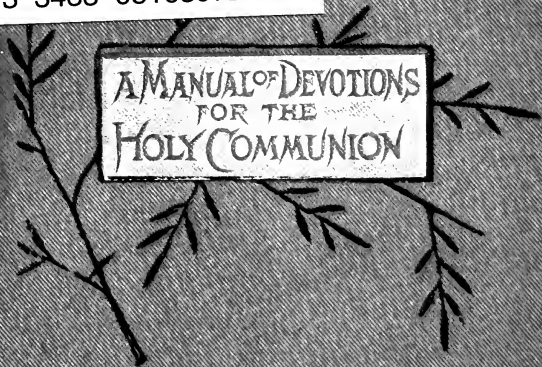

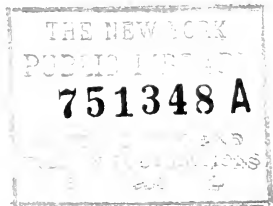

PREFACE.



THE Holy Communion is both the highest act of worship possible to the Christian, and also the richest means open to him for the reception of supernatural grace. By it we do "*show the Lord's death till He come;*" pleading with the Father the merits of the One Sacrifice offered up on the cross, thus taking part in Christ's great act of intercession, and holding up before men the atonement which was made for us upon Calvary as our one and only propitiation. Hence the Holy Communion is called by the Church "*our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving;*" not an offering for sin, but a thank-offering for a perfected redemption. But there is another view of the blessed Sacrament. To the believing soul it is the means of a true **and living** union with the glorified Redeemer.

The bread and wine remain unchanged after consecration, according to our Lord's words, "I will drink no more of this *fruit of the vine*," and the saying of St Paul, "We are all partakers of that one *bread*;" but, by the word of Christ, and the power of the Holy Ghost, they become the pledges and channels of that mystical union with the Body and Blood of the Lord, by which we so become one with Him, as to participate of His life: as He has said, "My flesh is meat indeed, and my blood is drink indeed," and "he that eateth Me, he shall live by Me." We believe in the "real presence" of Christ at His Holy Table; although, in the words of the venerable Hooker, "we look for the presence of the Body and Blood not in the elements upon the altar, but in the hearts of the devout communicants." This brief view of the nature of the Holy Communion will suggest to the Christian mind, not only the blessedness of its frequent reception, but the necessity of a thorough preparation for it. The heart must be cleansed by self-examination and sincere repentance, devout feeling be

deepened by meditation upon the love of Jesus in our redemption, earnest prayer predispose the soul to a closer communion with its unseen Lord, before the Christian can approach acceptably to the Lord's Table. For this preparation many will need no such helps as this little manual. Advanced Christians, to whom prayer and self-examination have become habitual, may profitably lay aside the use of all forms, in the performance of this, as of all other duties of the closet. But most young communicants do need the assistance of such a manual. They require to be taught how to practise self-examination, while edifying forms of prayer will often be of great use to them in promoting an earnest spirit of devotion. To meet the wants of such, this little book has been compiled. May God give to it His blessing.

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Help to Devout Communion.



I.

RULES FOR A DEVOUT RECEPTION OF THE HOLY COMMUNION.

I. During the week before Communion, add to your daily devotions a short prayer for a worthy Communion, either in your own words, or in the Prayer from the Communion Office: "We do not presume to come to this Thy Table," &c. ; or this, "O Lord! I beseech Thee, visit and cleanse my conscience, that Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, when He cometh, may find in me a dwelling-place prepared for Himself; who, with

the Father and the Holy Ghost, liveth and reigneth one God, world without end. Amen."

II. While at your work, try to think often of the great blessing you are about to receive, and lift up your heart to God in some short prayer; as, "Lamb of God, that takest away the sin of the world, have mercy upon me!"

"Come, sweet Jesus, live and reign in me for ever!"

"Pour, O Lord! Thy love into my heart, that I may love Thee above all things."

"Lord, I am not worthy Thou shouldst come under my roof; but speak the word only, and Thy servant shall be healed."

III. On the Friday before your reception — which should be, as all Fridays, a day of fasting and self-denial — set

apart some time for an especial act of preparation. This should consist, —

1. Of a careful self-examination of your thoughts, words, and deeds, since your last Communion.
2. Solemn confession to God, with hearty repentance.
3. Resolutions against your besetting sins.
4. Earnest prayer for God's help.
5. Meditation upon the sufferings of Christ for your salvation.

Without such special preparation, no one, as a general rule, should come to the Holy Table.

IV. On the morning of the Communion Day, let your first thought be upon the blessing you are to receive. Pray God to make your heart a worthy tabernacle of Jesus. Try to keep all worldly thoughts out of your mind, and be very watchful over your words and actions.

Receive, when you can do so, at an early celebration, when the mind is fresh, and can attend without distraction to the Service.

In Church attend devoutly to the Morning Prayer and Sermon, and make them a preparation for the higher Service. Be very careful not to let your mind be drawn off from God, by talking, or looking at your neighbors, or any irreverent action.

At the celebration try to think only of the presence of your Saviour, and make the solemn words of the Service your own by using them earnestly and reverently.

When you go forward to receive, shut out all other thoughts, except that Jesus is waiting to enter in and dwell in your sinful heart. Try to avoid all excitement, and receive Christ into a peaceful and loving spirit. Let the right hand be without a glove, and placed across

the left, so that the Bread may be received in the palm of the hand, and lifted to the mouth without danger of dropping any portion of it on the ground.

After you have communicated, endeavor to give the remainder of the time to devotion. Do not look around you and watch your neighbors, but feel the presence of Jesus, and pray to Him for yourself, the Church, your friends, &c. ; or read some psalms of praise and thanksgiving, or some appropriate hymn. Never leave the Church until the conclusion of the Service.

On your return home, spend at least a few moments in your closet, praising God for His goodness to you, and praying for grace to continue one with Christ.

Do not fail to attend the Evening Service, and make it a Special Thanksgiving for your Communion, keeping it

mind in the Canticles and Prayers the great blessing you have received.

V. In the week succeeding Communion be watchful against the sins you have renounced, and often pray the adorable Jesus to sanctify you wholly, so that your soul and body may be a Temple fit for Him to dwell in.

II.

SELF-EXAMINATION AND CONFES- SION.

PRAYER BEFORE SELF-EXAMINATION.

O LORD GOD, who searchest the hearts, and triest the reins! I Thy sinful servant beseech Thee to discover to me the evils and deceits of my heart, and all my open and secret faults. Help me to know my short-comings and sins. Give me the broken and penitent heart which Thou wilt not despise. Confessing my transgressions with true sorrow of heart, may I obtain Thy mercy and forgiveness; and, being restored to Thy favor through the love of my dear Redeemer, may I be strengthened against sin, and made worthy to be a follower of Jesus. Lord, hear me!

Lord, help me! for the merits of Jesus Christ, my Lord and my Saviour.

QUESTIONS FOR SELF-EXAMINATION.

FAITH AND REPENTANCE.

ON FAITH.—Do I believe in God with my whole heart? Have I learned to know Him as my Father? Under all circumstances have I been submissive to His providence? Have I felt His presence with me continually? Have I prayed to Him frequently and earnestly? Do I believe in Jesus Christ as the Saviour of the world? Do I believe He died for my individual soul? Have I realized any thing of His love for me? Is love for Him the one great motive of all my actions? Have I done anything—made any sacrifices, or borne any cross—to prove my affections?

Do I believe in the Holy Ghost as the author of spiritual life? Have I

sought earnestly in prayer for His grace, feeling I can do nothing of myself? Have I felt His presence in the services and sacraments of the Church! Do I use those services habitually and devoutly?

REPENTANCE. — Have I felt any real sorrow for sin? Does sin seem hateful to me? And have I really tried to find out my besetting faults? Do I so repent as to turn away from sin? Is my conscience more tender, and my resolution stronger than it was? What suffering and sacrifices am I willing to bear to escape from evil habits?

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS.

I. “*Thou shalt have none other Gods but me.*”

Have I read and studied the Bible regularly so as to know God? Have I allowed any sceptical doubts to remain in my mind? Have I read any infidel

or unchristian books? Have I tried to judge the mysteries of Revelation — such as the Blessed Trinity, the Incarnation, The Holy Sacraments — by my own reason, instead of the Word of God? Have I loved any thing or person more than God? Have I been ashamed to confess myself a Christian? Have I striven to love God with my whole heart, meditated upon Him, thought of Him, and prayed without ceasing for His grace?

II. *“Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image.”*

Have I lived in the neglect of God's worship? Have I missed my morning and evening prayers? How often? Have I said them reverently and earnestly, or hurriedly and with a wandering mind? Do I attend service in God's House regularly? When there do I kneel upon my knees, avoid conversa-

tion, and all idle behavior, and try to realize the Divine Presence? Am I regular at Communion, and careful in my preparation for it?

III. "*Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain.*"

Have I used any oaths or profane words? If so, how often? Have I used any foolish exclamations? Have I ever spoken irreverently of any thing belonging to God, — such as the Bible, the Church, the ministry, and the Holy Sacraments?

IV. "*Remember that thou keep holy the Sabbath Day.*"

Have I stayed away unnecessarily from Church on the Lord's Day? Have I sought my own pleasure upon it instead of God's glory? Have I spent the day in idleness, — reading papers, or visiting? Have I tried to do all the

good I could on the Lörd's day to others, — teaching in the Sunday school, visiting the poor and sick, &c.? Is it the happiest day to me in the week, and do I give more time on it to the duties of the closet than on other days?

V. "*Honor thy father and thy mother.*"

Have I ever disobeyed my parents openly or secretly? Have I been sulky to them, caused them grief by my faults, been an unnecessary burden to them? Have I failed in love, tenderness, and gratitude to them? Do I give to every one their due; e.g., my various relations, teachers, clergy, all in authority?

VI. "*Thou shalt do no murder.*"

Have I been violently angry, or given way to a sullen, passionate, or pettish temper? How did I show it, by manner or words? Have I done harm to

any one anger, — struck them, called names, stirred up quarrels with them? Have I been unforgiving, or cherished desires for revenge? Have I been impatient in sickness or any trouble? Have I been cruel to animals through anger, or wantonness, or love of cruelty?

VII. "*Thou shalt not commit adultery.*"

Have I literally broken this commandment? Have I been guilty of any impure talk, read bad books, listened willingly to dissolute conversation, kept evil desires in my mind, given way to any impure action? Have I valued modesty and purity above all things? Have I been careful to dress with sobriety; been sparing in the enjoyment of worldly amusements? Do I habitually practise self-denial? How far do I comply with the direction of the Church to make each Friday a day of fasting,

and to observe the Lenten season as a time for self-discipline?

VIII. "*Thou shalt not steal.*"

Have I taken any thing belonging to another? If so, have I made restitution? Have I been careless in restoring borrowed property? Have I run into debts without knowing whether I could pay them? Have I given too little wages for service? Robbed the poor of their alms? Taken undue advantages in business?

IX. "*Thou shalt not bear false witness.*"

Have I told a falsehood? How often? With what purpose? Have I added to or diminished from the truth? Deceived any one in any way, spoken evil of others unnecessarily, and without being certain of its truth? Am I given to exaggeration? Have I told

any secret? Have I judged my neighbor harshly and uncharitably?

X. "*Thou shalt not covet.*"

Do I wish for things God has not given me? Am I discontented and repining? Have I envied any one their looks, money, position, &c.? Do I dislike to hear other persons praised? Have I been covetous of my money? Am I selfish? Have I in any way struggled against the will of God?

N.B. — Many other subjects for self-examination might have been suggested; e.g., the Sermon on the Mount, the duties towards God and our neighbors in the Catechism, many passages in the Epistles: but the above will at least show the young Communicant how to try himself thoroughly and honestly. After self-examination, the heart should be humbled, and repentance

awakened by thoughts of God's hatred of sin, the love of Jesus, His sufferings for our sins, and their final result in the loss of the soul.

CONFESSION AFTER SELF-EXAMINATION.

O my most loving Father! miserable that I am, I have sinned against heaven and before Thee, and am no more worthy to be called Thy son. Forgive me, for Thy dear Son's sake, all that is past. Wash out in His most precious blood whatever I have sinned against Thee in thought and word and deed. Of Thee, O merciful Father! I beg and hope for pardon. To Thee do I call, and on Thee do I depend, for grace hereafter to serve Thee. I have destroyed myself, but my trust is in Thee. Oh, cleanse me from all sin! and grant me to serve Thee with a quiet mind, **through** Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Or use the Confession in the Communion Office. After confession, make fresh resolutions against your besetting sins, and pray earnestly for God's grace to enable you to conquer them.

III.

DEVOTIONS BEFORE THE HOLY COMMUNION.

The following devotions may be used in the week before Communion, or in the intervals of the Service itself. They should not, however, be allowed to take the place altogether of prayer in our own words.

AN ACT OF REPENTANCE.

O MY most loving God, my Creator, and my Saviour! I grieve from my inmost heart that I ever offended Thee, whom I ought to love above all things. Be merciful, dear Lord, — be merciful unto me; for I firmly purpose, by Thy help, without which I can do nothing, to offend no more against Thee. Oh, cleanse

my defiled soul in Thy most precious blood! and grant that, receiving the Blessed Sacrament with a firm faith and an humble repentance, I may be restored to the light of Thy favor, and defended against all occasions of sin, so that Thou mayst abide in me, and I in Thee.

AN ACT OF FAITH.

O Christ Jesus, very God and very Man! I believe, and confess with an undoubting faith, that, by virtue of Thy wondrous power, wisdom, and goodness, Thou art spiritually and so most truly present in this Holy Communion. Lord, increase my faith; fill me with the consciousness of Thy presence. Help me to draw near to Thee with unshaken confidence, and rejoice

my soul with the consolations of **Thy** love.

AN ACT OF HOPE.

Lord, I am not worthy Thou shouldst come under my roof, but I trust in Thy gracious promise: “Whoso cometh unto me, I will in no wise cast out.” I know that Thy love for me is infinite. I believe that Thou wilt save to the uttermost all who come unto God by Thee. I look to Thee for everlasting salvation. I plead Thy Name, which is above every name, for the pardon of my sins. Oh, let my hope never be ashamed! Give me that which my soul longs for. Strengthen my assurance of eternal life. Feed me in the Blessed Sacrament with Thyself. O Lord, in Thee have I **trusted!** let me never be confounded.

AN ACT OF LOVE.

O my Redeemer, it grieves me to the heart that I have loved Thee so little in return for Thy affection. But I pray Thee henceforth to pour Thy love into my heart that I may love Thee above all things. Make me willing to sacrifice every thing for Thy sake. Consume all that is sinful within me by the fire of Thy love. Help me to give myself wholly unto Thee. Come, Lord Jesus, — come, and reign in me for ever.

AN ACT OF SELF-DEDICATION.

To Thee, O my Jesus! do I devote myself henceforth, — my soul, my body, all the faculties of my mind, and the thoughts and intentions of my heart. I would be Thine, dear Lord, and Thine alone. I renounce

my past sins. I dedicate my whole future life to Thy service. I beseech Thee to take complete possession of my heart. Make my whole being, from henceforth, a sacrifice holy and acceptable unto Thee.

ACT OF PREPARATION.

O Jesu, Saviour of the world! who camest to save sinners, and saidst: "Come unto me all ye that labor, and are heavy laden, and I will refresh you," behold, I, a sinner, presume to come unto Thee; for with Thee is plenteous redemption. I come unto Thee from whom I have erred and strayed as a sheep that is lost; but, O Thou Good Shepherd, who didst lay down Thy life for the sheep, who camest to seek and to save that which was lost!

seek and save Thy servant, O Lord ! for I do not forget Thy commandments. I come unto Thee, pierced with many wounds, grievously vexed with many evil passions ; but, Lord, if Thou wilt, Thou canst make me whole. Have mercy upon me, O my Redeemer, for Thy mercies' sake ! Cleanse my defiled soul by Thy blessed Spirit, and then enter into it as Thy dwelling-place for ever. Be to my hungry soul the Bread of Life which cometh down from heaven. Make my thirsting soul glad with the Wine of Thy most precious Blood. O my Wisdom, Righteousness, and Sanctification and Redemption ! give Thyself wholly unto me, that I may become from henceforth entirely Thy own. Amen.

LITANY OF THE HOLY COMMUNION.

O God the Father, who didst so love the world as to give for it Thy only begotten Son, —

Have mercy upon me and hear me.

O God the Son, who hast redeemed us by Thy most precious blood, and by Thy death restored to us everlasting life, —

Have mercy upon me and hear me.

O God the Holy Ghost, Sanctifier of the faithful, uniting them in soul and body to the Redeemer, —

Have mercy upon me and hear me.

O holy, holy, holy Lord, three persons one only God, in whom all things live and move and have their being, —

Have mercy upon me and hear me.

O Lord Jesus Christ, the eternal Son of God, who didst lay aside the glory which Thou hadst with the Father before the world was, and for our sake humble Thyself to be born of a Virgin, —

Have mercy upon me and save me.

Jesus, who barest our sins in Thy own body on the altar of the cross, and hast by Thy one sacrifice for ever redeemed us from sin and eternal death, —

Have mercy upon me and save me.

Jesus, our adorable High Priest, who ever livest to make intercession for us at the right hand of God, —

Have mercy upon me and save me.

Jesus, by whose blessed institution that sacrifice of the cross is for

ever commemorated, and pleaded with the Father in the Holy Communion, —

Have mercy upon me and save me.

Jesus, who in that Divine Sacrament dost become to us the Bread of Life, and the True Wine that maketh glad the heart of man, —

Have mercy upon me and save me.

Jesus, our wisdom and righteousness, and sanctification and redemption, —

Have mercy upon me and save me.

By all that Thou hast done and suffered for our salvation; by Thy labors, Thy tears and prayers; by Thy weariness and watchings; by Thy cruel torments; by Thy unknown sufferings; by the an-

guish of Thy cry upon the cross,
by all the agony and mystery of
Thy passion, —

Have mercy upon me and save me.

From unbelief and irreverence in
the reception of Thy holy mys-
teries, —

Deliver me, good Lord.

From neglecting to come, and
from coming negligently, —

Deliver me, good Lord

From hardness of heart, and in-
gratitude for so unspeakable a
mercy, —

Deliver me, good Lord.

From falling again into the sins
of which I have repented, and
defiling my soul and body which

have been made the tabernacle of the Holy Ghost, —

Deliver me, good Lord.

That a deeper sense of sin, and more ardent desires after Thee, may lead me frequently and devoutly to Thy Table, —

Grant me grace, I beseech Thee, good Lord.

That by this communion with Thee I may be healed and strengthened, and my heart kindled to a more fervent love, —

Grant me grace, I beseech Thee, good Lord.

That my communion with Thee may strengthen my communion with Thy saints, and Thy love shed abroad within my heart may

prove itself in love to all around me, —

*Grant me grace, I beseech Thee,
O Lord!*

That through Thy cross the world may be crucified unto me, and I unto the world, so that not being my own, but bought with price, I may glorify Thee in my body and my soul, which are Thine, —

*Grant me grace, I beseech Thee,
O Lord!*

That Thy love constraining me, I may ever submit to Thy blessed will, delighting to go in the path of Thy commandments, and to do all such good works as Thou hast prepared for me to walk in, —

*Grant me grace, I beseech Thee,
O Lord!*

That nourished by the perpetual memorial of Thy passion, I may daily be filled with the Holy Spirit, and grow up into the measure of the perfect man in Christ Jesus, —

*Grant me grace, I beseech Thee,
O Lord!*

That in loving faith and patient hope I may look for Thy appearing, and at length behold Thee face to face, whom I now adore by faith as present at Thy Holy Table, —

*Grant me grace, I beseech Thee,
O Lord!*

O Bread that cometh down from Heaven and giveth life unto the world, —

*Have mercy upon me and strengthen
me to everlasting life.*

O blessed Vine, of which Thy disciples are the branches, and who makest us glad with joy and peace in believing, —

Have mercy upon me, cleanse me from sin, and rejoice me with the joy of Thy presence.

O sweetest Redeemer, who hast left us in the Holy Sacrament of Thy Body and Blood a perpetual memorial of Thy sufferings and death upon the cross! give me, I beseech Thee, such true repentance for my sins, and such a living faith in Thee as the only Saviour of the world, that I may draw near to Thy Holy Table in the marriage garment required in Holy Scripture, be fed spiritually with Thy most precious Body and Blood, and,

being made one with Thee by the power of the Holy Ghost, may continue faithful unto death, and at length receive a crown of everlasting life, through Thy merits, O blessed Jesus! who, with the Father and the Holy Ghost, livest and reignest one God, world without end. Amen.

SHORT PRAYERS FROM ANCIENT SOURCES.

I.

Grant me, blessed Lord, not only to receive that Sacrament in the outward elements, but in the virtue and power thereof; not bread and wine alone, but the Body and Blood of my Jesus, to the remission of all my sins, and to all the other benefits of His death and passion for me.

II.

O Lord God, the Bread of heaven and the Life of the world! I have sinned against Heaven and before Thee, and am not worthy to partake of Thy most holy mysteries; yet vouchsafe, merciful Lord, to make me worthy by Thy grace, that I may not receive the Sacrament of the Body and Blood of Thy Son to my condemnation, but to the remission of my sins, and everlasting life.

III.

I beseech Thee, O Lord! that I may so worthily receive these sacred mysteries of salvation, as to have Christ dwelling in my heart, and to become the temple of the Holy Ghost.

IV.

Let not the participation of Thy Body and Blood, O gracious Jesus! which I, all unworthy, presume to receive, be unto me for judgment, but effectual through Thy great mercy for the safeguard of my mind and body, and the healing of my sin-sick soul.

V.

Grant me, blessed Lord, so to eat the flesh of Thy dear Son Jesus Christ, and to drink His blood, that my sinful body may be made clean by His Body, and my soul washed through His most precious Blood, that I may evermore dwell in Him and He in me.

PRAYERS FOR THE DAY OF COMMUNION.

O Lord Jesus Christ, my Lord and my God! I am not worthy that Thou shouldst come under my roof; but as Thou didst not disdain to be laid in a manger, nor reject the sinner when she came unto Thee, trusting in Thy mercy and goodness I approach to the Sacrament of Thy most blessed Body and Blood. I come sick to the Physician of life; unclean to the Fountain of mercy; poor and needy to the Lord of heaven and earth; humbly beseeching Thee of Thy boundless goodness to heal my sickness, to wash away my defilements, to enrich my poverty, that I may receive Thee with that true faith and repentance, love and humility,

gratitude and praise, which becometh me who am most unworthy of so great a mercy; so that this Holy Communion may be unto me the remission of all my sins, and the preservation of my soul and body unto eternal life. Amen.

Or this:—

O God, the searcher of my heart! I desire to receive this wonderful and heavenly Sacrament with all the piety and devotion, all the love and fervor, that I ought to feel in the reception of so great a blessing. O Lord, all my desire is before Thee! My heart is ready, O God! my heart is ready. I offer unto Thee my whole heart, and all that I am. Lord, hear the desire of Thy servant. Let Thine ear be open to his

prayers. Supply out of Thy abundant goodness what my human weakness lacketh, and accept of me graciously for the love of Thy dear Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

AT THE TIME OF COMMUNION.

Bind the Sacrifice with cords, yea, even to the horns of the altar.

Come, Lord Jesus, come and enter in and dwell with me for ever.

Come, holy Jesus, come and take possession of my soul; purify it with Thy precious Body and Blood; empty it of all filthiness, both of flesh and spirit, that it may be fitted for Thy habitation, and that Thou mayest dwell in it for ever.

Lord, I am not worthy that Thou shouldst come under my roof.

Speak the word only, and I shall
be healed. Lamb of God, that
taketh away the sins of the world,
have mercy upon me! Grant me
Thy peace!

IV.

MEDITATIONS AND PRAYERS ON THE SUFFERINGS OF CHRIST.

No part of a proper preparation for the Holy Communion is more important than meditation upon the sufferings of Christ commemorated in the Holy Supper. Read over devoutly the history of the Passion, dwelling upon its various incidents, and making them the subjects of earnest prayer. Then you may use a part of the following devotions, being careful to make them your own by using them thoughtfully and devoutly; or close your meditations by such prayers as your heart may prompt.

A PRAYER UPON THE PASSION.

O Son of the living God, who, for the exceeding love which Thou didst bear towards me, hast vouchsafed to become man ! same cross through Thy blessed hands and feet; Thou wouldst, through three hours of agony, suffer innumerable torments, praying for Thy murderers, saving the penitent thief, consoling Thy anguished mother, thirsting for our salvation, crying out under the agonizing sense of desertion by Thy Father, declaring the finishing of our redemption, and at last commending Thy pure soul into the hands of God. All this, gracious and loving Jesus, Thou hast done and suffered willingly for my salvation. For me Thou didst pour out Thy most precious Blood, and make Thy soul an offering for sin. All love and praise be unto Thee, my Jesus. To Thee I would devote that soul which Thou hast redeemed. All that I

am I desire to lay down a living sacrifice at the foot of the Cross. Oh, teach me more and more of Thy love which passeth knowledge! Fill me with an ardent affection for Thyself. Make me willing to bear sacrifices and self-denials for Thy sake. By the power of Thy cross crucify me unto the world. May I forsake all sinful pleasures; may I resign myself wholly into Thy hands; may I be knit unto Thee henceforth in a true and loving fellowship; so that, bearing Thy cross in this world, I may at last sing Thy praise eternally in Heaven. Thou art worthy to receive honor and power, for Thou hast redeemed us to God by Thy Blood.

LITANY OF THE PASSION.

*In the form of Collects, that it may be used
in whole or in part.*

O blessed and adorable Saviour, who didst complete the work of our redemption with many sufferings and woes unutterable, Thy soul being exceeding sorrowful even unto death! give me grace, I beseech Thee, to follow Thee in the course of Thy bitter passion, that I may consider what Thou didst endure for us sinners; and be constrained to live henceforth not unto myself, but unto Thee, who didst give Thyself for me, and die, the just for the unjust, to bring me unto God.

*Grant this, Lord Jesus, for Thine
own mercies' sake.*

O gracious Saviour, who didst stoop to wash Thy disciples' feet, and didst wipe them with the towel wherewith Thou wast girded! overcome the pride and haughtiness of my nature, and engraft thereon Thy meek and lowly spirit, that I may follow Thy example, and never disdain the meanest offices of love to my brethren.

Grant this, Lord Jesus, for Thine own mercies' sake.

O blessed Jesus, who having loved Thy disciples while in the world, didst love them unto the end, and didst pour out Thy heart in earnest supplications to Thy Father in their behalf! make me to be partaker of Thine unchanging love, and ever to be remembered in Thy

glorious and prevailing intercession, who, having suffered for me on earth, now livest as the Advocate of Thy people, at the right hand of the Majesty on High.

Grant this, Lord Jesus, for Thine own mercies' sake.

O blessed Jesus, who art the bread of life, and the true vine of which Thy disciples are the branches, and who didst institute the Blessed Sacrament of Thy Body and Blood! grant that I may partake of the same with a true and living faith, so that my sinful body may be made clean by Thy Body, and my soul washed through Thy most precious Blood, that I

may evermore dwell in Thee and Thou in me.

Grant this, Lord Jesus, for Thine own mercies' sake.

O merciful Jesus, who didst suffer innumerable insults and injuries in Thy adorable person, and when smitten in Thy face by the soldier, didst only reply, "Why smitest thou me?" mortify in me all angry passions, that I may not return injuries with malice, nor ever think of revenge, but bear all things patiently for Thy sake, Thou meek and silent Lamb of God, the only Saviour of our souls.

Grant this, Lord Jesus, for Thine own mercies' sake.

O patient and long-suffering Jesus, who wast denied by one of

Thy disciples and forsaken by them all! let not Thy compassion fail towards me, who have denied Thee by my sins, and have well-nigh forsaken Thee in the weakness of my faith. Leave me not to myself, but call me back with the look of Thy grace, that I may repent so truly of all my unfaithfulness, and weep so bitterly over my ingratitude, as to obtain Thy forgiveness, through the merits of Thy most precious Blood.

Grant this, Lord Jesus, for Thine own mercies' sake.

O eternal Jesus, who didst wear the crown of thorns and the purple robe, with which Thy persecutors would mock Thy Heavenly Majesty! may I ever adore, love, and

obey Thee as the Lord of heaven and earth, and bow our knees at Thy Name, as the only name given among men whereby we may be saved.

Grant this, Lord Jesus, for Thine own mercies' sake.

O adorable Jesus, of humility and compassion that passeth knowledge, who didst carry Thine own cross to Mount Calvary, and didst bid the mourners who followed Thee not to weep for Thee, but for themselves! grant me to be partaker of Thy Spirit, that I may bear with a patient mind whatever cross Thou shalt lay upon me, and bewail with true repentance our transgressions, so that, crucified to the world, I

may be quickened by Thy cross to life everlasting.

Grant this, Lord Jesus, for Thine own mercies' sake.

O blessed Lord, who in Thy bitter pains didst pray for Thine enemies that crucified Thee, saying, "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do!" give me of Thy Spirit, that I may love my enemies, pray for them, and do good to them who do evil unto me, that at last I may not fail of Thy forgiveness at the day of judgment.

Grant this, Lord Jesus, for Thine own mercies' sake.

O compassionate Jesus, who, amidst the agonies of the cross, wast mindful of Thine afflicted mother, commending her to th

care of Thy beloved disciple, saying, "Woman, behold thy son"! give me grace to be a comfort to my parents in their sorrows, honoring and obeying them in the Lord, even as Thou wert subject unto Thy parent, O Thou divine pattern of goodness in all things!

Grant this, Lord Jesus, for Thine own mercies' sake.

O Lord Jesus, full of grace and truth, who, being crucified between two thieves, didst promise to one of them, believing on Thee and confessing Thee, the fruition of paradise! look upon me with the eye of pity wherewith Thou didst behold that repentant thief, that at the end of my life I may be found worthy to hear those blessed words, "This

day shalt thou be with me in paradise.”

Before Thy cross, and beholding

Thy bitter passion, I renounce my pride and haughtiness of spirit, and pray Thee to give me an humble, patient, and forbearing spirit, that I may be like Thee, my long-suffering Master, who wast oppressed and afflicted, yet openedst not Thy mouth.

Jesu, holy and immaculate Saviour :

Before Thy cross, and beholding Thy bitter passion, I renounce the impure and fleshly lusts that war against the soul. Possess me with Thy Spirit, and preserve me chaste and spotless, pure and undefiled, that my body may be a holy temple, and my soul a sanctuary fit for Thee to dwell in; that after a life of piety and chastity here, I may be presented to God, washed and

made clean by Thy most precious blood.

Jesu, Saviour full of grace and truth:

Before Thy cross, and beholding Thy bitter passion, I renounce all falsehood, slandering, and evil speaking, and I pray Thee to fill me with the love of truth, that it may abide in my heart and ever proceed out of my lips. Take from me the disposition to look upon the faults of my brethren, and to magnify the imperfections of my neighbor, and fill me with that divine charity that hopeth all things, and thinketh no evil.

O Lord Jesus, who didst pray Thy Father that Thy disciples might all be one:

Give me grace thankfully to continue in communion with the Bishops and pastors of Thy flock, and while I have charity for all men, may I contend earnestly for the faith once delivered to the saints; for Thy glory, O blessed Saviour, who art the head over all things to the Church!

Grant me Thy peace.
