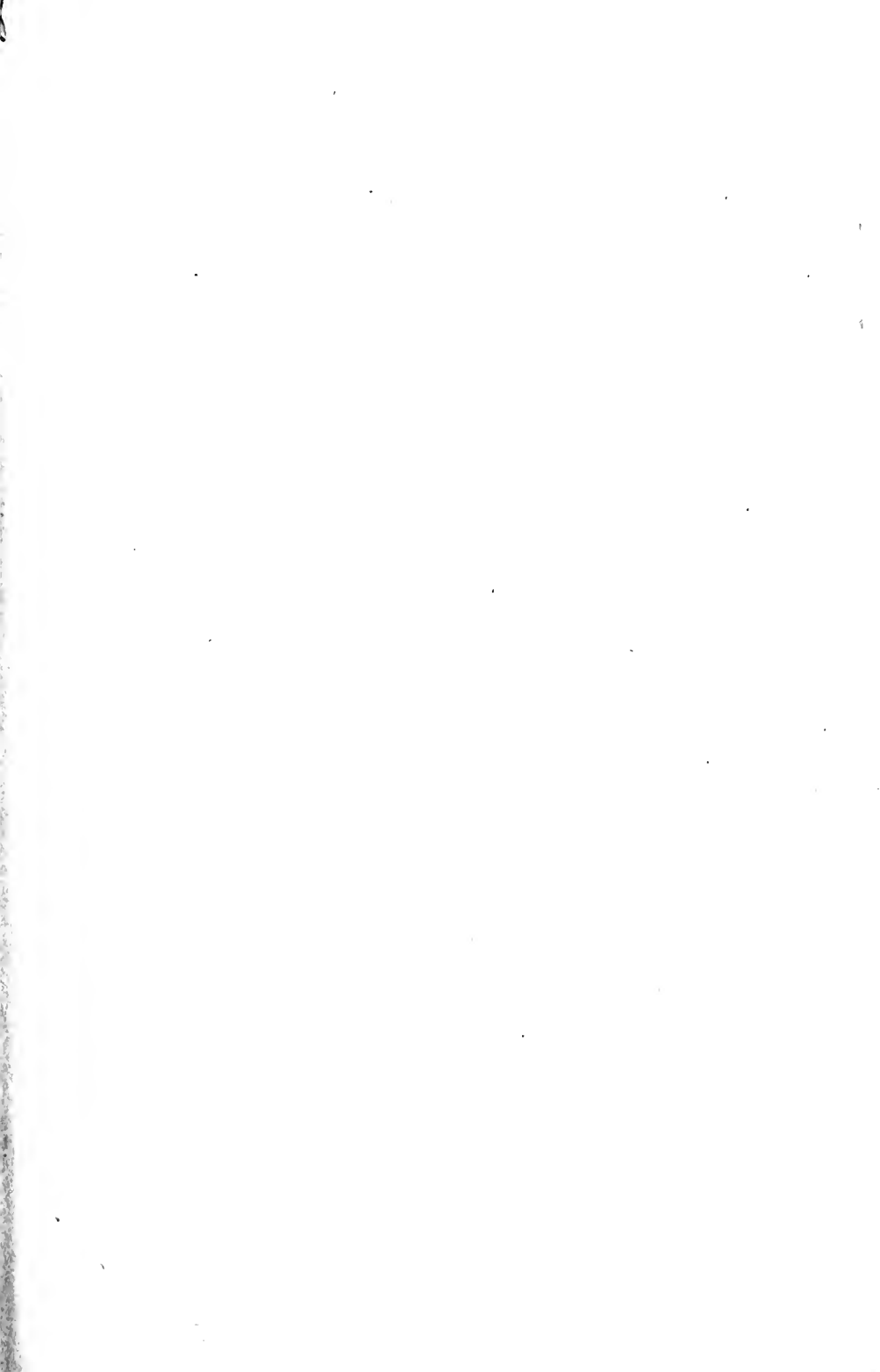


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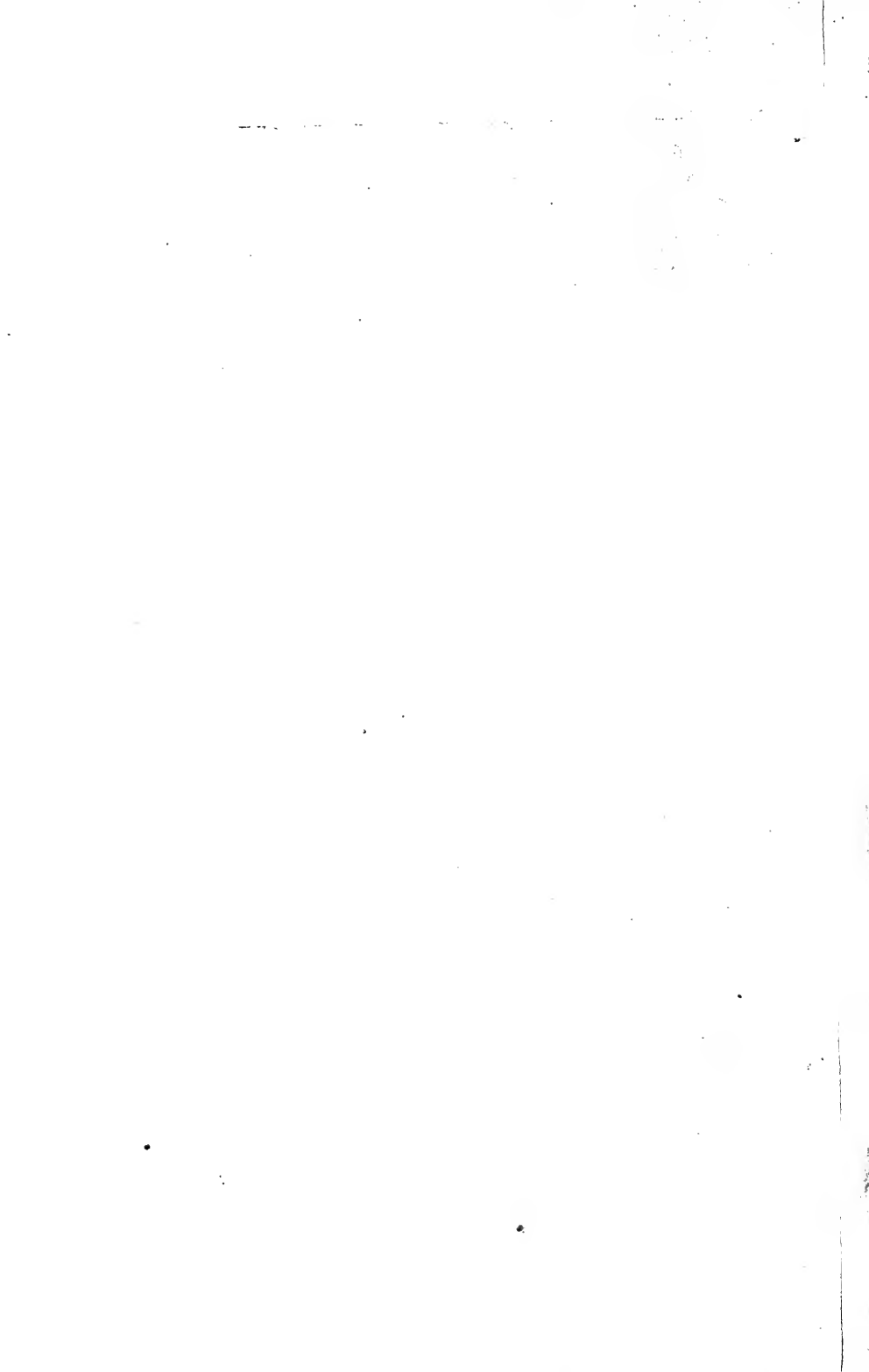

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PREFACE.

ANNUAL RE-UNION OF 1869.

FREEPORT, ILL., SEPTEMBER 23TH, 1869.

Pursuant to appointment a business meeting was held at the Howard House, at 4½ o'clock, P. M. The society was called to order by Major J. J. Palmer, senior Vice President, and on motion Lieut. J. A. Rollins was appointed Secretary, pro tem.

On motion the association then proceeded to the election of officers, for the ensuing year.

On motion of Capt. Evans Blake a committee consisting of one member from each company represented was appointed by the chairman to nominate officers to be elected.

The committee made the following report :

President, Gen. John E. Smith ; Vice Presidents, Major J. J. Palmer, of Rockford, Col. M. M. Miller and Gen. W. R. Rowley, of Galena, Capt. D. O. Reid, of Rock Island, Lieut. C. F. Dubs, of Freeport, Capt. J. M. Adair, of Lanark, Sergt. K. E. Olds, of Warren, Capt. B. F. Holcomb, of Galesburg, Lieut. E. L. Lawrence, of Belvidere.

Recording Secretary and Regimental Historian, Capt. J. M. Adair, of Lanark.

Corresponding Secretary, J. C. Glenat, of Galena.

Treasurer, Luther Smith, of Rockford.

Chaplain, Wm. D. Atchison.

The report of the committee was adopted and the officers named declared duly elected.

On motion of Giles C. Hard, it was unanimously agreed to exclude all intoxicating drinks from the table at the banquet in the evening.

At the request of Col. Miller and Sergt. Crummer, the association decided upon Galena as the place of the next meeting, and the time fixed to be the 29th day of September, 1870.

On a motion being made to extend an invitation to all soldiers of other regiments, and the citizens in the vicinity of Galena, it was unanimously adopted.

A motion then prevailed for the appointment of a committee of five to draft resolutions of respect to the memory of our deceased comrades since the last annual re-union. The chairman appointed the following : Sergt. Crummer, Col. Miller, Capt. Blake, Capt. Adair, Lieut. Lawrence.

A tax of Fifty Cents was levied upon each member present for contingent expenses.

On motion the meeting adjourned to meet at 7½ o'clock, in Hettinger's Hall, to hear the history of the regiment read, and to receive the report of the committee on resolutions.

EVENING—The association re-assembled at the hall at the appointed time. The history of the regiment was read by Capt. J. M. Adair, of Lanark, and was listened to with marked interest and attention; the members acknowledging their appreciation by a vote of thanks. Col. Miller from the committee on resolutions submitted the following which were adopted.

WHEREAS, The Supreme Ruler of the Universe in his divine wisdom has taken from our number since our last annual meeting, our former comrades Major Gen. John A. Rawlins, late Secretary of War, Chas. D. Evans, Pr. Co. D., Wm. Wheland, John G. Auger and Joseph Powell, privates Co. B. Therefore be it resolved

1st, That in the death of Gen. John A. Rawlins, our first Major, we mourn the loss of one who was prominent in organizing our regiment. A brave soldier, true friend, wise statesman and devoted lover of his country, who living gave utterance to and dying was a practical exponent of the sentiment "it is sweet and fitting to die for one's country."

2d **RESOLVED**, That in Charles D. Evans, Wm. Wheland, John G. Auger and Joseph Powell, we mourn the loss of brave and efficient soldiers, who when their country called, promptly answered, and faithfully served whenever and wherever duty required.

3d. **RESOLVED**, That we will ever cherish and revere their memory, and that we shall ever protect and care for the widows and orphans of these our beloved comrades who have fallen for their country.

4th. **RESOLVED**, That these resolutions be placed upon the records of our association, and that a copy of the same be furnished by the secretary for publication in the various counties where companies of the 45th were raised.

On motion the chairman was instructed to appoint a committee of three, whose duty it shall be to make arrangement for the publication of the historical sketch of the regiment in pamphlet form for distribution among the surviving members and friends of the regiment. The chair appointed Capt. J. M. Adair, Sergts. W. F. Crummer and Luther Smith as such committee.



HISTORICAL SKETCH
OF THE
FORTY-FIFTH REGIMENT ILLINOIS VOLUNTEERS.

Read at the Second Annual Re-Union of the Regiment at Freeport,
SEPTEMBER 28th, 1869.

DEAR COMRADES AND FRIENDS OF THE 45TH—At the re-union of the Regiment last fall, without my knowledge or consent I was selected as "Regimental Historian" perhaps as a penalty for not meeting with you at the first re-union. No one was more disappointed than myself at not being able to meet with you, but circumstances prevented. My only regret is that your choice did not fall upon some one more capable of carrying into effect your wishes, and more competent to have entertained you at this time upon such an interesting and important subject. However your choice fell upon me and with pleasure I accept the task, hoping that I shall succeed in giving better satisfaction to you than I have to myself in the brief sketch I have prepared. Before commencing my sketch allow me to make a word of explanation. A full history of the 45th would have required much more time and thought than I could have devoted to its completion, and when finished would have been too voluminous to read upon a single occasion like the present. So I have waived the formality of historical narration, and have adopt-

ed a series of suggestions of facts connected with our history, going over the whole ground as near as possible, stopping only to touch upon the different events transpiring by the way. I shall depend upon my hearers to supply the deficiency in their own minds as I proceed and at the close if I have aided you in recalling some of the scenes of the past and refreshed your memory upon a subject dear to all of us I shall be well paid for my trouble.

Few of us if any can realize that eight long years have come and gone, since the most of us, were in our first camp at Galeana. Eight years ago the 5th of this month the first companies took up their quarters at camp Washburne. Eight long and eventful years, yet how short they seem,—to look back. "Three years or during the war" seemed interminable to look forward to then; but to-day it is eight years and more and here we are, a goodly number of us—thank God, met together, to live over again, in a few hours the history of our "association in the war," and to talk about the things that transpired in those days, in the light of our after experience. The cir-

circumstances attending the organization of the "Lead Mine Regiment" as it was first called, were peculiar, and not altogether favorable. About the 1st of June, 1861, a formal tender of an independent rifle regiment from this Congressional district, to be commanded by Col. John E. Smith and to the Governor, was made by the Hon. E. B. Washburne, to the Secretary of War.— This tender was made in obedience to the patriotic impulses of the people in all parts of the district. The auspices for a speedy and effective completion of the organization of the regiment, were at that time most favorable, but the government unconscious of the magnitude of the contest into which it was about entering, declined immediate acceptance of the proffer, and the project was in a manner abandoned. Companies already full united with other organizations, and those in process of formation were disbanded.

The disaster of Bull's Run gave a new impetus to governmental sluggishness, and on the 23d of July, a telegram was received by Col. Smith from the Secretary of War, announcing the acceptance of the Regiment, if ready for marching orders within 15 days; and afterwards extended to Sept. 10th. The material which had been so ready at call a few weeks previous, was now, by cause of the delay unavailable, and the country appeared to be already stripped of serviceable men. Yet when the call was made it was responded to in a manner creditable to the noble sentiment of the 3d District. A mustering officer was assigned by the War Dept. to muster in the troops, and the work pushed speedily forward. I question whether any of us can repress a smile when we recall the awe inspiring effect which the presence of that august personage—as we then regarded him—Lt. Goodwin had upon us. He was the first specimen of a soldier I had ever seen out of the picture books, and I regarded him as the greatest hero of the age. The supervisors of Jo Daviess coun-

ty made a liberal donation for immediate wants, and the fair ground near Galena was turned into a camp of rendezvous, and christened "Camp Washburne." On the 5th of Sept. 1861, companies "A" & "B" went into camp; company "C" on the 8th and Co. "D" on the 9th. Lieut. W. T. Frohock was assigned to the immediate command of the camp. On the 18th Co. "G" was escorted into camp in due military style, company "E" on the 24th, myself a private in the ranks, and company "F" followed soon after, which completed the compliment, so far as "Camp Washburne" was concerned. Here was the starting point of our real regimental history. Here was our first experiences of a soldier's life, and we thought them hard enough at the time. Had we known what we had to endure before our terms had expired, how contentedly we would have adapted ourselves to the circumstances. Here we first tasted of soldier's fare and lodging which we denounced as barbarous. Here we took our first lessons in squad, company and battallion drills. In about a week we knew more than there was in the books, and were just about ready to graduate when Major Smith took us in hand and we found out that we didn't know half so much as we thought we did. On the 31st of October, sixty-one, a further organization of the regiment was effected by completing the roster of field officers. Then we drew our "Enfield" Rifles of which we all were very proud. You remember how proudly we shouldered them one pleasant afternoon, and marched down to Galena and halted in line in front of the custom house. We were all very curious to know what was to be done. Presently our curiosity was satisfied by the presentation in the name of the ladies of Galena, of two splendid banners. They were accepted in the name of the regiment by Col. Smith and in the course of his remarks promised that they should never trail in the dust or be tainted with dishonor and you sanction-

ed his word by cheer upon cheer. That was the first time we flung our banner to the breeze, and marched back to camp with our flag proudly floating. Boys, can you go to Galena and tell those ladies that you kept those promises sacred? Did the 45th ever desert her colors, or disgrace the flag she bore? Her record furnishes the answer. The memory of this period of our soldier life gather so thickly and fast that I would gladly dwell upon it longer, but I am reminded that other scenes crowd each other in quick succession, along our journey through those long eventful years of war, and are claiming our attention. I must hasten on to meet them, or my time will be gone before I am half through.

Thus partially organized, the battalion which heretofore had been known as the "Lead Mine Independent Regiment," was assigned to the state, by the general government, and thereafter known as the 45th Ills. Vol. Infy. The regiment was ordered into camp at Chicago, and moved there by Rail on the 22d of Nov. The breaking camp at Galena and the parting with friends that night at the depot, need not be mentioned by me to be remembered by all of you. As soon as barracks could be completed we were assigned quarters in Camp Douglas. In the mean time we rendezvoused in the Wigwam, a villainous place to be cooped up in. Soon after reaching Chicago Co. "I" joined the regiment and while in camp, companies "H" and "K" were assigned, which completed our organization, and raised our numbers to the proportion of a full grown regiment and who dare say we were not equal to the best of Illinois' honest boys in looks and valor.— When the organization was completed a resolution was adopted adding Washburne to the name of the regiment in honor of E. B. Washburne who had rendered such efficient aid in organizing the regiment.— July 12th, 1862 we left camp Douglas for Cairo, with the reputation of being the best drilled regiment in camp, a merited

honor, I think, at least we had worked hard for it. At Cairo we imagined we were in the heart of the enemy's country, and the most rigorous discipline was adhered to, as a poor calf which undertook to pass the guard line without giving the countersign, found out to its sorrow. One of the boys of Co. "E" shot it dead for this breach of discipline. Our next move was up the Ohio and Tenn. rivers, and on the 4th of Feby. we pitched our tents in our first camp in the field. Few of you have forgotten camp Halleck, or the rain storm which leveled nearly all our tents that night. Fewer still have forgot'en the boom, boom of the cannon in the direction of Ft. Henry, the next morning when Commodore Foote opened fire from his gun boats. It was the first hostile shot we had heard in this or any other war, and that peculiar indescribable excitement had so taken possession of everybody, that whatever eccentricities were displayed that morning, nobody can be held responsible therefor. There is something mysterious about that peculiar excitement felt on the eve of the first battle, which I have never heard explained satisfactorily. Every one who has ever been in a battle has experienced it, yet I never have seen any one who has been able to describe his feelings. The march to Ft. Henry through the mud and water, over the hills and hollows of that region, sometimes wading streams, swollen by late rains, in the month of Feb. are among the recollections of the war, not the most pleasant. When we reached the Fort late at night, the rebels had gone. The night turned suddenly cold and then the most of us remembered that we had left our blankets and overcoats behind, and what rations we had put into our haversacks had been eaten on the march. Cold, hungry and disappointed, we shivered around our camp fires that long dreary night, and began to realize what an earnest cruel thing a soldier's life was. But it was our first experience and we knew nothing

about making ourselves comfortable. With the knowledge of further experience, we can now look back, and realize how little we knew then, and how much we had yet to learn. Next came Donelson with a mere terrible and bloody experience, but with the same lack of wisdom in taking care of our bodily comfort. You remember how we unslung our knapsacks five miles from the scene of action, occasioned by a few cavalry shots in the advance.—The suffering and exposure resulting from this foolish act cost us more lives than rebel shot on the battle field.

On the morning of the 13th of Feby. we stood behind the guns which fired the first shot into Donelson, from McAllister's battery, on the hill we bivouacked the night before. We then moved off to the right and took up the position which we occupied during the day's fight. I have time to refer to but one or two incidents connected with the history of this remarkable siege, in which the 45th took such a gallant part. On Thursday, about noon, you will remember we were ordered forward of the main line to the support of the 49th Ill. which was getting the worst of it, to our left, and front. At the command we moved forward proudly and grandly with an unbroken front down across the open field, and up on the other side to within fifty feet of the enemy's works. This was our first experience under fire, and gallantly the 45th stood the first shock of battle.—I can hardly realize now in looking back upon the scenes, how raw troops, such as we were then, could display such dauntless courage and cool, almost reckless bravery. And when a charge on the breast works was abandoned as impracticable at that time and place, and we were ordered to retire to our former position, the coolness, amounting almost to impudence, in which it was done was something truly remarkable. You will remember our stopping on the way back to take a survey of the position and to speculate upon the chances of

success or failure, in case we had charged. Again we find ourselves in line to talk over our first engagement, and wait events.—They came that night, in the shape of a rain and snow storm, a freeze up, and a picket skirmish, which will not soon be forgotten. The next day and night was bitter cold, but not much fighting on our line but sharp shooting, in which the "boys" of the 45th took a lively hand, with their long range guns. Saturday the ball commenced on the right, bright and early in dead earnest, and the 45th took her full share of the blunt of that desperate fight. But the three days fight is ended and late Saturday evening we are retired some distance to the rear where we rest as well as we can on the snow and ice covered ground, with a scanty supply of blankets and provisions.

The next morning was the Sabbath, and a brighter and more beautiful morning never dawned. The 45th awoke to the glad news that the white flag proclaimed a cessation of hostilities and soon the message came, that the Fort had unconditionally surrendered to Gen. Grant. The 2d Brig. had the honor of leading Grant's victorious army to take possession of the prize, and I remember how grandly the old regiment looked that morning as they marched in, with their saber bayonets glittering and reflecting in the bright rays of the sun, until it looked like a long streak of sunshine itself.

It is remarkable that this day so beautiful and fair, was the only good day that we had while we encamped at Donelson, if my memory serves me right. The weather was miserably wet, cold and disagreeable all the time we remained. The colors of the 45th were the first to be planted on the ramparts of Fort Donelson, and as we mounted the works and looked down the Cumberland and watched the transport fleet coming up, I thought it one of the grandest sights I ever saw. We had won a great victory but at a fearful cost. The

beautiful sunlight of heaven, beaming out in all its splendor, played upon the upturned features of hundreds of our brave boys in death's embrace on the field where they fell, as if in the attempt to win them back to life. But the sun of their lives had gone down forever, casting its shadow of darkness and gloom in so many once happy homes in our own dear state. This was the price paid for the victory, and the 45th had contributed liberally of the sum.

On the 4th of March we again take up our line of march through snow and rain, over almost impassable roads for the Tennessee river where we embarked on the transports again, which are to convey us further on to repeat the scene on other fields. You remember well the trip up the river; the camp at Savanna; the expedition to Pin Hook and return; the leaving of our camp at Savanna, just when Sergt. Swartz had got the bake ovens finished; and then on to Pittsburg Landing; our camp at that place; the battalion drill again and many other things of interest which I have no time to mention, but which you will run over in memory half a dozen times while you sit here.

The memorable 6th of April finds us in our camp at Shiloh, almost unconscious of danger, and certainly, at the time the blow was struck, unmindful of it. Who of us that was present will forget the morning when the long roll beat the call to arms? The blood quickens in the veins, and the nerves thrill with excitement at the thought. From our scanty breakfast in camp we sprung to our arms to go through with all the horrors of that terrible day. We that are here to-day to live over again these scenes of blood can well consider ourselves fortunate. Many of our beloved comrades who obeyed the summons that morning, on earth, answered to roll call in the army on high at night.

The double quick to the left is still distinct in your memories, where we met not only the enemy, but our own broken and

dismayed troops, flying for life in every direction; but you faltered not. Amid the shot and shell flying thick and fast our line was formed, and although it seemed useless, the attempt was made to check the determined and resistless foe. The odds was too great against us, and as promptly reformed in a new position, not a man shirking, or hesitating in his duty. The work of death had already been felt, and good old Capt. Connor, of Co. "D" had received the fatal shot, and others of his comrades had felt the sting of rebel shot. For a short time we held our ground and then again were forced to give way, this time taking position to the rear of our camp ground. Here we made a determined stand, and the metal of the old regiment was tried in a terrible fire; but she was made of pure stuff, and nobly held her ground. Some of her bravest and best boys, however went down to rise no more, while many more were wounded. Company "B" being in the most exposed position, lost heavily in killed and wounded in the ranks, and the young and talented Baugher here received his death wound.—The ranks of Co. "G" were thinned by the murderous blast, and so on throughout the regiment, although the loss was not so heavy, as in the companies mentioned. A little later in the day another line had to be formed in the rear, and here company "A" saw the gallant George Moore go down with a mortal wound. It was our turn now to assume the offensive for a time, and you remember our first charge up through the brush, after the retreating rebels.

Many a patriot in the confederate cause bit the dust in that charge. I shall never forget the agony of fear depicted in the countenances of the wounded as we came up to them, which passed into a sigh of relief, as we passed by them, without doing them any further harm. The rebels had been taught to believe that the "Yankees" were a species of barbarous humanity, who

would take special delight in bayoneting the wounded, and mutilating the dead.— They were surprised to find us men with kind hearts possessing true manly courage. I have heard the remark made in the southern states, many times since the war, "That if the south had known the north better there never would have been any war," and I believe it. During the greater part of the first day's fight at Shiloh, the 45th under the trusty leadership of Col. Smith, fought mostly upon its own hook. Sometimes we were with the brigade, but often the rest of the brigade would move off and leave us fighting. It didn't seem to make much difference however, we fought on until we were out of ammunition, and when we couldn't get any more, or see anybody else but rebels, the Col. concluded to make his way to the river to replenish our cartridge boxes. So we started, you will remember, left in front, and the rebels followed us so close, that Capt. Polsgrove came up to the Col. and exclaimed breathlessly: "My God, Col. they are not fifty yards from my company, and we hav'nt a shot to defend ourselves." The Col. replied, "keep cool and don't say anything Capt. the enemy don't know we are out of ammunition and we will come out all right yet." We did come out all right, what was left of us and got back to the river bank without further loss, filled our cartridge boxes, and moved up to the right of the line then forming for the last engagement of the day. Here we found the brigade again, and took our position in the line which was to either win or lose the day. They didn't give us much to do in that grand repulse on Sunday evening, but we were ready, and their reception would have been warm if they had given us a call. After that we had our supper of "Hard tack" and cheese which good old "commissary" Hard, and Lieut. Bush provided us with. We appreciated their kindness for it was the first morsel we had seen since breakfast,—and that was an extremely light meal. We ate our supper and went to bed,—Oh! so tir-

ED. It rained down in torrents during the night, but we slept soundly through it all; —at least I did, and I suppose the rest of you did. The next morning almost as soon as it was light we were ordered forward, which surprised us a little, but we didn't stop to enquire into particulars.— We had'nt gone far before the rebel artillery opened upon us from a distance, and we were ordered up to support a battery, just in the edge of the wood, where Co. "F" lost the brave Capt. Johnson. Then we moved across the open field in our front, to the woods beyond, where we waked up a hornet's nest of rebels, and where the 53d and 71st Ohio came very near getting us gobbled up by their cowardice, and did cause us to retreat, for some distance.— Then came that last grand decisive charge which broke the rebel lines and put them all to flight. It was sharp awful work, but magnificently done. There was'nt many of us to answer roll call, when we formed in line after the charge, you remember, there was a good many reported afterwards, but many very many of our noble band, never were with us again.

The loss during the two days were 26 killed, 196 wounded and several missing, being over 47 per cent of the whole number engaged

The evening of the 7th we returned to, and occupied an old camping ground a dilapidated and dreary looking place enough as seen through the darkness with the dead of both armies strewn thickly upon the ground in every direction. We had gained the victory but we laid down on Monday night sad and mournful; the scourge of battle had taken away our bunk mates and messmates, comrades and friends and our hearts wept bitterly. But I have not time to dwell longer. Your memories will serve you better than I can, and I will pass on. On the 24th of April the 45th left camp at Shiloh, and with the rest of the army began the tedious and almost endless siege of Corinth. It always make me sick

to think of Halleck's mode of warfare, and I have not the patience to stop and tell you, how many miles of breastworks we constructed, or how many Tennessee farms we cleared off during the advance on Corinth, but with a sudden bound, clear them all, and land in our pleasant camp at Jackson, Tenn., where we remained during the summer of sixty-two. Our camp life at Jackson was varied somewhat by details for Railroad guard duty. Aug. the 11th the Regt. was detailed to guard the Miss. Central from Jackson to Toons Station a distance of 22 miles. Companies A, D, F, and I under command of Capt. Palmer, were stationed at Medon, company "C" was ordered to guard the trestle work in the neighborhood of Treager's Station, and companies B, E, G, H and K, were at Toons. Thus stationed we enjoyed a quiet easy camp life, with not much else to do but eat "peach cobbler" (you remember them don't you boys?) chickens, geese, &c., which somehow or other would find their way into camp, although there were strict orders against foraging. You know at that time it was the custom for our army to guard rebel property, return to their masters runaway slaves, and all that kind of thing, a kind of a patent way the government had of "making war tender and merciful." And the 29th of August information was received from below that Armstrong's Cavalry were making their way north along the railroad and that we should "look out for him." We did look out for him and was not disappointed in his coming. A picket post at Toons was driven in about noon and one man captured. Lt. Dubs can tell you more about that than I can as he did some tall walking to get out of their way. About the same time "clever" Capt. Rouse with his company were attacked by some three or four hundred, and invited to accept rebel hospitality for a few days which was accepted. Enquire of Capt. Rouse or any of Co. "C" for particulars. At three o'clock in the afternoon the force at Medon numbering in all about

125 men were attacked by something like twelve or fifteen hundred cavalry dismounted, who were just going to gobble up the boys in little less than no time. A 45th "boy" was'n't the easiest thing in the world to gobble at any time, and if there was such a thing as a cotton bale, attached to him he couldn't be swallowed no way. Well the boys under command of friend Capt. Palmer took to the cotton bales which happened to be lying around the station, and against such tremendous odds defied the rebel hordes for three hours when the 7th Mo. arriving from Jackson to reinforce them the rebels slunk away like whipped curs, without accomplishing their object. The brave and good Lieut. Green of Co. "I" and two of the boys who fought beside him yielded up their lives nobly fighting, besides 13 wounded and 43 of the regiment taken prisoners. The enemy losing in the same contest 8 killed and 40 wounded which were left on the ground besides others taken away. Last May it was my privilege to pass over this road again, and the train stopped long enough at Medon to enable me to look around upon this historic ground. The bullet holes in the old station house and the marks on the trees around are still plainly to be seen.— These scars of the bitter contest, have a peculiar interest to one familiar with their history, and when I walked about the premises and thought of the times when I had been there before and looking at the holes made in the building by rebel bullets each shot fired with the hope of letting out the life blood of one of my comrades and friends, my spirit of forgiveness was not so strong as Peter's faith. Yet we are asked to forget these things and let by-gones be by-gones. Perhaps it would be better but there are some things that are hard to forget.

But I must hasten on for the end is yet a long way off. The fall campaign of 1862 had been determined upon, and on the 2d day of Nov. we left Jackson, Tenn., for the south passing through Bolivar, and

then on to Lagrange where we spent some three weeks doing guard duty in that pleasant little town. On the 28th we started with the rest of the army on the Mississippi expedition which if successful was to put us in the rear of Vicksburg. The march south through Holly Springs across the Tallehatchie, with old Pap Price "skeddadding" with his army before us, and then on through Abbeville and Oxford to Spring Dale, is familiar to all of you. At the latter place an incident occurred which deserves a place in our history. It was the separation of Col. Smith from the Regt. in consequence of promotion to the rank of Brig. Gen., an honor richly deserved and worthily bestowed. Gen. Smith communicated the fact to the regiment in a very appropriately worded letter which I thought would be interesting to you to hear so I will give it to you in his own words, and also the reply on the part of the officers of the regiment.

Hd. Qrs. 1st Brig. 3d Div. Army Corps in the field, Dec. 16th 1862.

To the officers and soldiers of the Washburne Lead Mine Regt. 45th Ill. Vol.

Having been appointed to a position which will separate me from your immediate command, I desire to return my sincere thanks to you my friends, to whom I am indebted for my position. Having shared with you the dangers of Donelson and Shiloh, as well as the fatiguing march upon Corinth, and from there to this point I feel a just and honest pride in sharing with you the enviable reputation won by your valor, and trust you have had no cause to be ashamed of your commander. Suddenly called from the peaceful pursuits of civil life to encounter hardships, dangers and the privations of all social ties in defence of the constitution and the laws of our beloved country, without the practical experience of soldiers; you have been tried and found true to your trust. "The 45th can be relied upon," is your reputation throughout the victorious army of Tenn. Of myself I have but little to say,

other than that had I been perfect I should not have been human. I have endeavored to administer the affairs of the regiment with justice and impartiality; of this you must be the judges. If I have erred I trust you will attribute it to the head and not to the heart. Whatever may be our relative positions in future I shall always be glad to be considered as belonging to the 45th and shall always feel the same interest in your welfare that I have hitherto done. Trusting that the day is not far distant, when the stars and stripes will wave over every state in our country, and we will be again united with our friends in our distant homes, I have the honor to be sincerely your friend.

The following is the response of the officers of the regiment:

Sir:—It is with mingled feelings of pride, pleasure and regret that we the undersigned, commissioned officers of the 45th Regt. Ill. Vol. Infty. receive the announcement, that the military connection which has so pleasantly existed between yourself and the Lead Mine Regiment is severed. Pride and pleasure that the modest merit which your subordinate officers and men of the regiment, have long known, is appreciated by those in authority, and the gallant, manly, true, officer-like bearing, which led and sustained us on the ever to be historic fields of Donelson and Shiloh have been in part rewarded. Regret that the official and social relations which have existed between us since the first organization of the regiment; relations which your uniform kind, considerate bearing have made tender as family ties, must now cease. We shall watch with interest your future career and when by you glory is won on other fields, its rays must brighter gild the stars on the banner of the 45th. If in the future of this painful struggle for the perpetuity of our union, we shall be under your command, remember no matter how dark or gloomy the hour, at your word, at your need, the Washburne Lead Mine Reg-

fluent will never alter, never fail you.— May your future be happy and glorious, as your past has been generous and just, is the sincere wish of

(The Officers Signing this Letter.)

The expedition failed of success, from causes well known to all of you, and on the 23d day of Dec. we took the back track over the same route we had proceeded by to this point. You remember, the rebel cavalry cut our haversack strings, as we used to say at Holly Springs. You have not forgotten the short rations at the Tallhatchie. How we feasted new year's day, sixty-three on three ears of corn in the ear issued to each man in lieu of rations, which we had marched 31 miles the day before to gather. But it was a matter of necessity, and like good soldiers as you were, you murmured not but parched your corn and eat it. The early part of Jan. found us again at Lagrange, from which we were to make another start to gain the same point.

The preparations for the campaign of 1863, which was destined to be crowned with such grand success was now the order of the day. The months which intervened between this time and the crossing of the Miss. below Grand Gulf, was taken up by that portion of the army of which the 45th formed a part in making easy stages toward that point, and does not contain sufficient special interest to claim our attention except to mention one or two incidents, which happened while on the route. A Tennessee winter in the latitude of Memphis is not the most pleasant time for campaigning, as we all have reason to remember. The snow which fell at Colliersville, almost burying us in our tents, you still remember. The mud and slush which we trudged through from there to Memphis are easily recalled with unpleasant recollections. The embarkation and trip down the Miss. river by steamboat to Lake Providence; the camp on the Sparrow Plantation, on the bank of the Lake, one of the pleasanest if not the most pleas-

ant camp we were in during the war, where Jo. Vincent sang Lorena and "Sutler" Davis entertained the officers with a grand supper; then the camp at "Vista" where we could hear the boom of the cannon at Vicksburg 75 miles away; with nothing to do but play — well, never mind—we led a life of luxurious ease a couple of months or more, almost equal to that of our southern friends before the war. Time rolls on, however, and another stage is made in our journey. Milliken's Bend is our next stopping place, and here occurred one of the most memorable events of the war. Volunteers were called for to run past the rebel batteries at Vicksburg. Do you remember the line being formed as for dress parade and the order from Div. Hd. Qrs. being read? And then the Col. called first for all the officers who were willing to volunteer their service to step four paces to the front. At the command every officer I believe, or nearly all, in the line stepped promptly to the front. And then when the command was given for all enlisted men who were willing to volunteer for this dangerous service to step two paces to the front, none were left. No, when the word was given the entire regiment stepped forward as one man. Here was a predicament. A few only were wanted. All wanted to go. What was to be done? Lots were cast and the lucky fellows who drew the prizes, were envied by all the rest. What a grand spectacle!— There was not a man in the ranks, but knew that the chances for death were ten against one for life, and yet for the glory of victory and the success of our cause there was no danger too great to be dared, or undertaking too vast to be attempted, but there were more volunteers for the service than could be accepted. The detail from the 45th consisted of the following, if my memory serves me right. If I am mistaken I hope some one will correct me: Capt. L. B. Fisk, Co. E. Sergt. A. J. Esping and private Wm. H. H. Sweland, Co. B. Charles Evans, Co. D. A. Snow

J. M. Primmer, Co. F. Charles Flint, Wm. Tripp, Co. G. Joshua Kendall, Co. K. They were assigned to different transports as a portion of the crew, and although the boats on which they were, were badly damaged, none of the detail received any serious hurt. Charly Evans who was at the "wheel" of the Anglo Saxon, Captain Fisk commander, was knocked, wheel and all on to the hurricane deck, but strange as it seems was uninjured beyond the shock of the fall. But of this little band of braves Fisk, Esping and Evans are known to be dead. Of the rest I know nothing.

The march from Milliken's Bend to Bruinsburg was a hard one, over bad roads and in bad weather; but Vicksburg, was somewhere beyond; and to gain that point hardships were freely accepted. The morning of May 1st found us on the east bank of the Miss. again, and this time below Vicksburg. You remember what a beautiful bright morning it was too. At sunrise we were on the march, and at noon we had reached Thomson's Hills 19 miles away.— We had hurried up to help McClelland out of a scrape. It took a couple of hours to decide which way it could be done the best; but when it was finally decided to send our brigade into the canebrake on the left of the line to dislodge those impudent rebels, who thought they had such a good thing of it, didn't we do the thing up most handsomely? It is seldom that a fight and a foot race go together, so they say; but we had both that day, and it would be pretty hard to tell which we enjoyed the most. The rebels out ran us, however, we winning the fight and they the race. You remember how we cheered after the fight; first we cheered for we didn't exactly know why; then we cheered the 124th Regt. this being their first fight, and did so nobly; then we cheered Logan and McPherson; soon Grant came along, and we cheered him by brigade; and behind him on a couple of sorry looking secesh nags rode noble "Dick" Yates and E. B. Washburne. It wasn't our custom to cheer for

civilians as a general thing; but we gave Yates and Washburne three such cheers as they never got before or since, I'll bet a penny. On the 12th we met the enemy again at Raymond, and by a little too much curiosity we came very near being gobbled up. If it hadn't been for the 31st I am thinking we would have paid dear for our fun. But we had lots of fun, didn't we boys? It is true it was not just so funny to Capt. Rouse and Lieut. Dave Reed for they both got nipped with rebel lead, but they got well again in a short time, which made that all right. On the 14th we took another little round with them at Jackson and drove them beyond Pearle River. That wasn't much of a day for fighting either; but a splendid one for rain. But I guess that "bully" 24th South Carolina Regt. thought it was a good day for both, when the 17th Iowa caught their charge on the points of their bayonets and sent them back double quick over the picket fence. The honor of that repulse would have belonged to the 1st Brig. if the Iowa "boys" hadn't asked it as a favor to let them take the advance. I certainly never saw anything more splendidly done, and they deserve the honor. The haughty South Carolinians said that a loud noise would scare the western troops. Give THEM a chance and THEY would show how it was done. They got the chance and didn't scare anybody either. Nobody ever heard any more "blow" out of those fellows after their charge at Jackson. On the 16th we met Pemberton's army at Champion Hills where poor Sergeant Hammond and his brave comrades of the 45th were mustered into the great army in the spirit land, and many others fell wounded to suffer long pain and some of them perhaps to die afterwards. It was sharp quick work that day, and we were soon following the defeated and retreating rebels. The next day we built our own bridge over Black River and pushed on to Vicksburg, reaching the works defending that city with the rest of the army, on the 19th of May. You re-

member it was our intention to go immediately into the city. But you know city life is very demoralizing to soldiers, and we concluded to camp a few miles out for awhile. We didn't like the ground very well for camping permanently, so we made another attempt to move forward on the 22d of May. It was a serious day for many and as much so perhaps to the 45th as to any other regiment in the army. On that day the noble and brave Cowen fell a sacrifice to the holy cause of liberty and an undivided country. Besides we lost many more good fellows killed and wounded in that terrific charge. The 22d of May, 1863 will be a sad day in the minds of all of us, while memory shall last. The loss had been great and nothing gained, but sorrow and disappointment. But it is not expected that a soldier will lose much time, in mourning the loss of comrades and friends,—and it is well that it is so, for if they did, they wouldn't amount to much in war. So the next day and the next, and so on for weeks the bloody siege went on, and the 45th toiled on in their death work, day after day, and night after night, until the afternoon of the 25th of June the work of our hands and only battle assumed proportions that all other events in its history seems like mere boy's play in comparison. The mine under Fort Hill was to be sprung, and the honor of occupying the breach assigned to the 45th. The order was "to occupy the breach, and hold it, cost what it may." A terrible order to be executed by men of such acknowledged bravery and determination as the 45th was composed.—For my part I have always considered the enterprise a mistake,—a fearful costly mistake. Perhaps others with better judgment than myself, could see chances in the prospects of success which I was unable to discover. Perhaps the promised benefits of success may have been equal to the inevitable loss; but I never have been convinced of it. Be that as it may it will not mend the matter to speculate upon it now. The mine was sprung and the glorious old

regiment plunged into the breach regardless of the terrible fire of the enemy, which flashed in their faces like the wind driven rain. The gallant and brave Col. Melancthon Smith, and the young, noble, daring, good hearted Fisk, were the first to fall, the former with a mortal wound, the latter dead upon the spot. Esping, Sines and Brezier, brave fellows, also joined the spirit band soon after. To the killed may be added three commissioned officers, eight sergeants, three corporals, and forty-one privates wounded, as the price at which the honor of leading this charge was bought. Comrades you will pardon me, if I digress for an instant, to claim your attention to a matter, almost entirely personal to myself. When the bullet sped on its mission of death and pierced the brain of Major Fisk it took from me my tried, bosom friend. I loved him as a brother, and in his death I experienced that deep sorrow something akin to that felt, I imagine, by wives, fathers and mothers, brothers and sisters, when the news would come back from the battle field that their beloved ones had been killed. We had a compact between us, that if one should fall and the other live, the living would bury the other among friends if possible. Some of you will remember how persistently I labored until I accomplished my wish and purpose to bring his body home. I succeeded, and now in the Cemetery at Mount Carroll, I have a charge which consists only of a raised mound marked by a shaft of marble; but it is a dear spot and I love to visit it, for it is the resting place of the mortal remains of my friend. And when I go there I cannot help but wish that all the poor boys who sleep in distant graves were buried at home so that their friends could visit them at their last resting places.

But to resume my sketch After the 25th of June the same routine of daily toil as before, went on until the 3d of July when the white flags fluttered on the ramparts of Vicksburg, which had been so successfully defended against us for so long.—

The next day was Independence Day, a day dear to every American citizen already, but another interest was to be added in the surrender of Vicksburg to the victorious army of the west. At 12 o'clock, Logan's division passed the frowning battlements which still looked cross and surly, and marched into the city. At the head of the column was the heroic old 45th bravest of the brave, and her battle flag was the first to float over the Court House in Vicksburg.

In recalling the events and incidents which transpired during the siege of Vicksburg; the suffering, the toil, the trials and inconveniences so indelibly impressed upon our memories, if there are any which brighten those long dreary days of danger and toil, and relieved us in those trying times we can refer to them with especial interest and pleasure. You will remember that one of the chief difficulties to be overcome was the cooking of rations on the front line, on account of the camp fires drawing the enemy's shot with unerring aim, and with fatal effect. To add to the trouble, either from oversight or a lack of knowledge, on the part of the commissary department, as to the proper wants of the army at such a time, flour and fresh beef were issued, when "hard tack" and bacon were above all other things the all important commodities. To the 45th or rather to a single individual in the regiment belongs the honor of solving the question.—"Commissary" Hard our old stand-by and friend of Rockford, was the first to conceive, and carry into practical effect, the idea of a "regimental mess," to be controlled and superintended by one competent cook, assisted by negroes or convalescent soldiers unfit for duty. Commissary Hard obtained permission of the Col. to try the experiment, organized his "black brigade," and undertook the arduous duty of supplying the regiment with cooked rations. His plan was to form a camp for cooking purposes, far enough in the rear to be out of danger, and then draw the rations for

the regiment, cook them, and send them to the front to each company. The experiment proved a perfect success and the plan worked admirably. Hard had solved the question of using flour and fresh beef during the siege, and the boys after that, instead of having flour and fresh beef issued to them, which was next to nothing at all, were provided each day with good bread and coffee and cooked meat. Gen. Logan's attention being called to it, he was so well pleased with the working of the plan that he issued an order directing the adoption throughout the entire division. The "black brigade" was an institution, which in its place did as efficient service in capturing Vicksburg as did the "boys" at their more dangerous duty at the front, and its commander, Hard is entitled to a great deal more credit than will ever be recorded in history, for the part which he took in the siege or the service rendered by his genius and his labor; but the boys of the 45th will never withhold the praise and credit due to the originator of the idea which was to be of so much benefit to them.

The regiment was immediately detailed for provost guard duty in the city, and continued on such duty during the months of July, August, September, and until the 14th of October when it was relieved. The daily routine of guard duty during these months was varied by only one or two incidents of special interest which I will mention. On the 4th day of August, Col. J. A. Maltby was promoted to the rank of Brig. Genl. for meritorious services during the campaign which ended with the surrender of Vicksburg. His separation from the regiment was not attended by any public demonstration or correspondence of which I have any knowledge. The members of the regiment, officers and men tendered their hearty congratulations, and rejoiced that another of their number had been exalted one step higher than their partiality could avail. The regret that the connection between Col. Maltby and his regiment was severed, was expressive and sincere,

for they recognized in him, an efficient commander, a brave man and a true friend.

Another pleasing episode which occurred, at this time, the exact date of which I have lost, was another testimonial of the patriotic sentiments of the noble, true hearted ladies of Galena, and the love they bore the old 45th, in the presentation of another splendid set of regimental colors, to take the place of the old ones, which we had brought from Galena with us, and had been riddled with shot on so many hard fought fields. A letter of acceptance and thanks in appropriate terms was prepared and forwarded to the generous donors, as an expression of our appreciation and gratitude. Boys whatever you do, or wherever you may go, next to your wives, mothers and sisters, cherish forever the memory of the kind hearted and patriotic ladies of Galena. On the 14th of October you will remember you started on the Canton raid, and had a little skirmish with the rebels on the 17th at Boguechitto, where you drove their line six miles. On the 20th you returned to camp at Vicksburg and remained until the 7th of November when you moved to Black River, and went into camp. Black River is impressed upon your minds as strongly perhaps as any other camp, or more so than any other, during your term of service, for several reasons. One reason was that it was a pleasant breathing spell, after long and tedious service. Company and battalion drill was again instituted which had been so long neglected; the duty was light; rations were plenty; the reins of military discipline were not drawn so tight as usual, and altogether it was more like soldiering in time of peace than you had experienced since leaving Illinois. Another event transpired while you were in camp at Black River which I regard as the greatest event of the war. A victory more important had been achieved than the capture of Vicksburg. A great moral victory, the influence of which did more to depress the south and demoralize the con-

federate army than any battle ever fought. It was nothing less than the veteranizing or re-enlisting of almost the entire western army.

The hopes of the rebel cause hung upon the reduction of the Union army by expiration of the terms of enlistment of our soldiers, and the difficulty which they were led to believe we would have in recruiting them. The New York riots, and other public demonstrations by the opposition party in the north had encouraged the hope in secessia that the draft could never be enforced, and that volunteering had "played out." The news then of the veteranizing of the army at that time, was such a shock to the rebels, that they never recovered from its effects. For the campaign of sixty-four the war in the south had "reached every family, every man" in the language of good rebel history. Was it any wonder then that such an unlooked for event as the voluntary re-enlistment of the Union armies, should strike terror into the very heart of the confederacy? The "boys" of the 45th were among the first to re-enlist and every eligible man almost in the regiment went in for another term, determined to see the thing through. The dates of enlistment being in the months of December and January.

Every one of you proved yourselves in the act to be a real hero and a true lover of your country; confirmed an attachment to the old stars and stripes, and a true patriotism which could not be diminished by the hardships of war, or equaled by the love of life or the pleasure of dear homes. Your country wanted your strength and valor, in her defence, and she must have it, at any cost to yourselves. A glorious sacrifice for a glorious cause and worthy the noble men who made it.

The next event of interest was the great Meridian raid upon which you started on the 3d of Feb. I was'nt with you on that trip, but I watched your exploits with deep interest. On the 14th you routed about five times your own number of the "Rebs."

at "Chunky Station," and gave them a hard chase, suffering a loss of three men of Co. F. wounded. After that you had some hard marching, a little skirmishing, a good deal of fun foraging, but not much hard fighting; returning by the way of Canton, and going into your old camp at Black River again on the 4th of March.— On the 17th the regiment left Vicksburg for the North on Veteran furlough, arriving in the city of Freeport on the 25th, which was designated as the place of rendezvous while on furlough, and the place for reassembling. After a month's sojourn among relatives and friends in "God's Country," enjoying the pleasure of home and the genial society of former associates, the scenes at parting, and the kind good bye are repeated, and we are off for the front again, on the 23th of April. At Cairo we join our command, and on the 4th of May, take passage on the steamer up the Ohio and Tenn rivers once more, landing at Clifton on the Tenn. river, where we remain until the 14th. Leaving Clifton we make a rapid and fatiguing march over that mountainous region by the way of Pulaski to Huntsville where we camp beside the big spring and have a general cleaning up. Here the 17th army corps receives a permanent head again in the person of the redoubtable Frank P. Blair, Jr., who was going to do such wonderful things, if the democracy would elect him Vice President last fall. But then Frank was a better soldier than he is a politician, so we have no particular fault to find with him on that score.

After a day's halt at Huntsville we are on the march again after Sherman's army, which we hoped to overtake somewhere this side of the sea. Marching via Decatur, Sand Mountain, Rome and Kingston, we arrive at Etowah Bridge, on the 7th of June, having marched 292 miles since leaving Clifton. Sherman was then at Kenesaw and we were in high glee at the prospects of being re-united with the army's son. But we were doomed to disappoint-

ment. The 45th was detailed for the tedious and insipid duty of guarding Railroads in the rear of the army, and stationed at Etowah Bridge. We were not insensible of the fact, that the most reliable, and trusty troops in any army are selected for this kind of duty; but we couldn't exactly see it in that light. It was a compliment no doubt, but there wasn't enough glory in it. We accepted the situation however like good soldiers, and settled down to our little guard duty, apple dumplings and blackberry pies. While at Etowah we lost two men killed, while patrolling the railroad, and one man drowned in the river while bathing. You remember the celebration of the 4th of July at this place, the address being made by Col. Rogers of the 15th. Poor George! Who would have thought that he would be back in the ranks of democracy now, after delivering such a good republican speech as he did on that day. On the 13th of July we were relieved at Etowah, and went first to Kenesaw, and then on to Roswell Bridge. Then back to Marietta on the 17th of August and tried our hand at provost guard duty again at that point. Here the lamented Lieut. Trimble of Co. "I" died and was buried. The only officer in the 45th who was escorted to his grave by a detail from his own regiment. The regiment was relieved at Marietta, and ordered on duty at Ackworth on the 14th of Oct. still guarding railroads. On the 9th you changed camp, moving south of Marietta, where you remained a few days and then moved on to Atlanta. At this point I left you, and it was the last time I saw the 45th as a regiment. I have always been sorry that my connection with the regiment closed when it did. But fearful that I could not endure the fatigues of the long march to the sea, in the state of health I found myself at that time, I deemed it but just, that I should leave the service, and give place and emoluments to those upon whom the duty would devolve in my absence. I shall always regret that I did not attempt the "March to

the sea" regardless of consequences. As I shall not be able to draw from memory from this time on, you must excuse the meagre and imperfect account of the remainder of your history.

The march through Georgia to the sea by Sherman's army is world renowned and the 45th shares in the honor. You that are present will live over again to-day whatever there is in the history of that long journey, amusing yourselves in a hundred laughable incidents, and recalling many more which were anything but pleasant at the time. When Savannah fell into your hands no doubt you were glad.— But your stay was short, and on the 4th of Jan., sixty five, you took the steamer for Beaufort, S. C. At Pocotaligo you engaged the enemy on the "sacred soil" (?) of South Carolina. Skirmished heavily all day on the 14th, driving the "Johnnies" before you all the time, and after a severe engagement, captured the Fort on the morning of the 15th. Here you suffered a loss of 8 men wounded. Leaving Pocotaligo on the 30th you marched in a northerly direction through Orangeburg, Columbia, Ridgeway and Winsboro to Sugar Loaf Mountain, where you encamped on the 28th of Feb. having marched a distance of over 300 miles in less than a month.

March the 3d you are on the march again, passing through Cheraw and on to Bennettsville and Mill Creek, where you had another brush with the "gray backs" on the 21st, and then on again to Goldsboro where you arrived on the 24th. At Goldsboro you remained long enough to draw clothing, and such other little necessaries as you wanted, not caring anything about rations, for you were boarding yourselves then, and on the 10th of April you are off again to Raleigh and then on to Greensboro and back again to Raleigh, or near there, which is to be the end of your long journey. The news of Lee's surrender had reached you and you knew that the end was not far off. Then Johnston surrendered and your work was done. You had

marched and fought in the grandest campaign in the world's history, and now it had closed. I cannot describe your joyful feelings. I can scarcely imagine what they were, when the unmistakable news, the glad tidings was received that the war was over, and the greatest, the wickedest and most unholly rebellion, ever inaugurated and against the best government, ever established on the face of the earth was crushed. Then on the first of May you take up your line of march in the direction of Washington via Richmond and Petersburg, and I am told that this was the hardest march of all. A kind of foot race between the 17th and 15th army corps.— You who were there can tell more about it than I can; but my opinion is that it would make a lively race. At the grand review in Washington, on the 24th of May you muster your little band and proudly march past the grand stand under the eye of President, General, Sec. of War, &c., conscious that if yours has been a more humble duty it has been no less faithfully discharged than theirs. The last stage of the journey is reached. The journey by rail from Washington to Louisville is accomplished, and you go into camp for the last time. Anxiously almost impatiently you await the order for the final muster out. You are citizens from choice, not soldiers, and when your duty is done you are anxious to resume the character of a citizen, and settle down in your peaceful homes, and enter again the pursuits of civil life. July 12th, 1865, the 45th was mustered out of service having served four years lacking about a month. If it was necessary I would allude to the "last night in camp," and the midnight assault upon the sutler shop, led by that prince of good fellows, our old friend A. H. Davis, which I hope none have forgotten, but I have not time.

I have detained you much longer already than I intended, and yet I have passed over many important facts and scenes connected with your history. The pen of the impar-

tial historian must write for the 45th a brilliant record. Upon her banners the words "victory" and "liberty" is written in letters of gold, and the fame of her brave "boys" is a by-word in the annals of the nation's history, during the late rebellion.

But comrades while we have met here to-day to rejoice in the society of each other, to recall happy associations, and to live over again the story of the past, we have another duty to perform. Let us not forget our dead comrades who lie scattered all over this broad land; some are sleeping beneath the green sod in our own land; others lie by the banks of the Ohio, the Tennessee and Cumberland, on the bloody fields of Donelson and Shiloh, on the hill sides at Vicksburg, beneath the quiet shades of Chaupion Hill and down through the deep valleys of Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi. Some lie in unknown graves, scooped out by unfriendly hands, there to wait the resurrection morn. Let us cherish their memories and drop the tear of love upon their graves wherever they may be, and if you will listen while I call the roll of honor of the departed heroes of the 45th, you may have your memories refreshed even upon a subject, that would crimson your cheek with shame if you thought you had neglected it. So soon do we forget the past, though, and the faces and forms of those who mingle with it, that I am satisfied there are not a few names in this list, which has not passed unconsciously from your memory.

The history of the 45th full and complete shall embrace the history of the entire Army of the West substantially. From Cairo to Vicksburg and from Vicksburg to your camp at Raleigh, N. C., and finally the "last camp" of all at Louisville, Ky., conspicuous upon every battle field, in the camp and on the march, the banners of the 45th waved defiance to the rebel host.—The history of the great victorious army of the West is yours, and when that history is written the part taken by you in the war will be fully recorded. A brilliant record it will be; an heir-loom of honor to be handed down from generation to generation, with pride and satisfaction. Let us then cherish the sacred memories of our soldier-life, let us not forget the terrible price, at which we bought the victory, or that the purchase money was the life blood of our brothers slain. Let us never forget them, nor the sacrifice they made, that we might enjoy the blessings of peace, and an undivided country.

We have organized the "45th Ill. fifty.

Association," for the purpose of keeping the memories of the past and have agreed to meet once in each year and mingle with each other that we may the better fulfill the object of our society. It is for that purpose we have met here to-day, at this our "Second Annual Re-Union," and how pleasant and profitable it has been to all of us. At this re-union to day we have lived over again, all those long years of battle. We have grasped the friendly hand of comrades and friends and recounted to one another the incidents of those trying times. I am not a believer in the doctrine, that all these things should now be forgotten. I believe it is a duty we owe to our country; to the memories of our comrades gone; to the weeping widows, and the fatherless children they have left; to the gray haired father and mother, whose declining years have been shortened, and who went down into the grave weeping bitterly for their dear sons who were at once the pride and support of their old age, that these things should be remembered. It is a duty we owe to ourselves as citizens, that we should remember our soldier life, and the cause which called us to arms. Let us meet together once in each year, as many as can, and enjoy a good time, as we have to day. As the years roll on, and at each recurring re-union more or less names are dropped from our "muster roll" of surviving members, who can tell, which one of our members will be the last, to answer roll call on earth. The most of us yet are comparatively young. But forty years from now the youngest of us will be old. Naturally the oldest will be gathered to his Fathers first. And ten years from this many will be gone. If commissary Hard, who has served us with our rations so often, is here at the end of that time, he will have lived the whole number of years allotted to man. It is not likely then that he will meet with us twenty years hence.—One by one, we will be dropped from the rolls, until the last surviving member of the old regiment, will bid adieu to all things earthly, and pass over the dark river into the peaceful land. There we shall hold one grand re-union beyond the skies, where our comrades slain at Donelson, Shiloh and Vicksburg, and all the rest, who have gone before, are now waiting to greet us. Our re union here lasts but a day, and then we part, again, perhaps for the last time on earth. But up yonder, our re-union will never break up, and there will be no more parting, no more sorrow, no more war, nor no more strife. There we shall have Peace! Union! and harmony forever.

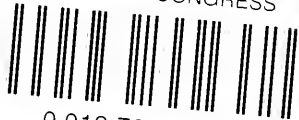
