 In 1755, the population was only 26645; the increase, then, in 76 years, has been 106798, being upwards of 400 per cent! As Renfrewshire contains 241 square miles, there are now 553 inhabitants to each square mile.

Longevity.—In 1791, there were in Upper Ward 772, Lower Ward 384, in all 1156 individuals above 70 years of age, in a population of 62853, being 1 in every 53. It is to be regretted that the number above 70 was not taken in 1831, as it would have shewn the comparative state of longevity at these two periods, and might have proved useful in the formation of Friendly Societies' Tables.

built, and now there is not an empty house. Either then the inhabitants have not diminished, or have taken to themselves a great deal more house-room. The inhabitants of the shire most comfortably lodged, seem to be those of the east parish of Greenock—no close

In the above table will be found the number of the inhabitants of Renfrewshire in 1791, 1801, 1811, 1821, and 1831, to which we subjoin a few particulars, that may be interesting to the statist. The proportionate increase of males and females, during last ten years, has been nearly

equal, the males having increased at the rate of $18\frac{1}{4}$ per cent, have gained 9,478—the females having increased at the rate of $18\frac{1}{2}$ per cent, have gained 11,292, the total increase is 20,770, rather above $18\frac{1}{4}$ per cent—excess of females is 11,135. The proportion of males to females, which in 1821 was nearly $84\frac{3}{4}$, is now $84\frac{1}{4}$ to the hundred, or about 17 to 20, which leaves 11,135 of the fair sex, as far as the operations of Hymen are concerned, wholly unprovided for. The parish in which the greatest disparity prevails, is the west parish of Greenock, there being in it only 73 males to 100 females. But when the seamen, not included in the census, are taken into account, the disparity will be considerably diminished. In only 3 of the parishes is there a surplus of males, Cathedral 2, Inchinnan and Dunlop 4 each, ten in all. There are 8 of the parishes which has increased above 1000.

The united increase of the three first, is more than all the other parts of the shire put together. All the parishes, except five, have increased. Of these five, Erskine is one, and it presents the singular fact, of having neither lost nor gained. Innerkip parish has decreased 256, Port-Glasgow parish 70, the Renfrewshire parts of Beith and Dunlop 2 and 12 respectively. We cannot account for the falling off in Port-Glasgow, and think there must have been some mistake, either in last or present census. A proof of this is, that in 1821, there were 89 houses uninhabited. Several have since been

houses, allowing a whole house for each of these three redundant families, there would still be 59 empty houses in the parish, and every family in a self-contained house! The surveyor seems to have fallen into the error of calling every place where he found a family, a house. Over the whole county, there are rather above $2\frac{1}{2}$ families to each house, and rather above $4\frac{1}{2}$ individuals to each family. We subjoin a few other particulars:—

Though the excess of female population in Paisley is so great, there are some parts in the suburbs where the males exceed. This is the case in Ferguslie, and to a still greater extent in Charleston. Should, therefore, any of our fair friends in the dense part of the town, think of emigrating to increase the chances of matrimony, they will thus know what course to steer.

HISTORICAL AND DESCRIPTIVE SKETCH
OF
PAISLEY.

THOUGH of comparatively recent date as a principal seat of British manufactures, Paisley is of venerable antiquity as a place of note. For, although Camden seems inclined to fix upon Renfrew as the Vanduaria * of Ptolemy, the general voice now assigns Paisley as the place meant by the Egyptian geographer; and finds in the ancient British words, *Wen dur*, which signify white water, and might be easily latinized into Vanduaria, some support to the conclusion:—Vanduaria, the station upon the white water, to this day called the White Cart. That the Romans had here a post of importance is unquestionable. “Pasly,” writes Bishop Gibson, in his additions to Camden’s account of the country formerly possessed by the Damnii, “for ancient grandeur, is the most considerable [place in Renfrewshire.] The Abbey and Church, (we will here insert all that the Bishop says about Paisley,) with fair gardens and orchards, and a little park for fallow deer, are all enclosed with a stoue wall about a mile in circuit.† The Monastery here was of the order of the Cluniacenses, founded [in 1160] by Walter the Second, great Steward of King Malcolm the Fourth. [Read, by Walter, son of Allan, Senescallus Scotiæ, Lord High Steward of all Scotland.]

The chancel of the church still standeth, * where lie buried Robert II, and his mother.† At this town there is a large Roman Camp: the Prætorium is at the west end on [of] a rising ground, upon the descent whereof Pasy stands. This Prætorium is not large, but has been well fortified with three fosses and dykes of earth; of which so much is still remaining, that one on horseback cannot see over them. It seems to have enclosed all that ground on which the town stands, ‡ and may have been about a mile in compass. When you tread upon the ground of the Prætorium, it gives a sound as if hollow, occasioned probably by some vaults underneath, such as are at Camelon and Ardoch—two others of their camps. About a quarter of a mile from this, are two other risings, one to the south, § and the other to the west, || which, along with this, make a triangular form. By the footsteps remaining, they seem to have been little larger than the Prætorium of the first, without any fortifications, save a single fosse and a dyke of the same form. “ ’Tis probable enough that these might be the stations for the outer guards.”

The present town of Paisley is spread extensively out on both sides of the river White Cart, which, little more than three miles to the northward, falls into the great river Clyde; being navigable all the way for vessels of from fifty to sixty

tous burden, or even more, if their draught of water do not much exceed five feet. The Burgh of Paisley occupies, with its dependant suburbs, the upper part, much of the declivities, and most of the plain ground that immediately encircles the base of a fine terrace-like eminence, running westward from the Cart; and, on the west, at the distance of about half a mile, terminating pretty abruptly, where was once the Prætorium of the Roman camp. This eminence, formerly called the "Hut," and which has still scarcely given place to the more modern appellation of Oakshaw-head, seems to have derived its original name from a mound of earth which received that name from its appearance, and was part of the wall of the Roman camp on the ground now used as a Bowling Green. On the eastern side of the river, is the New Town, consisting of many straight and level streets, formed on what were once the Abbey grounds; which were first let on building leases in 1781, by James, eighth Earl of Abercorn. Although, in the time of Crawford, whose valuable "Description of the Shire of Renfrew" appeared in 1710, Paisley, much injured, no doubt, by the desolation of its once celebrated and very opulent Abbey, consisted but of one principal street, with some divergent lanes, containing in all, perhaps, 2000 people; it is now, with its suburbs, at least two English miles and a half* in length; not greatly less than two in the extreme breadth; and including the inhabitants of the Abbey parish, has in it, at least, it is believed, 55,000 souls. Its progressive population has been as follows:—About 1750, 4290 persons; in 1792, 24,592; in 1811, 36,722; in 1821, 47,006. Parallel with the main street, on the south, are George-street and Canal-street; both, especially the former, of very considerable length. At right angles with the principal street, and intersecting it near the Cross, is a line of street, almost uninterruptedly continue, consisting of Causeyside, Moss, and New Sneddon-streets. But there are in the town many other considerable streets, besides numerous lanes, courts, &c. Paisley is very remarkable for the number of its suburbs bearing distinct names. On the east is Williamsburgh. To the southward are the Saucel, the Seedhill, Dovesland, Lylesland, Carriage-hill, Charleston, and Calside. At the west end of the town are Sandholes, Maxwellton, Ferguslie, and Millerston. Paisley is, indeed, fast improving in its general appearance.—Garthland place, Christie-street, Gauze-street, &c. in the New Town; M'Leod's, and other buildings in Old Smithhills, and Christie's near the Cross; a considerable por-

tion of High-street, and Caledonia-street on the Greenock road, exhibit neatness, and even, in many respects, elegance of structure; as do several detached houses in and around the town. The New Town has communication with the Old by means of three bridges. The Old (or middle) bridge consists of two arches; the Abbey Bridge of three arches; and the Sneddon Bridge of only a single arch. One of the arches of the last, Old (or middle) Bridge, was much older than the other, and was ribbed beneath, a style of architecture which was fashionable in the latter part of the 15th century. It is therefore probable, that at this period, the arch of the Old Bridge now mentioned was built; of course, to complete the communication between the opposite banks of the river, another arch, which had subsequently become ruinous, would also be erected.

Among the public edifices of Paisley, the Abbey Church, though only the mutilated remains of what it once was, holds the first rank. The nave, used as a place of worship for the Abbey Parish, by which the town is surrounded, though deformed within by those pews, &c. which are nevertheless necessary to its present appropriation, displays much magnificence, especially of interior structure. It is of a commanding height, and exhibits, internally, three tiers of arches. Those which open into the side aisles are pointed, as are also those of the clerestory; but the openings of the triforium are semi-circular, with two pointed arches, cinque foiled, formed within them. The semi-circular arch also occurs on the southern side of the building; the latter affording, therefore, specimens of the Norman, as well as of the early pointed and the decorated styles of British Ecclesiastical architecture. Above the great western door, which is pointed, and deeply recessed, are three handsome windows, considerably enriched with tracery. The north window of the transept is also a very fine, though ruined one. From the intersection of this transept with the body of the fabric, once rose a lofty steeple, the fall of which is said to have greatly damaged, perhaps destroyed the choir. South-east of the nave, and adjoining to what remains of the choir, is a structure, once, it is likely, the private oratory of the monks, but now a monumental chapel of the Abercorn family. This little building possesses a remarkable degree of resonance, on which account it is popularly called the Sounding Aisle. In it is an altar tomb, bearing the sculptured effigies of, as it is said, Marjory Bruce, wife of the great steward Walter, and mother to King Robert the Second. This chapel is entered from the cloister court, which is now, probably, only half its original size. Of the foundation of Paisley Abbey, something has been already said. It will be proper here to add, that the establishment was originally a priory for Clug-

niac monks; then formed into an Abbey of Cistercian monks; * and subsequently made an Abbey of Clugniacenses again. Its possessions were extensive; its revenues ample. They were the patrons of not fewer than thirty-one churches. By King Robert III., certain lands belonging to the Abbey were erected into a regality, of which the Abbot for the time being was Lord.

What was the appearance presented in former times by the part of the Abbey Church at present in ruins, can now only be conjectured. In our conjectures, however, we may probably be assisted by the ruins of an Abbey Church in Ayrshire, which belonged to monks of the same order as those of Paisley. This church is Crossruagel near Maybole. In it the eastern end, or that which is nearly demolished in Paisley, is entire; and so far as both can be compared, they agree very exactly. This part of the Abbey Church, called the choir, probably like that of Crossruagel, had only one tier of very lofty windows; and as the present ruins show, was much narrower than the portion now occupied as a place of worship. The magnificent remains of the north window of the transept, convey some idea of the grandeur of that part of the church. The tower, or spire, rose from the centre of the cross. In former times the appearance of the whole pile must have been very grand. There would then be very few houses in its neighbourhood; and the sites of many of the present would be probably occupied by some venerable trees, objects much better suited to the gothic style than the streets of a town. The river, which is now shut out from the view of the church, would likewise increase the beauty of the scene. It has often been remarked that the monks always chose good situations for their residence, and, in the present instance, they certainly did so.

In 1678, the Monastery was subjected to a very thorough repair by the Earl of Dundonald, who then possessed it. Some of the lower walls retain the massive thickness of the feudal age, but little of the external appearance of that period now remains. Perhaps the most ancient portions which have escaped with little alteration, are the vaults beneath the present Philosophical Hall, and the staircase leading up to the Museum.

It is said that a cross called "Gundy's" stood in the present Smithhills, for the convenience of devout people, who

might there present their prayers when going to and from Glasgow.

In Paisley, besides the Abbey Church, are four places of worship belonging to the Establishment. These are—the High Church, adorned with a lofty spire, conspicuous many miles off; the Middle Church; St George's; and the Gaelic Chapel. The town also contains the following houses of public worship; three for members of the United Secession Church; two for those of the Relief persuasion; and one each for Episcopalians, Roman Catholics, Burghers, Congregationalists, Reformed Presbyterians, Wesleyan Methodists, Baptists, and Primitive Methodists, who have but lately appeared among us. Some congregations also assemble of Methodists of the New Connexion, called in England, from their founder, Kilhamites; Independents of two sorts; Glasites: Particular Baptists; Universalists; Unitarians; Swedenborgians; and, perhaps, some others of the multifarious denominations of worshippers.

On the banks of the Cart, and eastern side of a large open space near the centre of the town, is the Castle; a large, embattled, but quite modern fabric, containing, besides public rooms and offices, a county goal, a debtors' goal, a bridewell, and a chapel. Opposite to this edifice it was once intended that a handsome row of buildings should be constructed, with an Athenæum in the centre.—The steeple at the Cross, and the Coffee-room buildings, are ornamental to the town. The Coffee-room itself, a noble apartment, well provided with newspapers, and with the larger periodicals, is liberally thrown open to strangers. In Paisley are, besides a Town Hospital, or Poor-house, a House of Recovery; a Flesh, and a Fish Market; a Grammar School, royally founded; four other Schools under the public authorities; a free School, endowed (Hutcheson's); four other Schools, either with endowments, or supported by subscription; an Infant School, established in 1828; numbers of private, and of Sabbath Schools; a Philosophical and Mechanic's Institution, with an attached library; three Subscription Libraries, one of them theological; a Provident Bank; a Theatre; and the following Societies, among, it is not unlikely, others:—Sabbath and Week Day Evening School—Roman Catholic School—Auxiliary Bible, (the Paisley and Eastern Renfrewshire,)—Female Bible—Female Benevolent—Missionary to the Highlands and Islands of Scotland—Youths', for religious purposes—Medical and Surgical—Faculty of Procurators'—Merchants'—Episcopalians'—Teachers'—and several other Friendly or Benefit Associations.

In the year 1488, James IV. by a charter granted in favour

of Abbot George Schaw, constituted the town a burgh of barony. The present municipal body, consists of a Provost, whose office, has not, however, been exercised, under this title, more than twenty years; three Baillies, a Treasurer, seventeen Councillors, a Town Clerk, and a Chamberlain.* The Provost and Baillies always act as Justices of the Peace. The revenue of the body corporate is about £3000 a-year. There is a police establishment for the Burgh, and another for the New Town. Most of the principal streets and shops are lighted with gas. About the year 1700, and for some time after, the goods made here consisted chiefly of Bengals, an imitation of striped muslins; and of coarse linen checks. Only a short time has elapsed since Paisley was the acknowledged chief seat of the plain and fancy muslin manufacture, which has now, however, greatly declined; although, in delicacy of texture, as well as in variety and elegance of pattern, the Paisley goods of this description were said to be unrivalled. Shawls, silk and cotton, and also of silk mixed with Merino wool, have, for several years, under the names of scarfs and plaids, as well as that of shawls, been extensively manufactured here; and at prices, varying from 6s. and 7s. to £15 each. Seven or eight years ago, cheneille shawls, composed wholly of silk, began to be made. Since, Canton crape shawls and handkerchiefs have been introduced—a most ingenious and elegant branch of manufacture. Various kinds of silk gauze, with Persians, and even velvets, are made here. The loom, and its appendages, have been, of late, much improved.—In the town and Abbey parish, exclusive of Johnstone, are three cotton spinning mills, and seven or eight thread mills, two steam-loom factories, six flour mills, a calico printing work, many bleaching works and dye-houses, three breweries, two distilleries, several timber-yards, an iron, and several brass founderies, an alum and copperas work, a soap work, a tan-yard, &c. &c. The computed value of goods made in and around Paisley, was, three years ago, a million and a half sterling.†

On the Cart, which has been considerably improved of late years, especially by a canal, or cut, to avoid some shallows near the mouth, are two quays. Along the southern edge of the town, passes the Glasgow and Ardrossan canal, completed only to Johnstone. Track boats ply on both the river and

the canal.—Considerable literary character attaches to many even of the working people of Paisley, who support a library, and several reading rooms, among themselves. A weekly Newspaper, called the Paisley Advertiser, is published every Saturday morning, and a variety of minor publications has, of late years, issued from the Paisley press. Wilson, the ornithologist of America, and Tannahill, a song writer of note; were natives of the town; which has produced several other tolerable writers, and one or two superior ones; of the latter of whom, however, nothing farther can be here, for a very obvious reason, said. Some time ago, at a public meeting, a committee of gentlemen was appointed for the laudable purpose of raising by subscription a fund for erecting a monument to the memory of our celebrated townsman, Robert Tannahill. We hope, ere long, to see realised this expression of public gratitude to the memory of the Bard whose songs have immortalized the loved scenes of our youth, and which are sung with rapture in every quarter of the globe.

The situation of Paisley is healthy and delightful. Except on the north, where a spacious level spreads out its ample and richly cultured bosom, the country around is finely diversified by gentle risings and graceful hollows; by wood, by water, and, in short, all that constitutes the soft and graceful in landscape. Cruikston, Raiss, and Stanely Castles, the Aqueduct Bridge, the Linn, Hawkhead House, and the Braes of Glennifer, would all recompense the taker of a short walk from Paisley.

Besides a weekly market, held on Thursday, fairs, each of three days' duration, annually begin, on the third Thursday of May and of February—the second Thursday of August and of November. But the August Fair, called the Paisley James' Day Fair, is the most considerable; being distinguished by horse-racing, attended by numerous shows, and observed as holiday time by all ranks of the people. Much attention has of late years been paid to the improvement of the Race Course, and the safety of spectators. It is now one of the best courses in the West Country; the consequence is, that better horses are brought forward, and the races excite among all classes a greater degree of interest.

Paisley is about 7 miles W. by S. of Glasgow; 17 S. E. of Greenock; and 3 S. of Renfrew, the county town.

HISTORICAL AND DESCRIPTIVE SKETCH
OF
JOHNSTONE.

FEW places in Britain, exhibit so striking an illustration of the effect of manufactures in originating and increasing towns, in attracting, condensing, and augmenting population, as does this thriving seat of business. Forty-six years ago, near that bridge over the Black Cart, which, till lately, gave to the place the popular appellation, "Brig of Johnstone," merely a few cottages were to be seen, where now is a town, consisting of two large squares, many considerable streets, and numerous public works—with a population of about 7,000 souls.

It is probable that the town of Johnstone never would have existed, or at most been confined to the few cottages that stuck upon the ground near to the *Brig*, had not the late public-spirited Laird of Johnstone, by his influence and example, excited a spirit of industry among its inhabitants, and cherished and supported it by his fatherly care and protection, and, we are happy to say, that the seed has been sown in good ground, as it continues to manifest itself by the increasing wealth and prosperity of the enlightened and enterprising merchants and traders belonging to the place.

Towards the end of October, 1782, nine houses of the New Town of Johnstone had been built, two others were building, and ground on which forty-two more were to be built, had been feued. In 1792, the inhabitants were 1434 in number; in 1811, 3,647; in 1818, by computation 5,000. As the introduction of the manufacture of cotton yarn by mill-machinery, led to the founding of Johnstone, so has the extension of the same manufacture caused its rapid increase, and present prosperity. There are now, within the precincts of the place, 17 cotton mills of varied extent, some propelled by water, others by steam; also, Elderslie, Cartside, and Linwood mills, in the neighbourhood of Johnstone, making in all 20 mills. Total amount of spindles in these mills, 151,203.

There are also in the town, two brass founderies, and two extensive iron founderies; five machine manufactories, and a public gas work.

Johnstone is very regularly laid out. Besides Houstoun square in the centre of the town; which is now built on every side, there is to the southward a large area, meant for a second square, as well as market-place, and which is also now beginning to be built round with neat houses. High street, extending from the Bridge of Johnstone on the west, to Dick's Bridge on the east, is closely built; as are several other streets branching at right angles from both its sides. It is in length 3 furlongs, 36 poles. The houses are for the most part, two stories high, substantially constructed, and roofed with slates—to many of them belong gardens. The shops are numerous, and well stocked with cheap, various, and excellent commodities.

Besides the Chapel of Ease, (an octagonal fabric, to which, about five years ago, a neat spire, after a design of Sir Christopher Wren, was added,) Johnstone contains a United Secession and Relief Church, a Universalist, and a Methodist chapel. The Universalists' Chapel is furnished with an excellent organ.

The inhabitants have formed themselves into a society for guarding the church-yard from the depredations of resurrection men; and this society, in all its labours, is aided by the venerable sexton, who has now held his place 36 years; and in that time has performed the last duty to upwards of 5200 of the villagers.

In Johnstone are also a Town School, a Subscription Library, two News Rooms, a Mechanics' Institution and Library, sundry Religious and Friendly Societies, various Sunday Schools, &c.—The Ardrossan Canal from Glasgow, terminates in a basin at the east end of the town; to the advantage of which it greatly contributes. Some years ago an act was passed, authorising the formation of a rail-road from Johnstone to Ardrossan; upon this, active operations have now commenced at Ardrossan; and if the work be carried on with spirit, it will soon be finished.

Near Johnstone are four collieries, highly beneficial to the public, and sources of considerable revenue to their proprietors. They are those of Quarrelton, belonging to Ludovic Houstoun, Esq. owner of the valuable estate of Johnstone:—Auchenlodmont, late the property of William King, Esq. now held by trustees; and Elderslie and Craigenfeoch, belonging to Campbell Snodgrass, Esq. We believe, from report, that Sir William M. Napier, and William Cuninghame, Esq. have begun to work coal in their estates. Lime-stone of excellent quality abounds in the estate of Ludovic Houstoun, Esq.—Relative to Quarrelton mine we extract the following particulars from the late Dr Boog's Statistical Account of the Parish of the Abbey of Paisley:—

“The coal at Quarrelton is one of the most extraordinary masses of that mineral in the kingdom. It consists, in reality, of five contiguous strata. The thickness of the whole, measured at right angles to the surface of the strata, is upwards of 50 feet; but as in some places the seam forms a considerable angle with the horizon, the thickness of the whole in those places, measured vertically, is about 15 fathoms. In consequence of the great depth, it is worked in floors or storeys. Till of late, the work was carried on horizontally from the shaft, so as successively to intersect all the five strata. At present, the miner pursues the same stratum, rising with it. In the former mode of working, there were five several floors or storeys; in the present, there are only three; the first, third, and fifth stratum being wrought, and afterwards so much of the second and fourth as may be done with safety. It is difficult to convey a clear idea of the manner in which this singular mass of coal lies. In a field of about 15 acres it is found to dip in several different directions. At least, conceiving a nearly circular area of these contents, the coal from the north, the east, and the south quarters of that circle, dips pretty uniformly towards the centre. This, however, is in some measure interrupted by several hitches, at one of which the mass of coal is suddenly thrown up about 50 feet, at another about 30. These hitches interrupt not only the direction, but the degree of the dip. On one side of the first-mentioned hitch, it is about one foot in three; on the other, only one in six. Some years ago this coal caught fire; and the pillars giving way, the ground sunk, and left the surface in a very rugged state. The excellent judgment and persevering industry of the proprietor (Mr. Houstoun of Johnstone) have surmounted many difficulties that have occurred in working this valuable coal; it now (1792) employs about thirty pickmen, and there are commonly twelve or fourteen horses below ground. The produce some years has been no less than 20,000 tons.”

Johnstone Cross, which is nearly opposite to the Black Bull Inn, is distant from the Cross of Paisley, 3 miles, 5 furlongs, 34 poles. Fairs are held, on the Thursday following the second Monday of July, and on the last Thursday of October, for cattle; also, on the last Friday of December for horses.

The southern neighbourhood of this place is greatly beautified by Johnstone Castle, a stately mansion, after the antique, situated among extensive pleasure grounds and valuable plantations. A similarly ornamental effect is produced by the house and pleasure grounds of Milliken to the westward of the town. The former is the seat of Ludovic Houstoun, Esq. of Johnstone; the latter, that of Sir William M. Napier, Bart. of Milliken. At Elderslie, 2 miles, 4 furlongs, 17 poles distant from Paisley, and 1 mile, 1 furlong, 17 poles distant from Johnstone, stands Wallace's tree, a venerable and scathed oak, which, by tradition, is said once to have been the hiding

place of our truly chivalrous Scottish patriot, when closely pursued by a band of Southrons. A short distance from the tree, upon an eminence, the house that gave birth to Sir William Wallace is affirmed by the same authority once to have stood; and various names still given to some circumjacent places, certainly corroborate the declarations of tradition.

RENFREW AND YOKER.

Beneath a rushing wide-spread stream is seen
 To bear a double tribute to the queen;
 Or King, if that's preferred, of Scottish rivers;
 Clyde is the Thames of Scotland now, I ween.—

The Plunkin Manufacturer.

THE Chronicle of Melross relates, that Sumerled, Lord of Argyle, rebelled impiously against Malcolm, King of Scots, his rightful Sovereign, during twelve years, bringing with him a numerous army from Ireland and other places; he arrived at Renfrew, and at length was killed, with his son, by divine vengeance, in 1164.

Between Renfrew and Paisley there is a mount, with a fosse round the base, and a single stone set up on the top. This mount, is said, by tradition, to be the memorial of Sumerled's fall, and the place of his interment.

Though Renfrew has been overshadowed by manufacturing and trading upstarts, it may claim distinction for its honours and antiquity. It is certainly the most ancient town, and the only royal burgh in the whole county of Strathgryfe. There was in early times some collection of houses called a town in the parish of Renfrew. David I. before 1177, made it a burgh; and he endeavoured to increase its buildings and its trade, by granting to some monasteries tenements or tofts for building, with certain rights of fishing and trading.

He gave to the monks of Kelso a toft or piece of ground at Renfrew, and the right of trading with one ship, and one net's fishing, free of exaction.

The same King David conferred on his favourite Lord High Steward of Scotland, the Saxon Walter, the son of Allan, the whole barony (or afterwards called) of Strathgryfe, on his conquest of this district; for the original inhabitants were Gælic or Celtic tribes. This period was the epoch of the forsaking that flexible speech, and of adopting the

more obdurate Saxon language. The parishes of Lochwinnoch and Kilmalcolm, are more distant from this focus, namely, Renfrew, as at the centre the rays of the new system of things were converging, and became more and more feeble in approaching to the extremities; those darker parts for several ages gave an asylum to the remnant of the ancient people, who fondly delighted in the love of their country, as is evident by a list of local names in Renfrewshire from the Gaelic in the Paisley Magazine, and those parochial districts shew more than other parts of the mountain language. So the King gave this extensive barony to Walter. Renfrew became the burgh of a baron, in place of the king.

Walter pursued the same policy of his Sovereign, by granting tofts for building on, with fishing in the adjacent waters: he gave to his monks at Paisley a full tenement, and a net's fishing for salmon, and six nets, and one boat's fishing for herring. Allan, the son of this Walter, gave to the monks of Newbattle a toft at Renfrew, adjacent to his garden, and a net's fishing in Clyde.

The first Steward, Walter, built a castle at Renfrew, which was the principal manor place, messuage, or *the Place* of the barony of Renfrew. It was situated on a pretty little *knowe*, called the castle-hill, on the lip of the Clyde, and surrounded with a large and deep ditch or fosse. From the site there is a pleasant view of many miles distant every way. In the great civil war between Bruce and Baliol, Baliol celebrated his yule in the castle of Renfrew, in royal state, where he distributed lands and offices among his guests.

Marjorie Bruce, wife of Walter the great Steward, was hunting near her residence, at the Knock, and was thrown from her horse. By this fall she was killed; but she being pregnant, an unskilful man resorted to the cæsarian operation. His instrument, by accident, injured the child's eye. Robert II. from this misfortune, was called King Bleirie. This melancholy accident happened in 1317.

The Royal Lady was buried in the monastery of Paisley. On the fatal spot there was erected a high cross called Queen Bleirie's Cross, so as tradition reports. Semple says, this cross was taken down, and was used as a lintel for a *barn door*, lately built by the farmer at the Knock. Horrid vandalism! The stone has been a long octagonal piece of rock.

Robert Stewart, from the very singular circumstance connected with his birth, before stated, succeeded, through his mother, daughter of Robert Bruce, to the Scottish throne, in 1370, from the barony of Renfrew, and even from the self same Castle of Renfrew. His son, Robert III. advanced this town to be a royal burgh in 1396.

This district of Strathgryfe was dissolved from the county

of Lanark, and erected into a separate sheriffdom, called Renfrewshire, between 1404 and 1406.

After the accession of the Stewarts to the crown, this Castle was committed to the charge of a constable; and, in the reign of James IV, this office became hereditary in the family of Lord Ross of Hawkhead; and also they had possession of the small isle on which the castle stood, called the King's Inch, a fishing in Clyde, and they levied certain customs at the Fairs of Renfrew.

Mr Speirs, the father of the present laird of Ellerslie, a merchant in Glasgow, bought the castle and lands of the King's Inch, in 1760. He built an elegant house, about 1776, and he unfortunately razed this old castle to its foundation; or, it may be called a palace, from the high rank of its former possessors, and interesting from its historical recollections, and planted a clump of trees on its site.

Had this old palace been preserved, it would have been a very curious thing to have shewn to the present Baron of Renfrew, William IV. on his landing at Pudzioch to take possession of his barony, what accommodation his fathers had about 700 years ago.

The present royal burgh consists of a principal street about half a mile in length, and some small wynds. It has a spacious market-place, and a handsome, as Crawford says, town-house, and a steeple covered with lead. It has a kirk very large, of an old model. The town has a very convenient harbour, called the Pudzioch, made by the tract of the ancient channel of the river, in which vessels of considerable burden are carried up to the brig of Renfrew.

The community have a right to fish for salmon from Scots-toun to the Kelly brig, near to the borders of Cunninghame. Though the situation of Renfrew is favourable both for trade and manufactures, it has made but little progress in either, while all the other towns in this county have been running such a rapid course of prosperity. Had it not been for the fatal effects of town politics, Renfrew might have been one of the principal seats of manufactures in the west of Scotland. But the burgh has a considerable property in land, the salmon fishing, and an excellent ferry boat. The whole revenue from these sources is about L.800 a-year. The number of people was 1880 in the year 1821.

Bishop Leslie, who lived in the 16th century, says, speaking of Renfrew, it had sixty ships plying in fishing during the whole year round. Crawford reports, that the Burgh had once some little foreign trade, but that the Irish trade only occupied the burgesses in 1710. The witty Isaac Brown, in 1824, relates the melancholy fact, the town now, can only muster half a dozen boats, with one or two sand punts.

Their manufacturing establishments, are, an extensive distillery at the Yoker on the north side of the Clyde, a Bleachfield, a Pottery, and a starch manufactory.

It behoves us to mention the gallant and brave Captain Thomas Crawford, of Jordan Hill. He was seduced by the Earl of Murray, to rebel against his sovereign. But waiving all his political motives, he achieved a splendid and heroic deed, in taking Dumbarton Castle in 1571. He scaled that strong castle by ladders, which reached the middle of the rock; where he found a gap or table of land, affording his followers a standing-place, they met fortunately with a stunted ash tree which did them much service, to which they tied their ropes, and having drawn up their ladders, they fixed them on this gap a second time, one of the soldiers climbing up by this second tier was seized with a kind of epileptic fit. They bound him fast to the ladder, and turned it, so that they ascended over his belly. They had arrived at the top of the rock, and had a wall to climb, they fixed the ladders for the third time, the soldier who first mounted on the third stage was discovered, by the sentinel; the brave adventurer, before the alarm was given, dispatched him by a lucky blow. Thus the valiant Crawford's party got into this almost impregnable fortress.

Those who take up opinions suited to their own taste or caprice, judge of the conduct of the unfortunate Earl of Argyle in diverse ways. The Episcopalians consider him a rebel, The Presbyterians think him a martyr. But a third party, or an occasional infidel of Galileo's horrid opinion, about the mighty fuss of those days, regard him as a fool for his pains.

This Lord Argyle collected an army in Holland, consisting of 1500 Presbyterians, refugees from Scotland, driven from their native land by the mad measures of the ministry of James VII. The Earl, attended with his followers and three-ships, invaded Scotland in 1685. His purpose was to overturn the prelatie and sinful government. He landed on the coast of Kintyre. He trifled about Campbelltown, Rothesay, Ellenegreg, Greenock, Cowal, Dumbarton, and Kilpatrick; his followers dwindled away to about eighty men; and this remnant was attacked by the Royal forces, at the Muirdykes, in the parish of Lochwinnoch.

This battle or skirmish of the Muirdykes, routed or *skaled* them. But the Earl, who was forsaken by all his attendants, crossed Inchinnan water by the ford, where the present famous bridge is built, and where the White and Black Cart meet. The united river assumes a new name, Inchinnan water.

The *fey* Argyle was *grippit* not far distant from the ford,

on the lands of the Kirklands, where he rested for a *wee blink*, to think about his fate, and leaned on a large stone, called Conallie's stone. This huge mass, since this event, has been named Argyle's stone. He was apprehended by two Militia men, was taken to the tolbooth of Renfrew, and was afterwards sent to Edinburgh, as a prisoner, where he was beheaded on the 30th of June 1685. He met his death with pious fortitude.

The Renfrew Burgesses and connections may be proud of the Walkinshaws. William Walkinshaw of that ilk was a humorous poet, and he wrote the song *Willie was a wanton wag*;

And wasna Willie weel worth gowd?
 He wan the love o' great and sma;
 For after he the bride had kiss't,
 He kiss't the lasses hale-sale a';
 Sae merrily round the ring they row't,
 When by the hand he led them a',
 And smack on smack on them bestow't,
 By virtue of a standing law.

This family had a daughter, who was mistress to Prince Charles; Edward she was the mother of the Duchess of Albany, who was born about 1743. The daughter did the honours of her father's Court. She was every where treated with great respect, more especially at Rome. On the death of her father, in 1788, she went to reside with her uncle, Cardinal York. She died of a fever, in 1789, unmarried, about the 45th year of her age.

NEILSTON, BARRHEAD,

AND

GRAHAMSTONE.

NEILSTON derives its name from some person who was named Neil, who settled here in early times, and who gave to the place the name of Neil's-town.

Crawford mentions that there was a chapel or hospital near Neilston, founded by Robert de Croc, under the reign of King William; and to which Rodger, prior of Paisley, before 1225, gave to the infirm brethren of the hospital, which Robert de Croc erected in his own land, that they may have a chapel and a chaplain, and they should perform divine duty, so that Robert de Croc shall provide for the same chaplain adequate stipends, and all other things proper for the uses of divine service. Robert de Croc pretended to have a right to the church of Neilston, and troubled the monks with his claim. But at length he recognised their right, and abandoned his pretensions in presence of Walter, the third High Steward of Scotland, and other honest men. We are informed that such claims, and such troubles still continue to agitate the good people of Neilston, but we trust, ere long, to hear that the descendants of Robert de Croc will so far follow his example, and accede to a mutual accommodation.

There is perhaps no country parish in Scotland which abounds so much in thriving and populous villages and *clachans*, as Neilston. This rising of country towns was occasioned by the introduction of manufactures and machinery, within these forty or fifty years. Lavern water and its tributary streams and burns, abounding with water falls, are admirably suited to the propelling of Cotton Mill machinery, and the purposes of bleaching. This place has accordingly long been famed for its Mills, and spinning of cotton, a species of manufacture that gives very extensive employment to men, women, and children, and its bleachfields agree with Ramsay's cheerful description:

A flourie howm atween twa verdant braes,
Whar lasses use to wash and spreid their claes;
A trotan burnie, wimplan thro' the grun;
Its channel pebbles shynan smooth and roun;
Thair view twa barefute bewties, &c.

Neilston, the Kirk-town, has long been a place of note. It

is situated on a most cheerful and healthful spot, on the brow of an eminence, overlooking a great expanse of country. It contains about 800 inhabitants. Its kirk, a handsome building, was erected in 1762, and its steeple is embellished with a public clock. The patronage belongs to Archd. Speirs, Esq. of Elderslie. The parish contains six extensive cotton mills, of four, five, and six stories high, displaying immense piles of building; and the least of them employing about three hundred people. There was a moderately sized spinning mill, at Dovecothall, the *second mill in Scotland* in point of time. It was built in 1780, and consisted of three stories. Another mill of two stories was erected before 1791, at Gateside. These two factories soon gave way to larger erections; and they were converted into dwellings for the workers.

There are twelve bleachfields, which give employment to about 450 people, and between 30 and 40 horses.

There was a printfield at Fereneze, which, in 1791, paid £3000 of excise duties. It was at a stand in 1818. But there are now three establishments of this kind in the parish.

Gavin Ralston of that ilk, about 1780, feued a new town called New Town Ralston. This new village, Barrhead, Dovecothall, and Grahamstone, contained about 70 houses, and nearly 130 weavers in 1782:—and now, Barrhead, and New Town Ralston having grown together into one town, have a population of about 1700. Grahamstone has about 500. Gateside and Chapel have about, 400. Crofthead has about 350; and west Arthurlie has about 300. Including these, there is in the whole parish a gross population of about 7,000 persons.

There was a curious monumental stone at Wester Arthurlie, ornamented with much wreathed work. This ancient stone was about 7 feet long, 2 feet broad, and 9 inches thick. Semple says, in 1782, it is now used as a *brig* over some *wee burn*. Alas! we are cast in the *utility* age; unless our contemporaries can find *some use* for ancient memorials, all may to go pigs and whistles. This stone cannot now be found, though, from Semple's account of it, it must have been thought worth the preserving by the antiquarian.

From the top of Neilston Pad, 820 feet above the level of the sea, the prospect is grand and extensive. The hills of Fereneze rise pretty rapidly to 400 or 500 feet above the level of the surrounding country, increasing 200 or 300 feet in height as they recede backward, and forming, as it were, a natural amphitheatre; from them also there is a widely extended view in all directions, embracing an admirable variety of scenery.

Chalmers gives a very intelligible explanation of the per-

plexing question, who were the *Lavernani* that were mentioned by Aldred, in giving his account of the *Battle of the Standard*, fought with the Picts of Galloway, in 1138. This point puzzled all the critics, and even Lord Hailes. The answer must be, the men of *Lavernside*, one of the finest streams of this country. This name appears to have been substituted for Strathgryfe, which comprehended all the modern Renfrewshire.

On Sunday, 23d Nov. 1666, being three days before the battle of Pentland Hills, a number of gentlemen, amounting to 39 in all, met at the Chitterfleet, about a mile and a half west from the House of Caldwell. In this number, the following are mentioned as heritors of Renfrewshire:—Mure of Easter Caldwell; the gudeman of Caldwell, or of that Ilk; Porterfield of Quarrelton; Porterfield of Dennistown; and Maxwell, the laird of Blackstoun. The object of this meeting was, to raise the country and join the Covenanters, then in full march to Edinburgh, under Col. Wallace of Auchins, (Dundonald parish.) It does not appear that they succeeded in raising many men, nor that any of the Renfrewshire gentlemen had got forward in time to be at the battle. But having been so far implicated in the rising, they found it necessary to leave the country. They were tried in their absence in 1667 at Edinburgh, and found guilty. They were condemned to death, and their whole estates forfeited. They saved their lives by flight, but the forfeitures took place.

The estates of Mure of Caldwell, were gifted by the crown to General Dalziel. Quarrelton's lands and Denniston's estate, were gifted to Hamilton of Halcraig. But the estates were restored to their rightful owners at the revolution in 1688.

The Laird of Glanderston, an ancestor of the present family of Mure of Caldwell, married in 1613, Jean, daughter of Hans Hamilton, Rector of Dunlop, and sister of James Hamilton, who began his career at Dublin as a schoolmaster, and rose to a professor's chair in Trinity College. One of his earliest pupils was James Usher, Archbishop of Armagh, the famous ornament of the Irish Church. Hamilton, for some valuable, secret, and political services, was created Viscount Clandebois, afterwards Earl of Clanbrissil. The honours of this family became extinct in 1798. Glanderston and his Lady, namely, Jean Hamilton, had issue, viz.

First, William, afterwards Laird of Glanderston.

Secondly, Ursula, who married Ralston of that Ilk.

Thirdly, Jean, who married John Hamilton of Halcraig.

Fourthly, Margaret, who was the Spouse of Zachary Boyd, minister of the Barony Kirk of Glasgow. He translated the

whole bible into rhyme, adapted to the weakest capacity. He left the manuscript to the Glasgow College, with a legacy of £3000 Scots, to defray the expense of printing it. The University refused to accept the money, but retaining the metrical version, it remains in the college library to this day. The following quotation shews the elegance of old Zachary Boyd's poetry:—

Jonah was threi days in the whaul's bellie,
 Withouten fyre or caunill,
 And had naething a' the while,
 But cauld fish guts to haunil.

Margaret Mure secondly entered the holy bonds of matrimony, with the famous and pious divine, James Durham, in Glasgow, author of the well-known exposition of the Book of the Revelations.

Fifthly, Jean, who entered the joys of married life with John Carstairs, minister in Glasgow. They had a son who joined the Covenanters, but recanted on being put to the torture in Edinburgh. Part of his confession was published after the revolution. He was afterwards appointed principal of the College of Edinburgh, as a reward for his afflictions.

Sixthly, Elizabeth, who married Alexander Dunlop, minister at Paisley. They were the parents of Principal Dunlop of the Glasgow College, and historiographer for Scotland.

Seventhly, Agnes was espoused by Porterfield of Quarrelton, who was troubled about his share of the rebellion, by the persecuting Government, as we have seen above.

LOCHWINNOCH,

NEWTON OF BELLTREES,

AND

H O W - W O O D .



LOCHWINNOCH is a considerable village, about 4 miles from Beith, 9 miles 6 furlongs from Paisley, and 17¼ from Glasgow. It is pleasantly situated on the north west bank of the Loch. This lake takes its name from the Gaelic *loch*, a lake, and

uineuch, a broil, a fray, a tumult. In this town there are two large and handsome cotton mills, and a woollen mill, and in the parish are extensive bleachfields. The Loch is two miles long, and one mile broad. It was formerly much more extensive than at present. A very enterprising gentleman, namely, James Adam, Esq., then of Barr, lately made an embankment, in the manner of the inhabitants of Holland and Netherlands, dried a large portion of the Loch, and recovered several hundred acres of rich carse land from the dominion of the water.

The Strath, containing the Loch, has much beauty, and it has been called by Robertson, the *Vale of Tempe* of Renfrewshire.

There are in the town above 2000 inhabitants. There are a new parochial church, with a handsome steeple, and a Church belonging to the United Secession, furnished with the unusual appendage of a pinnacled tower.

The following instances of longevity will shew the healthiness of this parish :—

Margaret Paton, died in 1736, aged 136.

Sempill of Belltrees, died in 1789, aged 103.

Mrs. Pinkerton of Mossend, died about 1806, aged 99.

Matthew Burns, died about 1825, aged 95.

Mrs. Donaldson of the Wauk mill, died lately, aged about 100.

Mr James King, a young man, a native of this parish, has taken up the profession of statuary at his own hand. He is employed at present in the shop of Mr. Bartholomew, Newton of Belltrees, on a statue of John Anderson, the celebrated Barrochan falconer. This piece of sculpture is of a free stone from the Milliken quarry. It is a full length statue, and is his second or third piece of this kind of work. The neighbours, of an unsophisticated taste, or ignorant of the rules of art, judge of this wonderful sculptor by their native feeling, with regard to a piece of imitation, and the subjects are meeting their eyes every day. The principal figure, as was stated above, is John Anderson, who was the falconer of the late Malcolm Fleming of Barrochan. He is well known to the sporting nobility and gentry of our county; and he went, under the patronage of the Duke of Athol, to London, in the character of Falconer, at the Coronation of George IV. The figure of John, as well as those of the hawks and dogs, are of full size, and as represented in a very beautiful plate in the possession of the Barrochan family, and dedicated to Sir John Maxwell of Nether Pollok. The block was obtained from the Milliken quarry, and in its rough state weighed upward of three tons. Mr. King thinks the weight of it, at present, is about thirty hundred weight. He has got from

Kilbirnie quarry, also, some smaller blocks, for more dogs to attend the falconer.

The Barr Castle once belonged to the Glen family. Glen of the Barr, being with Queen Mary's troops at the Battle of Langside, in 1568, the Castle was forfeited by the Regent, and restored, by the treaty of Perth, in 1753. The Hamiltons possessed this castle all the course of the last century. William Macdowall, Esq., is the present proprietor. It is in good preservation, and is an interesting ruin, with gun ports, battlements, and other furniture of defence.

From the eminence on which this Castle stands, exquisite prospects may be enjoyed of the vale, its town, its lake, its groves, and its environed hills: the last embellished with villas, farm-houses, and cottages; all, or nearly so, shaded by shaws or groves of trees.

It confers high credit on the judicious taste of Mr. Macdowall, the sacred preservation of this venerable castle. For many instances occur, even in this county, in recent times, of ruthless barbarity in razing old castles and other ancient buildings to their foundations. But the time, we hope, is not far distant, when the enviable possessors of old edifices, must be taught that good taste, their own interest, and national glory, require the conservation of these venerable relics of olden time. But for the keeping up of the auld kirk of Alloway, we never should have enjoyed the admirable Tam o'Shanter of Burns.

Some rustic Tower,

Founded by Norman or by Saxon hands,
Beloved of old, and that delightful time
When all alone, for many a summer's day,
I wandered thro' your calm recesses, led
In silence by some powerful hand unseen.

Akenside.

The Castle of Castletown, or Sempill, was built by John Lord Sempill about 1500. It stood on freestone, built over a strong arch with bulwarks and gunports, but it was demolished by Colonel Macdowall in 1735, who built an elegant large modern house.

The Peil on a small isle in the loch, which the great Lord Sempill built about the middle of the 16th century, is now in ruins, the vault is still preserved. There were found in the water round the Peil, some canoes and cannon, by the Macdowalls.

The Earl of Eglintoun was killed by the Cunninghams in 1586. All the friends and allies of the house of Eglintoun rallied about the chief of the clan, to revenge the death of his brother; and, in the heat of their resentment, assassinated

every man who bore the doomed name of Cunningham, whom they could meet in the fields, or find enjoying the sweets of private life by their own firesides. Sir Robert Montgomerie of Skelmorlie killed, at Paisley, John Maxwell, of Stanelie, kinsman of the Laird of Newark, who was descended maternally from the Cunninghams; shot Cunningham of Montgrewnan, and brother of the Earl of Glencairn, at his own gate, though he was so nearly connected with him that his wife was Sir Robert's cousin. In revenge for this, Patrick Maxwell of Newark, killed both Skelmorlie and his eldest son in one day. Skelmorlie had been engaged in a bond of mutual defence since 1572 with Lord Sempill: and this murder brought down upon the house of Newark more signally the revenge of that then powerful Lord.

Among the assassinations of this feud, the son of Cunningham of Auchinharvie, and Cunningham of Waterstown, were killed by the followers of Lords Eglintoun and Sempill. Therefore, the Master of Glencairn raised all his allies in Renfrewshire, and made a furious inroad into Ayrshire, and burnt the Castle of Eglintoun. Gabriel Sempill of Cathcart, formerly of Ladymure, in the parish of Kilmalcolm, killed Cuninghame of Craighends in 1532.

Of course Lord Sempill had been obliged to build a castle in the Loch between 1547, and 1572, from this great feud. The Peil was entire about 1650.

Elliestoun Castle or Tower, was the original residence of the Sempill family, till their abode at Castlesempill about 1500. It is called the *auld Tower*, and it is in ruins. It is a very picturesque fragment. Within the ruin is part of a curious staircase.

Auchinbathie Tower anciently belonged to the Wallaces of Ellerslie; and is alluded to by Blind Harrie in his metrical history of Sir William Wallace.

Macolm Walys hir gat in marriage,
That Ellerslie then had in heritage,
Auchinboth and othir sindrie places,
The second oe he was of gude Walys.

This family was in possession of this property in 1398. They had a castle or a tower there; and considerable ruins of it are to be seen to the present day.

It seems to us very strange, that one of the most romantic glens in this or almost any county in Scotland, namely, Calderbank should have been passed over in silence by every writer, with the exception of the poet Wilson.

Say, ye blest scenes of solitude and peace,
Strayed e'er a bard along this hermit shore?
Did e'er his pencil your perfections trace!
Or did his muse, to sing your beauties, soar?

Alas ! methinks the weeping rocks around,
 And the lone stream, that murmurs far below,
 And trees, and caves, with solemn hollow sound,
 Breathe out one mournful melancholy "no."

We would advise the stranger in these beautiful parts, to proceed to Lochwinnoch forthwith, and enquire the way to the Ravenscraig and the Tow Brig. He may safely advance as far as Garrat's Linn, which every body in the neighbourhood knows to be bottomless, and if he be a good swimmer, he may even venture into the cave at its north corner. After this peril is over, he may proceed to Tappilickoch, and the Knockan Linn, when, if Calder Water be not in a spate, he may venture to pass under the bed of the river without being wet. A little farther up the water, he will meet with two very interesting water falls, where the stream is so much contracted by basaltic rocks, that it may be stepped over. Proceeding a mile farther up, he will next be attracted by the Reikan Linn, a most romantic and sublime cataract. After this the water loses little of its wild impetuous character for some distance, as its banks are still covered with copsewood, as sloe, rown, dwarf oak, hagberry, quelder-rose, hazel, and fragrant birk; relieved with green spots of verdure, where the primrose may be seen in vernal beauty, the modest and drooping hyacinth, the delicate ladies' sourock, the gaudy dead man's bells, the bonny violet, the sweet honeysuckle, the shining ivy, sunny knowes covered with blawart, carladie, wild thyme, yellow clover, and broom; and frowning crags over his head, which give, in their crevices, a lodgement for braikens, eimock's-meat, and liverwort, and covered with the temptsome blaeberry. The rocks which compose the bed of Calder, are all basaltic, and contain, in great beauty and variety, that class of minerals called zeolitic, rock crystal, amethysts, and cornelians. In short, there is no inland place in the County of Renfrew, which contains so many beautiful, romantic, and sublime scenes, as the banks of Calder.

On the top of Knockmade, a hill at the Kame, are the remains of a Hill-fort. The ancient Caledonians had forts on the flat tops of hills; the ramparts were composed of dry stones, without mortar or cement; usually they exhibit a face towards the assailants, of regular, but rude mason work. The fortification generally is of an oval or circular form. The Celts defended themselves on these fortified hills, and threw vollies of stones down on their besiegers, as the Romans.

There was a feud between the Campbells and the Macleans. The latter were killed, except two, who came over and took up their residence at the Milbank. Wm. Orr lived at the Lochheid, a neighbouring mailen. He had an out-house where he kept his kibbocks. One night a Maclean of this

race, about the beginning of the last century, stole a part of his *kane*. Orr watched for his second visit, and when the reiver came to the cheese-house, Orr *stabbit* him through the *painshes* with a *sheep-heidit shabble*. Being sorry for what he had done, he went to the Castle to wait on Lord Sempill. That superior of the barony ordered him to bring the hieland corpse on a car, and he would hang him on a gallows tree as a thief:—and he did so.

Colonel Macdowall of Castlesemple was a whig in 1745, but his lady was a keen Jacobite, and favourer of Prince Charles. She was formerly a Miss Wallace of Woolmet. The Lochwinnoch militia started to Glasgow, and when they passed the Castlesemple House, she *swarfit* or fainted.

The following is a curious notice respecting the state of education in the parish of Lochwinnoch, at the end of the 17th century.

Oct. 13, 1691.—Mr John Paisley, minister, William Glen, schoolmaster, “formerlie continued schoolmaster, and in regard he could not precent himself, he was to furnish one for taking up the psalm as he was wont to doe, and to take care that all his schollars gett the catechism perquier, that by turns they may repeat the samin befor the congregatioun every Lord’s day, one standing in the east end of the kirk, enquiring the question, and the other in the west end answering.”

KILBARCHAN.

KILBARCHAN is a considerable town in the parish of that name; it is about 4 miles from Lochwinnoch, 1 mile and 3 furlongs from Johnstone, $5\frac{1}{2}$ from Paisley, and 13 from Glasgow. The town is delightfully situated on a southern declivity, sheltered on both sides by two large eminences or hills, which rise pretty abruptly to the height of nearly 200 feet above the valley in which the lower part of the town is built. Of these eminences, the one on the east side of the village is mostly within the policies of Milliken, and is tastefully adorned with forest trees. From a quarry of excellent freestone, on the west side of this hill, almost contiguous to the village, the houses of it are mostly built. The stratification of the rocks in the quarry, has attracted a good deal of attention from geologists, being hardly in accordance with the prevailing theories. Over the sandstone there is a stratum of

The Bruntshie'ds, commonly pronounced Branchill, old kirk, deserves some notice. It was built about 1745, by the Seceders. The Bruntshields sacrament used to be a great annual solemnity, and was resorted to by vast multitudes from the neighbouring parishes, for many miles round. The publicans who came from Kilbarchan, Johnstone, the Brig o' Weir, Lochwinnoch, &c., erected booths and sheds, and provided victuals and drink for the accommodation of the crowd. This celebrated Kirk was demolished a few years ago.

In the centre of the town is a schoolhouse to which a steeple is attached, and in a niche of the steeple there was placed, in 1822, a statue of Habbie Simson, the famous piper; it is considered an excellent piece of statuary, and highly creditable to the talents of the sculptor, Archibald Robertson of Greenock.

About two miles westward from the town, on the banks of St. Bride's Burn, is a great stone, commonly called "*the Clochodrick stone.*" It derives its name from the Gaelic *Clach-na-dhruidbeuid*, the Druids' stone. It is supposed that this stone is the remains of a Druidical Temple, and that it was the altar on which the priests offered sacrifices. But the circle of smaller stones, which had probably surrounded it, and the grove of oaks, had all been removed by the husbandry of succeeding ages. The neighbouring peasants used the following singular puzzle to try the ingenuity of their young folks, that, "*the Clochodrick stone turns about thrice withershins when it hears the cock crow.*" This *saw* probably took its origin from the Druidical mysteries and ceremonies.

HOUSTOUN, *BRIDGE OF WEIR, &c.*

JAMES MACRAE was a blackguard callan at Ayr, who ran messages for any body who employed him for a *bawbee*, in the 16th century. He was taken up off the streets by one M'Quire, a fiddler in Ayr. This musician gave to this orphan the means of getting some education fitting him to go to sea. Macrae rose rapidly to be Governor of the Presidency of Madras. He returned to this country, and gave to the town of Glasgow a metallic equestrian statue of King William

III. in 1735. He died in 1744, without issue, and left his whole fortune, and the estate of Houstoun, which he bought, to his former benefactor, Hugh M'Quire. This fiddler had a son who was obliged to change his name to James Macrae, and wear the Arms of Macrae, on becoming possessor of the castle and barony of Houstoun. This same James Macrae was a Goth, and committed a most barbarous act, to demolish the great and splendid castle in 1780, except one square, and applied the stones to the building of a new village called Houstoun.

It is inhabited by industrious weavers of silk and cotton. It is formed by two long streets, one on each side of Gryffe water. At the south end of the town is a considerable bleach-field, and at the east end a cotton manufactory. There is a parish church for the united parishes of Houstoun and Killallan. The houses are of good mason work, generally two stories in height, and covered with blue slate. The number of inhabitants is about 700.

There is an elegant monument in the church-yard of Houstoun, erected over the remains of Dr. George C. Monteath, late of Glasgow, second son of the highly respected and venerable minister of Houstoun, the father of the Presbytery of Paisley. Young Dr. Monteath was much celebrated for all departments of his medical profession, as an expert surgical operator, and especially as an oculist, and who gave the blessing of sight to many a previously blind person in that city, Paisley, and the neighbouring counties. His death was a public loss. According to report, this monument cost about sixty guineas. The following epitaph was written by Mr. Smith of Jordanhill:—

Sacred to the Memory of

George Cuninghame Monteath, M. D.

who died at Glasgow on the 25th of January 1828,

aged thirty nine years,

Distinguished by the highest attainments,

and most honourable conduct in his Profession,

to the humane and arduous duties of which, he was devotedly attached.

He was respected in public, and beloved in private life.

This tribute of affection

is erected by his afflicted widow,

Anne Colhoun Cuninghame.

There is a long octagonal freestone, being nine feet in length, having a dial fixed on the top, crowned with a globe; the pedestal forms a kind of a platform around it, having two steps of a stone stair on all sides, to ascend to the pedestal. This remarkable stone is the cross of Houstoun. It is supposed to have been set up by the Knights of Houstoun. It is an ornament to the village, and to the market place.

Another stone called the Barrochan Cross, near to the place of Barrochan. It is about 20 inches broad, and 9 inches thick, being about 5 feet to the cross, and about 3 feet above that to the top, standing on a pedestal about 3 feet. It is full of wreathed work, such as lions, and other wild brutes. There are no letters legible. It probably might have been set up in the times of popery, for passengers to worship; for it raised their piety and their devotional feelings.

Killallan from *Cil* (Gælic) a cell, a lair, a kirk, and Saint Fillan. There is a large stone a little distant from the Kirk, called *Fillan's Seat*. A little farther a spring well, called *Fillan's Well*, shaded with bushes hanging over it, to which, it is reported, that the country women used to bring their weak and ricketty children, and bathe them in the water, leaving some pieces of cloth, as a gift or offering to the saint or the bushes. This custom continued till about the end of the last century, when Mr. Hutcheson, who was then minister, caused the well to be filled with stones.

There is a fair held in the month of January, called Fillan's Day. The font stone for holding the holy water, stood long without the choir door, after the reformation, but it is now built in the church-yard wall. The Auld Kirk of Killallan is occasionally used for worship by the Cameronians. The kirkyard is a famous field for the resurrection operations. There were two very old monuments in Killallan churchyard, built in the walls of that kirk. One of them is a monument of the Rev. Mr. Hutcheson, who, during the time of the then oppressive government, was *outed* of his charge of Killallan, and a curate, it is supposed, forcibly put into the parish. Mr. Hutcheson, when put out of his church, used, it is reported by old people, to preach sometimes in the House of Barrochan, and occasionally in private houses. We have heard it said, that Mr. Hutcheson was opening the Synod of Glasgow and Ayr, at Ayr, in that week the witches were burned at the west end of Paisley; and that either the magistrates, or the justices, or both, sent an express to him to Ayr, to come to Paisley and preach on the day before the execution of the witches; and that he came and preached from Exodus xxii, 18, *Thou shalt not suffer a witch to live*. If true, it is a very singular part of the history of this county in general, and of Paisley in particular. There was a sermon by Mr. David Brown, 9th June, 1697, see the history of the witches of Renfrewshire, published in 1809. This circumstance of two sermons on the same occasion, does not militate against the Killallan tradition, for the great crowds flocking to Paisley, must oblige the baillies to have plurality of preachers.

The other monument is of Mr. Fork, who was remarkably popular, because he refused to take some of the disagreeable

oaths imposed by the then government, who, it appears, did not understand the rights of conscience. We are told some worthless dyvours destroyed one of these venerable monuments.

At the distance of about a mile from Houstoun, is the Brig o' Weir, on the banks of the river Gryffe. This water divides the parishes of Houstoun and Kilbarchan, and runs through the centre of the village.

The Brig o' Weir is wholly situated in Kilbarchan parish; but many houses, as a suburb of that town, on the north side of the Gryffe, near the Brig o' Weir, are built on the Mill-lands of Gryffe, on the Burngill, and on the Gryffecastle-lands, in the parish of Killallan.

It took its origin from the cotton manufactory, from 1790 to 1800.

There are four considerable cotton mills moved by the same river, and a tanyard, affording employment to the inhabitants of the place.

The number in this thriving village is, as we suppose, about 1000. The Brig o' Weir folk are said to be sober and industrious.

It has one place of worship belonging to the Burghers.

The family of Speirs', the tanners, have for a long time been celebrated for curling. They beat all their neighbours.

POLLOKSHAWS,

THORNLIEBANK, NITSHILL, AND HURLET.

Eastwood parish, Pollokshaws, Nitshill, Birkenshaw, &c. derive their names from the sylvan state of their vicinity. The ancient wood, it is supposed, was a part of the Caledonian Forest, at least an appendage to the forest near Paisley. So as Eastwood gives countenance to that etymology, *Schaw* is a grove *Nits*, as hazel nuts, must give the name to some hill. Crawford mentions merely a village at the Shaws, belonging to the Maxwells.

Semple, in 1782 says, this village contains 220 houses, 311 silk and linen looms; the weavers are almost employed by the Paisley manufacturers; there are six thread mills, ten stocking frames, four bleachfields; a large printfield, which was

begun about 1740. The second commenced in Scotland another establishment of the same kind at Thornliebank, a tannery for a particular kind of leather, viz. shamoy, being the first of that kind in Scotland; a burgher meeting house erected in 1764, and the main street is all causewayed, being near two furlongs in length. Robertson says in 1818, it is one of the largest villages in this county (Renfrew.) and contains a population of not less than 3,500, who are chiefly employed in the spinning of cotton yarn, and steam loom weaving." The extensive factory of Auldfield, was, for a number of years, at a stand; this proved a very serious loss to the industrious inhabitants of the town; but in 1828 the premises were again opened by Messrs. W. and A. Hunter, and Co., which tended much to give activity and life to the place.

At this work there are from 200 to 300 looms, driven by one engine alone. It is from this ingenuity of machinery that the British manufacturer is enabled to undersell all the world. A considerable number is also employed in the bleaching business; there are four bleaching establishments, which carry on this process in a style of excellence that is not surpassed in any other part of the country. The art of Turkey Red, and fancy dyeing, is also carried on here to a large extent at the Green Bank Dyeworks; great quantities of goods are sent here from the manufacturing districts of Glasgow, Paisley, and the surrounding country. This town has much improved of late in its general appearance; the streets are well laid off and kirbed; the houses numbered, and the names of the streets painted upon the corners. There are, besides the Parish Church at Eastwood, a United Secession, and Burgher Church. It has a Town House, surmounted with a tower, which is embellished with a clock.

In the parish of Eastwood is situated the field of Langside, memorable as being the scene of the last effort of Scotia's "Beauteous Queen," to establish her authority in Scotland.

This town was erected about 1812 into a burgh of barony, in favour of Sir John Maxwell of Nether Pollok, with a Provost, a Baillie, and six Councillors. Pollokshaws was lately mentioned in the House of Lords as a burgh of barony in Scotland, which astonished the Earl of Lauderdale, for he knew nothing of the same burgh: he might have guessed this notable town may be about the Shetland Isles, and may have been the first spewings of the volcanic Hecla in the *ultima Thule*.

Thornliebank is a very flourishing village, and of recent origin. The Messrs. Crum have established a Cotton Manufactory in all its branches; including calico printing. It has a population of between 1200 and 1500 inhabitants.

The Hurlet and the Nitshill, are two villages in the neighbourhood of Pollokshaws. The alum, copperas, soda, coal,

and lime trades, gave rise to these villages. The former, according to the census taken in 1830, by John Wilson, Esq. has about 300, the latter about 400 inhabitants. There were anciently coal *heuchs* about the neighbourhood. *Auld Bettie* Ferguson, who died at Castlesemple in 1828, aged 90 years, was once employed as a *bit lassie* in leading coals from the Hurlet to Paisley, in *creils*, one hanging on each side of the horse. There were then no carts in use.

The abandoned coal pits or wastages, at the Hurlet, contain copperas or sulphate of iron, and sulphate of alumina, or a chemical compound of oil of vitriol and clay, the chief ingredients of Alum. The Hurlet old coal *heuch* is about a mile and a half in length and three-fourths of a mile at the broadest, being level free, it is in general dry, and laid open gently to the air. From having remained in this situation for many years, the material is, in many places, produced completely by the aid of the atmospheric air, the clay or schistus, when brought to the surface of the ground, the substance wanted is brought to a solution by water, or a ley, with the aid of a little sulphate of potash; this same solution is boiled in, and, when evolving, the alum falls in crystals to the bottom.

Before 1458 Europe was supplied with alum from Turkey. About 1580 the Yorkshiremen began to make it at Whitby. A Glasgow company of some distinguished chemists, namely, M^rIntosh, Tenant, Knox, Wilson, &c. set up a work to make alum; accordingly this process was begun at the Hurlet in 1797. This salt is used to a great extent, in the leather trade, in dyeing, in calico printing, also, in candle and paper making, and for other purposes.

Copperas or sulphate of iron is also produced with the aid of the common air, in converting pyrites into this substance. An English company commenced this manufacture at the Hurlet in 1753, and continued it till within these few years. It is now under the able and spirited management of Messrs. John Wilson and Sons.

The pyrite is exposed, in heaps or inclined beds, to the action of the weather: it gradually undergoes a chemical change, and, washed with the rains that fall, runs down from these beds, and is conveyed by rones or wooden pipes into proper vessels. It is afterwards boiled to evaporate the water. The addition of a little iron is made. On cooling, it becomes crystallized, of a beautiful green colour, which is named sulphate of iron, or copperas. This salt is extensively used in the processes of dyeing, calico-printing, currying, ink-making, &c.

Nitshill is famed for its freestone quarry. Arden quarry produces a peculiar and superior sort of lime which is much used for outside buildings.

The Eastwood Kirk is about a quarter of a mile from Pollokshaws. There is no village at the said Kirk. Robert Wodrow was minister here from 1703 till 1735. He published, about 1720, a History of the Sufferings of Scotland from 1660 to the Revolution in 1688, in two bulky folio volumes. He was rather a plodding writer; his work is rather a mass of rich materials for history, than a history itself. Dr. Burns of Paisley, has lately presented the public with a new edition of Wodrow's History. He has added many valuable notes from tradition, from contemporary and subsequent writers, together with a copious Index. For such a work, arranged, as it is, like annals, in the order of dates, a minute index is essentially necessary; the exertions of this laborious and discriminating writer, will be like the opening up of a new country, clearing away the brushwood, making new roads, and bringing to public view, the precious, but before hidden treasures, left by the respectable minister of Eastwood. From the eminent talents, indefatigable industry, and extensive reading of our distinguished townsman, Dr. Burns of St. George's, the work will assume a new and more interesting form, and cannot fail to be received as a valuable addition to modern literature.

John Maxwell of Nether Pollok was the father of the celebrated Robert, Bishop of Orkney. The Bishop was first rector of Tarbolton, in 1521; next, Provost of the collegiate church of Dumbarton; and at last was promoted to the See of Orkney. He built the stalls in his cathedral, which are curiously carved with arms of his predecessors in the bishopric, and furnished the steeple with a set of excellent bells. In 1526 when James V. made his famous tour through the Scottish Isles, he was nobly entertained by this Bishop in his palace of Kirkwall.

In an Inventory of his *geir*, the following is a catalogue of the books of his library, which shews the fewness of the rays that emanated from the sun of knowledge and the *gloaming* of truth, that veiled in obscurity the intellectual energies of the mind, and shed its darkened influence over the times.

The namis of ye bukis.

Item, ane prent Pontificall.

Item, ane small text of ane Pontificall.

Item, ane auld written Pontificall.

Item, *seculinorum scripturam*.

Item, *cathena aurea sancte Thome*.

Item, *psalterium cum commento Edward episcopi*.

Item, *bibla in pergamena scripta*.

Item, ane Inglisse buke of goweir.

Item, ane Inglisse buke of ye histories of saintis liffis and stories of ye bible.

Item, ye *cornakillis*

The following curious particulars which besel a respectable gentleman of high rank, illustrate the ignorance of even more modern times. Sir George Maxwell of Nether Pollok, who died in 1677, had fancied himself bewitched. He was, at Glasgow, 14th Oct., 1676, seized with a hot and fiery distemper; he came home the next day, and was then confined to bed. The physician, fearing he had got a pleurisy and a fever, let blood, and prescribed some mendicaments. The fiery heat abated, but he continued in great pain for seven weeks, chiefly in his right side, though not confined to bed. He ascribed the slowness of his recovery, not to the real cause, his old age and frailty, but laid the whole blame of his illness to witchcraft. A gangrel *tinklar* lassock, pretending to be dumb, *eggit* up the spite of Sir George against some poor old women and ignorant *chiels*, who were braudit as witches and warlocks, by open *bruit* and common fame.

The *tinklar* lassock deponit that Janet Mathie, *the witch*, had a picture of bees' wax wi' preins in the syde o't, in her ain house in a hole ahint the ingle, hechtand to fetch it to them, provydand she war conveyit wi men to skug her fra cuffsits and skaith.

Saebeins Lourie Pollock, the factour, and Andro Martine, the flunkie, gaed wi the daft lassock to the witch's house, and stude by the ingle; the wee lassie comand quicklie past the factour, raxit her haun in the hole ahint the fire, and syne slippit into the haun of the flunkie, aneth his cleuck, the sin-fow ydol, wi twa preins in it, ane in ilka syde; but the tane in the richt syde was sae lang as to gay out throw at the tither; that in the left wasna sae lang, nar sae deep dung in. This image beand brocht to Pollock, Sir George's sin, withouten acquainting his faither, grippet auld Jennie Mathie, and neist day procurit the order of Lord Ross, for convoying her to the tolbooth. The baillies speir't anent the effigie, and she, after a whein affsets, allegit that it was a' the turn o' the dummie. In the meantime the witch beand still wilyart and dour, was graippit and serchit for insensible marks, afore the Sheriff-Depute of Renfrewshire, and monie famous witnesses at Pasly; and there were unco monie fund upo her.

Efter finding the wax image, thare was sum abatement of Sir George's brash, but nae to ony kenspekil degree. But upo the 14th Janwar followand, his sickness retourit wi that violence, that for four or fyve days his freins and familiars had nae grit confidence of his lyfe. But they were amaizit on the Sunday the 7th Janwar, the deil gade owr Jock Wabster, be ane fluisterand bodeward frae the dummie, wha was at the Shaws, but could nae win owr the water to the Place, (there was a grit spate at that tyme,) and she tauld the familie that Jock Stewart, the auld witch's sin, had made an effigie o'

glaur or saft clay, in order to tak awa the lyfe o' the frail Sir George, and the sam wyld image was onner the bouster of the neirdoweil Jock Stewart, in the bed strae.

The neist day, Househill and Auchinhude, wi some of the Pollock lads, gade to the warlock's bigging, taking the wee dummie wi them, and resolvit to make ane unco sicker tryal, that it nicht na be said that the tinklar lassock had brocht onie thing hither.

Quharfor thay gart Jock licht the cruizie and hand it, whyle Auchinhude and anither liftit, in his ain sicht, the same clay effigie frae among the strae aneth the cod—the wee dummie a the tyme stanand at the winnock.

But the image brak sindrie in twa pieces; it had bene made three or four days a' the teir, and saebeius no hard eneuch. Jock had naething to say for himsell, but he threepit that he kent nae wha had pat that thing thare, but he jalousit the pliskies o' the tinklar cuttie.

Whanabee Jock was grippit bedein; his wee sister at the samen tyme was grippit, a bairn, gaun in her thirteen yier, wha had harkit summat anent the waxen effigie; this wean at first was unco dour to reveil their kittle cantraips, and their hidden and mirk mysteries. But the neist day the bairnly thing grat, and confessit the image was made in Jock's house afore the black gentleman, (as she cawit the Deil); but when confrontit wi her brother she did not stick to her ain confession. Upo the fynding of this second picture, Sir George estit recoverit, and the pyne in his syde wure awa by degrees. Jock Stewart remainit, whatreck his wee sister's fause clyping, dour and sweir ay and until he was examinuit and graipit for insensible marks, of quhilk, waesucks, he had great plenty o' them.

The Yirl of Dundonald and Lord Ross grantit a warrant for gripping Bessie Weir, Meg Jackson, and May Craig, as complices in this reveil o' cantraips. The Lords of His Majestie's Privie Council grantit a commission to Gauston of that ilk, the Laird of Bishoptoun and Greinock, Anderson of Dowhill, and ane Preston an advocate, Lord Ross, assessor, Robert Martin, clerk, to try the same wyld witches and warlocks.

Their gentilmen made a grit rippat, and rampaunging, and backspeiring, and they frichit and cowit (and aiblin etlitt the thumbikins) the onhappie bodies, and gart them tell summat touchand witchcraft.

Jock Stewart declarit that Bessie Weir, Meg Jackson, May Craig, and himsell, held a meeting wi auld Satan—that the muckle deil had ane of his feet cloven, his cleiding was black, his owerlay was blew, his handcuffs war whyte, and he had buggers withouten shune, and his voce was sture, how,

and gowstie. The black man requyrit of him to renunce his baptism, and deliver himsell hail to him. That he, the said Jock, did sae, be putting ae haun on the crown of his pow, and the tither on the sole of his fit; that he was eggit up tilt by the deil's hechting to him that he soud na want ony pleisour. That the meeting than made the effigies o' glaur and bees' wax, for taking awa the lyfe o' Sir George Maxwell, to revenge the flitting auld Jennie to the tolbooth. That the deil stickit three priens, ane in ilka syde, and ane in the brisket. That his wee sister cam and tirlit at the hallen, and she stayed a gliffen; and that he canna wryte.

The others deponed such like *taivers*, the record is imperfect, it does not mention the final sentence, and it is not stated whether the poor pannels were burned, drowned, or imprisoned *allanerlie*.

DIRECTIONS

For the Recovery of the apparently Drowned or Dead,
BY THE PAISLEY HUMANE SOCIETY.

IN APPARENT DEATH three objects are constantly to be kept in view: 1st, to remove every hurtful cause; 2d, to regulate the temperature of the body; 3d, to restore breathing. For these purposes the following directions may be usefully employed, till medical assistance arrive, which ought instantly to be sent for in every case.

In a Case of Drowning.

Remove as quickly as possible all wet clothes from the body, dry it well, wrap it in any warm woollen covering, and convey it, with the head and breast moderately raised, to the nearest house, where none but useful assistants ought to be admitted. Let the body now be laid in a warm bed or upon a warm blanket near a fire, *but not exposed to a strong heat.* Let the lost heat be restored by rubbing the surface with warm cloths or hands, by wrapping a piece of warm flannel or blanketing round the waist, and by applying warm substances, *first and chiefly* to the trunk and head, *next* to the limbs. The most convenient for this purpose are bottles or flasks filled with warm water, and bags or stockings filled with hot grains, chaff, bran, salt, or sand. Large glysters of warm water should also be exhibited. To restore the breathing, let a person firmly compress the nostrils with the fingers of one hand, then apply his mouth across the mouth of the body, and blow forcibly; let him now lift his head, and the air will escape. This operation is to be commenced as soon as possible, and continued till natural breathing return, or till the case appear hopeless. If water in the mouth and nostrils prevent inflation of the lungs, it ought to be discharged by blowing into the mouth while the nostrils are left open.

In a Case of Strangling.

Remove every thing tight from the neck and breast, then proceed to inflate the lungs and restore heat, as directed above.

In a Case of Suffocation from Impure Air.

Admit fresh air, inflate the lungs, and restore heat as directed above, if the body be cold; if, as sometimes happens, it be warmer than naturally, reduce the heat by dashing the head, neck, and breast smartly with cold water.

In a Case of Apparent Death from Lightning.

Besides using the same means as for suffocation, give large glysters of salt and water, and use friction over the whole body.

In a Case of Apparent Death from Intense Cold.

Avoid placing the body *at first* near the fire, use friction rather than apply heat for a time; in other respects act as for drowning.

In a Case of Excessive Intoxication.

If the breathing be suspended, act as for drowning, give large gylsters of salt and water, endeavour to bring up the contents of the stomach by tickling the throat with feathers; for the same purpose when the power of swallowing is restored, give copious draughts of warm water.

To prevent Death from Loss of Blood.

If from a wound, apply firm pressure to the wound by the finger, or a small pad, till medical assistance can be procured. If fainting has taken place, lay the patient in the recumbent position, and apply hartshorn to the nostrils.—If the bleeding is from an internal part, apply cold wet cloths, and avoid all stimulants.

Johnstone Cross, nearly opposite to the Black Bull Inn, is distant from the Cross of Paisley, 3 miles, 5 furlongs, 34 poles. Fairs are held on the Thursday following the second Monday of July and on the last Thursday of October, for cattle; also, on the last Friday of December for horses.

Although this market is not generally known, being but lately established; yet, from the excellent supply of cattle brought forward promises to be one of the most numerous attended Fairs in the West of Scotland. The market place is spacious and very extensive, affording accommodation rarely to be met with.

PARLIAMENTARY BOUNDARIES.

By the Bill to regulate the Boundaries of Scotch Towns, returning, or joining to return members to Parliament under the new regime, the following are the boundaries assigned to Paisley and Renfrew. They are certainly ample, and will not be complained of as cutting too closely on the outskirts.

PAISLEY.

From the summit of Byres Hill, on the north-east of the town, in a straight line to the point near Knockhill, at which the Renfrew Road is joined by a road from Glasgow; thence in a straight line to the summit of Knock Hill; thence in a straight line to the northern Gable of Moss Toll-house on the Greenock Road; thence in a straight line in the direction of the chimney of Linwood Cotton Mill to the point at which such straight line cuts the Candren Burn; thence up the Candren Burn to the point at which the same is joined by the Braidiland Burn at the Bridge over the same on the Johnstone Road; thence up the Braidiland Burn to a point which is distant 500 yards (measured along the Braidiland Burn) above the said Bridge; thence in a straight line to Meikleridge Bridge over the Candren Burn; thence in a straight line to the point at which the Old Neilston Road leaves the New Neilston Road; thence in a straight line to the summit of Dykebar Hill; thence in a straight line to a point which is 100 yards due north-east of the summit of Bathgo-hill; thence in a straight line to the point first described.

RENFREW.

From the Bridge over the Paddough Burn on the Glasgow Road, in a straight line to a point up the Paddough Burn, which is distant 300 yards in a straight line from the said Bridge; thence in a straight line to a point on the Greenock Road, which is distant 250 yards (measured along the Greenock Road) from the point at which the same leaves the Paisley Road; thence in a straight line to a point on the River Clyde which is distant 300 yards (measured along the River Clyde) below the point at which the same is joined by the Canal; thence along the River Clyde to the point at which the same is joined by the Canal; thence along the Canal to the point at which the same is joined by the Paddough Burn; thence along the Paddough Burn to the Bridge aforesaid.

REGULATIONS FOR PORTERS AND BARROWMEN.

The Magistrates and Town Council of Greenock, in virtue of the powers committed to them by the Acts of Parliament, 41 Geo. III. cap. 51 and 57, Geo. III. cap. 32, hereby enact and ordain the following Regulations, to be strictly observed and enforced from and after the 1st June 1826, until expressly altered, viz:—

1st. That no Porter or Barrowman shall be permitted to ply for hire within the Town of Greenock, and on the Quays and Breasts thereof, without being first licensed pursuant to the said Act, and having found caution faithfully to observe and fulfil the present Regulations; and each Porter shall have constantly affixed to his breast a badge, specifying his number, and which shall be delivered to him on his being licensed;—and all persons contravening this Regulation, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence.

2d. That all Porters shall with diligence and expedition perform the services for which they are engaged, and shall not soil or injure the property entrusted to their charge; and shall conduct themselves with civility and discretion, under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence, besides being liable to the party injured for damages.

3d. That when a Steam Vessel, just arrived at the Harbour has taken a birth in the outside of another Steam Vessel, no Porters or Barrowmen to stand on the paddle-box or on the side of the inside Vessel, but arrange themselves in the middle of that Vessel, and if the Vessel just arrived occupies an inside birth, they shall then arrange themselves on the Quay, at least four feet from the edge thereof, till called to be engaged, and permitted to pass on board by the officer attending for that purpose; nor shall any Porter, upon being engaged to carry Luggage or other Goods in the Town of Greenock, or from the Quays and Breasts thereof, attempt to transfer these to another Porter, but shall himself fulfil his engagement, and when required, accompany his employer; and all persons contravening this Regulation, shall be subjected in a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence.

4th. That no Porter shall embark the Luggage of Passengers going on board of any Steam Vessel until the Passengers intending to land at the Harbour shall have first landed with their Luggage, under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence.

5th. That the Wheel Barrows belonging to the Porters who ply on the Harbour, appointed for the Steam Boats, and in the Town of Greenock, shall be arranged and stationed, each with the number of its owner's Badge, and his name legibly painted thereon, in a situation to be fixed by the Officers appointed for that purpose, under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence.

6th. That Porters plying on the Steam Boat Quay shall be careful not to permit boys or other idlers to go on board any of the Steam Vessels, and, if necessary, they shall call for assistance on the officer on the station, and on the masters and crews of the Steam Vessels, to aid them in keeping boys and idlers from going on board, and in forcing them when on board, on shore: And the officer, and the master and crews of Steam Vessels, shall be bound to give such assistance: And all persons contravening this Regulation, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence.

7th. That no Porter shall demand or take a higher sum for his services than the fares stated in the Table hereunto annexed, and each Porter shall, when plying, have in his possession a copy of these Regulations and the Fares annexed, and shall at all times produce the same to the person employing him when required, and that under a Penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence.

8th. That the Magistrates, on sufficient cause shown, may declare the Bond of Caution granted for any Porter forfeited, and deprive the offender of its Licence and Badge.

9th. The Penalties incurred under the preceding Regulations, may be sued for before the Magistrates, and recovered, at the instance of the Procurator Fiscal of the Town of Greenock; and such proportion of these penalties to be awarded to the informer as the Court may in its discretion direct.

10th. That a Printed Copy of these Regulations, and Table of Fares annexed thereto, be placed in the Cabin and Steerage of each Steam Vessel, for the information and guidance of the Public.

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REGULATIONS FOR STEAM VESSELS.

The Magistrates and Town Council of Greenock, Trustees for the Improvement of the Harbours of Greenock, and for establishing, supporting, and regulating the Police thereof, in virtue of the powers committed to them by the Acts of Parliament, 50, Geo. III. Cap. 167, and 57, Geo. III. Cap. 32, hereby enact and ordain the following Regulations, to be strictly observed and enforced from and after the first day of June 1826, until expressly altered, viz:—

1st. That every Steam-Vessel for the conveyance of Passengers only, shall be brought alongside of that portion of the outside of the Custom house Quay betwixt the Watch-house and Light-house, provided the same is not previously occupied; and Steam-Vessels for the conveyance of Goods and Luggage shall take their stations alongside

the other portion of the said Quay—and that under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence.

2d. That all Masters or other persons in charge of Steam-Vessels, shall depart and sail from the said Harbour *punctually* at the hours of sailing announced on the boards put up for the said Vessels within the town of Greenock, and that under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence. And the time of the day shall be regulated and determined by the Public Clock at the Square. And on no account shall the period which has been announced, be altered by the Masters, or by others under their directions or acting under their authority, under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence. But it is hereby provided and declared, that if, from the state of the weather or any unforeseen occurrence, the Vessel cannot sail at the time announced on the boards, she shall depart as soon thereafter as the Master or other in command shall be required by the person appointed as after-mentioned, and that under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence.

3d. That the Bugle or Horn, used as a call for the Sailing of any Steam Vessel, shall not be blown or sounded for such purpose until within five minutes of the time appointed for sailing, and it shall be done not on the Quays, or through the streets, but by a person stationed on board the said Vessel, and that under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence.

4th. That Masters and Crews of all Steam-Vessels, lying nearest the Quay, shall have a sufficient gang-way board, with a hand rail affixed to it, placed betwixt their Vessel and the Quay, and shall give free access over the decks of their Vessels to passengers, to and from the Vessels lying in the outside births or stations; as also free access for the conveyance of luggage and coals, to and from said vessels—under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence.

5th. That when it is dark, every Steam-Vessel, for passengers, shall, under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence, have and use sufficient lights at the time of their arrival at, or departure from the Harbour, so as to enable passengers to get on board or to land with safety.

6th. That the Masters and Crews of all Steam-Vessels, shall take special care to exclude all persons under pretence of selling fruit or other eatables, or persons pretending to be porters, from coming and remaining on board within ten minutes of the hour of sailing, and shall, when called upon, assist the officer on the Station and the Licenced Porters in keeping on shore boys or other idlers—under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence.

7th. That in order to defray the expence of removing and carting away the dross, ashes, and rubbish, discharged from Steam-Boats and laid down upon the Quay, there shall be paid annually as follows, viz :

For each Steam-Vessel plying on the River and resorting to Greenock Quays daily, at the rate of 1s. 6d. for every horse-power.

Steam-Boats plying on the line, that only call at Greenock,

Once in 2 days, 1s. 4d. per each horse-power.

Once in 3 days, 1s. 2d. do.

Once in 4 days, 1s. 0d. do.

Once in 5 days, 10d. do.

Once a week, 8d. do.

8th. That a person shall be appointed by the Magistrates and Council, to see these regulations carried into execution and strictly enforced; and the Masters and Crews of Steam-Vessels shall obey the orders and instructions given by that person.

9th. That the penalties incurred, under the preceding Regulations may be sued for before the Magistrates of Greenock, and recovered at the instance of the Procurators Fiscal of the Harbour Police of Greenock, and such proportion of these penalties to be awarded to the informer as the Court may in its discretion direct.

10th. That a printed copy of these Regulations shall, by its owners, be placed in the Cabin and in the Steerage of each Steam-Vessel, and which shall at all times be open and patent to the passengers on board of said Vessel—under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence.

DIRECTIONS

For the Recovery of the apparently Drowned or Dead,
BY THE PAISLEY HUMANE SOCIETY.

IN APPARENT DEATH three objects are constantly to be kept in view; 1st. to remove every hurtful cause; 2d. to regulate the temperature of the body; 3d. to restore breathing. For these purposes the following directions may be usefully employed, till medical assistance arrive, which ought instantly to be sent for in every case.

In a Case of Drowning.

Remove as quickly as possible all wet clothes from the body, dry it well, wrap it in any warm woollen covering, and convey it, with the head and breast moderately raised, to the nearest house, where none but useful assistants ought to be admitted. Let the body now be laid in a warm bed or upon a warm blanket near a fire, *but not exposed to a strong heat.* Let the lost heat be restored by rubbing the surface with warm cloths or hands, by wrapping a piece of warm flannel or blanketing round the waist, and by applying warm substances, *first and chiefly* to the trunk and head, *next* to the limbs. The most convenient for this purpose are bottles or flasks filled with warm

water, and bags or stockings filled with hot grains, chaff, bran, salt, or sand. Large glysters of warm water should also be exhibited. To restore the breathing, let a person firmly compress the nostrils with the fingers of one hand, then apply his mouth across the mouth of the body, and blow forcibly; let him now lift his head and the air will escape. This operation is to be commenced as soon as possible, and continued till natural breathing return, or till the case appear hopeless. If water in the mouth and nostrils prevent inflation of the lungs, it ought to be discharged by blowing into the mouth while the nostrils are left open.

In a Case of Strangling.

Remove every thing tight from the neck and breast, then proceed to inflate the lungs and restore heat, as directed above.

In a Case of Suffocation from Impure Air.

Admit fresh air, inflate the lungs, and restore heat as directed above, if the body be cold; if, as sometimes happens, it be warmer than naturally, reduce the heat by dashing the head, neck, and breast, smartly with cold water.

In a Case of Apparent Death from Lightning.

Besides using the same means as for suffocation, give large glysters of salt and water, and use friction over the whole body.

In a Case of Apparent Death from Intense Cold.

Avoid placing the body at first near the fire, use friction rather than apply heat for a time; in other respects, act as for drowning.

In a Case of Excessive Intoxication.

If the breathing be suspended, act as for drowning, give large glysters of salt and water, endeavour to bring up the contents of the stomach by tickling the throat with feathers; for the same purpose, when the power of swallowing is restored, give copious draughts of warm water.

To Prevent Death from Loss of Blood.

If from a wound, apply firm pressure to the wound by the finger, or a small pad, till medical assistance can be procured.—If fainting has taken place, lay the patient in the recumbent position, and apply hartshorn to the nostrils.—If the bleeding is from an internal part, apply cold wet cloths, and avoid all stimulants.

“During the course of the year it has pleased Providence to call to himself your chaplain, the Rev. Mr. William Wilson, and thus to deprive you of the services of one who has long been to you a valuable counsellor, supporter, and friend. Your Committee are sure of obtaining the cordial sympathies of all present, when they say that his removal has been a severe loss, as well to the community at large, as to your Society in particular. Such was the zeal and cordiality with which he entered into its object, such the industry which he showed in promoting its success, and such the kind hearted affability and blandness of manner with which he went about all its various interests and concerns, that it will be long before your Committee can cease to cherish his memory, or regret his loss. They trust he is now reaping the reward of all his labours; and among the number of those who, faithfully occupied in prosecuting their Master's work while on earth, are now encompassing his throne in heaven. And they take to themselves, and would suggest to their constituents, from his unlooked for and, humanly speaking, premature removal, a new lesson of the exceeding uncertainty of all sublunary things, and of the necessity of entering upon and prosecu-

ing our heavenly Father's work with increased solicitude and diligence, seeing that the night of death is coming when no man can work."

Mr. William Wilson was born about the month of October, 1777. His father, Andrew Wilson, was an excise officer in Paisley, where his son William, received his education. He was ordained Pastor of the United Secession Church, Nicholson street, Greenock, about Nov. 1803—died 10th March, 1831. His remains were interred in the new Burying Ground.

REGULATIONS FOR PORTERS AND BARROWMEN.

The Magistrates and Council of Port-Glasgow and Newark hereby enact and ordain the following Regulations, to be strictly observed and enforced from and after the 15th of May 1828, viz:—

1st. That no Porter or Barrowman shall be permitted to act as such for hire or reward, within the Towns of Port-Glasgow and Newark, or on the Quays and Breasts of the Harbours thereof, without being duly licensed, and having found caution for the faithful performance of the following Regulations.

2d. That all Porters or Barrowmen shall diligently, expeditiously, and civilly perform the services for which they are engaged, and shall not injure the property entrusted to their charge, under a penalty not exceeding Two Pounds for each offence, besides being liable to the party injured in damages.

3. That no Porter shall embark the luggage of passengers going on board of any Steam Vessel until the passengers intending to land at the Harbour, shall have first landed with their luggage, under a penalty not exceeding Two Pounds for each offence.

4th. That no Porter shall demand or take a higher sum for his services, than the fares stated in the Table hereunto annexed, and each Porter shall, when plying, have in his possession a copy of these Regulations and of the Table of Fares annexed to his license, and shall at all times, when required by persons employing him, produce the same for inspection, under a penalty not exceeding Two Pounds for each offence.

5th. That the Magistrates or any one of them may, on sufficient cause shown, declare the bond of caution granted for any Porter forfeited, and deprive the offender of the license.

6th. The Penalties incurred under the preceding Regulations may be sued for before the Magistrates, and recovered at the instance of the Procurators Fiscal of the Burgh Court of Port-Glasgow and Newark, and applied as the Magistrates may direct.

GREENOCK CATTLE SHOW.

List of Premiums awarded to Exhibitors of Stock at Greenock, on Wednesday 1st August, 1832.

The Show of Stock took place at Finnart, in a field on the farm of Mr Ivy Warden, under whose particular inspection the spaces for the various species of Stock were allotted, and stalked off with paling got for the occasion from Ardgowan. The Judges, Mr Brake-more, Seafield, Ardrossan; Mr Macfarlane, Faslane; Mr Craig-Cunninghame, Brediland, Dalry; Mr Fulton of Sproulston, Beith; Mr Holme, Branchhill, Kilbarchan; Mr Kerr, Barrogan, Beith; attended by Mr Wallace of Kelly, Convener; and other members of the Committee of the Highland Society, who met the Judges in the Tontine, a little past ten. The Judges immediately proceeded to inspect the stock produced, the owners of which they had no means of knowing, and the accuracy of their discrimination and their dispatch gave universal satisfaction.—The day was uncommonly fine, and a great number of spectators from the town and neighbourhood assembled. The Stock on the whole was excellent, and a growing improvement distinctly visible.
