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INTRODUCTION.

A SEARCH among the New England records seems to indicate that but seven persons bearing the name of Whitman emigrated to America prior to 1680; these are:

- 1. John Whitman, the Ancestor.
- 2. Zachariah Whitman, a brother of the Ancestor. According to Hutton he came in the "ship Truelove, Jo. Gibbs, Master," leaving London, Sept. 19, 1635. The ship's register give the names of "Zacharia Whitman," aged 40; "Sara Whitman," aged 25; "Zacha Whitman," aged 21: the child probably died soon after his arrival, as no mention is afterwards made of him. Zachariah settled first in Dorchester. The Dorchester records show that Jan. 16, 1636, "Zachariah Whiteman and Henry Withington" were ordered "to vew the pale in the feild next to their houses." In the list of allotments of pasture to Dorchester citizens, under date of March 18, 16378, "Mr. Whitman" was allowed "134 akers on the necke;" also "131 akers of the Cowes pasture;" his name appears third on the list, only preceded by those of "Mr. Stoughton" and "Mr. Glover;" his position on this list, together with the prefix of "Mr.," indicate that he was a man of means and position. The early settlement of the New Haven Colony was mostly by Dorchester people, who sailed from Boston, March 30, 1638; their first Sunday, April 18, was observed by Mr. Davenport preaching

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in the morning and Mr. Prudden in the afternoon. Some differences soon occurred in the colony between the friends of Mr. Davenport and Mr. Prudden, which occasioned the separation of the followers of the latter gentleman, and although they were all given allotments of lands in the so-called "Hertfordshire quarter," still they seem to have moved in a body to their new settlement of Milford. This purchase was made from the Indians, Feb. 12, 1639, the deed being taken by William Fowler, Edmund Tapp, Zachariah Whitman, Benjamin Fenn and Alexander Bryan in trust for the planters. The first enrollment was made Nov. 29, 1639, Zachariah Whitman heading the list.

The church records of Milford contain the following entry in the handwriting of Mr. Prudden: "At Milford, I, Peter Prudden, was called to ye office of a Pastour in this Church, and ordained at New Haven by Zachariah Whitman, William Fowler, Edmund Tapp, designated by ye Church for that purpose, Zachariah Whitman being ye Moderator for that meeting, in a day of solemn humiliation, upon ye 3rd Saturday in April, being, I remember, ye 18th day of April, 1640."

At a previous meeting, held in New Haven, Aug. 22, 1639, Zachariah Whitman had been chosen one of the "seven pillars" of the Milford Church.

In the list of Milord planters, made in 1643, the family of Zachariah Whitman was entered as comprising two persons and "800 estates."

June 26, 1645, Zachariah Whitman was ordained "Ruling Elder," which position he retained till his death, as the records show that the second minister, Mr. Roger Newton, was installed, Aug. 22, 1660, by "Elder Whitman" and deacon John Fletcher and Robert Treat, Esq.

He was chosen a delegate to the "General Court," held April 3, 1644.

In the original plan of New Haven, made 1641, Mr. Whitman was allotted a plot of ground in the "Hertford-

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shire quarter," now the S. W. corner of Chapel and College streets; he retained his interest in this plot till 1647, when he transferred it to Mr. Bracey.

He d. April 23, 1663; his wife d. (buried Jan. 2, 1670/71) leaving a nuncupative will, in which she mentions her "cousins," George Clark, John Streame, Zachary Whitman; the inventory amounted to £359. The following copy of the will of Zachariah Whitman was obtained from the Probate records in New Haven:

THE LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT OF ZACHARY WHITMAN OF MILFORD, DECEASED.

THE 24TH OF YE 2D MONTH, 1666.

Memorandum that I, Zachary Whitman of Milford, in the Colony of Connecticut, being weake of body but of perfect memory, doe make this my last will and testament in manner & forme as followeth:

Item. I give to Mr. Roger Newton five pound.

Item. I give to my cousin, Zachary Whitman, my brother's son, my house & land at ye decease of my wife.

Item. I give to my cousin, Zachary Whitman, all the bookes my wife can spare.

Item. I give to my cousin, George Clarke, twenty pounds, to be payd, ten pound in one yeare's end, and ten pound at ye end of ye next yeare.

Item. I give to my cousin, John Streame, ten pound at this yeare's end, ten pound at ye next yeare's end to be payd.

Item. I give Doctor Preston's books to my cousin, Clarke, and my cousin, Streame.

Item. I leave ye rest of my estate to my wife & make her my Executrix.

I desire Mr. ifen, Thomas Welsh, Thomas Wheeler, Richard Plat, to see this my will & testament fulfilled.

3. The name of Henry Whitman appears among the early proprietors of Weymouth, in 1651 receiving 32 lots; there is, however, but this single reference, but whether it was an error of record, or he d. without issue soon after, is unknown.

- 4. In the list of persons made free, May 19, 1680, is the name of Abraham Whitman of Weymouth; this is also an isolated entry, and the name does not again occur.
- 5. Hutton mentions among the passengers by the ship "Abigail," June 29, 1635, the names of "Robert Whiteman" and wife "Susan;" he was one of the early settlers of Essex and Old Norfolk, and, 1641, appears as one of the common proprietors of Ipswich. At a meeting of the General Court, held May 6, 1646, Robert Whitman of Ipswich was excused from guard duty on account of old age. Judge Whitman states that his name appears as one of the proprietors of Ipswich as late as 1679; he also states that he was illiterate, as he executed several conveyances by making his mark.

Robert left a large number of descendants, among whom the surname of "Davis" was of frequent occurrence; many of them settled in Boston, and followed the trade of caulker. The early interments, in the "Copps Hill Burying Ground," of persons by the name of Whitman, were evidently of this family; several Whitmans appear on the records of Hingham that were probably also of this branch. The last "Davis Whitman" d. without male issue at Lancaster, Mass., 1844, aged 82, where for many years he had held the office of Town Clerk and had been active in the government of the town. The writer has found no others who could be traced back to this Robert.

6. The name of "Valentine Whitman" occurs among the first settlers of Providence, R. I.; he is mentioned as acting as interpreter to the Indians; he d. Jan. 26, 1701, having had, according to Providence records, three daughters and one son, Valentine, Jr. From this family are descended nearly all those persons bearing the name of Whitman who reside in Rhode Island, also a majority of the Whitmans who settled in Vermont and Northern New York.

7. At a meeting of the General Court of New He. 22 held Oct. 17, 1655, reference is made to Joseph White of Stratford, Ct.; May 12, 1664, Joseph Whitman of Huntington, Long Island, was made a freeman of the New Haven Colony; without doubt these entries refer to the same person.

From this Huntington family are descended the Long Island Whitmans, many of the name who settled in Central New York and Canada, and who are scattered over the Western country; it is not known whether the Pennsylvania family came from this Joseph or from an early German emigration to Maryland. Walt Whitman,

the poet, is a descendant of this Joseph.

8. There are a large number of families of Whitmans who are descended from emigrants coming after 1700; excepting a Scotch family in North Carolina they are all of German descent; the most numerous of these families is one descended from John Whitman, b. Germany, Nov. 24, 1734, and Mary Kiblingen his wife, b. Germany, July 8, 1745; he settled in Ashburnham, Mass., his eldest son being born in that town, Feb. 22, 1769; he left a family of four sons and four daughters.

9. There is another family, the principal members of which are settled in Springfield and Westfield, Mass., and Troy, N. Y.; they are the descendants of Rev. Jesse Wightman, b. Groton, Ct., 1783, son of Rev. Timothy Wightman of Groton, he the son of Valentine Wightman, b. No. Kingston, R. I., 1681. The father of Valentine, tradition reports, was one of five brothers who came to this country, all of whom were Baptists. As they settled in Rhode Island, it is possible that the Valentine Whitman of Providence was one of them.

The Rev. Jesse, above referred to, came to Springfield, Mass., about 1800, was the first Pastor of the First Baptist Church of West Springfield, and for some reason changed his name to "Whitman"

"origin. Such curiosity seems to be natural, and, at the "same time, indicative of a respectful regard to those but "for whom we should not have existed. If so fortunate as "to find them worthy and respectable the emotion excited "is agreeable; and the mind delights to dwell in contem-"plation upon the incidents of their lives. Biography is at "all times pleasing and the source of valuable instruction. "How much more so when the subject is a relative or an "immediate ancestor.

"The posterity of John Whitman, who, by way of dis"tinction in these sketches, will often be denominated the
"Ancestor, will seldom find occasion to blush upon look"ing back upon the past lives of those from whom they
"have derived their origin. Fortunate, indeed, may the
"generations now in being esteem themselves, if they can
"be sure to bequeath to their posterity an equal source of
"felicitation.

"A speculation of this kind may, by many, be deemed "unprofitable. Such, however, are but superficial observers. No virtuously disposed mind can look back upon a long line of truly venerable ancestors without feeling his motive to a virtuous life strengthened. He can scarcely help feeling that it is not for him to be the first to bring disgrace upon his lineage. It will, more-vover, lead him to reflect that his posterity also will be looking back and comparing his life with that of his progenitors. And who in such case can fail to feel as a father in the presence of his offspring? And that sad indeed would it be to find them crimsoned with shame at witnessing in him a mortifying exemplar.

"The following sketches are confined principally to the four first generations, including the common ancestor. "Under each member of the fourth generation, however, "will be found a genealogical statement of his posterity "for one or more generations further. Many errors will "doubtless be discovered, especially as to the later genera-

"tions. Those now in being are so numerous and so "much scattered, that full and distinct information is not "easy to be obtained concerning them. As it respects the "female branches, it has not been practicable to trace their "descendants in any instance to any considerable extent."

An almost complete record has been obtained of the male descendants of all of the sons of the Ancestor except John². Continued and careful investigation has, however, failed to complete in this line the families of John⁵, Jesse⁵, Samuel⁵ and Daniel¹.

It is hoped to the reward of his labors will be received in the indulgence and favorable commendation of the readers.



FIRST GENERATION.

1. John Whitman, one of the earliest settlers of the town of Weymouth, in the State of Massachusetts, is the Ancestor, if not of all, vet of nearly all of the name of Whitman, as well as of an equal number, at least, bearing other names, in this country. He came from England. but from what particular part of it cannot be ascertained. He may have originated from Holt, in the county of Norfolk. The name of Whiteman has existed there. In the list of those copied into Winthrop's Journal, who were admitted freemen, the name of the above John is spelled with an e, as are those of Holt. Governor Winthrop and his company came principally from the vicinity, and, probably, some of them, from the town of Holt. And John came over, if not at the same time, yet not many years after, and attached himself to the same company, and, it may be presumed, was allured thither by his neighbors and friends, who either came with or had preceded him a few years. The e may have been omitted by him, as he and his pesterity have ever written their names without it.

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There was, however, a John Whitman, mentioned by Fox, in his Martyrology, who was of Rye, near Dover, and, as it would seem, much of an enthusiast. He left his family at Rye in 1572, abruptly, and crossed over to Ostend, and there demeaning himself fanatically and offensively to the Roman Catholics of that place, was apprehended and consigned to the flames, in which he perished without repining and in seeming exultation. He was forty-nine years of age and left a large family at Rye. It is possible that our Ancestor, who was born near the commencement of the succeeding century, may have been grandson of the martyr.

Our Ancestor must have arrived in this country some time, and probably some years, prior to December, 1638, when, as it appears by Winthrop's Journal, he was made free, viz: admitted to the rights and privileges of a citizen. This was not usually admissible until after a probationary residence of some time, and never until after admission as a member of some established church. He probably settled at Weymouth,* twelve miles south of Boston, soon after his arrival, but at what precise period cannot be ascertained. He was, by the Governor and assistants, appointed an ensign there in 1645, which was, probably, the first military appointment in that town. In the same year he was, by the same authority, with two others,

* The town of Weymouth lies on the south side of a navigable stream called Fore River, which separates it from Braintree. By the means of its packets it has ever had an intimate connection with Boston. The first attempt at a settlement there was 1622, at which time a company from England had been sent out for the purpose under the patronage of a mercantile gentleman by the name of Weston. This attempt, owing to the hostility of the Indians, provoked by the improvidence and misdemeanors of the emigrants, proved unfortunate, and in 1623 was abandoned. In 1624, Capt. Robert Gorges, son of Sir Ferdinando Gorges, renewed the attempt, and a settlement was commenced by emigrants from Weymouth in England, of good character and maintained, and in 1633, the place was incorporated as a town. Its local situation secured to it many advantages, being conveniently accessible from the sea, and enjoying every facility for being supplied with the products of the ocean as well as of the land, and having the market of the metropolis close at hand.

appointed "to end small controversies" there. What authority was exercised under the latter commission is not precisely known, but, probably, not very dissimilar to that which was subsequently expected of justices of the peace. He was also deacon of the church there, probably from its first establishment, until his death, which was on November 13, 1692.

He must have lived to a very advanced age, probably but little, if any, short of ninety years. This supposition is strengthened by the fact, that the youngest of his four sons, who was probably, the youngest of nine children, was born in 1644. And his oldest son, Thomas, gave a deposition in 1679, by which it appears that he was born in 1629. Some of the daughters may have been older, and they probably were, as it is scarcely to be presumed that the nine children were all born in the course of fifteen years; especially as their parents were separated for four years or more of the time, the family not having removed to this country till about 1641. The tradition, among the descendants of Thomas, has been that he was about twelve years old when he was brought to this country. Thus it results, as probable, that the Ancestor was married not far from 1625; and early marriages not being so common in England as in this country, it may be reasonable to suppose that he was not married till twenty-three years of age. This would make him about ninety at his decease.

He had a brother, Zachariah, who emigrated at the time he did, or soon after; and settled in Milford, in Connecticut, who is spoken of in the church records and history of that town as early as 1639. He was one of the ruling elders, and assisted at the ordination, in that town, of the Rev. Roger Newton, by the imposition of hands. These and some other circumstances concerning him are noticed in Trumbull's History. When he died is not known; but probably not until advanced in years. He left no issue. His estate in Milford he bequeathed to his




nephew, the Rev. Zechariah Whitman, son of our Ancestor. The farm which he occupied is called the Whitman farm to this day, and is now in the occupation of a man by the name of Fenn.

There was a Robert Whitman, also, who settled at Ipswich. Whether he was a brother, or but a relative, or neither, of the Ancestor, is not ascertained. He came over about the same time and arrived at the same place, and settled in the same colony. He was illiterate while the others were well educated, which makes it doubtful if he were of the same family. Whether he left any issue cannot be certainly known. There is no trace of any in the records, or in the recollection of the elderly people of Ipswich. And what he did with his estate is not known. There are conveyances on record to and from him and his wife Susan. And in 1679, he was recognized as one of the proprietors of the common lands in Ipswich, and his name appears on the records there on various occasions at that period.

If he left any posterity, a Francis Whitman, a shipwright, in Boston, who died in 1708, aged fifty years, may have been his son. He was not the son or grandson of our Ancestor. He left posterity in Boston, viz: Francis, Mary and Sarah. His widow Mary survived him; and, with her children, made a deed of land on Essex street, in Boston, in 1718. Francis, the son, is called ship-wright also; and was without doubt the same who was, in 1755, Captain of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company in Boston. And Elizabeth Whitman, a widow, who made her will in Boston, in 1760, and who therein mentions a Francis Whitman as her son, was doubtless his widow. And the latter Francis was probably an only son, if not an only child. And it is not ascertained that he left any posterity. With him probably ended the descendants in the male line of the first Francis.

There was, at an early period, in Providence, R. I., a



Valentine Whitman. He is mentioned in some of the ancient documents as an interpreter to the Indians. What posterity he left, or what became of him, is not certainly known. The family by the name of Whitman, who have been for many years inhabitants of Providence, were not of his posterity. There are, however, in the town of Warwick, in R. I., a progeny, who may and probably have descended from him. They cannot be traced to any other origin. And the name of Valentine is said to be common among them. Whether he was a brother, or any connection of our Ancestor, cannot be ascertained. He probably emigrated about the same time.

John, Zachariah, Robert and Valentine are, it is believed, the only persons of the name that ever emigrated to New England. They must have emigrated about the same time. These circumstances seem to render it probable that they were at least relatives. John and Zachariah are known to have been brothers. It is most probable the others were but relatives to these in a more remote degree. If they had been brothers, some trace of it would have been discoverable from what had been preserved from John and Zachariah.

John Whitman owned and lived upon a farm adjoining the north side of the highway, leading by the north side of the meeting-house of the north parish in Weymouth, and directly off against it, and extending to Weymouth river; and his dwelling-house was situated near the center of it. A part of the dwelling-house now remaining there is said to be 150 years old. If so, the Ancestor must have resided in it a dozen years before his death. It was built in the old style, being a wooden house, two stories in front, facing the meeting-house, and one in the rear towards the river, and well preserved with paint.

The same farm, entire, has descended, by bequest, from father to son, until 1806, when the Aucestor's great grandson, Abiah, dying without issue, leaving two widowed

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sisters, his heirs-at-law, one of them, a Mrs. Salisbury, purchased out the other, and has left it to her posterity, one or more of whom now own and occupy it. Thus it still remains, and ever has remained, in unbroken succession, in its first possessor and his descendants, for nearly two centuries—an instance the like of which does not often occur.

He was undoubtedly a worthy man. His enterprise had brought him to a new country, probably with but little if any estate. He had, like most adventurers into a new country, his own fortune to achieve. The wilderness was alone open to him. An undaunted resolution must have urged him forward. His wife and several children had been left in the country from which he had migratedthree thousand miles of ocean intervening between them. His only hope of again rejoining them, with emotions of unalloyed felicity, depended on his ability to carve from the wilderness the source of a comfortable subsistence. Affection on the one hand, and almost desperation on the other, stimulated his exertions. Joy and sadness must have alternated in his breast, as the idols of his affection, or the prospect before him, were uppermost in his mind. Years had elapsed before he could be allowed to realize that the day of anxiety and solicitude had passed away. In 1641, however, according to traditionary account, the measure of his felicity was made full by the arrival of his family, and their establishment on the venerated spot, in the town of Weymouth, where he had unremittingly toiled in anticipation of this consummation of his fondest hopes. There he would seem to have been trebly blessed with competency, offspring and length of days—his competency the fruit of industry, his offspring the gift of heaven, and his length of days the reward of temperance and virtue.

In him his posterity have an example worthy of imitation. His virtues were not of the obtrusive kind, nor adapted to catch the popular admiration. He was, proba-

bly, incapable of exploits that would astonish the crowd; or, if he was, his ambition did not prompt him to the attempt. Many a man has been lauded to the skies for the tricks of a mere mountebank without one single virtue to recommend him. Nine-tenths of the heroes of all times are of this order. Such is human nature, and so prone to the marvelous, and to be dazzled with external show and pomp, and to be blinded by it, and utterly reckless of what is simple, amiable and really praiseworthy!

But our ancestor, who feared God and hated covetousness; who did good continually all the days of a long life; who by honest industry and without offence to any one nurtured and educated a large family, and fitted them to become citizens worthy of any country; who was an exemplar to all around him; who braved and endured hardships and privations few can realize; and finally, who fulfilled every civil, religious and moral obligation, must not be forgotten by his numerous posterity. His virtues should be their virtues, and his history should be deeply engraven on their minds. To reverence and venerate our ancestors would seem to be but an instinct of nature. At any rate, it is a dictate of humanity, in every form of existence, from the most savage to the most civilized state, and so ordered for wise purposes. From veneration, imitation, if not emulation, will follow. Let us then cherish and not endeavor to extinguish this propensity. Let us honor our progenitors that our days may be many in the land which the Lord our God hath given us.

The foregoing has been taken from Judge Whitman's pamphlet published in 1821; recent researches have enabled the author to obtain some additional data.

(1.) As to the time of his arrival in this country a correspondent has sent a note stating that he arrived in the ship Confidence, Dec., 1638, but is unable to give his authority; the only trouble with this date is, that if authentic, he was made a freeman the same month, a

rather unusual occurrence, though his brother had already been in the country since 1635, and was a prominent member of the settlement at Dorchester, which may have accounted for this early addition to the list of freemen.

(2.) The exact date of his settlement in Weymouth has not been ascertained, but he appears among those who received allotments of land in the list of 1642; his share is described in the Weymouth records as:

"Twenty and one acres in the west ffield, fifteene of them upland and six of salt marsh, bounded on the east with a high waie, on the west and north with a creeke, on the south with land of Walter Harris-flower acres and halfe on the western neck bounded on the east with a creeke, on the west with a meadow, on the north the land of Thomas Streame and the land of Mr. Jenner on the south-eleven acres in Harrison's Rainge first given to himselfe, the land of William Hues on the east, a swamp on the west, the land of Hugh Roe on the north and Mr. Newman on the south—sixty acres by the great pond first given to Mr. Hull, bounded on the east with land of William Carpenter, on the west with a swamp and the pond on the south-flour acres of ffresh marsh first given to Mr. Hull, bounded with a creek on the east and Edward Benete's marsh on the south."

In the list of 1651 Ensign Whitman is given 12 lots of land, and on the list of 1663 he receives 81 lots comprising 60 acres.

The first deed on record to John Whitman bears date 10.28, 1649, in which Thomas Jenner of Charlestown grants to Elder Bates and John Whitman of Weymouth "one dwelling house at Weymouth (now in possession of John King), two orchards and twenty-one acres adjoining more or less; also twelve acres at ye western neck, be it more or less; also half an acre upon Grape Island, be it more or less; also forty acres, which is his own pp (proper) lot, be it more or less, and eighteen acres which was his



father's; also ye round marsh, being four acres more or less, and one acre of fresh marsh adjoining, and six acres of marsh above ye fresh pond and a wood lot on Hingham side."

The first deed on record made by John Whitman bears date March 19, 1648, by which he sells to William Hayward about 22 acres of land in "Braintry" which he had purchased of James Nash.

These entries show that he must have been one of the most extensive holders of real estate in the town.

- (3.) His office of ensign he held till March 16, 1680, when he was relieved from further duty and Ephraim Hunt, Jr., appointed in his place.
- (4.) At a session of the General Court held May 15, 1664, on the occasion of John Barrell and Richard Wayer being sent as messengers to the Indians, John Whitman was allowed four shillings a day "for his paynes" and use of "his horse in ye journey he was employed in for the countrye's services to the Narrowgansetts."

May 14, 1645, the Court granted a petition of "the Town Weymouth" that Capt. Perkins, William Torrey and John Whitman may be authorized by the Court to hear and determine as committees all actions in the town under 20 shillings; the following year, Nov. 4, 1646, "Lest. Tory," John Whitman and Thomas Dyer were chosen to end small causes and controversies at Weymouth.

- (5.) The Whitman Homestead remained in the family till 1830; Judge Whitman's book was written in 1821.
- (6.) In the Weymouth records is found this entry: "died 18.17, 1662, Ruth, wife of John Whitman;" there is evidently an error as to date, which should probably read: "d. 8.17, 1662;" some think this was the wife of John¹, while others think it refers to Ruth Reed, wife of John². The date of the birth of the eldest child of John², viz: Ruth, b. Feb. 1, 1663, would, however, indicate that it must be the wife of John¹. The loss of the early church



records on which the name of the wife of John would appear destroys any opportunity of clearing the mystery

regarding her name.

(7.) Judge Whitman suggests that John came from Holt; in some branches of the family there is a tradition that he came from Coventry; I am, however, of the opinion that he came from Herefordshire, basing my opinion on the fact that when Zachariah, the brother of John¹, settled in New Haven, he located in the so-called "Herefordshire quarter;" the settlers in this "quarter," under the lead of Peter Prudden, a Hereford minister, abandoned New Haven in a body and settled at Milford. It seems hardly probable that Zachariah should during his brief residence in this country have formed sufficiently strong attachments to any party to have joined in the formation of a new settlement unless he had known some of them in England. The records at Hereford have been for some time in such a condition that search among them was impossible, so I have been unable to verify my own theory.

He had four sons and five daughters, all but one of whom survived him, and six of whom lived to be over

eighty.

- 40. Thomas² (2), John¹, b. 1629, "the oldest son of the Ancestor, was about twelve years old when he came with his mother and some others of the children, about 1641, to settle in this country. From that time till of age, as may be presumed, he labored with his father upon the farm at Weymouth. In 1653 he was made free at Boston, being then twenty-four years of age, and a church member of course. Nov. 22, 1656, he married Abigail, daughter of Ensign Nicholas and Martha (Shaw) Byram, who probably came over with his father, as they were made free at the same time, and settled in the neighborhood of each other at Weymouth. An intimacy, undoubtedly, subsisted between their families, and this match may be believed to have been mutually satisfactory. Thomas at first settled in Weymouth; but in 1662 sold his farm there, as did his father-in-law, Nicholas Byram, and they both removed to Bridgewater,* twelve miles south of Wey-

^{*} Bridgewater had formerly a great reputation for its agriculture. Its soil was superior to that of any other town in the Old Colony of Plymouth. Its meadow lands were extensive and fertile. But since the war of the Revolution and particularly of late, owing to its abundant supply of eligible mill

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mouth, where each settled himself upon a valuable tract of land, in the easterly part of the town, then in a state of nature. That selected by Thomas Whitman was what has since been called Whitman's Neck, containing about two hundred acres, and lying between the rivers Sautucket and Matfield, and coming to a point at their junction. A more eligible situation could not have been selected. There he resided fifty years, until his decease in 1712 aged eighty-three years. His first dwelling-house there was in front of the one occupied by Dea. John Whitman and his son Alfred, and about half-way between that and Sautucket river.

The inhabitants of Bridgewater were greatly harassed by the Indians in the time of Phillip's war, which commenced 1675. It was then an interior town in the Colony of Plymouth, and presented a young unguarded settlement and frontier to the temptation of savage fury. The tradition is that all the houses not garrisoned or stockaded, and at a distance from the village, save one, were burnt. The one not burnt is said to have been Nicholas Byram's. This house was situated where Capt. Isaac Whitman lately dwelt and remote from the village. This was probably the place of refuge of Thomas Whitman and his family, and of the other neighbors, where their preparation for defence may have deterred the Indians from attempting an assault. There is a tradition, however, that this house was saved, from favor to the owner, on account of some favor before received by the Indians from him. But this may be reasonably doubtful. It is a trait scarcely characteristic of Indian warfare.

Thomas Whitman had three sons and four daughters. His will, dated 1711, mentions these daughters as then sites, the attention of its population has been turned to manufactures. Formerly it furnished the seaport towns with many of their agricultural products. At present, although the aggregate of its crops is increased, it does not supply its own consumption. It was formerly a large township, but has recently been divided into four towns, viz: Bridgewater, and East, West and North Bridgewater.

living; and after reciting that his sons had been provided for by deeds of conveyance, makes them, after the decease of their mother, his residuary legatees. John was the executor of this will. The widow of Thomas survived many years and until very aged, and made a will disposing of considerable personal estate and appointed Nicholas her executor. The character of Thomas, like that of his father, must have been enterprising and adventurous, and his habits those of industry and frugality. The estate which he was enabled to parcel out among his children was valuable. His privations in early life were those of a settler in a wilderness country, and his disasters from Indian depredations and barbarity were severely afflicting. Those in succeeding generations, who have enjoyed unmolested the fruit of his labors, privations and sufferings, have not too often called to mind with filial reverence the debt of gratitude due to such a progenitor. With the exception of John, there are no records of the birth of any of his children."-E. W.

(Mr. Wm. Latham of Bridgewater has furnished me some facts regarding the various homesteads built by Thomas Whitman. The first house, built about 1663 and undoubtedly a log cabin, was burnt by the Indians in 1676. The second, built in 1676, was occupied but a few years; this was also, probably, a log cabin. The third was built in 1680, and was occupied by four generations, and was the birthplace of thirty-six children, viz: Thomas till his death in 1712; Nicholas, his son, and the birthplace of his sixteen children, 1700-1736: John, son of Nicholas, and the birthplace of his six children, 1730-1747; Dea. John and the birthplace of his fourteen children, 1775-1801. In June, 1801, Dea. John raised his new house, and in September of the same year, the old house was sold to David French and by him moved to Satucket on the Plymouth road, where the frame still stands.)

48. John² (3), John¹, the second son of the Ancestor, was provided for by his father in what is now the south parish in Weymouth. He was settled there on a farm by the side of a large pond, which from him took and still retains the name of Whitman's Pond. He married, Oct. 19, 1662, Ruth (probably dau. of William) Reed. She died without issue in 1662, and he then married Abigail Hollis and by her had five children. The Weymouth records give the date of his death as Feb. 1, 1713. It has been impossible to find either in Suffolk or Plymouth records any mention of his will or of the administration upon his estates. Judge Whitman states that it is not known when he died, and that he left his homestead to his eldest son John. With regard to the children of John? and Abigail his wife, the Weymouth records and Judge Whitman are at variance in some respects, but as Judge Whitman wrote more than fifty years ago, and must have at least corresponded with persons closely related to their Ancestor, I shall follow him; I will, however, give both:



54. Rev. Zechariah² (4), John¹, the third son of the Ancestor, was born at Weymouth, 1644. He graduated at Harvard University in 1668, and Sept. 13, 1670, was ordained, upon a salary of £40, as the first minister of Point Alderton, Nantasket or Hull, which in 1673 was taxed more than Medford, Gloucester or Exeter, and one-third as much as Roxbury.

Marmaduke Matthews had been preaching at Hull, but for "several erroneous expressions" was admonished by the Government, who would not grant the desire of the people to have him return.

Soon after his ordination he married Sarah, twin dan. with Anna of Dr. John Alcock (H. U. 1646) of Roxbury, baptized May 26, 1650. The contract of marriage was dated Oct. 26, 1670, and the ceremony probably took place soon after. In May, 1673, he was admitted as a freeman. At the death of his uncle, Zachariah Whitman of Milford, Ct., in 1666, he inherited the former's property in that town, and in the right of his wife was possessed of a considerable estate, including lands on the Assabet river at Stow, Mass. With the exception of Mr. Whitman, Hull has never had one whose ministry continued through life. In Nov. 24, 1725, Ezra Carpenter (H. U. 1720) was ordained as a colleague, though Mr. Whitman continued to perform ministerial duty. He officiated at the Lord's Supper for the last time, May 2, 1725, and died Nov. 5, 1726. Receipts to the town for his salary are recorded from 1705-1723. Aug. 23, 1726, the town voted to pay to his children £25 for his maintenance while he lived and did not preach, and his son Samuel, his executor, gave the receipt "for his honored father, deceased." From a fragment of her gravestone it appears that Mrs. Whitman



died "April ye 3rd, 1715, aged 65 yrs." Mr. Whitman "was a good scholar and penman, and wrote most of the wills and legal papers in Hull." He signed the preface to a collection of manuscripts written by Rev. Edward Tompson, published in Boston, 1712.

According to the Boston News Letter of date Dec. 15, 1726, "he was well esteemed for his natural and acquired accomplishments; but especially for steady piety, diligent zeal and faithfulness in the discharge of his pastoral office; the exemplariness of his conversation; and his patience and submission to the will of God under his afflictions."

By his will, dated June 12, 1725, and proved Dec. 16, 1726, he confirms the grants of land already made to his sons and daughters; charges the shares of his sons Zachariah and John with certain payments to their sister, Joanna Hunt; makes his son Samuel and daughters, Sarah Goold, Joanna Hunt and Mary Jacobs, his residuary legatees, and appoints his son Samuel sole and only executor. The will was witnessed by Nehemiah Hobart, John Goold and Samuel Loring.

His records and family papers are supposed to have been in the possession of his son, the Rev. Samuel³ of Farmington, and later in the hands of the Rev. Elnathan⁴ of Hartford, Ct., and were destroyed at the time of the destruction of the latter's house by fire about 1780; 9 c.

Mary, daughter of Andrew Ford. But little is known concerning him. "He was undoubtedly a man of industrious and steady habits. The family he brought up and the property he bequeathed them (amounting to £1974.10.6), together with his great age, are evincive of this. He was, moreover, selected by his father to be a stay and a staff to him in his old age; and was one of the executors of his will, and inherited, it may be believed, a considerable portion of his virtues. He had one daughter, who lived to be ninety-two years of age, and two sons who lived to be eighty."

The records of the town of Easton show that he was one of the largest owners of land in the so-called "North Purchase" of Taunton, which comprises the present towns of Easton, Norton and Mansfield; he must have acquired this land prior to 1700; the earliest conveyance is dated Aug. 8, 1704, by which he gives James Hogg the land on which he settled "in consideration of the faithful services performed for Capt. John Thomas, his son-in-law."

It was supposed by Judge Whitman from the fact that

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Zechariah was mentioned after Abiah in the will of their father, that Zechariah was the youngest son, but the discovery of the gravestone has settled it, that Abiah was the youngest son. The inscription reads:

"Here lies ye Body of Abiah Whitman Dec'd January ye 28th 1727-28. In ye 82nd year of his age."

His wife died March 15, 1715.

By his will, dated Jan. 28, 1722–3, proven Feb. 26, 1727, he bequeaths to his sons John³, "Zechary³" and Abiah³ his moveables in equal parts; divides his lands in Taunton between John³ and Zechary³; leaves his homestead, subject to certain legacies, to his son Abiah³; mentions his "late daughter Elizabeth³, wife of Timothy Cooper, his daughters, Lydia Thomas³, Mary Daily³ and Eleanor Turner³; appoints his sons John³ and Abiah³ executors. The will was witnessed by John Torrey, Benjamin Richard, John Torrey, Jr. The will is endorsed "Serg't Whitman's Will."

The son Abiah³ was appointed sole executor, his brother having declined to act. Among the items in the executor's account, the following for funeral expenses are interesting as showing something of the social position of the man, viz:

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said to have been a very rough man, and his death was considered by many as a just punishment of his sins; she d. before 1722, as she is mentioned in her father's will as already deceased; they had a family of five daughters, one of whom m. Seth Babbitt.

66. Lydia³, b. 1678; m. Capt. John Thomas and settled in Braintree; prior to her marriage she resided for some time in the family of Rev. Zechariah2 of Hull; as shown by this codicil to the will of Rev. Samuel3 of Farmington, in which he signifies to his executors "for diverse reasons me thereto moving that Lydia Whitman who lived with my father as a maid many years, and was after married to Capt. Thomas who died and left her a widow with several children, that the s^d widow of Capt. Thomas have sixteen pound 'old honor' of my estate faithfully delivered to her by them if living, if not, to any of her daughters or children that are "-dated Sept. 13, 1750. Judge Whitman relates that "her marriage was attended with circumstances savoring a little of the romantic. While on a visit among her relatives in Boston, and while walking in the street, she caught the eve of a Captain Thomas, a respectable shipmaster then lately arrived from England. He was instantly captivated with her appearance, and followed her till he found where she lodged: and immediately after contrived to gain an introduction to the family there and to her; and soon after married her, and established himself in very respectable style near her father's in the town of Braintree, where he brought up a large and respectable family." He is reported to have commanded the ship that brought the Prince of Orange to England; he d. Oct. 4, 1714; she d. 1750; 4 c.

THIRD GENERATION.

196. John³ (41), Thomas², John¹, b. Weymouth, Sept. 5, 1658; m. 1686, Hannah Pratt of Weymouth. He lived near his grandfather Byram in Bridgewater, on the east side of what is now called the Forge Pond. At the age of eighteen he was an active partisan soldier, and took part in King Philip's war.

Judge Whitman relates the following incident: "In 1676, a party, twenty-one in number, of the inhabitants of Bridgewater, among whom were Nicholas Byram (probably junior) and John Whitman, son of Thomas, then eighteen years of age, performed a signal exploit. They were embodied as soldiers, and destined to join Capt. Church, who was expected from Plymouth, by way of Bridgewater, to pursue the Indians towards Narragansett; but finding the enemy approaching before Church could arrive, they sallied forth, drove the Indians back, and captured seventeen of them alive, with much of their plunder, and without the loss of a life on their part. This event is alluded to by Hubbard and Holmes They speak of a violent tempest as coming to their aid, by producing consternation among the Indians. The party was afterwards joined by Church, with his company, who pursued the enemy with great slaughter, and the capture of many prisoners. After this, it is probable that the inhabitants of Bridgewater remained unmolested, although not without occasional alarms during the remainder of the war."

He died, July 28, 1727, having had no issue. In his will, dated July 24, 1727, offered for probate, Nov. 5, 1727, he mentions his wife Hannah as then living; he

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bequeaths his homestead to his nephew David⁴, son of his brother Nicholas³ and appoints said brother executor; his outlands and other property he distributed among his other relatives. "He was a man of industry and frugality, as is manifested by the property he was enabled to bequeath; being appointed executor of his father's will in 1712 may be admitted as satisfactory proof that his standing in society was respectable.

His widow took administration of his estate, and was appointed guardian to the children. She afterwards married Edmund Hobart of Hingham, with whom she lived on the farm at Bridgewater; 5 c.

^{201.} Nicholas³ (43), Thomas², John¹, the third son of Thomas², had his father's homestead and lived with him. The following is taken from Judge Whitman's memoir:



"Nicholas Whitman was a man of great vigor, industry and activity. His dwelling-house was near Matfield river, a few rods west of the dwelling-house, afterwards built by his son Ebenezer, and lately occupied by Joseph Keen. He was born about the time of the breaking out of Philip's war, in which his father's dwelling-house and the other dwellings in that part of the town, were, according to tradition, destroyed by the Indians. This was a period of great disasters and alarm. The settlements were sparse and wide apart. To come to the aid of each other of a sudden was difficult and attended with danger. The progress of the settlement was of course retarded, and privations were multiplied. Schools could not be established, and the children were but scantily furnished with the means of They were taught by their parents to read, education. but not, in many instances, to write. Nicholas could doubtless read his bible, but if he could write at all it was with difficulty. But possessing strong native powers, he was enabled to manage the common affairs of life to good advantage. Although his family was large he increased his estate. He was a constant attendant upon public worship, although for a greater part of his life the meeting place was three miles distant from him.

In his religious notions he partook, in some measure, of the times and was somewhat pertinacious. He could not readily yield assent to what, by the then rising generation, were deemed improvements either in doctrine or ceremony. Whatever he had witnessed in the conduct of his forefathers had with him the force of law. Accordingly it is related of him that, having grown up while it was fashionable, owing probably to the open and unfinished state of the meeting houses in early times, for the men to put on their hats during sermon time, he could not readily brook the idea of an innovation even in this particular. This practice had existed during the whole of the ministry (about fifty years) of the first settled minister; after which,



his successor, a fashionable young man from the metropolis, who was able to persuade all, except Mr. Whitman, to lay aside the practice, and finding him contumacious, he delivered a discourse on the subject; but before he had finished, Mr. Whitman arose and with great gravity, and possibly without intending sarcasm, remarked, 'that rather than offend a weak brother, he would pull off his hat,' and accordingly did so thereafter, as well during the sermon as prayer time.

He had before his death settled portions of his homestead upon his sons Thomas and John, and his son David was amply provided for by the bequest of his uncle John, . as before mentioned. Seth, Eleazer and Benjamin were settled on his outlands. His other children, after his decease, had, between them, the residue of his homestead. He had the rare felicity of having eleven of his children all settled, and well settled, in the same town with himself, where they all spent their days in good reputation. Five of them lived to be of the ages respectively, 80, 86, 87, 90, 94. The other six died between 30 and 70 years of age. His posterity have been very numerous, and several hundred are now living.

He came to his death, 'unfortunately,' on the 6th of August, 1746, he being then seventy-one years of age. It happened at this time that his son John had some hay to get in, and he had come with his team to help him, and was remarkable always for insisting on driving his own team, which happened at the time to be somewhat unruly The cart being loaded on the meadow, by the river, nearly fronting the dwelling-house of Dea. John Whitman, he drove it from thence up a sidelong bank, he being on the upper side, and the cattle going quick, and the stubble being dry and slippery, he slipped and fell, and before he could recover himself, the cart wheel passed over his body, and he expired in a few hours after. The abovenamed Dea. John Whitman, who is his grandson, was




present, and pointed out the spot to the writer (Judge W.) But for this occurrence he might have attained to a great age. The vigor of his health and constitution gave promise of it, and his father and grandfather before him had lived to be very aged."

Nicholas was three times married. He m. 1.1700, Sarah Vining of Weymouth, by whom he had six children; she d. 1713; he then m. 2. Mary, daughter of Francis and Hannah (Brett) Cary, by whom he had two children; upon her death in 1719 he m. 3. the same year, Mary, daughter of William and Mary (Trow) Conant, the great granddaughter of Roger Conant, of whom honorable mention is made in the early history of the country; by this last marriage he had eight children, four of whom died in infancy; 16 c.

291. Samuel³ (58), Zechariah², John¹, brother of the next preceding, was born at Hull, Mass., 1676. He graduated at Harvard in 1696 and is said to have been a tutor there for a short period. He is mentioned as having occasionally preached at Lancaster, Mass., between 1697-1701. In 1699 he was employed as teacher of the Grammar School at Salem, where he probably remained till he was called to preach at Farmington, Conn., at that time one of the largest and wealthiest towns in the State.

The following are extracts taken from Farmington town records: At a General Court held 1702, "the town of



Farmington, laboring under great difficulties in reference to the calling and settling of a minister among them, and other ecclesiastical concerns, certain of the inhabitants made their address to this General Assembly praying for counsel and relief. In answer whereunto, this assembly doth order and direct them to seek counsel and help from the Rev. Elders, namely, the Rev. Mr. Abram Pierson, Mr. James Noves, Mr. Taylor, Mr. N. Russel, Mr. Samuel Russel and Mr. Thomas Ruggles, or any five of them, whom this assembly doth direct to be helpful unto them, and (unless the said inhabitants shall agree among themselves, etc.) to nominate and appoint a minister for them, and in case the minister so nominated and appointed will undertake this work, this assembly doth hereby order that said inhabitants of Farmington shall entertain him for one year, and also pay to him such salary as hath been usual and customary among them." The town officers were also appointed by the General Court. In 1704 the General Court directed the same ministers as above to procure a minister for the inhabitants of Farmington, "who are hereby ordered to receive him and to pay him as formerly until this court do order otherwise, or until they agree among themselves." In 1705 messengers were sent to Nantascot, near Boston, to confer with Mr. Samuel Whitman. So great was the zeal of the people, that they proposed to pay to any one who would lend money to bear the expenses of their messengers, two shillings for one shilling lent till the time of the next minister's rate. Their offers of salary were very liberal: first, 90 pounds a year, with the use of the parsonage in the Pequabuck meadows, as also forty acres of land in fee, and a house, he finding glass and nails. The year after, 200 pounds were voted as a settlement, a salary of 100 pounds, and his firewood. Wheat at that time was five shillings and threepence per bushel.

He was ordained Dec. 10, 1706, and remained in his

charge till his death. In 1708, Mr. Whitman being about to visit his friends in Boston, the town, by their vote, provided for the service and expense of a "waighting man" to attend their minister. He married, March 19, 1707, Sarah, daughter of the Rev. Solomon and Esther (Warham) Stoddard of Northampton, b. Apr. 1, 1680, d. Sept. 10, 1755, by whom he had a large family. She joined the church at Farmington by letter, Feb. 11, 1710/11. He had a high repute as a clergyman and was much beloved by the people under his charge. Ranking among the first literary men of New England, he was interested in all matters of education and culture; as a sign of this we find his name among the early subscribers to Prince's Chronology. In 1726 he was appointed one of the Fellows of Yale College, a position he retained for more than twenty years. According to Mr. Pitkin, his successor in the ministry, "he was a gentleman of strong mind and sound judgment; his sermons correct, accurate and instructive; his delivery and public address calm and moderate: he was highly esteemed and greatly improved in ecclesiastical councils, and was esteemed a truly learned man."

During Mr. Whitman's ministry the second meeting house was begun in 1709 and completed in 1714. This second church was fifty feet square, with height proportional, and furnished with a cupola or turret, which tradition has always placed in the center, from which the bell-rope was suspended so soon as a bell was provided. How hard it was to build the church of 1709–1772, and how rude it was when built, is obvious from the fact that the first tax of a penny in a pound was spent in procuring the nails. Another vote respected the glass and lead. Another directs that "it be ceiled with good sawn boards on the within side up to the railings and filled with mortar up to the girts." Later, thoughtfulness of the fierce northwesters suggested the vote that the mortar should be continued along the second story. Two tiers of new seats were

ordered, one on each side the aisle which extended to the east door. It follows from this and other notices that the house stood along the street to the northwest of the site of the present edifice, that the pulpit was on the west side, and the entrances were from the north and south and east. The seats from the first house were probably removed to the second, and were placed facing the pulpit, except the two new ones, which, it may be conjectured, filled the space not covered by the old seats, now transferred to a larger house. Mrs. Whitman, the pastor's wife, sat in a pew at the south, that is, the right hand of the pulpit, but this pew was built at Mr. Whitman's expense, and after his decease it was purchased by the society. In 1731 the purchase of a bell was ordered, and in 1738 a town clock. Before the bell was provided, the beat of drum called the people together on Sundays and public days at a cost of £1 10s. the year. New seats were next ordered for the gallery; now and then a pew was erected at the expense of its occupants. In 1746 a committee was appointed to repair the house and see "what can be done to prevent its spreading." From that time onward it was doomed to destruction.

The only ecclesiastical disturbance which occurred during the ministry of Mr. Whitman was caused by the "new way of singing." It would appear from the records of several meetings of the church that the result was for a time doubtful. The following resolution, passed by the parish, March, 1726–7, decided for the old way:

"This meeting, taking into consideration the unhappy controversy that hath been among us respecting singing of psalms in our public assemblies upon the Sabbath, and forasmuch as the church in this place hath several times in their meeting manifested their dislike of singing psalms according to the method not long since endeavored to be introduced among us, being the same way of singing of psalms which is recommended by the reverend ministers

of Boston with other ministers, to the number in all of twenty or thereabouts; therefore, that the controversy may be ended and peace gained for this society, this meeting, by their major vote, do declare their full satisfaction with the former way of singing of psalms in this society and do earnestly desire to continue therein, and do with the church manifest their dislike of singing according to the said method endeavored to be introduced aforesaid."

He had by bequest one-half his father's lands in Stowe, Mass., and was appointed executor of the will. His homestead stood on the main street just in the rear of the present Savings Bank, and the property on which it was situated remained in the family till after 1863. "His felicity was consummated by the settlement of his children in the vicinity in which he lived, and seeing them highly respected and prosperous." He d. July 31, 1751, from an attack of dysentery, at that time almost an epidemic, at the age of 75; 7 c.

to £1627.15.7; the widow's will was proven May 6, 1778; 6 c.



At the session of the Corporation of Yale College held Sept., 1774, Mr. Whitman being the Senior Fellow, the following minute was entered upon the record: "The Rev. Mr. Whitman, having repeated his earnest request to resign his Place at the Board on Account of his advanced Age and Difficulty of hearing, we do with Reluctance accept his Resignation and return him our hearty thanks for his many good Services done to the Collge for a Number of Years." He was a highly respected and useful minister. His pastorate in the Second Church of Hartford covered the period between the years 1732 and 1777, and in the successive and powerful revivals which followed upon the preaching of Jonathan Edwards and Whitfield, the church was greatly increased in numbers and power. It was during his pastorate that a new meeting-house was built (1754), and a large bequest of land was made to the society by the mother of Mr. Buckingham, the late pastor. In 1767 the Rev. William Patten was settled as colleague of Mr. Whitman, but was dismissed in 1773 and died in Roxbury in 1775. His publications were three sermons, one of them an election sermon preached May 9, 1745; another was the funeral sermon preached upon the death of Rev. Edward Dorr, pastor of the First Church, who d. Oct. 20, 1772, in the fiftieth year of his age; he had made a valuable collection of books and pamphlets, many of them rare and of great historical value; he also received by will the greater portion of his father's library; this entire collection was destroyed by fire a few years after his death; he d. March 4, 1777; 4 c.

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Hoadly, State Librarian; the inscription is now almost illegible:

In Memory of the Rev^d ELNATHAN WHITMAN

Pastor of the second Church of Christ in hartford and one of the Fellows of the corporation of Yale College, who departed this Life on th 4th day of March AD. 1777, in the 69th year of his age and 44th of his Ministry.

Endowed with superior natural abilities and good literary acquirements. He was still more distinguished for his unaffected Piety, primitive simplicity of manners & true Christian Benevolence. He closed a life spent in the service of his Creator, in humble confidence

apparently never followed it; a man remarkable for the native strength of his mind, the amenity of his manners and his inflexible integrity; though not a college graduate, he was well educated and deeply interested in all literary matters; was appointed in early life a magistrate by the colonial government, and was honored by the inhabitants of his native town with offices of every grade in their power to bestow; was appointed by the Assembly in 1751 Justice of the Peace and continued in office till 1767; in 1751 was chosen Deputy to the General Assembly and reëlected for sixteen terms; in 1769 the Probate Court of the Farmington District was established, and Solomon Whitman was the first Judge appointed, and probably retained the office till disqualified by age; the first Court was held March 3, 1769; the last record of his administration, 1778. He had a vigorous constitution and retained his full faculties till his death; it is related that he celebrated his 90th birthday by making a pair of shoes; he held the office of Town Clerk at the age of 92; possessing to a singular degree the influence and power to allay the spirit of litigation and contention among his neighbors, he was continually called upon to act as arbitrator in their disagreements. His death is said to have been caused by over fatigue in settling a fence boundary dispute between two brothers. Inheriting from his father large landed possessions, he improved them by careful management, and accumulated a handsome property; till the death of his third wife he lived in his father's homestead; after that time he resided alternately with his sons Solomon⁵ and Elnathan⁵; he d. Sept. 13, 1803, aged 93; 6 c.



The corner was for many years known as the Turk's Head, deriving its title from a large carved wooden head, representing a turbaned Turk, with a most hideous visage, and a fiery red tongue lolling from its mouth, which was placed at the corner of the house; its origin is unknown but it had something of a subsequent history: in the great gale of Sept., 1815, it was blown down and floated away; it was recovered by Jacob⁶ and his son George⁷, and by the latter taken to Montgomery, Ala., where it was set up in front of his place of business; it was finally stolen by some wags, who sent it, packed in saw-dust, to the Governor of Alabama, as the head of a notorious Indian chief, for whose head a reward had been offered. Jacob Whitman was a blacksmith by trade, and especially skilled in iron work for ships, in which he did a large business, filling orders from Boston, Salem, Lynn, and other shipping ports; he was also engaged in a general trading business for many years; an old ledger marked H. and coming down to 1772 is still preserved in the family; 1764-1765, he was "thrice" elected Deputy to the General Assembly; from 1769-1773, was member of the Town Council; was appointed by the General Assembly in 1778 "General Sealer of Weights and Measures within and throughout the State;" he d. May 10, 1802, aged 86, leaving a large central and valuable estate, a portion of which is still in the possession of his granddaughter.

The following obituary appeared in a Providence paper, dated May 15, 1802: "On Monday last, in the 86th year of his age, Mr. Jacob Whitman, a native of Massachusetts, but for upwards of sixty years a useful and virtuous citizen of this town. Industry, hospitality and inflexible integrity uniformly marked the conduct of this worthy man through the various periods of his protracted life. His native cheerfulness, equanimity of temper and suavity of manner



attracted to him in an uncommon degree the love and respect of his relatives, friends and fellow citizens. Pious without severity, the purity of his life was the best comment upon the religion he professed; its blessed precepts he religiously observed, and which supported him under the presence of age and infirmity, and enabled him to meet his dissolution with the same serenity and resignation which had so distinguished him amidst the numerous afflictions which it had pleased Heaven to visit him, having been bereaved of twelve children. His life was an excellent example to mankind, and his exit manifested the peace wherewith a Christian could die. His amiable partner survives to weep over the companion of her youth with whom she had passed with uninterrupted harmony nearly sixty years of her life. On Wednesday his remains were respectfully deposited in the burying-ground of the Benevolent Congregational Society attended by a concourse of affectionate relatives and friends." He was a charitable man and interested in all educational matters. The records show that in 1770 he subscribed £13 towards building the college edifice and president's house of Brown University: 13 c., 4 of whom d. in infancy, unnamed.

In 1755 the English Government, having dispossessed a large number of French settlers in Nova Scotia, the Governor of that Province issued a proclamation inviting settlers; in company with forty-five others John arrived at Annapolis, N. S., June, 1761, in the sloop "Charming Molly," bringing with them their families, household goods and stock; a full list of these possessions is to be found in the diary of Felsh, Evans and Bent, who were appointed a committee to wait on the Governor and obtain the promised lands; a grant was finally issued to about a hundred, of a tract extending along the south line of the Annapolis River from Saw-mill Creek to Wilmot line, and seven and one-half miles in depth. John did not survive to receive his share, which was distributed among his sons; he d. Sept. 12. 1763, leaving considerable property and the foundation for a handsome establishment; his widow was left with eleven children, all under fifteen. He studied medicine and settled in his native town, and practiced his profession there for nearly half a century. His first wife was Anna Stevens, a direct descendant of Pocahontas. was a man of great dignity of manner and very particular in his dress. It is a family tradition that he always wore a long, dark green coat with silver buttons, silver knee buckles, and his hair in a cue; he was always very exacting about the braiding of his hair and the freshness of the ribbons with which it was tied, always insisting that they should be three yards and a half in length; it is related that during his last sickness, one of the daughters becoming wearied with the care of the cue, cut it off, an act which her father never forgave. He had a slight impediment in his speech, which caused him to speak with great deliberation; he always, in prescribing for a patient, used a certain formula, which was: "I think, madame, upon the account, upon the account of it, that you need so and so." His first wife died in 1785, and the next year he married Mrs. Catharine Davis, widow of the Rev. Dr. Swift of Billerica. During the last years of his life his mind became impaired, and his property, by order of the Court, dated April 12, 1805, was placed in the hands of a committee, and his son, Dr. Charles, Jr., was appointed his guardian. He d. Dec. 10, 1807, aged 76; his widow survived him

many years, and d. Sept. 28, 1834, aged 87; 11 c., all by 1st m.

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

Dec., 1787, Mr. Whitman was settled in the ministry at Pembroke, Mass., and the next year, June 5, 1788, married Miss Winslow; he continued at Pembroke till Dec. 12, 1796; with an increasing family, he found his salary insufficient for their support, and decided to retire from the ministry; he then entered upon the practice of law, having studied with his brother Benjamin⁶, who resided in Hanover, an adjoining town; he was admitted to the bar in 1798, and attended the courts in Plymouth, Bristol, Barnstable and Dukes Counties and Nantucket: he retained his farm and home in Pembroke and had his office there; was chairman of the Selectmen in Pembroke and represented that town in the legislature for several terms; was also associate Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, when the Hon. Nahum Mitchell of E. Bridgewater was its Chief Justice; for many years he was County Attorney for Plymouth County, and for a long time, with Judge Nymphas Marston of Barnstable, was Overseer of the Marshpee and Herring Pond Indians.

During the many years he was in practice, he had at his office a large number of students who read law with him, many of whom afterwards became leaders at the bar; he was frequently called upon to deliver public addresses and to respond to toasts at public banquets and dinners; it is related that, at a collation given at the annual review of the Hanover Artillery Company, of which his brother Benjamin was Captain, being called upon for a toast, he arose with great dignity and impressiveness and gave: "The Hanover Artillery Company—may their pieces be loaded with true New England principles, wadded with Jacobinism, and pointed against every aspiring demagogue."

While Mr. Whitman remained in the ministry he was Congregational in his belief, but afterwards adopted Unitarian views, which he held while he lived; as a preacher he had fine presence, was forcible, elegant and popular; as a judge he was upright, dignified, able and urbane; as an advocate he was ready, witty, elegant and courteous, popular with the court, and successful with the jury.

His marked characteristics were fine presence, unusual conversational powers, felicitous wit and generous hospitality; among his frequent guests were Daniel Webster, Judge Strong, and many members both of the bench and the bar; and a large circle of friends and acquaintances always found cordial welcome at his house and home. Many anecdotes, showing his bright sayings and ready wit, are now remembered and often repeated by members of the bar and his friends.

With this brief notice, we leave him to go down the line of time with those of his name, and those of his blood and kindred. "His works do follow him." His only publications were a "Sermon preached at the ordination of Rev. Joshua Cushman at Winslow, Me., 1795; an Oration, 1798." He d. Dec. 11, 1835, aged 70; 11 c.

"The intelligence of the death of Mr. Williams has fallen upon his fellow-members of the class of 1848 with a startling suddenness. Possessing in an uncommon degree, every outward indication of vigorous health, he was yet more distinguished by a certain liveliness of movement and expression which betokened anything but premature death. But as frequently happens in similar instances the ruddiness of early manhood confirmed instead of combatting the acute disorder which finally mastered him.

The hearty sorrow of all who had the pleasure of knowing Mr. Williams is increased by the knowledge that his loss has occurred just as he was on the point of entering the profession, to which with singular earnestness he had devoted the last three years. With a hopefulness peculiar to him he had looked forward to the toils of the legal profession (for which he had laboriously fitted himself) with remarkable cheerfulness. His knowledge of law, which it would be presumptuous to call great when we remember the requisite 'lucubrations of twenty years,' was in the opinion of competent judges eminently meritorious for a young man and foretold a future full of honor and usefulness.

It is, however, for the signal graces of his heart, that his friends and especially his classmates love to remember him. Their four years intimacy with him was enlivened by his buoyant humor and the constant exhibitions of a genuinely good heart. Like his classmate, the young and lamented Hale who perished in a noble service to humanity last summer at Pensacola, he was peculiarly distinguished by a strong attachment to his classmates. No doubt half of the pleasures of a college life during its continuance, and more than this proportion of the pleasure with which one looks back upon it arises from that interchange of good offices and sympathies between college associates which is designated by the term class feeling. This, Mr. Williams eminently possessed, and encouraged. His ardent impulsive temperament knitted to him many fast friends, without making one enemy. On the first day of his illness he accompanied to the wharf a friend to whom he was remarkably attached and who was then upon the point of embarking for Europe. He returned to his home to die, and with unfeigned



readiness resigned all his youthful hopes for a death, which we trust though unexpected was not to him a surprise."



The following tribute appears in the 37th annual report of the Massachusetts School for the Feeble Minded: "Within the present month the institution has sustained a loss seemingly irreparable. William Brandt Storer, for thirteen years one of the trustees on the part of the corporation, and for eight years Secretary of the board, died at his home in Cambridge on the 14th day of October, 1884, at the age of 46. In the full vigor of his powers, with no fiery throbbing pain, and no cold gradations of decay, he passed instantly from the life that is to the life that is to be. He was a tower of strength to us; his noble presence



was familiar here. These feeble ones found comfort in his great heart and generous sympathy, rejoicing in the light of his benign and sunny countenance. His wisdom was a guide and support to the officers and teachers, and his counsels were invaluable to his associates on this board. His life was a constant and daily blessing. Few men, if any, in our community, were actively identified with so many important charities, few were of more service to any of these, than he to each and all. But he accepted no public offices and asked no promotions. His companionship was sought for the sunshine in which he lived, and which he was always diffusing around him. None were too high to bid him cordial welcome to their intimacy; none too low to be beneath the cheering and inspiring influence of his sympathy and friendship. His heart was open and his hand was free. It was his great happiness to make others happy, to cheer the sinking heart of poverty, to raise the fallen, to comfort the distressed. So while the strong rejoiced with him in his strength, 'the feeble soul, albeit a haunt of fears, forgot its weakness in his sight.' As in his life he was a constant blessing to the poor and lowly, so through his life and in his death the blessings of the poor and lowly followed him." For many years he held the post of Russian Vice-Consul, and was engaged in the Russian trade; she resides Cambridge; 3 c.

His father, like most farmers of the time, had but little ready money, and with that he was giving the eldest son, Kilborn, the advantages of a collegiate education; Benjamin, however, was determined to enjoy the same privilege, and was confident that if only permission was given, he could fight his way through; almost unaided by his parents he prepared for Brown University, from which he graduated, 1788; after studying law he settled first at Pembroke, and later at Hanover, where he continued to reside for many years; the exact date of his removal to Hanover is unknown, but it was about 1792; being the first lawyer to settle in the town, he naturally took a prominent part in



all town affairs; his office became a favorite one with students, among whom were Hon. Ezekiel Whitman; he was for many years postmaster; was one of the incorporators and first Captain of the Hanover Artillery Company; the uniform prescribed was "a coat of blue cloth faced with red, brass buttons, buff pants and vest, white leather belt, brass breastplate; the hats, the old-fashioned cocked hats of fur, surmounted by a black plume tipped with red;" was in 1825 Adjutant of the militia; a writer in the History of Hanover says: "He was an able lawyer, a man of great business enterprise, an active politician, and his services were of great value to the town during his residence in it;" in 1804 he removed his office to Boston, his residence being at So. Boston, and soon became well known both at the bar and in political life; from 1806-1819 he continuously represented Boston in the Legislature; in 1822 the Boston Police Court was organized, and June 22 of that year he was chosen presiding Justice, a position he retained till 1834, his successor, James E. Merrill, being commissioned Feb. 19, 1834; as a magistrate he was very popular, winning the admiration of all, not only by his strict impartiality, but by his sympathy and tenderness in dealing with the poor and unfortunate; he d. Boston, Aug. 31, 1840; the subjoined sketch has been furnished by his youngest son; 10 c.

"Benjamin Whitman, born in Bridgewater, Mass., graduated at Brown, 1788, and died in Boston, 31 Aug., 1840. He first resided in Pembroke, next in Hanover, where he built, near the river, what was considered one of the best houses in the county. The bitterness of democracy causing him to sell this eligible estate, he removed to Boston in the autumn of 1803. In 1809 he purchased of Gen. S. Elliot a large homestead in Federal street, where he died of heart disease, induced by a fall in 1828 while erecting houses in the rear of this estate. During his life he built nineteen dwellings, but never was a speculator; the wealth

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he left at its close was entirely the result of extensive legal practice in Suffolk, Norfolk, Plymouth, Bristol and Nantucket. By his own persevering energy, study and faithfulness he gained, unaided, his education, and became distinguished in the profession of the law, having had an unusual number of students with a large library of English and American law. His last public speech in Fanueil Hall was in favor of adopting the city charter. While in Hanover he was a master freemason, postmaster, and captain of the artillery of which he was a charter member by statute.

For many years he was President of the Boston Board of Health, rendering gratuitous yet efficient service during several panics of the yellow fever, and for quite as many years he represented the town in the Legislature. Upon the change to a city government, he was appointed Judge by Governor Brooks at the urgent solicitation of Chief Justice Parker.

In no official station would be stoop to a time-serving policy, or run after a popularity, ephemeral, because solicited. Always independent, industrious, honest and practical, both in opinion and action, he exemplified the fearless magistrate in time of riot, at the bar and upon the bench, intent on social order and the general weal, aiming to do justly, leaning to mercy, and walking undisguised among his fellows. He stood forth a conspicuous friend of the mechanics, and in all his contracts with so many of them, no Saturday night ever came to find him their debtor. From such freedom sound sleep is apt to spring.

In domestic life he illustrated what he inherited from his mother, Abigail Kilborn of Connecticut—an emotional nature, generous and affectionate almost to an excess. The milk of human kindness can be very distinctly traced through this rich fountain. From his varied reading he would cull the most sententious and impressive flowers of thought, to use them often as self-inspirations as well as weapons of reproof or of defence and warning.

Of course the heart that prompted him to comfort his own mother and two mothers by marriage besides in their old age, to fill his pockets with dainties for the little ones in the neighborhood, to arrange and hide for New Year's the multiform presents procured for so many sharers in the social festivals—such a heart would feel a heaviness imprinting itself upon the thoughtful features when any one grieved him by ingratitude, folly or vice. But the dead are free from all such disturbances.

Long ago he was laid away from the sight of those he tried to make happy. His three surviving children, who all now have reached threescore and ten, recall with sweeter and holier memories than ever his faithful public service, his private nobility of character and his affluence of affection, so they may lay a wreath upon his dust, attract others to his example, and insure the respect of his descendants for a true Christian man, who combined with vigorous capacity, mental and moral, the welfare of others as the daily incentive to exertion.

Among his legislative acts he drafted that which established a reporter of decisions and one for creating homes for those who represented what was called "the middling interest." Of his publications, a Fourth of July Oration in Hanover, a Plea in a capital trial, and an Index of Statutes, are only to be found."

"Abigail Kilborn, eldest daughter of Judge Whitman of Boston, was a woman of great culture and refinement. A sweet singer and in those days a fine pianist. 'The Battle of Prague,' eighty years ago, was regarded 'a master piece,' and one who could play it was indeed a proficient in the science of music; and so it was that the 'roar of artillery' was sure to be called for at the close of an even-ing visit or entertainment at our grandfather's. The Squire's daughter Abby excelled as a reader, and it is said that Edward Everett affirmed on one occasion that he received as much pleasure from hearing her read one of the plays of Shakspeare as from seeing it acted.

Illustrative of her noble, generous, unselfish nature, I give the following incident recorded of her when about seven years of age. In expectation of a visit to her Uncle's in Pembroke, Abby's wardrobe had been replenished with a new bonnet, vandyke and a pair of long mitts. When Sunday came these things were no where to be found, though her aunt and consins knew that after they had been seen and duly admired on Abby's arrival, they had been carefully placed on the bed in the spare room. Greatly perplexed as to what could have become of them, her aunt communicated the fact of their disappearance to her niece, expecting a flood of tears would follow the announcement. What was her surprise when Abby laughingly replied; 'Oh! anntie, I dave them all away to one poor little girl who had no nice things! It was soon ascertained that a beggar with a little child had passed through the village a day or two before, and had, by the road-side, so touched Abby's heart by the recital of her wants and woes, that she had rushed into the house and without a word to any one, taken and given the things to the child, saying by the act: 'Here thy needs are greater than mine.' Whether as a penalty, or because she would not of her own choice stay at home, I know not, but she went to church that Sunday with a handkerchief tied over her head.

During the summer of 1858, I spent a few days at a hotel in Franconia. Opposite at table sat an elderly lady who kept her eye constantly fixed on me; seemed anxious to engage me in conversation, for what purpose I could not divine. The interest manifested attracted the notice of the friend in company with me. At last, on my leaving the room, she ventured to interrogate my friend as to my name and place of residence; the reply received seemed to disappoint, for she was sure she knew no one by the name living in the place given, and yet my countenance and even my voice seemed so familiar! The next morning we met again and in the course of con-

versation, I said something about the pulling down of old land marks in Boston, mentioned the probable destiny of my grand-father's estate on Federal Street, calling him by name; her look of utter astonishment I shall never forget followed by the exclamation: 'Whitman! Whitman! can it be possible that I am talking with a daughter of my dear old school and playmate Abigail Whitman! I see it all now; Oh! your voice and looks have so impressed me!' The lady was Madam Candler, the mother of the President of the Boston Board of Trade. From her I learned much of interest relative to my mother as a school girl and playmate; but on everything was painted the same gifted, cheerful, kind hearted, jokeloving girl, and I bless God for the pleasant interview."



Never having heard a lady preacher, and having some curiosity in the matter, we were easily persuaded to drive on and avail ourselves of this opportunity to do so. By way of proof that our expectations were not raised too high we add, that we remained to both services and returned to Brattleboro by moonlight. Both sermons evinced uncommon ability and were impressively delivered. some parts of them truly eloquent in earnestness: the style of writing clear as well as earnest, a style that never fails to mark and an indelible mark too-words that burn into the soul. The personal appearance of the speaker, Miss Thompson, in the desk is unassuming, a little timidity apparent though hardly discernible, unless the listener is quite near and watches closely. Miss Thompson, we were informed, is a native and for many years a resident of Boston; the granddaughter of a late chief justice of that city, and daughter of one of Boston's old and widely known merchants. For several years she has made it her home in the quiet little village of Swanzey Center, N. H., much to the regret of her many friends who prize her mental abilities, genial companionship and fathomless kindness of heart. We would say to all, go and hear her if an opportunity presents, and you will be well repaid. The day spent at Chesterfield will be long and pleasantly remembered."

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

June 3, 1835; he graduated at Yale College, 1772; studied medicine and settled for a time at Plymouth; about 1780 removed to West Barnstable then known as "Gnob Marshes," where he had received the appointment of teacher; among his pupils was his future wife, the daughter of the wealthiest man in the town, generally known as "Silver John;" the "silver" was popularly supposed to have been in bars and gained in privateering; it is related that his first acquaintance with this young lady was made by standing her up in one corner of the school-room upon one foot, and making her hold a broom; attracted by her father's wealth, for she was decidedly inferior in education and refinement, the Doctor married her when she was scarcely nineteen; after this event he returned to Plymouth, remaining there till the death of his mother-in-law, when he settled in West Barnstable, practicing medicine and using his wife's fortune as a means of making money, loaning it at high rates of interest; he had the finest farm in the town, and was one of the leading physicians of his day, having a very extensive practice; he was one of the few Methodists of that time, and erected a pulpit in his kitchen, and assembled his co-believers there for service; in politics always a Democrat; in dress not neat, going often to visit his patients in his stable boots; as distinguished from his sons he was never intemperate except in his temper, and many stories are told more creditable to his strength of will than its control; his wife once sold his best cow for \$40; when the Doctor was told of it, he replied: "I can afford to



keep as good a cow as" so and so, naming the purchaser, and threw the money into the fire; he was continually engaged in litigation, particularly with a neighbor, Tom Block, a Scotchman; he left to his wife the use of a large portion of her money, and abandoned to her injudicious care the welfare and training of the children; she had a great idea of the importance of money, and the laudable ambition of bringing up her children as ladies and gentlemen, but had the mistaken idea that they should do nothing in the way of work; the result was that the sons were kept on the edge of shabby gentility, and grew up to be lazy and intemperate; he d. July 30, 1824; his will was burnt, with other town records, Oct. 22, 1827; in it he left the bulk of his property to his wife, after giving a farm to an old servant, one Jonathan Smith (who had been with him twenty years), a few legacies to friends and a small sum of money to his children; by her will executed June 23, 1831, she left to each of her daughters \$1000 and her household furniture; to her son Josiah \$100; to her son Jonas \$10; to her sons Samuel, Cyrus and Isaac each one-quarter part of her real and personal property not otherwise disposed of; the remaining one-quarter was left to Stephen Bailey and Josiah Whitman in trust for her son Jonas; Stephen Bailey of Wellfleet was appointed sole executor; 10 c. I. John⁶; II. Jonas⁶; III. Sarah⁶; IV. Sarah⁶; V. Josiah⁶; VI. Samuel⁶; VII. Cyrus⁶; VIII. Israel⁶; IX. Jonas⁶; X. Mercy⁶.

March 14, 1842; his will was executed Jan. 17, 1842, and a codicil Jan. 28, 1842; he directs that his share in certain "schooners" shall be sold and the proceeds invested for the benefit of his son John: orders a tomb to be erected "in the next field to house lot," the money to come from the estate of his brother Josiah, late of Cincinnati; according to his own directions, this tomb was built into the side hill of a large pasture adjoining the house, and was to be opened on sunshiny days that he might get the benefit of the sun; one of his cronies was entrusted with this mission, and was to be paid for it out of the estate; these directions were carefully observed till the death of the "opener," when they were discontinued; upon the sale of the premises, the bodies of Samuel and his wife were removed to

W. Barnstable and buried in the Jenkins lot; the tomb is now used as a chicken house; by the will, he left to his "beloved wife Rachel" all his household furniture, improvements on homestead and two lots of land, while she remained his widow; anticipating trouble, he made the codicil, where he recites that to avoid ambiguity about "wife," there being a supposed difficulty in proving a legal marriage, that "his beloved wife Rachel" is a daughter of Asa Jenkins of W. Barnstable, to whom he was married in 1825; he also states that "to his brothers Isaac and Jonas, and to my sisters Sally and Mercy, I have no bequest or legacy to make, intended to make none in my will, and make none now;" there was a claim made, however, by the brothers, and by direction of the court the executor paid them some \$360; his total estate was inventoried at \$6502.50; his widow remained in the homestead, and made a home for her son John, and added to her income by keeping boarders; she finally became reconciled to her father but never to her mother; a woman of sweet manners and disposition, and always retained her good looks; in her will, executed Aug. 19, 1851, she shows great anxiety to protect her son John from himself, and leaves all her estate in trust for his benefit; there were several children. but one of whom lived to maturity.



"OBITUARY.—Entered into rest. On Monday evening, June 21, at the age of 62 years, the Rev. Dr. Patrick Henry Greenleaf, Rector of Emmanuel Church, Brooklyn, after a laborious and faithful service of more than thirty years in the sacred ministry of the church.

The deceased was born in the State of Maine, and was a son of the late Hon. Simon Greenleaf. After graduating at Bowdoin College, Me., he devoted himself for a few years to the study of law, but his attention was soon turned to the work of the ministry. He pursued his theological studies under Bishop Doane, and was ordained Deacon by Bishop Griswold. During that period of his long and useful ministry which preceded his labors in Brooklyn, he was connected with the Dioceses of Massachusetts and Pennsylvania in the east, and Indiana and Ohio in the west. For several years he was Rector of St. John's, Charlestown, Mass., also of St. Paul's. Cincinnati, previous to his removal to Brooklyn. In 1862 he became the Rector of Emmanuel Church in the last named city, a Parish which has prospered greatly under his spiritual charge. His distinguishing traits were a steadfast devotion to duty as a parish priest; a forwardness in encouraging and sustaining works of merey and charity in the Master's name; singular impressiveness in pulpit ministrations, possessing talent in this respect, as we believe, above the average of his contemporaries in the ministry; and yet his sermons were ever characterized by spirituality of tone and manly earnestness, and eminently profitable to the hearers. He possessed also a remarkable aptitude for teaching, his presentations of religious truth being distinguished for clearness, conciseness and force of illustration. As an instructor of the younger members of the flock he had few superiors.

Suddenly, and under unwonted circumstances, reminding us most forcibly of the uncertainty of all human plans, while within the walls of that church where he publicly ministered, God called away his faithful servant, now grown old and feeble after years of patient toil.

We sorrow for him, but not as those without hope, for 'blessed are the dead who die in the Lord.' 'They rest from their labors, and their works do follow them.'

At a meeting of the Clergy of Brooklyn and vicinity, called by the Rt. Revd. the Bishop of Long Island (Bishop Littlejohn) and



held in the vestry room of Emmanuel church, on the nativity of St. John the Baptist's day, June 24, 1869, the following minute and resolutions were unanimously adopted:

It having pleased our Heavenly Father in his inserntable wisdom to call away from the scene of his earthly labors, the Rev. Patrick Henry Greenleaf, D.D., Rector of Emmanuel church, and our much beloved and respected brother and fellow laborer in the ministry of the church of God; therefore,

Resolved, That in the loss which the wardens, vestrymen and parishioners of Emmanuel Church have suffered in the removal of their pastor and associate, who was untiring in his devotion to their welfare, and whose earnest prosecution of all the details of parochial work, not only in the church and family, but in the schools he established and loved to foster for the nurture and care of the lambs of the flock, we desire to express our sincere sympathy and condolence, and to console them with the recollection of blessed promise of rest and reward, which are the inheritance of His faithful servants when, worn out in their Master's service on earth, they are translated hence to the fold of the chief Shepherd and Bishop of our souls.

Resolved, That we tender to the bereaved widow and family of the deceased assurances of our affectionate respect and sympathy, with the prayer that He who has smitten them so sorely may endow their souls with meekness and resignation under the trial, and in this dark hour of sorrow may lift up the light of His countenance upon them, and give them peace. estantine production of the pr

Whereas, it has pleased Almighty God in His Allwise Providence to remove from us our beloved Rector, the Revd. Patrick Henry Greenleaf, D.D., to whose well directed efforts and untiring energy, under God, we owe that measure of prosperity which has fallen to our lot during the seven years of his ministry among us; therefore,

Resolved, That while we bow in humble submission to this afflictive dispensation of our Heavenly Father, we cannot help feeling that this Parish has met with a loss that is well nigh irreparable. As our Rector and the Ambassador of Christ, he delivered his messages of love and mercy so as to speak to our hearts and influence our lives; while as our spiritual father and our friend his social, genial characteristics can never be forgotten by any who have ever been within the sphere of their influence.

His whole pastoral life among us has been marked with such self-sacrificing zeal and affectionate interest and earnestness of purpose to ensure our welfare, as to demand from each one of his parishioners the tribute of a grateful and enduring memory. Called away in a moment from the midst of his dearly loved labors, he leaves us, in his death, as he always presented to us in his life, an example of Christian resignation to the Divine will, and a solemn warning to be ready when the Master calls us home.

Resolved, That we tender to Mrs. Greenleaf and the other members of his family our respectful sympathy in this time of their bereavement. We would ask for them that same sustaining power, in the hour of trial, which he so largely enjoyed. And when this dark shadow has passed away, we would remind them of his virtues and the evidences of his usefulness and influence which will long remain behind in the Parish of Emmanuel.

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

"OBITUARY.—Died in E. Bridgewater, Jan. 26th Dea. Nathan Whitman, aged 65 years and 9 months.

The departure of this good man suggests something more than the usual newspaper notice; and it is with a mournful pleasure that these lines of remembrance are now penned.

Dea. Whitman was born in this town, April 26, 1796. Early in life he left the home of his youth, and worked at the trade of a mason in Boston. Applying himself with great diligence to his daily duties, prosperity attended his efforts, and after a few years he returned in 1830 to his native town, where he purchased a farm, and for the remainder of his days engaged in husbandry. That he was successful in this pursuit, the records of the Plymouth County Agricultural Society testify in the premiums often awarded him for his abundant crops and his valuable stock of cattle; and that confidence was placed in his judgment is to be inferred from his often being placed on committees connected with the above association.

His return to this town was at a time when the friends of the temperance cause were beginning to exert themselves to relieve the community of the frightful tide of woes which the traffic in ardent spirits had caused to sweep over our land. It required not a small degree of moral courage at that time to face the foes of human welfare who were striving to keep open the sluices of destruction. He labored undauntedly in this work, and the community at this day is enjoying the benefit of his labors. It was through his influence that an article was introduced into the regulations of the 'Union' Church, making it indispensable that the candidate for admission should assent to the pledge of total abstinence from the use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage.

Probably the greatest inducement for him to fix his residence permanently here, was that he might promote the cause of religion. He immediately united with the 'Union Congregational Church,' and was soon elected one of its officers. He remained connected with this Society till 1849, when, on the formation of the 'Trinitarian Congregational Church,' he united with the latter, and himself and the late lamented Francis Packard were chosen its deacons.



He held for some time the office of superintendent of the 'Union' Sabbath School, and afterwards of that of the new Society with which he was connected; and faithfully did he fulfill the duties of this important office.

A man of ceaseless industry, early and late at his daily labors, he seemed to realize the force of the scriptural injunction; 'Whatso-ever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might.' He took a strong interest in the education of the youth of our town and community, in the cause of human liberty, and in missions. His ardent interest in the cause of Christ led him to devote much of his time and substance to the promotion of religious institutions, and the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom on earth. Perhaps no one in this town ever contributed annually more for this purpose than he. To the poor and friendless he was always ready to render sympathy and relief. He was ever a faithful friend and counsellor to his excellent Pastor, who by this removal has been painfully bereaved, and a void is left which may not be easily filled. Happy will it be for us who remain if we keep in view those worthy men who have striven to follow in the steps of their Divine Master!

'Though dead, they speak in reason's ear, Their bright examples live; Their faith, and hope, and pious deeds, Still fresh instruction give.'"

"'MUSTERED OUT.'-With feelings of sadness came the news to the writer of the death of Nathan D. Whitman, No. 584 Seventh street, which occurred on Saturday last. Quietly since his soldier life, has he moved in our community, although for many years a resident. Still but little was known of him and his noble record as a soldier. On April 20, 1861, a meeting of the citizens of E. Bridgewater was called, for the purpose of forming a company for the war; on the 27th of April the company was formed and Nathan D. Whitman was chosen 1st Lieutenant. Early in May the company left for the seat of war and three days later were facing rebel cannon in Virginia, and were at the front for the next three years, and the stars and stripes had no truer defender than was Lieut. That service to him was severe, as in the regiment to which he was attached he was engaged in the following battles: Big Bethel, Hampton Roads, Gaines Mills, Peach Orchard, Savage Station, White Oak Swamp, Glendale, Malvern Hill, South Mountain, Antietam, Centerville, Fredericksburg, Vicksburg, Jackson, Blue Springs, Campbell Station, Knoxville, Wilderness and Spotsylvania. The marches of thousands of miles, the camps by 'Dismal Swamp' and the no less dismal camping ground by the Mississippi river, all contributed to his final muster out from our ranks and muster into the ranks of the comrades gone before. Yes, into the ranks of dear ones of his own family circle so recently gone. He was a kind husband and father as well as a true comrade. PromiThe state of the s

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nent amongst the flower pieces placed about him was a beautiful pillow, on which was the one word 'Comrade,' the gift of the 29th Mass. Reg't Association. Gen. J. H. Barnes, formerly commander of the regiment, was present with other comrades, and the scarred and mained condition of his comrades present at the funeral told more plainly than words what the silent comrade had passed through. He has gone from the 'Grand Army' here to be numbered with the Grand Army above."

Y., where he remained four years more; in the spring of 1835 Dr. Whitman accepted a commission from the A. B. C. F. M. as missionary to the North American Indians, and in company with Rev. Samuel Parker made his way as far west as the rendezvous of the American Fur Company on the Green River; in the fall Dr. Whitman returned east to obtain an outfit and arrange for another companion; his marriage had been deferred while he was searching for a colleague; chance gave him a meeting with Rev. R. H. H. Spaolding, who, with his bride, was on his way to a mission among the Osage Indians; he had but a hasty wedding, and the two brides started in the face of most discouraging reports of the possibility of ladies ever crossing the mountains; late in May, 1836, they reached the Loup Fork of the Platte; June 6, they were at Laramie; Sept. 2, four months from the Missouri River at Council Bluffs, they arrived at Walla Walla; the journey was commenced in an old wagon, which every one said would have to be abandoned, but the irrepressible energy of the Doctor overcame all obstacles, and the possibility of crossing the mountains in a wheeled vehicle was established; the Oregon question was at this time disturbing the relations between England and America; the Hudson Bay Company, who were in possession, were unwilling to give up their lands, and used every means to prevent a knowledge of the country from being ascertained; the whole question finally seemed to turn on the possibility of a wagon crossing the mountains, a point already proved by the Doctor; the indiscreet conversation of the English at Walla Walla betrayed their plans to hold the country at all hazards, and Dr. Whitman determined to defeat their schemes; in Oct., 1842, he suddenly decided to brave the perils of a winter passage over the mountains, and reach Washington before Congress adjourned; twenty-four hours after he had heard the ardent exclamation—"Hurrah for Oregon! America is too late! we have the country," he started: space forbids a narrative of the exposures he endured; twice the party nearly perished in snow storms, and nothing but Dr. Whitman's courage ever enabled them to accomplish the journey; March 3, 1843, five months after leaving home, he reached Washington, only to find the Ashburton Treaty passed by the Senate, but fortunately no mention was made of Oregon; the sturdy pioneer presented himself to Webster, then Secretary of State, and told his story; he was bluffly informed that Webster was about to exchange Oregon for some fishery rights in Newfoundland; as a last hope he decided to

call on President Tyler; after hearing him, though, the President said: "Your frozen limbs and leather breeches attest your sincerity. Can you take emigrants across the mountains in wagons?" "Give me six months and I will take a thousand emigrants across," was the reply; "well," said the President, "if you take them across, the treaty shall not be ratified;" with much effort the band of emigrants was raised, and though they were met by a delegation of the Hudson Bay Company, who declared it was impossible to cross the mountains, and were almost persuaded to abandon their wagons, before the time expired succeeded in their undertaking; the party had gathered on the Missouri at Westford, June, 1843; on the 15th they were at Fort Hall, and Sept. 10 they arrived at Walla Walla: the anger of the Company knew no bounds; they had anticipated no difficulty in retaining a country about which so little was known. and their disappointment was the greater; the Catholic missionaries. too, had marked the settlement for their own, and resented the presence of American missionaries; the country having been gained. Dr. Whitman turned himself to the task for which he had originally come, and but little is known of his life for the next four years, except as shown in the reports to the American Board; the Indians, undoubtedly instigated by both the clergy and the Company's agent, were not friendly, and this feeling at length broke out; Nov. 29. 1847, Dr. Whitman, his wife and seven others were cruelly massaered and their home destroyed; his work had, however, been accomplished, and the foul deed only recoiled upon its instigators; they quickly saw their mistake, and sought to throw the entire blame upon the Indians; history, however, has not held them blameless, though no positive proof of their complicity could be obtained: an appropriate memorial to the noble missionary has been created in the establishment of Whitman College, which was chartered in 1859 and is located at Walla Walla; the following is from a letter written by Mr. Perrin B. Whitman:

"Dr. Mareus Whitman having informed himself of a pending treaty between the U. S. Government and Great Britain, which would deprive our government of this glorious west, decided to proceed to Washington at once and stay such proceedings if possible; he left his station, Oct. 3, 1842, with one traveling companion, the Hon. A. L. Lovejoy, who continued with him as far as Taos, Mexico, where sick and discouraged he remained until spring, when he joined Dr. Whitman (then on his return) at Fort Laramie. It seems difficult to do justice to the conrage and fortitude of the

Doctor, who now pushed forward (with only a Mexican guide) by the way of Santa Fé, traveling now through a wilderness and over the most dreary and desolate mountains and barren and trackless wastes uninhabited by man. In vain storms and wintry torrents opposed him-his resolution surmounted every difficulty; he buffeted his way across rapid streams amid floating ice, traveling for hours with his clothes frozen upon him, subsisting for days upon mule and dog meat. He arrived in Washington early in March. After a futile effort with Webster, then Secretary of State, he obtained an interview with Tyler, the President, who listened with more attention and respect to his views; he presented to him the vast wealth and resources and natural advantages of the country, which resulted in his obtaining a promise from Tyler to stay all proceedings touching treaties for that summer, giving the Doctor an opportunity to prove the bringing of wagons from the Missouri River to the Columbia River either a failure or success. He arrived at Wallula, on the Columbia River, Sept. 3, 1843, establishing the practicability of emigration by wagon across the Rockies. It is due to the wonderful energy and perseverance of this one grand man that this broad, wide west, the home of so many happy, prosperous Americans, was saved to our government; he piloted the first emigration, a party of 1000 souls, across the plains, and yet this pioneer hero, to whom the country owes so much, sleeps on the mission grounds (now a farm), where he met his death at the hands of merciless savages, in a grave neglected and unmarked by even a marble slab." 1 c.

"OBITUARY.—Alice Whitman Wisewell, born in Rushville, Yates Co., N. Y., May 23, 1808; died at Naples, N. Y., June 22, 1887, aged 79 years and 1 month.

On Friday of last week (June 24, 1887) was laid to rest in Rose Ridge Cemetery one of the oldest residents of our village and one much beloved. Mrs. Wisewell was the daughter of Beza Whitman and Alice Green, pioneers to Rushville, N. Y., at the beginning of the present century. She was married to Henry F. Wisewell, March 14, 1826, and with her husband, in Sept., 1828, came to Naples to establish a home. The period of her residence here covers almost sixty years.

She was an only daughter. Her brothers were Augustus Whitman, Marcus Whitman, Samuel Whitman, Henry G. Whitman and a half-brother, Oren G. Loomis. These brothers were all especially well known in this section during their lives, and one of them, Dr. Marcus Whitman, is well known throughout the United States for his Christian missionary work in the North-west, and for his patriotic services in saving Oregon to this country. Mrs. Wisewell, the frailest member of the family, outlived all the rest. With all her legacy of ill health she possessed the Whitman endurance, resoluteness and strength of character. In the matter of memory, judgment, cheerfulness and Christian faithfulness few have been more remarkable. She kept her brightness and her interest in all that was good to the very last. She especially prized the friendship of children and young people and felt the keenest sympathy and interest for them. She was never the one to say 'The old days were better than these.' Her face was set forward not backward.

After living with the husband of her early choice for fifty-five years he was taken from her, May 4, 1881, at a time when she was herself so ill it did not seem possible that she could long survive him. But her wonderful tenacity of life stood her in good stead and six years more of courageous, useful and even happy living

were spared to her. These last years, during which she was treading the very verge of life, made familiar to her the exchange of worlds so that during the long period in which at last she lay so calmly and patiently looking death in the face she was simply happy and content. In her case nothing was left to be done, nothing to be desired. She was an intelligent Christian, having not the shadow of a fear and feeling that it was not her place to indulge in the faintest regret.

The name of Mrs. Alice Wisewell is the last one to be erased from the original roll of the First Presbyterian Church of Naples. Having been a follower of Christ and a member of the church at Rushville from the age of fifteen, she was one of the original members that were banded together in the Presbyterian church here.

At the homestead on which she had lived almost fifty years, and in the house which she had occupied forty-six years, and from which only one other spirit, that of her husband, has ever taken its flight, surrounded by all her living children, on Wednesday afternoon, (June 22, 1887) in perfect quiet and without pain, she gently breathed her last. Her children feel that it was the beautiful close of a beautiful life, and that in the memory of their mother they have a precious legacy."

Weaver and wife, \$5 in gold each; Edward Averill and wife, Jas. V. Orton and wife, \$2.50 in gold; and others, cash to the amount of nearly \$10; a picture of 'Christ in the Temple' by the Rev. Cyrus Bates of Cleveland, Ohio; gold spectacle case and gold tooth-pick by Mr. and Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Cornell; carving knife and fork, Mr. and Mrs. Turner: silk handkerchief, Mrs. Trautman. The occasion was one of the most enjoyable and all present joined in wishing this aged pair many happy years yet to come. Letters of congratulation were received from Mr. and Mrs. Almon Gilbert, Willoughby, Ohio; the Rev. Cyrus Bates of Cleveland, Ohio; Baxter Pratt, Westhampton, Mass.; James A. McKay, Dakota; Mr. H. Lyon, Wanseon, Ohio; C. E. Davison, Wavland, Mich. The observance was at the home of Hon. E. N. Bates, one of the five sons. The letter of James A. and Charlotte H. McKay is appended:

'Mr. And Mrs. Abner C. Bates—Ever honored and dear friends: Your eard of invitation to your golden wedding came duly to hand, for which please except our sincere thanks, and the assurance that it would gladden our hearts to be present to-day and take you by the hand and look into your faces once more. But as long distance, with other reasons, render this impossible, we are glad that we may communicate to you our interest—although but feebly—through the medium of the pen, and though "absent in body" yet as present in spirit, join with the circle of friends present, and present you with our united, warm, sincere and hearty congratulations. To-day marks an era in your life but seldom reached by mortals. Fifty years of wedded life are meted out to but few. Yet from these golden nuptials you are permitted to look back



through a half century to your first nuptial day when you joined hands "for better or for worse" and commenced the journey of life together. To yourselves, personally, a history is bound up in this period of fifty years. They span the activity of life, and are stored with associations and events around which your memories will often linger with fond, prolonged and glowing interest. True these years have not been one prolonged and glowing sunlight without any shadows, nor have they been one unmingled shade. But as night and day, sunlight and shade, succeed each other, giving variation and beauty to the landscape, so, also, have joys and sorrows come to you, and prosperity and adversity have succeeded each other, mingled with the cares and anxieties of life, only to develop and cement the character and impart a variegated beauty to the landscape of life. All this change and progress you have been permitted to witness and have wondered and rejoiced over it. And now, dear friends, as you stand to day upon this eminence and survey in

retrospect the accomplishments of life, none can present a better record or have better reasons for rejoicing over their life work. It is not necessary for us to remind you that your sun will go down and the shadows of the evening come on apace. All this you have anticipated and long since provided for. We express not only our own sincere sentiment but that of all present when we say, may the afternoon of your lives be greatly lengthened out and your evening be gilded with glory and brightness accompanied with peace and rest. And when in ripe old age, "full of years," you are called to your everlasting home, may your journey of life terminate in glory, honor and immortality.



John Whitman⁴]; as a lad he received the advantages of a district school education, though, like most farmers' boys, he only attended school during the winter; at the age of seventeen he was apprenticed to Dea. Carey of No. Bridgewater to learn the trade of "shop joiner," as it was then called; after leaving Dea. Carey, he went to work for Capt. Daniel Noves of Abington; the times, however, were dull and the French war, as it was called, was then raging, and in the expedition fitted out to attack Crown Point, he was



among the drafted men from Bridgewater; his elder brother, Samuel, who had accumulated a little property, went to Boston, and furnished him with the means to procure a substitute; soon after this, learning that there was a greater demand for mechanical labor in New Jersey, in company with a son of Eleazer Washburn of E. Bridgewater, he went to that State, remaining there some two years, and had strong thoughts of making that his permanent home: his father, however, had just lost his third wife, and he had a sister, whose powers had been so weakened by disease, that she was incapable of taking care of herself-urged by these considerations, he decided to return home and take charge of his father and sister, settling on his father's homestead; during the first year of their marriage, he and his wife joined the church in E. Bridgewater, and endeavored, to quote his own words, "to walk in all the commandments and ordinances of the Lord blamelessly;" about 1775 was chosen deacon of the church, an office he held till his advanced age rendered it fitting that he should retire; at the commencement of the Revolutionary war he was chosen Lieutenant of a company of militia under Capt. Alden, which office he held till the close of the war; he was, however, called into service but twice, and only once went into camp, when he was stationed for three months in Rhode Island guarding the shores; the following incident has been sent by a member of the family: "After the war he walked from Rhode Island to E. Bridgewater; when almost home, he was quite discouraged with thinking what a hard time was in store for him, as it was late in the season and his crops not planted, etc., etc.; when he came to a small 'grogshop,' he thought he would take a glass to revive his spirits; he went in and bought a drink of grog, for which he paid eleven dollars, Continental money; it was the last drink of liquor he ever took and he lived to be 107 years old; he was a strong temperance man in a time when

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temperance was surely not the fashion;" was for several years selectman, overseer of the poor and assessor of taxes, but his retiring disposition prevented him from being put forward for offices of distinction; was sometimes called upon to act as arbitrator in matters of dispute among his neighbors, and great deference was always paid to his opinions; after the death of his wife, he made an arrangement with his son Alfred to take charge of the farm, and he boarded with him the remainder of his days; he d. July 26, 1842, aged 107 years, 3 months, 22 days; this is the date as given on the grave-stone, though his son Jason, in his memoir of his father, says he died "on the night of the 19th of July, 1842;" the life of any one who attains such great age is always of interest, and his was especially so; in his personal habits he was temperate, and in some respects abstemious, being sparing in the use of alcoholic beverages, and but seldom indulging in the use of tobacco, though brought up under the influence of his father, who was an inveterate smoker; he seldom drank tea or coffee, though this habit was more from reasons of economy than because of any prejudices on the subject; it cannot be said that he had any particular habits of diet, though he always used milk very freely, and after he was 95 abstained from animal food for a few years, subsisting on a milk diet, but he thought that he was not quite as well, so resumed the use of meat, though in small quantities; he was a man who never was in a hurry, always doing every thing with great deliberation, but he was also never idle, so that he accomplished much more than those who acted with greater haste.

In his religous opinions he was liberal, in the sense that he was averse to all extremes; he had great reverence for the Bible; from the written word he sought to form his opinions, but he was willing that others should do the same; he lived at a period when there was much religious discussion between the Calvinists and the Arminians, and



while in many points he disagreed with both schools, he also found much in both with which he could sympathize; he was, however, unwilling to wear any sectarian badge or to be called by any party name in religion; he called himself a "Bible Christian," and in the religious education of his children he cared more to instill into their minds a deep and reverential piety, and leave all doctrinal questions to be settled as in their own matured judgment seemed best; acting upon this freedom, some of his children embraced views and doctrines different from his own, but this made no difference in his treatment or feelings toward them; in his family government there was much of firmness and decision, but nothing of severity; he seemed to place more reliance upon always showing before them his own example of Christian spirit and deportment than in talking to them upon the subject; he was not distinguished by any striking peculiarity of character, but was thoroughly well balanced; though having but scanty opportunities when young to secure a liberal education, he appreciated its advantages and sent three of his sons to college; a great reader in his later years, taking an interest first in practical and devotional religious works, and after that in the history of the country; he was universally cheerful and always satisfied with what was done for him, and was ever unwilling to give trouble even when his great age rendered him in many respects dependent on others; he would say: "I would not make you so much trouble if I could possibly help it;" the last few years of his life he lost his eye-sight, and his hearing became greatly impaired, but he never yielded to the natural peevishness of old age, and taking care of him was much more of a pleasure than a burden; he died of no disease, but the energies of his nature became exhausted; "when he expired there was no struggle, no convulsion; the spirit had occupied the tenement of clay until it was worn out, and then it quietly took its departure and passed to





BRIEF MEMOIR ON THE REV. NATHANIEL WHITMAN BY HIS ELDEST SON, H. C. WHITMAN OF CINCINNATI, O.

"The necessarily limited space allowed for this memoir will only permit a very imperfect record of the life and character of Mr. Whitman. To do full justice to his character and the labors of his long and blameless and useful life would require a volume. No more fitting justification 102502500 310

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for such memoir, if one be asked, could be given than the following truthful and touching words of his in the commencement of the funeral sermon preached by him in Billerica, Mass., upon the occasion of the funeral of his venerable colleague, the Rev. Henry Cummings, D.D.:

'It is no less a dictate of religion than the impulse of a virtuous heart to cherish a grateful remembrance of those who have shone as lights in the world. By embalming in our hearts the remembrance of the great and good, we give honor to whom honor is due, provide for ourselves the richest consolation under bereavements, and become stimulated to the pursuit of universal excellence.'

Mr. Whitman was born in E. Bridgewater, Mass., Dec. 25, 1785. His parents were Dea. John Whitman and Abigail His father, Dea. John, lived to the great age of 107 years and 3 months. The subject of this sketch was, on the maternal side, the fifth in descent from Captain Miles Standish, who has been aptly described as 'the renowned soldier, shield and defence of the Pilgrims.' Mr. Whitman's father, Dea. John, was not a man of wealth, and had a very large family; there were eleven brothers and sisters by last wife and two living by a former wife—in all thirteen. Of the sons, three—Nathaniel Whitman, and his younger brother Bernard, afterwards a Unitarian minister settled in Waltham, Mass., and Jason Whitman, who was also a Unitarian minister settled at Portland, Me.—all from early youth desired to obtain a liberal education, and to become religious teachers. I have often heard my father, Nathaniel, rejoice that his parents were lovers of education, and were glad to do all they could to aid the wish of their sons to acquire such an education. But though Mr. Whitman's father, Dea. John, had a farm and other means, yet it became necessary for the subject of this memoir to depend mainly on his own energy to procure the means to enable him to secure a ministerial and theological education; and to this end he labored in various ways assiduously.

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His father, with great liberality to aid in this laudable purpose, gave his sons 'their time' after they became sixteen; and my father improved all the time so given him to earn, in various ways, money, while at the same time he was forming habits of industry and labor which, through his long life, never left him. He says, in some recollections of his life which he left in writing: 'No forms of idleness were seen, or allowed to be seen, in our family; by precept and example the children were sedulously trained to habits of useful industry. Labor such as was demanded by the farmer-like life which we were leading was an honored institution with us.' And my father says, commenting on this rule of the family: 'We were thus privileged through necessity to begin life aright in this matter of personal labor.' He had the usual opportunities of those days in attending, in the winter, the common school; and his evenings were devoted mainly to improvement in his studies—reading, declamation, writing, etc. His father's family was a religious one; but unlike the case of too many so-called religious families, so wise and kind and liberal in word and deed were his parents, that the daily habit of family prayers, and the conduct of the members being governed by religious rules, were pleasant and only added to the charm of domestic life. My father says: 'And it was a pleasure and satisfaction to go up to the House of God with them who kept holy time.' The whole atmosphere of his father's home was religious without bigotry, moral without fanaticism, intellectual without dogmatism, gentle and refined, but bracing and progressive, its government firm but mild, and mutual love and affection filled the hearts and dictated the words and manners of all its members; so was laid in this blessed family circle the foundation of those mental, religious, moral and physical habits which grew with my father's years and ripened into the rich fruit of a Christian scholar, gentleman and a firm and eloquent advocate of those views of religion he deemed true; of a tender and

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sympathizing pastor and friend, and not least of all, a wise, firm, devoted, generous, loving and self-sacrificing father and husband, whom wife and children looked up to with confidence and respect, and loved deeply and trustingly.

My father's object in so devoting his energies to the acquisition of a liberal education was, that he might become a religious teacher. He says in his recollections: 'I cherished the purpose, from my earliest recollection, of getting a public education if it should prove to be consistently in my power, and to make the Christian ministry the profession to which I would aspire.' It was not pride, or vanity, or any selfish motive which prompted this purpose: but simply his desire to do good to humanity and aid in the propagation of the religious doctrines he so firmly believed in, as essential to man's happiness in this world and a future life. Time does not permit me to give in detail the struggles and sacrifices my father made and endured to secure this purpose. By all the proper means attainable by labor, school teaching, and partly aided by loans from generous friends, he at last was fitted to enter Harvard University, which he did in 1805, with distinction. His talents were of a high order, and he had a remarkable memory. He had special aptitude as well for classical as mathematical studies, and during his entire college course he took high rank as a scholar; and he enjoyed the respect and confidence of all the faculty. At one time, during his course, he was assigned by the faculty, as an exhibition mathematical part, the calculation of a total eclipse of the moon, and which proved to be exact. He was beloved and respected by all his fellow students, and was a leading member of all the important college societies or 'clubs' as they were called, which were supported by the undergraduates—as the 'Aureus Ramus' or Golden Branch, 'The Oratorical Club,' 'Hasty Pudding Club,' 'Phi Beta Kappa Society,' and 'The Moral and Religious Chub.'

His college life was marked by hard, close study, dili-

gent reading of instructive works, much attention to elocution and writing. John Quincy Adams was then the teacher of elocution, and his able Lectures on Elocution were afterwards published in two volumes. He graduated in 1809 with high honor, and through his life the faculty and his fellow students, so long as they lived, were his warm friends and admirers. He made sacrifices and had to use rigid economy to enable himself to pass through college. He was aided somewhat from the 'Hopkins fund,' which was, under the terms imposed by its donor, to the extent of its annual income, appropriated to the benefit of indigent students judged to have a claim on it, arising from 'talents, scholarship and character.' His sister, Miss Bathsheba Whitman, a lady of much rank as a teacher, and very generous, and who lived to be 92, kindly aided him from her earnings. Other friends also generously contributed. He also taught school in vacations, and held several positions in college which paid something. Upon his graduating, he received an invitation to go to Exeter, and take the position of assistant instructor in Phillips Academy. He remained there two years, teaching one year only, however, giving great satisfaction as a teacher, and was highly esteemed by Dr. Abbott, Principal of the Academy, and all others concerned in its management, for his abilities, zeal, manners and success in teaching. During his second year he pursued his theological and other studies and reading with a view of fitting himself for a minister, under the care and instruction of Rev. Joseph Buckminister of Portsmouth, N. H. Exeter at that time was noted for its culture and intellectual taste, and was graced by the society of numerous ladies and gentlemen of talent and education. This society my father was a member of, and he has in his recollection thus gratefully spoken of it, which he calls 'this Cultivated Circle: "The feast of reason and the flow of soul" enjoyed by me in the society, so constantly, so variously and so richly, lives in my memory in ever increasing fresh-



ness and nourish within me devoted gratitude to God for bestowing upon me so precious a privilege.' In after years many of these ladies and gentlemen filled high positions, socially, and several of the gentlemen became leaders among men and were called to high public stations. During his second year at Exeter, one of the religious societies there having no pastor, by special request he performed for several months public services on the Sabbath, reading printed sermons, and conducting the other services in the usual manner.

He was much beloved by all the people of Exeter who knew him, and general regret was expressed at his leaving. He also for a few months taught one session a day in a small school of young ladies, besides having at the same time a private lady pupil, afterwards wife of President Soule. Upon leaving Exeter he, in the fall of 1811, accepted the position of a tutor in Bowdoin College, at Brunswick, Me. There were but two tutors in college; my father was the eldest and so the heaviest tutorial duties and labors fell upon him. He says in his recollections, speaking of his position there: 'My own situation would have been more to my mind had the branches in which I was required to instruct been fewer and more fixed. That it was not so, was owing to the youth of the college and its scanty funds, so that the instructors were not as many as was desirable. The branches in which I was required pretty constantly to instruct were Latin and Greek, and Mathematics, including Conic Sections, Navigation, Surveying, etc., and occasionally, for a while, had to teach a class in International Law, parts of Natural Philosophy, Rhetoric, Butler's Analogy, etc.' He also says: 'The students boarded in term time at a hotel near the college in commons. It devolved on me, as the older tutor, to preside at the table. The students were orderly and respectful: I had not in a single instance the least trouble in presiding.' In addition to his duties as tutor, he diligently pursued his Biblical and other profes-



sional studies. He had a key to the College Library and used it as his own. He says: 'I confined myself at Brunswick too closely for my health, probably, to my college duties, and to my professional studies. My main efforts, however, were spent in a careful and critical study of the New Testament in Greek.'

He found, as he says, his year spent in Brunswick a happy and profitable one. He was respected and admired by Pres. Appleton and all the faculty, with whom his relations both professional and social were intimate. The college, years after, conferred upon him, in common with all who had been tutors, an honorary degree. The undergraduates he taught not only appreciated his talents and fine scholarship and happy manner of teaching, but loved him for his kindness and his warm sympathies with them, and his zeal in aiding their progress as students and men. And the two classes he taught—Sophomores and Juniors-in documents, written and signed by the members, thanked him for his instruction and kind zeal and interest in their behalf, and one of these documents, now before me—that signed by the Sophomore class, Aug., 1812—is subscribed: 'Your Affectionate Friends.' He left Brunswick, in the autumn of 1812, for Cambridge, there to complete his theological studies.

Previously to going to Cambridge, he had for a while thought of going to Andover. As he says in his recollections, he had, while a youth, and for some succeeding years inclined, from the bias given his mind by early reading and the doctrines taught in the church which his father and family attended, to the belief in the Trinity and orthodox (so-called) system of faith. But by study and long and conscientious examination, he became satisfied of the truth of liberal views and the falsity of the opposite. His father, though a Trinitarian, was liberal in his views, and always impressed on his children the duty of a free and independent thought. It is curious that my father's

intense love of individual liberty of thought should have been the determining cause of his refusal to go to Andover and instead to Cambridge; but so it was. And in simple justice to my father's head and heart, I must here quote somewhat at length from his recollections. Writing on the subject he says: 'For a deep love of liberty, to be controlled by Christian principles, I was trained by my parents, both by their precepts and their examples. I was educated, as were all the children of the family, to form my character under an influential sense of my individual or personal responsibility to God. The purport of parental instruction to me on the subject was: For your Christian course follow not me; follow not any man; follow not any body of men; but follow Christ. Reverence, love and obey the saving truths of the Gospel. Search the Scriptures. Prove all things; hold fast that which is good. Be thus faithful unto death and all will be well with you.' No nobler, safer rule could have been given a son by intelligent Christian parents. And my father says of it: 'This instruction has comprised the underlying elements of my Christian course from its commencement.' He says as to Andover: 'I concluded I would study divinity at Andover provided I could be free to follow the leadings of Gospel truth, as I should apprehend and experience them.' And to ascertain if he could so be free in thought, he visited Andover, examined the situation, but to his great surprise found that that institution and its professors were bound down to an iron creed, and to teach which all the professors were obliged then, as now, to sign an agreement at stated periods. Of course such stupid bigotry, so opposed to all free thought, to all candid and intellectual discussion, to all progress, could not but disgust such a man as my father. So he at once determined to enter the Cambridge Divinity School, and there, inspired by the lofty piety, by the broad and liberal and free course of study, which ruled that school, he completed his theologi-



cal course; and convinced by his critical study of the Scriptures, and by careful examination of Ecclesiastical History, and by Christian logic, of the truth of Unitarianism, he ever after was one of its sincerest, most earnest, intelligent, and able expounders and supporters; and in the long and often bitter controversy which raged in Massachusetts for many years between orthodoxy so-called and Unitarianism, he was a prominent actor, writer and speaker; in newspapers, religious magazines, sermons, addresses, intellectual combats at ministerial associations, and by every other honorable way, he did all he could to overthrow the bigotry and error of orthodoxy. But while he was ever bold, decided and earnest in his warfare, he was charitable, forgiving, and prudent and liberal, so that he won the respect and admiration of his theological foes spite his hard blows and gallant fights. And he was cheered and blessed in his old age by seeing the fruits of the long but noble warfare against orthodox ignorance and bigotry, in liberal thought, becoming dominant in Massachusetts even in most orthodox societies.

My father was well armed for such an arduous and lifelong contest. He was thoroughly educated in general studies, and history, both profane and religious. He was familiar with all the doctrines and history of all sects. was a splendid Greek, Latin and Hebrew scholar. He read and wrote the Hebrew with ease. He had the rare power of a critic, of a large, generous yet close and exact habit. His memory was remarkable; it rarely failed him. He was too modest, and so did not at all times receive the appreciation his great talents and acquirements and labors merited. But by those in and out of the ministry who knew him well, he was held 'primus inter pares.' He had a remarkable logical power, both in statement and in analysis. No language, however skillfully woven together, could confuse his clear, rapid, close, logical mind. And with all his great powers were combined the kindest, sweetest,



most winning and persuasive manner and speech. While he had great brain power, his sympathies were deep and his nature was gentle, loving and affectionate. To serve all, to do good to all, to assuage sorrow, cheer the sad, encourage the depressed and weary, to elevate the character by sound views of religion, to aid society in all ways, were to him not a cold duty, but a happy labor. And as eminent as he was as a minister, as a writer, thinker and speaker, he was, if possible, greater as a pastor in parochial visits to the sick, the poor, the anxious. His face, as he went among the homes of his people, was welcomed by all, rich or poor, on whom it shone. His footsteps were gladsome to hear. He was ever a strong friend of education, and wherever he was placed he gladly labored—on school committees and in all ways possible to build up and advance the cause of education. He had eminent social gifts, was a ready and instructive conversationalist, was witty, very humorous at times, and had a vast fund of anecdotes ever ready, which his fine memory enabled him to use in the social circle to the great pleasure of his hearers.

In May, 1813, at the earnest solicitation of the distinguished Henry Ware, D.D., Professor of Divinity in Cambridge, and other friends, my father consented to go before the 'Boston Association' of ministers to be examined for approbation as a clergyman. He had desired to remain a year longer at Cambridge. He was, as to character, acquirements and all requisites, found worthy by the Association of the high calling of a religious teacher, and was, by an unanimous vote, 'approbated,' as it was then called, to preach. He at once responded to invitations to preach, and Jan. 1, 1814, was ordained in Billerica, Mass., as colleague of the justly celebrated Rev. Henry Cummings, D.D. The parish was large and the duties heavy. He remained there, as colleague, and after the death of Dr. Cummings, as sole pastor—in all for twenty-one years

(21)—when he asked a dismissal, which was reluctantly given. Time or space forbid, as I would like, to give in detail a history of my father's services while pastor of several societies. All permitted to be said is—that as the minister at all these places, he was 'a bright and shining light' intellectually, morally and socially. Admired and respected as well by outsiders as the people to whom he ministered, constant and indefatigable in all good words and works, and faithful at all times, he labored to advance the cause of his Master, Jesus Christ.

In the autumn of 1836, having resigned in Billerica in the spring of 1835, he was installed as pastor over the Unitarian Church in Wilton, N. H., where he remained till the fall of 1840. His ministry there was successful, and his labors for the good of the parish and people generally were, as ever with him, constant and faithful. Here, owing to the fierce political strife in 1840, political difficulties arose in the parish. The majority of the people were Democrats; he was a Whig. They declared generally: 'A minister had no right to vote for presidential candidates.' He thought of course he had, and so discharged his plain duty as a citizen to vote as he believed. This made some unpleasant feeling among some of his parishioners. In the spring of 1841, in May, his dearly loved and devoted wife died. This sad affliction, added to the political difficulty, caused him, in the autumn of 1841, to ask a dismission, which was granted.

From Wilton he went to Calais, Me., and preached there to the Unitarian Society till May, 1844. June 1 he preached to the Unitarian Society in E. Bridgewater, Mass., his native place, and was immediately invited to settle there; he accepted the invitation, though the congregation and people of Calais were strongly attached to him, and wished him to remain. He was installed over the E. Bridgewater Church in July, 1844. He was much pleased at being called to minister in his native town. He



met old friends, and the associations of his boyhood and youth added delight. It is needless to say that his life and ministry in E. Bridgewater were rounded out with successful public labor and social duties and pleasures. He was beloved of all, by all religious denominations. He continued as pastor there till 1852 in September. At this time he had been in active life as clergyman for forty-one years, and although still vigorous in body and mind, his children thought he had labored in public long enough; and desirous that their father, who had ever been to them a devoted and loving father, should have rest and a chance to enjoy the pleasures of reading and study so congenial to him, succeeded in at last persuading him to resign his ministry and retire. His congregation was surprised at his unexpected request of dismissal, and urged him strongly to remain as their pastor. But yielding to the wishes of his children, he declined to stay longer, and with mutual love and confidence and respect the pastoral relations were sundered. The lovely village of Deerfield, Mass., in the Connecticut valley, was, by common consent of parents and children, chosen as the place of retreat. His children bought him a pleasant home, with an acre of fine garden soil attached, as he was passionately attached to gardening, and to this home he and his noble wife, Mrs. Abby P. Whitman, retired in September, 1852. The place met all the wishes and requirements of my father. He was a strong lover of nature in all her moods and developments, and here it was fully gratified. The town of Deerfield, too, was an intellectual one, having a large circle of cultivated people, among them several authors and authoresses. There was also a large and flourishing Unitarian church; and one of its pastors once told me that he 'had feared severe criticism from my father as a parishioner' when he first came. 'But he found him, to his joy, a generous, just, appreciative and sympathizing one.' Beside the pastor of the church, father had for a time the great pleasure



of intimate friendship and communion with the distinguished ex-Unitarian clergymen, Rev. Dr. Willard and Rev. Preserved Smith, both now dead.

My father, though thus retired from regular ministerial labor, yet true to his principles and tastes continued, up to his death active, so far as age permitted, in physical labor and duties, and a close critical scholar and student and He told me in the fall he died, that it was his custom generally to write one sermon a week, not for delivering but, as he said, 'to keep his mental powers strong.' His life there was a fragrance and a blessing to his family, his friends and to society. He preserved to the last his humor, his geniality and wit, his bright conversational power. His mind remained in full vigor, and so active was it, and so fond was he of scholastic reading, that the summer of his death, in July, he invited me, being on a visit, to sit on the porch and hear him read Plato in the original. Wonderful, noble, blessed old patriarch. He and his wife made the Deerfield home what our parents had named it-- 'Sunny Side.' And so it ever was to us children, who found it a sweet, loving home for all-parents, children and grandchildren. Some sixteen years were thus passed by him at Deerfield when, on October 29, 1869, our good father, after a short illness, passed away, aged 84 years and 10 months, respected and beloved of all, having lived a long life devoted to duty and good deeds. But for the relation I bear him, I could and should speak louder words of praise, for he merits them. I cannot omit a few words as to father's domestic life and relations. He was thoroughly a domestic man, a lover of home, of wife, and children and grandchildren, and of all its inmates. nature was so tender and sympathetic that as he more than once told me, he drew strength and consolation and inspiration from his domestic companionship. No better, kinder husband ever lived. He was very fortunate in his married relations.



I wish here to record what I know is the unanimous opinion of the children living, that never was a desolate family of children more blessed in a stepmother than we were. She was indeed a mother to us all, and our own mother could not have exceeded her in loving care, for-bearance and self-sacrifice for us. My father was very fortunate in both his wives. They were both brilliant, educated and accomplished and intellectual women. And in addition, they were good domestic managers and in all respects were to my father 'helpmeets' indeed."

"The life of Bernard Whitman, though comparatively short, was remarkably useful and busy, and his character

so far from ordinary, that he deserves some words of special notice. From early youth he had determined to have a collegiate education as the best training for future work. By the kindness of his father, he was allowed, after he was sixteen years old, to appropriate his own earnings for that purpose. At twenty-two, by different kinds of labor, more especially factory work, he had accumulated a small capital, but sufficient, in his opinion, to warrant the attempt, and so entered Harvard College as Freshman; but, owing to his connection with what was termed a rebellion against the authorities, was rusticated with some other participants. His enthusiasm, for what he deemed right, led him into this unfortunate difficulty, which he always afterward regretted, and which was the cause of his leaving college immediately after he had been reexamined and admitted but to the class below his own. Had that portion of his punishment been remitted he would have continued his collegiate course, but he could not bear that degradation in the community where before he had held a distinguished rank for scholarship and good character. That his participation in this unfortunate uprising was viewed, naturally, with different eyes by his associates is evidenced from the fact that, on leaving the University, he was the recipient of many tokens of esteem from his fellows-among others, an elegant edition of the New Testament in Greek, with this inscription:

> 'For more true joy Marcellus exiled feels Than Caesar with a Senate at his heels.'

Governors and governed rarely reason from the same stand-point. A collegiate course would undoubtedly have been a great advantage, but its loss could but modify not destroy his natural gifts which were after developed by self-training. His tendencies were toward a religious life and the position of a teacher.

Originally, from early associations, he was inclined to Trinitarianism and strictly Orthodox views, but before he

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entered the ministry, after deep thought and study, he adopted more liberal ideas, and in 1826 he was permanently settled as a Unitarian in Waltham, Mass. At that time religious controversy was rife, and attacks were frequent and venomous on his particular belief. He ardently entered the field, fighting many a good fight for his faith. The criticisms upon his ability as a controversialist by adversaries at the time are amusing. When he contended at one end of the line with the Orthodox, he was praised by the Universalists; when fighting the latter, he was lauded by the former, so it is fair to conclude that he exhibited considerable ability. But these methods were foreign to his disposition, which though ardent in defence of the right, was eminently one of love, especially toward the young and struggling. Wherever he worked as a teacher before his ordination—at Billerica, Wellfleet, Sandwich and Beverly-he left behind him grateful hearts, of the youth of both sexes, whom he had led into the pleasant paths of good literature and practical religion. And so after at Waltham he was one of the chief promoters of the Rumford Institute, well known as the means of vast good in mental and moral improvement.

He raised the standard of common education, and practically, assiduously and continually worked to carry out his theories for the increase of public happiness, which he thus formulized, saying: 'In the first place, I would propose that all our children receive a high degree of education; 2d, that all our children receive a Christian education; 3d, that the Christian ministry should fulfill the important purpose for which it was established; 4th, that a constant supply of useful reading be furnished for all members of society; 5th, that associations be formed in every town for mutual improvement.' His house and his large miscellaneous library were always open, particularly to that portion of his congregation dependent upon their daily factory labor. As he preached so he taught by his

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daily life; to use the language of an old friend: 'His great and peculiar characteristic was to infuse his own spirit into others. He breathed the breath of life into the people around him and made them living souls. There never seemed, there never was, any self in him. In this lay his great powers over others. We all, who knew him, seemed parts of him and he of us. There was a glorious energy of character in him, always directing itself onward with a high and noble firmness. It gathered to itself all good within its widely extended atmosphere. Blessed were those who lived within its influence. Of the people, for the people, to them he dedicated his life. Although larger, and, in the ordinary sense, more pleasant fields were offered to his ministry, he chose to labor with those who had first called him, believing that there he could do most good. An ardent Christian, devoted to all good works, so he lived, so he died, deeply mourned as he had been fervently loved. To all, but particularly to the earnest youthful struggler, his life is an example and incentive." 2 c., b. Waltham.

"Judge B. C. Whitman, who died at San Francisco on Thursday of last week (Ang. 5, 1885), was one of the notable men of the coast; he was born at Waltham, Mass., 1828, and graduated from Harvard in the class of 1846; he came to California in 1850, on the

Wells; in 1850 he was elected Sheriff of the county, but resigned after a few months; he also served as City Clerk of Benicia; Mr. Whitman also served this county in the Assembly of 1854, having been elected on the Whig ticket; in 1856 he ran for Congress on the Know-Nothing ticket, but was defeated; in 1863 Mr. Whitman left here for Virginia City, where he continued the practice of his profession, taking a prominent part in most of the mining litigations on the Comstock Lode; in 1868 he was elected one of the Justices of the Supreme Court of Nevada, and in the fall of that year was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Chief Justice Beatty; he removed to San Francisco in 1882, continuing there the practice of his profession; Mr. Whitman was a man of large attainments, and his character was above reproach; he was of genial disposition and extremely courteous in his manners; he attracted to himself a large circle of warm friends, several of whom are of this city; he married Miss Mary Church of Rough and Ready, having made her acquaintance when she was a pupil of Miss Atkins' Seminary;" 1 c.

Jan. 25, 1848, just before the completion of his new church; he was buried Jan. 28; the society voted to pay his salary till the May following, "as a token of their high respect for him and his family, and for his unceasing labors to promote the cause of religion, education and every good work while he was permitted to remain among the living:" though a man of feeble constitution, he performed a vast amount of work; leaving Saco, his first charge, as they were unable to provide a suitable support for a minister, he took charge of the general agency of the American Unitarian Association; a new society was organized at Portland and he was induced to take charge of the same; his incessant labors here impaired his health, and his physicians ordered rest and a change to a warmer climate; he went to Savannah and as soon as he found his strength returning sought occupation in that vicinity; finding that he could not preach in that section with the freedom to which he was accustomed, and lack of facilities for the instruction of his children being a further objection, he returned to Portland in 1842, residing there till his call to Lexington in 1845; he was ardently devoted to his profession, and never spared himself where there was a field of labor before him; in addition to his weekly preparation for the pulpit, he was a constant contributor for periodicals and the weekly press; his publications include, besides many sermons, religious tracts and addresses, the memoirs of Rev. Edward H. Ecles of Kennebunk, Me.; of his brother, Rev. Bernard⁶ W. of Waltham; and his father, Dea. John⁵ of Bridgewater; a man of modest unaffected piety, he was firm and decided in his religious opinions, yet far removed from a narrow sectarian spirit; by the simplicity of his manners, his liberal and benevolent disposition and good sense, he always secured the respect and esteem of the community in which he lived; his writings were characterized by strength and directness, guided by



practical wisdom and experience; his preaching was earnest, direct, practical and persuasive, and rather controversial than declamatory in manner; in matters of education he took great interest, and served on the Lexington school committee, 1846–47; his widow resides at Lexington with her daughter; 5 c.

Cleveland, O., June 23, 1884; a book-binder, engaged in business at Cleveland; Mrs. Wetmore has long been known as "the Prisoner's Friend;" of her it may be said literally and in the largest sense: "I was an hungered and ye gave me meat, naked and ye clothed me; I was sick and in prison and ve visited me;" inheriting from her parents a love of humanity, she early devoted herself to charitable works: never of a robust constitution, and for many years an invalid, she has yet accomplished in her chosen fields an amount of work that puts to shame those much stronger than herself; nearly twenty years ago she began the special work of earing for friendless prisoners, and from that time to this she has been constantly engaged in this work, but never to the neglect of her home duties; for years she ministered tenderly to her invalid mother, and her home was a blessed nook to the many needy ones who found refuge there; her cheering words and deeds of sympathy and friendship did not end when those, in whom she was interested, were discharged from prison; she has taken ragged and forlorn prisoners, just discharged, into her own home, clothed them and kept them there, sometimes for weeks, until employment at honest labor could be secured for them; in this she has had to bear the opposition of friends, who considered her a visionary enthusiast, squandering her time and means in a profitless and dangerous work; but she has the courage of her convictions, and has pursued the even tenor of her way; her sense of right and justice has carried her over opposition, prejudice and sneers; and her moral bravery has won the admiration of all who know her; resides with her father at Malden; P. O. box 596; no issue.

"In the midst of life we are in the midst of death. Again we are reminded of the shortness of life and the certainty of the briefness of our sojourn here below. Indeed, no land or clime, this side the 'silent flowing river,' has been discovered where the 'fatal monster' comes not.

Our esteemed townsman, Luther Whitman, quietly and peacefully passed over to that land 'from whose bourne no traveler ever returns,' Thursday, Jan. 26 (1882), after a painful illness of several weeks' duration. When the swift messenger removes from our midst one who for a great many years has been identified with the growth and varied interests of our town, it seems fitting as well as appropriate to extend the ordinary obituary notice to a brief outline sketch of the life and public services of the deceased. Mr. Whitman was born in Bridgewater, Mass., March 10, 1802; his ancestors were English. Capt. John Whitman, his great-great-grandfather, came to this country in the 'Mayflower' from the west of England. Luther Whitman came to Winthrop in 1815 with his father, Ezra Whitman, who was a clock manufacturer; for a number of years after attaining his majority he continued in the business of his father, manufacturing church and tower clocks chiefly, and the 'Old South' Church at Boston, Mass., has in its steeple, in active operation, one of the clocks of his make where, for many years, it has looked down upon the most populous and thriving city of New England, and correctly pointed out to hundreds of thousands of people the precise time of day. During this time he invented many eurious and useful articles-among them a gear-cutting machine for cutting the cog-wheels of clocks and watches; this principle is still embodied in every gear-cutter in use in America. In 1830 he constructed and put in successful operation a self-acting fog bell on the coast of Maine, near Owl's Head, upon a very dangerous rock which could not be reached in a storm; by his device, worked by



machinery, the bell could be rung continuously without the presence of an operator. But his active mind and inventive genius could not long be content or circumscribed with this kind of work. In 1831 he commenced his real life's work—that of an inventor and manufacturer. His first place of business was in what is now the carding rooms over the grist-mill on Mechanics row. After earrying on his business there for a short time, it became apparent that he must have more room to develop the plans and earry them into successful operation that were destined to give him rank high up among the inventors of the world. Consequently, he purchased the mills and privileges and dwelling-house of J. H. Merrill, Hiram and John Cole in 1845 and greatly enlarged his business. Feb. 13, 1853, he encountered a very serious drawback by the loss of his entire mill property and house by fire. Undaunted by this terrible eatastrophe, be immediately rebuilt his factories and purchased the mill privilege then owned by Benjamin and Davis in order to supply the everincreasing demand for his goods. These factories he continued to occupy and operate till 1876 when, on account of failing health, he turned the business over to his son, W. E. Whitman, who has continued the business until the present time. During all this time he did a large amount of business, employing a large number of workmen, and contributed very largely to the building up of our beautiful village. He also furnished capital and with his brother started a business in Baltimore under the firm name of L. & E. Whitman, which proved a very successful undertaking. As an inventor he will ever rank high among those who have benefitted the world by their useful inventions. In 1825 he commenced taking out patents on thrashing-machines and continued to make improvements on them for several years, and he is undoubtedly the original inventor of the thrashing machine in America. J. I. Case of Racine, Wis., said a few years since that he would give more to meet Luther Whitman and take him by the hand than any man in the world, for to him belongs the credit of inventing the thrashing-machine.' It is said, and probably truthfully, that there is not a thrashingmachine in use in America to-day that does not use his patent. He also invented the revolving horse-rake, hundreds of thousands of which have been used, and it is really the best horse-rake ever made. In politics Mr. Whitman was originally a Whig, afterward a Republican, always taking a deep interest in public affairs, but being too modest to put himself forward into the political arena; he served the town acceptably as selectman, absolutely declining a re-election. He was for many years a member of the Congregational church,

uniting with it in May, 1842; his purse was always open to supply the needs of the church; he was one of the twelve who agreed to assume all the expense of rebuilding the church edifice, and was chairman of the committee of three who rebuilt it, and upon whom devolved all the responsibility, which at this time was very great, as the church was split asunder from its extreme issues upon political questions; the undertaking was successfully earried out. As a temperance man he ranks among the first in his country; in this as in everything else he was practical and in earnest rather than demonstrative, and his deeds and every day life told rather than loud or boisterous declarations. To him belongs the credit of raising the first building without rum in this county (that where Abiel Robinson now lives). He was told he could not do it without rum (remember this was at a time when ministers even took their toddy), but he quietly said he would do it and he did; the building went up without any rum. No man had a higher appreciation of his friends than Mr. Whitman, and he never turned his back on a man who did him a kind act. His enemies, if he had such, he never deceived by telling them he loved or respected them. He was not without his faults-none of us are-but his good qualities largely outweighed them. He leaves a wife, to whom he was married almost a half-century ago, six sons and one daughter, and his is the first death that has occurred in the family since he was married in Nov., 1832. His six sons are all well known to the business and manufacturing world as smart, enterprising and successful business men and manufacturers. His four oldest sons own and operate one of the largest manufactories for agricultural implements and machinery in the Western States, located at St. Louis, Mo. His daughter Pamelia married Henry R. Saywood of Boston, a smart energetic business man and manufacturer.

In Mr. Whitman's death the town loses a good citizen; the village where he passed so many years of his life, a kind and obliging neighbor; his wife and children, an affectionate husband, a kind and indulgent father. His memory will be kept green by those who knew him best. He was a great sufferer for a few weeks previous to his decease, but his end was peaceful, and in the sweet slumbers of ripened manhood he passed quietly into the presence of God. May peace go with him to his eternal home.

'Life's race well run; Life's work well done; Life's crown well won; Now comes rest.'"

"'Those who have been instrumental in developing agricultural pursuits and bringing them to their present state of perfection have rendered the world and mankind a service which cannot be computed. It is a source of gratification that our citizen, Ezra Whitman, stands prominently among those whose name and agency in this great department of human industry and civilization will become historical, as they are now honorable to his family and city. As a citizen, editor, and an inventor and manufacturer of agricultural implements, he has exerted valuable influences on and in behalf of Baltimore.

He was born in Bridgewater, Mass., June, 1812, and reared in Winthrop, whither his parents removed when he was 4 years of age. Here his father had a manufactory and machine works. Ezra, the son, early manifested that he had inherited his father's peculiar genius, and contrived some valuable improvements in machinery which were adopted in his father's establishment. When 20 years of age, having learned various branches of mechanics, he desired to prosecute the watch-making and silver-smith business, and for this purpose entered the employ of Jacob Crooker, Waterville, Me., extensively engaged in that department of manufacture. Before the expiration of the year he determined to engage in business on his own account, and through the personal introduction and

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recommendation of Mr. Crooker, who had become strongly attached to him, he was enabled to purchase tools and a stock of jewelry and silver-ware, with which he began in Winthrop, Me., June 7, 1833, when he was just 11 years of age, which he continued for six years.

About this time public attention began to be directed to the construction of labor-saving machinery, especially in agriculture. Mr. Whitman being a close observer of the times and constant reader became satisfied that there was an opening in this direction—a profitable and useful field for genius and industry. He closed his jewelry establishment and began the manufacture of implements and labor-saving machines of various descriptions.

His father had early projected and began the construction of a reaping machine which had advanced so far as to demonstrate its practicability, and Ezra Whitman determined to give his attention to the subject of reaping by a machine. With Mr. Thomas White, who subsequently built a large establishment in York, Penn., he constructed a two-horse mower and reaper, which was probably the first complete one ever made. This was begun in 1824 and finished in 1832. It was of course comparatively crude, but demonstrated the feasibility and utility of such implements. Mr. Whitman, encouraged by its success, continued to manufacture and improve machinery, attaining a national reputation. Finding that Maine was too remote from the sections of the country where agricultural implements would be demanded, he came, in 1843, to Baltimore. He opened a steam factory for the manufacture of various farm implements and one for making plows by machinery. He also opened a warehouse for the sale of all kinds of implements, seeds, fertilizers, etc.

Up to this period the farmers and planters had proceeded upon the old principles and methods of tilling the soil and gathering erops with little prospect of change. Mr. Whitman, with wise regard for the public good and the interest of the producer, in the spirit of a reformer agitated the whole question of agriculture and disseminated through the press his views. He then interested himself in the agricultural welfare of the country, especially of his adopted State. He became a director of the Maryland Institute to encourage mechanical ingenuity and skill; assisted in the organization of the Maryland State Agricultural Society, of which he is a vice-president; circulated ably written articles upon all subjects of interest to the farmer. He founded and has since edited the Maryland Farmer, a monthly magazine, which is recognized as one of the leading agricultural journals of the day.

In Dec., 1873, he prepared and published in the Maryland Farmer an appeal to the public for a "Maryland State Horticultural Society," the result of which was the organization of the present society of that name by himself and a number of other leading gentlemen; of this he was chosen the first president. The benefits which this has conferred upon the State are seen at each annual fair, in the exhibition of splendid fruits and other productions of our State.

As a just recognition of his position and influence in the department of agriculture, he was elected treasurer of the National Agricultural Congress in 1876, and continued to hold the office a long time. For many years he has been and still is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Maryland Agricultural College. Mr. Whitman has spared neither time nor money to elevate the vocation of the farmer and advance the agricultural interests of the whole country, and with that view has traveled extensively in all

parts of the United States and Europe.

Though agriculture and agricultural implements have been Mr. Whitman's specialty, he has not confined his attention and efforts to them. He has always been thoroughly awake to the general interests of the country and communities in which he has resided. While a young man, in Maine, when the north-eastern boundary question threatened war between England and the United States, and Gov. Fairfield ordered out the State militia, Mr. Whitman was detailed as captain of a militia company to draft thirty men and rendezvous at Augusta for the protection of the north-east line. In the midst of the snows and storms of that severe climate, he reported his company ready for duty at Augusta in the remarkably short time of thirty-six hours. In 1867 he was a delegate from Baltimore to the State Convention for framing a new State Constitution, and has been prominently interested and consulted in many matters of public improvement and enterprise.

The commercial house which Mr. Whitman established in 1843 is now conducted under the firm of Ezra Whitman Sons & Co., by his sons, Frederick Winthrop and Harry Fay, whom he educated to the business, and have taken high positions in the commercial ranks as efficient merchants. His eldest son, Ezra B. Whitman, is now president of the Baltimore Plow Co., to which he devotes his

constant attention.

This brief sketch of Mr. Whitman is sufficient to show that he has, during his honorable career in Baltimore, rendered it a signal and abiding service, and that he must and will be distinguished in



its annals as one of the principal agents in its commercial progress and a real benefactor to the State of Maryland, in being among the first to emancipate her farmers from the tyranny of old and effete methods, and supplying them with material and machinery which have transformed her territory into bountiful pastures and fields, beautiful gardens and ladened orehards gleaming with golden fruit.'

In addition to the above facts we would add, that he is at present a vice-president of the old United States Agricultural Society and also a vice-president of the American Agricultural Association.

It must be a source of great satisfaction to Mr. Whitman that he was one of the first who solved the problem of entting grain by machinery, and thus opened the door of invention to the perfect mechanism of the present time in such harvest machines by which manual labor is almost dispensed with. He built the first establishment south of Mason and Dixon's line for the manufacture of plows by machinery, thus furnishing these indispensable articles to the farmer at greatly reduced cost. Another source of commendable pride must be the consciousness of having, in 1864, when the dark shadow was resting upon our country, true to the great agricultural interest, started the Maryland Farmer, which ever since has increased in popularity and value to the farming interest, while owing to enterprise on his part he has been able to reduce the price of subscription until now it has become the lowest-priced agricultural paper, while it has no superior in this country in its line of furnishing substantial knowledge and reliable practical information upon all subjects cognate to the pursuit in all its branches and to home life.

We cannot refrain from giving an extract from a well-written yet concise biographical sketch we find of him in the Biographical Encyclopedia for Maryland and the District of Columbia:

'For a man of his years (now in the 72d year of his life) he is comparatively young in appearance. He is in the enjoyment of good health; is cheerful and urbane in his manners, and though on suitable occasions determined and undaunted, is gentle and mild in his demeanor and speech. He is active and dignified in his bearing, warm in his friendship and unswerving in integrity. In all the relations of life he is irreproachable, commanding and deserving the esteem and confidence of his fellow-citizens and enjoying the rewards of his well spent years.'"

"The golden wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Ezra Whitman was celebrated on the evening of Dec. 31 (1886), at their residence, 149 Madison ave. extended. At an early hour and for some days pre-

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vious to that evening beautiful golden presents came to them from various parts of the country, some traveling a goodly distance to make glad the hearts of the recipients. Letters also from almost every State of the Union poured in upon them with pleasant congratulations. All the presents were beautiful, many of them of large value. Among them, greatly to be prized during all their lives, was a beautiful album, richly bound in velvet, containing father, mother, six children, with their husbands and wives and twelve grandchildren. There were seven silver ladles, with gold linings, and each in its superb velvet case. A beautiful gold-handled silk umbrella, manufactured in Baltimore expressly for the occasion, was a pleasant and unique offering. Several new-style parlor ornaments in golden bronze were attractive to look upon. A large double metal-framed highly polished desk inkstand for the editorial table of the Maryland Farmer. In addition were many precious gifts, such as gold pens, pencils, studs, eye-glass chain, silver cardbasket, gold souvenirs made from gold direct from the California mines, several pieces of gold coin, and a large number of beautiful bouquets, basket of flowers, etc. One of the best gifts was a largesized satin, hand-painted sachet, in richness of workmanship and perfume fit for a royal boudoir.

Decorations.—The entire dwelling was decorated with exceptional taste under the direction of Mr. Black, the florist, who has the reputation of standing No. 1 in this department. The marble mantel in the parlor was literally covered with rose-buds and cut flowers, while a large number of potted plants of rare beauty formed in the bay-window a sylvan grotto, in front of which hung the heavy lace curtains with the very appropriate and significant dates—'1836–1886.' Here Mr. and Mrs. Whitman received their guests. Potted plants were also ornamenting the hall and flowers and festoons of green were to be met with on all hands; the mirrors, curtains, chandeliers, etc., were wreathed in smilax, and the whole was a feast for the eyes of those who loved the beautiful.

THE SUPPER.—About 10 o'clock the dining-room doors were thrown open and the company were invited to the supper. The table stood, a 'thing of beauty,' in the center of the spacious dining-room. The center piece was a pyramid of fruits standing under the chandelier and aspiring well up towards its pendant lights; oranges, grapes and flowers vied with each other in making it beautiful. Mountains of cakes, meringues, ice cream in various shapes and styles, adorned the table. The substantials also held their own in turkeys, oysters, etc. From forty to fifty occupied the dining-

room at the same time while the supper was going on, and always during the evening the crowd of friends were congratulating the bride and groom in the parlor. Before the old year expired it was suggested by members of the guests that the couple whose fiftieth anniversary they were celebrating should be again married, and the Rev. H. R. Walworth, who was present, was called upon for the ceremony. Straightway all the chlidren and grandchildren were brought forward on the right and left of the bride and groom, and a most interesting ceremony of an informal character was listened to with smiling approbation by the large company. Soon after the striking of New Year bells, with many 'Happy New Year' greetings to bride and groom, the gathering dispersed.

On being admitted to the bar he formed a law partnership with Judge Gresham, and established an office at Leavenworth, Crawford Co., Ind., where he practiced law for a short time, when he removed to Corydon, purchased and took possession of the Corydon Argus, and continued it until after the commencement of Lincoln's administration, ably advocating the Republican cause. This position he relinquished to accept an appointment in the Interior Department, and was on his way to Washington from Philadelphia and had reached Havre de Grace, Maryland, when the Massachusetts troops were fired into at Baltimore (the first blood shed in the war), and the bridges between him and Baltimore burned. He then rejoined his wife at Livermore, Me., where she was visiting, and remained there until the first battle of Bull Run, when, inspired with patriotism, he, in conjunction with his cousin, Lee Strickland, organized Co. C, of the 8th Maine Vols., of which he was made second lieutenant, and his regiment being ordered to Washington was assigned to the command of Thomas W. Sherman, in charge of the expeditionary corps, for the capture of Hilton Head, S. C., in which he participated, and they afterwards erected the fortifications for the protection of the harbor, then the headquarters of the southern naval station. On account of being attacked with coast fever, he resigned his commission, returned to Indiana, and, on recovering, aided in enlisting and organizing the S1st Indiana Regiment, of which he was commissioned first lieutenant and adjutant. He participated in the battles of Perryville and Stone River. He afterwards assisted in organizing the 13th Indiana Cavalry, and with it participated in the battles of Nashville and Mobile, under command of General Hatch. This command received news of Lee's surrender at Eufaula, Alabama, while on an expedition under General Grierson, and he was detailed as confidential clerk in the adjutant-general's office, for the Northern District of Mississippi, headquarters at Jackson, under General Osterhaus, in which position he served until mustered out in Oct., 1865.

On leaving the army he returned to Harrison Co., Ind., and on account of the murder of his uncle and brother-in-law, Col. John Timberlake, his time was occupied for over two years in charge of his family and estate and the prosecution of his murderer, as well as looking after his own interests which had suffered greatly during the war. In 1870 he removed to Kansas, settling in Cherokee Co., where he has since been engaged in the profession of a teacher and for the last four years has been principal of the Columbus



graded schools. In 1876 he was the Republican candidate for probate judge of Cherokee Co., and after an active, exciting campaign was defeated by a very small majority, owing to a fusion of the Democratic and Greenback parties.

Mr. Timberlake stands among the ablest of the educators of the State. He has made the Columbus schools a model of order and educational advancement. He is a man of fine address, an able speaker and a patriotic citizen." At present date, 1882, Mr. Timberlake is engaged in the real estate business and located at Columbus, Ks.; 3 c.

"Prof. Ephraim Whitman Gurney, who died very quietly on Sunday, (Sept. 12, 1886), after a long and wasting illness, was better known to collegiate circles than to the world at large. Probably no one, except President Eliot, has had so much influence in bringing about the revolution in college discipline and curriculum which has taken place in Harvard College within the last sixteen years. During all that period he has been President Eliot's principal adviser, and his authority on all university matters was increasing steadily in weight all over the country down to his fatal illness, which was, indeed, probably in some degree due to the strain of a prolonged and exciting controversy, over university policy at Harvard, last winter. He was by temperament a strong conservative and this gave additional weight to the influence he exerted on the side, both of the extension of the elective system and of the relaxation of the old college discipline, which have marked President

Eliot's administration. No one was listened to in the faculty meeting with more attention, and the steady increase in the respect for his judgment and character was shown in his election, within a year or two, to a seat in the Corporation of the College, a distinction, if we are not mistaken, not previously bestowed on a professor.

Mr. Gurney was, when President Eliot took office in 1870. Assistant Professor of History, but had made so marked an impression as the friend and adviser of the undergraduates, not more in their studies than in their sports, that at President Eliot's earnest request. he assumed the office of Dean, which covers all the penal side of college discipline, and held it for five years. No man in that place can long retain the popularity acquired in any other, but we believe the parents of many a youth who, during that period, found the straight and narrow way of industry and economy hard to follow in college life, can bear testimony to the consideration, the tenderness, and the wisdom with which the stern duties of the Dean were discharged. No man whose own career had been, as Mr. Gurney's had, one of rigid self-denial and untiring labor, ever had more sympathy and generosity in dealing with the errors and short-comings of wayward youngsters, or knew better how to make words of warning words of hope and encouragement. He resigned the Deanship in 1875, for a two years' tour in Europe with his wife, and in England saw a great deal of nearly every Englishman of intellectual eminence, and left behind him a host of admiring friends. After his return he resumed his professorial duties, first in the chair of Roman Law, and then in that of University Professor of History, which he occupied at the time of his death.

Although possessing great ability as a teacher, the calling for which he trained himself from the time of his entering college, he was really perhaps even better fitted for the life of a scholar and literary man. A scholar he was in the old and best sense. He was never so happy as in the still air of delightful studies. His knowledge of the ancient classics was very thorough and his reading in the fields of philosophy, law, and politics, in French and German, as well as in English, was extraordinarily wide. It was really in the quiet of his library that his mind worked to best advantage. To him all necessity for haste, all noise, or tumult, or controversy, not only was distasteful, but made thinking a difficult and unfruitful process.

His English style was charming, polished, subtle and correct, but lucid and strong. Some specimens of it in the earlier numbers of the *Nation* cannot be read without deep regret that he had not

made literature his pursuit. But his love of perfection and finish was really too great to allow of his ever being a useful or ready contributor to any periodical, and the same devotion to high standards made his editorship of the North American Review for a year or two, after Mr. Lowell and Mr. Norton gave it up, a piece of

somewhat painful drudgery, which he soon relinquished.

Mr. Gurney's life was so retired, in spite of the important part he played in the history of education in this country during the past fifteen years, that even a word of tribute to his private virtues over his grave from sorrowing friends seems like an unwarrantable intrusion on the privacy which he loved. No adequate idea of the pleasures of familiar intercourse with him could be given to any stranger by any eulogy, however full. His almost invincible modesty made it difficult to learn, except under his own roof and beside his own delightful fireside, how sound his judgments were, how full and varied his knowledge was, how much worldly wisdom lay behind his scholarship, and with what feeling and devotion he could enter into the joys and sorrows of all who had any claim on his affection. He is a great loss to Harvard College and to the cause of sound learning, but even a greater to those who knew him well in private life."

Kilborn Whitman⁶ of Pembroke; he was, however, a wayward student, and though quick to learn had not formed habits of study and application: at length, in 1791, he entered Brown University; though at that time it was said that but twenty pounds a year would nearly support a student, still even this amount was lacking, and only by constant work-teaching school during vacation-was he able to carry himself through; he graduated 1795; upon taking his degree he was almost penniless, and in a fit of desperation talked of joining a troop of actors then performing in Providence, but his own better judgment coming to his rescue, he abandoned this project and decided to study law; he first studied for a time with Hon. Benjamin Whitman⁶ of Hanover, brother of Rev. Kilborn, and later with Judge Nahum Mitchell at E. Bridgewater; 1799, was admitted to the bar in Plymouth County, and decided that he would seek his fortunes in Maine; in April of that year he started on horseback for Turner, Me., the point at which he had thought best to settle; he remained here, however, but a few months, and in September moved to New Gloucester; here he remained till 1807, when he moved to Portland and soon built up an extensive practice, and enjoyed the confidence of the community; the appreciation in which Mr. Whitman was held was shown by the efforts of his friends to bring him into politics; 1806, he

was the candidate of the Federal party for Congress, but was defeated by Major Daniel Isley by a few votes; at the next election he was successful and defeated his former opponent by three hundred majority; 1810, the election was a tie and a new election was ordered, in which Mr. Whitman was defeated; he returned to his law practice with pleasure, and though enjoying his public life he greatly disliked the protracted absences from home; 1815-16, he was chosen member of the Executive of Massachusetts; 1816, was again elected to Congress, and re-elected for the two succeeding terms; 1822, the Court of Common Pleas of the State of Maine was established, and the judges consisted of Mr. Whitman as Chief Justice, Samuel E. Smith and David Perham as associate justices; he continued to exercise this office till 1841, when he was appointed Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State, succeeding Chief Justice Weston; 1848, he resigned the office, having been on the bench of the State twenty-six years; space will not permit a review of Judge Whitman's career as a lawyer and judge; as a lawyer he was clear and practical, and presented a case with great force and vet without any rhetorical display; as a judge he presided with calm dignity and impartiality except when attempts were made to practice collusion or fraud, when his latent aversion to shams and deception made itself manifest in a manner not to be mistaken; the death of his wife, after more than fifty-two years of fond companionship and close alliance, was a great blow; he now found his home desolate, and turned with a yearning for his early home; in Oct., 1852, he removed to E. Bridgewater and sought repose and relief among the associations of his early years: in 1832 he published a memoir of the descendants of John Whitman, of which this is in part a continuation, and after his return to Bridgewater he occupied himself with gathering together again the lost threads; unfortunately his papers and memoranda have been lost; he received the

degree of LL.D. from Bowdoin College and from his alma mater, of which institution he was for many years the senior alumnus; he was in many things eccentric but never vicious, and had a strong sense of the humorous; it is related that when teaching school at Marshfield the minister was troubled with a painfully hesitating manner of delivery; at a particular time he was unusually beset with his infirmity over some word, when Mr. Whitman, becoming impatient, called out in an audible whisper, "spell it;" the solemn pause which followed startled the young schoolmaster, and threw him into a confusion which was only relieved by a severe rebuke from the minister; he d. Aug. 1, 1866, aged 90 years, and was buried in Portland, Aug. 4, with testimonials of distinguished respect from the State authorities and entire community; 3 c.

"Obituary.—Naomi Gilbert born in Windsor, Mass., May 10, 1802, and died in Chester, O., July 3, 1884; she was married to Mr. Joel Gilbert, Sept. 25, 1835, he being one of the first settlers in Chester, as also of the first seven members of the Presbyterian church of that place; she was a mother truly, not only to her own children (six in number) but also to the children of her husband's former wives; she was left a widow, March 27, 1852; an only son, upon whom she depended for comfort and support in her declining years, fell at the battle of Chickamauga, Sept. 20, 1863; having been raised by devoted Christian parents, she identified herself with God's children in early life; at last, when all hopes of recovery had fled, her faith in the Redeemer was unshaken; she died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Walter Phelps; during the last hours of her life she was heard to say: 'I shall go away soon-would like to take Flora with me;' now Flora A. Phelps was the granddaughter of Naomi Gilbert and the only child of Walter and Charlotte Phelps, born Jan. 15, 1870, and apparently in good health at the time of her grandma's death, but alas! as soon as she returned from the funeral she commenced to fail; all efforts for her recovery were of no avail, unless it be to the bereaved parents a consolation that all that man could do was done; just one month from the day of grandma's death, Aug. 3, 1884, Flora died in the same room of quick consumption; she was a thoughtful, well-behaved and pious girl; she bowed at the altar for prayers with her parents; in the winter of 1883 joined the Methodist Episcopal Church; she was loving in spirit and though young impressed every one with her Christliness; when dying, she desired to know what she could do for Jesus in heaven; she was beloved by the entire community; so loving a



daughter, and especially an only one, made it very trying for her parents, yet they sorrow not as those who have no hope, but will find grace to help in this, their time of need."

[&]quot;It seems eminently proper that a more extended notice of the life and labors of Rev. Austin Robbins should appear in the Chris-



tian Secretary, for although most of his life-work was done in other States, by birth and in death he was one of us.

He was blessed with pions parents, by whom he was 'trained up in the way he should go.' His mother, especially, was recognized by all who knew her, as a truly godly woman, and to her example, instructions and prayers, under God, the son attributed all that he was as a man and as a Christian. He fondly cherished her memory to the last day of his life.

At the early age of 13 he became a subject of divine grace, and was soon after baptized into the old Thompson church, whose centennial has just been celebrated. From the 'day of his espousal' to the day of his death his course was steadily onward. He was never turned aside by the 'wiles of the devil,' nor by the 'cunning craftiness of men whereby they lie in wait to deceive.' Being 'steadfastly minded' to serve God, he was beloved of Christians and respected by all capable of appreciating his character. The testimony of one who knew him intimately in public and in private is-'that a more sincere, conscientious, devotional man it would be difficult to find;' and yet he was a modest, unassuming man, never laying claim to superiority in any respect. His nearness to God, his sense of the divine greatness and divine goodness, manifestly held in check any tendency to 'vain-glory' that may have lurked in his nature: while his vivid sense of the vileness and ill-desert of sin sent him often, as a penitent, to the mercy-seat for pardon.

Bro. Robbins was licensed to preach the gospel by the church at Thompson, Aug. 2, 1835, but was not ordained until 1842. During these years he preached as opportunity offered; supplied for one entire year at Sutton, Mass., and devoted what time he could, as the head of a dependent family, to preparation for the work of the ministry. In this he was greatly aided by the late Rev. N. Branch, whose public and private instructions he enjoyed, and to whose choice library he had free access.

Of his more public ministerial life the writer is able to give but a meagre outline. He was ordained in Uxbridge, Mass., and continued pastor of the church six years. The next twelve years he spent in Maine, dividing the time as follows: four years in Sanford, one in Biddeford, where he gathered a new church, and about seven in Topsham. The next pastorate was of seven years in Southborough, Mass., from whence he removed to E. Killingly, and was pastor six years. He had the unspeakable privilege of leading many an inquiring sinner to Christ, and of baptizing many a willing convert into the church that he served. From the time of his ordi-

nation to his final resignation of the pastorate, about thirty-one years, he was but three months without a pastoral charge.

He was early married to a Miss Sannders of Rhode Island, and was, as we have seen, the head of a family when he heard the 'effectual call' to the work of the ministry; and like the immortal Carey earned the means to support his family on a shoemaker's beuch. The companion of his youth died in Maine, and he subsequently married a Mrs. Work, an estimable woman who, in this her second widowhood, deeply mourns the loss of one of the kindest of husbands. He has left four children: one by his first wife (who is now a wife), and three young children by the last; all of them at an age when they need a father's as well as a mother's care. The widow is oppressed with the great responsibility that devolves upon her in this direction.

Our brother was the subject of many infirmities for years before his death; and for some four months his sufferings were very great, but they were borne without complaint. His disease was cancer of the stomach, and to avoid more agonizing suffering he took but very little nourishment, though the feeling of hunger was hard to hear. He may be said to have lived upon himself until little more than skin and bones remained. The triumph of grace in his case was wonderful. It was a privilege to spend an hour with him, and witness his resignation, yea, his cheerfulness, and hear him express the 'full assurance of hope' that he enjoyed, and speak of the delightful views he experienced of the coming rest and glory. Bless God for the life and death of dear Bro. Robbins. 'Let me die the death of the righteous, and let my last end be like his.'"

James Briggs of Cummington pronounced the benediction; he remained at Goshen for over thirty years, when his settlement was brought to a close by a long and unpleasant controversy in which personal feeling had probably as much to do as principle; he was accused of holding too liberal views, and a council was called to pass upon his beliefs; after a long session of nearly three days they voted his dismissal, July 15, 1818 (it was before the days of temperance, and among the expenses of the council was a charge for 120 mugs of flip); a man of strong feeling, good talent, studious habits and blameless life, but had many peculiar personal habits, and failed to ingratiate himself in the affections of his people; reserved in manner he probably had imbibed a good deal of the old-time notion that a "minister was something more than a man;" an inhabitant of Goshen relates that he was once sent to the minister with a nice quarter of veal as a present; his only acknowledgment of the gift was-"Well, put it down on that table;" a neighbor's son once came to the house to play with the Whitman boys; he was greeted by the Rev. Doctor with-"Boy, what did you come after?" "Nothing,



Sir," replied the boy; "Well, take nothing and go home;" "I have nothing to put it in" from the boy closed the colloguy and perhaps the boy's respect for the pastor; Mrs. Emmons Putney relates that he was accustomed to preach during the winter in his overcoat and stuff mittens, with a red bandana handkerchief as a covering for his head; despite, however, his peculiarities his ministry was very successful, and about 120 were added to the church during his ministrations; he published some works, those of especial note being—a sermon on the ordination of Levi Lankton; a sermon on the ordination of Moses Hallock; a key to the Bible doctrine of atonement by justification; and an impartial history of the proceeding of the church and people of Goshen in the dismission of their minister; he represented Goshen in the Massachusetts Legislature in 1808, and was always active in town affairs; his children inherited all his peculiarities and his ability to some degree, though in some of them it almost took the form of insanity; it is believed that none of his descendants are now living; he d. 

Danvers, Mass., July 25, 1788, having previously given birth to a still-born child; on her grave-stone is the following inscription:

'This humble stone,

In memory of ELIZABETH WHITMAN,

. Is inscribed by her weeping friends,

To whom she endeared herself by uncommon tenderness and affection;

Endowed with superior genius and acquirements,

She was still more distinguished by humility and benevolence;

Let candor throw a veil over her frailties,

For great was her charity to others;

She sustained the last painful scene far from every friend,

And exhibited an example of calm resignation;

Her departure was on the twenty-fifth day of July, A. D. 1778,

In the 37th year of her age,

And the tears of strangers watered her grave.'

To this town, to avoid the insupportable anguish of witnessing the overwhelming grief of her relatives and friends, her last efforts of vital energy, exhausted by wounded sensibility, had enabled her to flee;" a novel, called "The Coquette, or Memoirs of Eliza Wharton," was written by Mrs. Hannah, wife of Rev. Dr. Foster; published about 1789; the key to the characters of the book is supposed to be: "Eliza Wharton," Miss Elizabeth Whitman; "J. Boyer," Joseph Buckminster; "Mrs. Summer," Mrs. Henry Hills; "Peter Sanford," Hon. Pierrepont Edwards; much of the story had its origin in the fancy of the writer, and some friend of Mrs. Whitman published a reply, entitled "Eliza Wharton Vindicated;" she was engaged to Rev.

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Joseph Howe, Y. C. 1765, who d. Hartford, Aug. (buried Aug. 26), 1775; he taught the Grammar School at Hartford, and assisted her father, boarding in the family; Mr. Charles J. Hoadly, State Librarian, thinks that the "J. Boyer" of the novel was this Joseph Howe; among her papers after her decease was found a fragment, of which the following is a copy, in which is depicted the sorrows of a broken heart:

"Thy presents to some happier lover send, Content thyself to be Lucinda's friend; The soft expression of thy gay design Ill suits the sadness of a heart like mine: A heart like mine forever doomed to prove Each tender woe but not one joy of love. First from my arms a dving lover torn. In early life it was my fate to mourn: A father next, by fate's relentless doom. With heart-felt woe I followed to the tomb: Now all was lost; no friends remained to guide My erring step, or calm life's boisterons tide. Again the admiring youths around me bowed. And one I singled from the sighing crowd: Well skilled he was in every winning art. To warm the fancy, or to touch the heart; Why must my pen the noble praise deny Which virtue, worth and honor should supply? O youth beloved! What pangs my breast has borne To find thee false, ungrateful and forsworn! A shade and darkness o'er my prospect spread The damps of night and death's eternal shades: The scorpion's sting, by disappointment brought, And all the horrors of despairing thought. Sad as they are, I might, perhaps, endure, And bear with patience what admits no cure; But here my bosom is to madness moved-I suffer by the wrongs of him I loved; Oh! had I died by pitying Heaven's decree. Nor proved so black, so base a mind in thee! But vain the wish. My heart was doomed to prove Each torturing pang but not one joy of love. Wouldst thou again fallacious prospects spread. And woo me from the confines of the dead? The pleasing seenes that charmed me once retrace! Gay scenes of rapture and ecstatic bliss! How did my heart embrace the dear deceit! And fondly cherish the deluding cheat! Delusive hope and wishes sadly vain, Unless to sharpen disappointment's pain."

Dec. 8, 1838; he preserved his mental powers to the last, and d. Dec. 25, 1846, aged 86; was the last person buried in the "Old Burying Ground;" 1 c. by 1st m.

"He entered Yale College at the age of 16, where he conscientiously devoted himself to his tasks during the four years' course; after graduating in 1800, actuated perhaps by a desire to see something more of the world, perhaps by the hope of obtaining an independent support, he went to Bermuda, off the coast of So. Carolina, where he filled the position of teacher in a young ladies' seminary, remaining two years, when he was summoned home by the sudden death of his father; some months later, having decided upon the law as his profession, he entered the famous law school, established by Judge Tappan Reeves, at Litchfield, Ct.; here he developed that habit of intense application to study which he retained through life; among the members of his class was John C. Calhoun, and although the two were very unlike in manner and character, they were from their first meeting strongly attracted to each other, and an intimacy sprang up between them that ended only by Mr. Whitman's death; their homes were far apart, and they met but seldom in after life, but the distance was bridged by letters, and time seemed but to cement their friendship; after finishing the course at the law school, he returned to his native town (then one of the most flourishing in the State), where he entered assiduously upon the duties of a village lawyer; he was fond of society, and his great beauty of person, added to his culture, made him a favorite there; he took an active interest in politics as is evinced by his public writings; in 1818 he was appointed assistant judge of the Superior Court; in 1819-1821 was associate judge of the Hartford County Court, and from 1821-1823 was chief judge of the same; in 1821, the confidence felt in his ability was indicated by his selection as one of a committee of three to prepare the revision of the statutes of Connecticut, a work that demanded probity, sound judg-



ment, and an exhaustive knowledge of the technicality of law; his time was constantly occupied; his mind seemed so filled by the grave duties imposed upon him by his profession, that one would imagine he could never descend to anything so frivolous as a flirtation, but it is said that however immersed he may have been in study and business, he found ample time to devote to the fair sex; tradition tells us that 'among his favorite books were woman's looks,' and that he read with equal interest the stories told by black or blue, brown or gray eyes, and sometimes, it is alleged, his wandering fancy was caught, but it was not until the summer of 1820, when he had reached his fortieth year, that he married; his wife, then not quite twenty, was Miss Emily Case of Canton, Ct., a woman not only remarkable for her beauty of person, but for a clear intellect, a noble-spirited and singularly frank character; in 1823 Mr. Whitman was elected by the Democratic party as their representative in Congress, and entered upon his duties at Washington in December of the same year; in his first letter to his wife from that city we learn that from Tuesday morning until Saturday at sunset was consumed in the journey there, with little opportunity for sleep; within a few days after reaching there he met his old companion and chum, Calhoun, then Secretary of War; time, success, and the political honors heaped upon him had not estranged this early friend, nor changed his kindly manner; he greeted Mr. Whitman with all the cordial familiarity which characterized their earlier intimacy, pressing upon him the hospitalities of a delightful home, and placing at his disposal his private coach; in this day of horse cars and stage lines we may not fully estimate the value of this last offer; Washington was at that time a struggling city, with distances appallingly magnificent, with walks and roads famous only for mud, no means of transit except by public carriages, and these few in number, attainable only at exorbitant rates; the Secretary of Legation during Jefferson's



administration says: 'In going to assemblies one had to drive three or four miles within the city bounds, and very often at the risk of an overturn, or being what is termed stalled or stuck in the mud, when one can neither go backward or forward, and either loses one's shoes or one's patience;' Mr. Whitman spent many pleasant hours at Mr. Calhoun's house, meeting there the charming circle of friends that Mr. Calhoun's true southern hospitality and rare conversational talent gathered about him; from one of Mr. Whitman's letters we quote: 'Mr. Calhoun is almost universally considered as the most efficient member of the government;' Mr. Whitman's term at Washington was when, under the administration of Monroe, the country was enjoying several vears of well-earned peace and prosperity, disturbed by no wars nor rumors of wars, and but few political conflicts, so that his days there, instead of being full of thrilling incident, were passed in uneventful quiet; he says: 'The business of Congress sometimes becomes quite tedious, long speeches are made which are heard by very few, and many printed which were intended almost solely for that purpose; I cannot bring myself to make speeches for such purposes, nor without any prospect (as is so often the case) of having any effect upon the question in debate; a good degree of harmony still subsists among the members, though the transactions relating to the nomination of President for a time caused some excitement; it was soon over; I met for a few days some sour looks on account of the part I took in that business, but I have thereby gained more permanent friends than temporary enemies; his course there evinced high integrity; he advocated only such measures as his judgment approved, entirely regardless of the loss or gain of political popularity; in a letter written during his last winter there, referring to the election of Mr. Adams for President, he says: 'I can hardly conceive of a great question that has for so long a time agitated our whole country being settled in a more quiet way than was done last Wed-



nesday; there was no tumult, or harsh expression or looks, among the members, and I have never known so much harmony and good feeling among members of Congress as exists at this time; though all are not satisfied, yet all appear disposed to acquiesce without complaining;' the social life at the capital he very much enjoyed, fully appreciating the friendships formed; in letters he says: 'Parties and society here are very elegant, exceeding in splendor what in Connecticut can hardly be imagined;' of a party given by Mrs. Adams, on the 8th of January (when Mr. Adams was Secretary of State), intended in part for a celebration of Gen. Jackson's victory, he says: 'More than a thousand invitations were given, and nearly as many attended, Gen. Jackson the most conspicuous figure; Mrs. Jackson is of ordinary appearance but attracts much attention;' of Mrs. Adams on that occasion he says: 'Her appearance, the richness and elegance of her dress, surpassed anything of the kind I had ever seen-I think could not be exceeded by any of court ladies of Europe;' speaking of the first dinner he attended at Mr. Calhoun's as a delightful occasion, and by way of comparison to a dinner with the President directly after, he says: 'The entertainment was no finer than at Mr. Calhoun's, except in the table furniture; the knives, forks and spoons at the President's table were of gold;' after returning from Washington he resumed his practice; in a bare little room, undecorated save by an occasional cobweb, and containing the plainest of furniture, he spent every hour at his command, greedily absorbing every thought and fancy of the books with which he surrounded himself; every new study he looked upon as a recreation; no matter how dry the subject it interested him; he plunged into history, Greek and Latin, classics, systems of weights and measures, dramas, novels and poems, ancient and modern; he made of books, not taskmasters but friends and companions, introducing them affectionately to visitors; his daughter amused her children



often by telling them of the novel entertainment he provided for her when she, a girl of eleven, visited him in his sanctum; he spread before her such childish stories as the 'Iliad,' 'King Lear,' 'the Rape of the Lock,' tempting her to read them by the offer of a bunch of raisins; as years rolled by he gradually withdrew from all society save a chosen circle of personal friends, for whom he ever had a hospitable, cordial greeting; silent, thoughtful, taciturn, almost moody, we are bound to say his manner in his later years repelled rather than conciliated, but if a subject was broached that aroused his interest or tempted from him a reply, his keen and subtle insight, his quick appreciation, the ripe scholarship and culture he displayed, converted the indifferent and prejudiced into partisans and admirers; the reserve which seemed to take possession of him as he advanced in life, so unlike his manner in earlier days, was partly the result of disappointment and successive pecuniary misfortunes, and partly from disease which developed in middle life and proved incurable; in this quiet, uneventful manner, uninterrupted save by occasional calls to a neighboring court, and now and then a term in the State Legislature, his days and years passed until, on Nov. 13, 1841, in twenty-four hours after an attack of apoplexy, during which he had not a conscious moment, his life ended;" 6 c.

his final goal was the attainment of a medical degree and the practice of medicine; with this in view he had already, in 1844, entered his name as a student in the office of a physician in Boston, and had shortly afterward matriculated in the Harvard Medical School, where he faithfully attended the courses of lectures; while still a student of medicine, practicing the allied branch of dentistry by the way as a means of support, his attention became fixed upon the anæsthetic properties of sulphuric ether; soon came his announcement of success in its use, and the all-absorbing controversy which ensued of course precluded further medical studies; afterward the honorary degree of M.D. was conferred upon him by the Washington University, Baltimore, Md.; subsequent to his discovery, Dr. Morton's life was largely spent in defending his rights against the pretensions of after-claimants; these pretensions are now happily set at rest by the almost unanimous verdict of the scientific world, which agrees with the six U. S. Congressional reports of the Massachusetts General Hospital, affirming the validity and justice of Dr. Morton's claims as the real discover and inventor; the main points of this report briefly summarized are:

"I. Universal practical Anaesthesia by inhalation began in 1846. Before this date pain in medicine and surgery was inevitable. After this date pain was avoidable—safely, efficiently and consecutively. Thus voluntary escape from pain formed an epoch in the world's history, dating from 1846—an epoch marked by a striking revolution in medicine and by inexpressible relief to the human race. This epoch owed its birth to the revelation made to the world that sulphuric ether, properly managed, would produce complete insensibility to pain. This revelation was made by Dr. W. T. G. Morton of Boston. He issued the new facts. Immediate adoption and practice were a consequence of his announcement. The world's knowledge of the subject came from him. The very word was coined to meet his new facts.

II. After-claimants now arose, none of whom before this date (1846) had made any printed or written claim before scientific societies or the general or medical public of ever having discovered anything in regard to Anæsthesia.

-III. The first after-claimant was Dr. C. T. Jackson of Boston. His claim was that of suggestive science. He claimed to have said: 'Try ether.' The knowledge conveyed in this suggestion was common to text-books, and, further, superfluous to Dr. Morton, who had already been 'trying ether' during many months. Dr. Jackson



himself had never tried ether with a view of annulling pain, nor performed a single experiment. Dr. Jackson then claimed that Dr. Morton had worked under his directions. This statement is disproved by incontrovertible evidence. Neither Jackson's hand, nor influence, assistance or advice was recognized, heard of or suspected by any of the participators in the early decisive test operations, or, indeed, any other operation, first or last.

IV. The second after-claimant was Dr. Wells of Hartford. His claim was that of unrecorded priority. He referred back to 1844, to 'twelve or fifteen' experimental cases of tooth-pulling. His results were variable. There was no sequence to his experiments. In the next year even (1845) there was no such thing as Anæsthesia known or practiced. Dr. Wells' method was insufficient. He himself abandoned it. No one else at the time pursued it. After ether Anæsthesia became world-wide, he made several public failures to produce Anæsthesia by nitrous oxide, particularly in 1847. The secret of nitrous-oxide Anæsthesia was not discovered until 1848, and then not by Dr. Wells, and was not practiced until 1863.

V. The third after-claimant was Dr. C. W. Long of Georgia, a claim also of unrecorded priority, not advanced, indeed, until 1849, but revived with additions in 1877. He referred back to 'five cases of minor surgery,' occurring in 1842-46. Long, on his own admissions, did not produce what to-day is termed Anæsthesia; his 'effects' depended upon the voluntary self-administration of the ether by the patient to himself; his method was insufficient; his results indecisive; and he also distinctly abandoned his use of ether, as being of too 'short duration' for tooth-pulling even, and incapable of maintenance by constant inhalation. His attempts, like Wells, had no sequence. In the mere use of ether by inhalation to allay pain-to a greater extent, even, than he used it-he had already been anticipated by others, notably by William Wright, Esq., surgeon aurist to Queen Charlotte of England, 1829. Dr. Long had absolutely no relation with the event of 1846 which constituted the Anæsthesia known to-day. If, finally, he had really made the discovery in 1842, he deserves the execration rather than the praise of mankind for not having made it public, for he is then responsible for the sum total of human agony endured from 1842 to 1846. It is impossible to believe that, if he had been successful in his five experiments, he would have been cruel enough to have kept his knowledge to himself, or, on the other hand, so unconscions of the value of his success as not to have published his knowledge in some medical journal.



VI. There are also numerous other after-claimants whose claims are not at present especially urged, and not therefore alluded to.

VII. Dr. Morton's contribution to Anasthesia was in itself final; his effort brought all previous knowledge upon the subject to a focus; the past (up to 1846) had brought forth only abortive results; the future has added but detail and substitution. His work, by reason of its extent, its sufficiency and its completeness, now first constituted invention—by reason of its novelty and publicity was a veritable revelation. And he had faith in his convictions and in his results; he had the courage both to speak and to act; what he said, he proved and made public. He demonstrated that ether would produce complete, safe and repeatable insensibility to pain (before unproven by ether or by any agent); that this state was applicable to surgery (before inapplicable), and this he made plain to experts (physicians) and to the world. His labors stand the true test of invention or of discovery—that of a 'consecutive and continuous history' dating from the truth which he made evident. The world uses ether and other anæsthetics to-day, not because Long or Wells or Jackson used them but because Morton used them. Dr. Morton and the beginning of practical Anæsthesia are, therefore, not alone coincident but inseparably related as cause and effect. He is, then, the true inventor and revealer of anæsthetic inhalation—the true 'discoverer of Anæsthesia.'"

He d. N. Y. City, July 15, 1868—his most enduring monument to the world relief from pain; a simple marble shaft erected in Mount Auburn Cemetery by citizens of Boston bears upon its face this inscription:

"W. T. G. Morton.

Inventor and Revealer of Anæsthetic Inhalation.
Before whom in all time Surgery was Agony.
By whom Pain in Surgery was averted and annulled.
Since whom Science has Control of Pain."

March 14, 1866, aged 79; during his boyhood and up to the time of his grandmother's death in 1799, he lived in the family of his grandfather Solomon⁴, at the old Whitman homestead on the main street; soon after this Solomon4 broke up his household, and lived alternately with his two sons, Solomon⁵ and Elnathan⁵; young William then remained with his father and worked and managed the farm; until 1823 he remained at home with his widowed mother; that year he purchased of the estate of Adney Curtis the house at the upper end of the main street; this had been occupied for some years as a hotel, and Mr. and Mrs. Whitman continued the business already established; under their management Whitman's Hotel became widely noted for its good cheer, comfort and cleanliness, and for more than fifty years was carried on under his own and his son's management; he d. Nov. 12, 1876, aged 93 years and 4 months; Mr. Whitman was noted for his great shrewdness of judgment and acuteness of observation, and for an abhorrence of shams of every kind; he was naturally reserved in manner and undemonstrative; in person he was tall, over six feet in height, and possessed an iron constitution, preserving his faculties and unusual vigor to the last; his two sources of amusement were the theater and a rubber



of whist; among the papers he left were some play-bills of a Boston theater, and memoranda of a trip he and his wife made to that city in 1820 for the express purpose of seeing some, at that time, noted English actors; he never lost his interest in whist, and could, even when an old man, out-play many a younger one; the writer recalls with pleasure many an hour thus spent, and with especial vividness one evening of six hours' uninterrupted play, when Mr. Whitman was eighty-eight years of age; 4 c., all b. Farmington.


7590. 1. ANN SOPHIA7, b. Sept. 15, 1816; m. Dec. 1, 1839, Henry, son of Jeffrey Amherst and Mercy (Tracy) Farnam, b. Scipio, N. Y., Nov. 9, 1803; d. New Haven, Oct. 4, 1883, aged nearly 80; the parents of his father and mother emigrated to Orange Co., N. Y., when the latter were children; the parents of his father died in Orange County, while those of his mother removed to Cayuga County, where they died; his father went to Scipio when about 21 years old, immediately after his marriage, and settled upon an uncleared farm; he had eleven children, of whom Henry was the sixth; the subject of this memoir spent his childhood and early youth in laboring upon his father's farm in the summer and attending upon the public schools for the few months of every year in which they were provided; though strong for labor, he was especially interested in books and study; the few books of history and literature which were found in the library and log-houses of the neighborhood he read with the greatest avidity; he delighted especially in mathematics, and by strict studiousness he learned the elements of trigonometry and surveying before he was 16 years of age and the elements of algebra without a text-book; in the spring of 1821 Mr. Farnam was employed as rod man by David Thomas, then chief engineer of the Erie Canal west of Rochester, and after three months became assistant engineer and served until the winter set in, when he taught school; in the spring of 1822 he resumed his post in the field; in 1823 he superintended the location and construction of a canal connecting the Tonawanda and Oak Orehard Creeks; he continued his services till the Eric Canal was finished in the fall of 1824, and taught school again in the winter; in the spring of 1825, arrangements having been made by the Farmington Canal Company for the construction of a canal from New Haven to Northampton, Mr. Farnam was induced to accept a position as



assistant engineer, which position he retained until 1827, when Mr. Hurd resigned and Mr. Farnam took his place as engineer and superintendent; he subsequently finished the canal from the State line to Northampton; his connection with this enterprise brought him into the most intimate relations with the distinguished president of the company, Hon. James Hillhouse; though a young man he soon became to Mr. Hillhouse the strong staff on which he leaned in many dark and trying hours; in 1840 Joseph E. Sheffield became a large proprietor and afterward almost the sole owner of the canal; the canal was maintained under Mr. Farnam's management and direction, and he was brought into the most intimate relations with Mr. Sheffield. which led to mutual esteem and to lasting relations of cordial and faithful friendship; immediately after his marriage he established his residence in New Haven, where he remained till he removed to Chicago; in 1846, in view of the change of affairs produced by the general introduction of railways, it was decided to substitute a railway for the Farmington Canal, and in 1848 the Canal Railway was completed to Plainville; it was subsequently extended to Williamsburg, Mass.; in 1850 the railway was leased to the New York & New Haven Railway Company, and Mr. Farnam resigned the office which he had held from the first as engineer and superintendent; in the autumn of 1850 Mr. Farnam was invited to Chicago by William B. Ogden, Esq., then president of the Chicago & Galena Union Railway, with the purpose, if possible, to induce him to bring his engineering skill as well as his influence with eastern capitalists to the service and advancement of the railway interest in the great Northwest; this interest was at that time in its infancy and was laboring under very serious embarrassments; what was imperatively needed were perfected railway connections with Lake Erie and the East, which would facilitate the ready access of emigrants over these immense tracts of fertile soil and bring eastward the products which their labor was certain to create; then it was that Mr. Farnam and Mr. Sheffield brought every requisite to meet these conditions; they were known at the East as possessing skill and enterprise, peenniary ability and integrity, and they had shown a capacity for prompt and independent action in railway construction which had made them favorably known in the best circles in Wall street; in 1850 Mr. Farnam and Mr. Sheffield were invited to examine the route from Chicago to Rock Island with a view to their undertaking the construction of a railway which should connect Chicago with the Mississippi, following in part the course of the Illinois Canal and River; they were so favorably



impressed as to agree to construct the whole and to furnish the capital, provided a suitable charter could be obtained; while this was pending, Mr. Farnam was solicited by John B. Jarvis, the chief engineer of the Michigan Southern Railway, to superintend the running of the portion of the road so far as it was finished; to this he replied that he should prefer to contract for its completion to Chicago within a year, and would pledge himself to do this and to furnish the capital on certain conditions; the proposal was listened to with some incredulity, but was soon accepted and the pledge was redeemed; in Feb., 1852, a connection by railway had been partially effected between Chicago and Lake Erie, the Michigan Central Railway had been excited to avail itself of the two dormant charters of two projected railways, and in May, 1852, before the year was finished, trains upon both these railways entered Chicago; for the prosperity of this city this event was a new starting point; real estate at once rose rapidly in value and the city increased in business and in population; in June, 1852, a few gentlemen from New York were invited to avail themselves of the newly established railway connections for a visit to Chicago, and were startled by the observation from Mr. Farnam that in two years he hoped to take them by rail to the Mississippi; the promise was more than redeemed; in Feb., 1854, the Chicago & Rock Island Railway was completed, and in June of the same year a party of one thousand invited guests were taken by Messrs. Farnam and Sheffield not only to the Mississippi but four hundred miles up the Mississippi, to St. Paul, Minn.; no sooner had this railway been completed than Mr. Farnam gave his energy and attention to the construction of a railway bridge across the Mississippi; in 1855 the bridge at Rock Island was completed and the "father of waters" was made aware of the presence and triumph of its rival, the unbroken chain of railways which has since been carried across the Missouri and over the Rocky Mountains; in 1853 the Mississippi & Missouri Railway Company was organized, and in 1854 Mr. Farnam and new associates contracted for the construction of a railway across the State of Iowa from Davenport to Council Bluffs; it was completed as far as Iowa City in 1856, also a branch to Washington via Muscatine; Mr. Farnam was elected president of the Rock Island Company in 1854, and held the office till 1863, when he resigned all active connection with railway construction and management; his resignation was accepted with the most flattering and cordial testimonials on the part of the directors; early in 1863 Mr. Farnam took part in the organization of the Union Pacific Railway Company, and was in-



vited to take a prominent share in its management; for reasons most honorable to himself he declined these proffers and adhered to the resolution which he had been slowly forming to withdraw from active business of every kind, and to seek rest and refreshment by a residence with his family in Europe; he returned to witness the triumphant close of that struggle for national existence and unity in which he had taken the liveliest and most passionate interest, and after crossing and re-crossing the ocean twice afterward, he fixed his residence in New Haven in 1868; Mr. Farnam was distinguished by a wise but open-handed liberality: when his means were limited, he was a generous giver to private and public objects; in proportion to their increase he multiplied and enlarged his benefactions; to public objects without number, as school-houses and churches, literary and religious institutions of every grade, he was a willing and liberal benefactor; in 1863 he gave \$30,000 to Yale College to be expended for the erection of an improved dormitory, the first of the kind in this country that was both projected and provided for; to this sum he added \$30,000 more, and in 1870 the building, which bears his name, was completed and ocenpied; scores and hundreds of his acquaintances and friends can testify to his thoughtful and warm-hearted generosity: a very large number of persons who were in his employment have been put in the way of advancement to the highest posts in railway construction and management, and not a few have been directly and indirectly helped by him to affluence; the example which he gave of gentle kindness, of self-sacrificing sympathy, of stern integrity and of warm hearted interest in all that promotes man's welfare for the present life and the future, is valued most highly by those of his friends who knew him the longest and in circumstances that try men severely; 5 e.

The following is from the pen of Ex-Pres. Porter of Yale College: "New Haven buries to-day (Oct. 8, 1883) one of its most conspicuous and honored citizens. It is no exaggeration to say that no man has of late been more generally esteemed and loved than Henry Farnam. The prominent incidents of his life have already been given to the public. It is thought that some notice of his personal character, as it was formed and developed by the circumstances of his life, may not be uninteresting or unprofitable. The writer has had unusual opportunities to know these circumstances, and to estimate their influence in forming a character of unusual strength and attractiveness, as well as of distinguished usefulness and individuality.



If he shall write with more ardor than may seem to comport with the severity of truth, he begs his critics to remember that he writes from an intimacy of personal knowledge which warrants him in speaking with confidence.

Mr. Farnam's birth and early training were in Western New York, before the Erie Canal was finished, and almost before it was projected. He knew much of this region when it was an unbroken forest, more of it when its wheat fields and meadows were filled with stumps and many of its roads were rough and at times impassable, when produce was drawn to Albany and even to many of the nearest mills and market towns at an enormous cost, and when manifold inconveniences as well as hardships were familiar to the daily life even of the most prosperous. But he lived in a community of active-minded and strong-hearted men and women, who recognized duty to God and love to man as controlling springs of action, and who valued education and intelligence as of supreme importance. The variety of the population brought in a certain liberality which was strange to the traditionary New England rigor, and the hope and elasticity peculiar to a new country gave spring and elasticity to the thoughts and feelings even when they led them astray. His education at home was fortunate. His own mother was as remarkable in her way as was the son in his-simple, selfrelying, benevolent and strong-hearted till her death in 1873, at the age of nearly eighty-eight. He was a good student and an enthusiastic lover of mathematics, pure and applied. Early in life it was his good fortune to come under the influence of Mr. David Thomas, the county surveyor. Mr. Thomas was a Quaker and a gentleman of the plain and solid sort, full of love and shrewdness, who taught him mathematics and surveying, and most of all exemplified in his own household the dignity and beauty of a truthful and loving life. Mr. Farnam never wearied in recalling and relating the scenes and conversations which attended his opening youth and manhood, and it was evident that Mr. Thomas occupied a prominent place in his love and memory. Through the influence of Mr. Thomas and Mr. Davis Hurd he was attached to the corps of engineers who laid out and constructed the western portion of Erie Canal, and found in this employment a congenial field for the activities and tastes which determined the destiny of his life. That he was able and faithful was proved by his rapid promotion. That his mind was stimulated by the society and attractions which were incidental to this life was proved by the astonishing familiarity which he acquired with the history of the political parties and the conspicuous men of New



York, in those exciting times of New York polities, all of which he could recite with the utmost accuracy and fullness. Even at that early age he was no idle spectator in political life, but was an ardent thinker and personal actor in public affairs.

In 1825, at the age of twenty-two, he came to Connectient as first assistant engineer in the laying out and construction of the Farmington Canal. In 1827 he became chief engineer, and from that time forward was intrusted with the chief and almost sole responsibility of constructing and managing and repairing the same till 1846, when the railway took its place. This canal was supported by the cooperation of a few citizens who gave cordially of their sympathy but sparingly of their subscriptions. Conspicuous among these friends was the Hon. James Hillhouse, who seems from the first to have won his reverence and his love to an extraordinary degree. The ardent and public-spirited old man not only believed in the success of the canal, but was ready to give to it all his time and his strength. By day and by night, in storm and in sunshine, during summer's heat and winter's cold, he was with his young engineer in the field, encountering all sorts of inconveniences, equally regardless of them all. It is not surprising that laden with political honors and not forgetful of his federal principles, abounding with anecdotes of other men and other times and overflowing with enthusiasm, he should have gained the confidence of such a young man as was Mr. Farnam, and that Mr. Hillhouse should, till the day of his own death, have felt toward and talked of him as an adopted son. There were also other good and eminent men whom Mr. Farnam found in Connecticut, whom he learned to respect and honor. Mr. Hillhouse died in 1832, the staunchest and sturdiest supporter of the canal, leaving Mr. Farnam to bear the load of its responsibility for several years. New Haven was a small city of some 8,000 to 10,000 inhabitants, with a limited back country with by no means the most fertile soil, in imagined if not real competition with Hartford, which was surrounded by a rich agricultural region and commanding the rich valley of the Connecticut. What was more annoying, New Haven itself was discouraged and disunited in respect to the eanal, the responsibility for which was devolved upon Mr. Farnam. How faithfully and patiently he labored, by day and by night, in sunshine and in storm, his most intimate friends only know. How quick he was to meet any summons of duty at any one place, how often he drove in his one-horse wagon from New Haven to Northampton and any place between to meet any sudden exigency, and how often that exigency involved a loss by flood of thousands of dollars,



no one but himself and his family can tell. The end came at last, the poor canal became in small part his property and a source of some income beyond his salary.

These details are recited because they were to exemplify Mr. Farnam's character. During all this period of struggle he was almost alone in labor, in watchfulness, in self-denial and undaunted courage, with a scanty salary and no specially flattering prospects for the future. His habits were frugal and his savings were moderate. He was, however, generous from the first. This fact deserves special attention for the reason that an impression may have been formed that the abundant and willing liberality of his later life began with the large increase of his wealth, and that the generous gifts of his life were simply the casual overflow of a superabundant income. This was by no means true. Long before the Canal Railroad was ever thought of, while Mr. Farnam was painfully traveling between New Haven and Northampton in his onehorse wagon, he had begun to evince that generous and helpful spirit which was so conspicuous in the years that followed. Not a few of the living and the dead could testify that at that period, by his kindly help and his generous confidence, he had aided many to success in the early struggles of their life and set scores of men on the road to affluence. One of the most loving of his friends, who very recently died, was helped to the beginnings of a considerable fortune by Mr. Farnam's generous assistance, which was disposed of largely in benefactions, stimulated, as he said, by Mr. Farnam's example. 'So shines a good deed in a naughty world.'

Mr. Farnam's subsequent career in enterprise and acquisition and liberality need only be referred to. The change in his circumstances made no change in his character, except as his intellect was stimulated by larger enterprises, his respect for great and good men and his detestation of bad men were deepened as his acquaintance with both classes was enlarged, his confidence in his own resources was strengthened, and the confidence of the ablest and best men of the country in his integrity and sagacity was more firmly fixed. the beginning to the end of his career he has been the same selfrelying, modest, affectionate, true-hearted generous man. His career has in many respects been brilliant for its enterprise and its success. Many would say that the circumstances which favored him have been extraordinary, but on a second view of his eareer it will be seen that these circumstances have to a large extent been ereated by his own individual force and goodness. His connection with Mr. Sheffield it is true gave him access to the capitalists of the



country, but his own skill and integrity first won for him the confidence of Mr. Sheffield, and both together, with the experience of each in the railway which was designed to connect New York with Springfield and Boston, were needed to give effect to Mr. Farnam's forecast of what the railway would do for the Prairie States; to give him courage to finish the first link which had so long waited to connect New York with Chicago, and which had waited so long for a master to forge it, then to connect Chicago with the Mississippi, next to finish this railway months before the time agreed upon to the well-deserved profit of the contractors, to set off toward the Pacific, and last, to designate him as one of the parties who should be among the foremost in the first charter of the Union Pacific Railway Company. It is worthy of notice that the reputation for integrity which had contributed so largely to these splendid successes did not suffer in the bright noon of his splendid prosperity. nor during the later years of a life which continued to be successful to the end. That he should be prosperous was a matter of course with his 'troops of friends,' to whom he had lent a helping hand, with his knowledge of markets and of men, and the sagacity which comes from 'old experience,' but his name was never tainted with the suspicion of being a manipulating director who 'slaughtered his own railway in Wall street,' or a 'receiver' who 'wrecked' it for his personal profit. Nothing was more noticeable than the detestation in which he held practices of this sort, and the mixture of simplicity and scorn with which he looked upon manipulations of every kind which deviated from the obvious rules of business sagacity and forecast. Perhaps the most interesting trait of his character was the unconscious combination of the 'prophetic strain' which came from his wise experience and the artless simplicity of the openhearted childhood which he never could outgrow.

His public spirit was a passion. Wherever he lived he became interested at once in the possible improvement in the community, and he made it a matter of personal enthusiasm. When his country was in danger, though eminently a man of peace, he threw himself into the conflict with the fire of excited personal feeling, and felt, as he often said, that he did not desire to live if disunion was to triumph.

We have already adverted to his open handed liberality as begun in his early life and continued to the end. The habit of helping his fellow men was formed in his early business life, as could be shown by many striking examples, and it was so cherished and matured as finally to become to him one of the chief sources of occu-



pation and enjoyment. His gifts during his residence in Chicago. as his wealth increased, were incessant and various and took almost every conceivable form of public and private benefactions, and to the end of his life he continued to send westward his liberal responses to the incessant applications which were made to him. To how many churches and colleges and seminaries he sent his benefactions no one could venture to reckon, nor how quickly he anticipated some of their calls, as in the wise and loving telegraph despatch which he sent before the fire in Chicago was extinguished. It would not be easy to count how many subscriptions of \$5,000 he has given to astonished applicants. His large contributions to Yale College have amounted in one form and another to between \$70,000 and \$80,000. His gift of the drive in the East Rock Park, which is known by his name, was thoroughly characteristic in matter and in manner. He did not care to distinguish himself early by singular or conspicuous generosity to the park for reasons that were obvious and honorable to himself. He was convinced that nothing but time and trial would justify the purchase of the park and the expenditure upon it of any considerable sum. But he intimated more than once that some help would sooner or later come if it was likely to be When the time came his gift was ready. He had expected that \$5,000 would be all that would be required, but when he found that twice that sum would be necessary, he gave the whole with equal cheerfulness, and the progress toward completion, with its evidence of the pleasure and surprise which the use of the drive furnished so many, was a perpetual delight for months before his death.

To his friends and neighbors he abounded in kindness and sympathy. In their joys and sorrows he was a thoughtful, loving friend. His words and acts were kindness itself. To his own household he was tender-hearted and overflowing with sympathy. Nothing hindered the expression of his feelings to those nearest and more remote except the sensitive timidity which was characteristic of the man. Even to his own children his love was too sensitive and delicate to bear expression by words. What was true of his feelings towards man was evidently true of his feelings towards God. These feelings were sensitively cherished in his heart, but that they were cherished most sacredly and uprightly there we have abundant evidence. The language of his heart was—'O my soul, thou hast said unto the Lord, Thou art my Lord. My goodness extendeth not to Thee; but to the saints that are in the earth and the excellent in whom is all my delight.' He loved Christian men



and Christian teachers and devont and humble women, his own mother preëminently. He delighted in the services and teachings of the Christian church, in Christian song and prayer. He was steadfastly interested in Christian missions at home and abroad, contributing largely to the support of both. To his own pastor and to the welfare of the Center Church he was always most loyal and friendly, and never failed to be present in his place as a devout and attentive worshiper. Many reasons from the history of his early life might be given why he did not become a communicant of the church, but that he not only did justly and loved mercy but walked humbly with God those who knew him most intimately believe most firmly.

His last days were days of eminent blessing and peace. The evening of the closing events of his life was singularly happy and complete. From Tuesday till Friday previous he had been in Farmington, where he passed much of his time for the first fourteen years of his residence in Connecticut and where he married his wife. On Saturday he traversed the Farnam Drive to its termination and enjoyed fresh and more than usual gratification at the evidence that it was giving delight to many. On his return he called at the house of his daughter, Mrs. Whitney, to give his blessing to his grandchildren there, then visited his oldest son in his sick chamber, and greeted his children after their recent return from their summer home. After dinner he was solicitous punctually to despatch his accustomed remittances to beloved relatives on their appointed day, and was just prepared to enjoy his evening's quiet when he was summoned to the rest which remaineth for the people of God. After a brief paroxysm he fell into an untroubled sleep, and on Thursday at noon he passed from earth, which is the poorer by the loss of a man whose life was full of blessings and benefits to his kind, leaving to his family and to his friends his loving benedictions and his blessed memory. "Henry Farnam.—An honored citizen, whose physical presence, so gracious in its simple dignity, was itself a benediction—a noble man whom none who knew could fail to love—has passed away. By a kind providence, his closing days were for the most part free from pain. His friends were spared the anguish of seeing him suffer, him whose heart was always tenderly alive with sympathy for others and quick to devise means for their relief. It was the privilege of the writer of these paragraphs to spend with him a portion of the evening previous to the attack of illness which proved



fatal. The same benignity and gentleness, the same unaffected, genial courtesy, which always marked his manner, attended him to the end.

Mr. Farnam was a man of strong understanding. His intelligence was quick and penetrating. He seized on the main points of any question that engaged his attention. Not born to affluence, but obliged in early life to earn his own livelihood, he, nevertheless, availed himself to the full of the means of intellectual improvement within his reach. Passages of good authors, like Cowper, whom he had read in his earlier days, he retained in memory. In an important degree he made himself what he was. His prosperity was his own achievement. It was due to his own manly energy, enterprise, perseverance and uprightness. But he had none of the faults and foibles that are commonly attributed to self-made men. No one could be more unaffectedly modest. A self-respect, never obtrusively manifested, but serving as an effectual shield against aggression, accompanied that uniform consideration and regard for others which were inbred in his character. He honored learning and institutions of learning. He indulged in reminiscences of his own honorable career without the least appearance of self-flattery, and no farther than was natural to a man who was looking back in a season of repose upon the events of a successful and laborious life. His occupations had brought him into close acquaintance with various individuals of uncommon powers of mind, like James Hillhouse. They had known how to value his worth, and he in turn took pleasure in recalling his intercourse with them. For the public men of a former day, especially for Webster, the men whom he had heard and admired, he had an enthusiastic, yet discriminating, admiration.

A large-minded man, Mr. Farnam was marked out for large undertakings. A work like that which he accomplished in conjunction with Mr. Sheffield, of connecting Chicago and the interior cities with the Mississippi by a railway, was congenial not only with the business taste and capacity, but, also, with the generous patriotic sentiments which distinguished him. It need not be said that in all his enterprises he was governed by an integrity that could never be tempted to inflict a wrong. He instantly turned aside from every scheme, however enticing from a pecuniary point of view, the moment he saw in it the least taint of fraud. To enrich himself at the cost of other men or of his country would have given him no sensation of pleasure. He might have added vast sums to his worldly store, and, probably, without incurring serious public reproach, had

the manufacture and the control of t

he been less scrupulous in his judgment as to what strict honesty demands of business men.

Mr. Farnam has stood in this community for years as an example of beneficence. It was unostentations beneficence. It embraced the entire circle of his kinsfolk. But there it did not stop. It extended to public institutions of education and charity, and to families and individuals without number who were in need. His generous gifts flowed out in an almost incessant stream. One of his very last acts was the procuring of drafts to be sent to persons at a distance whom he wished to help. This was on the afternoon just previous to his prostration by illness. But there was no day of his life when death would not have surprised him in the act of doing good to his fellow-men. Giving, in the case of Mr. Farnam, fulfilled its idea. It was not from vanity or for applause. It was not even from the pressure of a sense of duty, although conscience was the regulative principle to which he was habitually loyal. Mr. Farnam was not amenable to the censure which a poet (in the 'Vision of Sir Launfal') attaches to benevolence springing from the constraint of obligation:

> 'He gives nothing but worthless gold Who gives from a sense of duty.'

He gave out of a heart-felt sympathy. Love was the animating The gift seemed to be suffused with the spirit of benevolence from which it emanated. It was 'twice blessed.' It made the giver happy not less than the recipient. The service rendered to a community by a man of this stamp is far from being measured by the particular benefits that result from his various benefactions. As an example to others, as a living illustration of Christian goodness, as inspiring men with a higher conception of what human nature is capable of, as diffusing abroad the joy which arises from a common admiration of a noble and generous soul, the life of such In the bestowal of his charities, a man is of incalculable benefit. as in all his conduct, Mr. Farnam discovered the innate refinement of his nature. He kept himself in the background. He shunned all noise and parade. Very much that he did was done silently, and was known only within the limits of his own household—the bereaved household where that 'good, gray head' will no more be seen.

Mr. Farnam revered God. None who knew him well could fail to discern that religious faith and love were deep and controlling sentiments in his heart. If he said little on these sacred themes it



was because they were sacred. They pertained to the profound experiences which it is more hard for some men than for others to expose to the light. In the familiar verses of Leigh Hunt, the angel had not found the name of Abon Ben Adhem on his list of 'those who love the Lord.' Then

'Abou spoke more low,
But cheerly still; and said—"I pray thee then
Write me as one that loves his fellow-men."
The angel wrote and vanish'd. The next night
It came again, with a great wakening light,
And show'd the names whom love of God had bless'd,
And lo! Ben Adhem's name led all the rest.'

It has not been the design of the writer to delineate the character of Mr. Farnam. That is left to other pens and voices. What is here said is but an imperfect expression of the sincere respect and love of one whose privilege it has been for a series of years to enjoy the friendship of one of the noblest of men.

He has built for himself an enduring monument in his liberal gifts of time and money to East Rock Park; yet more enduring will be the priceless memory of his incessant flow of generosity to all charitable objects, to the deserving poor, and in every direction where mankind could be made happier or better—a peaceful death closing a life conspicuously filled with good works.

The Mayor is directed to extend to Mrs. Farnam in the name of the city the sorrow so universally felt."

a time he had conquered his malady, and with health regained he returned to New Haven in 1867; he chose the practice of medicine for his life work, and was graduated at the Yale Medical School in 1869; soon after his marriage he went abroad to continue his medical studies at London and Edinburgh; in 1871 he returned to New Haven and settled down to medical practice, becoming one of the visiting surgeons at the hospital; the recurrence of his old disease, brought on by exposure to night air when called to attend surgical operations, interrupted his practice, and winter trips to the South, as well as a visit to the waters of Aix-les-Bains in 1877, failed to give him permanent relief; during a stay at Nassau in 1880 his ailment reached a culminating point, broke down his system and brought him near to the point of death; ever since then, save during his trips to Litchfield, where, with his family, he has passed a number of summers, Dr. Farnam has been almost steadily confined to his room; but though trammeled by the disease which chained his body, his mind, his sympathies and his keen interest in out-door affairs never relaxed: he continued to the very last the kind and gracious counselor of family and friends, the tender father and husband and the good citizen, whose works of charity and cheer reached far beyond the narrow bounds of his sick-room; d. Dec. 22, 1886; 7 c.

"A FRIEND'S TRIBUTE.—The life of Dr. Farnam has for the most part been a life of severe and protracted suffering, endured with heroic patience, conquered by strong and steadfast resolution and sweetened by affectionate sympathy. From the age of fifteen he has been visited with acute and insidious suffering which finally broke up his cherished plans and fond expectations for a college education, and constantly limited his ardent interest in the medical profession, in which he subsequently developed an intense enthusiasm. No pains or money were spared for his relief, but he could not escape the heritage of pain which from one year to another claimed him more completely for itself. At last he was bound hand and foot in almost every muscle and joint, in a fixed position for years, such as few men would easily endure for an hour. And yet under all this suffering his mind seemed to be more and more bright. His interest in men and events was more and more fresh and his thoughtful love for his friends more and more tender and affectionate. His wise and tender care for his children was beautiful to observe, and in it was exemplified the truth that unselfish love subdues and transfigures all limitations and can conquer pain and death.



In all this discipline and their successive conquests over pain and disappointment much may be ascribed to a native strength of resolution, an indomitable energy of will, such as make heroes of men and enables men to 'snffer and be strong' by the manliness that is as iron in the blood. Dr. Farnam had much of these by nature, for it was manifest in his boyhood, though coupled with rare affectionateness, gentleness and generosity. But he had more than these natural qualities and more than these were wanting to explain the maturity of his wonderful patience, his calm self-poise, his ever fresh curiosity, his unabated interest in old friends and new, his minute and loving care for wife and children and neighbors, and the friends of his youth, and above all, the serene contemplation of approaching death and the scenes that lie beyond. These experiences can only be accounted for by the Christian faith and hope which were distinet and bright as year after year and month after month recorded the steady and decided progress of his ebbing life, and which ended in that perfect peace which was to him the gentle dawn to the bright morning of the immortal life.

The writer would make no secret of the fact that his relations to Dr. Farnam have been most intimate for nearly thirty years. For several of these years he, Dr. Farnam, was an inmate of his household, and has been intimately known to him as a boy and a man. sweetness of temper and energy of action, his pluck and courage, his tenacity and heroism, his capacity for sympathy and self-sacrifice, have been familiar to his observation. These qualities, interesting as they were, and some of them remarkable in their combination in a youth of so much promise and hope, have been softened and hallowed by years of patient suffering and cheerful unselfishness. With his later history the writer has been equally familiar. It has been his privilege to see him familiarly in the chamber and bed in which he has been imprisoned for years, and to witness the patience and peace and loving sympathy and energy that have been there visibly matured for another life. This pathetic story is fitted to suggest the thought that now and then one of our friends is called to some strange and sad service of limitation and pain, in order to inculcate manifold lessons upon those who look on that we are slow to learn in the heyday of health and success. They lead us to remember that even Christ pleased not Himself. Perhaps those who are called to this service are, after all, more blessed in the influence and effect of their living than those who suffer less. They certainly leave behind them the most tender and loving memories.

Resolved, That his untiring efforts to raise the standard of practice in our Probate Courts and to make this assembly the vehicle of that elevation, merit our unqualified gratitude, and that we will cherish the memory of his endeavors and be guided by his example in these laudable attempts.

Resolved, That we tender to his afflicted widow and relatives our deepest sympathy and share with them in their sorrow and severe bereavement.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to Mrs. Whitman at Farmington, Ct., and a copy placed upon the records of this assembly."



Remarks of Judge White of Hartford: "The office of Judge of Probate in our State is a very humble one, and yet it may be safely affirmed that there is none more important or of more consequence to the people, nor any wherein one may serve his fellow-men or earn more enduring honor. It is peculiarly the people's court. The gates of its temples are always open, and at its bar, men, women and children may bring their cases and manage their own interests mainly without the aid of counsel skilled in the science of law. It is true the judge must not only be the judge of the court but counselor, arbitrator and friend as well. In cases bristling all over with points of controversy, he must set bounds to grasping selfishness, protect the interests of the weak and ignorant, and unaided by counsel in eliminating facts or citing authorities upon points of law, thread his way to find judgment which shall accord with law and as equal and exact justice as between the parties. A Judge of the Probate Court should, considering the peculiar duties he has to perform, possess a good knowledge of the law as applicable to probate proceedings, a quick and intuitive perception of human character and motives, inflexible integrity, a good talent for drudgery and good common sense. Twelve years ago Judge Whitman brought to the discharge of his duties as Judge for the District of Farmington all these good qualifications. He had a judicial mind and a love for the duties of the position. He was dignified and yet exceedingly courteous in his address and bearing, possessed a fine commanding presence, and had decided opinions upon all the politics and other questions which involved the interests of the State or the world. He was a diligent student and rarely accepted an opinion as conclusive until he had carefully examined for himself the authorities bearing upon the question. He was lineally descended from a New England Pilgrim stock, the immigrant ancestor being John Whitman, who bought land in Weymouth, Mass., in 1642, which remained in the Whitman family until 1806. He was deacon of the church at Weymouth, where he died in Nov., 1692, at the age of ninety years. He also possessed certain judicial qualities, for he, with two other townsmen, was appointed to 'end small controversies' in Weymouth, and reappointed to the same office. Rev. Zechariah Whitman, the third son of John, was born in 1644, graduated at Harvard College in 1668, ordained at Hull, Mass., in 1670. Rev. Samuel Whitman, third son of Zechariah, born in 1677, graduated at Harvard College in 1696, taught a grammar school in Salem in 1699, ordained pastor of the First Congregational Church at Farmington, Dec., 1706, fellow of Yale College from



1724 to 1746, died July, 1751. Solomon Whitman, son of Samuel, born April 20, 1710, died Sept., 1803. He was for nine years a representative in the General Assembly from Farmington, and was appointed Judge of Probate when the Farmington District was set off from Hartford in 1769, and held court for the last time, June 2, 1784, when he was succeeded by John, afterwards Gov. Treadwell. He was also Town Clerk and the principal Justice of the Peace during the most of his life. Elnathan Whitman, third son of Solomon, born March, 1746, and died March, 1813. William Whitman, eldest child of Elnathan, born July 11, 1783, and died Nov. 12, 1876. He was a farmer and hotel keeper. With good natural abilities, a retentive memory, and a disposition to acquire a knowledge of men and things, he became well known as a just and upright man, a safe counselor in all business matters, a man who, one of his townsmen informs me, hated a mean thing heartily. Charles Loring Whitman was his second son, born May 26, 1827. He attended school at Hingham, Mass., and at New Haven. In 1842 he entered the store of G. W. Warren & Co., in Boston, where he remained until he arrived at his majority. It was during this period doubtless that he acquired the habits of thorough accuracy and business honor which so conspicuously remained as his habits during life. He followed general business in trade and otherwise until 1852, when he returned to Farmington and there lived until his death. From his honorable ancestry he doubtless inherited many of his most prominent traits of character, but these would have been of little use to him, except for the use he made of them by his constant effort to fill his place in the world honorably and well. How successful he was in this his fellow-townsmen, his colleagues in the Senate of Connecticut, and we who have had the advantage of his counsel, can approvingly speak. He has left no lineal descendant, but he has left the example of a just and upright judge, an honest man, a good neighbor, husband and friend. I know not any higher praise to give him than this, but I could not say less and do justice to my own estimate of his character. I should be glad to speak at length of his service to the State as a legislator, of his service to his townsmen, to the church, and his cheerful cooperation in every good cause for the benefit of the poor or the amelioration of the sorrows and hardships of mankind, but the limitation of time in these assemblies forbids and I leave it to your own recollections of the man to fill out this brief and imperfect sketch."

Remarks of Judge S. T. Holbrook of Norwich: "Mr. President—These resolutions are not merely unmeaning formalities.



We sometimes think, when a man dies, that the utterances of friends are somewhat stilted and fulsome. But it would seem that no one who knew Judge Whitman, even no longer than my own comparatively short acquaintance with him, will say that the resolutions now before the assembly, as far as they go, are not strictly true. They were so intended. The partiality of friendship may appear in these resolutions (which I have drawn at the request of Judge White) and the great esteem I entertained for our deceased member be detected, in the few remarks I desire to make upon his character as it revealed itself to me after an acquaintance of about two years—a short time indeed to learn one's nature—but sufficiently long, methinks, to discover the transparent qualities of his mind and heart. I met him first in our Probate Assembly in Hartford in 1884, and was attracted by his genial manners and his earnest interest in the subjects discussed. He seemed to possess an unusual desire to gain all possible knowledge relating to his office of Judge. I think he attended every meeting of this organization and always participated in the discussion of matters of moment. His remarks were modestly uttered and clothed with great good sense. I am not surprised that the trustees of the Farmington Savings Bank (of which he was a vice-president) should say of him that 'as a Judge of the Probate Court he was to an unusual degree conscientions and efficient.' That he was 'conscientious' I have no doubt: that he endeavored to become more and more 'efficient' we all have had ample proof. His ideal of a Probate Judge was high and he felt it a duty as well as a pleasure to assist and protect the interests of those whose natural guardian had been removed by death. That the people of his district appreciated his ability is evinced by the fact that he was elected to office a number of times when his party was largely in the minority. If one will but turn the pages of the journals of the State Senate for the years 1878 and 1879 he will see in what esteem he was held by that body. He was one of the candidates for president pro tem. and was chairman of several important committees. Judge Whitman was with us at our meeting at the capitol at Hartford last February, and it was there that he had the first attack of the disease which ended his life. He died without descendants. He leaves a widow of whom he always spoke with respect and tenderness. He was the most devoted of husbands. In a touching and beautiful note, Mrs. Whitman says that her late husband and she were always together, and for the last seventeen years of their married life they had been separated but a few hours at a time, not even for one night. Another lady of.



Farmington says: 'Mr. Whitman had endeared himself by his thoughtful kindness and loving attentions to both rich and poor, and everybody in sorrow and trouble found in him a true friend,' and this lady writes in glowing terms when she speaks of him as a Judge of Probate. I would write upon the stone that shall mark his grave the words-'Well done.' Who but a Judge of Probate can tell what these words mean when applied to that office? Who bu' the Judge knows the constant mental and physical strain he is daily subjected to, especially in our larger districts, and the fact that seven out of eight who are doing business in his office are doing business for the first time, are mere novices and rely entirely upon the Judge for guidance in their every step? Who but the Judge knows that more than half of his time is spent in hearing grievances with which he has, by virtue of his office, no concern and in giving gratuitous advice which strictly should come from a lawyer? and how much he is relied upon by the widow and orphan to render them all assistance in his power in all matters pertaining to their welfare and comfort? And what is the reward? That Judge Whitman was admirably adapted to his office I am abundantly assured. That he filled the position to the best of his ability I am equally assured. The reward is, the consolation he must have had in his belief that after his death the people would say-'Well done.'

Judge Whitman died on the 8th of March last (1886). He was buried in Farmington, where he was born and where he spent the most of his life. May he there sleep peacefully through the long, long night until the morning breaks!"

Hartford at the time; at the time of her decease she had been a member of the church sixty-two years, and the earnest, active piety of her youth and of her middle life had ripened 'as a shock of corn;' having an income above her personal and family wants, she gave with a liberal hand to the needy and to public objects of charity; the missionary cause in its various needs shared largely in her benefactions; she was a generous friend of Williams College and liberal in contributions; but the charm of her declining years was her calm, submissive and joyful faith, growing brighter as she neared the eternal world; when reminded that there was 'rest for her in



heaven,' she said—'I rest now,' and there was meaning in the expression; so did she 'rest in the peace of God that passeth all understanding' until the blessedness of earth faded away into the blessedness of heaven;" 2 c

"OBITUARY.—Mrs. Whitman, whose maiden name was Bulkley, was born in Granville, N. Y., in 1806. Sixty-six years ago she removed to Williamstown, Mass., as the wife of Seymour Whitman, a well-known merchant, who conducted a business established long before by his father. The old Whitman homestead, a quaint relie of the past, still stands in the main street, and is remembered, together with the successive generations who have occupied it, by all who have been connected with Williams College or have resided in the town.

The Whitmans were public-spirited people, known for their hospitality, their warm sympathy with all religious and educational movements, and for their steadfast and liberal interest in the College.

Mrs. Whitman was in harmony with the spirit of the family she entered, and not only shared but enlarged it. She was remarkable for her kindness, her sound judgment and her helpfulness. These qualities drew around her a large circle of friends, and caused her



aid and counsel to be much sought. Her large heart and winning manners rendered her home attractive both to her family and to visitors. The village church was her peculiar care, and the pastor always found a warm welcome at her fireside and table. Though suffering much from ill-health, her industry was unwearied, and her interest in books and in public affairs continued almost to the last.

For many years a Tuesday evening prayer meeting was maintained at her house. Many of the old inhabitants and graduates of the College will recall the cosy front room, with its open fire on the hearth, in which these meetings were held.

Her husband died thirty years ago, and since that event she has spent much of her time with her children. The failure of her powers was gradual. Her death was in keeping with her life, and was a beautiful and convincing testimony to the nobility of the objects of the Christian faith.

Her remains were interred in the village cemetery in Williamstown."

"Obituary.—Died at Newington, Nov. 16, after an illness of five days, Mrs. Lucy Collins Brace. In her grave he feels that he has laid down his light and his glory. His purposes are broken and he is desolate. She was the 'crown to her husband' and her children and grandchildren 'rise up and call her blessed.' She had remarkable discernment. She lived for the good of others. In her family she was self-sacrificing and noble-hearted; and she walked up and down among the families of the parish a messenger of mercy. Continually she cried unto God for a blessing on her husband and children and on the people. She was associated in a Bible class, and was an earnest student of the Scriptures. For more than thirty years she was in a Ladies' Association for Missions, which her husband felt to be the spring and soul of their work in the kingdom of Christ. When asked by her husband-'Are you going to leave me? are you going to that Jesus whom we have loved and trusted so long?" she replied by repeating the stanza:

> 'Lord, when I quit this earthly stage, Where shall I fly but to Thy breast? For I have sought no other home, For I have learned no other rest.'

Avery of that place; the stay at Andover was short; in March, 1840, Mr. Morris returned to Colchester and to his old post as principal of Bacon Academy; as a teacher he combined sternness with those qualities which most attract and inspire young minds; a pupil during this period writes: 'How the boys feared and loved him; Mr. Morris had not yet determined on his permanent profession in life; most of his spare hours were devoted to the pursuit of theological studies; at Andover he had taken a number of lectures in theology; he was licensed to preach by the New London County Association, in Sept., 1843; in 1844 he removed to Norwich Town, Conn., where he was principal of the Norwich Town Academy for a short time in 1845; he had now fully determined to devote his life to the ministry; in April, 1846, he was ordained pastor of the Congregational Church in No. Stonington, Conn.; he resigned in 1852, and was installed pastor of the Congregational Church in W. Hartford, Ct.; his long pastorate in W. Hartford came to an end on his resignation, April 27, 1875, since which time he continued to reside in W. Hartford until his death, July 9, 1885; Mr. Morris was twice married; his first wife, by whom he had four children, died in March, 1854; in May, 1855, he was married to Emeline Whitman of W. Hartford; by this marriage he had three children; both before and after his last resignation he was connected officially with several State and County religious and charitable institutions; from 1867 until his death he was a member of the Corporation of Yale College;" she resides W. 



"When but a boy Mr. Hord began the study of law in his father's office; 1849, began the practice of law at Greensburg, Ind.; 1852, was elected prosecutor of that judicial district and served his term; 1862, was elected Attorney-General and a few months later removed to Indianapolis for residence; at the expiration of his term he formed a partnership for the practice of law with Thos. A. Hendricks, which was continued, except during Mr. Hendricks' terms as Governor, until dissolved by death; the firm was changed at various times, so that Mr. Hord was in point of service its oldest member; Mr. Hord was unquestionably one of the most learned lawyers of the State or country; his legal knowledge was thorough, not superficial, and the bulk of the real work of the firm fell to him and Major Hendricks; he worked systematically, being punctual and methodical in his office habits; he never slighted a client's interest, and was never known to undertake the trial of a case unprepared; he was an able advocate, and possessed all the elements that make up a successful lawyer; he was earnest, fearless and honest in all his methods, and no man was ever held in higher respect or esteem by fellow-members of the bar; aside from the Attorney-Generalship, the deceased never sought or held public office; throughout Mr. Hendricks' public



earcer, Mr. Hord enjoyed his confidence to a greater degree, perhaps, than any other Democrat in Indiana; he was, in fact, his first lientenant, and his time and means were constantly at the disposal of the great statesman; he aided in securing for Mr. Hendricks the nominations for Vice-President at both St. Louis and Chicago, and always regarded these as the two proudest acts of his life: Mr. Hord's attainments were not confined to the law; he was a scholar in the full meaning of the term; he was never happier than when at home with his books; his private library was one of the largest and most earefully selected in the State; he found his greatest pleasure in literary pursuits, and was thoroughly posted on current literature; scarcely a day passed that he did not invest in a new volume of some sort; he was a veritable 'bookworm,' and was commonly known as 'the greatest reader in Indianapolis;' socially Mr. Hord was one of the pleasantest companions; a cultured conversationalist, refined in thought and polished in manner, he was naturally sought after by gentlemen; his kindness of heart and generosity were striking traits of his character; he gave liberally to public charity, and was accustomed to contribute to the relief of distress wherever he found it; his purse-strings were constantly loosened to help the deserving; he was also ever ready to lend a helping hand to an ambitious young lawyer, and his friendship in every way was of the sort that counts."
