## Historical.

Col. H. SAVAGE, Chief Aid to GEN. JOHN SUTHERLAND, Major-General, has been by the citizens of the city of San Francisco to provide and in a fitting manner arrange for the celebration of the Anniversary of Independence, in his address, dated June 17th 1875, and invoking their aid and co-operation, said: "The occasion of the Ninety-Ninth Anniversary of the Declaration of Independence is the signal to invoke good citizens to make the arrangements for a fitting celebration of the

ANNIVERSARY OF INDEPENDENCE.

It is a national bias, looking only to the glorious past, and to the prosperous future stretching far and wide by the Western sea, send back a loyal and patriotic fervor over the birthplace of National Freedom and American Freedom, draws to its glorious close the struggle for existence have not shattered the noble principles of government, cemented as it is by the blood of our fathers. Looking backward to the early vicissitudes of our existence, the American citizen sees in the light of the Revolution, the grandest model of duty and sacrifice fittingly honor the day, the men, the deed. The Declaration of Independence gave hope to suffering millions and has given happiness to a vast nation, in world's history surpassing the most sanguine hopes of the man who gave his life for a spot, who died that we might live. Let us honor the freedom so dearly purchased by our fathers, and let all citizens forget any dividing line to the one proud name, "Americans."

The success of Col. Savage's appeal was the forerunner in the procession of a platoon of volunteers, which was commanded by Capt. F. C. M. WOOD, who subsequently became a member of the California Historical Society and of the Revolutionary Sites.

On the 17th of June, 1875, said of Capt. F. C. M.

meant. How could we be so ignorant as they are, to forget the noble and heroic deeds of the men who have so bravely sacrificed their lives for the celebration of this day of our enlightenment? And further says: "The battle-flags and heroes of the Revolution, the banners of the revolution which have been suspended across the streets, were here generally admired."

The call issued by Col. Savage took root about this period a few patriotic and enterprising San Francisco descendants of the early colonists of America, were quietly moving, coloring to the notice of their nation, that from blood and birth, the duty of honoring the American nation, and of honoring the soldiers who have so bravely sacrificed their lives for the preservation of our liberties and obligations of America.

Seriously led the authors of the celebration of Day fled away, when the sentiments assumed form and expression. A fine Friday evening, October 22nd 1870, came a group of soldiers, sailors, and patriots of the Republic called at the office of Dr. James F. Kennedy, Street San Francisco. Among the group were Major Edwin A. Stearns, Dr. Sawyer, General for Nevada, Dr. C. R. Riddle, Rush R. Riddle, Joseph W. Wood, Willard and others, "who when assembled together, deliberated upon the proper and rational means of celebrating preliminary steps for the celebration of the anniversary of the day."

at the same meeting, Dr. P. W. Ruddle was elected Moderator. Dr. Ruddle was born at Sparta, Georgia, November 10, 1790. His father was Captain Josias Ruddle of the Revolutionary War. For a time served as Aide de Camp to George Washington. With his father he removed to Illinois where he received his education at Transylvania University. He served with Abraham Lincoln in the West and was a Surgeon in the Mexican War and also in the Rebellion. On December 19th, 1849, he sailed for San Francisco in the ship *Albatross*, and in the following year he was connected with the U. S. Mint at San Francisco. He died, January 13th, 1881. His remains were buried in the mother earth by George H. Thomas of the Grand Army of which he was a member, in accordance with the wishes of the Grand Army of the Republic. This organization thus initiated, known as the Grand Army of Revolutionary Soldiers, was held well in our City on the 26th day of June, 1876. By word of mouth a number of descendants of Revolutionary Soldiers conveyed at the office of Dr. J. C. McLaughlin, the invitation to connect themselves with the Society of Patriots, organized on the previous 22nd day of June, 1876, to participate in the Centennial Anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, the celebration of the day having been organized by a General Committee of leading citizens of the city. At the request of the assembled Revolutionary Soldiers, the Grand Marshal issued the following

On the issuance of the above invitation, the *San Francisco Daily Call* column, called attention of the community at large to the approaching anniversary of our independence.

The Revolutionary patriots in this city are requested to assemble at the office of the Grand Marshal, No. 212, Kearny Street, on Saturday evening, July 1st, 1876, for the purpose of making arrangements for the Centennial Celebration.

In answer to the invitation, they met with a hearty response, there being present a large number of distinguished citizens of the State of California, and the following Revolutionary Soldiers, who were appointed for the purpose of preparing a list of names to be published in the following advertisement at the Palace Hotel Saturday evening July 1st, 1876.

At the adjourned meeting the 26th of July 1875 it was considered in by almost three hundred members who were present, and the nucleus for a promising parade on Independence the glorious day arrived there were no names enrolled, eight of whom were actual *Soldier Soldiers*; but at the present writing one

The parade attracted a great deal of attention, march starting from the Palace Hotel at 9 o'clock going through the principal streets, every eye being attracted which would naturally follow, whose soldiers bore aloft the *Yankee Doodle* the glorious stars and stripes the symbol of our independence. ## THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY

### OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

On the 11th of the Month of May, 1875, the Board of Managers of the California Society of the American Revolution, at its 117th Anniversary, held at the City of Boston, East President V. S. HENRY, adopted the following Preamble and Resolution which was adopted by a

**SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION**, organized October 22nd, 1875. The first body in membership organization of the Sons of the descendants of Revolutionary patriot soldiers, sailors, and the crew of the American vessels, who were instrumental in the United States' Independence.

A copy of this preamble and resolution be transmitted to the officers of the National and State Societies of the American Revolution; to all past and present officers of the several Subordinate Chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution; to the officers of the General and State Societies of the American Revolution; to the officers of the General and State Societies of the Revolution; to the Diplomatic Representatives of the United States residing in foreign countries; Order of the American Historical Association and State Historical Societies, to the Commandery in Chief and Chapters of the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States; Military and Naval Institutions; General "A. 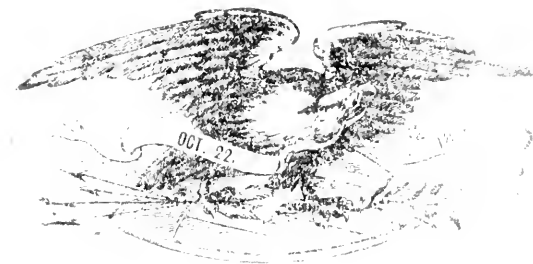

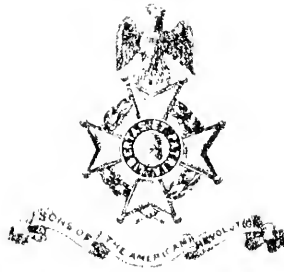
## California Society of the Sons of the American Revolution



### PREAMBLE.

THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION—Instituted October 22nd 1850, for the promotion, institution and organization of the descendants of Revolutionary patriots and the preservation of the memory of *all* those who took part in the American Revolution and maintained the Independence of the United States of America. It was fully and completely organized on the 4th of July, 1876 under the name of "Sons of the American Revolution." On the 30th of April, 1880, it was organized on equal Societies of different States, territories and possessions under the name of "THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION," in which form it has since been organized, co-operated and elevated. It is the purpose of the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution to:

1. Preserve the memory of the American Revolution.
2. Promote the education of the youth of the United States.
3. Encourage the study of the history of the United States.
4. Promote the interests of the United States.
5. Encourage the study of the Constitution of the United States.
6. Promote the interests of the United States.

## CONSTITUTION.

### ARTICLE I.

#### NAME.

The name of this Society is "THE CALIFORNIA  
SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION."

### ARTICLE II.

#### OBJECTS.

The objects of this Society shall be to unite  
the Fellowship among the descendants, and perpetuate  
the memory of the men who, by their services or sacri-

fice, won the American Revolution, achieved  
the independence of the American people; to inspire among  
the youth of the Society and the community at large a  
loyalty and reverence for the principles of the government  
of our fathers; to encourage historical research;

to preserve the memory of the American Revolution; to acquire and  
maintain records of the individual services of Revolu-  
tionary soldiers and documents, relics and landmarks  
of the War; to mark the scenes of the Rev-

ation by appropriate memorial to celebrate the anniversary of the prominent events of the War of Independence and the institutions of American freedom. He shall execute all the injunctions of Washington in his favor to the American people.

## ARTICLE III

### MEMBERSHIP.

SECTION 1. Any man shall be eligible to join this Society who being of the age of 21 years, a citizen of good repute in the community, is the descendant of an ancestor who while at all times and in all loyalties rendered actual service in the cause of independence either as an officer, soldier, sailor, militiaman or minute man, in the armed forces of the Continental Congress or of any one of the several States, or as a Signer of the Declaration of Independence, or as a member of a Committee of Safety or of any one of the Congresses or Legislatures, or as a civil officer of any one of the Colonies or States or of the national government, or as a recognized patriot who performed actual service in the cause of freedom against the British yoke.

## ARTICLE IV

### OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, a Senior Vice President, a Junior Vice President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Registrar, a Marshal and a Board of Managers consisting of the above mentioned officers and such other members who shall be elected by a vote of the majority of the members present at the annual meeting of the Society and who shall hold office for one year or until their successors shall be elected.

SEC. 2. Delegates and alternates to the General and National Society shall be elected at the annual meeting

## ARTICLE V.

### MEETINGS.

11. The regular meetings of the Society shall be held on the 22nd day of February, the anniversary of the birth of George Washington; on the nineteenth of August, the anniversary of the Battle of Lexington; on the fourth of July, the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence; on the 3rd of September, the anniversary of the Treaty of Peace with Great Britain; and on the 19th of October, the anniversary of the surrender of Yorktown. Whenever either of these dates shall fall on Sunday, in which case the meeting shall be held on the following day.

12. The meeting of the 22nd of February shall be the annual meeting.

13. Special meetings may be called by the President or the managers at any time.

14. The President shall call a special meeting when requested in writing so to do by five or more members of the Society. Business may be transacted at any special meeting.

## ARTICLE VI.

### AMENDMENTS.

15. Amendments to this Constitution may be proposed at any meeting of the Society, but shall not be acted on at the same meeting.

16. A copy of every proposed amendment shall be sent to each member, with a notice of the meeting at which proposed to be acted on, at least one week prior to said meeting.

17. A vote of two thirds of those present shall be required for the adoption of any amendment.

## BY-LAWS.

**SECTION 1.** All application for membership in any Society shall be made in duplicate, on blank forms furnished by the National Society; and each application shall be accompanied by five Dollars (\$5.00), being the membership fee and the dues for the current Society year when the application is presented, which shall be returned to the applicant is not accepted.

**SEC. 2.** No application for membership shall be accepted when the applicant does not clearly establish descent direct or descendent from an ancestor who participated in the American Independence, as required by Article III of the Constitution.

**SEC. 3.** Application for membership shall be reviewed by the Secretary, submitted to the Registrar, and shall be reported by the latter to the Board of Directors for action. When approved by said Board, the applicant shall become a member of the Society. On approval the application shall be retained by the Registrar for registration, and the duplicate forwarded to the Registrar of the National Society.

**SEC. 4.** 1. The membership fee shall be five dollars and the yearly dues shall be three dollars. The payment of three dollars by a member at any one time, or the payment of annual dues for thirty consecutive years, shall entitle the person paying such sum a life member, and thereafter be exempt from the payment of dues.

2. Annual dues shall be paid to the Registrar before the 22nd day of February, and the payment of dues for two consecutive years shall entitle the member to the privilege of

3. And in no cases, the Board of Managers may by vote suspend or suspend annual dues of a delinquent member.

4. Members dropped for non payment of dues may be restored to full membership by payment of such sums as may be due at the time of the termination of membership provided there are no charges unbecoming a gentleman or anything against him remaining undetermined or determined adversely against him.

5. Successors of those who actually participated in the war of the Revolution, and thereby assisted in establishing the United Independence, as referred to in Article III of the Constitution may be admitted to full membership in this Society without payment of membership fee or yearly dues, but they shall be supplied with all the other requirements of the Society belonging to a later generation.

6. Honorary membership may be conferred upon former and Ex Governors of the State of California, distinguished individuals for services rendered in the United Navy of the United States, or for contributions to the Society; who shall not be subject to dues or entitled to hold office, but may take part in debate and be eligible to the honors of re-unions and celebrations, provided they are eligible to membership in the Society.

7. The President, or in his absence the Senior Vice-President, or in his absence the Junior Vice-President, or in the absence a Chairman pro-tempore, shall preside at all meetings of the Society, and of the Board of Managers. He shall be a strict observance of the Constitution and By-Laws and perform such other duties as custom and parliamentary usage may require.

8. The Secretary shall receive all monies from the members and pay them over to the Treasurer, taking his receipt for the same. He shall conduct the general correspondence of the Society, shall have charge of the Seal, Charter of Incorporation, By-Laws and Records and, together with the presiding officer, shall certify all acts of the Society.

9. The Board shall keep fair and accurate records of all pro-

meetings and orders of the Society, and shall keep a true account of the several officers of all votes, orders, resolutions, proceedings affecting them or appertaining to their respective offices.

3. He shall notify all members of their duties, and shall, under the direction of the President, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Society, and attend the same.

4. He shall keep a true account of his receipts and payments, and of the accounts of the members with the Society, and at each annual meeting shall report the same, and at the same time a Committee shall be appointed to audit his account.

Sec. 9. The Treasurer shall receive from the Secretary all moneys belonging to the Society, giving his receipt for the same; these funds shall be deposited in a bank or Savings Institution in the city of San Francisco, to the credit of "The California Society of the Sons of the American Revolution," and shall be drawn thence on the order of the Treasurer for the use of the Society only, as directed by the Board of Managers, and the Secretary, and the Treasurer shall keep a true account of his receipts and payments, and at each annual meeting shall report the same, and at the same time a Committee shall be appointed to audit his account.

Sec. 10. 1. The Registrar shall keep a roll of members, and in his hands shall be lodged all proofs of ancestry, quantification, and the historical and genealogical data, manuscript or otherwise, of which the Society may be the possessor; and under the direction of the Board of Managers shall keep copies of such similar documents as may be obtained, if they can be willing to leave permanently in the keeping of the Society. He shall receive all applications for membership, and proofs of membership presented to the Secretary, shall carefully scrutinize such applications, and the Revolutionary services of ancestors, if any, may be made in the applications, and shall report the findings in each case to the Board of Managers.

2. The Registrar shall, if possible, be a member associated with the California Historical Society.



10. The Board of Managers shall consist of the following Officers: the President, Senior and Junior Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Marshal, and such other members, elected as provided by the Charter.

11. The Board shall judge of the qualifications of the candidates for Officers of the Society, and elect the same, two negative votes being sufficient to reject the applicant.

12. The Board shall recommend plans for promoting the objects of the Society, shall compile and prepare business, and shall supervise the disbursement and expenditure of unappropriated moneys in the treasury for the payment of current expenses of the Society. They shall generally superintend the management of the Society, and perform all such duties as may be assigned to them by the Society.

13. The Board have power to fill any vacancy occurring or occurring hereafter in the Society, and an officer so appointed shall act until the next annual election, or until his successor is elected.

14. At the annual meeting of the Society the Board shall report on their management.

15. The meetings of the Board of Managers, five or more members being present, shall be for the transaction of business.

16. The Seal of this Society shall be the same as that of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, organized April 30, 1889, with the addition of the words "California Society, S. A. R., organized \_\_\_\_\_, 18\_\_."

17. No alteration or amendment of the By-Laws shall be made unless openly proposed at a meeting of the Society, and entered in the minutes with the name of the member proposing the same, and shall be adopted by a majority of the members present at a meeting of the Society.
