THE AUTHOR'S APOLOGY.

The grandparents of the compiler of this book died when their children were quite young, and the consequence was they grew up with little knowledge or care for their ancestors; and so it was in my father's family that little was known of our origin or relations beyond those of our immediate neighborhood, where there was quite a settlement of Allens, all related and all friendly. When this work was begun at 67 years of age, the most we knew of family history was that three brothers, Samuel, Amos and Cornelius, came from Woodbridge before the Revolutionary War, and settled in that part of ancient Woodbury called North Purchase (later Camel Hill), which in the division into towns became parts of Washington and Bethlehem; Cornelius about three miles from the others, was on the Washington side, while Samuel and Amos, neighbors, were on the Bethlehem side.

The inception of this compilation was on this wise. About six years ago I was introduced to a lady of near my age, who was very pleasant and interesting. I soon learned she was a granddaughter of Cornelius, and as I was a grandson of Amos, we were second cousins, and had never lived ten miles apart, and yet personally unknown to each other. I said this is a shame that our families have known so little of each other, and if you will help in your family we will have a family record of those three brothers. She readily assented and within a year or so we had it fairly well completed. In the meantime we learned there were other brothers and sisters in the family, and becoming interested to know more and all that could be learned of them, I went about it in earnest, with the result of the present volume. This, however, has not been attained without a great searching of records and an extensive correspondence of several years' duration, but it was taken up voluntarily and persistently followed at my individual expense without expectation of pecuniary reward for collecting the facts. I have found quite a number who have been desirous for a genealogical record of the Allings, who have encouraged and aided me, but a great part of the name have been indifferent to

it, while some have given their families with reluctance, and a very few have respectfully refused. Every caution possible has been used to secure accuracy, but in a work of this kind, with so many names and dates, it would be hardly human to find no clerical or typographical mistakes.

While the records of New Haven and several other towns have furnished the foundation for this work, I am greatly indebted to other sources for its completion. Amos H. Alling of Derby (now deceased), William R. Alling of Newark, N. J., James Allen of Saybrook, Conn., Mrs. William Alling of Rochester, N. Y., Rev. George Lansing Taylor and Mrs. Robert Dickerman of Hamden, Miss E. S. Tomlinson of Waterbury, have all been reliable and willing helpers, while many others have freely assisted in obtaining records of their relatives; for all which I would here express my grateful thanks.

This work is far from being complete, but my age (73), and the consciousness that my physical and mental powers are fast slipping away, are admonitions that my part must soon be ended; and to save to posterity what the search of years has gathered, I now and here present my contribution—imperfect as it is—to the general genealogical wealth of this country that is fast accumulating among the descendants of the Colonial Ancestry.

ARRANGEMENT.

The index figures at the right of names show the generation from Roger, 1st, or John, Sen., their emigrant ancestor; and the figures at the left are the lineal numbers in their branch, from the same ancestor; the lower figures, if any, refer to the page where the same name and number may be found with further records.

To trace out ancestry.—Find the name in this book by the index, look above the name for the parentage, then by their lineal and page numbers find the grandparents, and in the same manner continue following back until the emigrant ancestor is reached.

INTRODUCTORY.

The origin of the Allens is lost in the impenetrable mists of the unrecorded ages. The name is very ancient, and is supposed by some to be of Saxon origin, and to have been originally written Alwyne—signifying “beloved of all.” It is a very common name in England, frequently appearing in history, and almost invariably spelled Allen. John, William, Thomas and Edward seem to be favorite christian names; for the early Allens were Christians, and many of them eminently religious, and mostly were non-conformists in later times. William Allen of Walsingham, Eng., was among the first of Protestant martyrs in 1555. Rev. John Allen, an English Puritan, had to flee from home in 1596, and settled in Massachusetts in 1639. Rev. Thomas Allen refused to conform, and was silenced in the English Church and fled to Massachusetts about the same time. Cromwell speaks in high terms of his Adj.-Gen’l Allen as a most reliable and earnest religious man, and in the records of the persecuted Puritans there are many Allens among them. Many of our English Allen cousins were men of much executive ability. As early as 1413, under the reign of King Henry V, we find Thomas Allen was High Sheriff of London, and all the way along the succeeding ages the High Sheriff, Lord Mayor, and other important offices were often filled by Allens. So we need not feel ashamed of our ancestral name.

While the origin of the name Alling—which is, perhaps, even more ancient than Allen—cannot be demonstrated, it seems probable it came from the Æthelings or Athelings—contracted Allings—a dark brunette race of the Angles, who came with the Saxons from Germany to Britain in the sixth century; they drove out the Scots and took possession of the country, giving it the name Angle-land (England), and by

their intermixture we have the Anglo-Saxon race Alling is the name of a very ancient town in Denmark, which indicates the origin of the name as German or Danish, while the ancient places, Allington, Allingham and Allingford, in England, render it probable that at one time this was not an uncommon name there, but it seems to have almost, if not entirely, disappeared in later times, while Allen has superseded it. Burke's Encyclopedia of Heraldry gives forty different crests for "Allen," four for "Allyn," and one for "Allin," but none for "Alling," indicating its rarity in comparatively modern times. The word Ætheling means "a person of royal blood," and the Athelings or Allings were a hereditary aristocracy, a thoroughbred brunette race, unlike the other Angles and Saxons, who were "a light haired, fair complexioned people." These Allings located in the north of England, and were converted to Christianity by the Culdee Missionaries, while the other Angles and Saxons in the south and west were still heathen barbarians. This opened the way for the great success of St. Austin and his band of Roman missionaries, who came to England in the latter part of the sixth century. As the Allings were the first of the Anglo-Saxon converts, so the Allings and the Allens were among the leading Christians of England in early as well as modern times.

It is said that Roger and many of his earlier descendants were of quite dark complexion, evidences of it still appearing in some branches of his offspring, and that it is not improbable he descended from the Allings (Athelings), and though his father and relatives spelled their name Allen, yet Roger and John, Sen., with their children, changed the form to Alling, perhaps to restore this ancient name and perpetuate the identity of their line; there is a tradition that they changed the spelling to distinguish themselves from the Milford Allens founded by Henry and Gideon Allen, who are credited with being loyal to the English Church, while the New Haven Allings were uncompromisingly hostile, and might

have desired to avoid all suspicions of consanguinity by a uniform name, hence the change to Alling. I have also found another tradition, that when Roger was in England after his father's death, he studied up his ancestral line and found an ancient spelling of the name to have been Alling, and for that reason changed it. The compiler has been told there is a record that "Roger Allen applied to the court and had his name changed to Alling," but as the entry has escaped my notice, I cannot vouch for its truth, but, be that as it may, for the first quarter century of the New Haven colony, Roger and John, Sen., answered to the name of Allen, but after about 1660 Alling is gradually introduced into the records, until, at the close of the seventeenth century, Alling had become the universal orthography of the descendants of Roger and John, Sen. This spelling continued for a full century, when some of the branches reverted to the form of their original grandfather, James Allen, the father of Roger, with whom our history begins.

I will here add, that I have been told I ought to change the spelling of my name to Alling, and that no other way is proper for a descendant of Roger Alling. While conceding a right to every son of Roger or John, Sen., to so spell their names if they wish, I still claim we have a better right to Allen, the way James Allen of England—the father of Roger—spelled his name, unless a good reason for the change by Roger can be given, or it can be proved we are the descendants of the Æthelings (Allings) who were with the German invaders and conquerors of Britain in the sixth century.

THE NEW HAVEN ALLENS (ALLINGS).

It is claimed there were some forty different Allens who early emigrated to various parts of this country and founded separate lines, variously spelling the name Allen, Allyn, Allin, Allan, etc., but Roger and John, Sen., who settled in New Haven, only spelled Alling, and they are thought to be the progenitors of all in the United States who thus spell the name, as well as many who have restored the more approved English form—Allen. It is proposed in this work to take up only the New Haven Allings (Allens) and their descendants, and to follow the spelling of the name as used by each individual. Roger and John, Sen., were cotemporaries and the founders of the New Haven Allings. Roger seems to have preceded John by about ten years; they were acquaintances and friends and named their children so nearly alike, there can hardly be a doubt they were relatives, and tradition makes them cousins, though we find no recorded evidence of relationship, but since Roger was first on the ground, we shall give him the first place in this history, to which he is entitled. What we know of his ancestry is all contained in his father's will, which is given in full as follows:

“In the name of God, Amen.

I James Allen, blacksmith, of Kempston in the county of Bedford, beinge of good and perfect memory at this present (praised be God therefore) doe make this my last will and Testament in manner and forme followinge. And first of all I bequeath my Soule into the handes of Almightye God, my Creator and Redeemer. And for my bodie I Comitt it to the earth willinge that it be decently buried in a Christianlike manner and way. And as concerninge my worldlie goods which God hath bestowed upon me, I doe give them and bequeath them as followeth, first I give and bequeath unto my Sonne Roger Allen nowe liveinge in Newe England the full Sume of thirtye poundes, And to his children Tenne poundes to be equally divided amongst them within sixe moneths after my decease. Item—I give and bequeath unto my daughter Joane the nowe wife of Abram Dowlittle live-

inge nowe alsoe in newe England the full sume of Tenne poundes. And to her children Tenne poundes to be equally divided amongst them within sixe moneths after my decease.

Item—I doe give unto my Sonne William Twelve pence, And to his daughter Elizabeth I give tenne Shillinges to be paid to her at sixteen yeares of age. Item—I give and bequeath unto Martha Parkes my daughter ffive poundes. And to each of her sonnes, Mathew and John Twenty Shillinges a peece to be paid (both hers and theirs) within six moneths after my decease. Item—I give more unto Martha my daughter one Saffe Cupbord, one mattresse one paire of sheetes one greene chayer one greene stoole one barrell. Item—I give more unto Martha my daughter one feather bedd and one feather bolster. In case my daughter Joane comes not to demand the same within twoe yeares. If she doth then I will both the feather bedd and feather bolster shal be hers. Item—I give unto Richard Parkes husband unto Martha Parkes half a Crowne. Item—I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Warrens children, Mary Warren, Rebecca Warren and Margaret Warren and James Warren, three poundes a peece, To be paid unto them and either of them (shall they live) at the age of sixteen yeares, And to her other fower sonnes William Warren, John Warren, Thomas Warren, and Henry Warren, I give and bequeath forty shillinges a peece, those of them who shall be at my death of sixteene yeares of age, to receive the same sixe moneths after my decease. The rest to receive the same when they shall come to the age of sixteene yeares.

Item—I give and bequeath unto my sonne John Allen that messuage or Tenement house and outhouses with the Close thereunto adjoyninge scituate and lyeing in Kempston wood end. And alsoe one Close more, called by the name of Nyne Leyes, with the appurtenances thereunto belonginge whatsoever unto him, the said John Allen To have and to hold to him and to his heirs forever.

Item—All my other goods and chattells whatsoever unbecathed I give and bequeath unto my said sonne John Allen, whom I make my whole and sole Execentor of this my last will and Testament. Item—I nominate and appoint my two trusty and well beloved friends John Ampps of Kempstone and William Ridgeley of Newport Pagnnell Overseers

of this my last will and Testament And I doe give and bequeath unto them Twelve pence a peece. In Witness whereof I the said James Allen have hereunto sett my hand & seale the seaventh day of January in the year of our Lord God one thousand sixe hundred fiftve and sixe.

This Will was proved at London before the Judges of probate of wills and grauntinge of Administracions lawfully authorized, the twentieth day of January in the year of our Lord God accordinge to the computacion of the Chereh of England one thousand sixe hundred fitye seaven, by the oath of John Allen the sonne and Executor therein named. To whom was committed administracion of all and singular the goodes, chattells and debts of the said deceased. He beinge first by Comission sworne well and truly to administer &c."

The children of James Allen as named in his will were

- Roger Allen, migrated to New Haven, Conn.; m. Mary Nash.
- Joana Allen, migrated to New Haven, Conn.; m. Abram Doolittle.
- William Allen; m. and lived in England.
- Martha Allen; m. Richard Parks in England.
- Mary Allen; m. ——— Warner in England.
- John Allen, his executor.

This John, brother of Roger 1st, could not have been John Allen, Sen., of New Haven, for *he* was married there four or five years previous and was living there at the time James made his will, and resided in New Haven until his death.

It has been thought and claimed that Roger was in the colony of pilgrims under Theophilus Eaton and Rev. John Davenport, who came over in the *Hector*, Ferris (Fernes) master, and who were the original settlers of Quinipiac (New Haven) in 1638-9, but the following extract from the Colonial History is clear evidence he came over with Captain Lamberton:

"May 6, 1640. Mr. Lamberton delivered into Court an account betwixt himself and Good^m Spencer, whom he

employed as his steward att sea on his voyage hither; for which service he allows him 5 lbs. and 10 s. for the whole voyage; but whereas he dyed before he had served half the voyage, he desired that Roger Allen who succeeded him should have one-half of the hyer."

If not one of the original settlers, Roger Allen (Alling) was one of the very early landholders and a conspicuous man in the political and religious affairs of the New Haven colony. He was given a desirable and eligible location in the original "lay out" in 1641, his residence being on the corner of Church and George streets. The first recorded act found of him was his signature to the Plantation Covenant or Fundamental Agreement on "the 4th day of the fourth month called June 1639," but that he did not sign it at that date is proved by the fact that only 63 persons gave their names at the time of its adoption, and 48 names were added later as they became free planters and church members; for only such were eligible to the elective franchise—and as Roger was not admitted into the church till 1641 and his name was the sixth from the last in the added list of 48 names, it is not probable he gave his signature to it until about two years after it was first adopted, for the record says he was received into the membership of the First or Center Church in 1641, and on the 29th November, the same year, he was admitted a member of the bar or court. Before 1643 (probably 1641) he was a recorded planter. Estate one person, 40 lbs. 17 acres of land, yearly rent for land 4 shillings 3 pence.

On the 1st July, 1644, Gov. Theophilus Eaton took the oath of allegiance and fidelity and then administered it to many others, and among them were Roger Allen and Robert Allen. This is all found of Robert. It seems likely he died soon after, leaving a widow and one child, for in 1648 widow Allen is mentioned, and in 1662 to 1678 widow Allen is recorded as a family of two persons (herself and child), estate 35 lbs. and 20 acres of land. In March, 1646, Roger was allotted pew No. 5 in the meeting house, and his wife Mary in corresponding pew across the aisle (males and females were seated separately). "In August, 1646, he took John Potter an apprentice for eight years to learn his trade (blacksmith) and have board and clothing supplied, and to get five shillings at the

end of the time." November 5, 1650, "Roger Allen and his man were fined for coming late to train." February 17, 1653, "it is ordered Roger Allen for his great negligence in the watch, when the alarm was given, that he pay 20 shillings, which the court gives to the military company to buy powder to improve themselves in shooting at a mark."

Roger's father died in 1657, and he returned to his paternal homestead in England to receive his patrimony and that of his sister, Joana, wife of Abram Doolittle. He was absent from New Haven several months, and the following entry appears in the records: "August 21, 1658. Roger Allen being returned from England was told that whereas the town had formerly chosen him to be a Public Brander of Horses—for they had also appointed him to take notice and keep a record of what horses or mares, etc., are sold and shipped out of this town, with what else is ordered in that case by the Jurisdiction (Gen. Court) in May last, which he might understand from the secretary, and have a copy of it."

He was a blacksmith as well as planter or farmer, being quite a large landholder, and was an active business man, much above ordinary ability, of sound judgment, of strict integrity, of sterling worth, and, crowning all, with an humble and earnest religious character. He was often called upon to appraise estates and damages, to act as an arbiter in the settlement of disputes, held many offices of trust, was a Custom House officer, a Collector of the "Colledge Corne," a Sergeant in the first military company, and was the first and only elected Treasurer of the colony until he became ineligible by being chosen a deacon in the First or Center Church in 1669, which office he held until his death. All through his life he was one of the prominent leaders in directing and carrying on the civil and religious interests of the new settlement, ending his life on the 27th of September, 1674, without a blot upon his fair name—a worthy progenitor of a numerous and upright family line—which, though not eminently illustrious, has been very uniformly conspicuous for its estimable characteristics of moral excellence that make a community worth the living in; the very salt of society. With scarcely an exception, his descendants have been honest, industrious and good citizens, helpful in all good works, and ready to do their part in promoting the peace and best inter-

est of society. 'The early fathers were a type of the character that New England is proud to claim as peculiarly its own. They were men who make the most of their surroundings; who reap prosperity from a rugged soil; who join honesty to thrift; who love liberality as they scorn extravagance; who know there is no station in life, however lowly, or however high, that cannot be filled with dignity; no reward of life which cannot be gained by industry, integrity, good sense and good morals;' and upon this base rests the ancestral character of the Allen Allings. As a matter of course the Alling blood has been so much thinned by intermarriages, that the name has in a measure lost some of its early characteristics, yet it is believed there are few, if any, names carry with them a more deserving reputation for integrity and the qualities essential for good citizens than attach to this.

Roger Alling, 1st, blacksmith, at his death in 1674, left only a nuncupative will, which his children accepted. His estate inventoried at 394 lbs 17s. His widow, Mary (Nash) Alling, survived him about nine years, and disposed of her estate by will as follows:

The last Will and Testament of Mary Alling of New Haven—widow.

Not knowing how soon my last change may bee, and being at this present in competent understanding and memory doe

order and dispose of that worldly estate I have to dispose of, in manner and form as followeth.

Imprimis—I give to my eldest son Samuel Alling a feather bed upon which I lodge, and bolsters and two pillows and the best coverlette and the biggest brasse pan and one of the biggest pewter platters.

Item—I give unto my son John Alling my biggest brasse kettle and one of the biggest pewter platters and the greene rugge and my great chest that stands in the lean too.

Item—I give unto my son James Alling the best flocke bed and one feather bolster and two pillows and curtains about the bed and the bed stead and one payre of the best sheets and a greene coverlette and two blankets and ye furnace and ye east brasse skillett and six napkins and one table cloth and one of ye biggest pewter platters and one cow.

Item—I give unto my daughter Mary Mosse a flocke bed and bolster and two pillows and the single greene coverlette and one blanket and one payre sheets and the great iron kettle and one of the biggest pewter platters and my trunk.

Item—I give unto my daughter Sarah Peck the lesser brasse pan, and one of the biggest pewter platters, and the wain-scott chest that stands in ye chamber and the dark colored covercloth and one blanket and the great iron skillett.

And all the rest of my estate (after my just debts are paid) whether within the house or abroad, in cattle or otherwise I doe heartily appoint to be equally divided among all my children, only my son Samuel Alling to have a double part—my wearing apparel excepted, all these I give to my four daughters, Mary Mosse, Sarah Peck, Elizabeth Alling and Susanna Alling, to be equally divided among them.

Also I doe define and appoint my eldest son Samuel Alling to be my sole executor of this my last will and testament, and in confirmation that I ordain this my last will and testament I hereunto sett my hand and seal this seventeenth day of July, 1682.

Sergt. Samuel Alling, 1st, blacksmith, made no will. He married (1) Elizabeth, daughter of John Winston, who bore him seven sons, and died soon after Daniel was born, in 1682. He married (2) Sarah, daughter of Deacon John Chedsey, by whom he had one son and three daughters. On the 20th Oct., 1709, she was appointed administratrix and Joseph Moss and John Punderson appraisers. Estate inventoried 526 lbs. 7 s., and distributed to Samuel, eldest, double portion 96 lbs. Roger, 3d, had already received his part. The other eight children 48 lbs. each. John was given a right in the homestead (corner Church and Center streets), 2 acres in the meadows at West Side, 1 acre in town and eight acres near Roger's farm (Allingtown), Daniel and Caleb land at Oyster Point. In 1711 Caleb and Esther chose Sarah, their mother, to be their guardian.

Samuel Alling, 1st, had seven sons and three daughters that lived to maturity, and all had families, given in this book, five of them heading lines that extend down to the present. Samuel, 2d, the eldest, settled in Newark, N. J., John at Elizabeth, N. J., James at Wallingford, Conn., Roger, 3d, at Allingtown, Theophilus at Allingtown, but removed to East Haven, Daniel at Orange, and Caleb at Hamden.

Rev. James Alling, youngest son of Roger, 1st, was educated at Harvard College (now university), where he graduated in 1679. He afterwards studied for the ministry and was called to the church in Salisbury, Mass., in 1682, where he died in 1696.

Sibley's Harvard Graduates, Vol. III, p. 173, says of him:

“James Alling, b. 1657; d. 1696, a. 39.

Rev. James Alling, M. A., of Salisbury, Mass., born June 24, 1657, was son of Roger Alling of New Haven, whose wife Mary, eldest child of Thomas Nash (gunsmith) of New Haven, died August 16, 1683.

The nuncupative will of the father directs that his son James Alling be brought up to learning.

At a meeting of ye Corporation, 14, 3, 77 he was chosen schollar of ye house. Being from ye colonie of Nox or Newhaven, he received seven pounds from ye Pemoyer Fund by vote of ye Corporation 3 July, 1679.

January 17, 1681, the village of East Haven, Conn., having received encouragement from the General Court, appointed a Committee to speak with Mr. James Alling to know his mind with reference to his settling there as a minister. He served them several months, but contemplating a long journey, he declined the invitation to stay longer with them. His name occurs several times in Noahadiah's Russell's Diary in connection with payments made to him. In 1682 he was invited to preach in Salisbury, Mass., and probably delivered his first sermon there the 17th December. He was ordained 4th May, 1687, being the successor of Wheelwright, and the third minister. He died March 3, 1695-6, after three months' sore sickness with dry Gripes. He was a gentleman well accomplished and of a sweet disposition.

In 1688, Alling married Elizabeth, born 5, 6 August, 1663, daughter of Rev. John Cotton of Plymouth (H. U., 1657), and his wife, the daughter of Dr. Bray or Bryan Rossiter. She outlived him, married his successor, Caleb Cushing (H. U., 1692), and died in September, 1743."

("Savages' Genealogical Dictionary says James Alling married, in 1688, Elizabeth, daughter of Rev. Seaborn Cotton, of Hampton." Does the parentage agree?—Ed.)

Court Records, Probate Court, October, 1697.

"This Court grants liberty and full power to Mrs. Elizabeth Allen, late wife of Mr. James Allen, the recent pastor of the church at Salisbury, deceased (upon her petition), to make sale of such housing and lands in the town of Newhaven as belonged to the estate of her deceased husband, said estate in housing and lands being in a decaying and wasting condition, always provided that good security be given to the countie Court of Newhaven for the preserving of the produce of the said housing and lands for the heirs and legatees of the said Mr. Allen, when they shall come to age to receive it."

Rev. James Alling left no sons to perpetuate the name. The record will be continued, starting in lines with Roger's son John, the Recorder, and from his (Roger's) grandchildren, the sons of Samuel, 1st.

LINEAGE OF ROGER ALLING, 1st.

BRANCH OF HIS SON JOHN THE JUDGE.

$\frac{4}{17}$ John Alling, Esq., called also Recorder and Judge, was the second son of Roger Alling, 1st. He was the founder of a numerous and talented branch of the Alling family. He married Susanna Coe, daughter of John Coe of Stratford, and by her had nine children; one died young, and the other eight all married and raised families, estimable and honored in their day. He seems to have been more talented and eminent than even his father or brothers, having held numerous and important offices of honor and trust for many years.

Although he learned the trade of blacksmith from his father with his brother Samuel, 1st, he seems to have been much of a student, and was interested in the cause of education and in the prosperity of Yale College, having been its Treasurer from 1702 until his death in 1717. He was elected Deputy or Representative by the colony to the Court or Assembly for twenty terms, and his name is entered on the record John Allen until 1701, when, for the first time, it is spelled Alling, although I find his signature Alling at an earlier date.

In 1704 he was appointed by the Assembly the Judge of the County Courts and also the Probate Judge, and was annually reappointed until 1714, when Jonathan Low was appointed to succeed him in the County Courts, and in 1716 he became so disabled that he could not attend to the business, when the Governor and Council delegated Samuel Ells to act for him during his disability. While Judge he united over seventy couples in marriage. For a time he was himself a member of the Governor's Council, and on the Governor's Staff. In 1708 the Assembly put into his care "a barrel of gunpowder with lead and flints answerable for the colony's use."

In 1714 he deeded to his son Jonathan several tracts of land, and also "all of his blacksmith tools of whatever sort," and in the same year he also deeded to his sons Ebenezer and Stephen various other pieces of land in about New Haven.

An old slab in the Grove Street Cemetery reads:

“ Here lyeth interred
the body of the
Worshipful John
Alling, Assis't, who
died March 25, 1717.
Aged 70 years.”

Capt. Jonathan Alling was a successful business man, an energetic and prominent citizen, a valuable leader in the train band, of which he was a captain of the 6th Co., 11th Regiment Militia, and was elected and represented the colony in the Assembly or Legislature twenty-three times from 1730 on. Of his children, the first, Sarah, died young. Mary

married Samuel Dickerman of Hamden. Jesse married Sarah Atwater and died without issue. His estate was distributed to his widow and his brothers and sisters. Oliver died unmarried. His will, made March, 1785, appointed his brother Joseph and his nephew, Samuel Dickerman, executors, gave his property to his sisters Susanna and Rhoda and to Thaddeus and Chauncey, sons of his brother Joseph. Susanna was the last survivor of Captain Jonathan's children. She died March 5, 1820, aged 92, and her estate was distributed to the heirs of James, Jonathan, Joseph and John Alling and Mary Dickerman.

* "Deacon Jonathan Mansfield lived on the corner of Elm and Church streets, site of the DeForest house, and his pigpen was on the northeast corner of the Green opposite. He was a deacon of the first church from 1751 to 1775, and was the custodian of the communion plate and wine. His negro servant, it is said, got drunk several times on this consecrated wine before he was discovered. Nathan, son of the above Deacon Jonathan, married Deborah Dayton. They had a daughter, Mary Mansfield, who married Isaac Beers of Stratford, born November 28, 1742; died August 30, 1818." (Tuttle family, p. 203.) Dr. Stiles' History of the Judges, 1793, says: "Mrs. Beers is of a singularly tenacious and retentive memory, well read, an excellent historian and versed in family anecdotes and antiquities of New Haven. and Oxford were also in his care. A grandson, Achilles Mansfield, was a Congregational minister at Killingworth, Conn., 1779 to 1814. His daughter Susan married Rev. Joshua Huntington, pastor of the old South Church, Boston. Many of the descendants of the deacon and wife Sarah are the most noted of the Mansfield family.

After the death of his wife in 1765 the deacon married (2) May 13, 1766, Abigail Dorman, who was the widow of Ebenezer Dorman of Hamden and daughter of James and Abigail (Bennet) Bishop. They had a son, Ezra Dorman, and three daughters, who married Allings, viz.: Hannah, who married Charles Alling, Lois married Caleb Alling, 3d, and Abigail, the wife of the Rev. Abraham Alling, all of Hamden.

The deacon's second wife, Abigail, was born September 1, 1707, joined the church August 9, 1747, and died January 25, 1798.

The *Connecticut Journal* of February, 1798, says: "Died, Thursday evening, January 25, Mrs. Abigail Mansfield, widow of the late Deacon Jonathan Mansfield, in the 91st year of her age. On the following Saturday her remains were carried into the church at Hamden Plains, where she had resided, and an excellent and well adapted discourse was delivered on the occasion by Dr. Trumbull of North Haven, from Eccl. VII, 1: "A good name is better than precious ointment, and the day of death than the day of one's birth."

In 1818, his son James died childless, and his brother Elijah was appointed administrator under a bond of \$8,000, when his estate was given equally to his brother Elijah, his sister Abigail and the heirs of Mabel. Mrs. Augusta (Alling) Hotchkiss, a granddaughter of Elijah, says his brother James went one night to what is now the central part of West Haven to stay with a chum of his, expecting to start gunning in the early dawn. During the night the British landed on the shore and surrounded the house; to escape them James crawled up the chimney, where they found him and took him a prisoner to Long Island, and there set him at work digging a well, but he was eventually released for good behavior. He was no doubt one of the four captives taken in the raid given below, described in the *Connecticut Journal and New Haven Post Boy*, published September 6, 1781, as follows:

“On Friday morning last, between one and two o'clock, three of the enemy's vessels—a brig of 16 guns and two

armed sloops—came off to West Haven and landed 150 men, who, having secured the sentinels and guards,—eleven in all,—they surrounded several houses, where they fixed guards in such a manner that not the least alarm was given, nor was the invasion generally known in the parish (though compact) till near sunrise; all which time the enemy were collecting cattle, horses and other plunder. Some families knew nothing of the affair, nor missed their cows till they went to milk them. The alarm was not given in town till too late to afford any assistance, the enemy having effected their designs and got on board their vessels. They took off four of the inhabitants, besides the above, and about 30 head of cattle and horses.”

Phebe, his first wife, lived less than two years after marriage, and Jared Ingersoll was appointed her administrator. At his decease his second wife (Hannah Miles) was made administratrix, and his estate was distributed to his widow and five sisters. She married (2) Jared Ingersoll.

Enos Alling was a merchant and a prominent and influential man in New Haven society. He graduated at Yale College in 1746, was a member of the Legislature in 1764, for many years was the clerk and a warden in Trinity Parish, and a leading man in that church, and received the sobriquet of “Bishop Alling.” He died childless and was buried in Grove Street Cemetery. A large red sandstone table monument marks his resting place, having this inscription: “In mem-

ory of Enos Alling, Esq., who received a liberal education in Yale College, was a useful member of civil society, and proved himself a man of integrity, virtue and honor. He died universally respected, September 11, 1779, aged 61 years."

The will of Ebenezer Alling, in Court, March 12, 1801, gives to loving wife, Lydia, one-third of all his estate, both real and personal, after debts are paid, but if she marries the property all reverts to their children. Item—I give and bequeath to my son Jonathan and my five daughters, namely, Lucy, Huldah, Abiah, Hannah and Patty (Martha), the one-half as to them equal alike as if set off, to Thomas and in with my five daughters, paying back to my son Jonathan soon after my decease, the sum of twenty shillings lawful money each apiece. Item—I give and bequeath to my sons Thomas and Ira just as much more as what I give to my other children.

Tis my will the girls pay to Jonathan what is above written.

Lastly—appoints son Jonathan sole executor, and sets his hand and seal thereto, the 4th of November, A. D. 1800.

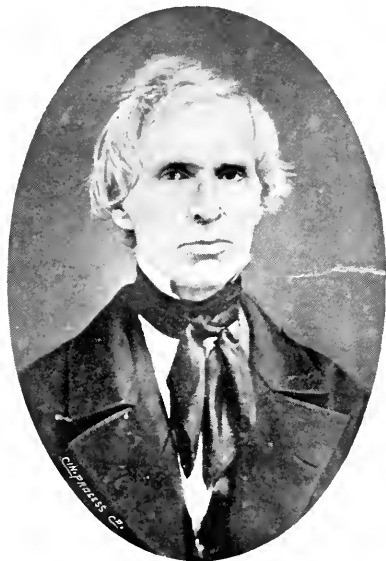

His father, Isaac, was a Revolutionary soldier, and served his country through the entire Revolutionary struggle. He was at Yorktown at the surrender of Cornwallis, and in many other engagements. He was a lineal descendant of Roger, 1st, while his wife, Esther, was in the line of John Alling, Sen., who, with Roger, 1st, were the emigrant founders of the New Haven Alling Allens. He moved with his family from Tolland, Mass., to Norfolk, Conn., when Nathan was seven years old. Two elder brothers had died in early life. Nathan

spent his boyhood days on his father's farm and at school. He acquired a good education, and taught school for a time. He was conversant with surveying, but never practiced it. He possessed a strong mind and an active intellect. In mathematics he was thought a compeer with Colburn. They had four children, as follows:

Mr. Allen was a well read man, modest and unassuming, of sterling integrity and unblemished Christian character. In politics he was a Whig, although he detested politics as such,

and never sought political place or the emoluments of office. He held "The Father of His Country" in reverential respect, and often spoke of the deep impression made upon his young mind when in school the teacher announced the death of General Washington.

When quite a young man he identified himself with the Congregational Church as a member. In 1850 he moved with his family to Indianapolis Ind., where he and his wife died. Their remains, with those of their daughter Emily and her two children, now rest in the beautiful Crown Hill Cemetery near that city. Two of his children, Edwin and Mary, are still living. Edwin, now 80 years of age, is a nurseryman at New Brunswick, N. J., where he has been engaged in active business over half a century. On the 21st of October, 1863, he married Sarah Van Nurse, born in East Brunswick, N. J., July 5, 1833.

1810, when 18 years of age. At that time the country was new and mostly covered with primeval forests. There were no roads and no facilities for public travel or transportation, and the migration was all done on foot or with ox teams, with an occasional horse, the journey taking about six weeks. His mother, Hettie Maria Clark, had come with her parents a few years earlier and settled in the same place. One day, when a little girl, she was sent alone on an errand to one of the nearest neighbors about a mile away, and when she returned told of seeing a lot of big dogs in the woods, that stood on their hind feet with their fore feet on a log, looking at, but did not bite, her. Those dogs were wolves, then quite common there. His father, Jonathan, went back to Connecticut at three different times, making the journey both ways on foot.

Williston, when a lad, was sent to live with two maiden aunts, and when twelve was taken by the husband of another aunt in Northampton, Summit county, where he worked on the farm summers and attended school winters. When 15 he went to live with his older brother, Francis, in Tallmadge, to learn the trade of carpentry, and while doing so attended the school at the academy. In 1862, when 20, he enlisted in the 115th O. V. I., serving three years in Company I, and six months under Adjutant-General Booth.

After the close of the Civil War he returned to Tallmadge and resumed his trade as contractor and builder, which he followed successfully until 1896, when he was selected for and elected recorder of Summit county, which office he still holds, to the entire satisfaction of the public.

In 1866, while building a church in Brimfield, O., he formed the acquaintance of Miss Emilie A., daughter of Horatio L. and Julia (Lyon) Carter, whom he subsequently married. He built himself a house in Tallmadge before marriage, after which they immediately moved into it, where they still reside. From youth to manhood, Mr. Alling has ever been an industrious, energetic and faithful man, approachable, kind and temperate in his habits, honest, just and upright in his dealings, and a pattern of good citizenship; all of which has been so well appreciated that he has been retained a justice of the peace continuously for more than twenty years. When a candidate for recorder the citizens of Tallmadge vol-

untarily united in a commendatory call to the voters of the county, in which they say: "We have selected a man whom the united voice of the township would say is entirely worthy, in every way thoroughly well qualified for the place, and has always been closely identified with all the interests of this town. As a soldier, a citizen and a Republican, his record is clear, and we most heartily commend him to your support." The result was he was elected by the largest majority on his ticket, and has just been renominated without opposition for a second term.

NEW JERSEY ALLINGS.

J., abt. 1701,* and d. there in 1732, a. 64. His will was dated May 4, 1732, and proved Aug. 3, the same year. His wf. Sarah survived him abt. three years, and d. in 1735, a. 63.

All the town and church records give him a title, either Lieutenant or Esquire. He was among the later early settlers of Newark, coming about thirty-five years after the first; he took a prominent place in the church, and held various town offices in Newark, and was one of its leading men.

At a town meeting held in 1708 he was on a committee to instruct Mr. Pierson to go to New England and procure a minister, and in 1716, the church being again vacant by the death of Rev. Nathaniel Bowers, he was put on the committee of supply. An old deed of his reads thus: "For, and in consideration of the love and affection which I do bear towards my well beloved (son) Thomas Alling, I have given, etc., etc., two acres of land, etc., in the year of our Lord Christ 1724, and in the year of our sovereign Lord George the 2d, by the grace of God, king, etc." Signed Samuel Alling; And in 1736 his son Deacon Samuel Alling gave a deed for twenty acres to his brother Thomas Alling (the same Thomas). In 1734, after the death of his father, Ezekiel Alling (the Deacon's brother) of Newark, N. J., gave a deed to James Alling of Wallingford, Conn. (probably his cousin and son of James, who was a brother of Samuel, Esq., of Newark).

* There seems uncertainty as to the exact date, which has generally been called 1708. The last record found of him as a resident of New Haven is June 23, 1701, when his brother John and wife Abigail, who had preceded him several years to Elizabethtown, make their well beloved brother Samuel Alling of New Haven their true and lawful attorney, etc., and the first recorded date found of him in Newark is 1703, when the attestation to the signatures to a deed is made before "Samuel Alling one ye Judges for ye Inferior Court of Common Pleas for ye County of Essex, N. J.," so it is probable he came to Newark the last of 1701 or the first of 1702. The New Haven Church record says 1703, but that probably refers to the time of his withdrawal from the New Haven Church, which might have been a year or two later.

The residence of Samuel Alling, Esq., which became the Alling homestead, was on the northwest corner of Broad and Market streets, and originally contained over six acres, which he purchased about 1710, and the corner has been in the family for nearly 200 years; but the encroachments of the growing city have reduced the lot until its present dimensions are 20 feet 5 inches by 67 feet, the title to which vests in the estate of Sarah M. Crane, deceased, and Mrs. John B. Van Wagenen, daughters of John and Matilda (Alling) Crane, who have just negotiated its sale for \$9,000 a front foot, or \$190,000 for the lot; doubtless the highest price ever paid for land in the State.

The old dwelling of the early Allings was a frame house of the conventional type, with any amount of outhouses, and in the rear was a large apple orchard. On this corner five generations of the Allings lived and died, and it was many years known as the John Alling corner, afterwards as the John Crane corner, from its occupancy by John Crane, who married Matilda Alling, a granddaughter of Lieutenant John. The Newark Allings sprung from Lieutenant Samuel, or Samuel Alling, Esq., whose son Samuel was called deacon, from being a deacon of the First Presbyterian Church, of which he was one of its pillars, and also an important and influential man in civil affairs. He married a granddaughter of Rev. John Prudden, the third minister of that church; the name Prudden subsequently becoming a christian name in that branch of the Alling family. The bodies of the deacon and wife were interred in the old burying ground of Newark, which has all been dug over and their headstones removed, and in 1892 Deacon Samuel's great-great-grandson, William R. Alling, had them tabulated in the rear wall of the first church, and the deacon's reads as follows:

"Aged 95.

Here lies a venerable sage,
Who shone in virtue more than age,
Adorned with every Christian grace
* * * * * has run his race.

His office made the church his care,
Her interests was his daily prayer.
He lived a saint, has gone to rest,
His children rise and call him blest."

Following the deacon in the Alling homestead was an unbroken succession of John Allings, down through the

troubulous times before and during the Revolution and out into the bright sunshine of the new Republic.

The deacon's grandson John was an ardent patriot and a Lieutenant in the company of Minute Men at Newark before the Revolutionary War broke out. Towards its end, one cold winter's day, a party of British soldiers who had been out foraging, came down into Newark on their way back to the main column near Newark bay. Presumably they came down what is now Springfield avenue, and it is a certainty, as they came, the colonists gave them a warm reception. It was not a battle, but what to-day would be termed bushwhacking. The Jersey-men fired from behind "each fence and farmyard wall," and they annoyed the British so that they got very angry. Finally they made a stand at what is now the corner of Broad and Market streets just in front of the Alling homestead. Lieutenant John seeing them said to his wife, "Abigail, the British are here, take the children and run down cellar, quick." The deacon, now nearly 90 years old, hearing the clamor and rattle of the flintlocks outside, raised the window and cried out, "Give it to 'em, boys." Upon which a British soldier raised his gun and called out to an officer, "Shall I shoot the old devil?" "No, he is too old to harm us," was the reply. Meanwhile a brisk skirmish was going on, and Lieutenant John had seized his flintlock and began firing and dropping the red-coats from his ambush, and as the day was cold, reloading by the kitchen fire. The British noticed this and finally sent a party to put a stop to it. They broke down the door of the house and drove the patriot by the back door into the orchard, following him with shot after shot as he ran dodging from one apple tree to another, until, just as he was passing beyond their reach, they put a shot into the calf of one leg, but he escaped. His son John (the third John Alling to occupy this corner), then a lad of 10 or 12 years, was one of the children Abigail had in the cellar during the fray, and was the grandfather of William R. Alling of Newark, to whom, in his old age, he related this incident, and to whom the compiler is indebted for the narrative, as well as for a large part of the genealogical and historical record of the Newark Allings.

Deacon Samuel's son Joseph, no doubt, is the person referred to in a paper in the Newark Historical Library, among some papers brought from Washington by the late Alexander M. Pennington.

"This is to certify that Capt. Joseph Alling has delivered me an enlistment roll. (Signed) Wm. Burnet, Nov. 13, 1775."

Dr. William Burnet married Joanna, a daughter of Capt. Joseph Alling. Besides Lieut. John Alling, Prudden, Isaac and Samuel Alling were all members of this Minute Company at Newark in 1775, before the Declaration of Independence.

Samuel Allen,³ Esquire, was one of the Judges of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas. In 1709 and 1711 and 1717 he was chosen town collector; in 1714 to see that the salary of Rev. Mr. Bowers was raised by subscription, and also a fence viewer; in 1715 he was put on committee to supply the deficit from the death of Rev. Nathaniel Bowers, and in 1721 was appointed surveyor of highways. In 1724 he deeds two acres to his son Thomas Alling, and like his father and grandfather, he was a blacksmith, and one of the principal men of Newark in his time. He was Elder in Synod from 1727 to his death, in 1732.

The life and character of William Alling of Rochester, N. Y., are portrayed in the following excerpts from the public tributes at the time of his death in 1890. It should be stated, however, that Mr. Alling was in business life a bookseller, publisher and dealer in paper, and that his religious life was in connection with the Central Presbyterian Church of that city.

“In the death of William Alling there passed away from our city a citizen who for the past half century has been one of the leading men of Rochester; for nearly three-quarters of a century an active member of the church, and for seventy-nine years leading a life without flaw or blemish.” “Generosity, honesty and their accompanying virtues were the characteristics of the man, in view of which it is not strange that hundreds of people of Rochester had learned to look upon him with kindly eyes.” “His name had been a household word in this city for nearly half a century, but he who bore it with so much honor, with such complete loyalty to every true principle of human life and character, has closed his earthly career.”

“Mr. Alling served as ruling elder in the Central Church for forty-six years. Seldom has a church been so favored with an officer so faithful and fruitful in his stewardship, or so keenly responsive to every responsibility, so uniformly laborious and diligent, so scrupulously accurate and faithful to every trust. But far beyond his official relations to the church was his warm personal attachment to it. In the broadest sense he loved the Church of God. His kindly sympathetic heart enabled him to be helpful to the poor in the church. His love for his fellow members bound their hearts to him in the warmest ties of love. He walked with God. He daily grew in grace. The fruits of the Spirit in all their profusion and fragrance abounded in him. His fruitfulness was the result of his fellowship with the Father and His Son Jesus Christ.” Thus he lived and thus he died.

Verplanck Colvin, superintendent of the New York State Land Survey, was born in Albany, N. Y., January 4, 1847, son of Hon. Andrew James Colvin (born April 30, 1808, at Coeymans, Albany County, N. Y.) and Margaret Crane Alling, his second wife, who was born in Newark, N. J., March 19, 1812, and married A. J. Colvin in Trinity Church, Newark, N. J., September 2, 1845. (Records of Trinity Episcopal Church, Newark.)

Verplanck Colvin's mother was a descendant of Roger Alling, 1st, who came to New Haven, Conn., in 1639. When Rev. Mr. Davenport proposed to found Yale College, Roger Alling was the first to respond and say he "would send his son" there.

Roger Alling's eldest son, Samuel, 1st, married Sarah Winston of the old Cecil (Churchill, Marlborough) families; their eldest son, Samuel Alling, 2d, married, New Haven, 1690, Sarah, daughter of Thomas Curry, and removed to Newark, N. J., 1701-2; their son Samuel Alling, 3d, the deacon, married Abigail Prudden, granddaughter of Rev. John Prudden, 2d, minister of the first church at Newark. They had a son, John Alling, 3d (first of Newark), who married Abigail Young of Newark; their son John Alling, 4th, born in 1746 at Newark, N. J., married Martha Crane of Orange street, Newark, a descendant of Jasper Crane (Martha Crane's sister married Hugh Toler; their brother married Samuel Pennington's sister). The third son of John Alling, 4th, was Prudden Alling of Newark, born in 1780, and who married Maria Halsey in 1806; their youngest daughter was Margaret Crane Alling, mother of Verplanck Colvin.

Prudden Alling, in later life, had vessels plying between Savannah, Ga., and Newark, N. J., and when he closed his business at Savannah, drove in his carriage from Savannah

to Ballston, N. Y., to visit his relatives the Balls. Grandfather Alling owned many black slaves, but gave them all their freedom. The Colvins, also, freed their slaves which

they owned in Albany County, before the act emancipating slaves in New York.

A daughter of the Mr. Ball above referred to married a Pierson and was called by the Allings "Aunty Pierson." Her father, Mr. Ball, was a confidential officer of General Washington; was captured by the Hessians on Staten Island and had his toes crushed by the butts of the muskets of these soldiers; and finally was killed by the soldiers. The Balls were relatives of General Washington's mother.

Prudden Alling had an uncle, General Prudden, who married a Miss Ogden of Newark, N. J. General Prudden was High Sheriff of Morris County, when Washington had his headquarters there in the time of the Revolutionary War. General Prudden took his nephew (then a child), Prudden Alling, to the camp of Washington. It was there, afterwards, that the portrait of Prudden Alling in scarlet coat and powdered hair in a cue was painted; portrait now in possession of Alling Ward, Ohio, son or grandson of General Prudden's sister. A portrait of General Washington was painted in the same style, and is now in Washington. General Prudden brought up his nephew, Prudden Alling, from a child. John Alling, 4th, maternal great-grandfather of Verplanck Colvin, in 1775 joined a company of Minute Men of the American patriots of the Revolutionary War. He was chosen third lieutenant. He was in the battles at Newark and elsewhere. The family records published tell of his fighting face to face with the British, musket in hand, at Newark. In April, 1782, he was wounded in the thigh by a bayonet. He died December 2, 1795, aged 49 years.

The Colvins are a family of ancient English lineage; the first appearance of the name in English history occurring in the old chronicles, where it is stated that Colvin, Duke of Colchester or Kaer-Colvin (Colchester = Colvin-town), became King of Britain and rejected the authority of the Roman Emperor. The Roman General, Constantius, being sent against him with an army, a truce was made, and Constantius married Helen Colvin, daughter of the King. The son born of this union was Constantine, afterwards Emperor of Rome, and called "The Great," who was the first Christian Emperor. His mother, Helen, was the Saint Helena of the

ancient Catholic Church; so honored as the discoverer, at Jerusalem, of the remains of the "true cross" on which our Savior died.*

Verplanck Colvin's paternal great-grandfather, John Colvin (born in Scotland, 1752) came to this country from Scotland in 1772, settled at Nine Partners, N. Y., where he married Sarah Fuller (born in Connecticut, April 25, 1754), descendant of a Mayflower pilgrim, and subsequently removed to Coeymans, N. Y. Their eldest son was James Colvin, born July 11, 1776, who was the father of the Senator, Andrew James Colvin. The paternal grandmother of Verplanck Colvin (Catherine Huyck Verplanck, born in Coeymans, June 30, 1778), was the granddaughter of David Verplanck, whose first wife was Ariaantje Coeymans (of an old Dutch family). From her he inherited a great part of the Coeymans' Patent in Albany and Greene Counties, N. Y., a very ancient Patent or Manorial Grant, located across the south line of the Van Rensselaer Patent. This David Verplanck left 8,500 acres of the Coeymans' Patent to each of his four children (Johannis, Ariaantje, Harriet and Isaac D.)

He was descended from Abraham Verplanck, who emigrated from Holland to New York when there were only 15 houses in the place, and was a commander of the Dutch forces there under Governor Kieft in the war with the Indians. In the house of the Verplancks at Fishkill-on-the-Hudson, where some of the family settled in 1682, the Society of the Cincinnati was formed. Verplanck Colvin's father, Hon. A. J. Colvin, was corporation counsel of Albany, district attorney of the county (the first ever elected in that county), and State Senator, 1860-1861. He was the author of the act giving women their present legal rights and the act abolishing the death penalty, which was restored after he left the Senate. He was noted for patriotism during the Civil War and was chosen by the State Legislature to be president of the joint session of the New York State Assembly and Senate, receiving Abraham Lincoln on his visit to Albany.† His wife, already mentioned, was a daughter of Prudden and Maria (Halsey) Alling of Newark, N. J.

She was a niece of Col. John Ford and related to General Prudden of the Revolutionary Army, and by marriage of her aunt Matilda (Rosekrans) Halsey to Gen. Ebenezer Foote of the Continental Army, related to that old Delaware County family.

Verplanck Colvin was educated at home, then at the Albany Academy, and afterwards by private tutors. At a later period he was, for a short time, an instructor in surveying, engineering and geodesy in Hamilton College, N. Y.

At Nassau, Rensselaer County, whither the family removed shortly after the outbreak of the Civil War, he indulged his taste for outdoor life and laid the foundation of his love for topographical science by preparing topographical maps of the country. He next studied law under his father, practicing successfully in the minor courts, but inclined more and more to scientific pursuits. He kept up his interest in topography and military map reconnaissance; joined the Albany Institute (one of the most eminent scientific and literary organizations in America), and organized a very successful course of free scientific lectures in the State Geological Hall. Continuing his topographical and geologic studies in 1865 he began his exploration of the Adirondack wilderness, corrected many errors in existing maps of that region, and during several successive summers continued this work. In 1870 he made the first ascent and measurement of the height of Mt. Seward, and about that time discovered the remarkable errors of the compass needle in northern New York, which render bearings taken in many parts of these mountains almost valueless. It was during this winter he killed a huge bear in close combat in the snow. In 1869 he made a careful geologic and topographical survey of the Helderberg Mountains, a brief account of which was published in *Harper's Magazine*. During the latter part of the winter of 1870 he traveled extensively through the Southern States and by pen and pencil illustrated his account of these journeys. In 1871 he crossed the great plains to Colorado, visiting Wyoming, Nebraska and the Black Hills, was the first to ascend, describe and map highest peaks in the Rocky Mountains, and subsequently wrote an article for *Harper's Magazine*, entitled, "The Dome of the Continent," which caused the name "Dome State" to be first applied to Colorado. He was

elected an honorary member of the Rocky Mountain Club of Denver, an honor rarely conferred, such honor being limited to a few special explorers of the Rockies, including General Philip Sheridan. It was this year that he urged the creation of the Adirondack Park and Forest Preserve. In 1872 Mr. Colvin induced the New York State Legislature to make the first appropriation for the State survey in the Adirondack region, and, from that time until the present, has been superintendent of that work, and of other State surveys. He, in 1872, traced the Hudson River to its highest pond source, Lake Tear of the Clouds, on south flank of Mt. Marcy. He was the first to visit and name the lake and source of the Hudson River. In 1873 he was appointed one of the Commissioners of State Parks of New York, having been the first to recommend making the Adirondack Forest Preserve, and in this commission was associated with William A. Wheeler, Vice-President of the United States, and Governor Horatio Seymour.

In 1875 he made the first true measurement with level and rod of Mt. Marcy, the highest peak in New York State, proving its altitude to be 5,344 feet above the sea. His services have been of great value to the State and science at large, and the highest mountain on the east shore of the lower Ausable Lake, in the eastern Adirondacks, bears his name; given by the Rev. Theodore Cuyler, in the *New York Independent* many years since. Mr. Colvin was the first to climb this mountain, and he has climbed and measured all of the highest peaks of the Adirondack region.

In 1876 he explored the headwaters of the Moose River and Beaver River region, finding numerous lakes never before placed on maps.

In 1877, while exploring on snow shoes among the mountains at the head of the Red River, he encountered an enormous panther—which had just killed a deer—and killed the panther by a single shot from his rifle.

In 1881 he was called to lecture on higher surveying and geodesy at Hamilton College, N. Y., at the suggestion of his friend the great astronomer, Prof. C. H. F. Peters (who was the discoverer of 36 of the minor planets of our solar system), and was the guest of President Darling.

In 1882 he was chosen, with Governor Cornell, one of the New York delegates to the first American Forestry Congress, and before that body read an important paper.

In 1883 he was given full charge of the New York State Land Survey, and has held that office continuously since. In 1888, when the national government was proposing to erect new gun foundries for the great cannon which has since proved so excellent, he showed in an able paper that the most secure location for the factory was at the Watervliet Arsenal, near Albany: Albany being the one unconquered Capital in the world! Congress adopted his views and he was called into consultation by the ordnance officers of the United States Army. In recognition of this service, the Burgesses Corps of Albany presented Mr. Colvin with a handsome sword. In 1891 he was nominated for the office of State Engineer and Surveyor and polled 538,000 votes, 4,000 ahead of the candidate for Governor. He is president of the Albany Institute, a life member of the Geographical Society and of the American Institute of Mining Engineers; honorary member of the Club Alpine Francais of Paris and of the Adirondack Club; a foundation member of the Fortnightly Club, fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and honorary member of the similar society in Great Britain; corresponding member of the Appalachian Mountain Club of Boston, Mass., and was the first honorary president of the Adirondack Guides' Association. He has delivered many lectures and written many paper and magazine articles on scientific subjects; has invented a portable boat for explorations, made improvements in telescopes and discovered a method of securing the mean temperature of the atmosphere independent of the thermometer by observations on the velocity of sound.

In 1893 he represented the State of New York in the reception of the Duke of Veragua and family, the descendants of Columbus, at the Capitol, and traveled with them to the lakes and mountains of the State, forming a friendship with that family which has since been maintained by correspondence. Mr. Colvin as president of the Albany Institute has for many years secured most valuable historical, scientific and technical papers from eminent people, affording to those interested in higher education the amplest opportunities for information abreast of the time with regard to all important topics. His own recent paper, mathematically proving from the records given by Plutarch, that this continent was probably

known to the Phœnecians and Carthagenians is very important. From the allusions made by Plutarch to the position of the star Saturn, to the direction of the sun at its extreme northerly elongation about the time of the first century of the Christian era, to the length of the days and nights at the extreme north point reached by the voyagers, to their account of stopping at Britain, and the distance sailed on the outward voyage to this continent, the height of the tides, the ice in the rivers, the warm tropical climate of the countries upon the Mexican Gulf and the voyage eastward back to Carthage, Mr. Colvin has worked out, by astronomical and geographical formulæ, on the basis of the observations of the Egyptian astronomer Ptolemy, even the latitudes, directions and distances of the points referred to in the text of the ancient Roman writer nearly two thousand years ago, and proved the knowledge of this continent by the ancients.

Mr. Colvin's paper on the true path of the moon in space, showing that the earth and moon move around the sun like projectiles in direct curves always concave toward the sun, and that, hence, the moon never goes around the earth in a circular or elliptical orbit, has made clear a very obscure question in astronomy and greatly facilitated the study of that science. His address to the Grand Army of the Republic at Albany in 1896 was a memorable paper, showing that the issues of the Civil War were not closed when the military conflict ceased, but that the industrial problems which arose enter into the present political conditions; particularly in the competition of cheap negro labor in the South with white labor in the North; and that these issues are not to be finally settled without full consideration of the rights and wrongs of the human race through all of the historic conditions of the preceding ages of effort for civilization, the *freedom to do right*, and prevention of wrong, which were the underlying causes which led up to the Civil War, and in the same way to the recent Spanish war. In 1898 Superintendent Colvin offered the services of himself and the chief officers and employees of his department to the State for military service in a letter to the Adjutant General; but the militia of the State were given the preference, and he was ordered by the Governor to continue his work in the civil service. His department was the only New York State civil division tendering its services for this war.

Mr. Colvin's chief work has been in higher engineering and geodesy, much of the results of which has been published by the State in the form of reports to the Legislature; but in addition to these there are numerous pamphlets and publications by him, the total number of books printed exceeding 40,000 volumes, many of which are profusely illustrated and accompanied by numerous topographical maps, designs and plans of inventions devised to improve and facilitate engineering work.

He has also acted as consulting engineer on many important works, in the location of railroads, etc.; has been president of the Schenectady and Albany Railway Company, and a director and officer in other railroad companies. He was consulted in regard to the Eastern extension of the Canadian Pacific Railway by Lord Mount Stephen and Sir William Van Horn of that company.

In his geographical explorations he has made large additions to knowledge. His map sketch of the snowy range of the Rocky Mountains around Gray's Peak, made in 1870, was the first ever published and has not been materially changed by any of the subsequent and more expensive and elaborate surveys. In 1883 Seth Green, then superintendent for the State Fishery Commission, published an estimate that there were only 300 lakes and ponds in New York State, and Mr. Colvin was called on to give an account of those which he knew of in the Adirondacks and northern counties of the State, and gave a list of those which he had either personally visited or which had been located by survey or reconnoissance, amounting to upwards of 1,000 in that part of the State alone, while there are many small ponds which have no names. Under the present law he has charge of the surveys of all State land and the relocation and restoration of boundary lines which may be in litigation or dispute between the State and private parties. His surveys are made by law *prima-facie* evidence in the courts of this State, when certified to by him under his hand and official seal.

Mr. Colvin has never been married. He resides with his mother in the old homestead, the large and beautiful place called "The Elms," on Western avenue; the same premises in which his grandmother and his father previously resided. The grounds surrounding the house have been a garden since old colonial times.

Of him it can truthfully be said he was an eminently good man; a bright and shining light, undimmed in radiance, until obscured by the clouds of "the dark valley," which enveloped him in the vigor of life at the age of 53. Although many years have since passed he is still remembered by those who knew him, with loving tenderness and pleasant recollections, as a man of honesty, an example of human affection and godliness.

He was a life-long member of the First Congregational Church of Newark, and one of its early deacons. It was his pleasure to help the poor; to aid charitable institutions, and to make others happy and Christ-like; to scatter seeds of kindness and love, which sprung up and bore an abundant

harvest of admiring friends and loving hearts that truly sorrowed over his departure. At the funeral of his widow, Jane Weir Alling, in 1889, Rev. Dr. Willam B. Brown, a life-long friend, said of him, "He was a saint on earth."

As an instance of his benevolence he at one time took a colored boy named Douglass and educated him in the University at Oberlin, O. He became a prominent clergyman,

and in honor of his benefactor took the name of Stephen B. Alling Douglass. At the Centennial in Philadelphia, 1776, an article referring to the above, with a photograph of Mr. Douglass accompanying it, was on exhibition there.

Mr. Alling was the organizer of the jewelry firm of Alling, Hall & Dodd of Newark, the success of which was apparent from the start, as was every enterprise to which he turned his attention; but for all this he would never claim his gains as his own by right, telling his children, "It belongs not to me, it is the Lord's."

Mr. Alling and wife were buried in their family plot in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery, Newark, and his headstone bears this epitaph.

"Thanks be to God
Which giveth us the victory
Through our Lord Jesus Christ."

While that of his wife, Jane Weir, reads:

"Her children arise up and call her blessed."

Two souls have gone to heavenly bliss,
Two souls, so hard to spare;
In Christ-like work,—if not remiss,—
We, too, shall gather there.

Mr. Alling's father settled in Madison, Ind., in 1822, where his three sons were born; his wife being Jane Robinson of Baltimore. At the age of 16 years, young William came to

Newark to visit his grandparents and other members of his father's family, and soon went to New York City and entered the employ of Thomas Hunt & Co., one of the well-known importing houses of that city, where he remained three years.

At 25 years he became associated with the firm of Alling Bros., who manufactured fine jewelry in Newark, with sales office in New York. Here he identified himself with the trade, and soon won their confidence. The firm was robbed of a trunk of jewelry in 1877, by what was then a new and startling scheme, viz.: the changing of check on the trunk at Worcester, Mass., while en route for New York. The boldness, originality and success of the scheme caused no little excitement among the jewelers and police authorities. Mr. Alling's persistent pursuit of the thieves and their arrest, conviction and incarceration in State's prison, led to the formation of the Jewelers' Protective Union, Mr. Alling occupying the position of president from its formation to the present time, there being on its rolls 1,200 travelers, with insurance on their stock amounting to \$7,000,000, including goods in charge of express companies.

In 1881 the firm of Alling Bros. & Co. was changed to Alling & Co., he having associated his two sons with him in the business. For 37 years his office has been 170 Broadway, New York, and residence at 974 Broad street, Newark. He is now 68 years old, and still continues to take an active part in his business, in which through life he has been assiduous and attentive. He has become thoroughly aroused to the importance of securing an ancestral record of the Allings, and has been untiring in assisting the compiler in collecting and collating the genealogical record of the Newark line. His marked personality, being singularly interesting and tactful as a conversationalist, coupled with what is popularly known as an approachable man, with his suavity of manner and kind and affable mien, have had much to do with his well-known popularity and business success.

thoughtfully to every branch of the business until he was thoroughly conversant with every detail, and thus became an important factor and a valuable assistant in the business of his employers. Realizing how completely he understood the calling and how well he was qualified to conduct it, he

decided to engage in it on his own account, and for this purpose, on the 1st of October, 1885, he formed a copartnership with Mr. George F. Secor, under the firm name of Alling & Secor, stock brokers. They opened offices at No. 30 Pine street, New York, where success has followed them, and they are to-day doing a prosperous business, being recognized as one of the leading houses of Wall street. Other members have been admitted into the partnership, and the firm is now known as Alling, Secor & Co.

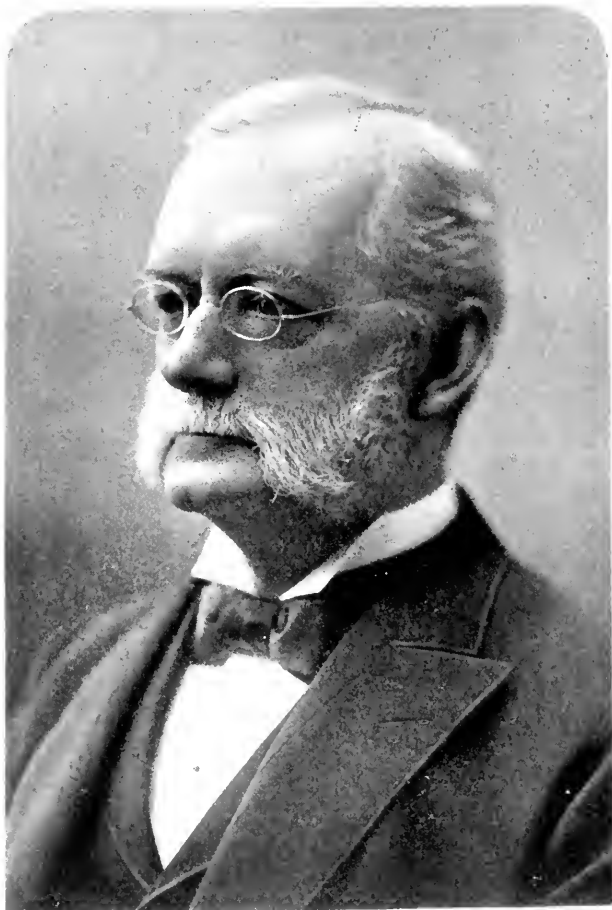

⁸⁶/₈₃ Horace Alling was the youngest son of David and Eunice (Roberts) Alling of Newark, N. J., born September 24, 1822, and is lineally descended from Roger Alling, the Puritan, who was one of the original proprietors in New Haven, Conn., and a signer of the compact of 1639.

Mr. Alling is the sole survivor of a family of five sons and one daughter. He received a thorough education in the Newark Academy and other preparatory schools, but was prevented by ill health from entering college as he had desired. At the age of sixteen he engaged for a brief period as a clerk in a dry goods store in Newark, but a little later turned his attention to the manufacture of jewelry, becoming apprenticed in June, 1841, to his two brothers Isaac A. & Joseph C. Alling. In 1850 he entered into partnership with his brothers under the firm name of Alling Brothers, and continued in this business for about thirty-five years. In 1860 Mr. William R. Alling was admitted an associate with them in the business under the firm name of Alling Bros. & Co., Mr. Horace Alling retiring from the business in 1882.

Mr. Alling has been long connected with some of the most important financial institutions of Newark. He was one of the original board of directors of the Prudential Insurance Company of America and is its treasurer. He is also a director of the Newark Firemen's Insurance Company, one of the most successful insurance companies in this country. He has had directorships of several banking institutions tendered him, but he has invariably felt it his duty to decline the honors.

Mr. Alling is a staunch Republican in politics, and has been a member of the Third Presbyterian Church since 1838, and in 1868 was elected a ruling elder of the same. He is also a Life director of the American Sunday School Union and Life member of the American Tract and Bible Societies, a director and treasurer of the Board of Managers of the Children's Aid, and Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children since its organization in 1868. He is also a trustee of the Newark Academy and Life member of the New Jersey Historical Society and Washington Association of New Jersey.

Mr. Alling married May 31, 1848, Julia Etta Ball of Newark, whose genealogy is traced to Milford, Conn., about the year 1667. Of their three children, Horace F., Clarence W. and Edwin Clifton, Clarence W. alone survives.

Ending of the descendants of Samuel Alling, 2d, of Newark, N. J.

Abigail Grannis, Mar. 20, 1689, and two chd., Abigail and Mary, are found recorded to him in New Haven. It is not unlikely he had other chd., as he left New Haven about 1696, first stopping at Newark, but finally settling at Elizabeth, New Jersey, then called New Ceserea. He was a cooper by trade and was also a planter or farmer. His brother, Samuel Alling, Esq., soon followed him to Newark and settled there about 1701. From 1697 to 1732 he deeds various tracts of land in and about New Haven to different parties, showing him to have been a man of considerable property, but we fail to fully trace his history. Hatfield's history of Elizabeth says John Alling was admitted an associate with the planters and proprietors in 1699, and in 1701 he subscribed six shillings yearly towards the support of the minister, Rev. John Harriman. His last record in New Haven is in 1732, when he deeds land in New Haven County to his loving chd., John Plum, Jr., of Milford and Daniel Smith of New Cheshire; these are probably husbands of his daughters, Abigail and Mary. It seems almost certain that the John Alling whose will follows was his s., but the early records of Elizabeth were all destroyed and it seems impossible to trace his line further. The inscription on his tombstone in the cemetery at Elizabeth reads:

"Here lyeth interred the body of John Alling, who departed this life y^e Apr. 23d, 1734, in y^e 63d year of his age."

The will of John Alling referred to above is recorded in book l. of Wills, p. 302, etc., at the Prerogative Court, Trenton, where probate was granted on it December 12, 1764, and parts of it are here given, hoping the names and descriptions therein may interest somebody better located than the writer, and lead them to trace out this family if possible.

"In the name of God, Amen.

The 28th day of August and in the fourth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lord George the third 1764. I John Alling of the Borough of Elizabeth Town and in the county of Essex and Province of New Jersey do make and ordain

this my last Will and Testament in manner and form as followeth: and first of all I do give and bequeath my soul unto the hands of Almighty God who gave me my being, and my body do I commit to the earth to receive a decent and christian burial; and as touching the distribution of all such worldly and temporal goods as has pleased God to bless me with, I do dispose of the same in manner and form as followeth:

Imprimis—My will is that all such debts as I shall justly owe at the time of my decease shall be well and truly paid by my executors. Item—I do give and bequeath unto my loving wife Abigail the third part of my movable estate my just debts being first paid and funeral charges, and then to be unto her sole dispose forever. Item—My will is that my wife Abigail shall have the use and improvement of the third part of all my lands and meadow and building * * * * according as the law doth direct as long as she shall remain my widow and no longer. Item—I do give, grant, devise and bequeath unto my two sons Daniel and Joseph Alling and to their heirs and assigns forever all the whole of my plantation I now live upon, which I purchased of Matthias Alling, formerly belonging unto Josiah Brodwill lying in Turkey beginning at the road by the land of John Clark, and is bounded on the said John Clark and on William Parsons and on Samuel Woodruff and on Parsake River or the Mill Pond and also on John Osborn, Jeremiah Ledham, Timothy Crane and William Parsons, Jr., with all the buildings erected thereon with the privileges and appurtenances belonging to the same to be equally divided between them part and part equal and alike both in buildings and the lands both in quantity and quality to be and to remain unto my two sons Daniel and Joseph and to each of them and to each of their heirs and assigns forever and to come to the possession of the same as they successfully come to the full age of twenty-one years.

He further gives them a tract of meadow on the northeast side of the great Island, and another tract of salt marsh in Elizabeth Town great meadow, adjoining forked creek, on Nathaniel Crane, deceased; also fifty acres at Brons Town and what was coming to him in the layout at the Purches or any other place.

He also bequeaths to his four daughters, Hannah Hicks, Phebe Meeker, Unis Boyd and Abigail Alling.

His sons to have the profit of their part when they come to fourteen years of age.

He appoints his loving friends and kinsmen, Isaac Woodruff, Amos Potter and Stephen Meeker, joint executors, and signs

Hatfield's History says John Alling was appointed overseer of the poor in 1739-40.

In November, 1729, Jonathan Allen had his title deed confirmed to him, the original title having been lost, and in 1739 he was allowed to collect pay for surveying and running lines. Jonathan and Joseph Allen were among the first settlers of New Providence, 1736-8. Joseph Allen was at the organization of the church at New Providence (then Turkey) about 1736.

Rev. Timothy Allen, born 1716, graduated at Yale, 1736, ordained to the ministry at West Haven, Conn., in 1738; called to New Providence in 1752; and died at Chesterfield, Mass., January 12, 1806, aged 91.

In 1792 widow Elizabeth Alling, administratrix, presented the inventory of the estate of Stephen Alling of North Haven, 29 lbs., 12 s., 9 d.

^{1^6} Roger Alling, 3d, settled at or near Allingtown, New Haven, from whom the place was named. Like two of his brothers, his father, grandfather, and great grandfather, he was a blacksmith, but with him the succession appears to have ceased.

His first wife, Susanna, was the mother of two children, Roger, 4th, and Eliazbeth, who died before she was two years old, and the mother died soon after, and Roger took for his second wife Ruth ——, who bore him three sons, and two daughters, all of whom grew up and married. He was admitted a member of the First or Center Church in 1704, and his wife Ruth in 1718. They were regular attendants at worship in their meeting-house, and as was the custom of "well-to-do people" from a distance, they had a "Sabbath Day House" near the place of worship, in which to eat their

lunch at intermission between morning and afternoon services, and in cold weather to warm themselves; for no fire was allowed to be made in the meeting-houses in the coldest weather in those days. After the death of her husband, Ruth, the widow, sold this Sabbath Day House and lot to Edward Meloy in 1760. February 27, 1753, Roger and wife deeded their negro woman Dinah to their daughter Hannah, wife of John Cornish, and in 1758 they deeded their negro Reuben to son Samuel of Amity, now Woodbridge.

They each made wills, Roger's is as follows:

In the name of God, Amen; I Roger Alling of New Haven town and county, Colony of Connecticut in New England, being far advanced in years and apprehensive of my approaching dissolution, yet of sound mind and memory (thanks be to God), do this fourth day of January 1758 make and ordain this my last will and testament, that is to say, I give and commend my soul into the hands of God who gave it, and my body to decent burial at the discretion of my executors: and as to my worldly estate which God in his providence has given me, I dispose of and bequeath the same in manner following.

I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Ruth, my house in which I dwell with all the movables therein, and ye buildings around about it, also my negro girl Sybille, also all my movables abroad and twenty-six acres of land where my house stands; also my Sabbath Day House at town with the land on which it stands, the whole to be at her sole disposal forever after my decease.

Item—I give to my son Roger Alling—five Shillings.

Item—I give to my son Thomas Alling—five Shillings.

Item—I give to my son Samuel Alling—five Shillings.

Item—I give to my grandchildren, ye children of my son John Alling deceased five shillings between them.

Item—I give to my daughter Elizabeth Beecher—five Shillings.

Item—I give to my daughter Hannah Cornish—five Shillings.

All said legacies to my said children to be paid by my executors within three years after my decease; and I nominate and constitute my wife Ruth Alling and my son-in-

law Joseph Beecher executors of this my last will, hereby revoking all former wills and ratifying this my last will and testament.

I, Ruth Alling being far advanced in years, but of sound mind and memory, considering my own mortality, and apprehensive that the time of my departure is at hand, do make this my last will and testament; and being about to dispose of my wordly estate, I would take occasion now renewedly to give my soul to God through Jesus Christ as my all sufficient portion, and I give my body to decent burial at the discretion of my children and friends, and especially of my executor hereinafter named, in hopes of a resurrection to an immortal life, and as to my worldly estate which God in his providence has given to me, my will is as follows, after my just debts and funeral expenses are paid.

Imprimis—I give to my adopted son Roger Alling (the s. of my husband) five shillings.

Item—I give to my son Thomas Alling five shillings.

Item—I give to the two children of my s. John Alling deceased viz Sarah Alling and Susanna Alling the sum of five Shillings to be divided between them.

Item—I give and bequeath to my dau. Hannah Cornish the wife of John Cornish all my wearing apparel and all the movables within my house excepting my negro woman and her child Laban.

Item—I give and bequeath all the rest of my estate, both real and personal to my children, Samuel Allen, Elizabeth Beecher, wife of Joseph Beecher of Amity and Hannah Cor-

nish aforementioned to be equally divided between them, excepting as above my negro woman Dinah, and her child Laban, and I nominate and appoint my son Samuel Alling, to be executor of this my last will and testament. In witness of the above I hereunto set my hand and seal in New Haven, this 13th day of November, A. D. 1761.

"An agreement made at Woodbridge April 16, 1788, by us the heirs to the estate of Samuel Alling, late of Woodbridge deceased. First it is agreed by Roger Alling, Samuel Alling, Amos Alling, Cornelius Alling, Gideon Alling, John Alling

and Dan Hine in behalf of his children, Seth Peck and his wife Hannah Peck and Elener Alling, that said estate shall be divided into eleven parts and the female heirs and their representatives shall have each of them one-eleventh part of said estate. It is further agreed that the remaining part of said estate shall be equally divided among the remaining part of said heirs, so that each one shall have an equal proportion, according to what each one has already received; and said division shall be made by Samuel Osborn, John Dibble and Enoch Newton."

Before the settlement of the estate in 1791, the children of the deceased, Seth and Hannah (Alling) Peck of Bristol; Amos and Eloner (Alling) Frisbie, Samuel, Amos and Cornelius Alling, all of North Purchase, Woodbury; Gideon and John Alling of Woodbridge; the children of Dan and Ruth (Alling) Hine, viz: Dan, Jr., Elizabeth, Hannah, Elexander, Mary, wife of Abel Stilson, all of Bethlehem; Kezia, wife of Timothy Goodrich, Eunice, wife of Jonathan Orms, all of Fair Haven, Vt., and Rebecca, wife of James Frisbie of Poultney, Vt., all gave quit claims to Roger Alling, the administrator.

Five of Samuel Alling's children, Ruth, Samuel, Amos, Cornelius and Eleanor, settled in North Purchase, Ancient Woodbury, now forming parts of the towns of Washington and Bethlehem. Some of the relatives of Gen. Ethan Allen were and had been living in that section for 40 years or more, and probably for the sake of uniformity and to prevent confusion the newcomers adopted the spelling of James Allen, our first known English ancestor, the father of Roger Alling, 1st, and their descendants to the present day write the name *Allen*.

He was an intelligent, progressive and influential man in the community, of good judgment, strict integrity, and enjoyed in a large degree the confidence and esteem of his neighbors; a Democrat in politics, he held many public offices, was a selectman for many years, represented his town in the Legislature in 1836 and in 1852, and responsible trusts were often placed in his hands as a prudent manager and honest accountant. He was a soldier in the war of 1812, for which his widow received a pension. His sudden death in the vigor of life, though in the 64th year of his age, was felt to be a great loss in the community.

²⁶⁰ Abner Allen was born and reared on a Connecticut farm, educated in the public and select schools of his time, and like many young men whose age and education qualified them for the position, he spent several seasons teaching. He seemed to have a strong migratory tendency, and soon

after he attained his majority started for the West with a wagon load of cigars and matches to defray expenses, exploring the country and looking for an inviting opening, which he apparently found in central Ohio. Here in company with a friend he opened a store of general merchandise, and in a

few years had built up a business that brought an advantageous sale. He then returned to his native town in 1846, married Hannah, daughter of Jerial Hayes, and went into partnership with his cousin, Frederick L. Allen, in a country store. In two years, December 12, 1848, his wife very suddenly died, which so unsettled him that he sought a change, and in the spring of 1849 he sold out his business and started for the California gold fields, just discovered, and attracting the attention of the world; reaching San Francisco by the Isthmus route on the 18th day of August. Here he had the usual experience of hardship in a pioneer life, passing through the times of scarcity and high prices, when flour, bacon and sugar were \$1, potatoes \$1.50 per pound, and other necessities were proportionally high. His success in the mines was varied, his greatest find being a nugget worth \$250, while many days did not yield a penny. While in California an opportunity opened to him which assured an immense fortune, but as it involved a point of questionable morals, he refused it and was severely censured by his companions. At the end of two years he returned to his Connecticut home, married Betsey Ann Hayes, a sister of his first wife, and soon started for a location in the far West, alighting at Oskaloosa, Ia. Here he again engaged in trade, purchased a farm near by containing a coal bank, all of which he managed until 1865, when, having disposed of his store, rented his farm and coal mine, he returned to Connecticut, purchased and settled down on a farm for six years, when advised by his physician to seek a more congenial climate for his wife's diseased lungs, he returned to Oskaloosa, and at the end of one year went on to Canon City, Colo., where they resided four years, and with health restored they again returned to Iowa and settled down on a large farm at Union Mills, near Oskaloosa, their present home. Here, dissatisfied and exasperated with the treatment of horned cattle to each other, in 1884 he substituted the imported Scotch Aberdeen Polled Angus breed of cattle, and is well pleased with the change to no horns. And now (March, 1899), at the age of 80 years, with eyesight seriously impaired, but otherwise in fair health for one of his years, he, with his wife, is spending his third winter in Florida. At the age of 20 he united with the Episcopal Church, and has ever been a consistent and exemplary member. Through all his career, his

honesty and integrity have been unquestioned, his character and reputation unsullied; keeping himself in sobriety and temperance, with a kind and genial disposition, a large heart and generous hand, he has filled up the full measure of four-score years, a living illustration of the proverb, "There is that scattereth and yet increaseth," having a competence and friends, assuring the comforts and care to make the winter of life the "halcyon days" of his earthly pilgrimage.

Dr. Obed Harvey came to California in 1850 when he was 25 years of age, and for the remainder of his life was identified with the history and growth of the State. He was a hard worker and took a prominent place in all plans for the public good, and by his beneficent acts won an enviable place in the affections of the people of his adopted State. He was a progressive man and stood high in his profession, and the State Medical Society delighted to confer honors upon him, while in the political field he was often wanted to fill places of trust and honor, and by his dignified, courteous and fair dealing acquitted himself to the satisfaction of the public. He was an energetic and sagacious business man, and accumulated a large estate at Galt, Cal., where he made his home, and was untiring in every good work to improve the educational and moral wants of his time. He went to his rest with the love and affection of the entire community, as well as a very large circle of acquaintances throughout the State.

To his s. Titus Alling he gives all his real estate, both land and buildings, and appoints him his executor. Very little further history of him is found, but what there is, follows.

In 1748 Timothy Allen (wife Sarah) of East Haven bought in ancient Woodbury the third, fourth and fifth lots in fourth tier of lots in the South Purchase from the Indians. Price

paid 850 lbs. money. In 1765 Benjamin Allen (wife Lydia) bought a tract near to Timothy. These were probably the sons of Theophilus Alling and more than likely were the ancestors of the Allens of that section, but their trace is lost.

It is probable that most of the descendants of the East Haven Allings reverted to the English form of the name—Allen—and adopted the same orthography as James Allen, the father of Roger Alling, and the identity of kinship with the Allings is lost.

He appears to have had a military talent, for he was chosen lieutenant in the 6th Co. of the train band of New Haven in October, 1732, and captain in 1735. He settled in that part of New Haven which is now included in the town of Orange; was a prosperous and progressive farmer, and accumulated a large estate for those days, and after his decease, his widow, Rebecca, on the third Monday of June, 1756, presented his will in the New Haven Probate Court, as follows:

In the name of God, Amen.

I, Daniel Alling, of the town and county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, do make and ordain this my last will and testament: first of all, giving my soul to God who

gave it, and my body to the earth for decent burial. As to my worldly estate, I give, devise and dispose of the same as follows, namely:

My will is that all my just debts and funeral charges and charge of settling my estate be paid out of my movable estate.

Item—I give to my wife Rebecca all my household goods, and one-half of my stock of cattle, horses, sheep and swine, to be at her disposal. I do also give her during her natural life the use of my two Negroes, Pero and Chant; also the use of my dwelling-house and of one-third part of my homestead, that is, my farm adjoining my dwelling-house.

Item—I give and devise to my son Timothy Alling, over and above what I have already done for him, a piece of salt meadow, about an acre, lying in the Oyster Point quarter; also all my right in the common or undivided land, including the divisions already laid out, to him and his heirs and assigns forever.

Item—To my son Daniel Alling I give and devise the northern half part (less a few acres in quantity) of my farm adjoining my dwelling-house, together with the building on said northern half, including that part of the farm which I have heretofore given him by deed, also half of about six acres of meadow in the west meadows; also, about one acre and a half of woodland that I bought of David Johnson, to him his heirs and assigns forever, also my said negro Chant after my wife's decease.

Item—To my son Silas Alling I give and devise the southern half (over five acres in quantity) of my said farm; also about $23\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land lying across the way over against my said farm, which said $23\frac{1}{2}$ acres I bought of Samuel Horton; also the half of the said about six acres of meadow in the west meadows, to him his heirs and assigns forever, with buildings thereon and appurtenances—reserving, nevertheless, to my said wife, out of what I have thus given, the use and improvement of such part and for such farm as is above-mentioned. I also give to my said son Silas a pair of oxen, and horse, two cows, five yearlings neat cattle, 15 sheep, four swine, my cart, plow, gears for horse, three chains, ax, hoe, scythe and snathe, hackle and pin for cart.

Item—My will further is that my said servant Pero, after my said wife's decease, have his freedom, and I do hereby manumit and make free said servant, as above said.

Item—My will is and I do hereby give and devise to my two sons Daniel and Silas Alling my land at town in the lot fronting the market place, and my Sabbath Day House to them and their heirs forever, without the benefit of * * * * to either of them.

Item—I give to my daughter Rebecca Thomas four pounds of lawful money out of my movable estate.

Item—All the rest and residue of my personal estate, not before in this will disposed of, I give and bequeath to my daughters Rebecca Thomas, Esther Washbond, Sarah Humphrevill, Phebe Wolcott and my granddaughter, Lois Roys, equally to be divided among them.

Lastly—I appoint my wife Rebecca and my son Daniel Alling Executors of this my last Will and Testament. In witness thereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal in New Haven this 13th day of December A. D., 1755.

In November, 1756, Daniel Alling's estate was distributed to the widow Rebecca, sons Timothy, Daniel and Silas, to daughters Rebecca Thomas, Esther Washbond, Sarah Humphreville, Phebe Wolcott and Lois Roys, granddaughter.

NOTE—"Uniform tradition among the Orange Allings reports that of these six grandsons of Roger Alling, through his eldest son Samuel 1st, two settled and gave the name to Allingtown on the right bank of the West River near (and then in) New Haven, one settled in Hamden, two settled in New Jersey; and one, Daniel, 1st, the sixth son who grew up, settled in the west part of New Haven, afterward Orange, and became the founder of the Orange or Dogman Allings.

"Dogman was (and still is) the name of a road running from the Milford turnpike, or old Boston and New York 'King's Highway' of colonial times, northward through the eastern part of the town of Orange to the Ansonia turnpike in the town of Woodbridge. The origin of the name is obscure. The road is about two and a half or three miles long. It is now a 'by road,' but was once a 'high road,' and nearly all the land it traverses was once Alling land. On the west side of this road, on a small hill north

of the present Derby turnpike, still exists the strongly walled cellar of the first house built by Daniel, 1st, the settler of Dogman, and which his children by his older son Daniel, 2d, long retained and thence spread northward up the road, while those of his younger son, Silas, 1st, spread down the road southward. The road is still full of Alling houses built by this stock."—(*From Rev. George Lansing Taylor's History, 1881.*)

The seven sons of Sergt. Samuel Alling who grew up settled, Samuel, at Newark, N. J.; John, at Elizabethtown, N. J.; James, at Wallingford, Conn.; Roger, 3d, at Allingtown; Theophilus, at Allingtown, but removed to East Haven; Daniel, 1st, at Orange, and Caleb, at Hamden.

For the first 120 years the New Haven Colony consisted of a single church, the first or Center Church, but in "Oct., 1759, the Assembly set off from the first church a society to be known, called and distinguished by the name of White Haven, and among those assigned to that society were Nathan Alling, Samuel Alling, Daniel Alling, Benjamin Alling, Thomas Alling, William Alling, Hannah Alling, Charles Alling, Timothy Alling and Zadoc Alling. While the following Allings were retained in the old or first society, viz.: Benjamin, Joseph, Rebecca, Roger, 3d, Hezekiah, John, Jonathan, John, Jr."—(*Colonial Records.*)

1^{25} William Allen, second son of Levi and Electa (Hall) Allen, was born in Meriden, Conn., Aug. 24, 1819, and died at No. 152 West 16th street, New York City, May 25, 1874, having never married.

He had the early training of the farm, the common school, the Sabbath school, of the boys' school at New Britain, and of Elijah Hillsdale Burritt, the distinguished astronomer and author of a Geography of the Heavens. He was one of the assistants of Mr. Burritt in a preliminary survey of a railroad between New Britain and Hartford; surveyed for practice and never built. He was afterward employed by the Hartford and New Haven Railroad Co., in its engineering department, under Messrs. Brodhead and Twining, respectively, in the construction of its road to Hartford; followed by serving that company in the capacity of conductor, ticket agent at Hartford, station agent at Meriden, and ticket and freight agent in charge at New Haven station. He was performing the latter duties when Mr. Pond became president of the railroad company.

Mr. Allen soon after surrendered the situation, declining the offer of a large salary to remain, having decided to qualify himself for the mercantile business in New York. He then entered the store of Messrs. Eno & Phelps in that city,



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to learn the dry goods jobbing business, without moneyed compensation. After serving with that firm and Messrs. Hopkins, Allen & Co. a preliminary clerkship, he was admit-

ted into the latter as a junior partner, his brother, John Allen, being one of the principals

On the expiration of the partnership, in 1855, the firm withdrew from business and was succeeded by its junior partners, William Allen, James McLean and Walter H. Bulkley, under the name of Allen, McLean & Bulkley, Lucius Hopkins and John Allen remaining as special partners for the ensuing three years. The large and apparently prosperous business of this firm was principally with the merchants of the Southern States, and on a credit. The house maintained the high reputation of its predecessors until the spring 1861, when the war of the rebellion cut them off from their resources and ruined their business. The troubles incident to the situation, the paralysis and bitter disappointment following, doubtless laid the foundation for his early death in 1874. He, however, tried to be resigned to the overthrow of his hopes for the accumulation of property, accepting it as his portion of the sacrifice required to ensure to his country a more enlarged and stable basis of human freedom.

In matters of religion he was an orthodox Congregationalist, a member of the Church of the Puritans, Dr. Cheever pastor, when it was located on the site of Tiffany's, corner of Broadway and 15th street, New York. He afterwards became identified with the Broadway Tabernacle Church, when Dr. Joseph P. Thompson and Dr. William M. Taylor were spiritual pastors, and was chairman of the committee on music in the latter church for many years, and at the time of his death.

Mr. Allen was a man of rare personal qualities and appearance, of fine executive ability, with a keen sense of humor, was warm in his friendships and apparently unconscious of the charm by which others were swayed by his influence.

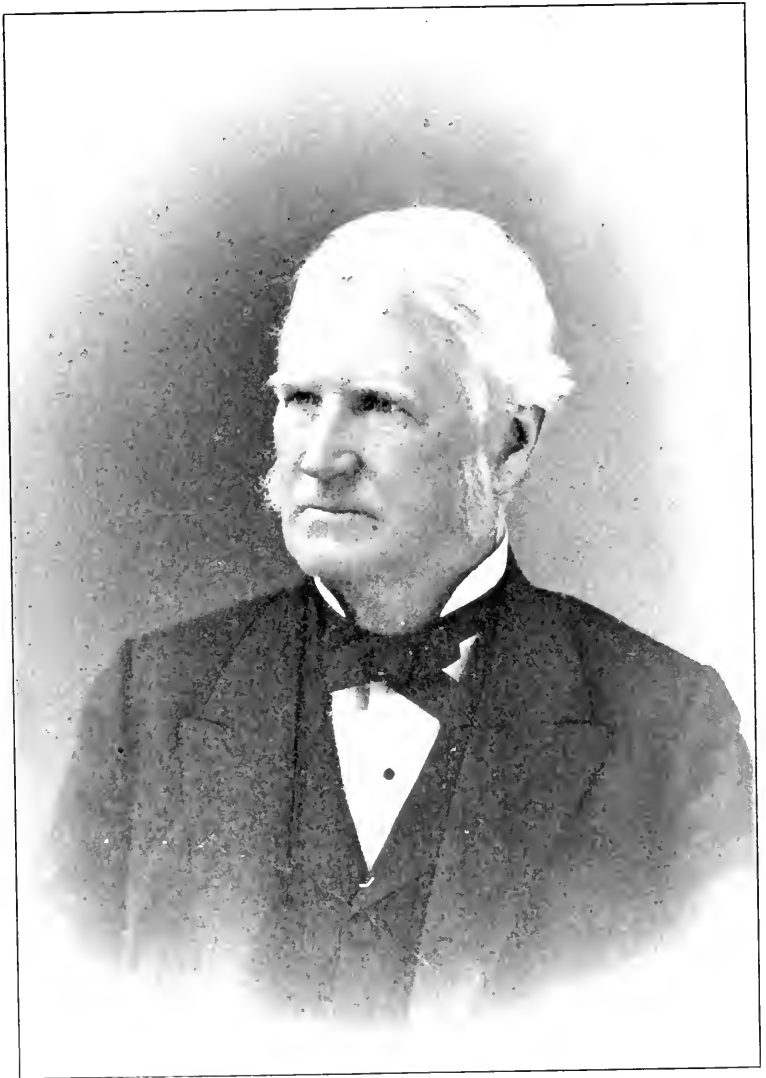

¹²³ John Allen of Saybrook, Conn., was born in Meriden, Feb. 6, 1815. He was the eldest of four children of Levi Allen, a farmer and prominent citizen of that town. His mother's maiden name was Electa Hall, and both his parents were natives of Wallingford. His grandfathers, Archelaus Allin and Aaron Hall, were patriots of the Revolution and soldiers in the war that achieved our national independence; the former enlisted at the time of the Lexington Alarm, and on returning from that service, re-enlisted. The latter enlisted May 20, 1777, at the age of 16, in Capt. Stephen Hall's company, of Col. Heman Swift's 7th Regiment, Connecticut Line, and was honorably discharged at the expiration of his term of service, May 15, 1780. He participated in the battles of Germantown, Brandywine, Monmouth and Stony Point, and was in the encampment at Valley Forge during that memorable winter of suffering.

After receiving a good public school and academic education, the latter at the Hall school in Ellington and Parson Cornwall's in Cheshire, the subject of this sketch, at the age of 14 years, was placed by his parents in the store of Major Elisha A. Cowles, in his native town, where he served a clerkship of six years. Incidental to his business duties were opportunities for attending an evening school during the winter months for advanced studies, an elocution society and a lyceum, of which he availed himself.

In March, 1836 he removed to New York and entered the employ of Perkins, Hopkins & White, wholesale dealers in dry goods, principally with the merchants of the Southern States. He remained in that firm in confidential relations through a period of unusual instability and difficulty in the business affairs of the country, during which time he gained valuable experience in laying the foundation for his future prosperity. Upon the dissolution of that firm in 1842 he became interested as a partner in the firm of Perkins & Hopkins, and upon its subsequent reorganization, under the name of Hopkins, Allen & Co., he came prominently before the public in its enterprising and successful administration. His intercourse with the people of the South made him acquainted with their views and policy in reference to the institution of slavery, and perceiving the conflict of principles that foreshadowed serious difficulty to the country, he

resolved to withdraw from the mercantile business (then conducted largely upon a credit), which he did as an active partner in 1855, and in the following year he established a residence in the town of Old Saybrook, Middlesex County, Conn., where his family now reside. He, however, retains the ownership of the homstead of his parents, where he was born, on Allen avenue in Meriden.

When the secession movement culminated in rebellion against the authority of the United States, he gave the national cause his earnest support. In September, 1862, he paid a private bounty of fifty dollars each to the several persons enlisting from the town of his residence in Company B, Twenty-fourth Regiment, Connecticut Volunteers, under the call of the President, and in 1863 he received an unsought nomination to represent the Nineteenth Senatorial District in the State Senate. He was elected and in the following year (1864) was re-elected, and in both years was made chairman of the joint standing committee of the Legislature on finance, whose labors were of the highest importance in that critical period of public affairs, when the State was raising money for the war. The financial measures recommended by that committee and adopted by the Legislature not only enabled Connecticut to creditably place her full quota of men in the field, but established a policy in the revision of the tax laws most favorable to the public interest, and which has reduced to a minimum amount the public debt. The present equitable method of taxing railroad property on the basis of the market value of its stock bonds is made the measure of value for purposes of taxation which was suggested by him. On the 17th of June, 1864, Mr. Allen introduced into the Connecticut Legislature the first resolution in favor of the abolition of slavery by constitutional amendment. He was one of the Connecticut delegates to the Convention of Loyal Southerners at Philadelphia, in September, 1866, called to give support to Congress against the policy of Andrew Johnson. He was prominent in the movement that arrested at Saybrook the raising of questionable peace flags by parties whose loyalty to the government was under suspicion. He was one of the corporation of Yale College while Senator in the years aforesaid, and was also one of the Republican electors in 1876 on the presidential ticket in Con-

necticut. In 1867 he was elected president of the Peoria, Pekin and Jacksonville Railroad Company of the State of Illinois, which position he held in active administration of the property for twelve years, completing in 1869 the extension of its road to Jacksonville.

In 1883 he was again elected to the Connecticut State Senate from the Twenty-first District (formerly the Nineteenth), and served during the sessions of 1884 and 1885 as chairman of the joint standing committee on railroads.

He was chairman of the legislative committee in charge of the public services at the inauguration of Warner's statue of William A. Buckingham in the battle-flag vestibule of the Capitol, for which ceremonies \$6,000 were appropriated.

For many years he has been identified with the public library in Old Saybrook and president of the association. He presided at the public exercises held under the auspices of the ladies of Old Saybrook on the 27th day of November, 1885, that celebrated the 250th anniversary of the first settlement of Saybrook by English colonists. He is a life member of the New England Society of the City of New York, having been such for more than fifty years. He is also a fellow of the National Academy of Design of that city, and while residing there was a member of the New York Historical Society.

In matters of church government Mr. Allen is a Congregationalist, in theology a Unitarian, in politics a Republican. He is now in his 85th year and has always lived an active and temperate life. His bodily and mental powers are vigorous to a remarkable degree, giving him the promise of their use for many years to come. He has been much interested in ancestral study. A full half century ago he had his paternity traced back to the emigrant, Roger Allen, 1st, and has heartily seconded the efforts and has materially aided the compiler in collecting the genealogical record of his relatives as contained in this work. His marriage and family record follow.

magazine writer, chiefly in verse, but also prose sketches and popular science. Several of his sermons and orations have been printed, also addresses on college occasions, and lectures, as well as three volumes of his poems, viz.: "Elijah, etc.," a volume of scriptural poems which fascinatingly illuminate Bible scenes, mostly in the Old Testament; "Grant Poems," containing his "Elegy on General Grant," etc., and "The Progress of Learning," delivered on the Centennial of Columbia University, on which occasion, in company with a number of the most eminent literary men of America, he received the degree of L.H.D. (Doctor of Polite Letters), the first Methodist upon which it was conferred. He was also one of the authors of "McClintock & Strong's Cyclopædia of Biblical, Theological and Ecclesiastical Literature," published by the Harpers, a work the most voluminous and exhaustive of its class in the world. But his classical poems, nature poems and miscellaneous poems, the most voluminous part of his writings, have not yet been collected into volumes. He has also been known for thirty years as the "Poet Laureate of Methodism," his services having been called into requisition by his church for odes, epics, and hymns in celebration of her centennials of America ever since 1866.

He is a man of exalted talents, a profound thinker, an eloquent speaker, a ready writer, and his composition is winningly poetic. His eminent abilities place him among the "great lights" of his church, and but for his advanced deafness he would doubtless be among the eminent official dignitaries of the Methodist Episcopal Church. But he has three times declined offered elections to college presidencies, preferring to remain in the pastorate. Still, he was one of the organizers of, and has been an active member of the "Board of Trustees" of Syracuse University ever since it was chartered in 1870.

His wife was the eldest child and only surviving daughter of Rev. Mansfield French, formerly of Ohio, then of New York City. 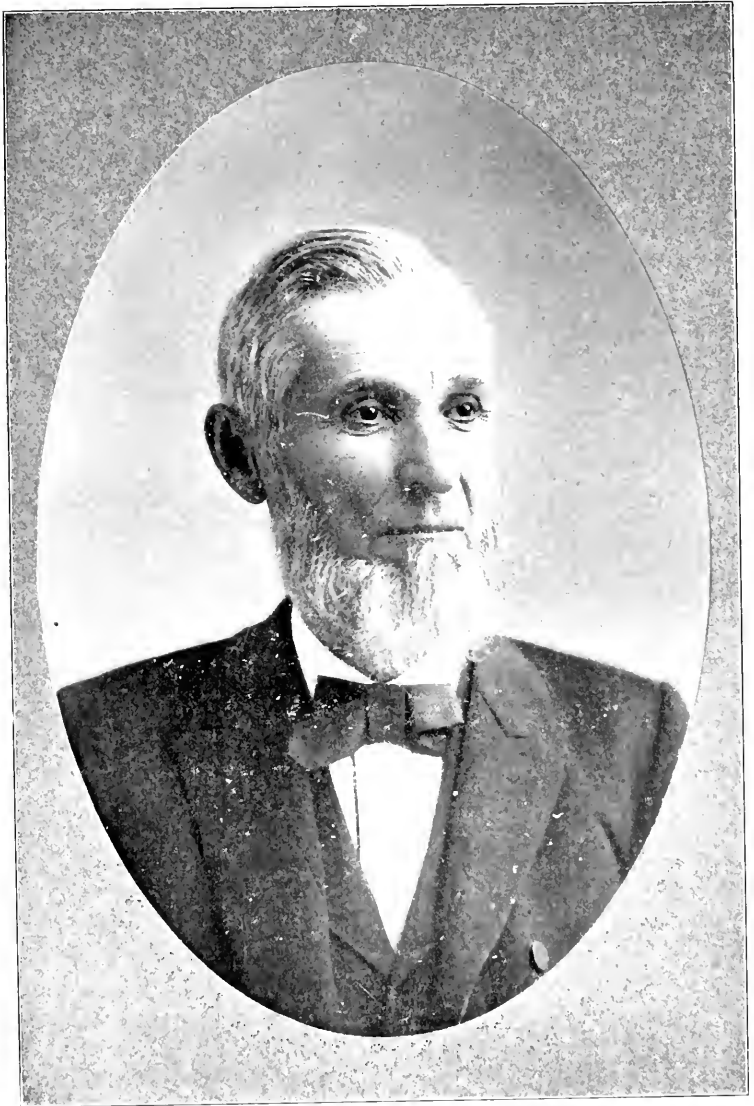

²₁₉³ Amos Henry Alling,⁷ was born in the town of Orange, Conn., January 3, 1823, the eldest son of Charles Wyllis and Lucy (Booth) Alling. He, early in life, engaged in the business his father was conducting, that of wool manufacturing. An excellent physique, a sturdy resolve to make the most of opportunity, and a resolute integrity helped him from the start, so that at the age of twenty-two he, with his brother Charles B., leased the mill of his father and began business under the name of A. H. & C. B. Alling. Perseverance and close fidelity soon showed good results. The mill became too small for the enterprise and the brothers decided in 1858 to move to Derby. This change was followed by a still further increase in the business, which has ever since shown a steady growth. Yarns, hosiery and underwear have been the principal products.

In various projects connected with the growth of the town Mr. Alling was intimately connected, serving in a number of public offices. In the construction of the Ousatonick Water Company's dam he was intensely interested and held the office of director in that company from its organization till his death. But not alone as a business man and a citizen was Mr. Alling held in the esteem of the people. In his church life and religious zeal, emphatically was he known and honored. Early in life he joined the Methodist Church, of which he was always a strong pillar. To it he gave a devotion and a financial support which were the outcome of a strong love of God's work. His religion was more than a form—it entered into every dealing with his fellows. His nature was singularly social and approachable, while in his benefactions few were so unostentatious, and his gifts outran his promises.

On the 2d of September, 1847, he married Sarah Elizabeth, daughter of Samuel and Susannah (Smith) Pruden, a descendant of the Rev. Peter Prudden, the first minister of the church in Milford. She died June 27, 1881. They had three children.

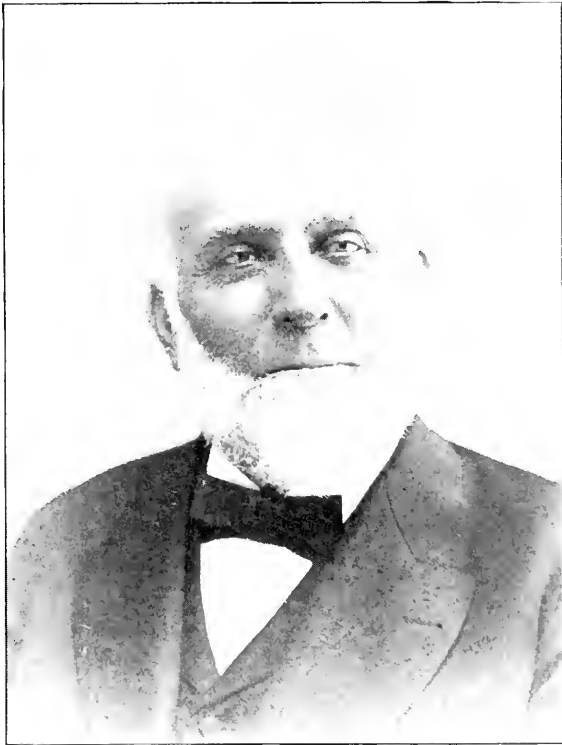

Until a comparatively short time before his death, which occurred February 6, 1898, Mr. Alling retained to an unusual degree the vigor and buoyancy of his early years. The universal feeling of grief at his loss expressed by every one showed the esteem in which he was held by all classes of the community, and to him more than to any other person the compiler is indebted for encouragement and aid in preparing this volume, and in his death feels keenly his loss, and with the multitude of those who knew and loved him joins in the great sorrow of his departure.

As a boy hardly out of school and yet in his teens, he went among the farmers gathering wool, which at his father's mill was made into cloth. On reaching his majority, in 1845, he associated himself with his brother Amos H., and they leased from their father the Orange mill. This was the

beginning of the copartnership of A. H. & C. B. Alling, which continued for fifty-three years, until the decease of Amos H. in 1898. By a close application to business and a constant study of the needs of the hour, the business grew and prospered till a closer classification of industries brought about a general decline in the custom making of

cloth for farmers, perceiving which, Mr. Alling, with a ready adaptability to the demands of the market, turned his attention to the manufacturing of yarn and hosiery.

The limits of the Orange mill were soon outgrown, and in seeking a new site with feasible water power and transportation facilities, Mr. Alling selected Birmingham (now Derby), and purchased in 1858 the property of the Globe Company, which was destroyed by fire in 1864, after which his firm continued to manufacture in the old copper mill of Anson G. Phelps.

These properties were located near the confluence of the Naugatuck and Ousatonic rivers. The mill has been enlarged time and again, besides being augmented by several annexes. During the war he secured for his firm large and valuable contracts with the government, and later he greatly enhanced the capacity of the business by adding the manufacture of underwear. Quick to read the signs over the threshold of the future, he has ever kept the firm "up-to-date" and its mill supplied with modern and adequate machinery, thus enabling it to compete profitably with the trade of the whole country; and to-day, under his entire management and ownership, it gives employment to 500 people. The products of his mill supply the demands of the largest wholesale houses in the metropolitan centers of the country.

Apprising himself of the future growth of his city, he influenced the purchase of quite a tract of land lying along Main and Elizabeth streets. Here, under his supervision, have been erected large blocks which comprise nearly all of the finest mercantile buildings in the city, and under his roofs he provides quarters for the Board of Trade, the Post Office and the large fraternal societies of the place.

Mr. Alling was one of the incorporators and is a director of the Ousatonic Water Company, to which Derby owes much of its material increase, and the borough of Shelton, just across the river, is entirely indebted for its founding.

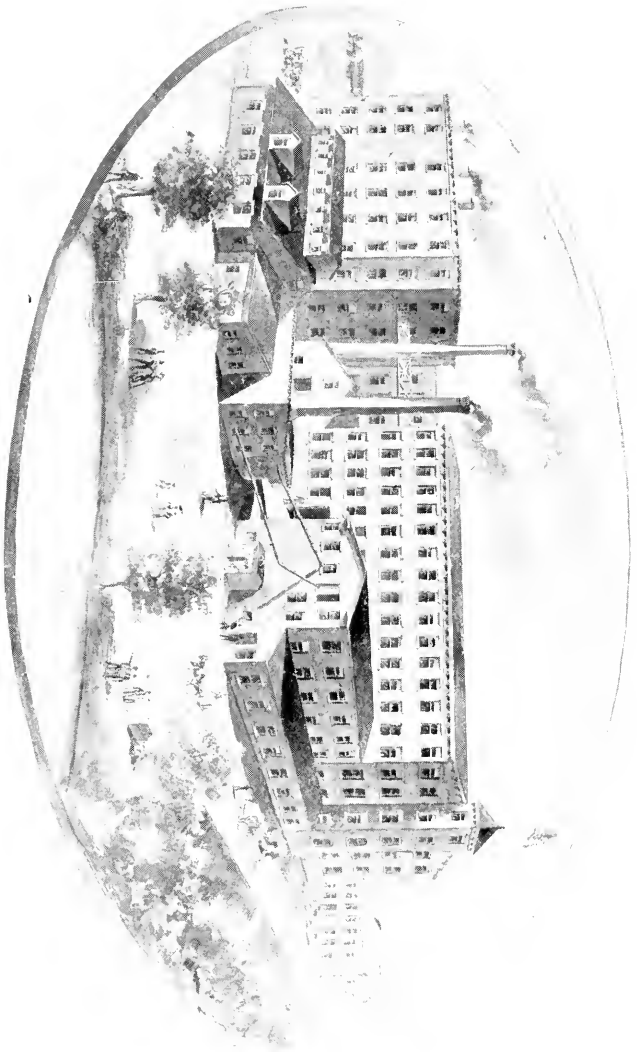
He has always lived a retired life, declining all political preferments, and times repeatedly, despite the earnest pleadings of his friends, he has refused to be of the representative personnel, directing the larger business interests of the community. The reason for this has been twofold: partly because of that modesty of character which seeks not self-

consciousness of personal power, and partly because of an infirmity, caused years ago by a severe sickness, which left him so seriously deaf as to make hearing possible only through the medium of a speaking tube, and by reason of which he has been excluded from all social and public life where the sense of hearing is a necessary qualification for personal enjoyment and action. His friends are always glad of the opportunity that brings them in contact with his personality. Gentle and pleasing in his manner, gracious in the reception of people, quick in his perceptions, and of intelligent expression and keen insight, he is a ready reader of human nature and character. Generously disposed, he always listens to the honest appeal for charity and sends its bearer away the recipient of his kindness. He is logical in his deliberations, and given to him as a premise, present conditions or complications, he can from his wide knowledge of persons and things, and from an experience broken as ore from the rocks, accurately foretell the profitableness of the result or warn against the disaster. His advice and counsels are daily sought by his fellow-citizens, and while possessing no public patronage to give official sanction to his words, he is largely and indirectly a conservator and moulder of the destinies of his community.

He married May 10, 1853, Miss Julia M. Prudden of Orange, a sister of the former wife of Mr. A. H. Alling. Mrs. Alling was a woman of rare personality, whose wealth of culture, grace and refinement made beautiful the atmosphere of home and won for her the esteem and admiration of all who knew her. She died August 12, 1889.

A son and daughter were born to Mr. and Mrs. Alling, Charles H. born December 27, 1855. On completing his education the son interested himself in the affairs of the Alling firm, and for a number of years was a very important factor in enlarging its market, and an indispensable assistant to his father in the conduct of its business. He was also a director of the Birmingham National Bank. He married Josephine Slade Hill of Ansonia, February 22, 1886.

Possessing a judicial mind and inheriting a taste and ability for business, he promised to be one of the leading and influential men of his period. He died at Asheville, N. C., March 20, 1890, whither he had gone to recruit his health.

His wife and two sons, Kenneth Slade, born March 23, 1887, and Charles Booth, born August 4, 1888, survive him. Their daughter, Susie Alling, born November 13, 1861, spent her childhood at the home of her father in Derby. She was married to Dr. Charles T. Baldwin, September 14, 1887. Shortly after their marriage they removed to Rome, Italy, where the doctor established a lucrative practice among the temporary residents and representative people of the old city. Here they continued for three years, and after the death of her mother they returned to her father's home, where they reside at the present time. Their children are Harold A., who was born in Rome, January 31, 1890; Julia, born September 2, 1891; Helen, born May 17, 1893, and Charles Booth.

For a man who has lived seventy-five years, Mr. Alling is in good health and his mental vigor phenomenal. He minutely follows all the details of his business, keeps abreast with the times and well informed concerning the welfare and new projects of his community. As sole proprietor he succeeds to all the manufacturing and real estate interests of the firm of A. H. & C. B. Alling, which for a number of years have received his supervision and management. In the possession of a conservatism which brooks no foolish hazard, he assumes large responsibilities and applies himself to the task, personally allotted, with all the indomitable persistency of a man in the fiery forties.

He is a Methodist, broad in his views; he adheres tenaciously to the generous principles of the Gospel of Christ, and believing true manhood to be life inspired by their very utterance, he will not follow the personal interpretation of any individual who by a rigid enunciation contracts the sphere of their usefulness. He is a large contributor to the support of his church, and Derby Methodism owes much to him for its prosperity and continuance.

Mr. Alling was graduated from Yale College in 1862, the salutatorian of his class. Studied law at the Yale Law School, was admitted to the Bar in New Haven County in 1864, and has ever since been practicing law at New Haven, principally in the same county, but also in all the other counties of the State, and in the Supreme Court of the United States, and has had a very extensive practice during the whole period of his professional career; as counsel for the State, he successfully prosecuted the first criminal boycott case in the United States. He has not only been one of the most prominent lawyers of the State—especially as a corporation lawyer—but he has held and now holds many positions of financial responsibility. He has been for many years a director and general counsel for the Merchants National Bank of New Haven, the Security Insurance Co. of New Haven, the New Haven Electric Co. and the Southern New England Telephone Co. and was also for many years a vestryman in Trinity Church, New Haven.

In 1884 Mr. Alling formed a partnership with James H. Webb of the New Haven County Bar; afterwards, in 1891, Samuel C. Morehouse was admitted to the firm; on his grad-



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uation from the Yale Law School, in 1899, his son, Arnon A. Alling, also became a member of the firm. Their office is at 42 Church street, New Haven, Conn.

Mr. Alling married October 10, 1867, Miss Constance Adelaide, daughter of Augustus H. and Jane E. (Hotchkiss) Parker of Derby, and a descendant of many eminent colonists. Among them, on the paternal side, were Rev. Samuel Stone of Hartford, famous for going with Capt. John Mason on the Pequot expedition against the Indians; Robert Sedgewick of Charlestown, Mass., Major-General of the Massachusetts Colony, the founder of the renowned Artillery Co., and Captain in 1640; Lieut. Francis Bell, founder of Stamford; Capt. John Hulls; Abraham Doolittle, who married Joanna, sister of Roger Alling, 1st; also Daniel Parker, who received seven balls at Stillwater, and Jehiel Preston, descended from the elder branch (now extinct in England) of the very ancient family of Preston Richard.

²¹ Capt. Caleb Alling's will, made May 19, 1755, was proved and approved in Probate Court first Monday of February, 1757, and is in substance as follows:

Imprimis—Gave to wife Hannah Alling the improvement and use of my house and barn, orchard, mowing land, improving land and pasture land lying and adjoining the highway and north of it, dividing between ye sequestered land and half division land, also south of sd way and next adjoining, half the improvement of plow land, mowing and pasture land, as also one acre of salt meadow in suburbs quarter near Oyster Point; all to be for her improvement so long as she continues to be my widow. Also I give to be at her disposal forever all of my movable estate remaining after paying my funeral expenses, just debts and fifty pounds old tenor to be paid to my daughter Rhoda Alling.

Item—I give to my loving son Asa Alling, ten shillings old tenor besides what I have already done for him, which was paying for 50 acres of land for him at the place called the Nine Partners, N. Y. Also 1 pair of young oxen and a cow and a calf.

Item—I give my loving son Charles Alling additional to former gifts, about 14 acres in the half division lying upon the 20 rods highway, being partly Costers and partly Stevens lot, also a small piece of salt meadow, lying westerly from Oyster Point, to him and heirs forever.

Item—I give my loving daughter Rhoda Alling, added to former gifts, fifty pounds old tenor to be paid out of my movable estate.

Item—I give to my little son Caleb Alling one-half of my house, barn, orchard, etc., with the whole of the half of my land on both sides of the highway aforesaid, not above devised to my sd wife, as also the whole of that half, together with the acre of salt meadow, when her improvement shall be at an end to him and his heirs forever, enjoining him my said son to pay my daughter Hannah Alling the sum of 200 pounds old tenor according to the present value when she arrives at the age of 18 years.

Item—I give my little daughter Hannah Alling two hundred pounds old tenor according to present value to be paid by my son Caleb Alling when she shall arrive at the full age of 18 years.

Lastly—I appoint my well beloved wife Hannah Alling sole executrix of this my last will and testament, revoking, etc.

Captain Caleb's estate was settled in 1762 and distributed to his five children, viz., Asa, Rhoda, Charles and little Caleb and Hannah. John Cornwall was guardian for Hannah and discharged in 1772. His widow Hannah died January 4, 1793, and was buried in Hamden Plains Cemetery and her estate divided between her children, Rev. Caleb Alling and Hannah Phipps.

It is said that Ezra and James of this family spelled their names Allen and their lineage is lost. The father, Asa, also seems to have adopted that form, as shown by his will given below, but his sons, Capt. Asa and Rev. Abraham Alling, retained the spelling adopted by Roger, the first American ancestor, which is still followed in their lines.

Copy of Asa Allen's (Alling) will. Probate issued in Dutchess County, September 5, 1786.

In the name of God Amen, I Asa Allen of Charlotte Precinct in Dutchess Co. and Province of New York, being at present—through God's goodness—of sound understanding and memory, though weak in body, think it my duty to make this my last Will and Testament as to such worldly estate as God hath entrusted me with, as followeth:

Imprimis—I will that all my just debts and funeral expenses be taken care of and duly paid by my executors hereinafter named. Item—I give my dear and loving wife for term of life the use and improvement of one third part of the farm on which I now dwell, and a third part of the house in which I now live and all the household goods forever requiring her to allow those of our children which are yet unmarried to dwell there so long as they shall live single.

Item—I give to my beloved son Ezra Allen all that farm on which he now liveth, and all the appurtenances thereof.

Item—I give to my son Abraham Allen twenty shillings.

Item—I give fifty pounds to my beloved son James Allen one half to be paid at twenty one years of age and the other half one year after.

Item—I give to my daughters Rhoda Allen and Anna Allen each of them ten pounds to be paid to them as they come of age or 18 years of age.

Item—I give to my beloved son Asa Allen all the farm of land on which I now dwell and house and barn and all movables, excepting the use of one third of the land and one third of the house given to his mother her life time above mentioned and household goods, he my said son Asa to enjoy the whole of the house, barn and land after his mother's decease and by him my said son Asa I require the payment of all my debts and legacies above mentioned (viz.) to Abraham, James, Rhoda, and Anna.

Lastly—My will is and I do hereby constitute my loving wife Anna Allen and my son Asa Allen to be my executors of this my last will and Testament—In confirmation of all which I have hereunto set my hand and seal the 12th day of March in the year of our Lord Christ one thousand seven hundred and seventy six.

Charles and Hannah (Dorman) Allen had no children of their own, but they received others into their family to care and provide for. They took his brother Asa's son Abraham and educated him for the ministry and gave him their homestead, upon which he lived until his death in 1836. Abigail, wife of Samuel Dorman, Amelia Woodin, wife of Samuel Ford, and Lydia Bradley, wife of Moses Cooper, were all recipients of their care and benefactions, and were given bequests by will.

Charles Alling was in the engagement at the invasion of the British in New Haven, in July, 1779, and testifies as follows:

I, Charles Alling of New Haven, of lawful age, testify and say that I saw, examined and assisted in burying Capt. John Gilbert, Asa Todd, Joseph Dorman, Samuel Woodin and Silas Woodin,—That Capt. John Gilbert was shot through the knee, and then appeared to be killed with a club, as his head was very much bruised and a club, bloody, lay by him,—That no wound appeared upon Asa Todd, except that he was pierced with a bayonet, one through the head and twice through the body,—That Joseph Dorman had his thigh broken just above his knee, but it appeared to me to have been done with a stone which lay by him bloody, and that he was pierced with bayonets once through the head and once through the body, but no other wound,—That Samuel Woodin appeared to be shot through the body with a grape shot, but not otherwise wounded,—That I cannot say anything particularly as to wounds of Silas Woodin and further saith not.

²⁸ Caleb Alling, 3d, was a selectman and one of the leading men of Hamden. In 1795 he opened his house for worship on Sundays, and invited all those who sympathized with him to join with them. He thus established a place of worship in his own house and conducted the services many years, and notwithstanding he was imprisoned for refusing to support the Fair Haven church, he continued the ministration of worship until a short time before his death, and his tombstone reads: "Rev. Caleb Alling, died Nov. 25th, 1823, in the 78th year of his age and the 26th of his ministry."

He was also a man of military attainments, and was appointed by the Assembly, October 21, 1778, Captain of the 17th Co., 2d Regt., Conn. Militia, and was with his company during the invasion of New Haven by the British, July 5, 1779. The sword he then carried is now in the possession of his descendants in Hamden.

Y., and when 16 years old, in 1769, his uncle Charles—being childless—took him to educate, but before ready for Yale, he married, and was then ineligible to college. He settled down to farm work, still pursuing his studies, and finally took orders in the ministry. eight years before which he wrote this letter to his mother, addressed Mrs. Anna Alling, Great Ninepartners, Dutchess Co., N. Y.:

Dear and honored Mother: At this time I sit down to write a few lines by which I would inform you that through the goodness of God, myself and my family are well at present, and in comfortable outward circumstances; my aged mother Mansfield and honored grandmother Alling are both very well for persons of their advanced age. Brother Charles and his family are well. Brother Caleb has lately an addition of a daughter to his family. They have now eight daughters and three sons, their eldest daughter only married.

The meeting on the Sabbath is continued among us for the purpose of religious exercises. The societies in the city seem to be somewhat disaffected with it, and insist on our paying our taxes there as usual, which some, refusing to do, have been imprisoned—brother Caleb for one. Our kinsman, Mr. Benjamin Beech (of Derby), preaches to us about one-quarter of the time, but it is to be feared, according to present appearances, there is but little more than the form of religion among us. We attend of late to the works of Mr. Flavel, left on record, which are, in my opinion, very excellently calculated to affect and inform the mind of all those that will read them with attention, but it is certain the best outward means, without the inward teaching of the spirit, will prove ineffectual.

Dear Mother, I have one particular request to make to you, that is, if you are willing, you would send down by the bearer hereof, that book of yours—those sermons of Mr. Erskin's. I will use it carefully and return it next fall, as I expect to come to the Ninepartners then, if not I will send it by the first opportunity I can after that, safely. But as I am going on some public business this day I am in great haste. This is my birthday—I accomplish the age of thirty-five years this day. Therefore I subscribe myself your affectionate son,

The inception and growth of the church at Hamden Plains (now Whitneyville Church) was so much the fruit of the labors of Abraham Alling that an epitome of its formation seems appropriate. Its establishment was vigorously opposed by the mother churches, who feared a loss in their pecuniary support, and the bitterness of the opposition is shown in Mr. Alling's letter above quoted, where he speaks of the imprisonment of his brother-in-law, Caleb Alling, for non-payment of church dues. Abraham Alling was among the twelve who withdrew from other churches to form this, and as soon as formed they gave him a call to be their pastor, and even before the formation of the church they had chosen him to be a standing deacon, and he had led their meetings, conducted their worship and even preached his own written sermons, so that he had been by far the leading spirit in their religious gatherings. Still in his native modesty he hesitated to accept this call in August, 1795, so it was October, 1797, before he was ordained their pastor, being then in the forty-fourth year of his age.

For twenty-five years he now assiduously devoted his energies to the double care of his farm, about three miles from his church, and the spiritual wants of his parishioners, preaching two sermons every Sunday, solemnizing their marriages, and burying their dead as occasion arose. In 1822, at the age of 68, he resigned his pastorate and withdrew from the active ministry, remaining on his farm until his death at the ripe age of 83 years.

The character and estimate of him is given in the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the church in Whitneyville, in 1895, wherein the Woodbridge pastor, Rev. Mr. Marvin, gives the impressions of one of his aged laymen who had often heard him. He says: "Mr. Alling's sermons made an impression not soon to be forgotten as to their length, and I doubt not as to the forceful presentation of the truth. Dividing his discourse into two heads, he would preach until he reached the *twenty-thirdly* for the first division of his subject,

and to the *sixteenthly* for the second, after which he would come *by way of application*, some fifteen minutes, and then *to conclude*, some ten minutes more. He was rather lengthy, but we all loved to hear him."

Deacon James M. Payne, in his Historical Poem, says:

* * * * *

"The church is formed, and now with hallowed mirth
They glorify the God that gave it birth.
Two years of weakness marred the new-born face,
Then Abraham Alling took the pastor's place;
For five and twenty years he bore this church upon his heart,
Desiring that the 'Lord of Hosts' his blessing would impart.
He preached the truth, denying self, he nursed the infant well,
How much this church may owe to him, no human tongue can tell;
But while he sowed the seeds of truth with loving, liberal hand,
Satan appears, and in his way divides the little band.
It was a case of discipline that wrought the sad estrangement,
And Brother Alling, sick at heart, concluded his engagement.
For sixteen years (so history saith) this church could not agree,
And many thought the church's death the sad result would be;
Though twelve score preachers sought the place, and each *thought* he
could fill it,
The Lord in mercy loved the church and would not let them kill it.

* * * * *

Till Rev. Austin Putnam came and filled the pastor's place,
In patient love he won them back to fellowship and peace."

* * * * *

Stephen C. Leonard, in his recollections, says: "The image of the Rev. Abraham Alling, in the old meeting house on the Plain, in the high pulpit, and under the sounding-board, with his little manuscript sermon before him, is pretty distinct in my mind, though I must have been quite young when I saw and heard him, unless he preached now and then after his resignation. As he appears to me now, he was a patriarchal man, venerable enough to be to a child, almost a suggestion of one of the prophets of Israel." He was, without doubt, a Godly man, and had enough of the old time ministerial dignity to command respect, and inspire in the youth a reverent fear and awe in his presence, yet still, with a kindly heart and loving hand, he so "ministered to the necessities of the saints," as to win the love and veneration of the community in which he lived.

The above is a copy of a photograph of ^{sr} Kneeland Joshua Munson, taken in Millerton in the 75th year of his age. Beside him stands one of his grandchildren Wilfred Russell Paine, a son of his daughter, Eunice Alling Paine, of Millerton, N. Y.

Mr. Munson was a lineal descendant of Capt. Thomas Munson, who came to this country from England prior to 1637. On his mother's side he was a grandson of Capt. Caleb Alling, whom he had often seen and remembered well.

In 1831 he went to Indiana and for fifteen years was engaged in business there, during which period he made seven different trips to his home in Connecticut. He traveled over the first railroad built in the United States, soon after its completion—that between Albany and Schenectady. His transactions in real estate were large, embracing many thousand acres of land in Iowa, as also farms and residences in many different States. He was personally acquainted with nearly every prominent public man in the States of Indiana and Kentucky, Henry Clay and William Henry Harrison among others. In 1846 he returned East and bought out the heirs of his father's estate of 1,100 acres on Canaan Mountain, where he lived for twenty years, active both in public and in business life, being president of the Norfolk Bank and representing Canaan in the State Legislature in 1856. In 1867 he moved to Claverack, N. Y., and in 1870 to Millerton. Here he engaged extensively in the iron business, operating the furnace at Beekman, and later the Chatham furnace, one-half of which he owned. About the time of the financial panic of 1874 he lost \$40,000. He voted at sixteen Presidential elections—first with the Whig and later the Republican party, and only missed the seventeenth, in 1896, by severe illness. His integrity of character and probity of life commanded universal respect. He died at Millerton, N. Y., August 10, 1898, in the 89th year of his age, the last of his generation.

Mr. Alling is a direct descendant in the eighth generation of Roger Alling, 1st, through the branch of his grandson Caleb, whose son Asa, 1st, about 1750, settled in Stanford, Dutchess Co., N. Y., upon the very homestead (since in the family), now owned and occupied by his father, J. Sackett Alling, who, during the active business part of his life, was a prominent merchant of New York, while his mother was Ann E. Bertine of East Chester, a descendant of the Huguenots. Educated in the public schools of New York and Dutchess County, Mr. Alling prepared for college at the Chappaqua Institute, and entered Cornell University in the Class of '83, from which institution he graduated with honors. During his college career he was active in the affairs of the institution, being one of the organizers and editors of the Cornell *Daily Sun*, the winner of the Woodford prize of one hundred dollars awarded for the best oration composed and delivered by the members of the Senior Class; Ivy orator, and one of the first members of the Cornell Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa. Mr. Alling is also a member of the Beta Theta Pi and Phi Delta Phi college fraternities. Returning to New York after graduation he entered Columbia Law School, graduated in 1885, and was admitted the same year to the Bar of New York. For nearly a year he practiced law in partnership with Judge Daniel W. Guernesey. He then entered the office of Platt, Gerard & Bowers, and in 1889 formed the present partnership of Kenneson, Crain & Alling, with offices at 11 and 13 William street. Mr. Alling has made a specialty of corporation and financial law. He was one of the organizers of the Colonial Trust Company, and is one of the attorneys of the company. He has organized a large number of other corporations and financial institutions, and has acted as legal adviser for banks and trusts and insurance companies. The general practice of his firm is large and remunerative. In the social and political life of the city Mr. Alling has been an important factor. He is a member of the Metropolitan, Manhattan, Reform, Democratic and Cornell University Clubs; the Bar Association, and the New England Society, New York Historical Society and the New York Biographical and Genealogical Society. He is also connected with other political, social and literary organizations.

Although a Democrat by political belief, Mr. Alling took a prominent part in the sound money organization of 1896, and by his energy and activity greatly aided in the success of the movement. In June, 1894, he married Miss Louise Floyd Smith, a descendant of old American Revolutionary stock. Mrs. Alling is a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and takes an active part in the social life and charitable work of the city.

PART II.

JOHN ALLING, SENIOR, AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

His origin and early history, or when he came to New Haven, are unknown, but he is supposed to have been born in England and to have come a few years later than Roger. His marriage is the first recorded of any Allen, or Alling, in New Haven, and is as follows: John Allin married Elling Bradley, October 14, 1652. Roger had married there about ten years prior to this, but the record is not found. John was no doubt a relative of Roger; tradition makes him cousin, but the recorded evidence is wanting. If not related, it would be a wonderful coincidence that these two men, of the same name, should be intimate companions, naming five of their children alike, and were more closely associated in life as acquaintances and friends than we expect to find among those not of kin. So it would seem there can hardly be a doubt but the tradition that Roger and John were cousins, is true, and that it was a mutual agreement with them to change the English form of their name from Allen to Alling. As they are the only known emigrants who thus spelled their name, it is pretty certain they were the progenitors of all the Allings in the United States, and they are entitled to have their names included in this book. For a century all of the descendants of both Roger, 1st, and John, Sr., adhered to their adopted form of the name. About the first found who reverted to Allen—the form of their forefathers—was Nathan 2d, born in 1729, and died in 1812, who, with his eight children, appear to have adopted Allen, to which their descendants have all conformed except Merit, a son of Nathan, 3d, who, with his posterity, spell Alling. It is thought, however, that the larger part of the offspring of John, Sr., spell Allen, while a majority of the lineage of Roger, 1st, retain Alling. John took the oath of allegiance and fidelity on the 4th of April, 1654, and on the 17th day of the third month, 1658, was admit-

ted a freeman and took the freeman's charge.* He was an energetic and successful planter and stood well among the early settlers of the colony. His family record and descendants follow.

I, John Alling, New Haven in New England being very sick in body, but of sound understanding do now make my last Will and Testament.

Imprimis—I give my soul to Jesus Christ who purchased it, and my body to be decently buried. After my just debts are paid, I give my worldly goods to my beloved wife and children as followeth, viz.:

I give and bequeath to my oldest son John Allin, that farm I bought of Henry Gleson (Glover?) on Homes Race containing 43¹/₂ acres together with a house standing upon it and all the appurtenances thereto belonging. Item—Two acres and a half of land in the suburbs quarter, by the cherry trees, it was formerly Richard Beechers—though not the corne growing upon the land. Item—A two year

I do give to my beloved wife and my son Samuel Allen the family homestead, while Samuel lives with his mother, and in case Samuel marry, my wife shall have ye new end of ye house, and half ye barn and half ye benefit of ye orchard, to be at her disposal while she lives, and after her decease the whole to return to my son Samuel. Item—I do give to my beloved wife the household goods within doors to be at her disposal. Item—I do give to my son Samuel fourteen acres of land in the suburbs quarter, about one acre of meadow, more or less, joining and lying on both sides of path ye leads to ye Oyster Point. Item—three acres of land in ye Yorkshire quarter lying between Henry Gibson and Philip Alcocks land, moreover two acres of land between ye coppis lying between John Thompson, Jun., and Isaack Beecher, Jun., and five acres in ye second division, butting on ye highway ye runs to Daniel Thomas. Item—my third division containing forty acres lying on ye west side of Mill River bounded by land of Robert Lines (Lewis?) Jun. and John Smith.

Item—I do give to my beloved wife and son Samuel all my corne that is upon the ground to be at their disposal.

Item—I do give to my son Hobson's children—namely Samuel and Elizabeth, five pounds. Item—I do give to my daughter Hannah Scranton five pounds. Item—I do give to my daughter Mary Guttowage (Goodrich?) five pounds, and respecting my grandchildren Ebenezer and Mary Wilcocks, I leave them to the disposal of my wife and my son Samuel, in case they stay with them, but if their father will take them away, my will is that he shall pay twenty pounds to my executor in current pay, and my will is that if my granddaughter Mary Wilcocks do stay till she is of age, she shall have five pounds.

Item—I do give to my daughter Sarah twenty pounds.

I do appoint my wife and my son Samuel to be my executors, to pay out of my estate the above mentioned legacies, to receive all just debts due to my estate and pay all just debts due from it.

Item—All ye profits from my estate indoors or without not herein mentioned, I do give to my wife and son Samuel to be

at their disposal. Also my will is that my son Samuel do comfortably provide for his mother while she lives, as witness my hand and seal this sixth day of May Anno Domini 1689.

New Haven Manuscript Records, p 416—John Allin, Sen., a planter of New Haven, having stood in peaceable and quiet possession of his lot and buildings for more than thirty years, in 1687 has his title confirmed to him.

Manuscript Records, Vol. I. b. p. 43, John Allin, Sen., husbandman, deeds to his loving son John Alling, Jr., a tract at a place called Homes Race, 43½ acres, bounded on the west by the line between Milford and New Haven; also, a lot in the suburbs quarter, 2 acres, at a place called Cherry Trees, March 11, 1689. ¹ John Alling, Sen., had two sons and six daughters, of these Martha, the youngest, died in infancy. ² Elizabeth, the eldest, married John Hobson, or Hopson, and died before her father, leaving two children, Samuel and Elizabeth. ³ Lydia married ——— Wilcocks, also died before her father, leaving two children, Ebenezer and Mary. ⁴ Hannah married ——— Scranton. ⁵ John, his oldest son, was a weaver or clothier, and appears to have settled at a place called Homes Race, near the Milford line. In his will, copied below, he makes no mention of his wife or son Samuel, who were, doubtless, both dead before the will was written, which was in court June 25, 1744, as follows:

In the name of God, Amen.

The 5th day of May, 1739—I, Samuel Alling, of New Haven, Connecticut, being aged and infirm in body but of sound mind and memory (for which I desire to bless God), and therefore calling to mind the uncertainty of life and that it is appointed unto all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament; that is to say, principally and first of all, I give and recommend my soul to God who gave it me, and my body to the earth to be decently buried, all at the discretion of my executor, hereinafter named, and as touching such worldly goods or estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life; I give, devise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form, my just debts and funeral expenses and charges and time in settling my estate being duly paid out of my movable effects.

Item—Having heretofore given to my eldest son Nathan Alling, sundrys by deed, in addition thereto, I do now give, devise and bequeath unto my said loving son Nathan Alling, and to his heirs and assigns forever, all that land lying over against his house across the highway, which I bought of Capt. Whiting, and one acre and a half of meadow, in the suburbs quarter, formerly Thompson's, and 12 acres of land lying on Poplar Hill, between his own land and Nathan Bradley's, and all my meadow at the West Side, near the place called Springfield, and also five acres of land lying by Stephen Row's farm, said farm on the north, and Samuel Chatterton's land at Poplar Hill, on the south, upon this condition only, that my said son pay to my daughter Hannah, the full value of said five acres in six months after my decease. Also, I give to my said son Nathan, the one-half of what team and tackling for a team, and all husbandry utensils I shall leave at my decease. I also give unto him my seventh division of land to be laid out, and all my undivided lands.

Item—As to my son John, I delivered to him while here his full portion of my estate, but I do now order my son Ebenezer to pay the sum of twenty pounds in equal shares to my son John Alling's children as they respectively arrive to lawful age.

Item—I give, devise and bequeath to my loving son, Ebenezer Alling, and to his heirs and assigns forever, all and singular, my house, barn, orchard and whole farm of land, lying above Dorman's (so called), where I formerly dwelt, only reserving to my three daughters, Sarah, Mary and Hannah the use and improvement of the fruits of half of my orchard aforesaid, for the term of ten years from this date, to be equally divided between these three, always provided, upon this condition, that my said son Ebenezer pay to my four daughters, Lydia, Mary, Sarah and Hannah the sum of eighty pounds in such time and manner as I shall hereafter in this my will direct, also I give my said son Ebenezer the other half of what team and tackling for a team and husbandry utensils I shall leave.

Item—As to my three daughters, Lydia, Sarah and Mary, who are already married, having delivered to each of them at marriage or since the sum of fifty pounds, as near as I can come at it in value, but if either of them have not re-

ceived that sum, my will and pleasure is that the sum of fifty pounds be made up to each of them out of the four score pounds to be paid by my son Ebenezer.

Item—I give and bequeath to my loving daughter Hannah Alling the sum of fifty pounds to be paid to her within six months after my decease, unless I shall pay said sum or any part thereof to her and also the five acres of land or said value thereof before mentioned in the devise to my son Nathan and what household goods is laid by for her to be accounted a part of said fifty pounds.

Item—I give and bequeath to my aforesaid four daughters, or those that shall legally represent them, all the remainder of movable estate in said house, equally between them to be divided, and what linen my daughter Hannah hath spun herself shall not be accounted any part of my estate.

Item—I give to my grandson, David Alling—Nathan's son—my shortest gun, and to his brother Samuel, my longer gun.

Item—All the residue of my personal estate I give and devise to my son Nathan and my daughter Hannah, equally to be divided between them, but the four score pounds aforesaid, after my three married daughters are made up fifty pounds aforesaid, the remainder to be equally divided amongst my four daughters or that legally represent them. Lastly, I do by these presents nominate and appoint my loving sons, Nathan Alling and Ebenezer Alling, to be the executors of this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all former wills and testaments by me made, confirming this and no other to be my last Will and Testament.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal in New Haven, the day and date first before written.

To the first Ecclesiastical Society in East Hamden and the School Society in Mt. Carmel \$500 each, and divided the remainder equally among his living nephews and nieces at the decease of his wife, which distribution was made the 16th day of May, 1851. This gave the persons named below \$102 each.

He was a school-teacher as well as a poet, and kept a daily record of the weather, twenty-five years of which he published, beginning April 1, 1785, entitled: "A Register of the Weather, or an account of the several rains, snow storms, depth of each snow, hail and thunder, with some account of the weather each day, and some other events worthy of notice for the last twenty-five years, ending March 3, 1810. From observations taken most of the time in Hamden, near New Haven, in Connecticut, lat. 41, 23, N.; lon. 73, 14, W."

The Franklin Elm—Jerry Alling, a "poet and pedagogue," brought it on his back from Hamden Plains and sold it to Thaddeus Beecher for a pint of rum and some other trifles. It was planted on the day of Franklin's death, April 17, 1790. Its girth, two feet from the ground, is sixteen feet. This noble tree spreads its graceful branches as a welcome and a shelter to all who make pilgrimages to New Haven. * * * In its shade is the "Town Pump," one of the old landmarks which thirsty people would regret to see removed. It was given to the city long ago, by Mr. Douglas of Middletown.

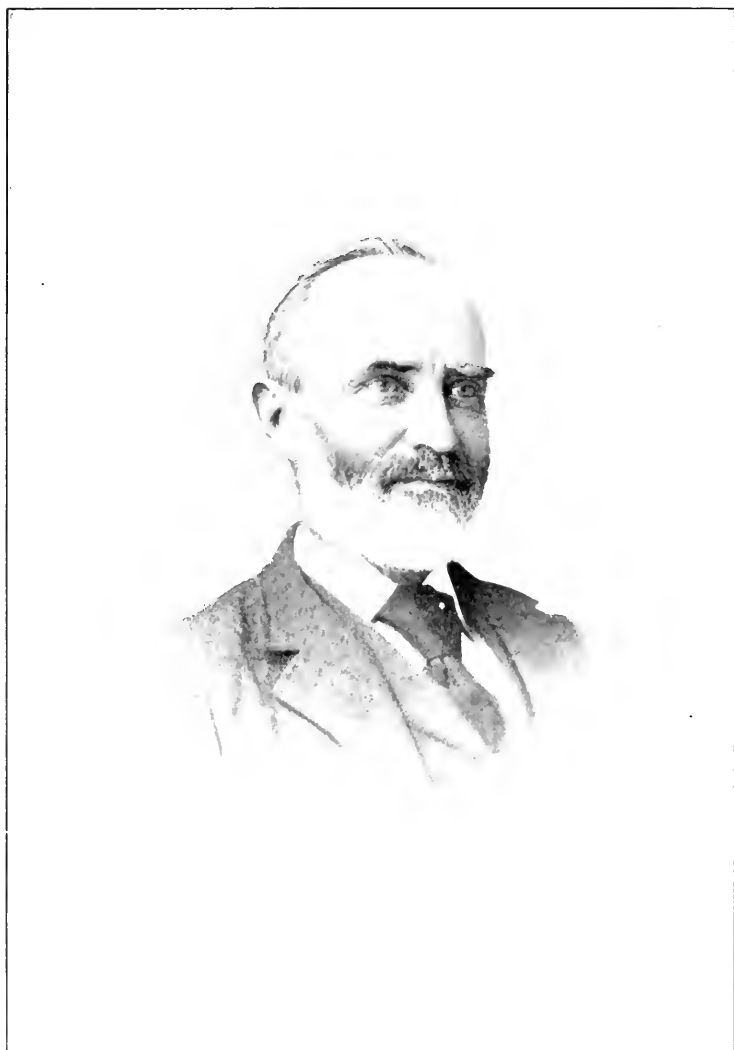
End of the descendants of John Alling, Sen.

SKETCH OF GEORGE P. ALLEN.

The compiler having finished his record of the descendants of Roger and John Alling, ventures to show his face for a good-bye bow to his kin; and as he offered an apology at the beginning, so now at the ending, feels justified in explaining the place given him by the engraver's art.

Having given my father the honorary frontispiece page, and one of my brothers a picture and sketch a proper setting, it was my desire and determination not to obtrude our immediate family further on the time or attention of the reader, for this work was not "begun, continued or ended" for any ostentatious display of self, but to give the family and the world a record of an eminently worthy, though not an illustrious clan; but after it was decided to admit cuts and sketches of a few representatives of the family stock, and the engravings and sketches were mostly ready for the book, it was learned by a few friends that my own face was not to appear. This raised an unlooked-for protest, and by earnest pleadings, cajolery and reproaches I have been induced at the eleventh hour to show my phiz, and with it give a brief account of myself.

Until I was sixteen years of age I was a regular New England farmer boy; a few of the old people will know what that was—constant work six days in the week—except while at school, and then kept busy nights and mornings; by this time I had learned of the growing fashion of a better education for the boys than was acquired from the district schools, and having a preference for study rather than hoeing corn and digging stones and potatoes, I prevailed on my father to send me to school, charging me the cost, to be as a part of my inheritance from his estate and an offset to the work of my older brothers, who served him faithfully till 21 years old. Thus equipped I went to the best teachers available, Ensign of Morris, Howard of Warren, Gunn of Washington, and Thompson of South Britain, and from 16 to 24 was mostly at study or teaching, except during the summer vacations,



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which always covered the period of haymaking, then all done by hand, from cutting the grass to stowing it away in the barn, in which, for about six weeks, I was an active participant in my father's meadows.

Then, in 1850, I went into a drug store and engaged in that business in Woodbury, from which I permanently retired in 1874, to care for a small farm previously purchased. This I sold in 1881, and since then had "no visible means of support." In the meantime, in 1851, I married Julia A., daughter of Ebenezer and Mary (Orton) Finch, who, in 1872, was stricken down with a painful spinal disease, rendering her for years almost entirely helpless, and in 1876 her physician advised the spending the winter with her in Florida. This we did, and though she was unable to stand or take a step alone on the way, on our return she was so improved as to walk unaided, and was comparatively comfortable, though still an invalid. Thus encouraged by the healing balm of a mild and sunny winter, I purchased an old house and lot beautifully situated on the west bank of the St. Johns river at New Berlin, twelve miles below Jacksonville, Florida. Here I built a comfortable house adapted to and rented for keeping boarders, and we have mostly spent our winters in it since, Mrs. A. gaining year by year till February, 1883, she suddenly sickened and died there. Two years later I married Mrs. Wealthy A. Root, widow of Deacon Seth Hollister of Woodbury, and with her have led the same migratory life—in Connecticut summers and in Florida winters.

For thirty-five years a communicant in the Episcopal Church, but the advancing and rising grade of churchmanship became too high and steep for me to climb; which forced a withdrawal, and three years since I united with the Congregational denomination. I was not a "born leader," in political, religious and civil life, always preferring to serve as a private rather than as an official guide, and while not desiring to shirk the duties and responsibilities of a good citizen, have been induced to accept but few of the places offered as a public servant.

About six years ago—as stated in my introductory apology—I sat about looking up my relatives, and here I am at the end of the list of my Alling-Allen kindred, with heart and

hand open for a friendly greeting, with no avaricious desires—beyond the printer's bill—upon your purses. Pleading forbearance and mild castigations for multiplied shortcomings, I would now and here make a most gracious "Good Bye Bow" to all my relatives, assuring you that our latch-string will always be out for a cordial welcome, and pen ready to respond to any questions or obscurities discovered in this book; for which address
