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

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PREFACE TO ATLAS.

PURSUANT to the request of the late Major-General George H. Thomas, the accompanying maps, illustrating the operations of the Army of the Cumberland during the War of the Rebellion, have been compiled. Many of them were examined and approved by him before his death, and much of their value is due to his suggestions, and to information furnished by him.

At his request, permission was granted me, by the Chief of Engineers United States Army, to consult and use all official data in the Topographical Engineer Office at headquarters Department of the Cumberland, deemed essential in the compilation of the maps. Permission was also granted me by General Thomas to freely consult all official reports, orders, letters, and telegrams pertaining to the operations of the Army of the Cumberland; also, to consult his private military journal. Circular letters, approved by him, were addressed to the corps, district, division, brigade, and to many of the regimental and post commanders, soliciting full information as to the operations of their respective commands.

The Topographical Engineer Staff of the Army of the Cumberland was organized under Captain N. Michler, United States Engineers, and subsequently brought to a high state of usefulness under Colonel W. E. Merrill, United States Engineers. It was the custom to assign to each brigade an acting engineer officer, with instructions to survey the lines of marches traversed, and the lines of works erected by the brigade, as well as its position on the fields of battle, and when possible,

the lines of works and position in its front held by t federate forces. The data thus obtained by the brig gineers was transmitted to the division engineers, c and transmitted by them to the corps engineers, and by them to the Chief Engineer of the Army of th At many of the posts, acting engineer were also stationed, who surveyed and mapped the country. At the close of the war, nearly all of the compiled and data gathered by the Confederate engir cers were secured. Immediately subsequent to the the war, in compliance with the orders of the Chief gineers of the United States Army, I caused to b under my supervision, surveys of all of the lines o erected by the United States and Confederate force the Atlanta campaign, as well as of some of the batt which had been but imperfectly surveyed on accounhurried events of the war. 


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
- 1. Map of the Operations of the Armies of the Cumberland and Ohio, while commanded respectively by Generals Anderson, Sherman, and Buell.





FROM COL.GEO.THOM'S MAP. Scale One Inch to 4800 Feet.

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

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
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






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
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Positions of May Gent. Grants Forces and the Divisions of
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






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
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
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
