Articles of Confederation. This territory was called the Northwest Territory. Eventually, the states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, and the part of Minnesota East of the Mississippi River were formed from this territory.⁶

One of the first acts of Congress regarding these lands was establishment of a new system to survey and describe property.⁷ This was a rectangular system that used a horizontal base line and a vertical meridian to provide axes to measure from. Then every six miles north and south of the base line, additional horizontal lines were established. These were called Township lines. Every six miles east and west of the meridian, additional vertical lines were established. These were called Township lines. Every six miles east and west of the meridian, additional vertical lines were established. These were called Range lines. These Township and Range lines divided the surveyed land into six mile by six mile squares. Then these six by six squares were further divided into thirty six tracts called sections. These sections were one mile square, or 640 acres.

When a survey was complete, the land was sold through a land office. Entire sections could be purchased, or parts of a section. Sections were divided into quarter sections of 160 acres and quarter sections were further divided into tracts of a quarter of a quarter section, or 40 acres. The first land sold by this method was in Ohio. By the early 1800s, when land in Indiana Territory opened for settlement, the sale of land by this system had become routine.

There were a number of U.S. land offices established in the Northwest Territory. The only ones that enter into this story will be those in Cincinnatti, Ohio; Jeffersonville, Indiana; and Brookville, Indiana (which was transferred to Indianapolis about 1825). The reason for discussing land and land offices is because these are among the best records available in Indiana and Ohio between 1800 and 1830.

Census records can be quite valuable, but the 1800 and 1810 censuses for Ohio and Indiana are missing. Courthouse records can also be valuable, but they are only available after the county government is formed. In the parts of Ohio and Indiana in which this story takes part, between 1800 and 1830 the governments were young and the records reflect that youth. One other record collection group is religions. But in this part of the United States, the preachers were mostly itinerant and their records are hard to find, if

they exist. The one exception to this latter statement is the Quakers. But the Headys in Indiana were not Quakers, with one minor exception.

This story begins about 1820 and ends about 1900. During this time great changes took place in Indiana. One good source of information about this period is *INDIANA From Frontier to Industrial Commonwealth.*⁸ The title tells a lot about the changes that took place during the period covered.

In 1820, Indiana was on the frontier. It is difficult for us in the late twentieth century to appreciate what that means. When we leave one place and go to another, we can call a mover to pack our belongings and transport them to another place. The new location will have a house for us to move into and a shopping center within reasonable distance to buy our food, clothes, and other necessities. We will travel over paved roads at 25, 45, or 65 miles per hour. If the roads are the least bit rough, we are unhappy. So we really can't appreciate what frontier life was like.

Those ancestors of ours who first settled in a newly opened territory had to provide everything for themselves, including the road used to get there. I won't go into great detail because others have done the job very well. But consider that a large portion of the land settled during this period was forest. If there was a path from where you were to where you wanted to go, it was probably wide enough for a person on foot, or possibly a horse. If wagons were involved, it could be necessary to widen the path by cutting down underbrush and possibly trees. This makes for slow going. Depending on the time of year and weather conditions, the trail could be muddy. This would further impede travel.

Then when they arrived at their new home, there would be no house. The first thing to do would be to begin to clear the land, plant, and build a log house. This was no small chore. Trees had to be felled. For a log cabin the trees were stripped of their branches, and moved into place. This was usually a cooperative effort among several families. Often, the husband would go ahead and make rudimentary preparations. Then he would go back and bring the family to the new home. A good description of this process is given by Augustus Finch Shirts in his history of Hamilton County, Indiana.⁹

On the frontier, the pioneers had to be self sufficient. They grew their own food or got it by hunting and fishing. They made their own cloth and sewed their clothes from it. Leather made from the hides of deer and other animals was used for clothing and shoes. They were their own doctors to a great degree. As time passed, the areas became more densely settled and communities and towns developed. More goods became available and a market developed for what was produced. But the increased population combined with with poor sanitation resulted in epidemics. There was a high degree of mortality, particularly among infants, as will be seen.

Introduction

After the Revolutionary War, the land west of the Ohio was largely Indian territory. Then as the Federal Government obtained the land from the Indians, many persons came West in search of a better future. Ohio was rapidly settled and became a state in 1803.¹⁰ That part of what is now Indiana that is along the Ohio river was also being settled during this time and by 1816 there were sufficient residents in the southern third of that part of the territory for Indiana to become a state.¹¹

Until 1818, most of the northern part of Indiana belonged to the Indians. In that year, the United States concluded a treaty with the Indians and obtained a large part of this territory from them. Next the land was surveyed and divided into sections for sale. In 1821, the surveying was complete and a land office was opened in Brookville, Indiana. Later this land office was moved to Indianapolis. The process of settlement began as settlers and speculators rapidly bought up the land.

Actually, there were a number of squatters on the land before it was opened for sale. A few Indian traders were in the territory before 1818. Others began settling the territory between 1818 and 1821 when the land was officially opened for sale. One account of these early traders and squatters is given by Augustus Finch Shirts. He was a descendant of two of the early settlers. In his book he names a number of these early settlers. A history of Hamilton County written in 1880 also names some of the early settlers.¹² Another source of information about the early settlers of this area is the 1820 U.S. census for Indiana.¹³ In 1820, county governments had not yet been formed by Indiana in the New Purchase (as land purchased from the Indians in 1818 was called). For census purposes, two counties, Delaware and Wabash, were defined. What ultimately became Hamilton County was in the White River Parish of Delaware County. The earliest settlers can be determined by comparing names in this census with those who ultimately purchased land from the Federal government. Among those was a Jeams Heady family.





Figure 2 INDIANA 1820 (with permission from Indiana Historical Society)

The map on the following page (Figure 2) shows Indiana Counties in 1820 and present. Hamilton County is in the center of the state where the word "Delaware" is. Figure 3 is a map of Hamilton County in about 1880. This county map is not to scale and is not detailed. It shows the Townships, the White River, Noblesville (the county seat), Fishers, and the Heady Cemetery. The Headys lived in the southern part of the county in Delaware Township in the vicinity of the Heady Cemetery (the Heady Cemetery is discussed in Appendix III). The town of Fishers today is much larger than in 1880 and includes most of the property the Headys owned.

Chapter 1

James and Dorotha Heady

This is the history of the family of James and Dorotha Heady that moved into what became Delaware Township, Hamilton County, Indiana, in the early 1820s. James and Dorotha Heady had a large family. There were eleven children in this family at the time of James' death in 1827, eight sons and three daughters. This part of Indiana was being opened for settlement and the Heady family were among the first settlers. Although James Heady died in 1827, his family participated in the growth of Delaware Township in the southern part of Hamilton county. But in 1972, there was not a family with the name Heady in Hamilton County.¹⁴

The Heady Family Newsletter states that James Heady is the son of Thomas Heady, Jr., who died in Nelson County, Kentucky, in 1811.¹⁵ The Newsletter does not show how this relationship was determined. I have attempted to confirm this relationship and believe that it is correct. The evidence I have found will be discussed in the following pages. Appendix I summarizes what the Heady Newsletter provides about the history of the Thomas Heady, Sr. and Thomas Heady, Jr., families.

The information I have found and that presented by *The Heady Family Newsletter* may not meet the rigorous test of evidence for conclusively showing a relationship. It is presented for those who would care to further investigate this family's antecedents. This history deals with persons living in Hamilton County, Indiana, in 1820 and their descendants. Information concerning these relationships are more readily available.

James¹ Heady was born between 1775 and 1779 in Fayette County, Pennsylvania.¹⁶ He died before 7 June 1827 in Hamilton County, Indiana, when his estate was entered into probate. He was part of the Thomas Heady, Jr. family that settled in Nelson County, Kentucky about 1790. Several children from this family moved first to Ohio and then to Indiana, or directly to Indiana. There is circumstantial evidence to support the belief that the James Heady that moved to Hamilton County, Indiana, was from this family.

Thomas Heady, Jr., who followed his father to Kentucky from Pennsylvania in 1792 had seven sons.¹⁷ They can all be accounted for except James and Elias. Thomas Heady, Jr., in his 1811 will states that neither James nor Elias are to receive anything because he has

already given them all that he intends to.¹⁸ Later in the will he instructs "that they (Jacob, Stilwell, and Elisha) shall pay unto my son James Heady for the improvements he made on the place that my son Elijah now lives on." From this it is concluded that James and Elias have left home.

The Nelson County, Kentucky, tax rolls were examined for evidence of James Heady, son of Thomas Heady, Jr. The 1800 Nelson County tax roll includes only one James Heady, the son of Thomas, Sr.¹⁹ In 1802, there is a James Heady, son of Thomas Heady, Jr., as well as the earlier James Heady. There are also two James Headys on the 1803 tax roll. The one there in 1800 and a second James Heady. Although, the second one is not identified as "son of Thomas, Jr.," it is assumed he is that person. Then in 1804 the second James Heady is not on the Nelson County, Kentucky tax roll. From this and the tenor of the will, it is assumed that James Heady, son of Thomas, Jr., has left the state. Although the evidence may not be conclusive, in this history it will be accepted that the James Heady that settled in Hamilton County, Indiana is the son of Thomas Heady, Jr. of Nelson County, Kentucky. Additional evidence is presented in the following paragraphs, including how he got to Hamilton County, Indiana.

A James Heady married a Dolly Henry in Hamilton County, Ohio, in November, 1801.²⁰ Martha [Castetter] Heady, wife of Alfred Tennyson Heady, identifies the wife of James Heady, son of Thomas Heady, Jr., as Dorothy Harvey (see Appendix II). The name Henry and Harvey (sometimes spelled Hervey) can be mistaken in the old handwriting and Dolly is a nick name for Dorothy. So Dolly Henry could be Dorothy Harvey. (Dorotha and Dorothy are used at different times in referring to James wife. My mother was named Dorotha at birth, but later used Dorothy. Other descendants of James and Dorotha were apparently named Dorotha, so Dorotha will be used as her name. But if the document cited uses Dorothy, the name will be shown as it appears in the document.) The 1850 census shows Dorothy Heady's age as 64. In 1860, her age is shown as 73. So in 1801, she would have been less than 16, under age for marrying in many communities. But Cincinnati was "Gretna Green" (no questions asked). This could explain their marriage there and then James Heady being in Nelson County in 1802. No record of a marriage of James and Dorothy in Kentucky has been found.

Then a James Heady made a first installment on 160 acres of land in Butler County, Ohio, 11 Feb 1805.²¹ This land was never recorded in James Heady's name. Instead, it was assigned to Sam'l Dick and was patented 18 Jun 1812.²² An attempt was made to find taxes being paid on land in Butler County, Ohio, by James Heady. But the tax records available on microfilm for Butler County start in 1816. There was a census taken in Butler County, Ohio, in 1807, and a male of 21 years of age or older named James Heady was recorded.²³

I believe that this is our James Heady and that he and his family left Nelson County, Kentucky, about 1804 and moved to Butler County, Ohio. He used money and or

equipment his father gave him to get started there. He would have cleared land, built a log cabin, and planted crops. Then in 1812, he sold his Butler, Ohio, property and began a move to Indiana. Also, during this time, several children were born. In the 1850 and 1860 censuses for Hamilton County, Indiana, the birth place of some of the known sons of James and Dorotha Heady is shown as Ohio.

On 1 Oct 1814, a James Heady of Washington County, Indiana Territory, made a first installment on 160 acres of land at the Jeffersonville land office.²⁴ This land was in what became Jackson County, Indiana, in 1816, but was part of Washington County in 1814. The patent was never obtained by James Heady on this property, although all the payments were made by him.²⁵ Instead, the final papers were assigned to Jesse Dickson who was given the patent. The patent was issued in 1819. A Thomas Heady also bought land at the Jeffersonville land office in 1814.²⁶ He bought his land in partnership with a Seth Goodwin. This Thomas Heady is undoubtedly the Thomas Heady who married Rebecca Goodwin and who later was in Monroe and Putnam Counties, Indiana. He is reputed to be a son of Thomas Heady, Jr. of Nelson County, Kentucky and would be the brother of James Heady.²⁷

A James Heady was accused of being a horse thief in Jackson County, Indiana, in 1816. But he was subsequently acquitted by a jury.²⁸ There are not a lot of James Headys in the world, so the land owner and the alleged horse thief are probably the same person. James did have a son named James, but he was only ten at the time. There is also a record of a James Heady marrying a Polly Beyher in Harrison County, Indiana, in 1816.²⁹ This could not be our James Heady because he required consent to marry. He cannot be James, Sr.'s son because James, Jr. is only ten years old.

The first available U.S. census for Indiana is the 1820 census. In this census there are two James Headys enumerated, one in Jackson County and one in Delaware county, White River Parish, (for census purposes, the New Purchase was divided into two counties, Delaware and Wabash). These two census records are interesting because they are almost identical. The following table shows them.³⁰

It is assumed that these are the same family and that James was in the New Purchase, probably with some of his sons, preparing their new home. Dorotha and the rest of the family were in Jackson County. But why should the James Heady family in Jackson County be the same as the one in Delaware county? The first clue is the composition of the families. Both have the same number of males and females. Only the age distribution is different, which can occur when two different persons are reporting. When the census takers came around, both segments of the family gave information as they knew it. The Jeams Heady (sic) in the 1820 U.S. census for Delaware County, White River parish, was listed on the same page as William Conner and Charles Lacey, who were known to be in the part of Delaware County that became Hamilton County.

A second census was performed in the fall of 1820 by Indiana.³¹ This census included only males over 21. The returns have been found for only some of the counties. Those for Jackson County are available, but not those for Delaware County. James Heady was not in the state's Jackson County census, but Jesse Dickson, who had been assigned the land James¹ had entered in 1814, was. From this it is concluded that James¹ Heady had left Jackson County to select and prepare a home in the New Purchase, which is what the land obtained from the Indians in 1818 was called.

In summary, it is proposed that the above facts support the contention that the James Heady in Hamilton County, Indiana, in the early 1820s is the son of Thomas Heady, Jr., of Nelson County, Kentucky. That he moved to Butler County, Ohio, about 1804 and bought land in 1805. Then, between 1812 and 1814, he and his family moved to Indiana. They settled on land he entered in what is now Jackson County, Indiana. Shortly after he entered his land, his brother Thomas also bought land close by. Then about 1820, James Heady and his family moved again, this time to what became Hamilton County, Indiana, where this story begins.

The composition of the family of James and Dorotha Heady is known from two documents in the Hamilton County Courthouse files. First is the probate record of James Heady. On 11 June 1827, Dorothy Heady is named administratrix of the estate of James Heady.³² In this record, she is identified as the widow. Then in 1866, in the settlement of the estate of Dorotha Heady, the eleven children of Dorotha Heady are named.³³ More will be said about these documents later. The children named in the settlement of Dorotha's estate are: Lewis, James, Mark, Vincent, Charles, Thomas, Andrew Jackson, Perry, Elizabeth, Mary, and Sarah Ann. It is not possible to establish exactly the order of birth or the place of birth of each child. But from the facts that are known some conclusions have been drawn, which will be discussed.

In the 1850 census for Hamilton County, Indiana, the birth place of James, Vincent, and Charles Heady are shown as Ohio.³⁴ These children of James and Dorotha were born in 1814 or earlier according to census, cemetery, or family sources. Lewis, Elizabeth, and Mark are dead by 1850 when birthplace is shown on the census. But there is evidence

that they too were born before 1814. The Kentucky tax records discussed above indicate that Lewis could have been born in Kentucky.³⁵ Mark and Elizabeth are assumed to have been born in Ohio because they were born before 1814, but after 1804 (when James, son of Thomas, Jr., is not on the Kentucky tax records). The other children of James and Dorotha, who were born after 1814, are all shown in censuses to have been born in Indiana. From this it is concluded that James and Dorotha lived in Ohio prior to 1814 and at least as early as 1807, which is when James² was born.

There is evidence of a James Heady in Hamilton County, Indiana, in the early 1820s, besides the census. *The 1880 History of Hamilton County, Indiana* shows a James Headdy (sic) as one of 36 Petit jurors in August, 1823.³⁶ In another place, this history says he came in late 1825.³⁷ The basis for this date is not given and it is believed that none of the arrival dates in this history are accurate. Many of the arrival dates are the same as the date that a person entered land at the Brookville (later Indianapolis) land office. Then, as previously stated, on 11 June 1827, Dorothy Heady, widow, is designated administratrix of James Heady deceased.

It is interesting that James Heady never entered the land he was living on in Hamilton County, Indiana, at the Brookville land office. After his death, his wife and three of his sons all entered land.³⁸ This was the third tract of virgin land that James Heady had settled. He must have been very good at it. One wonders why he moved so frequently. Maybe he liked to be on the frontier. When he died, an inventory was taken of his personal property. The result of that inventory is shown in the table on the following page.³⁹ Note that it is what you would expect of a pioneer.

A sale was held of the personal property of James Heady, deceased, that was reported by Dorothy Heady on 8 Jul 1827.⁴⁰ At that sale, among others were Dorothy Heady, Lewis Heady, James Heady, William Conner, and George Medsker. Lewis Heady's name is spelled several different ways, but it is assumed they are all one person.

James¹ Heady was one of those early pioneers who carved their home out of the wilderness. What we know about him is mostly from inference. It is believed that he was born in Fayette County, Pennsylvania, about the time of the American Revolution. This was in Southwestern Pennsylvania, and had only recently been settled by white man. That he was born in Fayette County is inferred from the fact that his father owned land there and was recorded in the 1790 census. In 1792 his father moved to Nelson County, Kentucky, which is near Louisville. Kentucky became a state in 1792, but Nelson County was still on the frontier. We know that James was industrious because, as previously stated, his father's will provides that he is to be reimbursed for improvements on his father's land.

Hamilton County Be it remembered that on the 25th day of June AD 1827, personally came before me Frances Kincaid a justice of the peace in and for said County two respectable freeholders of the neighborhood of James Heady Deceased, late of said County, and who were duly sworn to appraise all the goods and chattels of same Deceased proper to be appraised, which might be produced to them by Dorothy heady (sic) the administratrix of the estate of said deceased. As witness my hand and seal this 17th day of June 1827

We the appraisers

Thomas Morris Joseph Eller Thomas West James Heady was independent and apparently enjoyed living on the frontier. This is indicated by the fact that he left home about 1804 to obtain land in western Ohio, which had recently been opened for settlement. Then he moved two more times to newly opened land. He reminds me of a Blue Grass tune about a man who keeps moving because "he cannot abide the sound of his neighbor's ax." He probably did not have a formal education but he was well versed in the requirements for living in the wilderness. Had he not died in 1827, this story might be about some place in Illinois or further West.

In 1820, James and Dorotha had eight children, six boys and two girls. In the next six years, they had three more, two boys and a girl. There may have been another boy alive in 1820 that did not live to have a family. As previously stated the 1820 U.S. census shows seven males in addition to the head of household. The Eleven children that will be discussed in this book are those that were living in Hamilton County in 1830 and following years. These are all named in the settlement of the estate of Dorotha Heady on 3 Jan 1866. That Dorotha Heady is James Heady's wife is proven by her being named administratrix of James' estate 7 Jun 1827.⁴¹ As previously discussed, the court clerk called her the widow of James Heady.

The children of James and Dorotha Heady are as follows. Their birth dates were determined as discussed in the chapters devoted to each child:

The children of Dorotha Heady are identified in the proof of heirship and order of distribution for Dorotha Heady's estate that was conducted on Wednesday, 3 January 1866, in the Hamilton County Court of Common Pleas. The Charles Heady giving evidence in the hearing is Charles Wesley Heady, executor and son of James² Heady. It reads, in part, (punctuation and spelling is as found in the document):⁴²

Comes now into open Court Charles Heady and makes proof of heirship by his own oath that James Heady Andrew J. Heady Polly Redwine and Sallie Ann Eller are the living children of the decedent That Sarah Castetter Fanny J. Heady Joseph P. Heady William W. Heady Isaac Heady Polly Ann Heady and Amanda Heady and Hannah McDaniel deceased are the children of Vincent Heady deceased who was a son of the decedent Doritha Heady That Polly Ann McDaniel and Vincent McDaniel and one other name unknown are the children of Hannah McDaniel deceased Who was a daughter of Vincent Heady deceased who was a son of the deceased Doritha Heady That Melinda Lewis Ann Brandon who has deceased her child also dead leaving David Brandon as her heir Doritha Heady John W. Heady who has deceased since the death of the decedent Doritha Heady and who is represented by N. Chapman administrator James Franklin Heady and Angeline Heady are the children of Mark Heady deceased who was a son of the deceased Dorotha Heady That Jane McKnabb Calvin Heady Harriet Duke George Heady and Mahala Hollingsworth are the children of Lewis Heady deceased who was a son of the decedent Dorothe Heady That America Rooker Julia anna Heady and Malinda Heady are the children of Thomas Heady deceased who was a son of the decedent Dorotha Heady That Caroline Coppic who has deceased leaving her husband John Coppic and Henry Coppic And Joseph H Coppic her children as her heirs and Lucretia Castetter are the children of Betsy Redwine deceased who was a daughter of the decedent Dorotha Heady That Perry Heady deceased was a son of the decedent Daretha Heady and who is represented by Jacob Castetter his administrator That Nancy Ann Fauscett is a daughter of Charles Heady deceased who was a son of the decedent Dorotha Heady And that these are the heirs and the only heirs of the deceased.

It would make reading and understanding better had the court clerk been more generous with commas and periods. Also, the spellings and capitalizations have been written as nearly as was found in the original. Never the less, the relationships of the various parties are easy to determine. This particular document has been quite helpful in resolving some questions that will affect the subsequent chapters.

Dorotha Heady was born about 1786 in Massachusetts. Her birth date and place of birth are derived from the 1850 and 1860 U.S. censuses for Hamilton County, Indiana.⁴³ According to Martha Castetter Heady (see Appendix II) she was born in Vermont, but her birthplace is probably Massachusetts, since Dorotha probably gave that information to the census taker herself. An examination of vital records for Massachusetts Counties available in the Los Angeles Public Library failed to find a Dorothy Harvey or similar name for the time of her birth. However, there were a number of Harveys and Herveys.

She died before 15 Mar 1863 when her estate was entered into probate.⁴⁴ Her place of burial has not been found, nor has that of her husband, James.

Dorotha Heady was an outstanding person. I believe the success of the Heady family in Hamilton county is largely due to her influence. Because the recorded information is sparse one needs to read between the lines of what is available, mostly census and court records. She was married when she was sixteen and went into the wilderness of Ohio with her husband to establish a home. Just when the land was cleared and they were getting settled, they moved to Indiana. This probably occurred in 1814. She would have given birth to four boys and a girl by 1814, who ranged from one to twelve in age. Then about 1820, they moved again to what became Hamilton County, Indiana. Now there were six boys and two girls. While establishing their home in Hamilton County another boy and girl were born. Then in 1826 the last child, a boy, Perry, was born, just a year before his father died.

When James Heady died, Dorotha was left with ten or eleven children. Perry, was less than a year old. The oldest, Lewis, was probably 24 and indications are that he was married by this time and living in his own home. The next oldest son of James and Dorotha, James, Jr., was about 20. Both Lewis and James were at the sale of their father's property.⁴⁵ In the 1830 U.S. census for Hamilton Co., Indiana, two Heady families were listed, that of Lewis and that of Dorothy. In Dorothy's household, there are seven males and five females. All the females are accounted for except one that is under five years of age. As will be discussed in Chapter 3, this could be Caroline, the daughter of Elizabeth.

In 1827, when James¹ died, he was 47-52 years old and Dorotha was about 41.Dorotha handled this situation quite well. She administered her late husbands estate in a fairly businesslike manner, although she didn't complete it in a timely fashion. She was called into court in 1851 because the estate was still open.⁴⁶ At this time the probate was closed, but no record of final settlement has been found. There never was a final settlement with a naming of heirs. There may not have been anything to distribute. However, in November, 1827, Dorothy Heady bought 80 acres of land at the Indianapolis land Office (the W1/2 SE1/4 S35 T18N R4E) at a cost of 100 dollars. James, Mark, Vincent, and Mary's husband, David Redwine, also bought land from the government in the next seven years.

The only mention of Dorotha in Hamilton County histories is that a meeting of the M. E. church was held at her house in 1829.⁴⁷ Later we learn that there is a Heady school and a Heady Cemetery. One imagines that it was Dorotha who had these set aside. She raised her family and by 1850 they had all married, except Andrew. But Lewis, Elizabeth, and Mark were dead.

In 1850, we find Elizabeth's children and Dorotha's son Andrew living with Dorotha. As shown in the following summary of the census:

Dorotha Heady was an admirable person. She had a large family all but one of whom (Andrew Jackson) married and had families (Andrew did have a son who was successful and had a family). She took part in community activities. When members of the family had hardship, they could turn to her. She must have been a good business woman as well. When her husband died, his estate was valued at \$349.50 but only \$134 was realized in the estate sale, exclusive of what was bought by Dorotha and her sons Lewis and James. There may have been some money that would not have been counted in the inventory. The 80 acres of land she bought in 1827 cost 100 dollars, cash. When she died in 1863, there was \$811 left to distribute among her heirs after the debts were paid. Many estates during this time were declared insolvent and nothing was left for the heirs.

Lewis Heady

2. Lewis² Heady (*James¹*) was born about 1802, probably in Kentucky. His birth date is determined using the 1820 U.S. census where one male in the James Heady enumeration is 16-18 years old. In later censuses, the other Heady males are all born after 1805 leaving only Lewis to be born 1802-1804. He died before December, 1840, when his estate was entered into probate. Lewis' wife was named Charity Hardesty.⁴⁹ Charity was born 27 Mar 1805 and died 18 Jul 1896.⁵⁰ A marriage record for Lewis and Charity has not been found, although marriage records for the counties around Hamilton County have been examined. Marriage records for Hamilton County are not available until 1833. Their marriage probably occurred in 1824, because their oldest child, Jane, was born about 1825.

Little is recorded about Lewis. Although he is the oldest son, he never bought land in Hamilton County. He is enumerated in the 1830 U.S. census.⁵¹ There are three males in his household and two females, as shown in the following table.

The male 0-5 would be Calvin, who would be two years old. The male 10-15 has not been identified, but he is too old to be a child of Lewis and Charity. The male 20-30 is Lewis. The female 5-10 would be Jane, who is 5, and the female 20-30 is Charity.

Besides the census, there are three other records of Lewis in Hamilton county. In the first, he is indicted on 16 April 1827 for assault and battery with intent to commit murder. There were two counts to the indictment. Both took place on 15 March 1827 and involved William Price. Lewis Heady was accused of making an assault on William

Price both times and "...in a rude and angry manner unlawfully did touch strike beat and wound and other wrongs to him the said William Price..." Lewis Heady pleaded not guilty to the charges as stated. The jury found him guilty of the second charge, which involved only assault. He was fined one dollar and sentenced to 20 days in jail. The Final Report, which was consulted, did not give Lewis Heady's side of the story, and time did not permit further research.⁵²

Lewis bought a few items at the estate sale of his father's personal belongings in 1827.⁵³ Then an L. W. Heady is recorded as voting in a Marion County election in 1831.⁵⁴ In 1832 Lewis Heady witnessed two real estate sales. These were between his mother and his brother James.⁵⁵ His name on the real estate transactions was Lewis W. Heady. So he is presumed to be the voter in the Marion County election. Another Hamilton County resident, **Samuel Rooker**, also voted in the Marion County election. No other record has been found of Lewis until December 1840 when his wife started a probate of his estate.⁵⁶

The six children of Lewis and Charity Heady are:

The U. S. census of 1840 for Hamilton county includes several Headys, but not Lewis. Charity is recorded with two males and three females, besides herself.⁵⁷ Is Lewis dead at this time? The census presumably was performed during the summer. But the probate for Lewis was not entered until December.

This census presents another puzzle. Lewis and Charity had four daughters. The oldest is Jane who would be 15. But there isn't a female 10-15 or 15-20 in this enumeration. Where is she? As will be shown, there is a female 10-15 in James² Heady's family that could not be James'. This could be Jane.

The next record of Charity Heady's family is the 1850 U. S. census. In this census, there are two boys and three girls. This family is living in Marion County, Washington Township.⁵⁸ Washington Township is the township below Delaware Township in Hamilton County. Jane has married **Stephen McNabb** by this time and is living with him. Charity and the other five children are in the Washington Township enumeration. A **Reason Hardesty** is living in a nearby dwelling. Is he related to Charity? Some time after the census, Charity and her children, except Jane, left Marion County.

Additional information has been found concerning all members of this family except Sarah. She may have married, but no record has been found in Marion, Hamilton, or Howard County. Also, there was no mention of Sarah in Dorotha Heady's estate settlement. This could mean that she was dead without issue, or that she was not Lewis' child. She is included as a child of Lewis and Charity because the 1840 census shows a girl her age and the 1850 census shows her with the surname Heady.

A Charity Heady is listed in a marriage license with a Nathan Comer in Howard County, Indiana, in 1851, but there was no return in the record.⁵⁹ In 1860 the only Nathan Comer of the right age is in Tipton County and married to a different person. Charity has not been found in the 1860 census, but she is in the 1870 and 1880 censuses. In 1870 she is living in Howard County with Oliver Hollingsworth, Mahala's husband.⁶⁰ In 1880, she is living in Howard County with Andrew Duke, Harriet's husband, she is 75 years old.⁶¹ In both the 1870 and 1880 census records she is listed with the surname Heady.

On 12 October 1876, Charity Heady was received into membership of the Union Monthly Meeting of The Society of Friends (Quakers).⁶² Her daughter Mahala and her family had previously joined. She remained a member in good standing until her death, which was recorded in the Union Monthly Meeting record book.⁶³

At a meeting of the old settlers of Howard County on Saturday, October 4, 1879, County Auditor **Moreland** was requested to keep a record of old settlers of Howard County.⁶⁴ Included in that record is "Charity Heady, born Mar 27, 1805, in North Carolina, age 75, 60 years in Indiana, 20 years in Howard County, present residence, Taylor Township."⁶⁵ Her birth date here and in the Quaker records agree, but her birth place does not. Based on census records, the North Carolina birth place is considered correct.

Charity Heady is buried in Crown Point Cemetery, Kokomo, IN, in the same plot as the Duke family. Her headstone, which reads "Mother Charity Heady," is shown to the right. This indicates to me that she was highly regarded by her children.

Lewis Heady is presumed to be buried in the Heady Cemetery in Hamilton County, Indiana, but his grave site has not been found. Surveys of other early Hamilton County cemeteries did not contain his name.

These were hard times and it is remarkable that these families did so well. When Lewis died in 1840, he left little for his family. Charity had six children to care for, one was only two years old. She must have had help from family members, but we must admire her for what she accomplished. All her children, except Sarah married, had families, and were good citizens.

13. Jane³ Heady (*Lewis²*, *James¹*) was born about 1825, probably in Hamilton County, Indiana,⁶⁶ and died 1 Mar 1884 in Marion County, Indiana.⁶⁷ She married Stephen McNabb in Hamilton County, Indiana, 16 Apr 1846.⁶⁸ He was born 18 Jan 1820 in Kentucky, and died 22 Dec 1882 in Marion County, Indiana.⁶⁹

The only Stephen McNabb found in the 1850 U.S. census for Indiana is in Johnson Co.⁷⁰ His family has the following composition:⁷¹

The names, ages, and birthplaces of Stephen and Jane show that these are the same persons that are in Indianapolis in subsequent census records. But in 1860 neither James nor William are shown. They are presumed to have died before 1860.

In the 1850 census Stephen's occupation is brickmolder. In the 1860 census his occupation is master brickmaker.⁷² In 1870 he is a baggage master. From the value of real estate he has in each census, he must have been reasonably successful.

Stephen and Jane McNabb had seven children:⁷³

- vi. Mahala A., b. ca. 1859; m. 14 Jul 1878 in Marion Co., IN, George L. Carey.⁷⁸
- vii. Clara V., b. ca. 1859; d. Before 1870 U.S. census. Mahala and Clara were twins.

14. Calvin³ Heady (Lewis², James¹) was born 22 Mar 1829 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 6 Jan 1886 in Howard County, Indiana.⁷⁹ He is buried in the Heady cemetery in Hamilton County, Indiana. He married first Nancy Ann Cardwell 14 Apr 1851 in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁸⁰ Nancy Ann Cardwell was born 9 Mar 1833 in Indiana and died 5 Mar 1866, in Hamilton County.⁸¹ She is buried in the Heady Cemetery next to Calvin. The parents of Nancy have not been identified, but they could be Noah and Anna Cardwell. Anna Cardwell died 7 Oct 1839 and is buried in McKay Cemetery, Hamilton County, Indiana.⁸² Noah Cardwell was 75 years old and living with James Heady in 1870. His death date and burial have not been found.

The first record found of Nancy Ann Cardwell is in the 1850 census where she is enumerated with James Heady (see Chapter 4). In the 1860 U.S. Population Census, Calvin Heady, Nancy, and their children are in Delaware Township, Hamilton County.⁸³ Calvin Heady's occupation is farmer. The 1860 Agricultural Census shows he has 40 acres under cultivation, but there is no evidence in recorded deeds that he owned land. He continued living in Hamilton County until sometime after 1870, because he is found in the 1870 census.⁸⁴ In 1870 he still did not own land, but his occupation was farmer.

Children of Calvin and Nancy Ann Heady are:85

Calvin Heady married second 5 Sep 1866 **Diana Weaver** in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁹⁸ She was born about 1829, in Pennsylvania, the daughter of **Peter and Molly Weaver**.⁹⁹ The Calvin Heady family moved to Taylor Township, Howard County, Indiana, before September 1875 when Stephen Heady died. They appear in the 1880 U.S. census for Howard County, Indiana.¹⁰⁰ He did not buy land when he first moved to Howard County. Then, in 1884, he bought 20 acres.¹⁰¹ Calvin Heady died 6 Jan 1886 in Howard Co., IN.¹⁰² No probate was found of his estate. Later Diana sold the property to Calvin's sons, Noah and Peter.

Diana Heady continued living in Howard County and was residing with her son Peter in 1894.¹⁰³ She died at Olio, Fall Creek Township, Hamilton County, 5 Sep 1895 and is buried in the Spannuth Cemetery in Hamilton County with other Weavers.¹⁰⁴

One child was born to Calvin and Diana Heady:

- i. Peter⁴ W., b. Oct 1867, in Hamilton Co., IN,¹⁰⁵ d. 26 Jan 1930 in Howard Co., IN, and buried in Crown Point Cemetery;¹⁰⁶ m. 30 Aug 1895 in Howard Co., IN, Lydia Spurgeon, b. Jun 1872 in IN.¹⁰⁷ Peter was a brick layer by trade. His hobby was raising prize poultry, which may have been responsible for his death. One of his thumbs became infected and he died of blood poisoning. His obituary said that he may have been pecked on the thumb by one of his hens a week before his death. Peter and Lydia Heady had one child:
 - i. **Clarence⁵ L.**, b. 17 Nov 1893, d. 20 Mar 1895, buried Crown Point Cemetery.¹⁰⁸ His headstone reads "Roy 1893-1895."

15. Harriet³ Heady (*Lewis²*, *James¹*) was born in 1832,¹⁰⁹ probably in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 22 Apr 1922 in Noblesville, Indiana.¹¹⁰ Harriet and Andrew Jackson Duke were married 6 December 1854 in Marion Co., Indiana.¹¹¹ He was born 3 Sep 1832 and died 19 Jun 1885 in Howard County, Indiana.¹¹² Both Harriet and Andrew are buried in Crown Point Cemetery. A small stone next to his headstone reads "A J Duke Co K Ind Inf." Andrew was a cabinet maker and the son of Samuel and Jane Duke, who were born in Ireland.¹¹³

In 1860 Andrew and Harriet lived in Noblesville, Hamilton County, and in 1870 and 1880 they were living in Howard County, Indiana.¹¹⁴ The 1874 map of Howard County shows A. J. Duke owning 40 acres. Andrew and Harriet Duke are buried in Crown Point Cemetery in Kokomo, Indiana.

The children of Andrew and Harriet Duke are:115

- i. **James⁴ H.**, b. 12 Dec 1856, d. 6 Oct 1911 in Howard Co., IN;¹¹⁶ m. 16 Sep 1889 in Howard Co., IN, Alice Hinkle,¹¹⁷ b. 23 Sep 1868, d. 12 Nov 1952 in Howard Co., IN, daughter of **John and Mary [Wisher] Hinkle**. Alice Duke is buried in Crown Point Cemetery.¹¹⁸ She was widowed at the age of 43 and raised nine children on a 40 acre farm. She was a lifelong member of the Macedonia Christian Church.
- ii. Charity J., b. ca. 1858, prob. in Hamilton Co., IN; m. 12 Nov 1884 in Howard Co., IN, James W. Seburn,¹¹⁹ b. ca. 1849 son of James Seburn.¹²⁰
- iii. Leotia, b. ca. 1863; m. 16 Aug 1883 William E. Brobst.¹²¹
- iv. Calvin F., b. ca. 1864. m. 17 Oct 1894 in Marion Co., IN, Barbara Masner b. ca. 1867,¹²² daughter of Simon and Kate [Griener] Masner.¹²³

16. George³ W. Heady (*Lewis²*, *James¹*) was born about 1836 in Hamilton County, Indiana. He married Edny Jane Ashbrook 14 Jan 1858 in Marion County, Indiana.¹²⁴ She was born about 1840 in Indiana. In the 1860 and 1870 censuses the George Heady Family are enumerated in Hamilton County, Indiana.¹²⁵ George Heady was also a farmer. In the 1860 Agricultural Census for Hamilton County, Indiana, he had 25 acres under cultivation. But no record has been found of his owning land in Hamilton County.

Between 1870 and 1880 this family moved to Howard County, Indiana, as did the Calvin Heady family. George and Edny Jane must have died before 1880. In the 1880 census they are not found and their children are each living with a different family. No land record or probate was found in the Howard County Courthouse for George Heady, nor was there a guardianship for his children.

Children of George and Edny Jane Heady are:¹²⁶

- Mahala⁴ (Ella or Ellen), b. ca. 1859 prob. in Hamilton Co., IN, m. John R. Hickman.¹²⁷ No record has been found of this marriage, although adjoining counties have been searched. In the I880 U.S. Census Mahala is living with Emily Swisher as a boarder, her occupation is bonnet and hat clerk.¹²⁸ No record was found for John R. Hickman in the 1900 census or any other record in the Kokomo Public Library.
- 19 ii. Thomas, b. 27 Aug 1861; m. (1) Clara Belle White and (2) Cora A. Wilson.
 - iii. Clara, b. ca. 1864 prob. in Hamilton Co., IN, m. 4 Jul 1883 Silas Klepfer, b. ca. 1861 son of Elias Klepfer.¹²⁹ In 1880 Clara Heady, 14, is enumerated with Chas Edwards, relationship adopted daughter.¹³⁰ One child was found for Silas and Clara Klepfer:
 - i. male⁵, b. 27 Jan 1884.¹³¹
- 20 iv. Oliver Clinton, b. 22 Jan 1868; m. Oda Mae Hanna.

17. Mahala³ Heady (*Lewis²*, *James¹*) was born 25 Apr 1838 in Hamilton County, Indiana.¹³² She married James Oliver Hollingsworth 3 Nov 1861 in Howard County, Indiana.¹³³ He was born 30 Jun 1832 in Union County, Indiana, the son of William and Susanna Hollingsworth. On 11 May 1876 James O. and Mahala Hollingsworth and their three youngest children, Harriet, George, and Alice, were received into membership by the Society of Friends Union Monthly Meeting.¹³⁴ No further information about James and Mahala has been found.

Children of James Oliver and Mahala Hollingsworth are:¹³⁵

- i. Flora⁴, b. ca. 1863 in Howard Co., IN; m. 1 Oct 1885 in Howard Co., IN, Edward T. Hatton, b. ca. 1866 son of James H. and R. [Shoemaker] Hatton.¹³⁶
- Harriet M., b. 3 Oct 1864 in Howard Co., 1N; m. 6 Sep 1883 in Howard Co., IN, Walter K. Nicholson, b. ca. 1859 son of John and Jane [Kendall] Nicholson.¹³⁷
- iii. **George**, b. 27 Oct 1870 in Howard Co., IN; d. 13 Dec 1913, buried in Crown Point Cemetery.¹³⁸
- iv. Callie Alice, b. 13 Nov 1876 in Howard Co., IN,¹³⁹ d. 4 Nov 1940 in Howard Co., IN;¹⁴⁰ m. (1) 6 Feb 1892 in Howard Co., IN, Edwin M. Gibson, b. ca. 1864,¹⁴¹ d. 9 Nov 1906.¹⁴² Children of Edwin and Callie Gibson are:¹⁴³
 - i. ____(F)⁵, b. 16 Jun 1893. ii. ____(M), b. 31 Jul 1895.

Callie m. (2) 2 Jun 1907 in Howard Co., IN,¹⁴⁴ Squire W. Harris, b. 28 Jun 1875.¹⁴⁵ Edwin, Callie, and Squire are all buried in Crownpoint Cemetery, Kokomo, IN.¹⁴⁶ One child of Squire and Callie Harris has been found:

iii. Flora⁵ Leota, b. 7 Jun 1914.¹⁴⁷

18. Charles⁴ W. Heady (*Calvin³*, *Lewis²*, *James¹*) was born May 1861, probably in Hamilton County, Indiana. His death probably occurred in 1945 in Howard County, Indiana.¹⁴⁸ Charles Heady was married twice. His first marriage was to Tillie Lindley on 15 Mar 1883 in Howard County, Indiana.¹⁴⁹ She was born about 1863, and died 30 Aug 1892, in Kokomo, Howard County, Indiana.¹⁵⁰ Howard County birth records show one female child (later named Wilda) born to Charles and Tillie Heady:

i. Wilda⁵, b. 19 Feb 1884 prob. in Howard Co., IN.¹⁵¹ In the 1900 U.S. census, Wilda, 16, is living with Nancy Lindley, her grandmother, in Liberty Twp., Howard Co., IN.¹⁵²

Charles, Tillie, and Wilda are buried in the Greenlawn Cemetery, Howard County Indiana, but there are no dates.¹⁵³

Charles Heady's second marriage was to Hannah Frances Gibbens on 1 Nov 1894 in Howard County, Indiana.¹⁵⁴ She was born Aug 1858.¹⁵⁵ Her father and mother were

James and Elizabeth Gibbens. She died 4 Feb 1938 and is buried in Crown Point Cemetery, Kokomo, Indiana.¹⁵⁶ Charles and Hannah Heady had one child:

i. Goldie⁵ M., b. Dec. 1889 prob. in Howard Co., IN;¹⁵⁷ m. 27 Feb 1909 in Howard Co., IN, Edward H. Lurker, b. 18 Sep 1886.¹⁵⁸

19. Thomas⁴ A. Heady (*George³*, *Lewis²*, *James¹*) was born 27 Aug 1861 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 15 May 1927 in Howard Co., Indiana.¹⁵⁹ He was married to two women. The first marriage was to **Clara Belle White** on 15 Feb 1885 in Howard County, Indiana.¹⁶⁰ She was born about 1865, and died 13 Jan 1900 in Howard County, Indiana.¹⁶¹ Thomas Heady was living in Clay Township, Howard County in the 1880 U.S. census. He was living with **Robert M. Long** and his occupation was farmer.¹⁶² Later he moved to Kokomo and apparently met with financial reversals. He bought a lot in Kokomo that was later sold for taxes.¹⁶³

Children of Thomas A. and Clara Belle Heady are:164

- i. **Pearl⁵ Don**, b. 9 Jan 1886 in Howard Co., IN,¹⁶⁵ d. 20 Dec 1922 in Indianapolis, IN, buried in Crown Point Cemetery, Kokomo, IN;¹⁶⁶ m. 11 Nov 1916 Eva Hillman, b. 20 May 1896.¹⁶⁷
- ii. **Myrem E.**, b. 29 Jan 1888 in Howard CO., IN,¹⁶⁸ d. 26 Nov 1890 in Howard Co., IN, buried Crown Point Cemetery.¹⁶⁹
- iii. **Omer D.**, b. 7 Oct 1891 in Howard Co., IN,¹⁷⁰ d. 8 Jan 1892 in Howard Co., IN, buried Crown Point Cemetery.¹⁷¹

Thomas Heady married again on 8 Feb 1909, in Howard County, Indiana, **Cora A. Wilson**, who was born in 1876 and died in 1957.¹⁷² Thomas and Cora Heady are buried together in the Crown Point Cemetery. At the time of his death in 1927, he was a farmer living Southwest of Kokomo.

One child was born to Thomas A. and Cora Heady:

iv. Clara⁵ Belle, b. 5 Aug 1911 in Howard Co., IN,¹⁷³ d. 22 Mar 1966, prob. in Tipton, Co., IN,¹⁷⁴ buried in Fairview Cemetery, Tipton Co., IN; m. 23 Nov 1932 L. Dow Chapelle, b. 12 Oct 1891, d. 20 Nov 1949, also buried in Fairview Cemetery.¹⁷⁵ She probably married a second time because her name in the burial record is Clara Belle Chapelle Lewis.

20. Oliver⁴ Clinton Heady (George³, Lewis², James¹) was born 22 Jan 1868 in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 24 May 1940 in Howard County, Indiana.¹⁷⁶ About 1875, his family moved to Howard County. Not long after arriving in Howard County, his mother and father died. He and his brother and sisters lived with different families, as shown in

in the 1880 census and previously discussed. Oliver was living in Harrison Township, Howard County, with **George P. Pitzer**.¹⁷⁷ He was eleven years old. His relationship to George Pitzer was listed as laborer and his occupation was farm laborer. As shown above, Oliver's cousin, Noah Heady married Myrtle Pitzer. No attempt has been made to determine if a relationship exists between Myrtle Pitzer and George Pitzer.

On 16 March 1893 Oliver Clinton Heady and Oda Mae Hanna were married in Howard County, Indiana.¹⁷⁸ Oda Mae Hanna was born in May 1876 on a farm southwest of Kokomo on the Alto road. She was the daughter of Thomas J. and Louisa [Moore] Hanna.¹⁷⁹ She died 30 June 1938 on a farm near Cassville, Indiana.¹⁸⁰

Nothing has been found about Oliver Clinton Heady between the 1880 census and his marriage to Oda Mae. But he must have been industrious, because in 1894 he bought several lots in Alto. Sometime after their marriage, they moved to Carroll County where they appear in the 1900 U.S. census.¹⁸¹ Oliver lists his occupation as farmer. But he soon returned to Howard County and started a livery business. He was successful at this business and a short biography about him is included in the Jackson Morrow History of Howard County. He continued the livery business until about 1926 when they moved to a farm near Cassville, Indiana.

His grand daughter remembers visiting at their farm:¹⁸²

All I remember of Grandfather Heady is he was a tall man, at times cranky but also very loving and nice... In the winter he used to pull us on a big sled like thing that he used to pull the slop for the pigs. He would put all three of us on it and slide down the hill and across the creek into the snow bank.

Oliver Clinton and Oda Mae Heady are buried in Crown Point Cemetery, Kokomo, Indiana. They had one child:¹⁸³

Thomas⁵ Carl, b. 5 Sep 1897 in Howard Co., IN, d. 17 Jun 1968; m. 9 Sep 1919 Jeannesse Sumption, b. 4 Dec 1892, d. 13 Feb 1972, daughter of John and Julia C. Sumption.¹⁸⁴ Thomas grew up and was educated in Kokomo. During World War I, he entered the Army 1 Sep 1918 and was discharged August 1919. He attained the rank of Sergeant Major. In civilian life he was a successful businessman until his retirement in 1965. He and his wife are buried in Crown Point Cemetery, Kokomo, Indiana.

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CHAPTER 3

Elizabeth Heady

3. Elizabeth² Heady (*James¹*) was born between 1804 and 1810, based on the 1820 census, probably in Butler Co., Ohio. She died before October, 1837. Since James² Heady was born in 1807, she is assumed to have been born in 1805. She married **Frederick Redwine** before 1835 and possibly as early as 1828. Direct information about Elizabeth Heady has not been found in legal documents, except the final settlement of Dorotha Heady's estate. We know that Dorotha Heady had a deceased daughter called "Betsy" from the naming of heirs of Dorotha's estate reproduced in Chapter 1. From the same document, we know that "Betsie" married a man named Redwine. **Martha Heady**, wife of **Alfred Tennyson Heady**,¹⁸⁵ gives her name as Elizabeth and identifies her husband as Frederick Redwine.

The date of her marriage is estimated from the birth dates of her daughters. Her oldest daughter was born about 1829 and her youngest daughter about 1836. There is evidence that the oldest daughter may not be Frederick Redwine's, as discussed below. The death date of Elizabeth [Heady] Redwine is assumed from the date of a license for a second marriage of Frederick Redwine that was applied for in 1837.

Frederick Redwine was born between 1803 and 1808, probably in Virginia, based on census information. He died 16 Aug 1877 in Hamilton County, Indiana.¹⁸⁶ He is first placed in Hamilton County, Indiana, on 25 July 1834, when he witnessed a deed.¹⁸⁷ Then on 3 Sep 1834 he officiated at the wedding of Vincent Heady and Polly Ann Richardson (see chapter 6). He signed Frederick Redwine, MG (Minister of Gospel). He officiated at two other weddings in the same time period. In March, 1836, he bought 40 acres of land from **Alexander Bovard**.¹⁸⁸ In 1837 he was a Justice of the Peace in Hamilton County. There are advertisements in several issues of *The Newspaper* (the name of the local paper) in the summer of that year signed F. Redwine, J.P. In the fall, the advertisements signed by him ceased.

On 26 Oct 1837, he took out a license to marry Sally Smith at the Hamilton County Courthouse.¹⁸⁹ It is presumed that Elizabeth is dead at this time. A return was never made to this license so it is possible that the marriage never occurred. A Frederick Redwine did marry an Elizabeth W. Butler in Marion County, Indiana, on 21 Dec

1837.¹⁹⁰ Then on 9 Jan 1838, Frederick Redwine sold his forty acres of land in Hamilton County, Indiana, to Charles H. Heady. Elizabeth Redwine, his wife, co-signed the deed.¹⁹¹

It appears that Frederick Redwine moved to Clinton County, Indiana, because in the 1840 census, there is a Frederick Redwine in Clinton County.¹⁹²

The person recording this page of the census got his birthplaces off by one line. Frederick was born in Virginia and Elizabeth in Kentucky. So Henry must have been born in Ohio. That the birthplaces are wrong is deduced from the fact that the occupation "well digger" is on the same line as Elizabeth.

The 1860 census index does not record a Frederick Redwine in Indiana. There is a **James Redwine**, 22, and wife, **Lucy** in Clinton County.¹⁹⁴ **Sarah Redwine** is living with Caroline Coppock (Elizabeth Heady's daughter) in Adams Township, Hamilton County, Indiana (discussed below). The census taker recorded the last name of the Coppock family as Topick, but the composition of the family identifies them as Coppock. Does

the fact that Sarah Redwine is living with the Coppock family indicate a relationship between Caroline and Sarah?

There are problems with the census information. The 1840 census had only one boy 0-5 living with Frederick Redwine. But Henry and James are both in the same age group. Henry is too old to be the son of Elizabeth [Butler] and Frederick Redwine (married Dec 1837 and Henry born 1835 or 1836). Neither Henry nor James is named as an heir of Dorotha Heady. James Redwine was alive in 1870 and living in Hamilton County married to **Sarah [Harrison] McKinstry Redwine**.¹⁹⁵ Henry could be dead by 1866 when Dorotha Heady's Estate was settled, but he is probably Elizabeth Butler's son by a previous marriage and not a Redwine at all. James is probably the son of Elizabeth [Butler] and Frederick Redwine.

There is a Frederick Redwine recorded in the 1870 Hamilton County, census. His age is 67 and he is living in the household that includes **Humphrey Lacey** and family.¹⁹⁶ It is assumed that all these Frederick Redwines are the same person. Frederick Redwine died 16 Aug 1877. The *Noblesville Ledger* reported:¹⁹⁷

Another pioneer gone.-Last night Mr. Frederick Redwine, one of the early settlers of this county, passed away. His demise occurred about eleven o'clock last evening. His friends followed his remains to their last resting place this evening. Brother Redwine had been a consistent member of the M.E. church....The deceased leaves several grown up children all of whom are married.

Children of Elizabeth Heady are:

- 21 i. Caroline³ Heady, b. ca. 1829, m. John Coppock.
 - ii. Lucretia Redwine, b. *ca*. 1836; m. Jacob M. Castetter (see chapter 13 for this family).

21. Caroline³ Heady (*Elizabeth²*, James¹) was born about 1829 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana.¹⁹⁸ She died between June 1860, when the census was taken, and 3 Jan 1866 when Dorotha Heady's estate was settled. She may have been an illegitimate child of Elizabeth. She is enumerated with Dorothy Heady in the 1850 census and her surname is Heady. Her marriage record lists her as Caroline Heady. At the same time her sister, Lucretia uses the surname Redwine in her marriage license.

Caroline Heady married John Coppock 18 Sep 1851 in Hamilton Co., Indiana.¹⁹⁹ John Coppock was born 5 Apr 1831 in Indiana, the son of Isaac and Elizabeth [Richardson] Coppock.²⁰⁰ Elizabeth Richardson is the older sister to Polly Ann Richardson who married Vincent Heady (see Chapter 6). John Coppock died 5 Jan 1886 and is buried in East Union Cemetery, Hamilton County, Indiana.²⁰¹ The John Coppock family is recorded in the 1860 census in Adams Township, Hamilton County, Indiana. The last

name is incorrectly recorded as **Topick**. The census record of this fsmily is shown in the following table.

Children of John and Caroline Coppock are:

- i. Isaac⁴, b. 20 Sep 1853 prob. in Hamilton Co., IN, d. 28 Oct 1854, buried in Heady Cemetery.²⁰²
- Henry, b. Apr 1856, in Hamilton Co., IN, d. 1 Oct 1912, buried in East Union Cemetery in an unmarked grave;²⁰³ m. (1) 10 Jun 1875 in Hamilton Co., IN, Clara E. Perry,²⁰⁴ m. (2) 3 May 1880 in Hamilton Co., IN, Emma J. Frey,²⁰⁵ (1858-1933), m. (3) 5 May 1907 in Tipton Co., IN, Mrs. Louisa [Hickman] Varnes (1854-1914).²⁰⁶ His marriage to Emma was dissolved in divorce 5 Oct 1900. The action was instituted by Emma and the court ruled that she was entitled to a divorce because of Henry's drunkeness.²⁰⁷
- Joseph H., b. Sep 1857, in Indiana, d. 1940, buried in Fairview Cemetery, Tipton, Tipton, Co., 1N; m. 1 Dec 1881 Mary C. Hinkle, b. Mar 1860, d. 11 Feb 1953, buried in Fairview Cemetery.²⁰⁸

In 1870, John Coppock is living in Tipton County, Indiana and has a new wife, Nancy. On 22 Oct 1864 John Coppick (sic) and **Nancy Herrold** were married. She was born 8 Jan 1838 and died 14 Sep 1898. Nancy Coppock buried in East Union Cemetery, Hamilton County Indiana, next to John Coppock.²⁰⁹

One child, a son, has been found for John and Nancy Coppock:²¹⁰

iv. John Wesley, b. Apr 1865, d. 6 Mar 1952, buried in East Union Cemetery in Hamilton Co., IN.²¹¹

The John Copick (sic) family is included in the 1870 US census for Tipton County, Indiana, shown in the following table.²¹²

Chapter 4

JAMES HEADY

4. James² Heady (*James¹*) was born 30 Jul 1807, probably in Butler County, Ohio, and died 2 Nov 1873 in Hamilton County, Indiana.²¹³ He married about 1831 **Polly Snodgrass**. She was born about 1809 and died 29 Mar 1844 in Hamilton County, Indiana. James and Polly are buried in the Heady Cemetery and share a monument.²¹⁴ Birth and death dates for James and Polly Heady are derived from that monument. The inscription for James is on one side and that for Polly is on the other. The figure to the right shows the side of the monument with James Heady's inscription (see Appendix III for the survey of the Heady cemetery).

The record of this marriage was not found, although counties surrounding Hamilton County were searched (Hamilton County marriage records begin in 1833). The date of their marriage is assumed based on the birth of their first child, Charles, on 10 Sep 1832. The maiden name of Polly is provided by Martha [Castetter] Heady (see Appendix II).

There was a John Snodgrass living in Hamilton County, Indiana, in 1830.²¹⁵ The U.S. census shows a female 20-30 in his household (the right age for Polly). It has not been possible to identify this female and the parents of Polly Heady have not yet been verified.

James Heady was raised on the frontier, so he had little if any formal education. The first record to name him is the sale of his father's personal property in 1827 as noted in Chapter 1. He is included in the 1820 and 1830 censuses in the household of Dorothy Heady, but is not identified. On 7 Sep 1831, he purchased eighty acres of land in

Hamilton County, (the E 1/2 of the SE 1/4 of section 35, Township 18N, Range 4E) at the Indianapolis Land Office of the United States government.²¹⁶ This was the first of a number of real estate transactions by James Heady during his life. This tract of land is adjacent to the 80 acres that his mother bought in 1827.

On 7 Sep 1832, James and Polly Headdy (sic) sold twenty acres of land to Dorothy Headdy (sic).²¹⁷ The deed was signed by Polly Headdy (her mark). On the same day, James Heady bought 15 acres of land from Dorothy Heady.²¹⁸ The net effect of this transaction was to give James Heady a strip thirty rods wide across the top of the SE 1/4 of section 35. At the same time Dorothy Heady got a strip forty rods wide across the bottom of that section. Both deeds were witnessed by Eli Heaton and Lewis W. Heady.

In the 1840 census for Hamilton County, Indiana, a James Heady is recorded in Delaware Township. There are four males and two females in the household, as shown in the following table.²¹⁹

The male 30-40 is James and the female 20-30 is Polly. The two younger boys are the children of James and Polly (Charles and Thomas). The older boy and the female 15-20 have not been identified, although the female could be Jane, the daughter of Lewis and Charity Heady that was not found in the 1840 census for that family (see Chapter 2).

Polly Heady was dead by the 1850 census. The dwelling recorded for James Heady has the following Composition:²²⁰

There may have been other children that died young. This is suggested by the large gap between the births of Thomas and Francis.

James never re-married as far as can be determined. He farmed and bought and sold real estate. The table on the following page shows how his farming changed in the years 1850, 1860, and 1870. His products in 1850 are a little of everything, including wool. By 1870, his main grain product is corn and his swine population is down to two.

One aspect of his life is interesting, however, and has not yet been explained. In every census, as in the 1850 census shown above, there are other families living with him. There appears to be a relationship, but it has not yet been established. Following are the 1860 and 1870 censuses:²²¹

Zucilda Cardwell and Lida Cardwell are probably the same person. Zelida Jane Cardwell and John Sarver took out a marriage license 24 December 1841.²²² There was no marriage return recorded. This suggests that the marriage did not take place.

James Heady Agricultural Census

James Heady left a will in which a specific tract of real estate was left to each of his sons.²²³ This land was to go to his sons' children on the death of the parents. The remainder of his estate was to be divided equally among them. James' will names Charles, Frances, and Thomas as his sons and names Charles as his executor.

22. Charles³ Wesley Heady (James², James¹) was born 10 Sep 1832, probably in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 8 Oct 1914 in Marion, County, Indiana.²²⁴ Charles Heady was married twice. His first marriage was to Josephine Hartman 16 Nov 1854 in Hamilton County, Indiana.²²⁵ She was born 8 Mar 1835, probably in Hamilton County Indiana, the daughter of Zebulon and Elizabeth [Britton?] Hartman. Josephine [Hartman] Heady died 7 Mar 1863 in Hamilton County, Indiana and is buried in the Heady Cemetery.²²⁶

Charles Wesley was the most civically active of the Heady clan in Hamilton County during the period of this history. He was a trustee of Delaware Township for the years 1862, 1871, 1872, 1875, 1876, 1880, and 1884.²²⁷ In 1884, he was a member of the Board of Education and served on the Committee on Regulating Teachers Salaries.²²⁸ He was a good business man as well. During the time he lived in Hamilton County, he accumulated substantial real estate. Also, on a number of occasions he was called upon to be the admininistrator or executor of an estate. Politically Charles Heady was an Independent. In 1878 he was elected to be one of three representatives from Delaware Township on the Central Committee of the Independents of Hamilton County.²²⁹

Children of Charles and Josephine Heady are:²³⁰

The second marriage of Charles W. Heady was to Lydia George on 10 Sep 1866 in Hamilton County, Indiana.²³⁹ She was born 15 Nov 1837 in Ohio, the daughter of James and Maranda (Sinclair) George.²⁴⁰ Lydia George had a twin brother, William George, who moved to Neosho County, Kansas, as did others from Delaware Township, including Andrew Jackson Heady (see chapter 10). In later years, a descendant of William George married a descendant of Andrew Jackson Heady. A child of this marriage recorded an oral history of the Heady family (see Appendix II). When Lydia's father, James George, died, Charles Heady was the executor of the estate. Lydia Heady died 15 Dec 1911 at Broad Ripple in Marion County, Indiana.²⁴¹ Her obituary states that she "was well known among the W. C. T. U. workers of the county."

On his fourth run there was a wreck and Ed Heady was thrown from the train and his neck was broken. He was buried in the Heady Cemetery 7 Sep 1894, but his tombstone cannot be located.²⁴⁷

Starting in 1879, Charles Heady began selling his land. A large part of it was sold to **Thomas A. Fisher** in 1883 and 1884.²⁵¹ Then in September 1894 he moved with his family to Broad Ripple in Washington Township, Marion Co., Indiana. There he became a retailer of groceries, which business he pursued until his retirement about 1911.²⁵²

Charles Heady died 8 Oct 1914. His son-in-law, F. F. Hummel, wrote his obituary, which is reproduced in the *Heady Family Newsletter*.²⁵³ The entire obituary will not be reproduced here, but his final words summarize how many saw Charles Wesley Heady:

...After all, what more should be expected of a man than that he live an exemplary life, that he be true to his family, that he devote himself to the welfare of his fellow man and so discharge his every obligation that the world will have been made better by his having lived therein. That he did so live his life must be the verdict of all who knew him and who now grieve to see so good a man lay down his task. May he rest in peace.

23. Thomas³ W. Heady (*James*², *James*¹) was born 29 Dec 1834 in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 23 Jan 1881 in Hamilton County, Indiana. He is buried in the Heady Cemetery. This birth date is different from the 29 Dec 1831 shown in the *Heady Family Newsletter*. The date in that publication is derived from one of three readings of the tombstone of Thomas Heady. Dates read from tombstones can be incorrect for a number of reasons. In this case, the four was not chiseled deeply into the sandstone and can be easily mistaken for a one. The four can be brought out on a rubbing, however. Fortunately, age at death was also put on the tombstone. It is 46 years and 24 days, which makes the birth year 1834. A birth year of 1834 is also consistent with census records and the age at death as reported in both the *Noblesville Independent* and the *Noblesville Ledger*, the newspapers of that day.²⁵⁴

Thomas married America Tylier 14 Sep 1859 in Marion County, Indiana.²⁵⁵ She was born 6 Feb 1842 in Washington Township, Marion County, Indiana, the daughter of Lewis and Elizabeth [Colier] Tylier.²⁵⁶ She died 16 Mar 1909 in Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana.²⁵⁷

The surname Tylier is written in several different ways in censuses and legal documents. On the tombstone it is spelled Tylyer. The spelling *Tylier* is that shown in the death certificate of America [Tylier] Heady. Lewis Tylier was a farmer in Marion County, Indiana. He was born 30 Dec 1809 in Indiana and died 19 Oct 1869 in Marion County, Indiana.²⁵⁸ Elizabeth Colier was born 9 March 1815 in Indiana and died 26 Feb 1884 in Hamilton County, Indiana. There is a large monument in the Heady Cemetery with the names of Lewis and Elizabeth Tylyer on it. Elizabeth is surely buried there and Lewis may be as well.²⁵⁹

Thomas Heady was a farmer in Delaware Township, Hamilton County, Indiana. Like his father and older brother (Charles), he bought and sold real estate, although not to the degree of the others. Two of his real estate transactions are of interest. The first is related to the land that his father, James² Heady, left him in his will. This land was in Fall Creek Township and a few miles from his other property. So he decided to sell it. However, his father had stated that the land should go to his children on the death of himself and his wife. So to sell the land, a guardian had to be appointed to protect the

interests of his children. It is from this legal action that the ages of his children were determined.²⁶⁰ The other real estate transaction was just before his death. In this sale, the signature of his wife, America, was not on the deed. So after his death the court ruled that one third of the land was America's by right of dower.

Thomas Heady died 23 Jan 1881 in Hamilton Co., Indiana. He was 46 years old. The cause of his death was not reported. At this time, the Noblesville Independent was carrying a series of articles by J. I. Rooker about the early history of Delaware Township. In his January 28, 1881, article he had this to say about Thomas Heady:

Mr. Editor, I have just learned of the death of Thomas Heady, or Tom as he was familiarly called. Tom was the son of James Heady, one of the first settlers of this township (East Delaware), and who I shall speak about in time. I have known Tom for thirty years and can say he was one of the best men I ever knew. Strictly honest and free hearted. A good father. Had just one fault - intemperance. Had it not been for this, Tom would have been one of the leading men of this county.

Thomas Heady did not leave a will and the settlement of the estate was quite complicated. The first administrator of the estate was Charles W. Heady. Later America Heady took over the duties of administratrix.

America Heady did not re-marry. She devoted herself to raising her children and caring for her mother, who had moved to Hamilton Co. prior to the 1880 census. In 1880, Elizabeth Tylier was enumerated in the dwelling next to that of Thomas Heady. Elizabeth Tylier died 26 Feb 1884. The following obituary appeared in the Noblesville Independent:²⁶⁷

Died, on Tuesday last, Mrs Elisabeth Tillyer (sic) aged 68 years and 11 months, at the residence of her daughter Mrs. America Heady, disease congestion of the stomach.

Mrs. Tillyer had been a member of the church for upward of 30 years and lived in strict accordance with the rule of her church as her large circle of friends and acquaintenances will testify, but alas! never more will her silent and welcome presence gladden the eyes of a friend. She has gone to claim that haven of eternal rest prepared for all Gods people who like her shall walk in the straight and narrow path which leads to life everlasting. The calm and peaceful face and clasped hands as we took a last look at it had none of the terrors of death depicted upon it, but rest, sweet rest was stamped upon the countenance and the still form even in death resembled life, to those friends who mourn her death and who look with sorrow at the vacant chair where Grandma used to sit and which none can ever fill. There is but one consolation which is free for all who desire to meet with loved ones again. She is free from the cares and turmoils of life and enjoying the mysteries of a never ending eternity.

The sympathies of the community are with the friends in this sad bereavement. The funeral sermon was preached by Rev. Bailey at the M.E. Church at 9:30 A. M. on Thursday morning last. The remains were intered (sic) in cemetery near Allisonville. The funeral services were well attended considering the weather.

America Heady lived in Fishers until about 1900 when she moved to Noblesville and lived with her daughter Alice Lowther until her death. When she died America Heady left a simple and straight forward will:²⁶⁸

I, America M. Heady, of Hamilton County, State of Indiana do hereby make this my last will and testament:

1. I hereby direct that all my just debts be first paid, and I direct that a reasonable compensation be paid to my daughter Almeda Lowther for services and care performed by her for me during the entire time of my living with her.

2. I hereby direct that a cemetery lot be purchased in Crownland Cemetery, Noblesville, Indiana.

3. I hereby direct that all my real estate be sold and converted into cash.

4. After payment of my just debts, I hereby direct that a suitable monument be purchased for my grave at an expense not to exceed sixty dollars.

5. After the compliance with my specific direction and bequests herein, I hereby devise and bequeath all of my property both real and personal to my five children Mary

E. Eller, Ezodora Avery, Almeda Lowther, Clara V. Harrison, and James L. Heady share and share alike, the share going to each to go to the children of such child in case of death of the parent.

Witness my hand and seal this Thursday, October 8, 1908.

24. Francis³ M. Heady (*James²*, *James¹*) was born 26 May 1841 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana²⁶⁹ and died 2 Feb 1874 in Hamilton County, Indiana.²⁷⁰ He married Louisa J. Hartley on 19 Sep 1861 in Hamilton County, Indiana.²⁷¹ Louisa Hartley was born 17 Feb 1842 in Henry County, Indiana,²⁷² the daughter of Amos and Sarah Hartley.²⁷³

Frances Heady was a farmer all his life. But mostly he worked for other farmers. He did own property in Hamilton County and may have farmed it. The first property he owned was obtained from his father in 1856.

During the Civil War, he enlisted in the 20th Light Artillery Battery of the Indiana Volunteers on 18 Aug 1862 and was discharged 28 Jun 1865.²⁷⁴ He was married while he was in the Army. Shortly after his marriage he became sick and was sent to the hospital at Camp Carrington. His unit left Indianapolis without him but he re-joined it later in Louisville. His assignment in the army was teamster. During his service, he was injured by falling off a horse or cannon. This injury seems to have affected him later in life.

After the war, Francis returned to farming. He and his family lived in Delaware Township, Hamilton County, Indiana. For a time they lived on the farm of his brother, Charles Wesley, but later they lived on his father's farm. Francis Heady was only 33 when he died. The cause of his death was pneumonia according to the attending physician.

In later years, his widow and son applied for veteran's pensions, which were denied. The decision was appealed and the depositons taken for the original application and the appeal are voluminous.²⁷⁵ The application for pension was based on the claim that the pneumonia Francis Heady died from resulted from damage to his lungs caused by his army service. A special examiner who took charge of the case developed among other things that Francis Heady was a drinking man. The special examiner in his summary of the testimony expanded this observation about Francis Heady, saying:

It is admitted by all that he was intemperate. He came from a family of local reputation as "spree-goers" and fighters. He was a drinker before service as well as after. There appeared to be an attempt to show that the death of Francis Heady was the result of his getting drunk and catching cold by being out in the winter weather. Whatever the case, the requests for pension were denied. Frances Heady served his country for almost three years and was not given a pension, while others who served as little as three months were.

Children of Francis M. and Louisa J. Heady are:

Census records show him in 1870, with Francis and Louisa Heady; in 1880, he is living with John and Louisa Lewis and he is not shown as a Heady; in 1900, he is living with his mother, Louisa Lewis; and in 1920, he is living alone. In 1900 his occupation is livery man. He owned a farm at the time of his death, but had not lived on it for some time.

25. Mary⁴ Elizabeth Heady (*Thomas³*, James², James¹) was born 23 Jun 1860 in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 10 Nov 1919 in Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana.²⁸³ She married James H. (Harv) Eller 5 Jan 1879 in Hamilton County, Indiana.²⁸⁴ He was born about 1854, the son of George and Lucinda Eller,²⁸⁵ and died in 1930. James and Mary Eller are in buried Crownland Cemetery, Noblesville, Indiana.²⁸⁶ James Eller was a groceryman, by trade.

Children of Mary and James Eller are:²⁸⁷

26. Isadora⁴ Heady (*Thomas³*, James², James¹) was born 18 Jul 1862 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 13 Apr 1938 in Noblesville, Indiana.²⁹¹ She was married twice. The first marriage was on 8 Jan 1881 in Hamilton County to Absalom F. Eller.²⁹² This was a short marriage. It has not been determined how the marriage ended. But on 8 Jul 1883, she married Hiram Avery in Hamilton County.²⁹³ He was born in Feb 1851 in Ohio, and died 31 Oct 1923 at Federal Hill, near Noblesville.²⁹⁴ Hiram and Isadora Avery are buried in Crownland Cemetery, Noblesville, Indiana.

Hiram Avery was the son of James A. and Eliza [Caster] Avery. He was a plasterer by trade, most of his life, but when his health would not permit him to follow that trade, he bought a farm on Federal Hill. He had been previously married to Lou Garner.

Almeda⁴ (Alice) Heady (*Thomas³*, James², James¹) was born 31 Dec 1864 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 9 Oct 1918 in Hamilton County.²⁹⁷ She married 22 Apr 1886 at Fisher's Station, Hamilton County, William E. Lowther.²⁹⁸ He was born 26 Jan 1853 in Wilmington, Delaware, the son of William A. and Annie E. [Buen] Lowther, and died 19 Jan 1924, in Indianapolis, Indiana.²⁹⁹ William and Alice Lowther are buried in Crownland Cemetery, Noblesville, next to Alice's mother, America Heady.

William Lowther came to Noblesville with his parents when he was six. He was educated in local schools. On leaving school, he learned the occupation of retail businessman. He sold clothing for years in Noblesville with a partner. In politics, he was a Republican. He was elected to the Noblesville City Council in 1918 and served a four year term.³⁰⁰

Children of William and Alice Lowther are:³⁰¹

28. Clara⁴ V. Heady (*Thomas³*, James², James¹) was born 31 Jun 1867 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana. She died 11 Oct 1928 in Hamilton County following an operation for appendicitis.³⁰³ She married Allen C. Harrison 13 Aug 1885 in Hamilton County.³⁰⁴ Allen Harrison was born in Dec 1862 in Hamilton County and died 29 Mar 1917 in Noblesville.³⁰⁵ He was the son of John and Melissa M. [Brandon] Harrison. Allen and Clara Harrison are buried in Beaver Cemetery, Hamilton County, Indiana.³⁰⁶ Allen Harrison was born in the south part of Hamilton County and had a store in Fishers for a while. Later he had a drug store with his brother in Noblesville.

29. James⁴ Lewis Heady (Thomas³, James², James¹) was born 27 Sep 1873³¹⁰ at Fisher's

Switch, Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 30 Apr 1959 in Los Angeles, California.³¹¹ He is buried in Hollywood Memorial Cemetery, Los Angeles, California.

His father died when he was 7 years old. He went to school in Delaware Township and obtained a common school education. He probably also learned the occupation of farmer for he was a farmer later in life. He left Hamilton County sometime before 1900 and moved West. When he left Indiana and where he was before 1900 has not been established. There were Headys from Indiana living in Neosho County, Kansas, in this period. Whether he visited any of them on his way West has not been determined.

He married **Hattie Irene Kinnard**, in Pueblo, Colorado, on 6 December, 1899.³¹² She was born in Cowley County, Kansas, 2 Oct 1878, and died in Fallon, Nevada, 6 Feb 1914. She was the daughter of **Joseph and Sarah Jane** [Collins] Kinnard.³¹³

The IGI shows Henry as the oldest child. The US census for 1880 and the Kansas census for 1885, shown below, for the Joseph Kinnard family, establish Hattie as the oldest child. These censuses also establish 1878 as her birth year. Her birth place is Cowley County, Kansas, by the same evidence. My grandfather mistakenly showed her birth place as Wichita, Kansas, in her death certificate.

Hattie Irene Kinnard has not been found in the 1895 Kansas census. In fact, only her mother and two of her siblings have been found. Joseph and Sarah Jane Kinnard sold

their property in Cowley County 6 Nov 1885 and moved to Elk County.³¹⁵ There they bought land and had additional children. But they apparently had financial problems, because the Sheriff sold their property in 1896.³¹⁶ Since only Sarah Jane and two of her children can be found in 1895, it is assumed that Joseph Kinnard left the state.

After their marriage, James Lewis and Hattie Irene Heady lived in Pueblo, Colorado for several years. Two children were born in Pueblo, Colorado, and a third one in Fowler, Colorado. James Heady's occupation in Pueblo is shown as Mechanic in the birth record of his daughter Alice. In Fowler he was a farmer and on 11 Aug 1905 he is reported to have shipped a carload of cantaloupe.³¹⁷ On 24 Nov 1907, they moved to Fallon, Nevada.³¹⁸ This move was made by train. From the amount of belongings moved, it included a buggy for Hattie, we can conclude that James Lewis Heady had been successful in Colorado.

In Fallon, Nevada, he bought forty acres of land and began farming. Family tradition is that he introduced "Hearts of Gold" cantaloupe to Fallon. This crop was very successful in later years and is still grown there. The fact that he grew cantaloupe in Colorado lends credence to the story. But he changed occupations in 1910 before Fallon became known for its cantaloupe. In 1910 he bought the Fallon Hotel and re-named it the "Grand Hotel." He owned this hotel until 1921 when he sold it to Pierre Hauret.³¹⁹ He also became a real estate broker and, later, the president of Fallon Nevada Oil Co.³²⁰

Three more children were born in Fallon, but only one survived. 1914 was a sad year for this family. Hattie was pregnant and became ill. Her youngest child, Madeline died in January.³²¹ She died 6 Feb 1914 the same day her newly born child died.³²² She is buried in the Fallon Cemetery with the child in her arms.

The child that survived was my mother, Dorotha May Heady. She later changed her first name to Dorothy. She told of the time that they lived at the hotel. The children provided some of the domestic help. Also, this was before modern laundry systems and hotel laundry was hung out to dry. The children had the duty of watching the laundry on the line to keep the goats from eating it.

During the illness of his wife and child, James Heady engaged a nurse, Mattie Gross, to care for his wife and daughter. On 31 Oct 1915,³²⁶ James Heady and Mattie Gross were married in the Grand Hotel, Fallon, Nevada. Gross was Mattie's married name. She had a daughter Lois 9 years old. Matties mother, Mrs. Pilant, attended the wedding, so Pilant may be Matties maiden name. The 1920 census for Fallon, Nevada, has James Lewis, Mattie, his daughters Faye and Dorothy, and step-daughter Lois in the household.³²⁷ But this marriage did not last. In 1921, James and Mattie Heady were divorced.

After the divorce, James L. Heady remained in Fallon until about 1929, when the last real estate transaction in his name is recorded.³²⁸ About 1930, he moved to Los Angeles where he met and married **Cora [Cooly] Gilbert**. In Los Angeles, he managed apartments and was a salesman. His death certificate shows his last occupation as crane operator for Lockeed.

James Lewis Heady is my grandfather. My first recollection of him was in Los Angeles in the 1940s. At this time he was in his late sixtys. He was a short man and quite active. The thing I remember most was that he was working on an invention for an automobile to automatically indicate the turn direction. His idea was to equip a car with a mechanical arm that would swing out to show the turn direction. Soon the automobile manufactures adopted a different approach using flashing lights.

30. Edward⁵ Francis Heady (*James⁴*, *Thomas³*, *James²*, *James¹*) was born in Pueblo, Colorado, 10 June 1900³²⁹ and died in Loveland, Colorado, 23 Sep 1962.³³⁰ He grew up in Fallon, Nevada, living in the Grand Hotel, which was owned by his father. Here he learned the hotel and restaurant business, which he practiced most of his life. He was married twice. His first marriage was to **Deah** ______ about 1919. What became of this first marriage is not known to me. One child was born to Edward and Deah **Heady**:

i. Larue⁶, b. Mar 1920.

He married a second time to Lucille V. (Mollie) _____ on 28 March 1928, in Yuma, Arizona. Edward (familiarly known as "Jack") and Molly moved to Loveland, Colorado, about 1938, where they spent the rest of their lives. Until 1945, they operated the Windsor Cafe in Loveland. Then they bought a tourist court they named "Heady's Motor Court." The 1956 Loveland Directory shows them owning apartments as well as Heady's Motor Court. In 1960, Heady's Motor Court has new owners and Jack and Molly own the Beacon Motel and Heady Apartments.

Besides owning and managing motels and apartments, Jack Heady worked as a chef. Loveland Directories show him working at Draper Drug store in 1950 and as chef of his (Beacon) motel in 1960. His obituary states "...For several summers he worked as a cook at resorts in Colorado Springs, Grand Lake, and Estes Park. He was employed in Estes Park when he became ill about two months ago."³³¹ He is buried in Loveland Burial Park, Loveland, Colorado.

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Chapter 5

Mark Heady

5. Mark² Heady (*James¹*) was born 27 Dec 1812 based on his age at death on his tombstone.³³² He died 15 Mar 1848 and was buried in the Heady Cemetery. According to *Heady Family Information*, he was born 15 Jan 1813. The source of this information about his birth is not known so the date derived from the tombstone will be used. Mark's place of birth is probably Butler County, Ohio, as discussed in chapter 1. The IGI has his birthplace as Hamilton County, Indiana, but this is not consistent with fact that that part of Indiana was Indian territory in 1813. The first document of his presence in Hamilton County, Indiana, is a purchase of 40 acres of land from the Federal Government on 18 Jul 1833.³³³ He would have been 20 at the time, based on the above birth date.

He married **Martha Tharp** on 20 Dec 1834.³³⁴ Her birth date and death date have caused some confusion. The confusion begins with Martha's death date and age. Her tombstone very plainly shows her dying *13 Dec 1812, Age 66y 15d*, and as *wife of Mark*. This death date is obviously incorrect. The area where the cemetery is now was Indian lands in 1812. Also, Martha, wife of Mark, was 37 in the 1850 census.³³⁵ Then according to the IGI Martha Tharp was born 28 Dec 1812. The *Hamilton County Ledger* for Friday, 20 Dec 1878, states that Martha Heady died "Friday last," which would be 13 Dec 1878 (note that the day and month are the same as on the tombstone). Then if her age at death on her tombstone is correct, she was born 28 Nov 1812. It will be accepted that the death date from the *Ledger* is correct and that the age at death on the tombstone is correct. This would make Martha Tharp's birth date 28 Nov 1812.

Martha's birth place in the IGI is also wrong. The IGI has her birth place as Hamilton County, Indiana, which is unlikely as previously stated. Based on the 1850 and 1860 U.S. censuses, Martha was born in New York.³³⁶ Martha Tharp was the daughter of **John Tharp and Mary Benham**.³³⁷ This is confirmed by the probate of Mary Tharp's estate. On 21 May 1879, the heirs of Mary Tharp were defendants in a petition to sell some of the estate of Mary Tharp.³³⁸ Two of the heirs were Martha [Tharp] Heady's daughters Dorotha Colburn and Angeline Bradley (Martha having already died).

Little is known about the life of Mark Heady. He must have been successful as a farmer. He not only bought the 40 acres of land from the government mentioned above, he bought an additional 40 acres from William Conner 29 May 1847.³³⁹ Mark Heady died just a month after his last child was born. He did not leave a will and his brother, Thomas, was the administrator of his estate.³⁴⁰ The oldest child was twelve. Martha had to raise the six children and run the family farm. In the 1850 census, Jefferson Tharp, probably a brother, is living with her and is called a laborer.³⁴¹ Four of her children died before she did. Only Dorotha and Angeline survived her.

Mark and Martha Heady had six children:

31. Melinda³ Heady (*Mark², James¹*) was born about 1837,³⁴⁸ probably in Hamilton Co., Indiana, and died 10 Dec 1870, probably in Hamilton County.³⁴⁹ She married first **Francis M. Bradley** 1 Jul 1852 in Hamilton County, Indiana.³⁵⁰ It has not been possible to learn anything about the parents of Francis Bradley. Also, the marriage was apparently short lived because Melinda Bradley married a **John Lewis** on 11 Oct 1855 in Hamilton County, Indiana.³⁵¹ No information has been found concerning what happened to Francis Bradley or to the marriage.

John Lewis was born about 1830,³⁵² the son of **James** and **Nancy [Brown] Lewis**.³⁵³ John and Melinda Lewis lived in Hamilton County for the next ten years. During this time they had children, but none of them survived.³⁵⁴ On 17 Mar 1865, John joined the army to fight in the Civil war. He was a private in Company E, 155th Regiment of the Indiana Volunteers and was discharged 10 Aug 1865.³⁵⁵

After he was discharged from the army, John and Melinda Lewis had a son:

i. **Mark**⁴, b. *ca.* 1869³⁵⁶ prob. in Hamilton Co., 1N; d. *ca.* Sep 1893 prob. in Hamilton Co., IN.³⁵⁷

John Lewis had a brother, James W. Lewis, who had married Sylvia A. Butterfield on 15 Jan 1852 in Hamilton, Indiana.³⁵⁸ James Lewis enlisted in the army 7 Aug 1862 and died 26 Dec 1863 at Paris, Illinois, of typhoid fever.³⁵⁹ At the time of his enlistment, James and Sylvia Lewis had six children, who were:³⁶⁰

In the 1870 census, Sylvia and her five youngest children are living with John and Melinda Lewis.³⁶¹ But Sylvia and her children are listed right below John, with Melinda and her son Mark (Martin) at the bottom. This made it look like John had married Sylvia. But the pension records cleared it up. By this time, the oldest son of Sylvia, Franklin, had been placed for adoption.

It is possible that the confusion was caused by Sylvia. I wondered why her husband joined the army when they had six children. Then in 1865 John Hanks Butterfield included this in his will:

I...give devise and bequeath to my daughter Sylvia Lewis five dollars (\$5.00) only as the only portion she is to have in my estate in consequence of her disobedience and ungratefulness.³⁶²

Then on 20 May 1878 her oldest son Frank instituted an action to have her declared mentally incompetent.³⁶³ The next record we find for Sylvia Lewis is a marriage to **George Moore**.³⁶⁴

On 2 Sep 1875 John Lewis married Louisa J. [Hartley] Heady, the widow of Frances Heady.³⁶⁵

In this enumeration, Josephine and James are children of Frances and Louisa [Hartley] Heady, while Mark is the son of John and Melinda [Heady] Lewis. John and Andrew are children of James and Sylvia [Butterfield] Lewis.

John Lewis died 23 Mar 1893 in Hamilton County, Indiana, and is buried in the Heady Cemetery, but his tombstone has not been found.³⁶⁷ Mark Lewis died about six months after his father, also in 1893.³⁶⁸

Louisa J. [Hartley] Heady Lewis is living with her son James W. Heady in Delaware Twp in the 1900 census.³⁶⁹ She is the mother of two children, one of which is still living. She died 1 Mar 1919.³⁷⁰

32. Dorotha³ Heady (*Mark*², *James*¹) was born 12 Sep 1843, probably in Hamilton County, Indiana,³⁷¹ and died 9 Jan 1924 in Hamilton County.³⁷² She married Jonathan L. Colborn on 3 Sep 1866 in Hamilton County.³⁷³ He was born about 1843 in Hamilton County, the son of Jesse and Cassie [Smith] Colborn,³⁷⁴ and died 7 Aug 1899, in Hamilton County.³⁷⁵ Jonathan and Dorotha are buried next to each other in the Heady Cemetery.

Jonathon Colborn was a Civil War veteran. He enlisted twice, first enlisting on 24 Aug 1861 in Co. A, 11th Indiana Volunteers. He was discharged 19 Apr 1862 for medical reasons. Then on 20 Aug 1862 he enlisted in Co. A 101st Indiana Volunteers and was discharged 24 June 1865.³⁷⁶

Children of Jonathan and Dorotha Colborn are:

According to her obituary, Dorotha Colborn adopted two orphan children, who survived her. But they are not named.³⁹⁰

33. James³ Frank Heady (*Mark*², *James*¹) was born about 1845 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana.³⁹¹ He died 20 May 1870 in Hamilton County.³⁹² He served in the Civil war by enrolling in Company C, 130th Regiment of the Indiana Volunteers.³⁹³ He was mustered into service 19 Dec 1863, and was mustered out of service 15 June 1865. On 15 Dec 1864, he was wounded near Nashville, Tennessee.

He married his first wife, Nancy Emmaline Hicks, 17 Mar 1864, in Hamilton County, Indiana, while he was in the army.³⁹⁴ She was born 9 May 1846 in Tennessee, the daughter of William and Martha Hicks.³⁹⁵ Nancy [Hicks] Heady died 19 Apr 1869.³⁹⁶

One child was born to James F. and Nancy Heady:

James Heady married second Susannah Kimberlin on 18 Nov 1869 in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁴⁰² She was born about 1847, the daughter of Robert and Susanna Kimberlin.⁴⁰³ James Heady died seven months later. No children were found for this marriage.

34. Angeline³ Heady (*Mark*², *James*¹) was born February 1848 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana,⁴⁰⁴ and died 22 Apr 1916 in Noblesville, Indiana.⁴⁰⁵ She married Griffin Bradley on 14 Nov 1866 in Hamilton County.⁴⁰⁶ He was the son of Albert and Frances [Mumsel] Bradley.⁴⁰⁷ Griffin Bradley was born 24 Dec 1846, in Hamilton County, and died 26 Mar 1907 in Noblesville.⁴⁰⁸ Angeline and Griffin are buried in Crownland Cemetery, Noblesville, Indiana.⁴⁰⁹

Griffin Bradley enlisted twice in the service on the Union side during the Civil War. His first enlistment was in Co. B, 136 Indiana Volunteers from April to September 1864.⁴¹⁰ His second enlistment was in Co. I, 153 Indiana Volunteer Infantry from February to August 1865. He received a pension as the result of his military service. His occupation appears to be that of laborer. One of the persons who testified for him on his pension application was a butcher who said he "frequently employed the claimant to assist me in the dressing beeves and other work."⁴¹¹

Griffin and Angela Bradley had three children:

 1 May 1891 in Hamilton Co., IN, Minnie Dillon, b. ca. 1868 in Tennessee, daughter of John and Susanna [White] Dillon;⁴¹⁵ m. (2) 18 Apr 1895 in Hamilton Co., IN, Ida Earhart, b. ca. 1867 in Indiana, d. 28 Apr 1908, buried in Crownland Cemetery, Noblesville, IN,⁴¹⁶ daughter of Lewis and Crume Earhart.⁴¹⁷

iii. Cora Ellen, b. ca. 1872 prob. in Hamilton Co., 1N; m. 17 Mar 1892 in Noblesville, Hamilton Co., IN, John J. Kirwan, b. ca. 1870 in Ohio, son of Wm and Mary [Rise] Kirwan.⁴¹⁸ This marriage may not have been a happy one, at least at first, because Ellen attempted suicide 18 Aug 1898. The newspaper article suggested that marital relations were the cause.⁴¹⁹ However, at the time of her mother's death in 1916, Cora was still living.

6. Vincent² Heady (James¹) was born 10 May 1811 in Ohio, probably Butler County. State of birth is determined from the 1850 and 1860 U.S. censuses for Hamilton County, Indiana.⁴²² His date of birth was not as easily determined. The 10 May 1811 date is calculated from his tombstone in the Heady Cemetery. The IGI shows his birthdate as 10 May 1814, but the proof of this date is not provided. The 1850 census lists his age as 36, which agrees with an 1814 birth. The 1860 census shows his age as 52, which is consistent with an 1808 birth. The 10 May 1811 will be used because it is based on citable information. He died 21 Feb 1862 at the age of 50y 9m 11d,⁴²³ probably in Hamilton County, Indiana. On his tombstone, his name is spelled Vincen.

Vincent Heady was married twice. His first wife was **Polly Ann Richardson**. She was born 27 Feb 1817 in Ohio,⁴²⁴ the daughter of **John and Hannah Richardson**.⁴²⁵ Vincent and Polly Ann were married 3 Sep 1834 in Hamilton County, Indiana, by **F. Redwine**, MG (assumed to be Elizabeth [Heady] Redwine's husband).⁴²⁶ At the time of their marriage, Polly Ann was 17 and a minor. There is no indication that permission was obtained for her to marry.

Polly Ann Richardson's father, John Richardson, died 11 Oct 1830, in Marion County, Indiana.⁴²⁷ Her mother, Hannah Richardson, became executrix of John Richardson's estate and guardian of her five minor children, including Polly Ann.⁴²⁸ An older daughter, Elizabeth, was married to Isaac Coppock.⁴²⁹ Both families lived in Washington Township, Marion County, Indiana. Hannah died before 11 Feb 1834 when Isaac Coppock, as administrator, entered an inventory of her estate.⁴³⁰ At this time a neighbor, George Medsker, became the guardian of Polly Ann and Joseph, minor children of John and Hannah Richardson.⁴³¹ After marrying Polly Ann, Vincent Heady petitioned the Marion County Court for the guardianship to be revoked, which was granted.⁴³²

Vincent was a successful farmer and a prolific father. He was one of three sons of James and Dorotha to buy land from the Federal Government. He bought 80 acres in Section 36, Township 18, Range IV.⁴³³ The first 40 acres was purchased 22 Nov 1834, just over two months after his marriage to Polly Ann. The second 40 acres was purchased a little over a year later. Then in 1852, he bought 40 acres from William Conner in section 33.⁴³⁴ This gave him 120 acres. Then he bought another 80 acres before 1860. The following table from the agricultural censuses shows his success in farming. The 1870 data is for Sarah Heady, his second wife, since Vincent is dead.

Vincent Heady Agricultural Census

Vincent Heady's success as a farmer is demonstrated by comparing 1850 to 1860. Total acres owned increased from 80 to 200, and improved acres went from 30 to 100. Grain production went from 535 bushels to 1150. Also interesting is the change in distribution of products. Corn is the major grain and the cash livestock is swine.

Vincent and Polly Ann had nine children, but only only six lived to maturity. This was not uncommon during this period as cholera, typhoid fever, scarlet fever, and other diseases took their toll. Polly Ann died 25 Mar 1852 in Hamilton County, Indiana, and is buried in the Heady Cemetery.⁴³⁵

The second marriage of Vincent was to Sarah Castetter, one of five children of Peter and Molly Castetter who married Headys. Sarah was born 18 Feb 1824, probably in Marion County, Indiana. She died 24 Jan 1898 in Hamilton County, Indiana, and is buried in the Heady cemetery.⁴⁴⁵ Her death was attributed to an accident three weeks earlier. She slipped on the ice on a porch and fell breaking her hip.⁴⁴⁶ She was living with her daughter, Mrs. Frank Humbles, when she died.

Sarah Castetter and Vincent Heady were married 25 Sep 1855 in Hamilton County. Indiana.⁴⁴⁷ As will be discussed in Chapter 13, there was another Heady/Castetter marriage that took place earlier. That was between Vincent's daughter by his first wife, Sarah Elizabeth, and Michael Castetter, a son of Peter and Molly Castetter. So Vincent's

daughter became Sarah Castetter and Michael Castetter's older sister became Sarah Heady and his mother-in-law.

When Vincent Heady died in 1862, he left an estate that required probate. Charles Wesley Heady was made guardian of Vincent Heady's minor children⁴⁴⁸ and Thomas Heady was named administrator of his estate.⁴⁴⁹ On 19 May 1866, the proof of heirship and distribution of the estate was made.⁴⁵⁰ Then on 31 Mar 1868, his land was partitioned among his heirs. Sarah Heady was alloted one third according to law, which accounts for the 80 acres she claims in the 1870 agricultural census.

At his death, nine of his children were still living. Sarah and Hannah were married, so seven were still at home, these were: Fannie Jane, Joseph, Andrew Jackson, William, Polly Ann, Isaac, and Amanda. By 1870, only Polly Ann and Amanda were still at home. Isaac died in 1866 and Amanda died in 1872.

35. Hannah³ Heady (*Vincent²*, *James¹*) was born about 1837 in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died before 1866 when Dorotha Heady's estate was settled (the settlement lists her as deceased). She married Noble McDaniel 21 Mar 1853 in Hamilton County.⁴⁵⁶

Children of Noble and Hannah McDaniel are:457

- Polly Ann⁴, b. 15 Dec 1853 prob. in Hamilton Co., IN, d. 13 Jul 1892;⁴⁵⁸ m. 25 Sep 1886 in Hamilton Co., IN, Joshua Goodnight,⁴⁵⁹ b. ca. 1857 in Tipton Co., IN, d. before 15 Jan 1929, buried in East Union Cemetery;⁴⁶⁰ son of William and Rebecca [Hart] Goodnight. Joshua Goodnight died from a heart attack. He was a farmer and lived just south of the Tipton County line.⁴⁶¹
- ii. Vincent, b. 1856 prob. in Hamilton Co., IN, d. 1919, buried in Beaver Cemetery;⁴⁶² m. 31 Oct 1875 in Hamilton Co., IN, Mary E. Dayton, b. 1858, d. 1926, buried in Beaver Cemetery,⁴⁶³ daughter of Isaac and Susan [McKinstry] Dayton;.⁴⁶⁴ Mary Dayton's father, Isaac Dayton, is an interesting person. He was the Fisher's Station correspondent for *The Ledger* for a number

of years under the nom de plume "Fuzee." So some of the information in this book was supplied by him.⁴⁶⁵

iii. **Barbara Jane**, b. *ca.* 1858 prob. in Hamilton Co., IN,⁴⁶⁶ m. Milton House.⁴⁶⁷ The place of this marriage has not been found. Information about the marriage is provided by Martha [Castetter] Heady (see Appendix II).

36. Joseph³ Perry Heady (*Vincent²*, James¹) was born 19 Mar 1847, in Delaware Township, Hamilton County, Indiana.⁴⁶⁸ He died 29 Oct 1924 and is buried in Beaver Cemetery.⁴⁶⁹ Nothing has been learned about his life prior to 18 Dec 1863 when he enlisted in Company C, 130th Regiment of the Indiana Volunteers.⁴⁷⁰ At the time of his enlistment he is described as 5' 4" tall, fair complexion, dark eyes, and light hair. He served as a private until 2 June 1865, when he was honorably discharged at Louisville, Kentucky. He was in hospitals several times during his service and claimed to have been injured from having a log fall on him while building a breastwork in Georgia.⁴⁷¹

He was married three times. The first marriage was 31 Dec 1866 in Hamilton County, Indiana, to **Phebe Tharp**.⁴⁷² She was born about 1845 in Indiana, the daughter of **Vinson** (**Vincent?**) and Emaline Tharp.⁴⁷³ This marriage apparently did not last, because both Joseph and Phebe later had different spouses. But a divorce record has yet to be found.

One child was born to Joseph and Phebe Heady:

The second marriage of Joseph P. Heady was 9 Oct 1869 in Hamilton County, Indiana, to **Catharine Murphy**.⁴⁷⁴ She was born 29 Mar 1847 in Ohio,⁴⁷⁵ the daughter of **Archie and Elisabeth Murphy**.⁴⁷⁶ Catharine [Murphy] Heady died 9 Mar 1891 in Hamilton County, and is buried in Beaver Cemetery, Hamilton County, Indiana,.⁴⁷⁷ Eight children were born to this union, five of which died young.

Joseph Heady married third Nancy Phipps (her married name) 11 Sep 1894 in Indianapolis.⁴⁹¹ Nancy Heady died in 1908 and is buried in the Beaver Cemetery. Her tombstone shows her birth year as 1844. In the 1900 census for Hamilton County, Indiana, the Joseph Heady household includes his wife Nancy (age 69), born Aug 1830, his son Lemuel (16), and his step daughter Lola Phipps (11), born May 1889⁴⁹² (died 1916).⁴⁹³ It is unlikely that Nancy is 69 with a daughter eleven years old. The 1844 birth date on the tombstone is probably correct.

Much of the information shown above is from a Bureau of Pensions questionaire that Joseph Heady completed 1 Apr 1915. In that questionaire he stated that Nancy Phipps was dead and that he had no children by her. He also claimed to have had no children by Phebe Tharp, but Thomas Heady listed Joseph Heady and Phebe Tharp as his parents on his marriage application. Also, Joseph Heady's obituary in the *Ledger* states "The two sons, Lemuel and Thomas...were pall bearers."⁴⁹⁴

An interesting insight into Joseph Heady's character comes from **Charles G. Townsend**, a Special Examiner appointed to examine a claim by Frances Heady's widow (Louisa [Hartley] Heady) for a Civil War pension. Among the witnesses he deposed concerning this claim was Joseph Heady. He rated Joseph P. Heady's reputation as "fair", and said: "I rate him as I do for reason that I learn that he has been in habit of boarding at a low dive recently raided by the city police."⁴⁹⁵

A more favorable insight into the type of person Joseph Heady was is given by the report of his death by *The Noblesville Ledger*.⁴⁹⁶

Joseph Perry Heady, aged seventy-eight and one of the well known residents of the south part of the county, was instantly killed when he fell in a building in his property in Fishers. He suffered a fractured skull according to an investigation by Coroner Charles Coaltrin and lived only a few seconds after striking the floor.

He had sold the building in which the accident occurred to a man by the name of Morgan and a part of the contract was for him to wreck it. He was engaged in this work when the accident occurred. He was Knocking off some of the weather boarding with an ax and was about ten feet from the floor when, in some manner, he lost his footing and fell..."

You have to give credit to anyone who is that active and independent at 78 years of age.

37. Andrew⁴ Jackson Heady (*Vincent*², Jaines¹) was born 19 Apr 1849 in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁴⁹⁷ He died 14 Aug 1880, and is buried in the Lowery Cemetery in Hamilton County.⁴⁹⁸ He married Sarah Jane Humbles 13 Jan 1872 in Hamilton County.⁴⁹⁹ Sarah Jane was born in July 1846⁵⁰⁰ and died 4 Nov 1925, in Noblesville, Indiana.⁵⁰¹ She is also buried in the Lowery Cemetery.⁵⁰² She is the daughter of Isaac and Mary Jane Humbles.⁵⁰³ The 1880 U.S. census for Fall Creek Township., Hamilton County, Indiana, has the following entry for dwelling 283 on page 35.

The age shown for Andrew Jackson in the 1880 census is not consistent with the 1850 or 1860 census records, which are consistent with the birth date shown above. Also, the age shown for Seymour, who is listed as a son is not consistent with the marriage date. A census record for Andrew Jackson in 1870 has not been found, nor has an earlier marriage for either Andrew Jackson or Sarah Jane. Andrew Jackson Heady died 14 Aug 1880.⁵⁰⁴ On 19 Aug 1880 Sarah Heady, widow of A. J. Heady, petitioned the court to declare the estate of her deceased husband to be worth less than \$500.⁵⁰⁵ Since the estate was worth less than \$500, there was no probate and it was not possible to determine how Seymour was related.

A Cora S., son of A. J. and S. J. Heady is buried in Lowery Cemetery (the inscription recorded for that tombstone has his death year 1830, which is obviously wrong, possibly a misread). His birth date, based on this tombstone, assuming an 1880 death, is 9 June 1868. It is assumed that this child was adopted by Andrew and Sarah. There is a Cora Seymour, age 2, enumerated with Isaac Humbles in the 1870 census for Fall Creek Township, Hamilton County, Indiana, dwelling 226. But that Cora Seymour is recorded as a female. Both Andrew and Semour died within a month of each other. Note that Semour had typhoid fever at the time of the census.

Sarah Jane Heady did not re-marry. She is found in the 1900 U.S. census for Fall Creek Township., Hamilton County, Indiana, dwelling 310, living in the household of **George Lednum** and is called a sister-in-law. The census shows a Flora D. as George Lednum's wife. George Lednum and Flora D. Humbles were married 9 Dec 1877.⁵⁰⁶

38. William³ Worchester Heady (*Vincent²*, James¹) was born 15 Jan 1852 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana⁵⁰⁷ and died 16 Mar 1900 in Hamilton County.⁵⁰⁸ He married first Nancy Seymour 18 Mar 1874 in Hamilton County.⁵⁰⁹ The marriage apparently was not a happy one. Divorce proceedings were instituted in 1877 and twice in 1878, but were dismissed on each occasion. Then in May, 1879, divorce was granted.⁵¹⁰ There were no children from this marriage.

He married second Louisa Justice on 25 Jun 1881 in Hamilton County.⁵¹¹ William W. Heady died tragically by falling from a Midland passenger train, as described in the following newspaper article.⁵¹²

The remains of William Heady who was killed four miles east of this city last Friday by falling from a Midland passenger train, were taken through Noblesville, Saturday evening, to Fisher's Station, where they were buried Sunday Morning.

The particulars of the accident have not yet been published. Heady started to light his pipe in the general coach and, as there were two or three ladies on board, Conductor Trissal told him that if he wished to smoke he would have to go forward into the smoking compartment of the baggage car. He was helped across the platform by the conductor, but when the latter returned to the general coach, Heady followed him. Being under the influence of liquor, he could not steady himself while on the platform without assistance, and fell off. His neck was broken. He was 55 years of age and leaves a wife and several children in needy circumstances.

He died Friday, 16 Mar 1900, and was buried at Fisher's Station, presumably in the Heady Cemetery. However, his tombstone was not found in the Heady Cemetery nor in any of the other cemetery inscriptions recorded in the Noblesville-Southeastern Library.

Three Children were born to William and Louisa Heady. They are:⁵¹³

39. Polly³ Ann Heady (*Vincent²*, James¹) was born 16 Jul 1856 and died 8 Dec 1927.⁵¹⁴ She and William Franklin Humbles were married 23 Oct 1875 in Hamilton County,

Indiana.⁵¹⁵ He was born 3 Apr 1856⁵¹⁶ and died 3 Jan 1936 in Wayne, Michigan, where he had gone to visit his son, Lawrence.⁵¹⁷ Familiarly called "Frank," he was the son of **Isaac and Mary Jane Humbles**.⁵¹⁸ Polly Ann, William, and many of their children are buried in the Lowery Cemetery.

In the partition of Vincent Heady's real estate previously mentioned, Polly Ann and Amanda were given the homestead then occupied by Sarah Heady, subject to a life estate of Sarah Heady. Because Amanda was dead, Polly Ann got possession of the entire homestead on the death of her mother. Polly Ann was living there when she died.

40. Thomas⁴ Heady (*Joseph*³, *Vincent*², *James*¹) was born in March 1867⁵³⁹ in Hamilton County, Indiana. His mother Phebe [Tharp] Heady married, second, Sylvester Cutts 6 Apr 1868.⁵⁴⁰ Nothing further has been found concerning Sylvester Cutts. In the 1870 census, Phebe Cuts (sic) is living with her parents Vincent and Emaline Tharp. Thomas, 4, and a male Charles, 1, is living with them. Then on 23 October 1874 Phebe [Tharp] Cutts married, third, David E. Bainter.⁵⁴¹

In the 1880 census for Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana, p. 20, dwelling 159, Thomas Heady, 13, is enumerated in the Geiger household. His relationship is nephew and he is at school. **Rebecca [Tharp] Geiger** was Phebe's sister.⁵⁴²

Thomas Heady married **Nora Trout** 7 Oct 1886 in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁵⁴³ Nora Trout was born Feb 1868⁵⁴⁴ in Tipton County, Indiana, the daughter of **James and Nancy [Hugh] Trout**.⁵⁴⁵ On the Marriage application he listed his occupation as farmer, but in the 1910 census he was the proprietor of a butcher shop in Noblesville. In the 1920 census for Indianapolis, Marion County, Indiana, Thomas and Nora Heady are living alone on Colorado Street.⁵⁴⁶ Nora Heady died 14 Feb 1928 in Indianapolis and is buried in the Crown Hill Cemetery, Indianapolis, Indiana.⁵⁴⁷

Chapter 7

Charles Heady

7. Charles² H. Heady (James¹) is shown here as the sixth child of James¹ and Dorotha However, the information concerning his birth date and birthplace are Heady. conflicting. The inscription on his grave in the Heady Cemetery has his death date 9 Aug 1852 and age at death 39 years 5 months and 1 day.⁵⁵⁶ That would make his birth 8 Mar 1813. But Mark Heady's birthdate is 27 Dec 1812 (also from the Heady Cemetery). These two birth dates are too close together to be possible. In the 1850 census, Charles age is shown as 32, which would make his birthdate be 1817 or 1818. But his birthplace is shown as Ohio, which is consistent with a birth date before 1815. So it is not possible to say for certain when he was born, but if he was born in Ohio, it must have been before 1815. This is based on the assumption that the James Heady family left Ohio shortly after James bought land in Jackson County, Indiana. Rubbings made of the inscriptions on the tombstones of Mark and Charles show that the dates cannot be mistaken. The only explanation is that the person making the tombstone got the wrong information or made a mistake. Without additional information, it is not possible to determine which dates are correct.

Charles Heady was a farmer like his brothers. On 29 Jan 1838 he bought 40 acres of land from **Frederick Redwine**.⁵⁵⁷ He sold this property to Vincent Heady on 6 Aug 1852, three days before his death. In the 1850 agricultural census, he has improved 30 acres and 10 acres are unimproved. During the year, he produced 25 bushels of wheat and 600 bushels of corn. This is comparable to that of his brother Vincent.

On 14 Jun 1844 he married **Bulin (Beulah?) Tucker**,⁵⁵⁸ daughter of **George and Nancy Tucker**.⁵⁵⁹ She was born 9 March 1825 and died 18 Apr 1848 at age 23, probably in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁵⁶⁰ Buliah (the tombstone spelling) and Charles are buried in the Heady Cemetery, as are Buliah's mother and father.⁵⁶¹

Charles H. Heady died 9 Aug 1852, probably in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁵⁶² He made a will on 6 Aug 1852 and it was proved on 25 Aug 1852.⁵⁶³ He directed that first his just debts and funeral expenses be paid. The remainder of his estate was to be applied to the education of his daughter Nancy Ann during her minority and then for her to have on

reaching her majority. He asked that his "friend and brother Thomas Heady" be his executor and the guardian of his daughter.

Charles and Buliah Heady had two children:

But on 10 Nov 1854 Thomas Heady died and it was necessary to name another guardian for Nancy Ann. Then on 12 Feb 1855, another brother, Andrew² Jackson Heady became the guardian.⁵⁶⁶ In the 1860 census, Nancy Ann was living with her grandmother, Dorotha.⁵⁶⁷ On 5 Jan 1864 Andrew J. Heady reported to the court that he had purchased 61 1/2 acres of land for Nancy Ann and executed a deed in her name.⁵⁶⁸

41. Nancy³ Ann Heady (*Charles² James¹*) was born 24 Mar 1845, probably in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 9 Aug 1900,⁵⁶⁹ she is buried in East Hill Cemetery in Neosho County, Kansas. She married Fifield C. Fausset on 6 Apr 1864 in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁵⁷⁰ He was born 24 Mar 1836,⁵⁷¹ the son of Jacob V. and Lavinia Fausset.⁵⁷² Fifield Faussett may be buried in East Hill Cemetery in Neosho County, Kansas, in the same plot with Nancy Ann, five of their children, and his mother Lavinia. There is a tombstone in the Fausset plot with his name inscribed. It has his birth date on it but his death date is not cut. It is possible that he is not buried there, but that a tombstone was erected for him when his wife died. Then if he died somewhere else, he may not have been buried in Neosho County.

Lavinia Faussett, Fifield Faussett's mother, was born 4 Nov 1808 and died 7 Nov 1872.⁵⁷³ Jacob Faucett (sic.) died prior to 20 Feb 1867 when his estate was entered into probate in the Hamilton County, Indiana, Circuit Court.⁵⁷⁴ Apparently many or all of the Faussets moved to Kansas before 1870. Besides Fifield, Lavinia's sons Richard, J.V., and Robert have been found in Kansas censuses.

On 3 Aug 1864, Andrew J. Heady reported to the Hamilton County Court that he had paid to Nancy Ann's husband the remainder of her inheritance and his guardianship was terminated.⁵⁷⁵ Sometime thereafter, the Fifield Fausset family moved to Allen County, Kansas, where they are recorded in the 1870 U.S. census.⁵⁷⁶ They bought property in Allen County, ⁵⁷⁷ but later moved to the city of Osage Mission in Neosho County, Kansas, where they are recorded in the 1875 Kansas state census.⁵⁷⁸ The Fifield Fausset family was not found in the 1880 or the 1900 U.S. censuses for Kansas. Many states besides

Kansas were surveyed in the 1900 census, but they were not found. At this time, it has not been possible to determine what happened to this family.

Ida May, John Elmer, Larue, Blanch and infant are buried in East Hill Cemetery, Neosho Co., KS. The other children are named in *Heady Family Information*. Larue and Leroy may be the same person.

Mary Heady

8. Mary² Heady (*James¹*) was born 18 Oct 1815,⁵⁸⁵ probably in Jackson County, Indiana, and died 28 Mar 1875 in New Britton, Hamilton County, Indiana.⁵⁸⁶ She married **David Redwine** before 1832, probably in Hamilton County.⁵⁸⁷ David Redwine was born about 1808 in Virginia⁵⁸⁸ and died 12 Sep 1897 in Hamilton County.⁵⁸⁹ Mary and David are both buried in the Heady Cemetery, but David's tombstone was not found.

David Redwine bought 40 acres of land from the U.S. government in partnership with his brother-in-law James² Heady in 1833 (SW1/4 NE1/4 S35 T18 R4).⁵⁹⁰ He subsequently sold his interest in this land to James Heady⁵⁹¹ and bought land in Fall Creek Township. He was a farmer and the Redwines lived on that land the remainder of their lives.

There is nothing spectacular to tell about David and Mary. They were good citizens and good parents. When their daughter Lucinda died, with her husband already dead, they raised her children. Later in life, after Mary had died, David was the subject of the following item in *The Ledger* on 10 May 1889:

It has been said that "trouble never comes singly" and recent events seem to verify it. Mr. David Redwine, an octogenerian of this place, and a pioneer of this county, lost a good dwelling house by fire a few weeks ago, which, as there was no insurance, was an entire loss. I might add a big loss financially; and now Trip is sick, nigh unto death. Trip is not a large dog, but Mr. R prizes him just as highly as if he were ever so large. Mr. Redwine is 81 years old, and some few years ago when Trip was in the prime of canine life, Mr. R believing that he would precede Trip to the "unknown beyond," made a will; the "last will and testament" as it were, in which he devised and set apart \$20 for the benefit of this intelligent rat-killer, but today it looks as if Trip would shuffle off this mortal coil first, as Uncle Dave, as Mr. R is familiarly called, is hale and hearty. Should trip not rally from his present illness it would be a sad blow to Uncle Dave, as they have been inseparable companions for many years. The Noblesville Democrat had the following article in the 25 Mar 1894:⁵⁹²

Trip, a little dog belonging to Mr. David Redwine and a close companion of the old gentleman's for more than a dozen years, was killed by the cars last Saturday.

So David Redwine was able to enjoy the company of Trip for another five years.

On 1 Jun 1882 Martha Redwine m. George H. Gerwig.⁶⁰⁵ Martha Gerwig is buried in the Heady Cemetery.⁶⁰⁶

42. James³ C. Redwine (*Mary*², *James*¹)was born 26 Jun 1832 in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 25 Dec 1875 in Hamilton County.⁶⁰⁷ He is buried in the Heady Cemetery. James³ married Nancy J. Lewis on 3 Sep 1867 in Hamilton County.⁶⁰⁸ She was born about 1840 in Indiana.⁶⁰⁹

He served in the 153rd Indiana Volunteers during the Civil War. This Regiment was mustered into service the 1st of March, 1865 and was discharged 6 Sep 1865. James Redwine was a corporal.⁶¹⁰

James Redwine was not wounded in the war, but died of a gunshot inflicted while at a turkey shoot 24 Dec 1875. The circumstances of his death were reported on page 1 of the *Noblesville Ledger*, 31 Dec 1875:

A shooting match was held at Lowry's Woods, about one mile and a half below Fisher's Station, Friday of last week, which was largely attended by people in the neighborhood. The shooting was for turkeys, and a considerable interest seemed to be manifested by the participants. In the forenoon everything passed off quietly, and until between one and two o'clock, when a dispute arose between two men named Dick Parsley and James Redwine, both living in the vicinity, as to a shot that had just been made; examining the board Parsly claimed a shot as the one he had just made, which Redwine insisted was made in the forenoon. The mis-understanding grew into a violent quarrel which ended in the two disputants, clinching each other, when Parsly drew a revolver, and while they were scuffling shot, twice in succession, and then after a second's intermission a third time, the last shot taking effect in the stomach of Redwine, when they separated. Redwine declaring that he was fatally shot, was taken by his father toward his residence, which was only a few yards away...The suffering man lingered until Saturday morning at ten o'clock, when his injuries proved fatal...Parsly remained in the neighborhood for a few hours, when he disappeared, and at present writing has not been heard from. A warrant for his arrest was issued after he left, from the court of Esquire Cropper, and since then another has gone from Coroner Loehr.

In March of 1876, Parsley was arrested for the murder of James Redwine.⁶¹¹ He was found guilty and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.⁶¹²

Nancy Redwine was found in the 1880 U.S. census for Hamilton County, Indiana with five children.⁶¹³ These are the known children of James and Nancy **Redwine:**

Lucinda³ Redwine (*Mary*², *James*¹) was born 12 Aug 1836 (this date has been adjusted to compensate for assumed error on the tombstone, see endnote) probably in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 6 Sep 1870 in Hamilton County.⁶¹⁷ She married 12 Jan 1854 in Hamilton County Isaiah Brooks.⁶¹⁸ He was born about 1830 in Ohio and died 11 Jun 1863 of typhoid fever in the City General Hospital, Indianapolis, Indiana.⁶¹⁹ At the time of his death, Isaiah Brooks was a private in F Company of the 16th Indiana Volunteers. Isaiah and Lucinda Brooks are buried in the Heady Cemetery. In private life, Isaiah was a farmer.

On the death of Lucinda Brooks, in 1870, her father, David Redwine, became the guardian of her then living children.

She was born in December 1858 in Indiana, the daughter of Isaiah and Charlotte [Essery] Applegate.⁶³⁰ On Sunday, 30 Oct 1932, Eveline and Marcus Brooks celebrated their fiftieth wedding aniversary at their home in McCordsville, Indiana.⁶³¹

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Chapter 9

Thomas Heady

9. Thomas² Heady (*James*¹) was born 29 Nov 1817 probably in Jackson County, Indiana, and died 10 Nov 1854 in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁶³⁹ He is buried in the Heady Cemetery, Fishers, Hamilton County, Indiana. He married 27 Jan 1842 in Marion County, Indiana, **Susan A. Vert**.⁶⁴⁰ She was born 13 Jan 1819 in Kentucky,⁶⁴¹ and died 4 Sep 1867, probably in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁶⁴² She is buried in the Heady Cemetery.

Thomas Heady was a farmer, also. At his death, he owned about 120 acres. His will left his property to his wife for her life. On her death it was to be divided among his heirs, except that "my daughter July Ann is to have two hundred dollars more than the rest of my heirs in consequence of her lameness". Andrew J. Heady was named executor.

47. Malinda³ Heady (*Thomas*², *James*¹) was born about 1852 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁶⁷⁴ She married twice. Her first marriage was to John O. Rooker on 7 Dec 1871 in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁶⁷⁵ He was born about 1848.

Malinda [Heady] Rooker's second marriage was to Wm J. McLead on 12 Mar 1882 in Hamilton County, Indiana. He was born about 1861, the son of Norman and Hester [Dowler] McLead.⁶⁷⁹ No children of Wm and Malinda McLead have been found.

Susan [Vert] Heady married 6 Sep 1855 Samuel Rooker.⁶⁸⁰ He was born about 1812 in Indiana and died 20 Mar 1878 in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁶⁸¹ As shown above, Susan [Vert] Heady Rooker died 4 Sep 1867 and is buried in the Heady Cemetery.

Samuel and Susan Rooker had one child:

Apparently Samuel Rooker moved to Neosho County, Kansas, before 1870 because the 1870 census for Erie Township., Neosho County, Kansas, shows the following family in dwelling 248:

Chapter 10

Andrew Jackson Heady

10. Andrew² Jackson Heady (*James¹*) was born 13 Nov 1821,⁶⁸² probably in what became Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 7 Mar 1878 in Erie Township, Neosho County, Kansas.⁶⁸³ He is buried in East Hill Cemetery in Neosho County, Kansas.⁶⁸⁴ Andrew Jackson Heady never married, but he did have an illegitimate son by a woman named Lucy Pearce.⁶⁸⁵ Lucy Pearce was born about 1826 in North Carolina. Her father was Elijah Pearce and her mother's given name was Celia.⁶⁸⁶

Andrew Jackson Heady was less than six years old when his father died. Census records show him living with his mother in the 1850 and 1860 U.S. censuses for Hamilton County, Indiana (see Chapter 1). Although the 1830 and 1840 censuses don't name anyone other than head of household, he is assumed to be living with his mother those years also. His obituary in the *Neosho County Record* (Saturday, 16 Mar 1878) states, he went to work "...not only maintaining his widowed mother in comfort during the whole of her life, but accumulated a handsome competency for his declining years."

He must have been a successful businessman because he bought and sold land on several occasions. These are recorded in the Hamilton County Deed Books between 1850 and 1870. His occupation is farmer in 1850 and 1860 and he owns land in both censuses. As was noted in Chapter 9, he was the guardian of Nancy Heady after the death of Thomas Heady and he was the executor of Thomas Heady's estate.

After the death of his mother, he moved to Neosho County, Kansas, where he bought 160 acres of land 17 Apr 1869.⁶⁸⁷ Additional land purchases were made in 1869 and 1870.⁶⁸⁸ He appears in the 1875 Kansas State census for Neosho County.⁶⁸⁹ Enumerated with him is **Jno Leach**, 52. Andrew Jackson Heady declares that he paid \$50 in wages and has 50 acres planted in corn and 2 in oats. He farmed this land until his death.

The only known child of Andrew Jackson Heady is:

48. Alfred³ Tennyson Heady (Andrew², James¹) was born 31 Mar 1844, probably in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁶⁹⁰ He died 23 Aug 1891 in Neosho County, Kansas, and is buried in East Hill Cemetery, Neosho County, Kansas.⁶⁹¹ His mother was Lucy Pearce, as explained above. He married 18 Oct 1871 Martha Elisabeth Castetter,⁶⁹² daughter of Michael and Sarah Elisabeth [Heady] Castetter (see Chapter 13 for this family). Martha Castetter was born 12 Feb 1855 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana and died 13 May 1938 in Neosho County, Kansas.⁶⁹³

Alfred T. Heady lived his early life with his mother and her family in Morgan County, Indiana. His name during his youth was Alfred Verlin Pearce. This family is found in the 1850 U.S. census for Morgan County, IN, dwelling 443:

The two children, Verlin and Jane, are too young to be Celia's. We know from the evidence above that Verlin is Lucy's child. Jane could be either Millie's or Lucy's. There is a family in Hamilton County, Indiana, in the 1840 census whose head is **Elijah Pearce**.⁶⁹⁴ The Hamilton County family bears some resemblance to the Morgan County family, but there are some discrepancies. In the 1840 Hamilton County family there are two males, one 10-15, and one 60-70. There are also two females, one 15-20 and one 60-70. The male 15-20 could be Elisha and the female 15-20 could be either Millie or Lucy. The discrepancies are the ages of the older man and woman and the missing female. Elijah and Celia can't be 60-70 in 1840 and then 65 and 63 in 1850. Possibly the census taker made a mistake and the Pearce couple in Hamilton County were only 50-60.

The 1860 U.S. census for Morgan County, Indiana, has the following family:695

Alfred V. Pierce enlisted in Company K, 1st Heavy Artillery Battery, on 6 Jul 1861. He was discharged on 31 Jul 1864.⁶⁹⁶ His service record shows he is 5' 10" tall, fair complexion, blue eyes, and brown hair. He enlisted as a Private and was promoted to Corporal on 1 Nov 1863.

It is his Civil War service that provides the connection between Alfred Verlin Pierce/Pearce and Alfred Tennyson Heady. After his death, Martha Heady applied for a widows pension. In her application she states "...he was known as 'Pearce' before his enlistment and service, that being his mother's name. My husband being an illegit child of Andrew J. Heady, and after the war, his father recognized him and he took his true name before I and he were married".⁶⁹⁷

During his service, Alfred Pierce/Heady was wounded on two occasions, according to his pension record. He returned to duty on each occasion after recovery. He entered the service as a private and was promoted to corporal, the rank he held when discharged. Following his discharge, the officers of his company sent a letter to **Oliver P. Morton**, Governor of Indiana, that said in part:⁶⁹⁸

We the commissioned officers of the 1st Indiana Arty take pleasure in recommending him as a sober, moral, and upright man in every respect. And should he desire to again enter the service, we cheerfully recommend him ...

After the Civil War, Alfred Heady went to Hamilton County. In the 1870 U.S. census he is living with Elisabeth Heady, the widow of Perry Heady (see Chapter 12 for Perry Heady), in Delaware Township, p. 49, dwelling 36. His occupation is listed as medical student. After he married Martha Elizabeth Castetter, who was his first cousin once removed, they moved to Neosho County, Kansas, for a short time and lived with his father Andrew.⁶⁹⁹ Their first child, **Charles Darwin Heady**, was born in Kansas. But Kansas at this time didn't suit them and they moved back to Hamilton County, Indiana. That is where their second child was born in 1874.

Having a family apparently was not compatible with training to be a doctor, because Alfred became a farmer. He was a charter member of Hamilton Lodge, No. 533,

A.F.&A.M. It was first organized 11 Feb 1876 and the charter was granted 22 May 1877.⁷⁰⁰ Two other charter members were B. P. Castetter and Jacob Castetter, both of whom married Heady women. The close relationship of the Castetter and Heady families of Hamilton County is discussed in Chapter 13.

On 7 Mar 1878, Alfred's father, Andrew Jackson Heady, died in Neosho County, Kansas.⁷⁰¹ On 13 Mar 1878 the Probate Judge for Neosho County appointed **Henry Lodge** special administrator for A. J. Heady's estate until it could be determined who the heir(s) were. On the 15th of Apr 1878, A. T. Heady appeared in Neosho County court and showed that he was the only surviving son of A. J. Heady.⁷⁰² Thereupon, the court appointed him administrator of A. J. Heady's estate. Alfred and Martha Heady moved to Neosho County, Kansas, and lived there the rest of their lives.

Charles⁴ Darwin Heady (*Alfred³*, *Andrew²*, *James¹*) was born 15 Aug 1872 in Neosho County, Kansas, and died 4 Nov 1966 in Neosho County.⁷¹⁰ He is buried at East Hill Cemetery, in Neosho County. On 7 Oct 1896 he and Lillian Angeline Neal were married in Neosho County.⁷¹¹ She was born in April 1879⁷¹² and died 31 Aug 1931.⁷¹³

He was a farmer in Neosho County, Kansas, until 1941. In 1923 he was elected Neosho County Treasurer, an office he held for two terms. In 1948, he moved to Parsons, Kansas, where he served as constable until his health failed. He was a member of the Erie Christian Church.⁷¹⁴

On 11 Apr 1900 Ada Heady and Henry Fouts, were married in Neosho County.⁷²¹ He was born 9 Jul 1873 near Terre Haute, Indiana, the son of James and Lavisa Fouts. He died 23 Mar 1923 in Johnson Hospital in Chanute, Neosho County following an operation for appendicitis. He is buried in East Hill Cemetery, Neosho County.⁷²²

He died 2 Dec 1959 of a heart attack while raking leaves and is buried in East Hill Cemetery.⁷²⁴ On 18 Nov 1906, Thomas Heady and Marie (Mary) Bollinger were married in Neosho County.⁷²⁵ She was born 22 Dec 1883 in Galesburg, Kansas, and died 4 Apr 1962.⁷²⁶

Thomas Heady was a farmer. He belonged to the A.F. & A.M. and his religion was Baptist.

Her first marriage was 30 Dec 1909 in Neosho County, to **Ervin Orion Detrick**.⁷²⁹ He was born 27 Aug 1882, on a farm near Parsons, Neosho County, Kansas, and died 18 Oct 1918 in Bartlesville, Oklahoma.⁷³⁰ He is buried in East Hill Cemetery, Neosho County. His occupation was lawyer. He was a member of the Nights of Pythias and the Methodist Episcopal Church.

On 18 Jul 1956 Pearl Heady Detrick married Alfred Steven Thomas. He was born 17 Sep 1880 in Willowbranch, Indiana, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Thomas. He died 23 Jun 1967 in Parsons, Neosho County, and was buried at the Gate Oklahoma Cemetery, Laverne, Oklahoma.⁷³¹ He was a member of the Methodist Church. Alfred Thomas came to Kansas with his parents as a child. He had been previously married to Stella _____.

54. Vearlin⁴ Tennyson Heady (*Alfred³*, *Andrew²*, *James¹*), was born 17 May 1888 in Neosho County, Kansas, and died 3 Feb 1960 in Erie, Neosho County, of a heart attack.⁷³² He is buried in East Hill Cemetery, Neosho County, Kansas. Vearl Heady and Maude Mae Blaine were married 22 Nov 1910 at Erie, Kansas.⁷³³ She was born 4 Oct 1886 in Erie, Kansas, and died 5 Feb 1953 in Erie.⁷³⁴ She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Blaine.⁷³⁵

Vearl Heady was a farmer in Erie, Kansas. He was a member of the Erie Federated Church.

George** 24 Dec 1907 in Neosho County.⁷³⁷ He was born 28 Sep 1886,⁷³⁸ the son of **Mr. and Mrs. Ed L. George**.⁷³⁹ Fred George died 11 Aug 1976 and is buried in East Hill Cemetery, Neosho County.⁷⁴⁰

The life of Fred and Edith George was summarized in an obituary to Fred George:⁷⁴¹

Fred and Edith George were farmers. Somehow, through good years and lean years, they managed to give their large family all the comforts and some of the luxuries of life. They did it without complaining. They did it because they loved their children and because they were willing to work - and work hard.

During their long years of marriage and the hard times they must have endured in rearing this fine family, Fred and Edith George received no special acclaim for wealth, power, or great achievement.

That is if you don't consider as success that they provided well for a large family, earned the deep love of their children and their children's children, and had the satisfaction of seeing those children return home on frequent visits just because they wanted to be with their parents.

Chapter 11

Sarah Heady

11. Sarah² Ann Heady (*James¹*), was born about 1822, probably in what became Hamilton County, Indiana. She probably died between 1866 when her mother's estate was settled and the 1870 U.S. census, when her family is living in Neosho County, Kansas. She married 3 Mar 1842 Henry Eller in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁷⁴³ The Henry Eller family is found in Delaware Township., Hamilton County, Indiana, census in both 1850 and 1860.⁷⁴⁴ Then in 1870, the family is living in Neosho County, Kansas.⁷⁴⁵ But Sarah is not listed.

Henry Eller was born in Ohio about 1821, based on census information.⁷⁴⁶ His death has not been found. Neither has it been possible to determine who his parents were. The Eller name was prominent in Delaware Township during the period covered. Probates of possible parents of Henry Eller were examined, but he was not included.

Henry Eller was a farmer and apparently a successfuel one. The table on the following page shows the agriculture census for 1850 and 1860 for Henry Eller. As can be seen, all categories measured improved. Why did he leave Indiana for Kansas and what happened to Sarah Ann?

Henry Eller married second 19 Apr 1877 America Wise in Neosho County, Kansas.⁷⁵⁵ She was born about 1829 in Indiana, daughter of Peter and Elisabeth Wise.⁷⁵⁶ She was the widow of Hiram Rooker, the son of James I. and Betsy Ann Rooker.⁷⁵⁷ They had both lived in Delaware Township, Hamilton County, Indiana, prior to coming to Kansas. In the 1850 census for Delaware Township, Hamilton County, Indiana, the Rookers and Wises are neighbors, living in dwellings 67 and 70. The Henry Ellers live in dwelling 94.

Henry and America Eller had one child:

One interesting observation about the Eller and Rooker families is that Hiram Rooker officiated at the weddings of several of the Eller children. This indicates a close relationship of these families.

The Henry Eller family has not been found after the 1880 census.

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Chapter 12

Perry Heady

12. Perry² Heady (*James¹*), was born 8 Mar 1826 in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 30 Apr 1864 in Hamilton County.⁷⁵⁹ He is buried in the Heady Cemetery in Hamilton County. He married 10 Aug 1848 **Elizabeth Castetter**,⁷⁶⁰ born about 1827, probably in Marion County, Indiana.⁷⁶¹ She died before 11 Feb 1874, probably in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁷⁶² She is assumed to be the daughter of **Peter and Molly Castetter**.⁷⁶³

Perry was a farmer. In the 1850 census he is living in Delaware Township next to his brother James and has no land. Then in the 1860 census, he is living in Noblesville Township and declared real estate valued at \$3000.⁷⁶⁴ In the 1870 census, Perry is dead and Elizabeth is in Delaware Township and has \$1360 in real estate.⁷⁶⁵ The 1870 Agricultural Census for Delaware Township shows Elizabeth Heady with 18 acres improved and 16 acres unimproved. She has grown 69 bushels of wheat, 175 bushels of corn, and 20 bushels of potatoes. The only male old enough to work the farm in her household is Alfred T. Heady, Andrew Jackson's son (Chapter 10). He is listed as a medical student.

One interesting thing about Perry Heady is that on 20 Jul 1857 he took an apprentice named **Howard Huffman**.⁷⁶⁶ This apprentice was to live with him until 26 May 1861 and Perry was to provide him with food, clothing, shelter, and an education. Howard Huffman does not appear in the Perry Heady household in the 1860 census and nothing further has been seen concerning this arrangement. Apprenticeships were common in the early days, but this is the only one I found in my Indiana research.

Elizabeth Heady sold 33 acres of land in Section 30 T18 R5 to **Benjamin P. Castetter** on 18 Aug 1872.⁷⁶⁷ So when she died in 1874, she owned no land. Elizabeth left a will leaving each of her three surviving children the following specific bequest:⁷⁶⁸

Dorothy, one bed and bedstead complete. Amanda, one bed and bedstead complete. Joseph P., in lieu of a bed, two covers and fifty dollars. The remainder of her estate was to be divided equally among the three children. Each child received \$540.01. Charles W. Heady was her executor and became the guardian of her children.

56. Dorotha³ Heady (*Perry*², *James*¹), was born about 1857 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁷⁷⁸ She married **Benjamin L. Frazer** on 18 Aug 1878 in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁷⁷⁹ It is believed he was born about 1856, the son of **William and Mary Frazer**. The census records are somewhat confusing regarding this family and other records searched did not clear up the matter.

It is true that William and Mary Frazer had a son Benjamin L. who is 4 in 1860 and 14 in 1870.⁷⁸⁰ William Frazer is dead in 1870. Mary and her children are living next to Elizabeth and her children. Then the 1880 census for the Lindsay Frazer family is as shown in the following table.

Benjamin should be 24 if he is William and Mary's son. Of course he could be some other Benjamin L. Frazer. But Dortha is 23 and Mertie is one. We know Mertie's age for two reasons. First, Benjamin and Dorotha were married in 1878 and, second the *Ledger*, 5 Sep 1879, announced that "Lindsay Frazier is made happy...a girl baby."⁷⁸¹ In 1900, it is stated that Dorotha is the mother of two children.

The 1900 census doesn't help either. Lindsay is 54 (should be 44)and Dollie is 38 (should be 43).⁷⁸² Their son Ora is shown born in Apr 1882, but the Hamilton County birth record shows his birth occurring 2 Feb 1883.⁷⁸³

57. Amanda³ Heady (Perry², James¹), was born Nov 1859, probably in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁷⁹⁰ She and Robert F. Dunn were married 11 Dec 1879 in Hamilton County.⁷⁹¹ He was born in March 1860,⁷⁹² the son of Joseph and Amanda Dunn.⁷⁹³ Robert's occupation was businessman.

58. Joseph³ Perry Heady (*Perry²*, James¹) was born Sep 1864, probably in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁷⁹⁷ Heady Family Information, p. 11, states that Joseph Perry was raised in St. Mary's, Missouri, and that he later returned to Hamilton County. Nothing has been learned of his life before 1890, except that there is a Joseph Heady living with Anthony Hamble in Jefferson County, KS, in the 1880 census.⁷⁹⁸ Anthony Hamble was married to Mary Alice Heady (see Chapter 5). This Joseph Heady is 15 and could be the son of Perry and Elizabeth. Joseph Heady, son of Perry and Elizabeth, is Mary Alice [Heady] Hamble's cousin once removed.

On 11 Nov 1891, Joseph Perry Heady and **Bertha Steve** were married in St. Louis, Missouri.⁷⁹⁹ Then, on 24 Sep 1897, the Hamilton County Ledger carried this story on page 10: "NEW BRITTON Mrs. Dolly Frazer has her brother's children with her now, their mother having recently died in St Louis."

On 20 Feb 1899, Joseph Perry Heady and Nannie K. Bracken were married in Indianapolis.⁸⁰² She was the daughter of F. M. Bracken. Her mother's maiden name was Manship. At the time of the marriage, Nannie Bracken had a child, Thelma Bracken, who was born in 1895.⁸⁰³

After their marriage they moved to St. Louis Missouri where they are recorded in the 1900 U.S. census. However, their first child was born in Indiana. Maybe Nannie went to be with her mother during childbirth. Their other children were born in Missouri.

Joseph Heady died before April 1912. No death record nor will has been found. But he is shown in the 1911 St. Louis Directory. But in the 1912 Directory Nannie Heady is listed as widow. The effective date of the directory is April.⁸⁰⁴

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Chapter 13

Peter and Molly Castetter

Peter¹ Castetter was born about 1788 in Pennsylvania based on census information. He died after 1860.⁸¹⁰ He married **Mary M. (Molly) Rumple** 8 Apr 1819 in Butler Co., Ohio.⁸¹¹ She was born 13 May 1797 in North Carolina, and died 16 Nov 1859.⁸¹² Mary Castetter is buried in Beaver Cemetery in Hamilton County. The grave of Peter Castetter has not been located.⁸¹³ Five of Peter and Molly Castetter's children married descendants of James and Dorotha Heady. The Castetters were in Butler County, Ohio, before they moved to Indiana, as were James and Dorotha Heady.⁸¹⁴ It is not known whether they were acquainted in Ohio. While the Headys moved to Jackson County, Indiana, and then to Hamilton County, the Castetters moved to Marion County, Indiana, first.

Peter Castetter bought 69 acres of land in Lawrence Township., Marion County, Indiana, on 15 Oct 1821 from the Federal Government.⁸¹⁵ The record of this purchase shows him a resident of Butler County, Ohio. He developed and lived on this land until 1837. He was a Justice of the Peace in Marion County so he must have been an educated man.

In 1836, he bought 160 acres in Fall Creek Township., Hamilton County, Indiana, for \$625.⁸¹⁶ Then in 1837, he sold his Marion County property for \$1000 to Mark Day.⁸¹⁷ Molly Castetter signed with a mark.

59. Daniel² Castetter (*Peter¹*) was born 25 Jan 1820,⁸²⁴ probably in Ohio, and died 7 Sep 1877.⁸²⁵ He is buried in Beaver Cemetery. Daniel Castetter was married two times.⁸²⁶ His first marriage was to Rhoda Lewis on 11 Dec 1844 in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁸²⁷ She was born 25 Sep 1824, probably in North Carolina, and died 28 Nov 1857, probably in Hamilton County. She is buried in Beaver Cemetery.⁸²⁸

Daniel Castetter's second marriage was to **Pauline [Goodspeed] Garboder** on 11 Mar 1858 in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁸⁴⁴ She was born 21 Sep 1831 in Vermont,⁸⁴⁵ and died 29 Mar 1892 in Hamilton County.⁸⁴⁶ She is buried in Lowery Cemetery. **Pauline Goodspeed** and **Henry Garboder** were married 25 Sep 1852 in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁸⁴⁷ Henry Garboder died before 7 Feb 1859 when his estate was entered into probate.⁸⁴⁸

Daniel served in the Civil War in Co. I, 75th Indiana Volunteers. In civilian life, he was a farmer and a prominent member of the Stony Creek Grange.

Two trains were traveling in opposite directions on the same track and collided. Jacob Castetter was in the front seat of the smoker compartment and was shoved back ten feet in the collision. He was the only one killed.⁸⁷⁸

60. Jacob² M. Castetter (*Peter¹*) was born about 1830 probably in Marion County, Indiana.⁸⁸⁷ He married 31 Aug 1854, in Hamilton County, Lucretia³ Redwine,⁸⁸⁸ daughter of Frederick and Elisabeth² [Heady] Redwine (see chapter 3). Lucretia was born about 1836 probably in Hamilton County, Indiana, and died 8 Apr 1895 at New Britton, Hamilton County, Indiana.⁸⁸⁹ She is said to be buried in the Heady Cemetery, but her tombstone was not found.

Jacob and Lucretia Castetter lived in Fall Creek Township, Hamilton County. They are recorded in the 1860, 1870, and 1880 censuses.⁸⁹⁰ Several Hamilton County families moved to Kansas and in August, 1878, J. M. Castetter, Henry Redwine, and Winfield Alfrey were considering a move as well.⁸⁹¹ A Jacob Castetter died in Neosha County, Kansas, 23 Mar 1881.⁸⁹² No corroboration has been found that this is the Jacob Castetter that married Lucretia Redwine. But the age is right. He is 51 years, 5 months and 14 days old at death. This would make the birth date of this Jacob Castetter 9 Nov 1829, which agrees with the age on censuses for Lucretia's husband. The *Republican Ledger* (Noblesville, Indiana) reports on July 31, 1885, that "Mrs. Lucretia Castetter has rented the Osborn farm now owned by C. L. Young." This indicates Jacob Castetter is gone.

61. Michael² Castetter (*Peter¹*) was born 9 Sep 1832, probably in Marion County, Indiana, and died 10 Dec 1883 in Hamilton County, Indiana.⁹⁰⁶ He was buried 12 Dec 1883 in the Beaver Cemetery. He married 29 Mar 1854 in Hamilton County, Sarah³ Elizabeth Heady. daughter of Vincent² and Polly Ann [Richardson] Heady.⁹⁰⁷ She was born Nov 1835,⁹⁰⁸ probably in Hamilton County, (see Chapter 6) and died 17 Feb 1916 in Hamilton County.⁹⁰⁹ Sarah Castetter is buried in Beaver Cemetery.⁹¹⁰

Michael Castetter was first a farmer. He started by renting land but by 1860, he owned real estate valued at \$850.⁹¹¹ On 14 July 1862, he enlisted in Co. I of the 75th Indiana Regiment and served three years, being discharged 8 June 1865.⁹¹² At the time of his enlistment, there were four children living in his family, two having died young.⁹¹³

He served with distinction, being mustered out as a corporal. He was wounded at the battle of Chickamauga, 20 Sep 1863. His Captain, Mahlon H. Floyd, spoke highly of him and his contributions during the war.⁹¹⁴

On returning from the war, Michael Castetter continued his occupation as a farmer. He was quite successful in this occupation, but he branched out into other activites in later years. He is reported to be clearing ground for a brickyard in June of 1883 and in September is reported to be retiring from the grocery business.⁹¹⁵

During 1883, Michael Castetter had a new house built in Fisher's Station, Hamilton County, Indiana.⁹¹⁶ But on Monday night, 10 Dec 1883, Michael Castetter died of a heart attack. His obituary describes his last hours as the doctor sat with him unable to do more than comfort him.⁹¹⁷ Today, they would probably call the paramedics and he would have lived longer.

Benjamin Castetter married second, 26 Jan 1866 in Hamilton County, Fannie³ Jane Heady,⁹⁶⁰ daughter of Vincent² and Polly Ann Heady. Fannie was born 17 Sep 1844

in Hamilton County, and died 19 Aug 1908 in Hamilton County.⁹⁶¹ Benjamin Peter and Fannie Jane Castetter are buried in Gustin Cemetery, Hamilton County.

Benjamin Castetter was a veteran of the Civil War, having served in the 17th Indiana Light Artillery. In civilian life, he was a farmer and active in the Delaware Township chapter of the Grange. He was a past master of this organization.

In the 1900 census, Fanny Castetter says she is the mother of eleven children, seven of whom are living. But only ten are accounted for in the above listing.

A number of reference sources are used frequently. To save space and make these references easier to read, they are abbreviated in the end notes. The full reference for each abbreviated reference is given below. A number of record repositories were visited to obtain the information cited. These include libraries, Historical Societies, and Court Houses.

<u>Libraries</u>

By far the most used repository was the LDS Family History Library, in Salt Lake City, Utah, either through visits to Salt Lake City or by renting microfilm to read at a local Family History Center. Where this repository is the source, it will be abbreviated FHL. Other libraries used include Huntington Beach, California, Public Library; Los Angeles, California, Public library; Indiana State Library, Indianapolis, Indiana; and Noblesville-Southeastern Library, Noblesville, Indiana. Citations of these libraries will include only the name of the city or state and the word "Library."

Court Houses

Many court house records have been filmed and are available through the Family History Library. When the FHL was the source of the information, it will be so indicated by the words "FHL microfilm" followed by a seven digit number. However, during 1993 court houses in Kansas and Indiana were visited. If the information is from a court house visit, the end note will include the words "Court House."

Census Records

Census records taken by the United States and by the state of Kansas will be referenced by the date, state, county, township, page, and dwelling. For Kansas, the FHL microfilm number will be included.

Newspapers

Many old newspapers are on microfilm. A lot of the information in this book came from these old newspapers that were provided by the Indiana State Library, the Kansas Historical Society, the Denver Historical Society, or another similar repository. In the citation, the full name and repository will be indicated in all cases but one. The exception is the *Ledger*, a Noblesville Hamilton County, Indiana, newspaper that is the most frequently referenced newspaper. It began as a weekly newspaper and is now a daily paper in Noblesville. It has always had the name "Ledger" in its title along with other modifiers. Microfilm of back issues can be obtained on interlibrary loan from the Indiana State Library.

Vital Records

In Indiana, marriage records usually began with the formation of the county. But in the case of Hamilton County, marriage records begin in 1833, while the county was formed in 1823. The marriage records until 1882 consisted of a license to marry, issued by the clerk of the court, and a return provided by the person that officiated at the wedding. The only information in these records is the names of the participants and the date. A few records have no return indicating that no marriage took place or that it was not reported. In a few cases, where one or both of the participants was under legal age, a note giving permission to marry is attached, usually signed by a parent. In 1882, the State required that a marriage application be filled out prior to issuance of a license. This application included the parents of the applicants and the place of birth, as well as the ages of the applicants. Later, the application included the birth date of the applicants. Birth and death records also began in 1882, but many of these events went unrecorded in the early years.

<u>Cemeteries</u>

Inscriptions from cemeteries are used for births and deaths for a number of persons. Two cemeteries were personally visited, the Heady Cemetery in Fishers, Indiana and the Crown Point Cemetery in Kokomo, Indiana. The results of the survey of these cemeteries is given in Appendix III. Many cemeteries in Hamilton County, Howard County, and Tipton County have been surveyed by a number of persons and organizations. Results of these surveys are in the local libraries. It should be noted that some dates on tombstones, although carved in stone, have been found to be wrong. Where dates are suspect, it will be noted. Frequent cemetery abbreviations are as follows:

Heady Cemetery Inscriptions: See Appendix III.

Highland Cemetery Inscriptions: This cemetery is in Fall Creek Township. Three cemeteries, the Beaver, the Gustin, and the New Gustin, were combined in the early 1900s and were incorporated as the Highland cemetery. 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Appendix I

James Heady's Ancestors

In Chapter 1, it was claimed that James Heady was the son of Thomas Heady, Jr., who died in Nelson County, Kentucky, in 1811. Much that is known about Thomas Heady, Jr., and his father, Thomas Heady, Sr., is presented in the *Heady Family Newsletter*.¹ This Appendix is a short summary of that information.

The first *Heady Family Newsletter* is dated November 1971. It was published by Pat Heady Green and her father, Dr. Earl O. Heady. It continued quarterly until the last issue, which was published October, 1974. This newsletter has been put on microfiche by the Genealogical Society of Utah and can be seen at the Family History Library in Utah or at local Family History Centers. I have found that a few pages are missing on this microcopy. The Indiana State Library also has this newsletter and I found the missing pages in their holdings. We are indebted to Pat Heady Green and Dr. Earl O. Heady for the time and effort they put into this project.

Their history of the Heady family begins with the marriage of Thomas Heady and Rebecca Stillwell on 24 June 1749 in New Jersey. The place of this wedding is shown as Egg Harbor, New Jersey, in the *Heady Family Newsletter*. Others have placed it in Jersey City. The antecedents of Thomas Heady are not known, but evidence of other Headys in New Jersey, Connecticut, and in the South can be found. The *Heady Family Newsletter* followed the progeny of Thomas and Rebecca. This Appendix will summarize what the newsletter published about the families of Thomas Heady, Sr. and his son Thomas Heady, Jr., who are claimed to be the grandfather and father of the James Heady that moved to Hamilton County, Indiana about 1820. Anyone interested in more information about the early Headys should consult the original newsletters.

There is a gap in our knowledge about Thomas and Rebecca Heady between their marriage in 1749 and their appearance in records of the Tonoloway settlement in Cumberland County, Pennsylvania, in September, 1766 (Extra Issue, October, 1974, p. 10). When they first moved there is not known, but their departure can be placed as about 1769 when Thomas Heady, Sr. and Thomas Heady, Jr. had land surveyed in what

became Fayette County, Pennsylvania. The Headys lived in Fayette County, Pennsylvania, for about twenty years. About 1788, Thomas Heady, Sr. sold his land and moved to Nelson County, Kentucky. Thomas Heady, Jr. remained in Pennsylvania until about 1791 when he sold his land in Fayette County. Thomas Heady, Jr., appears in the 1790 U.S. census for Fayette County, Pennsylvania. In 1792, he is in the Nelson County, Kentucky, tax rolls.

1. Thomas Heady, Jr. was born about 1750. His place of birth has not been established. He died about 1811 in Nelson County, Kentucky. The first record of him is the survey request for land, described above, in what became Fayette County, Pennsylvania, on 27

Jun 1769. He appears in tax records in Pennsylvania during the period up to 7 May 1791, when he sold his land to an Isaac Wynn. Thereafter he appears in Nelson County, Kentucky, tax records until his death. Thomas Heady married Elizabeth Lloyd probably in Fayette County, Pennsylvania, in 1770 to 1775. The exact date is not known, but their oldest son, James³ Heady, was born between 1775 and 1779, as discussed in Chapter 1. Thomas Heady, Jr. left a will naming his children (*Heady Family Newsletter*, v. 1, p. 16).

Appendix II

Heady Family History

In 1938, Martha Castetter Heady of Neosho County, Kansas, told her granddaughter, Freeda George Pierce, what she knew about the descendants of James and Dorotha Heady. Freeda George Pierce typed what she heard and gave copies to various persons interested in the Heady family. One copy was given to Sheryl Johnson, the wife of James Johnson, a direct descendant of James and Dorotha Heady. James Johnson is the great grandson of Alfred Tennyson Heady and Martha Castetter Heady, and the grandson of Fred George and Edith Heady. Sheryl Johnson made a copy for me and gave me permission to include this information in my book.

Martha Castetter Heady and Freeda George Pierce have done a great service to those of us who would like to learn more of the history of our ancestors. Records about those of us who are not in the lime light are few and sometimes difficult to find. It would be very helpful if more persons would take the time to record what they know about their family.

Every effort has been made to record the rememberances of Martha Castetter Heady exactly as they were recorded. The copy given to me was scanned into my word processor. However, the copy was imperfect and some words were not easy for my computer to interpret. So I had to make corrections, which may have resulted in some errors. Also, the type style available to me was not exactly like that in the original. Within these restrictions, I believe this to be as true a reproduction as possible.

Some of the information presented in this appendix may not agree with that in the book. The differences are recognized, but the book version is as near correct as possible. Sources are cited, but it must be realized that no source is one hundred percent reliable. The amount of information supplied by Martha Castetter Heady is phenomenal. Her memory may not completely agree with what my research has found, but that is a small matter considering the shear volume of facts she supplied. We can only pray that our inemories will be that good when we are 83.

HEADY FAMILY

James Heady Sr. was horn in the 1700's in Kentucky. He had 8 brothers but they all scattered, don't know who or where any of them are. James settled in Indiana, but don't know if before or after his marriage to Dorothy Harvey who was born in Vermont around 1790. They had eleven children. James Jr., Lewis, Mark, Thomas, Charles, Vincent, Perry, Jackson, Mary, Elizabeth, and Sara Ann. James Sr. and wife Dorothy are buried in the Heady Cemetery in Indiana.

Jackson Heady son of James Heady Sr. was born October 13, 1821. He and Lucy Pearce (The mother of Aunt Jennie Thomas who lived in Iowa) had one child Alfred. Seems as though the Pearce's were somewhat well to do and they forbade their daughter to marry Jackson. I don't know who raised Alfred but Jackson came to Kansas in the 1800's and never married. He is buried in the Erie Cemetery, I think it is listed as Andrew Jackson Heady.

Alfred followed later but returned to Indiana where he met Martha Castetter. In a letter he wrote from Indiana to Kansas – "I have met a wonderful girl and hope to marry her. You know in this day and age one can't be too careful." (I guess each generation thinks the same thing)

Alfred was born March 31, 1844 and married Martha Castetter born Feb. 12, 1855. She was the daughter of Sarah Elizabeth Heady Castetter which made them second cousins. They had 11 children. Alfred studied medicine for a short while but did not get to finish.

Just how Grandmother Heady became the best of friends with Aunt Jennie Thomas in Iowa I never found out as she passed away in May of 1938, she gave me, Freeda George Pierce, the Heady history in February of 1938. Now there are several questions unanswered.

Grandmother said some thought the Heady's formally spelled their name Heddy but she didn't know or if so how far back it had changed.

Liddie George, 2nd wife of Wesley Heady, son of James Heady Sr., was related to the George's in Erie. The Georges came from Indiana and settled in Erie just north of the old high school and had a farm, in fact the land in that area of Erie is known as the George Addition. My great Grandfather George helped Grandmother Heady in many ways after Grandfather died. He gave her the land where she built her home on North Main. *Grandmother said he was a real friend indeed. Aunt Pearl use to tell how nice he was to all the kids. I can just barely remember him. As you know they came to Kansas went back to Indiana then returned to Kansas and stayed. Uncle Jim use to say "I was conceived in Iowa, born in Indiana and raised in Kansas."*

What a mind Grandmother had. None of this was written _____ she just gave it to me as I wrote.

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APPENDIX III

CEMETERY INSCRIPTIONS

Inscriptions from several cemeteries in Indiana, and a cemetery in Neosho, Kansas, have been cited in a number of end notes. Two cemeteries were visited by the author and his wife in the summer of 1993. These were the Heady Cemetery in Fishers, Hamilton County, Indiana, and the Crown Point Cemetery in Kokomo, Howard County, Indiana. Inscriptions from headstones of Headys or related families were recorded. The results of those visits are recorded in the pages that follow. In end notes, information derived from these two cemeteries are referred to by *Heady Cemetery Inscriptions* and *Crown Point Cemetery Inscriptions*.

Many, if not all, cemeteries in Hamilton County have been surveyed over a period of years and the records of these surveys are in the custody of the Noblesville-Southeastern Library in Noblesville, Indiana (ref. 977.256). The inscriptions from these surveys, as well as the two mentioned above were used to provide birth and death information in some cases. In the footnotes, these cemetery inscriptions will be referred to by the name of the cemetery. The author has copied inscriptions of the cemeteries referenced. The reader can obtain verification from the Noblesville-Southeastern Library. An explanation is in order for one of the references. The Highland Cemetery in Fall Creek Township was originally three cemeteries that have been combined. In the text, the name of the original cemetery is used (Beaver, Gustin, or New Gustin), but the end note will read "Highland Cemetery inscriptions" because that is the name of the survey in the library.

Another cemetery that is referenced, primarily in chapter 10, is the East Hill Cemetery in Erie County, Kansas. Inscriptions from this cemetery were published by the Chanute Kansas Genealogical Society. Copies referred to are in custody of the Los Angeles Public Library, Los Angeles, California, and the Carlsbad Public Library, Carlsbad, California. This reference is also available on microfilm from the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, Utah.

HEADY CEMETERY, HAMILTON COUNTY, INDIANA

The Heady Cemetery is located in Fishers, Delaware Township, Hamilton County, Indiana. It is on property formerly owned by Dorotha Heady. Inscriptions from this cemetery have been published on two previous occasions that I am aware of. The first was in 1972 by Ted and Kathy Humbles in *The Heady Newsletter*.² The second was in the 1980s by James and Velma Correll. The Corrells surveyed many of the cemeteries in Hamilton County. Their published surveys can be found in the Noblesville-Southeastern Library. The listing of inscriptions that follows is the result of three visits to the Heady Cemetery in June and July of 1993 by my wife and myself.

Our intent was to confirm the previous readings and resolve several discrepancies between them. We used three methods to bring out the inscriptions. First, we used shaving cream to enhance the inscriptions that were hard to read. Second, we photographed a number of the tombstones, both in color and in black and white. Third we made rubbings of a number of the tombstones that were either difficult to read or where there was a discrepancy between the previous surveys or between their survey and ours.

We found several foundations without tombstones, suggesting that some were missing. A resident living near the cemetery said that he and some other residents had found a number of tombstones stacked in a corner of the cemetery and that they had replaced them. The Corrells report in the preface to their readings that "natives of the area tell us that many of the gravestones of the cemetery are missing and are presumed to have been thrown into the lake during the development and construction of this area."

The Humbles published primarily the Heady names and did not include the complete inscription. Both the Humbles and Corrells did not include one or two inscriptions that we found. Of particular interest was that of James Heady, Jr., which was on the opposite side of the tombstone bearing his wife's name (Polly). One tombstone was recorded by the Humbles that was not found by the Corrells or by us. This was that of George W. Heady, son of Calvin and Nancy. This inscription is shown separately at the beginning of the listing, because it was the only one that was previously recorded but was not currently present.

There were a number of persons said to have been buried in the Heady Cemetery in their obituary whose tombstones were not found. There were also some small stones with initials on them that we did not include in our recording. We assume these to be footstones. In several cases the initials are the same as a name on an adjacent tombstone. In other cases the initials are illegible.

To locate the Heady Cemetery, drive north on Allisonville road from 116th street. Go



past the entrance to the River Glen Golf Course about half a mile to the entrance to the Sunblest Estates at Orchard Blvd. Turn right and go to Heady Lane (one long block) and turn right again. The cemetery is located in a wooded area about 100 yards south of the intersection of Lake Vista Drive and Heady Lane. It is along the side of Lake Vista. There is a fence around the cemetery and the gate is locked. The Delaware Township Trustee has the key to the gate.

The location of the grave sites is shown by a row and a number. The rows are numbered in the same order as that used by the Corrells. The rows, however, are not perpendicular to the fence, as shown in the map on the next page. Also the grave sites are not in neat columns, or rows, so the numbering system used by the Corrells has been abandoned. Instead, the grave sites are numbered sequentially from the top left hand corner to the bottom. The map does not present an exact depiction of the location of the graves. The rows are not as straight and the relation of one grave to those near by is not exact. The map was drawn by hand while standing in the cemetery. Then it was transferred to a limited computer program. Still, the map does show the layout of the graves within these limitations.

In the table that follows, normal type is the inscription as read. Bold type is to emphasize that the inscription is different from that found by the Corrells. All comments are in italics, including calculated births. To calculate births, actual number of days in months were used, including 29 days for February in leap years. We have found that in another cemetery months were assumed to have 30 days. It is possible that this method was used in this cemetery, which would make our birth dates off by a day or two. Several genealogical reference books were consulted to find an authority on the accepted method for calculating age at death. None of the references discussed the subject.

Marker number 61 is a statue without a head. It is of sandstone and may have had an inscription on it at one time. Several unsuccessful attempts were made at raising an inscription by the rubbing method. This monument is not included in the table, but is shown on the map.
